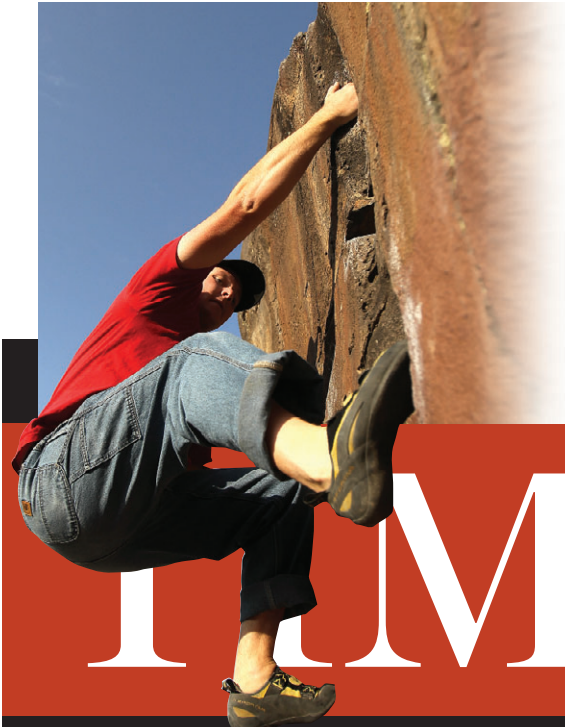

Obama, Romney Spar Over Taxes

TWIN FALLS • Why not turn the presidential debates into a get-together?

On Wednesday night, about two dozen gathered at Rock Creek restaurant for a watch party sponsored by the Twin Falls Democrats.

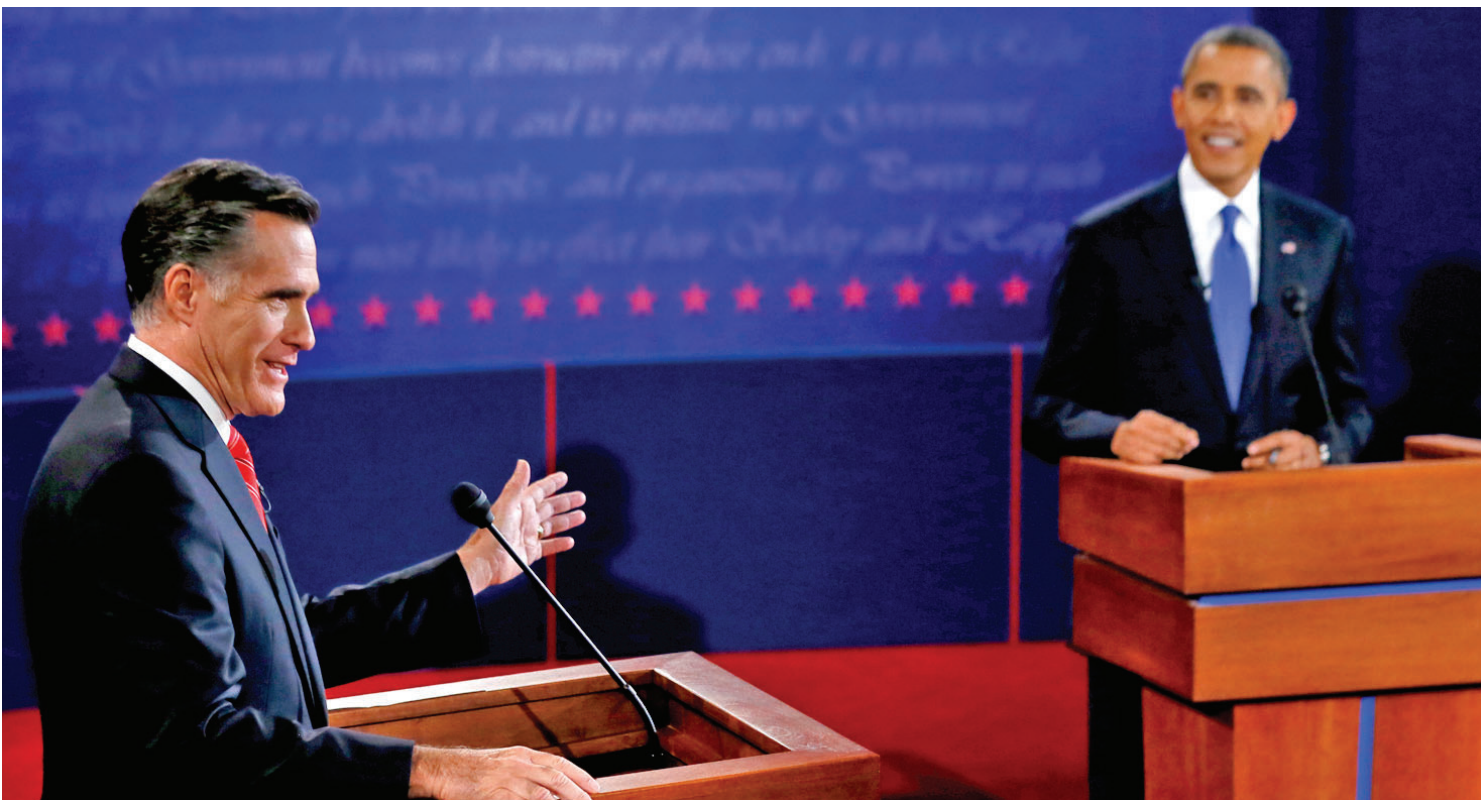
Everyone has televisions at home, said Bob Smith of Twin Falls. But watching together offers camaraderie.

As the debate started, attendees applauded, then listened quietly as President Barack Obama and Mitt Romney discussed tax policy and energy independence.

Scott McClure, who is running for Senate in legislative district 25, said it's not just about having a good time.

"There's also getting different perspectives on what's said, the pluses and minuses," McClure said. Watching together also allows for policy discussion, and even those in the same political party sometimes disagree on details.

DENVER • In the first debate of the fall campaign, Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney accused President Barack Obama on Wednesday night of offering more "trickle-down government" if he is re-elected in November.

Romney said Obama was running on the same platform as four years ago, while the Republican promised to generate more jobs by going to the assistance of small businesses.

Obama, given the first chance to say what he would do to spur more hiring, said he would also promote jobs by using money saved from the winding-down of the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq to rebuild America.

Leveling a familiar charge that Romney would offer more tax breaks for the wealthy, Obama said his alternative would be "a new economic patriotism that says America does best when the middle class does best."

Obama opened by wishing a happy anniversary to his wife, Michelle, whom he married 20 years ago Wednesday. He promised her that next year they wouldn't be celebrating before 40 million people.

Romney joined in, offering congratulations and drawing a laugh from Obama by joking that "this is the most romantic place you could imagine" to be celebrating: "Here with me."

He also shot back at Obama's charge over taxes, saying that cutting taxes on the rich was "not what I'm going to do." He said the rich would pay the same share of taxes as they do

now under his plan.

Answering one question that had been hanging over the event, moderator Jim Lehrer said that the questions would be about domestic issues. There had been some speculation that foreign policy might be one of the discussion topics in the wake of the recent killing of the U.S. ambassador and three other Americans in Libya.

Romney is lagging in the polls, but he took the stage at Wednesday night's debate with some key advantages that could help him catch Obama.

The Republican candidate was in position to surprise the public with a strong performance; recent polls showed that most voters expected Obama to get the better of his opponent.

BLM Releases Preferred Route for Gateway West

TWIN FALLS • The federal agency reviewing the Gateway West Transmission Line project has announced its preferences for the route.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management has selected its preferred alternative routes for the 1,100-mile high-voltage transmission line. The agency chose from options in a draft study that broke the route into segments that listed the route as proposed by Idaho Power Co. and Rocky Mountain Power, along with a number of suggested alternatives.

The project is expected to upgrade electric transmission capabilities for southern Idaho and southern Wyoming. Its route has been

Jerome Residents Face 48 Percent Sewer Rate Increase

JEROME • As a small business owner, Buzz Miller knows how utility bills can add up.

"It's definitely a big thing for me," he said Wednesday, as he worked in his downtown Jerome antique store.

For Jerome residents and business owners, a large increase in sewer rates may be on the horizon.

Miller — who owns Buzz's Antique Mall — said he hadn't heard about the proposal. But he said he's pleased with Jerome's current utility rates.

If the new rates are approved, residential customers can expect their base sewer rate to go up \$10 per

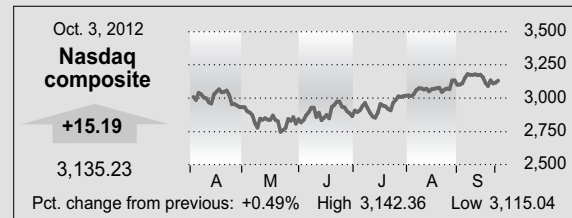
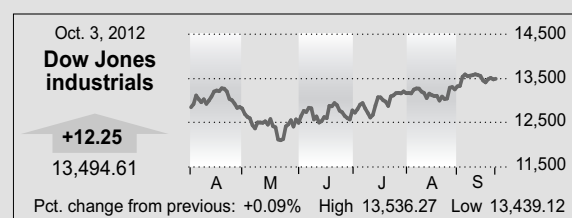


THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

Stocks Edge Up; H-P Sinks on Whitman's Outlook

NEW YORK (AP) • A pair of encouraging economic reports helped nudge the stock market higher Wednesday. The market's gains were held in check by a slump in energy stocks and Hewlett-Packard's 13 percent plunge. In a meeting with analysts and investors, Meg Whitman, H-P's CEO, predicted weak earnings and sales for the foreseeable future.

The Dow Jones rose 12.25 points to close at 13,494.61. The Standard & Poor's 500 index gained 5.24 points to 1,450.99.

Man Eats Pizza After Breaking Into Stranger's Twin Falls Home

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls woman called police after, she said, a strange man ate pizza in her kitchen.

Police responded to the 500 block of Main Avenue West in Twin Falls at about 2 a.m. Saturday for a call about a suspicious incident. As officers were looking for the suspect, the reporting party called back to

say the man was now sitting in her yard.

Police detained a man identified as Christopher K. Wasson, 28, of Twin Falls.

According to a police report, Wasson said he was drinking at a bar, then decided to walk to a friend's house that was next to the woman's house.

"Mr. Wasson said he saw a light on in an apartment next door and the door open," the report states.

"He also said a juvenile in the residence asked him if he would like to come in and have a piece of pizza."

The woman who called police said she was watching television in her bedroom while her 11-year-old son and his friend, also 11, were in the kitchen.

At about 1:45 a.m., the woman said, her son came in her bedroom and said a man opened the front door, walked into the kitchen and

started eating pizza.

According to the report, when the woman confronted Wasson, he wouldn't answer her and just repeated her questions back to her.

Police arrested Wasson on suspicion of misdemeanor unlawful entry, and he was booked in the Twin Falls County Jail. He was later released with no bond, and a pretrial hearing was set for Oct. 23.

The White Elephant in the City Park

TWIN FALLS • Folks in early Twin Falls loved a good celebration. And, for a proper celebration, the young town needed a good band with a place to perform.

The Twin Falls Municipal Band was an integral part of the community from the beginning, and band members marched down Shoshone Street every chance they got. The band gathered at city baseball games, and the bass drum sounded with every Twin Falls Cowboy home run.

By 1908, the need for a serious musical venue was apparent. Twin Falls had grown into a good-sized community, and the town began to talk about building a bandstand for concerts in the city park.

Plans for a new bandstand were drawn and local carpenters offered to donate their labor as long as the

band agreed to purchase the needed materials.

But that's when things went awry.

Builders inflated the cost of the materials for the bandstand until the total price tag rose to \$1,800 by the time it was built in 1910. According to early newspaper accounts, the band "worked like the devil" to pay off the debt.

When finished, the bandstand looked good - a lovely example of early 20th Century architecture.

But as charming as it was, the bandstand itself was useless. The acoustics were terrible, and the band ended up sitting in front of the bandstand when playing for a crowd.

For the next 25 years, the failed bandstand lived its life as a gazebo.

Finally, the town had enough of the white elephant in the park. The bandstand was torn down and Twin Falls architect Ernest H. Gates went to work creating a design for a new bandshell.

The city of Twin Falls paid for mate-

rials, and labor was provided by three dozen men paid through the Idaho Employment Relief Administration, the state equivalent of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's Federal Emergency Relief Administration.

In the end, the new bandshell - which was described as a "permanent structure of beauty and usefulness" - cost the city only \$700.

An estimated 800 tons of basalt rock from the Snake River rim and 10 tons of concrete was used to build the bandshell, which still stands in the city park today.

Under the city's sewer rate proposal, commercial customers face about a 62 percent rate increase. The amount will be based on each business' meter size.

And industries could see a 53 percent increase.

As she was waiting Wednesday outside Walmart, Jerome resident Susan Howard said she hadn't heard about the proposed rate increase.

She just moved to the city three months ago and isn't sure what her family's sewer bill is.

Howard said she isn't in favor of any rate increases — and she suspects she's not the only person with that opinion.

Howard and others who oppose a rate increase will have one more chance to speak their minds at a public hearing on Oct. 16.

Jerome city council members held a public hearing Tuesday night about sewer rates. There weren't any comments from the public.

Councilwoman Dawn Soto told the *Times-News* the ordinance will come back for a third reading Oct. 16. Then, council members will vote on it.

If passed, rate increases would go into effect.

Arlene Jackson — who owns a Jerome floral business called Arlene's Flowers — said her sewer bill is "minimal"

"It's not a big issue to me," she said, and doesn't expect her business would be impacted by a rate increase.

Jackson said the city's utility rates are low and need to be raised.

City officials say the rate increase is needed in order to balance the wastewater budget.

During the 2011 fiscal year, the city of Jerome had a \$600,000 deficit in the wastewater fund.

The deficit was down to about \$200,000 at the end of the 2012 fiscal year.

City spokeswoman Zoe Monahan wasn't in the office Wednesday and Mayor John Shine wasn't available to comment.

A rate increase would address increasing wastewater plant operating costs, provide funding to replace old equipment and add job positions.

As part of a master planning process for the plant, environmental engineering firm Keller Associates recommended adding four or five employees over time.

Two job positions will be added this year — a lab technician and pretreatment coordinator.

For the Jerome School District, business manager Brian Bridwell said the proposed sewer rate increase would have an impact on the district's budget.

"It's just another one of those fees, that through the normal course of business operations, we end up having to pay just like anyone else," he said.

Pit Bull Stolen from Twin Falls Shelter

TWIN FALLS • A dog was stolen from the Twin Falls Animal Shelter on Tuesday, and shelter employees are trying to bring it back.

Adoption coordinator Anne Hecht said a man posed as a volunteer said he was taking the dog for a walk. He provided a fake phone number to sign out the dog, then didn't return.

The dog is a slender, brown, female pit bull that weighs about 50 pounds. She has a distinctive bridge of hair on her nose, Hecht said.

The man, thought to be in his 20s or early 30s, has a black tattoo on the back of his right forearm. On Tuesday, he wore sunglasses and a

blue shirt with horizontal stripes. He has dark brown hair and is about 5 feet 10 inches.

A man who matches the description inquired about the dog earlier in the week, Hecht said, though the wit-

ness couldn't positively identify that man as the same in security video footage from Tuesday. The man on Monday was driving a white truck from a lawn care or sprinkler company, though the witness didn't know what company it was.

The man asked several questions about the pit bull from someone who was walking it, then drove away.

"We're just really worried about this dog," Hecht said. "If someone's willing to steal a dog, they probably don't have the best intentions for it."

But Romney performed well in the 19 Republican primary-season debates, often coming across as presidential and rarely slipping up.

Another factor that figured to work to Romney's benefit: The challenger typically has a built-in edge in the first presidential debate. Merely sharing the stage with the president helps to close any stature gap in voters' minds.

In the pre-debate spin, the Obama camp underscored that point, as both sides worked overtime to limit any gain by the other side. "If history tells us anything it's that, as the challenger, Mitt Romney is likely to be called the winner by pundits," deputy campaign manager Stephanie Cutter said in a memo to reporters.

At the same time, Romney faced substantially greater pressure than Obama heading into the 90-minute encounter. For a trailing candidate, simply holding one's own isn't good enough.

With less than five weeks until Election Day, most opinion surveys show Obama with a small but persistent lead nationally and in swing states that will decide the contest. By contrast, Romney

has never been ahead of Obama in the RealClearPolitics average of national polls dating back to the start of the year.

That gap has made it increasingly imperative for the Republican to shift the balance of the contest against the vulnerable incumbent. Obama has improved his job

approval ratings and has come close to the key 50 percent level in national polls. But voters continue to say that the country is on the wrong track, though that measure has also been moving slowly in Obama's direction.

Even Republicans said it was unlikely that Romney could accomplish the turn-

around he needs in the debates.

Republican pollster Bill McInturff, co-director of the NBC/Wall Street Journal survey, said in an analysis of the latest presidential polling that it "would take an episode of some magnitude to disrupt the structural lock in these numbers."

controversial in several Idaho counties, locally including Cassia County, in large part because of the amount of private farmland several options would cross.

The BLM's selection in Cassia County would cut directly through the county and consume 25 miles of BLM land and 100 miles of private property. But the route avoids priority archaeological sites and critical habitat for the sage grouse, which has been identified as a candidate for federal protection.

Cassia County has repeatedly attempted to avoid any of the transmission line from being installed on private property.

A taskforce of local landowners and county officials was created to find an alternative route. Their suggestion would utilize public land, dropping as far south as the

Nevada border, and require only 55 miles on private land.

Just because the BLM did not select the taskforce's preferred route doesn't mean it won't be used in the end, said Beverly Gorny, spokeswoman for the BLM.

"The public will have another opportunity to comment on the route," she said. "We're still anxious to hear from what the public has to say."

The agency is expected to release its final study of the project's impacts later this year. Once released, a 60-day comment period will begin, she said.

After the comment period and a final route decision, the proponents will begin permitting for private property rights-of-way.

The taskforce is expecting to comment against the BLM's recommendations, said Doug Pickett, vice-chairman of the group.

"We are going to still fight it," he said. "We feel like we made a lot of progress finding an alternative."

Larsen said he couldn't answer questions about potential suspects yet and police are still investigating the incident.

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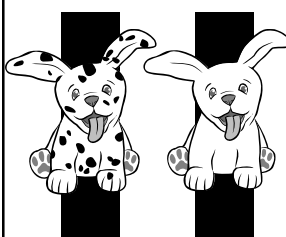

Instead, get ‘em on, get ‘em over, get ‘em in. There are no five-run home runs. Small, incremental gains matter because the game goes on until someone makes the 27th out. Until then, there is hope.

Unfortunately for Mitt Romney, presidential politics is, like football, a game with a clock, one with just five weeks of ticks remaining. In football, a team behind by lots of points late in the game must take gambles. Romney is behind — in the important swing states, with the national electorate regarding who would best handle the economy and health care, and in national measures of favorable voter perceptions.

So on Wednesday night it might be risky for Romney not to take risks. But what can he do? He might add to his menu of policies by embracing, say, the idea of breaking up the largest banks, a sound policy that would subvert the caricature of him as rapacious capitalism embodied. But debates are not good venues for explaining ... well, anything, actually, but especially not new initiatives. And October is a time for summations to the jury, not new submissions of evidence. Worse, Romney and his advisers must be bewildered by this fact: In October 2011 they would have been serenely confident of victory if they had been told that 12 months later the following would be true.

That President Obama would be waist deep in muddy and contradictory descriptions and explanations of the terrorist (he now concedes) attack on the U.S. diplomatic compound in Libya. That data just released for August 2012 showed that real disposable income had again declined. That Obama would actually celebrate the fact that for the first month since he took office there were more U.S. jobs than when he took office. That the most recent figures show a 13.2 percent decline in durable goods orders. That nearly 25 percent — the highest in three decades — of Americans between 25 and 55 are unemployed. That the second-quarter growth rate was adjusted down from an anemic 1.7 percent to the stall speed of 1.3 percent.

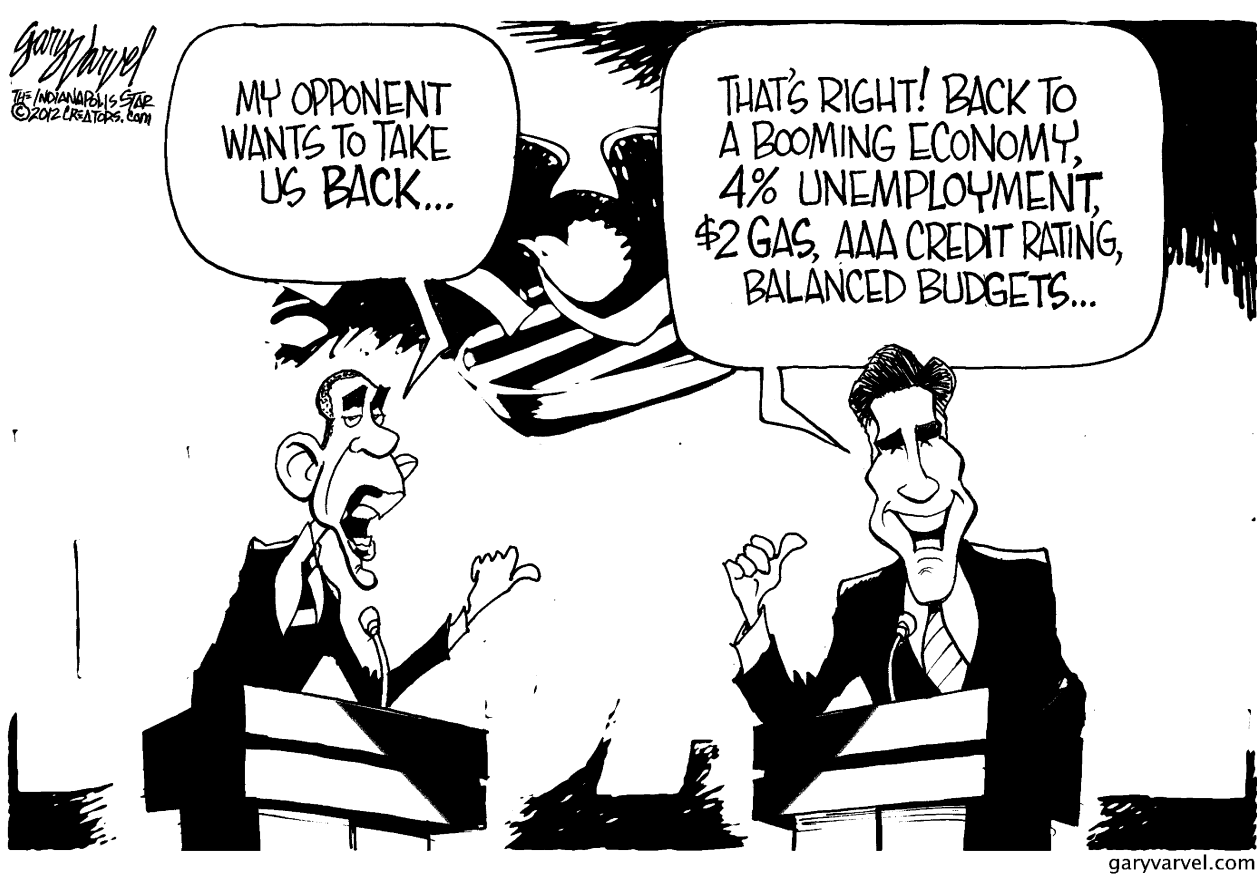
And regarding the Investor in Chief, that his Tesla Motors would be troubled. The California firm has received a \$465 million loan from the world’s most incompetent venture capital fund, the U.S. Department of Energy — source of Solyndra’s \$535 million — to make electric cars for the affluent. The Model S, unlike Tesla’s \$109,000 Roadster, is supposed to sell for between \$50,000 and \$98,000 — after the \$7,500 federal tax credit. But Tesla has just received a waiver on the terms of its DOE loan. Tesla joins California-based Fisker, another floundering would-be maker of high-end rides for rich people, which has received a \$529 million DOE loan.

Obama’s administration is in shambles, yet he is prospering politically. This may not, however, entirely be evidence of the irrationality of the electorate. Something more benign may be at work.

A significant date in the nation’s civil rights progress involved an African-American baseball player named Robinson, but not Jackie. The date was Oct. 3, 1974, when Frank Robinson, one the greatest players in history, was hired by the Cleveland Indians as the major leagues’ first black manager. But an even more important milestone of progress occurred June 19, 1977, when the Indians fired him. That was colorblind equality.

Managers get fired all the time. The fact that the Indians felt free to fire Robinson — who went on to have a distinguished career managing four other teams — showed that another racial barrier had fallen: Henceforth, African-Americans, too, could enjoy the God-given right to be scapegoats for impatient team owners or incompetent team executives.

Perhaps a pleasant paradox defines this political season: That Obama is African-American may be important, but in a way quite unlike that darkly suggested by, for example, MSNBC’s excitable boys and girls who, with their (at most) one-track minds and exquisitely sensitive olfactory receptors, sniff racism in any criticism of their pin-up. Instead, the nation, which is generally reluctant to declare a president a failure — thereby admitting that it made a mistake choosing him — seems especially reluctant not to give up on the first African-American president. If so, the 2012 election speaks well of the nation’s heart, if not its head.

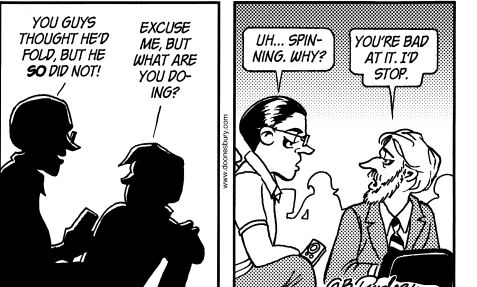
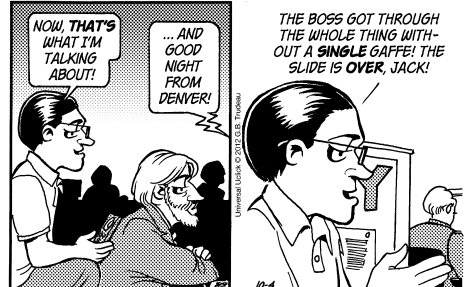

According to an announcement from the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, the training is part of an ongoing effort to coordinate emergency response

efforts between the agencies in times of natural and man-made disasters as outlined by members of the Local Emergency Planning Committee.

Numerous emergency vehicles and equipment will be staged at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds, Filer Middle School and the Filer High School parking lot during the exercise.

The sheriff's office is asking the public to avoid using the high school's parking lot or the fairgrounds during that time.

All roads in the area will remain open during the training.

to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center where it was determined he had no health issues. Hausner accepted the citation, and he was not taken to jail, Palmer said.

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Llama Sanctuary Needs More Hay

HAMILTON, Mont. (AP) • It's early afternoon and the crowd of woolly llamas pushing up against the gate has its eyes locked on the wheelbarrow being pushed by Char Hakes.

As happy as they might be to see their benefactor, this group of girls is really most interested in the bright green bale of hay that wheelbarrow is packing.

It doesn't take long for Hakes to scatter the dried grass across the pasture at her Safe Haven Llama and Alpaca Sanctuary just north of Hamilton.

It won't take long either for the 40 llamas to make it go away.

That makes Hakes nervous.

"I have enough hay to last until November," she said. "And that's only like eight weeks away. I'm not really sure what I'm going to do if I can't find some more."

This year's widespread drought has sent the demand for hay skyrocketing around the region and that's causing some folks involved in animal rescue operations around the state to be concerned.

"It's a struggle right now," said Jane Heath of Montana Horse Sanctuary in Simms. "I'm getting so many calls from people who say they can't afford to buy hay and they need to re-home their horses."

In central Montana, Heath said many of the dryland hayfields went unharvested because it was dry. Much of the irrigated hay is being loaded onto semitrailers to be shipped to Wyoming and Colorado, where the drought situation was even worse this year.

"Last year, we paid about \$150 a ton for hay," Heath said. "This year, horse hay is selling for somewhere between \$200 and \$225 a ton."

Heath said people should expect those prices to rise later this winter and spring.

"I'm hoping that people aren't thinking that I'll do my best to find hay in the

spring," she said. "It could be really awful by then."

Ravalli County extension agent Ralph Johnson said supply in the Bitterroot Valley is tight and prices are up,

but there is still enough to go around at this point.

This year's long growing season has helped quite a lot. Many hay producers are getting a third crop.

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Otter Readies Ad Targeting Cyberbullying

BOISE (AP) • Just months after an anti-bullying bill died in Idaho's Legislature, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter has added his voice to efforts to bring an end to electronic harassment.

Otter filmed a public service announcement urging students, parents and teachers to create a zero tolerance policy for cyberbullying.

The governor released the 30-second announcement via YouTube on Tuesday.

It says more than 18,000 children across the state receive text messages or other electronic communications from bullies each year.

"We can help stop this practice with education about the harmful effects of bullying, and how to create a zero tolerance for harassment in and out of school," Otter said in the spot.

October is cyberbullying awareness month.

In March, lawmakers in the Idaho House rejected a bill approved by the Senate requiring teachers and administrators to identify and crack down on students who harass and threaten classmates, including via electronic means.

The bill passed the Senate 25-8 before running in to problems when Rep. Bob Nonini, R-Coeur d'Alene, refused to give it a hearing in the House Education Committee.

Some representatives opposed the bill on grounds that it could add a financial burden to already cash-strapped school districts.

However, the Republican governor believes Idaho is among states that have a problem with bullying and that merits attention to keep children safe and secure.

Islamists in Mali Recruit Child Soldiers

MOPTI, Mali (AP) • Across northern Mali, Islamists have plucked and paid for as many as 1,000 children from rural towns and villages devastated by poverty and hunger, The Associated Press has found in several dozen interviews with residents, human rights officials, four children or youths and an Islamist official. The AP also saw several other children with machine guns half their size strolling down the streets in Timbuktu, where Westerners can no longer go because of the threat of kidnapping.

The interviews shed new light on the recruitment practices of the Islamists, including first-hand accounts of how much money is being offered to poor youth and their families to join. They also provide evidence that a new generation in what was long a moderate Muslim nation is becoming radicalized, as the Islamists gather forces to fight a potential military intervention backed by the United Nations.

"We need to intervene rapidly to discourage these people," said Amadou Bocar Teguede, the vice president of Mali's national Human Rights Commission. "The children are innocent and don't know what they are doing, and then they are transformed into criminals."

Human Rights Watch says child soldiers are fighting in at least 14 other countries worldwide. Mali, however, was a stable democracy until this year's coup and experts say the recruitment and religious indoctrination of child soldiers here marks a new and ominous development.

Child soldiers are being used by all the armed groups operating in northern Mali, but the Islamists, including a militant group known as Ansar Dine, have been among the most prominent recruiters, according to residents and human rights groups.

The U.N. children's agency said it has been

able to corroborate at least 175 reported cases of child soldiers in northern Mali this year, with parents receiving between \$1,000 and \$1,200 per child. However, Mali's human rights commission branch in Timbuktu said some families have reportedly received as much as \$2,000. And the AP's interview with Salif suggests some families are promised quite a bit more at \$4,800 a year, more than four times the average annual income per person in Mali. Mali human rights officials also put the total num-

ber of children recruited by the Islamists considerably higher than U.N. estimates at 1,000, based on accounts from the major cities of Timbuktu, Gao and Kidal. Officials said at least 200 child soldiers are operating in Mali's fabled town of Timbuktu alone.

Since a military coup in March that overthrew the country's democratically elected president, Islamists have taken over the north, and nearly half a million people have fled. Many of those who stayed lack the means to leave, and

are especially susceptible to cash or in-kind donations.

"The Islamists are distributing money and food to their parents, so the children have no choice," said El Boukhari Ben Essayouti, Secretary-General with the Malian Human Rights Association in Timbuktu. "It is poverty and misery that are pushing these children toward them."

The practice also takes advantage of a long tradition in western Africa, where parents in rural areas send their children away to the distant cities for an Islamic education, particularly if they have no money to pay for school fees or meals.

One young Malian who underwent training at a camp run by Ansar Dine confirmed that his instructors were Algerian members of AQIM. The role of the instructors was clear when a Toyota pickup truck stopped on the side of a dusty road in the town of Douentza. The truck carried Abou Dardar, the head of the Islamists in Douentza, and three child soldiers piled into the back. The children did not make eye contact with Dardar and did exactly what he said.

One of them, 13-year-old Abdullahi, was looking after his family's animals in the desert only a few months ago. Now he goes by the name of "Abou Konana," in keeping with the tradition of bestowing new "fighter" names upon those who join the Islamists.

His head and face were wrapped in a black turban, and his AK-47 dangled from his nose to his knees. When he's not doing military training exercises, he carries a notebook for Quranic studies inside a khaki-colored shirt several sizes too big.

"I have only my life to give to God," he told a reporter from The Associated Press.

STATE DEPT. OPENS BENGHAZI CONSULATE ATTACK PROBE

WASHINGTON (AP) • Past investigations into attacks on U.S. diplomatic missions have blamed both the administration and Congress for failing to spend enough money to ensure that the overseas facilities were safe despite a clear rise in terror threats to American interests abroad.

An Associated Press examination of two reports that are easily accessible to the public — those created after the devastating Aug. 7, 1998, bombings of the U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania — may offer clues to the possible outcome of the current investigation begun by Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton into last month's attack on the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi, Libya.

That attack by what is now believed to be al-Qaida-linked militants has become fraught with election-year politics as Republicans accuse administration officials of dissembling in the early aftermath on what they knew about the perpetrators and for lax

security at the diplomatic mission in a lawless part of post-revolution Libya.

Two House Republican leaders this week accused the administration of denying repeated requests for extra security at the Benghazi consulate, where Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans were killed on the 11th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks on the U.S.

"The men and women who serve this country as diplomats deserve no less than a full and accurate accounting wherever that leads, and I am committed to seeking that for them," Clinton told reporters at the State Department on Wednesday.

The State Department has convened at least a dozen accountability review boards to look into the deaths of American personnel in attacks on official buildings or vehicles overseas since the mid-1990s. Those attacks were committed in countries that included Jordan, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia and Sudan.

Obama Hoped to Try bin Laden in Court if Captured

WASHINGTON (AP) • A new book says President Barack Obama hoped to put Osama bin Laden on trial, showing the U.S. commitment to due process under law, if the al-Qaida leader had surrendered during a U.S. raid in Pakistan last year.

In "The Finish," journalist Mark Bowden quotes the president as saying he thought he would be in a strong political position to argue in favor of giving bin Laden the full rights of a criminal defendant if bin Laden went on trial for masterminding the Sept. 11 attacks. But Bowden says Obama expected bin Laden to go down fighting. A team of Navy SEALs raided bin Laden's compound in Abbottabad, Pakistan in May 2011 and killed the terrorist leader.

The Associated Press purchased a copy of "The Finish," which is due to come out Oct. 16, a few weeks before the presidential election. The revelation that Obama hoped to capture bin Laden may provide political fodder for Republicans who have criticized the Obama administration for trying to bring terrorists from Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, and overseas to trials in U.S. courts.

"Frankly, my belief was if we had captured him, that I would be in a pretty strong position...

to argue that displaying due process and rule of law would be our best weapon against al-Qaida, in preventing him from appearing as a martyr." Obama is quoted saying in an interview with Bowden. Obama believed that affording terrorists "the full rights of criminal defendants would showcase America's commitment to justice for even the worst of the worst," Bowden writes.

U.S. officials have said the Navy team was ordered to capture bin Laden if he surrendered

or kill him if he threatened them. Bowden asserts that the SEALs could have taken bin Laden alive but had no intention of doing so. Bowden's extensive access to top figures, including the president and high-ranking officials in the Pentagon and CIA, may revive criticism from the GOP that the White House allegedly leaks about the raid to burnish its foreign policy record during an election year.

Two-day Test Can Spot Gene Diseases in Newborn Babies

WASHINGTON (AP) • Too often, newborns die of genetic diseases before doctors even know what's to blame. Now scientists have found a way to decode those babies' DNA in just days instead of weeks, moving gene-mapping closer to routine medical care.

The idea: Combine faster gene-analyzing machinery with new computer software that, at the push of a few buttons, uses a baby's symptoms to zero in on the most suspicious mutations. The hope is to start treatment earlier, or avoid futile care for lethal illnesses.

Wednesday's study is a tentative first step: Researchers at Children's Mercy Hospital in Kansas City, Mo., mapped the DNA of just five children, and the study wasn't done in time to help most of them.

But the hospital finds the results promising enough that by year's end, it plans to begin routine gene-mapping in its neonatal intensive care unit — and may offer testing for babies elsewhere, too — while further studies continue, said Dr. Stephen Kingsmore, director of the pediatric genome center at Children's Mercy.

"For the first time, we can actually deliver genome information in time to make a difference," predicted Kingsmore, whose team reported the method in the journal *Science Translational Medicine*.

Even if the diagnosis is a lethal disease, "the family will at least have an answer. They won't have false hope," he added.

More than 20 percent of infant deaths are because

of a birth defect or genetic diseases, the kind caused by a problem with a single gene. While there are thousands of such diseases — from Tay-Sachs to the lesser known Pompe disease, standard newborn screening tests detect only a few of them. And once a baby shows symptoms, fast diagnosis becomes crucial.

Sequencing whole genomes — all of a person's DNA — can help when it's not clear what gene to suspect. But so far it has been used mainly for research, in part because it takes four to six weeks to complete and is very expensive.

On Wednesday, researchers reported the new process for whole-genome sequencing can take just 50 hours.

That's an estimate: The study counted only the time the blood was being decoded or analyzed, not the days needed to ship the blood to Essex, England, home of a speedy new DNA decoding machine made by Illumina, Inc. — or to ship back the results for Children's Mercy's computer program to analyze. Kingsmore said the hospital is awaiting arrival of its own decoder, when 50 hours should become the true start-to-finish time.

Specialists not involved with the study said it signals the long-promised usefulness of gene-mapping to real-world medicine finally is close.

"Genomic sequencing like this is very practical and very real now," said Dr. Arthur Beaudet of the Baylor College of Medicine "Fast forward a year, and I think this kind of thing will probably be pretty routine."

Oregon's Pot Measure Struggling

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) • As marijuana legalization efforts in Colorado and Washington pick up steam, a similar push in Oregon seems to be going up in smoke.

More than \$4 million has flowed to Washington and close to a million in Colorado.

Yet in Oregon — a state with one of the nation's highest rates of pot use and a reputation for pushing the boundaries on marijuana laws — organizers are looking at a bank account with just \$1,800.

Marijuana activists who have ploughed big bucks into campaigns in the other two

states complain the Oregon measure is poorly written and doesn't poll well. It didn't qualify for the ballot until July, severely limiting the time available to sway voters.

They also don't care for the man with a blemished record who's pushing Oregon's measure.

"That's just the hard, cold reality," said Allen St. Pierre, director of the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws. "They simply do not trust and will not work with the locals there."

Paul Stanford, the 51-year-old chief petitioner be-

hind the Oregon Cannabis Tax Act, dismissed criticism and said the Legislature can clean up any issues with the law after it passes.

As for funding questions, he said it's an advantage that the Oregon measure isn't being pushed by distant interests.

Oregon has been on the leading edge of the decades-long push to loosen marijuana laws. It was the first state to decriminalize marijuana possession in 1973 and was also among the first to allow medicinal use of marijuana.

The state ranked seventh

in the nation for marijuana use among people 12 and older, according to data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health. Colorado ranked third and Washington 11th.

In both those states, lawyers writing the initiatives took pains to incorporate lessons from earlier failures at the ballot box. Based on the results of polling and focus groups, the measures were carefully written to close down criticism that resonates with voters — both have a tough standard for stoned driving, for example.

Meningitis Outbreak Hits 26 People, 5 States

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) • An outbreak of a rare and deadly form of meningitis has now sickened 26 people in five states who received steroid injections mostly for back pain, health officials said Wednesday. Four people have died, and more cases are expected.

Eighteen of the cases of fungal meningitis are in Tennessee where a Nashville clinic received the largest shipment of the steroid suspected in the outbreak. The drug was made by a specialty pharmacy in Massachusetts that issued a recall last week. Investigators say they are still trying to confirm the source of the infections.

Three cases have been reported in Virginia, two in

Maryland, two in Florida and one in North Carolina. Two of the deaths were in Tennessee; Virginia and Maryland had one each, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

More new cases are almost certain to appear in the coming days, said Tennessee Department of Health Commissioner John Dreyzehner. Five new cases were confirmed over the past 24 hours, he said Wednesday, calling the situation a "rapidly evolving outbreak."

But federal health officials weren't clear about whether new infections are occurring. They are looking for — and increasingly finding — illnesses that occurred in the last two or three months.

Century-old \$5 Alaska Bill To Be Auctioned

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) • The \$5 bill displayed for decades on Charles Fairbanks IV's wall was long a treasured family heirloom from Alaska. Now, to the surprise of the grandson of a turn-of-a-century vice president, it's also become a likely treasure trove.

The rare find is expected to fetch as much as \$300,000 at auction this month when a Texas auctioneer plans to put it up for bids in Dallas and online as part of the American Numismatic Association National Money Show.

The bill was presented in 1905 to Vice President Charles W. Fairbanks — Theodore Roosevelt's No. 2 — and was from the First National Bank of Fairbanks, Alaska. The family has had it in their possession ever since and recently decided to auction it off through Dallas-based Heritage Auctions.

"It's a wonderful, wonderful find," said Dustin Johnston, director of Heritage's currency auctions.

Auction officials say the Fairbanks bill that features an image of President Benjamin Harrison is a highlight that's expected to sell for \$200,000 to \$300,000. The minimum starting bid is \$120,000.

Fairbanks always knew the bill was special, at least to his family, given that it was presented to the former vice president as a memento from the frontier city named after him.

Fairbanks learned last year that the uncirculated note's estimated value had skyrocketed far beyond the estimate of \$50,000 to \$60,000 set in the mid-1990s, which prompted him to start locking it up

whenever he traveled.

With the new estimate, the 66-year-old great-grandson no longer felt comfortable displaying it on a wall in his Santa Barbara, Calif., home.

It was no longer just a framed family keepsake, so off it went to a safety deposit box.

"Why stress out and worry about something?" Fairbanks said. "It'd be like having a Monet in the house."

But keeping it hidden didn't do anyone any good. So Fairbanks decided to consign it to Heritage. He said his family has plenty of other historical memorabilia, but he wouldn't have done it.

Charles W. Fairbanks was a U.S. senator from Indiana in the late 1890s when he was credited with playing a key role to resolve a border dispute with Canada triggered by the Klondike Gold Rush. As a result of his efforts, most of the disputed territory went to the United States.

But the real reason the city of Fairbanks was named after him was because he played a key role in the appointment of a federal judge, James Wickershaw, a man Fairbanks met during the border dispute, according to University of Alaska Fairbanks historian Terrence Cole. To return the favor, Wickershaw urged city founders to call the settlement Fairbanks.

"He said, 'I owe everything that I am to him,'" Cole said.

Auction officials also note the bill's rarity. Only three banks in Alaska — out of more than 12,000 banks nationwide — issued the bills.

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Secret Cold War Tests Targeted St. Louis

ST. LOUIS (AP) • Doris Spates was a baby when her father died inexplicably in 1955. She has watched four siblings die of cancer, and she survived cervical cancer.

After learning that the Army conducted secret chemical testing in her impoverished St. Louis neighborhood, she wonders if her own government is to blame.

In the mid-1950s, and again a decade later, the Army used motorized blowers atop a low-income housing high-rise, at schools and from the backs of station wagons to send a potentially dangerous compound into the air.

Local officials were told the government was testing a smoke screen that could shield St. Louis from aerial observation.

But in 1994, the government said the tests were part of a biological weapons program and St. Louis was chosen because it bore some resemblance to Russian cities that the U.S. might attack. The material being sprayed was zinc cadmium sulfide.

New research is raising greater concern about the implications of those tests. St. Louis Community College-Meramec sociology professor Lisa Martino-Taylor's research has raised the possibility that the Army performed radiation testing by mixing radioactive particles with the zinc cadmium sulfide.

Her report, released late last month, was troubling enough that both U.S. senators from Missouri wrote to Army Secretary John McHugh demanding answers.

Army spokesman Dave Foster declined an interview request from The Associated Press, saying the Army would first respond to the senators.

Bell Factory Resumes Production

EAST HAMPTON, Conn. (AP) • The 180-year-old New England company that made the little bell that rings every time an angel gets its wings in the Christmas classic "It's a Wonderful Life" has resumed production in time for the holidays, four months after its 19th-century factory burned down.

Over the past few weeks, employees working at a temporary factory set up in a rented warehouse across the street from Bevin Bros. Manufacturing Co. began filling customer orders, including the annual one from the Salvation Army for the steel and brass bells it uses during its kettle drives.

The resumption of bell-making, announced with fanfare Wednesday by Matthew Bevin, the sixth-generation owner of Bevin Bros., was welcomed by many in Belltown USA, as this town of 13,000 people 20 miles from Hartford has long called itself. Bevin Bros. is the last bell manufacturer in a town that had more than 30 of them generations ago.

Eric Fuller, an assistant manager at a hardware store, said it would be difficult to imagine an end to the company in a town where even the public school mascot is the bell-ringer.

Bells are pictured on the town seal and on street and welcome-to-East Hampton signs.

"It's the town's identity," he said. "It's important for

the long-time residents." Matthew Bevin, a 45-year-old businessman who fondly recalls putting "tongues" on bells as a child and now lives in Louisville, Ky., has vowed to build a new factory to replace the one destroyed by fire during a lightning storm May 27.

He said he is doing it for the employees and the town, and was inspired by

his ancestors, who managed to keep the company afloat through technological change, the Depression and cheap overseas competition. "We're fortunately wired not to quit," he said.

Voter ID Fight Far from Over

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) • Just because opponents of Pennsylvania's new law requiring voters to show photo identification won a preliminary injunction in court doesn't mean the issue or the court case is going away.

The law itself has not cleared the constitutional challenges before it, and indications from the state Supreme Court are that the law still faces significant legal problems.

Meanwhile, the hubbub over the divisive law has awakened new Democratic Party volunteers and prompted the formation of the 175-group Voter ID Coalition. The Democrat Party and the coalition both said Wednesday they will shift their education campaigns to reflect a judge's day-old decision that voters will not, after all, be required to show ID at their polling place.

"The issue remains, the law remains," said Joe Grace, a Philadelphia-based spokesman for the Voter ID Coalition. "It will have to be dealt with after Election Day, but it is simply not a factor when people go to the polls on Nov. 6 unless there's confusion."

The 6-month-old law, among the nation's toughest, sparked a debate over voting rights ahead of the presidential election, in which Pennsylvania's electoral votes could play a central role in deciding the victor. Critics of the law requiring voters to show ID had argued that it would disenfranchise minorities and the poor, groups that tend to vote Democratic.

Commonwealth Court Judge Robert Simpson halted the law Tuesday, saying voter disenfranchisement could happen.

Farm Tied to Salmonella Outbreak Deemed Unclean

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) • A federal inspector found two strains of salmonella and unclean conditions at an Indiana cantaloupe farm's fruit-packing plant during inspections prompted by a deadly outbreak linked to the farm's melons.

The Food and Drug Administration's report on the mid-August inspections at Chamberlain Farm Produce Inc. shows an inspector found improperly cleaned and apparently rusted and corroded

equipment. The inspector also found what appeared to be algae growing in standing water beneath conveyor belts at the Owensville, Ind., plant, the report said.

Two strains of salmonella were found on cantaloupes in the farm's fields and on surfaces throughout the packing building located about 20 miles north of Evansville in southwestern Indiana, according to the report, which was posted Tuesday.

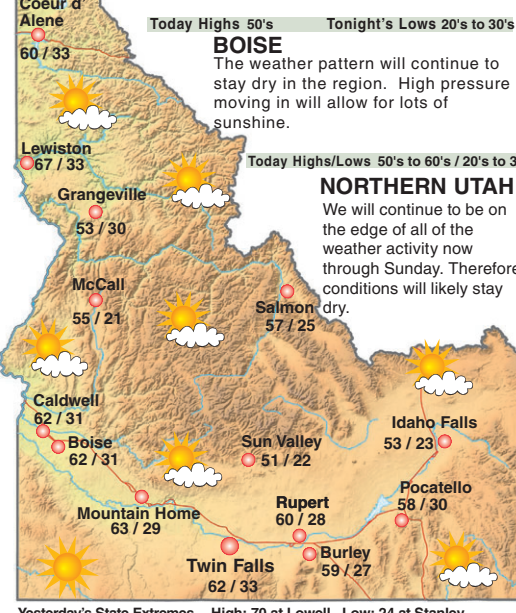

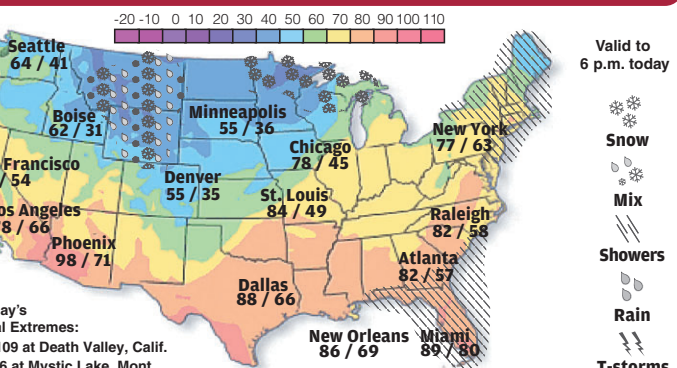

Demolition on Hold for Frank Lloyd Wright House in Phoenix

PHOENIX (AP) • The city of Phoenix and a developer who was poised to demolish a Frank Lloyd Wright-designed home have reached an agreement that will put any work on hold while a search continues for a buyer, a city official confirmed Wednesday.

The agreement with the developers who bought the 1952 home in the city's Arcadia neighborhood delays for nearly a month any demolition of the house, said Brendan Mahoney, a senior adviser for Mayor Greg Stanton.

The deal signed Monday allows time for a potential sale to buyers who will preserve the house, and also protects the developers, who contend they were issued a valid demolition permit that the city claimed was issued in error.

The potential demolition of the home on more than 2 acres set off a firestorm in the architectural community. The Chicago-based Frank Lloyd Wright Building Conservancy hurried to get historic status for the home when it learned a developer was planning to buy it, split the parcel of more than two acres and tear down the home.

"It's a unique design by Frank Lloyd Wright," said Janet Halstead, the conservancy's executive director. "It is probably the most important residential design of the last decade of his career."

Antelope Harvest Continues to Grow

There's some good news for hunters of pronghorn antelope and mule deer this season.

"This year's antelope season in southern Idaho has been very successful," said Jeff Frost of Intermountain Taxidermy and Worldwide Adventures in Twin Falls. A number of hunters have brought their antelope into the shop, he said, and he expects a good deer season, too.

Muzzleloader: "We are seeing some very nice bucks taken by muzzleloader this year as well," Frost said. "Units 54 and 42 have been exceptional for trophy quality. ... The muzzleloader elk season starts this week, and we have many reports of hunters who have been pre-season scouting excited about the number and size of bulls."

Controlled hunt: Controlled hunts open Friday, and hunters should expect to see quality deer in southern Idaho, said Regan Berkley, regional biologist with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. "We did counts in places like the South Hills, and those counts are up," she said. "We're seeing more deer than previous surveys. There's no reason to expect anything to affect the deer population in a negative way."

Five-hundred tags were sold for Unit 54, Berkley said; 375 for Unit 55. The general controlled hunt goes through Oct. 31.

Deer Season Opens Oct. 10 in Most of Idaho

JEROME • It's the time of year you've been waiting for: the regular deer season opens Oct. 10 in many parts of Idaho.

In some areas, a regular deer tag allows hunters to take either mule deer or white-tailed deer. A white-tailed deer tag allows hunters to take only a white-tail.

Many areas across the state also offer antlerless youth hunt opportunities, but check the 2012 big game rules brochure carefully for the areas where youth hunts are open.

To hunt deer in Idaho during the regular season, a hunter must have a valid 2012 Idaho hunting license and deer tag.

Fish and Game law enforcement officials ask that hunters report any poaching or suspicious activities they encounter or hear about while hunting. Hunters with information about a wildlife crime should call the Citizens Against Poaching hotline at 1-800-632-5999, 24 hours a day. Callers may remain anonymous. Or contact the nearest Fish and Game office or local law enforcement.

Hunters also can pick up a free copy of Fish and Game's backcountry game



meat care guide. The guide has helpful tips to ensure proper handling of game to avoid wasting the meat. The guide is available at Fish and Game offices and license vendors.

Boulderfest is King's way of getting the climbing community — both old and new — together.

The style of climbing that will be featured at Boulderfest is called bouldering.

Bouldering routes are usually shorter in height and more dynamic because ropes are not used. Climbers still maneuver themselves over the rocks but in more powerful, quick and thoughtout moves.

Because there are no ropes to protect climbers from falling, they instead use crash pads placed under their route in case they fall.

"You have to learn how to control the fall," King said. "The art is performing short, precise movements to get to the top."

Bingham is helping map out the routes and said they will be designed so everyone is able to participate whether they are fairly new to bouldering or an expert.

Climbers and volunteers will also have the opportunity to participate in a clean-up of the trail system north of Dierkes Lake.

Bingham said this area gets a lot of traffic and last year 50 volunteers showed up to help.

The trail rejuvenation and clean-up will take place at 7 a.m. Oct. 13 and if you are interested in volunteering just show up on the northwest corner of the Dierkes parking lot.

Waterfowl Season Opens Saturday; Hunt Areas Change

JEROME • The waterfowl season opens Saturday but the opening dates and areas have changed this year.

Area 1 opens Oct. 6 and runs through Jan. 18. The area includes all of the Fort Hall Indian Reservation, including private in-holdings; Bannock County; Bingham County, except that portion within the Blackfoot Reservoir drainage; Caribou County within the Fort Hall Indian Reservation; and Power County east of State Highway 37 and State Highway 39.

Area 2, which was Area 1 in the past, includes the rest of the state and opens Oct. 13 and runs through Jan. 25.

The daily bag limit is seven ducks; but no more than two female mallards, two redheads, two pintails

and one canvasback. The possession limit is twice the daily limit. The bag limit for Wilson's snipe is 8, and 16 after the first day of the season; the limit for coots is 25.

The season for dark geese – Canada and white-fronted – is the same as the duck seasons. The daily bag limit is four dark geese, and 10 light geese – blue, snow and Ross's. Possession limits after the first day of the season are eight dark geese and 20 light geese. (See map on Page 10 in rules brochure.)

Youth Pheasant Season Opens Saturday

JEROME • Hunting isn't just for adults.

A pheasant season for youth opens statewide on Saturday. The week-long hunt, for ages 15 and younger, opens 30 minutes before sunrise and continues through 30 minutes after sunset on the Oct. 12.

The regular season opens Oct. 13 in Area 1 and Oct. 20 in Areas 2 and 3.

Youth hunters must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 18 years or older; one adult may accompany more than one youth.

The daily bag limit is three cocks, and the possession limit is six after the first day, except on wildlife management areas where pheasants are stocked, in which case the daily limit is two cocks and four in possession.

Hunters 17 and older

need a WMA upland game bird permit to hunt on Idaho Fish and Game wildlife management areas where pheasants are stocked. Pheasants will be stocked on the Payette, Montour, Fort Boise, Niagara and Market Lake wildlife management areas before the youth hunt weekend.

All upland game hunters are required to wear hunter orange during the pheasant season when hunting on wildlife management areas where pheasants are stocked. And all hunters must have a valid 2012 Idaho hunting license.

Consult the 2012 upland seasons and rules brochure for details, available at all license vendors, Fish and Game offices and online at fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/hunt/rules/?get-Page67.

In no time at all, an entire aftermarket industry developed offering uncountable barrel/stock combinations, target trigger assemblies, high cap magazines and loaders, optical and metallic sights and mounting systems, muzzle breaks and noise-reducing compensators; literally something for every rimfire fancier.

This year, Ruger proved that it's still the Rimfire Versatility King by adding its own unique twist (pun intended) to the time-tested takedown concept. New for 2012 is the Ruger 10-22 TD (Takedown).

To assemble the two-piece TD, you slide the

smooth breech portion of the stainless steel barrel/synthetic stock forearm subassembly into the receiver/butt stock subassembly, turn it clockwise, and release the thumb-activated locking lever. Simply reverse the process to disassemble for cleaning and storage.

Be sure to check out the company's website, www.ruger.com, to see how quick and easy the process really is. Now that he is familiar with his TD, my son Andrew can complete an assembly/disassembly cycle in four seconds flat.

Since this is a firearm engineered and intended to serve generations of shooters, an ingenious takedown adjustment ring can be employed as needed to maintain a secure accuracy-enhancing union of the rifle's two subassemblies; no planned obsolescence with Ruger's American made products.

The TD is shipped in a black ballistic nylon backpack-style bag embellished with the red and black Sturm Ruger eagle logo. A Weaver-style scope base, one 10-round rotary maga-

zine, and a keyed safety lock ship with the weapon. The two subassemblies slip into internal Velcro-secured sleeves stitched into opposite sides of the zippered pack. An additional sleeve will accept a conventional scope and rings.

Two external pockets can conveniently house several 25-round extended magazines, ammunition, shooting glasses, hearing protection, survival gear, etc. The lower pocket is fitted with Molle loops for accessory attachment.

Test firing at 50 and 100 yards proved the TD to be just as accurate and dependable as its more conventional stable mates. We even proved its ability to maintain "zero" with multiple disassemblies during 10-shot strings.

If you're in the market for a dead-reliable backwoods hiking, camping, small game, survival or personal defense rimfire, you need look no further than to the Ruger 10-22 Takedown.

Researchers Measure the Shrinking of Beartooth Glaciers

Sledding took on a new meaning for a group of Rocky Mountain College students this summer when they helped launch a plastic toboggan loaded with high-tech GPS gear down two Beartooth Mountains glaciers.

"We were trying to get a baseline on the thickness of the ice at the center," said Jennifer Lyman, a Rocky professor of environmental sciences who has helped out on the two-year project.

The measurements were a way to ground-truth whether analysis of stereoscopic images was giving correct measurements. The work was funded by the Cinnabar Foundation and the Forest Service and was conducted in conjunction with the Absaroka-Beartooth Wilderness Foundation.

Lyman said she got the idea to use the sled after taking a group of students

into Yellowstone. They brought along plastic sleds to play on the snowpack.

Lyman's husband Tom, a field engineer for the National Science Foundation's Plate Boundary Observatory Project, designed the sled and installed the GPS system and electronics.

Rather than risk the safety of students or professors to climb down the steep glaciers to record data, the sled was tied onto 800-foot of 7mm mountain climbing rope and lowered down the glaciers.

"Sending the sled down worked great," Lyman said, "but to pull it back up was really hard."

That's where the young, strong students helped. They included Aron Smethurst, Taylor West-huessen, Zach Farrand, Robert Walker, Matt Dewitt and Sean Kenyon.

"We had really great kids who helped out and made it easier," Lyman said.

Make Sure Your Rifle and Aim Are Ready for Deer Season

DALLAS • The traditional fall deer season is right around the corner. Job One on every deer hunter's prep list should be making sure your rifle shoots accurately. That's done by firing bullets at paper targets, a chore that most hunters don't relish.

It's crucial, though, because deer rifles take a beating; riding in trucks over dusty, rutted ranch roads, and most of them haven't been fired (and probably not cleaned) since last season.

Virtually every Texas deer

rifle is fitted with a telescopic sight, and sighting-in is necessary to make sure the scope and rifle are in synch.

If you have a new rifle, please shoot it at a target before deer season. Unless you paid a gunsmith to sight-in your new rifle, all he did was mount the scope and align it to the bore with a bore sighting device. That's usually, but not always, good enough to hit a two-foot square target at 100 yards.

Rifle ranges should have sandbags available, and some ranges may have shooting cradles that help take human error out of the

sighting-in process. Use every aid you can find.

If the range has a 25-yard bunker, fire your first shots at that close distance. Precise bullet placement is easier at 25 yards because you can see much better. Most modern calibers that shoot about a third of an inch low at 25 yards are about 2 1/2 inches high at 100 yards. Fine-tune the windage at 25 yards, get all the shots striking in a tight group below the bulls-eye, then move to the 100-yard target.

At 100 yards, you can adjust the elevation so the rifle shoots dead-on or slightly high, as most hunters prefer.

Most calibers that shoot 1 1/2 inches high at 100 yards are close to dead-on at 200. If possible, you should shoot your deer rifle at 200, and at every distance at which you would be tempted to shoot game, just to make sure what happens.

Unless you've been to long-distance shooting school and routinely fire hundreds of rounds at long-distance targets, do not attempt the very long shots at game that you've seen on television. Those guys are shooting and selling custom rifles and ammunition, they practice a lot and they don't show you the shots that went bad.

Small Rivers and Big Fish Excite Guide

VALDEZ, Alaska • Stephanie Holcomb peered into the clear water of the Robe River and was greeted by a welcoming sight.

Waves of silver salmon making their annual fall spawning run filled the clear stream, which sat at the base of snow-capped mountains. Now it was just a matter of finding a way to catch them.

"Up until a few days ago, we were catching 40 to 50 fish a day," Holcomb said as she used her flyrod to whip a bright-colored bunny leach fly to a backwater area where salmon swirled the surface. "But it's slowed down."

"I don't know if it's the cold front we just had or that

they have other things on their mind now that the spawning run is in full force."

Holcomb stripped in line, swimming the fly through the water. When she paused, a silver salmon darted up and hit.

After she set the hook, the fish leaped out of the water and landed with a loud smack. It made a run to the left, then to the right and Holcomb held on. Finally, she played the fish to the shallows and into a waiting landing net.

Holcomb, who runs the Alaska Raft Fishing guide service, spends most of her summers and falls guiding customers to Alaska's famous salmon. She fishes for big king salmon – 50-pound fish aren't unusual,

she said – on the large rivers such as the Klutina and the Gulkana in the Copper River Valley from June through early August. Then in September, she transfers to the Valdez area and fishes for silver salmon making their spawning run.

The silvers don't grow as large as the kings – a 20-pound silver is a true trophy – and the fall river fishing isn't as popular, but Holcomb enjoys the September days when she can paddle her rubber raft down clear streams such as the Robe.

"The king salmon is the biggest draw, but I like fishing for the silvers, too," she said. "When you fish some of these small rivers and streams, you can catch some big fish."

Last Surviving Navy Doctor on Omaha Beach Dies at 95

GREENSBORO, Ga. (AP) • The last surviving Navy doctor who landed on Omaha Beach in Normandy during the D-Day invasion of World War II has died, according to a funeral director and a researcher.

Dr. Joseph Lee Parker Jr., of Greensboro, Ga., died Sept. 27 at St. Mary's Good Samaritan Hospital in Greensboro. He was 95.

Kenneth Davey, who has done extensive research of military records associated with the Allied invasion, said the Waycross, Ga., native was the last surviving Navy physician who served on Omaha Beach.

Davey said Parker was a member of the 6th Naval Beach Battalion. Parker's obituary from McCommons Funeral Home says he treated the wounded, including Allied and German troops, for 21 days on the beach.

Services were held Sunday in Greensboro, about 70 miles east of Atlanta.

Parker was awarded the French Legion of Honor medal in 2011, according to the 6th Naval Beach Battalion website. Parker and 16 other veterans were honored for their service during the war.

According to a 1999 interview with a historian that was posted on the website, Parker attended the University of Georgia. He went on to medical school in Augusta, and went in the service as an intern at the University Hospital in Augusta.

In 1943, Parker was assigned for temporary duty at Parris Island, S.C., then to Camp Bradford to the 6th Amphibious Forces, and later to the 6th Beach Battalion.

Parker said there was no training or orientation into the Navy when he joined. He said duties initially involved mundane tasks such as checking swimming pools for the chlorine content and looking for safety problems there.

"The main thing we did down in Parris Island was looking at the blisters on the GI's feet that were marching on those hot paved parade grounds," Parker said in the interview.

The Bruins had no seniors and anticipated that this would be the year they could really go places.

Then, two of their top scorers were gone. Where would the goals come from?

It hasn't been an issue for two reasons: One, the Bruins have scored nearly 76 goals. The other, they've only given up six.

"I think that's just time

Others prefer to get back and stay back.

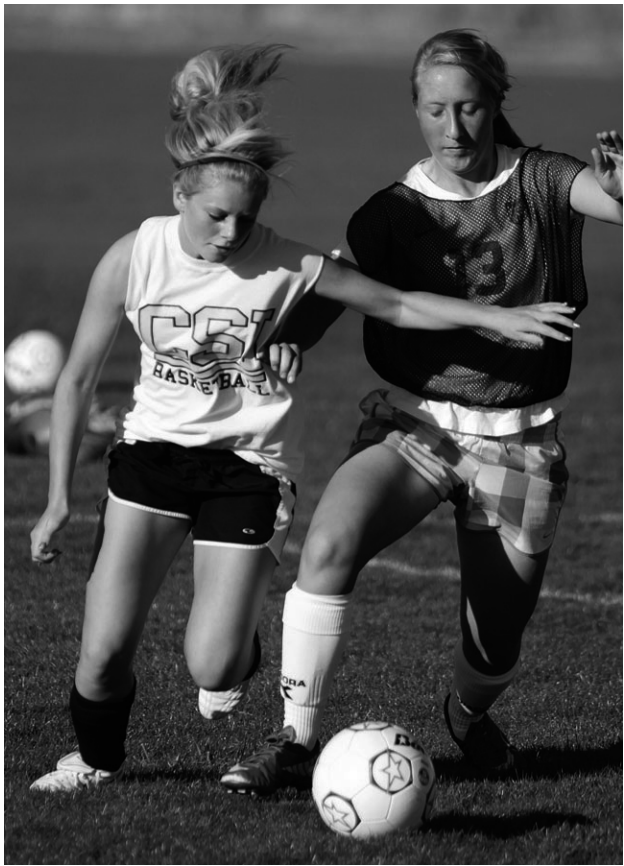
Tarchione, the left fullback, counts herself among those.

NBA Could Fine Players for Flopping

NEW YORK • Stop the flop.

The NBA will penalize floppers this season, fining players for repeated violations of an act a league official said Wednesday has "no place in our game."

Those exaggerated falls to the floor may fool the referees and fans during the game, but officials at league headquarters plan to take a look for themselves afterward.

Players will get a warning the first time, then be fined \$5,000 for a second violation.

The fines increase to \$10,000 for a third offense, \$15,000 for a fourth and \$30,000 the fifth time.

Six or more could lead to a suspension.

"Flops have no place in our game — they either fool referees into calling undeserved fouls or fool fans into thinking the referees missed a foul call," vice president of basketball operations Stu Jackson said in a statement.

"Accordingly, both the Board of Governors and the competition committee felt strongly that any player who the league determines, following video review, to have committed a flop should — after a warning — be given an automatic penalty."

The players' association plans to file a grievance with the league office and an unfair labor practice charge with the National Labor Relations Board, arguing that it should have been consulted first before the new rules were implemented.

NHL: Still Waiting For New Union Proposal

NEW YORK • The rhetoric is rising, while the time before the planned start of the NHL regular season is running out.

And now it seems more likely than not that regular-season games will be canceled before the league and the players' association even get back to the negotiating table.

The sides broke off talks Tuesday after just two hours, and it was hard to find optimism anywhere that the season would avoid a major disruption — just seven years after a full season was lost to a lock-out.

"Not prepared to speculate on next steps at this point," NHL Deputy Commissioner Bill Daly told The Associated Press in an email on Wednesday. "Obviously, we've been saying for over a month now that we would welcome a new proposal from the Players' Association. That continues to be our position."

"(It's) not a constructive position to say, 'Here's our first offer. We think it's really good. Call us back when you are ready to accept it.' That's what the union has effectively done here."

Daly also said on Wednesday that the NHL has no timetable when it will start calling off regular-season games.

The season is slated to open on Oct. 11. But with

training camps on hold and all preseason games already canceled, it is hard to imagine the NHL can stick to that schedule if a deal with the players' association isn't reached in the next day or two.

With no new negotiations scheduled, that seems to be nearly impossible.

"Unfortunately, the NHL's negotiation strategy was to lock out the players as a strategy of first resort," NHLPA special counsel Steve Fehr told the AP on Wednesday in an email. "After massive player concessions during the last round of CBA negotiations, followed by seven years of record NHL revenues, the league is once again seeking enormous reductions in players' salaries, along with significant changes which would limit individual player rights."

"The players have made multiple proposals that are favorable to the owners. The owners have not made a single proposal which would give the players anything meaningful. In fact, for much of September the owners did not even want to meet unless it was on their terms."

When the sides got together on Tuesday, for the fourth time in five days, they again focused their talks on secondary issues and not the core economics that have the NHL and the union at odds.

Athletics Complete Wild AL West Comeback

The Oakland Athletics won the division title with another improbable rally in a season full of them, coming back from four runs down and a 13-game division deficit to stun the two-time defending league champion Texas Rangers 12-5 on Wednesday.

"We knew this is a beast of a team we would have to beat, and to be able to beat them three games in a row and win the division on top of it, really it's a magical-type thing," manager Bob Melvin said.

Josh Hamilton dropped a fly ball in center field for a two-run error that put the A's (94-68) ahead 7-5 in a six-run fourth inning. The A's only added to Texas' troubles the rest of the way.

While Hamilton's Rangers (93-69) are headed to the new one-game, wild-

card playoff at home against Baltimore on Friday, the A's get two days off before opening the division series at Detroit on Saturday in their first postseason appearance since 2006.

"You can have all the experience as you want but when you run into a team that's hot, experience has nothing to do with it," Texas manager Ron Washington said.

The A's needed a sweep and they delivered to win their first division crown in six years and 15th in all. They overcame a five-game deficit in the final nine days and took sole possession of the West's top spot for the first time this year.

"It shows how important Game 162 is," Oakland's Johnny Gomes said. "I don't think it took 162 to games to check the character of this ballclub."

Grant Balfour retired Michael Young on a fly to center for the final out, then raised his arms in the air as the A's streamed out of the dugout and began bouncing up and down in the infield.

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Tigers' Cabrera Wins 1st Triple Crown in 45 years

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • Miguel Cabrera became the 15th player to win baseball's Triple Crown on Wednesday night, the reluctant superstar thrust into the spotlight after joining an elite list that includes Mickey Mantle, Ted Williams and Lou Gehrig.

Cabrera's milestone wasn't official until the Yankees pinch hit for Curtis Granderson in their game against the Boston Red Sox. Granderson had homered twice to reach 43 for the year, tied with the Rangers' Josh Hamilton and one shy of Cabrera.

Cabrera went 0 for 2 against the Royals before leaving in the fourth inning to a standing ovation. He finished the regular season with a .330 average, four points better than the Angels' Mike Trout, his biggest competition for MVP. Cabrera was the runaway leader with 139 RBIs.

Boston's Carl Yastrzemski was the last player to achieve the Triple Crown in 1967.

"I am glad that he accomplished this while leading his team to the American League Central title," Yastrzemski said in a statement. "I was fortunate enough to win this award in 1967 as part of the Red Sox's 'Impossible Dream Team.'"

Commissioner Bud Selig said also offered his congratulations, calling the Triple Crown "a remarkable achievement that places him amongst an elite few in all of baseball history."

The crowd at Kauffman Stadium gave him a standing ovation before he fled out in the first inning. He struck out in the fourth inning but remained in the game, allowing Leyland to remove him with two outs to another standing ovation from thou-

sands of appreciate fans. Cabrera high-fived his teammates as he entered the Detroit dugout, then walked back to the top step and waved his helmet. When the milestone became official, it was displayed on the center field scoreboard to another standing ovation.

"I would say without question he's enjoyed it. How could you not enjoy what he's done if you're a baseball player?" Tigers manager Jim Leyland said before the game.

"I would also add that I doubt very much, knowing him, that he necessarily enjoys all the extra attention, and all the extra conversations he has to have, it's kind of out of his realm in personality, to be honest with you."

Cabrera's pursuit of history has occurred largely in the dark, though, overshadowed by thrilling pennant races, the sheer enormity of the NFL — even the presidential election.

An event that in other years might dominate headlines has been mostly cast aside.

"The entire baseball world should be here right now," said Tigers ace Justin Verlander, the reigning AL MVP, who may soon watch that award get handed off to his teammate.

Perhaps part of the void has to do with Cabrera's very nature.

He's not the boisterous sort, never one to crave attention. He would rather hang out with a couple of buddies than stand in front of a pack of television cameras, answering countless questions about what makes him one of the game's most complete hitters.

In 1931, the comic strip "Dick Tracy" created by Chester Gould, made its debut.

In 1940, Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini conferred at Brenner Pass in the Alps.

In 1959, the Soviet Union launched Luna 3, a space probe which transmitted images of the far side of the moon.

In 1960, an Eastern Air Lines Lockheed L-188A Electra crashed on takeoff from Boston's Logan International Airport, killing all but 10 of the 72 people on board.

Five years ago: Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, defiantly vowed to serve out his term in office despite losing a court attempt to rescind his guilty plea in a men's room sex sting. Former city maintenance worker John Ashley shot five people in a law office in Alexandria, La., killing two of them; Ashley was shot and killed by police following a standoff. South Korean President Roh Moo-hyun and North Korean leader Kim Jong Il pledged to pursue a peace treaty and end their countries' decades-long standoff.

Today's deal comes from a knockout match in a regional event where all the players not only were competent, but (as usual) had an appropriately high opinion of their own abilities.

When one East-West pair came back to score up, their teammates called out "minus 50," and the first pair announced that they had conceded 420. Nothing more was said for a few seconds, then East made the mistake of asking how South had gone down.

He was told that, against four hearts, West had led the club jack (denying a higher honor). Declarer won, cashed the heart ace and jack, and played a spade to dummy's king and East's ace. Can you see what the defense ought to do now?

In one room, East made no mistake when he switched to the diamond queen. Just because East knew the contract would be cold if South covered didn't mean that South knew it.

Look at the problem from declarer's perspective. If East has the Q-J-9, he would be right to duck the queen. Even if he had covered and West had guessed to win and play a low diamond back, declarer would have been likely to go wrong.

When the unfortunate South retaliated by asking how the defense had gone in the other room, East (who had shifted to a low diamond at the critical moment) had little excuse but to say that the sun had got in his eyes as he was about to lead.

ANSWER: In context, you have a suitable hand for slam after your initial negative response. The only ways you could get your values across now (since you have nothing to cue-bid) would be to jump to five hearts — which I would do if I had one fewer spade and one more heart — or to raise to four spades, in case partner had four trumps and would find there is a useful discard available in that strain.
