Manslaughter Case from ATV Crash Delayed

GOODING • Hearings in a Gooding County vehicular manslaughter case have been delayed.

In late August, Shane Jeffery Haile, 25, was charged with vehicular manslaughter and driving a vehicle without the owner's consent, causing more than \$1,000 damage. The charges stem from an all-terrain vehicle crash that killed Blanton McGee, 27, of Hailey.

A preliminary hearing in the case is now scheduled for Oct. 18.

On Aug. 26 at about 1:50 a.m., Gooding County sheriff's deputies responded to a canal — Buckeye Ditch — at the end of Orchard Street West in Hagerman.

According to the deputies' report, upon their arrival, medical personnel were performing CPR on McGee and Haile was sitting in the ditch on the driver's side of the vehicle, a maroon Polaris Razor. According to the report, the driver's side seat was no longer in place and the windshield was detached.

The report states McGee was partially ejected on the passenger side and part of his body was under the frame of the Razor.

Neighbors who responded to the crash before emergency workers arrived later described to deputies how they held McGee's head above the water and attempted to get him out from under the vehicle.

In the report, deputies describe Haile as not being helpful, telling them he was driving 500 mph and, when asked how many people were in the vehicle when it crashed,

BLUE LAKES REPAIRS CONTINUE

TWIN FALLS • One lane will be closed in the 1200 block of Blue Lakes Boulevard North this morning as repairs on a gas line continue.

The line broke Tuesday afternoon at the site of a former Oasis Stop 'N Go gas station, said city of Twin Falls spokesman Joshua Palmer.

"It could take some time to repair it and test it to make sure the repair is safe," Palmer said. Commuters may want to con-

tinue to avoid Blue Lakes this morning as the right-hand northbound lane, next to the valve for the gas line, will be closed during the repairs.

Construction workers apparently struck a gas line in the course of their work. They called the incident in to emergency dispatchers at 1:35 p.m. Tuesday, Palmer said.

The valve was shut off and workers started to repair the line

at about 2:40 p.m. Crews from Intermountain Gas, the Twin Falls fire department and Twin Falls police were on the scene.

Blue Lakes was down to one lane in each direction for about an hour for safety reasons, Palmer said.

Crosswinds added to the danger, he said. Palmer said gas officials told him the wind causes more oxygen to mix

MORE THAN 12,000 IDAHOANS ARE ELIGIBLE FOR MORTGAGE SETTLEMENT

TWIN FALLS • More than 12,000 Idaho borrowers who lost their homes to foreclosure between 2008 and 2011 are eligible for payments under the National Mortgage Settlement.

In February, Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden joined in a \$25 billion nationwide settlement with some national banks. The banks — Ally/GMAC, Citi, JPMorgan Chase and Wells Fargo — are the largest servicers of mortgage loans in the nation, according to a news release from the attorney general's office.

Postcards were mailed recently to more than 2 million borrowers. The Idaho packet will include a letter from Wasden, a claim form and instructions on how to apply for payment. Packets were mailed to 2,687 Idahoans. The minimum amount borrowers will receive is \$840.

To receive a payment, borrowers must return their claim form to the administrator (or apply online) before Jan. 13, 2013.

"This payment is not intended to compensate Idahoans for the loss of their homes," Wasden said. "Rather, it is a step toward accountability for unfair business practices that harmed Idaho homeowners."

Lessons for Legislators

TWIN FALLS • Brian Dobbs' College of Southern Idaho sociology class was more full than usual Tuesday morning.

Dobbs and his students spent part of their class answering questions from Idaho lawmakers, who are in the Magic Valley for the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee fall interim tour. On the tour, committee members got to see the result of legislative decisions they've made in recent years.

The committee, which is charged with setting the state's budget, visited Cassia Regional Technical Center in Burley on Monday and the College of Southern Idaho on Tuesday. As legis-

lators toured the facilities, they peeked into classrooms and talked to teachers about the curriculum, which includes nursing, drafting and automotive.

In one class, Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, asked the students if they planned to attend college or go straight into the workforce.

"We're going to college," said sophomore Monique Naraonjo.

In Dobbs' sociology class, legislators asked about Idaho Education Network, which allows rural high school students to take college classes through video conferencing. On Tuesday, students from Hagerman, Garden Valley and Grace high schools were linked in, giving legislators a

Gooding Wants Water System Overhaul

GOODING • The city of Gooding will hold a public hearing today at 7 p.m. to take citizen testimony about a \$7 to \$9 million water system improvement project.

Mayor Duke Morton said the upgrade is needed because pipe is rotting in the current water delivery system, sediment has risen so high that water has trouble moving, and water has flooded some residential basements.

He called the present system "antiquated and useless."

However, Gooding resident Jo Ann Doerr said in an email to the *Times-News* that she opposes the move because it will significantly raise water rates. She also contends that trees throughout the city will die from lack of water and that the decision has been without public input.

"This is a decision made by a few and not put to a vote by the people of the city of Gooding," Doerr wrote.

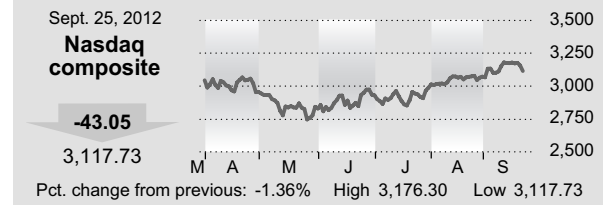
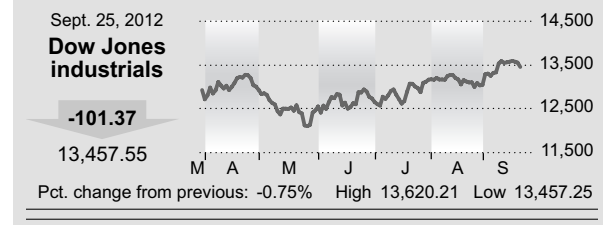
Morton acknowledges the new system will double the cost of water rates. That's because water users will have to repay the loan covering the

Cat Survives Euthanasia, Worker Loses Job

WEST VALLEY CITY, Utah (AP) • A woman who worked at West Valley Animal Shelter has claimed she was wrongfully fired after news broke about a cat surviving two euthanasia attempts.

Karen Bird filed a lawsuit Monday in U.S. District Court saying her employers retaliated because they believed she leaked the story of Andrea the Cat last fall.

West Valley City Manager Wayne Pyle said the city hadn't yet been served with the lawsuit, but he denied the allegation that Bird's firing was motivated solely by the cat incident.

"While Karen's termination came shortly after the case of 'Andrea the Cat's' failed euthanizing attempt, Karen's disciplinary history with the city pre-dated this incident for a period extending many months," Pyle said in a statement.

Pyle said Bird's work history included insubordination and failure to be courteous to fellow employees.

Andrea hadn't been adopted after 30 days in the city's shelter when workers tried to euthanize her last October. When they opened the carbon monoxide chamber, they found the black-and-white cat was still alive.

They put her back in the chamber and then transferred her to a cooler, assuming she was dead.

A worker who later checked the cooler found the cat had a low body temperature and had vomited and defecated, but survived.

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Idaho Woman Charged for Drawing Stick Figure Threats

BOISE (AP) • A woman who was about to be released from an Idaho prison will stay behind bars a while longer because federal prosecutors say she mailed a threatening stick figure drawing to a relative.

Linda Joyce Lakes was serving time at the Pocatello Women's Correctional Center on probation violations stemming from a 2007 grand theft sentence, and she was scheduled to be released last Friday. But earlier this month, the U.S. attorney's office charged her with mailing threatening communications, a felony.

Prosecutors say that in 2010, Lakes mailed a drawing that apparently de-

icted a battered stick figure alongside threatening phrases such as "No tears," "No hiding," and "No more you."

Kyle Wright, an FBI agent in Pocatello who investigated the case, described the drawing in a court document.

"One stick figure appeared to be lying down with his face smashed. The baseball bat was lying nearby with damage that appeared to be consistent with its use on the first stick figure. The second stick figure appeared to be walking away with a smile," Wright wrote.

Wright also said in his affidavit that Lakes sent a letter with the drawing that indicated her prison sentence was coming to an end and that the recipient should be prepared for his final moments.

Athletes Get Kids Excited about Reading

TWIN FALLS • Students watched closely as College of Southern Idaho men's basketball players took turns dunking balls into the hoop in the I.B. Perrine Elementary School gym.

Each time, the students cheered and clapped.

"As you can see, we have some pretty good basketball players up here, don't we?" Principal Bill Brulotte asked the students.

"Yeah," they yelled.

CSI athletes took time Tuesday to visit schools around the Magic Valley. The goal: to get students excited about reading.

The college's "Read like an Eagle" program kicked off with afternoon assemblies at 11 Twin Falls, Jerome and Hagerman elementary schools.

It's the third year of the semesterlong reading pro-

gram. Interested in having your school participate in the Read Like an Eagle program? It's not too late. For information, call Jason Vickrey at 732-6482.

Jason Vickrey, CSI's coordinator of marketing and athletic promotions, told the *Times-News* that the program has expanded over the past few years to include more schools.

"We started with just seven in Twin Falls and it's just grown and grown," he said.

Assemblies to kick off the reading programs at other schools — such as Kimberly and Hansen — will happen in the next few weeks.

For the "Read Like an Eagle" program, teachers set reading goals for each student this semester.

Each student will receive a general admission ticket

for a CSI athletic event. Once they finish a book, their teacher signs the ticket and it becomes valid.

Students can earn multiple tickets depending on how many books they read.

Those who meet their reading goal by the end of the semester will receive a T-shirt.

If they wear it to a "Read Like an Eagle" honorary basketball game Jan. 19, 26 or Feb. 9, they'll be recognized on court.

Last year, more than 5,000 elementary students completed the program.

CSI head men's basketball coach Steve Gosar told Perrine Elementary students Tuesday that it's ex-

citing when they come to basketball games.

The energy they bring, he said, is a "game changer."

"I don't think we've lost a game on a 'Read Like an Eagle' night," Gosar said, telling students not to let the team down.

"We're counting on you guys to read books," he said.

Before a slam dunk contest, Gosar and six athletes talked to students about their favorite childhood books. They got students' attention with some familiar titles.

Billy Reader from Lake Oswego, Ore., said he loved the "Goosebumps" book series.

"Anyone read those?" he asked. Nearly all the students raised their hand.

Kareem Storey from Baltimore, Md., said he liked Dr. Seuss' "Green Eggs and Ham."

"It's just a great book," he said.

Gusty Winds Push Deadly California Fire

CAMPO, Calif. (AP) • A fire that burned 11 homes and killed an elderly man who refused to evacuate was smoldering in rural San Diego County on Tuesday, but gusty afternoon winds could push it back to life, authorities said.

Nearly 1,000 firefighters planned an all-out effort to surround the blaze, which continued to threaten nearly a dozen homes and 14 outbuildings in the rural community of Tierra del Sol near the U.S.-Mexican border, said fire spokesman Andy Menshek.

Residents of two other small communities were allowed to return home earlier.

An evacuation order was lifted Tuesday afternoon for about 80 residents.

"That is the one remaining evacuated area," Menshek said. "That's our highest priority today ... we have propane tanks, downed power lines and a lot of hotspots to mop up." The fire, which has

burned nearly 4 1/2 square miles of hilly brush land since Sunday, was 55 percent contained.

Although no active flame was showing, winds began picking up Tuesday morning and gusts of up to 40 mph could hit in the afternoon, Menshek said.

"If we get one ember over the line, the fire could take off," he said.

On Monday, the body of an elderly man was retrieved from a burned home in Tierra del Sol. Neighbors reported the man missing when they saw his only vehicle parked at the home, authorities said.

San Diego County coroner's officials said Tuesday the man is believed to be a 69-year-old resident but they still haven't identified the victim and have yet to perform an examination.

Neighbors had previously told U-T San Diego that the man was 82 and had one leg.

Reverse 911 calls notifying homeowners of the

evacuation order were made by the county sheriff's department. Neighbors said the man decided to remain.

"He felt that he was going to be OK if he stayed," sheriff's Lt. Rose Kurupas told the newspaper.

"He chose to stay and that's sad," Menshek said. "That's why we issue these evacuations."

Other blazes in the West remained active, blanketing some communities in eastern Washington state with smoke. The air quality in many Wenatchee and Cashmere areas was deemed either "hazardous" or "unhealthy" by state officials.

Authorities there updated the sizes of two of the state's largest fires after more accurate mapping and burnouts to create fire lines, officials said. The

Wenatchee complex of fires was reported at 82 square miles, while the Table Mountain fire had burned nearly 57 square miles.

Crews also gained ground on a 5 1/2-square-mile fire in Montana's Musselshell County, allowing residents to return to about 50 homes southeast of Roundup. That blaze was human-caused and under investigation.

Senate Candidate's Campaign Rally Derailed by Bad Advice

MOSCOW (AP) • An Idaho Senate candidate appears to have gotten some bad advice when he was told to move his news conference from the sidewalk in front of a set of state offices in Moscow.

Republican candidate Gresham Bouma planned to hold the news conference Monday in front of a building leased by the Idaho Department of Labor and the Department of Health and Welfare. Bouma is seeking a Senate seat in northern Idaho's District 5, and he chose the spot because it fit with his plans to talk about job creation and the economy.

But before the event began, the building's owner Rick Beebe told Bouma and a handful of supporters to find another location, the *Lewiston Tribune* reported Tuesday.

Beebe said a Health and Welfare employee contacted him as Bouma supporters were setting up and suggested state rules ban politically themed events on the property.

But Idaho Chief Deputy Secretary of State Tim Hurst said he's "not aware of anything in state law that prohibits" such events.

"We have rallies on the Capitol steps all the time," Hurst said. He added legal precedent says the state can limit political activity to designated areas on property it owns or leases, but it can't prohibit such activity outright.

After being informed of the rules, Beebe stuck by

his decision and said he would have told Bouma and his entourage to leave anyway out of respect for the privacy of the clients served by the two state offices, the newspaper reported.

"I think it's rude," Beebe said, noting the Bouma campaign was filming the event and that members of the media were invited.

"The clients are two separate entities: people who are unemployed and people on welfare," Beebe said. "I've never been either one of those, but I don't think I'd want people taking pictures of me. I just don't think that's very nice."

In a statement, Bouma spokesman Judd Wilson said the campaign filmed only those who were involved with the news conference, and gave advance notice of the event to the Department of Labor office and a small business on the same property.

"They made no objections," Wilson said.

Tom Shanahan, a spokesman for the Health and Welfare Department in Boise, said the manager of the Moscow office asked Beebe to remove the group because of privacy concerns.

"But the main concern of our office manager was the privacy and confidentiality of people who come there for services," Shanahan said, adding the office also serves people with mental health issues. "We're just trying to be sensitive to their privacy."

Find Replacement Before Repealing Personal Property Tax

"It's about growth in Idaho."

That's a quote from Nathan Lyda, president-elect of the Idaho Association of Realtors. He's talking about repealing personal property tax, a tax businesses pay on movable property like desks, office supplies, clothing racks, bookshelves, art and machinery. It's a source of income for local taxing districts. Last year, for instance, the city of Twin Falls generated about \$950,000 from the tax – 6 percent of its property tax collection.

Businesses don't like it. Spending money tracking the ebb and flow of office supplies just to be taxed seems counterproductive. In fact, the Realtors' Association called it "the most hated tax in the state by those who pay it" in 2008.

"Our association feels that it is a barrier to economic development," Lyda said during a recent interview with the *Times-News*.

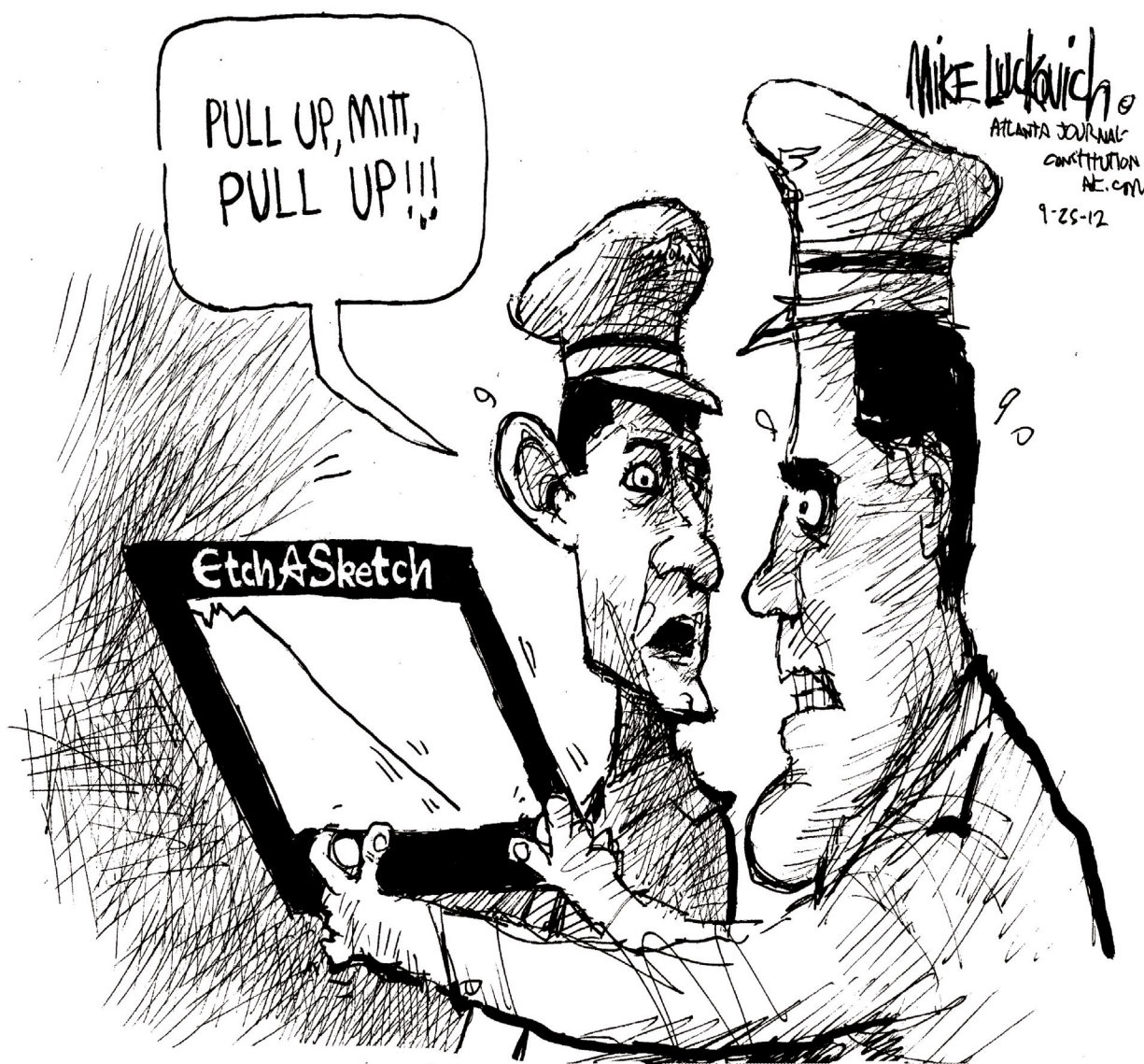
We hear that argument often. Businesses like to claim that certain taxes or fees impede development. In cases like these, it's best to look at the numbers.

Is Idaho's economy struggling to grow? Census data show otherwise.

From 2000-2010, private, non-farm employment grew 8.2 percent. Compared to the nation as a whole, which saw private employment shrink by 1.8 percent, Idaho is attracting employers just fine. Twin Falls County did even better, increasing private, non-farm employment by 11.4 percent.

We think this proves Idaho's tax policy already does its part in attracting new businesses. Meanwhile, local governments – our firefighters, police, schools and roads – continue to struggle financially. When Chobani opens, the personal property tax is expected to generate \$1.2 million for Twin Falls.

Are we willing to sacrifice these so businesses – already flocking to Idaho's expanding economy – can pay fewer taxes? We don't think so. We agree that tracking property can be a challenge for businesses, but let's come up with an alternative revenue source before repealing the personal property tax.

backhoe operator discovered that the line in use is an ancient piece of milled redwood. Apparently, it's part of an old private water system, which the city of Ketchum bought out decades ago. In addition, there seems to be a dispute as to who is responsible for repairing the line.

Being an old water boy myself, I've seen situations like this before and predict that the city will be ultimately held responsible for the repair. And with old man winter right around the next corner, it would be nice to have this redwood line patched soon, restoring a more normal pressure to our municipal water of life in that vicinity; as well as getting the mish-mash of hoses out of the way to make snow-throwing possible.

I think that the best thing that could flow out of this leaky line would be if the repair workers could carefully cut and salvage a small section of the redwood pipe and donate it to the Ketchum Museum. As one local newspaper editor observed, "This kind of thing really captures people's imaginations."

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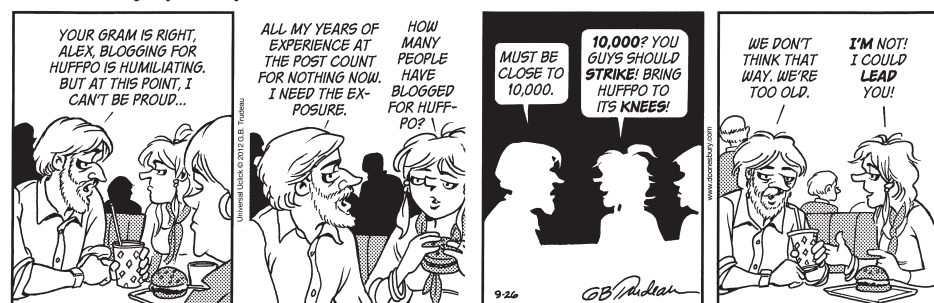

Burley Student is Finalist for FFA Title

BURLEY • Burley High School graduate Slade Beck heard a calling to be a farmer early in life. Next month, he'll travel to the FFA National Convention as one of four students seeking a National FFA Proficiency Award.

Beck will attend the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis the week of Oct. 22 to compete in the 2012 National FFA Proficiency Awards, where he'll go through a series of interviews.

"Slade's one of those kids who was driven early enough, found direction and allowed himself to be successful without being distracted," said Lex Godfrey, agricultural instructor at Burley High School. "Even before my time here, Dr. (Gaylen) Smyer was the ag teacher here. And he developed a tradition and set a standard of excellence that we've been able to continue."

Slade is the son of Bart and Danene Beck.

Beck submitted his sugar beet project in the state FFA special crop production competition, where he was named a national finalist.

Other winners of the state FFA Agricultural Proficiency Awards included Burley students Carson Lott, who took a gold award, Dakota Searle, silver and Mauro Analco, bronze.

"I'm not really nervous about going to nationals," Beck said. "I was really shocked and I think it's really a privilege to go."

Beck said for his project he grew

sugar beets under a youth contract for the Snake River Sugar Company.

Beck said his father owns and operates a 1,200 acre sugar beet

farm 13 miles west of Burley.

"I like everything about farming and I've been influenced by it my entire life," Beck said.

Beck said his future plans include

servicing a mission for his church, pursuing a college degree in business and automotive technology and getting married and raising a family.

In the next 10 years, he'd like to own and operate his own farm.

"The way of life and working the land will always hold a place in my heart," Beck wrote in his project notes. "I also have the heart of a motor head. There is no better sound than that of a finely tuned engine and to be the one who tunes that engine is definitely a dream of mine also."

Godfrey said the agricultural department at the school has a large board containing the names of many state and national winners.

"And Slade continues that tradition," Godfrey said. "It's rewarding to both the community and to those able to receive recognition for what we consider a lifestyle here."

Godfrey said it's rewarding as a teacher to see students find a passion and work to achieve it.

"Slade has worked hard. He's set himself on a course for excellence and achievement," Godfrey said. "The kids here in this community have a lot of opportunities. If students will discipline themselves enough to make proper use of their time and the resources around them they can go anywhere and do anything."

Bloody Machete Led to Lake Oswego Arrest

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)

• A Lake Oswego man died in his wife's arms in the couple's driveway after the two returned home from a morning walk and interrupted a burglar, who attacked the man with a machete, newly released documents show.

Fingerprints on the bloody machete led investigators to connect Erik Meiser, a white supremacist with a long criminal history, to the killing, according to an affidavit seeking an arrest warrant.

Meiser was arrested after a five-day manhunt, but the court documents indicate he escaped a brush with the law hours after the attack.

Detective Eric Lee of the Clackamas County sheriff's office said in the affidavit the machete was found in a driveway next to the home where 57-year-old Fritz Hayes died last week.

Medical Pot Crackdown Spreads to LA

LOS ANGELES (AP) •

Nearly a year after federal prosecutors started targeting California medical marijuana shops, they took their fight to Los Angeles on Tuesday after city officials struggled to halt a proliferation of dispensaries.

The U.S. attorney's office sued three property owners that house pot collectives and sent warning letters to 68 others as they enforce a federal law that doesn't recognize a California initiative that legalized pot for medicinal use.

The move came as the city's own ban on pot shops is being challenged and could be overturned by voters if a referendum is placed on an upcoming ballot.

"As today's operations make clear, the sale and distribution of marijuana violates federal law, and we intend to enforce the law," U.S. Attorney Andre Birotte Jr. said. "Even those stores not targeted today should understand that they cannot continue to profit in violation of the law."

California's four U.S. attorneys pledged last Octo-

ber to curb pot collectives they said were running afoul of the law by raking in huge sums of money and serving as fronts for drug traffickers. Proponents argue the dispensaries are

protected by California law that allows medicinal use of marijuana with a doctor's recommendation.

David Welch, an attorney representing some of the Los Angeles collectives tar-

geted by federal authorities, said he plans to file a lawsuit.

"I expected this to happen and we have planned

for this contingency," Welch said. "The future is a lot less certain considering what seems to be a full press by the federal government."

answering "enough."

A neighbor who was one of the first people on the scene described Haile as in shock and "all jumbled up."

Haile was removed from the canal on a sled and rope system by medical personnel. According to the report, he had a head laceration, two

broken kneecaps and a broken vertebra in his back.

In the report, a deputy stated he smelled alcohol on Haile's breath.

Both Haile and McGee were taken to North Canyon Medical Center in Gooding. McGee was later taken by air ambulance to Saint Alphonse Regional Medical Center in Boise where he died from his injuries.

According to the report,

Haile and McGee left a party in Hagerman and took the Razor, which belongs to the party's host, without permission.

In an interview with a deputy the night of the crash, Haile allegedly said he and McGee went to a bar and were trying to go back to the party before the crash.

At different points in the night, Haile allegedly both admitted to and denied being the driver in the crash, the

report states.

During the interview, a deputy talked to Haile about making mistakes.

"And I made one hard tonight," Haile allegedly said during the conversation, the report states.

After he was well enough, Haile was arrested on the charges and placed in the Gooding County Jail on \$5,000 bond. He has since been released on bond.

project — with a 1 percent interest rate — over an as-yet-undetermined number of years.

"We know it will cause a problem for some because rates will go up," he said. "It is painful. But you have to maintain your infrastructure. It's not a choice."

Morton added that citizens have had chances to attend three previous town hall meetings on the topic, including two in recent weeks.

"It's about as transparent as it gets," he said. "We have presented our position to the community. They understand what we are doing and

why we have to do it."

The mayor doesn't expect any trees to die, saying, "The trees will get water."

The city is pursuing project approval through judicial confirmation, Morton said, which bypasses a public vote in favor of seeking a judge's permission for the long-term debt. He said the formal application for judicial confirmation has not been filed yet, although he said Gooding City Council members have voted to pursue that arrangement. The context or timing of the vote was not immediately clear Tuesday.

The final price tag depends on the cost of drilling a backup city well as required by the Idaho Department of Environmental

Quality, which would provide the loan.

The backup well is needed to maintain water flow in case the primary pump goes down, Morton said. That's critical for the fire department, hospital, Idaho School for the Deaf and the Blind, and other organizations, he said.

Morton said it will be cheaper to build a new water system than revamp the existing one. He estimated the cost of the latter at \$14 million.

The city convened a citizen committee of volunteers to work with engineers to explore other options. Morton said "they grilled our public works director" and did their homework regarding the aquifer

and other details.

"They came up with the same option we did," Morton said. "They requested we make sure to do lots of public information about what we are doing, so we are following through with that."

He called the 1 percent loan "a fantastic rate."

The schedule calls for design work to be done next spring, with construction starting during the summer. He anticipates it taking two years to finish the project. In the meantime, water rates will remain the same, Morton said.

About 70 people attended the first town hall meeting and 50 were at each of the next two sessions, Morton said.

with the gas, making it more dangerous.

Employees from Inter-mountain Gas tested the air in the street and at nearby businesses on Tuesday afternoon.

Gas levels in the air stayed safe, but if they had reached dangerous levels

Neither became necessary and the air nearby was never dangerous to breathe, he said.

chance to see how the system worked in real time. Legislators were especially concerned with the quality of the connections.

Until this year, IEN was funded by stimulus and grant money. Budget analysts estimate the ongoing costs of the program to be about \$3 million per year, if the Legislature chooses to fund it.

During the tours, the legislators took time to ask students what they thought of the different programs offered.

Students spoke highly of Idaho Education Network, preferring it to online

classes offered by Idaho Digital Learning Academy.

"If I had questions or something, I wouldn't be able to ask my teacher right then and there," said Harlee Nevarez, who is attending her second semester at College of Southern Idaho.

After the tours, Heider said the interim tours help legislators get a realistic picture of the needs of the state and think of budget decisions as more than just dollars.

Earlier this year, the committee visited University of Idaho in Moscow, helping them understand the school's needs for occupancy costs.

"That's the whole reason we do this tour," Heider said.

McGee to Be Released Early

BOISE (AP) • Former Republican Sen. John McGee is due to get out of jail Saturday, five days before his originally-scheduled release date because jailers say he's behaved while behind bars.

McGee, from Caldwell, was sentenced to at least 44 days in jail on Aug. 21 after pleading guilty to charges linked to allegations of sexual harassment levied against him by a female state Senate staffer.

But Ada County Sheriff Gary Raney's office wrote to 4th District Court Magistrate James Cawthon earlier this month, requesting McGee be released early from the facility in Boise. Cawthon agreed to commute a portion of McGee's sentence for disturbing the peace, a misdemeanor.

"While an inmate in the Ada County Jail, he had a good record and performed all assigned tasks in an orderly and peaceable manner," wrote Chief Deputy Ada County Sheriff Ron Freeman.

Idaho prison inmates must serve fixed sentences and haven't received "good time" credit since the 1980s.

But state law allows those serving time in county jails like McGee to have their detention reduced by five days for every month of their sentence, upon request of the local sheriff.

McGee's treatment isn't

out of the ordinary.

Andrea Dearden, a spokeswoman for the Ada County Sheriff's Department, said it's not uncommon for inmates who comport themselves appropriately while incarcerated to win an early release.

"We do about 30 to 40 a month," she said Tuesday. "It's a behavioral management tool we use for all of our misdemeanor inmates without any disciplinary problems. McGee had none.

That's a requirement for them to be eligible for this time reduction."

When the 39-year-old McGee exits jail, his life will have changed considerably since he ascended to majority caucus chairman the No. 4 Senate post in 2011.

For instance, McGee still must fulfill terms of a separate probation-violation conviction, in which Cawthon in August gave him the option of performing county

labor duties.

An email message to McGee's attorney, Scott McKay, on Tuesday wasn't immediately returned.

Nampa Schools Chief Resigns over Budget Shortfall

NAMPA (AP) • The head of the Nampa School District has tendered his resignation about a month after officials disclosed a \$2.8 million shortfall stemming from budgeting errors.

The Nampa School Board was scheduled to meet Tuesday night to discuss Superintendent Gary Larsen's resignation letter, which he submitted Monday.

Portions of the meeting concerning Larsen's resignation will not be open to the public, school board trustee Dale Wheeler said.

"The board will have to discuss whether to accept his resignation," said Wheeler, who called the unexpected departure "devastating."

Larsen's resignation is connected with the district's financial problem, which may be worse than initially thought, said district spokeswoman Allison Westfall. District leaders disclosed the shortfall in August.

"The scope is still being determined," Westfall told the *Idaho Press-Tribune* in an email. "The board will discuss Tuesday whether to seek an independent auditor."

Larsen was hired 18 years ago, at a time when the district was struggling. He faced a challenge in improving the academic progress of Nampa schools and used proven, research-based methods.

Lake Trout Gives Fisherman the Finger

A fisherman cleaning a large lake trout he caught at Priest Lake found a human finger inside.

Detectives were able to get a fingerprint off the severed digit and track it back to the owner: a 31-year-old wakeboarder who lost four fingers from his left hand during an accident on the lake more than two months earlier.

On Sept. 11, Nolan Calvin reported that while fishing on the west side of Priest Lake, he caught a large lake trout, the Bonner County Sheriff's Office said.

Calvin began to clean the fish and discovered what he believed to be a human finger

inside the fish. He put the finger on ice and reported the incident to the sheriff's office.

Detectives confirmed the finger was human and discovered there was sufficient ridge detail to obtain a latent fingerprint. Detectives began to search for a possible victim.

Detectives learned that on July 21, a wakeboarding accident off Kalispell Island involved Hans A. Galassi, 31, who lost four fingers from his left hand during the accident. The fingers hadn't been recovered.

Detectives were able to find a fingerprint card for Galassi and a tentative identification was made and confirmed by the Idaho State Police Forensic Services Laboratory in Meridian, Idaho.

SCHOOL DISTRICT PULLS BOOK AFTER COMPLAINT

NAMPA (AP) • A school district in southwestern Idaho is removing the book "Like Water for Chocolate" from a ninth grade curriculum after some parents complained about passages including descriptions of sexual encounters.

The *Idaho Press-Tribune* reported Nampa School Board Chairman Scott Kido received 15 emails Sunday about the book by Mexican author Laura Esquivel. Kido says he agreed the book seemed inappropriate and it

will be pulled.

Parent who complained called the novel a "vile piece of work" with "an immense amount of pornography."

Esquivel shot to fame in the late 1980s with the book, which has been translated from the original Spanish into numerous languages. The passionate tale of unrequited love became an international best seller and later one of the highest-grossing foreign films ever released in the United States.

Immigration Requests Strain Consulates, Schools

SAN DIEGO (AP) • Schools in Yakima, Wash., are taking nearly a month to deliver transcripts to former students. The Mexican consulate in Denver introduced Saturday hours last month after passport applications spiked by one-third. San Diego public schools added five employees in a new office to handle records requests.

Schools and consulates have been flooded with requests for documents after President Barack Obama announced a new program allowing young people living in the country illegally to apply for two-year renewable work permits. Up to 1.7 million people may qualify, which would be the broadest stroke to bring illegal immigrants out of the shadows in more than 25 years. Ap-

plicants — some eager to get in line before November's presidential elections — are finding they may have to wait a few weeks longer for a prize that has eluded them for years.

The clamor for documents is an early sign that the policy is highly popular. The Obama administration said this month that it approved the first 29 applications among more than 82,000 received since it began accepting requests Aug. 15.

The Mexican consulate in Los Angeles issued 17,444 passports and consular identification cards in August, up 63 percent from the same period last year, said Consul General David Figueroa, who attributes the entire increase to the new policy. The wait for a passport appointment at the largest Mexican consulate grew

from one or two days to 40 days last month, then fell to 30 days after the consulate hired five employees to handle the increased workload, opened its main office on Saturdays and extended hours at satellite offices to seven days a week from five.

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services recently clarified expectations, relieving applicants who worried they would need exhaustive proof of their whereabouts. Eligible applicants must have come to the U.S. before they turned 16, be 30 or younger, be high school graduates or in college, or have served in the military, and they cannot have serious criminal records. They also must have lived in the country since June 2007.

The new guidelines, issued Sept. 14, say applicants should provide as

much evidence "as reasonably possible" that they stayed in the U.S. — ideally for every year — but they don't have to account for every day of the last five years.

The government also reassured employers who were nervous about providing evidence they hired an illegal immigrant. Documents will not be used against employers unless they committed "egregious violations of criminal statutes or widespread abuses."

Laura Lichter, a Denver attorney and president of the American Immigration Lawyers Association, said the new guidelines alleviated many concerns for applicants.

"I have to compliment (the government) for doing an excellent job of getting good, solid information

out there," said Lichter, adding that she rarely praises the authorities.

Rep. Lamar Smith, chairman of the House Judiciary Committee and a critic of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals policy, called the latest changes an example of how the Obama administration "routinely puts illegal immigrants first at the expense of the American people."

"Administration officials intentionally made these guidelines vague enough so that potentially millions of illegal immigrants can qualify. And now the administration has revised their guidelines to be specific enough to protect unscrupulous employers from facing legal action for knowingly hiring illegal immigrants that have applied for the amnesty program," he said.

Corps Let Off the Hook for Katrina Flooding

NEW ORLEANS (AP) • A surprise ruling by a federal appeals court that lets the Army Corps of Engineers off the hook for paying compensation for Hurricane Katrina's catastrophic flooding isn't going over well on the streets of New Orleans.

People in southern Louisiana have long taken for granted that the flooding in the wake of the 2005 storm was a manmade disaster — one caused specifically by the corps — and they have wanted the agency to pay up for lost homes and property.

But on Monday, a three-judge panel of the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals reversed its earlier opinion and shot down the only argument that had succeeded so far in holding the corps accountable. The ruling also could make it extremely difficult to force the government to pay damages for future mishaps.

In March, the appellate court panel upheld a 2009 ruling by U.S. District Judge Stanwood Duval that

had found the corps liable for the flooding of New Orleans' Lower 9th Ward neighborhood and St. Bernard Parish because the agency failed to properly maintain a shipping channel. That channel, dug in the 1960s, funneled Katrina's storm surge into the city. Thousands of homes were destroyed, about 1,400 people died in the flood and much of the city was left under water.

Then on Monday, the same panel did a legal backflip and said its new ruling "completely insulates the government from liability," leaving lawyers and residents baffled.

"There are certain criteria where the federal government can be sued, and I think the levee breaches is a perfect example because the Corps of Engineers is the one that developed the levee system," said Alvin Alexis, 62, who had two female cousins die in the flood.

His home was flooded, and he moved his family across the Mississippi River to an area he considers safer. Because he was a renter, he said he got only \$10,000 in federal aid.

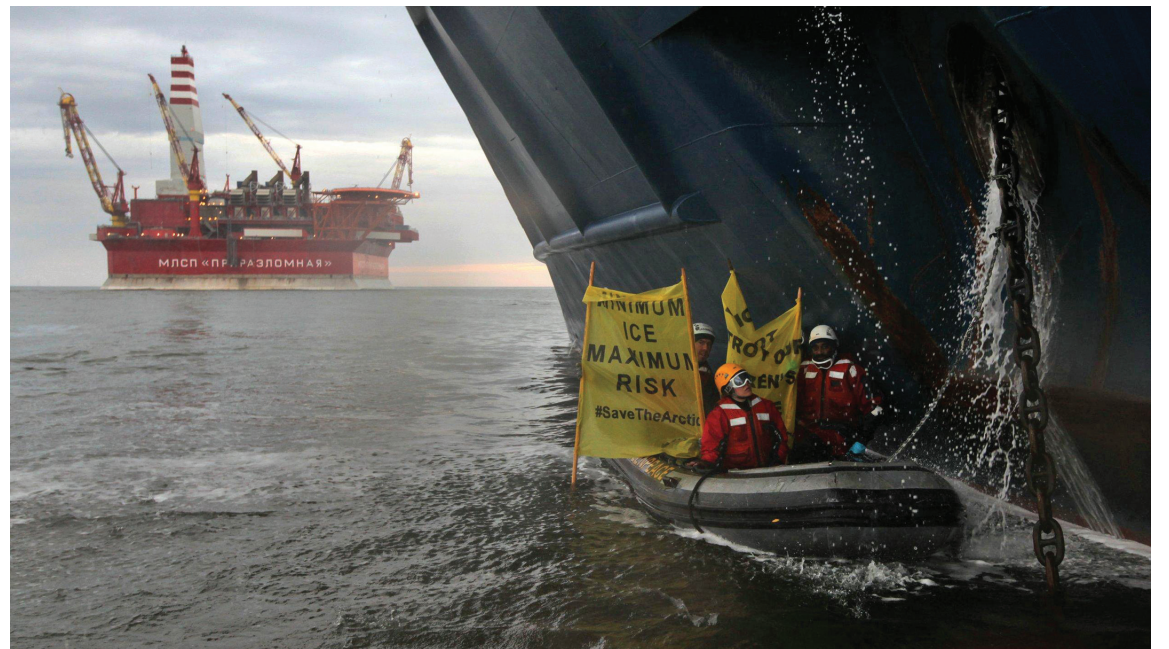
In the Lower 9th Ward, one of the areas hit hardest by Katrina, restaurant owner Henry Holmes said he was disappointed. He said he has struggled to keep his restaurant open in an area that is now a mere shell of what it was before the storm.

"I feel like somebody should be held liable," Holmes said.

Despite the tens of billions of dollars in reconstruction money spent so far in New Orleans, some 500,000 people, businesses and government agencies have sought additional compensation by filing claims against the corps.

But federal laws grant the corps extensive immunity against flood-related lawsuits and give the government lots of leeway in how agencies conduct their business.

The small army of lawyers fighting the corps over Katrina have long lamented how difficult it is to take on the federal government, a fact reinforced by Monday's ruling.

Arctic Oil Nears Soviet Toxic Waste

The Kara Sea, a body of Arctic waters so remote that the Soviet Union used it as an atomic waste dump for more than 25 years, has become the focus of an environmental battle that oil companies are preparing to win.

Exxon Mobil and its Russian partner Rosneft are taking steps to drill near the ocean-floor wasteland, eager to plumb an Arctic region estimated to hold enough crude to supply the world for five

years. They've sidestepped environmental groups' calls for a clean-up prior to exploration of the area off Russia's northern coast where Soviet ships dumped worn-out reactors and 17,000 containers of radioactive waste.

"All ecological and nature protection norms are being followed at the same time," Rustam Kazharov, a spokesman at Rosneft, said by email. The Moscow-based company is preparing for exploration based on Russian law and "the best world practices available." Exxon and Ros-

neft this month agreed to start designing a platform to drill in the sea's shallow waters.

Politicians, including a group of British legislators, and ecologists have urged a ban on oil and gas exploration to protect the region from the risk of spills.

Greenpeace has campaigned against Arctic drilling by Royal Dutch Shell in Alaska, Cairn Energy in Greenland and Gazprom in Russia. The activist group will oppose drilling in the sea regardless of the published findings.

MISRATA, Libya (AP) • One of the young Libyan rebels credited with capturing Moammar Gadhafi in a dramatic ditch nearly a year ago died Tuesday of injuries after being kidnapped, beaten and slashed by the late dictator's supporters — the latest victim of persist-

ent violence and instability in the North African country.

The death of Omran Shaaban, who was hospitalized in France, raised the prospect of even more violent score-settling, with the newly elected National Congress authorizing police and the army to use force if

necessary to apprehend those who abducted the 22-year-old and three companions in July near the town of Bani Walid. Libya is battling lingering pockets of support for the old regime, and its government has been unable to rein in armed militias.

Shaaban was praised as a

"dutiful martyr" by the National Congress, although his family says he never received a promised reward of \$800,000 for capturing Gadhafi on Oct. 20, 2011, in the former leader's hometown of Sirte. The eccentric dictator was killed later that day by revolutionary fighters.

Kent Hale

Dec. 1, 1920-Sept. 22, 2012

OAKLEY • Long-time Oakley resident Kent Hale passed away Saturday, Sept. 22, 2012.

Kent was born Dec. 1, 1920, in Oakley to Rosel H. and Jane R. Hale. His grandfather, Solomon E. Hale, was an early settler in the Oakley Valley. Kent spent the vast majority of his life in Oakley, where he received his primary education from the local schools. His childhood was filled with equal portions of Tom Sawyer-like adventure and mischief along with serious study and working on his family's small farm. After completing his Oakley education, he went on to study at Utah State Agricultural College (now known as Utah State University) and Brigham Young University, where he majored in landscape architecture which eventually led to his becoming a stone mason.

Kent joined the Army Air Corps and served in Europe during World War II as a radio man and belly gunner on a B-26 Marauder. Sometimes called the most dangerous plane ever built, the B-26 bomber had short, stubby wings and a landing speed of 130 mph, unheard of in its era. It had several nicknames, including Widow Maker, The Flying Coffin, B-Dash-Crash, and some other not so family friendly ones.

At the conclusion of his military service, he returned to Oakley and began his career in the building stone industry. Kent was one of the first to open stone quarry claims in the mountains south of Oakley. He continued to hone his skills as a stone mason doing stonework in Oakley and the surrounding communities. As Kent was building the base of the flag pole that stands in front of the courthouse in Burley, he met Helen Warwood who worked in the hardware store across the street. They married and quickly started a family. After brief stints living in other communities in Utah and Idaho, Kent returned to Oakley in 1966 with his family, which was then comprised of his wife, Helen, and three



sons. He continued to sell Oakley stone and do stonework.

Kent has given countless hours of service to his community. He was a Boy Scout leader; he founded Historic Oakley, built numerous monuments and served on the Oakley Museum Board. Kent was a popular emcee for numerous

U.S. BESTOWS HUMAN RIGHTS HONOR ON BELARUSIAN

WARSAW, Poland (AP) • U.S. officials have bestowed a human rights award on an imprisoned Belarusian activist, honoring his work and that of others struggling for democracy in the autocratic ex-Soviet state.

The U.S. Ambassador to Poland, Lee Feinstein, presented the State Department's 2011 Human Rights Defenders Award on Tuesday to the wife of Ales Belyatsky, who is in prison in Belarus.

Belyatsky, one of Belarus' leading human rights defenders, was convicted of tax evasion last November and sentenced to 4 1/2 years in prison, an act that U.S. and European officials have criticized and described as a punishment for his democracy struggle.

Feinstein said the award is meant to let Belyatsky know he has Washington's support, and it also "helps the regime to know that we are paying attention."

Plight of 2 Baby Gorillas Raises Fears in Congo

KINSHASA, Congo (AP) • The plight of two infant gorillas, rescued after being kidnapped from their wild families, highlights the dangers confronting the endangered Grauer's gorillas that have become victims of ongoing violence and a new rebellion in eastern Congo.

A decision to allow oil exploration in a national park there may put the gorillas at greater risk. Virunga National Park said Monday that wildlife authorities rescued two baby gorillas in the space of a week this month.

"Baby gorilla trafficking is terribly damaging for endangered gorilla populations because many members of the gorilla's family will probably have been killed to obtain the infant," said the park's director, Emmanuel de Merode.

Fighting between rival militia groups is making it impossible for wildlife authorities to find out how many of the Grauer's gorillas have been killed. Grauer's, also known as eastern lowland gorillas, exist only in

eastern Congo. Experts estimate that fewer than 4,000 remain, down from about 17,000 in 1995, de Merode said in a statement.

He said the first baby gorilla, a 9-month-old female now named Isangi, was brought to wildlife authorities Sept. 13 by a community conservation group that said it had rescued the infant from a local militia group called Raiya Mutomboko, which means Angry People in Swahili.

On Sept. 20, rangers and local officials acting on a tip-off carried out a sting operation and rescued a 4-month-old female who has been named Baraka, which means Blessing in Swahili. Baraka's captors claimed to have rescued the infant gorilla from the Walikale area where several armed groups compete for control of mines.

The two infant gorillas are being cared for in sanctuary at Virunga that is home to three mountain gorilla orphans whose parents were killed in the park in 2007.

Veteran AP Reporter Mary Foster Dies at 68

NEW ORLEANS (AP) • Mary Foster, a veteran Associated Press reporter who wrote about everything from New Orleans' love affair with food, Mardi Gras and Saints football to Hurricane Katrina, died Monday. She was 68.

Foster died at her New Orleans home from complications of cancer that was diagnosed earlier this year, according to her sister, Rosalie Foster. She had returned home on Friday after receiving treatment in Little Rock, Ark.

"Mary lived a large life and her work was infused with her love of Louisiana's people and their stories," said Kathleen Carroll, the AP's executive editor. "The stars over New Orleans are dimmer now that she is gone."

Foster joined the AP's New Orleans bureau in 1988 after working at newspapers and for television and radio stations. Foster started covering Louisiana sports for AP in 1992 at a time when few female journalists were covering professional sports. A single mom, she often brought her two sons on assignment with her and put them to work helping to gather quotes at New Orleans Saints and LSU games.

Her first-born, Foster Klug — whose name is a combination of his mother's maiden name and the last name of

her former husband — is now an AP news editor based in Seoul, South Korea. He said interviewing 300-pound linemen was a great way of overcoming any fears of approaching strangers for an interview.

"She was very, very proud of her work. She really did love talking to people and telling their stories," Foster Klug said.

Her fellow journalists called her a tough competitor who never shrank from tough interviews or personalities. Longtime Times-Picayune sports columnist Peter Finney said Foster scored plenty of scoops during her time on the sports beat.

After Katrina struck in August 2005, Foster reported from the Superdome as floodwaters stranded thousands of residents there for days without food or water. Kent Prince, AP's news editor in New Orleans from 1970 to 2006, said Foster was the "consummate street reporter" who did some of her best work while she was trapped at the Superdome.

News editor Brian Schwaner recalled her as always wanting to be "in" on the big story. "She was extremely competitive. She'd go on the street to report from the middle of a hurricane, or sweet-talk her way around tough country sheriffs to get a slice of a crime story no one had," he said.

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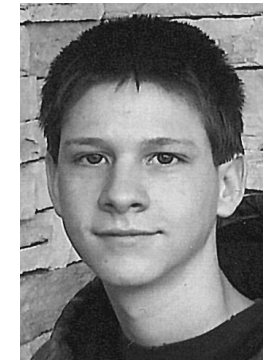

Sophie's Carrot Cake with Cream Cheese Frosting

1 cup vegetable oil
1 1/2 cups sugar
3 fresh farm eggs
1 pound carrots, cleaned and grated
1 can crushed pineapple, drained
1/2 cup walnuts
1 3/4 cups organic whole-wheat flour
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
1 1/4 teaspoons nutmeg
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 1/4 teaspoons baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt

For the frosting:

8 ounces cream cheese, softened
2 1/2 tablespoons softened butter
1/3 cup powdered sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour a 9-by-13-inch baking pan. Cream oil, sugar and eggs. Add carrots, pineapple and walnuts. Sift together then fold in flour, cinnamon, nutmeg, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Pour batter into pan. Bake until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, about 40 minutes.

To make frosting: Cream together cream cheese and butter. Beat in sifted powdered sugar. Frost cake when it is completely cooled. Sprinkle with extra walnuts if desired.

Sophie's Cream of Vegetable Soup

7 tablespoons butter, divided
1/2 cup flour
1 1/2 cups half and half or heavy cream (Waters loves the cream)
1 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped celery
2/3 cup chopped carrots
2/3 cup sliced portobello mushrooms
2/3 cup broccoli
1/3 cup chopped fennel
1 teaspoon fresh minced garlic
1 tablespoon dried basil or 2-3 tablespoons fresh chopped basil
1 tablespoon dried thyme or 2 tablespoons fresh chopped thyme
3 1/2 cups chicken stock
1/4 cup dry white wine
Salt and ground white pepper to taste

To make roux, melt 3 1/2 tablespoons butter in small saucepan. Stir in flour until well blended. Cook over low heat, stirring often, for 3 to 5 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside.

Meanwhile, heat half and half or heavy cream in microwave or over low heat.

Melt remaining 3 1/2 tablespoons butter in soup pot; add vegetables, garlic, basil and thyme and cook until almost tender, stirring often.

Add stock, bring to a simmer and whisk in roux until liquid is smooth. Whisk in warm milk mixture in 2 or 3 installments. Add wine, simmer 10 minutes. Season to taste with salt and white pepper.

Serve with an earthy bread such as seven-grain and your favorite glass of wine.

The Farmhouse Restaurant, run by 34 employees, has been owned by Stephanie Otero for the past four years.

Otero started working here 12 years ago, busing tables. She didn't apply for the job. Otero was just lending a helping hand to a friend who worked there; the owner saw her and offered her a job. Over the years she has been cashier, waitress and now owner.

"I've been here since I was 18 and never left," Otero said.

The restaurant has been a mainstay for homestyle meals for more than 30 years. It also features a small store selling Idaho souvenirs and a coffee shop with a drive-up window to order coffee and to pick up to-go orders from the kitchen.

"My favorite thing is interacting with people and getting to socialize with the travelers," Heitzman said. "I also love my crew."

For 10 years, Heitzman has worked as a waitress in Wendell and in Oregon. She graduated from Portland State University with a

Moseley is from Jerome but doesn't mind driving the 10 miles, especially on Sundays.

"There's no place to eat in Jerome on Sundays," he said. Moseley smiled and chat-

ted with Heitzman as she checked to see if he needed anything else. After his meal he walked slowly out the door. He would be back in two days.

Heitzman said there are about five regular coffee customers — or "adopted grandpas," as she calls them. She enjoys their visits when they come in for coffee or the daily special.

At the Farmhouse, the daily specials are well-known in the area, just like the Basque bread — a thick slice of white bread that can be served as toast or French toast. Otero said it's like Texas Toast but way better.

Kitchen manager Joe Napples, who sat at a table taking a short break, is responsible for cooking the specials. His specialties include Wednesday-night pot roast and Friday's beer-battered halibut.

"I make 60 percent of the soups from scratch, nothing out of the package for the soups," Napples said.

He also got his start in the restaurant business at a young age. He was 11 when

The Gin Gin Mule Tastes like Vacation

A trinket, photos, memories — what travelers bring back from vacation varies as widely as the travels. Sometimes, an unforgettable wine prompts a purchase of a bottle to relive the moment back home. Or maybe it's a cheese to smuggle in.

In our case, it was a drink happened upon in Canada — a cocktail that turned out to have migrated from the U.S.

Passing through London, Ontario, on our annual trip to lake country farther north and east, we overnighted at the Idlewyld Inn, a converted mansion whose handsome late-1800s facade welcomed after a long drive. Drinks on its generous veranda overlooking the garden popping with color after a heavy late afternoon rain seemed the perfect way to unwind.

We weren't expecting much beyond the basics in the traditional hotel. Something simple. So a concoction boasting gin paired with lime juice, ginger beer and mint piqued our interest. And the deftly executed drink sated our thirst with its spicy ginger flavor balanced with the refreshing mint and lime. Yes, vacation had begun.

The drink, a gin gin mule, turns out to have been invented at New York's Pegu Club by pro-

prietor Audrey Saunders, a pioneer in the ongoing cocktail revolution in the U.S. It's a variation on a Moscow mule, subbing gin for the vodka.

As with many popular cocktails, it has spread far beyond its home. Idlewyld co-owner and executive chef Alfred Estephan was happy to share Idlewyld's version. It uses bottled ginger beer, instead of the original recipe's homemade version, making it easy to create for nonmixologists who want a drink fast.

Back home, the gin gin mule tastes just like the one sipped on that porch — it tastes like vacation.

Gin Gin Mule

Makes: 1 cocktail.

- 1 1/2 ounces gin
- 1 ounce fresh lime juice
- 1 ounce simple syrup (see note)
- 1 1/2 ounces ginger beer
- 3 sprigs mint

Measure the gin, lime juice, simple syrup and 2 sprigs mint into a mixing glass. Muddle well to extract the mint's flavor. Add ginger beer; shake until mixing glass is cold. Strain into a tall, ice-filled glass. Garnish with a mint sprig.

Simple syrup: Heat 1 part water and 1 part sugar to a boil in a small saucepan. Lower heat; simmer until sugar dissolves, 3 minutes. Cool. Keeps in the refrigerator, covered, several days.

How Do You Bake a Crisp Cookie?

Question: We like crisp cookies, so I set out on a quest to find out what makes them crisp. One of the suggestions on a baking website was to use egg yolks instead of the whole egg. If the recipe calls for two eggs, would you use two egg yolks? What do you add to make up for the moisture the whites provide?

Answer: Most cookie

recipes call for one egg, so you could use two egg yolks without much loss of moisture. But I think eggs may be the wrong culprit. While some baking sites do suggest using yolks only for crispness, many more disagree with that theory — with good reason. Egg whites generally give crispness and dryness to the final texture of baking goods. Egg yolks contain most of the egg's fat, so they contribute richness and a softer,

cakier texture.

Instead, I'd look at two other factors that are involved with crispness. The first is the sugar. Brown sugar is more moist, while white sugar causes dryness. So you want a recipe that has more white sugar

than brown sugar. A cookie that has all brown sugar is going to be softer after it's baked.

Second, make sure you're using butter instead of shortening. Butter makes cookies crisp while shortening makes them softer.



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Looking Beyond Peanuts — A Primer on Almond Butter

Most of us have plenty of ideas for using whole or chopped almonds. Eat them whole. Bake them into treats. Scatter them over salads or green beans. But what about almond butter — toasted (and sometimes salted) almonds that have been ground to a peanut butter-like consistency?

If they are willing to try it at all, most people just crank out a few AB&J sandwiches, then lose inspiration and push the jar of almond butter to the back of the refrigerator.

Time to pull it forward because almond butter is easy to use in all sorts of delicious ways across numerous cuisines.

Let's start with the basics. Almond butter is what it sounds like — ground almonds, usually with a bit of oil and salt added for texture and taste. It is not the same as almond paste or marzipan, both of which are made from finely ground almonds (but with a fair amount of sugar added) and used in baking.

The texture of almond butter is similar to peanut butter (they are jarred the same and sold alongside one another at the grocer), but differ in taste. Whereas peanut butter has a pronounced — stay with me

here — peanut flavor, almond butter has a richer, creamier taste that is nutty, but (oddly) not distinctly almondy.

Nutritionally, they are similar. Two tablespoons of peanut butter have 188 calories and 16 grams of fat. Almond butter has 202 calories and 18 grams of fat.

There are numerous brands of almond butter, but it's easy to make your own. Simply grind whole toasted almonds in the food processor until chunky-smooth. You may need a drizzle of canola oil to get the consistency you want. And consider using smoked or tamari almonds for an extra burst of flavor.

Whether you make it or buy it, almond butter can be substituted 1-for-1 in recipes that call for peanut butter. This opens up lots of possibilities.

Mole-Style Pulled Pork Buns

This blend of Mexican mole sauce and pulled pork tenderloin makes for a crazy delicious sandwich. The filling also would be good tossed with warm noodles. Start to finish: 45 minutes (25 minutes active). Servings: 4.

1 tablespoon olive oil
1 pound pork tenderloin, cut into 2-inch chunks
1/2 cup smooth almond butter
1/2 cup canned crushed tomatoes
3 cloves garlic
1 shallot
1/2 teaspoon cocoa powder
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes
1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
1 cup water
Salt
4 sesame seed burger buns
1 scallion, white and green parts, chopped

In a medium saucepan over medium-high, heat the oil. Add the pork and sear for 2 to 3 minutes per side. Set the pan aside off the heat.

In a blender combine the almond butter, tomatoes, garlic, shallot, cocoa powder, cinnamon, black pepper, red pepper flakes, cloves and water. Puree until smooth, then add to the pork.

Bring the pork and sauce to a simmer over medium heat. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, for 15 to 20 minutes.

Use a slotted spoon to transfer the pork to a large

plate or cutting board, then use 2 forks to pull and shred it. Return the pork to the sauce and stir well. Season with salt.

Divide the pulled pork between the buns. Top with scallions.

A Creamy Vegetable Soup with No Cream or Butter

Years ago, when I was pregnant with my kids, all the advice books swore that smart moms-to-be made sure to eat broccoli three times a day.

It seemed a bit extreme to me, but I went with it. It wasn't that hard. I've always loved broccoli, even if it does have an unfortunate aroma. It's an excellent source of protein, calcium, iron, dietary fiber and many vitamins and minerals. And eating it three times a day when I was pregnant did not kill my affection for it after I gave birth.

It helps that it's easy to cook, too. Broccoli does well steamed, roasted, grilled or sauteed. You can also boil it, of course, as long as you don't overdo it, which not only chases away all the nutrients and turns the vegetable to mush, but also amps up that funky smell. Bottom line — broccoli is hearty and full-bodied. It can be the main actor in any meal.

Which is why broccoli is the star of this substantial stick-to-your-ribs soup for fall. To be sure, there's some Canadian bacon in it, adding flavor, but it plays only a supporting role. Pork in all its forms, especially regular old bacon, is the darling of many chefs these days. But I don't add it willy-nilly to every recipe, not least because of its fattiness.

Canadian bacon, by contrast, delivers that same smoky taste — reminiscent of the hearth and fall leaves burning — without a ton of calories. Canadian bacon actually is smoked pork loin,

one of the leanest parts of the pig, and has no relation to regular bacon, which comes from the fatty belly.

And just as this soup boasts smokiness without a lot of bacon fat, it is thick and creamy without any butter, cream or flour. The trick? Pureeing the vegetables.

Any soup with enough vegetables will be creamy when you puree it. And just about any vegetable will work, though I'll admit I smuggled in a single Yukon gold potato to assist the broccoli in this recipe. And by the way, a soup without a lot of cream or butter will

not only be leaner, it also will taste that much more vividly of the vegetables with which it is made. Cream and butter, much as I love them, tend to tamp down flavor.

The best tool to puree these vegetables is a blender. But if all you have on hand is a food processor or an immersion blender, don't worry. The finished soup won't be quite as silky smooth, but it'll still be delicious. And to save time and money, I've used every part of the broccoli. I roasted 3 cups of the florets and added them at

the end to add crunch and color to the soup.

I hope you will consider this mostly vegetable soup a suitable candidate for the main course at dinner. With some grilled or toasted country bread and a green salad on the side, I promise you will be plenty satisfied.

Smoky Cream of Broccoli Soup with Sharp Cheddar

Start to finish: 45 minutes. Servings: 4 mains or 8 starters.

2 tablespoons plus 2 teaspoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided
3/4 pound Canadian bacon, chopped
1 medium yellow onion, sliced (about 1 cup)
2 pounds fresh broccoli (4 cups small florets set aside, the rest, including the stalks, trimmed of tough skin and coarsely chopped)
1 small Yukon gold potato (about 6 ounces), scrubbed and thinly sliced
5 cups low-sodium chicken broth
Kosher salt and ground black pepper
1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice, or to taste
2 ounces sharp cheddar cheese, coarsely grated

Heat the oven to 450 degrees.

In a large saucepan over medium, heat 1 tablespoon of the oil. Add the bacon and cook, stirring, for 6 to 8 minutes, or until slightly

golden. Use a slotted spoon to transfer the bacon to a bowl and set aside.

Reduce the heat to medium-low. Add another tablespoon of the oil and the onion to the pan, and cook, stirring occasionally, until the onion is softened. Add the coarsely chopped broccoli (not the florets), potato and chicken broth. Bring the broth to a boil, then reduce the heat and simmer, partially covered, for 20 minutes, stirring every so often, or until the broccoli and potatoes are very tender.

Meanwhile, on a rimmed baking sheet toss the florets with the remaining 2 teaspoons oil. Season with salt and pepper, then spread in an even layer. Roast in the top third of the oven for 5 minutes, or until lightly caramelized.

When the vegetables in the soup are tender, transfer the soup to a blender and puree, in batches, until smooth. Be careful and only fill the blender a third full each time.

Return the soup to the saucepan, along with the roasted broccoli florets and the Canadian bacon. Add the lemon juice, then season with salt and pepper. Add water, if necessary, to achieve the desired texture. Ladle the soup into 4 shallow soup bowls and top each portion with some of the cheddar.

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These Mashed Sweet Potatoes Go for Sweet

Sweet potato dishes can be sweet, savory or a mix of both. Here I aim for sweet, adding honey, cinnamon and apples. The key is to balance the tartness of the apple with the honey. A little butter doesn't hurt, rounding out and softening the flavors. It's an ideal accompaniment to braised beef, spicy grilled chicken or roast pork.

It's also a beautiful dish, and if I'm serving it on a holiday table I add some apple chips to dress it up. You can buy apple chips, but they're easy to make. Thinly slice a whole apple, removing any seeds. Lay the slices out on a parchment-lined baking sheet and sprinkle with cinnamon sugar. Bake in a 300-degree oven for 30 minutes, then turn the slices over and sprinkle with a little more cinnamon sugar. Bake until the slices are dry and starting to brown, 20 to 40 minutes.

The dish can be made a day in advance, covered and refrigerated. To reheat, bake the foil-covered serving dish at 350 degrees until heated through.

Mashed Sweet Potatoes With Honey and Caramelized Apples

6 servings.

2 pounds sweet potatoes
(3 to 4 medium potatoes)

2 tablespoons unsalted butter
2 teaspoons vegetable oil
1 large Granny Smith apple (9 ounces), peeled, cored and cut into approximately 1/4-inch cubes
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg
Salt
Freshly ground black pepper
3 tablespoons honey, or more to taste

Place a large piece of aluminum foil directly on the middle rack of the oven, and preheat the oven to

350 degrees. Use a fork or skewer to prick the sweet potatoes on several sides. Transfer them to the aluminum foil and bake for 60 to 90 minutes, until juice is bubbling out of the sweet potatoes and they are soft to the touch. Let them cool for 15 minutes. Heat the butter and oil in a medium nonstick saute pan or skillet over medium-high heat. Add the apple cubes and stir; cook for 6 to 7 minutes, until it starts to soften, tossing every couple of minutes. Add the cinnamon, nutmeg, and salt and pepper to taste. Cook

until the apple begins to brown. Remove from the heat.

Cut each sweet potato in half and scoop the insides into the bowl of a stand mixer or hand-held electric mixer; beat at medium speed until smooth. Add the honey and the caramelized apples, beating at low speed to combine. Taste, and adjust the seasoning as needed. Serve warm.

Lots of Fresh Basil? Here Are 3 Ways to Preserve It

Question: I had an abundant crop of basil this year. What is the best way to preserve it? I tried hanging it like I do with other herbs, but it didn't work very well.

Answer: Basil is definitely different from sturdier herbs such as thyme or rosemary.

Its leaves are softer and more delicate, so they're not good candidates for drying. And they're prone to darkening when cut.

Freezing is the best option to save basil. There are several methods, depending on what you want to do with the basil. The simplest is to chop the basil, place it in ice-cube trays and cover with water. Try to fill the cubes with plenty of basil so you don't have to use too much water. That method

works great for soups and stews because you can just throw in a couple of cubes.

The second method is to place the basil in a food processor, pulse a few times to chop and then mix in oil. The basil will darken, but it will keep plenty of flavor. You can throw the basil and the oil into a dish you're sauteing, such as vegetables.

Finally, you can just make pesto. Basil pesto freezes well. I usually put it in a resealable freezer bag and flatten it. It will stay soft enough that you can just break off chunks whenever you need it.

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Can a Corn Relish

This is a sweet one. Add the honey to taste, but don't adjust the vinegar: That's the canning preservative here.

ClearJel is called for here. It's a modified food starch used by home canners. As the name suggests, it thickens without clouding (or clumping), and it doesn't break down when exposed to high temperatures. It is available through online food/spice purveyors. Cornstarch may be substituted, but it makes the mixture somewhat cloudy and the shelf life may be reduced to 9 months instead of 1 year.

For best flavor, do not open for at least 6 weeks. Store in a cool, dry place for up to 1 year.

Sweet Honey Corn Relish

Makes 5 pints.

Raw kernels from 10 to 12

ears fresh corn (8 cups)
2 medium onions, finely chopped
1 medium green bell pepper, stemmed, seeded and finely chopped
1 medium red bell pepper, stemmed, seeded and finely chopped
1 to 1 1/2 cups honey
3 1/4 cups cider vinegar
1 teaspoon celery seed
1 tablespoon pickling or fine sea salt
1/4 teaspoon ground cayenne pepper
1 tablespoon ClearJel (may substitute 2 tablespoons cornstarch)

Place a rack or towel inside a deep pot. Fill with water and bring to a boil over high heat. Add 5 pint jars (upright), making sure there is at least an inch of water over them, and boil for 10 minutes. Turn off the heat, leaving the jars in the water until you are ready to use them. Soak the jar lids and rings in a medium saucepan of hot, but not boiling, water, leaving them in the water until you are ready to use them. Combine the corn, onions, green and red bell peppers, 1 cup of the hon-

ey, 3 cups of the cider vinegar, the celery seed, salt and cayenne pepper in a large saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat, stirring to dissolve the honey.

Stir together the ClearJel and the remaining 1/4 cup cider vinegar in a liquid measuring cup until well incorporated. Stir into the corn mixture; reduce the heat to medium and boil gently until thickened, about 5 minutes. Taste and add up to 1/2 cup honey as needed. Turn off the heat. Drain the jars, lids and rings, placing the jars on the countertop.

Ladle the hot relish into the hot jars, leaving 1/2 inch of headspace. Wipe the rims to clear away any food particles or brine. Use a clean chopstick to stir/remove any air bubbles between the food and the sides of the glass. Seal with the lids and rings, making sure the ring is gently tightened.

You can use the same pot used to sterilize the jars (with rack or towel). Bring the water to a boil over high heat. Use a jar lifter or tongs to transfer the jar

to the water bath, making sure there is enough water to cover the jars by 1 to 2 inches. Process in a boiling-water bath for 15 minutes.

Use the jar lifter or tongs to transfer the jars to a countertop to cool. Let cool undisturbed for 12 hours. Check the seals; the lids should be slightly depressed at the center; this is a sign of a successful seal. Store in a cool, dry place for up to 1 year.

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Fans Are Going Bananas for Soft Serve Fruit

Pureed frozen fruit probably won't become the next bacon, or even cupcake. It's simply not sexy enough.

So-called soft serve fruit is, however, having a moment, recently becoming a darling of the mommy blog set, showing up on ABC's "Good Morning America," inspiring a new countertop kitchen appliance, even spawning a product line and small chain of shops, the New York City-based Soft Serve Fruit Co.

And to be clear, we are talking about something that is precisely as it sounds — frozen fruit that is pureed until it reaches the consistency of soft serve ice cream. That's it.

Soft serve fruit is "the answer to an ice cream lover's cravings," says Francesca Borgognone, Entertain editor at The Daily Meal.com, who adds that the appeal is easy to understand. "A fraction of the calories and mixed with the same type of fixings that frozen yogurt has — it can be sweet, savory as well as an any-time-of-the-day treat."

Soft serve fruit has been quietly building a following online, where recipes abound for turning all manner of frozen fruit into treats. It's hardly complicated. A splash of juice or water, a bag of frozen fruit and a few minutes in a food processor and the result is something that begs for an ice cream cone.

Just type "soft serve fruit" into Pinterest and see the multicolored flurry of frozen fancies that pops up. And kitchen supply companies are keeping up with the trend, marketing appliances specifically for making frozen fruit desserts, like the Yonanas machine that costs around \$50. Of course, most people just use their food

processors or blenders.

Tanya Steel, editor-in-chief of Epicurious.com, has been on to this idea for a while, keeping foil-wrapped, frozen over-ripe bananas in the freezer for times when she wants a treat that's tasty without being calorific.

"I started making them when my kids were little and I was trying to not only curb their constant need and quest for sugar, but also my own," says Steel, coauthor of the cookbook "Real Food for Healthy Kids." Steel says her site has a number of frozen fruit dessert recipes and "we see incredible interest in them," she says.

Soft serve fruit "makes so much sense," she says. "It's an almost guilt-free treat and you actually feel good about giving it to your kids and you feel good about giving it to yourself."

Tropical Mango Banana Soft Serve

Start to finish: 5 minutes. Servings: 4.

10-ounce bag frozen mango chunks
1 very ripe banana
1/4 cup sweetened cream of coconut
Pinch salt
1 tablespoon orange juice

In a food processor, combine the mango, banana, cream of coconut and salt. Pulse several times to roughly chop, then add the orange juice. Process until very smooth, this may take several minutes. You may need to stop the processor several times to scrape down the sides of the bowl or move any chunks of fruit that aren't being pureed. Serve immediately.

Per serving: 140 calories; 30 calories from fat (21 percent of total calories); 3 g fat (3 g saturated; 0 g trans fats); 0 mg cholesterol; 29 g carbohydrate;

2 g fiber; 24 g sugar; 1 g protein; 45 mg sodium.

Creamy Blueberry Banana Soft Serve

The bananas provide most of the "creamy" in this soft serve. They combine so wonderfully with the blueberries to create a silky, creamy soft serve. If you want to keep it dairy free, substitute plain rice milk, coconut milk, or apple juice for the regular milk. You also could use water. Start to finish: 5 minutes. Servings: 6.

12-ounce bag frozen blueberries
2 frozen bananas, cut into chunks
2 tablespoons honey
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
Pinch salt
2 tablespoons milk

In a food processor, combine the blueberries, bananas, honey, cinnamon and salt. Pulse several times to roughly chop, then add the milk. Process until very smooth, this may take several minutes. You may need to stop the processor several times to scrape down the sides of the bowl or move any chunks of fruit that aren't being pureed. Serve immediately.

Per serving: 90 calories; 5 calories from fat (6 percent of total calories); 0.5 g fat (0 g saturated; 0 g trans fats); 0 mg cholesterol; 22 g carbohydrate; 3 g fiber; 16 g sugar; 1 g protein; 30 mg sodium.

Strawberry Lime Soft Serve

Start to finish: 5 minutes. Servings: 4.

10-ounce bag frozen strawberries
1/4 cup agave syrup or honey
Juice of 2 limes (about 1/3 cup)

A Creamy Casserole for Those Chilly Fall Nights

Just as summer demands salads, fall calls for casseroles.

The combination of a chill in the air and the chaos of kids heading back to school means many families are looking for easy, warming one-pot meals that come together quickly and with little mess or fuss.

So when we created this recipe, we kept things simple. In fact, to cut down on mess and time, it is mixed right in the dish it is baked in. We also turned to that ultimate workhorse of the week-night kitchen — the rotisserie chicken. Add a few vegetables and a creamy sauce made from pantry staples, and dinner's on the table in no time.

Some folks may turn up their noses at using cream-of-anything soup in a casserole. But busy families have

been turning to it for decades for three simple reasons — it works, it's delicious and it's effortless.

Creamy Chicken and Potato Casserole

Bagged hash brown potatoes (not the frozen type) can be found in the refrigerator section of your grocer, often near the eggs. Start to finish: 1 hour (20 minutes active). Servings: 8.

1/2 cup light mayonnaise
10 3/4-ounce can condensed cream-of-chicken soup
1/2 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
20-ounce package hash brown potatoes
1 medium zucchini, diced

1 cup green beans, cut into pieces
1/2 cup grated carrot
Meat from a 2-pound rotisserie chicken, cubed, skin and bones discarded
3/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
1/2 cup panko breadcrumbs

Heat the oven to 400 degrees.

In a 9-by-13-inch baking dish, stir together the mayonnaise, soup, milk, pepper, salt, thyme and garlic

powder. Stir in the potatoes, zucchini, green beans, carrots and chicken. Sprinkle with the cheddar cheese and the breadcrumbs. Bake for 40 minutes, or until bubbling and the vegetables are tender.

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These Pickled Pears Taste Like a Cocktail

Pickling is a great way to preserve fruit for use in sandwiches or as hors d'oeuvres, as you would a sweet cucumber pickle or cornichon. These pears pair well with an aged Comte cheese or spicy Sottocenere cheese.

The syrup here tastes like an Aviation cocktail, with juniper berries and lemon complements. It can infuse and flavor even the most ho-hum-tasting fruit.

You will have leftover syrup, which can be strained, if desired, and used to macerate sliced fruit or in cocktails. The jars can be stored in a cool, dry place for up to 1 year.

Aviation Pickled Pears

Makes about 5 pints or 10 half-pints.

5 cups sugar
2 cups apple cider vinegar or white wine vinegar
1/2 cup water
One 3-inch piece peeled fresh ginger root, diced (a 3-ounce piece)
1 vanilla bean, split
2 ounces creme de violette liqueur
20 whole cloves
20 whole juniper berries
Peel of 1 lemon, cut into 5 or 10 pieces
Peel of 1 orange, cut into 5 or 10 pieces
4 pounds pears (about 8 1/2 cups peeled, cored and thinly sliced)

Wash and rinse 5 pint jars or 10 half-pint jars; put them into a stockpot with a rack or towel inside; cover the jars with water (by an inch or so) and bring to a boil over high heat; turn off the heat. Let the jars stand in hot water until you are ready to fill them. **Place new lids** and

rings in a small saucepan and cover with several inches of water. Heat over medium heat, but do not let the water come to a boil; turn off the heat. Let stand in hot water until you are ready to use them.

Combine the sugar, vinegar, water, ginger, vanilla bean and creme de violette in a 6-to-8-quart nonreactive (glass or plastic) pot over medium-high heat. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Reduce the heat to medium and boil gently for 10 minutes. Discard the vanilla bean (or dry, reserve and add to a jar of sugar to make vanilla-infused sugar).

Drain the jars, lids and rings. **Place 2 to 4** whole cloves, 2 to 4 whole juniper berries, 1 lemon peel slice and 1 orange peel slice in each jar. Pack the pear slices tightly into each jar, leaving a generous 1/2 inch of headspace at the top.

Ladle the hot syrup into each jar to cover the pears, still leaving 1/2 inch of headspace at the top of each jar. Use a clean chopstick to gently stir the contents of each jar, releasing any air bubbles. Wipe the rims of the jars so they are free of any food particles or syrup. Place the lids on the jars and gently tighten the rings.

Return the water in the pot (used to sterilize the jars) to a boil over high heat, with the rack or towel still inside. Use a jar lifter or tongs to place the jars upright in the boiling-water bath, making sure there is at least 2 inches of water above the jars. Process for 12 minutes.

Use the jar lifter or tongs to transfer the jars to a countertop to cool completely. Once cooled, the lids should be slightly depressed at the center; that is the sign of a successful seal.

Give Pork Big Flavor without a Long Shopping List

Weeknight cooking is all about getting gobs of flavor from just a few ingredients, no special techniques and as little effort as possible.

The trick is in finding those big, boldly flavored ingredients and knowing how to get them to do all (or at least most) of the work for you. Which isn't to suggest there is any great science to this. My rule of thumb — find an ingredient, grab a hunk of meat, toss them together in a bowl for a while, then see what happens.

That's pretty much how I came up with this wildly flavorful take on grilled pork tenderloin. And actually, I didn't even use pork the first time around.

All I did was whisk together mirin (a sweet Japanese cooking wine), a bit of kosher salt and some garlic powder. I tossed in a hunk of steak, then walked away for a while. A few minutes on the grill and I had one of the most flavorful, well seared steaks I'd ever enjoyed. Best yet, it was a cheap piece of steak that was pretty much at the end of its shelf life.

The next time I made it, I switched the meat to pork. The results were even better.

I could have stopped there, but I also wanted to give this dish a seasonal touch. I just didn't want much extra work. Since apples and pork work so nicely together, that seemed like the right place to start. I also liked the idea of playing the apples off mirin's sweet side.

All it took was a simple saute of chopped apples, onions and — for big, effortless flavor and a nice thick body — some purchased sweet chutney. The result? An incredible dinner for fall.

Mirin Pork Chops with Apple Chutney

You'll find mirin in the Asian or international sections of most grocers. The chutney should be nearby, too. It's

good to let the pork marinate for at least 30 minutes, but you can get away with 10 minutes or so if you're pressed for time. Even better: toss the meat in the marinade in the morning and let it absorb the flavor all day. Start to finish: 20 minutes active, plus marinating. Servings: 6.

1 cup mirin
1 teaspoon garlic powder
1 teaspoon kosher salt
2 pounds pork tenderloin, halved lengthwise and pounded evenly flat
1 tablespoon butter
2 medium apples, peeled, cored and diced
1 small yellow onion, diced
10 1/2-ounce jar sweet chutney (such as mango)

In a large bowl, whisk together the mirin, garlic powder and salt. Add the pork and turn to coat well. Refrigerate until ready to

cook. The pork can be marinated for as little as 10 minutes or up to all day.

When ready to cook, heat a grill to high. Using a vegetable oil-soaked paper towel held with tongs, oil the grill grates.

Reduce the heat to medium and add the pork. Grill for 6 minutes per side. Set aside to rest.

Meanwhile, in a medium skillet over medium-high heat, melt the butter. Add the apples and onion and saute until just tender, about 5 minutes. Remove the pan from the heat and stir in the chutney.

To serve, thinly slice the pork and top each serving with the apple chutney.

'Harr Rule' Dies at IHSAA Meeting

COEUR D'ALENE • Sierra Harr is a unique golfer with a unique situation.

That was the argument made over the last several months, during which it was debated whether she should be allowed to continue golfing with the Castleford High School boys team if the girls program doesn't have enough players to field a full team.

On Tuesday, that was the conclusion: The Castleford junior received a lifeline after thinking she would be golfing with the girls for the rest of her prep career.

In its annual general meeting, the Idaho High School Activities Association's board of directors voted overwhelmingly to not alter the language of its program rules, preserving the ability for Harr and other female athletes to compete with their male counterparts if certain circumstances exist.

"I'm really glad they left it the way it was, because it's not just going to benefit me," Harr said Tuesday evening. "It's going to benefit girls in the future. If we don't end up having a girls team I'll be able to play with the boys."

The proposed change, which passed an initial vote at the board's July meeting, would have changed the wording of IHSAA Rule 11-1-1 to state that if a school offers sport for both boys and girls at any level, varsity or otherwise, girls would not be permitted to compete on boys teams (and vice versa) irrespective of whether there were insufficient numbers to field a full team.

Currently, if there are not enough girls to field a team in a given sport, girls can compete on a boys team.

Harr won the 2A girls golf individual championship by six shots as a freshman in 2011. Last season, the Wolves didn't have enough girls for a team. She received clearance to compete with the boys, where she managed a top 10 finish at state and helped the Wolves win their second successive boys team title.

She said in a *Times-News* interview in April

that the faster pace of play, and the longer distances that come with playing from the boys tees, was the best thing to help sharpen her game as she tries to earn a college scholarship.

Some besought the IHSAA to take action, which led to the initial vote to restrict crossover participation.

Harr's story went national recently in an Associated Press article describing her situation. That led to publicity for her — she listed ESPN and CBS as national media outlets that asked for interviews — as well as the IHSAA, which had Executive Director John Billetz appear on a satellite radio show, according to Perrigot.

"It was kind of crazy, but I'm glad that I got everybody's opinion on it. I got to see a lot of the comments," Harr said. "Everybody was trying to help me and they were saying, 'Yeah, go after it if you want to.' I thought it was really nice to see that many people are supportive of the idea."

It had already been voted through once, but IHSAA measures need to pass two votes.

On Tuesday's second vote, all but one board member present voted to leave the current language as it currently stands.

"It was a very unique situation, and I think in the future we'll look at each case on an individual basis," said Tim Perrigot, Minico High School football coach and the boys sports coaches' representative on the IHSAA board.

"This is the first time that we've ever dealt with something like that, so we'll try to continue to look for ways to help kids out," he added. "Maybe down the road that's something the will be revisited, but at this time

TWIN FALLS • The Jerome volleyball team entered Baun Gymnasium Tuesday not thinking about remaining undefeated in the Great Basin Conference.

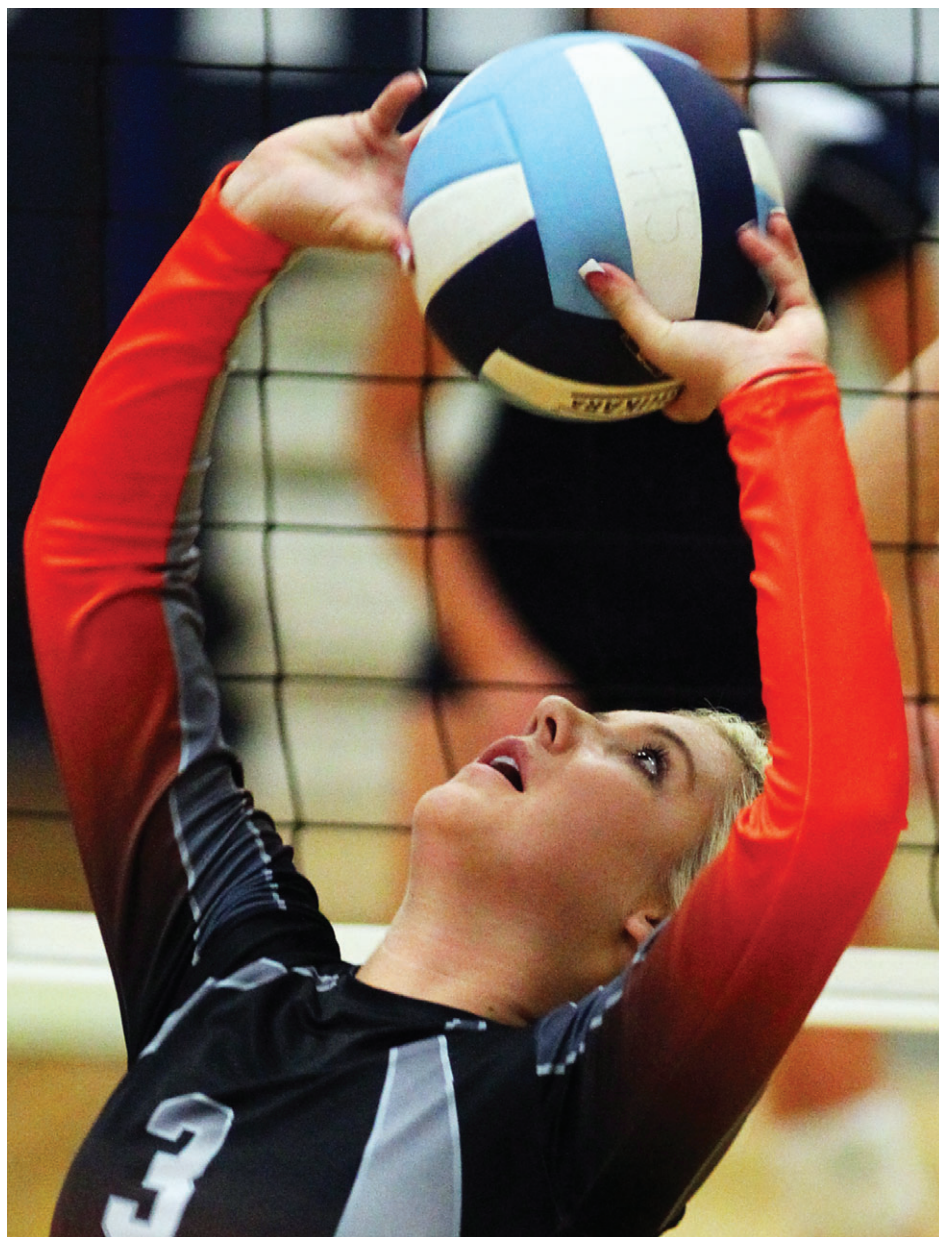
The Tigers sought a victory of greater magnitude, but one that would be almost invisible in the win column.

Brooke Bowers led Burley (2-7, 1-4 Great Basin) with eight kills, and likely a few



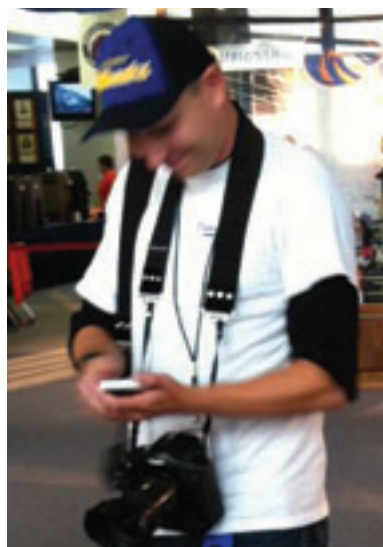

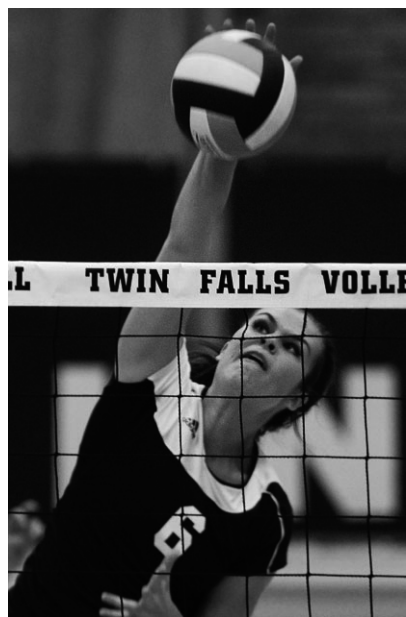

UNC QB Comfortable in New Offense

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. •

Bryn Renner is moving the chains, racking up big passing numbers and protecting the football in North Carolina's new offense. Now his coaches want him to do all that while running the team's no-huddle offense even faster.

Renner leads the Atlantic Coast Conference with 11 touchdown passes, and has thrown for nearly 1,200 yards with three interceptions through four games. The junior has thrown for 684 yards in the past two games, a program record for the most passing yards in consecutive games.

"It's been the offense as a whole," Renner said Monday. "Everybody's stepping up their role and just done their job. I think we were putting too much pressure on ourselves early in the year, trying to control everything and doing things that were out of the realm of our job description — me included."

Much of Renner's success started in the second half of the 39-34 loss at Louisville, where he finished with a career-high 363 yards and five touchdowns. Renner followed that by completing 27 of 43 passes for 321 yards and two scores as North Carolina (2-2) beat East Carolina 27-6.

Renner has thrown 78 straight passes without an interception heading into Saturday's home game against Idaho.

First-year coach Larry Fedora, who brought the offense with him from Southern Mississippi, said Renner is learning on every snap.

"Every time a safety moves and rotates down, and he gets to see that and see it live and see himself do it, it's just a learned experience and something he can continue to work on," Fedora said. "It's still about managing the game, which is moving the chains. Moving the chains is the most important thing he's doing — and taking care of the football."

Offensive coordinator Blake Anderson said Renner started the year by holding onto the ball too long and not getting the offense to the line quickly enough. He even described

Renner as "picking daisies" after a long pass play in the opener against Elon.

Since then, Anderson said, Renner has made better decisions, been more effective in avoiding rushers and made the right reads on checkdown passes to keep the chains moving.

"I think we've got a lot of improving left in us, which is encouraging because we have done good things throwing the ball the last couple of weeks," Anderson said. "I think as receivers get more comfortable and Bryn gets more comfortable, we'd like to think we can improve even more on what we're doing"

Still, the biggest complaint for Fedora and Anderson is the pace. Anderson said he'd ideally like the snap to come with anywhere from 24 to 28 seconds left on the play clock, with a rough target of getting 80 plays.

The Tar Heels are averaging about 72 plays this season, though they slowed things down in the second halves against Elon and East Carolina with comfortable leads. Anderson said things have improved but it's still like "watching paint dry out there for me right now?"

Anderson said Renner's next step is to make the handoff or the throw, then automatically run to the line to get the offense lined up without having to think about it.

Renner said he's up for the challenge of trying to please his demanding coaches when it comes to tempo.

"I think we're building toward that, but I think every week it's a point in the locker room and a point from the coaching staff to just get the tempo started and get us going," Renner said. "I think we've improved light years from where we were for Elon, but it can always get better."

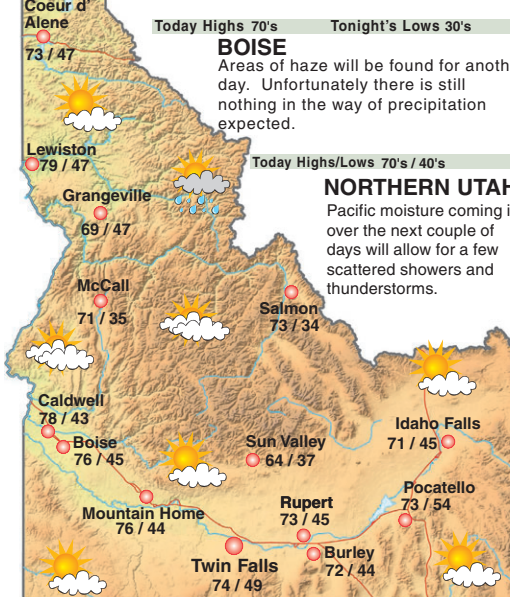

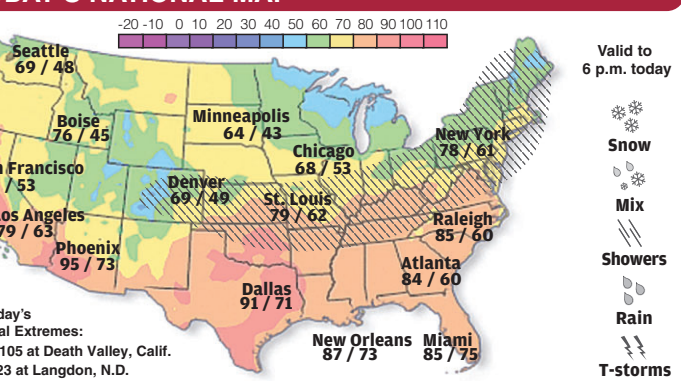

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NFL Upholds Controversial Seahawks Win

NEW YORK • The NFL put its stamp of approval on the still-smoldering outcome of the Green Bay-Seattle game: Wrong call. Right review. Wrong team still wins. Seahawks 14, Packers 12.

With frustration mounting among coaches, players and fans, the worst fear finally materialized: a mistake by a replacement official would decide the outcome of a game.

It came while the NFL and its regular officials, locked out since June, were in resumed talks in an attempt to resolve the impasse.

That was still a day late for the Packers.

The fiasco, which unfolded on the prominent stage of "Monday Night Football," was deconstructed by the league Tuesday in a way that surely rendered little comfort for Cheeseheads.

The NFL said Seattle's last-second touchdown pass should not have counted because Seahawks receiver Golden Tate should have been called for offensive pass interference, ending the game with Green Bay winning.

Instead, officials ruled it a touchdown, and penalties either way are not reviewable.

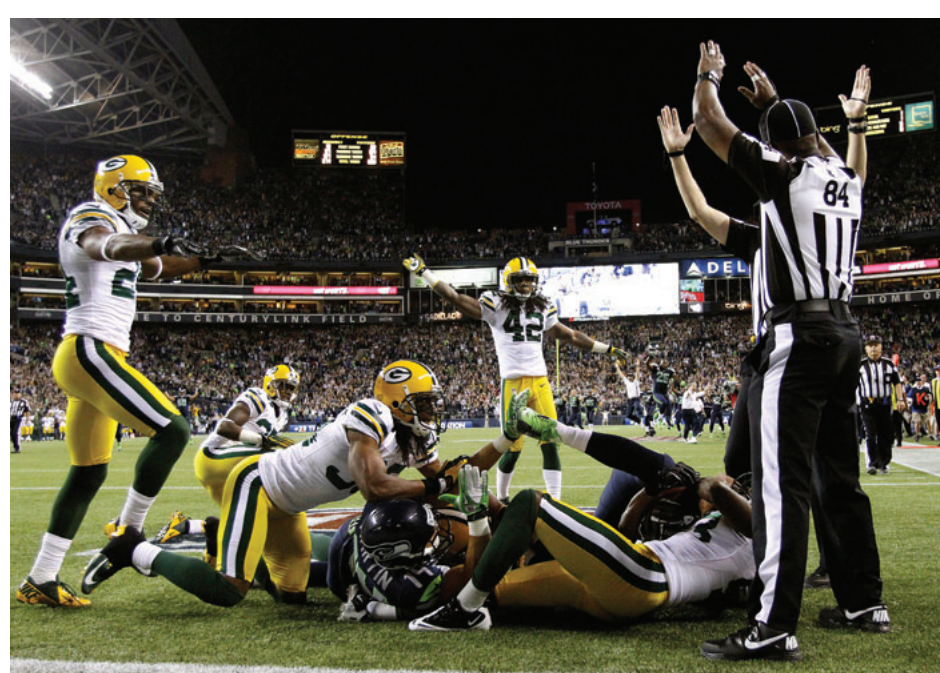
That left it to whether Tate and Green Bay safety M.D. Jennings both had possession of the ball. The officials said they did, but the Packers insisted Jennings had clear possession for a game-ending interception. The NFL agreed that the replay was inconclusive, upholding the touchdown and giving Seattle the victory.

Green Bay quarterback Aaron Rodgers, normally a soft-spoken player who didn't say much after the loss, lashed out on his radio show Tuesday.

"First of all, I've got to do something that the NFL is not going to do: I have to apologize to the fans," he said on ESPN 540-AM in Milwaukee.

Even President Barack Obama got in on the conversation Tuesday, tweeting: "NFL fans on both sides of the aisle hope the refs' lockout is settled soon."

The controversy began on the final play when Russell Wilson heaved a 24-yard pass into a scrum in the end zone with Seattle trailing 12-7. Tate shoved away a defender with both hands, and

he and Jennings got their hands on the ball.

"It was pinned to my chest the whole time," Jennings said.

Instead, the officials ruled on the field that the two had simultaneous possession, which counts as a reception.

"The NFL Officiating Department reviewed the video today and supports the decision not to overturn the on-field ruling following the instant replay review," the league said in a statement.

Saying there was no indisputable evidence, though, is not the same as confirming the initial call was correct.

The Packers, one of sports' most storied franchises and Super Bowl champs two years ago, fell to 1-2. The Seahawks are 2-1.

Fans' fascination with the finish was evident in the number who stayed with ESPN to watch the high-lights on "SportsCenter" after the game: 6.5 million viewers, the most for the full-length show since records started being kept in 1990.

On his weekly appearance on Seattle radio station 710 KIRO-AM, Seahawks coach Pete Carroll made no apologies Tuesday, saying, "The league backed it up and game over. We win."

"Golden makes an extraordinary effort. It's a great protection. It's a great throw. It's a great attempt at the ball and he wins the battle," he said. "They were right on the point looking right at it, standing right over the thing and they reviewed it. Whether they missed the

push or not — obviously they missed the push in the battle for the ball — but that stuff goes on all the time."

But Rodgers, in a reference to referee Wayne Elliott not seeing indisputable evidence, said: "I mean, come on, Wayne. That's embarrassing."

NFL Players Association executive director DeMaurice Smith posted a statement to members saying the lockout "jeopardizes your health and safety."

"This decision to remove more than 1,500 years of collective experience has simply made the workplace less safe," he wrote, adding, "We are actively reviewing any and all possible actions to protect you."

The NFL locked out the officials in June after their contract expired. Unable to reach a new collective bargaining agreement, the league opened the season with replacements, most with experience only in lower levels of college football.

Coaches and players began griping about the officials in the preseason, but the tension seemed to boil over this past weekend.

Scuffles after the whistle were frequent with players appearing to test the limits of the new officials, and coach-

es were fined for berating them.

Las Vegas oddsmakers said \$300 million or more changed hands worldwide on Monday's call. The Glantz-Culver line for the game opened favoring the Packers by 4½. Had the play been ruled an interception, Green Bay would have won by 5.

The call also found its way into Wisconsin politics, with Republican Gov. Scott Walker tweeting for the regular officials to return. Opponents noted that he seemed to be supporting the referees union after going after public employee unions last year, though Democratic state Sen. Jon Erpenbach added: "We're all fans, first and foremost."

Green Bay coach Mike McCarthy was stoic after the game, but Packers guard T.J. Lang vented on Twitter, using some expletives to say Green Bay was robbed by the refs. A day later, he said he regretted only his use of profanity.

"It was just heartbreaking to have a game taken from us like that," he told 97-FM The Ticket in Detroit. "We put way too much effort, and blood, sweat and tears into these games to have one absolutely stolen from us."

Texans Ascend to No. 1 in AP Pro32 Rankings

NEW YORK • The top of the AP Pro32 power rankings is a tough spot to hold.

The Houston Texans became the fourth team in as many weeks to sit first overall in the rankings. Fresh off an impressive victory at Denver to go 3-0 for the first time, Houston replaced San Francisco as the No. 1 team in voting Tuesday by 12 media members who regularly cover the NFL. Houston earned nine first-place votes and 380 points.

"Decisive win in Denver and big-time performance from Matt Schaub, losing part of his ear in the process," 2002 NFL MVP Rich Gannon of CBS Sports and Sirius XM radio said.

Schaub lost a small portion of his left ear lobe when his helmet cut it on a hard hit.

"I don't think we'll be hearing any more questions about Matt Schaub's toughness after the quarterback played with a severed ear lobe..." added Alex Marvez of Foxsports.com

San Francisco dropped to a tie for fourth with the New York Giants. Previously, Green Bay and New England also held the top spot, then lost.

The other unbeaten

teams, Atlanta and Arizona, were second and sixth, respectively. The Falcons got two first-place votes and 371 points, while the Cardinals had one and 335 points.

"The Falcons are hot, in all three phases," noted former All-Pro safety John Lynch of Fox Sports. "Is anyone playing the QB position better than Matt Ryan? I don't think so."

Dan Pompei of the *Chicago Tribune* gave the Cardinals the nod.

"It's hard to believe they are the best in football, but they have beaten more good teams and answered more challenges than any other team," Pompei said.

Rounding out the top 10 were third-place Baltimore, seventh-ranked Green Bay, No. 8 New England, No. 9 Seattle and No. 10 Chicago.

Last for the second straight week was Cleveland, which lost at home to Buffalo and is 0-3.

"Hope they're not expecting Ray Lewis to hold a pity party for them Thursday night," quipped Ira Kaufman of the *Tampa Tribune*.

Of course, the Browns have a bit of an excuse, as Rick Gosselin of the *Dallas Morning News* pointed out: "The Browns have the youngest starting lineup in the NFL at an average age of 24.86 years," he said.

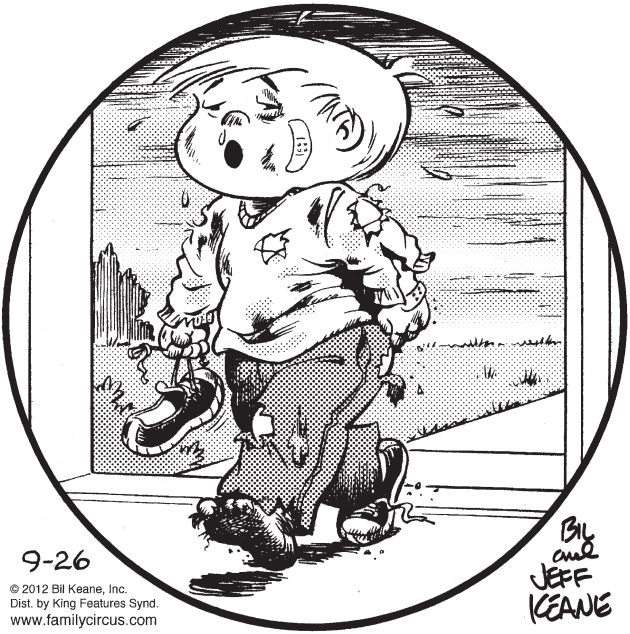

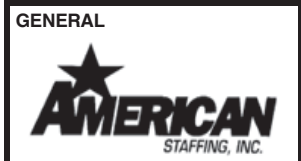

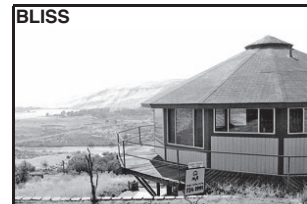

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

Plan the play in six hearts on the club-king lead, assuming a 2-1 heart break.

Before you play a card, count your tricks if you decide to draw trumps, thus avoiding unpleasant accidents in the spade suit.

You draw trump in two rounds and have six trumps left to take separately; that makes eight tricks. Three black-suit winners make 11, so you will need to establish an extra trick in spades. That would be a good bid if the opponents had not bid (best is to cash the king and ace then lead up to the jack), but here the auction has made this no better than even money — probably rather worse.

There are several possibilities, but the bidding makes the best line stand out. You win the club ace perform, then draw two rounds of trump ending in hand, and play the diamond queen, discarding a spade if West does not cover. Win the return, and play the diamond jack. If West covers, you ruff, then ruff a club to hand and discard dummy's last spade on the diamond 10. If West doesn't cover the diamond jack, the spade loser goes away immediately.

Even if the opponents had not bid, this line will work 75 percent of the time. The way to calculate the chance of success is to work out that the line works unless both diamond honors are offside — and the probability of that is one-quarter (one-half of one-half). So you succeed the other three-quarters of the time.

ANSWER: It is typically correct to raise partner's overcall with three trumps, but here you have a minimum (maybe a subminimum) for that action and your values are primarily defensive. Worse, you do not want to encourage partner to lead clubs unless he has a natural lead of that suit. So pass, don't raise.

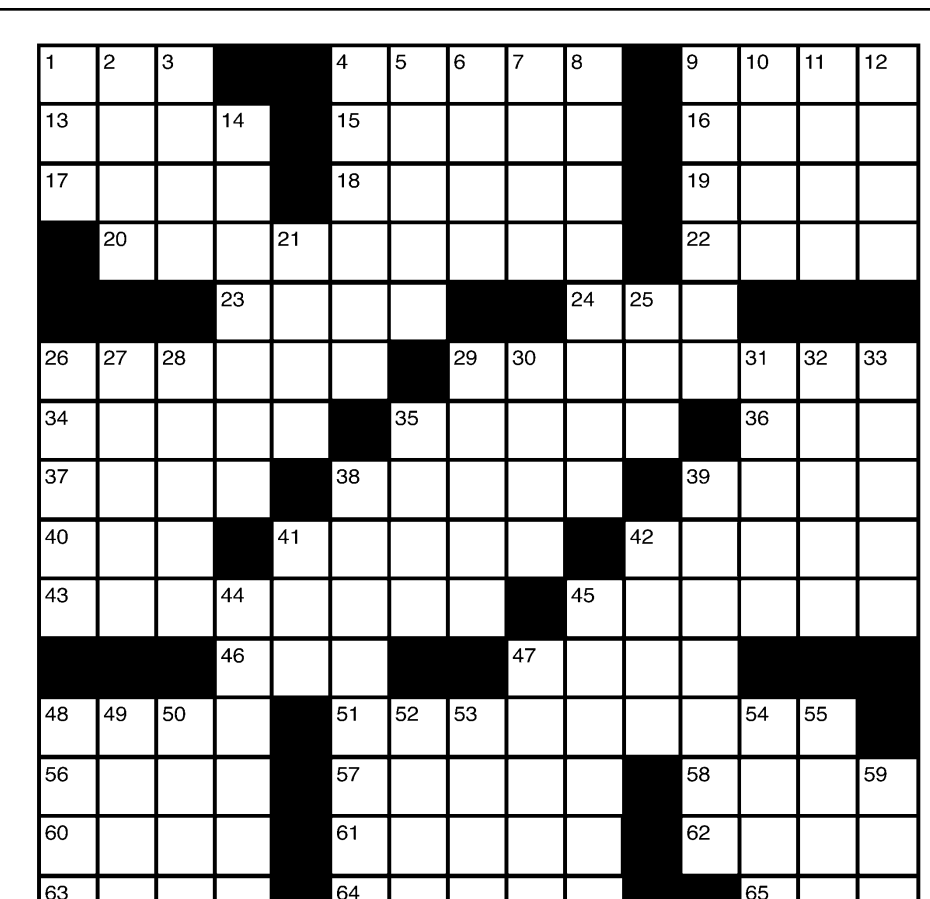

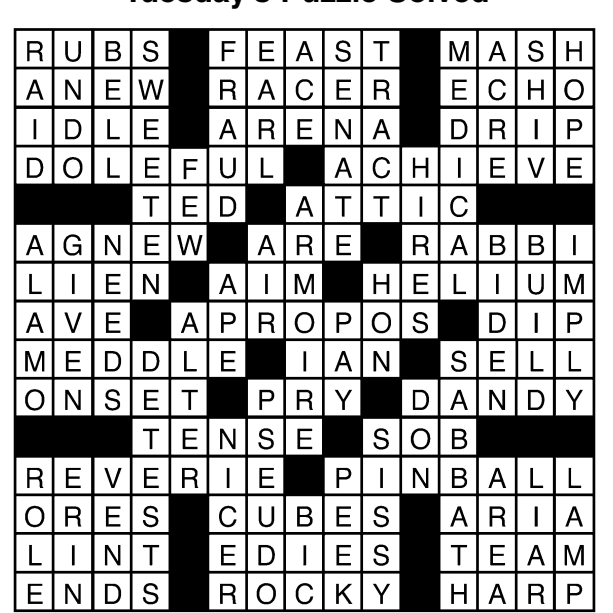


