of those grade levels were able to write essays that were well developed, organized and had proper lan-
guage and grammar -24 percent were considered proficient, 3 percent advanced. The remainder showed just partial mastery of these skills. is first-draft writing," said Mary is first-draft writing," said Mary
Crovo, deputy executive director of the National Assessment Governing Board, which administers the Nation's Report Card tests. "They did have some time to edit, but it wasn't extensive editing."
Students who took the writing test in 2011 had an advantage that
previous test takers did not: comprevious test takers did not: comsaurus. Previously, young people taking the National Assessment of Educational Progress writing test had to use pencil and paper; the switch was made in line with changes in technology and a need
for today's students to write across electronic formats.
Because this was the first version
of the computerized test, the board of the computerized test, the board cautioned against comparing the esults to previous exams. In 2007, some 33 percent of eighth-grade students scored at the proficient skills, as did 24 percent at grade 12 . Crovo said most students already use such technology as spell-check on a daily basis. Without those tools, she said, "It's as if years ago we had given them a pencil to write the say and took away the eraser." alone wouldn't result in significantly better writing scores if students didn't have the core skills of being able to organize ideas and present them in a clear and grammatical fashion. Still, students in both grades who
used the thesaurus and the backused the thesaurus and the backspace key more frequently had higher scores often. Students who scored below the 25th percentile were less likely to have computers at home: 87 percent said they did, compared to 99 percent were in the top quarter. The technology gap was hinted at
in other statistics as well: The lowin other statistics as well: The low-
est scorers reported less daily computer use for school assignments, and 44 percent fewer said they always used a computer to make changes to papers or reports. Mark Warschauer, an education professor at the University of California, Irvine, said research consis-
tently shows the use of computers in the classroom improves writing performance. He said students end up writing more, getting more feedback from peers and teachers and publishing more, all of which keeps them motivated.
"It just improves every aspect of The latesttestresultsmake argument for more use of technology in English language programs at school, Warschauer said, as home access is more uneven. The results at both grade levels showed a continuing achievement gap between white, black, Hispanic
and Asian students. At the eighth grade, Asian students had the highest average score, which was 33 points higher than black students on a 300 -point scale. At the 12th grade, white students scored 27 oints above black students.
There was also a gender gap,
with girls scoring 20 points higher with girls scoring 20 points higher
on average than boys in the eighth grade and 14 points higher in 12th grade. Those who qualified for free and reduced price lunch, a key indicator of poverty, had lower scores than those who did not;

## More Violence Explodes at Protests of Anti-Muslim Film

CAIRO (AP) • Fury over an anti-Islam film spread across the Muslim world Friday, with deadly clashes near and Sudan and Sudan, an American
fast-food restaurant set ablaze in Lebanon, and international peacekeepers attacked in the Sinai despite an appeal for calm from Egypt's Islamist president.
President Barack Obama said Washington would
"stand fast" against attacks on U.S. embassies around the
world. He spoke at a somber ceremony paying tribute to four Americans - including U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens - killed earlier this week when the U.S. Con-
sulate in Benghazi, Libya, was sulate in Benghazi, Libya, was
stormed by militants who may have used protests of the anti-Muslim film to stage an assault on the 11th anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist tacks.
In addition to countries where protests have oc-
curred, U.S. embassies

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## From the Moon to Hanoi

Neil Armstrong's
passing reminded me of the moment I learned of his historic accomplishment. I did
 n't gather with my fami to watch him take his "small step" onto the surface of the moon. When the momentous event occurred, I had no idea it was happening. I and several hundred comrades were otherwise engaged - prisoners of war in
the enemy's capital, where in 1969, news could travel the enemy's capital, where in 1969, news could travel slowly.
Our captors in Hanoi went to considerable lengths to all news but were selective about the information the allowed to reach us. They routinely apprised us of anti war protests, race riots, assassinations and the like. Reports were usually piped into our cells during Hanoi Hannah's "Voice of Vietnam," an often unintentionally funny, if repetitious, daily broadcast about America's "American woes,
"American GIs, don't fight in this illegal and imgaling us with victories by the people's liberation forces and the latest evidence that the United States had become a dystopian society.
Like much of the treatment we received in prison, propaganda was intended to discourage us and weaken turmoil that it had become a different country than we remembered, a country that had forgotten us, our cap tors hoped to convince us that whether we remained imprisoned or went home, whether we lived or died,
were entirely their decisions.
It rarely succeeded, but our morale, if not our will to
resist, suffered under resist, suffered under our steady diet of grim news. Every morsel of good news we managed to obtain
brought immense pleasure. Although we didn't wish for more Americans to be captured, neither did we want to waste a moment before learning what they knew. Newly captured prisoners were probably perplexed to be insistently pressed for uncensored information about the war and home as they struggled to come to grips with their new circumstances. Prison is hell on good manners
Once in a while, the Vietnamese unwittingly let a lit clip of a speech by a Ono evening, Hannah played a clip of a speech by a prominent American opponent of
the war. It was a quick, throwaway line in a long list of diatribes about the war and the president. But we all caught it. The quote was something like: "President Nixon can put a man on the moon, but he can't end the war in Vietnam."
Yes, that was news to us, arriving years after the suc We had all heard Prion. our country to putting a man on th. Kennedy commit decade. Most of us prisoners were pilots, and we admired and envied the pilots who became Mercury, Gemini and Apollo astronauts. Most of all, we wanted our pride in our country, our love for the place where place where it had been tested and mocked.
In that one screw-up, that brief mention of glorious news, our morale soared. We felt almost physically strengthened as we communicated with each other in whispers and tap code: "Did you hear that? Did you? We put a man on the moon. My God, we did it.' Many years later, I had the honor of meeting the learned what he had done and how much it had mean to us. Armstrong was a brave man who made his countrymen proud, but he was also a modest man with a quiet demeanor, and he seemed moved by the recollection.
I could never pay adequate tribute to how much he had once inspired me, in a place that at times seemed almost as distant from America as the moon.

On the final day that Egyptian au-
thorities courted 100 senior busines executives exploring investment opportunities, a mob overran the U.S.Em bassy in Cairo, defacing American flags, painting "bin Laden" on a gate and occupying the grounds for hours. The crowd was angered by aU.S.-produce Muhammad.
Egyptian President Mohammed Morsi focused his ire on the makers of the video, asking U.S. officials to prose cute them. It took a full day for Morsi to say his government was committed to protecting foreign missions, and that Obama described Egypt, which is tech nically a major non-NATO ally, as neither an ally nor an enemy of the United States.

Compare that reaction with that of the government in Libya, which responded with alacrity following an atin Benghazi, in which four U.S. diplo-
mats, including Ambassador Chris Stevens, were killed. Its leaders pledged killers. The president of Libya's Nakillers. The president of Libya's Na -
tional Congress apologized to the U.S., "if not the whole world" for the atroci"if no
ty.

Morsi had an opportunity, at the start of events, to dampen the risk of trouble spreading. Egypt, after all, aspires to be Insteaditical leader of the Middle East Instead, his too- little, too-late responses left the ground fertile for fur Tunnisia and in Yemen, where protesters breached the U.S. embassy's security perimeter. Egypt's Muslim Brotherhood, from which Morsi emerged, upped the ante, announcing additional nationwide protests to follow Friday prayers Sept. 14.
Morsi is no longer aleader of a religious movement. As the president of Egypt, he's a statesman, with responsi-
bilities that require him to go beyond pandering to his supporters. They include protecting and respecting as sacrosanct diplomatic missions in Egypt, which have suffered four attacks over the past year.
His job also requires him to ensure won't rise above its current economic
travails - crippling unemployment, sputtering growth, rapidly depleting re serves - without significant help from abroad. The U.S. alone supplies Egypt $\$ 1.5$ billion in annual assistance, has pledged $\$ 1$ billion in debt forgiveness and has supported a proposed $\$ 4.8$ biltary Fund. This is not the kind of largesse the U.S. government extends to a country that isn't truly an ally. Nor are those 100 business execs likely to return home eager to invest in Egyptian ente prises given the callousness of the country's response to the week's events. scarcely prepared for, and he's sho that he's capable of taking bold stands - for instance when he visited Tehran for the meeting of the Non- Aligned Movement and blasted Syria for the war it is waging against its people. Wis.Judge Strikes Down LawLimiting UnionRights

## MADISON, Wis. (AP) •

 A Wisconsin judge on Friday struck down nearly all of the state law champi-oned by Gov. Scott Walker that effectively ended collective bargaining rights for most public
workers.
Walker's administration immediately vowed to appeal, while unions, which have vigorously fought the law, declared victory. But what the ruling meant for
existing public contracts was murky: Unions claimed the ruling meant they could negotiate again, but Walker could seek to keep the law in effect while the legal drama plays out.
The law, a crowning that made him a national conservative star, took away nearly all collective bargaining rights from most workers and has been in effect for more than a year.
Dane County Circuit
Judge Juan Colas ruled that the law violates both the state and U.S. Constitution and is null and void. In his 27-page ruling, the judge said sections of the law "single out and encumber the rights of
those employees who choose union membership and representation solely because of that association and therefore infringe upon the rights of free speech and associa-
tion guaranteed by both tion guaranteed by both
the Wisconsin and United States Constitutions." Colas also said the law violates the equal protection clause by creating separate classes of workers
who are treated differently who are treated and unequally.
The ruling applies to all local public workers affected by the law, includ-
ing teachers and city and county government.

Now the spade five to the queen al lowed Crawford to eliminate the club suit by ruffing the club in dummy. Finally came a diamond to the 10 , and when West won with the queen, he then had either to lead a diamond or concede a ruff-and-discard. Either way, Crawford had his 10th trick.

It is hard to criticize West unduly, but a black-suit lead would have seen four spades fail since declarer does not have the timing right for the endplay on West.
