# **CROSS-TOWN** RIVALRY

A few grudge matches the Riverhawks and Bruins could learn from

win Falls and Canyon Ridge is a cross-town rivalry, at least by definition. With the Riverhawks in just their fourth year, it would be foolish to expect it to match up with some of the biggest grudge matches in the country. In Las Vegas, the Rancho and Las Vegas High rivalry began before Sin City had a strip, and as a result of the city's growth, now pits the affluent kids from the north side against the poor kids from the south side. It's generat-



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# Hollister School Plans Centennial Shindig

**HOLLISTER** • The voices of students and walls engraved with signatures from past generations echo with a century-old legacy of education at Hollister School.

Former alumni, teachers and community residents are invited to share in the school's "Rockin' It Old School" centennial celebration on Saturday afternoon. Festivities are scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. with building tours, then a 2 p.m. reception filled with history, personal memories and musical selections performed by Hollister Elementary School students.

Peggy Cristobal attended Hollister during her eighthgrade year and has been part of the event committee's efforts to design a commemorative book recording the town and school history. Profits from the sale of the book and T-shirts will benefit the school.

"We moved from Berger when several small-town school districts were consolidated with Hollister, and I remember an enjoyable time," Cristobal said. "This building is on the state historical register, and all of what has been done toward this weekend was made possible with donations from in-

dividuals, families with ties out there or businesses."

#### Decades in the Making

Early settlers in the Salmon Tract area south of Twin Falls came with money to invest and dreams of economic prosperity fueled by promises of plentiful irrigation from the Salmon Falls Creek Dam and Reservoir.

In 1910, three years after establishing a townsite named after eastern promoter Henry Hollister, a wood frame structure was erected to serve as a school one block north of the present school building site.

Population growth would accelerate a Jan. 27, 1912, vote approving construction of the current school, with an upstairs auditorium and stage, for a \$30,000 bond. Work on the project was completed and dedicated in December 1912. Concerns about potential structural damage caused by basketball games brought

an end to the auditorium's use as a sports venue in 1925.

Maureen Flennor, who completed her freshman and sophomore years at Hollister before a 1948 consolidation required busing high school students into the Filer School District, remembers her own experiences.

"Our principal laid down the law for us on what was required my first year. We had all the basic subjects they teach now and I really studied," Fleenor said. "Since we didn't have a gym the high school district rented part of the town's bank building for basketball. The room was so narrow there was nowhere to sit down and you were likely to end up with a ball in your lap."

The Filer School District, of which Hollister School is now a part, has since constructed a separate ground floor gym and auditorium building, with an addition space for kindergarten classrooms on the campus.

Hollister began as a grade

school and later secured approval from county commissioners to form a separate rural high school district in 1923. The agreement was to share the building with the existing grade school. Students in lower grades occupied the first floor with four grades in each room and the high school took the upper level.

"We shared the building and the two districts shared building costs, but I remember that the high school stayed pretty much separate," Fleenor said. "All that's out there now is the elementary school."

Cornie Lanting, who grew up in Rogerson and attended high school at Hollister between 1940-1944, is one of many students who wrote their names on a wall behind the stage. He remembers Hollister School as the focal point of community activity, a tradition that has remained amid years of change.

"We had droughts during the 1930s and some people just up and left everything they had. More left during the 1940s to get work in California defense plants during the war," Lanting said "Things never recovered, but this school is still the center and we're planning for around 300 people this weekend."

# Amendment Involves State's Role in Probation

TWIN FALLS • For one of two possible changes to the Idaho constitution this fall, voters are being asked to alter just one word.

The proposed amendment, S.J.R. 102, would clarify that the state Board of Correction controls and manages adult felony probation and parole.

Currently the constitution states "the Board of Correction shall have the control, direction and management of adult probation and parole." The proposed amendment simply adds the word "felony" before the word "probation."

If the amendment is adopted, the Board of Correction would not have the authority to supervise or manage misdemeanor probationers. Sen. Denton Darrington,

crystal clear what we're doing is legal and counties can go right ahead with their supervision," he said. Darrington said the one

word change was about as

simple as constitutional amendments can get, but it's still important. "A vote for it strengthens criminal justice system," he said. "It's another little

stepping block to keep

communities safer." Criticisms of the idea include that the constitution should only be altered for issues of major interest to the state, and that the change - ostensibly made out of concern over misdemeanor probation - addresses felony probation but says nothing about how misdemeanor programs may differ among judicial districts. Rep. Leon Smith, R-Twin

Falls, voted against the resolution this spring because he thought the small change wasn't worth the cost to the state to put it on the ballot. Also, he said, it doesn't really change how probation and parole are dealt with.

"I was a prosecutor 25 years ago," he said. "That's the way it was done then."

Now that the election is happening, Smith said he voted in favor of the change when casting an early ballot Wednesday.

"It doesn't change a thing with the way we're doing it," he said. "If it'll give the department of corrections peace of mind, let's give them peace of mind."

Other students joined Gully in a "stop, drop, cover and roll" exercise.



# Thompson Creek Fire Spreads to 650 Acres

**ROGERSON** • In any other fire season, the Thompson Creek fire could be considered unusual.

It's no longer the peak of fire season and the nights are dropping to freezing temperatures. However, the spark of the 650-acre forest fire fits right in with this year's busy wildfire season, said Scott Nannenga, Minidoka district ranger for the U.S. Forest Service.

Fire crews first responded to the Thompson Creek Fire on Wednesday evening, Nannenga said. With plenty of dry fuels, the fire quickly spread from 50 to 650 acres one-square-mile overnight. Crews expect to fully extinguish the fire by Sunday.

When firefighters arrived on

scene, nine summer homes were surrounded by the quickly spreading flames, Nannenga said.

"It's pretty impressive we didn't lose any homes," Nannenga said. "It burned all around them."

On Thursday, fire crews were still working to protect structures from the flames and keep the fire away from moving down into Rock Creek Canyon, he said.

Officials have closed Rock Creek Road at the Third Fork Crossing and 500 Road until the fire's activity dies down, Nannenga said.

As of Thursday, 11 engines, a dozer, a water tender and two hand crews were working on the fire,

said JW McCoy, incident commander with the U.S. Bureau of Land Management. More resources are expected to arrive in the next few days including air

"Āir support can be mysterious beasts that wander around," McCoy said. "You never know exactly what you'll get at one time."

As McCoy and Nannenga explained the fire's behavior, single engine air tankers swooped in the background, dropping resources to stop the flames from spreading further. The red streak of fire retardant matched the gold-and-orange colors of fall in the South Hills.

"Our fire plan had scheduled our seasonal fire crews to be done on Oct. 15," Nannenga said.

"It's pretty unusual to get a fire this late. We're waiting on our first snowfall or some rain."

The Thompson Creek Fire isn't threatening Magic Mountain Resort but the fire is close to the ski area. As of Thursday, fire officials estimated the fire was about a mile and half away from Magic Mountain, said Gary Miller, resort owner.

"The Forest Service does a good job," he said. "They're not going to let anything get burned. They won't let it close."

Still, Miller said the proximity of the flames makes him nerv-

"This is just a beautiful area," he said. "All our stuff can be replaced but the trees, that's the part that makes me worried. I can't imagine what the area looks like right now."

# OFFICERS RESPOND TO SHOOTING, ARREST WOMAN FOR METH

**TWIN FALLS** • Police responded to a call Saturday about a possible drive-by shooting and ended up arresting a woman for allegedly trafficking in methamphetamine.

Police responded shortly before 9 p.m. Saturday to a call from the 300 block of Lois Street, Twin Falls Police Lt. Craig Stotts said.

Stotts said the caller said a black Dodge pickup was chasing a small sedan in the parking lot of the apartment complex.

Police responded to the same apartment complex about a month and half ago when managers called to say a bullet traveled through two apartments.

The caller Saturday said two men got out after the sedan parked.

Then the pickup drove off and fired a shot, a re-

port by police states.

Officers searched the area and found a 12-gauge shotgun shell in the road, the report states.

The report states investigators at the scene spoke to probation and parole officers, who told them the apartment number where they'd likely find the people who owned the sedan.

According to the report, officers informed the residents they were entering at the request of probation and parole.

Once inside, a woman who rented the apartment, identified as Liana Malagon, quickly picked up her purse and carried it around with her, the report states.

While searching the residence, officers allegedly found a small baggie with a white crystal substance on it that tested positive for methamphetamine. Then, officers

asked Malagon if any other illegal items might be in her purse, the report states.

According to the report, Malagon admitted to having a meth pipe. The report states police also found a digital scale and \$929 in cash at the residence, along with more methamphetamine in Malagon's purse. Officers allegedly found a little more than 1.5 ounces of meth at the apartment, the report states.

Stotts said police found little evidence regarding the shot that was fired, but the charge would be unlawful discharge of a firearm if a suspect was found.

Malagon, 29, was charged with trafficking in methamphetamine and held at the Twin Falls County Jail on a \$5,000 bond. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Oct. 19.

# We Need More of 'Something Logical'

hen it comes down to it, high-voltage power transmission lines are a lot like a new prison; everyone wants the benefit they will bring but no one wants them anywhere close to where they live.

So this week's Bureau of Land Management recommendation for the 1,100-mile Gateway West route is likely to be met with skepticism if not outright anger by those seeking to keep the power lines off all private property. And Cassia County seems to have been hit the hardest, with nearly 80 percent of the recommended route through the county penciled in over private lands.

Before anyone — private or public — responds in kneejerk fashion to the recommendation, we urge all to take a deep breath. The process is long — a completed Gateway West is still more than five years in the future — and some compromise has already been achieved. Last January, we reported on an agreement in the Castleford area between farmers and Idaho Power that shifted the proposed route several miles to keep it south of privately owned farms. "We didn't have attorneys, we just took a collaborative approach from day one," said area farmer Kelly Murphy nine months ago. "And the process worked out the way we wanted. Kind of surprising to see something logical has come out

Well, in light of the BLM's release of their preferred route, what we need is additional servings of "something logical" and fewer of "something emotional."

Cassia County officials and property owners have long opposed the project in general — and any proposed path along private land in particular, and all would have reason to consider the BLM's recommendation as a further slap in the face, and perhaps it is. But it is extremely unlikely that Cassia County's inclination to "just say 'no" to Gateway West will prevail. Sooner or later, the project will come to fruition and power will flow through it.

In the meantime, it's important to appreciate that the task facing Gateway West partners Idaho Power and Rocky Mountain Power is formidable. Building 1,100 miles of high-voltage transmission lines from near Casper, Wyo. to just south of Boise in a cost-effective manner that avoids as much private land as possible while avoiding the habitat of those pesky sage grouse is a very tough needle to thread.

But additional discussion, and additional compromise, is necessary for the project to continue to move forward. In the end, not everyone will be totally happy; it's inconceivable that private property can completely be avoided. Despite how it might look, Cassia County property owners should find hope in last winter's compromise in the Castleford area. Collaboration really is possible.

We challenge Idaho Power, Rocky Mountain Power and private land owners to take the "surprise" out of working with a government entity on solutions and methodically work out a final Gateway West path that is quite simply "something logical."



# Wolverine Trapping Law Challenged in Montana Court

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) • A coalition of wildlife advocacy and conservation groups trying to halt wolverine trapping in Montana are filing a lawsuit Thursday that aims to provide new protections for an animal scientists warn is at risk of extinction.

Montana is the only state in the Lower 48 to allow wolverine trapping. As many as five can be trapped annually.

But eight groups represented by the Western Environmental Law Center want state District Judge James Reynolds in Helena to halt the practice. They said trapping should not resume until the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service determines whether new protections are warranted for the animal.

"You've got a low population that's going to continue to get smaller, and if you throw trapping on top of that, that's making a bad situation worse," said Matthew Bishop, the plaintiffs' attorney in the case.

Wolverines, the largest members of the weasel family, are fierce predators that keep to high elevations with deep snow and can fight off a grizzly bear when cornered.

Federal wildlife officials said in December 2010 that a decline in long-term wolverine numbers and future threats including climate change made it eligible for potential protection under the Endangered Species Act. Their habitat was forecast to shrink dramatically as warmer temperatures reduce areas with spring snow.

But the government at the time declined to list the animal as endangered or threat-

There are larger populations in Alaska, where trapping also is permitted, and as many as 20,000 wolverines in

FWP spokesman Ron Aasheim said Montana's quota of five wolverines a year is sustainable, and the state has no intention to harm the overall wolverine population. The quota was last adjusted in 2008, when it was cut in half from 10 animals annually.

"It's conservative, and we think it's sustainable and a reasonable season," Aasheim said. "It was based on the best science we have."

# EDUCATION REFORM FOES **OUTRAISE SUPPORTERS**

**BOISE (AP)** • Teachers unions and other foes of proposed education reforms easily outraised those promoting the measures ahead of a Nov. 6 vote that will determine if the changes survive.

The group Vote No on Propositions 1, 2, 3 added \$1.3 million through Sept. 30, compared with just \$164,857 for the group Yes for Education, according to the Idaho secretary of state's office.

The Federation of Republican Women also has raised more than \$100,000, mostly for radio ads to promote the reforms. And reform backers have raised at least \$200,000 through a separate group that's concealing contributors' identities.

Still, opponents of the "Students Come First"overhaul pushed by Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna appear to have a significant cash advantage

that they've used on, among other things, TV commercials seeking to persuade voters to reject the reforms.

The education reforms passed by the 2011 Legislature limit union bargaining power, promote teacher merit pay and require online

The National Education Association union group, based in Washington, D.C., chipped in the most to fight the reforms, nearly \$1.1 mil-

"We're grateful to the hundreds of thousands of teachers who basically contributed that money that we are receiving from the National Education Association," said Brian Cronin, a Democratic state representative who is leading the effort to overturn the reforms. "People trust teachers and understand that teachers have the kids' best interest at heart."

Advocates of the reforms - including members of the Idaho Republican Party, Luna and Gov. CL. "Butch" Otter - have portrayed foes as being financed by out-ofstate unions.

"In my opinion, it's just the unions trying to buy control of Idaho schools,"said Ken Burgess, the lobbyist leading the push to raise money to promote the re-

Mack Shirley, a retiring Republican House member and former teacher from Rexburg, is helping defend the reforms at the ballot box and chipped in \$2,000 to the

Shirley said he was a concerned that his group had not yet amassed deeper reserves to spread its message. He's finding some people still don't know whether a "yes" or "no" vote supports

"I do think we've got to get the public more informed, just on the correct procedure for voting," Shirley said. A "yes" vote is in favor of Luna's reforms, while a "no" vote on the three referendums would overturn them.

Among the major publicly disclosed donors who favor the reforms, direct-marketing health care business owner Frank VanderSloot gave at least \$50,000 through his company, Melaleuca.

Wood River's large, physical defenders were impenetrable, and by linking up passes the Wolverines dominated possession and played united in their 1-0 victory over Minico in the final elimination game of the Class 4A District IV tournament Thursday.

# College Football Guru Beano Cook Dead at 81

ASSOCIATED PRESS

PITTSBURGH • Beano Cook, the college football commentator with an encyclopedic knowledge of the sport he dearly loved, has

The 81-year-old Boston native had worked for ESPN since 1986 and was the sports information director at his alma mater, the University of Pittsburgh, from 1956 to 1966. The school announced Thursday that Cook had died in his sleep.

Cook was a diabetic and his health had been failing recently, as he made mention in his most recent blog at www.beancook.com.

"Sorry to say that health issues hit me at the worst time - start of College Football Season," he wrote in a post dated Oct. 1. "Everything except recovery takes a back-burner now. I won't say I'll be back to the blog by a certain date, as some businesses might "promise," but I do hope to return soon.

Thanks for your support and encouragement. Enjoy the season! - Beano"

Born Carroll H. Cook, he grew up in Pittsburgh before graduating from the university in 1954,

and was known for his love of the college game and, in particular, championing the cause of northeastern teams including Penn State and Pitt before either school was a nationally known power.

"Beano Cook was an American original. His passion, depth and breadth of knowledge, and humor were unique," ESPN host Chris Fowler said. "He was an invaluable early mentor to me and friend. His imprint can still be seen on GameDay each week."

Cook, like many in the business, fell in love with simply being around the competition. With a career that took him so many places, it was hard not to get wrapped up in it.

"Getting to know the ath-

me with my fondest memories," once said. "That was the most fun."

He said his favorites from his time working at Pitt were Mike Ditka, who

went on to become a Pro Football Hall of Famer, and basketball star Don Hennon. "He was special," Ditka

said in a statement. "We became really good friends the vears I was in school at Pitt. I don't know that anybody loved that job and loved Pitt more than he did." His wealth of knowledge

about college football and memory for details made him an irresistible storyteller, as well a passionate pundit.

He wasn't always right,

but he wasn't afraid to make bold pronouncements, such as when he predicted Notre Dame freshman quarterback Ron Powlus would win at least two Heisman trophies. Powlus never even won one, but Cook's prediction made

In recent years he was a frequent contributor on ES-PN Radio and did a weekly podcast with ESPN college football writer Ivan Maisel.

"He was one of a kind," ESPN executive chairman George Bodenheimer said. "There never was and never will be another Beano. His combination of humor, passion, love of college football and his engaging personality left an indelible mark on the sport and touched anyone who knew him."

He was an unapologetic defender of college football, while recognizing its warts, and wasn't shy about touting its superiority to the progame.

"On Sundays they play for money," he once said. "On Saturdays they play for passion, for the love of the game. I think that's why it's our greatest sport."

Cook was ABC Sports' press director for the NCAA after leaving the SID job at Pitt, and later worked in as a writer or media representative for the St. Petersburg

Chris Fowler, ESPN host

Times, Miami Dolphins, the Mutual Radio Network, and CBS before joining ESPN.

"Beano was a unique human being and he was college football at ESPN. I am indebted to him. Beano was a tremendous help at the start of my television career and I would not be where I am today without him," ES-PN analyst Lee Corso said. "I am forever grateful to Beano and the time we spent behind the GameDay desk."

Cook received his distinctive nickname as a youth, when his family moved from Boston to Pittsburgh. A neighbor of the Cook family said, "Oh, from Boston, like the beans" and tabbed the 7year-old "Beano."

Cook is fondly remembered at Pitt, where the media room in the Petersen Events Center is named after

"Beano left a legacy never to be matched. Not matched in accomplishment, wit or loyalty," Pitt athletic director Steve Pederson said. "Like so many others, it has been my privilege to be the beneficiary of Beano's counsel and friendship. He loved the University of Pittsburgh and his name is synonymous with all good things at Pitt.

"We all feel a tremendous void in our lives today."

Many in and around college football concurred Thursday.

"It's a sad day for college football," Penn State coach Bill O'Brien said. "Especially in the state of Pennsylvania, where he was an icon."

# Concussed Earnhardt to Miss Two Races

CONCORD, N.C. • Dale Earnhardt Jr. knew he had suffered a concussion in an August crash so jolting that other drivers tweeted about it immediately after the im-

Earnhardt was too stubborn to see a doctor about it. He was too worried he would be yanked from his car, derailing his long-suffering Sprint Cup Championship

So he kept it a secret until a 25-car accident on the last lap Sunday at Talladega left him with a lingering headache.

NASCAR's most popular driver sought medical attention from a neurosurgeon, who found Earnhardt had indeed suffered two concussions in six weeks and could not be medically cleared to race. Earnhardt said Thursday he will sit out the next two weeks, at Charlotte and Kansas, ending his championship chances.

"I would love to race this weekend, and I feel perfectly normal and feel like I could compete if I were allowed to compete," Earnhardt said. "But I think that the basis of this whole deal is that I've had two concussions in the last (six) weeks, and you can't layer concussions. It gets extremely dangerous."

A decade ago, it was Earn-

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hardt who helped spur changes in how NASCAR handled drivers showing signs of a concussion.

He self-diagnosed a concussion from an accident at California, but didn't tell anyone about it until revealing in an interview weeks later that he'd been having difficulty focusing and communicating with his crew chief. Within days of his admission, NASCAR strengthened its commitment to keeping drivers with concussions off the track.

NASCAR ruled that drivers unable to drive their car back to the garage after an accident had to make a mandatory trip to the infield care center. The attending physician could then refer a driver to a neurosurgeon for a CT scan or MRI if they suspected a concussion.

Clearance to race after suffering a concussion is not given until after a driver obtains a medical release.

"I think we've got a pretty good history of sending drivers to the care center and then also to a neurologist if we think there may be any cause to do so," said NASCAR senior vice president Steve O'Donnell, who added that only nine drivers from NASCAR's three national series have suffered concussions in the last five years.

Of course, Earnhardt

proved Thursday that NASCAR isn't always in the

know. Earnhardt's first concussion this season came in an Aug. 29 wreck during a tire test at Kansas. His crash into the wall when his right front tire failed was so hard that Brad Keselowski immediately tweeted about. Earnhardt was seen after the accident in the back of an ambulance, but was not treated in the infield care center and did not seek further exami-

nation elsewhere. He attended a Washington Redskins exhibition game later that night, but admitted Thursday he knew he suffered a concussion.

# Scientist Who Helped Clone Sheep Dolly Dies

LONDON (AP) • Keith Campbell, a prominent biologist who worked on cloning Dolly the sheep, has died at 58, the University of Nottingham said Thursday.

Campbell, who had worked on animal improvement and cloning since 1999, died Oct. 5, university spokesman Tim Utton said. He did not specify the cause, only saying that Campbell had worked at the university until his death.

Campbell began researching animal cloning at the Roslin Institute near Edinburgh in 1991. The experiments led to the birth in 1996 of Dolly the sheep, the first mammal to be cloned from an adult cell.

He believed research into medical use of embryonic stem cells would eventually lead to important breakthroughs despite opposition from some who found the technique abhorrent.

# U.S. Targets the Finances of MS-13

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Obama administration declared the ultra-violent street gang MS-13 to be an international criminal group on Thursday, an unprecedented crackdown targeting the finances of the sprawling U.S. and Central American gang infamous for hacking and stabbing victims with machetes.

The Treasury Department formally designated MS-13, or Mara Salvatrucha, a transnational criminal organization. The aim is to freeze it out of the U.S. financial system and seize what are estimated to be millions of dollars in criminal profits from drug and human smuggling and other crimes committed in this country.

The gang was founded by immigrants fleeing El Salvador's civil war more than two decades ago. Its founders took lessons learned from that brutal conflict to the streets of Los Angeles and built a reputation as one of the most ruthless and sophisticated street gangs, according to Immigration and Customs Enforcement Special Agent Jason Shatarsky.

With as many as 10,000 members in 46 states, the gang has expanded far beyond its initial roots. Members are accused of major crimes including murder, kidnapping, prostitution, drug smuggling and human traffick-

The group established itself in Los Angeles before spreading across the U.S., said Shatarsky, an MS-13 expert assigned to ICE's national gang unit. The group's violence - using a machete to hack a victim to death or shooting someone in the head in broad daylight, for instance - surprised authorities and even rival gangs.

"They saw a level of violence that hadn't been seen before," Shatarsky said, adding that as the gang has expanded it has also become more sophisticated than many rivals. The gang, which is allied with several of Mexico's warring drug cartels, has a strong presence in Southern California, Washington and Northern Virginia, all areas with substantial Salvadoran populations. Shatarsky said its members target residents and business owners for extortion, among other crimes. The gang is also active throughout Central America and in parts of Mexico.

The Treasury Department's undersecretary for terrorism and financial intelligence, David S. Cohen, said that while no specific members of the gang have been listed as part of the group's sanction, anyone identified as a gang member or associate trying to do business with gang members could be subject to criminal prosecution.

The government is also making it more difficult for gang members to use banks and wire transfer services to move profits from the group's crimes.

# Assessments of Libya Attack Changed Over Time

U.S. officials have provided evolving explanations for whether the attack on the U.S. compound in Benghazi, Libya, grew out of a protest over an anti-Islamic YouTube video or was a planned assault.

**Sept. 14**, White House spokesman Jay Carney: "We have no information to suggest that it was a preplanned attack."

Sept. 16, Susan E. Rice, ambassador to the United Nations, on ABC TV:

"What this began as was a spontaneous, not a premeditated, response to what had transpired in Cairo. ... We believe that folks in Benghazi, a small number of people, came to the embassy to — or to the consulate, rather — to replicate the sort of challenge that was posed in Cairo. And then, as that unfolded, it seems to have been hijacked, let us say, by some individual clusters of extremists who came with heav-

"The best information we have now, the facts that we have now indicate that this was an opportunistic attack on our embassy. The attack began and evolved and escalated over several hours at our embassy our diplomatic post in Benghazi."

"In the immediate aftermath [of the assault], there was information that led us to assess that the attack began spontaneously following protests earlier that day at our embassy in Cairo."

# **Liver Problem to Blame** for Panda Cub Death

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • National Zoo scientists have determined a 6-day-old giant panda cub's death last month wasn't momma bear's fault, and life was returning to normal Thursday for giant panda Mei Xiang.

Mei Xiang's cub, born Sept. 16, died of liver trouble and signs of lung disease, said Chief Veterinarian Suzan Murray. After a full necropsy, scientists found the tiny female cub's lungs hadn't fully developed and likely weren't sending enough oxygen to the liver. The cub was possibly

born prematurely.

Zoo keepers have said Mei Xiang took careful care of the cub. It weighed only about 4 ounces when it died. The tiny hairless, helpless creatures can be easily crushed, but the cub had no sign of injury. A small amount of milk in the digestive system suggested she had nursed.

Panda fans keeping tabs online were devastated by the death. The zoo has received an outpouring of cards and letters from around the world and some donations for conservation.

# VP DEBATE: BIDEN, RYAN AT EACH OTHER ON EVERYTHING

DANVILLE, Ky. (AP) • There was nothing listless this time as the 69-year-old Biden sat next to the 42-year old Wisconsin congressman on a stage at Centre College in Kentucky.

As Biden and Ryan well knew, last week's presidential debate has fueled a Republican comeback in opinion polls. Republicans and Democrats alike have said in recent days the presidential race now approximates the competitive situation in place before the two political conventions. Obama and Ryan are generally separated by a point or two in national public opinion polls and in several battleground states, while the president holds a slender lead in Ohio and Wiscon-

The serial disagreements started immediately after the smiles and handshakes of the opening.

The fiercest clash over foreign policy came in the debate's opening moments, when Ryan cited events across the Middle East as well as Stevens' death in Libya as evidence that the administration's foreign policy was unraveling. The Republican also said the administration had

failed to give Stevens the same level of protection as the U.S. ambassador in Paris receives.

Biden rebutted by saying that the

budget that Ryan authored as chairman of the House Budget Committee had cut the administration's funding request for diplomatic security by \$300 million. On the nation's economy, both men

were asked directly when his side could reduce unemployment to 6 percent from the current 7.8 percent. Both men side-

Biden repeated the president's contention that the nation is moving in the right direction, while Ryan stated the Republican view that economic struggle persists even though Democrats had control of both houses of Congress during the first two years of Obama's term.

"Where are the 5 million green jobs" we were told would be created? Ryan said to Biden.

Medicare was a flashpoint, as well. Ryan said Obama's health care plan had diverted \$716 billion from the program for seniors and created a new board that could deny care to patients who need it.

Democrats "haven't put a credible solution on the table," he said. "They'll tell you about vouchers. They'll say all these things to try to scare people."

Biden quickly said that Ryan had authored not one but two proposals in which seniors would be given government payments that might not cover the entirety of their care. Otherwise, he said, the Romney-Ryan approach wouldn't achieve the savings they claimed.

For Biden, Thursday night's debate was his first since the 2008 campaign, when he shared a stage with Sarah Palin, then John McCain's running mate.

Ryan spars frequently with Democrats during debates on legislation on the House floor and in the House Budget Committee, which he chairs, but not in a one-on-one encounter covering 90 minutes and a virtually unlimited range

For all their differences, the two men shared a common objective, to advance the cause of their tickets in a close race for the presidency. And they appeared to avoid any gaffes that might forever seal their place in the history of debates.

# Cartels Flood U.S. with Cheap Meth

ST. LOUIS (AP) • Mexican drug cartels are quietly filling the void in the nation's drug market created by the long effort to crack down on American-made methamphetamine, flooding U.S. cities with exceptionally cheap, extraordinarily potent meth from factory-like "su-

perlabs." Although Mexican meth is not new to the U.S. drug trade, it now accounts for as much as 80 percent of the meth sold here, according to the Drug Enforcement Administration. And it is as much as 90 percent pure, a level that offers users a faster, more intense and longer-

lasting high. "These are sophisticated, high-tech operations in Mex-

ico that are operating with

extreme precision," said Jim

Shroba, a DEA agent in St. Louis. The cartels are expanding into the U.S. meth market just as they did with heroin: developing an inexpensive, highly-addictive form of the drug and sending it through the same pipelines as other illegal drugs.

Seizures of meth along the Southwest border have more than quadrupled during the last several years. DEA records reviewed by The Associated Press show that the amount of seized meth jumped from slightly more than 4,000 pounds in 2007 to more than 16,000 pounds in 2011.

Mexican meth has a clearer, glassier appearance than more crudely produced formulas and often resembles ice fragments, usually with a clear or bluish-white color. It often has a smell people com-







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# Perry's Fixed-rate Tuition Plan Failed in Other States

**AUSTIN, Texas** • Gov. Rick Perry is promoting fixedrate tuition plans for all fouryear state colleges and universities, an approach abandoned by schools in Georgia and Michigan because of declining budget support.

The Republican is pitching the concept after lawmakers from his party cut about \$1 billion from higher education in the two-year budget through September 2013.

Spending reductions made in Atlanta derailed the Georgia program after just three years.

"Not only will this give students cost certainty heading into their education, it also will provide a powerful incentive for them to finish their degree on time," Perry said in a speech at an Oct. 1 event in Dallas.

Should Perry, the longestserving governor in the second-most populous state, succeed, Texas would join Illinois in providing fouryear fixed tuition rates at publicly funded colleges. He has been pushing the plan in public appearances, along with initiatives such as \$10,000 degree-granting programs, as ways to make postsecondary education more affordable.

"As interest in pursuing a college degree is increasing, state officials have to do everything we can to remove the roadblocks and enable students to pursue their dreams," Perry said in an opinion article printed this week in several Texas newspapers. He cited sharply rising numbers of Latino and black Texans taking SAT college entrance examinations.

"We must give our students affordable and predictable options, and reduce the debt that they carry with them as they start their careers," Perry said in the article, which was posted on the governor's website. "That's why I'm calling for a fouryear tuition freeze for incoming freshmen, so that the amount students pay when they first arrive on campus will be locked in through what should be their senior year."

Public colleges across the

country have raised student costs to offset declines in state aid. Tuition rose 12 percent last year at the 23 California State University campuses, with more than 400,000 students, after a \$650 million budget cut.

# The Writer and the Spy

A free symposium explores Ernest Hemingway's work in a political light.

**KETCHUM** • Ernest Hemingway's work as a war correspondent has been well documented. Less well known is his stint as a spy.

The U.S. Treasury Department hired the American author in 1941 to spy on how China was using the millions of dollars the U.S. paid China to fight the Japanese.

"The great literary man of action, ostensibly there as a foreign war correspondent, reveled in being a government operative while his new wife Martha Gellhorn championed the anti-Japanese resistance of Chiang Kai-shek," said Peter Moreira, a foreign correspondent in Hong Kong and South Korea.

Moreira authored "Hemingway on the China Front," the first book to track Hemingway's sojourn as a spy. He'll discuss his work as the

## A downtown alley project builds Twin Falls' art community in a funky setting.

TWIN FALLS • If you have the desire to paint or sculpt and to see your work on walls, a spot is waiting for you at the Downtown Art Alley Project.

The DAAP, located behind the Historic Ballroom, features the work of local artists

on the alley's brick walls. Organizer Jimmy Taylor, co-owner of the Historic Ballroom, came up with the idea after learning about a similar project in Boise.

Artists participating in DAAP are not allowed to paint directly on the bricks but instead mount their work using plywood. A post on the DAAP website said organizers made an agreement with building owners that artists would not paint on the brick walls because of the bricks' age and the risk of trapping moisture inside the walls, which could cause

mold and mildew damage. Artists are required to submit proposals of their

ideas. Once an artist's concept is approved, the finished product can be displayed in the alley for free for

a year. The idea of DAAP is to give artists - whether established or up-and-upcoming — a creative outlet to display their talents amid the history of downtown

Twin Falls. "Art is about fun," Taylor said, adding that he would like the project to attract new artists such as College of Southern Idaho students.



But a man doesn't fight three wars if he has no political leanings," said Sandra Hofferber, director of the Regional History Department at The Community Library. "As someone who struggled with death and dying, I don't think he would have put himself on the line if he hadn't had a cause he cared about."

landscape of asphalt, concrete and stone. You had to look down to notice the black outline of the Space Needle on a green, yellow and red background. It was painted on a curved piece of metal sitting on the ground.



# Explore a Colorful Piece of Idaho's Ranching History

TWIN FALLS • Longtime southern Idahoans may be aware that the tiny outpost near the Idaho-Nevada border called Murphy Hot Springs was once called Kittie's Hot Hole. But few know the whole story behind Kittie Wilkins, the woman of the late 19th century for whom it was named.

She'll be the subject of the next Herrett Forum lecture, by Idaho State University professor Phillip Homan, at 7:30 p.m. Oct. 17 at the Herrett Center.

Homan has made an extensive study of the woman the San Francisco Examiner first called "The Horse Queen of Idaho." She owned the Wilkins Horse Co. in Owyhee County's Bruneau Country. At the height of her career, she owned 10,000 range-bred horses, all carrying her Diamond brand. It was the largest herd of horses owned by one family in the American West, Homan said. In spite of the rough career she chose, however, the Boston Advertiser described her as "a thoroughly womanly woman."

Homan will detail the life of this tough but lovely Victorian woman who lived a single life on her ranch in the vast rangeland of southern Idaho.

# Now or Never: Late Summer Must-Dos for Your Lawn by Joe Cooper, All About Lawns Columnist

With most of the summer mowing, watering, and weeding behind you, there are a few more things to think about before fall arrives. For a few key issues, it's now or never, in order to provide the best chance for your lawn to stay healthy through the colder seasons.

#### Brace against bugs.

Late summer is high season for grubs and other grass-killing insects. Make sure these pests haven't settled into your lawn by rolling back a piece of sod and looking for them a few inches below the

surface. If you see a number of little white pests, here's what you can do:

- There are a number of different grub types out there; try to determine which you have.
- Pesticides and milky spore bacteria are the most common defenses against grubs, and both are available at your local hardware or gardening store.

#### Brown patches: now or never.

Before the temperatures cool and the growth of your grass slow down before winter, address those annoying brown lawn patches. Determine the cause (i.e. drought, insects), design a remedy (seeding, herbicide), and get to work before fall.

- If you are fertilizing before fall, don't over-fertilize brown patches (which is sometimes a lawn care instinct). This can work against you.
- Don't over-water either; excessive moisture can

also slow grass growth. Water lightly and often, during cool times of day or overnight.

#### Save shaded spaces.

Tree shade is marvelous, but not always for lawns. If you have an area of lawn that is struggling due to tree shade, don't despair: trim and feed for regrowth during the fall.

- Thin the tree branches out by trimming every other branch above the shaded lawn to allow more light.
- Seed the struggling area before summer ends; fall conditions are perfect for allowing grass to return to growth, with warm days and cool nights to speed the process.

Pretty soon, your lawn care duties will start to wane, so take a few simple steps now to preserve the life of your lawn as temperatures start to fall.

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# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

At the world championships in Veldhoven last year, everyone was impressed by the performance of the Indonesian women. In this deal from their semifinal against England, Grace Tueje made a nice play: one that decided the match in her side's favor.

When South upgraded her hand to a two-club opener, North was now happy to let her partner try for the slam bonus. Against six no-trump, West

led the spade four, covered by the seven, nine and ace. Declarer went after clubs first, and things did not look good for her side when East discarded the spade five on the third round. A fourth round of clubs saw declarer pitch a diamond from dummy (having let go a heart on the third club), and East discarded the spade six.

West now switched to the diamond six, and declarer put up dummy's ace and played a heart to the jack. When that held, she cashed the last club, West discarding the heart six, dummy the spade three, and East the diamond five. She next cashed the heart ace, and when the king fell, she had to decide who held the diamond queen. If it was West. a simple finesse would suffice, but since East appeared to have started with four cards in that suit, she played her for that card by leading a diamond to the king. Now the heart queen squeezed East between spades and diamonds for the contract.

While there is a slim chance that you have three fast spade losers, I think your third-round club control allows you to bid five diamonds now, suggesting an additional diamond control and no spade control. The five-level really should be safe.






