TWIN FALLS • It's been just more than a week since Kamal Darji's world fell down around him.

On Aug. 30, the 22-year-old, his two brothers and their parents were driving back from Boise to their home in Twin Falls.

Kamal said he remembered thinking a tire on his car was flat as he drove east on Interstate 84 near Bliss. He was driving in the left lane and pulled off the road to the left, toward the median, and activated his emergency blinkers, he

# Water Group Educates, Pleads with Lawmakers

**JEROME** • If they want to protect the Magic Valley's economy, lawmakers must first understand the importance of the state's most precious resource.

That was the message of a local water group at a Thursday event. The Middle Snake Regional Water Resource Commission invited experienced and new

legislators as well as county officials to learn more about the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer.

The Lake Erie-sized underground water source is the lifeblood to the Magic Valley economy, said Bob Muffley, executive director for the commission.

The commission is a collective group of Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Twin Falls representatives. The group is focused on educating the public, particularly lawmakers, on the importance of managing the quality and quantity of Idaho's underground aquifer.

The commission used to throw its efforts behind improving the aquifer's water quality, but concerns over the aquifer's depleting levels have shifted members' concern, Muffley said. Particularly, there's a concern over a lack of recharge throughout the ESPA.

# Blaine Fire Restrictions Begin to Lift

**HAILEY** • After weeks of being instructed to limit outdoor exposure, Blaine County residents are free to take a deep breath of fresh air.

Blaine County's Stage 1 air pollution alert has been lifted, according to an Idaho Department of Environmental Quality news release.

Air quality decreased after smoke from the Halstead and Trinity Ridge forest fires began drifting over the northern county. While the fires continue to burn, health officials expect air quality to return to normal as of Friday.

In other fire news:

 The U.S. Forest Service Fairfield Ranger District is no longer closed due to the Trinity Ridge Fire, officials announced Friday.

This includes opening all Sawtooth National Forest and Sawtooth Wilderness lands, the trail system from Graham to Black Warrior Trailhead, Yuba River Road and the road to Lester Creek GS and Pine.

However, fire officials urge the public to remain cautious when entering the forest. Firefighters have removed the majority of the hazard items but weather and time will

# US Stocks Rise Slightly After Weak Jobs Report

NEW YORK (AP) • The stock market followed one of its most exciting days of the year with a rather dull one Friday. Indexes barely rose following a weak jobs report, which increased hopes that the Federal Reserve would act next week to support the economy.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 14.64 points to close at 13,306.64. The Standard & Poor's 500 was up 5.80 points to 1,437.92. The Nasdaq composite barely moved, up 0.61 points at 3,136.42.

# Children and Adults Can Both Stay Safe

My kids are back in school and I want to keep my kids safe, but I also know I need to be aware myself of backto-school safety. Do you have any ideas?

— Lisa, Twin Falls

Answered by Page Geske, Manager, Safe Kids Magic Vallev:

ne of the most important tips is for parents to slow down when you come to school zones and watch for children. This is especially important in rural areas, where children may be standing out on the roadside, in the dark, waiting for buses. Also, when you are leaving your garage or driveway, make sure kids are not bicycling or walking past your car. Look both ways before you back out of your driveway, especially as it gets darker in the morning.

Obeying speed limits in school zones is the law. As children go back to school, they may only be aware of

getting to school and not paying attention to cars on the road. As an adult, it is your responsibility to pay extra attention and be more watchful.

Kids playing in and around bus stops also may not be aware of cars, so as a driver it is important to pay extra attention. Kids also may be late for the bus and dart out into the street, not paying attention to traffic.

Pay attention to school bus traffic and signals. Yellow flashing lights mean that the bus is preparing to stop and load or unload. When the red flashing light comes on, children will be getting on or off the bus and you need to stop. If you are traveling on a road that does not have a median, both lanes of traffic need to stop until the bus has loaded or unloaded children.

If your children walk or ride their bikes to school, it is important for you to have walked the route with them beforehand. That way you will know their route and be

able to find them quickly, in case of an emergency.

One other tip: if you are taking or picking up your child at school, be courteous about the traffic flow and make sure you don't create a traffic hazard for school buses, other parents or chil-

Children should always look both ways before crossing streets and walk, don't run. Pay attention to traffic signals, and cross the street only when it says "walk." When crossing the street to get onto a bus, children should walk ahead of the bus and cross in front of the bus,

rather than behind the bus where they can't be seen. When the bus comes to your stop, stand at least three large walking steps away from the bus. Wait until it comes to a complete stop before trying to enter the bus.

# Wendell Cemetery Flood Project Delayed

WENDELL • Every year, water run off from the property adjacent to the Wendell Cemetery causes flooding on the community memorial

During Thursday's Wendell City Council meeting, Cemetery Superintendent Paul Isaacson told the city a joint effort between the agency and the Wendell Highway District to fix the problem has "unrayeled" due to all the "confrontation" surrounding the project.

The Wendell Highway District could not be reached for this report.

In July, Isaacson approached the council for permission for the Wendell Highway District to dig a trench approximately 50 feet from where the flooding occurs to a nearby city storm water drain.

"Both the cemetery and highway district are taxing entities within the Wendell

don't have the funding, without going out to the taxpayers for more, for the project," Isaacson told the Times-News in July.

But the cemetery and highway district didn't get a clear green light by the council and now the project may be delayed even longer.

Also during the meeting, a \$300 monthly rental agreement between the city's fire department and the Wendell Rural Fire District was delayed, as the contract presented did not address how long it would be enforced.

City Treasurer Deb Gibbs said "legally any lease agreement should have a term," and told Fire Chief Bob Bailey she could help with the draft

The city will address the lease during its Sept. 20





When he awoke, Kamal said he remembers seeing an ambulance and called to his mother.

"She was sitting next to me," he said. "She didn't respond."

According to Idaho State Police, Kamal's mother, Harka, 55, and brother, Nar, 20, died at the

Kamal's father, Sha, 64, was trapped between the top of the car and the back seat, Kamal said. He suffered a fractured neck and is still sedated and in critical condition at Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise. His youngest brother, Khadga, 17, had a fractured left hip and a knee injury and is able to walk with the help of a walker. Kamal had cuts to his head and injured his left

Kunz was also injured and transported to North Canyon Medical Center in Gooding. He has since been released.

The Darji family is originally from Bhutan, but before coming to the United States spent 20 years in a refugee camp in Nepal. Many ethnic Nepalis fled Bhutan after the government led a campaign of discrimination and detainment against them.

Kamal's older sister and her husband were given the chance to leave the refugee camp and come to Twin Falls. Later Kamal, his brothers and parents joined them on July 14, 2011, followed later by his sister Bhim, 24. After a year in Twin Falls, the group applied for their green cards and on the day of the crash, went to Boise to get fingerprinted – the last step before receiving the cards.

On Sept. 1 a funeral for Harka was held, then on Sept. 2, one for

Family friend Lok Dargee said some people in the Nepali community were able to contribute to pay for the cremation costs, but Kamal's and his family's medical bills are mounting and will be tens of thousands of dol-

"He needs to take care of the whole family," Dargee said.

Kamal had car insurance, but hadn't applied for health insurance at work because of the cost, Dargee said. Now he's paying rent on both his own family's apartment and the one next door where his sister lives.

Kamal said he wants to work, but he's unsure the level of care his father will need when he's released from the hospital.

"If he needs support I need to be at home for him," Kamal said. "I need to see the situation."

It could be months before Kamal's father is released from the hospital, but it appears he's slowly beginning to recover.

"It's hard to predict," said family friend Chandra Upreti, who is handling communication with police and doctors.

Sha has had multiple surgeries and is still sedated. On Thursday, Upreti said doctors told him they removed Sha's breathing tube for 10 minutes and he was able to breathe on his own. Doctors then replaced it when he began to struggle, he said.

For now, Kamal said he's looking for some sense of justice for his family and help finding what direction to go next.

"I can't do this all myself," he said. "I need some help."

"We do recharge but we sure as hell don't do anything to help the problem," Muffley said. "We're spitting on a fire that is about to get out of control."

Water users take 200,000 acre-feet out of the aquifer each year, said Lew Pence, commission chairman. However, state officials have only enough funding to recharge not quite 100,000 acre-feet in that same time. An acre-foot is enough water to cover one acre of land one foot deep.

"I don't know if that's how you balance your checkbook but that doesn't add up," he said.

Without the aquifer, the Magic Valley wouldn't be able to contribute the \$7 billion to the economy that it does, said Steven Hines, extension educator for University of Idaho.

The commission partners with the university's extension office to offer more information on how the aquifer influences the local economy.

Most crops need about 2.5 acre-feet of irrigated water, Hines said. This places a high value on water. In some irrigation districts, the production value for water is \$355 per acre each year.

"Without water, the Magic Valley would have a bunch of sagebrush and jack rabbits," Hines said. "You wouldn't have the dairy industry here."

By the end of the night, Muffley asked the lawmakers not to dismiss the pending challenges water users and the Legislature will face in years to come.

"Our job is to educate so you can take this information to Boise," Muffley said. "Sometimes this gets lost out west."

# Analysis: Weak Jobs Report Delivers Blow to Obama

**WASHINGTON** • The disappointing August jobs report raises yet another campaign obstacle for President Barack Obama and makes his hopes of holding onto his own job even more challenging especially in closely contested battleground states with painfully high levels of

unemployment. Coming less than 12 hours after the president accepted his party's nomination for a second term, the lackluster report could wipe out or diminish any traditional bounce in the polls he might have gotten from the festive, well-choreographed threeday Democratic National Convention.

"The broad message here is flat, flat," said economist Heidi Shierholz with the labor-affiliated Eco-

nomic Policy Center. A disappointing report for one month might be dismissed in normal times as an aberration, she said, "but a stagnant report when the unemployment rate is over 8 percent represents a continuation of the crisis," meaning that getting back to prerecession employment levels will take many more months, even years.

The bleak news played right into the hands of Republicans, who claim that Mitt Romney asked reporters in Sioux City, Iowa. "Almost 400,000 people dropped out of the work force altogether. It's is sim-

The overall unemployment rate declined from 8.3 percent to 8.1 percent last month, which should be good news, but the "improvement" came only because more people gave up

Just 96,000 new jobs were created in August, sharply down from the revised July number of 141,000 and below the threshold of 100,000 to 150,000 new jobs needed each month just to keep pace with working-age population growth.

# Jurors Give Stacy Peterson's Comments Heavy Weight

JOLIET, Ill. (AP) • Jurors said Friday that comments Stacy Peterson made before her 2007 disappearance played the decisive role in convincing them to convict her husband, former police officer Drew Peterson, of

killing his ex-wife. Peterson was convicted Thursday of first-degree murder after a six-week trial that was the first of its kind in Illinois history. Prosecutors based their case on normally barred hearsay, which was only allowed after the Legislature passed a law specifically tailored to Peterson's case.

The strategy was risky and grew in large part from a lack of physical evidence collected in the case after investigators initially deemed Kathleen Savio's death an accident. Prosecutors claimed the hearsay would allow Savio and Stacy Peterson – who is presumed dead - "to speak from their graves" through family and friends.

It worked. Jury foreman Eduardo

Saldana, 22, said the women's comments were "extremely critical" in deliberations and in his decision to convict Peterson. He

# Quakes Kill at Least 64 in Mountainous SW China

BEIJING • Twin earthquakes and a spate of aftershocks struck southwestern China on Friday, toppling thousands of houses and sending boulders cascading across roads. At least 64 people were killed and hundreds injured in the remote mountainous area, and more than 100,000 residents were evacuated.

Damage was preventing rescuers from reaching outlying towns, and communications were disrupted after the midday quakes hit along the borders of Guizhou and Yunnan provinces, a rural region where some of China's poorest people live.

The first 5.6-magnitude quake struck just before 11:30 a.m. and was followed an equally strong quake shortly after noon, joined by dozens of aftershocks. Though of moderate strength, the quakes were shallow, which often causes more damage.

Hardest hit was Yiliang County, where all but one of the deaths occurred, according to the Yunnan provincial government's official web-

site. Another 715 people in the area were injured. Yiliang's high population density, shoddy building construction and propensity for landslides were blamed for the relatively high death toll.

China Central Television showed roads littered with rocks and boulders and pillars of dust rising over hilltops from the landslides. One image taken just as one quake struck showed people running out of a supermarket as the ground shook.

Other footage showed several hundred people crowding into a school athletic field in Yiliang's county seat, a sizable city spread along a river in a valley, as well as soldiers carrying injured people and rescue materials.

Though quakes occur in the area frequently, buildings in rural areas and China's fast-growing smaller cities and towns are often constructed poorly. A magnitude-7.9 quake that hit Sichuan province, just north of Yunnan, in 2008 killed nearly 90,000 people, with many of the deaths blamed on poorly built structures, including schools.

Friday's quakes destroyed or damaged almost 30,000 homes across several coun-

# No Jail Time for Obama 'HOPE' Poster Artist in NY

**NEW YORK (AP)** • The artist who created the "HOPE" poster that came to symbolize Barack Obama's 2008 presidential campaign was ordered to do 300 hours of community service Friday for a criminal contempt conviction but was spared jail

Shepard Fairey, 42, of Los Angeles nodded his head several times and said "OK" as U.S. Magistrate Judge Frank Maas told him he must commit no crimes during two years of probation and must pay a \$25,000 fine to the U.S. government.

During remarks before the sentence was announced, Fairey called his decision to fabricate evidence in a civil lawsuit he brought against The Associated Press in 2009 the "worst thing I've done in my life." He also apologized.

"I am deeply ashamed and remorseful that I didn't live up to my own standards of honesty and integrity," he said. After the sentencing, Fairey hugged his lawyers, was kissed by his wife, and shook hands with more than a dozen friends who packed into the small Manhattan courtroom.

Maas said the sentence needed to send a message to others who might destroy or fabricate evidence in a civil case that the consequences of covering up what they did is far worse than telling the truth.

But he said Fairey's considerable charity work over a long period of time mitigated the need for prison on a misdemeanor charge that carried a maximum potential sentence of six months.

# Schools Chief Luna Subject of Wikipedia Tug of War

**BOISE (AP)** • The spokeswoman for state schools superintendent Tom Luna triggered a tug of war over his Wikipedia entry when revising the Web page last week to make changes that included touting his polarizing education reforms, a newspaper reported Friday.

Melissa McGrath made numerous edits, including striking a false claim about Luna's experience. She also removed the word "online" when referencing Luna's degree, which he did earn online from Thomas Edison State College, the *Idaho* Statesman reports.

McGrath, public information officer for the state Department of Education, told the newspaper that was an oversight.

Luna's entry on the Internet encyclopedia, which anyone can update, has been revised more 60 times in the past two weeks, with critics lashing out at the changes and making edits of their own, and McGrath enlisting help from other Wikipedia users to combat the critical revisions being edited into the superintendent's page.

Wikipedia allows people to add information or make revisions to pages anonymously, while dedicated users worldwide seek to ensure the information is accurate.

Luna is not the first public official whose entry has become a source of debate and Wikipedia's senior editors have since revised his page to strip slanted material.

McGrath's Aug. 27 edits were posted under her name and trimmed negatively opinionated references to the education overhaul, which was approved in 2011 amid fierce debate. The changes limited collective bargaining, introduced merit pay and will distribute a laptop to every high school teacher and student.

McGrath's revision then included her own extolments of the education changes, which are subject to voter approval in November, saying, "Through these laws, every child - no matter where they live will now have access to the best educational opportunities."

Luna, a huge proponent of online education, is also making virtual courses a graduation requirement. He earned his bachelor's degree in measurement science online, which McGrath said is

"something we talk about all the time — that he does have a degree from an online university."

She initially said she didn't remember removing the word "online" from the section of his Wikipedia entry that mentions his degree, and denied that she would make such a change. When shown her entry compared to the previous version, McGrath told the newspaper that edit was an oversight.

McGrath, a former journalist, said she was always taught never to use the site as a reliable source. "But there are thousands of people that use it every day, so I do feel it's important that we ensure as much correct information as possible is out there," she

Jim Weatherby, professor emeritus of Boise State University's political science department, said Luna is wise to watch his online image, particularly given his rising profile.

"Wikipedia is subject to amendment by the minute, by friend or foe," Weatherby said. "You have to watch what funny business the anonymous contributors do to their political enemies."

# Man Mistakenly Sends Meth Text to Police Officer

LEWISTON (AP) • An Idaho man apparently trying to get the most bang for his drug-purchasing buck mistakenly sent a text message to a narcotics detective while he searched for people to join him in a methamphetamine buy.

Aaron D. Templeton of Lewiston was arrested this week and charged with conspiracy to deliver methamphetamine.

A police detective received a text Wednesday morning asking if he knew anyone looking for drugs, and after determining it wasn't his co-workers playing a joke, arranged to meet the man named Aaron the same day to deliver \$150 that would be pooled with money from other buyers to enable a bulk purchase of meth, officials said.

"It is common for dealers to try to get money fronted to them to get a better deal," said police Capt. Roger Lanier.

The detective, whom Lanier declined to identify, watched from a distance as two police officers pulled up behind Templeton's car at the designated meeting

Templeton then reportedly texted: "Well that's weird, a cop just pulled up on me so what's up with

Police recovered Templeton's cellphone, which they say included the text messages regarding the

A woman who was with Templeton was arrested and charged with possession of drug paraphernalia.

Templeton, 37, is scheduled for a preliminary hearing on Sept. 19, according to Nez Perce County court records. A spokeswoman in the prosecutor's office said Friday he does not yet have an attorney.

"It all started apparently from a wrong number," Lanier told the Lewiston Tribune. "I don't think he would have a narcotics detective in his contacts list."

# Inside Look at the Newly Found James Castle Art



BOISE (AP) • By all accounts, the works of famed outsider Idaho artist James Castle are some of the most essential American folk art of the 20th century.

The mute Castle may not have been able to talk, but his drawings continue to affect art lovers across the country. The drawings have been featured at the Museum of Modern Art in New York and the Philadelphia Museum of Art. Collectors have paid up to \$50,000 for single pieces of his work, and Castle's heirs made millions after forming a partnership in 1996 to sell his art.

Imagine being Jeannie Schmidt, the current owner of Castle's old house in Northwest Boise, who remodeled a bedroom in 2010 and found three bundles of his art hidden in the walls. The bundles held hundreds of drawings dating as far back as the 1930s. Not surprisingly, much of the art was badly damaged by water, mold, dirt and rodents - but it was still long-lost work by a major folk artist.

Two years later, a lawsuit and court trial have established that all the art found by Schmidt belongs to the Castle Family Trust. Fourth District Judge Deborah Bail ruled Schmidt has no claim on the art and must pay back

\$120,000 she got by selling about 50 of the least-damaged pieces to a New York art gallery. Schmidt has appealed Bail's decision to the Idaho Supreme Court.

While the ownership question is getting clearer, the question of the discovered bundles' artistic value is more opaque.

The art has been seen by only a few people, such as those who were in the courtroom during this summer's

civil trial. Until now. Court records obtained by the *Idaho Statesman* show every piece of Castle art found by Schmidt – almost 400 drawings. The Statesman shared those images with experts along with this basic question: What is the artistic value of the find?

Most agree that the damage from weather, dirt, rodents and mold significantly reduce the aesthetic value of the pieces themselves, as there are already thousands of James Castle's drawings out in the world that were not chewed on. But as a teaching and educational tool, they provide a unique insight into Castle's work.

"Except for a small handful of fairly complete drawings, which are haunting, lovely and evocative, I would characterize the majority of this find as significant 'shards' that offer further, very intimate insights into this talented and singular human being," said Stacy Hollander, who is the senior curator and director of exhibitions at the American Folk Art Museum in New York City.

# Eastern Idaho Man Appeals 1996 Murder Conviction

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • A man convicted of murdering an Idaho Falls woman in 1996 is appealing his case, saying police and prosecutors failed to turn over critical evidence.

John Thomas with the Bonneville County Public Defender's Office filed the petition Thursday on Christopher Tapp's behalf. In the document, Thomas says Tapp's conviction for the rape and murder of Angie Dodd must be thrown out because police never shared some evidence with Tapp's defense

Tapp, who was sentenced to life in prison, has long maintained he didn't kill Dodge. In his petition, he says a man named John Browning was interviewed by an Idaho Falls police officer in September 1996, and that testimony was never turned over to prosecutors or defense attor-

Browning, who lived near Dodge, told police that a man with blood on his clothes, scratches on his face and a rug burn on his chin knocked on his apartment door about 3 a.m. the day of the murder, according to court documents. Browning said the man asked if he could use Browning's bathroom to wash up, and Browning told him to use the hose

Tapp's petition also includes testimony from Browning's ex-wife, Gentri Goff, who lived with Browning at the time. According to the petition, Goff was shown a photograph of a man who was not Tapp and identified him as the bloodied and scratched person who came to their door the night of the murder.

Bonneville County Prosecutor Bruce Pickett said his office will respond to the defense's petition within 30 days, after which the matter could go to

The Idaho Innocence Project, a group that works to exonerate inmates that members believe were wrongly convicted, has been working on Tapp's case for a few years. Dodge's mother, Carol Dodge, has said in the past that she believes more than one person was involved in her daughter's murder.

"The bottom line is the true killer has not been found," she said Thursday.

# Ex-school Employee Sentenced for Providing Drugs

NAMPA (AP) • A former teaching assistant at a Wilder alternative school has been sentenced to a minimum of three years in prison for giving prescription pain medications to students.

Roberta Kondo of Nampa could be eligible for probation in less than a year if she successfully completes a treatment program designed for prisoners with substance abuse issues, prosecutors said. Otherwise, she faces a maximum of five years in prison.

"It all depends on her willingness to engage in the program, and how well she does on that program," deputy prosecuting attorney

Gearld Wolff told the *Idaho* Press-Tribune.

Kondo was arrested in May and charged with delivering a controlled substance. She was sentenced Thurs-

Prosecutors claim she provided prescription drugs to students while working as an educational assistant at the southwestern Idaho school. Particularly troubling was that the school serves troubled teens, many of whom already struggle with substance abuse, authorities said.

"I own every aspect of my life, and there's no excuse for sentencing. "I accept the consequences for my actions."

Kondo had worked at the Canyon-Owyhee School Service Agency since October. The alternative school for special education serves "at risk" students, along with gifted and talented kids, and is affiliated with Homedale, Marsing, Notus, Parma and Wilder school districts.

District Judge G.D. Carey acknowledged that Kondo has

been diagnosed with mental health issues, but said that did not excuse her behavior.

"The best thing for Ms. Kondo at this time would be probation, but that's not the only question," Carey said. "If we send out a message that if you've got enough problems, you can go ahead and sell drugs in school, and we'll put you on probation. That's not going to happen in this case."



# ACLU Wants FBI Records about Nevada Bear Hunt Foes

LAS VEGAS • The American Civil Liberties Union of Nevada is demanding to know what information the FBI has collected about people who spoke against bear hunting in the Lake Tahoe area during contentious public meetings earlier this year in northern Nevada.

A Freedom of Information
Act request filed Aug. 22
seeks to find out what federal agents reported learning
about American Indian
Movement of Northern
Nevada members and a
Nevada group called "No
Bear Hunt," ACLU legal chief
Staci Pratt said Friday.

"Our goal is to ensure that people are not targeted for exercising their right to free speech," Pratt said.

Agent Patrick Turner, spokesman for the FBI Nevada office in Las Vegas, said he could neither confirm nor deny the agency was investigating bear hunt foes. No criminal charges have been filed.

Pratt conceded that Washoe County Wildlife Advisory Board and Nevada Wildlife Commission meetings in March to consider quotas for hunting black bears led to sometimes heated exchanges between speakers and commission officials. But she said she viewed videotape of the meetings, and she didn't think threats were exchanged.

"The only threat seems to be that they had a difference of opinion, which is constitutionally protected," the ACLU official said.

An AIM spokeswoman, Raquel Arthur, claimed at one point that a member of the Washoe County board who favored bear hunting offended Native Americans who voiced their belief that bears were sacred. She said the member made a culturally biased comment that he didn't want to "hear of bows and arrows."

Union Members for the Preservation of Wildlife spokesman Randal Massaro, who helped coordinate Native American opposition to the bear hunt, later said commission chairman Rex Flowers apologized for the comment and said he didn't mean to insult or disrespect Native Americans.

Arthur did not respond this week to an email from The Associated Press.

Kathryn Bricker, a spokeswoman for NoBearHunt-NV.org, declined to comment on the ACLU move.

Pratt said an AIM member who lives in the Reno area and spoke at the meetings was arrested in early April and instructed while jailed to sign documents indicating she was involved with terrorist activity. The woman refused, and was released from jail without being charged with a crime, Pratt

Another AIM member was questioned by agents at work, she said.

A third AIM member told the ACLU she thought investigators watched her while parked outside her Reno home. The woman didn't approach the vehicle but thought the men inside were federal agents, Pratt said

"Members of No Bear Hunt Nevada who were also at the meetings expressed fears that their Internet activities were attracting attention from the FBI," Pratt said, declining to identify the people by name. "They knew what happened to the AIM members. They were concerned that they would be targeted."

Nationally, the American Indian Movement has a sometimes militant history. It was founded in the late 1960s to advocate for sovereignty for American Indians, and led protests in the 1970s including the takeover of federal Bureau of Indian Affairs headquarters in Washington, D.C., and an armed standoff with federal agents in 1973 at Wounded Knee,

Pratt said the AIM branch in Nevada has a different outlook and objectives than the national organization.

No Bear Hunt Nevada was established to fight for an end to bear hunting in the state. Hunters given licenses during an inaugural hunting season a year ago killed 14 black bears.

Up to 20 bears can be killed during the upcoming season, from Sept. 15 to Dec. 31. But wildlife officials made the Nevada side of Lake Tahoe off-limits to bear hunting.

In her information demand, Pratt cited reports by media, community organizations and the public that the FBI had been "engaged in a deliberate plan to harass and intimidate those who speak out against the hunting of bears in northern Nevada."

"This widely reported surveillance of Native American and nature-oriented groups by the federal government erodes the values and constitutional principles upon which the United States stands ... and amounts to racial profiling," the letter said.

Pratt said ACLU leaders decided to seek information instead of filing a lawsuit "so we can understand the extent and nature of the FBI inquiry."

# Police: Nev. Man Shot Golfer after Ball Hit Home

**RENO, Nev.** • A man has been arrested on suspicion of shooting and wounding a golfer after an errant ball broke a window at his home.

Jeff Fleming, 53, is accused of firing at a pair of golfers at the 16th hole on Thursday, striking the one who hit the home in Reno. The golfer was treated for minor injuries to an arm and both legs.

The suspect's neighbors told investigators that it was a "common, everyday deal" for stray golf balls to hit their homes, police Lt. Keith Brown said.

"The neighbors were shaking their heads, and we were shaking our heads, and no one could put rhyme or reason to this (shooting). It's crazy," Brown told The Associated Press. "I've been an officer for 25 years, and if you're here long enough, I guess you've seen everything."

The area around the 16th hole at the Lakeridge Golf Course was evacuated after the shooting, police said. Fleming drove to a Reno attorney's office, where he surrendered without incident.

The lawyer, Larry Dunn, did not immediately return a phone call seeking comment Friday. Fleming has an unlisted phone number and could not be reached for comment.

Fleming was booked at the Washoe County jail on felony charges of battery and assault with a deadly weapon. He was released early Friday after posting \$40,000 bail. He's scheduled to appear Oct. 4 in Reno

Justice Court.

"The golfer apparently didn't even realize he had broken the window, and was looking for his ball when Fleming went to find the golfer with a shotgun," Brown said.





# Panel Vacates **Bounty Suspensions** for 4 NFL Players

ORLEANS Jonathan Vilma, Scott Fujita and Will Smith are back in the NFL. For now.

The suspensions of those players, plus unsigned free agent Anthony Hargrove, for their roles in New Orleans' pay-for-pain bounty scandal were lifted Friday by a three-member appeals panel.

The league reinstated them all a few minutes

The Saints' Smith and Fujita, now with the Cleveland Browns, probably will play in Sunday's season openers. Vilma can at least rejoin teammates and coaches in New Orleans and get paid — even if the linebacker is not yet ready to play because of knee

problems. And Hargrove can start talking to NFL teams about giving him another shot, after he was cut by the Green Bay Packers.

Still, there's no telling how long the reprieve will

Coming just two days

before the first full slate of NFL games this season, the ruling is a setback for Commissioner Goodell and the league. But while the decision allows the players to rejoin their teams, it does not permanently void their suspensions.

NFL spokesman Greg Aiello said Goodell would "make an expedited determination of the discipline imposed" for violating the league's bounty rule. "Until that determina-

tion is made, the four players are reinstated and eligible to play starting this weekend," Aiello said. Vilma, who had been suspended the whole sea-

son, tweeted: "Victory is mine!!!! -stewie griffin" Added Fujita: "I'm overwhelmed with all the support. Thank you so much

everyone. Can't tell you how much it means to me." The ruling does not affect New Orleans coach Sean Payton, suspended for the season, interim coach Joe Vitt (six games) or general manager Mickey

Loomis (eight games).

# **UCI Considers Introducing Doping Amnesty**

BRANDS HATCH, England • World cycling's governing body is considering an amnesty for riders and officials to confess to doping offenses, and says there is no plan to challenge the decision to strip Lance Armstrong of his seven Tour de France titles.

In an interview with The Associated Press on Friday, UCI President Pat Mc-Quaid said he will propose an amnesty at a meeting this month in a move to help clean up cycling after an era tarnished by doping.

"I think there's room for it and I think the UCI could do well to (introduce it)," McQuaid said. "It's a subject I will bring up myself at the management committee of the UCI and it's something which we would look into possibly doing."

The meeting on Sept. 19 and 20 will consider whether offenders would

respond to any amnesty. "It would need to be examined as to how it could be introduced, what would be the parameters of it, what would be the framework in which it's worked, what would be the results

afterwards," McQuaid said. "We have to work in the world anti-doing rules and sanctions."

The UCI is still waiting to receive the evidence that resulted in the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency stripping Armstrong of his Tour titles, a move the American is not challenging.

In a related matter, a senior IOC member told The Associated Press that Armstrong could keep his bronze medal from the 2000 Sydney Games even if he is stripped of his Tour victories. Denis Oswald said the matter could turn on different interpretations of the eight-year statute of limitations stipulated in the World Anti-Doping Code.

Also Friday, the Lance Armstrong Foundation announced that Armstrong will not be allowed to run in next month's Chicago Marathon. Marathon organizers have little choice, given that the race is sanctioned by USA Track and Field and Armstrong's ban prevents him from entering any events organized, authorized or sanctioned by federations that follow WADA rules.

ince it is the end of summer and my garden and fruit trees are being very productive, now seems like a good time to talk about being fruitful in life. If you have bounty from your yard, why not take a bite of a juicy tomato or a lovely peach, and keep on read-

It takes work to create and maintain a beautiful yard and garden, and it takes that same kind of diligence to become more fruitful in life. One key thought is that each of us are responsible for our own growth. We can remain as we are, with the same attitudes and actions, or we can make a commitment to becoming a more fruitful person. BUHL • Every Wednesday afternoon, a 15-passenger van pulls up at a senior citizens complex in Buhl. A handful of residents, with their stomachs growling, file aboard and are taken to Calvary Chapel for a hot meal at the church's soup kitchen.

The soup kitchen is one of the church's ministries, and so is the passenger van.

The van allows people to get to church functions they otherwise would be unable to attend, said Jackie Roberts, the church's pastor.

"We use it all the time," he said. "We don't use it like a typical church bus, driving through neighborhoods, picking up people for church. Not that I'm opposed to that, but the need hasn't arisen."

The church instead uses the van to pick up the elderly, drive adults to retreats, and take youth on mission trips. It's most frequently used to pick up seniors for the soup kitchen. On those Wednesday afternoon bus rides, the church picks up between eight to 10 passengers, but sometimes more, Roberts said.

The church has two designated drivers for its one van, a vehicle it purchased about three years ago to replace a 1970s-era bus.

"We started out with a school bus," said Alan Slaugenhaupt. "It's a good experience for me. It's a blessing to be able to help get somebody (to the community kitchen) who might not otherwise make it for a meal."

The scene is different at The River Christian Fellowship in Twin Falls, where the church has two buses and three passenger vans.

The vans are used most, said Associate Pastor Brian Slusher, and takes church members to retreats, camp outs, mission trips and social events — such as ferrying youth to ice cream parlors or fast-food restaurants after church activities Wednesday nights.

Lighthouse Christian Fellowship in Twin Falls has three buses and two passenger vans that it uses for both school and church activities, said Kevin Newbry, the school's superintendent. This fall the church plans on expanding its bus service to include picking up folks for Sunday church

"We're just trying to get it off the ground, transporting people to and from church," he said. "That's a big thing for people who don't have a vehicle or another way to get to church on Sundays."

The challenge has been trying to find enough designated drivers. "Once we get this off the ground, we're committed," Newbry said, noting the church wants to make sure its buses are functional and on schedule every week. People will sign up for the rides and the church will create a bus route.

"We don't want to leave anyone hanging," he said.

Lighthouse currently uses its buses and vans for school activities - including sporting events - mission trips, and helping transport people in the College of Southern Idaho refugee program.

Some of the benefits for a church having its own bus or van: aiding elderly's church attendance, encouraging youth to participate in activities, transporting groups at lower cost, and taking up less space in the parking lot. Newbry said it's less expensive to take a bus on outings than it is to take six or seven cars.

And then there's the safety factor: "There's a higher risk taking several vehicles," he said. "When you take many cars someone could have a flat tire, get separated from the group. People have different driving habits. It's so much

safer in a bus." For churches considering purchasing a bus, Newbry said they're not as expensive as you might think. Lighthouse buys used buses from school districts for between \$3,000 and \$6,000. Not all of them have many miles, he said.

Gas mileage might not be great with a bus or van, but for Lighthouse there are other dividends.

"They've served us well," he said, noting the church couldn't do some of the things it does without them. "We try to use a bus whenever we can, as long as we have a driver available. ... We don't make a lot of wasted trips."

# **Sleeping Beauty Recreated** in Kiev Museum

KIEV, Ukraine • Looking for true love? Fall asleep in Ukraine's top museum and wait for a kiss.

A Ukrainian-Canadian artist is presenting an interactive art project called "Sleeping Beauty," in which five attractive young women take turns sleeping under dim lights in Kiev's top gallery, each under a pledge to marry the visitor who wakes her with a kiss.

Any unmarried museum-goer can kiss the woman in the hope of making Beauty fall in love and awaken.

Polataiko, Ukrainian-born artist now based in Canada, says the goal of his exhibit is to recreate the famous fairy tale and witness the birth of love.

But it also has political undertones, symbolizing the patience of the Ukrainian people trapped by what he calls the oppressive government of President Viktor Yanukovych, and hopes that the nation will one day awaken to true freedom.

"I am turning the fairy tale into reality, the Prince fell in love with her deeply, strongly and this love woke her up," Polataiko told The Associated Press. "Strong love happens by chance."

The nearly three-week exhibit ends Sunday, and so far only one Sleeping Beauty has woken up to a kiss - only to discover

that her Prince Charming was actually a princess. It is unclear what the two women will do now, given that Ukraine forbids same-sex marriage and that Princess Charming has a boyfriend of her

Romantic tension and anticipation are palpable in the ground floor room at the National Art Museum of Ukraine, where each Sleeping Beauty lies on a high white bed two hours a day. But the project is more of an artistic experiment than an act of match-making. The marriage pledges that the visitors sign are not legally binding and some of the Sleeping Beauties admitted they would not get married to someone they disliked.

While the young women said they were looking for love, many admitted they were also just curious to experience the public attention and the thrill of the artistic experiment.

Liza, a 23-year-old public relations manager, didn't dare open her eyes to any kisses, but later regretted it — discovering that one of the men was very attractive.

"It turns out that for a person who is used to being more rational, because most people perceive the world visually - it's hard to trust your feelings and follow your impulses," said Liza, who declined to give her last name because she didn't want her coworkers to find out about the project.

# Former Vegas Church Treasurer Facing Fraud Charges

LAS VEGAS (AP) • A former Lutheran church treasurer in Las Vegas is accused of pocketing congregation funds in a scheme that federal prosecutors in Nevada say cost the church \$1.75 million.

Gregory Olson, 48, of Ryder, N.D., is summoned to appear Oct. 5 in U.S. District Court in Las Vegas on fraud and tax charges that could get him up to 32 years in federal prison and more than \$1 million in fines, said Natalie Collins, spokeswoman for U.S. Attorney Daniel Bogden.

clear Friday whether Olson had a lawyer. An attorney representing the church in a separate civil theft, breach of contract and damages lawsuit filed in February in state court said he has been unable to locate Olson.

It wasn't immediately

The federal indictment handed up Wednesday alleges that as property chairman of Calvary Lutheran Church, Olson mortgaged church property and paid himself more \$440,000 from loan proceeds.

According to the indictment, Olson convinced the congregation that money was needed for remodeling, and from September 2006 to March 2008 obtained six mortgages on church properties totaling \$1.75 million.

The congregation later learned that Olson used the money to buy a vehicle, make a down payment on a house and pay off civil judgments against him. Church leaders confronted Olson in August 2009.

Olson is also is accused in the indictment of filing false tax returns for the years 2006 through 2009.

# Quake Shakes the 90210, Rattling Beverly Hills

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Some of the little tchotchkes that decorate the staid homes of Beverly Hills were tossed off their coffee-table perches this week, but their owners were only shaken and a little bit stirred by

a pair of earthquakes that rattled the city of the rich and famous.

The second quake struck just after midnight Friday, reaching a magnitude of 3.4. It was preceded by Monday's 3.2 shaker.

Neither one did any damage, according to Beverly Hills police. But the second, on a fault line just a mile under the Earth's surface, grabbed everybody's attention. The U.S. Geological Survey said more than 4,000

people checked in on its website to say they felt it. Dispatchers from police and fire agencies said they were inundated with calls.

"It scared the .... out of me," said longtime Beverly Hills resident Ellen Lutwak, quickly requesting that she not be quoted on the colorful noun she used to describe her moment of terror.

The only casualty in her home was a troop of plastic antique Army soldiers that were sent tumbling to the floor.



# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"Who overcomes By force hath overcome but half his foe."

— John Milton

Against your six-spade contract the opening lead is the diamond three. You win the ace, RHO playing the eight. Plan the play to protect against as many bad breaks as possible.

After winning dummy's diamond ace, play the spade ace, and now switch your attention to hearts. Lead out the queen, then play to the heart king.

If West discards on the second heart, win, ruff a heart, then lead a trump to dummy and run the hearts. It doesn't matter if the third heart is overruffed since you can ruff a diamond in dummy, then draw the last trump; equally, West's ruffing in on the second heart would clearly be fatal.

If it were East who could ruff the second heart to play a club. win with the ace, cross in spades (drawing the opponent's last trump), then ruff a heart, ruff a club, and run the hearts.

What happens if hearts are 5-0? If RHO ruffs the heart queen, you may still survive in much the same way as before. You simply need to take a heart finesse somewhere along the line after drawing the last trump. If LHO ruffs the heart queen, you will still survive if he does not have a third trump to play. (You have just enough entries to set up the long heart.) All in all, six spades makes except against 4-0 trumps or against a combined very bad heart break and trump break, when nothing would work.

ANSWER: The hand is too good for a rebid in either hearts or spades. Best is to cue-bid two clubs, simply showing a good hand, planning to bid two spades over two of a red suit from partner. This way your partner will know of real extras opposite (typically extra high-cards rather than four-card trump support). If you play — as I do — that one spade promises five, cue-bid, then jump to three spades to force to game.

# On this date:

In 1504, Michelangelo's towering marble statue of David was unveiled to the public in Florence, Italy.

In 1565, a Spanish expedition established the first permanent European settlement in North America at presentday St. Augustine, Florida.

In 1761, Britain's King George III married Princess Charlotte of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, just a few hours after meeting her for the first time.

In 1900, Galveston, Texas, was struck by a hurricane that killed an estimated 8,000 people.

In 1921, Margaret Gorman, 16, of Washington, D.C., was crowned the first "Miss America" in Atlantic City,

In 1935, Sen. Huey P. Long, D-La., was shot and mortalwounded inside the Louisiana State Capitol; he died two days later. (The assailant was identified as Dr. Carl Weiss, who was gunned down by Long's bodyguards.)

In 1941, the 900-day Siege of Leningrad by German forces began during World War II.

In 1951, a peace treaty with Japan was signed by 49 nations in San Francisco.

In 1971, the John F. Kennedy Memorial Center for the Performing Arts made its official debut in Washington, D.C., with a performance of Leonard Bernstein's "Mass."

In 1974, President Gerald R. Ford granted an unconditional pardon to former President Richard Nixon.

In 1987, former Democratic presidential candidate Gary Hart admitted during an interview on ABC's "Nightline" that he had committed adultery, and said he had no plans to resume his White House bid.

In 1994, a USAir Boeing 737 crashed into a ravine as it was approaching Pittsburgh International Airport, killing all 132 people on board.

Ten years ago: The government reported that violent crime rate had dropped by ten percent the previous year, reaching lowest level since 1973. Pete Sampras beat Andre Agassi 6-3, 6-4, 5-7, 6-4 to win his 14th Grand Slam title and the U.S. Open for the fifth time.

Five years ago: Sheriff's deputies in Logan County, W.Va., removed Megan Williams, a 20-year-old black woman, from a house in Big Creek, where she'd endured what authorities described as days of torture. (Seven white men and women pleaded guilty in the case, but in a strange twist, Williams recanted her accusations in 2009; however, one of the defendants said, "It did happen?") Top-ranked Justine Henin (EH'-nen) overwhelmed Svetlana Kuznetsova (svet-LAH'-nah kooz-NET'-so-vah) 6-1, 6-3 to win her second U.S. Open women's title and seventh Grand Slam champi-

One year ago: Addressing a joint session of Congress, President Barack Obama challenged a reluctant Congress to urgently pass a larger-than-expected \$450 billion jobs plan to "jolt an economy that has stalled." Ten oil workers were forced to abandon a crippled 94foot research vessel in the Gulf of Mexico and pile into a life raft during Tropical Storm Nate; by the time rescuers arrived three days after, three of the men had died, and a fourth died later at a hospital.




