WEST VALLEY CITY, Utah (AP) • A woman who worked at West Valley Animal fully fired after news broke about a cat surviving two euthanasia attempts.
Karen Bird filed a lawsuit Monday in U.S. District Court saying her employers retaliated because they be-
lieved she leaked the story of Andrea lieved she leaked the story of Andrea the Cat last fall. The cat's survival
story led to public outcry and changes in the shelter's policies. West Valley City Manager Wayne Pyle said the city hadn't yet been served with the lawsuit, but he denied the allegation that Bird's firing was motivated solely by the cat incident.
"While Karen's termination came shortly after the case of 'Andrea the Cat's' failed euthanizing attempt, Karen's disciplinary history with the city pre-dated this incident for aperiod extending many months," Pyle said in a statement.
Pyle said Bird's work history in-
cluded insubordination and faily cluded insubordination and failure to
be courteous to fellow employees. Andrea hadn't been adopted after 30 days in the city's shelter when workers tried to euthanize her last October. When they opened the carbon monoxide chamber, they found the black-and-white cat was still alive.
They put her back in the chambe They put her back in the chamber
and then transferred her to a cooler, assuming she was dead. A worker who later checked the cooler found the cat had a low body temperature and had vomited and
defecated, but survived.

## Find

 Replacement Before Repealing Personal Property Tax"It's about growth in Idaho."
That's a quote from Nathan Lyda, presidentelect of the Idaho Association of Realtors. He's talking about repealing personal property tax, a tax businesses pay on movable property like desks, office supplies, clothing racks, bookshelves, art and machinery. It's a source of income for local taxing districts. Last year, for instance, the city of Twin Falls generated about $\$ 950,000$ from the tax -6 percent of its property tax collection.
Businesses don't like it. Spending money tracking the ebb and flow of office supplies just to be taxed seems counterproductive. In fact, the Realtors' Association called it "the most hated tax in the state by those who pay it" in 2008 .
"Our association feels that it is a barrier to economic development," Lyda said during a recent interview with the Times-News.
We hear that argument often. Businesses like to claim that certain taxes or fees impede development. In cases like these, it's best to look at the numbers.
Is Idaho's economy struggling to grow? Census data show otherwise.
From 2000-2010, private, non-farm employment grew 8.2 percent. Compared to the nation as a whole, which saw private employment shrink by 1.8 percent, Idaho is attracting employers just fine. Twin Falls County did even better, increasing private, non-farm employment by 11.4 percent.
We think this proves Idaho's tax policy already does its part in attracting new businesses. Meanwhile, local governments - our firefighters, police, schools and roads - continue to struggle financially. When Chobani opens, the personal property tax is expected to generate $\$ 1.2$ million for Twin Falls.
Are we willing to sacrifice these so businesses already flocking to Idaho's expanding economy can pay fewer taxes? We don't think so. We agree that tracking property can be a challenge for busi nesses, but let's come up with an alternative revenue source before repealing the personal property tax.

Most of us have plenty of ideas for using whole or hopped almonds. Eat them chopped almonds. Eat them
whole. Bake them into treats. Scatter them over salads or green beans. But what about almond butter - toasted (and sometimes salted) almonds that have been ground to a pean
If they are willing to try it at all, most people just crank out a few AB\&J sandwiches, then lose inspiration and push the jar of almond butter to the back of the refrig-
rator.
Time to pull it forward because almond butter is easy ways across numerous cuisines.
Let's start with the basics. Almond butter is what it sounds like - ground al-
monds, usually with a bit of oil and salt added for texture and taste. It is not the same as almond paste or marzipan, both of which are made from finely ground almonds (but with a fair amount of sugar added) and used in baking.

Whether you make it or buy it, almond butter can be substituted 1 -for-1 in recipes that call for peanut butter. This opens up lots of possibilities.
