How Would Repealing the Personal Property Tax Affect Idaho?

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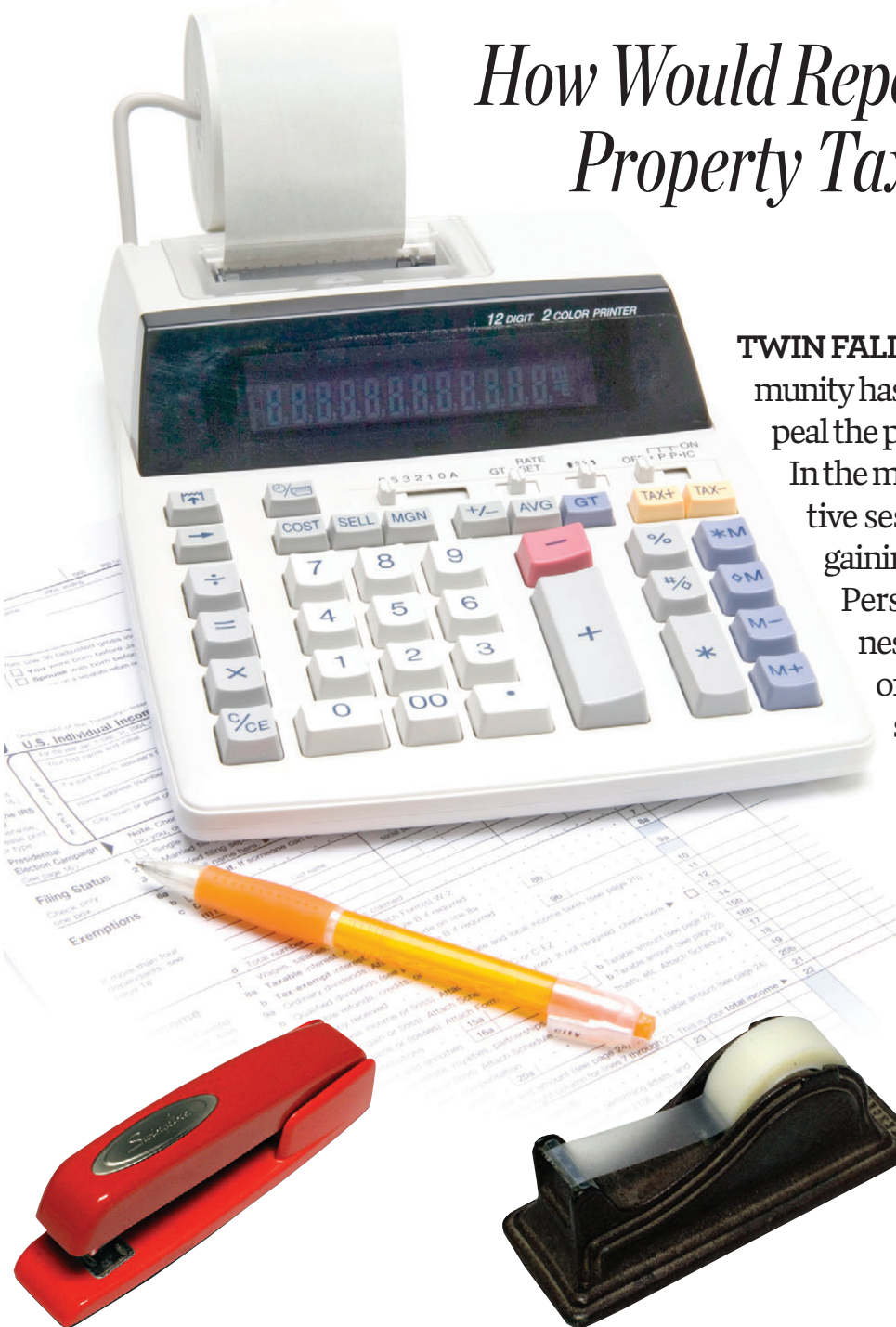
TWIN FALLS • For years, Idaho's business community has lobbied the Idaho Legislature to repeal the personal property tax.

In the months leading up to the next legislative session, that movement is once again gaining traction.

Personal property tax includes a business' moveable property, such as desks, office supplies, clothing racks, bookshelves, art and machinery.

How would a repeal affect Idahoans? It depends on who you ask.

• The Business Owners
What does it take to account for every office supply, every piece of medical equipment, every tool?
A big time commitment, said Shawn Barigar, president and CEO of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.
"What we've heard from our business members is it takes a tremendous amount of time to track the specific items that end up being accounted for in the personal property tax."

• The Local Government
The problem with repealing a tax: Government needs money to operate, and if that money isn't replaced, taxing districts may struggle.
Right now, it's difficult to estimate how big the impact of a repeal might be, said Gooding County Commissioner Helen Edwards.
"There are so many variables," she said.

• The Lawmakers
In August, Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, sent a letter to Idaho taxing districts asking how a personal property tax repeal would affect revenue and services.
"My purpose in sending out the letter was not to encourage or discourage elimination of the tax," Hill said in a Monday interview. Rather, he hoped to gather as much information as possible to educate lawmakers.

Technology Money to Hit Schools Later this Month

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TWIN FALLS • For a second year, south-central Idaho schools will receive money to boost classroom technology.

Through the state's Students Come First reforms, \$9 million in funding will go out statewide to school districts and public charter schools.

They'll get to choose how to spend the money.

In the Twin Falls School District, teachers and school principals can apply for in-district grants for specific technology proposals.

"The goal is really innovation and experimentation," information technology coordinator Brett Keller said.

He said awards will help teachers make their classrooms more engaging and interactive for students.

Fresh Wave of Insects Attack Sawtooths

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KETCHUM • Idaho's trees need a hug.

After years of being ravaged by aggressive beetles, forest officials are now reporting signs of a new insect infiltration just south of Stanley.

The new invasion is just another blow to efforts to help recover the ecosystem of southern Idaho's forests, said Jim Rineholt, forester with the U.S. Forest Service.

"I've said it before, it's a rough time to be a tree in a forest right now," he said.

The Sawtooth National Recreational Area is currently experiencing a spruce budworm outbreak first spotted in 2004. The insect is known for defoliating Douglas-fir, spruce and many other tree species. Once stripped of their foliage, trees are at a greater risk of reduced growth, dead tops and mortality.

The outbreak is part of the forest's long line of insect infestations that have wreaked havoc on the SNRA.

Most recently, mountain pine beetles once infested the majority of lodgepole pines in the Sawtooth Valley. The beetles first

showed up in the 1990s and fed on the forest until 2010.

Though the beetles are gone from that area, Idaho is still feeling the effects of the attack. For example, fire crews have pointed

What's Burning?

Wildfires burning across Idaho spread quickly with the help of plenty of beetle-killed trees. Here's a look at major fires currently burning in the southern half of the state.

Halstead: Sprawling across 153,000 acres, the fire is located just three miles north of Stanley. Fire crews estimate that close to 45 percent of the fire is contained. The fire hasn't grown over the past few days, and fire crews expect the flames to be fully contained by Oct. 16.

Trinity Ridge: More than 146,000 acres have been consumed in this fire burning just northwest of Featherville. Fire officials expect to fully control the fire by Oct. 1.

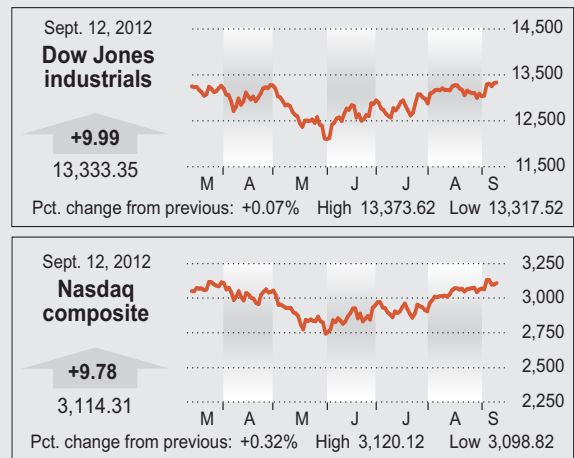

U.S. Stocks Rise; Investors Wait for the Fed

NEW YORK (AP) • The stock market edged higher Wednesday after a court cleared the way for Germany to participate in a European rescue fund. Attention shifted to the Federal Reserve, which began a big two-day meeting. The Dow Jones industrial average climbed 9.99 points to close at 13,333.35, a four-year closing high. The Standard & Poor's 500 index added an even 3 points to 1,436.56, also close to a four-year high. The tech-heavy Nasdaq composite index climbed 9.78 points to 3,114.31.

More Revealed about Bryan Point

BLUE LAKES • A photograph in a private album that once belonged to Jessie Bisbee has added more mystery to six rock towers at Bryan Point, overlooking what was once the Perrine Ranch.

A Hidden History feature in August identified three rock monuments on the Snake River Canyon rim that were built by three-time United States presidential candidate William Jennings Bryan. But the story behind three other monuments that stood beside Bryan's rock towers remains unknown.

Photographer Clarence E. Bisbee shot Bryan Point many times in his career, creating a partial timeline of the rock towers.

Bisbee moved to Twin Falls in 1906 at the urging of a school buddy from Nebraska, and brought his girlfriend, Jessie Robinson, to Twin Falls in 1910. Bisbee married Jessie in Salt Lake City on their way to Idaho.

But before Jessie agreed to marry him, Bisbee sent her scenic photographs from his new home. One of these photographs was of Bryan Point — before it earned that name.

Bryan first came to Idaho in 1897, the year after he lost his initial run at the presidency. I.B. Perrine and Bryan became close friends, and the Bryan family made numerous visits to Twin Falls over the next 28 years. The Perrine monuments were built in 1907.

Why or when the other rock towers were built has perplexed the Perrine family for decades.

"Who built the other three, and what did they represent?" wondered Randy Perrine. "That's my big question."

Further investigation has

revealed a Bisbee photo showing the rock towers in question standing in place a year before Bryan built the Perrine monuments.

Although Bisbee had a bad habit of not dating his photographs, this particular photo was part of an Easter gift — a photo album — that Bisbee sent Jessie in March of 1907. The photo — showing Lombardy poplar trees in

full foliage — was taken the previous summer, shortly after Bisbee arrived in Twin Falls.

The photo was taken at the Perrine Ranch, and shows Alpheus Creek in the foreground and Bryan Point in the background. Standing on the canyon rim are two rock towers and a possible third, a full year before Bryan built the Perrine monuments.

While Bisbee's photo does not answer the question of who built the first three rock towers, it does tell where Bryan got the idea for the Perrine monuments.

Despite efforts to preserve the monuments, the rock towers have all but disappeared, bit by bit, over the canyon rim.

Randy Perrine is looking for folks who may be interested in helping him save the monuments.

The Bisbee photo album containing the 1906 photograph is on display at the Twin Falls County Historical Museum.

A district committee will decide how to dole out the money. Keller said he expects most requests will be for mobile devices.

The school district anticipates receiving between \$230,000 and \$240,000 in technology funding this year.

Statewide, school districts and charter schools will receive the first half of the technology money at the end of this month.

Melissa McGrath, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Education, said administrators then have to submit a technology plan by Dec. 15.

That will detail how they're planning to spend the money. Then, the second half of the funding will go out.

In addition to in-district grants, the Twin Falls School District plans to buy interactive whiteboards for more classrooms this year.

"We will finish making sure all classrooms have interactive whiteboards," Keller said.

School board members took a step in that direction Monday night. They awarded a \$156,420 bid to purchase 110 interactive whiteboards for classrooms.

Currently, some classrooms at Canyon Ridge High School and a few elementary schools lack the technology.

Most of the funding — \$100,000 — will come from a grant from the Twin Falls School District Education Foundation. The remaining cost will be covered by the state technology funding.

In Kimberly, teachers will have a chance to apply for in-district grants for classroom technology — a scenario similar to the Twin Falls School District.

Kimberly Superintendent Luke Schroeder said it's the

Teen Sentenced to Prison in T.F. Applebee's Robbery

TWIN FALLS • A 19-year-old Jerome man was sentenced to prison time Friday for robbing the Twin Falls Applebee's restaurant in January. Jorge Banuelos pleaded guilty to the robbery charge on July 23 and will serve two to 12 years in the Idaho State Penitentiary. He was credited about five months of time served.

On Jan. 8, Twin Falls police responded to Applebee's at about 3 a.m. for a call of an armed robbery. An officer met with the manager, who said a person pointed a gun at him and told him to give over all his money as he left the store with a night deposit. The robber wore a dark-colored hoodie sweatshirt with a red bandana over his face, the manager said.

The manager told police he gave the masked robber all the money from the cash registers, totaling \$1,255.65.

Prosecutors asked that Banuelos spend between four and 10 years in prison, while Banuelos' defense attorney asked that he go to a therapeutic community in the state's retained-jurisdiction

program for a year. The attorney said Banuelos' family worried what effect prison time would have on him

since he's so young. Twin Falls County 5th District Judge Randy Stoker called the crime of robbery "one of the more shocking things that happens in society." He also pointed out it's one of the few crimes where the Idaho Legislature has authorized judges to sentence those convicted to life in prison. The others include rape, lewd and lascivious conduct, murder and some drug cases.

"If I saw it in my discretion I could put you in the penitentiary for the rest of your natural life without the possibility for parole," he said. "I'm not going to do that today."

Stoker told Banuelos he doubted the teen would commit another crime, but a considerable prison sentence was necessary.

"Whether you make parole depends directly on what you do," he said.

First, the Legislature needs to define personal property tax. For example, the Gooding County assessor classifies milk equipment in a barn as actual property, Edwards said, because it's bolted to the floor.

But if the Legislature defines that bolted-down machinery as personal

property, the county will take a bigger hit.

"If they say it's personal property, that's going to make a real difference," she said.

Then there's the question of whether the state will allow districts to replace revenue. Even if they're allowed to increase taxes elsewhere, Edwards pointed out that Idaho taxing districts have levy limits.

Ketchum Roadwork Begins

KETCHUM • Roadwork near the intersection of Saddle Road and Idaho Highway 75 will limit traffic on the highway today and Friday, state transportation officials say.

According to the Idaho Transportation Department, the roadway resurfacing project on Idaho 75 could produce traffic delays and lane closures. Crews must first mill, then repave nearly half a mile of the highway both north and south of the intersection. The goal is to replace the worst areas of rutted and deteriorated pavement near the intersection.

The highway will be reduced to as little as one lane during working hours. Drivers should watch for flaggers and be prepared for delays of up to 15 minutes, according to ITD. Saddle Road will be closed during milling and paving operations as the asphalt is placed and allowed to cool.

Though work is expected to end Friday, that will depend on weather and roadway conditions, ITD warned. Drivers should consider using an alternate route through the area.

Jerome-based Idaho Sand and Gravel is the contractor for the \$115,000 project.

trees as one of the reasons the 153,000-acre Halstead Fire grew so quickly.

Idaho is not the only state to experience an onslaught of insects and disease in its forests. More than 6.4 million acres of the nation's forests died from a combination of insect and disease in 2011, according to a recent report from the Forest Service.

Close to 60 percent of the mortality was caused by the mountain pine beetle and more than 4.5 million acres were defoliated by spruce budworm, the report stated.

Overall, Idaho has seen a drop in the amount of trees

killed by insects and disease since 2008. But that doesn't mean forests are getting better, Rineholt said.

If Idaho's weather continues to have shorter and warmer winters, then the ecosystem must change, he said.

Without a cold enough winter, the chances of insects and diseases dying remain low. This could eventually force forest officials to change what types of trees get planted in the forest in order to assure long-term survival, Rineholt said.

"This is the start of a broader picture," he said. "These trees are going to have to face more insects than drought in the long term."

being accounted for in the personal property tax," Barigar said. "At the end of the process, it truthfully doesn't generate a whole lot of dollars."

While the chamber hasn't yet had its meeting about legislative priorities, "it'll certainly be something we discuss at length," Barigar said.

The tax doesn't just affect business owners currently set up in Idaho, said Nathan Lyda, president-elect of the Idaho Association of Real-

tors. Some surrounding states, including Utah, don't have the tax, which may affect businesses' decisions on where to locate.

"It's about growth in Idaho," he said.

And that affects everyone, including real estate agents with property to sell, Lyda said.

In 2008, the Realtors association called it "the most hated tax in the state by those who pay it." That position hasn't changed, Lyda said.

"Our association feels that it is a barrier to economic development," he said.

Some are already familiar with the topic. House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke, R-Oakley and a member of the House tax committee, said repealing the personal property tax has come up multiple sessions in a row.

"It's deja vu all over again," Bedke said.

The difference this time: Many of the lawmakers considering this new legislation will be new to the Statehouse. Between redistricting and retirements, the Legislature may see as much as a 40 percent turnover in its ranks in January.

During the 2012 session, a group of lawmakers attempted to solidly define personal property, debating intricacies like whether to include machinery bolted to the floor, or utilities.

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But many of those who worked on those definitions are no longer in the Legislature, Hill pointed out. Rep. Dennis Lake, R-Blackfoot and chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, retired this year; Sen. Tim Corder, R-Mountain Home, lost his May primary race; House Caucus Chairman Ken Roberts, R-Donnelly, stepped down this summer after being appointed to the Idaho State Tax Commission.

Bedke said he wants to repeal the tax, but acknowledged there are difficulties. Some counties with huge chunks of public land depend largely on personal property tax revenue for their budgets. Should the state force them to cut their budgets, replace that money with state general fund dollars, or allow them to shift the

tax elsewhere?

There's no easy answer, Bedke said, and there hasn't been for years.

"I'm certainly willing to listen to any of the new ideas," he said.

Resisting the Monetary Morphine Fix

Fortunately, not everything is up to date in Kansas City. Esther George, president of the regional Federal Reserve Bank here, is refreshingly retrograde regarding what less-circumspect people welcome as the modernizing of the nation’s central bank into a central economic planner. She has concerns, both prudential and philosophical, about the transformation of the Fed in ways that erase the distinction between monetary policy, which is the Fed’s proper business, and fiscal policy, which is inherently political.

The basic interest rate — i.e., the federal funds rate minus the inflation rate — was negative during about 40 percent of the disastrous 1970s and the 2000s, which ended disastrously. Because today’s rate is negative, the Fed’s stimulus repertoire is reduced to “quantitative easing.” That phrase, which is how government speaks when trying not to be understood, means printing money. Except printing is so 20th century. Nowadays, the Fed gives banks digital transfusions of money to lower long-term interest rates, which result in...

Not much bang for trillions of bucks. With corporations holding upward of \$2 trillion in cash, and 30-year mortgages at 3.5 percent, George, speaking several weeks before this week’s meeting of the Federal Open Market Committee, asked: “Is there anyone not borrowing today or purchasing a house because interest rates aren’t low enough? Do we expect that businesses will hire if their long-term rates are lower?”

Very low interest rates discourage saving, punish retirees living off interest-bearing assets and, George says, “incent people into riskier assets.” These include commodities, farm land (for the first time on record, prices of cropland in George’s district have risen more than 20 percent for two consecutive years) and equities. Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke evidently thinks that driving up the stock market will quicken the animal spirits of the affluent 20 percent who own 93 percent of equities, and this “wealth effect” will spur economic activity, eventually benefiting others. So, the interest rates Barack Obama favors are a form of the trickle-down economics he execrates.

Richard W. Fisher, George’s counterpart at the Dallas regional Fed, is “perplexed” by Wall Street’s “preoccupation, bordering upon fetish” concerning a possible QE3. Financiers “have become hooked on the monetary morphine we provided when we performed massive reconstructive surgery” during the 2008-09 panic. However, “monetary policy provides the fuel” for America’s economy and “we have filled the gas tank and then some.”

George considers the Fed’s dual mandate — “stable prices” and “maximum employment” — “redundant”: Achieving the former is the best thing the Fed can do for the latter. James Bullard, president of the St. Louis Fed, seems to agree. Monetary policy, George acknowledges, is “a blunt tool.” Its bluntness is, however, a virtue if it discourages the folly of trying to fine-tune the economy.

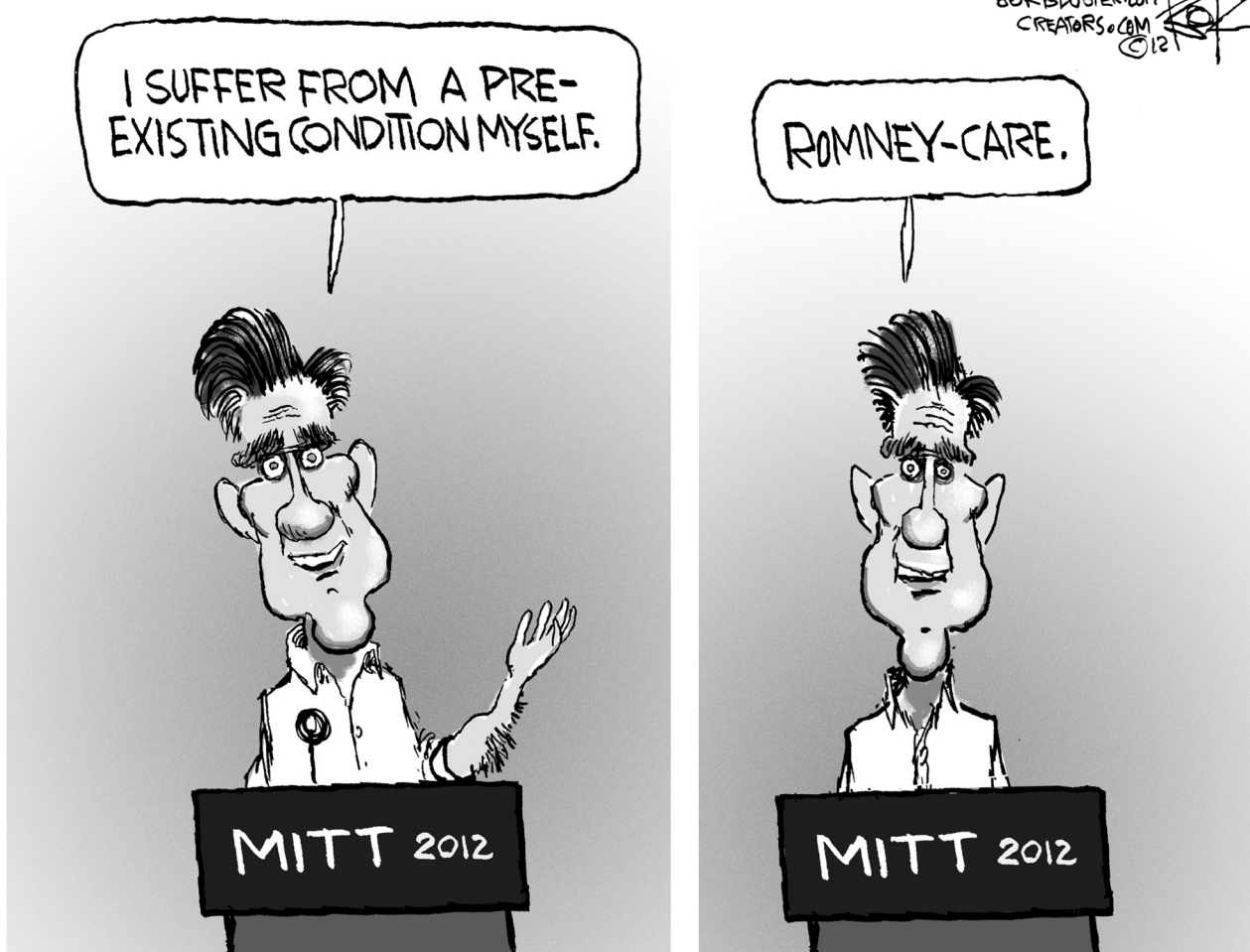
“People,” George says, “will figure out a way to make a buck if they know what the rules are.” Investing — including hiring, which is investing in employees — is a wager on the future. Fidgety government makes the future unnecessarily opaque. Stanford’s John Taylor notes that “over the past 12 years, the number of provisions of the tax code expiring annually has increased tenfold,” the number of federal regulators has grown 25 percent in five years, and Obamacare and Dodd-Frank expand uncertainty by enlarging the government’s discretion.

Uncertainty is exacerbated by the Fed’s exercise of its vast discretion, including QE1, QE2, and perhaps soon QE3 (or QE5, including two “twists” also aimed at lowering borrowing costs). Bernanke, who promises more “policy accommodation” to support the economic recovery, is inadvertently vindicating Milton Friedman’s belief that “the stock of money [should] be increased at a fixed rate year-in and year-out without any variation in the rate of increase to meet cyclical needs.”

When the independent Fed buys bonds to affect short-term economic stimulus by manipulating long-term interest rates, this is less monetary policy than fiscal policy, which is the business of an accountable Congress. It also is a preposterous arrogation by the Fed of a role as the economy’s central planner, a role beyond the Fed’s — or anyone else’s — competence, and incompatible with its independence.

Bernanke’s term ends in 2014 and Mitt Romney says he would not reappoint him. If Romney becomes president, he should appoint someone such as George, who would concentrate on protecting the currency as a store of value — restraining inflation — while reversing the recent inflation of the bank’s ambitions, which have not prevented the recovery from being dreadful and may have helped to make it so.

Romney Presidency Could Face Its Share of Obstacles

This election is likely to result either in a continued face-off between President Barack Obama and congressional Republicans or in a unified Republican government led by Mitt Romney.

The first scenario is a recipe for legislative gridlock, because neither side accepts the other’s view of how to promote the national interest and neither side will read the election results as a reason to compromise. Even in the second scenario, though, getting legislation through Congress is going to be very hard.

The 2011 deal to raise the debt ceiling reduces planned defense spending starting next year, and Romney says he wants to reverse that, too. Perhaps worst for Romney, the government will hit the debt ceiling again early next year. During the primaries, he pledged not to raise it unless Congress passes a constitutional amendment to limit federal spending to 18 percent of the economy. That would take a two-thirds vote by the House and the Senate. It’s not going to happen. A Romney presidency, in other words, would have to start with his breaking a promise to conservatives.

All new presidents want to accomplish a lot quickly. For Romney, however, the clock will tick more loudly. Tax rates are scheduled to rise in the new year. He will need legislation to roll them back, and to make good on his campaign promise to cut them an additional 20

He would have to get Re-

publican congressmen to break their own promises, too, because many of them made the same pledge he did. And he wouldn’t be able to rely on Democratic votes to raise the debt ceiling. Especially if Republicans have just taken the Senate, Democrats will probably do what minority parties usually do: let the majority take the heat for an unpopular but necessary step. Since any Republican majority in the Senate is likely to be narrow, Romney won’t have votes to spare.

There has been a lot of debate in recent weeks about whether all of Romney’s budgetary goals can be reconciled as a matter of mathematics. Even if they can, it’s not clear they can be reconciled legislatively. It seems highly likely that Romney will have to abandon some of his goals. The prevailing view has been that Romney will stick with his tax cuts, on the assumption that they are what matter most to Republicans. My own sense is that today’s Republicans care much more about spending.

If Romney tries to achieve some of his goals by reaching a grand deal with the Democrats, he will find the obstacles are large. Democrats won’t accept any bargain unless it raises taxes on the rich and leaves Obama’s health-care plan in place. Republicans, with control of Congress and the White House, won’t see why they should concede on either point.

My bet is that Romney’s tax cut would fall victim to a growing Republican realization: Even if they triumph this November, they will find it very hard to legislate.

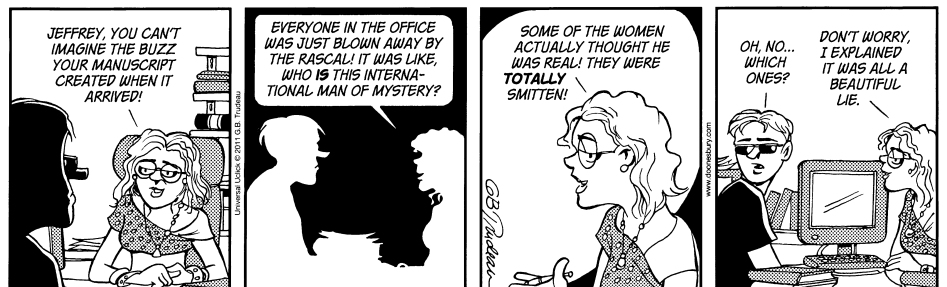

Kimberly to Examine Accounting System

KIMBERLY • The city of Kimberly will consider changes to its financial accounting system after completing an annual budget process that elected officials said was more difficult than it should have been.

"The current system has not been working," Mayor Tracy Armstrong said during a City Council meeting Tuesday.

The council voted to solicit new proposals for professional auditing services and agreed to consider changes in accounting services as well.

Last month, the council approved a \$3.7 million budget for fiscal year 2013, but it wasn't easy. City officials were dissatisfied with services provided by an outside accounting firm.

"We gave our accountant representative/auditor ample time to provide us with information that we needed to move forward with our budgeting process, and we could not get the answers," Armstrong said.

The city was forced to hire another outside accountant on a temporary basis to help finalize the budget.

The sudden resignation earlier this year of city administrator Polly Hulsey only complicated the budgeting process, said Councilman Jim Eisenhower. Hulsey was familiar with the city's financial system and would likely have been able to provide the needed information, he said.

The city will solicit proposals from certified public accountants to perform an audit of the city's financial statements for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30. The selected firm will also be asked to prepare an audit of the city's water system.

Council members debated at length whether to solicit proposals from outside accounting firms or to rely on in-house staffers.

With a little more training and the right computer programs, newly hired Administrator/Treasurer Nick Camberlango and Clerk Jennifer Rowe should be able to perform the necessary accounting duties, Eisenhower said.

He questioned the need to hire an outside accountant.

"I'm not certain that I am convinced that we need a separate accounting firm to do what Jennifer and Nick are capable of doing," he said.

Council President Brandon Hoobler said he would support the solicitation of outside accounting help, but only for the purpose of training city staffers so they could eventually do it themselves.

"If we're outsourcing a lot of those duties to somebody else, it seems to me that there might be a position no longer needed within the city," he said.

The council didn't take any action, but agreed to revisit the issue at its next meeting on Sept. 28.

In other action, the council approved an increase in trash collection fees from \$8.95 to \$11.15 per month.

The vote was largely a formality since the new budget adopted on Aug. 28 provided for the increase. No one spoke in opposition to the fee hike during a public hearing held on the same date.

City officials also announced that a town hall meeting will be held today to discuss the status of the city's proposed downtown revitalization project.

The city applied for a \$500,000 community development block grant to help pay for the project, but was recently informed by the Idaho Department of Commerce that it would only qualify for \$350,000 due to limited funding.

The meeting will be held at 6 p.m. in the Kimberly Middle School Commons.

On Sept. 8, police responded to the 800 block of Sunrise Boulevard in Twin Falls for a call about a possible aggravated assault.

During the investigation, officers discovered the gun used in the al-

leged assault was a stolen .45 caliber handgun. According to a police report, the suspect in the assault told officers he was supposed to return the gun to Spencer Wells, 18. Wells was a suspect in the burglary on Washington Street, the report states.

According to the report, police found Wells at the Magic Valley Speedway and arrested him on the burgla-

ry warrant. Well allegedly told police he didn't steal any weapons, but bought a Hi-Point 380 caliber handgun from a 16-year-old boy, the report states.

According to the report, Wells allowed an officer to look through his cell phone. The officer reported finding several pictures of Wells holding the Hi-Point 380 that was reported stolen from the 16-year-old's mother.

Through interviews police said they were able to recover the other two guns, a

Ruger 10/22 rifle and a Taurus .22 caliber semi-automatic pistol.

Wells was charged with the burglary and arraigned Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Sept. 21.

A second suspect in the burglary, Shane Egan, pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary and is scheduled to be sentenced Monday.

The suspect in the alleged assault did not appear to have been charged with a crime as of Wednesday.

Idaho Man Accused of Tying up Child Pleads Guilty

SANDPOINT (AP) • A northern Idaho man accused of injuring his nephew while hog-tying him pleaded guilty to a lesser charge in a deal with prosecutors.

Shane Lee Crawford of Laclede told the court Tuesday that he bound the hands and feet of the 12-year-old boy, who has a mild form of autism, to keep the child from running away.

"He would run off. We couldn't stop him," said Crawford, 38, who pleaded guilty to misdemeanor child endangerment.

Court documents say Crawford's son videotaped him while he forced his nephew to the ground and bound his hands and feet. The Sept. 22, 2011, video later landed in the hands of the boy's counselor, who turned it over to authorities, documents state.

Crawford's attorney previously argued that the video was taken to show

the man's interaction with the boy because the child was prone to exaggerating.

The charge was reduced to a misdemeanor because an unidentified witness was unable to testify, said Bonner County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Shane Greenbank.

The plea agreement called for a 180-day sentence with 135 days suspended and credit for 45 days served.

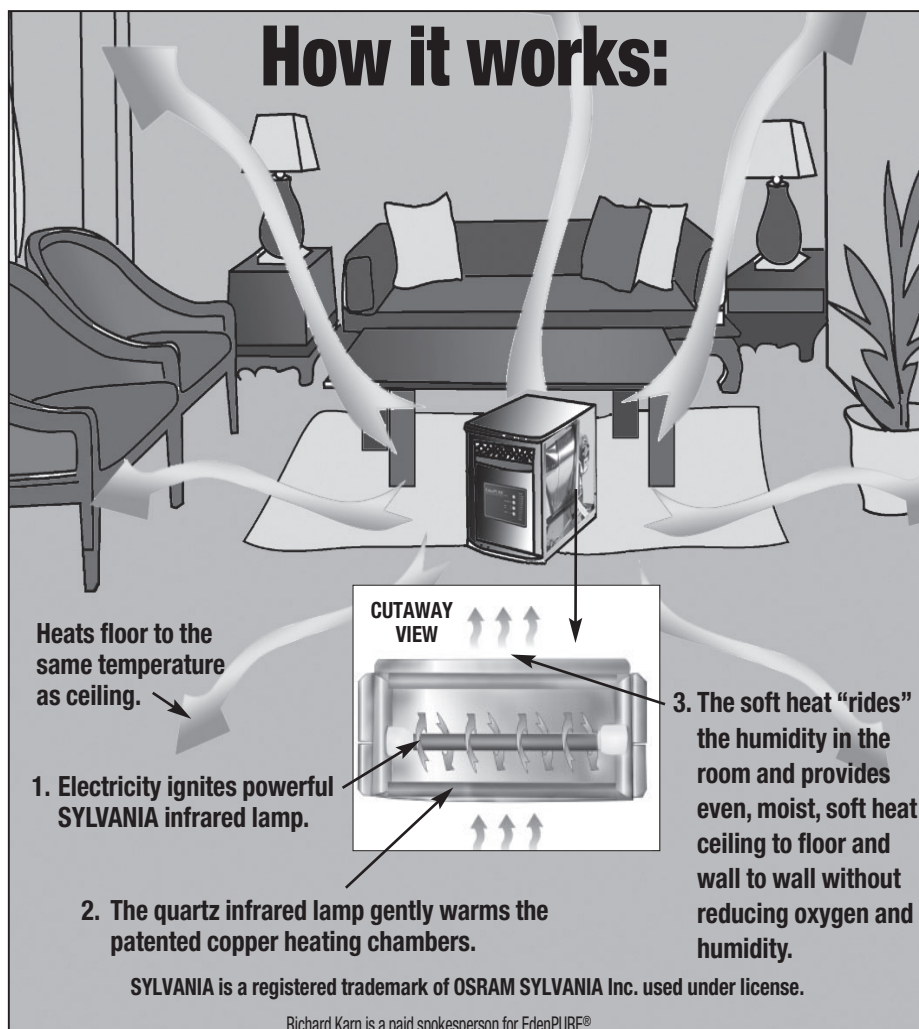

Was Libya Attack Planned to Mark 9/11?

President Barack Obama vows to bring those responsible to justice.

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Obama administration, roiled by the first killing of a U.S. ambassador in more than 30 years, is investigating whether the assault on the U.S. Consulate in Libya was a planned terrorist strike to mark the anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks and not a spontaneous mob enraged over an anti-Islam YouTube video.

President Barack Obama declared in a White House appearance that the U.S. would “work with the Libyan government to bring to justice” those who killed Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans. Intelligence officers said the attack on the Benghazi consulate was “too coordinated or professional to be spontaneous,” according to a U.S. counterterrorism official.

The official spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss the incident publicly.

White House press secretary Jay Carney said it was too early to judge whether the attack was planned.

“I know that this is being investigated, and we’re working with the Libyan government to investigate the incident. I would not want to speculate on that at this time,” he said. Several Libyan security guards also were killed.

The FBI was sending evidence teams to Libya, said a law enforcement official.

Analysts are working on several different scenarios based on intelligence that could lead to a motive for

the attack. Some concern the possibility of targeting high-ranking officials, according to a law enforcement official briefed on the investigation. But none of the intelligence has suggested terrorists would specifically target Stevens, said the official who also spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak publicly about the investigation.

The attack in Libya, which came hours after a mob stormed the U.S. Embassy in Cairo and tore down the U.S. flag, was presumed to have been triggered by a movie, whose trailer has gone viral on YouTube, depicting the Islamic prophet

Muhammad in disrespectful ways. In an extraordinary move, Gen. Martin Dempsey, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, called anti-Islamic preacher Terry Jones and asked him to stop promoting the film. A spokeswoman said the church would not show the film Wednesday evening.

“Make no mistake. Justice will be done,” a somber Obama pledged at the White House, Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton at his side.

He ordered increased security at U.S. diplomatic missions overseas, particularly in Libya, and said he condemned “in the strongest possible terms the outrageous and shock-

ing” attack. Clinton said she was particularly appalled that the attack took place in Benghazi, which the U.S. had helped liberate from dictator Moammar Gadhafi during the Arab Spring revolution in Libya last year.

Three Americans were wounded, U.S. officials said.

The aftermath of the two attacks also stirred the U.S. presidential campaign, where until Wednesday, foreign policy had taken a back seat to the struggling economy.

The Republican nominee, Mitt Romney, criticized the administration for statements issued before and after the Cairo attacks that ex-

pressed sympathy for those insulted by the video.

“I also believe the administration was wrong to stand by a statement sympathizing with those who had breached our embassy in Egypt instead of condemning their actions,” Romney told a morning news conference. “It’s never too early for the United States government to condemn attacks on Americans and to defend our values.”

Obama said later than Romney “seems to have a tendency to shoot first and aim later.”

Obama and Clinton made a rare joint visit to the State Department, where grieving colleagues of Stevens and the other three Americans killed in Benghazi gathered in a courtyard. The president also ordered U.S. flags to be flown at half-staff at government and military buildings and vessels around the world until sunset on Sept. 16. Flags had already been lowered in many places to commemorate the victims of the 9/11 attacks.

Clinton denounced those who might kill over an insulting movie.

“There is no justification for this,” Clinton said. “None. Violence like this is no way to honor religion or faith and as long as there are those who would take innocent life in the name of God, the world will never know a true and lasting peace.”

Underscoring the administration’s frustration, Clinton wondered aloud about the attack in Benghazi, which Gadhafi had once threatened to destroy.

“This is not easy,” she said. “Today, many Americans are asking, indeed I asked myself, how could this happen? How could this happen in a country we helped liberate, in a city we helped save from destruction? This question reflects just how complicated and, at times, just how confounding, the world can be.”

Era of Supersized Soft Drinks Could End Today in New York

NEW YORK (AP) • The era of the supersized cola may come to an end in New York City today, when health officials are expected to approve an unprecedented 16-ounce limit on sodas and other sugary drinks at restaurants, delis and movie theaters. But will it actually translate into better health?

Doctors and nutrition experts said the regulation’s success or failure may depend on more than just the modest number of calories it might slash from people’s diets. It will hinge on whether the first-in-the-nation rule starts a conversation that changes attitudes toward overeating.

“Ultimately it does come down to culture, and it comes down to taking some first steps,” said Dr. Jeffrey Mechanick, a professor at the Mount Sinai School of Medicine who has studied the effect of government regulation on the obesity epidemic.

“There are so many factors that are acting in this complex disease. Obesity is not just a disease simply of people drinking too much sugary soft drink,” he said. “Just attacking one thing, individually, isn’t going to do much.”

But if the rule is part of a broader social and scientific assault on the dangers of too much sugar, he said, it could be tremendously effective. He likened it to the drumbeat about the dangers of smoking, which took decades to translate into results.

“People talk about it. It gets ruminated at social parties. It gets ruminated in politics and the media. And all of a sudden, you have an awareness,” he said.

City health officials say that by restricting portion sizes for sugary beverages, they are taking on one of the leading culprits in the national fat problem.

Since the mid-1970s, Americans have increased their daily intake by 200 to 300 calories while getting less exercise — a couch-potato lifestyle that has left the country with epidemic levels of obesity and diabetes.

While plenty of foods contribute to the problem, some experts believe soft drinks deserve a greater share of the blame, in part because the body doesn’t scream, “I’m full!” when someone downs a 32-ounce soda, even though it has more calories than a typical fast-food cheeseburger.

Poverty Numbers Unchanged

WASHINGTON (AP) • The nation's poverty rate remained stuck at a record level last year, while income dropped and the number of people who don't have health insurance declined.

A Census Bureau report released Wednesday provided a mixed picture of the economic well-being of U.S. households for 2011 as the nation enters the final phase of a presidential election campaign.

The overall poverty rate stood at 15 percent, statistically unchanged from the 15.1 percent rate in the previous year. Experts had expected a rise in the poverty rate for the fourth straight year, but unemployment benefits and modest job gains helped stave that off, the bureau reported. For last year, the official poverty line was an annual income of \$23,021 for a family of four.

While unemployment eased slightly from 2010 to 2011, the gap between rich and poor increased. The median, or midpoint, household income was \$50,054, 1.5 percent lower than 2010 and a second straight annual decline.

In a blog post, the White House said the latest figures show that government policies can help the poor, middle class and uninsured, while more work remains to be done.

Nation on Track for Deadliest West Nile Year

NEW YORK (AP) • Health officials say they're convinced this will be the worst year for West Nile virus deaths and severe illnesses since the disease hit America's shores in 1999.

So far, 1,405 serious illnesses and 118 deaths from West Nile have been reported across the country. The bulk are in Texas but Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, South Dakota and Michigan have also seen substantial numbers.

The worst year for the mosquito-borne disease was 2002, which saw nearly 3,000 severe cases and 284 deaths, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

This year's count of severe cases rose by more than 30 percent in the past week, and is on track to surpass 2002, the CDC's Dr. Lyle Petersen said in a call with reporters on Wednesday.

While the height of mosquito season has passed, infections are expected to continue into October, and severe illness and death reports are expected to keep coming in for months, CDC officials said.

West Nile virus was first diagnosed in Uganda in 1937, but no cases were reported in the U.S. until 1999 in New York.

Only One in Five Trust Unions

WASHINGTON • The teachers strike in Chicago this week could be a bruising battle on the picket line and in the school of public opinion.

The job protections and benefits packages enjoyed by public-sector union members have started to breed resentment among some Americans who have lost their jobs, seen reduced benefits packages or suf-

fered pay cuts — sometimes multiple ones — during the economic recession.

Support for unions hit its peak in the 1950s, when 75 percent of Americans said they approved of labor unions. Only about one in five Americans now say they trust unions, according to a Gallup Poll conducted in August. The poll didn't differentiate between public-sector and private-sector

unions, but the waning labor support gives politicians like Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel greater backing to confront public employees in the name of fiscal responsibility.

Chicago teachers are striking about a reform package that includes teacher evaluations, job security and merit pay. While the strike was not reverberating politically at the mo-

ment, it could, if only because any unexpected news event so close to the Nov. 6 elections is going to be scrutinized, said Peter Brown, assistant director of the Quinnipiac University Polling Institute in Connecticut.

"It gets the whole issue of managing government and collective bargaining back into the picture," Brown said.

Britain Looks to China for Nuclear Renaissance

LONDON (AP) • A government campaign to usher in the next generation of nuclear power in Britain hit a major snag when German companies, scared off by the crisis last year at Japan's Fukushima plant, pulled out of plans to build new reactors here. But another investor with deeper pockets has stepped in: China.

Chinese state corporations are backing consortiums that are vying to build nuclear plants here in a deal that pits the security interests of Washington's closest ally against the commercial considerations of a country desperately seeking to modernize its aging energy grid. The possible entry of China as Britain's nuclear benefactor is being seen here and across the region as a test case not only for the viability of nuclear energy in a post-Fukushima world, but also for how far fiscally strapped European governments will go in their quest for cash.

The bid marks the largest and most controversial of China's recent investments in Britain — which range from the revered Savile Row tailors Gieves & Hawkes to a stake in the Thames Water utility company — and would add to a string of Western world investments by Beijing that also includes the pending takeover of

Nexen Inc., a Canadian oil firm with operations in the Gulf of Mexico.

To the dismay of critics who fear the implications of Chinese influence over the energy sector — and particularly over nuclear power generation — the British government has generally blessed the notion of China's involvement. As one energy department official here put it, London is sending a signal to Beijing that Britain "is open for business."

"Problem is, I don't see anyone else but the Chinese rushing to invest in this area right now," said Nick Butler, a former energy sector adviser at No. 10 Downing Street and a critic of the deal. "They are the only ones with the money. If you know of anyone else, please send them to the government."

The pending deal underscores how differently the United States and Europe view China. European countries do not entirely share the U.S. perception of Beijing as a strategic competitor but instead increasingly see a financial patron, with Chinese investments in a key port in troubled Greece and a power company in hard-hit Portugal illustrating its role as banker and investor where others fear to tread.

Is North Korea Experimenting with Change?

PYONGYANG, North Korea (AP) • Deep in the North Korean countryside, in remote villages that outsiders seldom reach, farmers are now said to be given nearly one-third of their harvests to sell at market prices. Collective farms are reportedly being reorganized into something closer to family farms. State propagandists are expounding the glories of change under the country's new young leader.

In the rigidly planned economy of this Stalinist state, could this be the first flicker of reform?

A string of long-doubtful observers have become increasingly convinced that economic change is afoot, akin to China's first flirtations with market reforms 30 years ago.

But, they also warn, exactly what is happening remains a mystery.

No outsiders are known to

have been to the villages, in Ryanggang province, since the new policies reportedly went into effect. No outsiders have seen the details of the June 28 government order — "On the Establishing of a New Economic Management System in Our Own Style" — that supposedly launched the program. Other reported reforms, from shifts in investment laws to new industrial profit-sharing regulations, are

even more opaque.

Still, there are undeniable signs that the world's most closed-off society may be toying with change, from a carefully scripted campaign to soften the image of the country's young leader, Kim Jong Un, to the apparent purging of a hardline general and a series of often-cryptic official statements hinting that Pyongyang is serious about liberalizing its economy.

Whooping Cough Vaccine Loses Punch Too Fast after Final Shot

NEW YORK (AP) • As the U.S. wrestles with its biggest whooping cough outbreak in decades, researchers appear to have zeroed in on the main cause: The safer vaccine that was introduced in the 1990s loses effectiveness much faster than previously thought.

A study published in Wednesday's New England Journal of Medicine found that the protective effect weakens dramatically soon after a youngster gets the last of the five recommended shots

around age 6.

The protection rate falls from about 95 percent to 71 percent within five years, said researchers at the Kaiser Permanente Vaccine Research Center in Oakland, Calif.

The U.S. has had more than 26,000 whooping cough cases so far this year, including more than 10,000 in children ages 7 to 10.

"The substantial majority of the cases are explained by this waning immunity," said Dr. William Schaffner, an infectious-disease specialist at

Vanderbilt University.

In light of the findings and earlier, similar research, health officials are considering recommending another booster shot for children, strengthening the vaccine or devising a brand new one.

But "there's nothing in the pipeline that's close," said Dr. Tom Clark of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Whooping cough, or pertussis, is a highly contagious bacterial disease that can strike people of any age but is most dangerous to children.

Pakistan Factory Fires Kill 283

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) • Fires at two clothing factories in Pakistan left 283 people dead — many trapped behind locked doors and barred windows — tragedies that highlight workplace perils in a country where many buildings lack basic safety equipment and owners often bribe officials to ignore the violations.

The blazes broke out Tuesday night at a garment factory in the southern port city of Karachi and a shoe manufacturer in the eastern city of Lahore. At least 258 people died in the fire in Karachi, where rescue workers were still searching Wednesday for bodies in the charred building. Another 25 perished in Lahore.

Panicked workers in Karachi had only one way out since the factory's owner had locked all the other exit doors in response to a recent theft, officials said. Many victims suffocated in the smoke-filled basement.

"The owner of the factory should also be burned to death the way our dear ones have died in a miserable condition," said Nizam-ud-Din, whose nephew was killed in the fire, one of the deadliest industrial accidents in Pakistani history.

Police were searching for the factory's managers and placed the owner on a list of people who are not allowed to leave the country, said Roshan Ali Sheikh, a top government official in Karachi.

"It is a criminal act to lock the emergency exit doors, and we are trying to know who did it, and why," Sheikh said.

The fire started when a boiler exploded and the flames ignited chemicals that were stored in the factory, which manufactured jeans

and other clothes for export. Between 300 and 400 workers were inside when the blaze erupted.

Many of the deaths were caused by suffocation as people trapped in the basement were unable to escape when it filled with smoke, said Karachi fire chief Ehtisham-ud-Din.

Those on the upper floors of the five-story building had to break through metal bars

covering the windows so they could leap to safety. Dozens were injured doing so, including a 27-year-old pregnant woman.

"When smoke spread all around, I jumped out the window in panic," said Mohammad Shahzad, who broke an arm and a leg when he hit the ground. "I found myself in the hospital when I regained my senses."

Others burned to death as

they tried to wriggle through the barred windows.

"There were no safety measures taken in the building design," said senior police official Amir Farooqi. "There was no emergency exit. These people were trapped."

Firefighters were still battling the blaze Wednesday. The death toll spiked as they entered previously inaccessible parts of the factory and found scores more bodies.

The death toll stood at 258 by Wednesday evening, including a 10-year-old boy, said Sheikh. Another 31 people were injured.

Rani Bibi said her two sons-in-law called Tuesday night to say they were trapped in the factory and asked her to tell their wives to take good care of their children. She hasn't heard from them since, and couldn't find their bodies in any of the hospitals.

Amish Haircut a Hate Crime? Jury to Decide

CLEVELAND (AP) •

Each one of the hair-and-beard-cutting attacks against Amish men and women last fall was connected to one person, an Amish bishop who thought he was above the law and free to hand out punishment based on his religious beliefs, a federal prosecutor said Wednesday.

And every one of the attacks carried out by members of a breakaway Amish group comes back to religion, Assistant U.S. Attorney Kristy Parker said during closing arguments in the government's hate crimes case.

The bishop, Sam Mullet Sr., believed the government should stay out of the dispute because this was a religious matter and he wanted to discipline those who went against him, she said. "That is where he's absolutely wrong," Parker said.

Sixteen members of the group are accused of planning or taking part in five separate attacks that the government says were hate crimes because they were motivated by religious differences among the Amish. Prosecutors say the defendants cut off Amish men's beards and women's hair because the hair carries spiritual significance in their faith.

Defense attorneys acknowledge that the hair-cuttings took place and that crimes were committed but contend that prosecutors are overreaching by calling them hate crimes.

"Use common sense," defense attorney Neal Atway told jurors. "What happened was offensive, but what crime was committed?"

All of the defendants are members of Mullet's settlement that he founded in eastern Ohio near the West Virginia panhandle.

Violence Breaks Out in Venezuela

PUERTO CABELLO, Venezuela (AP) • Violence broke out at an opposition campaign event Wednesday as supporters of Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez blocked a road and a campaign truck was burned. Both sides hurled rocks, and police said at least 14 people were injured.

A large crowd of Chavez supporters in red shirts blocked a main road near the airport in the coastal town of Puerto Cabello before a visit by opposition candidate Henrique Capriles. A truck used by Capriles' campaign was set ablaze, and a motorcycle was also torched.

The area has traditionally leaned pro-Chavez, and opposition supporters were seen running for cover during the violence. At least 14 people suffered cuts and other minor injuries, police in Carabobo state said.

After the violence, Capriles spoke at an outdoor rally in the town, blaming Chavez and small "radical groups." He was on his way to the event when the clashes erupted.

"Those actions aren't spontaneous. There's someone responsible for those actions," Capriles told the crowd.

Addressing Chavez without mentioning the president's name, Capriles said: "It's you who wants that scenario. It's you who wants to sow fear."

"We know that he who turns to violence, it's that he's afraid of the other's

ideas," Capriles added. "We're tired of violence."

His supporters chanted, "We aren't afraid!"

Chavez has recently said that his rival has a hidden agenda to impose right-wing measures "that would lead Venezuela to a civil war." But

Chavez has denied intending that as a threat or trying to promote violence in any way.

During the melee, some of the red-shirted government supporters went into the airport compound and carried away speakers and a generator.

Renoir Painting Found at Flea Market

WASHINGTON (AP) • A woman who paid \$7 for a box of trinkets at a West Virginia flea market two years ago apparently acquired an original painting by French impressionist Pierre-Auguste Renoir without knowing it.

The woman considered discarding the painting to salvage its frame, but instead made an appointment to have it evaluated in July by the Potomack Co. auction house in Alexandria, Va., said its fine arts director Anne Norton Craner.

When the woman pulled the painting out of a garbage bag she carried it in, Craner was nearly certain the paint-

ing was a Renoir with its distinct colors, light and brushwork. A plaque on the front labeled it "Renoir."

"My gut said that it was right, but you have to then check," Craner said.

French handwriting on the back of the canvass included a label and number. Craner turned to the catalog by French gallery Bernheim-Jeune that's published all of Renoir's work.

"Low and behold, it was in volume one," she said.

An image of the painting was published in black and white, and the gallery's stock number matched the flea market find. So Craner made

a digital image of the flea market painting, converted it to black and white for a closer look, and the brush strokes also matched, she said.

"It's not a painting you would fake," Craner said. "If you're going to fake something, you'd fake something easier."

Painting No. 24349 turns out to be Renoir's painting "Paysage Bords de Seine," which translates to Banks of the River Seine, Craner determined. It dates to about 1879 and measures 6 inches by 10 inches.

The painting is set for auction Sept. 29.

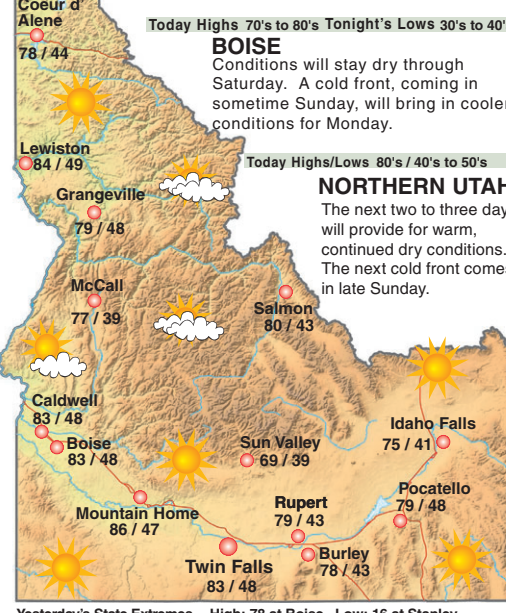

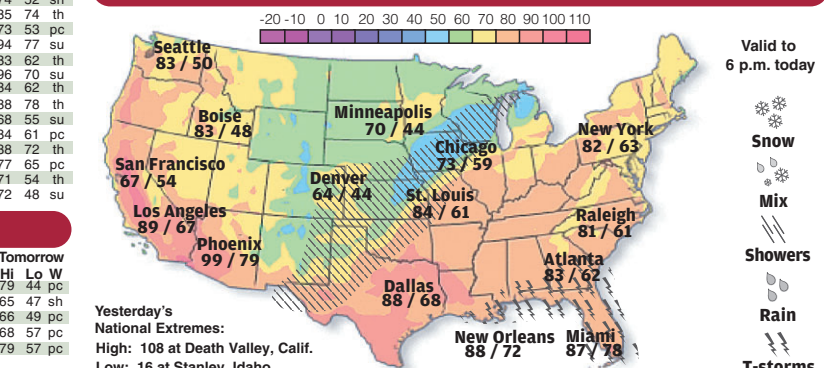

Mohawk Named World's Tallest

NEW YORK (AP) • Guinness World Records is calling it the tallest mohawk in the world. A fashion designer from Tokyo showed off his 3-foot-8.6-inch hairdo in a New York City park on Wednesday.

Forty-year-old Kazuhiro Watanabe said he's been growing the hair for 15 years. He said to make it stand up-right it takes stylists two hours, one can of gel and three cans of hairspray. He said he wanted to grow the mohawk to rebel against the conformity of Japanese society.

Watanabe has held the title since January 2011. His appearance in Washington Square Park was to promote the newest version of the Guinness World Records book, which for the first time includes him.

JUDGE STRIKES DOWN 'INDEFINITE DETENTION' LAW

NEW YORK (AP) • An anti-terrorism law was struck down Wednesday by a federal judge who said she saw legitimate fears in claims by journalists, scholars and political activists that they could face indefinite detention for exercising First Amendment rights.

U.S. District Judge Katherine Forrest in Manhattan said the government has softened its position toward those who filed suit challenging the law, but she said the "shifting view" could not erase the threat of indefinite military detention. She urged Congress to make the law more specific or consider whether it is needed at all.

"First Amendment rights are guaranteed by the Constitution and cannot be legislated away," Forrest wrote. "This Court rejects the Government's suggestion that American citizens can be placed in military detention indefinitely, for acts they could not predict might subject them to detention."

In May, the judge temporarily struck down the law subjecting to indefinite detention anyone who "substantially" or "directly" provides "support" to forces such as al-Qaida or the Taliban. She heard additional arguments last month before issuing the final ruling, likely to be appealed to the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

While calling the law "unconstitutionally overbroad," Forrest said the government can use another law to indefinitely detain people connected to the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks or others picked up on the field of battle. She said the government at some point without additional congressional authorization began interpreting its detention authority more broadly.

"In short, the Court can find no authority in domestic law or the law of war, nor can the government point to any, to justify the concept of 'support' as a valid ground for detention," Forrest wrote.

The judge said the government struggled to explain what the statute means and what and whose activities it was written to cover.

"That is no small question bandied about amongst lawyers and a judge steeped in arcane questions of constitutional law; it is a question of defining an individual's core liberties," she said.

She questioned in her 112-page opinion whether a news article perceived as favorable to the Taliban and garnering support for the Taliban could be considered to have "substantially supported" the Taliban?

"How about a YouTube video? Where is the line between what the government would consider 'journalistic reporting' and 'propaganda'?" she asked. "Who will make such determinations? Will there be an office established to read articles, watch videos, and evaluate speeches in order to make judgments along a spectrum of where the support is 'modest' or 'substantial'?"

Ellen Davis, a U.S. Attorney's office spokeswoman, said the government had no comment.

On Top of the World

A Ketchum woman plans to make her fifth climb on Mount Everest.

KETCHUM • Melissa Arnot of Ketchum reached the top of Mount Everest for the fourth time in May — the most summits of that mountain by any woman in history.

Instead of relaxing, the 29-year-old professional guide is headed back to Nepal in a few days to lead clients on a trek. She's also planning her fifth Everest expedition next spring for Rainier Mountaineering Inc., her employer since 2004.

Setting the record for Everest summits by a woman didn't come without some sobering moments. Just as Arnot's team was advancing to the first camp, a Sherpa from another group fell from a ladder spanning a crevasse on the Khumbu Icefall, considered the most dangerous section of Everest's South Col route. Arnot's RMI team assisted in the rescue, but couldn't prevent the man from dying.

"That was the first in a string of deaths from unrelated accidents on

the mountain this year," she said. "It's definitely in your face and reminds you that what you're doing has real consequences."

Arnot hasn't been seriously injured during her climbing career, which began shortly after she finished college while joining a friend on a climb in Glacier National Park. Arnot said she knew nothing about climbing at that point, but was immediately hooked.

She broke her leg in 2009 on the trek into Everest base camp, although she recovered and summited later that year. Arnot also has been pulled into crevasses, fallen on rock, and been smacked by falling ice.

"All without major injury," she said. "I have been exceedingly lucky."

Linden Mallory is a Rainier Mountaineering guide who has climbed with Arnot on Mount Rainier and Mount Everest. She says her colleague's strengths are as well rounded as they are impressive.

"Melissa is a dedicated and

Check out a waterfall, soak in a hot pool, go leaf peeping ... it's all out your back door.

Here are a few ideas:

The House That Rock Built

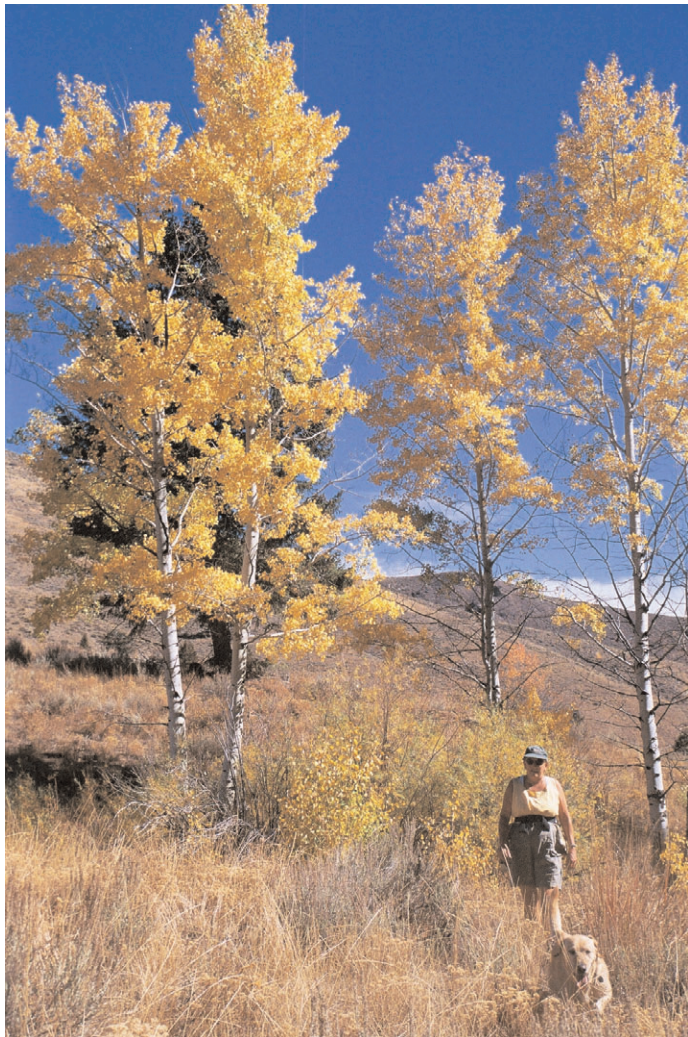
There are no baguette carts or espresso bars in the City of Rocks — no one lives here save for some sand lizards, mule deer, porcupine and bobcats.

But thousands of rock jocks from all over the world flock to the City of Rocks each year to walk winding corridors below twisted spires of granite that rise like skyscrapers 60-some stories above a vast high curving plain.

"It seems as if Idaho is known for three things: its spuds, Sun Valley and the City of Rocks," says climber Susan Bernatas.

The City, 15 miles southeast of Oakley, has captured man's imagination ever since it became a landmark for a quarter million pioneers traveling the California Trail between 1840 and 1860.

And, even if you don't relish a climb up routes like "Baked Beans from Hell" and "Bloody Fingers Walls," you can have a fun time choosing climbers. You can also choose from several day hikes, including the 2.5 mile Tea Kettle Trail, the 5-mile North Fork Circle Creek Trail and the .5-mile Flaming Rock Trail.

yellow, golden and even orange in the mountains around Sun Valley.

A good fall foliage loop starts at the Hemingway Memorial on Trail Road just past the Sun Valley Club.

Monte Bruhn of Buhl never served his country in the military, but he's found a way to serve those who have.

His way of doing so has become something of a tradition since 2010 when he and his wife, Diane, founded Idaho "N" Heroes Outdoors Inc., formerly the Doug Bridges Memorial Hunts.

The nonprofit group, part of the national The Link-up, every year takes wounded veterans into Idaho's backcoun-

try to hunt or fish. Some of the veterans come from out of state, others from just around the corner.

Quality Deer Hunting in South Hills; Other Units Are Overlooked

Archery season is under way in Idaho, and one of the more populated places for hunters is the South Hills.

"It's close to home for a lot of hunters," said Randy Smith, big game manager for Idaho Department of Fish and Game. He said the hills see about 600 hunters annually during the hunt, with some big bucks harvested.

"It's by far our highest-density bowhunting area,"

Smith said. "We don't manage it as a trophy unit but as a quality unit. So in terms of mature bucks it's certainly better than most of our general seasons. There are a lot of good trophy mule deer taken down there, occasionally a whopper."

Don't miss: But because the hills are so populated with said hunters, he said, other units are overlooked. A couple you might consider: Units 47 in the Jarbridge

foothills and 57 near Black Pine.

"If you're looking for a place to bowhunt that doesn't have much pressure, you might look at these units," Smith said.

Coming up: For bird hunters, remember that upland game season begins Saturday. Smith anticipates a good one.

"Bird numbers this year should be some of the best in a decade."

versatile climber with an accomplished resume in rock, ice, alpine and high altitude climbing," Mallory said. "As a guide, her climbing skills are complemented by her excitement and energy for the mountains.

"She understands the challenges, hardships and rewards of the mountains and Melissa inspires those she climbs with with her passion for them."

Mount Everest is the world's highest peak at 29,035 feet. However, Arnot acknowledges it isn't the most difficult to climb. That distinction usually goes to K2 in Pakistan, a 28,253-foot peak with a lower success rate and higher mortality percentage than Everest.

Still, the sport's dangerous nature is something every climber has to reconcile no matter where the climb occurs.

"When you are in your living room, or training in the gym, it is easy to say that death is something we accept," Arnot said. "When it is in your face, that is a much harder thing to come to terms with."

"In 2010 my partner was killed in Nepal while we were climbing together. He left behind a family and there is no satisfaction or thrill that can compensate for a loss like that. I feel like it isn't a give-and-take or a balance of thrill to risk. It is something you accept or something you don't."

Arnot was married in July to the director of a nonprofit organization in Ketchum. She said he provides stability "in my crazy chaotic life," but also makes it difficult to leave home for extended periods.

She's often asked how she finds inspiration to return again and again to the Himalayas. Arnot uses motivation outside of her own goals, she said, such as helping clients fulfill their dreams — and doing it safely.

"It would be arrogant and foolish of me to say that I can protect clients from all the hazards that are there," Arnot said. "But I at least try to be aware of them and make very conservative decisions — much more conservative than I would on my own climbing."

Making so many trips to Nepal has given Arnot a special feeling for the country's culture and the welfare of Sherpas who risk their lives making a living from assisting foreign climbers. This year, she's starting a fund to serve as supplementary life insurance for Sherpas hired to work on peaks such as Everest. It will guarantee their families financial help for five years after an accident resulting in death while the Sherpa was working.

Arnot, who works as a remote site medic when not guiding, plans to keep guiding as long as she can.

"I know there are limitations to what my body, and my husband, will endure,"

she said. "I hope to continue to be able to give back to the local people in the places I have been lucky enough to work over the years.

"I hope in 30 years I am still in the mountains, showing people that mountaineering is a life-long sport and the joy knows no age,

gender or past experience. Every day I get to see the sunrise from high on the side of a mountain is a day I can know I really lived!"

pass the cabin and continue following the trail past the Proctor Mountain turnoff. The trail will take you through woods that were scorched in a fire about five years ago before turning towards the east through aspen up Corral Creek Canyon.

The trail ends at the old corrals that gave the canyon its name. On your return trip, you can head out to Trail Creek Road for a half-mile to get some additional color. Once you cross Trail Creek, head back to your car on the dirt trail that follows the creek.

The entire hike is about seven miles.

Soaking It All In

The Trinity Ridge Fire and Halstead Fires have blocked access this summer to some of the best geothermal gems that south-central Idaho has to offer.

But you can find plenty of good fall soaking at Frenchman's Bend Hot Springs on Warm Springs Road near Ketchum.

The hot springs sits near the site of what was once a way station for ore wagons on their ways to mines in Atlanta. The site also included a hotel and brothel from the rough and tumble days when miners worked three mines in the nearby hills.

The pool itself features rock walled pools with gravel and sand bottoms. Bathing is not allowed after sunset.

"The road is a bit bumpy, but we've had some great wildlife viewings," says occasional user Mike White.

The hot springs is located at a left-hand turn in the road eight miles past the Warm Springs ski lifts.

Give the Devil His Due

The 25-foot canyon wall at Malad Gorge State Park sports a dramatic series of waterfalls that crash down stairstep falls on their way to the Snake River.

The Malad River below has been called the world's shortest river. Only about two miles long, it springs out of the underground aquifer of the Snake River Plain before flowing into the Snake.

Be sure to take the easy two-mile trail with the steel foot bridge that spans the canyon. You'll be rewarded with the sight of a 60-foot waterfall dropping into Devil's Washbowl Basin.

The park is located off exit 147 off Interstate 84, five miles east of Bliss at the Tuttle exit.

There is a picnic area and interpretative shelter at the park entrance.

Entrance fee is \$4 per car. The park is day use only.

Biking the Skull Trail

As temperatures moderate, the mountain biking on the Indian Spring trails south of Kimberly get more appeal-

ing. From the Indian Springs parking lot you can take the short uphill trail known as Skull Trail to Sweet 'n Low.

Follow it east to Dry Gulch, an easy dirt trail with a mix of single and double track.

To get there follow Kimberly's Main Street south and continue to follow it as it turns into 3500 East Road. About eight miles out cross 2900 North Road onto a dirt road called Indian Spring Road. Follow this for a quarter mile until you reach a parking lot on your left.

Up north, you'll find some good fall riding at Greenhorn Gulch where the creeks are as low as anyone can remember them being in the last 10 years.

Greenhorn Gulch is located about seven miles north of Hailey. Turn left onto Greenhorn Road and follow it 3.5 miles to the trailhead. A nice ride for this time of year is the 11-mile Mahoney-Greenhorn Loop, which follows Mahoney and Greenhorn creeks and features quite a bit of shade.

The ride is most suitable for intermediate and advanced riders as it does gain 2,200 feet in elevation.

Watching the Migration

We most often think of bird-watching in spring. But Thousand Springs Preserve offers some nice opportunities to see migratory waterfowl congregating along the north side of the Snake River where the spring water flows into the river.

As many as a quarter-million mallards, pintail ducks, wood ducks, mergansers and other waterfowl winter at the preserve, taking advantage of the constant 58-de-

gree temperature of the water bubbling out of the ground. As fall progresses, golden and bald eagles, goshawk and other raptors begin arriving.

And you get the added benefit of hillsides thronged with yellow and red-colored sumac, yellow birch trees, orange gooseberry leaves and the brilliant red of poison ivy — a vivid contrast to the Kelly green Veronica and watercress lining the springs.

"Fall's my favorite time of year on the preserve," says Mike O'Brien, who managed

the preserve for many years. "The crowds are gone. The currant bushes are turning orange and yellow. And the Virginia Creeper's turning bright red. It may not be as spectacular as New England, but it's pretty in its own right!"

The plan is available for public review and comment on the Fish and Game website. The document describes how Fish and Game proposes to manage public fisheries statewide and in individual river drainages over the next six years. Whether it is native cutthroat trout, white sturgeon, salmon, steelhead, bass or hatchery trout, the plan lays out how Fish and Game would protect, conserve and provide continued supplies of fish and manage fishing.

It also includes results of the 2011 angler opinion survey, which helps Fish and Game prioritize and develop management programs with consideration for angler

preferences.

The document is available for review in two parts. Part 1 is Fish and Game's statewide direction describing fisheries management philosophy, challenges, and statewide fisheries programs. Part 2 describes specific fishery management programs on an individual river basis.

Fish and Game welcomes comments submitted via the website or through the mail. Review copies of the draft plan are available at all Fish and Game regional offices and the Bureau of Fisheries at the headquarters office in Boise.

Just a State Away, Stunning Scenes in Utah

TORREY, Utah • About eight hours away from Twin Falls, a wonderland of natural sights sprawls across southern Utah.

Many of these are quite famous, of course — even if you haven't been to Arches or Zion, odds are good you have an idea of what they look like.

Less known is Capitol Reef National Park, a skinny park along Utah Highway 24 shaped around a monocline — described as a geologic “wrinkle” in the earth.

Early pioneers with nautical backgrounds dubbed such obstacles “reefs,” according to National Park staff. Today, visitors don't have to worry about crossing the nearly 100-mile ridges; a scenic drive runs south through the park, granting spectacular views of colored rock that was once hidden underground.

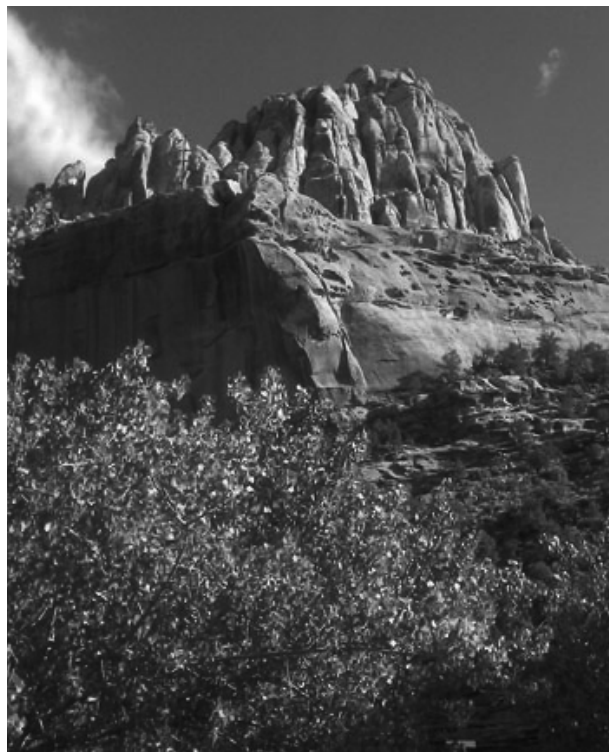
From Capitol Reef, Utah Highway 12 leads southwest through the striking scenery

of Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument. The drive to Bryce takes about two hours if done all at once, but you'll want to stop to take in both the monument and three Utah state parks, including one that holds a set of Anasazi ruins.

More famous than Capitol Reef, Bryce Canyon National Park is actually the smaller of the two. But what you can see there inspires no less awe. Pitch your tent in one of two large campgrounds and plan a hike down into the canyon itself, where you can stroll among the hoodoos — spires of rock left standing by the gradual erosion of their neighbors.

Carbon Is in Earth, Space and Us

By weight, Earth's most abundant element is iron, comprising nearly a third of the planet. Billions of years ago, when Earth was molten, most of the heavy iron sunk to the planet's interior, leaving oxygen (the second most common element, bound to other elements as minerals) to dominate the crust.

Carbon is 15th on the list of planetary ingredients. Carbon atoms absorb blue light, but are transparent to red, which becomes apparent when forests burn, their carbon becomes airborne as soot, and the sun takes on sunset colors at midday.

Carbon stars, seen in a telescope, resemble distant, glowing embers, partly because carbon, forged in their cores, escapes their surfaces, enveloping them in a cloud of soot.

Venus (currently blazing in the east before dawn), demonstrates carbon's power as a one-way valve for solar energy: Venus's dense, carbon dioxide atmosphere lets sunlight in, but absorbs outgoing heat, producing the hottest planetary surface in the solar system, approaching 900° F. While Earth would be an ice world without carbon's heat-trapping properties, our planetary neighbor serves as an extreme example of what can happen when a planet has too much of a good thing in its atmosphere.

On Sept. 28, 1969, celestial carbon came to Earth in a meteorite that fell near Murchison, Australia. Like fewer than one in 20 meteorites, Murchison is a car-

bonaceous (C) chondrite, containing a relatively large fraction of carbon (and 12 percent water to boot). Having avoided significant heating since their formation, they represent relatively pristine samples of the early solar system. Surprisingly, C chondrites contain amino acids, the molecular constituents of proteins.

It may well be that the earliest terrestrial life owed its existence to a gift of necessary organic building blocks, delivered by C chondrite bombardment.

Dove Calling

Texas man gets a kick building his own mechanical dove decoy.

DALLAS • Charles “Chip” Stewart finally understands why some duck hunters sit in their workshops during the spring and summer, painstakingly carving and painting their own decoys, restlessly turning calendar pages and longing for the start of duck season.

Stewart built his own spinning wing dove decoy and used it successfully on opening weekend. It’s a way to stay plugged into his favorite form of hunting.

He’s an old-school dove hunter who grew up in Richardson, Texas, where he still lives, and learned about hunting from his dad, John Stewart, whom he still hunts with. Now he’s teaching his 12-year-old daughter, Zoe.

“I always thought that I would never use a dove decoy,” said Stewart, an electrical engineer. “Then I got the idea of making my own spinning wing decoy. It was actually pretty simple.”

Battery-powered spinning wing dove decoys are literal spinoffs of spinning wing duck decoys. They were popularized by Louisiana-based Mojo Outdoors.

The first time I saw a spinning wing dove decoy, I thought it was a joke. My host set it up in front of me in the field, then he and three or four other hunters took their positions and we all loaded up. They were shooting 12-gauge shotguns and I felt undergunned with my little .410.

There weren’t many doves flying that day, but the ones that came over were attracted by the Mojo motion. It comes with a metal stake to position it about two feet above ground level, as if the realistic-looking plastic dove were landing.

I wound up with the only limit that morning, not because I’m a great shot but because the decoy pulled birds close enough that

they were pretty easy to shoot, even with a .410.

On my way home, I stopped at the first sporting goods store I saw and bought my own spinning wing dove decoy. The Mojo remained basically unchanged until this year. The company has a new Voodoo Mojo that’s slightly larger, has a more realistic body posture and has wings held in place magnetically. It costs \$50, about \$10 more than the original.

Some days, the spinning wing decoy works like magic. Other days, it doesn’t seem to work so well at all. I’m not particularly “handy,” and it would never occur to me to make a decoy. Stewart’s an engineer, though. It seemed easy to him.

“I bought some clip-on stationary soft plastic dove decoys (a four pack sells for about \$15), split one down the back and inserted a battery-powered electric motor that I’d saved from one of my son’s toy cars,” he said. “I used my jigsaw to cut the wings out of thin wood and painted them the appropriate colors. Then I added an external on-off switch and it was ready to go.”

Stewart used a half-inch PVC pipe to construct his own “decoy tree” that elevates multiple decoys where they’re more visible to passing birds. You can pay \$70 for a commercial version of the same thing, but it didn’t cost Stewart nearly as much to make his own.

He rigged it with two perching decoys and one spinner. It made the shots closer and easier for Zoe. Stewart is already planning improvements. He’s thinking of ways to rev up his decoy motor to make the wings spin faster. He also regrets not building the decoy body out of wood.

“This would be a great project for Scouts,” Stewart said. His son, John, is a Cub Scout. “A spinning wing decoy has everything that appeals to kids — motors, wood carving and motion.”

Sweet September Mornings

Early goose hunt ushers in autumn.

PLEASANT PRAIRIE, Wis. • September came in like a celebrity, spotlighted by a waning blue moon.

The silvery light spread across the landscape and aided our predawn hike across the tilled sweet cornfield.

If mad dogs and Englishmen are found in the midday sun, retrievers and obsessed Wisconsin waterfowlers come out at o-dark-thirty on Sept. 1.

“Well, what do you say we start another season?” said Richie Santiago, 32, of Kenosha.

Santiago got a tail-thumping “yes” from Banks, his 2-year-old chocolate Labrador retriever.

And the presence of the rest of the group — Blake Lawrence, 25, of Cudahy and Jake Riedel, 25, of Black River Falls and me — said more than words.

September ushers in the

first two hunting seasons of the year in Wisconsin — the early Canada goose season and the mourning dove season.

For waterfowlers, the early season not only opens the year, it provides a liberal hunting opportunity on a large population of resident birds and the chance to help control the population of a species that is considered a nuisance in many Wisconsin communities.

“That’ll do it,” Lawrence said, making a final adjustment to a spread of four dozen life-size Canada goose decoys.

Banks sniffed and circled the stiff figures. The field, cut and tilled about a week before, was dry and soft. Sections of green stalks and a few ears of sweet corn poked out at odd angles from the furrows.

The nearly full moon was still high in the western sky when the first blush of dawn touched the eastern horizon.

About 5:30 a.m., we set-

ting in layout blinds along a grassy strip on the eastern edge of the field and listened for goose music. A moderate northeast wind blew over our heads.

A freight train rumbled past about 6. As the rattle and horn faded, a faint “heeh-onk” filtered through the air.

All five of us heard it. Santiago told Banks to get down; he obediently plopped at the back of Santiago’s blind.

The Wisconsin goose management plan has included the early September hunt since 1990. The season, held statewide with a daily bag limit of five birds, targets the resident population of giant Canada geese.

The population goal in Wisconsin is a breeding population of Canada geese near 125,000. This spring the Department of Natural Resources estimated the Wisconsin breeding population at 145,386.

The first goose note was followed by a chorus and eventually a flock of 10 birds circled to our southwest. They dropped in altitude,

looking carefully at our field, but veered away at 100 yards.

Geese love to eat sweet corn and will damage the crop before it’s harvested. The farmer on this property had some equipment to scare the geese away in August.

The efforts were only partly successful. Santiago had secured permission for us to hunt on the property.

Although the harvest was complete, the farmer appreciated our efforts to reduce the local goose population.

A second flock entered our airspace about 6:30. It circled twice, but despite some enthusiastic calling and flagging by our group, the birds turned west to another field.

The temperature was warm enough to cause us to sweat in our blinds, an occasional mosquito buzzed over our heads and we were rejected by the first two flocks of the season. Still we laid back and talked about how good it felt to be in September.

Jay Leonard McBride

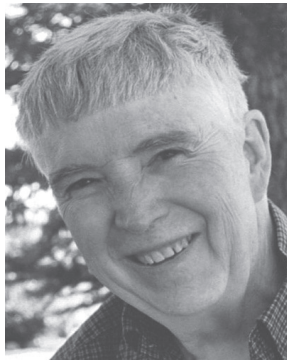

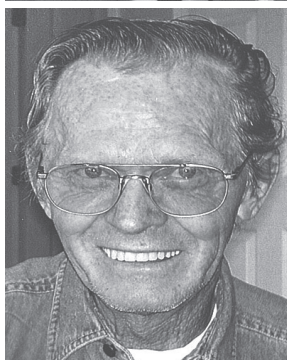

TWIN FALLS • This weekend marks the last real test before opening conference play.

The first hurdle figures to be a whopper.

After Loss to ULM, Arkansas Tries to Beat 'Bama

The Southeastern Conference's first huge game of the season was spoiled by Louisiana-Monroe.

Instead of a top-10 matchup in Fayetteville, Ark., on Saturday, No. 1 Alabama comes to town to face an unranked Arkansas team that's still shaking off a monster upset and unsure whether star quarterback Tyler Wilson can play.

Wilson sustained a head injury in the 34-31 loss to the Warhawks, a setback that has Razorbacks fans wondering if their team's once-promising season is already shot.

If Wilson can play — coach John L. Smith said Wednesday he was more optimistic than the day before, but "I'm keeping fingers crossed as well" — it should give the Razorbacks at least a puncher's chance against the Tide.

If not? Brandon Mitchell could move back to quarterback after switching to receiver this season — to face Alabama. Not ideal.

Arkansas lost 38-14 at Alabama last season with Wilson. Home-field advantage might not be enough to compensate.

No. 2 Southern California also faces a potentially tough road test at No. 21 Stanford. The Cardinal have won three straight against the Trojans, remarkable considering the relatively one-sided history of the rivalry.

USC leads the series 59-28-3 and Stanford has never won more than three straight.

The last two meetings have produced wild games. Andrew Luck and the Cardinal beat Matt Barkley and USC 37-35 in 2010 and 56-48 in triple overtime last year.

Barkley is 0-3 as a starter against Stanford.

"It's just another game," Barkley told the Press-Telegram of Long Beach (Calif.) earlier this week. "It's the next game. It's Week 3. We're going up north for an away game. Nothing special about it."

Green Bay, which dropped from the top spot to No. 5 in the AP Pro32 power rankings, wants no part of falling two games behind the Bears (No. 8, AP Pro32) so early in the schedule. The Packers, 6-point favorites in this one, don't get another shot at the Bears until Dec. 16.

Chicago showed plenty of balance in its opener, and the Jay Cutler to Brandon Marshall combination was superb: Marshall had 119 yards on nine receptions and scored a touchdown, while Cutler passed for 333 yards.

These symptoms are not just warning signs of cancer. They could also indicate a polyp that needs removal, or a sexually transmitted disease.

On Sept. 13, 1997, funeral services were held in Calcutta, India, for Nobel peace laureate Mother Teresa.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1759, during the final French and Indian War, the British defeated the French on the Plains of Abraham overlooking Quebec City.

In 1788, the Congress of the Confederation authorized the first national election, and declared New York City the temporary national capital.

In 1803, Commodore John Barry, considered by many the father of the American Navy, died in Philadelphia.

In 1912, a state funeral was held in Japan for Emperor Meiji.

In 1948, Republican Margaret Chase Smith of Maine was elected to the U.S. Senate; she became the first woman to serve in both houses of Congress.

In 1959, Elvis Presley first met his future wife, 14-year-old Priscilla Beaulieu, while stationed in West Germany with the U.S. Army. (They married in 1967, but divorced in 1973.)

In 1962, Mississippi Gov. Ross Barnett rejected the U.S. Supreme Court's order for the University of Mississippi to admit James Meredith, a black student, declaring in a televised address, "We will not drink from the cup of genocide."

In 1970, the first New York City Marathon was held; winner Gary Muhrcrke finished the 26.2-mile run, which took place entirely inside Central Park, in 2:31:38.

In 1971, a four-day inmates' rebellion at the Attica Correctional Facility in western New York ended as police and guards stormed the prison; the ordeal and final assault claimed the lives of 32 inmates and 11 employees.

In 1989, Fay Vincent was elected commissioner of Major League Baseball, succeeding the late A. Bartlett Giamatti.

In 1993, at the White House, Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and PLO chairman Yasser Arafat shook hands after signing an accord granting limited Palestinian autonomy.

In 1996, rapper Tupac Shakur died at a Las Vegas hospital six days after he was wounded in a drive-by shooting; he was 25.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush said it was "highly doubtful" that Saddam Hussein would comply with demands that he disarm and avoid a confrontation with the world community. And Bush mocked Democrats and other lawmakers who wanted U.N. action before a congressional vote on confronting Saddam.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush, addressing the nation, rejected calls to end the war in Iraq, but said he wanted gradual U.S. troop withdrawals from the country. Abdul-Sattar Abu Risha, the most prominent figure in a U.S.-backed revolt of Sunni sheiks against al-Qaida in Iraq, was killed by a bomb planted near his home in Anbar province. The NFL fined New England Patriots coach Bill Belichick \$500,000 and the team \$250,000 for spying on the New York Jets during a game.

One year ago: Teams of insurgents firing rocket-propelled grenades and automatic weapons struck at the U.S. Embassy, NATO headquarters and other buildings in the heart of Afghanistan's capital, Kabul. In New York City, Republican political novice Bob Turner scored an upset victory over Democratic state Assemblyman David Weprin in a special election to fill the House seat vacated by Democratic Rep. Anthony Weiner. Leila Lopes of Angola was crowned Miss Universe at the pageant in Sao Paulo.
