 Best Choice for District 25The two candidates running for Senate seat A in District 25 impressed the TimesNews editorial board with their knowledge of state issues and vision for the fuure. The race pits Democrat Scott McClure against Republican Jim Patrick. While we think the district will be well represented no matter who wins, Patrick wins our endorsement.
A farmer for 40 years, Jim Patrick possesses first-hand knowledge of his constituents' needs and the problems Magic Valley agriculture will face in the future. Chief among those concerns is aquifer management
Patrick envisions a conservation system based on monetary value, where unused water rights can be sold to fellow farmers. That, combined with supporting state resources for water studies and aquifer recharge, makes Patrick a strong advocate for the Magic Valley's most precious resource.
As a founding member of Magic Valley Bank, Patrick is ready if re-elected to examine lien law for ag loans following some confusion earlier this year over who should have first lien on dairy cows. And Patrick promised to continue to be an advocate for ag research funding, if the money is available.
We believe his experience farming the Magic Valley - through good times and bad - will make him a strong voice for local farmers.
Patrick failed to impress, however, in the areas of corporate taxes and education. He favored repealing the personal property tax for businesses in order to spur growth, but couldn't provide many specifics on a plan of action. The same went for the Luna Laws, which he supports, even while admitting they're not perfect.
Education was a strong focus for McClure. He sees education as the key to economic development. He supports better funding for $\mathrm{K}-12$ educa tion to post-secondary training for jobs available in the Magic Valley. He pointed out that the Legislature took control of education funding, only to cut it by 19 percent.
McClure would like to see the state and universities enter into partnerships with local processors in order to provide better training for workers. He said employers are putting a higher value on experience and education, and training work ers for those positions would encourage companies to come to the area.
While we believe Patrick will be the best advocate for District 25 interests, we encourage McClure - a fiscal conservative, Magic Valley native and business owner - to stay involved whenever and wherever possible.

AMSTERDAM (AP) • Thieves broke into a Rotterdam museum on Tuesday and walked off with works from the likes of Picasso, Monet, Gauguin and Matissepotentially worth hundreds of millions.
Police haven't said how they
pulled off the early hours heist, pulled off the early hours heist,
but an expert who tracks stolen art said the robbers clearly knew what they were after.
"Those thieves got one hell of a haul"," said Chris Marinello, who directsthe Art Loss Register. The heist at the Kunsthal mu-
seum is one of the largest in years seum is one of the largest in years
inthe Netherlands, and is a stunning blow for the private Triton Foundation collection, which was being exhibited publicly as a group for the first time "It's every museum director's worst nightmare," said Kunstha
director Emily Ansenk, who had been in Istanbul on business but returned immediately. News of the theft "struck like abomb," she said at a press conference in the museum's cafe. She declined to reveal any details of how the
thieves got in and out with the thieves got in and out with the protected, other than describing its security as "state of the art"and "functional." Willem van Hassel, the museum's chairman, said its security systems are automated, and do not use guards on site.

In 20 In 2002 , the Idaho State Departcreditation as an organic certifying agency from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Organic Pro gram. For organic certification, a food producer or handler must sub-
mit an application
 sales and undergo an on sales and undergo an on-
site inspection and sometimes unannounced inspections. On Oct. 11, agriculture investigator Kim Flynn traveled from Boise to Twin
Falls to look at the organic side of Soranco Bean Products Inc. She does about 80 inspections a year across Idaho. It usually takes Flynn two weeks after her inspection to put together her report. If all the company's orcertified as an organic handler with its certificate arriving in about six weeks. Even though only about 3 percent of Soranco Bean Products is organic, the inspection is still throughout. It lasted more than four
on, general manager of Soranco, talking about documentation. Every year companies that either grow or handle organic products are required to undergo an inspection. It always starts with a meeting to go
over a lot of paperwork that proves they are providing organic produce, crops or meat.
The paperwork provides trace ability and protects the integrity o the organic product, Flynn said.

Here, the beans are not grown by Soranco, but by a certified organ ic grower. From the time they ar rive on a truck until they leave they are tracked with a form and signature.

In today's deal, you have bid to what looks like an excellent no-trump slam. North's jump to six may seem precipitous, but he has so many high cards that he would be a pessimist not to drive to slam.

Since you have nine tricks outside hearts, three tricks from that source will give you your contract. However, while it might appear that all you need to do is find one heart honor onside, you will need to exercise considerable care in managing your entries. Can you see why?
The point is that you may need to take three finesses in hearts, so you should arrange your play of the spade suit with this in you play the spade king and overtake with the ace The first heart take wine loses to West's king and finesse loses to West's king and you win the club return. You then lead the spade 10, overtaking with dummy's queen when West follows low.

If spades break 3-2, you can afford this double overtake; the spade jack will draw West's last spade. If instead East began with a singleton spade, you will have cleared the way for a finesse of dummy's eight! Let's say that East does indeed show out on the second spade. You take a second heart finesse, which wins, and return to dummy with a marked finesse of the spade eight. After cashing the spade jack and spade three, you finesse for the third time in hearts and mark up your slam.
