Fatal Stabbing **Followed** Fistfight

Investigators weigh charges.

TWIN FALLS • The fatal stabbing of a 24-year-old Twin Falls man allegedly started with a fistfight, Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs said Monday.

Jerimiah D. Paiz, 24, died from stab wounds early Saturday morning following the incident at the Canyon Crest Dining and Event Center at 330 Canyon Crest Drive in Twin Falls.

Police arrived at about 1 a.m. Saturday and later arrested Cayde Lish, 21, of Twin Falls on charges of voluntary manslaughter.

out what was said before the fight. "At some point during the fistfight, when the victim was hitting the suspect, the suspect pulled a knife and stabbed the victim," Loebs

Should Fishing, Hunting, Trapping Be Protected by the Constitution?

TWIN FALLS • This election, Idahoans will be asked to vote on whether the right to hunt, fish and trap should be added to Idaho's state constitution. Here are the details:

What it's about: Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, who crafted the amendment, said it's about protecting Idaho's heritage. Hunting, fishing and trapping have always been part of Idaho's culture, and adding the amendment will protect that heritage from future attempts to erode Idaho's wildlife management laws, Heider said.

The Idaho Fish and Game Com-

mission supports the amendment. "The Idaho Fish and Game Commission's legal authority to regulate hunting, fishing, and trapping and require licensing is not impacted by this amendment," says an Oct. 3 open letter from the commission. "This amendment would also keep punishment for those who violate our wildlife laws."


CSI Starts

Stocks Lower on Weak Outlook for 3Q, Asian Economy

NEW YORK • Investors looked warily at forecasts for poor U.S. corporate earnings and weaker growth in Asia and decided there wasn't much reason to buy stocks.

The Dow Jones industrial average gave up 26.50 points to close at 13,583.65 points Monday. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 5.05 points to 1,455.88 and the Nasdaq composite lost 23.84 points to 3,112.35.

Companies in the S&P 500 index are expected to post an overall decline in profits for the first time in 11 quarters, according to FactSet. The third-quarter earnings season starts on Tuesday when aluminum maker Alcoa releases its results.

Curious Mind Who Was That 'Perrine' Guy?

Who is the Perrine Bridge named after?

he I.B. Perrine Bridge is named for Ira Burton "Bert" Perrine, who spearheaded the early 20th-century irrigation projects in the Magic Valley and is credited as the founder of Twin Falls.

Perrine was an Idaho farmer, rancher, and businessman. He moved to Idaho Territory in 1884 from Indiana and established his operation in the Snake River Canyon in Jerome County.

Jim Gentry, author of "In the Middle and on the Edge: The Twin Falls Region of Idaho," said "Perrine came to the canyon as a tireless promoter who could see new possibilities that few could imagine. He wanted to raise fruit and animals; provide a stagecoach line, a hotel, and an attraction for tourists; develop mines; and ultimately establish a town and an irrigation system.

Kimberly Williams-Brackett Curious Mind

After a recession that lasted from 1893 to 1897, Perrine pounced on the opportunity to develop an 'irrigated paradise' under the aegis of the

Carey Act of 1894." Perrine received a gold medal for his fruit display at the 1904 Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis, Mo. The ranch remained in the Perrine family until 1964, when it was sold and became part of Blue Lakes Country Club.

Beginning in 1893, Perrine persuaded investors to build a dam on the Snake River along with a canal system to irrigate the area. As a result, the Twin Falls Land and Water Co. was founded in 1900 and Milner Dam was subsequently completed in 1905.

Perrine is buried near his former ranch. Besides the bridge, I.B. Perrine Elementary School is named after him.

The first bridge was named the Twin Falls-Jerome Intercounty Bridge, opened to traffic in September 1927. "At 502 feet above streambed, this new bridge was the highest in the world," said Gentry.

By 1971, the original bridge was outdated and truck weight restrictions were imposed, said Gentry. Construction on the current bridge began in May 1973 and was completed in July 1976. The original bridge to the west was disassembled.

Eight new board members were added recently, bringing the total to 20. "These are people who are very passionate about the Y," Ettenger said.

Recent success comes largely from the 140 classes and programs that are offered weekly. More than 6,000 people attend at least one group class each month, and Ettenger said more than 250 children attend weekly classes - not counting activities in the city pool, which the Y operates on behalf of Twin Falls.

He believes the membership boost would be even larger if the Y had more

The director is committed to adding even more programs for children, and a big future goal involves building a large space dedicated to children's activities. The Florence Gardner Trust has pledged \$200,000 to help it become a reality but more fundraising is needed.

"Once built, we will have an incredible area for kids to exercise after school, on weekends and during summer," Ettenger said. "This is an important project and we need some more people in the community to step forward and help us."

He noted that national studies have found that one in three American children are overweight or obese. Many experts believe that number will grow to one out of two in the next several

years, he added.

"For the first time in the history of the United States, the generation that our high school kids are in is expected to have a shorter longevity than their parents' generation," Ettenger said. "That's tragic and the Y needs to work hard to turn that around."

The \$1 million in investments the YMCA has made includes the XR Zone, an area specifically for children ages 6 to 14. It's a high-tech environment that appeals to youths with a dance space, lights and other attractions that make working out enjoyable, Ettenger said.

Cleland added that the Y has Idaho's only Jacob's ladder, similar to the one seen on "The Biggest Loser" television series. She emphasized that other top-of-theline exercise equipment has been added in recent years,

New activities are being added as well. The first of three community 5K runs will be held Oct. 27, with others on Thanksgiving Day and New Year's Day.

There's more work to be done, however. Cleland said the Y needs new roofs on the two buildings it owns, two repaved parking lots and four renovated locker rooms. Major mechanical upgrades or replacements, and improved energy efficiency enhancements also are necessary, Ettenger said.

He estimated the financial cost at \$400,000 to \$500,000.

"Our need is pretty great," Cleland acknowledged.

That's why membership prices were boosted recently and why efforts are under way to increase membership to 10,000 by January. Ettenger said anyone who wishes to give taxdeductable contributions may contact him at 410-2496.

"I have been absolutely touched by our members' overwhelming support of our fee increase," he said. "While I agree there is never a good time for a fee increase, members have approached me in large numbers stating that they want this Y to be here for their kids and for their grandkids and they are glad we are pushing on to keep it moving in the right direction."

Quesnell, the member who re-joined during the summer, acknowledged that the price increase coincides with tough economic times.

TWIN FALLS • On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council approved an agreement with CH2M Hill to update its wastewater facility plan.

City engineer Troy Visek told the council that the plan is required to keep up with commercial and resi-

dential growth in the city.

The plant is currently at about 90 percent capacity, Visek said. With the plan, the city can decide how to upgrade.

The plan will cost \$178,093, and is subject to approval from the Department of Environmental Quality. The city's budget for the plan was \$250,000.

"We'll look at what we think the facts are and look at what the law says," Loebs said. "We'll determine by (Tuesday) what the charges should be."

Loebs said if Lish is officially charged, he'll be arraigned at 1 p.m. today at the Twin Falls County Courthouse.

Online court records show Lish was ordered to start two years of supervised probation in Twin Falls County on Aug. 7 for a second driving under the influence charge. In May, he was placed on a year of unsupervised probation in Lincoln County for buying or consuming alcohol as a minor, the court records show.

Police are still looking for more information on the fatal stabbing. As of Monday, Loebs said only two people are officially eyewitnesses to the alleged crime.

"If people are eyewitnesses to this, have them call police," Loebs said. "A lot of people were there and just scattered."



Canyon Park Proceeds; Next Step, Infrastructure

TWIN FALLS • The developer of a 200,000-square-foot shopping center on the south Snake River Canyon rim may be close to getting approval to

build infrastructure for the project. Gerald Martens of EHM Engineers, the firm doing the Canyon Park design work, said Monday the site development plan will be given to city of Twin Falls officials within a week.

The plan outlines where roads and utilities will be located as well as parking areas, landscaping and drainage features. If the city engineering department approves the plan, it frees Canyon Park Development to begin adding those elements.

The project is planned for a section of empty land just west of the Perrine Bridge and the Buzz Langdon Visitor

Martens said he anticipates approval before the end of the year, "which will allow us to begin improvements in the spring."

"We are in the process of finalizing lot dimensions so we can record the plat," he said. "There is no change in the basic plan, just minor adjustments among the various users."

Renee Carraway, city zoning and development manager, said the City Council has already approved the final plat but it hasn't been recorded. The document requiring engineering department sign-off is the construction

That still wouldn't give Canyon Park Development the green light to construct buildings, she added. A separate building plan must be submitted and gain building department approval for that to begin.

Twin Falls Community Development Director Mitch Humble noted that work has progressed on the site near Golden Corral during the summer.

"They are pushing dirt around and that's OK," he said. "They are grading and flattening. They can dig a hole but can't put a water or sewer line in it."

The project calls for 12 lots for shops and restaurants on 25 acres. The construction price is estimated at \$25 million.

A Twin Falls gate manufacturer has seen business boom.

TWIN FALLS • Eagle Gate Systems of Twin Falls has an enviable business problem.

The company is suddenly so busy that its staff is running at full speed just to handle all "We're having the best year we've ever

had," said Tom Skeem, owner of the 13-yearold security gate business. "We're up 70 percent over last year." He's hired some part-time workers to help installer Zac Hutchins and office manager

full-time employees in the future. "We're very small," Skeem said. "We always have been. It doesn't take much to make us feel overwhelmed."



But the boost in business is something he welcomes, whether it comes from an improving local economy or the fact that Eagle's reputation is starting to get noticed.

"It's probably a mixed thing," the owner said. "Some of it seems to be that people who wanted to do something with a gate are now ready."

Hutchins loaded up another gate Monday morning that is destined for a Twin Falls selfstorage facility. It received its finish from Idaho Powder Coatings in Kimberly, which does frequent work for Eagle Gate. Powder Coating shop manager Eric Fowler said the black exterior surface will last seven to 10 times longer than paint.

The company sandblasts the metal before

applying its powder coating. "We've used Powder Coating for years, and it's always been a good product," Skeem said.

Eagle's customers are a mix of residential and commercial buyers. Blaine County homeowners have become a particularly good market - about half of Eagle's sales because the company has built relationships with developers there over the years, Skeem

Eagle's focus is on gate automation. There are several options for customers, from radio transmitters to telephone entry and card reader opening systems. Some are computer-programmable so the owner can track who entered the gate and when.

Exit detectors open the gate automatically when people are leaving.

The product is manufactured at Eagle's location at 2188 Fourth Ave. E. in Twin Falls.

Skeem came to the security gate business by way of his father, who worked in the industry and developed a product called the silent operating sensor, which sold nationally.

"He was involved early on in the gate industry," Skeem said.

Thompson Creek Metals, which owns the molybdenum mine, announced Wednesday it was suspending the stripping aspect of the

Losing 100 jobs will ratchet Custer County's unemployment

rate from 6.7 to 10.7 percent, said Will Jenson, regional labor economist for the Idaho Department of

That number doesn't take into account that many mine employees hail from Salmon, Mackay and the surrounding area, Jenson said. But

the actual figure could be worse. "A lot of businesses in the area survive off of wages that are earned and spent by Thompson Creek employees," Jenson said. "When there's

a layoff of 100 people, it won't just

be limited to those 100 people."

Chairman and CEO Kevin Loughery said the declining value of molybdenum and weakening demand for it domestically, as well as in China and Europe, prompted the

Loughery said the company will save about \$100 million by halting stripping.

The remaining workforce of about 300 will continue mining ore that already has been stripped until the end of 2014, he said. The com-

pany then will re-evaluate the operation. If the market doesn't rebound, the operation will close until the market improves, Loughery

"There's no question about that," Loughery said. "If between now and

the end of 2014 there's no stripping, we won't (resume operations). With the exception of Idaho Na-

tional Laboratory, layoffs of more than 100 employees are rare in eastern Idaho, Jenson said.

More than 120 workers lost their

jobs when the Idahoan Foods potato processing plant near Dubois closed in 2009. The last major mine layoff came in 1999 when as many as 200 workers lost jobs after the Bear Track Mine near Salmon closed, Jenson said.

Melissa Fitzgerald, executive director for the Challis Area Chamber of Commerce, said she wasn't ready to comment on the long-term consequences. But she said the news wasn't good.

"We recognize this is a big blow to the individuals in our community," Fitzgerald said. "Layoffs, of course, have a large impact on our local economy."

US Panel: China Tech Giants Pose Security Threat

WASHINGTON • American companies should avoid sourcing network equipment from China's two leading technology firms because they pose a national security threat to the United States, the House Intelligence Committee warned Monday.

The panel said in a report that U.S. regulators should block mergers and acquisitions in this country by Huawei Technologies Ltd. and ZTE Corp, among the world's leading suppliers of telecommunications gear and mobile phones.

Reflecting U.S. concern over cyber-attacks traced to China, the report also recommends that U.S. government computer systems not include any components from the two firms because that could pose an espionage

"China is known to be the major perpetrator of cyberespionage, and Huawei and ZTE failed to alleviate serious concerns throughout this important investigation. American businesses should use other vendors," the committee's chairman, Rep. Mike Rogers, R-Mich, told a news conference. He said the Chinese companies could not be trusted with access to computer networks that support everything from power grids to finance systems.

The recommendations are the result of a yearlong probe, including a congressional hearing last month in which senior Chinese executives of both companies denied posing a security threat and being under Beijing's influence.

Rogers said they are clearly tied to the Chinese government, and that allowing Huawei and ZTE to provide network equipment and services in America risks confidential consumer information and undermines core national security interests. He said the committee was not concerned about the sales of handsets that make up the bulk of their U.S. businesses, but rather network infrastructure where they have made fewer inroads.

William Plummer, vice president for external affairs for Huawei, said his company, a private entity founded by a former Chinese military engineer, was being victimized because of U.S. govern-

ment concerns about China's government.

"Huawei is Huawei, Huawei is not China," he told reporters. "My company should not be held hostage to someone's political agenda?'

Ahead of the report's release, China's foreign ministry said investment by telecommunications companies is mutually beneficial. "We hope the U.S. will do more to benefit the interests of the two countries, not the opposite;' spokesman Hong Lei said at a regular briefing in Beijing Monday.

The panel's recommendations, however, will likely hamper Huawei and ZTE's ambitions to expand their businesses in America. Their products are used in scores of countries, including in the West.

The bipartisan report could also become fodder for a presidential campaign in which the candidates have been competing in their readiness to clamp down on Chinese trade violations. Republican Mitt Romney, in particular, has made it a key point to get tougher on China by designating it a currency manipulator and fighting abuses such as intellectual property theft.

Rogers said its release had nothing to do with politics, and was motivated by the need to alert U.S. companies of the risks. The committee's top Democrat, C.A. Dutch Ruppersberger, said U.S. companies should proceed with "their eyes wide open." He cited an estimate from the U.S. Cyber Command that more than \$300 billion in U.S. trade secrets was stolen last year.

GM Moves to Bring Computer Technology In-house

DETROIT • Now hiring in Detroit: scads of software developers and programmers.

General Motors is moving past layoffs and the Motor City's rusty, low-tech image. It's setting out on its own to develop software and invent the most advanced gizmos for your car.

The nation's biggest automaker plans to hire up to 10,000 computer professionals in the next three-to-five years as it tries to lead the auto industry with cutting-edge technology.

It's a bold and expensive move, counter to the industry's history of buying software and other electronic applications from outside comthe start of a trend as manuis among the few things that will set them apart

from competitors.

"The companies that build the software themselves in general are going to have an advantage," says David Kirkpatrick, author of a book about Facebook and CEO of Techonomy Media Inc., a New York firm that specializes in setting up technology conferences. "If you outsource the development of software in particular to others, you can risk ... your own ability to compete in the fu-

General Motors Co. isn't alone in trying to move more technology development under its roof. But the plans of its biggest competitor, Ford Motor Co., aren't nearly as ambitious.

of its computer technology work into the company by recruiting workers to four new information technology centers around the nation. Ford recently joined GM, BMW AG and Renault-Nissan in opening a technology office in California's Silicon Valley, although it's staffed by only about 15 people.

GM's first "Information Technology Innovation Center" was announced last month in Austin, Texas, with plans to hire 500 programmers and software experts. And Monday the carmaker unveiled plans to hire 1,500 more at a second computer center in Warren, Mich., on the campus of its big tech center. GM already has product designers, engineers and other technical experts at the site, including the team that created the Chevrolet Volt electric car.

The other two sites haven't been revealed.

Staff at the centers will try to stay on top of software trends. They'll develop the latest ways to link smartphones with cars or control a vehicle's heating and air conditioning with voice commands. They'll also be counted on to invent technology that no one's thought of yet. And GM also sees long-term cost savings when the centers are fully in operation.

"We have firm commitments for a majority of the space," Martens said, declining to name specific

tenants.

He said there could potentially be 12 tenants, but called that "highly unlikely" because some businesses will probably occupy more than one lot.

Opposition to the development appears to have become less vocal since the council's vote. Carraway said Monday she has not received any calls objecting to Canyon Park for the past few months.

Danish Saxophonist John Tchicai Dies

COPENHAGEN (AP) . Danish saxophonist and pioneer of free jazz in Europe, John Tchicai, has died. He was 76.

Tchicai moved to New York in 1963 and co-founded The New York Contemporary Five with Archie Shepp. He later became a leading figure of the jazz avant-garde movement in Europe. He also played with John Coltrane, Milford Graves, Carla Bley and Steve Swallow.

Tchicai was born to a Danish mother and a Congolese father in Denmark. He returned to Europe in 2001 and eventually settled in southern France.

His former wife, Margriet Naber, said Monday that he had died in the hospital earlier that day. No cause of death was given but Tchicai has been in a coma since suffering a brain hemorrhage in June.

SYRIA'S CROSS-BORDER SALVOS MEANT TO SEND MESSAGE TO TURKEY

BEIRUT (AP) • Syria's cross-border attacks on Turkey in the past week look increasingly like they could be an intentional escalation meant to send a clear message to Ankara and beyond, that the crisis is simply too explosive to risk foreign military intervention.

With Turkey eager to defuse the crisis, the spillover of fighting is giving new life to a longshot political solution, with the Turks floating the idea of making President Bashar Assad's longtime vice president, Farouk al-Sharaa, interim leader if the president steps aside.

A military option - which would involve foreign powers that already have expressed a deep reluctance to getting involved in the crisis — is still not on the table, analysts say, despite six consecutive days of Turkish retaliation against bombardment from inside Syria.

"Syria is aware that Turkey cannot go a step further," said Ali Tekin, assistant professor of International Relations at Ankara's Bilkent University. "The Turkish people don't want a war and there are no vital national interests at stake to

warrant a war. Syria sees this." The most recent flare-up between Syria and Turkey started Wednesday, when a shell fired from Syria slammed into a house in the Turkish border village of Akcakale, killing two women and three children. That set off the most serious and prolonged eruption of violence along the frontier since the upris-

ing began nearly 19 months ago. Although it was not clear whether Wednesday's shelling was intentional, Turkey responded swiftly by firing back and convening parliament for a vote



Romney: Obama Made Middle East Less Secure

LEXINGTON, Va. • Barack Obama's chief foreign policy achievement was his order to carry out the raid in Pakistan that killed Osama bin Laden. But Mitt Romney challenged his rival, arguing Obama has not done enough to secure peace in the Middle East, allowing terrorists to build strength while "leaving our destiny at the mercy of events."

During a formal foreign policy address at the Virginia Military Institute, Romney said Americans should take pride "in the blows that our military and intelligence professionals have inflicted on al-Qaida" in Pakistan and Afghanistan - which he called "real achievements won at a high cost."

But he said al-Qaida "remains a strong force in Yemen and Somalia, in Libya and other parts of North Africa, in Iraq, and now in Syria."

"Drones and the modern instruments of war are important tools in our fight, but they are no substitute for a national security strategy for the Middle East," Romney

High Court Looks at Race in College Admissions

WASHINGTON (AP) • Nine years after the Supreme Court said colleges and universities can use race in their quest for diverse student bodies, the justices have put this divi-

sive social issue back on

their agenda in the middle

of a presidential election

campaign. Nine years is a blink of the eye on a court where jus-

tices can look back two centuries for legal precedents. But with an ascendant conservative majority, the high in arguments court Wednesday will weigh whether to limit or even rule out taking race into account

in college admissions.

The justices will be looking at the University of Texas program that is used to help fill the last quarter or so of its incoming freshman classes. Race is one of many factors considered by admissions officers. The rest of the roughly 7,100 freshman spots automatically go to Texans who graduated in the top 8 percent of their

high school classes. A white Texan, Abigail Fisher, sued the university

after she was denied a spot in 2008. The simplest explanation for why affirmative action is back on the court's calendar so soon after its 2003 decision in Grutter v. Bollinger is that the author of that opinion, Sandra Day O'-Connor, has retired. Her successor, Justice Samuel Alito, has been highly skeptical of any use of racial preference.

Justice Anthony Kennedy, a dissenter in the 2003 decision, probably holds the deciding vote, and he, too, has never voted in favor of racial preference.

As a result, said Supreme Court lawyer Thomas Goldstein, "No matter what the court does, it is quite likely that the UT program is going to be in big trouble."

The challenge to the Texas plan has gained traction in part because the university has produced significant diversity by automatically offering about three-quarters of its spots to graduates in the top 10 percent of their Texas high schools, under a 1990s state law signed by then-Gov. George W. Bush. The admissions program has been changed so that now only the top 8 percent gain automatic admission.

Nobel Prize Goes to Stem Cell Researchers

LOS ANGELES • Two scientists who upended fundamental beliefs about biology by demonstrating that every cell in the body has the potential to grow into every other type of cell have won the Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine.

Sir John Gurdon and Dr. Shinya Yamanaka were honored Monday for "the discovery that mature cells can be reprogrammed" to return to a very early state of development, the Nobel committee said in its citation.

Their research is still years away from yielding a clear breakthrough in medical treatment. But the work has completely upended the study of intractable conditions including heart disdiabetes Alzheimer's by allowing scientists to grow disease-specific - and even patientspecific - cells for experimentation in the laboratory, experts said.

"It's nothing short of a revolution in how we think of a cell," said Dr. Deepak Srivastava, director of the Roddenberry Stem Cell Center at the Gladstone Institutes in San Francisco, where Yamanaka works one week out of each month.

ast week's debate was important not only because Mitt Romney "won" and thereby energized his moribund campaign. It was important because Romney won in a way that exposed and deepened President Barack Obama's two greatest vulnerabilities in this election, while overcoming, at least for one night, Romney's greatest weakness.

Maybe we should have seen this coming. For weeks, Romney had performed so badly and had fallen so far behind in swing states that if this campaign were a Ryder Cup singles match, you'd have said the president felt he had the match in the bag with just a few holes left to play. So he did the worst thing you can do in match play golf: He started playing not to lose. He continued with an uninspired, vague and cautious campaign and just waited for Romney to keep hitting balls out of bounds. Romney, his back to the wall, had no choice but to start aggressively playing to win.

He did so by repositioning himself as a center-right Republican moderate. Yes, this required him to mischaracterize and disguise key aspects of his platform on taxes and health care. But because Obama did not pounce on that abrupt Romney shift to the center, Romney's arguments were allowed to be presented without any counter and, as I said, scored a direct hit on Obama's two greatest vulnerabilities. The first, and the most dangerous threat to Obama's reelection, is a critical mass of voters saying this: "Barack Obama, nice man, good father, great that we finally elected an African-American. He tried hard. But you know what? I just want to try something new, even if I don't know it will work."

That sentiment is deadly for Obama. As long as Romney didn't seem like a credible alternative, Obama kept it at bay, even though the economy has stagnated. But Romney reawakened that mood by the confident and crisp way he talked about the mechanics of how jobs are created - through startups, small businesses and entrepreneurship – and the catalytic power of markets. His presentation crackled with a freshness and a sense of possibility that was completely missing in Obama's monotone discussion of health care, deficits and government programs. And where Obama had a chance to talk about how his own green jobs initiative has actually spurred all kinds of innovations and startups, he whiffed. (As some have noted, it is too bad the debate rules didn't allow him to phone a friend.) I confess, spending time

with inventors, social entrepreneurs and people who start companies really floats my boat - and I am not alone. If there has been one consistent weakness to this president's public messaging, it is that it is often lacking in any excitement about



innovation and entrepreneurship — the real drivers of our economy. In recent years, all net new jobs in the United States have come from startups.

Obama knows this, and, in his convention speech, at least he actually spoke to it eloquently, saying: "We honor the strivers, the dreamers, the risk-takers, the entrepreneurs who have always been the driving force behind our free enterprise system."

Yes! Yes! Mr. President. And, in the next debate, look into the camera and tell us what you are going to do in a second term to multiply the number of those risk-takers by 10. Give those people who are saying, "Nice guy, but I just want to try something new," a real reason to be excited that you not only want to deliver national health insurance but also an innovation economy that will ensure we can afford it.

13,000 Got Steroid Shot Linked to Meningitis

NEW YORK (AP) • As many as 13,000 people received steroid shots suspected in a national meningitis outbreak, health officials said Monday. But it's not clear how many are in

Officials don't know how many of the shots were contaminated with meningitis-causing fungus tied to the outbreak. And the figure includes not only those who got them in the back for pain — who are most at risk but also those who got the shots in other places, like knees and shoulders.

Those injected in joints are not believed to be at risk for fungal meningitis, said Curtis Allen, a spokesman for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. He said there was no breakdown available of how many had the shots in the back or in joints.

In Idaho Basement, L.A. Takes Shape

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • After 10 years of painstaking work late into the night, Larry Kmetz says he's done.

He built a city in his basement and is ready now to devote his time to other passions.

Kmetz, 70, assembled a scale model of the downtown Los Angeles of his

"I guess it was just a love for where I grew up," the Coeur d'Alene retiree said.

Pieced together from custom efforts and model kits, the city rose and spread across platforms spanning 144 square feet. It includes

dozens of buildings, from banks to theaters to churches, as well as an industrial area, mass transit and minute landscaping.

"Believe me, I'm not a modeler. I don't know how I did it," Kmetz said. "I think the big guy said, 'All right, you like LA? Well, I'm going to let you build it?"

He recalls moving to Los Angeles from Gary, Ind., in 1948 and being fascinated with the big city.

"I was 6 years old, and we stayed downtown in Skid Row. But I didn't know any difference. All I knew was I saw these old yellow street cars rocking on the track. I thought they were cool, and I used to love to ride them,"

Kmetz said. "And LA was my playground."

Growing up in South Central, he would explore the sprawling metropolis, marvel at the architecture and tune in to the hum of city

"It was kind of a hustle and bustle for a young kid that I thought was pretty cool," he said.

Anyone who knows old LA will recognize some of the iconic architecture Kmetz has recreated — the 27-story Los Angeles City Hall, which still stands after 84 years, and the massive natural-gas storage tanks of the Los Angeles Gas Co., which disappeared in the

"This was scratch-built from a coffee can," Kmetz said, pointing to one gas tank dominating his favorite part of the replica. "That was a devil."

A highlight is an electric trolley running the full 18foot length of the model, bound for Pasadena. Tiny overhead wires allow him to run the tram between stations and past waiting commuters under palm trees.

The smallest embellishments offer some of the most delicious visual treats: water tanks on apartment roofs, street signs, lamp posts, fire plugs, park benches – even coffee cups at a walk-in McDonald's restaurant.

SIERRA VISTA, Ariz. (AP) • Family members and hundreds of uniformed law enforcement officers gathered Monday to mourn the U.S. Border Patrol agent killed last week in an apparent case of friendly fire, remembering him as a family man who wouldn't want loved ones and colleagues shedding tears over his death.

Agent Nicholas Ivie was killed last week as he and two other agents responded to a sensor alarm aimed at detecting smugglers crossing into the U.S. The shooting occurred at night about five miles north of

the border near Bisbee.

The FBI said it appeared to be friendly fire involving only the agents. An investigation was ongoing.

"If Nick were here he'd say, 'Guys, I'm taken care of. Just take care of my girls, my wife and my family," brother Joel Ivie, also an agent, said during the funeral. Dozens of agents on horse-

back lined the street outside The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints meeting house, leading with them Ivie's riderless horse, nicknamed Mouse for his rounded ears.

Court Allows Shooting Victim To Sue Gun Maker

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) • A former high school athlete who was shot in 2003 may sue the companies that made and distributed the handgun used in the crime, an appellate court ruled.

The appellate panel said the Buffalo man's lawsuit should have been allowed to move forward because Williams' claims fall within exceptions contained in the Protection of Lawful Commerce in Arms Act, a 2005 federal law shielding gun makers from lawsuits over criminal use of products.

It is the first case in which a court has held that a gun manufacturer may be held liable under the PLCAA, according to the Washingtonbased Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence, which brought the appeal.

"If a gun company knows or has reason to know that a dealer or distributor that is

selling the guns is doing so irresponsibly and in some cases, illegally, they need to do something about it," Brady Center attorney Jonathan Lowy said Monday. "They can't just continue to blindly supply them, knowing they're going to be arming criminals and just pocket the money and look the other way."

Williams was 16 when he was shot by a gang member in a case of mistaken identity as he played basketball outside his home. The bullet to his stomach ended his hopes of a Division I college basketball career.

Attorneys for Williams argued the gun had ended up on the streets of Buffalo and in the hands of convicted shooter Cornell Caldwell through gun trafficker James Bostic, who'd bought some 200 guns from a federal licensed firearms dealer.

Alaska Airlines Fixes Computer Problem That Caused Delays

SEATTLE • Alaska Airlines has fixed the computer problem that delayed flights Monday across its 64-airport network on the West Coast and in Mexico and Canada, and operations slowly were returning to normal.

The problem was caused by a severed fiber optic line that cut the Seattle-based airline's connection to its ticketing system at 7:40

Lines of frustrated pas-

sengers grew at the airline's Sea-Tac hub and at other airports as the company was unable to put passengers on planes, except by handwritten paperwork.

Alaska Airlines said the data connection was restored before 1 p.m. but passengers could still expect some delays as the system adjusted.

The problem was caused by a combination of two fiber optic cuts in the Sprint system. One occurred at a construction site along railroad tracks between Chicago and Milwaukee and the other was somewhere between Portland and Seattle, said Sprint spokeswoman Crystal Davis in Reston, Va.

"Typically if there's just one cut traffic reroutes automatically," Davis said. "Because there were two cuts with hours of each other, it caused this disruption."

The airline told waiting passengers at Sea-Tac they could rebook later at no charge.

About half the flights at Sea-Tac are Alaska Airlines or its sister airline, Horizon Air.

No other airlines or any

airplanes at Sea-Tac were affected by the problem, airport spokesman Perry Cooper said. But lines were out the door in the Alaska Airlines part of the terminal.

Seattle-based Alaska Airlines is the seventh-largest U.S. airline based on passenger traffic and is the dominant U.S. West Coast air carrier. It has an average of 436 flights a day at 64 destinations.

Officials Rethink Lake Levels for Kokanee

SANDPOINT (AP) • Idaho fisheries biologists are rethinking the formula used for several years to set recommendations for winter lake levels at Lake Pend Oreille in an effort to boost kokanee salmon recovery.

Since the 1990s, the Idaho Department of Fish and game has pegged its annual recommendation for winter pool levels to egg-to-fry survival rates. But the reliability of that metric has fallen into question amid closer scrutiny of the data collected by the department.

Initially, survival rates ranged at expected levels of 6-to-15 percent, but those rates have grown higher recently even when the lake is drawn down to lowest levels, which reduces the amount of shoreline spawning habitat. The accuracy of the survival rate is important because it's the

scientific basis for recommending a higher winter pool of 2,055 feet above sea level and the lower pool of 2,051 feet, according to a story published by the *Bonner County Daily Bee*.

"Three years in a row, we had these really high egg-to-fry survival rates — so high that they weren't really even plausible," said Andy Dux, Fish & Game's principal fishery research biologist in the Panhandle.

The egg-to-fry survival rate takes into account several categories, including estimates of wild and hatchery fry abundance, sex ratios and the number of wild or hatchery spawning fish. Department officials say they remain confident in the accuracy of those individual categories, but have growing doubts about accuracy when all those factors are thrown into the same mix.

Two Men Arrested for Trying to Sell Stolen Wire



After five games, the No. 24 Broncos have gotten so good that the defense ranks among the best in the nation in creating turnovers, averaging nearly one take-

away per quarter. So far, the young defense's knack for stripping balls and picking off opposing quarterbacks is a big reason a rebuilding Boise State (4-1, 1-0 Mountain West) is back in the AP Top

Saturday's 41-14 victory at Southern Miss was a prime example. The defense picked off two passes in the first half, giving the offense a short field en route to a 24-0 lead at the half. The defense also recovered three fumbles to help preserve the win.

Coach Chris Petersen was at a loss Saturday to explain his team's thieving ways. But defensive lineman Darren Koontz attributed Boise State's 17 takeaways - tied for second best nationally with Oregon and UCLA - to a mindset that makes stripping, punching and jarring the football out of a ball carrier's arms an essential part of tackling.

"We've always paid attention to the turnover battle ... just because it's a big statistic in the outcome of a game." Koontz said. "Getting a turnover just gets everyone pumped up and gets the offense out there in a good mood. It can change the game so much, change the energy of the game."

All season long the Broncos defense has specialized in bolstering the mood of the offense. Against Michigan State and in a 7-6 victory over BYU, the interceptions returned for touchdowns offset an offense struggling to move the chains and score consistently. The defense notched five takeaways against Michigan State, five more against BYU, and two weeks ago three recovered fumbles helped stake Boise State to a 25-0 halftime lead at New Mexico.

Knee Injury Shelves BYU Quarterback Hill for Year

PROVO, Utah • BYU freshman quarterback Taysom Hill will have surgery on his left knee and will miss the rest of the season with a lateral collateral injury suffered on his final carry in Friday night's 6-3 win over Utah State.

Coach Bronco Mendenhall announced the injury after practice Monday as the team geared up to play No. 10 Oregon State, which will be without starting OB Sean Mannion because of knee

BYU senior Riley Nelson said Monday he is ready, pain-free and will start against the Beavers after missing two games with what he called "back frac-

"My heart goes out to (Hill)," Nelson said. "Season-ending injuries are tough. I've experienced those before. They're hard to get over but first and foremost it's a big blow to our team. He's a playmaker and one of our best offensive weapons. It leaves a hole in our offense."

Hill passed for 425 yards this season and rushed for 336, with 8 TDs.

His injury occurred on a 4-yard run — even though coaches were trying to get him to take a knee with about a minute to play and Utah State down to one timeout.

Mendenhall said Hill received a sign from the sideline that indicated the clock was going and to run the play but looked away as the "victory" signal came in momentarily thereafter.

That meant Hill should have taken a knee on the season-ending play, as he did the next two plays.

"There was miscommunication, and I'm responsible when anything happens when one of my guys gets hurt," Mendenhall said Monday.

BYU trainer Jeff Hurst said Hill took a helmet directly on the left knee and also injured his hamstring. He will have surgery within the week, and recovery will take 4-to-6 months - a shorter period than if he had torn his anterior cruciate ligament.

Hurst said Hill should recover fully, good news for the Cougars (4-2) considering he is BYU's quarterback of the future.

Hurst would not go into Nelson's specific injury but said he looked great Monday. "He's moving around re-

ally well and looked as good as he has since the injury occurred," Hurst said. "I wouldn't let him play unless I felt very comfort-

able with him playing." Can the fiery, competitive Nelson withstand the hits if he tucks the ball and runs?

"I hope so. That's generally what he does," Hurst said. "He should be fine."

Foster Runs for 152 Yards as Texans Top Jets

• The Houston Texans are still undefeated - but very nearly let this one slip away.

Arian Foster ran for 152 yards and a touchdown, and the Texans stayed unbeaten by defeating the New York Jets for the first time in team history, hanging on for a 23-17 victory Monday night.

With a chance to lead the Jets on a winning drive, Mark Sanchez was intercepted by Kareem Jackson on a pass that tipped off the hands of Jeff Cumberland with 1:51 remaining and the Texans (5-0) joined the Atlanta Falcons as the NFL's only teams without a loss.

The Jets (2-3) were heavy underdogs after coming off a 34-0 loss to San Francisco last week, but made a game of it. Backup quarterback Tim Tebow got the crowd fired up at times throughout the game, including running for a first down on a fake punt, but had little impact otherwise.

Houston also overcame a 100-yard kickoff return by Joe McKnight that cut the

Jets' deficit to 20-14.

Daniels finished with four catches for 79 yards for the Texans, who have just their second fivegame winning streak in team history.

Nick Folk's 21-yard field goal with 11:55 left made it 23-17, but the Jets appeared as though they would get more.

Sanchez hit Cumberland for 24 yards on first down, and then Jeremy Kerley for 36 yards two plays later. Then, Tebow came in and took the direct snap — with Sanchez lined up as a wide receiver - and rumbled up the middle for 13 yards to make it first-and-goal from the 3. 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

ST. LOUIS • Three hits and an excruciating loss one day, double-digit runs and a laugher the next. The St. Louis Cardinals have been that type of team all season.

The defending World Series champions tied their NL division series with Washington at one game apiece by doing what they do best — forgetting about what happened the day before and concentrating on the game at hand. They lost the division series and NLCS openers last year, and look how that turned out.

Carlos Beltran hit the last two of the Cardinals' four homers and St. Louis chased an ineffective Jordan Zimmermann early in a 12-4 rout of the Nationals on Monday.

"We know this offense has the potential to do this," Cardinals rookie manager Mike Matheny said. "It was nice to see this, and hopefully it becomes contagious and the guys just keep going."

Daniel Descalso and Allen Craig also went deep to help the Cardinals build a big lead that compensated for a twoinning start from an ailing Jaime Garcia. Craig hit his fifth career postseason homer and scored three times.

"If we get things going, we feel like we can carry the team," Craig said. "As you saw tonight, we put a lot of good swings on the ball and really

drove the ball. It was a lot of

Ryan Zimmerman and Adam LaRoche hit consecutive homers in the fifth for the Nationals, who head home for the remainder of the bestof-five series. But the NL East champions are without All-Star ace Stephen Strasburg, shut down for the rest of the season early last month to protect his surgically repaired

"I miss him not experiencing this with us and he misses not experiencing it with us," Nationals manager Davey Johnson said. "But we did the right thing, there's no ques-

"He'd have been the guy that opened the series."

Garcia was taken out with a shoulder injury and sent for an MRI exam. The left-hander missed two months this season with shoulder fatigue.

"It just wasn't right the whole time. I had to come out of the game," Garcia said. "I don't know how it happened, I don't know when it happened.

"I'm just hoping it's not too bad, but at the same time you've just got to wait and see how it goes."

Game 3 is Wednesday afternoon at Nationals Park, the first postseason contest in the nation's capital since the original Senators played the New York Giants in the 1933 World Series. Edwin Jackson starts for Washington against longtime Cardinals ace Chris Carpenter, who made only three starts during the regular season because of injury.

"Today, for us, was a mustwin game," Beltran said.

The Cardinals seem to live for those. They lost the division series and NLCS openers last fall, then finished strong in the World Series after spotting Texas a 3-2 lead.

So, they're on familiar ground. And once again, as a wild card.

"We knew how big this game was for us," center fielder Jon Jay said. "We've seen it all year - when we are able to do that, we are pretty dangerous."

Francona Gets Fresh Start with Indians

CLEVELAND • Terry Francona could have waited to manage somewhere else. At some point, a more talented team in a major market with a massive payroll would make him an offer.

But if he was going back, there was only one team for

And when the Cleveland Indians called, Francona was on his way.

"I knew it was right for me," he said.

Francona, who led the Boston Red Sox to two World Series titles, was introduced Monday as the new manager of the Indians, who crashed in the second half this season after contending for four months. It's a family reunion of sorts for Francona, who has ties with the Indians stretching back over 50 years.

His father, Tito, played six seasons in Cleveland and Francona spent a year working as an assistant in the Indians' front office after he was fired by Philadelphia.

Francona signed a fouryear contract. He hopes to stay even longer.

"I don't want to be a rental manager," he said. "I didn't want to come in worried. I want to be part of the solution. I want to stick around. I didn't come here

to go to pasture." With an impressive resume that includes ending Boston's 86-year drought between world championships, Francona was picked by the Indians over Sandy Alomar Jr., who served as the club's bench coach before taking over as interim manager for the final six games after Manny Acta was fired on Sept. 27.

Francona is inheriting an Indians team that finished 68-94 and 20 games out of first place in the AL Central. Cleveland went 18-45 after July 27, an inexplicable collapse that cost Acta his job and sent Indians general manager Chris Antonetti and president Mark Shapiro searching for a strong leader to take over a club with young talent and potential.

They didn't have to look far. The night Acta was dismissed, Antonetti called Francona, who spent the past year working as an analyst for ESPN. Before long working as a broadcaster

the two friends were hammering out contract terms.

"There's two main reasons I'm here today — Chris Antonetti and Mark Shapiro," Francona said. "We've kept in touch for the last 12 years. I value not only their friendship but their guidance and their leadership. I know we have challenges ahead of us but I look forward to us tackling these challenges as a unit, as a 'we.' I'm genuinely excited to do that."

After being introduced by Antonetti, Francona looked toward the back of the room, where his 78-yearold father sat proudly.

"In 1959, a guy hit .363 and that was the year I was born," Francona said, "and it just so happens to be the same guy that is the best father a son could ever ask. "

Francona said he became emotional when he informed his dad that he was the new manager of the Indians.

"I kind of cried a little bit," Francona said. "I didn't want to, but it just happened. You can't take a job because your dad was a good Indian, but it's a still a good story. It's pretty special."

Tito Francona said he offered his son some advice when he learned he was interviewing in Cleveland.

"I said, 'Stop right there,"

the elder Francona said. Francona has not yet hired any coaches for his staff. Alomar is under contract for one more season with Cleveland and has been offered the chance to return as the team's bench coach. But the 46-year-old Alomar could be a candidate for other managerial openin Boston ings Colorado.

Since accepting the Indians' offer on Saturday, Francona said he has reached out to several players on Cleveland's roster and is eager to begin getting the Indians, who haven't made the playoff since 2007 when they lost to Francona and the Red Sox in the ALCS — headed in the right direction.

"This is a clean slate for everybody," said Francona. "Dealing with players is fun. Dealing with young players

is really fun." Francona said the year has re-energized him. He acknowledged making mistakes during his final season in Boston as the Red Sox collapsed by going 7-20 in September and missed the playoffs. The pressure took its toll on Francona, forcing him to withdraw from the game and reflect "on what mattered to me."

"To do this job and do it correctly, you've got to be all in all the time," Francona said. "I was showing some signs of wear and tear. But I wouldn't have interviewed here if I didn't think it was the right thing to do."

Francona has some simple goals for the Indians.

"We're going to compete," he said. "We're always going to compete. We may not win every game, but we won't back down from any-


With Cleveland, Francona won't enjoy the same hefty payroll he had with the Red Sox, who were able to add high-priced free agents to complement their stable of young talent. While some fans fixate on baseball's economic imbalance, Francona said success and failure isn't predicated on dollars spent.

"Tampa has done if for years in the American League East," he said. "They've gone toe to toe with Boston and New York. Oakland is doing it. That's not something I spend a whole lot of energy on. My job is to get the players that we have to play the utmost of their ability, and then even beyond that to care about each other on the field fiercely and start building loyalty.

"I don't really care what players are making. What I want them to do is play the game right."

word As circulated around baseball of his interest in the Indians, Francona said he was met by some who wondered if he was serious.

Cleveland? Really? "They said, 'What are you doing? Why don't you wait for a team that's guaranteed to win?' The people that were asking didn't know me as well as I thought," he said. "I'm looking forward to this challenge. I can't guarantee we're going to win. Nobody can, but I'm excited about the chance to go about this and make this better?
