# Rancher Dies in Cassia Co. Plane Crash

TWIN FALLS • Joseph Edgar Tugaw, a prominent rancher and veterinarian in the Twin Falls area for more than three decades, died Monday evening in a plane crash in Dry Creek Canyon.

An announcement from the Cassia County Sheriff's Office states deputies received information about a plane crash in the Dry Creek Canyon area at about 8:30

They found Tugaw's single engine Savannah ADV fixed-wing plane about 18 miles up the canyon, the announcement states.

"Everyone here is deeply saddened," said Wyatt Prescott, Idaho Cattle Association executive vice president. "He's a legend in the Idaho cattle industry."

Tugaw was elected president of the Idaho Cattle Association in 1995 and in 1999 was inducted into the Southern Idaho Livestock Hall of Fame.

Mott Hill assisted in the search for Tugaw's plane. He said he worked with Tugaw for 20 years, but was also a friend.

# Coming in from the Cold

Twin Falls police hope the passing years will encourage people with information about cold cases to share what they know.

TWIN FALLS • While the passage of time can make a case go colder, it can also lead a once-reticent person to help police solve the unsolvable.

As the years go on, police occasionally revisit people who were previously interviewed in the same case, said Twin Falls Police Staff Sgt. John Wilson.

"Their relationship with the people involved may have changed," he said. "They get to a point in their lives where they say, 'I'm not going to lie anymore?"

As the lead investigator, Wilson has the department's three cold homicide cases assigned to

"There are moms who have children who are dead and they want to know why," Wilson said. There are also daughters.

May 1994, Chouinard's daughter came home from school to find her mother dead, a belt wrapped around her neck.

The person who killed Chouinard was most likely known to her, Wilson said.

"Somebody had to be allowed in," he said.

While police arrested Eddie Aguilar and charged him with Chouinard's murder, the case was thrown out at Aguilar's preliminary hearing. Police said Aguilar dated Chouinard for several months before her death.

According to Staff Sgt. Dan Lewin, prior to being charged, Aguilar allegedly admitted to going to Chouinard's home and said

the two got into a fight before he left. Later, Lewin said, Aguilar told them he returned but Chouinard did not answer the door.

"Those windows need to be filled," Wilson said.

About a year after his release, Aguilar's body was found lying in a Salt Lake City field amid hypodermic syringes.

In 2005, new questions were raised in the case when Christopher C. Chouinard, Leslie Chouinard's husband, was charged with the kidnapping and

rape of two women. Court records indicate Leslie filed for divorce against Christopher a few months

before she died. That year a detective was assigned to look over the case and came to the conclusion that the original suspect, Aguilar, was still the most likely killer.

Aguilar also was among several suspects in the shooting death of Edward Alvarado outside the Pour Haus bar in November 1991 – the coldest of the three unsolved homicides in Twin Falls.

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

# Stocks End Mixed on Weak U.S. **Economic Reports**

**NEW YORK (AP)** • Stocks zigged and zagged after reports that the U.S. economy is weakening at a time when China and Europe are also slowing.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed down 54.90 points at 13,035.94 on Tuesday. Heavy equipment maker Caterpillar was the weakest stock in the Dow average, slipping 3 percent, or \$2.67, to \$82.66. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 1.64 points to 1,404.94.

The Nasdaq index bucked the losing trend, gaining 8.10 points at 3,075.06. A big reason was that the index's biggest stock, Apple, rose \$9.73 to \$674.97 after the company invited reporters to a news event next week at which it is expected to announce the long-awaited iPhone 5.

# Heading to the Top of Idaho

My palms began to sweat as I drove toward the jagged peaks to the east. This was the weekend that was going to test it all. All the way from my new camera and trekking poles to my endurance

and resolve. We jumped out of the car and were greeted by a jovial bunch.

They had just cracked their first beers after reaching Idaho's highest point - Mount Borah and were happy to tell us their tale. "It's basically a scramble all the way to the top," said one man. "It'll take everything you've got to overtake the last 800 feet," said another. I preferred what one 16-year-old told me, "Don't get ahead of yourself, keep one foot in front of the other?

I was surprisingly tired. We hit the sack at around 10 p.m. though I tossed and turned for over an hour once I was there. I woke up at 1 a.m., anxious and alert. I had to concentrate on keeping my heart rate down to get back to sleep. At 3:30 a.m. nearby hikers were getting up and preparing to hit the trail. My eyes were closed but I didn't sleep. At 4:30 a.m it was our turn. I scarfed down half a slice of cold pizza (our stove wouldn't light), turned on my new headlamp and we started up the mountain.

I found hiking under the stars surreal. A dozen or so lights bobbed through the trees behind us. Up we went, climbing 2,000 vertical feet before the sun even rose. A rainbow of haze began creeping up on us and I began making images using the golden light surrounding

We broke the timber line. Loose rock was everywhere as reporter Steve Kadel kept us on a slow and steady pace. We met fellow hikers and grabbed some quotes, took a break and gobbled a granola bar. We took in breathtaking views at 10,000 feet.

The trail disappeared. We were out of options, or so we thought, as we waited for other climbers to reach us. No one wanted to say anything but I was pretty sure this was the beginning of Chicken Out Ridge. Climbers slowly began to trickle up an exposed rock face and we decided to follow. Once we overtook the obstacle, I still didn't see a trail and then I watched a man turn from a hiker to a climber as he dug his hands and feet into a scarred rock and shimmied across.

There was nothing to do but smile, because this, well this was ridiculous. I took a deep breath and I shimmied my tail off. I had already begun my trek along the infamous Chicken Out Ridge as I turned to my fearless leader, the man that had gotten me into this debacle, the guy who had climbed Mount Rainier a year ago. He said with a quiver, "Sorry man, this is too weird for me!"

My quest to the top wasn't over yet. I asked the fellow hikers in front of me if I could tag along and they agreed. I kept telling myself just to focus on the next hand hold, than the next foothold, as I maneuvered over unforgiving jagged rock. One misstep here and my life would forever change.

We were like sheep. Following each others' every move, occasionally asking questions on what the best hold might be. We came to a 15-foot climb down at the end of the ridge. Without spotting each other, this would have been nerveracking but in the end it wasn't all that bad.

It was time to scramble. With Chicken Out Ridge out of the way, we only had 800 feet of loose jagged rock separating us from the top of Idaho. I took a breath, hit play on my workout playlist (because this was going to be a serious workout) and started for my destination. The first 200 feet were reasonable, the next 300 were brutal. The last 200 felt like an all out bare-knuckle boxing match with Ali.

I reached the top of Idaho in around six hours. I immediately started checking off my list of things to do. Photo with the paper, photo of me with the flag, interviews, panoramic video, panoramic still, sign the register, it felt never ending. When I was done it was time to leave. The men I had tagged along with had eaten, drank and been merry and it was time to get off this rock. As I skated down loose rock, I felt like a changed man, this had been a life event for me. I thought of all the people who motivated me to keep stepping, to keep pushing, the most important one was my Uncle Rob. He passed away in June, and this one was for him.

TWIN FALLS • This year's Air Magic Valley Air Show benefited local businesses and the community while leaving plenty of cash for the next event, according to event officials.

Air show director Jim O'Donnell gave a short presentation in front of the Twin Falls City Council on Monday explaining how the event affected the Magic

"This is something we have to do again," he said. "I wouldn't have said that when we were first planning this."

Thanks to thousands of spectators showing up to the air show, which included a U.S. Navy Blue Angels showcase, event officials were left with \$53,000 after expenses. The total cost of the air show came close to \$260,000.

The extra money will be saved for the next event's planning, O'Donnell said.

For every dollar spent on the air show, three more were reinvested into the community, said Dan Olmstead, air show committee member.

"By conservative estimates, the air show had a \$1.2 million to \$1.5 million impact on the community," he said.

Council members praised the event's success and commended the organizers' ability to stay out of the red. The city gave \$65,000 in advanced funding for the project but that has since been paid off, according to expenditure documents.

A July 2008 air show ended about \$50,000 in debt, split between Twin Falls county and city.

"We were initially apprehensive but we supported it," Councilman Jim Munn said Monday of this year's advanced funding. "This is important for our local community."

In other business, council members unanimously voted to award \$84,854 to Heyburn-based Walton Inc. to improve water lines in the city's Block 132.

Council members also agreed to further work on amending a section of city code addressing zoning and subdivision regula-

tions. City officials have been amending sections of Title 10 for years. However, with so many new members on this year's council, Community Development Director Mitch Humble decided to revisit the issue.

He requested more direction from the council on which area to focus.

Mayor Greg Lanting suggested creating a committee that would help get easier items like parking lot sales and xeroscaping out of the way. This would help make more time to finesse pieces of the code to take on subdivision regulations and downtown districts.

"This section of code is where good ideas go to die," said Councilman Chris Talkington. "My suggestion

# Twin Falls County Holds Quiet Budget Hearing

TWIN FALLS • On Tuesday night, the Twin Falls County Commissioners held the first of two public hearings on the proposed \$41.5 million budget for fiscal year 2013.

Though about 25 people showed up to the hearing, only one woman spoke, standing up briefly to thank commissioners for increasing pay for county employees.

The budget includes a 3 percent merit-based raise for county employees, \$4.5 million in reserve funds for county operations to move to the new facility at County West and a 3 percent property tax increase.

County employees will also see changes in their insurance coverage. Most notable: a deductible increase from \$3,000 to \$5,000 starting next year.

Part of the challenge of setting this budget, said Commissioner George Urie,

was the drop in taxable property values. Last year, the county had an estimated \$4.34 billion in taxable market value property, said County Clerk Kristina Glascock. This year, that dropped by an estimated \$168 million.

"That was substantial," Glascock said last week.

Of the budget, \$18.94 million comes from taxes. The rest come from other sources like grants, fees and reserve funds.

# Record West Nile Cases Make World Diseases a Problem for U.S.

ith increasing numbers of mosquitoes in the United States carrying the West Nile and dengue viruses, it's getting a little scary to go

West Nile is poised to break records this year. Almost 1,600 cases have been reported to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention so far, including 66 deaths. The virus has been in the U.S. since 1999, sickening 30,000 altogether; this year the worst outbreak has been centered around Dallas.

West Nile's cousin, dengue, also a sometimes fatal infection, has been in the U.S. since 1980, with outbreaks in Texas, Hawaii and Florida, most recently in 2010.

These are growing public-health problems, but they can also serve as opportunities to pull the U.S. squarely into the global fight against these mosquito-borne viruses.

Identified only in 1937, West Nile is a disease mainly of Africa, the Mideast and parts of Asia. Severe infections lead to brain diseases such as meningitis and encephalitis. Dengue, known as breakbone fever for the muscle and joint pain it causes, can lead to dengue hemorraghic fever and the sometimes fatal dengue shock syndrome. As many as 100 million people are infected worldwide every year.

The two illnesses have come to the U.S. courtesy of climate change and globalization. Rising temperatures promote mosquito reproduction and survival. And infected mosquitoes easily travel via the cross-border exchange of goods. Globe-trotting people, for their part, carry viruses from endemic to nonendemic zones. (Neither dengue nor West Nile spreads directly from person to person, but a mosquito can transmit the viruses from one person to another.)

Health authorities have few good measures to cope with either disease, and are reduced to asking people in vulnerable communities to avoid exposure to mosquitoes by staying indoors in air-conditioned or well-screened quarters, wearing long pants and sleeves in the heat of summer, and using mosquito repellant. They counsel households to eliminate places where mosquitoes lay eggs, notably artificial containers that hold water.

When outbreaks occur, officials apply insecticides on the ground or by air if the affected zone is large. Yet today's formulas don't pack nearly the wallop of those 50 years ago, which contained DDT.

Patients receive acetaminophen for fever and pain, fluids if they are dehydrated and get-well wishes. No vaccines, no cures and no specific medicines exist to prevent or treat dengue or West Nile.

That is not uncommon for illnesses that predominantly affect the developing world. Companies with the know-how to develop such products have generally lacked the profit motive to make the necessary investments, given that sales would be mainly in poor countries.

This failure of the market points to the need for other mechanisms. Thankfully, they exist. The U.S. government invests directly in neglected-disease research, principally through the National Institutes of Health. It also supports nonprofit organizations called product development partnerships that spur innovation and bring products for neglected diseases to market. These groups, were responsible for almost half of the 45 new global health products to treat a range of illnesses registered from 2000 to 2010.

Traditionally, government spending on neglected diseases has been seen as charity or foreign assistance. Now it must become a public-health priority for the sake of Americans, as well. Thanks to efforts of the Dengue Vaccine Initiative, a product development partnership, four experimental dengue vaccines are now undergoing trials. Yet only a few medicines to treat dengue are in the early stages of development. And research to address West Nile virus is embryonic. Funding is needed to study better methods of controlling the types of mosquitoes that spread the two viruses; especially promising is the development of genetically modified bugs that would wipe out their own species or be incapable of carrying disease.

It hasn't quite been five years, but Dickinson estimates there are already between 1,140 and 1,150 students.

"We've grown faster than expected," he said.

Jerome School District: Most students in the Jerome School District were back Tuesday. But at the high school and middle school, only sixth-graders and ninth-graders

Other middle- and high-schoolers return today. Superintendent Dale Layne said enrollment numbers aren't solid yet, but anticipates a 100-plus-student increase over last year.

There are 83 more students in kindergarten through fifth grade and 37 more in middle school.

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

# Fire Nears Idaho County Community; Some Flee

**LEWISTON (AP)** • Firefighters worked to protect homes from a wildfire in remote Idaho County on Tuesday as wind gusts pushed the blaze toward the community of Dixie, which some people have fled under a voluntary evacuation order.

The U.S. Forest Service began asking residents to leave Monday as the McGuire Fire Complex grew near the unincorporated community in north-central Idaho.

Some residents heeded the warning to leave town, but others planned on staying put, said fire incident commander Shawn Pearson.

Firefighters estimated Tuesday the blaze was two miles from the center of Dixie and one mile from the nearest structure, he said.

"They're looking for areas where we can stop or slow down the fire's progression southeast into Dixie," Pearson said. The fire started with a lightning

strike on Aug. 27 and has since spread to more than 24 square

Forest Service spokesman Ted Pettis told the *Lewiston Tribune* that fire crews are "working on structure" and that about 180 firefighters have battled the blaze.

The gusts were expected to shift to the southeast and in a more direct line toward Dixie, which has between 30 and 35 residents and more than 100 cabins that are occupied off and on throughout the year as vacation homes.

# Also Burning

In southern Idaho, the state's three largest wildfires were proving difficult to control.

The Mustang Complex of fires are not contained and have been burning for more than a month

along the Idaho-Montana border, so far covering approximately 377 square miles.

The fires will be difficult to contain without rain or snow, officials said. The community of North Fork is threatened and a community meeting was postponed due to evacuations ordered along portions of Highway 93 late Monday, fire managers

# **Boise's Whitewater** Park Proves Popular

BOISE (AP) • A kayaker paddles into a wave at the new whitewater park on the Boise River, dropping suddenly from sight so that only the top of his bright-red helmet and the flashing blades of his paddle are visible amid the spray.

A few moments later, he pops up and flies through the whitewater, turning gently as he zooms downstream, hits an eddy, and paddles back to do it again.

While Spokane has struggled for years to achieve the vision of a whitewater park in the Spokane River, Boise's opened this summer, and has proven highly popular.

"Ithink it's sweet," declared Mason Shaw, 23, shaking water from his hair after a wave ride that left him shouting, "Wooh!"

The Boise River Park that's now attracting kayakers, surfers and boogie-boarders in throngs didn't just happen. "It was 12 years in the works," said Amy Stahl, Boise city parks spokeswoman. "They're very complicated projects."

The \$3.6 million whitewa-

Esther Simplot Park along the riverfront just downstream, with parking lots and restrooms, and the third will add more in-river features.

"We did a lot of research, probably talked to 15 or 20 others across the country," said Boise city parks Superintendent Tom Governale. "And every one of 'em told us it wasn't so much the boaters, it was the spectators you have to worry about?"


Boise's new park is right along the city's riverfront Greenbelt path and includes an overlook, a line of benches and a natural-looking seating area made of boulders that can accommodate a couple of hundred onlookers.


"It took a long time, be $tween\,the\,fund raising\,and\,the$  design and just getting the political support for it," Governale said. "I really give a lot of credit to the citizens group, the Friends of the Park — they had a lot of perseverance, a lot of dedication."

The previously channelized site targeted for the whitewater park was once an industrial area marked by riverfront slaughterhouses, and an aging irrigation diversion dam had deteriorated and made the river hazardous there.

The first phase of the Boise River Park replaced the Thurman Mill diversion dam with a new one that both efficiently delivers water for irrigation, and also contains two hightech "Waveshaper" mechanisms that can be adjusted daily to create waves.

# Democrats: Romney 'Doesn't Get It'

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) • Democrats ridiculed Republican Mitt Romney as a millionaire candidate for president who "quite simply doesn't get it" and worse on Tuesday, opening night of a national convention aimed at propelling Barack Obama to

economic distress. Obama "knows better than anyone there's more hard work to do" to fix the sputtering economy, said San Anto-

nio Mayor Julian Castro, the

convention keynote speaker, sharing the prime-time spotlight with first lady Michelle

Delegates cheered as a parade of speakers extolled Obama's support for abortion rights and gay marriage, for consumer protections enacted under his signature health care law and for the auto industry bailout he won from Congress in his first year in

"He said he'd take out bin Laden, and with our great SEAL team, he did," declared former Virginia Gov. Tim Kaine in one of several references to the military raid that ended the life of the terrorist mastermind behind the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

The crowd cheered even louder when the subject turned – dismissively – to Romney.

"If Mitt was Santa Claus, he'd fire the reindeer and outsource the elves," former Ohio Gov. Ted Strickland said in a biting speech.

Obama was back home in the White House after a campaign appearance in Virginia earlier in the day. He said he'd be watching on television when his wife spoke.

There was no end to the appeals for donations to his re-election campaign, falling further behind Romney in cash on hand with each passing month. "If you think Barack's the right man for the job, please show your support with a donation of \$5 or more today," the first lady emailed supporters a little more than 90 minutes before her scheduled speech.

Polls made the race for the White House a tight one, almost certain to be decided in a string of eight or 10 battleground states where neither the president nor Romney holds a clear advantage. There was ample evidence of an underperforming economy, from a report that said manufacturing activity declined for a third straight month to a government announcement that the government's debt exceeded \$16

trillion for the first time. Castro was unsparing in criticizing Romney, suggesting the former Massachusetts governor might not even be the driving force on the Republican ticket this fall.

"First they called it 'trickle down,' the supply side," he said of the economic proposals backed by Republicans. "Now it's Romney/Ryan. Or is it Ryan/Romney?"

"Either way, their theory has been tested. It failed. ... Mitt Romney just doesn't get it," Castro said. Romney's running mate is Wisconsin Rep. Paul Ryan.

# Insider Book Details Komen Foundation Rift

NEW YORK (AP) • Criticizing major players on both sides, former Susan G. Komen for the Cure vice president Karen Handel has written a blistering insider's account of the prominent cancer charity's decision to halt grants to Planned Parenthood and its swift retreat in the face of an intense, widespread backlash.

Titled "Planned Bullyhood" and due for publica-

tion on Sept. 11, the book depicts Planned Parenthood as an aggressive, partisan organization that was willing to weaken Komen to further a liberal political agenda. However, Handel also assails Komen's leadership as indecisive, timid and politically naive, and says the hasty decision to backtrack

was "a terrible mistake." Handel was hired by Komen as vice president for public policy in April 2011 after losing a Republican gubernatorial primary in Georgia, and was given the task of figuring out how to disengage Komen from Planned Parenthood. The grants from Komen were for breast-cancer education and screening, but the charity was under pressure from anti-abortion groups to cut ties with Planned Parenthood because it is the nation's leading

provider of abortion.

Late in 2011, Komen made a final decision to halt the grants, which totaled \$680,000 that year. However, the rift did not become public knowledge until Jan. 31, when The Associated Press broke the news.

Reaction was immediate and passionate. Twitter and Facebook were flooded with denunciations of Komen's action.

# 35 Years Later, Voyager 1 Heads for the Stars

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) • Thirty-five years after leaving Earth, Voyager 1 is

reaching for the stars. Sooner or later, the workhorse spacecraft will bid adieu to the solar system and enter a new realm of space – the first time a manmade object will have escaped to the other side.


Perhaps no one on Earth will relish the moment more than 76-year-old Ed Stone, who has toiled on the project from the start.

"We're anxious to get outside and find what's out there," he said.

When NASA's Voyager 1 and Voyager 2 first rocketed out of Earth's grip in 1977, no one knew how long they would live. Now, they are the longest-operating spacecraft in history and the most distant, at billions of miles from Earth but in different directions.

Wednesday marks the 35th anniversary of Voyager 1's launch to Jupiter and Saturn. It is now flitting around the fringes of the solar system, which is enveloped in a giant plasma bubble. This hot and turbulent area is created by a stream of charged particles from the sun.

Outside the bubble is a new frontier in the Milky Way – the space between

# San Antonio Mayor Highlights Opening Night

**CHARLOTTE, N.C.** • San Antonio Mayor Julian Cas-

tro walked onto the stage Tuesday night to share the story of how his grandmother came from Mexico to build a life in the United States, ultimately leading to his time in the spotlight – and Democrats are

Castrocounting on him to energize the party's base and electrify Latino voters of all political persuasions who could be decisive in the

November election. Latinos are to take center stage on opening night of the Democratic National Convention. Not only was Castro the first Latino to give the keynote address, but he would be speaking to the highest number of Latino delegates, 800, at any

presidential convention. Latino voters are being wooed by both Democrats and Republicans to a degree never seen before.

The fastest-growing voter bloc could be the difference in November, as the election will likely be decided in battleground states such as Florida and Colorado that have large Hispanic populations. And Latino delegates in North Carolina are reminding supporters that Obama won the Tar Heel state by a mere 14,000 votes.

Exit polls showed Obama received 26,000 more Latino votes than John McCain, according to the Immigration Policy Institute.

At a Hispanic Caucus meeting, delegate Matty Lazo-Chadderton called on South Carolina Latino delegates to come to Charlotte to help mobilize Latinos in

the state. "We're fired up," said Lazo-Chadderton, a Cary, N.C., delegate originally from Peru. "We're walking the walk. The Hispanic vote is more important than people realize."

Latinos make up just a fraction of North Carolina's 6.4 million registered voters, but their voter registration numbers have doubled in the past four years. Arturo

Vargas, executive director of the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials, said Latinos could decide the state if they vote in a

bloc. "Everyone wants to be asked to the dance," he said. "The key here is that there will be no majority party in this country without participation from Latinos. We're already 16 percent of the population, 9 percent of the voters. It's only going to

increase." In excerpts of his speech released by the campaign earlier Tuesday, Castro criticized Romney for failing to understand the challenges most Americans face and that sometimes they can use a little help.

"Republicans tell us that if the most prosperous among us do even better, that somehow the rest of us will too," he said, according to the prepared speech. "Folks ... we've heard that before."

Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz, chairwoman of the Democratic National Committee, warned Latinos at a Hispanic Caucus meeting this week that a loss for Obama would be devastat ing for Latinos who have benefited from Obama's policies, including a new health care law and deferred deportations for young undocumented immigrants.







# Stoner Voters Targeted in Dutch Election Campaign

THE HAGUE, Netherlands
• With slogans like "Don't let your vote go up in smoke!", owners of the free-wheeling cafes where bags of hashish are sold alongside cups of coffee are mounting a getout-the-stoner-vote campaign ahead of next week's Dutch election.

The campaigners are calling on their sometimes apathetic dope smoking clientele to get out and support political parties that oppose the recently introduced "weed pass" that is intended to rein in the cafes known as coffee shops and close them altogether to foreign tourists.

At a coffee shop in The Hague, a member of staff selling weed wears a T-shirt emblazoned with a modified Uncle Sam style poster calling on smokers to "Vote against the weed pass on Sept. 12." Under the new system, coffee shops become member-only clubs and only Dutch residents can apply for a pass to get in. The cafes are limited to a maximum of 2,000 members.

The online vote2smoke.nl campaign offers cannabis

and marijuana users voting advice by showing which political parties support dumping the "weed pass," which came into force in the southern Netherlands earlier this year and is intended to roll out over the whole country in coming years.

Joep Oomen of the legalize cannabis movement says it is hard to know exactly how big the pot-smoking constituency is, but he estimates it at around half a million people in this nation of 16 million.

Basically the advice to them boils down to this: Voting for any political party on the left is good, and any party on the right is bad.

One champion of the smokers' lobby is Socialist Party leader Emile Roemer, a jovial 50-year-old former teacher whose party is expected to make significant gains at the Sept. 12 election.

Speaking at a campaign event this weekend, Roemer called the weed pass "incredibly stupid" and vowed to scrap it if he wins power.

He said the pass system simply pushes drug dealers onto the streets and out of the controlled environment of the coffee shops — "so stop the wietpas," he said,

using its Dutch name.

Jerome Croonenberg, enjoying a joint at The Hut coffee shop in a side street close to the Dutch parliament building, said he would be voting for Roemer because of his coffee shop policy.

"I will vote to keep coffee shops open so I can keep smoking," he said Tuesday.

The center-left Labor Party, which is surging in preelection polls thanks to strong performances by its leader Diederik Samsom in televised debates, also advocates scrapping the pass and replacing it with legislation that would further enshrine tolerance of marijuana in Dutch law and regulate not only coffee shops but also growers.

However, the coffee shops still have a fight on their hands — the conservative VVD party of outgoing prime minister Mark Rutte is topping polls and looks set to become the biggest single party. It was a VVD-led coalition that introduced the weed pass and it is standing by the policy.

If Rutte winds up negotiating a centrist coalition, all parties would likely be willing to bend or drop their position on the pass in favor of other policy goals.

Coffee shops have long been tolerated in the Netherlands because authorities believe they keep dope smokers away from street dealers of more dangerous and outlawed drugs like cocaine and heroin.

The cafes have become tourist magnets in Amsterdam, but Rutte's government clamped down on them because they are blamed for crime, traffic and parking problems in towns and cities close to the Dutch borders with Germany and Belgium.

In those places, authorities say that many of the clients are foreign drug runners who drive in from neighboring countries to stock up on marijuana.

The VVD's election manifesto underscores the party's support for the weed pass, and other right-leaning parties who back the crackdown on cannabis.

Marc Josemans, who runs

a coffee shop in the southern city of Maastricht and has long fought against the weed pass, says he is attempting to push smokers to the voting booths to support parties that reject the pass.

# UN chief: Both Sides in Syria Violating Rights

**UNITED NATIONS •** U.N. Secretary-General Ban Kimoon accused both the Syrian government and the opposition Tuesday of large-scale human rights violations, including torturing and reportedly executing prisoners and failing to protect civilians fleeing the war-ravaged country in record numbers.

In an address to the U.N. General Assembly, Ban demanded that those responsible for violating international humanitarian and human rights laws be held accountable.

The U.N. chief went before the 193-nation world body to report on an intensifying conflict that he said has taken "a particularly brutal turn." He warned that "the entire region is being engulfed by the complex dynamics of the conflict."

Activists say the civil war has claimed between 23,000 and 26,000 lives.

The U.N. refugee agency said Tuesday that more than 100,000 Syrians fled their country in August, the highest monthly total since the crisis began in March 2011. A total of 234,368 Syrians have fled to neighboring countries in the past 17 months, the agency said.

Ban said more than 2.5 million people inside Syria need assistance, along with those who have fled to Turkey, Jordan, Lebanon and Iraq. He urged donors to come forward, saying the

U.N. appeal for \$180 million is only half-funded.

The U.N. chief accused Syrian forces of indiscriminately shelling densely populated areas with heavy weapons, tanks and military aircraft and urged both sides — but especially President Bashar Assad's government — to end the fighting.

ians are bearing the brunt of the violence, saying even people in bread lines have been attacked. "Prisoners on both sides

"Prisoners on both sides are subject to harsh treatment and, often, torture," he said. "There have been alarming reports of summary executions on both sides."

He added, "government forces and the armed opposition have clearly failed to protect civilians and respect the rules of international humanitarian law."

The U.N. chief urged the world to unite behind a plan to end the conflict.

Missing in all international initiatives so far, Ban said, "is a unity of effort that will have an impact on the ground."

"How many more will be killed and wounded, their lives shattered, before president Assad and his advisers are persuaded to change course?" Ban asked. "How can we convince armed groups that a better future lies not in fighting, but in building the foundations of a new political and social contract that guarantees freedom and justice?"

# Former NC Congressman Charlie Rose dies at age 73 BY EMERY P. DALESIO Rose, a Democrat, spent

RALEIGH, N.C. • Former U.S. Rep. Charlie Rose, a savvy political player who used his seat on the House Agriculture Committee to help tobacco farmers, has died. He was 73.

Stacye Hefner, the wife of the former congressman, said Tuesday that he died of Parkinson's disease at a hospital near their northern Alabama home. She said Rose was diagnosed with the degenerative brain disorder last year. 24 years in Washington representing the 7th Congressional District, which included his hometown of Fayetteville. The attorney and former prosecutor became a powerful lawmaker in Congress and used his Agriculture Committee seat to back the interests of farmers, especially tobacco growers back home.

He also chaired the House Administration Committee in the early 1990s. Rose retired in 1996 and

# Ketchum Restaurant Turns Up the **Wow Factor**

**KETCHUM** • Digging into John Beriker's Lobster and Avocado Bomb is an afterthought.

First you have to admire the creative way in which the avocado is sliced and stuffed and topped with crispy wonton chips. Then you have to size up the bright colors that Beriker has so carefully selected. Finally, you have to applaud the way the swirl of sweet chili sauce contrasts with the fiery red borders of the hand-crafted plate on which it is

Then, and only then, do you get to bite into the dish, detonating a wave of flavors over your tongue as you savor the healthy fresh ingredients that Beriker has assembled.

"I strive for the 'Wow' factor I hear guests exclaim when they're tasting the cuisine," said Beriker.

Beriker and his brother Timur Beriker recently opened B. Restaurant and Bar in the 60-year-old brick building that formerly housed the Roosevelt Grille owned by Elevation 486 Restaurateur Tom Nickel.

The first thing they did was to throw out the curtains in the Main Street Ketchum restaurant and lighten the place up in keeping with the white linen tablecloth service they introduced.

Then John Beriker went to work creating a long list of dinner items culled from an award-winning career as chef in such venues as Singapore, Sydney, Australia and the Inn at Rancho Santa Fe in San Diego.

His menu - a fusion of French, Asian and California tastes — features such dishes as oven roasted halibut with corn, leeks and asparagus served with seafood ravioli and a sundried tomato cream sauce; tandoori prawns with Indian-scented basmati rice and mango chutney in a red bell pepper sauce with a light coconut cream, and a roasted rack of lamb in an herb crust with polenta,

ratatouille and garlic in a mint sauce. "His dishes are exotic-everything from comfort to exotic, safe to daring," said Joanne Zwingenberg, a 30-

plus-year resident of Ketchum. They're also artfully prepared, with Beriker turning even Warm Chocolate Flourless Lava Cake into a piece of art.

cup filled with raspberry vinaigrette or ranch.

The whistle of a passing train nearly drowns out the order of a tall man wearing a cornflower blue T-shirt as Black takes his order at the register.

Mo Black, her husband Shane and Wilson first purchased the location on the corner of Blue Lakes Boulevard and Kimberly Road a year and a half ago. Black and Wilson said they were told by many they were crazy.

The building used to be a gas station and lawn mower repair shop and required a lot of clean up to be made into a coffee shop and deli. But Black and Wilson said they loved the location.

"We held our breaths, but now we feel comfortable," Wilson said.

Natural light floods the room from six-pane windows, some painted different colors - red, blue, burnt orange, chartreuse like stained glass. The afternoon sunshine warms the cream and yellow walls, enticing you to take a seat at one of the tables and order the latte of the day -Smores - for \$2. In spring and fall the shop often opens the garage doors to allow customers to dine al

If you don't want to sit and dine, you can always order take-out or pull up to the window on the side and order without getting out of your car. And if you really don't feel like leaving

home or the office, they also deliver for online or telephone orders.

When they came up with the idea to open a restaurant, Black and Wilson said, they said they didn't want to join the chain stores that sit along Blue Lakes and instead opted for a side of town with more history.

On Saturday mornings the

shop often gets large groups of runners looking for food after their workout. They are greeted with batches of homemade oatmeal, biscuits stuffed with sausage and cheese or spinach and cheese, and parfaits. But always with the hungry man or woman in mind - Wilson and Black serve up a plate of biscuits smothered in gravy.

They like to use fresh and local produce. Sometimes the produce is so local it grows right outside. Butternut squash, chocolate cherry tomatoes and peppers grow in small swatch of soil surrounded by gravel, next to a neighboring auto repair shop. Vegetables growing in friends' and families' gardens are also chopped up.

The next day's special is pulled pork with homemade barbeque sauce and coleslaw, so Katelyn Jorgensen, one of the deli's three workers, shreds chunks of cabbage in a food processor. Then she slices carrots, two at a time, placing the bright orange medallions on top of the heap of slaw.

In a month or so, the garage doors will open once again, letting in crisp fall air to mix with the sweet smell of Butternut squash soup wafting from the kitchen.

from your eyes down to the mouth with the flavors. I strive for a dish that's simple, yet a work of beauty."

The Beriker Brothers were seemingly destined for this restaurant.

Their father - Swissborn Kerman Beriker — has managed luxury hotels and resorts in Europe, Canada, Mexico and the Caribbean, including the Mansion at Turtle Creek in Dallas and the Four Seasons in Toron-

The boys lived above Michael Jackson when the pop star stayed at the Bel Air Hotel and they watched a parade of kings and queens and movie stars pass through the Beverly Hills Hotel, which earned its first five-star ratings when their father managed

John Beriker began helping out a French chef in the kitchen of the Rosewood Crescent Hotel in Dallas when he was 12.

"He was a tough cookie," he recalled. "If you messed up, you'd find yourself having a one-on-one in the refrigerator. But I realized that's what I wanted to do with my life. I want to make people happy, have good experiences?

After online training in several five-star restaurants, Beriker found himself at Wolfgang Puck's side at Spago in Beverly Hills. There he learned to cook for 650 people every night – and make the food taste good. And he won the admiration of his boss, who called him "one of the world's leading chefs with extraordinary ability and brilliant talent."

But, wanting his own thing, he went on to become executive chef at Raffles in Singapore where he was named Best Chef in Singapore by the Ministry of Tourism.

"I landed in that country with two suitcases in my hands and \$800 in my pocket. But the food there inspired me," he recalled.

Eventually, Beriker moved on to the Four Seasons Hotel in Hamburg, Germany, where he was named Best New Chef of the Year by Gault & Millau. He then went to the Merchant Court Hotel in Sydney and Auberg Dab in

Bangkok before joining his father at The Inn at Rancho Santa Fe.

There, he penned "The Inn at Rancho Santa Fe Cookbook," which features such recipes as Crab Tower with Cilantro Coulis, Organic Cucumber Martini, Japanese Pumpkin Soup, Chocolate Won Tons and Veal Loin with Red Currant Sauce. The book is available for \$29.95 at Amazon.com and the restau-

He struck out for Sun Valley after his father retired in April. And he's set his touch in his new restaurant, opening up the kitchen so it looks out onto the dining room and adding row upon row of colorful sauces and fresh fruits and seasonings for himself and his assistants to dip into.

Many of the guests who have eaten there in its first month of operation still remember eating John's grilled chopped vegetable salad at Rustica, which the Beriker brothers ran for five years in Beverly Hills, said Timur Beriker.

"Having lived here for 15 years I know what people want - an international menu with food for everyone," Timur Beriker added. "Usually, you have to choose between eating at a Mexican restaurant or a Chinese restaurant. But we have something of everything, and our kids menu is as big as the adult."

John Beriker says the B. Restaurant and Bar, named for the family surname, is quite small compared with the two hotels, restaurants and deli he's opened.

"But it's mine," John said. "My goal here is to make people happy by offering something new, authentic and different from anywhere else."

# Dinner in 35 Minutes: **Stuffed Tomatoes**

You'll want to choose large, firm tomatoes for this preparation, because they need to yield enough chopped flesh to add to the filling and because they will serve as edible vessels for the eggs. The stuffed tomatoes are seated on pita or flatbread because: It's a good way to use up those slightly stale pieces; the bread base helps keep the tomatoes upright, and it absorbs some of the tomato goodness; baking intensifies the tomato flavor.

A finishing touch of the earthy Middle Eastern spice blend za'atar makes the dish. You can find it at some larger grocery stores, in addition to Middle Eastern markets.

Serve with a fruit salad. Adapted from a recipe in "The New Middle Eastern Vegetarian: Modern Recipes From Veggiestan," by Sally Butcher (Interlink, 2012).

# Cheese-Baked Egg-Stuffed **Tomatoes**

2 or 3 servings.

3 whole-wheat pitas or 1 large flatbread 2 or 3 large tomatoes 2 medium cloves garlic 1 small onion 1 tablespoon olive oil

Leaves from 2 sprigs marjoram 1/2 teaspoon ground turmeric 2 or 3 large eggs

Kosher salt Freshly ground black pepper 3 1/2 ounces freshly grated hard cheese, such as pecorino Romano

1 teaspoon dried za'atar (may substitute sweet paprika)

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Use nonstick cooking oil spray to grease the inside of a medium baking dish.

Toast the pita bread, or cut the flatbread into pieces that will fit in the toaster, then

Core the tomatoes. Cut the tops (about one-third) off the tomatoes, then coarsely chop the tops and place in a bowl. Use a melon baller or grapefruit spoon to scoop out the insides of the tomatoes, adding them to the bowl. Mince the garlic. Coarsely chop the onion to yield about 3/4 cup. Heat the oil in a small skillet over medium heat. Add the onion and cook for 6 to 8 minutes, stirring occasionally, until the onion becomes translucent. Stir in the garlic, marjoram and turmeric, then add the chopped tomato and bits, stirring to incorporate.

Arrange the toasted pita or flatbread pieces so they cover the baking dish in a single layer. Divide most of the oniontomato mixture between each tomato shell, then spread the rest on the toasted bread in the baking dish. Nestle the tomatoes on the bread, then crack an egg over each tomato, letting it fall on top of the onion-tomato mixture. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Sprinkle with the cheese and za'atar.

Bake for 15 minutes or just until the eggs have set and the cheese has melted. Transfer the bread and tomatoes to individual plates; serve right away.

"That wasn't bad at all. Not bitter and no bad aftertaste," Koch said. "I like that."

Koch was familiar with Von Scheidt's beers — they've been brewing since 2009 and looks forward to the tap room opening.

The brewery operated a restaurant, which closed last summer, that Koch frequented. The tap room will be located in the same 1,500-squarefoot space as the restaurant, while brewing takes place in a 1,500-square-foot processing space at the same site. "I worked next door so we'd

stop in for lunch, have a burger and beer," Koch said, adding that the tap room would be a good way to try the craft brewery's new blends.

Tap rooms are part of "the brewery microculture" and Scheidt said he will develop three new varieties for his opening, but those haven't yet been determined.

"I was a lousy restaurant manager, but this will allow me to focus on the brewing while giving customers a chance to visit the brewery and try our beers and see what we are about," Scheidt said. "We also plan on hosting special events once a month or so comedians, musicians or even special guest speakers."

The tap room will open one day a week and feature Scheidt's creations on tap, as well as cases for sale. Customers will also be able to purchase or refill kegs and growlers (halfgallon containers).

Capps said customers have been great about feedback and the brewery takes positive and negative comments to heart.

"We are small enough that we can pinpoint sluggish sales down to the batch. We find the inconsistency and fix it, although that doesn't happen very often," he said. "We've been lucky to perfect our brews with unwavering community support and look forward to the future. We're going to grow and Twin Falls has been a big part of that."

Capps said the tap room doesn't require any additional permits beyond what the brewery already maintains. It renewed its city-issued retail alcohol sales permit last month, he said.

An opening date and hours of operation for the tap room have yet to be scheduled.

# A Simple Grilled Tuna Steak with Big, Bold Flavors

Summer makes us long for the grill. But by the end of the season, even our favorite burgers and dogs can feel a bit

speedy grilled tuna dish that packs tons of big, bold flavors. For our recipe, we used tuna steaks, which are thick, meaty pieces cut from the fish in the opposite direction than a fillet. You also could use salmon steaks, which often include the bone (which helps the flesh hold together on the grill). Swordfish also would work in this recipe.

# Grilled Tuna Steaks with Mango Herb Salsa

Start to finish: 20 minutes. Servings: 4.

1/2 cup packed fresh parsley leaves 1/4 cup packed fresh oregano leaves 1/4 cup fresh mint leaves 3 tablespoons olive oil, divided 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar 2 cloves garlic

1/2 teaspoon red pepper flakes Zest and juice of 1 lemon 2 mangos, peeled, pitted and diced Salt and ground black pepper Four 6-ounce tuna steaks

Heat the grill to high.

In a food processor, combine the parsley, oregano, mint, 2 tablespoons of the olive oil, the red wine vinegar, garlic, red pepper flakes, and the lemon zest and juice. Process until well chopped, scraping down the bowl as needed. Add the mango and pulse once or twice to combine and lightly chop. Season with salt and pepper, then set aside.

Rub the tuna steaks on all sides with the remaining 1 tablespoon olive oil, then season them with salt and pepper. Grill the steaks for 2 to 3 minutes per side for medium-rare. Serve topped with the salsa. # Nori: What It Is and How to Use It

If you've ever had a California roll, you've had nori.

Now it's time to learn what else you can do with this ubiquitous, yet always overlooked paper-like ingredient made from seaweed.

Nori – also called laver is a somewhat generic name for a variety of seaweeds cultivated for use mostly in Japanese cooking. I say mostly because the same varieties are added to oatmeal in Ireland. But Americans know nori best as the paperthin black-green wrapping used in sushi.

It is produced by washing and chopping fresh seaweed to create a slurry. That mixture then is spread thin, dried, cut into sheets and lightly toasted. The result is a crunchy, dark paper with just a hint of ocean flavor.

In Japan, nori has a life beyond the sushi bar. It is consumed for breakfast with fish and rice, eaten as a snack dunked in soy sauce and used to wrap balls of rice. In recent years, the snack approach has begun to catch on in the U.S. Nori now is sold in small potato chip-like strips, often seasoned with sea salt, wasabi, even chipotle pepper.

Most grocers sell packages of 10-inch sheets of nori, usually near the sushi or in the international aisle. It also is used in Japanese snack cracker mixes.

Nori sheets usually are sold pre-toasted; use them as is for sushi. But when using the nori in other ways, toasting it briefly can improve the flavor and texture. To do this, simply use tongs to hold the sheets one at a time over a lit burner (or candle if you have an electric stove). About 10 to 15 seconds will suffice.

Start to finish: 20 minutes. Servings: 2.

2 sheets nori

half of the egg. Sprinkle the cheese over the vegetables. Use a spatula to carefully lift the other half of the omelet and gently flip it over onto the fillings. Cover the pan and cook for another 6 to 7 minutes.

# Bittman: Dark and Leafy Suddenly Hip and Trendy

Not so long ago, the admonishment to "Eat your greens!" generally focused on lettuce, maybe spinach. And that's about as adventurous as it got.

Today, it's hard to flip through food magazines or watch television shows without seeing someone sauteing chard, roasting kale, wilting mustard greens or swooning over watercress. You even can get collards and kale washed, chopped and bagged at big box stores and niche grocers.

It's a change for the better, says New York Times' food and opinion columnist Mark Bittman. And it's happening because more people are listening to messages about what is good for them to eat.

"That is a big change. All the talk about these things has had some kind of impact and that's a great thing," he says. "They're being sold because there's noise being made about them and there's noise because they're good things for us to be eating," he says. "And some people are listening."

Greens were one of Bittman's early obsessions as a gardener. Today, they still feature prominently in his recipes and in his overall approach to food. In fact, he just reissued his 1995 book, "Leafy Greens" (Wiley, 2012).

Several years ago, Bittman began including more plants and fewer animal products in his diet. The result? He dropped more than 30 pounds, published the responsible eating manifesto "Food Matters," and began writing about food policy and its impact on our health. Today, his fresh, unfussy recipes share space with columns that advocate a healthful, environmentally friendly plant-heavy

Most Americans fall somewhere on a spectrum that runs from pure vegans who eschew all animal products to folks who live Morgan Spurlock's famous 30-day fastfood-only diet.

"For better personal and planetary health, the idea is for all of us to move away from the Morgan Spurlock end toward the vegan end," says Bittman, whose next book, "VB6: Eat Vegan Before 6:00" (due out March 2013), encourages people to eat vegan for the first two meals of the day. "I don't think that means we have to become vegans. But I do think we need to move toward eating a greater portion of plants."

But Bittman thinks real change needs to come at the political rather than personal level. He urges the revamping of the government subsidies that supports commodity crops, a system many say artificially lowers the cost of many of the unhealthiest processed foods. He also favors regulations that discourage eating junk food, such as New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg's proposal to ban from city restaurants sodas and sugary drinks larger than 16 ounces.

"In 50 years, I won't be alive, but people who are will say, 'Ha, ha! Remember when you could buy soda for a dollar anywhere you wanted?"" he says. "That's not going to be the case?"

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

# Spinach Gnocchi

Spinach not your style? Bittman says chard and beet greens (leaves only for both) can be substituted. Start to finish: 60 minutes. Servings: 4 small (suitable for lunch or an appetizer).

10 ounces fresh spinach, tough stems removed 3 or 4 medium potatoes Salt and ground black pepper, to taste

Dash or tiny grating of nutmeg, about 1/16 teaspoon 1 cup all-purpose flour, approximately About 1 cup any light

tomato sauce Freshly grated Parmesan

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Set a bowl of ice water nearby.

When the water boils, add the spinach and cook until it wilts and the stems become tender, 30 seconds to 2 minutes. Use a slotted spoon or strainer to transfer the spinach to the bowl of ice water (leave the pan of water at a boil). Once the spinach has cooled, lift

it from the water, squeeze out any excess moisture, then chop very finely. Wash the potatoes. Using the same water the spinach was cooked in, cook the potatoes until tender but not mushy, 30 to 40 minutes. Transfer the potatoes to a large bowl (leave the pan of water at a boil, adding more water if needed).

Mash the potatoes or put them through a food mill, then combine them with the spinach, salt, pepper and nutmeg. Add the flour a bit at a time, kneading with your hands, until the mixture is no longer extremely sticky (the amount of flour you add will depend on the potatoes). Not enough flour will make

much will rob them of flavor. Once they stop sticking, add a little more flour and do a test run, then add more flour if necessary. Form the gnocchi, by hand, into inch-long oval shapes. Cook the gnocchi about 6 at a time, lowering them into the water and removing them with a slotted spoon when they rise to the top, 2 to 3 minutes. Place the cooked gnocchi in a warm, shallow bowl and keep warm. When all the gnocchi are cooked, top them with tomato sauce and cheese, then serve. 3 cloves garlic 1/4 cup honey 2 tablespoons red curry

11/2 to 2 pounds pork tenderloin Kosher salt Freshly ground black pepper

Mince the garlic and place in medium bowl. Stir in the honey, red curry paste, tamari or soy sauce and 2 tablespoons of the oil.


Trim and discard any visible fat and silver skin from the pork.

Cut the pork tenderloin crosswise into 1 1/2-to-2inch-thick sections (a total of about 12). Place a slice on one piece of plastic wrap and cover with the second piece. Use a meat pounder to create a cutlet that's 1/4-to-1/2inch thick, then place it on a plate. Repeat with the remaining pork. Season each piece on both sides with a light sprinkling of salt and pepper. Place a wire rack over a rimmed baking sheet.

Heat a tablespoon of the oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium-high heat until the oil shimmers. Add three or four cutlets and cook for about 2 minutes on each side, until lightly browned but not quite cooked through (they will be a little springy when gently pressed with a finger). Transfer to the rack and cover loosely with aluminum foil to keep warm. Repeat with the remaining pork, adding up to another tablespoon of oil to the skillet as need-

When all of the pork is cooked, add the garliccurry paste mixture to the (empty) skillet. Bring it to a boil and cook for 1 or 2 minutes to form a glaze, then return the cutlets to the skillet, turning them to coat evenly. Once they are glazed and heated through, divide them among individual plates, spooning any glaze over the meat. Serve right

Green Bay earned five first-place votes from a panel of 12 media members who regularly cover the league, and had 373 points overall to edge New England and the defending Super Bowl champion New York Giants. The Patriots got two first-place votes and 367 points, while the Giants were No. 1 on five ballots and totaled 363 points.

"I've seen enough improvement from the defense in preseason to keep the Packers at the top," said 2002 NFL MVP Rich Gannon of CBS Sports and SiriusXM NFL Radio.

Added Dan Pompei of the Chicago Tribune: "The addition of Cedric Benson could give the Packers a dimension they lacked."

# Rays Down Struggling Yankees 5-2, AL East Tied

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# KENSETH MAKES MOVE TO JOE GIBBS RACING OFFICIAL

ASSOCIATED PRESS

HUNTERSVILLE, N.C. • Matt Kenseth opened this season with a second victory in the Daytona 500, and it didn't take him long to establish himself as a legitimate championship contender.

But before the midpoint of the season, Kenseth had decided he no longer wanted to drive for Roush Fenway Racing. On Tuesday, nearly two months after RFR said Kenseth was leaving, the driver finally confirmed he's moving to Joe Gibbs Racing at the end of the season. "Surprise," he said as he en-

tered a JGR news conference, a dry quip at one of the worst kept secrets in NASCAR.

Kenseth was deliberately vague, though, as to why he's leaving RFR after 13 full Cup seasons. He's never driven for anyone else at NASCAR's highest level, and paired with Jack Roush won 22 races, a pair of Daytona 500s and the 2003 championship.

"I knew it would not only be a good fit, but it's about winning races and winning championships and you want to put yourself in a position to be competitive going forward," Kenseth said. "I felt like this was it."

But he was winning races and he was competitive at Roush, where the 40-yearold Kenseth is considered one of NASCAR's elite drivers. Pressed as to what JGR offered, Kenseth knew he wasn't going to give a clear an-

"There's just a lot of different things that go into that. It's about 2013 and beyond," Kenseth said. "I felt like and I feel like (Gibbs) was the right place for me. I know without a doubt at all it's the right place for me to be."

Kenseth was in the final year of his contract with RFR, and every one of his previous deals with Roush had been extended before he'd gotten to the final season. But he indicated Tuesday things "got cloudy" after his Daytona 500 victory.

Enter JGR, who has room for a fourth car but was also eager to add an upgrade to its lineup.

"When we realized there might be a possibility to get Matt, we realized it would be foolish not to do that," said team president J.D. Gibbs.

Kenseth said it was RFR's decision to announce in June that Kenseth was leaving at the end of the year and would be replaced in the Sprint Cup Series by defending Nationwide champion Ricky Sten-

house Jr. Then it was Joe Gibbs Racing's decision on when it was ready to announce Kenseth had signed to drive the No. 20 Toyota next year. Behind the scenes, Gibbs officials were trying to figure out how to also keep Joey Logano but Penske Racing made it formal Tuesday and hired him to drive the No. 22 Ford in the Sprint Cup

"I am very excited to join Penske Racing and begin the next phase of my career," said Logano, who is 22. "I am looking forward to the opportunity as it will be an honor to drive for Roger Penske and race for wins and championships."

Logano has spent four seasons in the No. 20, and JGR wanted to keep him even after signing Kenseth. But they didn't have the pieces in place for a fourth full-time Cup team, and AJ Allmendinger's failed drug test opened the No. 22 seat at Penske Racing that Logano pursued.

"We felt like if we could get Joey into a full Nationwide deal and add some Cup races, we'd be in good shape," said J.D. Gibbs. "When the 22 car opened up, we knew it might







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# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"Ignorance of the law excuses

— John Selden

In today's deal, from the World Olympiad four years ago in Beijing, West has a splendid hand, but until he finds a fit, he can hardly drive to the four-level,

Few pairs judged the East-West cards that well: let's focus on the match between Norway and China.

In one room, Glenn Groetheim as West played four clubs doubled after his two-no-trump overcall had shown the minors, then had doubled three spades. North cashed his heart winners and played a third heart, ruffed with the gueen and overruffed. That had the effect of promoting a trump trick for the defenders, to go with their diamond winner, for down one.

This was good, but not good enough. In the other room (shown here) the Chinese West overcalled two no-trump and also balanced with a double of three spades, which East gambled to pass for want of anything better to do. After three rounds of clubs, ruffed and overruffed, declarer played the side suits, ruffing diamonds high and hearts low, and made nine tricks.

In England v. Romania, both East-West pairs defended against three spades (one contract doubled, one not). Both Wests led three rounds of clubs and both Easts ruffed in and were overruffed. In each case, declarer handled the trump spots sensibly to bring home nine tricks. None of these three Easts noticed they had a guaranteed way to set the hand. All they had to do was discard a diamond on the third club instead of ruffing in, thus ensuring they could collect their ruff to beat three spades.

In 1957, the novel "On the Road," by Jack Kerouac, was first published by Viking

In 1961, President John F. Kennedy signed legislation making aircraft hijackings a federal crime.

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford escaped an attempt on his life by Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme, a disciple of Charles Manson, in Sacramento, Calif.

In 1986, four hijackers who had seized a Pan Am jumbo jet on the ground in Karachi, Pakistan, opened fire when the lights inside the plane failed; a total of 22 people

were killed in the hijacking. In 1997, Britain's Queen Elizabeth II broke the royal reticence over Princess Diana's death, delivering a televised address in which she called her former daughterin-law "a remarkable person." Mother Teresa died in Calcutta, India, at age 87; conductor Sir Georg Solti (johrj SHOL'-tee) died in France at age 84.

Ten years ago: Afghan President Hamid Karzai survived an assassination attempt in Kandahar, hours after an explosives-packed car tore through a Kabul market. Actor Cliff Gorman, who'd won a Tony for portraying comedian Lenny Bruce in the 1971 play "Lenny," died in New York at age 65.

Five years ago: German officials announced that three militants from an Islamic group linked to al-Oaida were planning "imminent" bomb attacks against Americans in Germany when an elite anti-terrorist unit raided their small-town hideout. Fred Thompson announced on "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno" that he was running for the Republican presidential nomination; his candidacy lasted less than five months. Alicia Sacramone's floor routine rallied the United States to the world women's gymnastics title in Stuttgart, Germany.

One year ago: President Barack Obama used a boisterous Labor Day rally in Detroit to put congressional Republicans on the spot, challenging them to place the country's interests above all else and vote to create jobs and put the economy back on a path toward growth. The prosecution's first witness in the trial of ousted Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak, Gen. Hussein Moussa, startled the court by testifying that police had not been ordered to fire on protesters in Cairo's Tahrir Square, contradicting prosecutors' cen-

tral claim.

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





