GOODING • The line dividing public and private gets a tad blurry when it's covered in sage brush.

If you ask Richard Saiya, his private property line ends at the 87-year-old fence just west of Gooding.

However, the Bureau of Land Management disagrees. Pointing to a historical archaeological site nearby, the agency claims that despite Saiya's fence, the area is public land.

At the very root of the dispute is an unfinished construction project. With a partially built deck and uncovered roof, it has all the makings of a future home. But whether the project will reach completion remains unknown.

According to a BLM letter sent to Saiya, the agency claims he developed not only an unapproved structure but roads, utilities and a pipeline without authorization on public land.





Community Night Showcases Classroom Technology

TWIN FALLS • As a newcomer to Twin Falls, Heidi Wade was surprised to learn how much technology is

used in classrooms. On Thursday night, she and Joshua Besancon attended a community night hosted by the Twin Falls School District and Discovery Education showcasing technology used in class-

"It's really neat to see there's that much technology," Wade said, adding it wasn't what she expected after arriving from Califor-

Her daughter Madaleigh Wade — who goes Bickel Elementary School - said she liked seeing videos Thursday

that middle schoolers made. Parents and students got to choose from about 15 different sessions led by Twin Falls educators.

Topics ranged from blended learning to digital safety.

After participants went to a few sessions, they screened a Discovery Education video titled, "The Making of a Frozen Planet."

Isaiah Hanson and Amanda Olsen brought their fourth grader to the community night.

Isaiah said he learned about new technology he was never aware of, such as interactive whiteboards.

It was surprising, he said, to see what's out there in classrooms.

Discovery Education

For the first time this year, all Idaho schools have access to digital content through Discovery Education.

The J.A. and Kathryn Albertson Foundation provided funding to buy the initial license for the program in the spring.

"They saw a real need initially," said Jacque Hyatt, professional development coordinator for the Idaho State Department of Education.

After this school year, the cost of the program will be covered through Students Come First classroom technology funds.

Hyatt said the community night was a way to let people know about Discovery Education and how it's used in classrooms.

Later this fall, parents and students will have access to the program. Resources include digital textbooks, podcasts, games and research

Community Night

On Thursday night, Vera C. O'Leary Middle School teacher Annette McFarlin played videos produced by students during the "Lights, Camera, Action" session.

O'Leary students write scripts, produce and edit videos on topics such as the school announcements or campus feature stories.

"The kids are engaged and using the technology at all levels," McFarlin told the audience.

They also make career connections, while strengthening reading, writing and communication skills.

In another classroom, two Twin Falls High School students demonstrated a micro-controller program they developed that reads and records light and temperature data.

Binary codes filled the classroom projector as students worked on a computer.

Junior Thor Lund and senior Isaac Laris started the project during a summer internship at Twin Falls High School.

By this winter, the program will be used in the high school's science department.

In a classroom nearby, second-grade teacher Cathy Adams talked with attendees about how she uses blended learning in her classroom.

It means combining inperson instruction with online and interactive tools.



Wolf Back on Grid after Eluding Satellite

GRANTS PASS, Ore. •

Oregon's famous wandering wolf was back on the grid Friday after escaping satellite surveillance for five straight days, allaying fears something might have happened to him.

But OR-7 eluded biologists trying to get a look at him up close and personal on Thursday in the wilds of Northern California, where he has been searching for a mate since last winter.

Karen Kovacs of the California Department of Fish and Game said she and other biologists found a wolf track in the dirt when they went looking for OR-7 in steep, timbered country on the Plumas National Forest, but they did not pick him up on a radio tracking device or see any other sign of him. The area had abundant deer for him to prey on, she said.

"Whether or not he was in an area that satellites couldn't get a fix on him, or his collar is starting to malfunction, we don't know," she said. "But he is back online this morning in western Plumas County."

They left an automated trail camera to see if they can get a picture of him, like the one taken by a hunter in Oregon last year. Though reports of wolf sightings come in regularly, there has been no hard evidence of any other wolves in California, Ko-

Meanwhile, a public hearing is scheduled for Wednesday in Sacramento, Calif., on whether to put gray wolves on the California state endangered species list. Conservation groups petitioned the California Fish and Wildlife Commission for the pro-

tection, but at least one rural county — Tehama — has formally opposed the idea.

The biggest opposition to the restoration of wolf populations has come from ranchers fearful they will prey on livestock, but so far there have been no reports OR-7 has attacked any.

The gray wolf is a federally protected species in California.

OR-7 was born in northeastern Oregon as a member of the Imnaha Pack, and was captured and fitted with a tracking collar a year and a half ago. The GPS system sends daily signals to a satellite that plots his position, allowing biologists to follow his trek across Oregon into Northern California. The collars typically last about two years.

The young wolf left his pack a year ago to find a mate and a new territory. He is the first wolf known to roam into California

since the last trapping of a wild wolf in 1924. Not long after he left, state wildlife authorities put a kill order out on his father and another member of the pack for killing cattle. The Oregon Court of Appeals is considering whether the order violates the state Endangered Species Act.

Judge: Post-9/11 Arrests Get Trial

BOISE • An Idaho jury will decide whether the U.S. government misused a law designed to ensure key witnesses show up for trial to target Muslim men after the 9/11 terrorist attacks, a federal judge said

eral judge said. Thursday evening's ruling from U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge in Boise enacts a recommendation made by a magistrate earlier this year. It's a win for former Idaho man Abdullah al-Kidd, who has been embroiled in a lawsuit against the government for seven years, contending his arrest as a material witness in 2003 was simply a way for the FBI to keep him locked up while it investigated him for any potential crimes.

Lodge agreed that al-Kidd was falsely imprisoned. A jury should decide if the government's motives for the arrest were pure, the judge said.

Al-Kidd's attorney, Lee Gelernt with the American Civil Liberties Union, said al-Kidd has always believed in the court system and the ruling vindicated him

"We have been saying for a decade that the government misused the material witness law and now a federal court has agreed that a trial in necessary to get to the bottom of the government's post September 11 practices," Gelernt said. "The court firmly concluded that there is too much contrary evidence simply to credit the government's explanation for why an innocent U.S. citizen like Mr. al-Kidd was arrested."

DOJ spokesman Charles Miller did not immediately return a phone message left by The Associated Press. The government has several options moving forward: DOJ attorneys could try to appeal all or part of Lodge's ruling, they could allow the remaining claims in the case to move toward a trial or they could seek a settlement with al-Kidd.

Al-Kidd is a U.S. citizen who had changed his name from Lavoni T. Kidd when he converted to Islam as an adult.

Student Loan Default Figures Show Moderation

After a sharp jump during the worst of the recession, new figures show the number of students defaulting on federal loans seems to be stabilizing. Students at forprofit colleges continue to have the highest default rates but the sector saw some improvement compared to last

The latest cohort default rates, released Friday by the Department of Education, show 13.4 percent of student borrowers whose first payments came due in fiscal 2009 had fallen behind by last September, or within three years of entering repayment. That was down slightly from a 13.8 percent trial rate calculated last year for the cohort that entered repayment in 2008.

Still, default figures are "really the tip of the iceberg when it comes to looking at borrower distress," said Debbie Cochrane, research director at The Institute for College Access and Success in California. "For every borrower that defaults on their loans there are many more in distress struggling to make repayments."

The department has traditionally measured default rates by the number of borrowers falling behind within two years of entering repayment, but is shifting to a three-year measurement to better capture the number of students who eventually can't make payments.

The latest two-year default rate rose slightly, from 8.8 to 9.1 percent, which followed a sharp jump from 7.0 percent a year ago. Those latest two-year figures translate to 375,000 of the 4.1 million students who borrowed in fiscal 2010 falling quickly into repayment problems.

The overall numbers may have been helped by new regulations and efforts to improve default rates at a number of larger for-profit chains, though students at for-profit schools remain far more likely to fall into default than their counterparts elsewhere. The latest figures show 22.7 percent of students at for-profits default within three years, though that's down from 25 percent a year ago.

The comparable threeyear default figures are 11 percent at public institutions and 7.5 percent at private non-profits.


Critics contend default rates are higher at for-profit colleges because they provide poor value for money, have poor graduation rates, and have too few incentives to ensure their students succeed in the job market. Cochrane also believes forprofits are finding ways to game their default figures.

"We have to be skeptical that this reflects improvements in student outcomes," she said.

For-profit colleges say they're working to improve and argue higher default rates are to be expected because they serve lower-inCollege Association, which represents for-profit colleges, did not immediately return a phone message seeking comment.

I-84 Lanes to Be Closed Near Burley

BURLEY • The westbound lanes of Interstate 84 will be closed for two nights as crews work to replace two damaged girders on the 850 West Road bridge, west of Burley.

The detour will begin 10 p.m. Monday and continue through 6 a.m. Tuesday, then resume Tuesday night through Wednesday morning.

The closure is required as crews remove a portion of the overpass roadway above the westbound lanes of Interstate 84 at about milepost 205. The section of Interstate 84 between Burley and Kasota Road will be closed between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. for two nights Monday through Wednesday.

All westbound traffic

will be detoured onto Idaho 27 at the Burley interchange - exit 208, north to Paul and west on Idaho Highway 25 to the Kasota Road interchange - exit

Work to replace the girders and roadway will continue through mid-November. Drivers will continue to see intermittent single-lane closures near the structure during regular work hours, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

Cannon Builders, of Blackfoot, is the contractor for the \$142,000 repair project. The damage occurred when an illegal overheight load struck three girders, according to an Idaho Transportation Department announcement. The repair is to be paid for by private insurance.

Obama Cabinet Flunks the **Disclosure Test**

m On\, his\, first\, full}$ day in office, President Barack Obama ordered federal officials to "usher in a new era of open government" and "act promptly" to make information public.

As Obama nears the end of his term, his administration hasn't met those goals, failing to follow the requirements of the Freedom of Information Act, according to an analysis of open-government requests filed by Bloomberg News.

Nineteen of 20 Cabinet-level agencies disobeyed the law requiring the disclosure of public information. In all, just eight of the 57 federal agencies met Bloomberg's request for those documents within the 20day window required by the Act.

"When it comes to implementation of Obama's wonderful transparency policy goals, especially FOIA policy in particular, there has been far more 'talk the talk' rather than 'walk the walk," said Daniel Metcalfe, director of the Department of Justice's office monitoring the government's compliance with FOIA requests from 1981 to 2007.

The Bloomberg survey was designed in part to gauge the timeliness of responses, which Attorney General Eric Holder called "an essential component of transparency" in a March 2009 memo. About half the 57 agencies eventually disclosed the out-of-town travel expenses generated by their top official by Sept. 14, most of them well past the legal

Bloomberg reporters in June filed FOIA requests for fiscal year 2011 taxpayer-supported travel for Cabinet secretaries and top officials of major departments. Justice Department official Melanie Ann Pustay said in an interview that disclosure of those records is in the public interest.

Even agency heads who publicly announce their events - including Holder, Secretary of State Hillary Clinton and Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius didn't provide the costs of their outof-town trips more than three months after the initial request.

"It's ironic that the demands in the presidential campaign for Mitt Romney's tax returns are unrelenting, but when it comes time to release the schedules for senior appointees there's the same denial of access," said Paul Light, a New York University professor who studies the federal bureaucracy.

The travel costs generated by some other Obama officials - Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood, Energy Secretary Steven Chu, Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Lisa Jackson, and Homeland Security chief Janet Napolitano – also remain undisclosed. Government travel costs have received greater scrutiny since a report by the General Services Administration's inspector general on April 2 revealed that a 2010 Las Vegas junket – featuring a mind reader and a clown - cost taxpayers more than \$823,000. Since then, GSA Administrator Martha Johnson has resigned and the IG has referred the matter to the Department of Jus-

Records obtained as a result of another Bloomberg FOIA request showed that the GSA almost tripled its expenditures for conferences from 2005 to 2010. Taxpayers paid \$27.8 million for more than 200 overnight gatherings attended by at least 50 GSA employees over the five-year period, according to the records.

During the first year of the administration, cabinet agencies employed exemptions 466,402 times, a 50 percent jump from the last year of the presidency of George W. Bush. While exemption citations have since been reduced by 21 percent from that high, they still are above the level seen during the Bush administration, according to Justice Department data.

Teacher Kills Masked Teen, Learns It Was His Son

NEW FAIRFIELD, Conn. (AP) • A small Connecticut town was sent reeling in grief and confusion Friday after a popular fifth-grade teacher shot and killed a knife-wielding prowler in a black ski mask, only to discover it was his 15year-old son.

No immediate charges were brought against the father, Jeffrey Giuliano, in the slaying of his son, Tyler, who was gunned down in his aunt's driveway next door to his own home around 1 a.m. Thursday.

"It's something out of a Hollywood script," said John Hodge, the first selectman, or top elected official, in the town

of nearly 14,000 people about 50 miles from New York City. He said he couldn't recall another killing in his eight years on the job.

State police spokesman Lt. J. Paul Vance said the boy had never been in trouble with the law, and some of those who knew him described him as a good kid with an easygoing personality. Investigators and acquaintances said they were at a loss to explain what he was doing outside dressed all in black and carrying a weapon.

"Certainly, that is the major question we are trying to answer at this point," Vance said.

U.S. AIMS TO RALLY SYRIAN **OPPOSITION WITH NEW**

NEW YORK (AP) • The Obama administration moved Friday to rally Syria's opposition with pledges of \$45 million in new non-lethal and humanitarian assistance as the administration and other world leaders lamented the failure of diplomatic efforts to push Syrian President Bashar Assad from power.

Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said the U.S. would contribute an additional \$15 million in non-lethal gear - mostly communications equipment – to the civilian opposition trying to oust Assad as well as \$30 million in new humanitarian assistance to help those affected by the continuing violence.

She also delivered a new, stark warning to Iran that it must stop arming and supporting the Assad regime.

"It is no secret that our attempts to move forward at the U.N. Security Council have been blocked repeatedly, but the United States is not waiting," Clinton said as she announced the new aid at a gathering of the Friends of Syria group that she hosted at a New York hotel on the sidelines of the UN General Assembly. She and other foreign ministers from the group met with nine Syrian opposition figures, including several who traveled from Syria to attend Friday's session, to discuss strategy.

With U.N. action blocked by Russia and China, Clinton said the rest of the world must support the Syrian opposition. She also said it was urgent that the fractured foes of the regime unite around plans for a political transition that could put an end to more than three decades of Assad family rule. Activists say the current 18month long conflict has led to more than 30,000 deaths.

"Conditions in Syria continue to deteriorate as the Assad regime relentlessly wages war on its own people," Clinton said. "We see more bodies filling hospitals and morgues and we see more refugees fleeing their homeland and flooding into neighboring countries."

In Washington, Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said new intelligence suggested the Syrian government has moved some of its chemical weapons in order to protect them, even though the U.S. believes that the main sites remain secure.

The new U.S. humanitarian assistance – which brings America's total humanitarian contribution to more than \$130 million since the crisis began - will include food, water, blankets and medical services to victims of the violence. U.S. officials said on Thursday that an earlier shipment of medical goods provided by USAID had just arrived in southern Syria. The officials would not provide details of how the aid made it into Syrian territory.

The additional non-lethal support brings the total U.S. contribution in that area to nearly \$40 million since the crisis began and includes 1,100 sets of communications equipment, including satellite-linked computers, telephones and cameras and training for more than 1,000 activists, students and independent journalists.

"We are working to help them strengthen their networks, avoid regime persecution and document human rights abuses," Clinton said. The U.S. is not providing military aid to the rebels although it acknowledges that other countries are.

Clinton's announcement came as fighting intensified in Syria's largest city, Aleppo, with the most widespread battles reported in three months in the city of 3 million people as rebel forces launched a new offensive against Assad.

Despite some battleground success, there have been complaints that the opposition is hopelessly splintered and unable to coalesce around a transition plan that was adopted by members of the U.N. Security Council in Geneva over the

"It is encouraging to see some progress toward greater opposition unity, but we all know there is more work to be done," Clinton said. U.S. officials have noted that revolutionary councils in cities including Damascus, Homs, Aleppo, Idlib and Deir al-Zour were becoming increasingly organized.

California Man Behind Anti-Muslim Film Ordered Jailed

LOS ANGELES (AP) • A federal judge on Thursday determined that a California man behind a crudely produced anti-Islamic video that inflamed parts of the Middle East is a flight risk and ordered him detained.

Citing a lengthy pattern of deception, U.S. Central District Chief Magistrate Judge Suzanne Segal said Nakoula Basseley Nakoula should be held after officials said he violated his probation from a 2010

check fraud conviction. Nakoula, 55, was arrested Thursday. He had eight probation violations, including lying to his probation officers and using aliases, and he might face new charges that carry a maxi-

mum two-year prison term,

authorities said. Nakoula will remain behind bars until another hearing where a judge will rule if he broke the terms of his probation. After his 2010 conviction, Nakoula was sentenced to 21 months in prison and was barred from using computers or the Internet for five years without approval from his probation officer.

In July, a 14-minute trailer for the film "Innocence of Muslims" was posted on YouTube, leading to protests around the Middle East. Nakoula, a Christian originally from Egypt, went into hiding after he was identified as the man behind the trailer, which depicts Muhammad as a womanizer, religious fraud and child molester.



New Details Emerge on Colorado Shooter


DENVER (AP) • The suspect in the Aurora movie shooting case mailed "burnt currency," along with a notebook, to his psychiatrist before the attack. He threatened a professor and was banned from a university campus before withdrawing from its neuroscience graduate program. His defense team has added a psychia-

Those were the few tidbits of information in hundreds of pages of heavily-redacted court documents released Friday, which serve as the best chance the public has to understand what happened before James Holmes allegedly opened fire at a midnight screening of the new Batman movie more than two months ago.

The documents shed little light on Holmes' possible motives or whether the university ignored warning signs about him. That's partly because Arapahoe County District Judge William B. Sylvester continued to keep under seal the key documents in the case the affidavit that lays out prosecutors' case against Holmes, and the search warrants that allowed them to gather evidence against him.

Another impediment is the heavy redaction of the documents. Some are entirely blacked out. In others, Sylvester's rulings on legal disputes, references to years-old case law and even copies of newspaper articles are redacted, along with information about investigation.

The documents do shed a little more light on one of the main disputes in the case – Holmes' threats against a professor, possibly the university psychiatrist, Dr. Lynne Fenton, who has tes-

tified that she contacted campus police after her last meeting with Holmes June 11. Fenton, who testified Aug. 30, said she went to police to gather more information and communicate her "concern."

She did not refer to her concern as a threat.

Prosecutors contended that Holmes was barred from campus after making the threats. The University of Colorado has said that Holmes was denied access to nonpublic buildings on campus because he withdrew as a neuroscience graduate student, not for safety reasons.

A university spokeswoman did not return a call for comment on Friday. The university has previously refused to comment on how it handled Holmes, citing a gag order that Sylvester imposed. Before the gag order, university officials said their police force had no contact with Holmes and that the chief of the department knew nothing about him.

The defense team sought sanctions against prosecutors for contending Holmes had been barred from campus, arguing that the false statements could contaminate the jury pool. But Sylvester shot that down, ruling the statements were within legal bounds.

Defense attorneys did not return a call for comment Friday.

The most legally significant disclosure Friday was the inclusion of the psychiatrist on Holmes' defense team. Holmes' attorneys have said he is mentally ill.

"This is unusual in a normal case, but not surprising in this case," said criminal trial lawyer Dan Recht, former president of the Colorado Criminal Defense Bar. "Presumably he's (the psychiatrist) the one who is going to opine on whether Holmes is insane or not.

"It's a foregone conclusion that the defense will plead not guilty by reason of insanity."

Other documents likely contain new information, but are blacked out. For example, in one pleading, attorneys describe how law enforcement handled the package that Holmes sent Fenton, which was discovered four days after the attack and also after Holmes allegedly booby-trapped his own apartment.

POLICE: MAN SHOT BY OFFICERS HAD **EXPLOSIVE DEVICE**

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A man who threatened to detonate a bomb at a Salt Lake City light rail station before an officer fatally shot him Thursday night actually had an explosive, police said.

Police Detective Dennis McGowan said it's not clear how powerful 39-year-old Anthony Mayhew's explosive was, but authorities closed down nearby streets and train service at the Gallivan Plaza TRAX station before shooting him and having robots destroy his backpack about 11 p.m. Thursday.

Mayhew was pronounced dead at a hospital shortly after the confrontation.

One officer has been placed on administrative leave pending an investigation into the shooting.

Police responded to the station about 9 p.m.

Thursday and said they found Mayhew carrying what appeared to be a switch with wires leading to a backpack.

Mayhew took things out of the backpack and alternately sat down and stood up before he stopped talking to negotiators about two hours later, McGowan

When he began walking toward police and didn't comply with orders to stop, one officer shot him, Mc-Gowan said.

A police report described the officers as "fearing for their lives and given the credible threat of an explosive device."

After the bomb squad destroyed the backpack, officials collected the remnants and tested it for explosive material.

Mayhew's last address was in West Jordan. Police have not released a motive.

With Quota Filled, Wolf Season Closes in Montana

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) • Wolf hunting outside Glacier National Park was shut down after a wolf was killed this week, filling an area quota on the predators, according to a Fish, Wildlife and Parks spokesman Friday.

The animal was taken by an archery hunter west of Glacier, one of two areas in the state where there's a specified harvest limit this hunting season. The other is north of Yellowstone National Park, where hunters have so far taken two of the three wolves that will be allowed this season.

There are no quotas on wolves for the rest of Montana as officials seek to drive down the predator's population.

It's the state's second consecutive wolf season and third in modern times following their recovery from widespread extermination last century.

Utah Activist Drops Conviction Appeals

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Environmental activist Tim DeChristopher is giving up appeals of his conviction for bidding on oil-and-gas parcels he couldn't pay for at a federal auction in Utah.

DeChristopher said Friday he was dropping appeals after being turned back earlier this month at the Denverbased 10th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals.

"Throughout every stage of this legal process, it has been a predetermined conclusion that I should be punished for standing up to the collusion between government and corporations," DeChristopher said in a statement to The Association Press. "Any potential discussion of ethics, justice or the role of citizens has been banished from the court."

From the start, De-Christopher asserted the government auction in 2008 was illegal and that he was acting in civil disobedience to safeguard wild lands near Utah's national parks from drilling.

On Friday, DeChristopher said his fate was sealed by a trial judge who refused to let him testify about his environmental motives.

"As a result, our defense team has been restricted to debating a narrow range of technicalities rather than the critical issues of the case,"

said the University of Utah economics graduate.

DeChristopher has served 14 months of his two-year sentence at a federal prison in California and is due to be released in April.

His first appeal was reject ed Sept. 14.

A three-judge panel of appeals court judges ruled he knowingly broke the law when he jumped into the bidding to run up prices for oil-and-gas parcels. Other bidders complained De-Christopher cost them hundreds of thousands of dollars in higher prices.

He ended up winning 14 drilling sites for nearly \$1.8 million, but acknowledged he had no money.

The Obama administration later upended the auction that was held in the final months of President George W. Bush's administration, rescinding many of the parcels and denying them to winning bidders.

"Whether the BLM complied with all applicable environmental regulations in conducting the auction has nothing to do with whether defendant organized a scheme, arrangement or plan to circumvent or defeat" the law, the 10th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals ruled.

The Bureau of Land Management runs auctions of federal drilling parcels.

NAMPA SCHOOL DEFICIT AT \$4.5M

NAMPA (AP) • The Nampa School District's budget deficit is now projected at \$4.5 million, up from a \$2.8 million shortfall announced in August, according to officials.

No employees will be laid off this school year to address the shortfall, Deputy Superintendent Josh Jensen said Thursday. But he says drastic changes will have to be made in the district's \$68.7 million projected spending for the current fiscal year.

"At this point in the game, we need to look at all options," said Jensen, who is leading the district after the resignation of Superintendent Gary Larsen after 18 years in the job.

Larsen disclosed the initial \$2.8 million gap in the district's 2012-13 budget to the school board last month. But last week, in his resignation letter, he said the shortfall was "drastically" different.

The \$4.5 million figure emerged Thursday, after district officials decided to give the discrepancies more scrutiny.

"We didn't see this coming and figured we'd better take a hard look," Jensen said.

The Nampa School District is the third largest in the state, with more than 15,000 students. School board chairman Scott Kido said the district could look into selling some property to make up the difference.

Danielle Sisayaket, a district accountant whose job was eliminated a year ago, has filed a lawsuit alleging she was fired for pointing out mishandling of public funds within the district.

Teachers Leaving in Bigger Numbers

BOISE • Idaho teachers are leaving the profession in bigger numbers, with more than 1,800 making their exit last year, but at the same time, more individuals are getting certified to become educators, the state Department of Education said Friday

The agency's data also show an increase in the number of individuals seeking an alternative, quicker route to certification in Idaho instead of attending a traditional four-year education program offered through a college or university.

More than 957 of the 1,884 teachers who left the profession during the 2011-2012 school year cited "personal reasons." The departures increased significantly from the previous year, when 1,276 teachers left the profession, and the year before, when 716 exited.

Last year, the statewide teachers union attributed the increased exits to new education reforms that limited collective bargaining and eliminated job protections.

The group is concerned that more teachers are leaving the profession at such a rapid rate, IEA President Penni Cyr said Friday.

"We are losing an unacceptably high number of experienced teachers," said Cyr,

who reiterated her organization's stance that the sweeping education overhaul approved in 2011 is making Idaho unattractive to educators. "If we continue to silence teachers' voices and impose one-size-fits-all mandates, the best and brightest teachers will be discouraged from working in the schools that need them most."

Public schools chief Tom Luna countered that his education changes, which are subject to voter approval in November, weren't to blame for the jump in departures. He said the recession was more likely the culprit for why teachers were ditching the profession.

Luna's office maintained that argument for the latest data, saying the biggest reported increase in the number of teachers leaving the profession was during the 2010-2011 school year, when 1,300 teachers exited the profession. That was up 600 from the previous year.

The latest data show an in-

crease of 560 leaving the profession during the 2011-2012 academic year.


"It's clear that when you look at the data over the course of the past few years, this has more to do with economic recession than with education reforms," said state Department of Education spokeswoman Melissa McGrath.





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Bradley, Bubba Give U.S. Early Ryder Cup Lead

MEDINAH, Ill. • Keegan Bradley made Friday at the Ryder Cup feel like the best day of his life, and it wasn't too shabby for the rest of the

Bradley led a strong performance by rookies on both teams at Medinah by teaming with Phil Mickelson for two wins against Europe's best two partnerships. Even with Tiger Woods getting shutout on opening day for the fourth time, the United States took a big step toward regaining the cup by taking a 5-3 lead.

Leading the way was Bradley, the former PGA champion whom Mickelson took under his wing last year for a series of money games at the majors to prepare the New England kid for moments like this. And did he ever deliver.

"This is literally what I've dreamt about since I was a little kid," Bradley said. "I got to do it next to my idol

Bradley holed a 25-foot birdie putt in morning foursomes to hand Luke Donald and Sergio Garcia their first loss ever in Ryder Cup foursomes. Next up were Rory McIlroy and Graeme Mc-Dowell, and the Americans won the first three holes. Mickelson wasn't there only for support. Right when Europe was trying to rally, the four-time major champion closed it out with a 7-iron to 2 feet that was conceded for

It was a day Bradley didn't want to end.

"Oh, baby, I wish we could go 36 more," Bradley said.

He wasn't the only rookie to shine on a mild day in the Chicago suburbs. Nicolas Colsaerts, the 29-year-old from Belgium, helped Europe avoid getting shutout in afternoon fourballs by single-handedly taking down Woods and Steve Stricker.

Colsaerts made eight birdies and an eagle - a 10under 62 if he was keeping score on his own. He teamed with Lee Westwood, who was just along for this amazing ride for a 1-up victory that ended 11 hours of enormous cheers and plenty of American red on the leaderboard.

Woods and Stricker also lost to Ian Poulter and Justin Rose in morning foursomes, making this the fourth time in the seven Ryder Cups that Woods has played that he lost both matches on the opening day.

There was nothing he could do against Colsaerts, the biggest hitter in Europe who isn't too bad with the putter, either.

"Nicolas probably had one of the greatest putting rounds I've ever seen," Woods said, high praise coming from a 14-time major champion.

Woods turned in a mixed performance. He missed a 6-foot birdie putt on the 15th to fall 2 down, and then came back with a bending, 25-foot birdie putt on the 16th and a shot into 4 feet on the 17th that looked as if it might square the match. 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

Getting Real, Getting Help

t least it's no longer an illusion that people within the church have it together and people outside the church don't. Church people are finally 'fessing up that they have hurts, habit, and hang ups like everyone else. We're learning to be a little more authentic.

Church folk have historically been notorious for keeping issues carefully tucked away in the closet. Being of Western European extraction, where stoicism is the emotional norm, and "suck it up" the general world view, demonstrating emotion for me has never been all that compelling. Let alone allowing someone to get a glimpse of my true emotions. Translate that into a church environment, and it's only natural that we're generally hesitant to discuss anything more personal than sports allegiances, commodity prices, or partisan politics.

Paul's mandate in Gal. 6:2 that we "Carry each other burdens..." really makes a subliminal statement. At first glance, it would appear that the primary point of that statement would be to those called to serve someone in need. That's true. However, there's another message implied here. Sometimes the greater challenge is for the burden bearer to be authentic enough to allow someone to assist with their burden!



I know of a lot of Christians willing to help carry someone's burden. I know fewer Christians willing to allow others into that inner sanctum of their lives to assist them with their burden. The ability to assist someone else requires a willing heart, the ability to ask for help requires a humble heart. I'm not sure which is the more difficult. I'm not sure which is the rarer com-

So what do you think is the greater symptom of spiritual maturity? A willingness to assist someone in their burden bearing, or a willingness to allow someone to assist you in carrying yours?

The next time you recognize someone has a need and you have an opportunity to assist-go for it! Also consider this... the next time you recognize YOU are the one with the burden, allow that willing burden carrier the privilege of being like Jesus to you. In the process, both of you will be taking a step of

Downtown Church

A year after moving downtown, a Twin Falls church says it feels welcome in its new location.

TWIN FALLS • The lights dimmed inside the old Cain's furniture building – now home to Magic Valley Bible Church - in downtown Twin Falls. A slide show set to gospel music flashed across the wall: photographs of the building in various phases of reconstruction as church members readied for the move.

Some of the members at the Sept. 16 worship service laughed when a photo showed a church member in a hard hat; others had tears in their eyes as they watched the pictures tell a story of faith and hard work.

Visitors to the dedication service didn't have to view the slide show to know its end; all they had to do was look around. A large cross stood like a sentinel near the podium, giving the facility a much different look than it had when it was a furniture store. Rows of chairs lined a large room where sofas and recliners once sat - the chairs filled with people holding Bibles.

A church, Pastor Greg "Bear" Morton told the audience before the slide show, is made of the people in its congregation, not the building. In that context, the church, formerly at 601 Shoshone St. N., could move anywhere, but it chose to be downtown.

Its coming, however, was not without controversy.

The chief opposition came from downtowners who thought the church would prevent a nightlife-driven rehabilitation of the area.

Jeff Hepworth, a Downtown Alive co-chairman and one of several who argued against the move, said the church would hurt downtown activities and doesn't fit his group's vision for the area, though he specified none of them are antichurch or against this specific church.

He said he wanted more bars and restaurants downtown, not a religious facility.

Others jumped on board, however, and said they thought the church's presence would be a good thing for the area.

"I don't even know they're there," said Alan Fife, owner of 208's Finest Tattoo Shop, noting he'd like to see all the empty buildings filled. His shop isn't open Sundays, so church traffic doesn't bother him and weekly church events hasn't hurt his busi-

"Anything's better than having the buildings empty," he said.

Sherry Dowalo, owner of Magic Valley Thrift Store just west of the church, said the traffic the church brings on Sundays has helped her business.

"It's been wonderful," she said.

Her son Will DeWalt, who works at the store, said the only thing that's been a challenge is church members parking in front of their

Afterschool Spirituality

A church-sponsored program inspires learning, friendship.

TWIN FALLS • Since its inception, 17-year-old Simon Halsell has been participating in the Twin Falls First Presbyterian Church's once a week afterschool program

called LOGOS. The Twin Falls teen said the program has led him to new friendships, pride and accountability, and a deeper awareness of how he treats others.

Another 20-week season of LOGOS is set to start at the church on Wednesday.

Although LOGOS includes Bible study, Halsell said its not "heavy theology" and activities aren't all spiritually based.

"My favorite activities are more intellectual, although there are physical games and activities, too," Halsell said. "One of my favorite things we've done is building a popsicle stick bridge and seeing whose could handle the most weight."

According to the LOGOS ministry website, Thelogosministry.com, the program is "a non-denominational Christian ministry that

works in partnership with local church leaders to build young disciples of Jesus Christ."

First Presbyterian Church LOGOS Chairwoman Kathy Price initiated the program five years ago. Having grown up within the church, Price participated in LOGOS as a youth and thought the ministry was exactly what the congregation needed.

"Before LOGOS our afterschool program wasn't consistent and it didn't have much of an impact," Price said. "Now we have about three dozen kids, from prekindergarten to the 12th grade, with weekly attendance over 90 percent?

She said the program helps teach children and youth to become disciples for Jesus Christ, while teaching them how to treat their peers as "children of God," instead of with disrespect.

Participants have time for recreation, snacks, Bible study and worship at LO-GOS, Price said. The evening's highlight is the family-style dinner, where a group of about six youth are paired with two "table parents" throughout the sea-

No Tax, No Blessing: German **Churches Insist on Levies**

BERLIN (AP) • The road to heaven is paved with more than good intentions for Germany's 24 million Catholics. If they don't pay their religious taxes, they will be denied sacraments, including weddings, baptisms and funerals.

A decree issued last week by the country's bishops cast a spotlight on the longstanding practice in Germany and a handful of other European countries in which governments tax registered believers and then hand over the money to the religious institutions.

In Germany, Catholics, Protestants and Jews pay a surcharge of up to nine percent on their income tax bills – or about €56 (\$72) a month for a single person earning a pre-tax monthly salary of about €3,500 (\$4,500). For religious institutions, struggling to maintain their congregations in a secular society where the Protestant Reformation began 500 years ago, the tax revenues are vital.

The Catholic Church in Germany receives about €5 billion (\$6.5 billion) annually from the surcharge. For Protestants, the total is just above €4 billion (\$5.2 billion). Donations, in turn, represent a far smaller share of the churches' income than in the United States.

With rising prices and economic uncertainty, however, more and more Catholics and Protestants are opting to save their money and declare to tax authorities they are no longer church members, even if they still consider themselves believ-

"I quit the church already in 2007," Manfred Gonschor, a Munich-based IT-consultant, said. "It was when I got a

bonus payment and realized that I could have paid myself a nice holiday alone on the amount of church tax that I was paying on it."

Such defections have hit the Catholic Church especially hard — it has lost about 181,000 tax-paying members in 2010 and 126,000 a year later, according to official figures. Protestants, who number about 24 million nationwide, lost 145,000 registered members in Germany in 2010, the most recent year from which figures are available.

But the figures include some people who still want to baptize their children, take communion on major religious holidays, marry in a religious ceremony and receive Christian burials.

The group We are Church, which claims to represent tens of thousands of grassroots Catholics, said many Germans stop paying the tax because they disagree with the church's policies or simply want to save money — not because they have lost their faith.

"I haven't quit because I still think that I might want to get married in a church one day, even though I know that's absurd," said Anna Ainsley, a 31-old-year banker and a Protestant from Frankfurt. "But when I see my tax declaration, then I think every year that I should finally quit?

Christine Solf, a Munichbased consultant, says she doesn't attend services regularly but appreciates the church's charitable work. For her, church membership is also a family tradition.

"I know people who quit for financial reasons but then still want their children to be baptized. That's not OK in my opinion," she said.

CAMBODIA GENOCIDE DEFENDANT FREED DUE TO ILLNESS

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) • Cambodia's war crimes tribunal set free a former leader of the Khmer Rouge on Sunday, upholding a decision that has outraged survivors seeking an explanation of the mass killings committed more than 30 years

Eighty-year-old Ieng Thirith, who has been declared mentally unfit for trial, was driven out of the U.N.backed tribunal's compound by family members. She made no comment to reporters.

The Sorbonne-educated Shakespeare scholar served as social affairs minister during the Khmer Rouge's 1975-79 rule, during which an estimated 1.7 million people died of execution, medical neglect, overwork and star-

The tribunal initially announced its decision to free Ieng Thirith on Thursday, saying medical experts had determined there was no prospect for her to be tried due to a degenerative mental illness that was probably Alzheimer's disease.

Prosecutors then delayed her release by filing an appeal demanding that conditions be set to restrict her freedom.

On Sunday, the tribunal's supreme court said it had accepted the appeal, which is expected to be heard later this month. In the meantime, it set three provisional conditions on her movement.

The tribunal said Ieng Thirith must inform the court of her address, must turn in her passport and cannot leave the country, and must report to the court whenever it summonsher.

Ieng Thirith was the Khmer Rouge's highestranking woman and also a sister-in-law of the group's top leader, Pol Pot, who died in 1998. She is accused of involvement in the "planning, direction, coordination and ordering of widespread purges," and was charged with crimes against humanity, genocide, homicide and torture.

Three other senior Khmer Rouge leaders are currently on trial, including her husband, 86-year-old Ieng Sary, the regime's former foreign minister; 85-year-old Nuon Chea, its chief ideologist and No. 2 leader; and 80-year-old Khieu Samphan, a former head of state.

The tribunal said earlier that Ieng Thirith's release does not mean the charges against her are being withdrawn and is not a finding of guilt or innocence. It plans to consult annually with experts to see whether future medical advances could render her fit for trial, although that is considered unlikely given her age and frailty.

Survivors of the Khmer Rouge called Ieng Thirith's release shocking and unjust. They said they have waited decades for justice and find it hard to feel compassion for her suffering. "It is difficult for victims and indeed, all Cambodians, to accept the especially vigorous enforcement of Ieng Thirith's rights taking place at the (tribunal)," said Youk Chhang, director of the Documentation Center of Cambodia, a group that researches Khmer Rouge atroc-

In a statement Sunday, he noted the irony of Ieng Thirith receiving "world class health care." As social affairs minister she was "personally and directly involved in denying Cambodians even the most basic health care during the regime's years in power," he

The lengthy delays have been costly and raised fears that the former leaders could die before their verdicts come.

'Pink Panther' Actor Herbert Lom Dead at 95

LONDON (AP) • Herbert ter's laughter, they ruined Lom, the durable Czechborn actor best known as Inspector Clouseau's longsuffering boss in the comic "Pink Panther" movies, died Thursday, his son said. He was 95.

Alec Lom said his father died peacefully in his sleep at home in London.

Herbert Lom's handsomely lugubrious look and rich, resonant voice were suited to comedy, horror and everything in between. It served him well over a sixdecade career in which roles ranged from Napoleon Bonaparte – whom he played twice — to the Phantom of the Opera.

The London-based star appeared in more than 100 films, including "Spartacus" and "El Cid," acted alongside film greats including Charlton Heston and Kirk Douglas, and worked for directors from Stanley Kubrick to David Cronenberg.

But Lom was most famous for playing Charles Dreyfus, the increasingly unhinged boss to Peter Sellers' befuddled detective Clouseau in the popular "Pink Panther" series. The two actors starred together from "A Shot in the Dark" in 1964 until Sellers' death in 1980, and Lom continued in the series until "Son of the Pink Panther" in 1993. Alec Lom said his father was forever grateful to director Blake Edwards for offering him a comic role after years of being cast as "the suave Eastern Bloc gangster with the dark

"It was a new lease of life as an actor, one he embraced warmly," Alec Lom said.

"He had many funny stories about the antics that he and Peter Sellers got up to on the set. It was a nightmare working with Peter because he was a terrible giggler and, between my father and Pedozens and dozens of takes."

Born Herbert Karel Angelo Kuchacevic ze Schluderpacheru in Prague in 1917, Lom came to Britain just before World War II and began his career as a radio announcer with the BBC's Czech-language service.

Adopting the shortest stage name he could think of, Lom had his first major movie role as Napoleon in 1942's "The Young Mr.

He played a psychiatrist counseling a traumatized pianist in "The Seventh Veil," a big box-office hit in 1945, and had roles opposite Richard Widmark, in the moody "Night and the City" (1950), Henry Fonda in "War and Peace" - Lom was Napoleon again - and a pre-James Bond Sean Connery in truck-driving thriller "Hell Drivers" (1957).

In the comedy "The Ladykillers" (1955), one of the best-loved British films of the 1950s, Lom played a member of a ruthless crime gang fatally outsmarted by a mild-mannered old lady.

Horror roles included the title character in Hammer Studios' "The Phantom of the Opera" in 1962, and Van Helsing in 1970's "Count Dracula," opposite Christopher Lee.

A postwar American career was stymied when Lom was denied a visa - he suspected because of his leftwing views - though he later appeared on U.S. TV series including "The Streets Of San Francisco" and "Hawaii Five-O."

In the 1950s, Lomalso had stage success playing the King of Siam in the original London production of the "The King And I" at the Theatre Royal Drury Lane, opposite Valerie Hobson.

Lom is survived by his sons Nicholas and Alec, and his daughter Josephine.



THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"I reason, earth is short, And anguish absolute. And many hurt; But what of that?"

. In today's deal it would have

been easy enough to defeat three no-trump after a top heart lead. (Declarer wins the opening lead and runs five rounds of diamonds, but West simply keeps his club 10 till the last diamond (to prevent declarer from finessing in the suit), then discards his spade on the top clubs. He keeps four winning hearts and the spade ace. Mission accomplished.

However, you have done well to reach five diamonds instead, on the lead of a top heart. You could rely on the spade ace being onside, but before you do that, try something else. The key to the deal is to try to establish clubs to allow you to discard your spade losers without letting East on lead. To that end, you win dummy's heart ace perforce and take the diamond queen, all following. Next, you lead a club, and when East plays low, you put in the eight.

West wins the club 10 and does best to punch dummy with a heart. You ruff, draw the second round of trumps, cash the club ace and king, and ruff a second heart. Now you ruff a club to set up the suit and ruff another heart with dummy's last trump. At this point, the fifth club has been established and takes care of one of your two spade losers.

The avoidance play in clubs requires West to hold one of the three remaining top clubs. You also need either diamonds or clubs to break evenly.

ANSWER: It is very tempting to bid two no-trump, going for the big payout if you are right; but here you have a viable alternative, which is to bid two spades. The point is that with such a misfit and no real club stopper, your chances of making three no-trump are very slim. Also, if partner has extras, he can still bid on if he wants.

Today's Highlight:

On Sept. 29, 1862, Prussia's newly appointed minister-president, Otto von Bismarck, delivered a speech to the country's parliament in which he declared the issue of German unification would be decided "not through speeches and majority decisions" but by "iron and blood (Eisen und Blut)." (Some references give the date of this speech as Sept. 30, 1862.)

Today in **HISTORY**

On this date:

In 1789, the U.S. War Department established a regular army with a strength of several hundred men.

In 1829, London's reorganized police force, which became known as Scotland Yard, went on duty.

In 1902, William Topaz McGonagall, affectionately remembered as one of Britain's worst poets (if not the worst), died in Edinburgh, Scotland.

In 1907, the foundation stone was laid for the Washington National Cathedral, which wasn't fully completed until this date in 1990.

In 1912, movie director Michelangelo Antonioni was born in Ferrara, Italy.

In 1938, British, French, German and Italian leaders concluded the Munich Agreement, which was aimed at appeasing Adolf Hitler by allowing Nazi annexation of Czechoslovakia's Sudetenland.

In 1957, the New York Giants played their last game at the Polo Grounds, losing to the Pittsburgh Pirates, 9-1. (The Giants moved to San Francisco.)

In 1962, Canada joined the space age as it launched the Alouette 1 satellite from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California. The musical "My Fair Lady" closed on Broadway after 2,717 performanc-

In 1978, Pope John Paul I was found dead in his Vatican apartment just over a month after becoming head of the Roman Catholic Church.

In 1982, Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules laced with cvanide claimed the first of seven victims in the Chicago area. (To date, the case remains unsolved.)

In 1987, Henry Ford II, longtime chairman of Ford Motor Co., died in Detroit at

In 2005, John G. Roberts Jr. was sworn in as the nation's 17th chief justice after winning Senate confirmation.

Ten years ago: Israel bowed to U.N. demands and U.S. pressure, pulling troops and tanks out through the barbed wire encircling Yasser Arafat's West Bank headquarters. West Coast longshoremen were ordered off their jobs for a second time in a costly labor dispute with shipping lines. Europe beat the Americans to win the Ryder Cup, 15 1/2-12 1/2.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush signed a bill to prevent a government shutdown, but lambasted Democrats controlling Congress for sending him the stopgap measure while they continued to work on more than a dozen spending bills. Actress Lois Maxwell, who'd starred as Miss Moneypenny in 14 James Bond movies, died in Fremantle, Australia, at age 80.

One year ago: Germany kept alive hopes that the 17nation euro currency could survive the debt crisis as lawmakers in Europe's largest economy voted overwhelmingly in favor of expanding the powers of the eurozone's bailout fund. Phillip Matthew Hannan, the former New Orleans archbishop who eulogized President John F. Kennedy and who served more than three decades as the popular leader of his Roman Catholic archdiocese, died on the 47th anniversary of his ordi-

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
