Home Blast Hospitalizes State Lawmaker's Wife

The cause of an explosion at the home of Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley, remained under investigation Sunday. The blast injured his wife Amy Wood, who was taken by air ambulance to a Utah hospital.

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BURLEY • The state fire marshal did not release any details of his investigation Sunday after a room converted to a gun safe exploded Saturday, injuring an Idaho state legislator's wife.

Amy Wood, wife of Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley, was taken by air ambulance to the University of Utah's Burn and Trauma Center.

She was in "good" condition Sunday, according to hospital spokesman Phil Sahn.

Ivan Hibbert, deputy state fire marshal, said the case is still under investigation and will be further reviewed by insurance investigators before reports will be available.

The reports will not be available for a couple of weeks, he said.

"We're not real positive but we kind of figured out where there was a problem," Hibbert said.

He would not disclose any details of what may

have caused the explosion.

The incident occurred at 8:11 p.m., according to Burley Fire Chief Keith Martin. The Woods were eating dinner at their home at 100 S. 147 E. when "they heard a sound like a 747 coming from the basement," Martin said.

Martin said the explosion from the room lifted up the patio slab behind the home and collapsed the patio roof. Martin said the patio

slab appeared to be the roof of the gun safe room. Amy Wood was on the patio when the explosion occurred.

On Sunday, Rep. Wood told the *Times-News* that he wanted to thank the community for its thoughts and prayers. "She really is doing OK," he said.

Senior Center Requests Permission to Sell Alcohol

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TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls Senior Center requested permission from the city council to be able to sell alcohol at special events. City council will consider the request at its meeting today at 5 p.m.

Currently, the center can rent out parts of the facility for other events, but the sale of alcohol at those events has never been discussed, so the center is looking for guidance from the city council about the issue. The city owns the Senior Center, but does not provide direct financial support.

Also set for tonight's meeting:

- The council will consider a request from a citizen to receive support to allow bungee jumping from the Perrine Bridge.

City of Twin Falls spokesman Joshua Palmer said a group making a documentary submitted the request.

- The Twin Falls City Historical Preservation Commission is seeking approval for its Certified Local Government Application to the Idaho State Historical Society.

The Historical Preservation Commission is applying for a \$2,500 grant for the 2012-2013 fiscal year. The Idaho State Historical Society requires that the mayor sign the application. The proposed application is to purchase a laptop, projector and screen for educational presentations to the schools and civic clubs.

- At Monday's meeting there will also be a presentation of the finances for the city of Twin Falls for 11 months of the 2011-2012 fiscal year.

Programs are Back in Hazelton Schools

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HAZELTON • Seventh-grader Ally Beck has only been playing flute for a year, but is already thinking about the future.

The 12-year-old from Hazelton wants to earn a college music scholarship.

On Friday, she sat down with Idaho State University flute student Cassie VanderSloot for a free private lesson at Valley Middle/High School.

As Beck picked up her flute, VanderSloot asked if she felt comfortable with most of the notes. Beck answered "yes."

Beck said she's had some great opportunities in music so far, such as playing last year in an area honor band.

The opportunity to play in a school band is relatively new for Hazelton students, though.

Last year, the Valley School District resurrected its middle and high school music program after a four- or five-year hiatus.

When the former music teacher left, the job position was left vacant.

Valley High School principal Rod Malone said district administrators couldn't find a qualified candidate to fill the position.

Like other school districts, a tight budget was also a barrier, he said.

Kindergarten through 12th grade music teacher Robbie Hanchey was hired last year to bring the music program back to life.

Why do you think the 2-year-old has so many questions? He's fascinated by the learning, discovery, and understanding of the growing process.

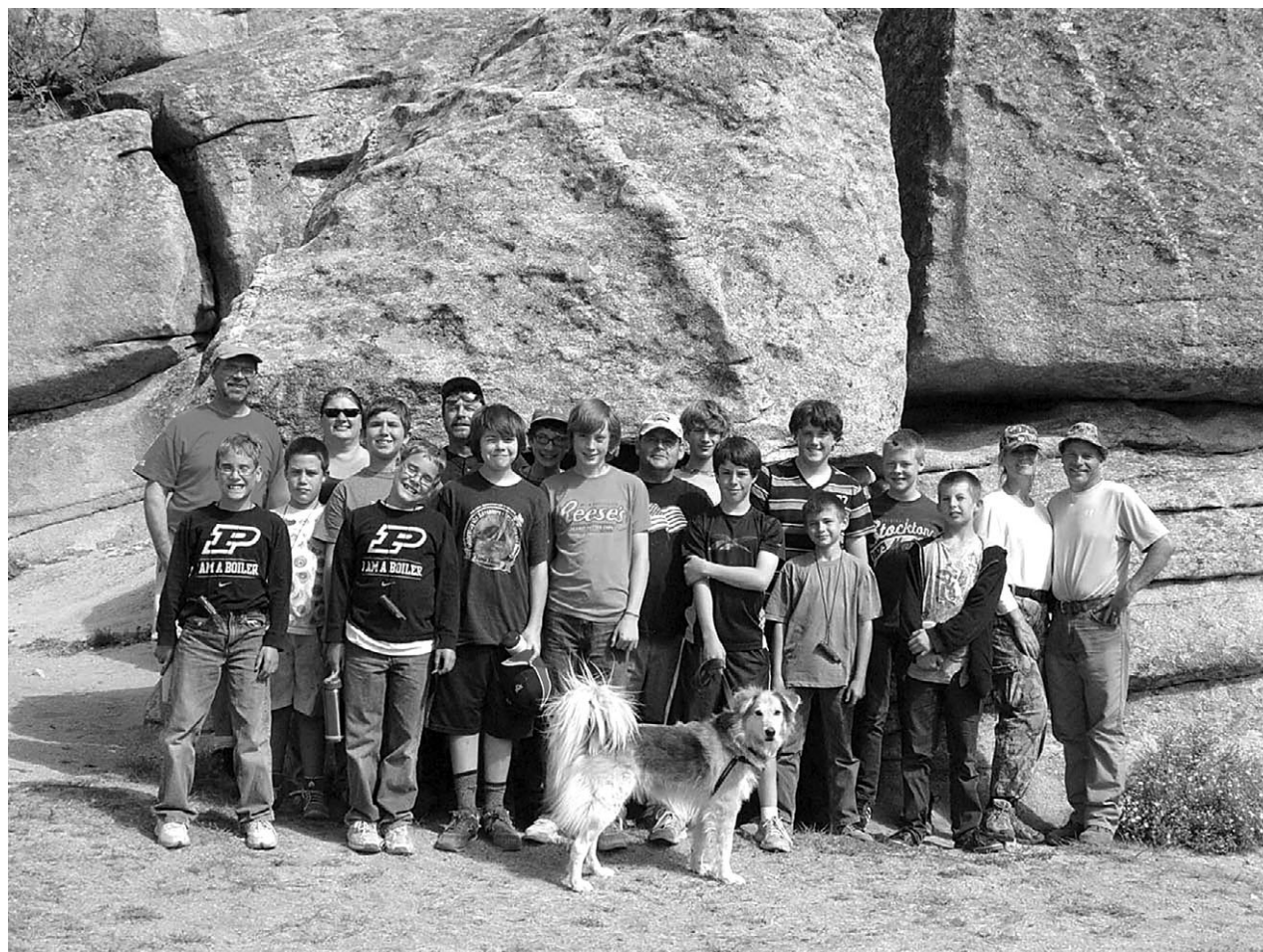

Now, programs are growing quickly and he's looking to offer more ensembles.

There are 60 middle and high school band students this year. That's 10 percent of the students in Hazelton.

Hanchey said he's hoping for 80 or 90 band students next year.

"We're growing so big that we might have to find another room," he said.

The band room is in a small building separated from the rest of campus. Wood paneling lines the walls and there's a chalkboard in the front of the room.

In the back, instruments are neatly tucked into cubbies.

Rachel Resz, 15, said band is "extremely fun."

The high school sophomore wanted to learn how to play an instrument ever since her brothers went through band classes.

At first, Resz wanted to play violin, but the school didn't own one.

Now, she has been playing flute for two years. She wants to keep it up and minor in music in college.

Currently, the Valley School District has two bands — one for sixth-graders and another for seventh through 12th graders.

Hanchey's goal: to have three bands next year. That would mean having separate middle and high school ensembles.

He also hopes to get a choir up and running in the future.

This winter, Hanchey plans to get a drumline running again for a second year. Students perform at winter basketball games on buckets donated from Walmart.

Bringing in guest musicians

With just 600 students in

the Valley School District, there's one school building complex surrounded by agricultural fields.

Hazelton may be a small town, but Hanchey said he wants to give his students the same kinds of opportunities that larger school districts have.

Hanchey — who is in his second year in the job — hopes to bring in more guest artists, as well as col-

lege music professors.

Hanchey said having musicians come to the school helps students think outside the "Eden/Hazelton bubble" and gain a world perspective.

"We want them to think big," he said.

He asked Vandersloot to come to Hazelton for the day. They played together in college musical ensembles at Idaho State.

During a Friday morning assembly, she played two musical pieces in front of several hundred elementary schoolers.

As students filed out of the school gym, Vandersloot let them touch her flute. Some students waived goodbye.

Vandersloot said the pieces of music she played during the assembly showcased "all the cool things

flute does."

On Friday, she also performed for band students. The rest of the day, she gave free and private group lessons to seven middle and high school flute players.

Vandersloot told the *Times-News* that she started playing flute in sixth grade. And at one point, she almost called it quits.

"I went from almost quitting to completely falling in love with my instrument," she said.

Now, it's her last year at ISU and she's applying to graduate programs in musicology.

Community Support

The Valley School District's parent-teacher group has raised money to get school musical instruments repaired and back into use.

"I've never seen a community so excited about music," Hanchey said.

There are a lot of migrant families in the community, he said, who can't afford to rent a band instrument from a music store.

Community members have also donated old instruments to the school that are in good condition.

He said teachers have purchased items that music students need, such as reeds.

Hanchey has also rolled up his sleeves to provide for his band students.

He spray painted and repaired music stands that are at least 20 years old so they look practically new.

Body of Missing Canadian Man Found in Elko County

ELKO, Nev. • Two hunters found the remains Saturday of a Canadian man who was stranded in remote northern Elko County in March 2011 along with his wife, the Elko County Sheriff's Office reported Sunday in a news release.

Albert Chretien was identified by some items in the pocket of his clothing. Hunters Rodney Thompson and Jay Doke found the remains in a heavily wooded area of Merritt Mountain and called authorities, the sheriff's office said.

Sheriff's representatives met with the two men early Sunday and were taken to the spot Chretien was discovered.

He and his wife, Rita, 56 at the time, became stranded when their vehicle was stuck in mud on a back-country road on their way to a trade show in Las Vegas. Albert Chretien, then 59, tried to walk for help and was not seen alive again.

Rita Chretien survived a 49-day ordeal in the wilderness with only a small bag of mixed nuts, some hard candy and fish oil capsules. She slept in the couple's van and was eventually discovered by hunters.

She spoke Sept. 16 to an audience at the First Church of the Nazarene in Twin Falls. The Penticton, British Columbia, couple had driven through Twin Falls before getting stranded.

Police Seek Motive in Downtown Shootout

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • Law enforcement officers in northern Idaho say they have at least five crime scenes to examine after a downtown shootout in Coeur d'Alene left one man dead and another injured.

The suspect, whose name has not yet been released, was shot and killed Saturday after opening fire on police officers at the end of a 5-mile car chase through Coeur d'Alene, located about 30 miles east of Spokane, Wash.

Kootenai County sheriff's Maj. Ben Wolfinger said it's not clear why the suspect started shooting. Investigators were withholding the man's name until his nearest family members were notified of his death.

The suspect reportedly shot one man in the chest before taking off in his car, randomly shooting at bystanders as he fled. Wolfinger said the chase stopped when the suspect lost control of the car and exchanged gunfire with officers. He was shot and died at the scene.

Police identified the man who was shot in the chest as 29-year-old Frank James of Coeur d'Alene. James was taken to Kootenai Medical Center for emergency surgery immediately

after the shooting; the sheriff's office said Sunday his condition was unknown.

"We're still trying to put all the pieces together," Wolfinger said. "We don't even know how many witnesses we may have."

Rick Knoke, who lives in an apartment complex at the intersection where the earlier shooting occurred, said he was

sitting outside and saw the violent confrontation.

A white four-door car pulled up and stopped, and the suspect in the case got out of the front passenger seat and fired two shots at a man in the back seat, Knoke said. The female driver and the shooting victim fled the car and ran for cover, and the shooter got in the driver's seat and took off,

firing at residents in the area as he left, Knoke said.

"He was shooting at us," Knoke said. "It was duck and cover time."

The Interagency Critical Investigation Team, which is made up of officials from local agencies, will investigate the shooting, Wolfinger said. The sheriff's office is leading the investigation.

BSU Drops Out of AP Poll, Reemerges in Coaches' Poll

NEW YORK • An embarrassing loss at New Mexico was avoided, but Boise State paid the price anyway.



Sort of. The Broncos fell out of the Associated Press Top 25, released Sunday, after their 32-29 escape from Albuquerque, N.M., but they moved into the USA Today coaches' poll at No. 25. The coaches poll counts toward the Bowl Championship Series standings, whereas the AP poll does not. Alabama still holds the No. 1 spot as LSU slipped another spot in The Associated Press college football poll.

The Crimson Tide received all 60 first-place votes for the first time this season.

The Tigers had a second straight sketchy performance, this time against Towson, and dropped a spot for the second consecutive week.

LSU won 38-22 at home against the FCS opponent Saturday night and is ranked No. 4 in the new media poll.

Oregon remained No. 2 and Florida State moved past LSU to No. 3. After beating Stanford on Thursday, Washington moved into the rankings at No. 23. No. 24 Northwestern is ranked for the first time this season.

Some things we know. Some things we only think we know. If it feels like this column is taking on a familiar refrain, you'd be right.

Many of the teams in District IV's 2012 football season have become pretty easy to figure out. A good chunk, though not quite as many as are in the former camp, are similarly difficult to peg.

Nevertheless, here's my latest stab at it.

1. The Great Basin Conference is truly wide open. After Jerome's stunning comeback to beat Twin Falls, all bets are off as to who wins the conference. The Tigers were dominated in the first half and could have been run off the field, but they got momentum and rode the wave to a huge win over their biggest rivals. The Bruins will have a chance to bounce back this week, but there are still games against Burley and Minico on the schedule. Same for Jerome, which is

now 2-0, as is Minico. Right now it's Twin Falls behind the 8-ball, but this league just keeps changing week-to-week.

2. Dietrich's biggest remaining threat might not be Mackay. The Miners play Dietrich this week, but they're in total disarray.

Carey's physical style dinged up some of their most important players, and the result was a 48-0 shutout loss to Clark County that essentially ends Mackay's playoff hopes. Dietrich should be wary of the wounded Miners this week, but it could be the Clark

County game that poses the biggest remaining challenge to the Blue Devils' undefeated regular season.

3. Declo and Gooding are the only two 11-man teams I am beyond certain are good. Each school is the class of its division in District IV, and both would present challenges to any of the Great Basin Conference teams and might be able to beat any of them on a given day. The difference is in the statewide comparison. Declo is at least on-par with Firth and Grangeville (for the record, I think the Hornets are the most complete team in 2A), and Gooding is a cut below Shelley and Fruitland (who isn't?) but is probably the best of the rest. As detailed above, the Great Basin is a mess, with teams getting handled by average-to-above average counterparts from other districts. If you're looking at a long title chase from this district, look to 3A or 2A.

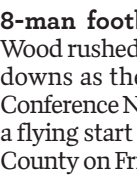
4. The 8-man balance of power remains in District IV. Hagerman showed that by mercy-ruling a Grace side that beat Butte County the previous week, although Butte had a couple

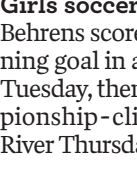

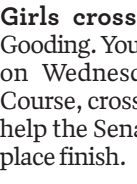

Keselowski Emerges Late to Win at Dover

DOVER, Del. • Brad Keselowski had fuel to spare for a couple of victory burnouts.

Those few splashes of gas left down the stretch were just enough for a checkered flag — and a sign Keselowski is a championship favorite.

With other contenders battling fuel woes and limping toward pit road, Keselowski had enough gas in the No. 2 Dodge to win Sunday at Dover International Speedway for his second victory in three weeks.

Keselowski's stout start to the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship allowed him to swipe the points lead from Jimmie Johnson.

Keselowski holds a five-point lead over Johnson as the Chase shifts to Talladega Superspeedway. Keselowski, who won the Chase opener at Chicagoland, has deftly avoided the famed Big Ones that strike the Alabama track to win twice there in seven career starts.

He held off a late push from runner-up Jeff Gordon to match Denny Hamlin for the season victory lead with five.

"I can't state loudly enough how much longer this battle is," Keselowski said.

Keselowski, Johnson and Hamlin have staked their claim through the first three of 10 Chase races as the drivers to beat.

Johnson and Hamlin each led a chunk of laps on the mile concrete oval, but failed to stretch their fuel to the end. Johnson, who has seven career wins at Dover, was ordered to back off the gas and salvaged a fourth-place finish. Hamlin pitted with 10 laps left, opening the door for Keselowski, and denying him his first win at the Monster Mile. Hamlin faded to eighth after starting from the pole.

"They're not going to beat us on the track, that's just plain and simple," Hamlin said. "We're just too fast right now and I feel like everything is going well. These strategy games, and the way these cautions are falling, it's ill-timed."

There was a caution at the end of a cycle of green-flag pit stops only 69 laps into the race that quickly dropped drivers a lap back. Amazingly, most of the field couldn't ever get that lap back, and only six drivers finished on the lead lap.

Eagles Beat Giants, 19-17

PHILADELPHIA • Lawrence Tynes missed two field-goal tries from 54 yards with 15 seconds left and Philadelphia held on to beat the New York Giants.

Tynes missed wide left, but the Eagles had called a timeout to ice him. He was short on his second attempt.

With LeSean McCoy leading the way on the ground, Michael Vick guided the Eagles (3-1) to another comeback.

Alex Henery kicked a 26-yard field goal with 1:49 left and the Eagles overcame two pass-interference penalties on New York's final drive. The defending Super Bowl champion Giants (2-2) have struggled against Philadelphia, losing eight of the last nine meetings.

McCoy had 121 of his 123 yards rushing in the second half.

FALCONS 30, PANTHERS 28

ATLANTA • Matt Bryant kicked a 40-yard field goal with 5 seconds remaining and the Atlanta Falcons remained unbeaten, rallying past the Carolina Panthers 30-28 on Sunday.

The Falcons (4-0) are off to their best start since 2004, when they reached the NFC championship game. Despite taking a career-high seven sacks, Matt Ryan threw three touchdown passes for Atlanta. Bryant added three field goals.

The Panthers (1-3) nearly clinched it on Cam Newton's run with just over a minute remaining, but he fumbled the ball while trying to dive for the necessary yardage. Carolina recovered and wound up punting, downing the ball at the Atlanta 1. But Ryan immediately got the Falcons out of the hole, throwing a 59-yard pass to Roddy White.

Four plays later, Bryant won it.

TEXANS 38, TITANS 14

HOUSTON • Danieal Manning and Kareem Jackson returned interceptions for touchdowns and Matt Schaub threw two TD passes.

Arian Foster had a touchdown run for the Texans (4-0), who are off to the best start in club history.

Titans quarterback Jake Locker left in the first quarter and did not return after hurting his left, non-throwing shoulder on a hit by Glover Quin.

Matt Hasselbeck threw two touchdown passes in relief of Locker for the Titans (1-3). Chris Johnson carried 25 times for 141 yards, more than tripling his rushing total through the first three games.

CARDINALS 24, DOLPHINS 21, OT

GLENDALE, Ariz. • Jay Feely kicked a 46-yard field goal 6:31 into overtime to keep Arizona unbeaten.

The Cardinals (4-0) forced overtime when Kevin Kolb threw a 15-yard touchdown pass on fourth down to Andre Roberts with 22 seconds to play in regulation.

Two big defensive plays set up the final two Arizona scores. First, Daryl Washington sacked rookie Ryan Tannehill, whose fumble was recovered by Vonnie Holliday at the Arizona 49 and the Cardinals moved downfield to score.

The winning field goal came after Tannehill was hit by Paris Lenon as he threw and Kerry Rhodes came up with an interception.

Tannehill threw for 431 yards. Brian Hartline set a Dolphins record with 253 yards receiving on 12 catches.

49ERS 34, JETS 0

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. • Carlos Rogers returned a fumble 51 yards for a touchdown, and San Francisco ran for more than 200 yards.

Frank Gore, Kendall Hunter and backup quarterback Colin Kaepernick — on a wildcat-style option — all ran for scores as the 49ers (3-1) bounced back from a loss at Minnesota. Rather than head back to the West Coast, coach Jim Harbaugh chose to have his team stay in eastern Ohio — and it apparently helped.

The Jets (2-2) lost top wide receiver Santonio Holmes to what appeared to be a serious foot injury. It was the first time New York was shut out since losing 9-0 to Green Bay in 2010, and the Jets' biggest shutout home loss since falling 37-0 to Buffalo in 1989.

BRONCOS 37, RAIDERS 6

DENVER • Peyton Manning finished with 338 yards and

three touchdown passes.

Manning opened the game by leading the Broncos on an 80-yard touchdown drive — their first first-quarter touchdown of the season — and Denver never trailed.

The Broncos (2-2) beat the Raiders (1-3) at home for the first time since 2007.

Willis McGahee ran for 112 yards for his 32nd-career 100-yard game.

The Broncos held Darren McFadden to 34 yards on 13 carries and Carson Palmer, who led Oakland to a comeback win last week over Pittsburgh, never got on track. He finished 19 for 34 for 202 yards.

VIKINGS 20, LIONS 13

DETROIT • Percy Harvin returned the opening kickoff 105 yards for a touchdown and Marcus Sherels scored on a punt return early in the third for Minnesota.

Minnesota (3-1), in first place in the NFC North, matched the number of wins it had last season. The Vikings also snapped an 11-game losing streak in the division.

The Lions (1-3) have lost three straight.

They are the first team since at least 1940 to give up a kickoff and a punt return for TDs in consecutive games, according to STATS LLC. They gave up scores on a kickoff and punt in last week's 44-41 loss in overtime at Tennessee.

RAMS 19, SEAHAWKS 13

ST. LOUIS • Rookie Greg Zuerlein kicked four field goals, including a 58-yarder and a club record 60-yarder, and the Rams also used a fake field goal to score their only TD of the game.

PACKERS 28, SAINTS 27

GREEN BAY, Wis. • Aaron Rodgers threw a go-ahead touchdown to Jordy Nelson in the fourth quarter, and Green Bay shook off a week's worth of controversy with a rally.

With Packers fans howling about what appeared to be yet another bad call — this time by the regular officials, not the replacements — Garrett Hartley missed a 48-yard field goal attempt with just under three minutes remaining, costing the Saints a shot at the lead.

Rodgers threw for 319 yards with four touchdowns and an interception for the Packers (2-2).

Drew Brees threw for 446 yards with three touchdowns for the winless Saints (0-4). Brees has thrown at least one touchdown in 47 straight regular-season games, tying the NFL's all-time mark set by Johnny Unitas.

REDSKINS 24, BUCCANEERS 22

TAMPA, Fla. • Billy Cundiff redeemed himself for a poor day kicking, booting a 41-yard field goal with 3 seconds remaining.

Cundiff missed three earlier attempts, including a 31-yarder that would have put the Redskins (2-2) up by two scores early in the fourth quarter. He also missed twice in the first half, but was on the money after Robert Griffin III marched his team into position for the winning score.

Tampa Bay (1-3) wiped out an 18-point deficit to go ahead 22-21 on Connor Barth's third field goal, a 47-yarder with 1:42 remaining.

BENGALS 27, JAGUARS 10

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. • Andy Dalton threw two touchdown passes and ran for a score.

Dalton and A.J. Green burned Jacksonville several times, including once to set up a second-quarter touchdown and again for a fourth-quarter score.

The Bengals (3-1) finished with six sacks, putting constant pressure on Blaine Gabbert and overcoming all those defensive injuries. Cincinnati played without starting cornerbacks Nate Clements and Leon Hall as well as backups Jason Allen and Dre Kirkpatrick.

The Jaguars (1-3) failed to take advantage.

Gabbert completed 23 of 34 passes for 186 yards, with a touchdown and an interception. Dalton completed 20 of 31 passes for 244 yards.

Comeback Complete, Europe Wins Ryder Cup

MEDINAH, Ill. • Jose Maria Olazabal squeezed his eyes shut as they filled with tears, overwhelmed and overjoyed that the Ryder Cup still belongs to Europe.

His players wore the image of Seve Ballesteros on their sleeves and played their hearts out Sunday at Medinah, filling the scoreboard with European blue as they chipped away at a four-point deficit until completing a comeback even more remarkable than what the Americans did to them at Brookline in 1999.

This one was on the road, where Europe didn't have the advantage of a flag-waving crowd carrying them along. All they had was a message from their captain to "play your socks off," and the spirit of another Spaniard whose name didn't need to be mentioned in the closing ceremony.

"Seve, Seve, Seve," the crowd chanted when Olazabal bowed his head to compose himself.

"I'm pretty sure he's very

happy where he is today," Olazabal said.

The Americans were simply stunned.

Three times they came to the 17th hole with a chance to win a match, only for Europe to deliver the key shots that win the Ryder Cup. Ian Poulter won the last two holes, and so did Justin Rose,

a birdie-birdie finish to beat Phil Mickelson. Sergio Garcia won the last two holes with pars to beat Jim Furyk.

Even at the very end, this Ryder Cup could have gone either way until Martin Kaymer of Germany stepped forward to erase another bad memory. He stood over a 6-foot par putt that he needed

to make to assure Europe would keep the trophy. If he missed, Tiger Woods was in the fairway behind him, ready to take the final point the Americans needed.

Kaymer poured it in to beat Stricker, and the celebration was on.

"What you did out there today was outstanding,"

Olazabal said. "You believed, and you delivered. And I'm very proud that you have kept Europe's hand on this Ryder Cup. All men die, but not all men live. And you made me feel alive again this week!"

He hugged all 12 players, saving the longest embrace for Westwood, the only European who played on the 1997 team with Ballesteros as the captain.

Woods missed a 3½-foot par putt on the 18th hole, and then conceded a par to Francesco Molinari of about that length to halve their match. That extra half-point made it a clear-cut win for Europe, 14½-13½. Woods and Stricker, the anchors in the lineup, didn't win a single match at Medinah.

"This one is for all of Europe," Olazabal said. "Seve will always be present with this team. He was a big factor for this event for the European side, and last night when we were having that meeting, I think the boys understood that believing was the most important thing. And I think they did."

What Are the Battleground Cities in Idaho?

One of the closest measures, coast to coast, of whether a place is likely to lean Republican or Democratic – now and in recent years – is whether it's urban or rural. Urban generally goes Democratic, rural Republican.

That's part of the reason suburban areas, which are a bit in between, have been political battlegrounds, in Idaho and elsewhere. But apart from suburbs, there's another variation on the theme: Small to mid-sized cities, of which Idaho has a bunch, and which are also sort of in-betweeners.

The largest Idaho city and one true metro center, Boise, has been trending Democratic, running deep blue in its downtown and north area and getting more purple as you move further away, transitioning into bright red in the suburban areas, which have not (yet, or maybe ever) turned into battlegrounds. But what about Idaho's other cities?

Several of them fit the thesis: Many of the central city areas around Idaho are true battlegrounds or even tint a little blue, especially for legislative seats and sometimes statewide and county offices. Other cities, not so much.

The most Democratic semi-urban area, the Ketchum-Hailey area in the Wood River Valley, of course isn't a large city but the central areas have a real urban feel, and the same atmosphere of a variety of people, lots of traffic, cultural links to urban areas, and people coming and going. In many ways they fit the pattern and character, as do the small cities of Driggs and Victor in resort-oriented Teton County.

Lewiston and Pocatello are cities with long Democratic histories but which are much more competitive now. The central Lewiston legislative district, or as close to it as exists (it also includes the rest of Nez Perce and Lewis counties), is home to some strongly competitive races this year. The most interesting may be the Senate contest between Republican Jeff Nasset (who defeated an incumbent Republican, Dan Johnson, in the primary) and Democrat John Bradbury, a former district judge.

Most of Kootenai County is solidly Republican, but one of the hottest legislative races in Idaho this fall is taking place in the central Coeur d'Alene district. The district 4 House B contest, between Republican Kathy Sims (who has been a legislator) and Democrat Anne Nesse, is reputed to be close, and this is based on more than speculation. In the last decade in a similar predecessor district, Democrats held the two House seats here exactly half the time. This seat is on the short list of realistic Democratic legislative pickup opportunities.

Central Idaho Falls is much less Republican, or more Democratic, than anything around it, but a few terns back it actually elected a Democrat to the House, and that area has seen other close legislative races. It may again, though this year it remains a tough catch for Democrats.

Then there's Nampa, Caldwell and Twin Falls, which would make a useful political science study. In theory, all three have the components that other, more Democratic or at least more competitive, mid-sized cities have.

Democrats have talked in recent years about making inroads into each of them, and there are demographic reasons to think they might shift a bit toward purple. There's been no significant evidence so far at least that any of them are shifting. Down the road, the possibility remains.

Most of the rest of Idaho? Think of them as non-battleground states in a presidential year.

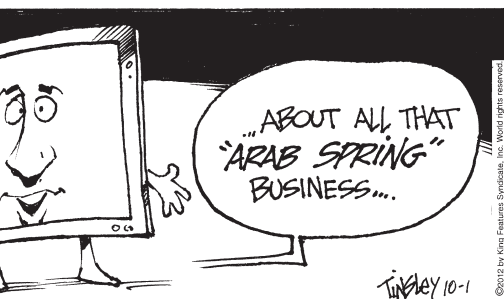
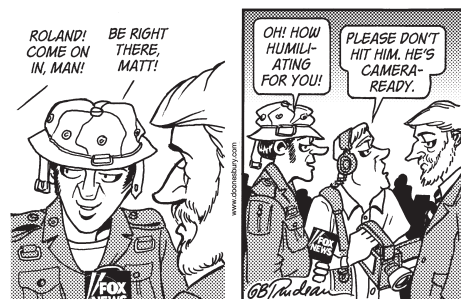

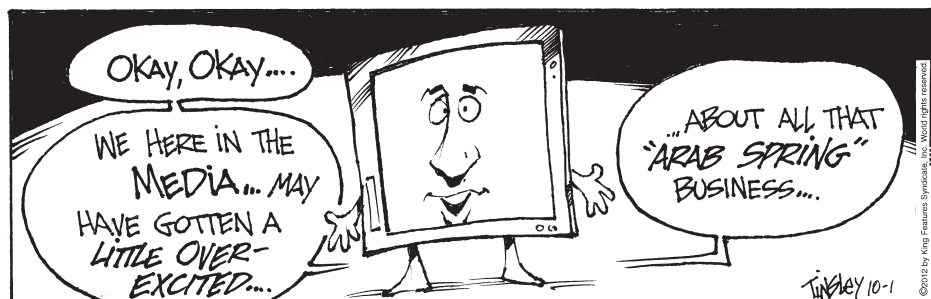

MISSOURI ABUSE CASE POSES THE QUESTION OF CONSENT VS. CRIME

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • Advocates for people who engage in rough but consensual sex say they fear an abuse case unfolding in Missouri ultimately could criminalize their lifestyle.

Ed Bagley faces a federal trial early next year on 11 counts of abuse against a woman authorities say he groomed to be his sex slave. Now prosecutors plan to present consensual, though violent, acts between Bagley and his own wife as evidence that Bagley has a history of sexually assaulting women.

The case will include evidence of "sadistic sexual assaults" committed by Bagley against his wife, Marilyn, prosecutors say.

"Marilyn Bagley's 'consent' to the sexual assaults by Defendant Edward Bagley does not change whether the acts legally constitute assault or not. Pursuant to the Missouri state assault statute ... consent is not a defense to assault resulting in serious physical injury," prosecutors wrote in court documents filed last month.

Some worry the government's assertion could open up people who practice bondage, dominance, sadism and masochism — or BDSM — to criminal charges for consensual acts they're already performing, said Susan Wright, founder of the Baltimore-based National Coalition for Sexual Freedom.

"We are following this case specifically because we were hoping this issue would not come up," she said.

Ed Bagley, 45, of Lebanon, Mo., is accused of grooming a young woman to be his sex slave starting in 2002, then keeping her captive for years while making money from her images on fetish Internet sites and forcing her to work as a dancer at strip clubs. Marilyn Bagley, 47, is charged with five counts, including sex trafficking and

forced labor trafficking.

Both have pleaded not guilty and are scheduled for trial in February.

Prosecutors claim Bagley, known as "Master Ed," tortured the young woman and made her available to other men who came to his trailer, either to torture or have sex with her. Four men, who said they visited Bagley's trailer to watch or take part, have pleaded guilty to conspiracy charges.

The case came to light in early 2009 after the woman, then 23, was hospitalized after what prosecutors said was a torture session. Then-U.S. Attorney Beth Phillips called the case one of "the most horrific ever prosecuted in this district."

Advocates for the BDSM community say even the most brutal acts detailed in Bagley's federal indictment are not criminal acts, as long as there was consent. But if the woman was too young or not intelligent enough to consent, as prosecutors allege, or if she initially gave consent and then changed her mind, most who spoke with the AP said that would be criminal sexual abuse.

It's the inclusion of Bagley's acts with his wife in the case that concerns BDSM advocates and Bagley's attorney, Susan Dill.

"Like many people from all walks of life, my client and his wife engaged in what some might term alternative, but nonetheless, consensual sexual activity that they both enjoyed," Dill said

in an email to The Associated Press. "The assertion that their consensual, marital sex life is evidence of prior criminal activity is nonsensical."

As in several other states, Missouri assault laws limit instances in which consent can be used as a defense against criminal charges when serious injuries occur. Exceptions generally are made for athletic activities and the victim's occupation or professions in which the conduct and harm are reasonably foreseeable hazards.

Wright's group contends "serious physical injury" is not well-defined under law.

"The assessment of the seriousness of harm is often affected by judges' 'moral judgments about the iniquity of the conduct,'" the organization says on its website in a section focusing on the consent issue. "Courts tend to inflate the risk and harmfulness of an activity they want to denounce. For example, any injury caused during a sadomasochistic encounter has been consistently classified as serious."

Diana Adams, a New York attorney and sexual freedom activist who represents clients in alternative lifestyles, said the landmark 2003 U.S. Supreme Court ruling "Lawrence v. Texas" that struck down a Texas an-

ti-sodomy law "declared we had a right to consensual sex between adults in the privacy of our own homes," but that the law is not clearly defined.

"In this kind of case, sometimes it's selectively applied," Adams said.

She said federal courts in Texas and Alabama interpreted the Lawrence decision in different ways in 2004. The Texas court used the case to strike down a ban on sales of sex toys, citing Lawrence's privacy conclusion. The Alabama court, however, upheld a similar ban by saying commercial sale of the toys was an issue of obscenity, not privacy.

Wright notes that regardless of the legal precedent, prosecutors' attempts to present acts between Bagley and his wife as evidence in the Missouri case also comes at a time when kinky sex practices appear to be gaining broader public acceptance amid the popularity of the E.L. James "50 Shades of Grey" bondage books.

"Because of '50 Shades of Grey,' a lot of people are trying BDSM for the first time this year," she said. "We want to be sure they understand they have to do these activities consensually, and to make sure they have the skill to do them safely."

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Idaho Wildfire Smoke: 'Still Stuff Falling'

BOISE • The river-bend outpost that is Riggins has been obscured for weeks with the charred remains of evergreens wafting down and littering parked vehicles with ashes in the shape of pine needles that crumble to the touch.

The town of 419 is surrounded by mountains, but some days they're shrouded by a smoky haze hovering in the air from wildfires still scorching the area.

"You can smell it," said Riggins Mayor Robert Crump on Friday. "There's still stuff falling."

Wildfires in the state are less active as cooler fall weather sets in at night and the daytime humidity rises. But, without help from rain or snow, Idaho's worst wildfire season since 2007 appears set to keep smoking.

And, according to federal meteorologists, no such help is in the forecast.

That means towns such as Riggins can probably expect the bad air to linger for

weeks — or longer.

Shelby Law, U.S. Bureau of Land Management meteorologist who helps predict fire danger for Idaho, said some interesting benchmarks underscore why the 2012 fire season will be remembered as long, severe and very expensive.

For instance, the fire season in 2007, when an area three times the size of Rhode Island burned, ended when a big rain and snow storm hit the first week of September. This year, October has arrived, with no such weather in sight.

Hundreds of firefighters are still busy on the 23-square-mile Wesley Fire upstream of Riggins, a big wildfire that got started late in the season.

"It's not very often we have new team fires in September," Law said, adding the El Nino weather pattern predicted for this winter could set the region up for another bad fire season in 2013. "If it does happen, we'll be right back in it next year. Wildfire potential will remain in elevated in the West."

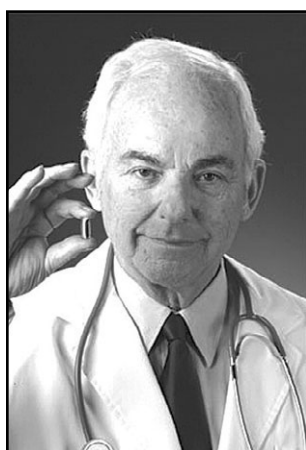

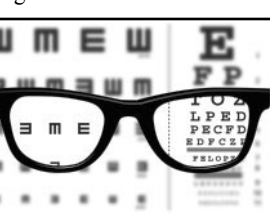

Storm Speeds Out of Japan After Injuring Dozens

TOKYO (AP) • A weakening tropical storm was speeding out of Japan on Monday after bringing gale-strength winds to Tokyo and injuring dozens of people, causing blackouts and paralyzing traffic to the south and west of the capital.

Japan's Meteorological Agency had warned Tokyo residents to stay indoors while Typhoon Jelawat passed Sunday night. The storm then had winds of up to 126 kilometers (78 miles) an hour but weakened to a tropical storm with 108 kph (67 mph) in the morning.

On Sunday, Nagoya city issued an evacuation advisory to more than 50,000 residents because of fear of flooding from a swollen river. A similar advisory was issued for more than 10,000 people in the northern city of Ishinomaki that was hit by last year's tsunami.

The typhoon left 145 people with minor injuries in south-

ern and western Japan, about half of them on the southern island of Okinawa, public broadcaster NHK said. Tens of thousands of homes were without electricity.

Kyodo news agency reported one fatality, a man who was swept away by seawater while fishing in Okinawa.

Dozens of trains were halt-

ed in coastal areas around Tokyo and many stores inside the capital closed early Sunday as the storm approached. It is expected to move into the Pacific Ocean early Monday.

L.A. Mayor Declares 'Carmageddon II' a Success

Villaraigosa says his hope and expectations for a "Carmahaven" came true. He thanked drivers for their cooperation and called them the real stars of the sequel.

Muslims Set Buddhist Temples on Fire to Protest Insult on Facebook

AMRITSAR, India • Hundreds of angry Muslims in southeast Bangladesh torched at least 10 Buddhist temples and dozens of homes Sunday after alleging that a Buddhist man insulted Islam on his Facebook page, authorities said.

The protest gained momentum late Saturday in the area of Cox's Bazar about 200 miles from the capital of Dhaka when Muslims, claiming that a Facebook page showed a burned copy of the Koran, headed to several Buddhist villages in the area.

Although there have been periodic clashes between the majority Muslim population and Hindus, tension is relatively rare with Buddhists, who make up less than 1 percent of Bangladesh's 150 million people.

Authorities said extra security forces were called in to restore order after the mob burned and vandalized more than 100 homes.

"We brought the situation

under control before dawn and imposed restrictions on public gatherings," Salim Mohammad Jahangir, Cox's Bazar district police superintendent, told local media.

Analysts said this clash was unfortunate and disturbing given a general pattern of tolerance of religious minorities in Bangladesh, which gained its independence from Pakistan in 1971.

"This comes as a real surprise, and I feel sadness that this happened," said Manzoor Hasan, adviser to the Institute of Governance Studies at Dhaka's BRAC University. "Generally, not just with Buddhists, but the small Christian community and relatively larger Hindu community, as a society we've been tolerant and respectful of each other's religions and ways of conducting ourselves."

Tensions have increased in recent months, however, over a crisis in neighboring Myanmar involving clashes between the majority Buddhist population and members of the minority stateless Rohingya Muslim commu-

nity, in some ways a mirror image of Sunday's attacks.

Many people in predominantly Muslim Bangladesh also have been angered recently by a low-budget film called "Innocence of Muslims" that was made in California and mocks the prophet Muhammad. It has sparked protests across the Islamic world.

"Generally, there is extra sensitivity at this moment, not just in Bangladesh, but in other countries," Hasan said. "We see people taking advantage of this, and there are copy-cat tendencies. The population as a whole needs to be far more vigilant in protecting minorities. We all need to be a bit more careful and circumspect so we don't incite sensitivities."

Bangladesh's English-language Daily Star newspaper reported that the Buddhist who allegedly posted the offensive image on Facebook mistakenly tagged it on his Facebook profile and that his account was closed soon after violence erupted even as police escorted him and his mother to safety.

R.I. Man Wins \$15,500 With 1-ton Pumpkin

TOPSFIELD, Mass. (AP) • Organizers of a fair in northeastern Massachusetts claim a Rhode Island man has set a new world record with the first pumpkin ever to weigh more than a ton.

Leaders of the Topsfield Fair say the huge gourd grown by Ron Wallace of

Greene, R.I., tipped the scales at 2,009 pounds on Friday, winning him \$5,500 for first place and another \$10,000 as a bonus for breaking the one-ton mark.

The Guinness World Record for heaviest pumpkin is 1,810.5 pounds set by Chris Stevens of New Richmond, Wis., at the

Stillwater Harvest Fest in Stillwater, Minn., in October 2010.

A New Hampshire man appeared to break the record on Thursday. Steve Geddes of Boscawen turned in a pumpkin weighing 1,843 pounds at the Deerfield Fair in Deerfield, N.H.

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Dallas Suburb Rattled by Quake

DALLAS (AP) • Damage from a small earthquake and a subsequent aftershock in a suburb west of Dallas was mostly limited to cracked walls and knocked-down pictures, authorities said.

The unscathed Dallas-Fort Worth airport, near the epicenter of Saturday's late-night temblor, kept up with normal flight operations. And emergency officials said there were no indications of any injuries.

The initial earthquake, measured at a preliminary magnitude of 3.4, struck at 11:05 p.m. CDT Saturday and was centered about 2 miles north of the Dallas suburb of Irving, the US Geological Sur-

vey's national earthquake monitoring center in Golden, Colo., reported.

USGS geophysicist Randy Baldwin told The Associated Press from Colorado that the initial quake lasted several seconds and appeared strong enough to be felt up to 15 or 20 miles away. He said the smaller aftershock with an estimated 3.1 magnitude occurred four minutes later and just a few miles away in another area west of Dallas.

Irving's emergency operators were flooded with more than 400 calls after the initial quake, with people reporting minor damage, such as cracks in some walls and a

ceiling, pictures that had been knocked down and a report of a possible gas leak, according to emergency official Pat McMacken.

"We have had no infrastructure impact at all," McMacken said Sunday morning.

The Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport continued routine operations even though the shaking was felt at the airport, which is partly located in Irving's city limits, airport public affairs officer David Magana said. He told AP that the airport, which has 1,800 daily departures and arrivals, had little air traffic late Saturday night.

KABUL, Afghanistan • The killing of an American serviceman in an exchange of fire with allied Afghan soldiers pushed U.S. military deaths in the war to 2,000, a cold reminder of the perils that remain after an 11-year conflict that now garners little public interest at home.

The toll has climbed steadily in recent months with a spate of attacks by Afghan army and police — supposed allies — against American and NATO troops. That has raised troubling questions about whether countries in the U.S.-led coalition in

Afghanistan will achieve their aim of helping the government in Kabul and its forces stand on their own after most foreign troops depart in little more than two years.

"The tally is modest by the standards of war historically, but every fatality is a tragedy and 11 years is too long," said Michael O'Hanlon, a fellow at the Brookings Institution in

Washington. "All that is internalized, however, in an American public that has been watching this campaign for a long time. More newsworthy right now are the insider attacks and the sense of hopelessness they convey to many?"

Attacks by Afghan soldiers or police — or insurgents disguised in their uniforms — have killed 52

American and other NATO troops so far this year.

"We have to get on top of this. It is a very serious threat to the campaign," the U.S. military's top officer, Army Gen. Martin Dempsey, said about the insider threat.

The top commander of U.S. and NATO forces in Afghanistan, Gen. John Allen, was blunter.

"I'm mad as hell about them, to be honest with you," Allen told CBS' "60 Minutes" in an interview to be broadcast on Sunday. "It reverberates everywhere across the United States. You know, we're willing to sacrifice a lot for this campaign, but we're not willing to be murdered for it."

The insider attacks are considered one of the most serious threats to the U.S. exit strategy from the country. In its latest incarnation, that strategy has focused on training Afghan forces to take over security nationwide — allowing most foreign troops to go home by the end of 2014.

IRAN SWIPE AT WEB BRINGS ANGRY REPLY

TEHRAN • Iran's cyber monitors often tout their fight against the West's "soft war" of influence through the Web, but trying to block Google's popular Gmail appeared to be a swipe too far.

Complaints piled up — even from email-starved parliament members — and forced authorities Sunday to double down on their promises to create a parallel Web universe with Tehran as its center.

The strong backlash and the unspecified pledges for an Iran-centric Internet alternative to the Silicon Valley powers and others highlight the two sides of the Islamic Republic's ongoing battles with the Web. It's spurred another technological mobilization that fits neatly into Iran's self-crafted image as the Muslim world's showcase for science, including sending satellites into orbit, claiming advances in cloning and stem cell research and facing down the West over its nuclear program.

But there also are the hard realities of trying to reinvent the Web. Iran's highly educated and widely tech-savvy population is unlikely to warm quickly to potential clunky home-grown browsers or email services. And then there's the potential political and economic fallout of trying to close the tap on familiar sites such as Gmail.

"Some problems have emerged through the blocking of Gmail," Hussein Garrousi, a member of a parliamentary committee on industry, was quoted Sunday by the independent Aftab-e Yazd daily. What he apparently meant was that many lawmakers were angry and missing their emails.

He said that parliament would summon the minister of telecommunications for questioning if the ministry did not lift the Gmail ban, which was imposed last week in response to clips on Google-owned YouTube of a film mocking the Prophet Muhammad that set off deadly protests across the Islamic world.

Even many newspapers close to the gov-

ernment complained over the email disruptions. On Saturday, the Asr-e Ertebat weekly reported that Iranians had paid a total of \$4.5 million to purchase proxy services to reach blocked sites, including Facebook and YouTube, over the past month.

Iranian authorities — perhaps recognizing the risks at hand — decided against taking a symbolic twin shot at Google and cut access to the Web browser in a country with 32 million Internet users among a population of 75 million, according to official statistics.

That would rank online Iran among the world's top 20 in terms of sheer numbers of users, and equivalent to some European countries in per capita Web use at more than 40 percent, according to the private monitoring group Internet World Stats. The World Bank, however, puts Iran's Internet link rate at just 21 percent last year.

The U.S. is among the world's highest at more than 75 percent.

Iran's deputy telecoms minister, Ali Hakim Javadi, told reporters that Iranian authorities were considering lifting the Gmail ban. But he also used the opportunity to again promise development of Iran's domestic alternatives: the Fakhri ("Pride") search engine and the Fajr ("Dawn") email, Aftab-e Yazd reported.

When reporters noted the quality of Gmail services, Javadi quipped: "If there is Mercedes Benz on the street, that doesn't mean everyone drives a Mercedes."

Truck Accident in Northern Mexico Kills 16

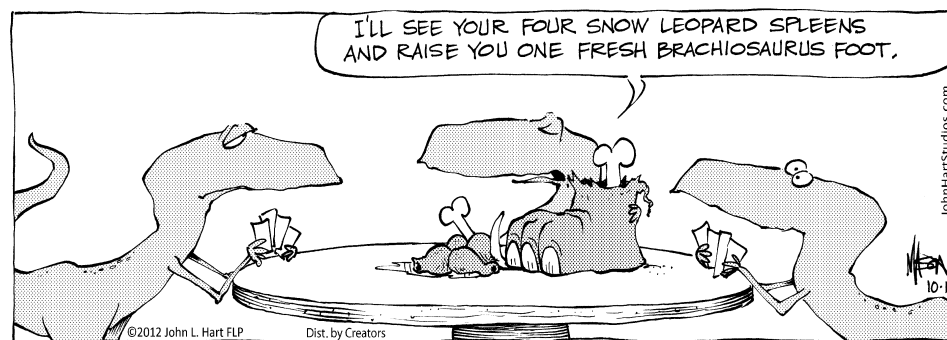
MATAMOROS, Mexico (AP) • Authorities in Mexico say a tractor-trailer has collided with a truck carrying members of three families, killing at least 16 people in the nation's north.

Sergio Sisbeles, security spokesman for the northern state of Coahuila, said Sunday that the accident occurred Saturday evening on a non-toll highway between the community of Viesca and Matamoros.

The spokesman says the people in the truck were from Matamoros and were traveling to the girl's traditional 15th birthday celebration in the rural community of Congregacion Hidalgo.

Sisbeles says a preliminary investigation shows that the tractor-trailer crossed into the opposite lane and collided with the truck. The driver of the big rig fled the scene of the accident.

Afghanistan

As part of that draw-down, the first 33,000 U.S. troops withdrew by the end of September, leaving 68,000 still in Afghanistan. A decision on how many U.S. troops will remain next year will be taken after the American presidential elections. NATO currently has 108,000 troops in Afghanistan — including U.S. forces — down from nearly 150,000 at its peak last year.

The program to train and equip 350,000 Afghan policemen and soldiers has cost the American taxpayer more than \$22 billion in the past three years.

The most recent attack came just days after Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said most U.S. and coalition combat units in Afghanistan returned to their practice of partnering with Afghan forces, nearly

two weeks after the top U.S. commander put restrictions on such cooperation.

Like so many other deaths in Afghanistan, the latest were shrouded in confusion and conflicting accounts.

On Sunday, U.S. officials confirmed the deaths of two

Americans, a service member and a civilian contractor killed late Saturday.

The fighting started when insurgents attacked a checkpoint set up by U.S. forces in eastern Wardak province, said Shahidullah Shahid, a provincial government spokesman. He

said the insurgents apparently used mortars in the attack. The Americans thought they were under attack from their allies at a nearby Afghan army checkpoint and fired on it. The Afghan soldiers returned fire, Shahid said.

The Afghan Defense Ministry spokesman said the shooting broke out as a result of a “misunderstanding” while ISAF forces were on patrol near an Afghan army checkpoint.

NATO’s International Security Assistance Force, commonly referred to as ISAF, gave a different account of the fighting in Sayd Abad district.

“After a short conversation took place between (Afghan army) and ISAF personnel, firing occurred which resulted in the fatal wounding of an ISAF soldier and the death of his civilian colleague,” the coalition said in a statement. It said the three Afghan soldiers died “in an ensuing exchange of

fire.” NATO did not say whether it considered this an “insider” attack on foreign forces by Afghan allies.

In Washington, Pentagon press secretary George Little said 2,000 deaths is one of the “arbitrary milestones defined by others “that the U.S. administration does not mark.

“We honor all courageous Americans who have paid the ultimate sacrifice in Afghanistan to make the American people more secure,” he said. “The fact of the matter is that America is safer because of all of those who have served in this war, including our fallen heroes.”

In addition to the 2,000 Americans killed since the Afghan war began on Oct. 7, 2001, at least 1,190 more coalition troops from other countries have also died, according to iCasualties.org, an independent organization that tracks the deaths.

According to the Afghanistan index kept by

Brookings, about 40 percent of the American deaths were caused by improvised explosive devices. The majority of those were after 2009, when President Barack Obama ordered a surge that sent in 33,000 additional troops to combat heightened Taliban activity. The surge brought the total number of American troops to 101,000, the peak for the entire war.

According to Brookings, hostile fire was the second most common cause of death, accounting for nearly 31 percent of Americans killed.

Tracking deaths of Afghan civilians is much more difficult. According to the U.N., 13,431 civilians were killed in the Afghan conflict between 2007, when the U.N. began keeping statistics, and the end of August. Going back to the U.S.-led invasion in 2001, most estimates put the number of Afghan civilian deaths in the war at more than 20,000.

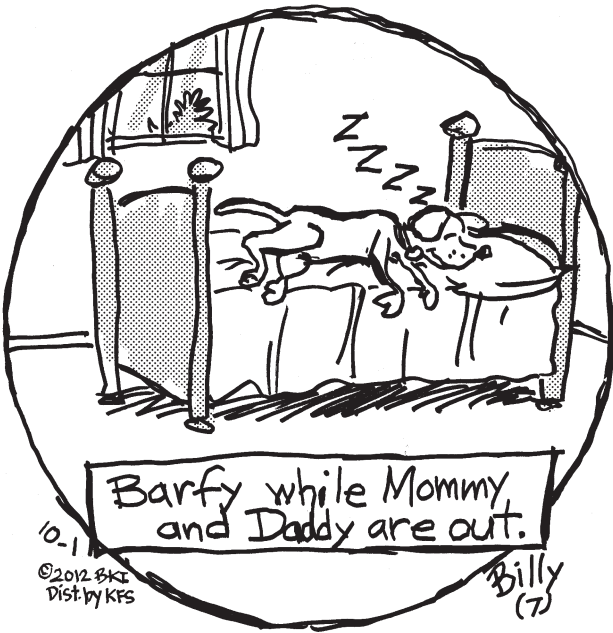

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

"But what is past my help, is past my care."

Today's deal comes from an international match between Poland and Portugal. At first glance, you might imagine it was a dull four-heart contract with the spade ace aside. The only thing that appears to be at stake is the overtrick.

In the closed room, on the lead of the spade 10, the Portuguese declarer made 11 tricks without raising a sweat by guessing the diamond jack. But Jacek Roman-ski got a less helpful heart-nine lead to his 10. Can you see the best line?

Obviously, you could simply play a spade to the king at some point after drawing trumps, then rely on your table presence to find the diamond jack — a line that is perhaps just a bit better than 75 percent. But you do have an even better chance once trumps turn out to be 2-2.

You should play the heart king at trick two, then ruff out the clubs by playing three rounds of the suit, and next play a diamond to the queen. When it holds, you run the diamond 10. Even if the defenders have two diamonds to cash, West will be endplayed after taking his winners. If the diamond queen loses to the ace, you can still succeed if East has either the diamond jack or the spade ace.

This line succeeds unless all three critical cards are badly placed. In other words, you come home seven times out of eight. The fact that the spade ace was inside all along does not spoil the elegance of this line.

ANSWER: The attraction of a diamond lead is that it is unexpected; the opponents sound as if they are prepared for a club lead. As against that, clubs offer a far better chance of setting up immediately, plus you have a fast entry to them on the side. So put me down for a small club lead. Also, because South didn't promise real clubs, the opponents might not need such a great club stopper to bid no-trump.

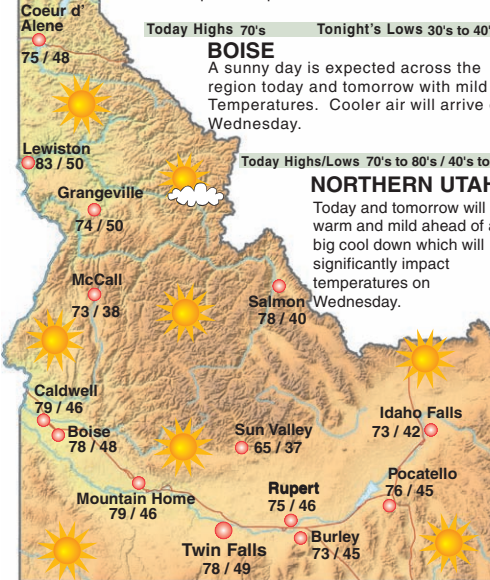

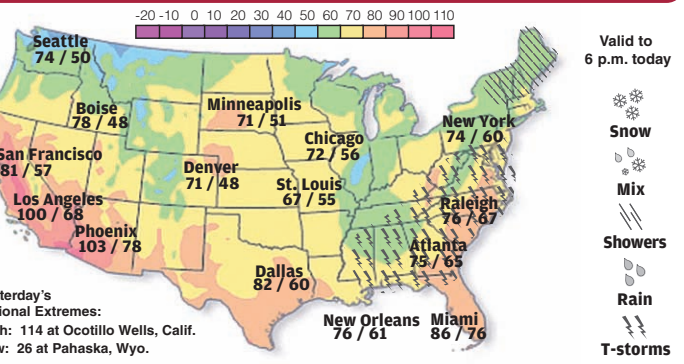
