Water Group Educates, Pleads with Lawmakers

JEROME • If they want to protect the Magic Valley's economy, lawmakers the state's most precious resource. That was the message of a local water group at a Thursday event. The Middle Snake Regional Water Resource Commission invited experienced and new
legislators as well as county officials to learn more about the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer. The Lake Erie-sized underground ic Valley economy, said Bob Muffley, executive director for the commission. The commission is a collective group of Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Twin Falls representatives. The group is
focused oneducating the public, partic-
ularly lawmakers, on the importance of managing the quality and quantity of
Idaho's underground aquifer.
The commission used to throw its efforts behind improving the aquifer's water quality, but concerns over the aquifer's depleting levels have shifted members' concern, Muffley said. Particularly, there's a concern over a lack of ticularly, there's a concern over alack of

"Both the cemetery and

community and they offered
to help us out because we

don't have the funding, without going out to the taxpayers
for more, for the project" Isaacson told the Times Newsin July.
But the cemetery and high way district didn't get a clea green light by the council and
now the project may be de layed even longer.
At the time, the city requested an engineer draw up plans on how to properly di vert water and Public Work Director Joe Durham told th cemetery that if they we wouldn't help anyproblems if the highway district screwed
up. Christophursay, Mayor Brad Christopherson said the city merely wanted to make sure the project along the city's
West Avenue Bwas donecor rectly, as the city is responsible for the street's mainte nance and the trench would beonitsproperty.
Christopherson told Isaacson he was surprised the
highway district pulled its highway district pulled its support of the project and said
the city would allow a system to divert the water to be built
as soon as it approves the plans. ${ }^{\text {"The city }}$ is waiting for the plans," he said. Isaacson said the cemetery district will come back to the city once it has obtained the proper plans. When that will
be is unknown as Isaacson be is unknown as Isaacson
said in July the agency didn't have the funds to hire out the job.

The Darji family is originally from Bhutan, but before coming to the United States spent 20 years in a refugee camp in Nepal. Many ethnic Nepalis fled Bhutan after the government led a cam-
paign of discrimination and detainment against them.
Kamal's older sister and her husband were given the chance to leave the refugee camp and come to Twin Falls. Later Kamal, his brothers and parents joined them on July 14, 2011, followed later by Twin Falls, the group applied for their green cards and on the day of
he crash, went to Boise to get fin
receiving the cards.
On Sept. 1 a funeral for Harka was held, then on Sept. 2, one for Nar. $\quad$ Family friend Lok Dargee said some people in the Nepali comto pay for the cremation costs, but Kamal's and his family's medical bills are mounting and will be tens of thousands of dollars.
"He needs to take care of the whole family," Dargee said. hadn't applied for health insurance at work because of the cost, Dargee said. Now he's paying rent on both his own family's apartment and the one next door where his sister lives. Kamal said he wants to work, but he's unsure the level of care released from the hospital.
"If he needs support I need be at home for him," Kamal said. "I need to see the situation." It could be months before Ka mal's father is released from the hospital, but it appears he'
slowly beginning to recover "It's hard to predict" s family friend Chandra Upreti, who is handling communication with police and doctors.
Sha has had multiple surgeries and is still sedated. On Thursday, Upreti said doctors told him tube for 10 minutes and he was able to breathe on his own. Doctors then replaced it when he began to struggle, he said.
For now, Kamal said he's looking for some sense of justice for his family and help finding what

## Quakes Kill at Least 64 in Mountainous SW China

BY CHRISTOPHER BODEEN

BEIJING • Twin earthquakes and a spate of aftershocks struck southwestern China on Friday, toppling sending boulders cascading across roads. At least 64 people were killed and hundreds injured in the remote mountainous area, and more
than 100,000 residents were evacuated.
Damage was preventing rescuers from reaching outlying towns, and communications were disrupted after the midday quakes hit along the borders of Guizhou and
Yunnan provinces, a rural Yunnan provinces, a rural
region where some of China's poorest people live. The first 5.6-magnitude quake struck just before 11:30 a.m. and was followed by an equally strong quake shortly after noon, joined by dozens of aftershocks. Though of moderate
strength, the quakes were strength, the quakes were
shallow, which often causes more damage.
Hardest hit was Yiliang County, where all but one of the deaths occurred, according to the Yunnan provincial government's official web-
site. Another 715 people in the area were injured. Yiliang's high population density, shoddy building construction and propensity for landslides were blamed for the relatively high death toll.
China Central Television Chowed roads littered with rocks and boulders and pillars of dust rising over hilltops from the landslides. One image taken just as one quake struck showed people
running out of a supermarket as the ground shook. Other footage showed several hundred people crowding into a school athletic field in Yiliang's county seat, a sizable city spread along a river in a valley, as well as sol-
diers carrying injured people iers carrying injured pe
and rescue materials. Though quakes occur in the area frequently, buildings in rural areas and China's fast-growing smaller cities and towns are often constructed poorly. A magni-

## Inside Look at the Newly Found James Castle Art

BOISE (AP) • By all accounts, the works of famed outsider Idaho artist James

art lovers across the country. The drawings have been featured at the Museum of Modern Art in New York and the Philadelphia Museum of Art. Collectors have paid up to $\$ 50,000$ for single pieces
of his work, and Castle's heirs made millions after forming a partnership in 1996 to sell his art.
Imagine being Jeannie Schmidt, the current owner of Castle's old house in
Northwest Boise, who reNorthwest Boise, who re-
modeled a bedroom in 2010 modeled a bedroom in 2010 his art hidden in the walls. The bundles held hundreds of drawings dating as far back as the 1930s. Not surprisingly, much of the art was badly damaged by water,
mold, dirt and rodents - but mold, dirt and rodents - but
it was still long-lost work by a major folk artist.
Two years later, a lawsuit
and court trial have estaband court trial have established that all the art found by Schmidt belongs to the Castle Family Trust. Fourth District Judge Deborah Bail
ruled Schmidt has no claim on the art and must pay back

The church instead uses the van to pick up the elderly, drive adults to retreats, and take youth on mission trips. It's most frequently used to pick up seniors for the soup kitchen. On those
Wednesday afternoon bus rides, the Wednesday afternoon bus rides, the passengers, but sometimes more passengers,
The church has two designated drivers for its one van, a vehicle it pur chased about three years ago to replace a 1970 s -era bus.
"We started out with a school bus," said Alan Slaugenhaupt. "It's a good experience for me. It's a blessing to be able
to help get somebody (to the communi ty kitchen) who might not otherwise make it for a meal" The scene is different at The River Christian Fellowship in Twin Falls three passenger vans.
three passenger vans.

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## THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Against your six-spade contract the opening lead is the diamond three. You win the ace, RHO playing the eight. Plan the play to protect against as many bad breaks as possible.

After winning dummy's diamond ace, play the spade ace, and now switch your attention to hearts. Lead out the queen, then play to the heart king. If West discards on the sec ond heart, win, ruff a heart, then lead a trump to dummy and run the hearts. It doesn't matter if
the third heart is overruffed since the third heart is overruffed since then draw the last trump; equally, West's ruffing in on the second heart would clearly be fatal.
If it were East who could ruff the second heart to play a club, win with the ace, cross in spades (drawing the opponent's last trump), then ruff a heart, ruff a club, and run the hearts.
What happens if hearts are 5-0? If RHO ruffs the heart queen, you may still survive in much the same way as before. You simply need to take a heart finesse somewhere along the line after drawing the last trump. If LHO ruffs the heart queen, you will still survive if he does not have a third trump to play. (You have just enough entries to set up the long heart.) All in all, six spades makes except against 4-0 trumps or against a combined very bad heart break and trump break, when nothing would work.

ANSWER: The hand is too good for a rebid in either hearts or spades. Best is to cue-bid two clubs, simply showing a good hand, planning to bid two spades over two of a red suit from partner. This way your partner will know of real extras opposite (typically extra high-cards rather than four-card trump support). If you play - as I do - that one jump to three spades to force to game.
