A Rise in Coal Exports Could Affect Idaho Towns



SHOSHONE • Stay long enough for coffee at the Manhattan Cafe and you'll be greeted with a familiar tune.

It's not a scheduled performance, but about once every hour, the rolling hum of a locomotive stops traffic.

This railroad routine is a norm for many Shoshone residents. However, in years to come, this historical little town's railroad could find itself

Search On for Armed Robbery Suspect

in the middle of a debate over increased coal exports to China.

If this issue doesn't sound familiar, you're not alone. It's a conflict that's not expected to hit towns along the coal's possible route for several years. But it's important for many city leaders and commuters to begin discussing the issue now in order to prepare for increased traffic delays and potential environmental impacts from coal exports.

It starts with six proposed coal export terminals sprinkled along the Oregon and Washington state coasts. The proposed terminals would allow coal companies to ship coal to China, a nation with a hungry appetite for coal and loose en-

vironmental regulations regarding the energy source – unlike the United States.

Coal mines in the mountains of Wyoming and Montana would feed the Asian nation. Coal companies would theoretically ship the coal by train, which would require going through northern or southern Idaho. The Union Pacific railroad goes through Shoshone. At the moment, no coal trains pass through the town, said Aaron Hunt, spokesman for the railroad. If that does change, it won't be for several years, he said. But just how many railcars may go through Shoshone once the coal terminals open is still unknown,

Hunt said.

"It depends on where they open and what our clients decide to do," he said. "Everything is kind of up in the air at this point."

Environmentalists and government officials in the Pacific Northwest have criticized the proposed terminals. Kimberly Health Clinic Hits a Snag

KIMBERLY • Kimberly will have to revise its agreement with Family Health Services before a clinic can be built to serve the city's low-income population.

Elected officials still see a need for the clinic, but the city's plan to lease FHS a building for \$10,000 a year and transfer ownership to the nonprofit after 10 years failed to comply with state law.

The city has already been awarded a \$500,000 community development block grant to construct the clinic on the old City Hall site on Main Street.

But city officials didn't realize when

they signed an agreement with Family Health Services earlier this year that ownership of the property could not be transferred without a competitive bid or public auction process.

"We as a council didn't realize that it fell into that category," Mayor Tracy Armstrong said in an interview Wednesday. "Because of that, we have to go back to the drawing board to see how to handle this."

The council also didn't realize that the city could be responsible for repaying the grant if Family Health Services were to abandon the project within five years.

The legal snafu may not scuttle the project, but construction, originally *Please see* **COUNCIL, A3**

No Coliform Found in Monday School Water Tests

MALTA • Water samples taken Monday at three Cassia County schools all came back negative Tuesday for coliform bacteria.

Cassia County School District Superintended Gaylen Smyer said Wednesday all the samples taken from Raft River Elementary School, Raft River High School and Almo Elementary School were free of the bacteria, which often indicate the presence of other harmful bacteria and


pathogens.

Fourteen water samples were taken on Monday, including from three residences near the Raft River schools. One of the tests from a residence came back positive for coliform bacteria, but negative for the presence of E. coli.

The two Raft River schools, which share a water system, have been plagued with intermittent problems with the water for years. This was the first time the Almo school received a positive water test result.

U.S. Stocks Fall on Europe Unrest, Weaker Home Sales

NEW YORK • A mixed report about the housing market and unrest in Europe on Wednesday extended the longest losing streak for the Standard & Poor's 500 index since mid-July. Other risky assets, like European stocks and oil, fell more sharply.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 44.04 points, or 0.3 percent, to 13,413.51. The S&P 500 index fell 8.27, or 0.6 percent, to 1,433.32. The only category that rose was utilities, relatively safe stocks that tend to hold their value when the economy is weak. The Nasdaq composite average fell 24.03 points, or 0.8 percent, to 3,093.70.

Hidden History

When Blue Lakes Boulevard met the Waterfall at the Perrine Coulee

BLUE LAKES • Driving the boulevard in the early days was no easy task.

Early in the 20th century, Blue Lakes Boulevard began near the present-day Jerome County Airport, ran south through sagebrush to the top of the Snake River Canyon, followed an old Indian trail into the canyon and past the Blue Lakes, ferried the river, began the climb up the south wall of the canyon, ran under the falls at the Perrine Coulee and over the canyon rim, then shot straight south to Rock Creek.

"The scariest part of the trip was driving a team of horses under the Perrine Coulee," said Cleone Arrington, remembering the stories her mother used to tell.

Arrington's grandfather was a Mormon bishop who lived in Carey. Occasionally, church business would require

George Harris to travel to Albion. The trip from Carey to Albion took three days.

Arrington's mother, Florence, was a teenager when she would accompany her father on those trips.

Back then, that section of the boulevard - today known as Canyon Springs Road - ran under the waterfall, where irrigation water from the canal system dropped over the canyon's south rim on its way back to the Snake River.

When their wagon reached the waterfall, the skittish horses refused to go any farther, Arrington said.

George Harris would have to blindfold the horses and lead them on foot through the spray and the roar of the falling water. Florence Harris would drive the horses from the seat of the wagon.

In later years, automobiles would replace horse-drawn wagons on the grade and under the waterfall, but the fear factor probably remained.

The road into the canyon – which was built by I.B. Perrine in the 1890s was eventually rerouted to avoid the waterfall. The graveled road was finally widened and paved in the early 1970s.

Remnants of the old road can still be seen west of the coulee.

The Perrine Coulee formed as a result of the creation of the canal system in 1905.

Blue Lakes Boulevard ended at the canyon rim once the first rim-to-rim bridge was built in 1927.

T.F. Resident Kicks off 7,500 Mile Tour to Educate Others on Brain Injuries

TWIN FALLS • A former Twin Falls City Council member kicked off a 22-state tour here this week to prompt a national discussion of how people with brain injuries are treated.

Pamela Dowd's daughter, Brenna, died last year at age 28 after suffering a medically unexplained traumatic brain injury following retina repair surgery.

Dowd, 65, plans to travel more than 7,500 miles with her two dogs in a 34-foot trailer, talking to people with loved ones who have brain injuries, before ending her trip in Washington, D.C. She wants to share what she learned during Brenna's treatment with families, physicians, therapists and elected officials.

"I have learned you must ask the critical questions of the physicians and therapists right up front and you need to describe to them the type of personality your family member had before the injury," Dowd said. "They need to get to know and understand your injured family member almost as well as you do."

She learned that patients are evaluated on how they are responding to therapy according to a generic schedule medical personnel establish for progress.

"If patients do not respond according to pre-determined targets, therapeutic treatments may be significantly cut back or withdrawn altogether," said Dowd, who now lives in Boise.

The problem is that all traumatic brain injury patients don't respond to treatment in the same way, she added. She emphasized that family members must be ready to take over physical therapy if the amount of time a therapist can give the patient runs out.

Dowd described brain injuries as the slowest-improving injury in the medical field. However, she was able to help Brenna progress to the point of limited speech.

The single mother remembers her daughter's generosity, love of Boise State football, talent for baking and enjoyable times with her Miniature Pinscher. Brenna grew up and went to school in Twins Falls.

Dowd removed all her living room and dining room furniture so she could install exercise and rehabilitation equipment to help her daughter.

"My family room was ready for a hospital bed," she said. "I really thought in Brenna's case that being home with the family gave her the best chance for recovery."

Dowd said those with brain injuries are too often treated as though they are not a person.

"We can't just keep warehousing people. They are not vegetables."

One hospital official told her that the medical industry has a quota for accept ing brain injury patients. That person added that hospitals are trying to reduce the quota level because of the expense in giving extremely long-term care, Dowd said.

She is hoping to block that trend with help from U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo's office and other national lawmakers. The 31year Twin Falls resident also wants to see the medical community develop educational programs to teach families how to care for stricken relatives at home.

"I know (Brenna) would want her story told so other people don't face what she went through," Dowd said. "You give up everything before you give up hope. I can only fail if I don't keep trying."

Lawmakers Get Peek at Chobani

TWIN FALLS • Visiting members of the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee toured Chobani on Tuesday, getting a close look at the yogurt factory that will bring an estimated 400-500 jobs to Magic Valley.

Corporate spokeswoman Melissa Stagnaro talked about the company's history and what it plans to do at its Twin Falls facility.

Legislators were interested in what attracted Chobani to Southern Idaho (the labor

pool and the milk availability, among other things, Stagnaro said).

Here are some of the Chobani facts the legislators heard from Stagnaro during the presentation:

• Currently, Chobani makes up 50 percent of the Greek yogurt market in the United States. The Twin Falls factory will allow the company to more easily reach markets in the West. "There is definitely room to grow," Stagnaro said.

 It takes three pounds of milk to make one pound of Chobani yogurt, and 60,000 cows from 700

dairies to meet Chobani's needs at their New York factory.

• The Twin Falls facility will be four times larger than what the company has in New York.

• So far, \$300 million has been invested in construction for the approximately 900,000-square-foot facility.

Chobani doesn't have a set opening date for the Twin Falls factory, though Stagnaro said officials hope to open soon. "This fall is definitely our goal," she said.

\$10,000 Grant Goes to Filer High Ag Programs

on the horizon for Filer High School's agriculture program, thanks to local farmers. The school district received

a \$10,000 grant last week from Monsanto Fund after area farmers submitted a nomination.

Filer superintendent John Graham said the funding will be used for employee training on how to use blended learning to expand the agriculture program.

"We're very grateful for this opportunity," he said.

The grant was presented during a Friday homecoming assembly in Filer.

Through America's Farmers Grow Rural Education - an initiative sponsored by Monsanto Fund - farmers can nominate the school district their town for up to a \$25,000 grant to improve math and science education.

Out of 3,342 school districts nominated nationwide, Filer was among 176 to receive a grant.



An Attack on Free Speech

RALEIGH, N.C. • North Carolina is giving Steve Cooksey some choices. He can stop speaking. Or he can get a

Ph.D. in nutrition, or a medical degree, or a bachelor's degree in nutrition and then pass an examination after completing a 900-hour clinical internship. Or he can skip this onerous



credentialing, keep speaking, and risk prosecution.

He has chosen instead to get a lawyer. His case, argued by the libertarians at the Institute for Justice (IJ), will clarify the First Amendment's relevance to an ancient human behavior and a modern technology.

Four years ago, Cooksey was a walking - actually, barely walking - collection of health risks. He was obese, lethargic, asthmatic, chronically ill and pre-diabetic. The diet advice he was getting from medical and other sources was, he decided, radically wrong. Rather than eat a high-carbohydrate, low-fat diet, he adopted what he and other enthusiasts call a Paleolithic diet, eating as primitive humans did e.g., beef, pork, chicken, leafy green vegetables. Cooksey lost 75 pounds and the need for drugs and insulin. And, being a modern Paleo, he became a blogger, communicating his dietary opinions. When a busybody notified North Carolina's Board of Dietetics/Nutrition that Cooksey was opining about which foods were and were not beneficial, the board launched a three-month investigation of his Internet writings and his dialogues with people who read and responded to them. The board sent him copies of his writings, with red pen markings of such disapproved postings as: "I do suggest that your friend eat as I do and exercise the best they can."

"If," the board sternly said, "people are writing you with diabetic specific questions and you are responding, you are no longer just providing information — you are counseling — you need a license to provide this service." This had the intended effect of chilling his speech; his self-censorship stopped his blog. By saying his bloggings will be subject to continuous review, North Carolina hopes to silence him in perpetuity.

IJ's Jeff Rowes notes that Cooksey's speech "involves no sensitive relationship (as in psychological counseling), no uniquely vulnerable listeners (as in potential legal clients forced to make snap decisions), and no plausible presumption that the listeners are unable to exercise independent judgment." That presumption is, however, the animating principle of modern regulatory government. North Carolina is uninterested in the fact that Cooksey's advice is unpaid, freely solicited and outside any context of a professional-client relationship. The state simply asserts that Cooksey's audience is "a uniquely vulnerable population," which is how paternalistic government views everybody all the time.

Were Cooksey blogging for profit to sell beef and other Paleolithic food, he would be free to advise anyone to improve their health by buying his wares. So his case raises two questions:

Is an individual's uncompensated advice, when volunteered to other individuals who seek and value it, constitutionally protected? And does the Internet $-\operatorname{cost-free}$ dissemination of speech to spontaneous, self-generated audiences - render many traditional forms of licensing obsolete? Two principles are colliding. One is that when government regulates speech based on its content, judicial "strict scrutiny" of the regulation requires government to bear the burden of demonstrating a "compelling" need for "narrowly tailored" speech restrictions. The second is that when government regulates occupations in ways that restrict entry to them, excluded citizens bear an enormous burden of demonstrating that there is no reasonable basis for the regulation. People, being opinionated mammals, have been dispensing advice to one another since the advent of language, and have been foisting dietary opinions since cavemen weighed the relative benefits of eating woolly mammoths or saber-toothed tigers. So IJ has two questions for North Carolina and for the judicial system: Did Ann Landers and Dear Abby conduct 50-year crime sprees by offering unlicensed psychological advice? Is personal advice as constitutionally unprotected as child pornography? If so, since a 2010 Supreme Court opinion, it is less protected expression than videos of animals being tortured.



TIMES-NEWS **Nev. Student Teachers Lose Pell Grants**

RENO, Nev. (AP) • Low-income students who graduate with a degree in education are no longer eligible for Pell grants to complete the last hurdle needed to become a certified teacher - a semester of student teaching.

Chris Cheney, College of Education dean at the University of Nevada, Reno, tells the Reno Gazette-Journal that a change in federal policy means about 30 of UNR's education students could be affected each semester.

"The sad part is just last year, the Pell grant did cover student teaching after our students graduated," Cheney said. "But they reinterpreted the rule and are tightening up on Pell grants."

Teaching for 12 to 13 weeks in one of Nevada's school districts is required for an education school graduate to be licensed by the state.

"They don't want to pay for anything that goes beyond the baccalaureate degree," Cheney said of Pell grant administrators. "The problem is our students do their student teaching after they graduate."

Cheney said the rule will be a hardship for students who are expected to give up working at any other job to devote three months to fulltime student teaching.

"We highly recommended they don't try to work at another job because of all the time they spend planning and preparing for classes," Cheney said. "Student teaching is so extensive."

"We have about 250 to 300 education students who use the Pell grants, but the ones at jeopardy are the ones in their senior year who will be completing their degrees," Cheney said.

VAUGHN, N.M. (AP) • The police chief of the small eastern New Mexico town of Vaughn resigned Wednesday, leaving the town with just one certified member on its police force – a drug-sniffing dog named Nikka.

Dave Romero, attorney for the town, said Wednesday that police Chief Ernest "Chris" Armijo decided to step down after news stories reported that he wasn't allowed to carry a gun because of his criminal background.

"He decided the attention was distracting," Romero said.

State officials said Armijo couldn't carry a gun since acknowledging that he owed tens of thousands of dollars in delinquent child support payments in Texas. Armijo also faces new felony charges after being accused of selling a town-owned rifle and pocketing the cash.

Romero said Armijo is working to clear up the latest case. He said Armijo has not ruled out seeking the police chief's position again if his case is resolved and the position is open.

According to records, the only qualified member of the Vaughn Police Department is Nikka, a drugsniffing dog. Vaughn's other officer isn't certified and pleaded guilty to charges of

assault and battery last year. But Romero said not

having an officer qualified to carry a gun didn't put Vaughn at risk. "England doesn't allow police officers to carry guns," he said. "Sometime the strongest weapon in law enforcement is communication."

Vaughn, a town of about 450 located 104 miles east of Albuquerque, is a quiet town that is an overnight stop for railroad workers. And while residents say there is no crime problem, the town is set deep in what U.S. Homeland Security Investigations officials say is an isolated region of the state popular with drug traffickers.

Officials say the desolate roads in Guadalupe County make it hard for authorities to catch smugglers moving drugs from Mexico.

County Guadalupe Sheriff Michael Lucero said since news about the police chief's record became public his department has helped patrol Vaughn. But he said those efforts have put a slight strain on his already short-staffed department.

"I visit the town at least once a month," said Lucero. "The important thing is to keep a presence so residents know we're there to help if we're needed."

UC Pays \$1M Settlement in Pepper Spray Lawsuit

ment is approved, total costs associated with the incident could exceed \$2 million, according to the Sacramento Bee newspaper.

Those expenses come as UC faces the prospect of deep budget cuts if Gov. Jerry Brown's tax initiative fails in November.

UC and plaintiffs represented by the American Civil Liberties Union filed the preliminary settlement in U.S. District Court in Sacramento. The agreement, which was approved by the UC Board of Regents in mid-September, is subject to the approval of a federal judge, and parties have the right to appeal.

The settlement also calls for UC to set aside \$100,000 to pay other individuals who can prove they were arrested or pepper-sprayed.

The university would give the ACLU up to \$20,000 for its work reviewing free speech and protest policies at UC Davis.

IDAHO VETERANS CEMETARY TO EXPAND

BOISE (AP) • The Idaho Veterans Cemetery is receiving a \$2.5 million grant to expand its capacity with more burial sites.

Without the expansion, officials say the cemetery will run out of burial sites by 2016 and the columbarium that holds cremated remains would be at capacity by 2015.

The cemetery plans to use grant money from the Department of Veterans Administration to install nearly 2,900 additional burial sites and add roughly 3,700 spaces to the columbarium. The project will likely start in early October and finish next August.

Neo-Nazi Festival Has Boise Police on Alert

BOISE (AP) • The Boise mayor's office is fielding numerous complaints about a neo-Nazi music festival planned for early October, the city's police department said.

Authorities have been on alert since advertisements for Hammerfest 2012 near Boise surfaced online, said Sgt. Jeff Basterrechea, who is with the police department's gang intelligence unit. The white supremacist group Hammerskin Nation plans to hold the event Oct. 6, according to the flier circulating online.

"This is a very high priority," Basterrechea said. "The mayor's office has received numerous complaints about this."

The skinhead group is

rooted in Texas and has branches in Australia and Canada. The gunman who killed six worshippers at a Sikh temple in Wisconsin last month described himself as a member.

The group has not disclosed the exact location of the planned Idaho event and attempts to contact local Hammerskin chapters were unsuccessful, KTVB-TV reported. Police are working with local venues to make them aware of the group, Basterrechea said.

Former neo-Nazi skinhead Marine T.J. Leyden told the news station he previously recruited for the group with events like Hammerfest. Leyden, who famously left the movement in 1996 and has promoted tolerance ever since, said the Boise event will be used to boost the group's numbers.

"They're going to say, 'Hey, come to this show.' These kids are going to see it, they're going to get all pumped up, they're going to think it's fantastic," said Leyden, who cautioned that protesters should stay away and allow law enforcement to monitor the event.

"The group is extremely violent. The Hammerfests that they throw in different parts of the country are designed for a couple things. One it's designed for unity, but it's also designed to get people's anxiety up," Leyden said.

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Child Left Alone on School Bus, Found in Lot

LEWISTON (AP) • A 5year-old from north-central Idaho spent a half-hour alone in a parking lot after she was left on a school bus.

Miranda Main said her daughter, a Lewiston kindergartner, normally takes a bus to another school and then switches buses for the remainder of her ride home. But Main said that last Wednesday, neither the bus nor her daughter showed up.

"I waited for about half an hour, then started calling," Main told the *Lewiston Tribune.* "I called the bus barn and got an answering machine, then I called the school, and they said she did get on the bus."

After she made a panicked phone call to the school district's emergency line, workers found her daughter alone on the first bus, which was parked at the district's bus barn. She had been sitting on the bus for about 30 minutes, Main said, and may have fallen asleep.

"The driver didn't have her switch buses at Centennial, and she stayed on the same bus, which was a totally different route," Main said.

Lewiston School District Assistant Superintendent Bob Donaldson said he can't talk about specific incidents, but similar situations have happened in the past.

"It's very seldom, and we take it very seriously," he said.

Bus drivers are required to keep a checklist of students as they board and exit the bus, and they're also required to check every seat after they park, Donaldson said.

"We go through routine training and really harp on that and make sure that's understood and the drivers understand that's a responsibility they have," he said.

REBELS STRIKE SYRIAN CENTER WITH CAR BOMBS

BEIRUT (AP) • Syrian rebels struck deep in the fortress-like inner sanctum of President Bashar Assad's rule Wednesday in Damascus, detonating two car bombs that engulfed the army headquarters in flames.

The suicide bombings and subsequent gun battles in the Syrian capital killed at least five people, including a reporter for Iranian TV. The carefully orchestrated attacks highlighted the regime's growing vulnerability, even as the 18-month battle to bring down Assad is locked in a stalemate.

International diplomacy has failed to stop the bloodshed.

Making his debut on the global stage at the United Nations, Egypt's new President Mohammed Morsi said he will not rest until Syria's civil war is brought to an end. He blast going off inside the complex, with flames rising up behind trees.

After the second explosion, rebel fighters and regime forces exchanged fire for more than three hours, including inside the military compound, said Rami Abdul-Rahman of the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, an activist group. The fighting spilled over into nearby Omayyad Square, with regime troops - some wildly firing in the air – chasing after rebel gunmen, witnesses said.

Syrian state TV reported that four army guards were killed and 14 people were wounded, including civilians and military personnel.

The Iranian English language Press TV said one of its Syrian correspondents, 33-year-old Maya Nasser, was killed by a rebel sniper following the blast. The station replayed Nasser's last report, in which he was on the phone from Damascus during a live broadcast, when the line suddenly went silent. The Damascus bureau chief for Press TV, Hosein Mortada, was wounded in the clashes. "It is obvious that there are no more safe areas in Syria," said Hala, a 28year-old resident who only gave her first name for fear of repercussions. "We are all under fire." The two sides are deadlocked in the northern battle for Aleppo, Syria's largest city. In the western slice of Syria that is most heavily populated, rebels control large swaths of the countryside, while the regime is clinging to urban centers.

Police to Search for the Remains of Jimmy Hoffa Under Detroit Driveway

DETROIT • Police will be taking soil core samples at a home in the Detroit suburb of Roseville on Friday in search of the remains of missing Teamsters boss Jimmy Hoffa, whose 1975 disappearance sparked one of the 20th century's biggest mysteries.

"We received information from an individual who saw something," Roseville Police Chief James Berlin told the *Detroit Free Press.* "The information seemed credible, so we decided to follow up on it." Berlin wouldn't say who provided the tip — one of hundreds authorities have pursued in the years since Hoffa vanished from a restaurant parking lot in Oakland County, Mich.

Hoffa, 62, disappeared on the afternoon of July 30, 1975, from the parking lot of what then was the Machus Red Fox restaurant in Bloomfield Township. He had gone there for a reconciliation meeting with Anthony "Tony Pro" Provenzano, a mob-connected New Jersey Teamster official, and Anthony "Tony Jack" Giacalone, a Detroit mafia captain.

Despite thousands of tips,

authorities never found Hoffa's body, and no one has been charged in his disappearance. Hoffa's daughter, Barbara Crancer, a retired St. Louis administrative judge, said she doesn't hold out much hope the search will produce her father's body or solve the mystery of his disappearance.

"I don't put much credence into it," she said Wednesday afternoon. "I don't think the case will ever be solved. Too many people are dead and gone. I believe there are people out there who know what happened, but they're not talking.

"After so many false turns,

I'll be surprised if anything comes of it. But as his daughter, I would like to have a body to bury?

Washington Monument Will Take More Than a Year to Repair

WASHINGTON • Work to repair remaining earthquake damage to the closed Washington Monument will begin within about 30 days and be completed in 12 to 18 months, National Park Service officials said Wednesday.

The Park Service announced that Perini Management Services Inc. of Massachusetts had been chosen to complete the \$15 million project. The damage was caused by a magnitude 5.8 earthquake that struck the East Coast in August 2011.

"This is a major step toward getting the monument safely opened to the public once again," said Bob Vogel, superintendent of the National Mall and Memorial Parks. The \$9.6 million contract will be funded in part by a congressional appropriation of \$7.5 million. That sum was matched by philanthropist David Rubenstein, founder of the Carlyle Group.

"His support has been invaluable in our mission to restore and improve the National Mall, home to the history, heroes and hope of America," said Caroline Cunningham, president of the Trust for the National Mall.

Repairs have already been completed on the monument's elevator, which was severely damaged by the earthquake. Work yet to be finished includes removal of loose stone fragments, repair of stone and mortar joint damage, and replacement of the lightning protection system.

The western side of the National Mall is built on former marshland, which has caused the 555-foot-tall structure to gradually sink — albeit at an extremely slow rate.

"We did not find any change in the height of the structure that we could attribute to the earthquake," said Dave Doyle, chief geodetic surveyor at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. It is possible too that the monument is leaning slightly to one side, but Doyle confirmed that there is no current observational data available to make that determination.

IRANIAN PRESIDENT SAYS 'UNCIVILIZED ZIONISTS' THREATEN HIS COUNTRY

UNITED NATIONS • Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad told the United Nations General Assembly on Wednesday that "uncivilized Zionists" are threatening to attack his country, but he otherwise was silent on the continuing clash between Iran and world powers over the Tehran's disputed nuclear program.

Ahmadinejad, in an address that climaxed days of public and media appearances in New York, focused his remarks on what he described as an unjust international system, built around the United Nations, that oppresses the world in the interests of the West's wealthy minority.

He said his country has "suffered from the agonies of forced aggressions" from countries he didn't identify. He said that an "arms race and intimidation by nuclear weapons and weapons of mass destruction by hegemonic powers have become prevalent" and that a "continued threat by the uncivilized Zionists to resort to military action against our great nation is a clear example of this bitter reality."

He complained that the United Nations has no legitimacy, while praising the Non-Aligned Movement, which met weeks ago in Tehran with the Iranian

regime presiding. Ahmadinejad said he spoke for the group.

"A state of mistrust has cast its shadow on the international relations, whilst there is no trusted or just authority to help resolve world conflicts," he said.

Ahmadinejad didn't dwell for long on his regime's disputes with Israel, as he has in earlier remarks to the media this week. In an interview on Monday, he said Israel's presence in the Middle East would be only a short-term one, and predicted that before long it would be "eliminated."

Before the U.N., he took

aim at the materialism of the West and what he saw as the corruption of the

American political system. He said the wealthy in the United States spend "hundreds of millions of dollars" on elections, spending they viewed as just "an investment."

Powerful Americans don't care, he said, "about the 99 percent."

The U.S. and Israeli delegations didn't show up for the speech, but many others did, including representatives of Britain, France, the Palestinians and many Arab countries.

Outside the U.N., protesters denounced his visit.

PROMINENT RUSSIAN TYCOON FACES CRIMINAL CHARGES

MOSCOW (AP) • A Russian tycoon who has financed a newspaper critical of the Kremlin and supported the opposition has been charged with hooliganism and assault for punching a fellow billionaire during a television talk show. He dismissed the criminal case as politically motivated.

Russia's top investigative agency, which announced the charges Wednesday, said the defendant, Alexander Lebedev, cannot leave Moscow while the probe is under way. In Russia, filing charges marks the start of a criminal investigation, which may or may not lead to a trial. Lebedev said in comments carried by the Interfax news agency that he considers the charges against him political and "completely made up."

He could face up to seven years in prison, if he's convicted on hooliganism charges similar to those that were filed against three members of the feminist rock band Pussy Riot. They were sentenced to two years each last month for performing a "punk prayer" against President Vladimir Putin in Moscow's main cathedral. Putin has taken an increasingly tough course against dissent after massive protests against his rule last winter, with searches and interrogation of opposition activists and the passage of repressive bills.

Lebedev, whose net worth was reported by Forbes magazine to be \$1.1 billion, made his money in the banking industry. He has financed the Novaya Gazeta newspaper, which is fiercely critical of the Kremlin, and the British papers the Independent and the Evening Standard.

Lebedev's son, Yevgeny, who owns the two British publications, tweeted that his father is "being targeted by people who don't like his stance against corruption, and hate Novaya." He later described the charges as "extraordinarily disproportionate."

"My father has been targeted because of his determination to fight against corruption and to be a crusader for democracy in a country where this has not always been welcome," Lebedev's son said in a statement.

Toyota Joins Nissan in Saying Deeper China Output Cuts Loom

TOKYO • Toyota, Nissan and Honda signaled Wednesday that Chinese production cuts may deepen this month after anti-Japanese protests flared in the world's largest vehicle market.

Nissan lowered August output in China, its largest market by volume, 8.9 percent from a year earlier to 86,488 units, the Japanese carmaker said Wednesday. Chinese production fell 18 percent to 67,625 vehicles at Toyota, Asia's biggest automaker, and declined 10 percent at Honda.

Officials at the Japanese automakers said sales and production are poised to worsen in September after anti-Japan protests over disputed islets in the East China Sea escalated, with some demonstrators torching auto showrooms and smashing cars. Japanese autos will lose their lead this year over German name-

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plates in the country for the first time since 2005, China's Passenger Car Association estimates.

"You can't leave the Chinese market, but you may try to move the production line out of China for the time being,"said Yuuki Sakurai, president of Fukoku Capital Management. Investor demand for the automakers' shares "depends on how the companies are going to cover these risks," he said. Nissan fell 2.6 percent to 664 yen at the close in Tokyo trading, while Toyota dropped 2.7 percent and Honda declined 4.2 percent.

"The impact from the anti-Japan protests are not yet reflected in the August numbers," said Yurika Motoyoshi, a Toyota spokeswoman. "Last year's numbers were unusually high as we recovered from the earthquake and tsunami. We've already seen that orders are declining, so the protests' impact will be shown in the September numbers." Nissan said Wednesday it's halting Chinese production three days ahead of schedule to reflect demand, while Toyota said that it's suspending output from today until Oct. 8 at plants in Guangzhou and Tianjin, and at its Sichuan FAW plant starting Sept. 29.

Nissan will suspend production in China from Sept. 27 and resume output on Oct. 8 in view of the "current market situation," Chris Keeffe, a spokesman for the company, said by telephone Wednesday. The company makes cars in the country with Dongfeng Motor Corp.

"In previous years, they often added shifts around this time to meet rising demand during hot sales season in September and October," said Han Weiqi, a Shanghai-based analyst with CSC International Holdings Ltd. "Japanese automakers will see their market share be-

Billionaire Rinehart Sued for Ownership of Pilbara Ore Mines

SYDNEY (AP) • Gina Rinehart, Asia's richest woman who built a fortune from her father's iron-ore discoveries, is being sued by the heirs of his former partner for half of some assets in Western Australia's Pilbara's region, including a mine being built with Rio Tinto Group.

Wright Prospecting, founded by Peter Wright, who with Rinehart's father Lang Hancock discovered the iron ore deposits, said Hancock Prospecting has been making commercial decisions regarding the properties without Wright Prospecting's involvement.

"Wright Prospecting is now trying to recover its interest in those tenements,"Wright said Wednesday in an emailed response to questions from Bloomberg News, referring to part of the Hope Downs property. It's seeking a 50 percent stake in the Hope Downs 4, 5 and 6 tenements, according to a copy of the writ filed Sept. 24 in the Supreme Court of Western Australia in Perth and obtained by Bloomberg News Wednesday.

Hancock Prospecting and Rio jointly own the Hope Downs assets after a 2005 agreement. Hope Downs 4, owned 50 percent by Rio, will have annual capacity of 15 million metric tons once it is operating next year and will cost \$1.6 billion to build, according to an August statement from Rio.

Rio, based in London, is expanding its iron-ore mines in the Pilbara region to 353 million tons a year by the first half of 2015 from current capacity of 230 million tons, it said in August. Australia is the world's largest exporter of iron ore.

Wright accused Hancock of breach of trust for selling the Hope Downs property without its consent and breaches of fiduciary obligations.

Wright sought an accounting of all profits earned by Hancock from the Hope Downs 4, 5 and 6 assets and compensation for the breaches. It also sought a declaration from the court that Hancock held half the property in trust for Wright as well as any proceeds from the sale and royalties Hancock received. The dispute over Hope Downs between the heirs of Hancock and Wright continues an ongoing battle over assets. The two families have an 11year dispute over the Rhodes Ridge property, with a judge having awarded Rinehart's 25 percent stake in it to Wright. Rinehart appealed and a decision is pending.

Wright's children, Angela Bennett and Michael Wright, were listed the 14th wealthiest people in Australia last year on BRW's Rich 200 list. Michael Wright died in April. Rinehart is the 35th richest person in the world, with a net worth of \$18.8 billion, according to the Bloomberg Billionaires Index.

The Hancock and Wright partnership owned the tenements, now known as Hope Downs 4, 5 and 6 in the 1970s, Wright said in the statement. The tenements were re-awarded in 1989 by the Western Australian government and held by Hancock on the partnership's behalf, according to Wright.

Lang Hancock and Peter Wright, whose lifelong friendship and business relationship appeared to be deteriorating by the early 1980s according to court records, initially agreed in 1983 to carve up some of their properties, with each having the option of taking full control of their portion.

Greek Protest Turns Violent During Strike

ATHENS, Greece • Police clashed with protesters hurling petrol bombs and bottles in central Athens Wednesday after an anti-government rally called as part of a general strike in Greece turned violent.

Riot police used tear gas and pepper spray against several hundred demonstrators after the violence broke out near the country's parliament. Protesters also set fire to trees in the National Gardens and used hammers to smash paving stones and marble panels to use as missiles against the riot police.

About 50,000 people joined the union-organized march in central Athens on Wednesday, held during a general strike against new austerity measures planned in the crisis-hit country. The action, the first large-scale walk-out since the country's coalition government was formed in June, closed schools and disrupted flights and most services.

Everyone from shopkeepers and pharmacists to teachers, customs workers and car mechanics joined the demonstration, seen as a test of public tolerance for more hardship after two years of harsh spending cuts and tax hikes.

"People, fight, they're drinking your blood," protesters chanted as they banged drums.

As the strike got under way Wednesday, Greece's prime minister and finance

minister hammered out a \$14.87 billion package of spending cuts demanded by the country's international lenders.

Greece's politicians have struggled to come up with more austerity measures that would be acceptable to its rescue creditors, with disagreements arising between the three parties that make up the coalition government. The country has been dependent on international loans from other eurozone

countries and the International Monetary Fund since mid-2010. Without them, Greece would be forced into a chaotic default on its debts and possibly into an exit from the 17-country bloc that uses the euro.

The country's lenders have demanded more fiscal reforms if they are to continue issuing more rescue payouts. The next payment of 31 billion (euro) hinges on the government agreeing to further cuts.

Finance Minister Yannis Stournaras and Prime Minister Antonis Samaras formulated a deal on the new \$14.8 billion austerity package for 2013-14, along with an additional \$2.56 billion in improved tax collection, a finance ministry official said Wednesday morning.

The other two party leaders were to be briefed by Samaras on Thursday, a party official said. Both spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak on the record.

Wednesday's strike shut the Acropolis, down Greece's most famous tourist site, and halted flights for hours. Ferry services were suspended, schools, shops and gas stations were closed and hospitals were functioning on emergency staff.

One of those striking was Athens hospital worker Alkis Betses, who has seen his monthly salary fall from \$1,680 to \$1,035, says new cuts will bring it down to \$775.

"How can you survive on 600 a month, with ever-rising taxes, and continue to pay bills and buy necessary supplies?"

Betses said hospitals have been hard hit by spending cuts, with staff shortages and long delays in doctors' overtime pay for night shifts.

"The resentment has been there for long before the new measures. Imagine what will happen when they're made public," he said.

During the past three fiscal years, the Justice Department has filed nearly 1,500 mortgage fraud cases against nearly 3,000 defendants, according to an agency spokesperson. During that same stretch, the department saw a 92 percent increase in the number of mortgage fraud prosecutions. FBI agents also have worked on a record volume of cases in recent years. The overwhelming majority used to involve fraud related to the origination of mortgages, but now about 40 percent of the bureau's case load involves homeowner-rescue

In France, Hollande's Honeymoon Period Ends

PARIS • After a swell of euphoria over President Francois Hollande's electoral victory in May and a blissful timeout for summer vacation, France is coming to grips with a harsh reality of high unemployment, tax increases and budget cuts imposed by a flat-lining economy and Europe's perilous debt crisis. The realization that tough times lie ahead was slow in coming in part because, during the election campaign, Hollande decried austerity measures outlined by former President Nicolas Sarkozy and suggested renewing economic growth was the best recipe for paring down the debt. Moreover, Hollande promised to renegotiate a treaty committing European Union countries to limiting their debt to 3 percent of gross domestic product, raising hope that the economic discipline implied in such a goal could be bypassed. But once installed as president, Hollande settled for a side agreement bundling several previously funded E.U. growth programs with limited impact on the slumping economies of the union's 27 member nations. Now it is Hollande's own finance minister, Pierre Moscovici, who is insisting that the treaty must be ratified as is and



Although Sarkozy holds to a self-imposed silence, his followers in the conservative opposition have seized on the bleak economic situation to intensify criticism of Hollande as inept and of his Socialist Party as naive and out of touch. Francois Fillon, who was Sarkozy's prime minister, raised fears in a recent Q&A in Le Figaro newspaper that Hollande could lead the country "into a lasting recession, dragging Europe into a major crisis, with a threat to the European currency." From the far left, former presidential candidate Jean-Luc Melenchon was even more caustic. Although eliminated from the first round of presidential voting, he said he would have been more able to govern the country "than this gang of penguins," suggesting Hollande's ministers were strutting around like emptyheaded Arctic birds. Although the threats to Europe and its currency were already intense during Sarkozy's rule, many French people seem to agree - with Fillon if not with Melenchon. Hollande's standing in a key opinion poll has plummeted 11 percent since vacations ended, to an unusually low 43 percent approval rating in a survey published Sunday in the Journal du Dimanche.

box for Asia's superpowers, one in which the United States is deeply entangled. The U.S. occupied the islands after World War II and was ultimately responsible for handing back administrative authority to Japan.

Until the late 19th century, the Chinese had the strongest claim to the islands. The Chinese name, Diaoyu, (taken from a legend about a fisherman) appears in literature dating back to the 13th century. Ming Dynasty records describe the islands as navigational markers for ships traveling between China and Okinawa, which was then part of a kingdom known as Liuqiu or Ryukyu.

Chinese ships occasionally stopped at the largest island to replenish supplies of fresh water and firewood. The only documented Japanese presence is from the 16th century, when Japanese pirates used an island as a base for launching raids against the Chinese coast.

The border between China and Liuqiu was an underwater trough to the east of the islands, making them clearly part of Chinese territory, wrote Japanese scholar Unryu Sugislands probably belonged to China ("It has been found that these islands lie near the border area with the Qing ... and have Chinese names," the Japanese foreign minister wrote in an 1884 memorandum, according to Suganuma's book.) But the government changed its mind in 1895, the same year that it annexed Taiwan after its decisive victory in the first Sino-

> Japanese war. Japan declared the islands terra nullius, basically no man's land, and formally annexed them. The name Senkaku was a translation of "Pinnacle Islands," which British seamen had been using as a nickname for the islands because of their steep rock formations.

"The islands were part of the booty of war," said Han-yi Shaw, a scholar from Taiwan, which also lays claim to the islands.

Given a 30-year lease to the islands, the Koga family invested substantially in them. On the largest, they built houses, reservoirs and piers, and set up a collection center for albatross feathers for export to Europe as well as a processing plant for dried bonito flakes, an ingredient in Japanese fish broth. Up to 248 workers lived on the island, many of them children, as it was difficult to recruit adults to go to such a remote place.

"There was great hardship living on that island. Charter boats didn't want to stop there; food and fuel had to be imported. Koga hired children between the ages of 7 and 12 and to sweeten the deal built a pute. But this was the Cold War and they didn't want the islands to fall into communist hands," said Suganuma.

Zenji Koga later sold the islands to the Kurihara family, real estate developers who did little with the property except to lease one island to the Japanese Defense Ministry for training exercises and occasional use by the U.S. military.

The current flare-up began in April when the right-wing Tokyo governor, Shintaro Ishihara, announced during a visit to the Washing-

ton-based Heritage Foundation that he was raising money to buy the islands from the Kuriharas for an estimated price of \$26 million and that he would try to develop them for tourism. The Japanese government stepped in, saying it would purchase three of the islands instead. (The island leased to the military is owned by a Kurihara sister and is not included in the sale.)

There is also a private Chinese claimant to the islands: In the 1970s, the granddaughter of a prominent pharmacist produced a will and purported edict from the late Empress Dowager Cixi bequeathing the island to her grandfather, Sheng Xuanhuai. Scholars have been divided about whether the edict was genuine, but in any case, the family never developed the property. (Ironically, the heirs now operate a Chinese restaurant in Japan.)

Chinese were outraged by the proposed sale of the islands they believe are rightfully theirs. Violent protests broke out this month in dozens of Chinese cities with Japanese stores and factories attacked and Japanese-model cars

Archery Season Comes to a Close

Hunters, Sunday is the last day of archery season. But don't fret. More hunts open in October.

Sharp-tail grouse season opens Oct. 1, providing Magic Valley upland game hunters with opportunity to bag birds in areas east of Interstate 84 in Cassia County, said Regan Berkley, regional biologist with Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

Other Magic Valley areas are closed to sharp-tail, though upland hunters have been known to travel distances to harvest the birds. Hint: eastern Idaho.

"The numbers we've seen have been good," Berkley said, noting that hunters need a sage grouse permit and a sharp-tail permit.

Rifle hunt: A lot of young deer are expected in the South Hills this season.

"We had a mild winter," Berkley said. "What that means is that we had good fawn survival and a pretty good crop of yearlings out in the hills."

That could be good news for hunters who aren't looking for trophy animals. "Young bucks don't have things quite figured out yet."

Check stations: They'll be set up in October at some places where deer harvest is expected, Berkley said.

But it's not all business at stations, she said. Sometimes they'll measure antlers, and it's always fun to see what hunters bring out of the hills. — Andrew Weeks

Best Bets for Fall Offroading

JEROME • A busy work schedule and other commitments keep Ryan Patrick from riding the trails as much as he'd like. But whenever he does have the chance to get out, it comes as a blessing.

The Twin Falls man prefers heading north, to Fairfield or Stanley, but when time doesn't permit he might go closer to home — to the South Hills or Devil's Corral.

I met up with Patrick on Sept. 22 at Devil's Corral, north of the Perrine Bridge, just as he was suiting up for an afternoon ride with his buddy Tristan Benavidez, also of Twin Falls.

Benavidez was riding an all-terrain vehicle, Patrick a dirt bike. As the two readied to ride, the machines sat inside

F&G: Several Ways to Detect Wildlife Crimes

JEROME • Don't even think about breaking the law this hunting season.

Chances are good that you'll be caught.

In areas where the Idaho Department of Fish and Game receives complaints of spotlighting or other suspicious activity near roads, conservation officers will use "artificial simulated animals" to apprehend unlawful hunters.

Artificial simulated animals, commonly called ASAs, are life-like specimens of deer, elk and other game species.

Aside from the inherent danger in shooting from a vehicle or road, road hunting for wildlife brings to question the ethical behavior of some hunters. Most hunters abide by the laws, but those who do not continue to perpetuate a negative image for hunters.

"Road hunters are the visible minority," said Mark Hill, regional conservation officer of Lewiston. "They are what everyone sees, and many of their activities are bad for the image of all hunters."

Many of the citations issued to road hunters, who violate game laws, include spotlighting, trespassing, shooting from a motorized vehicle, shooting across the road and waste of game. The penalties for shooting an artificial animal may include a mandatory license revocation and a fine up to "Road hunters are the visible minority. \$1,000 and a jail sentence up to six months. There also is a \$50 minimum restitution penalty for shooting an ASA to help maintain the decoys.

The use of such tools has been upheld in the court systems across the country as a legitimate method of apprehending violators and has helped to reduce illegal hunting. More than 48 states and several Canadian provinces have been using artificial animals since the late 1980s.

To check for law compliance, officers will conduct impromptu enforcement check stations at which all hunters and anglers, successful or not, must stop. Usually conducted on less traveled roads and set up at any time day or night, impromptu check stations are another tool officers use to detect wildlife crimes. would take only a couple of seconds before his bike's wheels became coated in dirt.

'A Tremendous Amenity'

Ketchum city approves master plan for whitewater park.

KETCHUM • Jeff Smull can wax eloquently about Sun Valley's skiing, mountain biking, hiking, fly-fishing and golf. But there's one thing missing, he says: A whitewater park.

That's about to change.

The Ketchum City Council has approved a master plan for a \$2.7 million park that would run along 1,500 feet of the Big Wood River near Hulen Meadows just north of Ketchum.

"It'll be just a tremendous amenity for a mountain town like Ketchum," said Smull. "Having something like this is in keeping with the Sun Valley thing and the Idaho thing since Idaho is the whitewater state of the U.S."

"There are certainly enough characters around who'd use it," added Scooter Carling, a Ketchum river guide.

Strategically placed drop features would create a variety of play waves on the river that kayakers can surf and perform flips at various water levels.

There also would be nature trails, wildlife viewing areas, dog play areas and fishing sites. The city hired S20 Design

and Engineering, a Lyons, Colo.-based whitewater park design firm to build the park. S20 designed the 2012 London Olympics whitewater course, which was voted the best venue of the Olympics.

Three-time Olympic kayaker Scott Shipley said he would expect the park to attract up to 50 kayakers a day during spring and early summer. Otherwise, the park will likely see the same amount and kinds of uses the area pond gets today.

Jen Smith, director of parks and recreation for Ketchum, said she hopes that the park will attract out-of-towners who might be persuaded to stop a couple days and practice their kayaking skills before heading on to the Middle Fork and Main Salmon rivers in early summer when tourism revenue for local businesses is at a seasonal low.

"I suspect the majority of users will be local and regional," she added.

This particular stretch of river was deemed the best site for a park because it's sur-

rounded by public property.

"This will give people an area they can take kids and have a safe experience. The Big Wood is called the Big Wood because it has a lot of logs and debris in it and that makes it pretty unsafe for those who want to boat or ride it in innertubes," Smith said.

Smith said she hopes construction can begin in 2014 with the park opening in the spring of 2015.

First there must be a \$101,240 environmental assessment, paid for by the Wood River Land Trust, the White Water Park Committee and the city.

The city also has applied

for a patent from the BLM to create a park on the BLM land. The Recreational and Public Purposes Act permits public lands owned by BLM to be transferred to local governments for recreational purposes. The city already has been providing seasonal maintenance for the area since the BLM's Shoshone office doesn't have the resources to take care of it on a daily basis.

The park will have a more natural look than the new whitewater park in Boise or the Cascade park that hosted the USA Freestyle Kayaking National Championships last July.

Tired of the same ol' places to ride? Here are five suggestions for fall offroading.

South Hills

Twin Falls resident Kent Gillett has been riding dirt bikes for about as long as he can remember. He devotes most of his riding time to motocross, and he and his Yamaha CRF450 are frequent visitors of Rock Creek Race Track near Kimberly.

But if you were to head out tomorrow, I asked, some place in the backcountry, where would you go? Probably the South Hills, he replied.

"It's a really good spot," Gillett said, noting the hills' fall-colored landscapes are a boon. "There are several different trails to ride."

The hills are most popular for ATV riding, because of their wide trails, but dirt bikers enjoy these easy trails, too. One popular trail is Porcupine-Alpine, an 11mile loop accessed near Third Fork south of Magic Mountain Ski Resort. Head north of the resort to the Diamondfield Jack Snow Play Area to access other trails.

Fairfield

Another place Gillett likes to ride is Chimney Creek near Fairfield, where "there's really good singletrack trails for offroad fun," he said.

Chuck Sharp, co-owner of J&C Motorsports in Twin Falls, said he also enjoys Chimney Creek and knows several other riders who do, too. Trails here are best suited for intermediate dirt bike riders, Sharp said. But novice riders also can find trails.

The narrow trails here are best suited for dirt bikes, not ATVs, and offer dirt and wooded terrain and hill climbs.

The foothills near Soldier Mountain, also in Fairfield, are another scenic place to ride, Sharp said, and have much the same type of terrain.

For four-wheelers there's the Wilson Flat ATV trail system, which includes about 11 miles of loop trails designed for ATVs. These trails offer scenic views of Anderson Ranch Reservoir, South Fork of the Boise River and the surrounding area.

Get trail maps from the Fairfield Ranger District office.

Baumgartner

A lot of the riders Sharp knows also like to ride their offroad machines at Willow Creek in the Baumgartner complex of trails, he said.

Trails are accessed from the Baumgartner Campground along the South Fork of the Boise River about 12 miles east of Featherville.

Trails here are for both two- and four-wheelers; some are easier than others, but experienced dirt bikers like the single tracks and switchbacks.

Another popular trail: 9mile Iron Mountain Trail, accessed about one mile west of the campground. The trail originally was a road providing access to Iron Mountain Lookout. Motorized travel is heavy, according to the Sawtooth National Forest website, and is restricted to vehicles with 48-inch or less wheel base. "The highlight of the trail," reads the website, "is the scenic view from the Forest Service Lookout on Iron Mountain."

Hemingway Butte

Hemingway Butte, which boasts a 2,602-foot mountain summit and several 1,000-feet peaks in Owyhee County, has a number of trailheads with access to literally hundreds of miles of roads. Single-track trails are specific for dirt bikes only, while ATV riders can access others.

Terrain here is varied,

from wide dirt trails to more difficult narrow, wooded and pock-marked trails. According to the Bureau of Land Management, all types of surfaces may be encountered, from sand washes to rocky landscapes.

From Hemingway Butte - which is near Walters Ferry about 18 miles south of Nampa and a mile west of Reynolds Creek Road - visitors may also access popular Rabbit Creek and Fossil Creek trailheads.

Yankee Fork

About 12 miles north of Stanley, Yankee Fork is a challenging place to ride. And what better time to visit its two ghost towns than before Halloween?

Rob Glodowski, of Action Cycles 'n Sleds in Twin Falls, said in a former Times-News article that it is one of his favorite trail systems because it offers challenges that other systems do not.

Don't expect to go fast here. Average speed for experienced riders is only about 22 mph. But, he said, that's fast for these trails.

Don't worry, ATV buffs. The area also offers opportunity for exploration on four wheels.

Star and Flame Colors Have Different Origins

t's a common misconception that the same process is responsible for the colors of both candle flames and stars. While there's a tiny grain of truth in this notion, it's mostly wide of the mark. Sky Calendar

First the truth: The blue part of the candle flame, nearest the wick, is **Planets**: hotter than the yellow part near the top. So it is with stars: Blue stars are hotter, and reddish stars are cooler. But the similarities end there.

The bluish part of a candle flame is a cloud of vaporized wax, whose molecules get broken apart, liberating carbon and hydrogen atoms. The combination of oxygen, carbon, and hydrogen (i.e. combustion) produces blue light by chemiluminescence (a cooler version of which gives fireflies their glow). The heat of combustion then excites the carbon compounds' electrons, which emit blue light when they return to lower energy states.

The yellow part of a candle flame comprises a rising cloud of soot particles (large carbon molecules) glowing like microscopic campfire embers. Unlike soot particles -

which are solid – stars are gas, and much hotter.

While the highest temperature in a candle flame (in the dull orange-brown region) might reach 2,600 degrees Fahrenheit, the coolest stars are at least 4,200 degrees and the hottest may reach 72,000 degrees Fahrenheit. A

Whitewater features will be built on nine natural structures that already exist. Eddies – areas of slow water – will be incorporated into the design as safe areas in case kayakers come out of their boats.

"It'll be great for the kids growing up, for adaptive

sports, wounded warriors anytime you can get to the water, it's a healing process," said Smull. "And like the halfpipe in the ski business, it'll attract people to watch kayakers do tricks. People take picnics to the whitewater park in Reno and never get their feet in the water but they have a ball watching the kayakers play in the hydraulics."

Sharp-tailed Grouse Season to Open

JEROME • Attention, upland game bird hunters, sharp-tailed grouse season opens Oct. 1.

The season runs through Oct. 31, with a daily bag limit of two birds and a possession limit of six.

The season is open only in eastern Idaho in these areas: Bingham and Clark counties east of Interstate 15, Franklin, Fremont, Jefferson County east of Interstate 15, Madison, and Teton counties, Bonneville County east of Interstate 15, Bannock County east of Interstate 15 and south of Interstate 86, Bear Lake, Caribou, Cassia County east of Interstate 84 and that portion west of Interstate 84 south of the Malta-Sublette Road and east of the Malta-Strevell Road, Franklin, Oneida, and Power County south of Interstate 86.

Sharp-tailed grouse have been introduced into historical range in southern Twin Falls county and southeast

ern Owyhee County. Twin Falls County, Owyhee County and most of Cassia County are closed to the hunting of sharp-tailed grouse. Sharp-tailed grouse also occur around Split Butte area in Minidoka County. Hunting of sharp-tailed grouse is closed in Minidoka County.

person hunting Any sharp-tailed grouse must have in their possession a valid Idaho hunting license with a sage/sharp-tailed grouse permit validation at \$4.75. The permit, available at Fish and Game license vendor, sallows better monitoring of the harvest of this game bird.

Enjoying the Musky Mornings and Golden Days of Grouse Season

NORTH OF DULUTH, Minn. • The old tote road trail not only looks right on this opening day of Minnesota's 2012 grouse season it smells right, too.

The trail is dappled with fallen aspen leaves, and every grouse hunter knows they smell earthy and a little bit sour. It's the smell of fall in the North Woods.

It is still early on this opening day in mid-September, cool and damp, and the sun throws long shadows down the trail. For now, it is just the yellow dog and I, working a familiar two-track about 20 miles north of Duluth.

This isn't supposed to be a banner year for ruffed grouse in Minnesota or Wisconsin. The bird population is start ing its downhill slide toward the bottom of its 10-year cycle. Drumming counts were down significantly last spring in both states.

But for most of us who hunt grouse, the hunt isn't about how many thousands of birds will be taken this fall. It's about getting out in some good country, poking along with an old shotgun and seeing what opportunities present themselves. One satisfying shot, a couple of startling flushes, can make a hunter's whole week

The dog courses back and forth from one side of the trail to the other. She has figured out, with some prodding, that this is the way to hunt grouse. A swing into the woods on the left. A swing to the right. When she crosses the trail, she throws a split-second glance over her shoulder to make sure the guy in blaze or ange is still there.

A person can get spoiled hunting with an 8-year-old dog who understands the game.

The woods are brilliant with color. The maples are coming on in shades of peach and crimson. The sumac leaves are the color of merlot. The popples and birches quiver in gold. Every time the dog bumps an aspen on her passes, more gold coins shower down.

A quick look into the woods, though, tells me that any flushing grouse will have the advantage. The cover is still dense. I'm soon able to confirm this when a grouse launches into flight among the alders. I throw the gun up but catch only intermittent glimpses of dusky feathers. On top of that, the bird takes low trajectory, just over the dog. The familiar shoot/don't shoot scenario plays instantly in my brain, and I pass on the shot out of concern for the dog.

The whirring of the bird's wings diminishes to nothing, and the forest is silent again.

Other hunters are celebrating the opener as well. When I stop at Island Lake to refill the dog's water bottles, I come across Dan Frigaard of Duluth fishing just below the Island Lake bridge.

"I already got a grouse," says Frigaard, 32. "I saw four, got one. Now I'm trying to get a walleye."

Frigaard was hunting alone, without a dog. Early.

"I was north of Boulder Lake at 5:30," he says. "I started walking at 6:25 or 6:30."

He likes the early shift. "It's peaceful. The wind's calm. You can hear a lot better," he says. "I typically have my best luck in the morning."

A little later, Dan Mettner of Duluth is finishing a swing through woods on a snowmobile trail with Riley, his 11-month-old half yellow Lab, half golden retriever. In an hour's walk, he hasn't flushed a bird.

"I'd like to get one," Mettner says, looking down at Riley. "I'd like to see what he does. He retrieves real well." At midday, I encounter Jim Winklesky Jr. and Amy Swanson of Rice Lake Township riding their four-wheelers. Winklesky has a shotgun on his rear rack. Both are wearing blaze orange.

"It's pretty slow around here," Winklesky says, assessing the grouse numbers. "I've been hunting around here since I was a kid. I haven't heard or seen that many this fall. It's just slow."

They've ridden 15 or 20 miles, Winklesky says. A couple of hours. They haven't seen a bird yet.

"We've seen a lot of deer, though," he says.

The yellow dog and I find another trail we've hunted before and take one more walk. I haven't hunted here for a while, but it used to produce some birds. Sure enough, on a rise topped with 20-year-old popples, the dog plunges in and all but disappears in the foliage. I hear one bird flush but never see it. Another appears and disappears in the same instant in the slice of sky right over the trail. No shots are fired.

The dog snuffles the spot hard, trying to make another bird materialize, but it won't happen.

It's still early in this season. We will be back in a couple of weeks, when the birds are dispersing. We'll be back when the leaves are down and thick on the trail, making the woods smell even more like grouse hunting.

Another Early Morning in Birdland

RENVILLE, Minn. • The issue Friday night when we turned off the shack's gas lights was whether alarm clocks in sufficient number would awaken us at 4. We also wondered just how cold our two-bit clapboard hovel might get and whether a fire in the woodburning stove would be required. Camouflage hanging from nails and cots carpeting the floor, this was as close to "Deliverance" as a fella could get without being in the movie itself.

As it happened, every weirdo jingle imaginable awakened our crew at the appointed hour. Smarters to Iowa and points south already on Friday.

Yet as the gloom of first light arched overhead, ducks took wing. Mostly these were teal. But reasonable smatterings of mallards also outlined themselves against the brightening sky. Watching every wing beat, Cole and Parker were as alert as sentries.

The morning's earliest fliers teased the two boys, who flamed their barrel ends but drew no feathers. But they chambered more cartridges, and more still, and soon a smattering of hard-luck ducks peeled away from their squadrons and somersaulted into the boys' decoys, dead.

Back, I'd huff when this occurred, directing Duke,

Don't Kid Yourself, Archery is Expensive for Bow Hunters

BY MIKE LEGGETT

AUSTIN, Texas • When I got into bow hunting, I naively thought that I would save some money on equipment and get lots of extra hunting time with the special season.

bought the bow, all you need are a few arrows, maybe some points, a face mask and some smell-good scents, and you're in business.

This is America, the land of consumerism, where bigger means better and better means more.

As I recall, my first bow, with a dozen arrows and a carrying case, cost me \$1,200. The last one, with no carrying case and no arrows, cost me close to \$1,500. Arrows run about \$100 a dozen, and, between shooting hogs and targets, I go through a couple of dozen during the year.

Mechanical broad heads

run about \$12 each in a package of three, and I'll use three or four packages each year. Throw in field points for practice and fixed broad heads for hogs, and there's another \$150 every year.

Then, I have to buy a couple of pop-up blinds every year, because they just don't make those things to last. That's another \$300-400. Scents will set me back \$30 a season, and I'll buy some new kind of camouflage every year, so figure another \$50-75 for that.

What I'm getting at here is that hunting costs money; bow hunting costs real money.

Take binoculars and range finders, for example.

Ordinary binoculars will not do when you're bow hunting.

Unless you want to be chasing wounded animals or watching your \$10 arrow go sailing off into the atmosphere, you better have some kind of range finder hanging from your neck when you're hunting.

phones in the hands of smart alecks will get you that: duck quacks rising from one cot, harps strumming from another, also car horns and various techno beats that have no place whatsoever in a backwoods shanty. Soon, oatmeal and orange juice were on the table. We wanted to eat more poorly, really laying into eggs and sausages. We just didn't have time.

Across Minnesota on Saturday morning when the state's most recent duck season opened, some waterfowlers surely had only short distances to cross from where they slept to where they hunted. This did not include us. Tangles of cedar and buckthorn needed conquering to reach our waters. Thankfully, the younger among our crew were happy to break trail, bags of decoys on their backs, trigger fingers itching.

With me were Parker Smith, a Willmar eighthgrader, and my son, Cole, a high school junior. On another stand overlooking a different portion of the same waterway were Matthew Smith, Parker's brother, and Neil Smith, the boys' cousin. We had another good gun not far away: Harrison Smith, brother to Matthew and Parker, and not far from him, Willy Smith, dad or uncle to all Smiths present.

Shooting time for us Saturday was 6:34 a.m. But the morning was dark. And cold. And windy, with strong gusts whirling from the north and northwest. Our decoys, once set, bobbed in mini-whitecaps, and I worried they might not attract even a whiff of winged fowl: Any bluewinged teal or wood duck worthy of its name should have ridden these nor'west-

the young black Labrador at my side, to retrieve.

The appeal here is to all of the senses: Smell, with the marsh's pungency; also the sight of waterfowl arrowing over water; the explosion of gunfire; and, finally, the telltale splash of a duck cartwheeling into water, a retrieving dog soon also on the crash site, eager to fulfill his birthright while earning a pat on the head. Mark, Cole said, signal-

ing that birds were approaching.

This was a tight knot of mallards he saw, banking hard against the chilled breeze before slipping air through their primary feathers and losing altitude. Bang. The boys' shot-

guns echoed.

And twice more: Bang. Bang.

A big duck fell, and the boys reloaded.

Meanwhile, Neil. Matthew and Harrison, and Neil's good dog, Jade, also were having a day of it, jacking an occasional mallard but folding mostly teal before sleeving their scatterguns in late morning.

In the end, this was a day for brothers, cousins and friends, collecting as they did some 25 birds. Willy and I mostly looked on, as our next generation of waterfowlers, and the next generation still, entombed forever memories of big days over decoys.

The dogs were tired. We cleaned the birds. The sun set. We fired up the grill.

Before us soon was a duck feast on paper plates, the birds marinated first, then braised delicately, salad and beans on the side.

Harps strumming, ducks quacking, techno beats pulsating.





Youth Golf Facility **Breaks Ground in Rupert**

No. 3 CSI Confident Ahead of Top 5 Showdown

TWIN FALLS • The College of Southern Idaho's comefrom-behind five-set win over Salt Lake Community College isn't that far in the team's rearview mirror, but the Golden Eagles are treating it like ancient history.

"That one's done, and it was pretty easy to forget about that and get ready for this week," sophomore outside hitter Emily Ottinger said after Wednesday's practice.

The Golden Eagles (17-1), who moved up a spot to third in the NJCAA Division I poll released Wednesday, back-door swept Salt Lake after dropping the first two

Built adjacent to Rupert Country Club at 100 South and 200 West, "Wee Links" will feature a short six-hole course, a clubhouse, storage area and patio area.

The project is headed by Rupert Rotary Club, with partnerships by the Rupert Elks Lodge and Rupert Country Club.

"It's truly a community service-driven idea," said Charlie Creason, co-president of the Rupert Rotary. "Lifetime sports, golf especially, teach kids to play by the rules, respect, honor, and the sort of values that make for good kids. Making (golf) affordable is always a challenge in a small rural community. Here is a way kids can learn the game without very much cost, and hopefully they will grow up and take those life skills on and become productive members of our community."

Creason said Wee Links will offer programs, golf lessons and clinics for youth. According to preliminary design plans provided to the Times-News, hole lengths are estimated to range from 68 to 133 yards.

"One of the disadvantages of trying to get kids involved with golf at a young age is they only have a limited attention span. If they go out on a regular golf course and have to hit the ball 15 times to get to the green, they may have lost their attention by the time they get there. A short course like this is scaled to what kids can do," Creason said.

"Lifetime sports, golf especially, teach kids to play by the rules, respect, honor, and the sort of values that make for good kids."

Initial design work was completed with a \$5,000 grant from Project Mutual Telephone (PMT) Foundation. Creason is CEO of PMT.

The First Federal Foundation is providing partial funding to remodel a current building to serve as the Wee Links clubhouse. The largest chunk of remaining cost will come from Wadsworth Golf Charities Foundation, which has pledged \$150,000 spread over a five-year period.

Rupert Elks Lodge is donating the land. Rupert Country Club will provide maintenance. Bob Lantz, RCC's head professional, said the new course won't cause members' dues to increase. Planners aim to make Wee Links self-supporting through other means, such as hole sponsorships.

"It's a great way to promote junior golf and get kids involved in golf," said Lantz. "The juniors will come first, but adults will have the opportunity to work on their short game."

If construction stays on schedule, Creason said Wee Links should be ready to play by late fall 2013.

McIlroy the 'Marked Man' of Ryder Cup

MEDINAH, Ill. • Rory McIlroy has gone from being a rookie in the Ryder Cup to a marked man at Medinah.

McIlroy is the first European in nearly 20 years to go into the Ryder Cup as the No. 1 player in the world, although the star power of this 23-year-old from Northern Ireland is defined by much more than a computer ranking. He already has won two majors, with a record score in the U.S. Open last year at Congressional and a record margin at the PGA Championship last month at Kiawah Island.

His four wins this year are the most of anyone in the world, all against the strongest fields.

So it was no surprise when Jim Furyk referred to Boy Wonder as the "present day Tiger Woods" and a "marked man" at this Ryder Cup. That's the role Woods played for so many years in these matches when he dominated golf. There was a feeling among Europeans that beating Woods was worth more than one point because of the emotional lift it gave the rest of the team.

McIlroy doesn't see it that way.

"This week I'm not the

out there and play very, very well to have a chance. So if I play on Friday morning, I just want to get my point and then take it from there."

Wednesday brought the Ryder Cup one day closer to the start of matches that are growing in anticipation. Both teams look strong on paper, with all 24 players among the top 35 in the world. The Americans are loaded with experience behind Woods, Furyk and Phil Mickelson. Europe has only one Ryder Cup rookie, Nicolas Colsaerts, and has the experience when it comes to winning. It has captured the cup six of the last eight times.

And while captains Davis Love III and Jose Maria Olazabal have preached civility and respect throughout the week, leave it to Ian Poulter to set the record straight on how the intensity can change when the first tee shot is struck Friday morning.

"It's not that we don't like each other," the Englishman said. "We are all good friends, both sides of the pond. But there's something about Ryder Cup which kind of intrigues me, how you can be great mates with somebody, but boy, do you want to kill them in Ryder Cup."

Poulter is not alone. Among the four American rookies is Brandt Snedeker, coming off an \$11.44 million payday for winning the Tour Championship and the FedEx Cup. "I'm very, very competitive," Snedeker said. "People don't get that, because I'm polite. But I tee it up on Friday here – tee it up against anybody – I'm going to try to beat their brains in as bad as I can." Love brought the first dose of tears to Medinah when talking about the time spent Tuesday night at a team dinner, when he showed a video of past captains and spoke of the camaraderie in the team room. Then, he dressed his team in bright red pants for a practice session of foursomes, keeping together the same partnerships he had the previous day. Olazabal mixed up his team ever so slightly, with Luke Donald

"Hopefully, I won't get heckled, but if I do, then you've just got to stay calm and be focused on the golf and just get on with it." He could not think of a time when he has heard it from a heckler. "But just because of my hair," McIlroy said, touching his curly brown locks. "Nothing too insulting." As for the notion that he has the biggest target on the back of his European uniform? McIlroy says that's nothing more than a compliment. Love doesn't buy into the idea that beating McIlroy is any better than beating a team

that features Francesco Molinari or Martin Kaymer. The captain has wondered if a loss by any of his top players would be a boost for Europe, "but I hadn't really looked at it from their side."

"I don't know if that's worth scratching my head over," Love said. "I didn't go to bed until 2:30 already thinking about my team. If I had to think about their team, I wouldn't get any sleep, because they're as strong as we are."

NFL, REFEREES END IMPASSE

NEW YORK • The NFL and the referees' union have reached a tentative contract agreement, ending an impasse that began in June when the league locked out the officials and used replacements instead.

The NFL said it planned to have regular refs work tonight's Cleveland-Baltimore game.

With Commissioner Roger Goodell at the table, the sides concluded two days of talks at 10 p.m. MDT with

the announcement of a tentative 8-year deal, which must be ratified by the union's 121 members.

NFL spokesman Greg Aiello tweeted "Pleased to report that an agreement has been reached with the NFL Referees Association. Details to follow."

The replacements worked the first three weeks of games, triggering a wave of frustration that threatened to disrupt the rest of the season. After a missed call cost the Green Bay Packers a win on a chaotic final play at Seattle on Monday night, the

two sides really got serious. It was not certain who would work this week's games, but ESPN reported regular refs

will work tonight with Baltimore hosting Cleveland. The union was seeking improved salaries, retirement benefits and other logistical issues for the part-time officials. The NFL has proposed a pension freeze and a higher 401(k) match, and it wants to hire 21 more officials to improve the quality of officiating. The union has fought that, fearing it could lead to a loss of

jobs for some of the current

officials, as well as a reduction in overall compensation.

The NFL claimed its offers have included annual pay increases that could earn an experienced official more than \$200,000 annually by 2018. The NFLRA has disputed the value of the proposal, insisting it means an overall reduction in compensation.

Replacement refs aren't new to the NFL. They worked the first week of games in 2001 before a deal was reached. But those officials came from the highest level of college football; the current replacements do not. Their ability to call fastmoving NFL games drew mounting criticism through Week 3, climaxing last weekend, when ESPN analyst Jon Gruden called their work "tragic and comical."

Those comments came during "Monday Night Football," with Seattle beating Green Bay 14-12 on a desperation pass into the end zone on the final play. Packers safety M.D. Jennings had both hands on the ball in the end zone, and when he fell to the ground in a scrum, both Jennings and Seahawks receiver Golden Tate had their arms on the ball.

The closest official to the play, at the back of the end zone, signaled for the clock to stop, while another official at the sideline ran in and then signaled touchdown.

The NFL said in a statement Tuesday that the touchdown pass should not have been overturned - but acknowledged Tate should have been called for offensive pass interference before the catch. The league also said there was no indisputable evidence to reverse the call made on the field.

Ravens Must Avoid Letdown Vs. Browns

The Baltimore Ravens know that, and they're coming off one of their most significant regular-season victories, that entertaining and dramatic squeaker against New England.

Normally, the Browns wouldn't be much of a test for the Ravens. "We have to let this one go right now. We have to move on," cornerback Lardarius Webb said.

"It's going to be tough, and we knew that," star linebacker Ray Lewis said. "So we're going to have to get healthy and get healthy real quick. Cleveland doesn't care how we feel." All the Browns care about is getting a win, but the Ravens swept the AFC North last year and have won eight straight against Cleveland. On a short week, the experienced team usually has an edge, as the Giants proved last Thursday at Carolina.

NEW YORK • A tentative plan for the new college football postseason calls for a Pac-12 or Big 12 team to face the best team from a group of five conferences, including the Big East.

A person with direct knowledge of the plan for the four-team playoff in 2014 told The Associated Press that either a Pac-12 or a Big 12 team likely will be the opponent for the top-rated champion from the Big East, Mountain West, Conference USA, Sun Belt and Mid-American Conference.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity Wednesday because the conferences did not want to make the plan public.

The proposal has the Pac-12 sending either its champion or a replacement team to the game in years when the Rose Bowl hosts a national semifinal. In years the Rose Bowl is a traditional Big Ten-Pac-12 matchup, the Big 12 would send one of its top teams to the game.

The deal with the Big 12 and Pac-12 would be similar to the one the Orange Bowl is working on with the Big Ten and the Southeastern Conference. That deal, which has not been completed, would match a team from either of those conferences or Notre Dame against the Atlantic Coast Conference champ or a another ACC team.

The original playoff plan had the national semifinals rotating among six bowl sites, giving the new system two playoff games and four other high-revenue bowl games each season. The top four teams determined by a selection committee, regardless of conference affiliation, will play in the semifinals. The winners meet in a championship game about a week later.

The spots in those other four games would be for other highly ranked teams, but those slots have quickly started filling up as the major conferences began making deals.

The Rose Bowl, as has been tradition, will always match the Pac-12 and Big Ten when it does not host a semifinal. The new marquee bowl being created by the Big 12 and the SEC – site to be determined - will be also part of the system, so those two spots are filled. The Orange Bowl's deals took two more spots out of play.

That led to concerns about limited access to the highrevenue games for the other five conferences.

The rebuilding Big East, which currently has automatic-qualifying status to the Bowl Championship Series, has been trying to gain a more secure spot in the new postseason system.

The person with direct knowledge of the plan said new Big East Commissioner Mike Aresco spearheaded the push for the addition of a seventh game to be added to the system, and presented a plan for the highest-rated champion from the other five conferences to be assured a spot in the game.

Sun Belt Commissioner Karl Benson told the AP last week there was enough support for a seventh game among the commissioners to make it happen.

The Big East is being transformed into a 12-team football conference next season that will include Boise State and San Diego State, along with Memphis, Central Florida, SMU and Houston. While the conference has lost its status as one of the BCS power-brokers, it's still well-positioned to be the best of the other conferences and to grab that guaranteed slot if it does not have its best team selected to play in the national semifinals.

Allowing the Pac-12 and Big 12 to share the spot opposite the best of the rest in a bowl would give the game stability and likely increase the value of its television rights, as compared to having the opponent be left undetermined.

The site of the game is still being discussed, but Glendale, Ariz., site of the Fiesta Bowl, or Houston would make geographical sense and are prime candidates, the person said.



TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1540, Pope Paul III issued a papal bull establishing the Society of Jesus, or Jesuits, as a religious order.

In 1779, John Adams was named by Congress to negotiate the Revolutionary War's peace terms with Britain.

In 1854, the first great disaster involving an Atlantic Ocean passenger vessel occurred when the steamship SS Arctic sank off Newfoundland; of the more than 400 people on board, only 86 survived.

In 1862, during the Civil War, the Union Army's first all-black regiment, the self-"Chasseurs described d'Afrique" (Hunters of Africa), was formed in New Orleans (which was then under Northern control).

In 1979, Congress gave its final approval to forming the U.S. Department of Education.

In 1994, more than 350 Republican congressional candidates gathered on the steps of the U.S. Capitol to sign the "Contract with America," a 10-point platform they p ladged to anact if voters sent a GOP majority to the House. Ten years ago: President George W. Bush said the United Nations should have a chance to force Saddam Hussein to give up his weapons of mass destruction before the United States acted on its own against Iraq, but told a Republican fundraising event in Denver that action had to come quickly. Five years ago: Soldiers fired into crowds of antigovernment demonstrators in Yangon, Myanmar; Kenji Nagai, 50, a video journalist for Japan's APF News, was shot and killed. President George W. Bush promised to take steps to reduce air traffic congestion and long delays that were leaving travelers grounded. One year ago: Opening statements in the Los Angeles trial of Michael Jackson's personal physician, Dr. Conrad Murray, took place as prosecutors accused Murray of killing the superstar through irresponsible use of the anesthetic propofol, and the defense maintaining Jackson had caused his own death. (Murray was later convicted of felony involuntary manslaughter.) Israel gave the go-ahead for construction of 1,100 new Jewish housing units in east Jerusalem; the announcement met with swift criticism from the United States and the European Union.

Against four spades West le the diamond ace and king, the switched to the club four. Decla er won in the dummy and too a spade finesse. When that was wrong and clubs failed to break 3-3, he had to go one down.

Can you see how he could have done better?

Since he needed one of the major-suit finesses for certain, he should have won the club in hand and run the heart queen. In practice, West would have covered with the king (it doesn't help him to duck), and declarer wins with dummy's ace. Only now does declarer play a spade to the queen. West wins and no doubt continues with another club. Declarer wins in dummy, draws trump, then cashes the heart jack and crosses to the club king. If clubs are 3-3, he has no more losers. He can ruff a heart, cash his long club, and ruff a diamond with dummy's last trump.

However, when clubs fail to break, he can take a ruffing heart finesse. The king and 10 have gone, and East just has the nine poised over dummy's eight-seven. This finesse is certain to succeed because declarer knows that West started with two spades, four clubs, five diamonds (for his overcall) and therefore only two hearts, both of which have been played.



Guilt is the last thing you need to add to what you're dealing with. It's normal to crave the closeness you haven't experienced in two years.

If you reach out in either direction, you'll feel better. It could also be helpful to ask your husband's doctor for a referral to someone who does end-oflife counseling for him.


