Few people living today likely carry memories of the Great Fire of 1910. But Byrne attained a milestone this week when she turned 110 years old on Wednesday.

She'll celebrate the milestone with an open house Saturday after-

noon at Evergreen Place Assisted Living in Buhl, where she's lived for the past year. But she's marking it in other ways as well, including joining a national study of such "supercentenarians."



The Boston University School of Medicine New England Supercentenarian Study is claimed to be the largest recruitment of people 110 and older ever done.

According to the study's website, there are probably between 70 and

140 supercentenarians in the country. The study has recruited 60 so far between the ages of 110 and 119.

# Grouse Group Completes Milestone

JEROME • When Idaho's sage grouse populations began falling, state wildlife experts saw a need for change.

However, finding the best data and meeting with the right experts takes time. For one group, identifying the best conservation efforts took close to five years.

After spending years drafting a grouse conservation plan, the North Magic Valley Local Working Group is now ready to take action.

Local working groups are volunteer operations created across southern Idaho that bring land users and local residents together with government biologists to find ways to improve grouse populations.

Completing a conservation plan allows working group members to tackle more projects instead of rewriting parts of a draft, said Regan Berkley, a regional biologist with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game who helps lead the group.

The plan is being released in a time where wildlife experts have only a short deadline to improve sage grouse populations. In 2010, federal officials declared that the sage grouse

### Bliss Seeks to **Build New EMS** Unit amid Dispute

**BLISS** • The Bliss Quick Response Unit – which provides initial medical aid for emergency patients in and near Bliss - has been shut down by the city that holds its license.

That poses a serious safety threat to residents, QRU members say, possibly adding a half-hour or more to the time it takes help to arrive.

But Mayor Chris Pruett says the city had no choice because QRU members have not acquired worker's compensation insurance to cover themselves.

"We asked them to get insurance and the city offered to pay," Pruett said. "All they had to do was shop and we'd pay the check. It's frustrating."

# Will Muggers Get New Life?

A foreclosure sale puts a vacant Old Towne restaurant building back on the market.

TWIN FALLS • Those who turned an Old Towne flour warehouse into a trendy brewpub in the 1990s were pioneers, leading the way in private investment to redevelop the historical district's industrial structures.

But that transformation was costly. Since 1996, three restaurants came and went in the Muggers Brewpub building, unable to consistently draw enough business to sustain its high costs. Vacancies followed each departure, as Twin Falls restaurateurs went elsewhere for more affordable real

Now, a foreclosure and a sheriff's sale have put the building back on the

market — at a price that's attracting

interest. Once listed at \$1.1 million and later sold for close to \$650,000, the brewpub on June 6 was sold at public auction to creditor Bank of the West for \$366,000.

"We recognize that the building at 516 Hansen St. S. in Twin Falls is a unique location, and we are in the process of seeking a buyer for the property," Jim Cole, spokesman for the California-based bank, said Wednesday.

The 1990s restoration left some brick walls exposed and employed a good deal of dark wood, for a classy but comfortable pub setting. Sun Valley's Scott Featherstone of Trail Creek Brewing Co. operated the second microbrewery there before leasing the space to Pandora's Restaurant. The doors have been closed since Pandora's exited in September 2010.



#### Fed Steps In, and Stocks Soar: Dow Climbs 206

**NEW YORK (AP)** • The stock market staged a huge rally Thursday after investors got the aggressive economic help they wanted from the Federal Reserve.

The Dow Jones industrial average spiked more than 200 points and cleared 13,500 for the first time since the beginning of the Great Recession. The average is within 625 points of its all-time high.

The Fed said it would spend \$40 billion a month, for as long as it takes, to stimulate the economy by buying mortgage securities — and perhaps buy more if the job market doesn't improve.

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# Wendell Library to Reopen Tuesday

WENDELL • Just a day after accepting a job offer to direct Wendell's public library, Christine Hernandez faced a tough audience during her first library board meeting this week despite confirming the Sherburn Smith Memorial Library will reopen Tues-

Hernandez, 51, of Twin Falls told the small crowd she has a master's degree in business administration, library experience and a willingness to work 30 hours a week at a yearly salary of about \$18,000.

Although Idaho law doesn't require the person running a city library to have studied library science or have a degree, some in the audience were surprised that wasn't a requirement for filling the job.

"You're not going to find a fully qualified person at \$18,000 a year," noted Bonnie Marshall, of the Gooding public accounting firm Jones, France, Basterrechea and Brush, contracted to provide professional services to the city.

Board Chairwoman Stephanie Green said Hernandez was a "great choice," and her administration and grant writing experience were taken into consideration.

The library closed this summer because of personnel loss and disintegration of the library board and Hernandez will spend her first week preparing for next

week's opening. For now, the facility will be open from noon to 5 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays and 1-5 p.m. Saturdays. The schedule will be reevaluat ed, with evening hours considered during the board's October meeting.

In addition to continuing to clean the facility, Hernandez plans to take inventory of the library's equipment and hire a part-time staff member. Prior to closing, the library had parttime employees but they will need to re-apply for the job.

Hernandez said she will consider past employees but has the right to make the final decision.

With the library's fiscal year coming to a close and funding tight, the board decided the additional staff member could be hired next

"I only get one part timer," Hernandez said. "I have to make sure and hire someone I can work with. I will be meeting with all of the past volunteers

and staff next week to begin the process."

Marshall addressed the board about budgeting and spending with a lingering \$45,000 deficit to consider. After years of fiscal mismanagement the city uncovered a \$750,000 deficit in 2010, with spending overruns in every department.

Although the new board and staff wasn't responsible for the deficit, they will play an instrumental part in essentially paying off the

Marshall pointed out that any fundraising dollars brought in or money left in the budget for the fiscal year will have to be surrendered to the city's general

The library operates on about \$55,000 a year.

In a police report, officers state Dameniel Preston Owens, 31, went to Costco at 731 Pole Line Road in Twin Falls six times between April 13 and April 24 and wrote a total of \$721.31 in returned checks.

"It should be noted that cashiers checked Owens' identification at the time of each transaction," the report states.

# Environmentalists Sue over Idaho Logging Project

**BOISE** • Two environmental groups are suing the U.S. Forest Service over a planned logging project in northcentral Idaho because they contend the logging will vi-Endangered olate the Species Act.

Alliance for the Wild Rockies and Friends of the Clearwater filed the lawsuit against the Forest Service, agency officials and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Idaho's U.S. District Court earlier this week. The groups say the government's decision to allow logging on about 4 square miles of the Nez Perce National Forest was arbitrary and capricious and that the work will threaten some endangered species by destroying habitat for animals including Canada lynx, northern goshawks and bull trout.

The Little Slate Project includes just under 2 square miles of clear-cutting, according to the lawsuit. It's planned for the Salmon River Ranger District of the Nez Perce National Forest. The project will also implement prescribed burns on 515 acres and other work.

The environmental group contends it will adversely affect the Little Slate Creek watershed and the Allison Creek and Kelly Creek watersheds, both of which are tributaries to the Salmon River.

The Forest Service has said the work would yield timber products, reduce wildfire fuels, help restore watersheds and manage roads.

The Fish and Wildlife Service has declared Canada lynx to be no longer present in the Nez Perce National Forest, according to the lawsuit. But the environmental groups maintain that the species was historically present in the region, and that Forest Service workers reported sighting a Canada lynx in July 2006 and November of 2010. The groups claim the federal agencies didn't take those sightings under consideration when approving the logging plan.

# SW Idaho Attorney Stands Trial on Battery Charge

BOISE (AP) • An attorney accused of assaulting a woman at his Nampa law office is facing trial this week on a charge of battery with intent to commit a felony.

Prosecutors say 50year-old John Prior tried to have sex with a woman who rebuffed his advances during a May 2011 incident. But Prior's attorney has said the encounter was consensual, and that the woman's story has changed at times.

A grand jury indicted Prior earlier this year and since he practices as a Canyon County defense attorney, the Idaho Attorney General's Office is prosecuting the case.

The alleged victim, a 20-year-old woman, testified Prior offered her money, employment and assistance in a legal case is she would have sex with him. She testified that Prior forced himself on her when she refused.

### Coeur d'Alene Man Recovers Distinctive Truck after Theft

Police Sgt. Christie Wood says they are questioning the man, but do not believe he was the thief.

September 2011, Featherstone and Trail Creek were in default for failure to plead or otherwise defend in the case, and Featherstone did not return calls from the Times-News this week. A November 2011 foreclosure judgment ordered the property sold to satisfy the debt and other fees - which by early June totaled \$440,287, court records say.

On June 6, Twin Falls County Sheriff Tom Carter sold the property at public auction. Bank of the West's high bid left more than \$74,000 of the judgment unsatisfied.

What price will Bank of the West put on this distinctive piece of Twin Falls' historical district? The bank isn't saying.

Potential buyers were unwilling to speak on the record this week. But the prospect of a price lowered by foreclosure has some in the restaurant industry talk-

"I've heard varying interest in it. I understand there are qualified buyers who are interested in purchasing. And I think it bodes well for downtown," said Lynn Sheehan, executive chef at the nearby Cucina Gemelli.

Any deal now would have to take into account a rightof-redemption period that doesn't expire until early December.

Because this was a judicial foreclosure, Idaho law provides for a right of redemption – by previous owners or junior lien holders - for six months from the sale date, said Kelly Greene McConnell of Boise, attorney for plaintiff Bank of the West. After that point, the sheriff's office will be authorized to issue a deed to the bank, she said.

Has there been activity by anyone intending to redeem the property?

"I haven't received any notification that there has been," McConnell said.

Neither has Carter's office, sheriff's spokeswoman Lori Stewart said.

2009: Though Pandora's is still operating, Featherstone puts the Old Towne building up for sale for about \$665,000.

February 2010: After ceasing brewery operations in 2009, Trail Creek Brewing sells and ships out the last of its microbrewery equipment.

September 2010: Pandora's closes its doors. "The economy has been down and times are tough, and we're about 30 days late on our rent," Kurt Handley says, "so the landlord (Featherstone) has asked us to leave."

March 2011: Business lender Bank of the West files its civil case against Featherstone, Trail Creek Brewing and associated businesses, leading to a November foreclosure judgment and a June 2012 public auction. At \$366,000, the bank is the highest bidder.

# 4 dead, 8 Injured after Car Hits Bus Stop in Las Vegas

LAS VEGAS • A motorist faces four counts of driving under the influence after his speeding car went airborne Thursday and plowed into a Las Vegas bus stop, killing four pedestrians and injuring eight others.

All the victims appeared to be adults, and the four people killed were apparently pedestrians waiting at the bus stop, according to Las Vegas police officer Laura Meltzer.

"It's a pretty horrific scene out here," she said.


The driver, who police say will be booked into jail when he gets out of the hospital, was with three other passengers in the early morning crash. At least some of the occupants had to be removed from the vehicle, police said.

Debris and sheet-covered bodies remained on the scene several hours after the crash. Roads were shut down well into the afternoon as investigators worked to piece together the chain of events along the busy business corridor lined by fast-food restaurants, strip malls and gas stations two miles west of the Las Vegas Strip.

A police officer who was fueling his vehicle at a nearconvenience store watched as the car appeared to lose control and bottom out on a downward slope before leaving the pavement and slamming into the bus stop, according to police Sgt. Richard Strader.

"First responders said they smelled alcohol, and he even said something to the effect that he had been drinking," Strader said.

The vehicle, which came to rest in a fast-food restaurant parking lot, was so mangled that authorities initially had difficulty determining its make and model.



### 'Mountain Man' Makes Drug Conspiracy Plea Deal

**HELENA**, **Mont**. • The vounger half of the fatherand-son duo convicted of kidnapping a biathlete in the 1980s to be his mountain bride is facing possible prison time again after making a plea deal with prosecutors over

federal drug charges. Dan Nichols made the deal Tuesday over his employment with a medical marijuana provider raided in a statewide crackdown of large pot operations last year. He had been scheduled to go to trial on Sept. 24.

The plea deal reduces the nine drug, conspiracy and weapons charges Nichols originally faced to a single charge of conspiracy to maintain a drug-involved premises.

He plans to plead guilty in an Oct. 4 court hearing, said his attorney, Chad Wright.

"Conviction is likely in these cases. I don't know of any of these medical marijuana folks who are going to

trial," Wright said Thursday.

Nichols faces up to 20 years in prison, though prosecutors will recommend a lighter sentence under the deal.

Federal prosecutors said Nichols assisted in the operations of Montana Cannabis' Helena greenhouse, where agents confiscated 950 plants in a March 2011 raid and found a handgun in the nearby camper where Nichols was staying.

The raids were among 26 search warrants executed against homes, businesses and warehouses of medical marijuana providers across Montana. The raids have resulted in more than two dozen indictments, with most pleading guilty despite protesting that they were following state medical marijuana laws.

Among them three of the four owners of the now-defunct Montana Cannabis, which served more than 300 medical marijuana users from locations in Helena, Missoula, Billings and Miles City.

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# Utility Tax Fight May Hit Idaho Residents

BOISE (AP) • Idaho property taxpayers could get stuck with repaying up to \$11.6 million if state Supreme Court justices side with a utility, state officials said Wednesday.

Rocky Mountain Powerparent PacifiCorp contends that state appraisers inflated the value of their turbines, transmission lines and office buildings, resulting in higher tax bills.

PacifiCorp won a lawsuit over the issue in 2010, and Idaho Supreme Court justices could rule this year on the state Tax Commission's appeal. Idaho Power Co., the state's biggest utility, has also appealed recent appraisals that will likely be impacted by the case's out-

If justices side with PacifiCorp, Idaho taxpayers could see higher assessments or new taxes as districts scramble to repay money collected from the utilities.

"The concern from our vantage point is the impact on everyone's budgets," said Tony Poinelli, of the Idaho Association of Counties.

Ada County could have to repay \$1.8 million and Bannock County may have to come up with nearly \$1 million for the utilities, according to State Tax Commission estimates.

Smaller counties may also face stiff obligations: \$328,000 for Oneida County and \$414,000 for Payette County, home of the Idaho Power's new Langley Gulch gas plant.

In Idaho, operating properties such as power lines, gas pipelines and railroads are assessed centrally by the Tax Commission as a single unit - not

# Homeless Group Wins \$1M in Lawsuit

BOISE (AP) • A federal jury has ordered the city of Boise to pay \$1 million to an organization that helps homeless people for discriminating against women and children and retaliating against the organization when board members complained.

The verdict was handed down Wednesday evening in U.S. District Court in the lawsuit brought by Community House Inc.

"The city respectfully disagrees with the jury's decision and will be reviewing all its options to reverse this verdict," Boise city spokesman Adam Park said in a prepared statement released Thursday morning.

Community House and the city of Boise worked together in the 1990s to build and run a homeless shelter and soup kitchen, funded largely through federal grants and private donations. The city owned the building and administered some of the grant funds, and Community House operated the shelter and soup kitchen, providing emergency shelter and transitional housing to homeless men, women and

children. But over time the relationship began to unravel, and in 2003 the city began looking for a new organization to run

the shelter. When officials with Community House learned that the Boise Rescue Mission which houses only men was likely to take over, it filed a complaint under the Fair Housing Act contending that the move amounted to discrimination by the city because the women, children and family groups that lived at the shelter would be left with no place to go.

The complaint further strained the relationship between city leaders and the organization. In 2005, the city of Boise officially entered into a lease-and-purchase agreement with the Boise Rescue Mission.

That's when Community House sued in federal court, contending that the city was discriminating against women and children and that it was violating provisions of both the Idaho and U.S. Constitutions by becoming too entangled with a religious organization, the Boise Rescue Mission. Community House also contended in the lawsuit that the city retaliated against the organization after it filed the Fair Housing Act complaint.

We hear from this crowd on a regular basis, asking us to "cover" the national campaign from the slant that "Obama is deliberately destroying our economy as he is an anti-colonialist and wants us to become a third world nation." (An excerpt from an email this week).

Of course we also hear from a quieter minority that asks why we're not reporting on Romney's purposeful attempts to abolish all domestic social service programs simply because he doesn't like poor people.

We won't get sucked into believing that either Romney or Obama is evil. Not only because our mission is local news coverage, but also because we believe that there is enough of a difference in their actions and ideologies to provide voters with a clear choice on Nov. 6. We don't believe the conspiracy theory that has either candidate working against the future of the United States.

They may be wrong; they may be myopic; they may be naïve. We just don't believe they're evil.

### About Those Policies that Got Us Into This Mess

"They want us to go back to the same old policies that got us into this mess in the first place."

President Barack
Obama? Bill Clinton? Rahm
Emanuel? Debbie Wasserman Schultz?

All of the above and many more of the luminaries who graced the stage at last week's Democratic National Convention in Charlotte, N.C. This has become a standard, stumpspeech line, yet no on bothers to spell out exactly what those policies are.

Before we get to causality, we have to define the "mess" they all talk about. I assume it refers to the 2008 financial crisis, which rocked the United States and global economy to its foundation.

What was at the root of the mess? In other words, what single element precipitated the crisis?

Answer: bad loans. The same thing that historically has gotten banks into trouble. (No, it wasn't proprietary trading.)

This time around, it was subprime and substandard mortgages that were bundled, packaged into securities, sliced, diced and sometimes squared, and sold to investors. So what policies were responsible? I doubt the Bush

tax cuts of 2001 and 2003 had anything to do with the housing bubble. On the other hand, the government's unwritten, and underwritten, policy on housing did.

Start with housing's taxed-advantaged status. Mortgage interest and real estate taxes are deductible. The first \$250,000 of capital gains (\$500,000 for a married couple) from the sale of a home is exempt from taxation as long as you have lived in it for two years. The tax laws on capital gains were relaxed in 1997, when Clinton was in the White House.

Why is housing tax-advantaged? Because the folks who write the laws or, more correctly, those who influence the folks who write the laws decided it should be. The government enacted laws to encourage lending to minorities and low-income households. It established affordable-housing goals for Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. And it closed its eyes to financial chicanery at the two government-sponsored, publicprivate enterprises.

And while we're on the subject of Clinton, I almost fell off

my chair when I saw his recent adendorsing Obama.

"The Republican plan is to cut more taxes on upper income people and go back to deregulation," Clinton says. "That's what got us in trouble in the first place."

Deregulation? As in the repeal of Glass-Steagall in 1999? Didn't some Obama campaign official vet the ad before the president gave it his imprimatur?

The Financial Services Modernization Act of 1999, better known at Gramm-Leach-Bliley, removed the barriers among banks, investment banks and insurance companies. Banks got bigger and more leveraged. Pretty soon, they were too big to fail.

Next came the Commodity Futures Modernization Act, which exempted over-thecounter swaps and derivatives from regulation. It was signed into law in 2000 by ... Bill Clinton. Leading the deregulatory charge during his administration were Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin who subsequently landed a plum job with no line responsibility at Citigroup, which had already merged with Travelers before Glass-Steagall was repealed and his No. 2, Larry Summers. The idea was to distribute risk; the effect was to magnify it.

Financial deregulation,

President Jimmy Carter, didn't cause the crisis. It did serve as an accelerator, allowing Wall Street to manufacture newfangled securities. Government policy had a role to play in the misallocation of capital into housing. But that in no way exculpates the other actors in this saga: lenders, who had no incentive to perform due diligence since they sold the loans as soon as the ink was dry; compliant rating companies that failed to understand that over-collateralized junk is still junk; Wall Street investment banks, which were only too happy to satisfy investor demand by feeding them high-yielding, AAA-rated securities; the Federal Reserve, which kept

Maybe it's time to take the goal of homeownership down from its lofty perch. It really doesn't belong in the category with life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.





# Missle Contrails Streak across the West

PHOENIX (AP) • People across the Southwest got an early morning show in the sky Thursday, courtesy of a trio of unarmed missiles fired from New Mexico, one of which left a brilliant contrail that changed colors as it was illuminated by the rising

The twisting cloud-like formation was visible in southern Colorado, Phoenix, Salt Lake City and Las Vegas just before sunrise, and led to hundreds of calls and emails to area television stations.

Law enforcement agencies in northern New Mexico and southern Colorado received some reports of a crash, but those were quickly discounted. A sheriff's deputy in northern New Mexico who saw one of the missiles leaving behind a contrail as it lifted into the pre-dawn sky said he spotted what appeared to be an explosion and a part falling off the craft.

"When I saw it, it surprised the heck out of me, and I thought, 'Wow, that's not something you see every

day," said San Juan County deputy J.J. Roberts. "So I pulled over, pulled out my iPhone and started taking some pictures and video."

The "explosion" was a normal separation of the first and second stages of the unarmed Juno ballistic missile that was fired at 6:30 a.m. MDT from Fort Wingate near Gallup, N.M., said Drew Hamilton, a spokesman for the U.S. Army's White Sands Missile Range. The expended first stage landed in a designated area of U.S. Forest Service land.

The Juno missile was then targeted by advanced versions of the Patriot missile fired from White Sands, about 350 miles away, as part of a test. Two of the missiles were fired and hit the incoming Juno missile, said Dan O'Boyle, a spokesman for the Redstone Arsenal in Alabama, which was in charge of the Patriots used in the test.

The Patriot missiles kill incoming targets by direct

strike and don't explode. The rising sun backlit the Juno missile's contrail and provided a spectacular morning sight for early risers across the region.

"It's one of those things it does not happen every time - the weather and light conditions have to be just right, and this was one of those times," Hamilton said. "We even had people calling from (Los Angeles) asking about it. They want to know about it. Apparently this thing really lit up the sky really well."

Roberts said he was driving between Aztec, N.M., and Farmington, N.M, before sunrise when he saw the missile heading into the sky.

"It was pretty obvious. The first thing that came to mind, it was some sort of a missile or a jet or something like that," Roberts said.

Calls began coming in to dispatchers, and two deputies on the other side of San Juan County were dispatched to look for a crash. But Roberts said he quickly waved them off.

"We had gotten reports that there was an explosion or a UFO or missile or whatever, and people thought it was real close so they were concerned there would be debris falling from the sky," Roberts said. "To me, it was obvious when I saw it, it was real high altitude."

TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls volleyball team was on the verge of losing a set against Great Basin Conference opponents for the first



# Packers Run Fake FG, Beat Bears

GREEN BAY, Wis. • On a night when defenses dominated the NFL's most storied rivalry, the Packers got creative – and it worked.

Punter Tim Masthay and backup tight end Tom Crabtree combined for a touchdown on a fake field goal in the second quarter, and the Green Bay Packers rattled and robbed Jay Cutler in a 23-10 victory over the Chicago Bears at Lambeau Field on Thursday.

Cutler threw four interceptions, including a pair to Tramon Williams. Facing a fierce Packers pass rush all night, Cutler was sacked seven times, including 31/2 for Clay Matthews. New Bears wide receiver Brandon Marshall was held to two catches for 24 vards.

"Clay was incredible," Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers said. "Defense causing turnovers, if they play like this we're going to be hard to

The Bears also lost running back Matt Forte to an ankle injury.

After Williams collected his second interception, Rodgers finally found the end zone in the fourth quarter, hitting Donald Driver for a 26-yard touchdown and a 23-3 lead.

Driver, who barely played in the Packers' season-opening loss to San Francisco, did a celebratory dance in the end zone, recalling his stint on the "Dancing With the Stars" reality television show.

But Rodgers threw an interception to Tim Jennings and the Bears finally cashed in. Facing fourth-and-7 at the Green Bay 21, Cutler threw a touchdown to Kellen Davis, cutting the lead to 23-10 with 6:49 remaining. But the Bears couldn't mount a comeback as Matthews and the Packers kept turning up the heat.

Rodgers finished the game 22 of 32 for 219 yards with a touchdown and an intercep-

Cutler was 11 for 27 for 126 yards.

Earlier in the week, a confident Cutler wished the Packers' defensive backs "good luck" in trying to match up physically with a new-look wide receiver corps led by Marshall. Stalked by Williams for much of the night, Marshall didn't see much of the ball. And he couldn't convert his one big opportunity, dropping a potential touchdown in the third quarter.

Forte provided much of what little offense the Bears could muster before leaving the game in the third. He appeared to twist his right ankle while being tackled by Charles Woodson.

Mason Crosby hit three field goals for Green Bay, including a 54-yarder in the fourth quarter.

The biggest play of the night, though, came from the unlikely tandem of Masthay and Crabtree.

With the Packers facing fourth-and-26 on the Chicago 27 late in the second quarter, Masthay, the punter who also functions as the holder on field goals, and Crosby appeared to line up for a field goal attempt.

But Masthay took the snap and flipped the ball to Crabtree, who ran through a huge hole and streaked all the way to the end zone.

Jed Thomas led the Bobcats to wins over Perrigot and the Spartans in both his junior and senior seasons. As a senior in 2002, Thomas rushed for 198 yards on 33 carries and scored two touchdowns as the Bobcats won

Since then, however, Burley has only beaten Minico once, in 2004. The Spartans have dominated the last seven rivalry games by a combined score 305-54.

The rivalry dates back to 1955 (or 1916, if you count the old Rupert High days), and Minico leads the all-time series 33-24.

"I think it's one of the alltime rivalries," said Jed Thomas, likening it to the Holy War between Notre Dame and Boston College. "It's right across the river. It's bragging rights. You can't explain it; it's a lot of fun."

Thomas and Perrigot agree that to win high school football games, believing is half the battle. When Minico takes the field, it expects to win. It's a mindset that Thomas is trying to instill in his players, and it's beginning to sink in as the Bobcats are 2-O after wins against Filer and

battle, but I think he has potential to do some great things?

Tonight promises to be Burley's biggest test so far, as it takes on the defending Great Basin Conference champs.

The Burley-Minico rivalry will kick off the 2012 Great Basin Conference slate, along with Canyon Ridge (0-2) hosting Jerome (1-2).

He became convinced that the adoption of new technologies such as fax machines and early email systems were vital to improving the efficiency and reducing the costs of written translations. As a result, he



founded GlobaLink Inc. and was subsequently recruited to manage Euramerica Inc., the largest translation firm in New York City and perhaps

in the United States at the time. In 1983, he and his business partner, Sean Susanin, started an auction house, SU-SANIN'S Auctions based in Chicago,

that has grown into the largest fine art auction house in the Midwest. While still active in the business at the time of his death, Christian was semi-retired and living near family in Twin Falls.

Close surviving relatives include Christian's children, Massimo (Emma) Renke of Chevy Chase, Md., Richard Skeem of Twin Falls and Giulia Skeem of Chicago; one grandchild, Naima Skeem of Chicago; parents, Wayne and Arlene Skeem of Twin Falls; and siblings, Susan (Les) Payne of Park City, Utah, Dan Skeem of Preston, Tom (Jill) Skeem of Kimberly, Cindra (Terry) Eardley of Monticello, Utah, Jill (McKay) Lundgren of Buhl and Rebecca Dixon of Twin Falls.

**BURLEY** • James Henry (Jim) Roper, 89, passed away Tuesday, Sept. 11, 2012, at his home in Burley, Idaho, after suffering from congestive heart failure and pulmonary disease (and after a good day of visiting with lifelong friends).

He was born Jan. 29, 1923, to William and Tess Roper in Burley. He grew up on Burlev's Conant Avenue, worked in the family clothing store (Roper's, started in 1912 by his father) from age 8, graduated from Burley High School in 1941 (third in his class of 141 students), attended the University of Idaho, and enlisted in the U.S. Navy's V12 program in 1943. The Navy sent Jim to Supply Corps Training School at Harvard University and, after receiving his commission, Jim served as Disbursing Officer aboard the USS Guadalcanal. Following the war, Jim finished his degree work from the University of Idaho. He also met Bette Lee Isenburg from Rupert; they were married Sept. 16, 1946, and they began a partnership that would last 61 happy years. Jim and Bette moved to Palo Alto, Calif., in the fall of 1946 so Jim could attend Stanford University, and he earned a Master's in Business Administration degree the following year. Oct. 7, 1925-Sept. 10, 2012








WASHINGTON (AP) • The Federal Reserve unleashed a series of bold and open-ended steps Thursday designed to stimulate the economy by boosting the stock market and making it cheaper for people to borrow and spend.

The Fed said it will spend \$40 billion a month to buy mortgage bonds for as long as it deems necessary to make home buying more affordable. It plans to keep short-term interest rates at record lows through mid-2015 — six months longer than previously planned.

"The idea is to quicken the recovery," Chairman Ben Bernanke said at a news conference. But Bernanke made clear that he thinks the economy will need the Fed's help even after the recovery strength-

Stock prices rose steadily after the Fed's announcement at 12:30 p.m. Eastern time. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up more than 200 points. Other stock averages also surged. The Fed's policy committee announced the aggressive actions after a two-day

# U.S. Braces for More Violence from Anti-Muslim Film

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Obama administration was caught by surprise by the ferocity of the Sept. 11 attack against the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi, Libya, that killed the ambassador and three other Americans. Now it is bracing for another potential eruption of violent demonstrations in parts of the Muslim world after Friday's weekly prayers – traditionally a time of protest in the Middle East and

North Africa. Angry demonstrations over an anti-Islam video already have occurred in Egypt and Yemen, and officials theorize that well-armed Libyan extremists hijacked a similar protest in Benghazi, where several Libyan security guards also were killed. The U.S. put all of its diplomatic missions overseas on high alert, and Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton delivered an explicit denunciation of the video as the administration sought to pre-empt further turmoil at its embassies and consulates.

"The United States government had absolutely nothing to do with this video," she said before a meeting with the foreign minister of Morocco at the State Department. "We absolutely reject its content and message."

"To us, to me personally, this video is disgusting and reprehensi-

ble," Clinton said. "It appears to have a deeply cynical purpose: to denigrate a great religion and to provoke rage."

U.S. officials said they suspect that the attack at the Benghazi consulate, which had also been the target of an unsuccessful attack in

June, may have been only tangentially related to the film.

They also stressed there had been no advance warning or intel-

ligence to suggest a threat in Libya that would warrant boosting security, even on the 11th anniversary of the terror attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

"As we did with all of our missions overseas, in advance of the September 11 anniversary and as we do every year, we did evaluate the threat stream and we determined that the security at Benghazi was appropriate for what we knew,"State Department spokeswoman Victoria Nuland said.

The intelligence leading up to the attacks will be examined to "see if there was any way of forecasting this violence," as in any violent incident, House Intelligence Committee member Adam Schiff, D-Calif., said in an interview Thursday. But he said the focus now "has to be on finding out who is responsible and bringing them to justice."

President Barack Obama, speaking a campaign event in Golden, Colorado, also vowed that the perpetrators would be punished.

"I want people around the world to hear me," he said. "To all those who would do us harm: No act of terror will go unpunished. I will not dim the light of the values that we proudly present to the rest of the world. No act of violence shakes the resolve of the United States of America."

# Tax on Amazon Purchases in California Begins This Weekend

#### SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)

• Online retailer Amazon.com has tried to become all things to all consumers, but in California, it is about to take on a role it has fought against for years: tax collector.

The change, which takes effect this weekend, comes after years of bitter back and forth between the world's largest online mall and the California Legislature over whether Internet retailers should have to charge sales tax. The two sides reached a deal in 2011 that included a one-year grace period set to end Saturday.

The deadline has spurred at least some consumers into impulse-buying mode, making big-ticket purchases and stocking up on essentials before the tax collection kicks

"Even the mailroom is laughing at me," said Derek Daniels, 37, who has had Amazon packages delivered to his Los Angeles office every day this week. He's loading up on household supplies like trash bags and collecting birthday and Christmas presents for his Superman-loving 2 year-old.

"We are hoping he won't fall in love with Batman by the time November rolls around," Daniels said.

The looming deadline prompted San Diego artist John Purlia to finally buy that Samsung flat-screen television that had been sitting in his Amazon shopping cart for months. He also picked up four CDs, an external hard drive and an oddly decorated \$17.99 kitchen cutting-board a gag gift for his sister.

"The TV was the motivating factor and the other stuff came along for the ride," said

fulfillment center in Goodyear, Ariz.

Technically, Purlia and Daniels owe taxes on all of this: California residents are supposed to calculate their obligation and send it directly to the state. But fewer than 1 percent do, according to the Franchise Tax Board.

Lawmakers have long complained that the increasingly popular e-retailer was depriving the state of millions of dollars by refusing to charge taxes at checkout. But Amazon said it was shielded by a 1992 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that prohibits states from forcing businesses without a physical presence in the area to collect

The e-commerce giant said it did not have a physical presence in California because it does not have warehouses or other buildings

Similar fights have played out in other states, with Amazon sometimes shuttering distribution centers and canceling contracts to be able to continue selling tax-free

### Chicago Teachers on Edge as **Contract Talks Move Closer**

CHICAGO • Chicago Public Schools and the teachers union began the day saying they were close to a deal that could return teachers and students to the classroom Monday, but gave little information subsequently as negotiations to iron out details extended well into Thursday evening.

The union's House of Delegates is scheduled to meet at 2 p.m. Friday to discuss the district's latest proposals. The delegates approval is needed to end the strike and put teachers back on the job, but the union was not saying whether the body will vote at Friday's meeting.

The union is inviting other labor organizations to join it at a rally at noon Saturday at Union Park on the Near West Side, which could be a final show of force and solidarity before the walkout ends. If a tentative deal is reached and delegates vote before the end of the weekend to call off the strike, a contract would still need to be ratified by the union's full 25,000 members, likely in the next two weeks.

Before talks started Thursday in the Chicago Hilton and Towers on South Michigan Avenue, Chicago Teachers Union President Karen Lewis, who has consistently downplayed progress at the negotiating table, rated her confidence "a 9" on a scale on 1 to 10.

Her confidence buoyed teachers, but as with parents, the optimism of many educators was tempered with caution.

"We're most optimistic that the union leadership will make sure our demands are met," Michelle Gunderson, a fourth-grade teacher at Nettelhorst Elementary School in Lakeview. "We can't just do this again. This has to be the finish line."

With the union saying early on its members wouldn't be returning to school this week, the city's first teachers strike in 25 years moved into its fourth day Thursday. Some 350,000 students remain out of the classroom and will have to make up the loss of a week at some point during the school year.

Under the deal put on the table by CPS Tuesday, teachers would receive on average a 16 percent raise over the next four years.

# Explore the History that Made Shoshone a 'Train Town'

**SHOSHONE** • The town of Shoshone has seen a lot of trains come and go. It was established in 1882 in anticipation of the railroad coming through.

By the turn of the 20th century, Shoshone was a major railhead for sheepherders and for bootlegging in the 1920s and '30s. In the 1940s the trains brought celebrities here to vacation and hunt, sending off soldiers to war and bringing in visiting relatives from the East Coast.

And some stayed or returned years later – such as Shoshone resident Lanita Hall, who remembered traveling for two days from Chicago to Shoshone to visit her aunt in the 1940s. When Hall arrived, she said, the town was swarming with people, mostly men, on

"I sure like the beauty God left," Phillips said.

Also catching the riding bug last year was Clement "C.J." Fitzgerald, 10, of Shoshone.

This year, Fitzgerald didn't want to ride in the carriage; he wanted to ride a horse. So all year he learned how to handle and care for a horse. His payoff was this week's journey.



their way to fight during

World War II. "It was a real bustling town," Hall said.

That was more than half a century ago, and once again Hall boarded a passenger train at the Shoshone station Sept. 6. But this time, Hall was already home and her roundtrip journey would take less

than an hour. The yellow Union Pacific passenger train pulled slowly next to the station, an American flag emblazoned on the lead engine car. Hall and about 100 other Shoshone residents lined up to take a ride to nearby Gooding for the first time in 15 years since passenger trains stopped running through this area. Today the trains carry agricultural products and commodities instead of people.

Hall and the others weren't going to visit friends or family but to celebrate their town's induction as one of three Idaho cities on Union Pacific's "Train Town USA" registry.

On Sept. 6, Shoshone joined Boise and Pocatello on the registry, marking Union Pacific's 150th anniversary this year.

"I think it's awesome," said Shoshone Mayor Dave Wendell. "We are already on the map and this will put us on the map ... and will add to the history of Shoshone."

Wendell said he hopes the honor will bring in

lava rock buildings can be found. The buildings are unique because lava rock cannot be cut and must be assembled in irregular shapes.

On the Shoshone Historic Walking Tour, 11 of the 12 buildings featured are on the National Register of Historic Places. The Lincoln County Courthouse, built in 1904, still has the original oak furniture and is one of the last remaining "flat-iron" jails, with bars that are flat instead of round.



# High-energy A Cappella Quintet Heads for Burley

**BURLEY** • Karen Taylor says VoicePlay will knock off your socks. The Mini-Cassia Community Concerts board member loves laughter, and she loves this a cappella quintet unabashedly.

Florida-based Voice-Play, which recently changed its name from 42Five, will perform at Burley's King Fine Arts Center on Sept. 18, opening the concert series' five-show season.

The new name suits. The singers play like likeable teenagers, and their voices are remarkably versatile, mimicking sounds from the trumpet to the drums.

VoicePlay member Geoff Castellucci says three of the musicians met in seventh grade and started out in barbershop quar-

Mowing your grass in the rain can be miserable for you, and it may not do your grass any favors, either. While some commercial mowers, with their balloon tires and super fast, super sharp blades can handle the task, most residential lawn mowers aren't up to it. At best, you may end up with a badly cut lawn. At worst, you can end up with ruts and dead patches that are a pain to repair.

#### Wet Grass 101

There are numerous of reasons why rain gives grass the upper hand when you try to mow:

Grass behaves like people when it's getting rained on: it hunches over. The result is that many blades of grass get pushed over, not cut, when you try to mow. At least

until the sun comes up, when all of the uncut grass should once again stand at attention.

- Some of the wet grass may stick to the mower blades, making it cut less efficiently;
- Wet grass can stick also to the mower's undercarriage. Eventually it should get thick enough to impede the mower blades and slow their rotation, further diminishing the mower's cutting ability.
- Most mowers have mulching blades that create suction. Cut grass gets sucked up and cut into tiny pieces when it's dry. But when it's wet, the grass clumps up and doesn't get mulched. If left in your yard, clumps of grass larger than the diameter of a tennis ball can weigh down and kill the grass underneath them in a matter of

days, leaving you with dead patches.

• If your grass has been saturated past its root depth, and if your mower wheels or shoes slide laterally, they can literally push the grass, roots and all, out of place, leaving ruts.

#### But if You Have to Mow in the Rain

If you can't avoid mowing in the rain, mow in passes less than half the width of the mower to minimize clumping and keep the blades turning fast. And as soon as your lawn dries out, go out with a blower and dislodge any clumps you couldn't avoid.







I would expect East to pass as dealer here, then double at his second turn to speak. If South could redouble to show a strong hand, there is something to be said for that action, after which East would retreat to two diamonds. Now 300 is available by doubling this, but at most forms of scoring, there is a lot to be said for aiming higher, since if you bid three no-trump and make it, the rewards are far greater.

At many tables, East would unthinkingly win the first diamond and try to cash the suit from the top. That would make sense if South had a doubleton diamond, but how likely is that? Not very,

East does best to duck the first or second diamond, stopping the easy route home via the club finesse. Declarer has a counter: He must run the hearts, forcing East to make two discards. The first one, a small spade, is easy; the second appears relatively innocuous as well, in that he must throw an apparently irrelevant small club. But then declarer has to reconstruct the hand. Since East appears to have started with four spades, two hearts and five diamonds, he either has the bare club king or doesn't. South must cash the club ace and exit with his remaining diamond. East is now endplayed; he can cash his diamonds but in the three-card ending he must lead into dummy's spade tenace and concede the rest.



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
