Remains Found Could Be Missing Rupert Woman

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RUPERT • Remains found Friday at the City of Rocks National Reserve may be those of a Rupert woman who has been missing since December 1988.

Norine Boyd was reported missing two weeks after Rupert police obtained an arrest warrant, charging her with stealing \$992 from a Rupert man. In March of 1989, hikers from Buhl found Boyd's 1984 two-door Ford in the City of Rocks area near Almo in Cassia County.

On Friday, Rupert Police Det. Jeff McEwen and criminal analyst Diane Gines were pursuing infor-

mation connected to the disappearance with a cadaver dog and personnel trained in forensic anthropology when they discovered human remains in the City of Rocks area.

McEwen said evidence at the scene indicates there's "a good probability" the remains are those of Norine Boyd.

The area the remains were found in is one clue, he said. He would not elaborate Monday on what other evidence was found.

A DNA test is pending to confirm the identity of the remains, he said.

After the remains were discovered, the Rupert detectives

Few Tickets Follow

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TWIN FALLS • Idaho's ban on texting while driving went into effect on July 1, but the number of tickets written by local law enforcement agencies ranges from few to none.

"Since July 1 when it took effect, we've had one," said Lt. Kevin Haight with the Idaho State Police, Region 4 office.

That one citation — written by a trooper in Cassia County — is among 16 by ISP statewide for people who were texting while driving, Haight said.

Records show two tickets were written in Twin Falls County since the law went into effect. Both were outside of the region's population center — the city of Twin Falls —

said Lt. Craig Stotts with the Twin Falls Police Department.

In Jerome, Police Chief Dan Hall said his officers haven't written any texting tickets either.

"I support the law but in some respects it's more symbolic than anything else," Hall said.

"We would encourage people not to text but distracted driving in general is a problem."

Texting, talking, eating, applying makeup and other activities while driving are dangerous, he said.

In Minidoka County, Sheriff Kevin Halverson said his deputies have not written any tickets for texting while driving. But they're working to educate drivers, he said, especially younger ones.

As deputies make traffic stops, Halverson said, they talk to drivers about the new law. They're al-

so ensuring the information is included in student driver classes.

"Everybody pretty much knows what they should and shouldn't do," Halverson said.

Stotts said one reason for the lack of tickets is that proving someone is actually using their phone to text is difficult, since the law does not ban dialing a number.

While the law defines texting as engaging "in the manual preparation and transmission of written communications via handheld wireless devices," it is unclear whether a person could be ticketed for typing in another smartphone application like their phone's Internet browser.

Haight said he believes the law meant all typing on a "handheld wireless device" was banned. He would also like to see the use of

in-car touchscreens like those on a GPS navigation system banned in order to cut down even more on distracted driving.

"Accidents happen in fractions of seconds and people just don't have time to respond to hazards when they're not paying attention," Hall said.

Haight said he believed the code was written well but could be expanded. Stotts agreed, saying a blanket ban on cellphone use in cars could help officers decide whether to ticket someone or not.

So far, Stotts said the texting ban has done a good job of educating drivers about the dangers of distracted driving. He believes the law will continue to evolve and become easier for officers to enforce.

"We'll get there," he said.

T.F. Council Endorses Rec Center Partnership

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TWIN FALLS • A community recreation center in Twin Falls is a tiny step closer to becoming a reality.

On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council endorsed a plan for pursuing a partnership with the Boys

and Girls Club of Magic Valley to build and operate a rec center.

The unanimous vote doesn't lock the city into any course of action. Rather, the city and Boys and Girls Club will each explore options for funding and ongoing costs.

Under the proposal, the city would donate land on Maxwell

Avenue to the Boys and Girls Club, and the organization would construct the facility. Details of the partnership haven't yet been nailed down.

Other funding options included attempting to pass a \$7 million bond and forming a recreation tax district. Council members shied away from those choices.

But all agreed that the need for a rec center is real. Chris Scholes, member of the recreation center advisory committee, said there are 300 community sports teams in Twin Falls, and there aren't enough facilities to adequately serve those teams.

The Boys and Girls Club is also

Barron, Pence Seek Dist. 26 House Seat

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TWIN FALLS • A Camas County Republican is challenging an incumbent Democratic legislator in District 26.

Lee Barron and Donna Pence are running for House seat B.

District 26 is made up of Blaine, Camas, Gooding and Lincoln counties. It's one of the few legislative districts in the state that remained unchanged after redistricting.

In the 2012 session, Pence worked on a piece of legislation that would give tax exemptions to value-added agriculture businesses — in other words, processing businesses, like those that turn grain into flour. Currently, Idaho exports much of its raw agriculture products out of state for processing, Pence said. She wants to keep those products in state to stimulate the economy, and hopes the tax incentives would lure more businesses to Idaho and boost the economy.

If re-elected, Pence said, she'll bring that legislation back.

Pence would like to restore money in education. She's opposed to the Students Come First education reform laws, which are on the ballot for repeal this election.

"If the propositions get defeated, especially (Propositions) 2 and 3, there'll be a lot of work to get that money back into how it needs to be," Pence said.

Pence has also made aquifer recharge a priority.

Barron supports Students Come First, though he sees potential changes that could need to be made. While he strongly supports Propositions 1 and 2 — regarding labor negotiations and teacher merit pay — he isn't sure about Proposition 3, which concerns laptops and technology in the classroom. He does believe students should have access to technology, but wonders if students should be able to take the devices home.

"(The laws) are works in progress," he said.

Remington, Miller Both Seek Open House Seat

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TWIN FALLS • Two legislative newcomers are competing for an open House seat in District 26.

John Remington of Ketchum and Steve Miller of Fairfield are running for House seat A. Rep. Wendy Jaquet, R-Ketchum, previously held the seat, but will retire this year.

District 26 is made up of Blaine, Camas, Gooding and Lincoln counties. It's one of the few legislative districts in the state that remained unchanged after redistricting.

Remington said it's important to him to work with citizens throughout the district, regardless of age.

"I really make a point when I go around that I'm really interested in what people (who are younger than 35) think," Remington said.

He's also concerned about education, and would like to see more support for both public education and higher education.

"In my opinion, (the College of Southern Idaho) does such a phenomenal job in our district," he said.

Remington said many District 26 residents are concerned about rising health care costs. He supports expanding Medicaid in the state, and believes it will bring down prices in the long run.

Miller, however, is concerned about the idea of expanding Medicaid. The federal government may pay for most of the cost of expanding the program, he said, but he doesn't think it will be able to continue covering that portion.

"I think that's kind of an implied burden that states shouldn't have," Miller said.

One of Miller's major focuses is the economy.

"Everybody knows, has friends who have lost their job and have had to shut their business down, or slow their business down," he said.

The state, he said, should find a way to draw companies to Idaho.

"We have a good work force,"

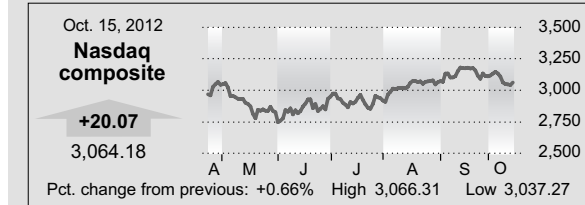
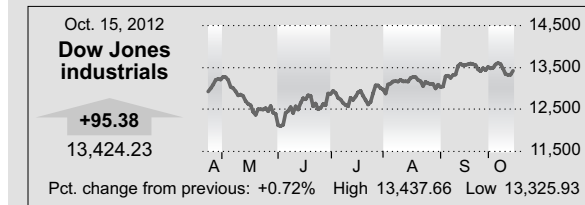

Justin Matthew Crawford pleaded not guilty to solicitation of rape and solicitation of burglary Monday morning in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

Police said Crawford, 32, used the on-line classifieds website Craigslist to find men to rape a woman known to Crawford. The *Times-News* doesn't identify victims of sexual assault.

A status hearing is scheduled for Nov. 13. A pretrial conference is scheduled for Dec 3 and a jury trial is set for Dec. 13.

Two Races, One Cause

Kimberly school group and alumnus organize events to benefit wounded soldiers.

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KIMBERLY • For Kimberly native Trevor Barrott, community service isn't anything new.

As a high-schooler, he created a "Dare to Care" program to provide assistance to families of deployed members of the Idaho Army National Guard.

Now, the 2005 Kimberly High School alumnus has a new project: an 8K race to benefit the Wounded Warrior Project.

"He's been involved in service his whole life," his mother Chris Barrott said.

Trevor is serving in the U.S. Air Force at the Transit Center at Manas in Kyrgyzstan. It's his third deployment.

Kimberly High teacher Sharon Meeks has stayed in touch with her former student since he graduated.

And when she heard about the fundraiser, she got the high school's Business Professionals of America group on board.

It's the same group Trevor participated in as a high-schooler.

"We like to do things out of the ordinary, so this was a good opportunity for us," Meeks said.

The group is organizing a 5K race at Kimberly City Park. The event is scheduled for Saturday – the same day as Barrott's race on the other side of the world.

In addition to the run, children can participate in a "boot camp" with 11 members of the Idaho Army National Guard's 116th Calvary Brigade Combat Team.

Chris Barrott said the 5K will be a "family fun race" and is about appreciating service members.

"It really is just about showing support for the Wounded Warrior Project," she said.

The nonprofit organization advocates for soldiers who are wounded in the line of duty.

Meeks said all the money raised during Saturday's event will go to the organization.

"We're taking not one penny," she said. "We want it all to go to the Wounded Warrior Project." For the BPA students, or-

Curious Mind Railroad History in the Magic Valley

Which came first, the Twin Falls town plat or the railroad?

It was the plat – or several plats, really, according to Ron Yates, president of the Twin Falls County Historical Society Museum.

"The railroad arrived in 1905. The town plat was filed before, in several plats, at different times," Yates said.

While the Twin Falls plat was filed May 12, 1904, the first official train on the Minidoka & Southwestern Railroad arrived Aug. 7, 1905, and "Railroad Day" was celebrated.

The M&SW was acquired by the Oregon Short Line Railroad in 1910, and OS� built the Rupert-Wendell and Burley-Martin lines about 1912. OS� was part of the Union Pacific System, which sold the lines to present operator Eastern Idaho Railroad on Nov. 21, 1993.

The south-central cluster includes 154 miles, and runs 75 miles from Minidoka to Buhl. Branch lines also run 58 miles from Rupert to Wendell, and 21 miles from Martin to Burley and Declo. This cluster doesn't include the line that ran along the Salmon Tract to Rogerson, or the 90 miles of track from Rogerson to Wells, Nev.

By 1910 a line south to Rogerson was completed by an independent railroad, Idaho Central. Union Pacific later completed a line south from Rogerson toward Wells, Nev., in 1926 after buying the Idaho Central in 1923.

In early 1912, I.B. Perrine formed the Twin Falls Electric Railway Co. to run a trolley for tourists from downtown to Shoshone Falls. The 12-mile loop began at the downtown depot, crossed Shoshone Street, then ran along Gooding Street West and North to Five Points. Tracks looped out Blue Lakes Boulevard to the canyon rim, then east to Shoshone Falls, south for several miles, and finally west to the city again.

The track was completed August 1914, and ran until July 1916 when operations ceased. The local population and tourism weren't large enough to support the transportation system, and automobile usage was on the rise. One of OS�'s principal stops was Shoshone, one

of the first towns in the Magic Valley. Although the first rails stretched to Shoshone Feb. 7, 1883, Shoshone was laid out in 1882 in preparation for construction of the track. Shoshone was recently awarded membership in Union Pacific's Train Town USA Registry as part of the railroad's yearlong 150th anniversary celebration.

In 1936, Union Pacific Railroad Chairman W. Averell Harriman developed Sun Valley as the first destination winter resort in the U.S., primarily to increase transportation service in the West. The railroad company introduced the world's first two chairlifts at Sun Valley Resort.

Rail passenger service has been reduced with better airline scheduling. "The Twin Falls Municipal Airport was established in 1947. The community was the recipient of a U.S. Civil Aeronautics Administration grant in the amount of \$384,000 to establish the initial footprint of the regional airport we utilize today," said Airport Manager Bill Carberry.

Today with nearly 270 mainline miles, the Eastern Idaho Railroad is one of the largest single short line spinoffs in UP history. Serving the agriculturally diverse areas along the Snake River, the EIRR carries a wide variety of products in its near-35,000 annual car load capacity – transporting grain and agricultural products, food products, coal, limestone, aggregates and chemicals.

According to the Southern Idaho Economic Development Organization, while less than 15 percent of all shipments in the U.S. are moved by rail, many rural areas have lost rail service due to mergers. Twin Falls, Jerome and Gooding are fortunate that railroad transportation is available.

Morris, the president of the group, said the school – built in the late 1930s by the Works Project Administration, a New Deal agency that carried out public works projects using unskilled workers – is an important part of local history. The group would like to turn it into a museum and cultural center.

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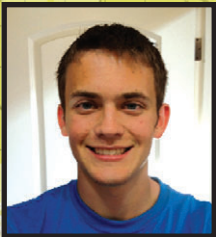

CONSUMERS
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SALES A LIFT

WASHINGTON • Americans spent more money at retailers in September — a buying surge that reflected growing consumer confidence and the launch of the latest iPhone.

Retail sales jumped 1.1 percent last month, producing the best two months of sales in two years, according to figures released Monday by the Commerce Department.

“The consumer is back,” said Joel Naroff, chief economist at Naroff Economic Advisors. “They are not spending money like it is going out of style, but they are spending at a more normal pace that is consistent with a moderately growing economy.”

The spike in spending could boost sluggish growth and help revitalize President Barack Obama’s campaign after a strong debate performance by challenger Mitt Romney.

The increase comes only 10 days after a report that unemployment fell to its lowest level since Obama took office. And it follows a survey last week by the University of Michigan that showed consumer confidence rose in early October to a five-year high.

Stocks climbed after the

retail report. The Dow Jones industrial average gained 95 points to close up at 13,424. Broader indexes also rose.

Businesses appeared to be banking on a resurgent consumer.

A second Commerce Department report Monday showed companies increased their stockpiles in August by 0.6 percent after a slightly larger gain in July. Companies typically step up restocking when they anticipate sales will rise in coming months.

The retail sales report is the government’s first monthly look at consumer spending. Consumer spending is critical because it drives nearly 70 percent of economic activity.

In September, retailers saw gains in almost every major category. That contrasted with August’s retail sales, which rose almost entirely on the strength of auto sales and higher gas prices.

Sales of electronics and appliances last month swelled 4.5 percent, in part because of iPhone sales. Sales at auto dealers increased 1.3 percent. Building materials and garden supplies, furniture and clothing sales all gained, too.

Some of the September increase also reflected higher food and gas prices. If those prices continue to rise, consumers could cut back elsewhere, and that could keep growth from accelerating.

Consultant: Sun Valley Needs to Look

SUN VALLEY • The Wood River Valley needs to build businesses that do not depend on tourism, a consultant told Sun Valley-area businessmen Wednesday.

“You have arguably one of the great resorts here. You have to ask: Who could be profitable here?” Austin-based TIP Strategies director Jon Roberts asked 178 people who turned out for a day-long economic summit at the Sun Valley Inn. “Innovation is going to be the economic driver. Those communities who do not embrace innovation will not be successful.”

The summit was organized by Sustain Blaine, a public-private partnership promoting economic growth. It brought out the valley’s CEOs, including Cody Langbehn, CEO of St. Luke’s Wood River Medical Center, and Sun Valley Co. owners Carol Holding and her daughter, Kathleen.

Harry Griffith, executive director of Sustain Blaine, said sales in the county increased \$38 million in 2011 over 2010 but that tourism, lodging and eating receipts were flat in 2012. The residential sales volume is stabilizing after four

years of decline, and the rate of decline in property values is slowing.

Hotel occupancy rates were 60 percent in 2011 and 2012 with a few weeks in summer approaching 100 percent. Seasonally, occupancy rates average 57 percent in winter, 85 percent in summer and 36 percent during fall.

Sixteen marquee events, such as the Sun Valley Wellness Festival, bring in 94,000 people and \$48 million each year. The median number of registered

participants per event is 2,700; the median total economic impact per event is \$2.2 million.

The 15-day Sun Valley Symphony brings in the most people and has the largest impact money-wise, followed by the Nordic Festival, Sun Valley Wine Auction, Wagon Days, Ride Sun Valley and Trailing of the Sheep. Allen and Co.’s annual gathering of media and technology CEOs has the biggest direct financial impact per registered participant.

The Sun Valley Wine Auction is next.

“Events are big business,” Griffith said. “We have to ask: Can we expand some of these events to bring in more people and more money? How can we extend events across the year? We’re a winter sports mecca — why can’t we have more marquee events during the winter? Can we add new events to the shoulder season? Can we get multi-event package sponsors? Can we form an incubation organization?”

In response, Sun Valley Mountain Manager Peter Stearns said Sun Valley is eye-balling hosting the Alpine Nationals to add to the number of winter events.

“We need to decide as a community what we want to go after instead of taking what’s brought us,” he added.

Ketchum developer George Kirk told the group that he has the appetite to create the kind of innovation ecosystem that Robbins talked about. The question, he asked, is who is going to do it?

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Burley McCain Foods USA Plant Slated for Renovations

BURLEY • McCain Foods USA plans a major renovation this fall at one of its two plants west of Burley.

The capital improvements and renovations at Plant 2 are expected to be complete within two years and will include improvements to the building, as well as new and updated equipment.

“We expect to have brief outages during that time but we’ll operate continuously throughout the renovations,” Jeff McCray, manager of the Burley facility, said Friday.

Plant 2 processes conventional French fries and battered French fries, he said.

The potatoes processed in Burley are distributed throughout the U.S. and exported to Asia.

McCray, who has been manager at the Burley facility for five years,

said the investment demonstrates the company’s commitment to

the Burley plant and to the community.

Burley Economic Development Director Doug Manning said although the plant is located outside the city limits, it is part of the community. The upgrades will preserve that, helping McCain cope more easily with market changes.

“That way if the market does change it’s easier for the company to adapt and less likely to become outdated,” Manning said.

Dierdre Dickerson, director of corporate communications at McCain Foods USA, said Friday she could not disclose the dollar amount of the renovation. The Burley plants 1 and 2 employ a combined 600 people, McCray said.

“Although the renovation won’t increase the plant’s capacity or employment, it will position us for greater competitiveness by adding state of the art manufacturing equipment and updated infrastructure,” McCray said in a press release.

McCray said the improvements will make the plant more efficient.

McCain Foods USA is headquartered in Lisle, Ill., and employs more than 4,300 people. The company has 10 facilities in Idaho, Maine, Washington, Wisconsin, New Jersey, California and Nebraska. The company’s customer base includes McDonald’s, Burger King, Wendy’s, Arby’s, Walmart and others across the U.S.

McCain Foods Limited employs more than 20,000 people internationally with 57 facilities. Its products can be found in 130 countries around the world. One of every three French fries sold worldwide comes from McCain, which translates to 100 million servings of fries each day, according to company information.

The company purchased the Burley facility as part of a \$500 million acquisition from Ore-Ida in the 1990s.

Kindle Customers May Get Credit Via Settlements

NEW YORK (AP) • Amazon has alerted its Kindle customers that they are entitled to a credit on prior electronic book purchases as part of settlements between some major e-book publishers and the government.
In September a federal judge approved the U.S. Justice Department's settlement with Hachette, HarperCollins and Simon & Schuster, which were accused of conspiring in a price-fixing scheme.
Among other things, the agreement requires the publishers to abandon the price-

ing system that they had conceived with Apple before it released its iPad tablet in 2010. The publishers must also provide the funds for the Kindle credit.
"We think these settlements are a big win for our customers and look forward to lowering prices on more Kindle books in the future," the Amazon Kindle Team said in the email sent to customers.
Amazon.com Inc. told its Kindle customers over the weekend that they will be contacted when the credit is applied to their account if

the court approves the settlement in February. Customers don't need to do anything to receive the credit.
Amazon said that while it doesn't know the amount of the credit until the court approves the settlements, the state Attorneys General estimate it will be from 30 cents to \$1.32 for every eligible Kindle book purchased between April 2010 and May 2012. The credit can be used to buy e-books or print books, or customers can request a check in the amount of the credit.
Shares of Amazon fell

\$3.36, or 1.3 percent, to \$239 in morning trading Monday. They peaked at \$264.11 in mid-September and traded as low as \$166.97 last December.

Softbank to Buy 70 Percent of Sprint for \$20.1B

The deal is the largest ever foreign acquisition by a Japanese company.

NEW YORK • Sprint dug a hole for itself when it bought Nextel in 2005 in one of the worst deals in telecom history. Now, a deep-pocketed friend from overseas could help the company climb out of its hole and reinvigorate its fight against AT&T and Verizon Wireless.
Japan's Softbank Corp. has agreed to buy a controlling stake in Sprint Nextel Corp. for \$20.1 billion, money that will be divided by the company and its shareholders.
Announced Monday in Tokyo, the deal positions Sprint as a stronger competitor to its two biggest rivals, AT&T and Verizon.
The agreement, however, doesn't solve all of Sprint's underlying problems. Sprint, which is based in Overland Park, Kan., has been limping along since it purchased Nextel. The merger quickly turned sour, saddling Sprint with the cost of running two incompatible networks while customers fled.
Sprint has more than 56 million subscribers, compared to AT&T's 105.2 million and Verizon Wireless'

94.2 million. No. 4 U.S. carrier T-Mobile has over 33 million U.S. customers.
Softbank Corp., a holding company with investments in Internet and telecom businesses, made its own venture into the wireless world in 2005, with the acquisition of Vodafone Japan. It turned that business around, giving President Masayoshi Son the confidence that he can make Sprint a profitable company again after five straight years of losses.
Sprint CEO Dan Hesse has laid the groundwork for a turnaround but his efforts haven't had an immediate impact on profitability. In particular, the company's reputation for customer service has improved during his tenure, as he's focused on enhancing the store and call center experience. The company scored the highest of the Big 4 wireless carriers in the American Customer Satisfaction Index this spring.
Hesse has also coaxed Sprint subscribers to pay more, helping the company stem its financial losses. But the highest-paying customers keep leaving for the larger, faster networks of AT&T and Verizon. On its own, the company would have a hard road ahead, as it pays for a network revamp and fulfills a commitment to buy \$15.5 billion in iPhones from Apple.

Asian Powers Double Defense Spending

WASHINGTON (AP) • Asia's top powers have doubled defense spending in the past decade, spurred by the explosion in military expenditure by China, new research shows.

While troop numbers have remained constant, overall annual spending has grown to \$224 billion in 2011, according to a report released Monday by the Washington-based Center for Strategic and International Studies. Spending particularly accelerated in the second half of the decade.

The research covers China, Japan, India, South Korea and Taiwan, which account for some 87 percent of Asia's defense spending.

China's share of the total spending has risen from about 20 percent in 2000 to 40 percent in 2011. The report's authors noted that the official figures they cite likely underestimate how much China actually spends, perhaps by a margin of around 60 percent.

Only the United States spends more on defense: about \$670 billion this year, more than double the amount spent in 2001.

China's lightning economic rise and elevation as a military power has unnerved its neighbors and

drawn more attention from the United States, long the pre-eminent force in the Asia-Pacific.

China eclipsed U.S. ally Japan as the top defense spender in the region in 2005.

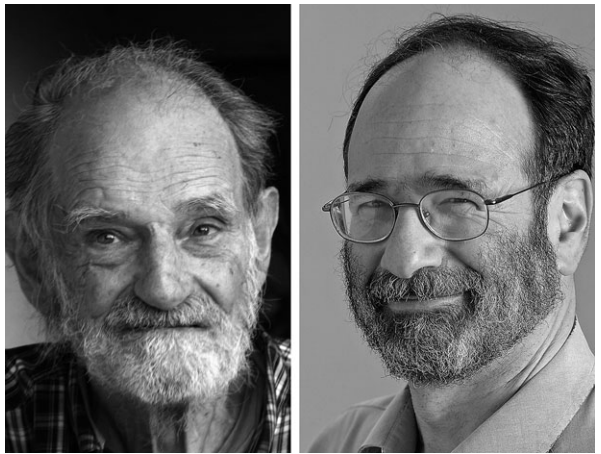
China's official defense spending in 2011 was \$89.9 billion, followed by Japan with \$58.2 billion, and India with \$37 billion.

"There's no question that the rise of China is in part responsible for the growth in defense spending" in the region, said David Berteau, director of the center's international security program. He added that countries were also looking at the increased capabilities of their other neighbors.

But Berteau said it wasn't comparable to the kind of arms race seen during the Cold War.

"The levels of increases and concentration of spending is nothing like we saw in the 1950s and 1960s, or even the 1970s and 1980s, between East and West," he said.

For the report, expenditure in each country was converted into dollars at 2011 value. It found China's defense spending has been growing annually at a rate of 13.4 percent.

Americans Handed Economics Nobel Prize

STOCKHOLM (AP) • Two American scholars won the Nobel economics prize Monday for work on match-making — how to pair doctors with hospitals, students with schools, kidneys with transplant recipients and even men with women in marriage.

Lloyd Shapley of UCLA and Alvin Roth, a Harvard University professor currently visiting at Stanford University, found ways to make markets work when traditional tools fail.

Shapley, 89, came up with the formulas to match supply and demand in markets where prices don't do the job; the 60-year-old Roth put Shapley's math to work in the real world.

Unlike some recent Nobel prizes — such as the Peace Prize that went to the embattled European Union last week — this year's economics award did not seem to send a political message.

"It's all about down-to-earth, highly useful stuff,"

said Robert Aumann, a professor at Jerusalem's Hebrew University who won the 2005 economics Nobel. "We're talking about the nitty-gritty of health care and education — which medical students are assigned to which hospitals. We're talking about how to arrange donors of kidneys."

Shapley made early theoretical inroads into the subject, using game theory to analyze different matching methods in the 1950s and '60s.

In a groundbreaking 1962 paper, Shapley and the late David Gale looked at how to match 10 men and 10 women in perfectly stable marriages. They created a model in which no two people liked anyone else better than each other.

While that may have had little impact on marriages and divorces, the elegant algorithm they developed has been used to better understand many different markets.

Study: Private Medicare Raises Premiums

WASHINGTON (AP) • Nearly six in 10 Medicare recipients would pay higher premiums under a hypothetical privatized system along the lines of what Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney has proposed, according to a study released Monday.

The report by the nonpartisan Kaiser Family Foundation also found striking regional differences that could lead to big premium hikes in some states and counties. That finding instantly made it ammunition in the presidential campaign.

In the senior-rich political swing state of Florida, the hypothetical plan modeled by Kaiser would boost premiums for traditional Medicare by more than \$200 a month on average. In Nevada, another competitive state, 50 percent of seniors would face additional monthly premiums of \$100 or more for their coverage.

Romney and his running mate, Paul Ryan, have proposed changing Medicare to a "premium support" system dominated by private

plans that are paid a fixed amount by the government. President Barack Obama says replacing the current Medicare benefit would shift costs to seniors.

Romney's approach would mirror the difference between traditional workplace pensions and modern-day 401(k) plans, in which the employer contribution is limited. While Medicare financing wouldn't be as heavy a lift for taxpayers, the risk is that retirees could end up paying more if medical costs rise.

The study carried a prominent disclaimer: It should not be taken as a specific analysis of the Romney-Ryan proposal, partly because their plan lacks details. However, Kaiser says it is modeled on what Romney and Ryan propose.

"This approach is similar to the premium support proposal included in (House Budget) Chairman Paul Ryan's ... budget proposal for (fiscal year) 2013 that was embraced by presidential nominee Mitt Romney," the report said.

PHARMACY'S OTHER DRUGS MAY BE CAUSING MENINGITIS OUTBREAK

NEW YORK (AP) • Two more drugs from a specialty pharmacy linked to a meningitis outbreak are now being investigated, U.S. health officials said, as they urged doctors to contact patients who got any kind of injection from the company.

The New England Compounding Center of Framingham, Mass., has been under scrutiny since last month, when a rare fungal form of meningitis was linked to its steroid shots used mostly for back pain.

Monday's step by the Food and Drug Administration followed two developments. One was a report of a meningitis illness in a patient who got another type of steroid

made by the company.

The agency also learned of two heart transplant patients who got fungal infections after being given a third product from the company during surgery.

The illnesses are under investigation, and it's very possible the heart patients were infected by another source, FDA officials cautioned. They did not say whether fungal meningitis was involved in the new report.

The current outbreak has sickened 214 people, including 15 who have died. For weeks, officials have been urging doctors to contact patients who got shots of the company's steroid methyl-

prednisolone acetate, advise them about the risks of fungal infection, and urge them to take any meningitis symptoms seriously.

The steroid was recalled last month, and the company later shut down operations and recalled all the medicines it makes.

The FDA on Monday expanded its advice to doctors to contact all patients who got any injection made by the company, including steroids and drugs used in eye surgery as well as heart operations. The agency said it took the step "out of an abundance of caution" as it investigates the new reports involving the heart surgery drug and the second

steroid, called triamcinolone acetonide.

Last week, federal health officials said 12,000 of the roughly 14,000 people who received steroid shots had been contacted. Nearly all the 214 illnesses are fungal meningitis; two people had joint infections.

Symptoms of meningitis include severe headache, nausea, dizziness and fever. The CDC said many of the cases have been mild, and some people had strokes. Symptoms have been appearing between one and four weeks after patients got the shots, but CDC officials on Thursday warned at least one illness occurred 42 days after a shot.

White House Mulls Strike over Libya Attack

WASHINGTON (AP) • The White House has put special operations strike forces on standby and moved drones into the skies above Africa, ready to strike militant targets from Libya to Mali — if investigators can find the al-Qaida-linked group responsible for the death of the U.S. ambassador and three other Americans in Libya.

But officials say the administration, with weeks until the presidential election, is weighing whether the short-term payoff of exacting retribution on al-Qaida is worth the risk that such strikes could elevate the group's profile in the region, alienate governments the U.S. needs to fight it in the future and do little to slow the growing terror threat in North Africa.

What Romney Didn't Say

Mitt Romney gave a foreign policy speech this past week that could be boiled down to one argument: Everything wrong with the Middle East today can be traced to a lack of leadership by President Barack Obama. If this speech is any indication of the quality of Romney's thinking on foreign policy, then we should worry.

It was not sophisticated in describing the complex aspirations of the people of the Middle East. It was not accurate in describing what Obama has done or honest about the prior positions Romney has articulated. And it was not compelling or imaginative in terms of the strategic alternatives it offered. The worst message we can send right now to Middle Easterners is that their future is all bound up in what we do.

Ever since the onset of the Arab awakening, the United States has been looking for ways to connect with the Arab youths who spearheaded the revolutions; 60 percent of the Arab world is under age 25. If it were up to me, I'd put Arne Duncan, the secretary of education, in charge of U.S. policy in the Arab/Muslim world. Because we need to phase out of the Cold War business of selling arms there to keep “strongmen” on our side and in power, and we need to get into the business of sponsoring a “Race to the Top” in the Arab-Muslim world that, instead, can help empower institutions and strong people, who would voluntarily want to be on our side.

Look at the real trends in the region. In Iraq and Afghanistan, sadly, autocracy has not been replaced with democracy, but with “elective kleptocracy.” Elective kleptocracy is what you get when you replace an autocracy with an elected government before there are accountable institutions and transparency while piles of money beckon.

Meanwhile, in Tunisia, Yemen, Egypt, Iraq and Libya, we have seen the collapse of the “Mukhabarat states” – mukhabarat is Arabic for internal security services – but not yet the rise of effective democracies, with their own security organs governed by the rule of law.

As the former CIA analyst Bruce Riedel put it in a recent essay in *The Daily Beast*, “The old police states, called mukhabarat states in Arabic, were authoritarian dictatorships that ruled their people arbitrarily and poorly. But they were good at fighting terror. ... These new governments are trying to do something the Arab world has never done before – create structures where the rule of law



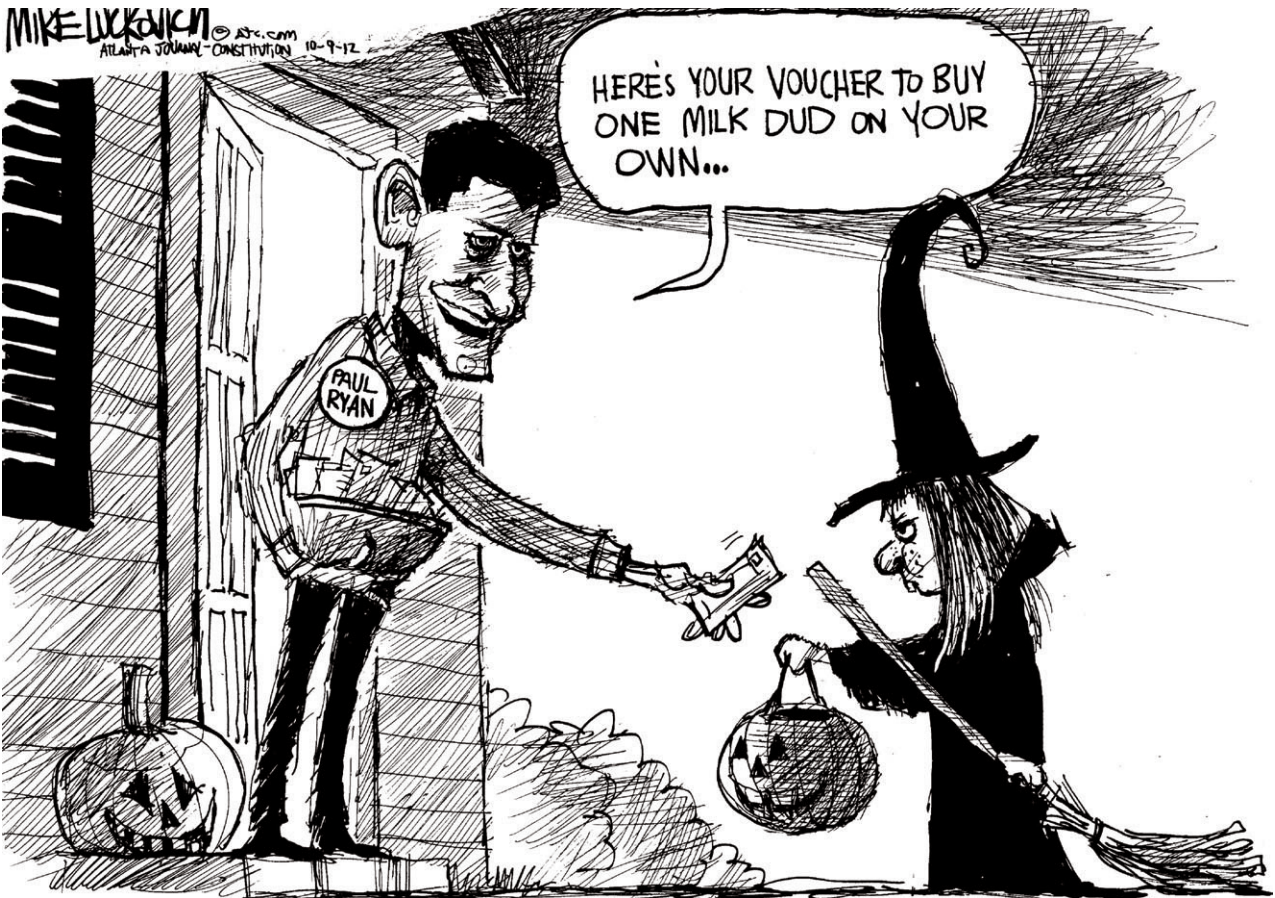
applies and the secret police are held accountable to elected officials. That is a tall order, especially when terrorists are trying to create chaos.”

At the same time, the civil war between Sunni Muslims, led by the Saudis, and Shiite Muslims, led by Iran, is blazing as hot as ever and lies at the heart of the civil war in Syria. In addition, we also have a struggle within Sunni Islam between puritanical Salafists and more traditional Muslim Brotherhood activists. And then there is the struggle between all of these Islamist parties – which argue that “Islam is the answer” for development – and the more secular mainstream forces, which may constitute the majority in most Mideast societies but are disorganized and divided.

How does the U.S. affect a region with so many cross-cutting conflicts and agendas? We start by making clear that the new Arab governments are free to choose any path they desire, but we will only support those who agree that the countries that thrive today: 1) educate their people up to the most modern standards; 2) empower their women; 3) embrace religious pluralism; 4) have multiple parties, regular elections and a free press; 5) maintain their treaty commitments; and 6) control their violent extremists with security forces governed by the rule of law. That's what we think is “the answer,” and our race to the top will fund schools and programs that advance those principles. (To their credit, Romney wants to move in this direction and Obama's Agency for International Development is already doing so.)

But when we're talking to the Muslim Brotherhood in Egypt or the new government in Libya, we cannot let them come to us and say: “We need money, but right now our politics is not right for us to do certain things. Give us a pass.” We bought that line for 50 years from their dictators. It didn't end well.

This is going to be a long struggle on many fronts. And it requires a big shift in thinking in the Arab-Muslim world, argues Husain Haqqani, the former Pakistani ambassador to the United States, from “us versus them to us versus our own problems.” And from “we are weak and poor because we were colonized” to “we were colonized because we were weak and poor.”

Reform Needed, But 'Luna Laws' Not the Answer

I am a high school math teacher and would like to comment on why I oppose the Luna Laws and plan to vote no on Propositions 1, 2 and 3.

Giving laptops to all high school students is like giving a treadmill to everyone in Idaho. If we give everyone a treadmill, we have now solved all of our health issues. We know that is absurd; the same will be true for laptops and academic performance.

The pay for performance law is extremely offensive. If School A reaches its goal for test scores and School B does not, then we should reward those excellent teachers in School A. I know for a fact that there are many excellent teachers in schools that don't reach their ISAT goals. These schools typically deal with issues beyond their control such as poverty, language barriers, lack of parental involvement and lack of adequate funding. It is wrong to categorize so called “excellent teachers” by test scores when the playing field is not even.

Tom Luna keeps saying that the teachers union (Idaho Education Association) is in the way of reform. So he wrote a law to silence a teacher's voice on topics like class size, prep time and any working condition that all adults should have a right to discuss. He has shown over time that he uses fear and intimidation to control people, just like threatening to not pay out bonuses that were earned if his laws are overturned. He is also heavily vested in K12 Inc., a for-profit online school which is under two separate investigations and produces test scores below most public schools.

I think most educators agree that reform is needed but not the way Mr. Luna went about it. We need to listen to what research says and invest in the lower grades to make sure children enter school prepared and are reading at grade level at an early age. If this is not addressed, we know that children will struggle for the remainder of their education.

In a news story on Friday, Oct. 5, the *Times-News* referred to the Idaho Education Association as “reform foes.” Please check your facts before labeling an organization that has worked tirelessly for reforms in education for more than 30 years.

Take note: In the early 1980s, the IEA worked with the State Legislature on a bill called “The Idaho School Improvement Act” (HB475) and developed career ladders, which established teacher excellence in response to the federal “A Nation at Risk” report.

In the 1990s, the IEA published “Visions of Change” outlining what workplace changes needed for student success and demonstrating the organization's prescience in all things educational. This document is still relevant today as this vision is now being propounded by current reform ideas and trends.

In 1997, the Idaho Education Association worked with the Legislature to create a charter school law. During the 1998 legislative session, they developed the Idaho Literacy Program and the Idaho Reading Initiative (HB178).

In the late '90s, they also worked together to establish Idaho's MOST Program (Maximizing Opportunities for Students and Teachers). The Legislature called on teachers to help advise and design reforms that would benefit students.

Currently, the IEA has established an Education Excellence Task Force of Idaho Educators to once again set education reform in motion.

Unlike the above reforms, the Luna reforms are not in the best interests of children. Those reforms should be defeated.

Second, Gooding has no other choice. Just like anybody who realized their car is on its last legs and repairs are no longer fiscally wise, the city looked at our irrigation system and made that same call. We don't have the funds to repair it. Period.

Finally, yes, water costs will go up. When other living expenses increase, we make changes. We use more efficient light bulbs, turn off lights, turn down thermostats, eat chicken, travel less. We adjust. If we cannot afford to live in three lots with a lawn, flowers and a garden, we downsize. Don't we tell our government to stop spending money on unessential items? Maybe we should cut some of the “pork” out of our own lives if we can't afford it.

It comes down to this – our irrigation infrastructure is not sustainable as is. Our leaders spent thousands of hours working on a solution. They identified the best solution for the needs and available resources. It's our turn to step up and tighten our belts like mature adults and accept the reality of the situation.

I appreciate the efforts done by the mayor, city council, employees and others for their dedication and hard work. Thank you.

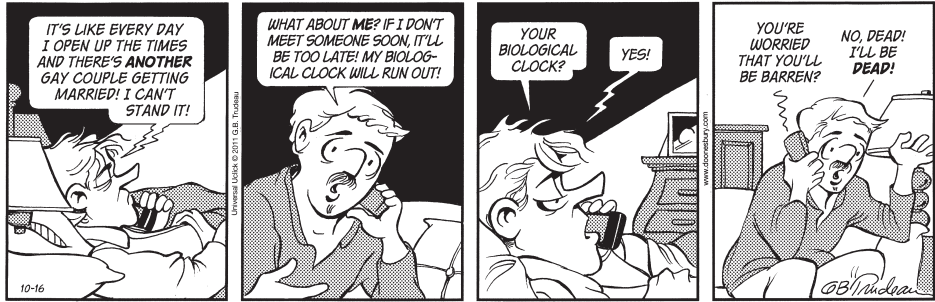

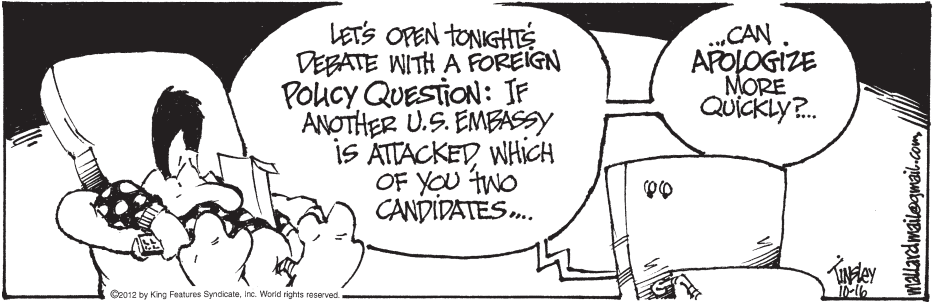

BOISE (AP) • Brandon Woolf was appointed Monday by the governor as the state's new controller after the elected office holder decided to focus on her recovery from an automobile accident.

Woolf was named temporary controller in July, with the expectation that 73-year-old Donna Jones, a Republican, would return to her job.

Jones broke her neck in a May 25 accident on Interstate 84 near Rupert. She

was initially taken to Minidoka Memorial Hospital before being flown to Boise for medical care.

Jones is now walking but said in a letter that she would retire from elected office, effective immediately, because medical officials expect her recovery to take as long as two years. She's currently staying at an assisted-living facility near St. Alphonsus Medical Center in Boise, where she has multiple physical therapy sessions every day.

notified officials at the City of Rocks National Reserve and the Cassia County Sheriff's Office, who responded and took control of the scene.

The remains are now in possession of the Cassia County Coroner's Office, McEwen said.

After the discovery of Boyd's car two decades ago, law enforcement organized a two-day search for Boyd in the area, then waited for snow to thaw to see if her body could be found. It never was, and the case remained open in the department's books.

McEwen, Gines and other Rupert police detectives have worked on the case for many years. New Rupert Police Chief James Wardle made the case a priority to solve when he took the job earlier this year.

In September, McEwen and Gines spoke to the *Times-News* about their work on the case and said they hoped to get DNA off a pair of aviator sunglasses found near Boyd's car. McEwen said Boyd's family did not remember her owning that style of sunglasses.

es. Detectives hope DNA on the glasses may lead to another person who was at the scene who might know what happened.

"Diane and I believe there's people out there who have stories to tell," McEwen said at the time. "It's just a matter of getting people to come tell them."

Realizing all their hard work and research made the discovery an "amazing moment," McEwen said.

"It was a very special moment," he said. "We came to know a lot about this lady and her life."

The discovery of the remains opens up a new dimension in the case, but more importantly could begin to give Boyd's family some closure, McEwen said.

A statement from the Rupert Police Department said Boyd's family was notified and Rupert police were working with other law enforcement officials to confirm the identity of the remains.

in favor of exploring the partnership, said Sam Fowler, executive director of the Boys and Girls Club of Magic Valley. Like the city, the club's needs are outpacing its current space.

Barron is a fan of local control. Problems in Fairfield aren't the same as they are in Ketchum or Gooding or Shoshone, he said.

Barron also wants to do away with redistricting — forming legislative districts based on population — and have each Idaho county represented by one senator and at least one representative.

In 1964, the U.S. Supreme Court said legislative districts must be based on population to adhere to the principle of "one person, one vote." Barron disagrees with the decision, and said Idaho should stand up to the federal government.

The proposed amendments, the Legislative Council's Statements of Meaning and Purpose and Result to be Accomplished, and the Statements For and the Statements Against are listed as follows:

S.J.R. 102

Text of Proposed Amendment

IN THE SENATE
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 102 BY JUDICIARY AND RULES COMMITTEE

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 5, ARTICLE X, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, RELATING TO THE CONTROL OVER STATE PRISONS; TO PROVIDE THAT THE STATE BOARD OF CORRECTION SHALL HAVE THE CONTROL, DIRECTION AND MANAGEMENT OF ADULT FELONY PROBATION AND PAROLE; STATING THE QUESTION TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE ELECTORATE; DIRECTING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO PREPARE THE STATEMENTS REQUIRED BY LAW AND DIRECTING THE SECRETARY OF STATE TO PUBLISH THE AMENDMENT AND ARGUMENTS AS REQUIRED BY LAW.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:
SECTION 1. That Section 5, Article X, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to read as follows:
Section 5. STATE PRISONS -- CONTROL OVER. The state legislature shall establish a nonpartisan board to be known as the state board of correction, and to consist of three members appointed by the governor, one member for two years, one member for four years, and one member for six years. After the appointment of the first board the term of each member appointed shall be six years. This board shall have the control, direction and management of the penitentiaries of the state, their employees and properties, and of adult felony probation and parole, with such compensation, powers, and duties as may be prescribed by law.

Ballot Question

"Shall Section 5, Article X, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to provide that the State Board of Correction shall have the control, direction and management of adult felony probation and parole?"

Legislative Council's Statement of Meaning, Purpose and Result to be Accomplished S.J.R. 102

Currently, Section 5, Article X, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho provides that the Board of Correction shall have the control, direction and management of adult probation and parole. The proposed amendment would insert the word "felony" before the word "probation" and would clarify that the Board of Correction's authority is limited to the supervision and management of felony offenders. Consequently, if the proposed constitutional amendment is adopted, the Board of Correction would not have the authority to supervise or manage misdemeanor probationers. Misdemeanor probationers would continue to be supervised by Idaho counties, as is permitted by law.

Legislative Council's Statements FOR the Proposed Amendment

1. Currently, adult felony probationers are supervised by the Board of Correction through the Idaho Department of Correction. This amendment would preserve local control of the misdemeanor probation process by clarifying that the state's role is limited to felony offenders, while counties have supervision authority over misdemeanor probationers.

Statements AGAINST the Proposed Amendment

1. Changes to the Constitution should be made only for major issues of interest to the state or in the event of a constitutional crisis.
2. This Section preserves the statewide uniform felony probation system, but does not address possible different misdemeanor probation treatment among judicial districts.

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE I, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION 23, ARTICLE I, TO PROVIDE THAT THE RIGHTS TO HUNT, FISH AND TRAP, INCLUDING BY THE USE OF TRADITIONAL METHODS, ARE A VALUED PART OF THE HERITAGE OF THE STATE OF IDAHO AND SHALL FOREVER BE PRESERVED FOR THE PEOPLE AND MANAGED THROUGH THE LAWS, RULES AND PROCLAMATIONS THAT PRESERVE THE FUTURE OF HUNTING, FISHING AND TRAPPING, TO PROVIDE THAT PUBLIC HUNTING, FISHING AND TRAPPING OF WILDLIFE SHALL BE A PREFERRED MEANS OF MANAGING WILDLIFE AND TO PROVIDE THAT THE RIGHTS SET FORTH DO NOT CREATE A RIGHT TO TRESPASS ON PRIVATE PROPERTY, SHALL NOT AFFECT RIGHTS TO DIVERT, APPROPRIATE AND USE WATER, OR ESTABLISH ANY MINIMUM AMOUNT OF WATER IN ANY WATER BODY, SHALL NOT LEAD TO A DIMINUTION OF OTHER PRIVATE RIGHTS, AND SHALL NOT PREVENT THE SUSPENSION OR REVOCATION, PURSUANT TO STATUTE ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE, OF AN INDIVIDUAL'S HUNTING, FISHING OR TRAPPING LICENSE; STATING THE QUESTION TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE ELECTORATE; DIRECTING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO PREPARE THE STATEMENTS REQUIRED BY LAW; AND DIRECTING THE SECRETARY OF STATE TO PUBLISH THE AMENDMENT AND ARGUMENTS AS REQUIRED BY LAW.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:
SECTION 1. That Article I, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a NEW SECTION, to be known and designated as Section 23, Article I, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho and to read as follows:
SECTION 23. THE RIGHTS TO HUNT, FISH AND TRAP. The rights to hunt, fish and trap, including by the use of traditional methods, are a valued part of the heritage of the State of Idaho and shall forever be preserved for the people and managed through the laws, rules and proclamations that preserve the future of hunting, fishing and trapping. Public hunting, fishing and trapping of wildlife shall be a preferred means of managing wildlife. The rights set forth herein do not create a right to trespass on private property, shall not affect rights to divert, appropriate and use water, or establish any minimum amount of water in any water body, shall not

lead to a diminution of other private rights, and shall not prevent the suspension or revocation, pursuant to statute enacted by the Legislature, of an individual's hunting, fishing or trapping license.

Ballot Question

"Shall Article I, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended by the addition of a New Section 23, to provide that the rights to hunt, fish and trap, including by the use of traditional methods, are a valued part of the heritage of the State of Idaho and shall forever be preserved for the people and managed through the laws, rules and proclamations that preserve the future of hunting, fishing and trapping; to provide that public hunting, fishing and trapping of wildlife shall be a preferred means of managing wildlife; and to provide that the rights set forth do not create a right to trespass on private property, shall not affect rights to divert, appropriate and use water, or establish any minimum amount of water in any water body, shall not lead to a diminution of other private rights, and shall not prevent the suspension or revocation, pursuant to statute enacted by the Legislature, of an individual's hunting, fishing or trapping license?"

This proposed amendment would provide that the rights to hunt, fish and trap are a valued part of Idaho's heritage and would preserve these rights for the people of Idaho and manage these rights through the laws of the state. This amendment specifies that hunting, fishing and trapping shall be a preferred means of managing wildlife. This amendment does not create a right to trespass or affect rights to divert or appropriate water. This amendment also will not prevent the suspension or revocation of licenses issued by the state for hunting, fishing or trapping.

Legislative Council's Statements FOR the Proposed Amendment

1. Hunting, fishing and trapping have long been practiced by the people of Idaho, and this amendment preserves Idaho's great sporting heritage.
2. Hunters, fishers and trappers help sustain a healthy ecosystem, and this amendment provides sportsmen meaningful and permanent protection to hunt, fish and trap.
3. Without constitutional protection, bans on certain types of hunting and trapping have been successful in other states and have incrementally eroded sportsmen's rights.

Statements AGAINST the Proposed Amendment

1. Future legislation to address public concerns regarding inhumane and unsportsmanlike practices could be affected by this amendment.
2. This amendment is unnecessary because the rights to hunt, fish and trap are not threatened and are already protected by law.
3. The Idaho Department of Fish and Game's wildlife management decisions could be constitutionally challenged as a result of this amendment.

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DA May Seek Indictment in Firefighter-Hitman Case

LAS VEGAS • A prosecutor said Monday he may ask a grand jury to indict a Las Vegas firefighter and the homeless man he's accused of hiring for the fatal hammer bludgeoning of the firefighter's estranged cocktail waitress wife.

With media and two co-workers of the slain woman in the courtroom, firefighter George Miguel Tiaffay spoke only during his brief arraignment to correct how the judge pronounced his name.

Neither Tiaffay nor co-defendant Noel Scott Stevens was asked to enter a plea. That would come when and if a grand jury hands up an indictment or Las Vegas Justice of the Peace Deborah Lippis determines there is enough evidence for trial in state court.

Police allege that Tiaffay paid Stevens \$600 and provided the key to Shauna Tiaffay's apartment weeks before the 46-year-old mother of an 8-year-old daughter was killed as she returned home from a mid-night shift at the Palms Casino Hotel. George Tiaffay was at work at the time as a Las Vegas city firefighter.

George Tiaffay had their daughter with him when he arrived at Shauna Tiaffay's apartment at a little after 9 a.m. Sept. 29, discovered the body and summoned police.

Medics told investigators they couldn't tell if Shauna Tiaffay had been shot or bludgeoned, and the mangled fingers on her right

hand bore defensive wounds.

The alleged murder conspiracy unraveled after Stevens, who went by the name "Greyhound," allegedly bragged about the slaying to someone who contacted police. Police said Stevens later told another witness that he had been promised \$20,000 for the killing.

"To think something so cruel was done to her," Palms Casino Hotel co-worker Lacey Green said outside the courtroom on Monday. "It's hard to believe."

Green called Shauna Tiaffay's daughter "Shauna's whole world and life."

The judge scheduled a Jan. 24 evidentiary hearing for George Tiaffay, 40, and Stevens, 37, on multiple felony charges including murder, conspiracy, burglary and robbery that could qualify for the death penalty. A decision whether to seek capital punishment would come when and if the case reaches state court.

Tiaffay's lawyers, Robert Langford and Maggie McLetchie, and two public defenders appointed for Stevens, Curtis Brown and Dan Silverstein, didn't object to the long preliminary hearing date. The defense teams may seek the release of the two men on bond in coming weeks.

Chief Deputy Clark County District Attorney Marc DiGiacomo told the judge he may seek an indictment that would make the preliminary hearing moot. Prosecutors will decide later whether to seek the death penalty.

Suspect in Wyo. Kidnapping Won't Fight Extradition

BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP) • A Montana man faces charges of kidnapping and assaulting an 11-year-old girl in Wyoming after police said he lured her to his car by saying he needed help finding a missing puppy, court records obtained Monday state.

Jesse Paul Speer, 39, was taken into custody Saturday in Belgrade, Mont., and held for Wyoming authorities. He faces extradition on charges of kidnapping, aggravated assault and felony use of a weapon, the records state.

Speer was being held without bond and waived his right to an extradition hearing during a brief court appearance Monday in Bozeman. He has not entered a plea.

Speer was dressed in an orange prison jump suit and only spoke to give Judge Holly Brown his name and to answer yes and no questions.

Public defender Eric Brewer told Brown that law enforcement officials had confiscated Speer's eyeglasses and questioned him without an attorney present.

Brewer requested that officers not interrogate Speer any further without a lawyer. Brewer didn't know when Speer would be sent to Wyoming.

Authorities have looked into a possible connection between the case and the disappearance of Jessica Ridgeway, a 10-year-old girl in Colorado, but now say they don't think the cases are related. Jessica's body was found Wednesday in a park about 7 miles from her suburban Denver home. No arrests have been made.

Speer approached children in Cody on Oct. 8 and asked for help finding his lost dog, police Detective Jonathan Beck wrote in a statement. The girl initially was receptive but then changed her mind, prompting Speer to pull a pistol and motion for her to get into his SUV, Beck wrote.

Speer most recently lived

in Manhattan, a small community about 20 miles west of Bozeman, said Gallatin County Sheriff Brian Gootkin. He declined to release any personal information about Speer.

Speer was arrested without incident in Belgrade, near Manhattan. Authorities declined to provide any further details of the arrest.

S. Dakota Executes Inmate Who Killed Prison Guard

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. • A South Dakota inmate has been put to death for killing a prison guard by beating him with a pipe and cover-

ing his head in plastic wrap during a failed escape attempt.

Fifty-year-old Eric Robert received lethal injection Monday night in South Dakota's first execution since 2007. That had been the state's first execution in

60 years.

Robert was put to death in the same prison where he killed guard Ronald "RJ" Johnson in April 2011. Robert was serving an 80-year sentence on a kidnapping conviction when he and inmate Rodney Berget attacked

Johnson, killing the guard on his 63rd birthday. Robert and Berget were apprehended before leaving the grounds.

Robert pleaded guilty and asked for the death penalty, saying he would kill again if he wasn't executed.

Constantly-updating Twitter and Facebook streams of finger pointing and shock lasted well into the next day, a proverbial battleground, where fans cried in unison against this great crime. Based on the backlash, you would have thought the Seahawks had ousted the Packers for a spot in the Super Bowl.

It was a moment in the sports world wherein everyone remembers where they

were when it happened, and within days the months-long referee lockdown came to an end. No doubt Facebook and Twitter played a small role in that.

For me, Twitter is often a window into worlds I don't have immediate access to, like that of professional athletes or Hollywood. I find it fascinating I can get unfiltered commentary on events as impactful as this straight from those involved, as well as various other perspectives. And even though I was overwhelmed by the avalanche of opinions about the bad call, results from a study conducted this February and March by sports media group Perform indicated that the outcry had the potential to be even bigger.

The study revealed that one in four American sports fans leverage social media to stay close to their sport preferences, but of those, only 33 percent of them use Twitter to do so. I would have expected the number of Twitter users to be higher.

For me, Twitter gives me the opportunity to make a different kind of connection with athletes.

I've never had a particular reason to root for the Minnesota Vikings, but I do now. These days I root for their punter, Chris Kluwe. A few weeks ago, I got wind of his recent advocacy for legalizing same-sex marriage and followed

Dangerous Duo Key to No. 24 Boise St. Ground Game

BOISE • Boise State is rediscovering the beauty of having two running backs to move the chains and wear down opposing defenses.

In the last three games, D.J. Harper and Jay Ajayi have given foes fits and have carried the load for an offense still working through the kinks of a new quarterback and young receivers.

Harper, a sixth-year senior, and Ajayi, a redshirt freshman, proved the point again Saturday in No. 24 Boise State's 20-10 victory over Fresno State. The tandem combined for 233 yards rushing, more than two-thirds of the team's total offensive output, against a Bulldog defense ranked third in the Mountain West Conference for yards rushing allowed.

Harper had 122 yards on 21 carries and a touchdown, his third game with more than 100 yards, while Ajayi added 91 yards on a career-high 15 carries.

"For us to run for five

yards per carry and over 200 yards ... that's progress," said coach Chris Petersen.

Harper, who has had two seasons ended by knee injuries, is averaging 91.5 yards per game this season as the workhorse. But Petersen has always preferred having more than one tailback to share the load and throw defenses off balance by having to adjust to different run-

ning styles.

The combination of Harper and Ajayi is doing just that.

Ajayi, at 6 feet, 220 pounds, provides a big, tackle-breaking presence on the inside, but he also has the ability to bounce outside for long gains. Ajayi is averaging 8.1 yards per carry this season in four games and had his best performance

three weeks ago at New Mexico when he rushed for 118 yards on six carries, including a 71-yard run. His performance Saturday earned the team's offensive player of the week honor.

Harper is more elusive, and his quickness enables him to exploit even the smallest of holes at the line of scrimmage. He showed that burst against Fresno State (4-3, 2-1 Mountain West) when he hit a hole in the line, spun away from a defender and sprinted down the sideline for a 28-yard touchdown that put the Broncos up 17-0 just before the half.

Harper is also a threat in the passing game and is tied for fourth on the team with 11 catches for 86 yards and a touchdown.

"You have to have a 1-2 punch," Petersen said after Saturday's win. "You're not going to have the type of running game we want to have if you don't."

The Broncos probably wouldn't be 5-1 without

GOODING • Gooding state champion cross-country runner Rachel Youren remembers watching the speck-sized middle school runners race around the other side of the track a few years back.

One speck didn't get much bigger as he came around the corner. The one in front.

"I just remember that he was truly small," Youren said. "But fast."

Eliseo Garcia is a photo-finish taller than 5 feet. He's one carbo-load over 110 pounds. Garcia is a sophomore, and he's the greatest runner Gooding cross-country coach Kent Seifert has seen in his 21 years at the school, a big deal considering it just graduated standout Michael McHan.

"You don't see a lot of un-

derclassmen at the top of the leaderboard," Seifert said. "He's a small guy and he has a lot of growth to go and a lot of strength to gain. An 18-year-old is going to beat a 15-year-old most of the time."

Garcia has a talent. According to his coach, he's not fast on his feet — yet. He's getting faster. He doesn't have the arm, core and leg strength other runners have — yet. But Garcia plans on hitting the weight room and growing a few inches.

Instead, at least for now, Garcia is winning with something else.

"(Long-distance running) talent is an ability to know what your pace is," Seifert said. "It's an ability to know your own strength and weaknesses. You have to be like a Schnauzer on the leg. You have to go after it; you have to take a chance. With this guy, his only weakness is

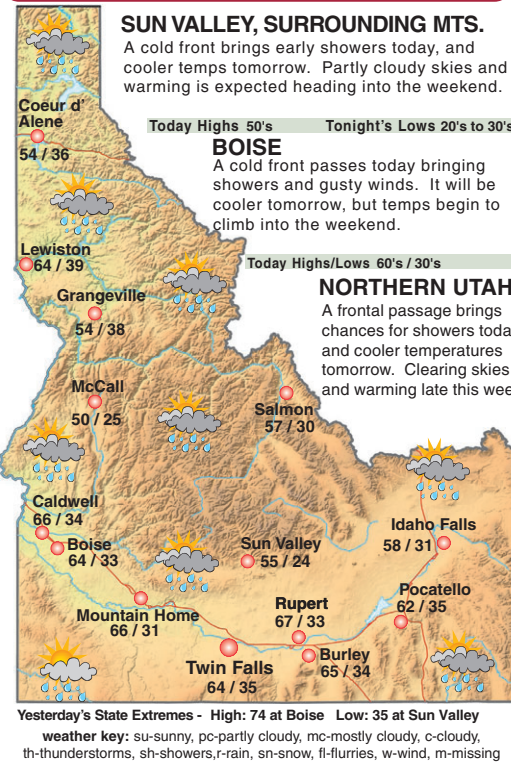

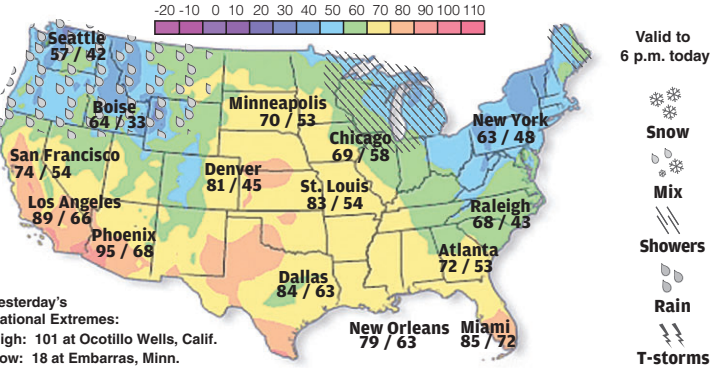

him on Twitter. What followed in his 140-character posts was a wealth of insight into his character and personality. The result was that I made an emotional connection to a player I might not have made otherwise and I am now invested in his success. Regardless of whether he stays with the Vikings for his entire career

or is traded, I'll be watching him.

I'm not suggesting I forego a player's athleticism or capability, but there's no doubt I'm paying far more attention to him than I did before. It's the same reason I love watching HBO's *Hard Knocks*: it gives me another level of insight into player personalities. I identify with them when I realize we share beliefs.

In another example, as a graduate of the University of

Nevada, I feel a special bit of pride when Colin Kaepernick trots onto the field for the San Francisco 49ers. His talent isn't overshadowed because we're fellow alumni, it's simply enhanced.

Twitter has the ability to be both an outlet for fans and players (as evidenced by the Seattle-Green Bay debacle) as well as forge stronger connections between the two groups. I don't doubt this access to player insight — on topics

other than what their team needs to do in order to win the next game — has the ability to cultivate more dedicated fans, men and women alike. It has the potential to transform lackluster occasional viewers into the kind of fans who post profanities toward replacement refs in response to bad calls.

Perhaps players feel less

scrutinized over Twitter, or perhaps they feel empowered by their platform, but for some reason they feel comfortable enough to give their fans more.

As a writer, I would love to ask Oakland A's GM Billy Beane face to face if he was scared to take a chance on a different recruiting approach than the "Money-ball" method. I would love to

sit down with Venus and Serena Williams to chat about women in tennis being scrutinized for grunting on the tennis courts. I'd love to ask Kaepernick his favorite memories from Reno. But for now, I'm content to cultivate my respect for athletes from the Twitter sidelines.

And that's OK, because plane ticket prices these days are ridiculous.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Tim Bourke of Canberra, Australia, spotted this fine play in a delicate 4-3 fit from the Transnational Open Teams at the last world championships.

Against four spades, West led the spade jack to the seven, two and king. At trick two, declarer played the heart nine around to East's king. That player switched to the diamond five to his partner's king, on which declarer unblocked the 10 from dummy.

Now West returned the spade six. To maintain trump control and to cater to a possible 4-2 trump break, declarer played the eight from dummy. East won with the nine and persevered with the three to dummy's queen. Declarer cashed the spade ace to draw the last trump, then finessed in diamonds, cashed the diamond ace (dropping the jack), then played the diamond queen. The clubs provided the rest of the tricks, giving 420 to North-South.

It was impossible to see, but had East continued with a top spade at trick three, the combination of the bad lies in spades and diamonds would have been too much for declarer. Of course, the auction had given him no chance to get this right.

But declarer had deviated from the winning line — one that he really should have spotted. Declarer's best play is to duck trick one! Now the defenders cannot do anything. Maybe a club shift would be best, attacking declarer's communications, but so long as he plays diamonds for two tricks, one way or another he is home.

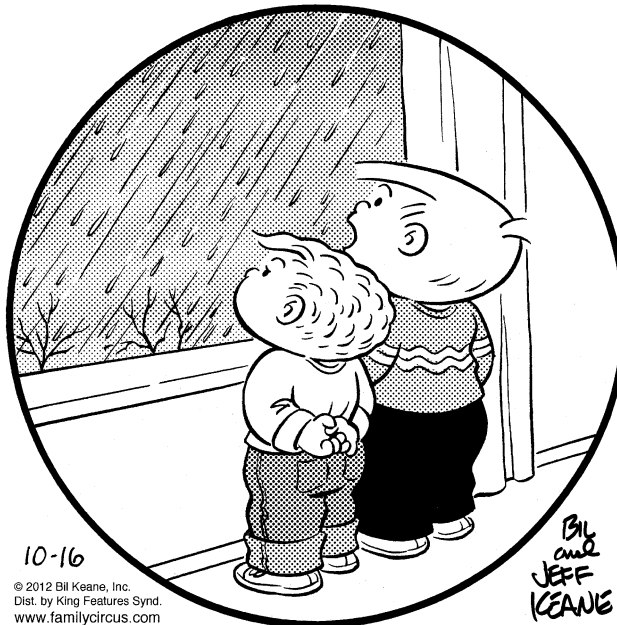

Here, a jump to four hearts is a splinter agreeing clubs and setting up a game-force. As you can see, slam might be cold facing the right minimum hand, and you owe it to your partner not to give up on it just because both opponents are bidding.

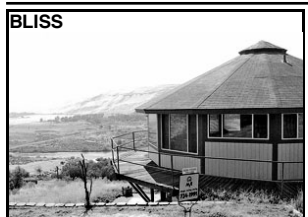

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1793, during the French Revolution, Marie Antoinette, the queen of France, was beheaded.

In 1859, radical abolitionist John Brown led a group of 21 men in a raid on Harpers Ferry in western Virginia. (Ten of Brown's men were killed and five escaped. Brown and six followers ended up being captured; all were executed.)

In 1901, Booker T. Washington dined at the White House as the guest of President Theodore Roosevelt, whose invitation to the black educator sparked controversy.

In 1912, the Boston Red Sox won the World Series, defeating the New York Giants in Game 8, 3-2 (Game 2 had ended in a tie on account of darkness).

In 1942, the ballet "Rodeo", with music by Aaron Copland and choreography by Agnes de Mille, premiered at New York's Metropolitan Opera House.

In 1943, Chicago Mayor Edward J. Kelly officially opened the city's new subway system during a ceremony at the State and Madison street station.

In 1952, the Charles Chaplin film "Limelight" premiered in London.

In 1962, the New York Yankees won the World Series, defeating the San Francisco Giants in Game 7 at Candlestick Park, 1-0.

In 1972, a twin-engine plane carrying U.S. House Majority Leader Hale Boggs, D-La., and U.S. Rep. Nick Begich, D-Alaska, disappeared while flying over a remote region of Alaska; the aircraft was never found.

In 1978, the College of Cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church chose Cardinal Karol Wojtyla to be the new pope; he took the name John Paul II.

In 1987, a 58-1/2-hour drama in Midland, Texas, ended happily as rescuers freed Jessica McClure, an 18-month-old girl trapped in an abandoned well.

In 1991, a deadly shooting rampage took place in Killeen, Texas, as George Hennard opened fire at a Luby's Cafeteria, killing 23 people before taking his own life.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush signed a congressional resolution authorizing war against Iraq. The White House announced that North Korea had disclosed it had a nuclear weapons program.

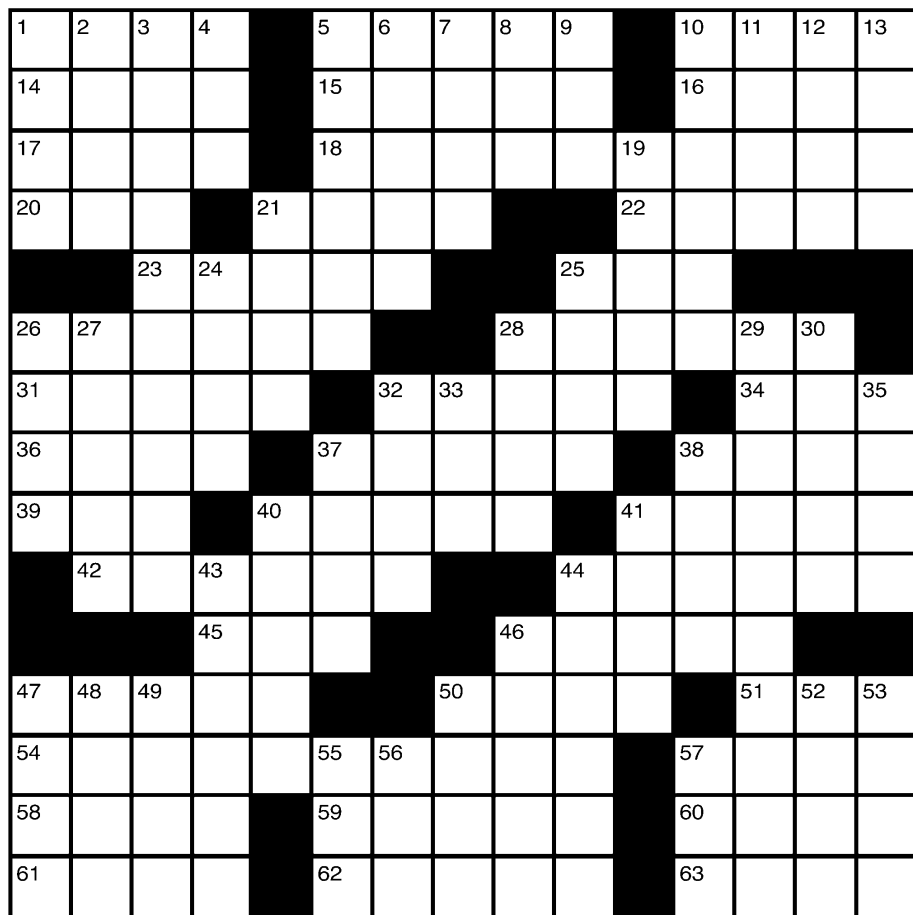
