When Dogs and Bikes Don't Mix

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TWIN FALLS • Mark Alexander saw the dog run from its yard toward the street, but the Australian shepherd didn't see him.

Instead, it focused on chasing Alexander's wife, who was riding her bicycle ahead of him with three other cyclists. The dog hit Mark's front wheel, knocking him to the ground and causing \$1,000 damage to his relatively new \$4,500 bike.

"I was mostly just scraped up," the Filer resident said. He was able to recover the cost of bike repairs from the dog's owner, who had insurance coverage.

Robin Seastrom wasn't as lucky when a dog ran in front of her bicycle on June 17, Father's Day. It stopped suddenly in front of her, jolting Seastrom from her bike onto the pavement. Her injuries required a bone graft, and seven screws were inserted in an elbow during two surgeries.

"Only once or twice have I encountered a hostile dog," she said. "The one that came after me was not aggressive. He just ran in front of us and decided to stop. I hit him and was launched."

Seastrom said it was an accident and didn't press charges against the dog's owner. "If it's an aggressive dog that's a whole different story," she said.

Tales of dogs vs. bicycles are common in the cycling community. Seastrom mentioned a friend in Burley who was hit by a dog while riding. The impact slammed the woman to the ground and broke her pelvis.

Recently, members of the Magic Valley Chain Gang bicycle club were charged

Schools Strive to Decipher Star Rankings

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TWIN FALLS • With a new five-star rating system for Idaho schools, local school districts are trying to figure out how to use the information.

The Idaho State Department of Education released preliminary ratings last week.

The Richfield School District's school received a five-star rating — the

highest possible.

"We're pleased to be recognized as a five-star school, but we're not reading too much into it yet," Superintendent

Mike Smith said.

That's because school ratings are still preliminary since the state's No Child Left Behind waiver hasn't been approved by the U.S. Department of Education.

If the waiver is approved, the state will receive relief from NCLB mandates. Idaho schools would then be held accountable under the new five-star system.

New Fee Model Introduced to Health System

TWIN FALLS • A new partnership between St. Luke's Health System and a Utah-based health insurer plans to lower the cost of health care by focusing on charging for value instead of volume.

SelectHealth and St. Luke's will begin transitioning into a pay-for-value model in order to change how health care providers are reimbursed for services, said David Pate, chief executive officer for the health system.

"No one denies that the current system is broken," said Pate. "But no one really knows how to fix it. This puts us on the right track to lowering costs and providing better care to the patient."

One way the new model will do this is by factoring the results of medical care

into incentives for providers, insurers and patients.

Currently, providers are reimbursed by the type of services provided to a patient, Pate said. But whether or not the patient actually gets better is not factored into the payment.

The change will only apply to patients using SelectHealth. The insurance provider currently provides coverage to Idahoans in the Burley area but plans to expand coverage to individuals, families, and small businesses later this fall. The insurer organization will offer coverage plans to large employers and federal organizations in January 2013.

"This will help make our health plan more efficient and avoid duplicate services which drive up the costs of care," said Patricia Richards, president and chief executive officer of the health insurer.

"Over time, we want premiums to stabilize and hopefully lower."

The new plan is good news to doctors, said Steven Kothz, a St. Luke's physician.

"We're aligning how we get paid that's centered on getting your patient healthy and better," Kothz said. "That's huge for doctors."

While the new partnership was influenced by the recent passing of the federal health care reform law, Pate said St. Luke's was pushing for a new payment model before the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the law.

"We need a model that offers incentives for making people better," Pate said. "We're going to be changing our clinical model and business model. Some may not like that — not everyone is a fan of change — but we cannot afford to do things like before."

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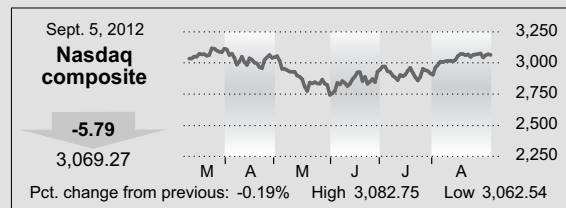
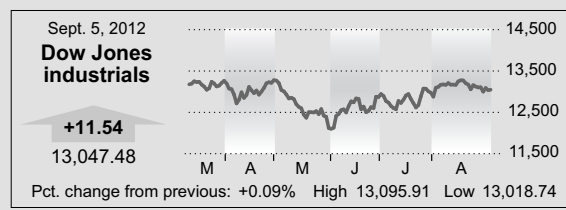

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Another West Nile Case Confirmed in T.F. Co.

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls County now has two confirmed cases of West Nile virus, according to Idaho health officials.

Similar to the rest of the nation, Idaho is seeing an increase in the amount of people infected with West Nile. This year, Idaho has confirmed eight reported cases of West Nile in five different counties, according to the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

Though state officials didn't deem it a clear enough case to report, a Jerome man said in August that his doctors said he had a brush with

West Nile, raising the Magic Valley's total this year to a three possible cases.

"It is very important that we all prevent mosquito bites and take protective measures, such as wearing repellent and reducing mosquito breeding habitat around our homes," said Leslie Tengelsen, deputy state epidemiologist, in a news release. "We expect transmission of the virus to continue until a hard freeze, which we anticipate will occur in October for much of Idaho."

Out of the eight human cases, three people contracted neuroinvasive illnesses — like meningitis —

related to West Nile. Additionally, state health officials are investigating five more cases of reported illness.

Livestock have also been affected by the rise of West Nile-infected mosquitoes. Two horses in Gooding County, one in Washington County and another in Canyon County tested positive for the virus.

West Nile is typically spread through infected mosquito bites. It cannot be spread person-to-person through casual contact.

Symptoms of West Nile include fever, headache, body aches, nausea, vomiting and sometimes swollen

lymph glands or a skin rash. The virus can cause severe illness for people over the age of 50, according to Health and Welfare.

This year, Texas reported more than 800 human cases of West Nile, the highest in the nation. Forty-eight states have reported cases of West Nile and it has caused the death of 87 individuals.

To help reduce chance of infection, health officials advise the public to avoid mosquitoes, apply DEET or other EPA-approved insect repellent and cover exposed skin when outdoors.

Hidden History

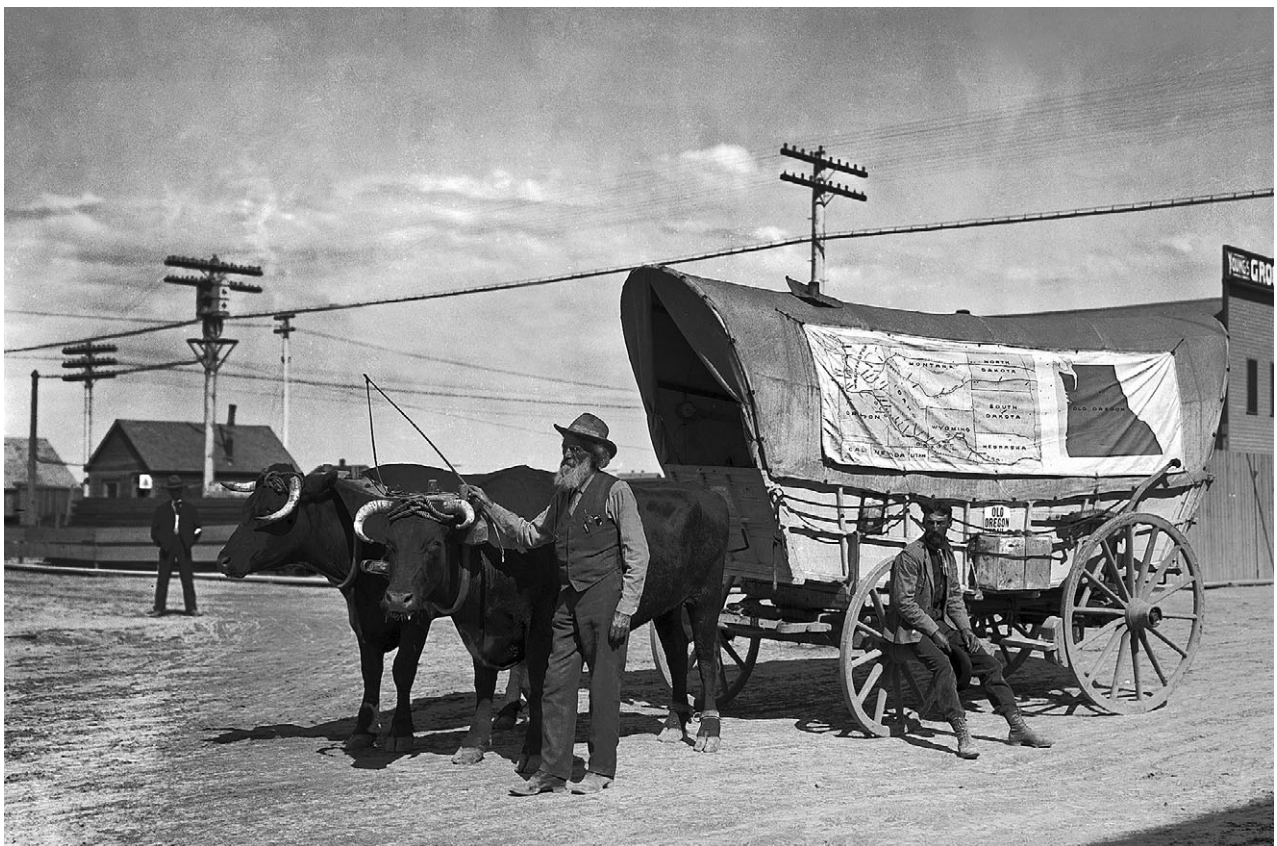

Ezra Meeker

TWIN FALLS • Ezra Meeker was 22 years old when he passed through here the first time. Meeker, along with his wife, Eliza Jane, and his infant son, Marion, followed the Old Oregon Trail through here in 1852, in search of the American Dream.

Meeker settled in what would become Puyallup, Wash., where he amassed a fortune and became one of the most influential men in the state.

Hard times at the end of the 19th Century destroyed his financial empire, so Meeker started a new life devoted to preserving the Oregon Trail, the route that took more than 300,000 emigrants west.

The Oregon Trail had started to disappear across the West. The trail was being plowed under in many places, and progress was erasing the trail from the

nation's collective memory. Determined to keep the historic emigrant route from fading into obscurity, Meeker set out with a team of oxen and a covered wagon, and traveled back east over the route he had taken some 50 years before.

The attention Meeker drew to the Oregon Trail on his numerous trips across the West resulted in the eventual preservation of the trail and its alternate routes.

The white-haired, bearded pioneer caused a stir everywhere he went. He stopped at each town along the way and gave speeches about the Oregon Trail. In 1910, on his second trip back, an 80-year-old Meeker spoke at Shoshone Falls to a large gathering celebrating Twin Falls County's first Flag Day.

Meeker charged a fee — 10 cents for adults and a nickel for children — to view his wagon, which was painted with slogans advertising the Oregon Trail.

Finally, in 1924 — at the age of 94 — Meeker flew from Vancouver, Wash., over the Oregon Trail to Dayton, Ohio, in an open-cockpit plane, piloted by Lt. Oakley Kelley. The next day, he rode in a parade with Orville Wright, then flew to Washington, D.C. to meet with President Calvin Coolidge.

Meeker gave the president his plan to designate a national highway honoring the Oregon Trail.

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LeFavour Opens Twin Falls Campaign Office

TWIN FALLS • Before showing up to the grand opening of her Twin Falls campaign office on Tuesday, Nicole LeFavour spent her afternoon talking to voters and recruiting volunteers at a coffee shop.

That on-the-ground approach has defined the retiring state senator's attempt to unseat Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, in this November's election. With the opening of campaign offices in Twin Falls, Pocatello and Idaho Falls, LeFavour is striving for face-to-face interactions with voters.

Only four Democrats have represented Idaho in Congressional District 2 since the district was created in 1919. The last Democrat was Richard Stallings, who served from 1985 to 1993.

LeFavour hopes to be the next, and has spent the summer knocking on doors and meeting with voters throughout southern and eastern Idaho.

It's a tough district for Democrats. Since he won the seat in a close race against Stallings in 1998, Simpson has repeatedly beat every Democratic challenger by at least 60 percent of the vote.

But feedback from voters has encouraged LeFavour. "I just continue to be amazed," she said. "We're up against a lot of money and a lot of incumbency, but that's a bit of a double-

edged sword these days."

Campaign volunteer Cody Hafer is optimistic about LeFavour's chances. Her campaign slogan — "I love Idaho and we can do better" — will resonate with people, he said.

"I think with Nicole, she's just impressed so many people statewide already," Hafer said.

Why an office in Twin Falls, which currently has all Republican lawmakers between its two legislative districts?

"Nicole and the campaign feel that Twin Falls is an extremely crucial city in this election," Hafer said.

Though the campaign office will be open through the election, LeFavour isn't planning to spend much time in the space.

"I'll probably be out knocking on doors," she said.

The office is located at 212 2nd Ave West, Suite 201, Twin Falls. LeFavour's campaign office is also hiring a full-time office assistant for the election. For more information, call (208) 713-4889.

Filer Approves \$7.8M City Budget

FILER • Hearing no public comment, the Filer City Council formally approved a \$7.8 million budget for the 2013 fiscal year.

Next year's general budget underwent a small increase from \$1.1 million to \$1.2 million. The sewer budget was set at \$3.6 million and water came in at \$1.3 million. The next fiscal year will begin on Oct. 1.

In other action Tuesday, city officials discussed the need to fill a council vacancy. Councilman Bob Parent resigned his seat last month for personal reasons after 14 years of service.

"There's still one year left on my term, but this seemed like as good a time as any to submit my resignation," Parent said.

The council plans to interview candidates expressing interest in the appointed, one-year position

at 6 p.m. Sept. 11 and 12, in the 300 Main Street council chambers. The individual appointed to the seat will then have an opportunity to run for election to a full council term.

"Right now, there are five people on our list," said Mayor Bob Templeman, "and we'll just spend time discussing things, getting to know each one, and plan on having a recommendation by our Sept. 18 public meeting."

Filer Police Chief Tim

Reeves also reported that his department is looking to add a certified patrol officer on staff. The closing date for receiving applications is Sept. 17.

"I already have quite a few applicants but once this is advertised, I'll probably get just about everyone in the county," Reeves said. "We want someone who is already fully certified."

Woman Pleads Guilty to Stealing from Her Elderly Roommate

TWIN FALLS • A Buhl woman pleaded guilty Tuesday to charges of forgery and abusing a vulnerable adult.

Shon Leslie Briggs, 33, was originally charged with 11 counts of forgery and of abusing an 82-year-old woman.

Twin Falls Sheriff's deputies say she repeatedly exploited the woman, stealing about \$2,000 from her.

In a report, a deputy wrote Briggs spent so much of the woman's money she could not afford her vital heart and seizure medications or pay her insurance premiums.

"The fact that she has gone weeks at a time without medications, coupled with her advanced age, (82-years-old and 78 pounds) puts her in grave danger," the deputy wrote.

Deputies said Briggs stole

the elderly woman's checkbook and bought cigarettes, beer and jewelry, among other items.

According to a plea agreement with prosecutors, the state will dismiss ten counts of forgery in exchange for Briggs' guilty plea.

Prosecutors will recommend Briggs spend three to six years in prison for the crimes.

The state will also ask for restitution for the victim, fines and a no contact order with the victim.

Briggs is scheduled to be sentenced on Oct. 29.

Obama: The Real Radical

Four years ago, Barack Obama was America's Rorschach test upon whom voters could project their disparate yearnings. To govern, however, is to choose, and now his choices have clarified him. He is a conviction politician determined to complete the progressive project of emancipating government from the Founders' constraining premises, a project Woodrow Wilson embarked on 100 Novembers ago.

As such, Obama has earned what he now receives, the tribute of a serious intellectual exegesis by a distinguished political philosopher. In “I Am the Change: Barack Obama and the Crisis of Liberalism” Charles Kesler of Claremont McKenna College rightly says Obama is “playing a long, high-stakes game.” Concerning the stakes, Obama practices prudent reticence, not specifying America's displeasing features that are fundamental. Shortly before the 2008 election, he said only: “We are five days away from fundamentally transforming” America. Tonight, consider Obama's acceptance speech in the context that Kesler gives it in the American political tradition.

Progress, as progressives understand it, means advancing away from, up from, something. But from what?

From the Constitution's constricting anachronisms. In 1912, Wilson said, “The history of liberty is the history of the limitation of governmental power.” But as Kesler notes, Wilson never said the future of liberty consisted of such limitation.

Instead, he said, “every means ... by which society may be perfected through the instrumentality of government” should be used so that “individual rights can be fitly adjusted and harmonized with public duties.” Rights “adjusted and harmonized” by government necessarily are defined and apportioned by it. Wilson, the first transformative progressive, called this the “New Freedom.” The old kind was the Founders' kind — government existing to “secure” natural rights (see the Declaration) that pre-exist government. Wilson thought this had become an impediment to progress. The pedigree of Obama's thought runs straight to Wilson.

And through the second transformative progressive, Franklin Roosevelt, who counseled against the Founders' sober practicality and fear of government power: “We are beginning to wipe out the line that divides the practical from the ideal” and are making government “an instrument of unimagined power” for social improvement. The only thing we have to fear is fear of a government of unimagined power: “Government is a relation of give and take.” The “rulers” — FDR's word — take power from the people, who in turn are given “certain rights.”

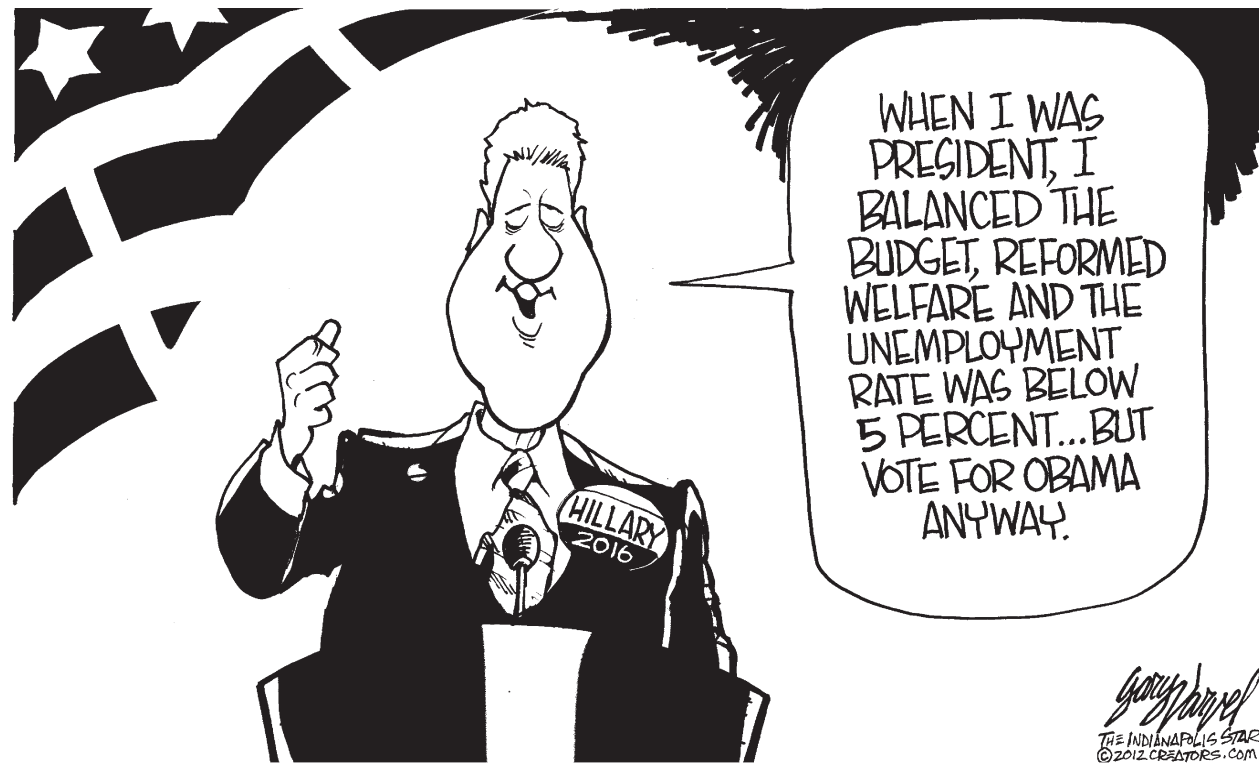
This, says Kesler, is “the First Law of Big Government: the more power we give the government, the more rights it will give us.” It also is the ultimate American radicalism, striking at the roots of the American regime, the doctrine of natural rights. Remember this when next — perhaps tonight — Obama discourses on the radicalism of Paul Ryan.

As Kesler says, the logic of progressivism is: “Since our rights are dependent on government, why shouldn't we be?” This is the real meaning of Obama's most characteristic rhetorical trope, his incessant warning that Americans should be terrified of being “on your own.”

Obama, the fourth transformative progressive, had a chief of staff who said “you never want a serious crisis to go to waste.” More than a century before that, a man who would become the first such progressive said a crisis is a terrible thing not to create. Crises, said Wilson, are periods of “unusual opportunity” for gaining “a controlling and guiding influence.” So, he said, leaders should maintain a crisis atmosphere “at all times.”

Campaigning in 1964, Lyndon Johnson, the third consequential progressive, exclaimed through a bull horn: “I just want to tell you this — we're in favor of a lot of things and we're against mighty few.” He learned this progressive vernacular from his patron, FDR, who envisioned “an unlimited civilization capable of infinite progress.” Poet Archibald MacLeish, FDR's choice for librarian of Congress, exemplified progressives' auto-intoxication: America has “the abundant means” to create “whatever world we have the courage to desire;” and the ability to “take this country down” and “build it again as we please;” to “take our cities apart and put them together;” to lead our “rivers where we please to lead them;” etc.

In 2012, Americans want from government not such flights of fancy but sobriety; not ecstatic evocations of dreamlike tomorrows but a tolerably functioning today; not fantasies about a world without scarcities and therefore without choices among our desires and appetites but a mature understanding of the limits to government's proper scope and actual competence. Tonight's speech is Obama's last chance to take a first step toward accommodation with a country increasingly concerned about his unmasked determination to “transform” what the Founders considered “fundamentals.”

The Shameful Attack on Romney's Investing

the Democrats' manic obsession to bring down our commander in chief?”

Republicans in 2012 have partially replicated these tactics. Mitt Romney has repeatedly called Obama's ideas “foreign.” Romney and his surrogates said Obama doesn't understand America. Democrats countered these attacks with economic nationalism. They blasted Romney for outsourcing jobs and mocked his rendition of “America the Beautiful.” But this week, they turned up the heat, ruthlessly challenging Romney's patriotism.

The offensive began at 6 p.m. Tuesday in remarks by Newark Mayor Cory Booker: “When your country is in a costly war, with our soldiers sacrificing abroad and our nation facing a debt crisis at home, being asked to pay your fair share isn't class warfare. It's patriotism.” Booker's statement seemed benign. But it signaled the Democrats' line of attack, casting a shadow of dishonor over anyone who opposed tax increases.

An hour later, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid escalated the assault. He alleged that Romney “chose Swiss bank accounts and

Cayman Island tax shelters over American institutions. And we can only imagine what new secrets would be revealed if he showed the American people a dozen years of tax returns, like his father did.”

Reid's speech sharpened the economic nationalism theme into an indictment of Romney's patriotism. In doing so, Reid exaggerated the extent of the cited accounts and their conflict with U.S. investment. While the value of Romney's Swiss account (which was closed two years ago) and his Cayman investments fluctuated, the average seems to have been possibly \$25 million — about 10 percent of Romney's assets — of which \$3 million was in the Swiss account. But why sweat the details or stick to the facts? Reid's hint at other shady entanglements “we can only imagine” was the perfect McCarthyite touch.

At 9 p.m., former Ohio Gov. Ted Strickland abandoned all restraint. He declared:

Mitt Romney has so little economic patriotism that even his money needs a passport. It summers on the beaches of the Cayman Islands and winters on the slopes of the Swiss Alps. In Matthew, Chapter 6, Verse 21, the Scriptures teach us that where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. My friends, any man who as-

pires to be our president should keep both his treasure and his heart in the United States of America. Barack Obama is betting on the American worker. Mitt Romney is betting on a Bermuda shell corporation. Barack Obama saved the American auto industry. Mitt Romney saved on his taxes. Barack Obama is an economic patriot. Mitt Romney is an outsourcing pioneer.

That's worse than anything I can recall from the 2004 Republican convention. If a Republican speaker had used the New Testament to charge that Obama lacked patriotism and that his heart wasn't in this country, based on peripheral investments made by a blind trust, liberals would have gone insane with outrage. But when Strickland did it to Romney, Democratic delegates roared their approval.

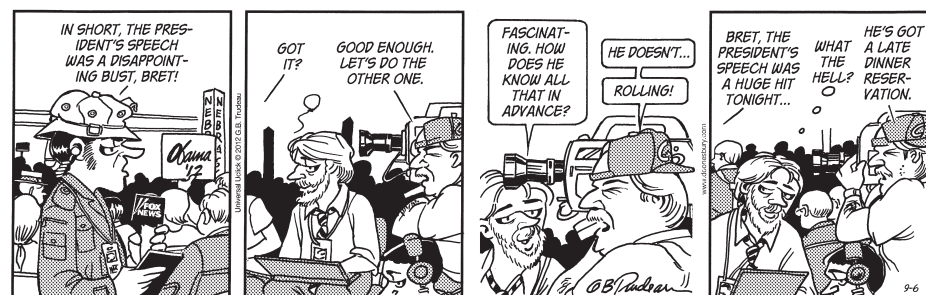
You can fault Romney for laying off workers. You can fault him for exploiting tax havens. You can fault him for withholding his tax returns. But when you depict overseas investment per se as evidence of a candidate's national disloyalty — when you quote the Bible at him, deny that he's a patriot, and accuse him of selling out his homeland — you've crossed the line. You might win an election that way. But it won't be worth what you've done to yourself and to this country.

Wiley Dobbs, superintendent of the Twin Falls School District, said the new system is “pretty complicated.”

“Our first process is seeking to understand it as best we can,” he said.

Dobbs said the emphasis on student growth — rather than strictly achievement — is a good change under the new system.

Three- to five-star schools will be publicly recognized by the state. But three-star schools will be required to develop an improvement plan for certain areas.

One- and two-star schools are those in which the state has identified areas of improvement. Those schools will also develop improvement plans.

Where’s the Waiver?

ISDE spokeswoman Melissa McGrath said the state is still in negotiations with the U.S. Department of Education about parts of the waiver application, which was submitted in February.

“We do believe our waiver will be approved soon,” she said.

If the state’s waiver is approved, the new five-star accountability plan will go back to the Idaho State Board of Education for final approval.

School ratings won’t be official until that happens, McGrath said, but they’ll remain the same.

School administrators had a chance to see their designations — and how they were calculated — this summer. And schools could appeal the ratings through mid-August.

McGrath said state officials hoped the NCLB waiver would be approved by the time the appeal process ended.

How Did Twin Falls Perform?

Out of the Twin Falls School District’s 13 schools, nine received either a three or four-star rating.

Dobbs said the ratings serve as feedback about what schools are doing well and areas that need improvement.

“We really approach this in a healthy manner,” he said.

Bridge Academy — the district’s alternative middle school — received a one-star ranking. That’s the lowest on the scale.

Dobbs said he has noticed that an “inordinate

number” of alternative schools statewide received a one- or two-star ranking.

“It’s an issue that I think we need to work with the state department to figure out,” he said.

The school district also had a few schools with a two-star rating: Harrison Elementary, Lincoln Elementary and Magic Valley High.

Dobbs said a few schools with one- or two-star rankings — such as Bridge Academy and Harrison Elementary — still made “adequate yearly progress” under NCLB.

And that’s not easy to do. Schools have to meet benchmarks in 41 categories, based on ISAT scores.

McGrath said some schools that made AYP received a one or two-star rating.

That’s because the new accountability system factors in academic growth.

Some schools may have high-performing students, McGrath said, but aren’t demonstrating the improvement every year the state would like to see.

What about Other Districts?

Half of the Blaine County School District’s eight schools received a four-star rating.

Spokeswoman Heather Crocker said she plans to share data and information about the new rating system with community members this week.

“It gives parents the information they need,” she said.

Bellevue Elementary School received a two-star rating. Crocker said there’s not a plan in place yet for improvement.

The district had one school with a five-star rating: Silver Creek High School — an alternative school.

In Buhl, all three schools received a four-star rating.

Superintendent Byron Stutzman said administrators are already looking at rubrics to see what it would take to earn five stars in the future.

But Stutzman said the district won’t move in that direction unless it’s beneficial for students.

by what member Rick Greenwald called “a vicious dog” southwest of Jerome. The pit bull “came out at us aggressively ... and I thought it was about to take me off of my bike,” he wrote in an email to club members.

“Then it circled around on my right side and I feared I was about to lose a chunk of my calf. Only as it circled behind me and to the other side of the road did I realize the dog was muzzled.”

Jerome County Sheriff Doug McFall said his county doesn’t have an ordinance preventing dogs from running at large.

However, the city of Twin Falls’ municipal code calls for a \$100 fine for the owner of a dog running loose. The city code also provides for much harsher penalties if the dog is considered vicious. According to code definition, a vicious dog is one that has

dog whose temperament or habits endanger or menace any person or other animal

without provocation ...”

Dogs classified as vicious may be euthanized under Twin Falls city code.

Sgt. Chuck Garner of the Twin Falls Police Department said officers have taken 184 dog-at-large reports since assuming animal control responsibility from the Twin Falls County Sheriff’s Office on June 15.

“These reports encompass vicious and stray dogs,” he said.

Cyclists have advice for fellow riders who encounter frightening dogs. Greenwald used his email to warn others of the area where the pit bull lives.

Seastrom, who is co-owner of Cycle Therapy with her husband, suggests a moderate approach.

“I try to be aware when a dog is coming out,” she said. “I shoot him in the face with my water bottle. I yell at him. And I pick up speed.”

“People don’t realize how vulnerable we are when dogs run out.”

Mother Arrested After Baby Allegedly Consumes Oxycontin

TWIN FALLS • A 20-year-old woman was arrested after police say her 14-month-old baby ingested OxyContin while in her care.

On Aug. 30 at about 5:15 p.m., Twin Falls police responded to the intersection of Orchard Drive and Harrison Street for a call about a 14-month-old child who was not breathing. According to a police report, CPR was being done on the baby on the hood of the mother’s car in the area.

When officers found Aerial Wood and the baby, she allegedly told them the child ingested liquid ibuprofen, the report states.

The baby was transported to St. Luke’s Magic Valley Medical Center where medical person-

nel discovered the child had actually ingested OxyContin, not ibuprofen, the report states.

After a drug screening, it was found that the child also had opiates and sedatives in his system, the report states. According to the report, the child was transported via air ambulance to St. Luke’s Boise Medical Center.

The child was no longer listed as a patient at St. Luke’s Boise on Wednesday evening.

Police interviewed Wood, who allegedly said she went with a friend to a home she had never been to before. At the house, the woman said her child found some OxyContin pills when she left the room for a short time, but she didn’t believe he’d eaten any.

Wood was charged with felony injury to a child and is scheduled for a preliminary hearing on Friday.

TWIN FALLS • A Buhl man who was recently arrested for allegedly shooting another man was sentenced Tuesday for a conviction stemming from a November 2011 child abduction case.

Daniel D. Thomas, 35, was accused of helping Stefanie Contreras enter the Pierce Street residence of her child's father on the morning of Nov. 30. Contreras entered to take her

4-year-old son, Brandon, while two other men — Thomas, who carried a pistol, and Kelvin Milo Jr. — accompanied her. Jason Bearce, the father, told police that when he went to confront Contreras in the living room, Thomas shot at him.

Thomas was originally charged with custodial interference, aggravated as-

sault with a deadly weapon, burglary and unlawful possession of a weapon by a convicted felon.

Prosecutors dropped everything but the gun charge in January.

Thomas was sentenced to one to five years in prison and a \$1,000 fine. The sentence is to run consecutively with a charge from a separate case of theft by acquiring lost property.

Thomas was convicted of using a credit card be-

longing to a woman who accidentally left it in an ATM in mid-October 2011.

In his latest run-in with the law, Thomas, 35, was accused of shooting John Valenciano Jr., 19, in the neck shortly before 4 a.m. Aug. 11. Thomas was arraigned on a charge of aggravated battery and, after medical treatment, Valenciano was taken into custody on a warrant related to an ongoing aggravated assault case.

Couple Gets Probation for Confining Teenagers

BOISE (AP) • A southwestern Idaho husband and wife charged with keeping two teenagers confined to their rooms and severely restricting what they could eat have pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of disturbing the peace.

Brian K. Bracy, 38, and Melissa Louise Bracy, 34, of Kuna, pleaded guilty Tuesday and were placed on probation for two years during which time they cannot have any contact with the teens, the *Idaho Statesman* reported.

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Jerome County Finalizes Budget With Salary Increases

JEROME • Jerome County employees will receive a 2 percent salary increase during the coming fiscal year.

Following a public hearing Tuesday night, commissioners approved an approximately \$11.5 million final budget. It goes into effect Oct. 1.

Commissioner Cathy Roemer told the *Times-News* Wednesday that the budget is a "little bit tight" for the coming fiscal year.

She said commissioners worked with the county clerk and staff members to make sure expenditures

were well within budget. Roemer said one impact on the budgeting process was less tax revenue due to a drop in property values.

Some Highlights of the Budget:

- **Lower property tax rates**
Due to the City of Jerome closing out the Jerome Urban Renewal Agency's Area 1, residents should see a drop in property taxes.

- **Roemer said property taxes will fall to \$4.90 per \$1,000 of assessed value.**

- **That's down from the current \$5.03 per \$1,000 rate.**

- **Trimming department budgets**
County department

heads were asked to trim their operating budgets from a 3 percent increase during the tentative budgeting process to a 2 percent increase for the final budget.

- **Increase in pay for sheriff's deputies**
Roemer said the commissioners worked with the sheriff's office to trim the budget in different areas.

- **The result: Money is now available to increase deputies' wages by 2 percent, with a 3 percent discretionary pay increase for longevity.**

- **Increase in health insurance costs**
Health insurance costs will increase 8 percent. The plan includes a \$3,000 deductible per employee,

with the cost split between the employee and county.

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Feds Uproot 1 Million Pot Plants in 7 State Sting

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) • A federal crackdown on marijuana growing in seven western states has uprooted more than 1 million plants, about two-thirds of which were found on public land.

The U.S. attorney's office in Sacramento said the pot found on public lands was worth nearly \$1.5 billion. The agency released total figures for the July and August raids in Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington on Wednesday. More than three-quarters of the pot plants were found growing in California.

Authorities found 93,000 plants in Washington, with smaller amounts in the other states.

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Clinton Boosts Obama in Rousing Speech

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) • President Barack Obama inherited a wreck of an economy, “put a floor under the crash” and laid the foundation for millions of good new jobs, former President Bill Clinton declared Wednesday night in a rousing Democratic National Convention appeal aimed at millions of hard-pressed Americans yet to decide how to vote.

Conceding that many struggling in a slow-recovery economy don’t yet feel the change, Clinton said in a prime-time speech that circumstances are improving “and if you’ll renew the president’s contract you will feel it.”

To the cheers of thousands of Democrats packed into their convention hall, he said of Obama, “I want to nominate a man who is cool on the outside but who burns for America on the inside.”

The speech was vintage

Clinton, overlong for sure, insults delivered with a folksy grin, references to his own time in office and his wife Hillary, all designed to improve Obama’s chances for re-election in an era of painfully slow economic growth and 8.3 percent unemployment.

The convention hall rocked with delegates’ applause and cheers as Clinton — unofficial Democratic ambassador-in-chief to

anxious voters in a tough economy — strode onstage to sounds of “Don’t Stop Thinking About Tomorrow,” his 1992 campaign theme song.

He sought to rebut every major criticism Republicans have leveled against the president at their own convention last week in Tampa, and said that in fact, since 1961, far more jobs have been created under Democratic presidents than when Re-

publicans sat in the White House — by a margin of 42 million to 24 million.

Clinton accused Republicans of proposing “the same old policies that got us into trouble in the first place” and led to a near financial meltdown. Those, he said, include efforts to provide “tax cuts for higher-income Americans, more money for defense than the Pentagon wants and ... deep cuts on programs that help the mid-

dle class and poor children.”

“As another president once said, ‘There they go again,’” he said, quoting Ronald Reagan, who often uttered the remark as a rebuke to Democrats.

Obama flew into his convention city earlier in the day and arrived in the hall for Clinton’s speech. He arranged to join the former president onstage afterward in a made-for-television joint appearance.

CAIRO (AP) • Power and water outages are common across Egypt. Crime is rampant. The value of the currency is slipping.

Egypt’s Islamist President Mohammed Morsi has yet to offer anything concrete on how he plans to tackle some of the nation’s most intractable problems. Instead, he is taking steps to shore up his Muslim Brotherhood group ahead of new parliamentary elections and is trying to project himself as a charismatic Arab leader standing up to authoritarian regimes in the

Middle East.

Morsi campaigned on a package of promises that included political inclusion, freedom of expression and a swift end to paralyzing traffic congestion, skyrocketing crime and the scourge of garbage uncollected.

Yet in his first two months in office, he has appeared to focus his attention elsewhere. That has raised questions about his priorities at a time when Egyptians’ expectations are higher than ever following the ouster last year of Hosni

How Weak Is the U.S. Job Market?

WASHINGTON (AP) • Is the U.S. job market dismal as Republican presidential nominee Mitt Romney says? Or is it steadily improving as President Barack Obama contends?

Not to dodge the question, but both men are correct. It’s all about how you slice the data.

Romney and his Republican allies like to point to the unemployment rate. It’s stuck at 8.3 percent, compared with 7.8 percent when Obama took office. Most economists say “normal” unemployment is 6 percent or less.

Obama naturally prefers to stress the more than 4

million jobs the economy has added in the past 2½ years.

Neither figure fully illustrates the state of the job market — the pivotal issue for many voters in the final stretch of the election season. You have to consider other numbers, too.

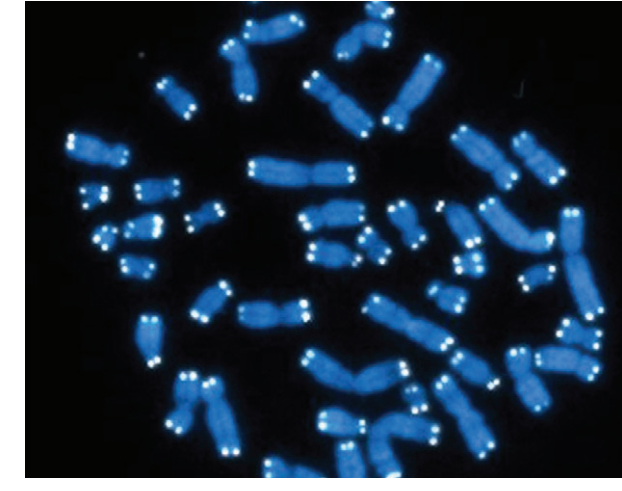
What about the number

of people who’ve given up looking for work and so aren’t counted as unemployed?

Or the pace of layoffs? What about the level of job openings advertised?

The job market began strengthening in mid-2010. That was about a year after

New DNA Encyclopedia Shows Its Complexity

NEW YORK (AP) • A colossal international effort has yielded the first comprehensive look at how our DNA works, an encyclopedia of information that will rewrite the textbooks and offer new insights into the biology of disease.

For one thing, it may help explain why some people are more prone to common ailments such as high blood pressure and heart disease.

The findings, reported

Wednesday by more than 500 scientists, reveal extraordinarily complex networks that tell our genes what to do and when, with millions of on-off switches.

“It’s this incredible choreography going on, of a modest number of genes and an immense number of ... switches that are choreographing how those genes are used,” said Dr. Eric Green, director of the

Turkey Accuses Syria of State Terrorism

BEIRUT (AP) • Turkey accused Syria of “state terrorism” Wednesday after a sharp spike in the death toll from the Syrian civil war, and Iran came under new scrutiny with the U.S. alleging that Tehran is flying weapons to President Bashar Assad’s regime across Iraqi airspace.

With violence escalating in the nearly 18-month-old crisis, strains rippled across the region as Egypt’s president urged Assad to take a lesson from the Arab Spring uprisings that deposed other leaders and step down.

There appears to be no end in sight for the conflict, however. Neither side seems

to be able to gain a significant advantage in the fighting that has killed 23,000 people, according to activists’ estimates.

Turkey has become one of the strongest critics of Assad and is host to Syrian opposition groups as well as about 80,000 of the more than 200,000 refugees who have

fled to surrounding countries to escape the bloodshed.

“The regime has become one of state terrorism,” said Turkish Prime Minister Recep Tayyip Erdogan. “Syria is going through a huge humanitarian saga. Unfortunately, as usual, the international community is merely watching the slaughter.”

7-year-old Girl Recovers from Bubonic Plague

DENVER (AP) • The parents of 7-year-old Sierra Jane Downing thought she had the flu when she felt sick days after camping in southwest Colorado.

It wasn't until she had a seizure that her father knew something was seriously wrong and rushed her to a hospital in their town of Pagosa Springs. She had a 107-degree fever, and doctors were baffled by the cause.

"I didn't know what was going on. I just reacted," Sean Downing said. "I thought she died."

The Downings eventually learned their daughter was ill with one of the last things they would've thought: bubonic plague, a disease that wiped out one-third of Europe in the 14th century but is now exceedingly rare — it hasn't been confirmed in Colorado since 2006 — and treatable if caught early.

Federal health officials say they are aware of two other confirmed and one probable case of plague in the U.S. so far this year — an average year. The other confirmed cases were in New Mexico

and Oregon, and the probable case also was in Oregon. None were fatal.

Plague is generally transmitted to humans through the bites of infected fleas but also can be transmitted by direct contact with infected animals, including rodents, rabbits and pets.

Officials with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention acknowledged that a series of frightening illnesses linked to insects and pests have been surfacing lately across the country, including mosquito-borne West Nile virus outbreaks in Texas and other states, deadly hantavirus cases linked to Yosemite National Park, and some scattered plague cases.

But with some of the illnesses — like plague — this is not an unusually bad year; it's just getting attention. And the number of cases of each disease is driven by different factors.

"I don't think there's a confluence of any particular set of factors" driving the recent illness reports, said Kiersten Kugeler, a CDC epidemiologist.

Dems Add God, Jerusalem to Platform

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) • Needled by Mitt Romney and other Republicans, Democrats hurriedly rewrote their convention platform Wednesday to add a mention of God and declare Jerusalem the capital of Israel after President Barack Obama intervened to order the changes.

The embarrassing reversal was compounded by chaos and uncertainty on the convention floor, requiring three votes before a ruling that the amendments had been approved. Many in the audience booted the decision.

The episode exposed tensions on Israel within the party, put Democrats on the defensive and created a public relations spectacle as Obama arrived in the convention city to claim his party's nomination for a second term.

The language in the party platform — a political document — does not affect actual U.S. policy toward Israel. The administration has long said that determining Jerusalem's status is an issue that should be decided in peace talks by Israelis and Palestinians.

Obama intervened directly to get the language changed both on Jerusalem and to reinstate God in the platform, according to campaign officials who insisted on anonymity to describe behind-the-scenes party negotiations. They said Obama's reaction to the omission of God from the platform was to wonder why it was removed in the first place.

The revisions came as Obama struggles to win support from white working-class voters, many of whom have

strong religious beliefs, and as Republicans try to woo Jewish voters and contributors away from the Democratic Party. Republicans claimed the platform omissions suggested Obama was weak in his defense of Israel and out of touch with mainstream Americans.

GOP officials argued that not taking a position on Jerusalem's status in the party platform raised questions about Obama's support for the Mideast ally. Romney said omitting God "suggests a party that is increasingly out of touch with the mainstream of the American people."

"I think this party is veering further and further away into an extreme wing that Americans don't recognize," Romney said.

Added to the platform was a declaration that Jerusalem "is and will remain the capital

of Israel. The parties have agreed that Jerusalem is a matter for final status negotiations. It should remain an undivided city accessible to people of all faiths."

That language was included in the platform four years ago when Obama ran for his first term, but was left out when Democrats on Tuesday approved their 2012 platform, which referred only to the nation's "unshakable commitment to Israel's security."

Some delegates were angered by the change.

"There was no discussion. We didn't even see it coming. We were blindsided by it," said Noor Ul-Hasan, a Muslim delegate from Salt Lake City, who questioned whether the convention had enough of a quorum to even amend the platform.

the Great Recession officially ended. The gains since then have been steady but achingly slow. That's why nearly every gauge of the job market plays into a glass-half-full, glass-half-empty election debate.

Here's an overview of key numbers and the varying stories they tell:

Unemployment

Romney and other Republicans have stressed that the unemployment rate has topped 8 percent for 42 straight months. That's the longest such stretch since government record-keeping began in 1948.

For Obama, this is probably the most threatening statistic. No president since World War II has won re-election with such a high rate. President Gerald Ford lost to Jimmy Carter in 1976, when the rate was 7.8 percent. President Carter was unseated by Ronald Reagan in 1980, when it was 7.5 percent.

Reagan managed to win a landslide re-election in 1984, when unemployment was a still-lofty 7.2 percent. But the rate had tumbled from a peak of 10.8 percent in December 1982.

A similar trend could benefit Obama. True, unemployment is historically high. But it's down from a peak of 10 percent in October 2009. Some economists argue that the trend in the unemployment rate in an election year affects voters more than the rate itself does. Presidents have won re-election even when unemployment was high — as long as the rate was trending down.

That said, Obama has a problem: The unemployment rate has stopped declining recently. It's now where it was in January. That could all change in coming months. Three more jobs reports will be issued before the election, including the August numbers that will be released Friday.

Jobs

Obama and other Democrats point out that the private sector has added jobs for 29 straight months. And over that time, 4.5 million jobs have been added. By contrast, over roughly the same period after the first year of President George W. Bush's first term, only 1.3 million private-sector jobs were added.

But the positive trend for Obama depends on a carefully selected time frame. It counts job gains dating

from February 2010. It ignores Obama's first year in office, when employers shed an average of 357,000 jobs a month. And by counting only private-sector jobs, Obama's claim excludes hundreds of thousands of layoffs by local and state governments.

Since Obama took office, the overall economy — including the public sector — has lost 316,000 jobs. Private employers have added only 332,000 jobs. Put all that together, and you're a long way from 4.5 million.

The administration's supporters argue that it's fair to exclude the early part of his term. That's because his economic policies, particularly the \$824 billion stimulus package, didn't kick in until months after his inauguration.

Even counting the gains of the past 2½ years, the economy still has 4.7 million fewer jobs than it did in December 2007, when the recession began.

Underemployed

Many analysts point out that the unemployment rate would be even higher if it included millions of Americans who have given up looking for work. (The government counts people as unemployed only if they're looking for a job.)

Nearly 12.8 million people were unemployed in July. But Romney and his running mate, Rep. Paul Ryan, prefer to cite a different figure: One that also includes people no longer looking for a job and people working part time who would prefer full-time work.

When you add up those groups, plus the unemployed, you end up with 23.5 million. That produces an "under-employment" rate of 15 percent.

The trend is especially stark among younger Americans. An Associated Press analysis earlier this year found that roughly half of college graduates under age 25 are unemployed or underemployed.

Layoffs

There's one clear area of improvement since Obama was inaugurated: Layoffs have plunged.

As Obama has often pointed out, more than 800,000 Americans lost their jobs in January 2009, the month he took office. That was the largest one-month drop in more than 60 years.

The pain persisted for months: The economy shed 600,000 or more jobs each month from November 2008 through April 2009.

A total of 4.5 million jobs were lost.

Mubarak, whose authoritarian regime was widely seen as favoring the rich over the poor during three decades in power.

While Morsi has done little of substance to address domestic woes so far, he has tried to make his mark on foreign policy. It is a realm where there is little accountability because most of Egypt's 83 million people are too preoccupied with making ends meet.

"Experience has shown that foreign policy brings him more success and popularity than if he fulfilled his promises to the people," said political scientist Mustafa Kamel el-Sayed of Cairo University.

The Brotherhood's political arm, the Freedom and Justice Party, rejected as baseless the claim that the president assumed a high profile on foreign policy at a time when progress on do-

estic issues was slow. "The president does not speak of the rights of the Palestinians or the people of Syria to bolster his populari-

ty," said Nader Omran of the party's foreign relations committee. "He does this out of principle," he told The Associated Press.

Morsi also won praise for standing up to the military generals who ruled Egypt for 17 months after Mubarak was ousted.

National Human Genome Research Institute, which organized the project.

The work also shows that at least 80 percent of the human genetic code, or genome, is active. That's surprisingly high and a sharp contrast to the idea that the vast majority of our DNA is junk.

Most people know that DNA contains genes, which hold the instructions for life. But scientists have long known those genetic blueprints take up only about 2 percent of the genome, and their understanding of what's going on in the rest has been murky.

Similarly, they have known that the genome contains regulators that control the activity of genes,

so that one set of genes is active in a liver cell and another set in a brain cell, for example. But the new work shows how that happens on a broad scale.

It's "our first global view of how the genome functions," sort of a Google Maps that allows both bird's-eye and close-up views of what's going on, said Elise Feingold of the genome institute. While scientists already knew the detailed chemical makeup of the genome, "we didn't really know how to read it," she said in an interview. "It didn't come with an instruction manual to figure out how the DNA actually works."

One key participant, Ewan Birney of the European Molecular Biology Laboratory in Hinxton, England, compared the new work to a first translation of a very long book.

"The big surprise is just how much activity there is," he said. "It's a jungle."

The trove of findings was released in 30 papers published by three scientific journals, while related papers appear in some other journals. In all, the 30 papers involved more than 500 authors. The project is called ENCODE, for Encyclopedia of DNA Elements.

The human genome is made up of about 3 billion "letters" along strands that make up the familiar double helix structure of DNA. Particular sequences of these letters form genes, which tell cells how to make proteins. People have about 20,000 genes, but the vast majority of DNA lies outside of genes.

So what is it doing? In recent years, scientists have uncovered uses for some of that DNA, so it was clearly not all junk, but overall it has

remained a mystery.

Scientists found that at least three-quarters of the genome is involved in making RNA, a chemical cousin of DNA.

Within genes, making RNA is a first step toward creating a protein, but that's not how it's used across most of the genome. Instead, it appears to help regulate gene activity.

Scientists also mapped more than 4 million sites where proteins bind to DNA to regulate genetic function, sort of like a switch. "We are finding way more switches than we were expecting," Birney said.

The discovery of so many switches help scientists in their search for the biology of disease, particularly common conditions such as high blood pressure, heart disease and asthma, scientists said.

Closed GOP Primary Spurs More Protests

BOISE (AP) • Idaho's closed Republican primary drew more criticism after an Elmore County GOP official east of Boise withdrew his party affiliation — just hours after winning his second term as a Republican precinct committeeman.

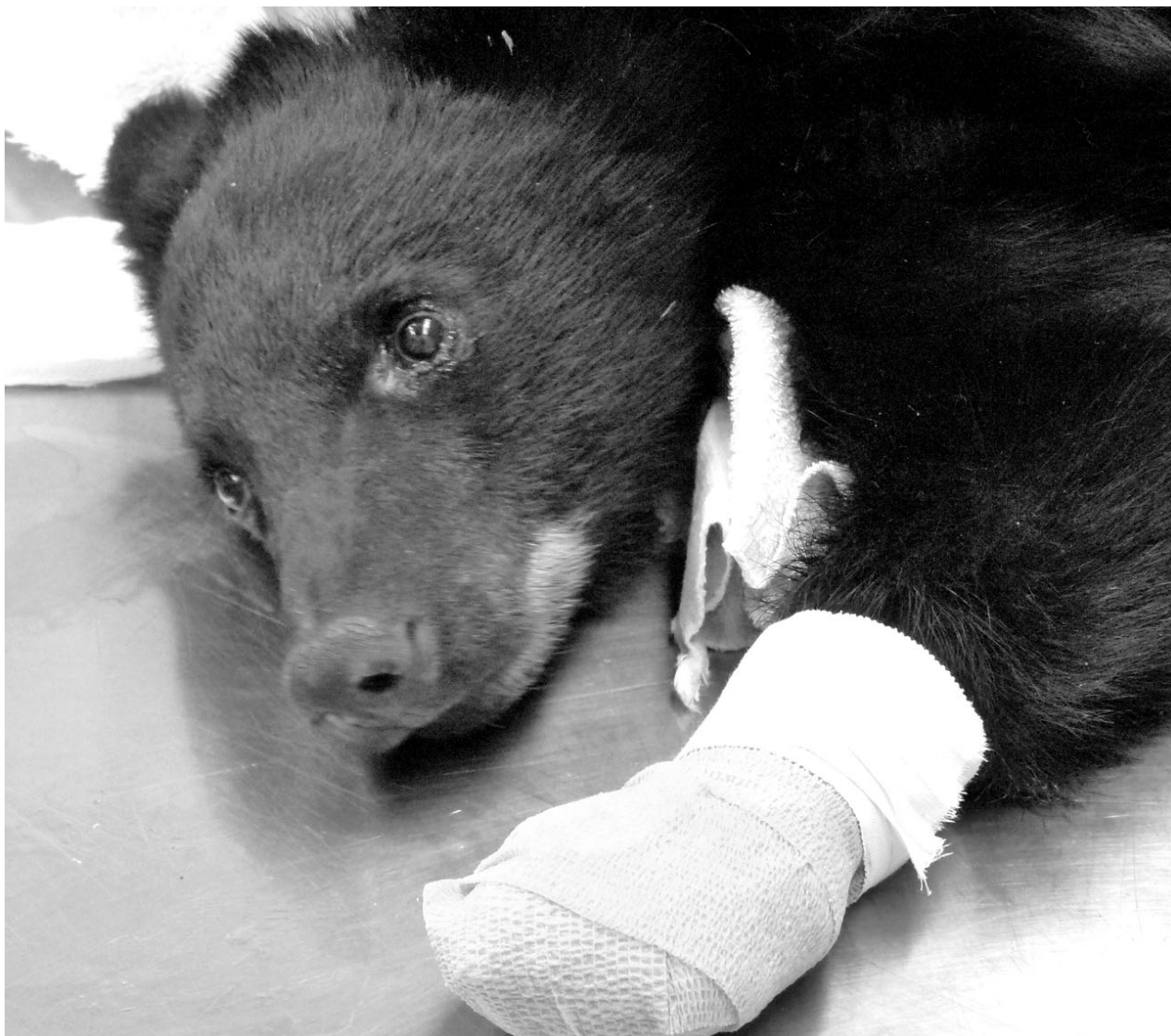
The *Idaho Statesman* reported Geoff Schroeder made the move to have himself declared “unaffiliated” following the May 15 election to protest the new law that allows only registered Republicans to vote in the party's primaries.

He's among party members including Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter who have concluded the closed primary alienates voters because it makes their choice of ballot a matter of public record and compromises their privacy.

“The GOP is ‘leering over ... a list of who is and who isn't declared as a Republican, a creepy aspect of government that is done by people like Saddam Hussein and Adolf Hitler,” Schroeder said. “I'm not going to be a part of it.”

Schroeder disagrees with the move by Idaho's majority party two years ago to sue the state to force the closed primary.

The 2011 Idaho Legislature adopted the closed primary after a federal judge sided with closure proponents who wanted to limit election participation and prevent cross-over voting by independents.

Boo Boo Is Making Progress

The bear, whose paws were burned during the Mustang Fire, could be released into a wildlife sanctuary within a couple weeks.

BOISE (AP) • A 4-month-old bear with paws burned in an Idaho wildfire is healing faster than expected.

The *Idaho Statesman* re-

ported the bear, known as Boo Boo, could be ready for release from care at the Idaho Humane Society to a wildlife sanctuary “in a couple of weeks.”

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game hopes to eventually return the cub to the wild.

A short rehabilitation would be helpful in ensuring the young bruin doesn't become habituated to people.

If the bear recovers sufficiently and hasn't become accustomed to hu-

mans, it could join four other orphaned black bear cubs at Snowdon Wildlife Sanctuary near McCall.

Native habitat there would be an ideal halfway house, to prepare the bear for eventual release to Idaho's backcountry.

The bear was found Aug. 26 without its mother.

Agencies Continue to Investigate Canal Electrocuting

Investigators are uncertain what caused the irrigation ditch to become electrified.

BLACKFOOT (AP) • Officials from several agencies are still working to determine just what caused the water in an eastern Idaho irrigation ditch to become electrified, killing three people.

Bingham County Sheriff Dave Johnson says his office, state and private investigators and Idaho Power Company officials are all reviewing the deaths of 31-year-old Jacquelyn Poulson, 41-year-old Lance Hicks and 49-year-old Keith Tarpley.

The three died in succession Thursday after entering an irrigation ditch containing electrified water.

Johnson says a nearby irrigation pump was the source of the charge, but the reason appears to be a problem with the main flow of electricity from a nearby transformer.

It's the region's second irrigation ditch electrocution in about a year.

Lisa Warwick died in July 2011 when faulty pump wiring electrified irrigation water.

Idaho County Land Swap Plan Likely Dead

GRANGEVILLE (AP) • An Idaho County commissioner says the county's efforts to keep land slated for a trade between a timber company and the U.S. Forest Service within county borders are likely over.

The *Lewiston Tribune* reported Commissioner Skip Brandt said during a meeting Tuesday that the Forest Service hasn't yet reached a decision on the deal to trade land in the Nez Perce-Clearwater National Forest for a checkerboard of about 62 square miles of Western Pacific Timber Co.-owned land in the upper Lochsa River drainage. County commissioners have opposed the plan,

fearing it would cause the county to lose even more of its property tax base.

As a compromise, county officials recently pushed to keep all of the traded land within county borders. That would have meant that private land owned by Western Pacific Timber Co. and federal land within the county would simply trade places, leaving the tax base largely the same.

But Brandt says he's learned the county's proposal won't work, because the land the county suggested for trade contains too much old-growth timber and doesn't pass National Environmental Policy Act requirements.

Two Men from Caldwell Arrested on Federal Drug Charges

CALDWELL (AP) • Herminio Sandoval, 58, and Rogelio Villasenor, 47, both of Caldwell, were arrested Wednesday on federal drug charges, U.S. Attorney Wendy J. Olson said. The two men were indicted by a federal grand jury in May.

According to the 19-page indictment unsealed Wednesday, the men are both charged with conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine, cocaine and marijuana. Sandoval is also charged with conspiracy to maintain drug-involved premises, maintaining drug-involved premises and conspiracy to launder money.

Arraignment has not been set.

The charge of conspir-

acy to distribute methamphetamine, cocaine and marijuana carries a mandatory minimum of 10 years in prison, a maximum fine of \$10 million and at least five years of supervised release.

The government is seeking criminal forfeiture of assets derived from the drug trafficking offenses.

The indictment was the result of a joint investigation of the Organized Crime and Drug Enforcement Task Force, a federal multi-agency program that supplies supplemental federal funding to federal and state agencies involved in the identification, investigation and prosecution of major drug trafficking organizations.

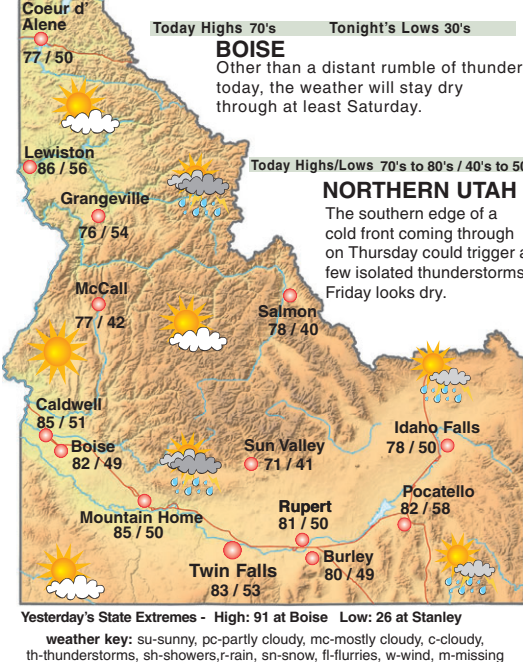

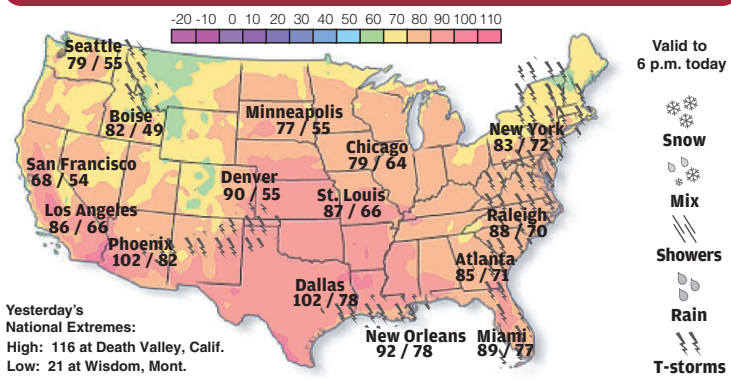

Suspect ID'd in Quebec Election Rally Shooting

MONTREAL (AP) • Police interrogated a man accused of opening fire at a midnight victory rally for Quebec's new separatist premier, but they said the suspect's rambling statements in French and English offered no immediate motive for the shooting that killed one man and wounded another.

Police said a 48-year-old man was pronounced dead at the scene and a 27-year-old man was wounded but would survive. A third man was treated for shock. Police didn't identify the victims, but they worked at production company Productions du Grand Bambou Inc, a person answering the phone at the Montreal company confirmed.

Marois said that when she first went backstage, she saw that someone was wounded and there was a fire outside, but she thought everything was under control. Police initially said the gunman made it into the building, but later said they believe he opened fire just outside in the back alley. The gunman then lit a small fire before he was captured, police said.

and there are plenty of videos on YouTube showing the epic fails of sinking SkiDoo's if you don't do it just right.

But despite the potential of sinking a machine weighing hundreds of pounds in the middle of a lake, Guthrie said he is out to prove this

machine isn't just for winter months.

"As long as you don't stop, you won't sink," he said. "Thirty-five miles per hour is a good general rule."

Guthrie rides a 1994 Polaris XLT and doesn't really do any big modifications to run it across local lakes.

"You don't have to do anything, you just have to be brave," he said.

The only thing he removes is the seat, preferring to stand, and tapes up holes where water could enter and flood the engine and let the clutches slip. He also puts in just a gallon of fuel, enough to do a couple of laps and circles.

He hasn't sunk one yet.

"I've been pretty lucky," Guthrie said.

Just to be safe he ties a rope to it so he can attempt to grab it and a

buoy to mark its place and help it float.

Guthrie said he and six others used to ride their snowmobiles across water all the time, but now it's just him, that he knows of who rides.

"Here everyone thinks you're crazy," he said.

But there is a community of riders called the International Watercross Association, a member owned and operated nonprofit organization founded in 1988. The IWA's mission is to provide a safe environment for the sanctioning and promotion of the sport of Snowmobile Watercross Racing.

Several competitions have been held during the summer in Wisconsin and Minnesota, with one more coming up in the middle of September.

In Idaho you can see snowmobiles skimming over water at the Blackfoot Pride Days in Blackfoot. The event has become tradition at the annual celebration.

Guthrie said he registers his snowmobile as a boat and along with proper licensing also has to buy an invasive species permit.

"You do have vehicles that are amphibious," said Connie Dunbar, supervisor of the Twin Falls County Department of Motor Vehicles. "There are vehicles that can have dual registration."

For example, she said, a utility or all-terrain vehicle can have skis added so it can be used on snowmobile trails.

In the winter, Guthrie said he likes to hit the powder behind the handlebars of his snowmobile.

"I'm on a mission to prove it's not seasonal," he said.

Cast, Boom, Splash

Whether you're looking to birdwatch, drown a worm or take a hike, try Magic Valley's six wildlife management areas.

HAGERMAN • The wind whipped across the water's surface, making waves as Don Torbett cast his fishing line. At its end was a white plastic jig he'd used since arriving at the small lake a couple of hours earlier. In that time, with help from his basic jig, he caught 15 trout — most of them rainbows, but some golden.

He kept only a couple.

"I like to catch and release," the Wendell man said — one of the reasons he uses a jig instead of a bait hook. The jig usually is not swallowed by the fish and is easier to get out of the mouth than a regular hook.

Torbett, who fishes at least once a week at Riley's Pond inside the Hagerman Wildlife Management Area, said Aug. 24 that he usually has plenty of luck near the pond's bridge. That, it seems, is where most people cast their lines. It also is where the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, which manages the site and five other WMAs in the Magic Valley, stocks the pond every Friday.

Fishing is a favorite activity at these places, but there are other things to do besides drop a hook.

Like what?

"We try to allow most all recreational uses

at our WMAs," said regional big game manager Randy Smith. "We get all kinds of users. We get hikers, hunters, bird watchers."

Unlike nature preserves, management areas are places where licensed hunters can go after game, usually waterfowl or upland game, but in some cases small and big game. The exception is Hagerman, he said, which serves as a refuge for wintering birds.

What else is there to see and do at these often scenic places? Plenty of family fun, Smith said.

Hagerman

What to see: The Hagerman site, home to a variety of waterfowl, is one of the best places in the valley to view nature at its most active. The site is habitat for songbirds, muskrat, otter, frogs and butterflies, to name a few.

Wendell resident Jodee DeWitt, an angler, said she once saw a fly fisherman at the pond unintentionally catch a frog. And there's a

particular osprey in the area that once in a while swoops down to grab a fish out of the pond, she said, noting that she visits the WMA at least once a week in summer.

What to do: Fishing is perhaps the most popular activity here, but it's not the only thing. A nearby show pond with a variety of fish — including golden and rainbow trout, tiger muskie and sturgeon — is something both children and their parents enjoy. Drop a quarter into a machine to get a handful of pellets to feed the fish, or read the bulletin board to learn about the region's many kinds

of freshwater fish.

Want to eat your lunch or chill with a good book? Try the picnic tables beneath thick shade trees in a small park just south of the show pond.

Young people might like to search for frogs near the water's banks or see what kinds of butterflies flit among the flowers and reeds.

To get there: From Twin Falls, take U.S. Highway 30 west toward Hagerman. After passing Thousand Springs State Park and crossing the Snake River, watch for the green

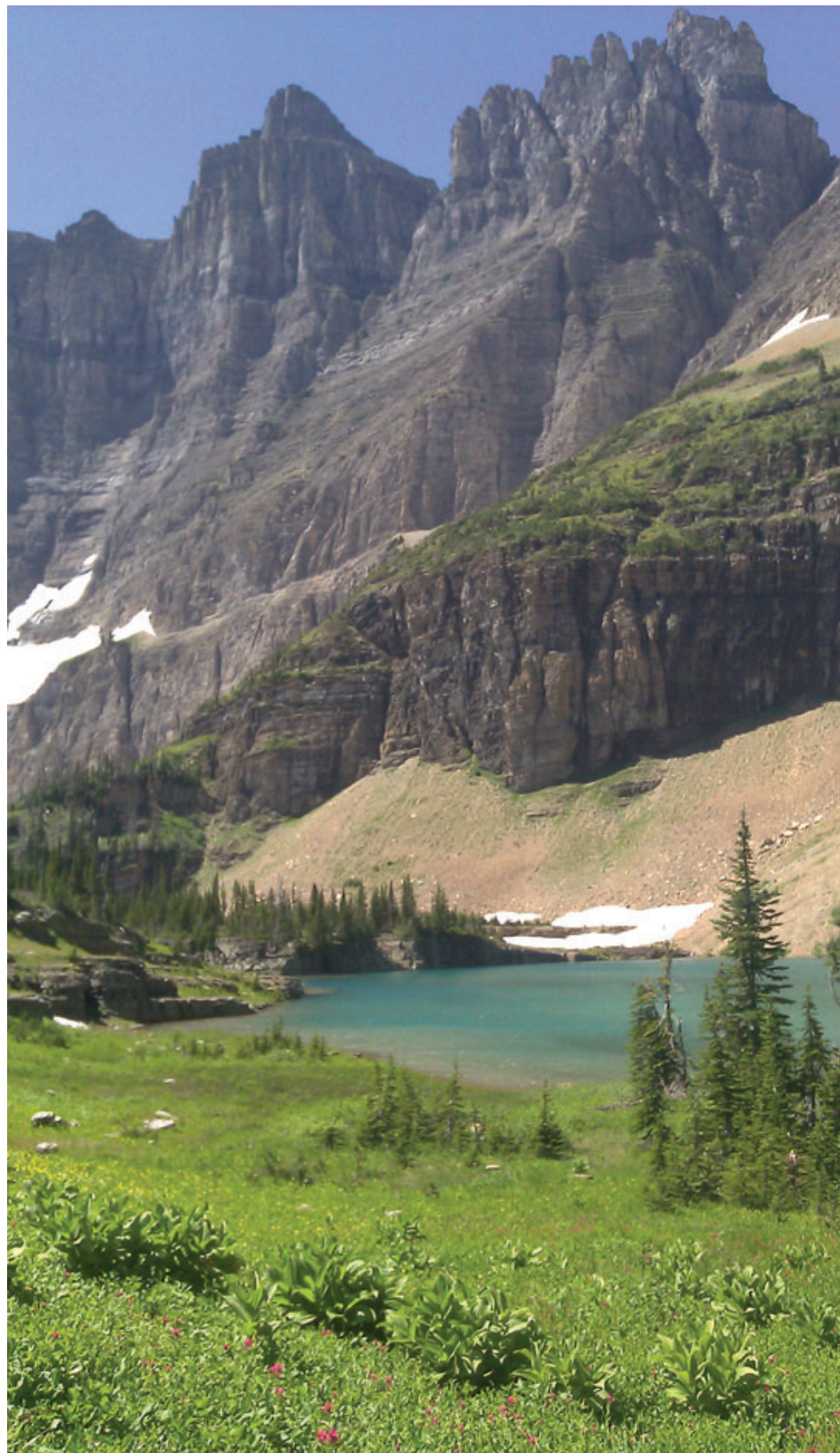

Staying on the Beaten Path

BOISE • Officials with the Idaho Off-Highway Vehicle Public Outreach Campaign are urging people who use ATVs or motorbikes during hunting season to stay on designated trails and do their homework to ensure that the trails they plan to ride are open. Some new resources are available.

Officials with the U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management and Idaho Department of Fish and Game say that hunters riding off-trail on ATVs or motorbikes continue to be a problem on public lands during hunting season.

"We are most concerned with instances where a hunter drives off-trail to scout for game or retrieve game," said Andy Brunelle, a spokesman

for the U.S. Forest Service. "One set of tracks through the brush or in a meadow can invite others to do the same, and the impacts add up, damaging vegetation and causing soil erosion into streams."

According to the latest survey, about 70 percent of the 240,000 people who hunt in Idaho (residents and non-residents) during the fall months are using motorbikes or ATVs to access their hunting areas.

There are five ways that hunters can research what trails and hunting units are open to OHV use:

1. U.S. Forest Service officials encourage hunters to obtain Motor Vehicle Use Maps from the national forest where they plan to hunt. Hard-copy maps are available from national for-

est ranger district offices, Fish and Game offices, and in many cases, the MVUMs are online. The OHV Campaign's stayon-trails.com web site has a link to all of the current online MVUMs: <http://stayon-trails.com/mvum/>.

2. BLM travel maps. A comprehensive list of BLM travel maps statewide is located here: <http://stayon-trails.com/blmTravel/> and on BLM web sites. Hard-copy maps are available at BLM district offices and field offices.

3. Check the Fish and Game Big Game Regulations booklet (pages 79-80) to see if there are any restrictions on OHV use in specific hunting units. The Fish and Game OHV Rule affects 31 units statewide out of a total of 78

hunting units. The OHV rule applies only to certain big game hunts.

4. The Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation has a new online map resource that's great for researching new OHV trails and for checking on whether OHV trails are open during hunting season, and when. The web site is: <http://trails.idaho.gov>. The maps break down trail restrictions by OHVs, Utility Terrain Vehicles, ATVs and motorbikes.

5. YouTube hunting tips video. The video walks hunters through the process of researching whether trails are open; youtube.com/watch?v=Pcs-DxtNGG4M

Under the Forest Service's National Travel Rule, "it's

incumbent on the user to know if the trail is open or closed" regardless if the trail is signed appropriately, forest officials said. That's because people have been known to shoot signs full of bullet holes, remove signs or vandalize them.

Jon Heggen, enforcement chief for the Idaho Department of Fish and game, encouraged motorbike and ATV riders to be sensitive to the fact that some people

may be hunting on foot in the same area where they are riding their trail machine. "We want to remind hunters to stay on trails and be courteous to other users," Heggen said.

Hunters also should be aware that a new state law requires youths who do not have a driver's license to take a free safety course before they ride OHVs on forest roads, and that youths under the age of 18 are required to wear a helmet when riding on an OHV or driving one.

A couple of years ago my eldest granddaughter, Amy, told me that she wanted to learn how to shoot. I took that opportunity to make a pinky-swear deal with her. I told her that if she would do some extra Mom-assigned chores around the house and talk her Dad into taking the Hunter Education class with her, I would gift her with her first firearm.

She held up her part of the bargain, and at the end of the summer I arrived at her house with a brand new Ruger 10-22 Compact carbine, several bulk packs of .22s, a couple of 10, 25-round magazines and a zippered case.

Over the next several years she honed her safety and shooting skills by expending thousands of rounds at the formal and informal targets, as well as popping literally hundreds of gophers, prairie dogs, and a smattering of skunks, feral cats and rock chucks.

Early this summer, Amy

told me that she felt she was ready to carry her own big game rifle when she went deer and antelope hunting with her father this fall. Obviously always the easy sell, I told her I would be proud to include enough money in her 18th birthday card for her to buy a reasonably-priced big game rifle of her choice.

With limited funding, Amy limited her search to new entry level bolt-action rifles. Locally, there were about a half-dozen viable candidates within her \$300-\$450 price range. She studied and handled the Remington 770, Weatherby Vanguard, Mossberg ATR, Stevens (Savage) 200, Marlin XL7, and the Thompson Center Venture. For fit, finish and standard features, she settled on the T/C Ven-

ture Compact in .308 Winchester.

Here's why she put her money down on the Venture: For 2012, the Venture is available in three distinct models. Additionally, all Venture stocks are pillar-bedded and feature Hogue nonslip rubberized wrist and fore-

arm inserts for sure gripping, no matter the weather. The Venture's adjustable trigger is blocked by a convenient two position safety. Weaver style bases sit atop the sculpted steel receiver, which accepts the three-shot single-stack polymer detachable magazine.

Perhaps best of all, this economy rifle boasts the same precision match grade barrel as T/C's flagship bolt gun, the (\$1,000) Icon. Did I mention it also carries the same lifetime warranty and accuracy guarantee as its pricey stable mate?

Everything considered, if you're in the market for a quality predator or big game rifle this year, you might want to visit your local gun retailer and wrap your hands around a Venture. With the pre-season sales and rebates about to kick in, odds are very good that you'll be taking one home.

How to Avoid Bear Conflicts

JEROME • As hunters venture into the woods this fall, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game is asking them to be mindful of their food and garbage.

The same cautions apply to homeowners in bear country. Most bear complaints happen in later summer and early fall when bears are traveling in search of food.

"Anyone who leaves food out are actually baiting in hungry bears," said Barry Cummings, Fish and Game conservation officer based in Deary. "Bears have a tremendous sense of smell, and once they get used to finding an easy food source, they'll keep coming back and problems will occur."

Tips around camp:

- Keep a clean camp. Pick up garbage and store it in a closed vehicle, bear-resistant container, or in a bag tied high between two trees. Store all food the same way. Coolers are not bear-resistant and never keep food in a tent.

- Don't cook near tents or sleeping areas, and never wear clothes you cook in to bed.

- Don't bury food scraps, pour out cooking grease, or leave anything that might be tasty on the ground or in the fire pit. Also, store barbecue grills or other smelly cooking gear inside your vehicle or within a sealed

bear resistant container.

- Make game meat unavailable by hanging it at least 10 feet high and 4 feet from the nearest tree.

- If you see a bear, watch it from a distance and leave it alone. Black bears are not usually aggressive, but the danger may increase if a bear loses its fear of humans.

If your home or cabin is near bear country, here's some extra tips for you in these areas:

- Keep garbage in bear-resistant containers or in a closed building.

- Empty and remove bird feeders during the summer months when songbirds are able to forage on food provided by nature.

- Clean up fruit that has fallen in your yard. Rotting fruit will attract bears as well as raccoons and skunks.

- Feed pets inside or during daylight hours; don't leave pet food or food scraps outside of your home or camp, as it can attract bears, raccoons and skunks.

- Store horse and livestock grains inside closed barns.

- Keep barbecue grills stored in closed buildings.

Mourning Dove, Sandhill Crane Seasons Open

JEROME • September has opened a few hunts in Idaho, including mourning dove and sandhill crane hunts, which opened on Sept. 1.

Mourning dove season runs through Sept. 30, with the daily bag limit set at 10 birds; the possession limit after first day of season is 20.

Eurasian collared-doves are an introduced species that have expanded their range into Idaho. Eurasian collared-doves harvested while dove

hunting, should be left unplucked so they can be distinguished from mourning doves. They will not count as part of your aggregate bag limit of mourning doves as long as they are identifiable.

Eurasian collared-doves may be taken in any number and at any time by holders of a valid Idaho hunting license, provided such taking is not in violation of state, county, or city laws, ordinances or regulations.

Sandhill crane season

opened Sept. 1 and runs through the 15th in hunt areas 2, 3, 4 and 5. It runs through Sept. 30 in hunt areas 1 and 6.

The daily limit is three birds and the season limit is nine. Season and limit details are available in the sandhill brochure available at license vendors and online at <http://fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/docs/rules/uplandCrane.pdf>.

Anyone hunting mourning doves or sandhill cranes in

Idaho must have a valid Idaho hunting license with a federal Migratory Game Bird Harvest Information Program validation. The validation costs \$1.75 for residents and \$4.75 for nonresidents, and it is available at any license vendor. It is valid from Jan. 1-Dec. 31 of each year.

Shooting hours for mourning doves and sandhill cranes are listed on Page 19 of the upland game seasons and rules brochure.

Lightning Overshadows the Fishing During River Trip

ON THE RED RIVER, Manitoba • We thought we'd taken the necessary precautions. We'd read the weather forecast, watched the radar online and delayed our departure for an afternoon catfish excursion on the Red River near Selkirk, Manitoba.

Besides, another cup of coffee in the dryness of my Canadian friends' spacious house in the woods was a lot more appealing than launching a boat in the rain that poured down most of the morning.

The rain was going to pass, the forecast said, and the skies would clear after lunch.

That seemed to be the case a couple of Sundays ago, when two of us launched at the public boat access in Selkirk. I'd made the trip north not to specifically go fishing, but to take in a fish fry my Canadian friends host every year. More than 50 people had turned out the previous afternoon for the occasion, which included enough commercially-

bought Lake Winnipeg walleye to feed a small town.

The weather had cooperated, as well.

Early the next afternoon, the clouds lingered but the rain had stopped as we fished our way upstream from Selkirk. We'd give a spot 20 or minutes or so and pull anchor and move on if we hadn't caught a fish.

About three hours and seven big catfish into the afternoon, we'd fished our way to within about a mile of the St. Andrews Lock and Dam some eight miles upstream. The weather was unsettled, the fishing not fast and furious, but it was good enough to keep us interested.

Things were about to get a lot more interesting.

The rumbling was almost undetectable, at first, but then we saw the dark clouds billowing over the tall trees on the west side of the river.

Somebody, apparently, forgot to tell the storm that it wasn't in the forecast.

As bad luck would have it, we were as far from the boat

ramp as we'd been all day when the storm hit. That left us two choices: Hunker down and ride out the storm or pull anchor and make a beeline for the landing.

Taking immediate shelter — the recommended course of action during a thunderstorm — wasn't an option. It's a situation anyone who spends time outdoors inevitably encounters.

Foolish though it might have been in hindsight, we decided lightning would have a tougher time hitting a moving target. My Canadian friend tucked the boat in as close to shore as he dared — safer there than in the middle of the river, we figured — and throttled up his 60-horse Mercury as fast as it would go.

The rain fell so hard it was difficult to see where our surroundings ended and the river began.

I've been caught in lightning storms before and all of the most memorable — make that scariest — have occurred in Canada several miles from shelter. On one occasion, the

bolt of lightning that hit a few hundred yards in front of the boat sent us scrambling to shore, where we huddled in the trees amid an onslaught of mosquitoes.

The storm passed quickly, and we were back on the water within 15 minutes.

I was thinking about that encounter a couple of Sundays ago when I saw the bright flash, followed a millisecond later by a clap of thunder so loud it overpowered even the rain and the sound of the outboard.

"That one was close, eh?" I surely would have said if I was Canadian.

Gambling isn't a good idea where lightning is concerned, but by the time the city of Selkirk appeared in front of us, we'd driven out of the storm and the sky to the west was clear. It reminded me of a line a bush pilot once used when we pulled up to the dock at a fly-in fishing camp north of Red Lake, Ont.

"Once again, we cheat death," he said.

What's the Best Hunting Dog? That Depends on the Hunter

Tom Ness owns and operates Oahe Kennels near Menoken, N.D., and has been training dogs professionally since the early 1980s.

Ness, 59, became a full-time dog trainer in 1994.

Ness, who also guided pheasant hunts for several years, specializes in springer spaniels and cocker spaniels — flushing dogs — and has trained some 20 field trial champions.

Herald outdoors writer Brad Dokken recently talked to Ness about dogs, training and getting dogs ready for hunting season. Here's an edited transcript of that conversation:

Q. How did you get started in dog training?

A. A couple buddies of mine in college, we started going out west pheasant hunting. We'd shoot a few here and there and most of the time wouldn't find them. I thought, "I've got to get a dog." I was mostly settled on a springer and spent a number of years with springer spaniels. I started looking into other breeds and types, and I've had all kinds. They're all kind of specialists; that's the thing about dogs that I think people sometimes don't realize — they have a niche they evolved out of.

Q. How does one go about becoming a professional trainer?

A. When I graduated from (the University of North Dakota) I moved out to Wyoming. It's not really

bird country and so I started thinking about, "What am I going to do with this dog?" So I got involved with training. I got wind of field trials and started going to those. One day, someone asked me if I would train their dog, and away it went.

Q. When should training begin?

A. I start them when they're babies, when I bring a puppy home at 8 weeks old. If it's a retrieving breed, I start playing little retrieving games to get them proficient at retrieving short distances, and then longer and longer. The best dogs — I won the national cocker championship in 2010 — all the best dogs have been in the house and were pets. They get more stimulation.

Q. Walk me through the program you offer when you receive a dog for training.

A. I like to get them, plus or minus a couple of months, at about a year old so they've been well socialized and play trained so the natural instincts are kind of instilled in them, those natural things with no real control.

If they're a retrieving breed, I want the owner to be playing those retrieving games, play training, when they're little. If they're pointing dogs, try to get them out and get them into game and scent.

When I get them at that age, I've got them for about three months. I start with basic obedience and then take them into the field and teach them the mechanics of hunting — things like stop on command and change directions on command.

sign that reads “Hagerman Wildlife Management Area.” Turn east onto the gravel road that leads to the WMA.

Billingsley Creek

What to see: This is a tricky spot, because of private property that surrounds the WMA. Pay attention to where WMA property ends and private property begins. Reeds, cattails, frogs and waterfowl are here, as are some deer.

What to do: Billingsley Creek is best known by fishermen, who come here to drown a worm or cast a fly. It's a quiet spot, where the only sounds you might hear are the chirp of a bird or splash of a fish. Fall duck hunting and mule deer hunting also are allowed at the site, but because of its size — it's one of the smaller WMAs in the region — it can become overcrowded.

To get there: From Twin Falls, take Interstate 84 west to exit 141 and then drive 12 miles south on U.S. Highway 30 toward Hagerman. Just before entering Hagerman, sportsman access signs will direct you east to Billingsley Creek.

Big Cottonwood

What to see: Thick trees, ragged brush and flowing creek are some of the things you'll see at this nature getaway near Oakley. But there's also plenty of wildlife in the area.

The 814-acre site was purchased by Fish and Game

in 1993 for fish and wildlife conservation and is home to reintroduced California bighorn sheep, mule deer, upland birds, wild turkeys, bobcats, Yellowstone cut-throat trout and other wildlife. In the vicinity, you might catch a glimpse of wild turkeys. You'll likely need binoculars, however, to catch a good view of these skittish birds.

What to do: Besides wildlife viewing, Big Cottonwood offers visitors spectacular views and easy to moderate dirt trails for mountain biking and horseback riding. This WMA is gateway to thousands of acres of public land. Hunters like it because they can find an assortment of upland gamebirds.

To get there: Take Interstate 84 to Exit 208 (Burley) and travel 20 miles south on Idaho Highway 27 to the Big Cottonwood WMA sign (1600 South). Turn west on 1600 South and follow the signs seven miles to the WMA.

Camas Prairie

What to see: As with most of the WMA's, there's plenty of waterfowl here including Canada geese, mallards, gadwalls, American wigeon, northern pintails, green-winged, blue-winged and cinnamon teal, northern shovelers, lesser scaup, canvasbacks, redheads and ruddy ducks. Sage grouse and gray partridge inhabit upland areas of the WMA. Barn, bank and violet-green swallows hunt insects over Centennial Marsh. Upland habitats are home to western flycatchers, horned larks,

mountain bluebirds, sage thrashers and a host of other species.

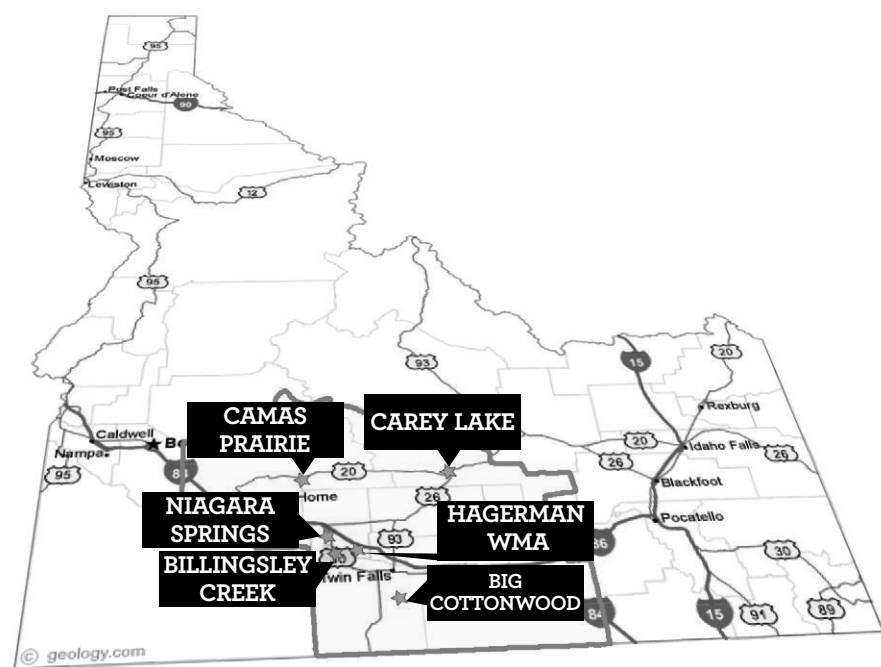
What to do: While Fish and Game tries to allow most recreational uses at its WMAs, Smith said, some are better for certain types of activity than others. At the Camas Prairie, about 14 miles west of Fairfield, waterfowl and small game hunting is allowed. “However,” reads the Fish and Game website, “opportunities are directly affected by precipitation levels the summer and fall previous. Upland bird hunting is spotty, while small game hunting can be good...”

To get there: Take Interstate 84 to exit 95 (Mountain Home). Turn north on U.S. Highway 20 and travel 45 miles to Hill City. Watch for the WMA sign and west entrance (Swamp Road) to Camas Prairie Centennial Marsh WMA.

Carey Lake

What to see: There are plenty of wildlife to view at Carey Lake. Mule deer are the most abundant big game animal and can be found here throughout the year. Pronghorn antelope occasionally come onto the WMA. Coyote, red fox, badger, striped skunk and numerous rodents are found throughout the area and surrounding farmland.

What to do: Bring your binoculars, for starters, and to try catch a glimpse of the wildlife. You don't need any glasses for the most popular activity here, however. Instead, bring your fishing pole. Fishing is the main



draw at this WMA, and the lake is stocked with healthy bass and bluegill.

“Carey Lake is pretty good before it freezes up,” Smith said.

“Waterfowl hunters can expect to be successful,” reads the Fish and Game website. Big game hunting and trapping are also popular at this WMA.

To get there: From Carey, travel about 1 mile east on combined Highway 20/26/93 that borders the northern boundary of the WMA. Signs and a short access road will take you to the parking area.

Niagara Springs

What to see: Birds of prey seem to like Niagara Springs. Don't be surprised if you see golden eagles, prairie fal-

cons, American kestrels, red-tailed hawks and northern harriers, all of which nest on these WMA lands. Osprey and bald eagles occasionally are seen along the Snake River.

Reptiles and amphibians also make their home here, including gopher snakes, racers, side-blotched lizards, Great Basin spadefoot toads, bull frogs and Pacific treefrogs.

What to do: A couple of fish hatcheries are nearby where you can see trout and steelhead. Across from the Fish and Game hatchery are bubbling springs. Find the bench at a lookout spot where you can sit and listen to the roaring waterfalls, or head farther into the WMA to a small park with picnic tables and restrooms. You're likely to see varieties of butterfly

among the many flowers that bloom here, and you can fish in the Snake. Small game and waterfowl hunting are allowed for licensed hunters.

“I was down at Niagara Springs the other day, after about a year and a half, and I couldn't believe the amount of work that's been done,” Smith said. “There's nice big parking areas, good clean restrooms, some of the ponds are being fixed ... and it's not very far away.”

To get there: Take Interstate 84 toward Wendell, take exit 157, and travel seven miles south. As you approach the WMA, the striking lava rock rim of the Snake River Canyon will loom into view. After a sharp left turn, the road descends to the canyon bottom and the WMA entrance.

Bait Fishermen Hooked on Oregon's East Lake

EAST LAKE, Ore. • As soon as we pulled up to the boat ramp, John Garrison noted the coots that crowded the edge of the lake.

The arrival of the dark, ducklike birds marks the coming of fall, according to Garrison, a longtime Central Oregon fishing guide.

“The change in season is upon us,” he said.

But one thing that has not changed is the consistent bait fishing on East Lake this summer.

Garrison powered his 24-foot pontoon away from the Hot Springs boat ramp on a Tuesday morning through thick smoke from regional wildfires. We were headed for an underground mound near the middle of the lake, where fish tend to congregate.

East Lake — located at 6,381 feet in elevation in the Newberry National Volcanic Monument, 37 miles southeast of Bend — offers a variety of fish to the sport angler: rainbow trout, brown trout, Atlantic salmon and kokanee.

As the cold wind whipped up waves on the lake, Garrison rigged one rod with PowerBait and another with

a live dragonfly nymph and a bobber. (A piece of worm and a bobber is also an effective technique on East Lake.)

East Lake has long been a reliable fishery for bait anglers, but it typically undergoes a midsummer slump when high water temperatures drive the trout and salmon down deep.

“East Lake's been good this year,” said Garrison, owner of Garrison's Guide Service in Sunriver. “It's not as good as it was, because of the heat. It's cooling down, so the rest of the season should be thumbs up.”

The first strike of the day was on the PowerBait. The rod twitched in the holder, and I grabbed it and set the hook. The fish — a plump 18-inch rainbow trout — came splashing out of the lake as I reeled it into the boat. Over the first hour of fishing, we landed five rainbows in the 16- to 20-inch range — colorful, healthy-looking fish that fought with tenacity.

“The rainbows here are getting beautiful,” Garrison said. “Very, very nice rainbows.”

Fishing boats began to crowd the popular lake as ospreys soared overhead and the wind gained even more

intensity, clearing some of the smoke that had hovered above the lake.

We hit a dry spell by mid-morning. But Garrison glanced at his fish finder and we knew we were back in business — the finder showed a huge school of fish directly below the boat. They were most likely Atlantic salmon, as they tend to swim in schools.

Slim, and silver-sided with spots, Atlantic salmon often fight hard beneath the surface, rather than flying out of the water like rainbows often do.

“The Atlantics are nice fish — good fighters, too,” Garrison said. “They're big, lean and crazy.”

More than 40 feet away from the boat, one of the yellow bobbers stood on end. Garrison yelled and I clutched the rod, reeled the line tight, watched the bobber disappear, then set the hook. I cranked a 16-inch Atlantic salmon to the boat, and we admired its shiny silver coloring.

We had found the Atlantics, and they seemed to want only the dragonfly nymphs. By late morning, the PowerBait was ineffective.

Our bobbers were so ac-

tive, I began to develop what Garrison calls “bobberitis,” an affliction of the easily excitable and anxious angler who thinks he sees movement on the bobber when in fact there is none.

“You have bobberitis,” Garrison scolded me. “That's when people start seeing things. I've seen it thousands of times. They see stuff that's just not happening.”

Dove Hunting Has Many Advantages

SACRED HEART, Minn. • The eastern sky hadn't yet turned crimson when the first mourning doves appeared, jitterbugging over the lush landscape.

“There's one!” 22-year-old Eric Hillesheim shouted. He whirled around, shouldered his shotgun and fired once, dropping the bird.

Gunshots echoed in the distance as six other hunters in our group peppered the sky with birdshot, trying to hit the elusive birds.

On a balmy summer day that later sizzled, Minnesota's mourning dove season opened Saturday. The dove opener doesn't have the tradition in Minnesota that duck, pheasant or ruffed grouse openers have. I saw no other dove hunters at my motel, or in the restaurants or gas stations nearby.

But for those who love wing-shooting, retrieving dogs and excellent wild cuisine, the hunt is a time to renew acquaintances with a 12-gauge.

Why not more?

Dove hunting — wildly popular in many states to the south — was reinstated by the Legislature in 2004 after a nearly 60-year absence.

Officials had estimated 30,000 to 50,000 hunters might pursue the sporty birds, which are among the most challenging for wing-shooters. Instead, Minnesota hunter numbers have averaged around 10,000 the past three years. That compares to 78,000 pheasant hunters, 83,000 duck hunters and 94,000 ruffed grouse hunters.

Dove hunting has a lot going for it: Action can be fast. Gear requirements are minimal. And doves taste great.

So why hasn't it grown? Ed Boggess, Department of Natural Resources Fish and Wildlife director, can only speculate.

“We lack the long-term tradition of dove hunting,” he said. “And we're blessed with lots of options here — goose hunting, bear hunting and fishing. I think there always will be a number of hunters who like to do it, but it may never be a big activity here.”

Singer-songwriter Joe South Dies at 72

ATLANTA (AP) • Singer-songwriter Joe South, who penned hits in the 1960s and 1970s like "Games People Play" and "Down in the Boondocks," died Wednesday, his music publisher said. South was 72.

South, whose real name was Joseph Souter, died at his home in Buford, Ga., northeast of Atlanta, according to Marion Merck of the Hall County Coroner's office. Merck said South died from natural causes stemming from a heart attack.

"He's one of the greatest songwriters of all time," said Butch Lowery, president of the Lowery Group, which published South's music. "His songs have touched so many lives. He's such a wonderful guy and loved by many."

South was an inductee in the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame and the Georgia Music Hall of Fame.

South's song "Down in the Boondocks" was a 1965 hit for singer Billy Joe Royal. South

worked as a session guitar player on recordings such as Aretha Franklin's "Chain of Fools," and on albums such as Bob Dylan's "Blonde on Blonde" and LPs by Eddy Arnold and Marty Robbins.

South also had a solo singing career producing hits such as the late 60s-song "Games People Play," which won him two Grammys for Best Contemporary Song and Song of the Year. The song, which was released on South's debut album "Intro-spect," spoke against hate, hypocrisy and inhumanity.

"Walk A Mile In My Shoes" and "Don't It Make You Want to Go Home" were also hits for South. He also wrote the Grammy-nominated "(I Never Promised You a) Rose Garden" for Lynn Anderson.

But his music career was struck by tragedy when his brother, Tommy Souter, committed suicide in 1971. South's last album was "Classic Masters" in 2002.

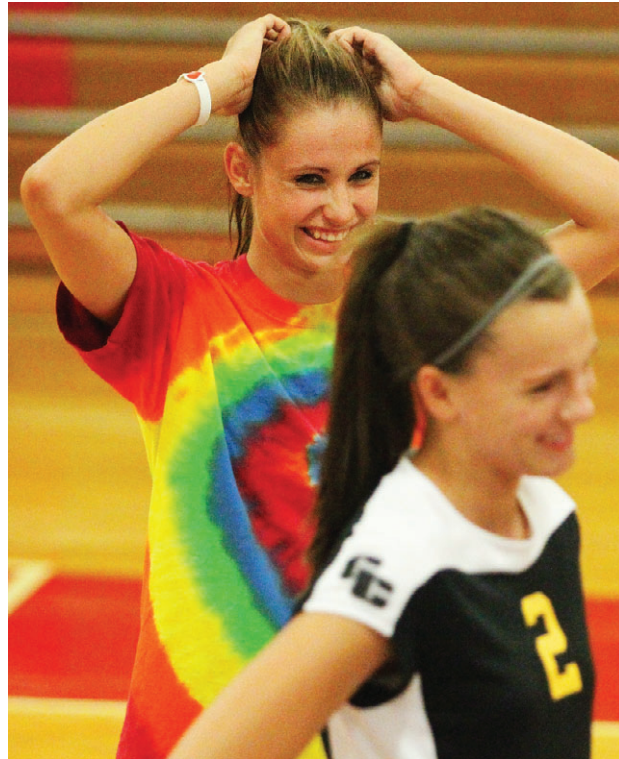
When coaches realize she's barely played three years of volleyball, her upside is tantalizing.

Roddick's Career Ends With Loss to del Potro

NEW YORK • More than an hour after hitting one last shot as a professional tennis player, then delivering one last, voice-wavering speech to an adoring U.S. Open audience, Andy Roddick exited the locker room one last time.

Accompanied by his wife and other family members, a black baseball cap tugged low over his eyes, Roddick slung a racket bag off his aching right shoulder — the one responsible for so many high-speed aces, violent forehands and the most recent Grand Slam title by an American man — and tossed the equipment in the back of a waiting van.

Won't need that any longer.

Serenaded by choruses of "Let's go, Andy!" that rang through Arthur Ashe Stadium in the closing moments of his career, the 2003 U.S. Open champion headed into retirement with a 6-7 (1), 7-6 (4), 6-2, 6-4 loss to 2009 champion Juan Martin del Potro of Argentina in the fourth round at Flushing Meadows on Wednesday.

"If we do badly, then it costs us something; if we do well, we get great things. This was about something bigger. It wasn't about ranking points or paychecks or anything else," Roddick said. "This week I felt like I was 12 years old, playing in a park. It was extremely innocent. That was fun. I enjoyed it."

It was a bittersweet goodbye, for the fans who gave him a standing ovation at the end — del Potro joined in, rising from his changeover chair to applaud — and for Roddick himself.

He covered his face with a white towel while seated on the sideline after sailing a running forehand long with the final swing of his racket. Earlier, he appeared to be trying to avoid crying while serving in the next-to-last game; in the stands, his wife, model-actress Brooklyn Decker, stuck a finger underneath her dark sunglasses to wipe away her tears.

"Playing the last five games was pretty hard. Once I got down a break, I could barely look at my (guest) box," Roddick said during a news conference sprinkled with the sort of witty one-liners he quickly came to be known for after turning pro in 2000. "I don't know what the emotions are. I'm a little overwhelmed right now. I normally feel like I can grasp things pretty quickly and clearly. I certainly don't feel that way right now."

During an on-court address to the crowd, Roddick got choked up, particularly when making a reference to his longtime agent, Ken Meyerson, who died last year.

When handed a microphone, Roddick began by saying: "Oh, wow. For the first time in my career, I'm not sure what to say."

"Since I was a kid, I've been coming to this tournament. I felt lucky just to sit where all of you are sitting today, to watch this game, to see the champions that have come and gone," Roddick told the fans in a moment reminiscent of Andre Agassi's farewell speech at the 2006 U.S. Open after his final match. "I've loved every

minute of it."

It was appropriate that Roddick would leave tennis at Flushing Meadows, which is why he surprisingly announced last Thursday, his 30th birthday, that the U.S. Open would be his final tournament. A perfect bookend: He visited the hard-court Grand Slam tournament at age 9, a trip his parents gave him as a birthday present.

He would go on to win a junior title in New York, then the 2003 men's trophy at age 21, allowing him to end that season No. 1 in the ATP rankings.

He later participated in four other major finals — one at the U.S. Open, three at Wimbledon — and lost each to Roger Federer, including a 16-14 fifth set at the All England Club in 2009.

"In my mind," Federer said last week, "he is a Wimbledon champion."

Federer Ousted in Quarters

NEW YORK (AP) • Maybe Roger Federer got too much time off between U.S. Open matches. This much is certain: He won't be playing again at this year's tournament after losing to Tomas Berdych in the quarterfinals.

Five-time champion Federer departs Flushing Meadows before the semifinals for the first time since 2003, stunned by the sixth-seeded Berdych 7-6 (1), 6-4, 3-6, 6-3 on Wednesday night.

Federer's forehand was way off, while the 6-foot-5 Berdych kept pounding serves and groundstrokes right where he wanted them. It was Berdych's fourth victory in his last seven meetings against Federer, including in the 2010 Wimbledon quarterfinals.

Mizzou, Texas A&M Welcome New SEC Rivals

For good measure, Richardson added: "If we execute, nobody in this league can touch us. Period."

Missouri coach Gary Pinkel, of course, tried to douse the flames Wednesday.

"First of all, what Sheldon did was wrong and irresponsible," Pinkel said. "That doesn't happen around here. He got caught up in the moment, he made a mistake, we handled that internally. We don't do that here at Missouri!"

And Georgia coach Mark Richt had some fun with it: "Being over 50, and I'm getting AARP stuff in the mail, I took it as a compliment."

There have been no such sparks flying out of College Station, Texas. The Aggies' scheduled opener against Louisiana Tech was postponed by Hurricane Isaac, so this will be A&M's first game under new coach Kevin Sumlin.

The Gators hope they got the kinks worked out, and there were plenty, in a 27-14

victory against Bowling Green.

While the Aggies have refrained from trash talking, somebody out there was trying to cause trouble this week.

On Tuesday a billboard popped up in Gainesville, Fla., that had this message for the locals:

"Howdy Gainesville: You've been annexed by Aggie Nation The Best Academics & Cleanest Program in the SEC. WHOOP! Real Football. Real Tradition!"

The school immediately distanced itself from the sign, saying it had nothing to do with it and was "investigating" to find out who did.

It was down by the end of the day, and whether or not it was placed by overconfident Aggies fans or maybe fans of one of Texas A&M's old Big 12 rivals, it made for some fun Twitter fodder.

The former Formula One driver took the Paralympic gold medal Wednesday in paracycling — a hand cycle powered by the arms — at the Brands Hatch race track, posting a time of 24 minutes, 50.22 seconds.

The victory capped an incredible journey for the 45-year-old who almost died in a horrific accident at a 2001 CART race in Germany.

"It's an amazing feeling," a clearly exuberant Zanardi said. "I'm really, really happy for the result!"

Zanardi celebrated by sliding out of his cycle and lifting it over his head with one hand and raising his other arm, fist clenched, to the sky.

It was unusual. It was on purpose.

"I'm Alex Zanardi," he said with a huge grin, his Italian accent dragging each syllable. "I always have to come up with something. I have a little bit of a big head."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Today's deal was played in the quarterfinals of the world championships in Beijing four years ago. At most tables, East showed both minors, West selected diamonds, and North doubled for takeout. Can you guess what should happen next? Let's see what happened in the match between the Netherlands and Germany.

In the first room, the German South, Joseph Piekarek, sat for the double of three diamonds. The heart lead got the defenders off on the right track (not everybody found it). Declarer now had no chance to avoid losing one trick in each major, two clubs and two trumps, down 500.

The Dutch South, Huub Bertens, escaped from three diamonds doubled, to three spades, and I'm sure if the German East-West had known their teammates had collected 500, they would have happily conceded 140. But East chose to double Bertens in the pass-out seat to show extras for his two-suited action, a good idea in theory. West passed it out, and his opening club lead went to the queen and king. But that persuaded East to continue the suit rather than shift to diamonds. Declarer won the club ace, then led a heart to the queen and another heart to the 10 and ace. Now he ruffed a club, led a spade to the six, cashed the heart king, and led a fourth heart, pitching a second diamond.

West could ruff in, but Bertens could trump the next diamond in dummy, draw one more round of spades, then run hearts and give West his trump trick for 730.

In 1939, the Union of South Africa declared war on Germany.

In 1948, Princess Juliana of the Netherlands was inaugurated as queen, two days after the abdication of her mother, Queen Wilhelmina.

In 1952, Canadian television broadcasting began in Montreal.

In 1966, South African Prime Minister Hendrik Verwoerd (fehr-FOORT') was stabbed to death by an apparently deranged page during a parliamentary session in Cape Town.

In 1970, Palestinian guerrillas seized control of three U.S.-bound jetliners. (Two were later blown up on the ground in Jordan, along with a London-bound plane hijacked on Sept. 9; the fourth plane was destroyed on the ground in Egypt. No hostages were harmed.)

In 1972, a memorial service was held at the site of the Summer Olympics in Munich, West Germany, a day after the deadly terrorist attack that had claimed the lives of eleven Israelis and five of their abductors.

In 1985, all 31 people aboard a Midwest Express Airlines DC-9 were killed when the Atlanta-bound jetliner crashed just after take-off from Milwaukee's Mitchell Field.

In 1991, the Soviet Union recognized the independence of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia. Russian lawmakers upheld a decision by residents of Leningrad to restore the city's pre-revolutionary name, St. Petersburg.

Ten years ago: Meeting outside Washington, D.C. for only the second time since 1800, Congress convened in New York to pay homage to the victims and heroes of September 11.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush and Chinese President Hu Jintao, in Sydney, Australia, for an Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summit, called for greater international cooperation in tackling climate change without stifling economic growth. Death claimed opera superstar Luciano Pavarotti in Modena, Italy, at age 71 and author Madeleine L'Engle ("A Wrinkle in Time") in Litchfield, Conn., at age 88.

One year ago: A man with a rifle opened fire in an IHOP restaurant in Carson City, Nev., killing three of five uniformed National Guard members and a woman having breakfast with her husband; gunman Eduardo Sencion also shot himself and died in the parking lot. 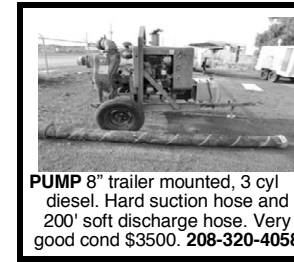
