TWIN FALLS • If you went to Shoshone Falls during the past week, you've probably noticed something missing –

Between April 1 and Labor Day, Idaho Power Co. is required to divert at least 300 cubic feet per second of water over Shoshone Falls during the daylight, said Dennis Bowyer, parks and recreation director for the

city of Twin Falls.

The obligation is part of the utility company's current license agreement. Now that Sept. 5 has passed, Idaho Power no longer has to make sure that 300 cfs are flowing over the falls, Bowyer said.

With almost no water flowing down from Milner Dam, Bowyer expects Shoshone Falls to have less water until next spring.

"It's really dry right now and it might be that way for a while," he said.

The goal of a new elementary

Jerome ISP Building Named for First Slain Trooper


JEROME • Trooper Fontaine Cooper started his career in Pocatello in 1931. A year later he became one of the first members of the Idaho State Police.

Four years after that, he became the first trooper killed in the line of duty.

On Friday, the ISP District IV headquarters in Jerome was dedicated in Cooper's honor.

Cooper was killed on Nov. 25, 1935, near Buhl after he spotted the vehicle of a suspected kidnapper, Douglas F. Van Vlack. Van Vlack was accused of kidnapping his exwife off the streets of Tacoma, Wash., at gunpoint and police throughout the Northwest were on the lookout for him.

Cooper and Twin Falls County Sheriff's Deputy Henry Givins spotted Van Vlack's vehicle on U.S. Highway 30 outside of Buhl. When Cooper approached the car, Please see **DEDICATION**, A4

NEW YORK (AP) • The stock market rose again Friday because of economic help from the Federal Reserve. But even some of the buyers weren't believers.

The Dow rose as much as 113 points Friday before pulling back. It ended up 53.51 points to 13,593.37. The Standard & Poor's 500 rose 5.78 to 1,465.77, almost exactly 1,000 points below its all-time high. The Nasdag composite index, which has been trading at the highest levels since 2000, climbed 28.12 to 3,183.95.

FILER • A new homebrewing supply shop on the north end of Filer will become an Internet-based operation after city officials warned it was violating local zoning codes.

Owners Steve and Connie Baum opened the Twin Fools Brew Shoppe on Sept. 1, offering a selection of homebrewing ingredients and equipment out of a shop and garage next to their home. The store was open on Saturdays.

But the Baums were ap-

parently never supposed to have a storefront. On Thursday evening, Steve Baum said he is shifting his store online after receiving a letter from the Filer city attorney accusing Twin Fools of not following its zoning rules.

The Baums' home is in a rural residential zone, a blend of residential and ag uses that does not allow for a retail storefront, said City Attorney Fritz Wonderlich.

Steve Baum presented his idea to sell homebrew supplies to the Filer City Council on May 1, Wonderlich said, but did not seek a specialuse permit at the time. Thus, the council informed him that he could not have any walk-in or drive-in traffic, Wonderlich said.

"Everybody thought it was a good idea," the attorney said Friday. "They wanted him to locate downtown in commercial."


The council then learned about the storefront from publicity surrounding its opening, Wonderlich said.

Steve Baum isn't disputing the issue.

"I'm in the wrong," he said.

He now plans to take orders online and in the mail or calls for local delivery. Twin Fools' new website could be up in a week or so, he said.



Burley Airport Users Formalize Group

BURLEY • Pilots and citizens interested in the fate of the Burley airport have formed an organization to make sure their voices are

The Burley Airport Users Association met Thursday and adopted bylaws that defined the group's purpose. It also elected officers to represent the membership.

"I don't know if it's fair to characterize us as wanting to support this airport unequivocally without looking at some of the other options," said Jack Hunsaker, who spearheaded the group and was elected vice president. "If they want to proceed, we want to look at the options and have some input and help them determine which one is the best site."

For a time, pilot Joe Larsen was on the committee tasked with examining new airport sites, but later resigned.

Larsen said the new airport users' group does not necessarily want preservation of the Burley airport as it sits today, but rather of a Burley airport in general. The sentiment, he said, comes in response to an statement made in April by Burley Mayor Terry Greenman that the city would petition the Federal Aviation Administration to close the airport if it could not be relo-

City: Talks are Continuation from 2011

The city of Burley included four potential airport sites panned by local residents last year in a new packet of possible locations this week.

That, said City Administrator Mark Mitton, is because officials view this week's activities as a continuation of the site identification process from 2011, not a new

The packet, also including two new proposed sites, was briefly discussed with no action Monday by the Cassia County commissioners.

An advisory committee that identified the first four sites stepped back from them last year after there was almost unanimous opposition by landowners.

At the time, Cassia County officials said they would not support the relocation of the airport on agricultural land and that too many questions remained unanswered about the need and cost of a new airport.

Burley municipal airport exceeds that of most of the airports in Idaho," said Larsen. "Safety is a big issue that hits a raw nerve with pilots and users and the characterization that it is an unsafe airport. That's one of the things we want to dispel as a group."

Hunsaker said he researched the National Transportation Safety Board records for the last 30 years and the two fatality crashes that have occurred near the airport were both due to pi-

Former Burley councilman Jay Lenkersdorfer, who attended the meeting, said the underlying driving force to relocate the airport lies in economic development of the airport ground by the

"I think economic development is a big piece of it," said Lenkersdorfer. "Obviously it's not good to put an airport in the middle of a city but it happened that way. Ideally you'd have it somewhere else. It's the last big piece of ground inside the city limits that the city could sell power to and that's a big economic factor."

Burley Administrator Mark Mitton said during an interview Friday that economic development of the land has not been discussed by city officials.

"Jay wasn't around at the beginning of this," Mitton said.

The city has been trying to relocate the airport for more than 15 years.

Mitton said the issue is about the "future of the Burley airport."

City officials are concerned about having an "adequate airport" and an "improved airport that's safe," Mitton said.

Mitton said the city has looked at other options at the current site, including making a runway longer. But because of the airport's location, it doesn't have proper safety zones.

Larsen said there is also concern of financial compensation by pilots who have purchased hangars at the airport and by business owners at the airport.

Members also expressed concern that hangar costs at a new facility would not be affordable.

Minidoka County Commissioner Bob Moore said if the airport users and the public want to relocate the airport and the true costs are publicized, he would not oppose the project.

Moore said the cost estimates change each time they are discussed by city officials and he does not think accurate estimates on federal reimbursements have been presented.

"The man stated he did not like his party at the lake so he left," the report states, citing the witness account.

According to the report, when detectives contacted the Alpine motel the clerk said Prince was checked into a room. When the detectives knocked on the door, Prince did not answer but the detectives could hear dogs barking inside. The manager opened the door with her key.

Prince told investigators he was trying to get to his van in Heyburn. Detectives then gave him and his dogs a ride. According to the report Prince's daughter later called detectives to tell them Prince was on his way back to Nevada.

Van Vlack shot Cooper, killing him instantly. Givins was also shot and died two weeks later from his injuries.

Givins is the only Twin Falls County sheriff's deputy to be killed in the line of duty, ISP Capt. Rob Storm said at the ceremony. Cooper was 34 years old and Givins was 45.

Cooper's daughter Dorothy Cooper-Swainston, granddaughter Tery Layland, two great-granddaughters and several other family members were present at the ceremony Friday.

Law enforcement from Twin Falls, Jerome, Rupert and across the Magic Valley were also present along with dozens of ISP troopers.

ISP Col. Jerry Russell thanked Cooper's family for traveling from Kent, Wash., for the ceremony. He pre-

sented Cooper-Swainston with a flag and a posthumous Purple Heart in honor of Cooper, along with a replica of the plaque that will hang inside the ISP building.

Cpl. Steve Hobbs, Idaho State Police officer who was shot in the chest as he made a routine traffic stop in 1991, also spoke at the ceremony. He was only the second trooper in ISP's history to be shot while on duty.

"Being an Idaho State trooper is not something you do," he said. "Being an Idaho State trooper is who you are."

Hobbs said if he could do it all over again he'd become a state trooper again, and believes Cooper would have too.

After the ceremony Cooper-Swainston said she was overwhelmed by the event, and called it a privilege to at-

Most Student Writers Still Lack Proficiency

Students who have access to computers at home and regularly use them for assignments are more likely to be strong writers, a national exam suggests. But it also says just a quarter of America's eighth- and 12th-grade students have solid writing skills. Twentyseven percent of the students at each of those grade levels were able to write essays that were well developed, organized and had proper language and grammar -24 percent were considered proficient, 3 percent advanced. The remainder showed just partial mastery of these skills.

"It is important to remember this is first-draft writing," said Mary Crovo, deputy executive director of the National Assessment Governing Board, which administers the Nation's Report Card tests. "They did have some time to edit, but it wasn't extensive editing."

Students who took the writing test in 2011 had an advantage that previous test takers did not: computers with spell-check and thesaurus. Previously, young people taking the National Assessment of Educational Progress writing test had to use pencil and paper; the switch was made in line with changes in technology and a need for today's students to write across electronic formats.

Because this was the first version of the computerized test, the board cautioned against comparing the results to previous exams. In 2007, some 33 percent of eighth-grade students scored at the proficient level, which represents solid writing skills, as did 24 percent at grade 12.

Crovo said most students already use such technology as spell-check on a daily basis. Without those tools, she said, "It's as if years ago we had given them a pencil to write the essay and took away the eraser."

She said word processing tools alone wouldn't result in significantly better writing scores if students didn't have the core skills of being able to organize ideas and present them in a clear and grammatical fashion.

Still, students in both grades who used the thesaurus and the backspace key more frequently had higher scores than those who used them less often. Students who scored below the 25th percentile were less likely to have computers at home: 87 percent said they did, compared

to 99 percent were in the top quarter.
The technology gap was hinted at in other statistics as well: The lowest scorers reported less daily computer use for school assignments, and 44 percent fewer said they always used a computer to make

changes to papers or reports.

Mark Warschauer, an education professor at the University of California, Irvine, said research consistently shows the use of computers in the classroom improves writing performance. He said students end up writing more, getting more feedback from peers and teachers and publishing more, all of which keeps them motivated.

"It just improves every aspect of the writing process," he said.

The latest test results make a strong argument for more use of technology in English language programs at school, Warschauer said, as home access is more uneven.

The results at both grade levels showed a continuing achievement gap between white, black, Hispanic and Asian students. At the eighth grade, Asian students had the highest average score, which was

33 points higher than black students on a 300-point scale. At the 12th grade, white students scored 27 points above black students.

There was also a gender gap, with girls scoring 20 points higher on average than boys in the eighth grade and 14 points higher in 12th grade. Those who qualified for free and reduced price lunch, a key

12th grade. Those who qualified for free and reduced price lunch, a key indicator of poverty, had lower scores than those who did not; there was a 27 point difference between the two at the eighth grade.

Teacher Strike Nears End of Negotiations

CHICAGO (AP) • Chicago Public Schools and the teachers union began the day saying they were close to a deal that could return teachers and students to the classroom Monday.

The union's House of Delegates was scheduled to meet at 2 p.m. Friday to discuss the district's latest proposals. The delegates' approval is needed to end the strike and put teachers back on the job, but the union was not saying whether the body will vote at Friday's meeting. The union is inviting other labor organizations to join it at a rally at noon Saturday at Union Park on the Near West Side, which could be a final show of force and

solidarity before the walkout ends. If a tentative deal is reached and delegates vote before the end of the weekend to call off the strike, a contract would still need to be ratified by the union's full 25,000 members, likely in the next two weeks.

"We're most optimistic that the union leadership will make sure our demands are met," said Michelle Gunderson, a fourth-grade teacher at Nettelhorst Elementary School in Lakeview.

With the union saying early on its members wouldn't be returning to school this week, the city's first teachers strike in 25 years moved into its fourth day Thursday.

More Violence Explodes at Protests of Anti-Muslim Film

CAIRO (AP) • Fury over an anti-Islam film spread across the Muslim world Friday, with deadly clashes near Western embassies in Tunisia and Sudan, an American fast-food restaurant set ablaze in Lebanon, and international peacekeepers attacked in the Sinai despite an appeal for calm from Egypt's

Islamist president.
President Barack Obama
said Washington would
"stand fast" against attacks
on U.S. embassies around the

world. He spoke at a somber ceremony paying tribute to four Americans — including U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens — killed earlier this week when the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi, Libya, was stormed by militants who may have used protests of the anti-Muslim film to stage an assault on the 11th anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

In addition to countries where protests have occurred, U.S. embassies around the world, including in France and Austria, issued alerts Friday advising Americans to review their personal security measures and warning them that demonstrations may occur and may turn violent. Other embassies issuing alerts were those in Denmark, Mauritania and India. More than 50 U.S. embassies and consulates had released similar alerts Thursday.

The heaviest violence came in Khartoum, Sudan,

where a prominent sheik on state radio urged protesters to march on the German Embassy to protest alleged anti-Muslim graffiti on mosques in Berlin and then to the U.S. Embassy to protest the film.

Leaders of Egypt's Jihad group, a former militant organization, held a conference in the Egyptian city of Alexandria and said anyone involved in "defamation" of the prophet should be

Obama, Romney Both Worry in Florida

APOPKA, Fla. (AP) • President Barack Obama and Republican Mitt Romney have this in common when it comes to Florida: They're both worried about the biggest election battleground prize

battleground prize.


The president has an edge here, but Democrats fear the advantage may be fleeting and fret about Florida's undecided voters. They're also nervous about legal battles over state voter laws that could cut into Obama's support among minorities.

support among minorities. The state is especially critical for Romney.

With his paths limited toward the 270 electoral votes needed to win the White House, Romney's chances are far more difficult if he doesn't claim Florida's enormous cache of 29.

That explains why he's starting to pour even more money into television commercials here now that he has access to general election funds. Both campaigns expect Republicans to outspend Democrats on the airwaves in the final weeks of the race in a state that already has seen each side spend roughly \$60 million on TV ads.

The situation in Florida — and the campaigns' anxieties

about it — reflects the overall state of the presidential race. A new smattering of polls shows Obama ahead by several percentage points in key states, as well as nationally. The clock is ticking toward November, Obama clearly has momentum on his side and Romney faces dwindling opportunities to change the race's trajectory.

Without Florida, Romney would have to win all of the states that are leaning his way, as well as all of the

others that Obama won four years ago but now are too close to call — Ohio, Virginia, Iowa, Colorado, Nevada and New Hampshire — and still pick up two more electoral votes elsewhere, in states that are even more difficult.

Idaho Supreme Court Rules Against Elk Rancher

BOISE (AP) • The state Supreme Court on Friday upheld a 2006 shoot-to-kill order that authorized state game wardens to pursue a herd of domestic elk that escaped from an eastern Idaho hunting farm.

The unanimous decision likely marks the end of former elk rancher Rex Rammell's legal fight that stems from one of Idaho's most colorful wildlife controversies of the last decade.

Rammell had challenged the state's right to shoot a person's private property – in this case, dozens of trophy bull elk that Rammell had been saving for paying hunters before they bolted through a fence at his Chief Joseph elk preserve just west of Yellowstone National

Justices unanimously upheld an earlier 4th District Court ruling, concluding the state was legally authorized to take Rammell's escaped elk. The elk had been on the loose for at least 34 days – well after the seven-day limit that Idaho lawmakers had given elk ranchers to recapture their animals before they could be killed without

liability. "All the requirements of Idaho code... were satisfied in this case, authorizing the State to legally take the Rammells' escaped domestic elk without liability," Justice Jim Jones wrote.

Rammell, now 51, unsuccessfully sought to capitalize on the furor over the case to launch a political career. He lost a 2008 contest for a U.S. Senate seat against then-Gov. Jim Risch, who gave the shoot-to-kill order, and also lost in a 2010 run for governor.

After a third failed politi-

cal bid — he lost a 2012 GOP primary for the state Legislature in Idaho County -Rammell moved Wyoming in June to work as a veterinarian. Efforts to reach him were unsuccessful on Friday.

Risch told The Associated Press he had remained confident all along that the decision he made as governor would be affirmed.

"We worked on the decision for some time and examined all the facts and looked at it from all directions," he said Friday.

Exactly how many elk escaped has never been determined, but the best estimate is about 135 animals. Rammell recaptured 61 animals and hunters killed 43 of them. Thirty-one were never caught, so they or their progeny may still be on the



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Wyoming Tribes Seek Bison

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) • American Indians Wyoming have petitioned the state of Montana to give their tribes a group of bison from Yellowstone National Park whose fate has been in limbo since they were relocated to Ted Turner's ranch more than two years ago.

The request comes amid a push by Interior Secretary Ken Salazar to find more places suitable for bison on public and tribal lands across the West.

Montana Gov. Brian Schweitzer also has sought new habitat for the animals, and earlier this year his office helped engineer the transfer of several dozen bison to Montana's Fort Peck Reservation.

But such efforts have run up against determined opposition from the livestock industry, drawing a lawsuit that resulted in a restraining order against moving more bison.

Leaders of Wyoming's Northern Arapaho and Eastern Shoshone tribes said in a resolution signed this week that bison are an important icon that the tribes can help preserve.

They asked the state of Montana to transfer an unspecified number of the approximately 170 bison held on Turner's Green Ranch near Bozeman to the Wind River Reservation in western Wyoming.

Schweitzer spokeswoman Sarah Elliot said Friday no formal request had yet been

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received from the tribes.

The tribes also sought help from Salazar and requested a consultation with the federal government on how to achieve the tribes' goals.

Yellowstone has a burgeoning population of more than 4,200 bison that periodically spill into surrounding areas of Montana. Thousands of bison have been captured and sent to slaughter in the past two decades to avoid spreading the disease brucellosis to livestock.

The bison on Turner's ranch were spared when they were put into a government quarantine program for several years to ensure they were disease-free. Turner has agreed to take care of the animals for five years. In exchange, he gets 75 percent of their offspring, estimated at 150 animals. The media mogul already had an extensive private bison herd but wanted the Yellowstone animals for their pure genetics.

The animals had been slated to go to the Wind River Reservation several years ago but ended up on Turner's ranch when the tribes' proposal fell through.

"Our ultimate goal is to have a free-roaming heard to some extent that exists on the reservation," said Jason Baldes, a member of the Eastern Shoshone who said he's been working with government agencies and conservation groups to move the animals onto the reservation.

"There are a lot of things to work out, such as management, once we get the buffalo on the ground," Baldes added.

Bison once numbered in the tens of the millions across the West before overhunting in the late 1800s nearly drove them to extinction. Yellowstone has one of the largest remaining wild populations.

Another group of quarantined animals from the park was moved this year to northeast Montana's Fort Peck Indian Reservation. A lawsuit from ranchers, property rights advocates and others concerned about the spread of brucellosis and bison competing for grazing space blocked plans to move some of the animals onto a second reservation. From the Moon to Hanoi

eil Armstrong's passing reminded me of the moment I learned of his historic accomplishment. I didn't gather with my family around the television



to watch him take his "small step" onto the surface of the moon. When the momentous event occurred, I had no idea it was happening. I and several hundred comrades were otherwise engaged — prisoners of war in the enemy's capital, where in 1969, news could travel

Our captors in Hanoi went to considerable lengths to keep us in the dark. They didn't restrict our access to all news but were selective about the information they allowed to reach us. They routinely apprised us of antiwar protests, race riots, assassinations and the like. Reports were usually piped into our cells during Hanoi Hannah's "Voice of Vietnam," an often unintentionally funny, if repetitious, daily broadcast about America's manifold sins and woes.

"American GIs, don't fight in this illegal and immoral war," Hannah would plead, while cheerfully regaling us with victories by the people's liberation forces and the latest evidence that the United States had become a dystopian society.

Like much of the treatment we received in prison, propaganda was intended to discourage us and weaken our will to resist. By portraying America as so beset by turmoil that it had become a different country than we remembered, a country that had forgotten us, our captors hoped to convince us that whether we remained imprisoned or went home, whether we lived or died, were entirely their decisions.

It rarely succeeded, but our morale, if not our will to resist, suffered under our steady diet of grim news. Every morsel of good news we managed to obtain brought immense pleasure. Although we didn't wish for more Americans to be captured, neither did we want to waste a moment before learning what they knew. Newly captured prisoners were probably perplexed to be insistently pressed for uncensored information about the war and home as they struggled to come to grips with their new circumstances. Prison is hell on good manners.

Once in a while, the Vietnamese unwittingly let a little good news slip by. One evening, Hannah played a clip of a speech by a prominent American opponent of the war. It was a quick, throwaway line in a long list of diatribes about the war and the president. But we all caught it. The quote was something like: "President Nixon can put a man on the moon, but he can't end the war in Vietnam."

Yes, that was news to us, arriving years after the successful Apollo 11 mission.

We had all heard President John F. Kennedy commit our country to putting a man on the moon within a decade. Most of us prisoners were pilots, and we admired and envied the pilots who became Mercury, Gemini and Apollo astronauts. Most of all, we wanted our pride in our country, our love for the place where free people reached for the stars, reaffirmed in the place where it had been tested and mocked.

In that one screw-up, that brief mention of glorious news, our morale soared. We felt almost physically strengthened as we communicated with each other in whispers and tap code: "Did you hear that? Did you? We put a man on the moon. My God, we did it."

Many years later, I had the honor of meeting the man who planted that flag. I told him how we had learned what he had done and how much it had meant to us. Armstrong was a brave man who made his countrymen proud, but he was also a modest man with a quiet demeanor, and he seemed moved by the recollection.

I could never pay adequate tribute to how much he had once inspired me, in a place that at times seemed almost as distant from America as the moon.

Rest in peace, Neil Armstrong, and thank you from the bottom of my heart.



Allies Don't Let Allies Breach Embassy Walls

t so happens that this was the week Egypt hosted the biggest U.S. trade delegation ever to tour the Middle East.

On the final day that Egyptian authorities courted 100 senior business executives exploring investment opportunities, a mob overran the U.S. Embassy in Cairo, defacing American flags, painting "bin Laden" on a gate and occupying the grounds for hours. The crowd was angered by a U.S.-produced video mocking the Muslim Prophet Muhammad.

Egyptian President Mohammed Morsi focused his ire on the makers of the video, asking U.S. officials to prosecute them. It took a full day for Morsi to say his government was committed to protecting foreign missions, and that happened only after President Barack Obama described Egypt, which is technically a major non-NATO ally, as neither an ally nor an enemy of the United

Compare that reaction with that of the government in Libya, which responded with alacrity following an attack hours later on the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi, in which four U.S. diplomats, including Ambassador Chris Stevens, were killed. Its leaders pledged to work with the U.S. to track down the killers. The president of Libya's National Congress apologized to the U.S., "if not the whole world," for the atroci-

Morsi had an opportunity, at the start of events, to dampen the risk of trouble spreading. Egypt, after all, aspires to be the political leader of the Middle East. Instead, his too-little, too-late responses left the ground fertile for further unrest, which in fact broke out in Tunisia and in Yemen, where protesters breached the U.S. embassy's security perimeter. Egypt's Muslim Brotherhood, from which Morsi emerged, upped the ante, announcing additional nationwide protests to follow Friday prayers Sept. 14.

Morsi is no longer a leader of a religious movement. As the president of Egypt, he's a statesman, with responsibilities that require him to go beyond pandering to his supporters. They include protecting and respecting as sacrosanct diplomatic missions in Egypt, which have suffered four attacks over the past year.

His job also requires him to ensure the prosperity of his people. Egypt won't rise above its current economic $travails-crippling\,unemployment,\\$ sputtering growth, rapidly depleting reserves — without significant help from abroad. The U.S. alone supplies Egypt \$1.5 billion in annual assistance, has pledged \$1 billion in debt forgiveness and has supported a proposed \$4.8 billion loan from the International Monetary Fund. This is not the kind of largesse the U.S. government extends to a country that isn't truly an ally. Nor are those 100 business execs likely to return home eager to invest in Egyptian enterprises given the callousness of the country's response to the week's events.

Morsi is still new in a job he was scarcely prepared for, and he's shown that he's capable of taking bold stands - for instance when he visited Tehran for the meeting of the Non-Aligned Movement and blasted Syria for the war it is waging against its people. He has time to correct course, and needs to do so, beginning with a clear condemnation of the violence and a declared willingness to stop and punish further such

Egyptians make the argument that though the Muslim Brotherhood is now in charge, Egypt is not the new Iran. A fifth, sixth or seventh embassy transgression could make that case hard to

Bomb Threats Prompt Evacuations

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) • Thousands of people streamed off three college campuses Friday after bomb threats prompted officials to issue evacuation orders for schools in Texas, North Dakota and Ohio.

The campuses of the University of Texas at Austin and North Dakota State University in Fargo had been deemed safe by early afternoon, and authorities were working to determine whether those threats were related. A third evacuation order for much-smaller Hiram College in northeast Ohio was issued hours later and remained in effect Friday evening.

Hiram spokesman Tom Ford said the school had received an emailed bomb threat that it was taking seriously. Crews with bombsniffing dogs were checking all buildings on the campus about 35 miles southeast of Cleveland where about 1,300 students are enrolled, he

The threats on the muchlarger campuses in Texas and North Dakota ended as false alarms after tens of thousands of people followed urgently worded evacuation orders, one of which some worried didn't come fast enough.

Both of those campuses emptied at quick but orderly paces Friday morning, though students acknowledged an air of confusion about what was going on. The threats coming as violent protests outside U.S. embassies in the Middle East also stirred nervous tension among some students, and

Texas officials acknowledged global events were taken into account.

The first threat came around 8:35 a.m. to the University of Texas from a man claiming to belong to al-Qaida, officials said. The caller claimed bombs placed throughout campus would go off in 90 minutes, but administrators waited more than an hour before blaring sirens on the campus of 50,000 students and telling them to immediately "get as far away as possible" in emergency text messages.

Authorities said they started searching buildings for explosives before the alert was issued.

Man Gets 30 Years for Capitol Bomb Plot

WASHINGTON • An Alexandria, Va. man was sentenced to 30 years in prison Friday for plotting a suicide bombing at the U.S. Capitol in Washington using explosives he thought were given to him by al-Qaida.

Amine Mohammed El Khalifi, 29, was arrested in February as he headed toward the Capitol with what he believed were an explosive-laden vest and an automatic weapon. But the material had been made inoperable by undercover FBI

He pleaded guilty to a charge of attempting to blow

up a federal institution.

Khalifi expressed no remorse for the plot as he stood before U.S. District Judge James Cacheris in federal court in Alexandria on Friday. He had a bushy beard and thick glasses.

"I just want to say, 'I love Allah, that's it," Khalifi told the courtroom.

Prosecutors described an evolving terrorist plot that gradually grew in scope as Khalifi worked with the two undercover FBI agents he believed were al-Qaida operatives.

At one point, prosecutors said Khalifi detonated a test explosive at a West Virginia quarry.

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White House Warns of 'Destructive' Budget Cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) • A White House report issued Friday warns that \$109 billion in across-the-board spending cuts at the start of the new year would be "deeply destructive" to the military and core government responsibilities like patrolling U.S. borders and air traffic control.

The report says the automatic cuts, mandated by the failure of last year's congressional deficit "supercommittee" to strike a budget deal, would require an across-the-board cut of 9 percent to most Pentagon programs and 8 percent in many domestic programs. The process of automatic cuts is called sequestration, and the administration has no flexibility in how to distribute the cuts, other than to exempt military personnel and war-fighting accounts.

"Sequestration would be deeply destructive to national security, domestic investments and core government functions," the report

The cuts, combined with the expiration of Bush-era tax cuts at the end of the year, have been dubbed the "fiscal cliff." Economists warn that the one-two punch could drive the economy back into recession.

The across-the-board cuts were devised as part of last summer's budget and dent Barack Obama and Capitol Hill Republicans. They were intended to drive the supercommittee evenly divided between Democrats and Republicans - to strike a compromise. But the panel deadlocked and the warring combatants have spent more time since then blaming each other for the looming cuts than seeking ways to avoid them.

RUPERT • For the first time in eight years, the Burley High student section was still on its feet during the fourth quarter of a Burley-Minico rivalry game.

"We're witnessing the resurrection of Bobcat football," longtime radio voice of the Burley Bobcats Doug Manning broadcasted from the press box.

With 2:32 remaining, Burley quarterback Zander Cook zipped an eight-yard slant pass to Carson Hawker to pull the Bobcats to

within a touchdown. However, Minico's Taylor Seaton - who was the Bobcats' bane all night — recovered the ensuing onside kick and the Spartans ran out the clock and hung on for a 26-20 victory over its Mini-Cas-

Minico (2-1, 1-0 GBC) extended its rivalry winning streak to eight games, but the six points is by far the narrowest margin since Burley last beat Minico in 2004. For the past seven years, the average margin of victory was 35.8 points.

"That's the way it used to be. That was fun," said Minico head coach Tim Perrigot, whose teams are 13-4 against Burley. "(Burley) won some baseball games this summer, their kids believe that they can win. They beat some 3A schools, but they beat them badly. They're a team to reckon with in the Great Basin."

Cheerleaders and fans lined up to congratulate Burley's players after the game, but the Bobcat players weren't in a celebratory mood.

"We didn't get the job done. Nobody is satisfied," said Burley senior Juan Labra. "We came out in the second half and competed with the Great Basin Conference champions, so it says something that we're not going to be walked on in this conference anymore. But we really wanted to win. Losing sucks and we're not going to let this happen again."

Burley's first-year head coach Jed Thomas isn't one for moral

"I told the team, they're going to give you high-fives and say good job competing and making it a good game. No. We need to change the attitude. We're here to win. Close, but no cigar."

Seaton had 122 yards rushing, 62 yards receiving and scored three touchdowns. But the game ball should go to the Spartan offensive line — Jonathan Valero, Brayden Winmill, Josh Barclay, Brett Thompson, T.J. Strunk, Bryce Denker and Garrett Buttram which pummeled Burley's defense to allow Minico's backs to rush for 321 yards.

Burley (2-1, 0-1 Great Basin) had no running game to speak of, as Minico held the Bobcats to minus-1 yard rushing. But the Bobcats found success through the air, as junior quarterback Zander Cook completed 21 of 32 passes for 276 vards and three touchdowns.

As Burley wasn't happy with the loss, Minico players seemed equally displeased with the win, which came much narrower than most anticipated.

"We got too confident. We could have done better," said Minico senior Jonathan Valero. "They

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
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Magic Valley Muslims Condemn Attacks in the Middle East

TWIN FALLS • Magic Valley Muslims say they condemn the recent attacks on the U.S. consulate in Libya, which killed the U.S. ambassador. The violence quickly spread to other embassies in Middle Eastern countries.

"No, no," said Bakhritdin Yusupov, imam of the Twin Falls Islamic Center. "We don't accept that. We try to show Muslim good way, not bad way."

Yusupov said he was saddened at the news, and said that those Muslims who participate in terrorist attacks are not living their religion. Islam, he said, is about peace, not hate and terror.

A film called "Innocence of Muslims," which denigrates Islam and portrays the Prophet Muhammad as a fraud, womanizer and child molester, sparked the violence on Wednesday.

"We Muslims condemn the movie made to underestimate the Prophet Mohammed," wrote Naser Buhendi Shahin, a Muslim who posted on the Times-News' Facebook page. But, Shahin continued, Muslims also condemn the killing of U.S. Ambassador

Chris Stevens. True Islamic followers try to be polite and kind to everyone, Yusupov said, whether they're Muslim or not.

A Christian Realist's View of Politics

everal years evangelical author Jim Wallis declared, "God is not a Re-



publican ... or a Democrat," thereby drawing ire from both parties. Some believe that faith has nothing to say about politics, while other Americans see a divine mandate to establish a Christian theocracy in America. I invite the reader to explore a third position, that of the Christian Realist.

The Christian Realist is first a Christian, one who believes in Jesus and in his saving work. She pledges allegiance to God's kingdom, one that is "not of this world." God's reign is accomplished not through the mechanisms of this world: military power and might, destruction or political maneuverings, but through the self-sacrificial love of Christ and those (of any and no faith) who live in a similar manner.

Further, the Christian Realist acknowledges individual and institutional sinfulness. We recognize that without God's grace all human efforts fall short of Kingdom promises. The Christian Realist rejects the inevitability of social evolution and the triumph of rational decision-making because of the intrinsic nature of

What is crucial for the political process is the realization that while individual ethical behavior is a struggle, it is virtually impossible for a society to act selflessly, rationally or nobly. As a Christian realist, the believer understands that no political party, no organization, however noble, offers salvation. The prayer of Reinhold Niebuhr summarizes the Christian Realist's approach to all things temporal:

Nothing that is worth doing can be achieved in our lifetime; therefore, we must be saved by hope. Nothing which is true or beautiful or good makes complete sense in any immediate context of history; therefore, we must be saved by faith. Nothing we do, however virtuous, could be accomplished alone; therefore, we must be saved by love. No virtuous act is quite as virtuous from the standpoint of our friend or foe as it is from our own standpoint; therefore, we must be saved by the final form of love, which is forgiveness.

Relevant magazine (for young people desiring a relationship with Christ) reflects a Christian Realist perspective in its "Seven Things Christians Need to Remember about Politics." To summarize: hope in God, not humans or our institutions; love one another across the political spectrum; forgive one another as God has forgiven us and have faith not in any party's platform but in the sovereign hand of God. A prescription for peace and sanity to replace rhetoric and

After four years of planning, saving and hard work, Eastside Baptist Church dedicates its new meeting house.

TWIN FALLS • As music rang out, voices and hands lifted each of them praising God.

Smiles came easily to the congregants' faces. After all, it's not every Sunday they get to dedicate a new building.

Eastside Baptist Church on Sept. 9 dedicated its new 6,000-square-foot meeting house, which it started in late 2008. The building replaces a former annex the church burned down that year, and it will accommodate up to 400 people compared with the 125person capacity of the old building that sits just north of the meeting house.

The 80-member congregation has been in the new building since June.

Before Sunday's official dedication service, associate pastor John Martinez greeted people as they came inside.

"Welcome," he said, a smile lighting his face. "It's good to see you."

Andrew Vawser of Kimberly has attended the church for about nine months and said everyone has been welcoming and friendly. He and his wife once attended a different church but became disenchanted and wanted something else.

"I first read some of the sermons online and liked what the pastor was teaching," Vawser said. He was happy about the new building, saying it will serve the church well as it continues to grow.

The city granted the church a temporary permit, giving it a three-year delay to

complete the project with the condition that two things happen in that time: The church must have its water retention in place by October 2013, and it must pave the parking lot and install curbing by June 2015. Thompson said the church also plans to landscape the grounds.

The parking lot alone is estimated at \$80,000, he said.

One thing that still needs to be done inside is the flooring. But Thompson said members might just have to get used to

concrete for a while because of the expense of the parking lot.

Eastside will use the meeting house - a name, Thompson said, that fits its intended community purpose - mainly as a worship hall, though others are invited to use it too.

The building includes a worship hall, a kitchen, a nursery and restrooms.

"It's been great," Thompson said. "We like it a lot. It's been a long time in coming and we're glad to be in it now."

Thompson said the congregation isn't sure what to do with the existing structure, which was built in 1972, but it has at least three years to think about it. For now, it'll be used as church offices.

Jaylee Mead, NASA Astronomer Dies at 83

WASHINGTON • Jaylee Mead, a NASA astronomer who married into a paper manufacturing fortune and with her husband, Gilbert, helped transform Washington's cultural scene by donating more than \$50 million to local theaters, died Sept. 14 at her home in Washington. She

Her death, from congestive heart failure, was confirmed by her sister Mary Watts.

For decades Gilbert and Jaylee Mead lived in Greenbelt, Md., and worked in relative obscurity at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center, he as a geophysicist and she as an astronomer. They came, in some ways, from different universes. Gilbert was an heir to the riches of Consolidated Papers in Wisconsin one of the largest papermakers in North America while Jaylee was the daughter of a general store owner in rural North Carolina.

The two scientists met through an amateur Broadway troupe for Goddard employees, found a kinship in their love of the theater and married in 1968. In the late 1980s, after years of quiet patronage of local playhouses, the Meads established themselves as two of the most generous arts philanthropists in

the capital. Gilbert Mead died in 2007, three years before the opening of the couple's most dramatic project: the fully renovated Arena Stage in Washington, renamed the Arena Stage at the Mead

Center for American Theater in recognition of the couple's \$35 million in gifts and matching pledges.

The Arena Stage project was a fitting capstone for the Meads' decades of philanthropic work. Founded in 1950, the company was created during a national movement to cultivate regional theater across the United

The Meads' contributions to cultural life in Washington are often compared to those of Arlene and Robert Kogod, who built the courtyard connecting the National Portrait Gallery and the American Art Museum, and Victoria and Roger Sant, who gave millions of dollars to organizations including the Smithsonian Institution and the National Symphony Or-

Barbara Jaylee Montague was born June 14, 1929, near Clayton, N.C., southeast of Raleigh.

Encouraged by her parents and teachers to pursue higher education, she received a bachelor's degree in mathematics from what is now the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 1951 and a master's degree in education from Stanford University in

In 1959, she was working for the State Department in Washington when she was recruited by NASA. At Georgetown University, where she received a doctorate in astronomy in 1970, she studied with the celebrated astronomer Vera Rubin

Larry Gibson, West Virgina Mountain Activist, Dies at Age 66

Larry Gibson, an unlikely activist who fought West Virginia's powerful coal interests to preserve a mountain that had been his family's home for generations, died Sept. 9 at a hospital in Charleston, W.Va. He had a heart attack while working at his family's property on Kayford Mountain in Raleigh County, W.Va., his daughter, Victoria Gibson, said. He was 66.

Gibson was best known for his tireless and often courageous opposition to a mining practice called mountaintop removal. After being away from West Virginia for many years, he returned to Kayford Mountain in 1986 and dis-

covered a landscape that was beginning to change beyond recognition. By the 1990s, his family's 54 acres were the only patch of green remaining near Kayford Mountain.

"Just a stone's throw away, on that mountaintop removal mining site," he said, "you couldn't find anything alive if you wanted to. It's bare rock, uninhabitable."

He established the Keeper of the Mountains Foundation, testified before the United Nations and spoke at colleges throughout the country, in-

cluding Virginia Tech and Yale. "I've never met a braver man," said Rob Perks, who ran a campaign against mountaintop removal at the Natural Resources Defense Council

Peter Lougheed, Who Shaped Modern Alberta, Dies at 84

Peter Lougheed, the former premier of Alberta who helped transform the Canadian province into one of the world's largest exporters of oil and natural gas, has died. He was 84.

Lougheed, the 10th premier of Alberta, died Thursday from natural causes, according to a statement from his family.

Lougheed became premier in 1971 as leader of the Progressive Conservative party, leading the province until 1985. During his tenure, he revamped rules to encourage fossil fuel exploration and production and had a stand-off with then Prime Minister

Pierre Trudeau over the country's energy policy.

"Peter Lougheed saw an Alberta that was on the cusp of something remarkable," Premier Alison Redford said in a June 6 speech in Calgary. "Where others looked at the oil sands and saw no prospect of commercial success, Premier Lougheed saw potential."

The Harvard business school graduate and former player for the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League was chosen by

30 Canadian historians, political scientists, economists and journalists as the country's best premier over the past four decades.

Art Emerges from Solyndra's Bankruptcy

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) • A small building tucked in the hills of Northern California shines with an unusual green glow from hundreds of glass tubes jutting out from one side toward nearby bushes.

Inside, the dark wooden shed contains an undulating wall filled with the translucent rods, each like a 3-foot-long drinking straw, sucking in a cool breeze and the rushing sounds from a nearby water-

The work of experimental architecture is called the SOL Grotto — and Republicans are making fun of it as a symbol of a \$528 million federal boondoggle, calling it the most expensive art project ever built.

The newly opened installation owes its 1,368 distinctive glass rods, and its name, to Solyndra — the failed solar company that received a hefty sum in federal loans before going bankrupt and becoming a favorite target for critics of President Barack Obama's energy policy.

When the Fremont-based solar company went under, it left behind millions of 39inch glass tubes custommade for its signature solar

Husband and wife design partners Ronald Rael and Virginia San Fratello got the rods from a storage company that ended up stuck with thousands of pallets of them and created the installation in the Botanical Garden at the University of California, Berkeley.

"We thought they glowed so beautifully, we had to use them in the grotto," said San

"These materials, instead of being disposed of, are being reused and recycled in a fantastic way," she added.

Like Solyndra, the installation has become an object of ridicule for critics, especially with the presidential election only months away.

The Republican-controlled House Energy and Commerce Committee put out a news release titled, "UC Berkeley's Solyndra Artwork Would Shatter Record for World's Most Expensive Piece."

Three years ago, the federal government made a \$528 million loan guarantee to Solyndra as part of a stimulus program to promote renewable energy and create "green

In the spring of 2010, President Obama visited the company's newly built Silicon Valley campus, praising Solyndra for "leading the way toward a brighter and more prosperous

Then 15 months later, it filed for bankruptcy protection and laid off 1,100 work-

"What we have here is a very expensive monument to failure," said Jeff Wald, a Republican Party official in Alameda County, standing outside the shuttered Solyndra building.

"It's disheartening to see the government wasting so much money," he said.

Attorneys for Solyndra did not respond to a request for comment Thursday.

Obama administration officials say the decision to give Solyndra a loan guarantee was not political. They say cheap imports from China, the collapse of the European market for solar panels and other economic changes doomed the California firm.

In a party-line vote Friday, House Republicans pushed through legislation that would phase out federal loan guarantees such as the one Solyndra received. Democrats call the "No More Solyndras Act" an election-year stunt.

Wis. Judge **Strikes Down Law Limiting Union Rights**

MADISON, Wis. (AP) • A Wisconsin judge on Friday struck down nearly all of the state law championed by Gov. Scott Walker that effectively ended collective bargaining rights for most public

Walker's administration immediately vowed to appeal, while unions, which have vigorously fought the law, declared victory. But what the ruling meant for existing public contracts was murky: Unions claimed the ruling meant they could negotiate again, but Walker could seek to keep the law in effect while the legal drama plays out.

The law, a crowning achievement for Walker that made him a national conservative star, took away nearly all collective bargaining rights from most workers and has been in effect for more than a year.

Dane County Circuit Judge Juan Colas ruled that the law violates both the state and U.S. Constitution and is null and void.

In his 27-page ruling, the judge said sections of the law "single out and encumber the rights of those employees who choose union membership and representation solely because of that association and therefore infringe upon the rights of free speech and association guaranteed by both the Wisconsin and United States Constitutions."

Colas also said the law violates the equal protection clause by creating separate classes of workers who are treated differently and unequally.

The ruling applies to all local public workers affected by the law, including teachers and city and county government.

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Superbug Kills 7th

WASHINGTON • A deadly, drug-resistant superbug outbreak that began last summer at the National Institutes of Health Clinical Center claimed its seventh victim Sept. 7, when a seriously ill boy from Minnesota succumbed to a bloodstream infection, officials said Friday.

The boy was the 19th patient at the research hospital to contract an antibiotic-resistant strain of the bacterium Klebsiella pneumoniae that arrived in August 2011 with a New York woman who needed a lung transplant. But his case marked the first new infection of this superbug at NIH since January a worrisome signal that the bug persists inside the huge brickand-glass federal facility in Bethesda, Md.

"It's heartbreaking," said John Gallin, the physician-researcher who directs the clinical center. "What happened this summer was a very unfortunate case. All of these cases are hugely sad cases."

The boy arrived in Bethesda in April after complications arose from a bone marrow transplant he received last year. His underlying condition a severe genetic defect that crippled his immune system increased his risk of acquiring the superbug, as did the steroids and other drugs the boy was given to combat complications from transplant.

This deal was declared by John Crawford, a great American player of the early postwar years. I've substituted an auction that might occur today. After an opening call of two no-trump, it is common to play transfers at both the three- and four-level. The Texas transfer at the four-level is either to play or to be followed by Blackwood, while a transfer and raise is a mild slam-try.

Against four spades West led the heart two and Crawford took East's heart king with the ace. Next he played the spade king, followed by the spade jack to dummy's ace. Then came a heart to the nine and 10. West now shifted to clubs, declarer capturing East's 10 with his ace.

Crawford next played the heart jack from his hand and discarded dummy's club jack when West covered this with the queen. West did his best by exiting with a club, which was ruffed in dummy. Now the spade five to the queen allowed Crawford to eliminate the club suit by ruffing the club in dummy. Finally came a diamond to the 10, and when West won with the queen, he then had either to lead a diamond or concede a ruff-and-discard. Either way, Crawford had his 10th trick.

It is hard to criticize West unduly, but a black-suit lead would have seen four spades fail since declarer does not have the timing right for the endplay on West.
