# **Animal-rights Group Pushes Companies to Drop Dry Creek**

MURTAUGH • The animal advocacy group responsible for producing hidden camera footage at Dry Creek Dairy is now demanding companies stop using products made from the dairy operation.

The hidden camera footage shows a cow being dragged out of a barn with a chain wrapped around its neck, workers beating cows with a cane as the animals slip on a wet concrete floor, and workers punching and jumping on cows between metal bars in the milking stalls.

The footage was filmed by an employee who also worked for Los Angeles-based Mercy for

Animals, said Matt Rice, director of investigations for the nonprofit.

"This is our first investigation in Idaho and the fourth case we've documented criminal animal abuse," Rice said. "This is leading us to believe that animal abuse is running rampant

in the dairy industry."

After being made aware of the footage, Luis Bettencourt - owner of the dairy southwest of Murtaugh - fired five of his employees in August. Three of the five employees are being charged with animal cruelty in Twin Falls County, according to court documents.

Bettencourt has since shown the video to all of his 500 employees and had them sign a contract stating that type of behavior was unacceptable. He then installed video cameras in the barn and hired an additional supervisor.

This isn't normal industry practice but it should be, said Bob Naerebout, executive director of the Idaho's Dairymen's Association. Please see CRUELTY, A3

SAN ANTONIO • On Feb. 7, Terence "Bo" Jones nearly lost everything.

The U.S. Army private from Twin Falls was serving in southern Afghanistan when he stepped on an antipersonnel mine while on foot patrol.

Jones, who turned 22 on Oct. 3, lost both of his legs in the explosion and nearly lost his left arm. Doctors at a German hospital were able to stabilize his arm enough that it could be saved, though his bones are fused at the elbow. The percussion from the blast also shattered Jones' pelvis and he underwent extensive surgeries to clear debris from his wounds.

Eight months later, the open wounds have closed, a metal plate and long screws hold Jones' left arm in place and new legs have been ordered.

"I'm not letting anything stop me," he said Monday in a phone interview from San Antonio, Texas.

Jones is currently at the Audie L. Murphy Polytrauma Center in San Antonio, but he'll soon move to the Center for the Intrepid rehab center in San Antonio.

So far, Jones' father, Tim Jones, said his Please see JONES, A3

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# **Evening Wildfire Threatens South Hills Structures**

**ROGERSON** • A small wildfire threatened homes and cabins in the South Hills Wednesday evening, as federal fire crews moved to quash it.

The 50-acre wildfire was reported late Wednesday afternoon. The cause was unknown that evening, according to Heather Tiel-Nelson, spokeswoman for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management.

The threatened structures were located just west of Magic Mountian and Thompson Creek. The fire closed the 500 Road connecting Shoshone Basin Road and Rock Creek Road.

The Twin Falls and Cassia County sheriff's offices were on scene providing assistance at the closure, Tiel-Nelson said.

Six engines, a water tender and a dozer all responded, along with air support and six smokejumpers.

The fire is estimated to be contained by 6 p.m. Friday and controlled by Sunday.

### Dow Falls 128, with Chevron and Alcoa Leading Way

NEW YORK (AP) • Downbeat reports from Alcoa and Chevron at the start of corporate earnings season pulled stock indexes lower for a third straight day Wednesday. The Dow Jones industrial average slumped 128 points, its steepest loss since late June. Alcoa's stock fell 42 cents Wednesday to \$8.71.

The Dow fell 128.56 points to close at 13,344.97, just shy of 1 percent, its fourth straight drop and the largest point decline since June 25. Chevron alone pulled the Dow down 38 points. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 8.92 points to 1,432.56.

# The Mummy of 'John Wilkes Booth'

DECLO • History is full of myths and conspiracy theories – and one of these myths pulled into town on the rails and never left.

Shakespearean actor and Confederate secret agent John Wilkes Booth shot President Abraham Lincoln at Ford's Theatre in Washington, D.C., on April 14, 1865. Most historians – but not all – agree that Booth was tracked down and killed in a barn in Virginia nearly two weeks later. Booth's body was buried in Green Mount Cemetery in Baltimore.

Others say that government agents killed the wrong man in Garrett's barn.

Rumors of his escape from the barn began to circulate even before Booth's body was cold. Some say the body was hastily buried to cover up the government's mistake

Nearly 40 years later, a man claiming to be John Wilkes Booth committed suicide in Enid, Okla.

"This isn't the story you'll find in textbooks," said Valerie Bowen, director of the Cassia County Historical Museum in Burley.

The man claiming to be Booth turned out to be a drifter who called himself David E. George. George bore a striking resemblance to Booth, and could spout Shakespeare at the drop of a hat.

Some folks in Enid took George's confession seriously. An undertaker embalmed the body, fully expecting that someone from the government or Booth's family would claim it.

But the body - which eventually became mummified - remained unclaimed until an old friend came for it.

The friend, Finis L. Bates, had heard George's story before. Twenty years after Lincoln's assassination, George (who then went by the name John St. Helen) was ill and thought that he would soon be dead. George confessed to Bates, who was a lawyer.

After George recovered, Bates notified the government of St. Helen's confession, but no one seemed interested.

After hearing of George's suicide and mummification, Bates asked a judge in Oklahoma for the body. The judge agreed, thinking that Bates would give his friend a decent burial.

Instead, Bates wrote a book called "The Escape and Suicide of John Wilkes Booth Written for the Correction of History" and put the mummy on tour. They say that the mummy made more money on tour than John Wilkes Booth ever did as an actor.

Eventually, the mummy – which by then was affectionately known as "John" was leased to William Evans, known as the Carnival King of the Southwest. Evans paid a \$40,000 bond, plus a fee of more than \$2,000 a year, to display "John" in his so-called greatest freak-animal show in the country.

After a train wreck destroyed his carnival business, Evans traveled from town to town in a luxury Pullman rail car, charging folks a fee to see "the body of John Wilkes Booth" in a coffin.

Evans later retired, and moved "John" and his Pullman car to a small potato farm in Declo. He eventually left town with the mummy, but Evans left the Pullman car in Declo.

Evans' Pullman car "has come a long way," said Bowen. Since it was sold, the rail car has been used as a barber shop, a residence and a pig pen.

The rail car was moved from Declo to the Cassia County Historical Museum in Burley a few decades ago, where it was cleaned up and remains on display.

"It's not the plush private car it used to be," said Bowen, "but it's not a pig pen anymore."

"John" was last seen publicly in 1976, before the mummy was sold to a private collector.

"Both are good steps to prevent this from happening again. It's something a lot of our producers don't have in place and that they should. There needs to be a better vetting process when hiring employees," Naerebout said. "What is shown in that video is not tolerated."

However, Mercy for Animals believes Bettencourt's actions are "a little too late," Rice said.

"If it wasn't for Mercy for Animals, this would still be happening," Rice said.

As a result of the video, the group is asking companies like Burger King to stop buying milk products sourced from the Dry Creek Dairy.

Burger King Worldwide is aware of the video but does not have a relationship with the dairy, the fast food chain said in a statement.

"Burger King Worldwide estimates that a fraction of our dairy products, less than 1 percent, could have originated at the Bettencourt facility where the video that depicts inhumane treatment of dairy cows was allegedly filmed," according to the statement provided.

Bettencourt sells his milk to Jerome Cheese Co., which is owned by Daviso Foods International Inc. Davisco then sells its milk products to another producer which sells products to Burger King.

At this time, it is unlikely Daviso would stop purchasing milk from Bettencourt, said Jon Davis, CEO of the company.

"I know Luis Bettencourt. I know his ethics. He has no benefit to continue cruelty to animals," Davis said. "This is a

The three employees each face a misdemeanor charge for their actions. As of Wednesday, Jesus Garza is charged with one count of animal cruelty and is scheduled to appear in in court on Oct. 16 for a pretrial conference. Javier Victor Rojas-Loayza and Jose Acensio both have warrants out for their arrest for animal cruelty charges.

Idaho lawmakers just recently passed the state's first felony animal cruelty law during the 2012 legislative session. Under the law, a person is only charged with a felony if they have two prior animal cruelty convictions within the 15 years prior to the third charge. Animalrights groups had sought a harsher punishment, but the final law reflects a compromise with livestock and dairy groups.

Sen. Bert Brackett, R-Rogerson, who was involved with crafting the final law, wasn't aware of the Bettencourt incident when contacted by the Times-News on Wednesday. However, he said that the fact that the employees are being prosecuted shows that the process is working.

"Obviously this type of behavior cannot be condoned and this is particularly egregious," he said. "It sounds like they can and should be prosecuted under the statute."

### Idaho's Animal Cruelty Law: A Refresher

Idaho's felony animal cruelty law was just passed during the last legislative session. Under the law, animal cruelty starts as a misdemeanor. But a person can be charged with a felony if they have two prior animal cruelty convictions within the 15 years prior to their third charge. Each incident of alleged cruelty - regardless of the number of animals involved - is charged as one count.

The penalties for the felony are the same as the previous third-offense misdemeanor for the crime - a fine of \$500-\$9,000 and up to a year in jail.

# Kimberly Council to Revise Clinic Lease

**KIMBERLY** • The Kimberly City Council on Tuesday decided a long-term lease agreement is the best option for a planned health care clinic on city property.

The city would retain ownership of the building and old city hall site on Main Street under the proposed long-term lease. A previous lease agreement was found to be in violation of state law because it allowed for the eventual transfer of city property to Family Health Services without a competitive bid process.

"I think the city needs to retain ownership interest in that property," City Attorney Tim Stover advised the council prior to its vote.

Other options on the table

included transferring ownership of the property to the Kimberly Urban Renewal Agency or selling the property to the highest bidder at auction.

Family Health Services, a nonprofit, plans to build a clinic on the old city hall site to serve the city's low-income population. The city has already been awarded a \$500,000 community development block grant to pay for the project.

Terms of the new agreement have not been determined. Construction, which was originally scheduled to begin this month, could be delayed.

In other action Tuesday, the council voted to explore the possibility of selling several residential building lots in the Stonegate Subdivision.

The lots have declined in value since the city acquired them in a lawsuit with a developer a few years ago.

But now that the housing market has begun to recover, it may be time for the city to sell, elected officials said.

"My thought is to strike while the iron is hot," Councilman Jim Eisenhower said. Mayor Tracy Armstrong said he would like to see a

new appraisal of the lots. "They were appraised a couple years ago, but they were appraised really low," he said.

"The market is coming back. Obviously, our hope would be that the value of the lots would be coming back as well so we can reclaim the money that we have wrapped up in that development."

The council also took un-

der advisement a request to help a local food bank.

Robyn Moss, coordinator of the Rock Creek Food Bank, asked that the city kick in \$225 a month to pay for the delivery of donated food. The need is great, she said.

"We're averaging 175 homes a month that we are serving," she told the council.

The local food bank is also looking for volunteers and a building, Moss said.

"We don't need a large building. Eight hundred square feet would be plenty of space," she said.

The next council meeting will be held at 6 p.m. Oct. 23 at the Kimberly Middle School Commons Room. The first item on the agenda will be a public hearing on city water rates.

is cruising through his recovery. Tuesday, Jones had two more reconstructive surgeries. Once he heals from those, he'll begin the process of adapting to prosthetic legs.

Like many soldiers who returned from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, some of the lasting effects on Jones are the result of a traumatic brain injury sustained in the blast. While his injuries have affected his memory, Jones said he's not letting it slow him down.

"As long as I can ride motorcycles, shoot animals and have fun that's good enough for me," he said.

Keeping a positive attitude and continuing to do

the things he loves has helped him make it through the past few months.

"You just get to the point where you don't realize you have a problem anymore," he said. "I don't think of my self as an amputee. I'm not a hero, I'm just a normal guy. Just built different."

Many of Jones' days now are filled with physical therapy as he learns how to maneuver in his wheelchair and does strength training to regain function in his left arm.

"I've yet to find something that really challenges me," he said.

So, far the toughest feat he's conquered is getting off the floor into his wheelchair relying on one arm, he said.

Now, falling out of his chair when no one is around to help him is no longer a

fear, he said.

As he continues to heal, Jones said he gets out of the hospital as often as possible. He'll soon get a new driver's license. And he's developed some new interests in Texas.

Jones said he never hunt ed back home, but has connected with several people in Texas who have taken him out a few times and recently bagged his first deer.

The hunting trips keep him from being cooped up in a hospital room day after day, he said.

"Sitting there idle isn't good for you," he said. "You sit around thinking about negative stuff."

Once he returns to Twin Falls for good, Jones said he wants to help young people who are in the same positions he was in.

"I've got a lot of ideas in my head," he said.

One of those ideas is to start a hunting and fishing program to help children learn new hobbies instead of getting into trouble.

"If kids are starting to get in trouble with the law or having trouble in school, instead of immediately condemning them, give us a call and try to get them into hunting or fishing," he said. "If I had that I probably wouldn't have done the stupid stuff I did."

The next big goal for Jones and his family is to visit home in Twin Falls for Christmas. The trip depends on his medical status come winter.

"If everything's looking good he can possibly come home for a couple weeks," Tim said.

# Humpty Dumpty **Over** Recess

The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the Senate. The Constitution, Article II, Section 2

"When I use a word," Humpty Dumpty said in a rather scornful tone, "it means just what I choose it to mean – neither more nor less."

hen on Jan. 20,2009, Barack Obama swore to defend the Constitution, he did not mean all of it. He evidently be-



lieves that the provision quoted above merely expresses the Framers' now anachronistic anxieties about abuses of executive power. (Jefferson's lengthy catalog of George III's abuses is called the Declaration of Independence.) So on Jan. 4, 2012, Obama simply ignored the Recess Clause.

He was in his "We can't wait!" - for Congress and legality - mode, as he was when he unilaterally rewrote laws pertaining to welfare, immigration and education. On Jan. 4, he used recess appointments to fill three seats on the National Labor Relations Board, even though the Senate said it was not in recess. Obama's cheeky Humpty Dumpty rejoinder was: I decide what "recess" means. Now a court must decide whether the Constitution means what it says.

In 2011, the Noel Canning company, which bottles soft drinks in Yakima, Wash., was negotiating a labor contract with Teamsters Local 760. The union says it and the company reached a verbal agreement. The company disagrees. An administrative law judge sided with the union. On Feb. 8, 2012, after Obama's disputed appointments, the NLRB upheld that decision and asked a federal court to enforce it. Noel Canning is asking the court to declare that the NLRB's intervention in the dispute was unlawful because the board lacked a quorum until Obama made the recess appointments, which were invalid because the Senate was not in recess

In support of the company, Senate Republican Leader Mitch McConnell and 41 members of his caucus have filed a brief arguing that the recess appointments "eviscerated" two of the Senate's constitutional powers - to "determine the rules of its proceedings" and to reject presidential appointments.

The Recess Clause says the president's power extends only to vacancies that "happen" while the Senate is in recess. This does not describe the NLRB vacancies or many vacancies filled by many presidents' recess appointments since George Washington made the first ones in 1789. It does, however, describe the problem the Framers addressed: Until the Civil War, travel was slow and arduous, so Senate sessions usually lasted only three to six months. The Framers wrote the Recess Clause to give presidents very limited authority to fill important posts, while preserving the Senate's absolute veto over presidential nominations.

For more than a century, it was generally accepted that recess appointments could only fill vacancies that occurred between sessions, not in recesses during sessions. Of late, however, presidents of both parties have made many recess appointments during short adjournments - as short as 10 days. To limit this, both parties when controlling Congress have adopted the practice of conducting pro forma sessions so the Senate is not in recess even while most senators are away. It was holding such sessions every three days when Obama abandoned the settled policy of presidents respecting this practice. He treated the Senate's unwillingness to act on his NLRB nominations as an inability to act, and said this inability constituted a de facto recess. He disregarded the Senate's express determinations on Jan. 3 and 6 that it was in session. And the fact that twice in 2011 the Senate, while in such pro forma sessions, passed legislation, once at Obama's urging. Because the Constitution unambiguously gives the Senate the power to regulate its proceedings, Obama's opinion that the Senate was not in session when it said it was, and his assertion that it was in recess even though it held sessions on Jan. 3 and 6, has no force or relevance. And although he is a serial scofflaw, not even he has asserted the authority to make recess appointments during adjournments of three days or fewer. The constitutional guarantee of congressional selfgovernance, combined with the Senate's determination that it was in session Jan. 4, destroys Obama's position, which is that he can declare the Senate in recess whenever he wishes to exercise what the Framers explicitly denied to presidents - a unilateral appoint ments power. Consider this episode when deciding whether on Jan. 20, 2013, he should again have a

# Mont. Campaign Finance Limits Put Back in Place

**HELENA, Mont. (AP)** • The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals reinstated Montana's campaign donation limits, telling the federal judge who struck down the limits that the panel needs to see his full reasoning so it can review the case.

The court intervened late Tuesday less than a week after the judge's decision opened the door to unlimited money in state elections – during the height of election season.

In response, U.S. District Judge Charles Lovell issued a 38-page conclusion Wednesday morning that reinforced his earlier decision finding that the state's limits are too low to allow effective campaigning. He suggested the state Legislature would have a "clean canvas" to perhaps establish new, higher limits that could meet constitutional muster.

The 9th circuit did not immediately respond, leaving the state limits in place — for the time being. The legal back and forth came with less than a month until Election Day.

Montana limits range from

\$630 for an individual contributing to a governor's race to \$160 for a state House candidate. The amounts are adjusted each election cycle to account for inflation. The law also limited aggregate donations from political parties.

Conservative groups emboldened by the 2010 U.S. Supreme Court's Citizens United decision have made Montana the center of the fight over many campaign finance restrictions.

The groups have convinced a federal judge to strike down several laws as unconstitutional, including the cap on contributions given to candidates by individuals and political parties.

Over the past week, Montana election officials had urged candidates to abide by the old limits. But attorneys for conservative and Republican groups advised candidates they could take unlimited money during that window.

Some candidates said they would abide by the old limits, while others considered the idea of taking larger donations.

# NONPROFIT IDAHO REFORM BACKER SHIELDS DONORS

**BOISE (AP)** • A promoter of Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's education reforms isn't revealing the source of hundreds of thousands in campaign cash by giving it through a nonprofit group whose donors he says are exempt from disclosure.

The *Idaho Statesman* reported Wednesday a pro-reform nonprofit, Education Voters of Idaho, created by Boise-based lobbyist John Foster, gave \$200,350 to another group, Parents for Education Reform, for broadcast ads touting the reforms.

Though Parents for Education Reform disclosed its contribution — its only one, according to the Idaho Secretary of State — Education Voters of Idaho won't file a similar sunshine report detailing its backers. That's because it's exempted from such requirements by federal tax laws governing nonprofit, 501(c)(4) "social welfare organizations," Foster said, adding there's precedent in Idaho for such donor protections.

"I'm a big believer in the First Amendment, and the rights of people and corporations to engage in the political process as they see fit, without restrictions," he said.

Bail Set for T.F. Man Charged with Rape

**MOSCOW (AP)** • Bail was set at \$125,000 for a Twin Falls man charged with raping an acquaintance behind a fraternity house at the University of Idaho.

Moscow police arrested 21-year-old Jesse Vierstra early Sunday. The former University of Idaho student made an initial court appearance Tuesday and told Magistrate John Judge that he was innocent.

# Feds Approve \$4.5M for Trinity Ridge Fire Rehab

**BOISE (AP)** • Federal forest officials say they have approved \$4.5 million to restore acreage damaged by the Trinity Ridge Fire in the Boise National Forest.

The U.S. Forest Service approved the spending this week for repairs that include watershed protection, road and trail improvements and noxious weed treatments. The work is scheduled to begin immediately and wrap up by this winter.

The biggest expense will be an estimated \$2.1 million to place straw mulch in areas to protect Bull Trout fisheries, soil stabilization and vegetation recovery in three watersheds.

Another \$2 million will be used on road improvements and upgrading stream crossings.

The Trinity Ridge Fire started on Aug. 3 and burned nearly 229 square miles including popular recreation spots. The fire is projected to be fully contained next week.

# Man Gets Prison for Vegas Chip Heist

LAS VEGAS (AP) • A California man was sentenced Wednesday to two to five years in a Nevada prison for his role in a botched graband-run casino chip heist last May at the Bellagio resort on the Las Vegas Strip.

Michael Quinn Belton, 25, of Nuevo, Calif., apologized in court and gave Clark County District Court Judge Kathleen Delaney a letter saying he wanted to enter the military and turn his life around.

"I'm sorry about what I did," Belton said in a raspy voice as he stood shackled to other jail inmates in the courtroom. "It was poor judgment on my part."

Belton could have faced up to 21 years in prison, but a presentencing report recommended no more than seven years.

Delaney chose a more lenient sentence but rejected a bid by Belton's public defense lawyer, Dedree Miles, for probation for what Miles called a "stupid and foolish" robbery attempt at a Las Vegas resort featured in the 2001 movie "Ocean's Eleven."

"I don't know what was going on in his mind," Miles said of her client.

The grandparents have since died, Miles said. No Belton family members were

in the courtroom.

Belton told police the plot was hatched by a man who posted an Internet ad offering a job repossessing vehicles in the Las Vegas area, then recruited Belton and another man for the robbery once they got to town.

Police never found the man who they said used the

name Carlos Rodriguez when he rented a room for Belton at the Mandalay Bay resort.

"When he found out what the real job was, he agreed," Miles said Wednesday. "At that moment of desperation, maybe he was thinking, 'Hey, it's in the movies. Maybe it's something we could possibly

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# Wildlife Officials Say Coyote Attack 'Strange'

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Utah officials are awaiting the results of a rabies test on a coyote that attacked a guard at a Kennecott Utah Copper site in Salt Lake County, calling the attack rare.

The woman was sitting in a booth Monday night when the covote entered through the door and lunged at her, Kennecott spokesman Kyle Bennett said. The coyote bit the woman before she was able to get it out of the security station.

A Unified police officer responded and fatally shot the animal. The animal's head was sent to a laboratory managed by the Utah Department of Health early Tuesday for a rabies test. The rest of the coyote was sent to the Utah Veterinary

Diagnostic Laboratory for a necropsy.

The guard was treated with a few stitches and released from the hospital.

John Shivik, mammal program coordinator for the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources, said the animal looked healthy but that more may be known about what led to the attack after the laboratory tests.

"This was an isolated, rare, strange and uncommon thing to happen," he told The Salt Lake Tribune for a story Wednesday. "We need to figure out what was going on."

At least four bats from across Utah have tested positive for rabies this year, but it is uncommon for other mammals to carry the disease.

# U.S. Duo Shares the 2012 Nobel Prize

**STOCKHOLM** • U.S. researchers Robert J. Lefkowitz and Brian K. Kobilka on Wednesday shared the Nobel Chemistry Prize for their pioneering studies on cell receptors, which enable each cell to sense its environment, the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences said. Their research on "G-proteincoupled receptors" could also contribute to developing better drugs, according to the Nobel Committee.

Receptors serve as sensors for cells, communicating from outside the cell to the inside, similar to the body's sensors for light (eyes), smell (nose) or taste (mouth), the committee said. G-protein-coupled receptors comprise "a whole family of receptors," it said, noting that "about half of all medications achieve their effect through G-protein-coupled receptors."

Antihistamines, beta blockers and different drugs for psychiatric conditions use receptors. "The receptors are a bit like the switchboard in a building," explained Sara Snogerup Linse, a committee member. "How it works is very important information for the development of drugs."

"Thanks to the receptors I now can enjoy a cup of coffee," she said, as an assistant poured her a cup. "And thanks to Lefkowitz and Kobilka I know how it works." Lefkowitz is with Duke University Medical Center in Durham, N.C. He used radioactivity in 1968 to trace cells' receptors, discovering several and gaining an initial understanding of them.

Kobilka, affiliated with Stanford University School of Medicine in California, worked as a research assistant with Lefkowitz in the 1980s and was instrumental in tracing a key gene that codes the receptor for adrenalin. The 57-year-old told dpa the news had hit him "like a thunderbolt … I keep trying to convince myself that this is not a dream."

The phone had rung in the middle of the night, he said. "Since then there's been one call after the other. I am answering the house phone, my wife is on the mobile."

But the prize has not gone to his head. "I am not interesting, rather dull," he said. "I can't offer much besides a bit cycling here and there."

Earlier he told Swedish Radio that the Nobel Committee had had to phone him twice, because "I didn't make it to the phone in time."

Lefkowitz told the committee in Stockholm by phone that he was "very, very excited," to receive the prize.

"I was fast asleep and the phone rang. I was wearing earplugs. My wife gave me an elbow. And there it was, a total surprise."

"By then, I was wide awake. Surely, Stockholm did not call to ask me for the weather," Lefkowitz told dpa a few hours after the call.

After the flood of emails from friends, he said it felt as though he was "reliving my whole life." He hadn't yet found the time to notify his five children and five grandchildren. "Not one of them is in science. I think they saw how hard I was working and came to the conclusion: This is not for us," he laughingly told dpa. "I was going to get a haircut today, I am afraid I will have to postpone that ... It'll be a pretty crazy day at my office," he told Swedish Radio.

# Wolf Hunting Begins in Wis. and Minn.

MADISON, Wis. (AP) • For years, vacationers and farmers across northern Wisconsin and Minnesota have heard the eerie howl of the gray wolf and fretted the creatures were lurking around their cabins and pastures, eying up Fido or Bessie. The tables are about to turn: Both states plan to launch their first organized wolf hunts in the coming weeks.

The hunts won't be anything on the scale of the two states' beloved whitetail deer hunts, when hundreds of thousands of hunters rearrange work and school schedules and fan out across the woods. Both states have limited the number of wolves hunters can kill and capped the number of permits, creating an exclusive club of hunters. Wolf hunting isn't unheard of in the United States. Alaska, Montana, Idaho and Wyoming allow it. Federal officials removed Great Lakes wolves from the endangered species list in January. That spurred Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin lawmakers to draft bills establishing hunts, too, pushing aside animal advocates' concerns that the wolf populations remain too fragile to sustain hunting.

Farmers in all three states have long complained about wolves wreaking havoc on their livestock. Wildlife officials estimate there are now 700 wolves in Michigan and 850 in Wisconsin. About 3,000 roam Minnesota, the largest wolf population in the lower 48 states.

# **High Court Questions Texas Affirmative Action**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • Supreme Court justices sharply questioned the University of Texas' use of race in college admissions Wednesday in a case that could lead parture, could affect the outcome of the Texas case. Justice Samuel Alito, O'Connor's successor, has voted consistently against racial preferences since he joined

No one on the court Wednesday expressed opposition to diversity in education. But Chief Justice John Roberts, Justice Antonin Scalia and Alito raised repeated objections to the affirmative action plan. Roberts wanted to know how the university would determine when it had a "critical mass" of diversity on campus that would allow it to end the program.Near the end of the session, he complained, "I'm hearing a lot about what it's not. I would like to know what it Scalia, a dissenter in the 2003 case, mocked the university's efforts to have more minority students not just in the student body as a whole but at the classroom level. "How do they figure out that particular classes don't have enough? What, somebody walks in the room and looks them over to see who looks Asian, who looks black, who looks Hispanic? Is that how it's done?" Scalia said. After the argument concluded, Fisher read a brief statement outside in which she said she hoped the court would rule that race or ethnicity "should not be considered when applying to the University of Texas." The university said in court papers that Fisher would not have been admitted even without a racial preference program.

The court heard arguments in a challenge to the program from a white Texan who contends she was discriminated against when the university did not offer her a spot in 2008.

The court's conservatives cast doubt on the program that uses race as one among many factors in admitting about a quarter of the university's incoming freshmen. The liberal justices appeared more supportive of the effort. Justice Anthony Kennedy, whose vote could be decisive, looked skeptically on Texas' defense of the program. "What you're saying is what counts is race above all," Kennedy said. He has never voted in favor of an affirmative action program but has voiced support for diversity in education.

Twenty-two-year-old Abigail Fisher, the rejected student who sued, was among the hundreds of spectators at the arguments. Also in attendance was retired Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, who wrote the majority opinion in a 2003 case that upheld the use of race in college admissions. Changes in the court's makeup since then, especially O'Connor's dethe court in 2006 and appears likely to side with Fisher. Among the liberal justices who looked more favorably on the Texas admissions system was Justice Sonia Sotomayor. She told Bert Rein, Fisher's Washington-based lawyer, that he was looking to "gut" the 9-year-old decision.

The university says the program is necessary to provide the kind of diverse educational experience the high court has previously endorsed. Along with race, the university considers community service, work experience, extracurricular activities, awards and other factors as it seeks to fill out its incoming classes. The bulk of its slots go to students who are admitted based on their high school class rank, without regard to race.

In 2008, the freshman class of more than 6,600 included 1,713 African-American and Hispanic students. Of those, 216 were admitted under the program that is being challenged. Opponents of the program say the university is practicing illegal discrimination by considering race at all, especially since the school achieves significant diversity through its race-blind admissions.

A decision should come by late June.

# **Experts: Global Warming Means More Antarctic Ice**

WASHINGTON (AP) • The ice goes on seemingly forever in a white pancake-flat landscape, stretching farther than ever before. And yet in this confounding region of the world, that spreading ice may be a cockeyed signal of man-made climate change, scientists say.

This is Antarctica, the polar opposite of the Arctic. While the North Pole has been losing sea ice over the years, the water nearest the South Pole has been gaining it. Antarctic sea ice hit a record 7.51 million square miles in September. That happened just days after reports of the biggest loss of Arctic sea ice on record.

Climate change skeptics have seized on the Antarctic ice to argue that the globe isn't warming and that scientists are ignoring the southern continent because it's not convenient. But scientists say the skeptics are misinterpreting what's happening and why.

Shifts in wind patterns and the giant ozone hole over the Antarctic this time of year - both related to human activity - are probably behind the increase in ice, experts say. This subtle growth in winter sea ice since scientists began measuring it in 1979 was initially surprising, they say, but makes sense the more it is studied. "A warming world can have complex and sometimes surprising consequences," researcher Ted Maksym said this week from an Australian research vessel surrounded by Antarctic sea ice. He is with the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution in Massachusetts.

Many experts agree. Ted Scambos

of the National Snow and Ice Data Center in Colorado adds: "It sounds counterintuitive, but the Antarctic is part of the warming as well." And on a third continent, David Vaughan of the British Antarctic Survey says that yes, what's happening in Antarctica bears the fingerprints of man-made climate change. "Scientifically the change is nowhere near as substantial as what we see in the Arctic," says NASA chief scientist Waleed Abdalati, an ice expert. "But that doesn't mean we shouldn't be paying attention to it and shouldn't be talking about it?

Sea ice is always melting near one pole while growing around the other. But the overall trend year to year is dramatically less ice in the Arctic and slightly more in the Antarctic.

# Heating Costs to Rise This Winter as Cold Returns

**NEW YORK (AP)** • Americans will pay more to heat their homes this winter as they feel something they didn't feel much of last year: cold.

Prices for natural gas, heating oil and other fuels will be relatively stable. But customers will have to use more energy to keep warm than they did a year ago, according to the annual Winter Fuels Outlook from the Energy Department's Energy Information Administration.

Last winter was the warmest on record. This year temperatures are expected to be close to normal.

Heating bills will rise 20 percent for heating oil customers, 15 percent for natural gas customers, 13 percent for propane customers and 5 percent for electricity customers, the EIA announced Wednesday.

Heating oil customers are expected to pay an average of \$3.80 per gallon, the highest price ever. That will result in record heating bills, at an average of \$2,494. That's nearly \$200 more than the previous high, set in the winter of 2010-2011.

Kathleen Ryan of Cohoes, in upstate New York, is on a payment plan in which she is billed for oil November through May to spread out the costs. But with oil prices high bring," she said. "They're already talking about frost this weekend. My costs could double."

She regrets not switching over to natural gas earlier this year when sewer line work in her neighborhood would have made it easier to run a gas line to her home. But she has a plan to keep a lid on her heating bills. "I'm going to buy a portable heater, an electric heater," she said.

That could help. Customers who use natural gas, electricity or propane will see lower bills than in a typical winter because of relatively low prices. For example, natural gas should average \$10.32 per thousand cubic feet. That's 0.8 percent higher than last year but 13 percent lower than the five-year average.

Rising heating oil costs come at a time when funding for low-income heating assistance is falling. Over the last two years, federal heating assistance funding has been cut to \$3.5 billion from \$5.1 billion. The number of households receiving assistance has dropped by 1.1 million over the period, according to Wolfe.

Just 6 percent of the nation's households use heating oil, but they tend to be in some of the coldest parts of the country where heating needs are high, mainly in the Northpercent use wood.

Electricity prices will fall 2.3 percent to 11.4 cents per kilowatt hour, the government estimates. Propane prices will fall 8 percent in the Midwest to \$2.02 per gallon and 13 percent in the Northeast to \$2.95 per gallon.

Natural gas, propane and electricity prices are relatively low because of a dramatic increase in domestic natural gas production over the last five years. Natural gas is used to generate about one-third of the nation's electricity and is instrumental in setting the price of electricity. Recently drillers have been increasing production of so-called natural gas liquids, including propane.

Heating oil will hit record prices because it is made from crude oil. Crude is priced globally, and has stayed high because of increasing world demand, worries about supply disruptions in the Middle East, and stimulus programs from central banks around the world that encourage investment in oil and other commodities. Oil has averaged \$95.95 per barrel in the U.S. so far this year, up from an average of \$94.86 in 2011.

Consumers in the Northeast already have an issue with oil: high gasoline prices. Drivers in New England are pay-

# Iran's Spy Agency Finds Voice in Cyberspace

**TEHRAN, Iran (AP)** • A glimpse into the shadow world of Iran's main spy agency is now a click away.

In an unexpected display of outreach, the Intelligence Ministry now hosts a website with addresses of provincial offices, appeals for tips and anti-American essays that mock rising obesity rates, large prison populations and school shootings.

There's no mission statement on the site, but it appears part of stepped-up attempts by Iran's leadership to promote national unity and project its authority amid Western sanctions and international isolation. After protests in Tehran last week over Iran's slumping currency, the nationally broadcast Friday prayers tapped heavily into the theme of shared sacrifice in times of trouble. And Wednesday, Iran's on Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei described the sanctions as a "war against a nation."

The new website also fits into Iran's narrative of fighting a "soft war" in cyberspace against Western cultural and political influences. For more than a year, Iran's leaders have touted plans for a "clean" Internet that could presumably try to block Western content, but Web experts have raised questions about its technical feasibility.

"The ministry is going online to make its presence known to the Iranian public, especially the young who use the Internet," said Meir Javedanfar, an Iranian-born political analyst based in Israel. "This is basically a show of force."

What the new Farsi-language site, www.vaja.ir, lacks in innovation (mostly a simple list of stories and links), it makes up for in pure anti-American bluntness.

Click on "America from a Different Perspective." The list of shame includes the huge U.S. prison population, rising obesity, school shooting statistics, why supporters of euthanasia and how giant chain stores such as Walmart are smothering small businesses.

Another essay claims the chief goal of U.S. economic sanctions is not to force concessions over Tehran's nuclear program, but to incite civil unrest. It specifically cites U.S. diplomat Jillian Burns, who set up Washington's first Iranian monitoring office in Dubai in 2006 and is currently the consul in Herat in western Afghanistan, where Iran has strong cultural and economic ties. There was no immediate comment from the State Department.

Tehran-based political commentator Hamid Reza Shokouhi sees the website – the web name is the Farsi acronym for the Intelligence Ministry – as part of a new image-building campaign by Iran's ruling system in the Internet era, which has left authorities in a constant struggle to block opposition sites and Western influences.

"Economic and military threats against Iran have increased. Under such circumstances, it is necessary to reduce the gap between the people and the ruling system," said Shokouhi. "The website is a move in this direction. This is a big deal."

It's far from the first time that Iran's leadership has planted its flag in cyberspace.

Websites have operated for years for Khamenei and others including President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad in Farsi, English and Arabic. More than a dozen staterun and semiofficial news services also flood the Web around the clock.

"The leadership, particularly within the hardline elements of the Intelligence Ministry, has an obsession with the notion that Washington is coordinating a soft revolution to unseat the Islamic Republic," said Suzanne Maloney, an Iranian affairs expert at the Brookings Institution in Washington. strategy appears to be a kind of information overload in response to U.S. initiatives, such as the State Department's launch last year of a "virtual embassy" in English and Farsi that seeks to reach out to ordinary Iranians. The site was quickly blocked by Iranian authorities, but firewall bypasses such as proxy servers are widely used by Iran's young and tech-skilled population.

"There is probably an element of mimicry here as well," said Maloney. "The Iranians enjoy turning the table on Washington and imitating American tactics."

Last week, a U.S. broadcast oversight board accused Iran of jamming regional radio and television programming that includes the Persian services for the Voice of America and the BBC. And on Monday two days after the website was launched — Iran's Intelligence Minister Heidar Moslehi claimed that Iran's secret services have the upper hand in the Web war with the West.

"The intelligence apparatus confronts enemy measures in the cyber front," the official IRNA news agency quoted Moslehi as saying.

The intelligence minister was at the center of one of Iran's most public political feuds. Khamenei last year demanded Moslehi keep the post despite objections from Ahmadinejad, who was so angered that he boycotted government meetings for more than a week. In response, the ruling clerics arrested dozens of Ahmadinejad's allies and left him politically weakened entering his final year in office.

A journalist at Tehran's moderate Shargh newspaper, Soroush Farhadian, interprets the new website as an effort by intelligence agency to gain its own voice.

"One of the objectives is to demonstrate its independent position rather than speaking through the semiofficial news agencies,"

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# Drought Cuts U.S. Crops Below Demand for 1st Time in 38 Years

**CHICAGO** • Drought damage to corn and soybean fields in the United States, the world's top grower and exporter, is eroding supplies of the nation's two largest crops to below year-earlier consumption levels for the first time since 1974.

The government probably will say Thursday that the U.S. corn harvest and inventories on Sept. 1 will be a combined 11.604 billion bushels, less than the 12.33 billion consumed and exported last year, according to a Bloomberg survey of 31 analysts. Soybean supplies will be 2.932 billion bushels, below the 3.157 billion used in 2011. Supplies failed to top usage from the previous year only twice since 1960 for corn and five times for soybeans, U.S. Department of Agriculture data show.

Record heat in June and July sparked the worst drought since 1956, sending corn and soybeans prices to record highs. Morgan Stanley predicted corn may rally 35 percent in a year, while Barclays Plc sees soybeans gaining 16 percent. Higher costs for dairies, grain processors and livestock producers helped send global food prices in September to the highest since March, United Nations data show.

"Supplies of both corn and soybeans will be tight, and we expect prices to rebound after the report," said Bill Tierney, the chief economist for Chicago-based AgResource Co. and a former USDA grain analyst. "There is no evidence that current prices are rationing soybean supplies, and there will be less supply relief for corn" from South American harvests that start in February, he said.

Corn futures have jumped 15 percent this year to \$7.415 a bushel on the Chicago Board of Trade, and soybeans surged 28 percent to \$15.425 a bushel. The 24 commodities tracked by the Standard & Poor's GSCI Spot Index rose 3.2 percent in the period, led by wheat's gain of 33 percent. The MSCI All-Country World Index of equities climbed 11 percent, and Treasuries returned 1.9 percent, a Bank of America Corp. index shows.

In its report Thursday, the USDA probably will cut its domestic corn-production forecast to a nine-year low of 10.616 billion bushels, down 1 percent from 10.727 billion estimated in September and the fourth straight monthly reduction, according to the average of estimates in the Bloomberg survey. As recently as June, the government predicted a record harvest of 14.79 billion bushels.

Combined with the government's Sept. 1 estimate of reserves at 988 million bushels, total U.S. supply will 6.3 percent below estimated consumption last year. Inventories before next year's harvest may fall to 656 million bushels, the lowest since 1996, a Bloomberg survey showed.

Prices have dropped from the record of \$8.49 on Aug. 10, as exports slowed and farmers increased sales from newly-harvested fields. Corn futures for December delivery touched \$7.05 on Sept. 28, the lowest since July 12. Soybean futures that reached an alltime high of \$17.89 on Sept. 4 slipped as low as \$15.04 on Oct. 3.

There are still signs that farmers will store more of their remaining supply in a bet prices will increase. Premiums paid on Tuesday above Chicago futures for corn delivered to export terminals near New Orleans and in Decatur, Illinois, were the highest since at least 2008, a sign that grain merchants are increasing inventories from this year's harvest, said Tim Emslie, the research manager for Country Hedging in Inver Grove Heights, Minn.

# MUBARAK LOYALISTS ACQUITTED IN ATTACK ON PROTESTERS

**CAIRO (AP)** • An Egyptian court on Wednesday acquitted 24 loyalists of ousted President Hosni Mubarak who had been accused of organizing one of the most dramatic attacks on protesters during last year's uprising, the "Camel Battle," in which assailants on horses and camels charged into crowds in Cairo's Tahrir Square.

The 24 were found innocent on charges of manslaughter and attempted murder. The defendants included some of the biggest names of Mubarak's regime, including the former parliament speaker and the head of the now-dissolved ruling party, along with government ministers and businessmen. A 25th defendant died during the course of the trial.

The Feb. 2, 2011 assault left nearly a dozen people killed and was a major turning point in the 18-day wave of

protests that led to Mubarak's downfall. It came a day after Mubarak spoke on national television, saying he would eventually step down. The emotional speech won him sympathy and drained the numbers of protesters in a days-long sitin in Cairo's Tahrir Square, the heart of the uprising.

But then the attack came. A crowd of Mubarak supporters waded into the young activists at the sit-in. Amid the melee, a number of men on horses and camels swept in, trying to beat and trample protesters.

The assault, widely aired on TV, turned into an all-out battle that lasted two days, with more protesters flooding into the square to defend it in clashes that saw the two sides pelting each other with stones, bricks and firebombs. In the end, the Mubarak supporters were driven away.

# Vice Presidential Debate's No. 1 Rule: If Chatter's about You, You're Doing It Wrong

The dark art of the vice presidential debate begins with a single rule: If everybody's talking about you, you're doing it wrong.

Since 1976, there have been eight televised face-offs between vice presidential nominees. The ninth will come today, when Vice President Biden debates Republican Rep. Paul Ryan (Wis.) in Danville, Ky.

By now, both parties have worked out tactics to fit this odd ritual. They require the barbed wit of an insult comedian and the humility of the hind legs in a two-man horse costume.

Candidates are told: Talk up your running mate. Zing your opponent. But avoid letting your career or your policy ideas become the focus. On the biggest night of your political life, it's not about you.

On Thursday, the stakes will be unusually high, and the job of playing second banana especially tough. Biden spent 36 years in the Senate. Ryan crafted a plan for remaking the entire government.

Now, the proud, successful men will have to insist convincingly – that they'd rather talk about somebody else

said Samuel Popkin, a professor at the University of California at San Diego who has helped coach Democrats in debates. Popkin said the task might be especially touchy for Ryan, because Romney has said he would not adopt Ryan's famous budget plan in full.

"You need his goal in life to be power now, not power later," Popkin said. "The only way I can see you do that is to get Ryan to say, 'Romney's budget is better than what I started with?"

At the polling firm Gallup, researchers recently analyzed survey results before and after every running-mate debate since 1976 (except 1980, when there was no debate). "We really don't see any statistical change in any of them," said Frank Newport, Gallup's editor in chief.

But this year, both parties

# **Drug Firm May Have Misled Regulators**

BOSTON (AP) • The specialty pharmacy linked to a deadly meningitis outbreak may have misled regulators and done work beyond the scope of its state license, Massachusetts Gov. Deval Patrick said Wednesday.

Meanwhile, a second pharmacy connected to the New England Compounding Center in Framingham has shut down for state and federal inspection.

The New England Compounding Center made a steroid that was used in injections for back pain that were later found contaminated. More than 130 people in 11 states have been sickened. Twelve have died.

On Wednesday, Patrick told reporters that state and federal agencies "may have been misled by some of the information we were given."

The company was licensed to fill specific prescriptions for specific patients but exceeded that, he said.

"What they were doing instead is making big batches and selling them out of state as a manufacturer would, and that is certainly outside of their state license," he said.

Massachusetts U.S. Rep. Ed Markey seized on Patrick's statement, and sent a letter to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, asking if it believes it was misled by the company.



# MOM WHO GLUED **TODDLER'S HANDS:** I'M NOT A MONSTER

DALLAS (AP) • A mother who admitted to beating her 2-year-old daughter and gluing the child's hands made a plea for leniency Wednesday, saying she was no longer the "monster" who committed the attack.

"I will never forgive myself for what I did to my own daughter," said Elizabeth Escalona, who pleaded guilty in July to felony injury to a child.

Police say Escalona lost her temper last year with Jocelyn Cedillo over potty training problems. Escalona beat and kicked Jocelyn before sticking her hands to an apartment wall using an adhesive commonly known as Super Glue. The child was hospitalized for days.

Judge Larry Mitchell has a wide range in choosing Escalona's sentence: Anything from probation to life in prison is possible. Prosecutors are asking for a 45vear sentence.

Defense attorney Angie N'Duka asked Escalona what she thought of photos that prosecutors presented earlier this week showing her daughter's injuries.

"Only a monster does that," Escalona responded. N'Duka then asked Escalona whether she thought she was a monster. "When that happened, I was," Escalona replied.

Escalona asked Mitchell for an opportunity to show she had changed, adding that she would accept any sentence as fair.

"I want everybody to know I'm not a monster," Escalona said. "I love my kids."

Escalona admitted to hitting and kicking her daughter but said she didn't recall why she did it.

Prosecutors have portrayed Escalona as an unfit mother with a history of violence. They have played recordings in which Escalona as a teenager threatened to kill her mother. They said she was a former gang member who started smoking marijuana at age 11.

Her sentencing hearing is scheduled to resume today.

Jocelyn suffered bleeding in her brain, a fractured rib, multiple bruises and bite marks, and was in a coma for a couple of days. Some skin had been torn off her hands, where doctors also found glue residue and white paint chips from the apartment wall, witnesses testified.

Escalona's family has acknowledged their dismay and anger following the attack, but both her mother and sister asked the judge for leniency.

like we do," said McDonald, a regional biologist with Fish and Game. He and Gene Wright, a Fish and Game volunteer, were at the station to make sure hunters were legal, to ask questions in a survey and to inspect the deer.

"Is it OK if we cut the mouth of this one?" Mc-Donald asked the Stones.

Wright sliced the deer's mouth, opening the jaw wider so they could look at

its teeth. "I'd say this one is about 2 1/2 years," McDonald said after a minute.

Wright measured the antlers.

"It has a 19-inch spread," he said.

The two bucks the Stones harvested Saturday weren't trophy by any means, Mc-Donald said, but the quality you expect to see in the hills. After the inspection, the questions: "How many deer did you see?" McDonald asked Daniel Stone.

"Probably around 15," he replied.

"How many of them were bucks?"

"Five or six," he said.

GREEN BAY, Wis. • According to the planetary chart, the sun had risen. But the water of Green Bay was cloaked in dark, gray fog and low clouds at 7:30 a.m. Central time.

We'd have to take the sunrise as an article of faith.

That's not a stretch for anglers, who by nature trust in the unseen.

But when it comes to musky fishing - the "fish of 10,000 casts" - it requires an extra measure of belief.

"They're out there," said Dennis Radloff, 45, of Oconomowoc, Wis., looking at the dark water from the Metro Public Boat Launch. "I have a really good feeling about today."

Radloff has more than two decades of guiding experience to back up his optimism.

And in a rare confluence of schedules, this early October day was indeed shaping up to be memorable.

Our group of four included Dennis' father, Randy Radloff, 65, of New Holstein; fishing guide Brett Jolly, 34, of Green Bay; and me.

Radloff runs Sterling Guide Service. Jolly runs Captain Jolly Charters.

They are cooperators, not competitors. And along with a third local guide, Brett Alexander, they share information daily and assist each other in staying "on the bite?

"We probably talk most when the fishing is toughest," Radloff said.

guides (they had clients cancel), the four of us set out to test the waters.

The outing was notable for several reasons. It was the first time good friends Radloff and Jolly fished in the same boat.

The trip was in prime time for fall musky fishing.

And most important for Radloff, it was the first time he'd been able to get his father on the water in some time.

"You get working and you're typically so busy. . . " Radloff said, issuing a son's lament.

Past misgivings dissolved as we motored into the bay and focused on the present.

The air temperature was about 50, the water about 60. The fog lifted as we passed through the lower bay's shipping channel about 8 a.m.

Flocks of gulls wheeled in the air and dived onto the water. Feeding birds are typically a good omen for anglers.

"They're in here eating shad," Jolly said of the gulls. "If the bait fish are here, bigger fish will be, too."

Jolly slowed the boat as we reached a shallow flat in the southwestern corner of the bay and he and Radloff began to set lines.

The best musky action typically comes by trolling large crank baits behind planer boards. The water on the flat was 7-10 feet deep; the lures were set to run about 5 feet down.

Radloff said the muskies follow migrations of gizzard shad, yellow perch and whitefish to various parts of the bay in late summer

Growth rates and survival of muskies on the bay has been exceptional. A 53inch, 53-pound musky caught in 2001 was aged at 121/2 years old. In most areas of Wisconsin, it takes from 18 to 20 years for a musky to reach 50 inches.

However, the discovery of viral hemorrhagic septicemia fish disease in the bay took some wind out of the fisheries' sails in the last decade. The stocking program was suspended from 2007 to 2009 and has since been resumed at a fraction of the former rate.

The muskies have spread out and are using more areas of the bay, said Radloff, and fishing pressure has affected catch rates for many anglers, too.

A professional musky tournament held on the bay in September produced a total catch of zero fish over two days.

That can happen, especially in bad weather. But as always, it helps immensely to have experience on your side. The fish of a lifetime can be a short troll away.

"Not that muskies are Harvard-educated braniacs, but they have adjusted to fishing tactics and pres-

Antares's conspicuous red color is the source of its name, which translates as "against Mars" ("anti-Ares) in Greek. Antares's imagined rivalry with Mars was likely inspired by its location near the plane of the solar system.

Thus, when Mars's twoyear orbit carries it through Scorpius, it passes fairly close to the Scorpion's heart, which is similar in both brightness and color.

Although they're a bit challenging to see, Mars is currently near Antares. The difficulty lies in the fact that both are currently quite low in the southwest after sunset, and thus must shine through low-lying haze in a twilit sky. Currently, Mars appears to the right of Antares, but the gap between them will shrink each day until Oct. 21, when Mars will lie less

25th year of teaching "Ants and Plants" classes for College of Southern Idaho this year. Many of her young charges have returned as her assistants, chasing after frogs and scouring plants for caterpillars. Others have gone on to study environmental-related studies in college.

"It's been the fastest 25 years of my whole life," she says. "Some years it's been so much fun I've told CSI I was going to pay to do this."

Christensen has been working on behalf of critters in Idaho ever since she was moving boxes into her family's cabin in the Stanley Basin many years ago and

noticed salmon stranded in the irrigation ditches. Panicked, she scooped up the salmon in her moving boxes and carried them back to Valley Creek.

She keeps a menagerie of deer mice skeletons and other critters in her freezer, pulling them out for the youngsters to examine.

When a two-foot snake poops on her, she reacts with concern for the snake.

"Wasn't that a mean thing to do to a snake? To scare it like that?'

"We have not seen a spider today so I'm counting on you guys to find me a spider. I love spiders because they eat insects," she adds.

Hailey resident Katie Corkery says her 8-year-old daughter, Madelaine, has been attending Christensen's weekly Science Hour at The Community Library for years.

"To get out in nature with her is so special. She's like the Pied Piper. She leads the kids down the nature trail and challenges them to use their eyes and ears to see what's going on all around them. I love how she captives them," she adds.

Christensen may have a little arthritis creeping into her joints. But she doesn't let that slow her down as she demonstrates how a rabbit hops.

She points out horsetails which, she notes, the dinosaurs used to eat. She explains how Idaho salmon use their sense of smell – "they smell their own river" - to return to their place of origin after making their way to the ocean. She digs out a deer leg to show how deer walk on their toenails to help them run quicker.

"Humans and bears don't need to do that," she adds, "because they have other ways of protecting themselves."

"How do you know so much?" asks one dark-eyed girl.

"Well, honey, I'm old and I've been studying a long time," Christensen replies.

"She knows pretty much everything and she's good with the kids," observes Galena Hansen.

"I worry about the kids now," says Christensen. "They spend so much time on technology. If they don't learn to love nature, who's going to take care of it?"

nearly half a century, Pheasant Valley Preserve has taken bird hunting to a different level.

The farm is Washington's oldest licensed game-bird shooting preserve. While most of the 1,300 acres are devoted to farming or grazing, 400 acres of irrigated river bottomland is seeded with some of the 6,500 pheasants being raised this year in huge netted pens.

Washington's general pheasant season runs Oct. 20-Jan. 13. At Pheasant Valley – 8 miles north of LaCrosse, Wash., at the end of Wiedrich Road - the hunting season runs from September through April.

Preserve members or clients who book by the day can complement their hunt with a round of sporting clays.

The traps and shooting stations are arranged up a basalt-rimmed side canyon that will challenge any shooter's skills.

Want to work on that shot you missed last year at chukars flushing downcanyon below your feet?

There's a station for that. But whatever you call Pheasant Valley Preserve, it's first and foremost a Whitman County farm the Wiedrich family is proud to

have homesteaded in 1902. Jack O'Connor lost track of that distinction on his first visit to the shooting preserve, family members say.

The Idaho writer, famous for his Outdoor Life magazine stories and books about hunting and shooting, came along with a Pheasant Valley member around the time the operation became Washington's first licensed shooting preserve in 1967.

Fay Wiedrich, the farm's owner, was walking with the group toward the pheasant hunting fields

• Sporting clays, \$35 per shooter.

• Pheasant hunting, \$300 per group.

"We get a lot of fatherson groups from Washington State University," said Terry Cummings, who took over as preserve manager this year following the death of Jerry Townsend, who ran the show for 20 years.

Cummings said he's working through the learning curve with help from others familiar with the operation.

"It's always something," he said. "A mink got in the pens and killed over 200 pheasants."

He shook his head pointing to one pen where some roosters had their long tail feathers pecked out by other birds. "We clipped all of their beaks to prevent that, but I didn't realize how quickly the beaks grow back. Way faster than a fingernail."

# Early-season Tips for Dogs

SPOKANE, WASH. • Hot, dry weather is hard on dogs, which is why hunters must give special attention to their dogs during early bird-hunting seasons. Based on years of experience, Dan Hoke, veteran dog trainer from Dunfur Kennel near Cheney, offered these tips:

• Trim toenails. Don't let them get long and break off. • Hunt early in the morning and late in the afternoon.

• Keep hunts short. Most dogs need weeks of hunting to get into shape, but even fit dogs can suffer heat exhaustion, which could set them back for

weeks or months or possibly kill them.

• Bring plenty of water for the dog, and yourself.

 Check dogs for seeds in eyes and be wary of cheatgrass and other seeds getting into ears. Cotton stuffed in ears can help prevent trouble. Q-Tips and saline solution used by contact lens wearers can be squirted to irrigate and extract stubborn seeds that get under a dog's inner eyelids.

 Keep expectations in check. If the dog didn't get any training during summer, don't expect it to have improved since last hunting season.

• Scenting conditions usually are not prime in early season. Even good dogs will miss birds.

# **Bull Creek and Silver Creek Trails Are Back**

### IDAHO STATESMAN

Two popular motorized trails in the Middle Fork of the Payette River drainage about 45 miles north of Boise opened Oct. 1, after being closed for more than two years.

The 22-mile Bull Creek and Silver Creek trails on the Emmett Ranger District reopened following extensive work by crews from Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, Boise National Forest, Trails Unlimited, and motorized clubs.

The trails are open for motorcycles and non-motorized recreation. ATVs or UTVs are prohibited. That provides "sustainable and manageable opportunities while reducing impacts to natural resources and watershed values," national forest officials said.

Reconstruction included:

• Installing 42 arched culverts throughout the 22-mile trail system, which gets water off the trail and prevents trail erosion.

• Rerouting 10 sections

of trail.

• Building a 35-foot bridge.

• Building a 40-foot retaining wall.

 Connecting the upper Bull Creek Trail with the Rice Peak Trail for a longer ride opportunity into the Cascade Ranger District.

• Completing extensive brush cutting and clearing of the trail.

The Treasure Valley Trail Machine Association volunteered to work on weekends over a two-year period. In addition, the Squaw Butte Backcountry Horseman volunteered with trail clearing.

The Emmett Rough Riders ATV Club volunteered trail clearing on the Telephone Ridge Trail, which was key to hauling equipment and better access to the upper Bull Creek Trail.

The trail system will be open from July 1 through Nov. 14.

For more information on the trail system, call the Emmett Ranger District at365-7000.

them is so worn out he just leaves," Berg said.

Bow-hunting season for elk is open in Montana now. Rifle season begins Oct. 20.

But during the rut, hundreds of the state's most beloved big-game animal regularly gather at the Slippery Ann Elk Viewing Area at the Charles M. Russell National Wildlife Refuge, where hunting is off limits.

The display of classic elk rut behavior, such as bulls bugling and fighting over cows, is increasingly becoming must-see viewing for both residents and outof-state visitors interested in watching and photographing wild elk in their element rather than shooting them.

In 2011, 3,000 people made the trip to the Missouri River elk mecca, even though it's located at the remote refuge far off the beaten path, 70 miles northeast of Lewistown.

With elk consistently occupying the area in the fall, an intimate wildlife experience is almost the rule rather than the exception, and that draws a crowd.

"I see a big one!" said 3year-old Weston Sauby, standing in a pickup truck bed, binoculars trained on the herd.

This year, his father, Nick Sauby of Billings, Mont., bow hunted five miles downriver from the elkviewing area, and bagged a 5-by-5 bull elk, "not huge but a trophy for me." Even if he doesn't get an elk, Sauby said, the opportunity to watch the prized animals from a stone's throw away is a thrill, and he stopped to share the experience with his son.

In 2011, 950 vehicles were counted at the viewing area from Sept. 1 to mid-October, said Matt deRosier,

Creek Wildlife Station. said.

Slippery Ann, he said, has become known as the most reliable place in Montana to consistently see elk up close, deRosier said. now.

Wildlife viewing is one of the FWS' six priority offerings at wildlife refuges nationally, and the CMR elk viewing area fits the mission perfectly, deRosier said. He once talked to a couple who went on an African safari to view wildlife. The experience at Slippery Ann, they told

him, was no less impressive. On a recent chilly evening, 30 vehicles were parked along the road. Binoculars, not rifles, were in the hands of visitors. Elk grazed as close as 50 to 60 yards away.

Visitors driving through Yellowstone can see elk, too, Berg notes, "But the ability to get right in amongst them like this place is hard to find."

Between 3,000 and 5,000 elk occupy the 1.1 millionacre CMR and a perfect storm of factors draw elk to the 1,200-acre Slippery Ann.

For one, elk seem to know that the wildlife viewing area is off-limits to hunters.

Between 200 and 300 animals congregate there from late August to mid-October.

Elk also are drawn by the green river bottoms where they bed in the trees during the heat of the day before venturing into the open to graze on grasses and shrubs in the evening, within full view of the road, Berg said.

"It's kind of an oasis in a

"When the bulls start to bugle, it can get pretty noisy," Royetta Dvorak says.

Dvorak and her husband, Allen, have been the camp hosts at Slippery Ann for seven years. Each evening, they count elk and visitors.

They've already recorded license plates from 15 states this year.

Visitors often turn the elk viewing into a tail-gating party, with some people even setting up tables of wine and cheese, Royetta Dvorak says. Occasionally, visitors need to be warned not to move off the road in attempts to get a closer look at the elk.

"We tell them, 'Just sit and they'll come to you,' " she says

Elk were all but gone from the Missouri River Breaks at the turn of the 20th century, done in by hunting pressure, but they were reintroduced from Yellowstone Park in 1951.

Today, the population is flourishing and is known for its trophy bulls, which grow exceptionally large antlers because of the lush habitat provided by the Missouri River, which flows through an otherwise desert-like landscape that receives only 10 to 12 inches of annual precipitation. The ratio of 30 to 35 bulls per 100 cows in the Breaks is much higher than the ratio in other areas, Berg said.

The harsh climate at the

refuge also is managed specifically for wildlife habitat and hunting requires a special permit as opposed to areas that are open to all hunters during the general season.

Both factors have aided the overall population, Berg said.

Elk often are associated with timbered habitat but the Breaks elk are one of the few remaining prairie elk populations in the country, making a trip to Slippery Ann a unique viewing opportunity because they can be easily spotted in open country, Berg said.

"It's a little different than going up in the mountains and relying on hearing their bugle to determine their location," Berg said.

As the sun began to set on а recent Wednesday evening, a few hundred cows and calves with a few young bulls sprinkled in the mix grazed just outside of a grove of trees.

The elk kept a constant watch on the people on the road. If anybody moved toward them, the elk would have left, Berg said.

"It's really interesting and beautiful to hear," says Arleda Hopkins, 65, of Great Falls, who was visiting for the first time with her brother, Amos First Raised of Fort Belknap, and sister Loretta Retan of Chinook.

First Raised noted the irony of having so many elk within his view. When he's hunting, he said with a laugh, they're usually "four miles away."

"Hear 'em but never see 'em," he says.

# NCAA Upholds Boise State Scholarship Sanctions

**BOISE** • The NCAA has rejected an appeal from Boise State and is standing by its decision that the football program must reduce the number of scholarships it hands out this season and the next.

The Division I Committee on Infractions announced the decision Wednesday and in the process rejected an appeal filed by the school stemming from a broader package of sanctions handed down by the NCAA last year.

As part of the penalty package, the NCAA ordered the football program to cut scholarships from 85 to 82 for the 2012-13 and 2013-14 academic years. The school had already self-imposed the scholarship reduction for last season.

Still, Boise State lawyers argued that the scholarship sanction was excessive, es-

pecially when compared to past infraction cases investigated by the NCAA.

But NCAA officials denied that the Boise State case has direct comparison to any past cases.

"While past infractions cases and their respective penalties are part of the institutional memory of the Committee ... when it tailors the penalties in a case, they do not provide a 'one-size-fits-all' measure of whether a penalty is fair and appropriate," the committee said in its report.

"Each case – and the fairness of the penalties imposed in each case – ultimately stands on their own facts," the report stated.

The decision upholding the sanctions is the latest twist in the case in which the NCAA found a lack of institutional control.

After Boise State's appeal,

the NCAA Division I Infractions Appeals Committee concluded in June that the scholarship penalty, in addition to Boise State's self-imposed sanctions, was excessive and teetered on an abuse of discretion. That committee sent the case back to the Committee on Infractions for reconsideration.

"The Infractions Appeals Committee favorably recognized that Boise State had a compelling case for reconsideration of an appropriate penalty," Boise State president Bob Kustra said in a school statement. "However, the Committee on Infractions disregarded the ruling. We will abide by the decision, but we are disappointed in the outcome and the lack of meaningful review."

Boise State – which is 4-1 this season, ranked No. 24 and takes on Fresno State on Saturday — has been dealing with the penalties despite the appeal process. The school imposed that scholarship reduction in 2011 and took the penalty again this year.

The infractions case focused on a series of violations involving more than 75 athletes and several men's and women's teams over a five-year period. Violations ranged from recruiting infractions to impermissible transportation and lodging, and prompted the departure of longtime athletic director Gene Bleymaier.

Since then, the university has bolstered its oversight and hired a new director of compliance. The school has also made changes to its student-athlete handbook and put new emphasis on education and awareness programs for athletes.

# Football Coach Accused of Hitting Utah Boy in Game

**SALT LAKE CITY** • A youth football coach struck a 13-year-old player from an opposing team near the sideline during the fourth quarter of a tied game, giving the boy a concussion and outraging parents and spectators, a Utah police sergeant said Wednesday.

Police arrested Nathan Harris for investigation of felony child abuse after watching grainy video and talking to witnesses about Saturday's incident in Payson, about 60 miles south of Salt Lake City.

"As the 13-year-old ran down, Mr. Harris stepped out and hit him with his forearm under his chin," police Sgt. Lance Smith said. "And then Mr. Harris stepped back and just stood there."

Referee David Durrant said the boy looked like he was about to go out of bounds — or had just gotten out of bounds — when he was hit near the sideline of the visiting team.

"It looked like the coach had a lot of time to move, he didn't move, and he stood there and delivered a blow," Durrant said. Durrant threw a penalty flag and ejected Harris.

The incident was an accident and there was no malice behind Harris' actions, attorney Dean Zabriskie said. He said police have relied too heavily on witnesses who were standing far away and the video – which was shot from the opposite sidelines – shows Harris wasn't too close to the field and appears to show the coach stepping backward as players came toward him.

Also, it looks like a player who was pursuing the 13-year-old had some contact that pushed the boy toward Harris, he said.

"It seems to me like a tempest in a teapot," Zabriskie said.

Harris, a volunteer assistant whose son was also playing in the game, was arrested Monday and posted \$5,000 bail on Tuesday. The Utah County Attorney's office will decide whether to file charges.

Police said the boy was expected to miss a month of playing time. His team won in overtime with a field goal, Durrant said.

# **Steelers Need to Lower** the Flags Against Titans

**NEW YORK** • When the Pittsburgh Steelers are around, flags fly.

Despite playing one fewer game than most teams, the Steelers lead the AFC in penalties with 37. It's something they must clean up soon.

Fortunately for Pittsburgh (No. 9 in the AP Pro32), the opponent this week is Tennessee (No. 30), perhaps the most disappointing team in the conference. When they meet Thursday night in Music City, the Steelers (2-2) will be a 51/2-point choice over the Titans (1-4), whose main problem is a sieve of a defense that has yielded a league-high 181 points.

If the Steelers don't stop attracting those yellow handkerchiefs, though, taking advantage of Tennessee's inability to stop anyone will be difficult.

"They're just small mental errors," Steelers center Maurkice Pouncey said. "It's a part of football. Sometimes it happens. That's something that we've got to tighten up if we want to be the team we want to be?"

Handing the opposition more than 86 yards per game in penalties just won't cut it, especially on the road, where the Steelers are 0-2 and played their worst game of the season – and perhaps several seasons - in a sloppy 34-31 loss at Oakland.

The world's most famous cyclist said he wanted to see the hard evidence that he was a doper. The agency gave him that, too: About 200 pages filled with vivid details - from the hotel rooms riders transformed into makeshift blood-transfusion centers to the way Armstrong's ex-wife rolled cortisone pills into foil and handed them out to all the cyclists.

In all, a USADA report released Wednesday gives the most detailed, unflinching portrayal yet of Armstrong as a man who, day after day, week after week, year after year, spared no expense - financially, emotionally or physically - to win the seven Tour de France titles that the anti-doping agency has ordered taken away.

It presents as matter-offact reality that winning and doping went hand-inhand in cycling and that Armstrong was the focal point of a big operation, running teams that were the best at getting it done without getting caught. Armstrong won the Tour as leader of the U.S. Postal Service team from 1999-2004 and again in 2005 with the Discovery Channel as the primary sponsor.

USADA said the path Armstrong chose to pursue his goals "ran far outside the rules."

It accuses him of depending on performanceenhancing drugs to fuel his victories and "more ruthlessly, to expect and to require that his teammates" do the same. Among the 11 former teammates who testified against Armstrong are George Hincapie, Tyler Hamilton and Floyd Landis.

**ÚSADA Chief Executive** Travis Tygart said the cyclists were part of "the most sophisticated, professionalized and successful doping program that

sport has ever seen."

Armstrong did not fight the USADA charges, but insists he never cheated.

His attorney, Tim Herman, called the report "a one-sided hatchet job - a taxpayer funded tabloid piece rehashing old, disproved, unreliable allegations based largely on axegrinders, serial perjurers, coerced testimony, sweetheart deals and threat-induced stories."

Aware of the criticism his agency has faced from Armstrong and his legion of followers, Tygart insisted his group handled this case under the same rules as any other. Armstrong was given the chance to take his case to arbitration and declined, choosing in August to accept the sanctions instead, he noted.

"We focused solely on finding the truth without being influenced by celebrity or non-celebrity, threats, personal attacks or political pressure because that is what clean athletes deserve and demand," Tygart said.

The report called the evidence "as strong or stronger than any case brought in USADA's 12 years of existence."

In a letter sent to USADA attorneys Tuesday, Herman dismissed any evidence provided by Landis and Hamilton, saying the riders are "serial perjurers and have told diametrically contradictory stories under oath."

The testimony of Hincapie, one of Armstrong's closest and most loyal teammates through the years, was one of the report's new revelations.

"I would have been much more comfortable talking only about myself, but understood that I was obligated to tell the truth about everything I knew. So that is what I did," Hincapie said of his testimony to federal investigators and USADA.

His two-page statement did not mention Armstrong by name. Neither did statements from three other teammates-turnedwitnesses, all of whom said this was a difficult-butnecessary process.

1998, only twice has neither of the teams ranked first or second in the initial standings reached the national title game.

The Tigers are still looking for their first Southeastern Conference victory, coming off a loss to Vanderbilt, and they will be without injured starting quarterback James Franklin (knee). So good luck beating 'Bama.

Oregon is off this week and stands a good chance to be right behind Alabama in the BCS standings, just as it is in the polls. The Ducks are a solid No. 2 in both.

The computer ratings going into this weekend treat Notre Dame a bit better than the pollsters. The Fighting Irish are ranked seventh in the polls, but first in two of the five computer ratings that have already been released. A sixth doesn't start coming out until Sunday.

And with the Irish facing another strong opponent Saturday, at home against Stanford, don't be surprised to see Notre Dame ahead in the BCS standings of some teams that it trails in the polls if it beats the Cardinal.

The most important thing to remember is this: Don't get too worked up. There are plenty of games to be played.

Wait about a month or so, and then get worked up.

# **Sides Still at Odds** in NHL Labor Talks

### ASSOCIATED PRESS

**NEW YORK •** Five hours of talks in two sessions between the NHL and the players' association did little to move the sides closer to a deal in the nearly onemonth lockout.

The NHL's top two executives - Commissioner Gary Bettman and Deputy Commissioner Bill Daly met with the NHLPA's main negotiators - executive director Donald Fehr and special counsel Steve Fehr - for nearly an hour Wednesday morning to assess where the sides were on Day 25 of the NHL lockout, but there was no concrete discussions on the troublesome core economic issues preventing a deal.

A four-hour session that stretched into evening centered on player health and safety issues along with other miscellaneous legal topics. The health issues involved seeking multiple medical opinions on injuries, and who should make determinations when a player is healthy enough to return to action after being hurt.

"We have some disagreements in those areas," Daly said. "When you get to this point of the discussions on some of those areas, that is to be expected so we're kind of refining some of the things we continue to have disagreements on.

"We had no discussion of the major economic is-

sues or system issues, so that continues to be a disappointment from our perspective."

The sides will meet again today - which should have been NHL opening day but there are still no plans to delve into how the sides will split up hockey-related revenue that was in excess of \$3 billion last season.

Steve Fehr took a more optimistic view of what was discussed Wednesday, but lamented that the discussions were taking place instead of action on the ice.

"You often don't know whether you're making progress until you look back on it," he said. "We were just sort of discussing the overall status of the bargaining and where the parties are."

The NHL is eager to get a new proposal from the union on the main economic issues, but the players contend that they have moved closer to the league's demands in their previous offers while the NHL has only sought to take more away from the union in each proposal it has made.

"I think we're making progress in a number of the areas that were discussed today," Steve Fehr said. "They were good discussions. It's a shame that they are going on in the midst of a lockout when we could be doing it while we're playing or we could've been doing it a month ago or two months ago.

Today's deal from last year's Bermuda Bowl features the match between the young USA-2 squad and Bulgaria. It shows both U.S. pairs combining nicely for a gain.

Against four hearts, both Wests led a small club. John Hurd realized that if the club finesse was right, he really did not need to take it. He put up dummy's club ace, won the second trick with his heart jack, and continued with the heart seven. Victor Aronov took his ace and led a small spade, declarer getting it right by playing the jack. West won the trick with his ace and shifted to the diamond 10, but declarer won the trick, played a trump, and claimed. He still had to lose a club trick when diamonds did not behave, but he had his contract.

In the other room, the Bulgarian declarer played dummy's club queen at trick one and could no longer make his contract. Justin Lall played his club king and switched to the diamond two, the only card to defeat the contract. Declarer won the trick with dummy's queen and played a heart. Lall ducked this trick, then won the next trick with his heart ace to switch to a small spade. Seeing the ruff coming, declarer took his only legitimate chance by playing his king. Joe Grue won with his ace and returned a diamond for his partner to ruff. East now cashed the spade queen for two down.

In 1910, Theodore Roosevelt became the first former U.S. president to fly in an airplane during a visit to St. Louis. Mo.

In 1932, the first American political telecast took place as the Democratic National Committee sponsored a program from a CBS television studio in New York.

In 1942, the World War II Battle of Cape Esperance began in the Solomon Islands, resulting in an American victory over the Japanese.

In 1958, the lunar probe Pioneer 1 was launched; it failed to go as far out as planned, fell back to Earth, and burned up in the atmosphere.

In 1968, Apollo 7, the first manned Apollo mission, was launched with astronauts Wally Schirra, Donn Fulton Eisele and R. Walter Cunningham aboard. The government of Panama was overthrown in a military coup.

In 1984, space shuttle Challenger astronaut Kathryn Sullivan became the first American woman to walk in space.

In 1986, President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev opened two days of talks concerning arms control and human rights in Reykjavik, Iceland.

In 1992, in the first of three presidential debates, three candidates faced off against each other in St. Louis, Mo. -President George H.W. Bush, Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton and businessman Ross Perot.

Ten years ago: The Senate

joined the House in approving, 77-23, use of America's military might against Iraq. Former President Jimmy Carter won the Nobel Peace Prize. A man was shot to death at a gas station near Fredericksburg, Va., in the latest slaying by the Washington-area sniper. A chain reaction crash on a foggy interstate near Cedar Grove, Wis., killed ten people and injured 40 others. A teenager set off a homemade bomb inside a crowded mall in Vantaa, Finland, killing himself and six others.

Five years ago: The Bush administration reported that the federal budget deficit had fallen to \$162.8 billion in the just-completed budget year, the lowest amount of red ink in five years. Cold medicines for babies and toddlers were pulled off shelves amid concerns about unintentional overdoses. Briton Doris Lessing won the 2007 Nobel Prize in literature. Werner von Trapp, a member of the musical family made famous by the musical "The Sound of Music," died in Waitsfield, Vt., at age 91.

One year ago: Presidential challenger Mitt Romney accused President Barack Obama of failing to lead in a time of economic peril but sounded less conservative than his Republican rivals in their debate in Hanover, N.H., defending the 2008-2009 Wall Street bailout and declaring he could work with "good" Democrats. U.S. officials accused agents of the Iranian government of plotting to assassinate the Saudi ambassador to the U.S. The U.S. women rolled to their third title at the world gymnastics championships held in Tokyo. The Detroit Tigers won their first game of the 2011 AL championship series, sweeping past the Texas Rangers 5-2 in Game 3.
