Schools to Get Merit Pay Proposals Next Week

TWIN FALLS • School employees will have to wait a little longer to find out if they'll receive merit pay.

The Idaho State Department of Education plans to release preliminary data on the pay – part of the Students Come First reforms - to school districts and charter schools early next week.

Originally, that data were scheduled to go out Sept. 1.

ISDE spokeswoman Melissa Mc-Grath said the timetable was delayed a little due to putting out ratings for another new program, the state's five-star accountability system for schools.

Once school districts receive data, they'll be given 30 days for any appeals.

Intermountain Gas Proposes 7.1 Percent **Price Reduction**

BOISE (AP) • Low natural gas prices brought on by a glut in the resource are prompting Intermountain Gas Co. to propose a total 7.1 percent rate reduction for customers in Idaho.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission says it will take public comment on the proposal through Sept. 20.



Market Milestone: Stocks Return to Late 2007 Level

NEW YORK (AP) • The last time the stock market was this high, the Great Recession had just started, and stocks were pointed toward a headlong descent.

But on Thursday, the Dow Jones industrial average hit its highest mark since December 2007, and the Standard & Poor's 500 index soared to its highest level since January 2008 in a rally that seemed destined to mark a milestone: American stocks have come almost all the way back.

T.F. Police Warn of Craigslist Renting Scam

TWIN FALLS • Potential renters beware. Twin Falls police say there have been reports of scammers posting listings on Craigslist for rental homes they don't own, showing the homes to prospective tenants and collecting rental deposits before disappearing.

"They are pretending to be the owner," said Nancy Glaesemann, executive director of the Greater Twin Falls Association of Realtors.

Glaesemann alerted authorities after hearing about an incident where a real estate agent got a call from a potential tenant who said they viewed the home with the supposed owner. The prospective tenant told the realtor they saw their sign out front and wanted to rent the home, but didn't want to worry about it being sold.

"The property is not for rent, just for sale," Glaesemann said, and only the agent would have access to show the house.

In another instance, Glaesemann said a prospective tenant drove from Boise to view a home that was for sale but is currently occupied. In that case, the tenant was asked to mail a security deposit to a foreign country, Glaesemann said.

Police are hearing of the scam from realtors, landlords and people who own investment properties in town, said city of Twin Falls spokesman Josh Palmer. Police say anyone with in-

formation about these inci-

Jerome Asks Day Cares to Comply with Fire Code

JEROME • A handful of Jerome day care centers are being required to make changes in order to comply with fire code.

The city of Jerome announced Thursday that its fire department recently learned a number of residential day care facilities need residential fire sprinklers.

The state's fire marshal

made the recent clarification of the 2009 International Fire Code.

Out of 21 licensed day care operators in Jerome, seven are affected. That's because the businesses opened after January 2010. Businesses affected were

notified Aug. 22. The Jerome Fire Department will work with operators

Day care operators have until the end of their current family day care license period to comply.

"Family day care" is defined by International Fire Code as a facility with six to 16 children.

Operators must make changes in order to renew their business licenses. The fire department will be required to conduct a fire inspection.

Albertsons Closures

Falls Albertsons store is not among 27 of the retail grocery outlets being closed by parent company Supervalu Inc.

Supervalu spokesman Mike Siemienas said 19 of the Albertsons to be shuttered are in Southern California. The other eight are in Oregon and Washington, he said.

Supervalu announced Wednesday it will close about 60 "underperforming or non-strategic" stores to save \$35 million in the next year and an estimated \$80-\$90 million over the next three years. Most closures will occur by Dec. 1, al-

though a few stores will remain open until February 2013, according to a news release from Supervalu.

Several Save-A-Lot stores along with four ACME stores and one previously announced Jewel-Osco location are being closed in addition to the Albertsons outlets.

Besides the stores named for closure Wednesday, eight more Supervalu stores also are slated for closure. However, the company cannot release details about those outlets at this time due to ongoing contractual discussions, Siemienas said.

Supervalu Inc. has annual sales of approximately \$35 billion, the news release said. The network includes 4,400 stores.

TWIN FALLS • Two dozen kindergartners at I.B. Perrine Elementary School are getting a longer school day experience this year.

It's the only school in the Twin Falls School District with a full-day kindergarten class.

There's a mix of students some at grade level and others catching up.

"It's a wonderful opportunity for students who are struggling a little bit to get them on track," Principal Bill Brulotte said.

It's not the first time the school has offered a full-day kindergarten class.

Two years ago, the school paid for it through federal Title I funding. And before that, parents footed the bill.

After a one-year hiatus, the full-day class is back. And this year, parents are paying \$220 per month. Brulotte said some parents have found financial assistance through community foundations.

During past years, more Twin Falls schools offered full-day kindergarten classes.

But the Idaho State Department of Education gives school districts enough money for half-day kindergarten.

If districts want to offer full-day classes, they're left to come up with the rest of the funds.

Brulotte said full-day kindergarten is beneficial for students. And he'd like to see more students have access to that opportunity.

"I just wish there would be a time in the future that we could offer this for every student in the Twin Falls School District," he said. In Murtaugh, the school district has offered full-day kindergarten for 17 years.

"It's one of the programs we work really hard to keep in place," Superintendent Michele Capps said.

There's also a preschool program for every 4-year-old. Over the years, funding

sources have changed occasionally - including Title I federal funding, grants and the school district's operating budget.

In Buhl, all kindergarten classes at Popplewell Elementary School are also full days this year.

It's a change from last year, where students went to kindergarten all day for just a couple of days a week.

Superintendent Byron Stutzman wrote in an email to the Times-News that the district doesn't receive funding for full-day kindergarten, but feels the program will serve the district well.

"If we can bring every student up to speed by the time they exit kindergarten, we will justify the expense," he wrote.

Some school districts don't have a traditional fullday kindergarten program. But they're finding ways to provide assistance to kindergartners who need it.

In Gooding, Superintendent Heather Williams said there's an expanded kindergarten program two days a week.

Students who need extra help stay for both the morning and afternoon sessions.

The Jerome School District is offering one session of fullday kindergarten this year at each of the primary schools. Superintendent Dale

Layne said it's paid for through a federal grant. Students are selected for full-day kindergarten based on academic need. Once they catch up, they're transitioned out of the program.

Man Charged for Bringing Tobacco into Jail

TWIN FALLS • Jail deputies say they charged an inmate at the Twin Falls County Jail for bringing tobacco into the jail

According to an arrest report, deputies found inmate Jonathan Rowland, 25, hid a baggie of tobacco inside his body.

On Aug. 28 at about 6:45 p.m., a jail deputy was conducting cell checks when he smelled smoke coming from

one of the cell blocks, the report states. The deputy wrote that the smoke smelled like cigarettes and he and other deputies had all the inmates in that block stand against a wall with their hands up.

Two deputies patted down all the inmates while another escorted the inmates one by one to a dressing room for a strip-search, the report states.

Each inmate was asked if they had any contraband and then a visual strip-search was conducted. The report states all inmates denied having contraband.

Upon searching Rowland, the report states a deputy saw a plastic baggie fall to the floor during the search. According to the report, Rowland told the deputy it was tobacco and he was allowed to have it at a different jail he had been to in Georgia.

According to the report, deputies said they found electrical wires in the cell that were destroyed. Deputies believed inmates

They must meet both state and local benchmarks in order to receive merit pay. In Gooding, Superintendent Heather Williams said all the teachers in the district earned some portion of a local share.

School districts had about 20 options to choose from when putting together their plans, ranging from Idaho Reading Indicator Test scores to parent involvement.

A total of \$38 million in bonuses has been appropriated by the state. Payments are scheduled to go out Nov. 15.

But that will only happen if the law that includes merit pay remains in place after the November Students Come First referendum votes.

McGrath told the Times-News last month that if the law is repealed, the ISDE won't have the authority to distribute the money.

spending on Idaho schools by \$64.5 million next year, with most of that money going toward compensation, he said during a meeting with reporters in his downtown Boise office.

"This fully funds the Student Come First programs and also makes considerable inroads into bringing up teacher compensation," Luna said.

Along with more money for base salaries - which remain below levels established in fiscal year 2009 teacher paychecks would also get a boost from a \$22.6 million increase in funding for merit bonuses that were approved under Luna's reforms in 2011, he said.

With the increase, Luna budgeted \$61 million for pay-for-performance next year, when the program will be expanded to allow other school professionals to compete. Also, teachers will be rewarded not only for raising student achievement, but also for taking on hard-tofill positions or leadership roles.

Luna's budget also includes an \$8.4 million increase in funding for laptops that will start going to high school students next year. The state is already spending \$2.5 million to give teachers the devices this year under the reforms, which go before voters in November. Critics succeeded last

summer in getting repeal measures on the ballot, decrying the sweeping changes that limited teacher collective bargaining and introduced merit pay while phasing in laptops and making online courses a graduation requirement.

The reforms initially called for shifting money from salaries to help fund the changes. While lawmakers eliminated further deductions in the 2012 session, an initial withdrawal of more than \$14 million remained. Luna's proposed budget, based on feedback from various education groups, would eliminate that deduction next year, he said.

"That was a common request," Luna said.

The state Department of Education and other state agencies typically submit budget proposals in September for the next fiscal year, which doesn't start until July 1. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter reviews those proposals before making spending recommendations in his State of the State speech in January.

Luna has often said predicting Idaho's economy is tough in a good year and even more difficult in bad times. His budget recommendation includes a 5 percent increase for public schools next year, following a 4.6 percent increase in state general funding this fiscal year.

Prosecutors: Day **Care Worker Admits** Abusing 23 Children

NAMPA (AP) • Prosecutors say a 23-year-old day care worker in Idaho has confessed to sexually abusing 23 children.

Joshua Ritchie is charged with lewd conduct with a child and is being held on \$2.5 million bond.

Ritchie was arrested Aug. 21 after a 5-year-old boy reportedly told his parents that he was sexually abused.

Ritchie worked at Cornerstone Childcare in Nampa about 20 miles outside of Boise and was also a kitchen staff substitute for the Nampa School District and at the Idaho Arts Charter School.

Prosecutors told Judge Brian Lee during a hearing Wednesday that Ritchie told investigators he's sexually abused 23 children between the ages of 5 and 12.

Ritchie's attorney, public defender Bill Schwartz, did not immediately return a phone call from The Associated Press.

Meridian Waiter Charged

in Credit Card Fraud

BOISE (AP) • A waiter at a Meridian restaurant faces two felony counts of grand theft after a credit card left at the restaurant was used during a one-day shopping spree.

The Idaho Statesman reports Ronald Keith Schaefer was arrested Wednesday at the restaurant, which police declined to name. He was expected to make an initial court appearance on Thursday.

Court records say the credit card was left at a restaurant on Aug. 9 and several purchases were made later that day, including food, tires, disc golf items and a home theater system.

The card holder realized the card was missing the next day and called her credit card company to cancelit.

Deputy Police Chief Tracy Basterrechea says officers used video surveillance and other financial records to identify Schaefer as a suspect.

CSI Trustees Provide Invaluable Service to Our Community

Amidst all of the hoopla surrounding the national party conventions, it's easy to lose sight of local items that will be on the Nov. 6 ballot. Frequently, these local elections have a far greater impact on our lives than who ends up residing at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue next January. Such is certainly the case with the election of trustees that govern the College of Southern Idaho.

These five volunteer board members have a tremendous responsibility; preserving what has become an outstanding community resource and working with administrators to anticipate future job trends and deliver to area employers an educated work force that possesses both the knowledge and intellectual curiosity necessary to be successful in upcoming decades.

This November, three board trustee seats are up for election and nine candidates have announced their plans to run for those seats. And when the new board is seated following the November election, it will look substantially different than it did just two years ago. Longtime (36 years each) CSI board members Charles Lehrman and LeRoy Craig were defeated in the election two years ago and 24-year veteran Donna Brizee and six-year board member Dr. Allan Frost chose not to seek re-election this year. This leaves the possibility that only one — or perhaps none — of the 2013 CSI Board of Trustees would have more than two years of experience on the board.

That's a stark departure from the past; when tenure on the board virtually assured re-election every four years. The *Times-News* has been critical of the unchanging makeup of the board in the past, but having all newbies carries with it a whole different set of challenges. The 2013 version of the CSI Board of Trustees will not have the institutional knowledge they've had in the past, but a collective fresh set of eyes must compensate for that lack of knowledge.

We applaud the efforts of Brizee and Frost, wish

There Are Ways to Reduce Afghanistan's Inside Killings

The following editorial appeared in Thursday's Washington Post:

The latest threat to the U.S. mission in Afghanistan is particularly sinister and hard to combat: a rising toll of "green-on-blue" killings, in which gunmen dressed in the uniforms of the Afghan army or police open fire on American or coalition troops. Fifteen were killed that way in August alone, including 10 U.S. soldiers; the year-todate total of 45 deaths already exceeds by half the number recorded in 2011.

The danger this trend poses is clear. The U.S. and NATO endgame strategy for Afghanistan involves training Afghan security forces so that they can handle the fight against the Taliban on their own. Even after 2014, when that process is supposed to be completed, thousands of U.S. trainers and advisers are expected to remain embedded with the army, police and special forces. If the interpersonal trust vital to that strategy breaks down, so will the military partnership – and perhaps the Afghan army itself.

Though the Taliban benefits most from this bloodshed, and often claims credit for it, U.S. commanders say that at most a quarter of green-on-blue killings can be blamed directly or indirectly on the enemy. The Afghan government, for its part, has offered no evidence to support its claim that "foreign intelligence services" - by which it means Pakistan and Iran – are behind the slayings.

The more difficult truth is

tween Afghans and Westerners, exacerbated by the stress of war; and the creeping Afghan disenchantment with foreign armies that have remained in the country more than a decade but failed to bring peace.

These are not problems that can be entirely fixed, except by a total withdrawal of Western forces – something that would do far more harm than good to Afghanistan as well as its allies.

There nevertheless are ways to significantly increase the security of U.S. and other Western troops. One has already been adopted: a re-vetting of Afghan forces to screen out rescreening is completed; the 16,000-member force is a quasi-militia used to defend remote villages and is guided by U.S. Special Forces.

U.S. and allied forces also must begin following their own security procedures. As The Washington Post's Greg Jaffe and Kevin Sieff reported Sunday, numerous guidelines were ignored by both Afghan and U.S. officers and troops because they slowed the training mission or complicated other operations.

Their story reported that thousands of Afghan police lack proper identification and that a 15-year-old civilian who shot three Marines last month was neither a soldier nor policeman yet had lived for weeks on a U.S. base. While it may not be possible to eliminate greenon-blue killings, such dangerous laxity on basic security procedures security can and must be ended.

incumbent candidate Dr. Thad Scholes all the best, and commend the eight challengers who are vying for one of the seats up for election this November. We urge the eight challengers to get "up to speed" with CSI issues now because there just won't be sufficient time following the election.

Our advice to all board of trustee candidates is simple — get up to speed very, very quickly. You aspired to a big task and a big task it will be from the very first day. There simply isn't time for a learning curve.

Magic Valley Fellowship Hall is not AA

The article in Saturday's (Sept. 1) *Times-News* I feel gave a good review of the Magic Valley Fellowship Hall but contained a number of errors relative to Alcoholics Anonymous.

There is no local board of directors for Alcoholics Anonymous; AA does not own or operate any halls or facilities; each AA group is autonomous and self-supporting through contributions by its members.

The Fellowship Hall is a nonprofit corporation created to provide a center of various 12-step recovery programs. Its primary support has been membership dues and rent paid by the various groups holding meetings there. The hall is operated by a board of directors elected by the members of the hall.

AA stresses anonymity at the level of press, radio and film to ensure individuals do not become spokespersons for AA. Food Co-ops Brace for Arrival of Rivals

BOISE • The Boise Coop eliminated thousands of slow-selling items, sweeping away the claustrophobic effect that accompanied too many offerings. The Wheatsville Food Co-op in Texas is opening its second store after 40 vears

And in California, the Davis Food Co-op turned to a designer to revamp its look.

It's no coincidence food cooperatives across the U.S. are making big Many are changes. preparing for the arrival of a Whole Foods or Trader Joe's, two organicand specialty-food industry giants that are opening new stores nationwide.

Some co-ops are even dispatching camera-toting, intelligence-gathering crews to poach ideas from the big guys.

With demand for organic, natural and specialty food continuing to outpace other segments in the grocery industry, co-ops say they must improve their stores, identify trends and appeal to a changing audience as the competition moves in.

Whole Foods Market Inc. aims to triple stores to 1,000, including in Boise and Davis, Calif.; German-owned Trader Joe's is expanding, too, with a 19 city "comingsoon" list.

"Co-ops had it easy for years" when customers had few other places to go, said Robynn Shrader,

head of the 125-member, 164-store National Cooperative Grocer's Association. "It's more com-plicated being a retailer today."

The modern co-op movement dates back to the 1970s, when customer-owned food stores including in Boise, Davis, Calif., and Austin, Texas - were organized to provide an alternative to national grocery chains. Despite typically higher prices, shoppers often feel as if they're buying more than groceries, that they are supporting a lifestyle.

They emphasize community roots and, though they've evolved from when nearly everything came in big bulk bins, they still stock an average of 20 percent local products, compared to 6 percent at conventional stores, according to a study released in August by Shrader's group. About 80 percent of coops' produce is organic, compared to 12 percent for conventional grocers.

Over the years, demand for natural, organic foods has only grown. The Organic Trade Association reports 2011 sales rose 9 percent to \$31.4 billion.

Brent Hueth, director of the Center for Cooperatives at the University of Wisconsin-Madison,

said he'd expected an increasingly crowded landscape of organic purveyors, including from conventional stores, to be tougher on co-ops.

That hasn't materialized. "Demand is grow-

ing faster than supply," Hueth said. "It's not saturated yet."

Even so, some co-ops have been hurt. In West Des Moines, Iowa, for instance, the Tall Grass Grocery Co-op closed in August, a year after opening and a month after Whole Foods' arrival.

At the 40-year-old Davis Food Co-Op in Davis, sales slipped 7 percent after Trader Joe's October 2010 opening, forcing wage freezes and retirementplan cuts, manager Eric Stromberg said.

"Honestly, the emotion I felt was anger," he said. "I worked really hard to give our employees good benefits. And I hate to see that nibbled away."



No Jail for Marijuana Lobbyist

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • A lobbyist who became the face of the effort to legalize medical marijuana in Montana and helped draft the initiative approved by voters in 2004 won't see jail time on a federal conviction related to the pot business he co-founded.

U.S. District Judge Dana sentenced Christensen Daubert Thursday in Missoula to five years' probation. Daubert had previously pleaded guilty to conspiracy to maintain a drug-involved premises, a charge that stems from the 2011 raid of a Montana Cannabis, the medical marijuana provider Daubert co-founded in 2009.

One of Daubert's partners, Chris Lindsey, pleaded guilty Thursday to the same charge. That afternoon, the family of a third Montana Cannabis partner, Richard Flor, held a protest in Helena as federal officials spoke out for the first time about his sudden death while in custody.

Daubert's attorney, Peter

Lacny, said he believes the judge took his client's history and background into consideration in handing down the sentence. Prosecutors had recommended a prison sentence between 6 1/2 and eight years.

"He was pretty worried going into the sentencing," Lacny said of Daubert. "I think it's going to take a few days to get his head on and then go back to working in various ways to the benefit of Montanans."

Daubert started his lobbying and public relations firm, Daubert Associates, in 1985. He has represented businesses and local governments before the state Legislature and spearheaded initiative advocacy campaigns.

The Missoula resident received the Bureau of Land Management's Public Lands Award in 1997 for his grant writing and fundraising to support preserving the Garnet Ghost Town.

In recent years, he was best known as the director for Patients and Families United, a medical marijuana advocacy group that lobbied to allow severely ill patients to use the drug. He helped draft Initiative 148, which passed in 2004 and made medical marijuana legal in Montana.

Five years later, he started Montana Cannabis with Lindsey, Flor and Chris Williams. A fifth partner left the business soon after its founding.

Lindsey's sentencing was set for Dec. 13. Williams, the only partner to reject any plea agreement, is scheduled to go to trial Sept. 24.

Flor was sentenced in April to five years in prison. He died late last month in the custody of U.S. Marshals while being transferred to a new prison, and his daughter led a small protest Thursday outside the federal courthouse in Helena where he was sentenced.

Kristin Flor said her father was very ill and was denied proper medical treatment while he waited months for officials to decide where he would serve his sentence. He broke his shoulder blade falling from bed in a detention center in Shelby and then had two heart attacks while at a transfer facility in Nevada last Tuesday.

The next day, Kristin Flor made the decision to take her father off life support.

Richard Flor had complained of stomach pains while in Shelby but he never saw a doctor for what was discovered after his death to be cancer, Kristin Flor said.

"My dad died of neglect," she said. "My dad was in the military and he voted and he did everything right. The system should not have failed him. At one point, he should have at least gotten some medical care out of it."

A U.S. Marshals official in Washington said Thursday that Flor died a natural death caused by cancer, with factors that included pulmonary disease, renal insufficiency and high blood pressure.

Engine Failure Caused F-16 to Crash in Utah

NORFOLK, Va. - The Air Force said one of its jets crashed during a training mission in Utah this May because of an engine failure.

Details of the accident were released in a report on Thursday by Air Combat Command at Joint Base Langley-Eustis in Virginia.

The F-16C Falcon crashed about an hour af-



ter takeoff in the Utah Test and Training Range about 60 miles west of Salt Lake City. The Air Force says the engine failed because an 8year-old fan blade broke free, causing catastrophic damage.

The pilot safely ejected, but the jet was destroyed on impact. The Air Force values the loss at nearly \$24 million.

The pilot and the jet were assigned to the 421st Fighter Squadron at Hill Air Force Base, Utah.



Utah Lawsuit Filed over Alleged Taser Death

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A wrongful-death case was filed Thursday against Salt Lake City police for the reported Taser death of a 44year-old man who was stopped while riding his bicycle months ago for reasons that aren't clear.

Family members say police refuse to give them any information about the death of Allen Keith Nelson, who they say was one day of out jail on a shoplifting conviction when he was pulled over shortly after 3 a.m. on June 9.

Darlene Bessonette, a 78-year-old retired nurse, said she overhead the confrontation while walking a dog.

"I could hear Allen crying and saying, 'Don't hit me anymore. I didn't do it," Bessonette said Thursday at a news conference with family members.


She added, "I heard one officer say, 'I Tased him,' and another officer say,




they'll be in double wing and the next play they're in an empty backfield with five wides. But the biggest challenge is that Wing-T and they've run that forever."



Former Ravens Owner Art Modell Dies at 87

BALTIMORE • Former Baltimore Ravens owner Art Modell died early Thursday, the longtime NFL stalwart who incurred the wrath of Cleveland fans when he moved the team from Ohio and admittedly tarnished his own legacy as a civic leader.

He was 87.

David Modell said he and his brother, John, were at their father's side when he "died peacefully of natural causes."

Modell was among the most important figures in the NFL as owner of the Cleveland Browns and a league insider. During his four decades as a team owner, he helped negotiate the NFL's lucrative contracts with television networks, served as president of the NFL from 1967 to 1969, and chaired the negotiations for the first the collective bargaining agreement with the

players in 1968. He also was the driving force behind the 1970 contract between the NFL and ABC to televise games on Monday

night. Modell Modell, however, made one decision that hounded him the rest of his life. He moved the Cleveland franchise to Baltimore in 1996 and Ohio fans never forgave him for it.

"It's a shame that one decision hurt how some people think of him, because he did so much good," said Doug Dieken, a Browns offensive lineman for 14 years.

Practically overnight, the man who was one of Cleveland's most notable civic leaders was a pariah in his own community.

"I have a great legacy, tarnished somewhat by the move," he said in 1999. "The politicians and the bureaucrats saw fit to cover their own rear ends by blaming it on me."

The move was also believed to be the main reason why Modell never made it into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He was one of 15 finalists in 2001 and a semifinalist seven times between 2004 and 2011.

The Ravens won their lone Super Bowl in January 2001, less than a year after Modell sold a minority interest of the team to Steve Bisciotti. In April 2004, Bisciotti completed purchase of the franchise but left Modell a 1 percent share.

"He worked alongside Lamar Hunt, Tex Schramm, Well Mara and Art Rooney, and all of those men are in the Hall of Fame," former Browns guard John Wooten said. "He worked with them in all of those meetings. He was there. It is indeed a shame that he is not in the Hall of Fame."

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell praised Modell's work within the league as it was gaining momentum a half century ago.

"Art Modell's leadership was an important part of the NFL's success during the league's explosive growth during the 1960s and beyond," Goodell said in a statement. "Art was a visionary who understood the critical role that mass viewing of NFL games on broadcast television could play in growing the NFL."

Goodell also appreciated Modell's sharp wit.

"Art's skills as an owner and league contributor were matched only by his great sense of humor," he tweeted. "Any conversation with Art included laughs."

Modell's Browns were among the best teams of the 1960s, led for a time by legendary running back Jim Brown. Cleveland won the NFL championship in 1964 - Modell's only title with the Browns - and played in the title game in 1965,

1968 and 1969.

Patricia, his wife of 42 years, died last year.

"'Poppy' was a special man who was loved by his sons, his daughter-in-law Michel, and his six grandchildren," David Modell said. "Moreover, he was adored by the entire Baltimore community for his kindness and generosity. And, he loved Baltimore."

Art Modell hoped one day the people of Cleveland would remember him for what he accomplished there. Long after the move, Modell pointed out that Cleveland ultimately got the new stadium he coveted, and that the expansion version of the Browns could draw on the history he helped create.

"I think that part of my legacy is I left the colors, the name and the records in Cleveland," Modell said. "The fans in Cleveland were loyal and supportive. They lived and died with me every Sunday for 35 years."

To get your lawn aerated, you have a couple of options. You can contact a lawn care service that will come over and aerate your lawn for you, or you can rent an aerator from a home improvement store and tackle the job yourself. If you opt to aerate yourself, be sure to make a couple passes with the aerator to ensure that you have gotten thorough coverage.

When Should I Aerate my Lawn?

The best times to aerate your lawn are the spring and fall. If you have warm season grass in your lawn, spring is preferable because the grass is gearing up for rapid growth and can recover quickly from aeration. Cool

season lawns grow most vigorously in the early fall, so that is a prime time to aerate them. You should avoid aerating in the heat of summer, or if your lawn is very dry. Plan on giving your lawn a good watering two days before you want to aerate.

Some lawns are better candidates for aeration than others. Lawns growing in clay soils usually need aeration around twice a year because the clay compacts easily. Lawns in sandy soil usually need to be aerated much less. Once a year should be sufficient.

Aeration is an easy way to improve your lawn's health. By aerating just once or twice a year, you can ensure that your lawn's roots are strong. You will see the result of healthy roots every time you look outside: an emerald green carpet of thriving grass.

TWIN FALLS • Dr. Joseph Edgar Tugaw, 81, a prominent rancher and veterinarian in the Twin Falls and Salt Lake City area for more than 50 years, passed away Monday, Sept. 3, 2012, in an aviation accident at his Dry Creek Ranch near Murtaugh, Idaho.

He was an only child, born into the ranching tradition to Joseph Theodore and Ruie Howell Tugaw on Nov. 12, 1930, and was raised on their beef cattle ranch near Okanogan, Wash. After graduating from Okanogan High School in 1948, he attended Washington State University, where he graduated with a Doctorate of Veterinary Medicine degree in 1954. While attending WSU, he was affiliated with the Theta Chi Fraternity, where he developed many lifelong friendships. After marrying Mary A. Conner on Sept. 5, 1953, he worked briefly as a veterinarian in Portland, Ore., before enlisting in the U.S. Air Force to serve in Taipei Formosa during the Korean Conflict. After two years in the service, he joined his uncle and mentor, Dr. Edward A. Tugaw, in veterinary practice in Salt Lake City, Utah. A short time later, Dr. Clark Vanderhoof joined their practice to form Central Valley Veterinary Hospital and together, they grew the practice to include eight doctors, the first 24-hour emergency animal clinic in the Intermountain Region and several more satellite clinics in the Salt Lake area. Collectively, they became one of the largest veterinary hospitals in the western United States. He has contributed his time and talents to local, state and national civic associations, including service as national president of the American Society of Veterinary Ophthalmologists, president of the Utah Veterinary Medical Association, president of the South Salt Lake Rotary Club, Utah delegate to the American Veterinary Medicine Association, and board president member of the Idaho Cattle Association, chairman of the Federal Lands Committee, member of the National Cattlemen's Association Board of Directors and a member of the Bureau of Land Management's Upper Snake River Resource Advisory Council. In 1999, Dr. Joe Tugaw was inducted into the Southern Idaho Livestock Hall of Fame and he was also named the "Idaho Cattleman of the Year" by the Idaho Cattle Association. 

Folk artist 'Preacher' Dennis dies at 96

VICKSBURG, Miss. (AP) • The Rev. Herman D. "Preacher" Dennis, who turned a Mississippi Delta grocery store into a folk-art castle that became a roadside attraction, has died. He was 96.

Jefferson Funeral Home in Vicksburg said he died Tuesday at Covenant Health and Rehab.

Margaret's Grocery started as a modest store north of Vicksburg off U.S. 61, nicknamed the "blues highway." Margaret Rogers Dennis had owned the store nearly 40 years when she married "Preacher" in 1984, and he said he'd build a monument to her and their faith in God.

The Vicksburg Post reports that during the 1980s and '90s, the couple used red, white, pink and yellow paint ed concrete blocks, scrapiron columns, foam balls, cardboard tubes and other common items to turn the

building into a castle. Inside, surfaces were covered with Mardi Gras beads, plastic trinkets and Christmas lights.

Hand-painted signs displayed Bible verses and religious phrases welcoming Jews and Gentiles.

"God don't have no white church, and he don't have no black church," one sign declared.

The building is still standing, though deteriorated. The inside has been closed to visitors for years.

"Margaret's Grocery has been the cornerstone of folk art environments in our state and many have traveled far and wide to experience the vernacular architecture created by the Rev. Dennis and Miss Margaret, as well their one-of-a-kind personalities," said Mary Margaret Miller, heritage director for the Mississippi Arts Commission.

Israel Says Differences Remain with U.S. on Iran

JERUSALEM (AP) • Israel's defense minister said differences remain with United States over Iran's dispute nuclear program, despite efforts by Israel and the U.S. to come to an agreement on the issue.

Ehud Barak told a meeting of his Independence Party that "the clock is ticking at a different pace" for the U.S. and Israel, suggesting disagreements remain on the timeline for any attack on Iran's nuclear facilities.

Earlier this week, Israeli officials said the U.S. and Israel were working closely in hopes of getting the countries' positions in sync, holding close discussions with American officials over how to deal with Iran's nuclear program.

Barak, who spoke hours after meeting the U.S. Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Adm. James A. Winnefeld, reiterated that Israel reserves the right to carry out a strike unilaterally. He added, however, that there was "no doubt" about Washington's "readiness to face the challenge on every level."

Israel believes time is running out to stop Iran from acquiring nuclear weapons, while the U.S. opposes any Israeli military action at the current time.

Israel and the U.S. both believe, however, that Iran is trying to develop nuclear weapons. Tehran denies the allegations, and says its nuclear program is for peaceful purposes like producing energy and medical isotopes.

Part of the dispute over timing is related to military capabilities. Israel's timeline for military action is shorter than that of the United States, which has far more powerful bunkerbusting bombs at its disposal — which would be necessary to try to puncture Iranian facilities buried underground — than Israel does.

Israel views a nucleararmed Iran as an existential threat, citing Iranian calls for Israel's destruction.

Immigration Law to Take Effect

PHOENIX (AP) • More than two years after it was signed into law, the most contentious part of Arizona's landmark immigration legislation is expected to go into effect following a federal court ruling issue late Wednesday.

But the U.S. Supreme Court laid a legal minefield that Arizona now must navigate when the critical provision takes effect. The clause, one of the few significant ones that the high court left standing in a June ruling, requires all Arizona police officers to check the immigration status of people they stop while enforcing other laws and suspect are in the country illegally.

While preserving that requirement, however, the Supreme Court explicitly left the door open to arguments that the law leads to civil rights violations. Attorneys would need actual victims to make that case.

Civil rights activists are preparing to scour the state for such victims. Lydia Guzman, who runs Respect/Re-

speto, said volunteers at the organization's call center have already been told to listen for complaints.

"We're watching and we're looking for cases," she said. Barring a successful, emergency challenge of Wednesday's ruling to an appeals court, the requirement is expected to go into effect in the next several days. U.S. District Judge Susan Bolton rejected arguments by civil rights attorneys that she should prevent the requirement from kicking in, noting that the Supreme Court specifically found the provision should be allowed to become law.

U.S. Health Care System Wastes \$750B per Year

WASHINGTON (AP) • The U.S. health care system squanders \$750 billion a year — roughly 30 cents of every medical dollar through unneeded care, byzantine paperwork, fraud and other waste, the influential Institute of Medicine said Thursday in a report that ties directly into the presidential campaign.

President Barack Obama and Republican Mitt Romney are accusing each other of trying to slash Medicare and put seniors at risk. But the counterintuitive finding from the report is that deep cuts are possible without rationing, and a leaner system may even produce better quality.

"Health care in America presents a fundamental paradox," said the report from an 18-member panel of prominent experts, including doctors, business people, and public officials. "The past 50 years have seen an explosion in biomedical knowledge, dramatic innovation in therapies and surgical procedures, and management of conditions that previously were fatal ...

"Yet, American health care is falling short on basic dimensions of quality, outcomes, costs and equity," the report concluded.

If banking worked like health care, ATM transactions would take days, the report said. If home building were like health care, carpenters, electricians and plumbers would work from different blueprints and hardly talk to each other. If shopping were like health care, prices would not be posted and could vary widely within the same store, depending on who was paying.

If airline travel were like health care, individual pilots would be free to design their own preflight safety checks — or not perform one at all. CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) • Hisre-election in doubt, President Barack Obama conceded only halting progress Thursday night toward fixing the nation's stubborn economic woes, but vowed in a Democratic National Convention finale, "Our problems can be solved, our challenges can be met."

"Yes, our path is harder, but it leads to a better place," he declared in a prime-time speech to convention delegates and the nation.

He acknowledged "my own failings" as he asked for a second term, four years after taking office as the nation's first black president.

"Four more years," delegates chanted over and over as the 51-year-old Obama stepped to the podium, noticeably grayer than four years ago when he was a historymaking candidate for the White House.

The president's speech was the final act of a pair of highly scripted national political conventions in as many weeks, and the opening salvo of a two-month drive toward Election Day that pits Obama against Republican rival Romney. The contest is ever tighter for the White House in a dreary season of economic struggle for millions.

Vice President Joe Biden preceded Obama at the convention podium and proclaimed, "America has turned the corner" after experiencing the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression.

Obama didn't go that far in his own remarks, but he said firmly, "We are not going back, we are moving forward, America."

With unemployment at 8.3 percent, the president said the task of recovering from the economic disaster of 2008 is

exceeded in American history only by the challenge Franklin Delano Roosevelt faced when he took office in 1933.

"It will require common effort, shared responsibility and the kind of bold persistent experimentation" that FDR employed, Obama said.

In an appeal to independent voters who might be considering a vote for Romney, he added that those who carry on Roosevelt's legacy "should remember that not every problem can be remedied with another government program or dictate from Washington.

Theft of Romney's Tax Records Being Probed

FRANKLIN, Tenn. (AP) • The Secret Service said Wednesday it is investigating the reported theft of copies of Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney's federal tax records during a break-in at an accounting office in Franklin. Someone claiming responsibility demanded \$1 million not to make them public.

An anonymous letter sent to Romney's accounting firm and political offices in Tennessee and published online sought \$1 million in hard-totrace Internet currency to prevent the disclosure of his tax filings, which have emerged as a key focus during the 2012 presidential race. Romney released his 2010 tax returns and a 2011 estimate in January, but he has refused to disclose his returns from earlier years.

Romney's accounting firm, PricewaterhouseCoopers, said there was no evidence that any Romney tax files were stolen.

"At this time there is no evidence that our systems have been compromised or that there was any unauthorized access to the data in question," Pricewaterhouse-Coopers spokesman Chris Atkins said.

In Washington, Secret Service spokesman Edwin Donovan confirmed the agency was investigating. The Romney campaign declined to comment, referring all questions to the accounting firm.

Franklin police said there were no recent alarms or break-ins reported at the site. "We've had nothing from that address in August," Police Lt. Charles J. Warner said.

There was no sign of forced entry at the five-story building that housed the accounting firm's local office, not far from the Cool Springs Galleria, a large mall about 20 miles south of Nashville.

The building does not restrict access during business hours and has no guard. After-hours access to the doors and elevators appear to be controlled by keycard. A spokeswoman for the building manager, Spectrum Properties, said the company would not speculate on the burglary claim.

"All of the tenants operate independently and the building is highly secured," the spokeswoman, Beth Courtney, said.

The data theft was claimed in letters left with political party offices in Franklin and disclosed in several Tennessee-area newspapers.







Reddit Co-founder Has Politicians Agreeing

WASHINGTON • Reddit founder Alexis Ohanian has accomplished what virtually no one else in Washington is doing these days: Bring the political parties together on a controversial issue.

Democrats and Republicans have stepped up their support this year of Ohanian's cause of keeping the Web free of government intervention. During their conventions, both sides touted a platform plank affirming Internet freedom. And last week, President Obama stopped by Reddit last week for a surprise Q&A session, saying that he would "fight hard to make sure the Internet remains the open forum for everybody." "Republicans want to keep the open internet safe from big government. Democrats want to keep it safe from big corporations. I say we agree to agree and move ahead," Ohanian said in an interview. "It was so successful because we literally had the Tea Party next to the Move On.org guys at these meetings. They don't often hang out together." Ohanian's inroads in Washington is a homecoming of sorts for the Columbia, Md. native. But the 29year-old never intended to go into politics. In 2005, he co-founded Reddit.com, where users rank the most interesting content on the Web. A mere 18 months later, Ohanian sold the site to Conde Nast, at a price tag that some speculate was between \$10 million and \$20 million. The site draws about 35 million users.

His introduction to highstakes, Beltway politics

abashed geek who sees hightech innovation and "datadriven solutions" as the answer to just about every problem. At 40, he also exudes the confident charm and calibrated ambition that are essential for anyone plunging into American politics.

After a decade of quietly building behind-the-scenes influence, Indian Americans in the Washington area – as well as in California, Pennsylvania and other states – are entering public and political life in record numbers. This year, six Indian Americans are making credible runs for Congress, two are serving as state governors and dozens more are either holding or seeking seats in state legislatures.

"There's no question, the Indian-American political tiger has sprung," said Toby c Chaudhuri, 35, a political a strategist in Washington who is deeply involved in Democratic politics. "It is no longer la just about writing checks to gain access. We realize we need to use politics to gain a say in government. Our numbers are swelling at a time of enormous s

Indian Americans have long been one of the nation's most educated and affluent immigrant groups, according to U.S. census figures and surveys conducted by groups such as the Pew Research Center. Doctors and engineers began arriving from India in the 1960s, and its computer experts manned the information technology boom. of the 1990s. Their numbers were small, but their democratic and English-speaking roots helped them fit into American jobs and society. came earlier this year when he and other executives from Silicon Valley stopped a pair of bills that would have held websites accountable if they host pirated content. The effort overcame fierce lobbying from powerful constituents including the Chamber of Commerce and the Motion Pictures Association of America.

These groups complained that Web companies were enabling pirated content, robbing billions of dollars from artists, authors, and movie producers. A spokesman for the MPAA said the Web should not be encumbered by regulation, but that smart legislation is needed to crack down on pirates.



Vladimir Putin: President and Stunt Man

MOSCOW (AP) • Start with manly ventures – flying, hunting, scuba-diving. Add an element of danger – polar bears, tigers, fighter jets. Throw in a bare chest here and there.

In Russian politics, Vladimir Putin is both the star of the show and the stuntman.

The Russian president's flight Wednesday in a motorized hang glider purportedly helped young white Siberian cranes learn how to migrate.

Media events portray him as both exceptionally bold and just a regular guy who enjoys proletarian pastimes like hunting and fishing. Although critics say Putin is tremendously wealthy, his stunts are careful to avoid any suggestion of riches. Putin — unlike John Kerry — will never be filmed going windsurfing.

Some of Putin's notable stunts:

Top Gun

Putin and George W. Bush may have

had little in common, but they both understood that showing up in a fighter jet makes a dramatic entrance.

Putin did it first, in March 2000, flying into war-torn Chechnya in the rear seat of a Sukhoi-27 advanced fighter jet.

Coming just a few days before Russia's presidential election, the stunt aimed to bolster Putin's image as the man who could wipe out the Chechen separatists, in contrast to predecessor Boris Yeltsin, who had allowed Chechnya to become virtually independent and gruesomely lawless.

Seabed Find

The low point of Putin's stunts may have been his 2011 scuba dive in the strait connecting the Black and Azov seas. He came up from the dive holding fragments of what were said to be 6th century B.C. Greek jugs, saying "the boys and I found them."

Critics snorted. The seabed was only

about seven feet (a few meters) deep and the likelihood that the fragments had hidden in plain sight for more than 2,500 years seemed slim. Some joked that Putin's staff had bought the pottery at IKEA.

A few months later, Putin spokesman Dmitry Peskov admitted the jug fragments had been planted.

The Swimmer

Whatever sleight of hand or outright fakery may be involved in a Putin media moment, he obviously does a lot of the work himself.

That was never more clear than in a 2009 photo of Putin swimming in a Siberian river. He chose to do the but-terfly, swimming's most visually dra-matic stroke. Photographers caught his head and torso surging out of the water, his well-muscled arms extended and a look on his face that seemed to express both the joys of exertion and the coldness of the water.



Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2013 A public hearing for consideration of the proposed Urban Renewal Project budget for the fiscal year that begins October 1, 2012, and ends September 30, 2013, will be held at the Heyburn City Hall, 941 18th Street, Heyburn, Idaho on September 10, 2012, at 11:00 a.m., pursuant to Idaho Code 50-1002. Written or oral comments about the proposed budget are welcome. Written comment may be submitted prior to the meeting to: Heyburn Urban Renewal Agency, c/o Heyburn City Hall, P.O. The Agency budget funds the programs, services, and capital projects that the Agency Board and the City Council have determined to be important to meet the Agency's strategic goals.

City Council Resolution No. 2010-6 adopted on July 14, 2010, authorized the establishment of the Urban Renewal Agency. The City Council established the Northwest Industrial Urban Renewal Project by adopting City Ordinance No. 541 on October 26, 2011. The Agency expenses have been limited to legal expenses and other planning expenses. Those activities have been funded by the city of Heyburn in an amount of \$292,178. Expenses for FY2011 totaled \$24,458. Expenses through July 2012 totaled \$30,759. The Agency expects to incur additional expenses of \$238,000, through September 30, 2012. The budget below shows the breakdown of anticipated expenses for FY 2013. For FY 2013, the Agency's revenues will be limited to the remaining amount of the City's initial advance along with note revenue from the Northwest Industrial.

This public hearing on the proposed budget is required for formal adoption of the FY 2013 budget. The proposed expenditures and revenues for FY 2013 have been tentatively approved by the Heyburn Urban Renewal Agency Board of Directors on August 6, 2012.





DEAR TAKEN ABACK: In California, people have the legal right to dress in a style not typical of their gender without fear of discrimination or retaliation. That right is protected by state law. If customers find it offensive, they can either request a different server or take their business elsewhere. Presumably, the customer would pay for food that had already been prepared.

Because children today grow up quickly and are less sheltered than in past decades, I recommend you explain to your 11-year-old that not all people are alike, and the importance of treating others with respect. It's called REALITY.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

When the world championships took place in Beijing four years ago, the main event followed the qualifying stages. Here is a sparkling piece of play from an early knockout round in that event.

As Mark Horton, a journalist, remarked, one of the delights of Beijing is the opportunity to enjoy its famous Peking duck, but that is not the only dish it offers. This cosmopolitan city offers a wide range of international cuisine. Poland's Ewa Harasimowicz conjured up a wonderful dish at the table. It featured a coulis of squeeze and a dash of throw-in garnished with an endplay, the whole thing being stirred with a Morton's Fork.

Against four hearts West led the club seven. East took the ace and returned the suit. West winning and playing a third round, ruffed by declarer. Knowing that East, who had already showed up with the club ace-queen, was unlikely to have the diamond ace, declarer played a low diamond toward dummy's king. West could not afford to play the ace or the spade loser would go away. When the diamond king held, declarer settled down to run the trump suit.

In the five-card ending, West had three spades and the acejack of diamonds, but had to discard the diamond jack on the last trump. Now declarer could exit with the queen of diamonds to endplay West to lead a spade around to declarer's jack.

ANSWER: There is no single right answer here (and my suggested answer would get me burned at the stake in 14 states in the United States), but I believe that with only three clubs you should rebid one no-trump, not one spade. If you are facing extras, partner will be able to find a spade fit. If he has limited values, you do not want to make him think you have a shapely hand when you are as balanced as possible.



On Sept. 7, 1812, the Battle of Borodino took place during the Napoleonic Wars as French troops clashed with Russian forces outside Moscow; although France won a short-term victory, Russia was able to ultimately drive out Napoleon's invaders. (The battle was commemorated by composer Peter Ilvich Tchaikovsky with his "1812 Overture.")

On this date:

In 1907, the British liner RMS Lusitania set out from Liverpool, England, on its maiden voyage, arriving six days later in New York.

In 1940, Nazi Germany began its eight-month blitz of Britain during World War II with the first air attack on London.

In 1957, the original version of the animated NBC peacock logo, used to denote programs "brought to you in living color," made its debut at the beginning of "Your Hit Parade."

In 1962, author Karen Blixen, also known as Isak Dinesen, died in Rungstedlund, Denmark, at age 77.

In 1964, the controversial "Daisy" commercial, an ad for President Lyndon B. Johnson's election campaign featuring a girl plucking flower petals followed by a nuclear explosion, aired on NBC-TV.

In 1972, the International Olympic Committee banned Vince Matthews and Wayne Collett of the U.S. from further competition for talking to each other on the victory stand in Munich during the playing of the "Star-Spangled Banner" after winning the gold and silver medals in the 400-meter run.

In 1977, the Panama Canal treaties, calling for the U.S. to eventually turn over control of the waterway to Panama, were signed in Washington by President Jimmy Carter and Panamanian leader Omar Torrijos.

In 1986, Desmond Tutu was installed as the first black to lead the Anglican Church in southern Africa.

In 1996, rapper Tupac Shakur was shot and mortally wounded on the Las Vegas Strip; he died six days later.

Prime Minister Tony Blair. meeting at Camp David, said the world had to act against Saddam Hussein, arguing that the Iraqi leader had defied the United Nations and reneged on promises to destroy weapons of mass destruction. Uzi Gal, the German-born inventor of the Uzi submachine gun, died in Philadelphia at age 79.

Five years ago: Osama bin Laden appeared in a video for the first time in three years, telling Americans they should convert to Islam if they wanted the war in Iraq to end. A federal judge ruled that Iran had to pay \$2.65 billion to the families of the 241 U.S. service members killed in the 1983 bombing of the U.S. Marine barracks in Beirut. A jury in St. Francisville, La., acquitted Sal and Mabel Mangano, the owners of a nursing home where 35 patients died after Hurricane Katrina, of negligent homicide and cruelty charges. Shawn Johnson won the women's all-around title at the world gymnastics championships in Stuttgart, Germany; among the men, China's Yang Wei won his second straight title.

One year ago: The latest in a series of Republican presidential debates brought together Mitt Romney, Michelle Bachmann, Rick Perry, Herman Cain, Newt Gingrich, Jon Huntsman, Ron Paul, and Rick Santorum in Simi Valley, Calif. A private Russian jet carrying a top ice hockey team slammed into a riverbank moments after takeoff from the airport near the western city of Yaroslavl, killing at least 44 people. (Investigators blamed pilot error.) A powerful bomb hidden in a briefcase ripped through a crowd of people waiting to enter a New Delhi courthouse, killing 13 people.
