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Hassani Challenges Carter for County Sheriff

TWIN FALLS • Two men with more then two decades of law enforcement experience each seek the title this fall of Twin Falls County sheriff.

The sheriff's current annual salary is \$73,700.

Incumbent Sheriff Tom Carter,

a Republican, said he's accomplished the goals he set when he took office and is ready to take on new ones. Challenger Kelly Hassani, who is running as an independent, thinks it's time for a change in Twin Falls County and believes he's the one to do it.

Hassani was a senior investigator at the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office until he was dismissed in May. Hassani said he was injured in an on-duty car crash, and the long-term effects required certain accommodations at work he said the sheriff's office would not provide. He is currently still pursuing a lawsuit against the county and said the Idaho Human Rights Commission is investigating.

"The accommodations were

not practical for a patrolman, that's about all I can say, but I did not terminate him," Carter said back in May.

This fall, Hassani said he believes the sheriff's department is too topheavy and wants to "invert the pyramid" of the office, putting deputies and citizens at the top and the sheriff at the bottom.

Gooding to Send Water Debt Request to Judge

GOODING • Despite opposition from residents, the city of Gooding will file a petition to finance water system improvements without a public vote.

Gooding City Council members voted unanimously Monday night to seek a 5th District Court judge's permission to take on long-term debt for the project.

The estimated project cost is about \$9.45 million, though that doesn't include potential grant funding.

Mayor Duke Morton told the Times-News there isn't a timetable yet for the judicial process.

After city officials submit information to the attorneys handling the petition, "they'll give us a timetable back," he said.

During a quiet meeting Monday, there wasn't any discussion before the council voted.

Storm Knocks Out Water Pumps, Thousands Lose Power

TWIN FALLS • A severe thunderstorm swept through the Magic Valley on Tuesday afternoon, spreading debris and knocking out power in many locations throughout the region, including the water pumps for the city of Twin Falls.

The wind storm knocked out the pumps that bring water out of the canyon for about an hour, said city of Twin Falls public information officer Joshua Palmer. The city had a two-day supply of water at the time. Palmer said workers could

have switched on the power to the pumps sooner, but approached the situation cautiously because they didn't want to blow any fuses.

The storm also downed trees and power lines across the Magic Valley, causing about 11,500 power outages in the area. As of 6 p.m. Tuesday, there were still 6,100 homes without power with no estimated time of restoration, said Idaho Powspokesman Kevin Winslow.

Winslow said crews were scattered throughout the entire coverage area and would work through the night

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Environmental Group Sues Over Idaho River Dredging

BOISE • An environmental group said Tuesday it had sued the state after the governor and other officials approved a plan to dredge the Salmon River for gold an operation some contend will harm migrating fish habitat and create hazards for anglers.

The Idaho Conservation League announced it had asked a 4th District Court judge to require the state to approve a reclamation plan before signing off on any mining projects.

In September, Grangeville miner Mike Conklin was awarded a five-year lease by the Idaho Land Board, giving him sole access to a half-mile stretch of river about 13 miles downstream of Riggins where he can mine the gravel for precious

The Boise-based environmental group contends Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and the other board members ignored laws meant to protect Idaho's water, arguing that miners who use gasoline-powered dredges often leave big holes in the riverbed that damage valuable habitat for salmon and steelhead.

"Before anyone goes onto our lands which need to be protected for the benefit of water quality, fisheries and wildlife, and public health and safety, miners need to submit a restoration plan before they're allowed access onto these properties," said Jonathan Oppenheimer of the environmental group. "If there's anywhere there ought to be a high level of scrutiny, it's in the bed of the Salmon River, which is one of the gems of Idaho."

Staff members at the Idaho Department of Lands who oversee mineral leases with proceeds and royalties that benefit public schools, contend the league is misinterpreting state rules and laws governing suction dredge mining and reclamation requirements.

Eric Wilson, minerals program manager, told the Land Board in August that regulation of recreational dredgers such as Conklin

suction falls to the Idaho Department of Water Resources, and the Department of Lands only has jurisdiction over awarding a lease.

On Tuesday, Wilson declined to comment on pending litigation

Some anglers have also opposed Conklin's permit, saying it will hurt popular steelhead fishing areas and create hazardous holes where people could fall in and drown.



As a founding member of Magic Valley Bank, Patrick is ready if re-elected to examine lien law for ag loans following some confusion earlier this year over who should have first lien on dairy cows. And Patrick promised to continue to be an advocate for ag research funding, if the money is available.

We believe his experience farming the Magic Valley - through good times and bad - will make him a strong voice for local farmers.

Patrick failed to impress, however, in the areas of corporate taxes and education. He favored repealing the personal property tax for businesses in order to spur growth, but couldn't provide many specifics on a plan of action. The same went for the Luna Laws, which he supports, even while admitting they're not perfect.

Education was a strong focus for McClure. He sees education as the key to economic development. He supports better funding for K-12 education to post-secondary training for jobs available in the Magic Valley. He pointed out that the Legislature took control of education funding, only to cut it by 19 percent.

McClure would like to see the state and universities enter into partnerships with local processors in order to provide better training for workers. He said employers are putting a higher value on experience and education, and training workers for those positions would encourage companies to come to the area.

While we believe Patrick will be the best advocate for District 25 interests, we encourage Mc-Clure — a fiscal conservative, Magic Valley native and business owner — to stay involved whenever and wherever possible.

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





Family of Missing Woman Thanks Investigators

RUPERT (AP) • The family of a Rupert woman missing since December 1988 on Tuesday thanked investigators who believe they've found her remains.

Norine Boyd, mother of three from Rupert, was last seen on Dec. 20, 1988, about two weeks after police obtained a warrant charging her with stealing \$992 from a local man.

On Friday, Rupert Police Det. Jeff McEwen and criminal analyst Diane Gines were pursuing information connected to the disappearance with a cadaver dog and personnel trained in forensic anthropology when they discovered human remains in the City of Rocks area.

McEwen told the *Times*-News on Monday that evidence at the scene indicates there's "a good probability" the remains are those of Norine Boyd.

The Rupert Police Department told Boyd's family about the discovery, and the family issued a prepared statement Tuesday morning.

"The family of Norine Kay Boyd would like to thank all the officers and Diane Gines for all the hours and hours of investigation they performed to give the family closure after 24 years and bring the body of Norine Boyd home. Rest in Peace, Norine. You are finally back home," the family's statement said.

Confirmation of the remains as Boyd's still awaits the results of a DNA test.

Ysursa Likely to Demand Donor Names Ahead of Vote

BOISE • Secretary of State Ben Ysursa says he's likely to demand that a group helping finance the campaign to save Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's education reforms reveal the names of its contributors.

Education Voters of Idaho collected at least \$200,000 to promote Luna's reforms ahead of the Nov. 6 referendum, but says it doesn't have to disclose donors because it's a nonprofit organization under federal tax law.

On Monday, Ysursa said the group has yet to provide a legal explanation for why it's not a political action committee required by Idaho's 1974 "Sunshine laws" to disclose donors ahead of the election.

He said it appears to violate what he calls his office's "11th Commandment:" that political groups need to tell the public where they get their money from.

"It eviscerates the law if we don't get disclosure," Ysursa said in an interview inside his 2nd floor Capitol offices. "We personally do not believe there's a doubt

Absent a response from the group, Ysursa said he'll seek

"legal remedies" that could include a request for a court order for it to reveal its donors. He expects to act this week.

Susan Buxton, Education Voters of Idaho's attorney, didn't return a call seeking comment Monday.

John Foster, a lobbyist who founded the group, declined to comment.

Education Voters of Idaho was incorporated as a nonprofit, 501(c)(4) group under federal Internal Revenue Service laws. As such, Foster has said its contributors are shielded from disclosure, to protect their free-speech

Its involvement in the campaign came to light when it gave at least \$200,000 to a related political action committee, Parents for Education Reform, to finance broadcast ads touting the reforms. Parents for Education Reform disclosed the contribution in its state filings last week.

Despite any federal tax status of Education Voters of Idaho, Ysursa said he's convinced it's still got a duty to disclosure its financiers under state law.

"I haven't seen any IRS provision that would supersede state law on disclosure,"

Fact Check: Ad Uses Union Comment Out of Context

BOISE (AP) • A new ad promoting an Idaho education overhaul recycles a 3year-old speech from a retired union leader, using a portion of it out of context to bash those trying to repeal the changes on Nov. 6.

The advertisement unveiled Monday on the Internet and Idaho television and radio station uses an excerpt from a 2009 speech by former National Education Association top lawyer Bob Chanin.

It claims Chanin's words illustrate why the union has spent more than \$1 million to defeat a series of new education laws promoted by Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna.

In the excerpt, Chanin says, "It is not because of the merit of our positions. It is not because we care about children. And it is not because we have a vision of a great public school for every child. It's because we have power."

The reference to union power underpins the overhaul proponents' message that out-of-state labor organizations are working to kill Luna's changes - not to help students but because unions fear an erosion of their clout.

But Chanin's retirement speech, to union members in San Diego, predated Luna's 2011 "Students Come First" plan by two years.

Poll: School Reforms Face Ballot Box Test

BOISE (AP) • A new *Idaho* endum and a variety of other Statesman poll of likely voters across the state shows that a series of laws overhauling public education faces a tough test at the ballot box next month.

The newspaper poll released Sunday, less than four weeks before the Nov. 6 general election, also shows that support is soft for three public school propositions among respondents who identify as Republicans.

The poll, conducted by Washington D.C., -based Mason-Dixon Polling and Research, questioned respondents on the education referpolitical and state issues. The poll was conducted last week and is based on interviews of 625 voters who said they were likely to take part in the election and has a margin for error of no more than plus or minus 4 percentage points.

The newspaper reported that opponents outnumber supporters on two of the three propositions on the ballot.

On Proposition 1, which centers around a 2011 law limiting teacher contract negotiations to pay and benefits, the poll found that 42 percent would vote to reject the law compared to 38 percent who support it. About 20 percent of voters say they are still undecided.

For Proposition 2, the measure asking voters to reject or uphold the merit pay law for teachers, the newspaper reports that 42 percent support the plan while 39 percent would reject it and 19 percent remain undecided.

The poll also shows those against Proposition 3 outnumber those who like it. Prop 3 focuses on a plan to give computers to high school students and teachers and require students to take online courses before graduation. The poll found that 47 percent of likely voters would reject the measure, while 40 percent are in favor and 13 percent have yet to make up their mind.

Obama, Romney in Crackling Debate

HEMPSTEAD, N.Y. (AP) • An aggressive President Barack Obama accused challenger Mitt Romney of favoring a "one-point plan" to help the rich in America and playing politics with the recent deadly terrorist attack in Libya in a Tuesday night debate crackling with energy and emotion just three weeks before the election.

Romney pushed back hard, saying the middle class "has been crushed over the last four years," that 23 million Americans are struggling to find work and that the death of the U.S. ambassador to Libya was part of an unraveling of the administration's foreign

The president was feistier from the outset than he had been in their initial encounter two weeks ago, when he turned in a listless performance that sent shudders through his supporters and helped fuel a rise by Romney in opinion polls nationally and in some battleground states.

Obama and Romney disagreed, forcefully and repeatedly – about taxes, measures to reduce the deficit, energy, pay equity for women and health care as well as foreign policy across 90 minutes of a town-hall style debate.

Immigration prompted yet another clash, Romney saying Obama had failed to pursue the comprehensive legislation he promised at the dawn of his administration, and the president saying Republican obstinacy made a deal impossible.

Romney gave as good as he got. "You'll get your chance in a moment. I'm still speaking," the former Massachusetts governor said at one point while Obama was mid-sentence, drawing a gasp from the audience. He said the president's policies had failed to jumpstart the economy and had cramped energy production.

The open-stage format left the two men free to stroll

freely across a red-carpeted stage, and they did. Their clashes crackled with energy and tension, and the crowd watched raptly as the two sparred while struggling to appear calm and affable before a national television

audience. Both men had rehearsed extensively for the encounter, a turnabout for Obama. "I had a bad night," the president conceded, days after he and Romney shared a stage for the first time, in Denver. His aides made it known he didn't intend to be as deferential to his challenger this time, and the presidential party decamped for a resort in Williamsburg, Va., for rehearsals that consumed the better part of

three days. Romney rehearsed in

Massachusetts and again after arriving on Long Island on debate day, with less to make up for.

Asked Tuesday night by one member of the audience how he would differ from former President George W. Bush, the last Republican to hold the office, Romney said, "We are different people and these are different times."

Though the questions were from undecided voters inside the hall - in a deeply Democratic state – the audience that mattered most watched on television and was counted in the tens of millions. Crucially important: viewers in the nine battlegrounds where the race is likely to be settled.

The final debate, next Monday in Florida, will be devoted to foreign policy.

Secretary of State Clinton Takes Responsibility for Attack in Libya

WASHINGTON • As criticism mounted on the Obama administration, Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton acted Monday to shield the president from blame for the deadly September attack on a U.S. mission in Libya, saying that any fault lies with her as America's top diplomat.

"I take responsibility," Clinton told a CNN interviewer during a trip to Peru.

U.S. Ambassador J. Christopher Stevens and three other Americans were killed Sept. 11 when dozens of heavily armed men drove up in a convoy and attacked and burned the thinly protected U.S. diplomatic mission and a nearby annex in Benghazi.

Two State Department security officers who served in Libya this year told a House oversight hearing last week that they had requested an extension of a 16member military team at the U.S. Embassy in Tripoli, several hundred miles away from Benghazi, but that mid-level State Department officers in Washing-

ton had rejected the request. In addition to the congressional

probe, the State Department has convened a formal review of the assault, and the FBI has sent agents to Libya to conduct a criminal investigation.

Though the incident could mar Clinton's record as chief diplomat, Republicans in Congress and on the campaign trail have raised few questions about her role. They have charged instead that the failure to protect the diplomatic mission reflects a broader failure of foreign policy by Obama as he runs for re-election.

Clinton has kept a generally low profile on the issue and on Friday she declined to answer a reporter's question about precisely what she was doing during the attack.

On Monday, Clinton portrayed the mounting criticism as motivated by political partisanship. "I want to avoid some kind of political gotcha," she said.

She said Obama and Vice President Joe Biden were not involved in decisions about the level of security for diplomats in Libya, a country that has been overflowing with weapons since an armed insurgency toppled and killed former leader Moammar Gadhafi last

PICASSO, MONETS STOLEN IN NETHERLANDS HEIST

AMSTERDAM (AP) • Thieves broke into a Rotterdam museum on Tuesday and walked off with works from the likes of Picasso, Monet, Gauguin and Matisse potentially worth hundreds of


Police haven't said how they pulled off the early hours heist, but an expert who tracks stolen art said the robbers clearly knew what they were after.

"Those thieves got one hell of a haul," said Chris Marinello, who

directs the Art Loss Register. The heist at the Kunsthal museum is one of the largest in years in the Netherlands, and is a stunning blow for the private Triton Foundation collection, which was being exhibited publicly as a

group for the first time. "It's every museum director's worst nightmare," said Kunsthal director Emily Ansenk, who had been in Istanbul on business but returned immediately. News of the theft "struck like a bomb," she said at a press conference in the museum's cafe. She declined to reveal any details of how the thieves got in and out with the paintings, or how the museum is protected, other than describing its security as "state of the art"and "functional." 



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

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Don't Have the Time to Make Steamed Puddings? Episcopals Will Do It for You

TWIN FALLS • Ascension Episcopal Church is taking orders for its annual sale of steamed plum puddings and carrot puddings for the holidays.

Whether or not a warm steamed pudding with light sauce is a Christmas memory for your family, it's certainly a convenience, church member Cindy Jardine said. The pudding can be placed in a slow cooker or in a steamer on the back of the stove, to be ready to serve at dessert time.

The puddings are rich with sugar, fruit, nuts and spices, and each serves six to eight.

Because of the long cooking required to make steamed puddings, many families abandon the tradition. But here Ascension does the cooking; you just reheat them and make the sauce.

The recipe for the church's "plum" pudding came from England and was given to an Episcopalian in Caldwell in the early 1950s,

then to Ascension in 1994. Flaming plum puddings take center stage in Christmas stories such as Dickens' "A Christmas Carol," but "Christmas plums" is the English term for what Americans call dates.

The recipe for the church's carrot pudding came from the Wallington family in Jerome in the early 1970s. Carrot puddings are fat-free, but they still contain sugar, nuts, raisins, carrots and potatoes for a filling dessert, Jardine said.

The Episcopal puddings cost \$8 each and do not contain any alcohol. They are decorated and wrapped to use as gifts. They must be frozen or refrigerated until serving. Sauce recipes are included.

To order, call the church at 733-1248 prior to Nov. 4; the office is open 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Mondays through Fridays. Puddings can be picked up at Ascension Episcopal Church 371 Eastland Drive N. in Twin Falls — between 9 a.m. and noon Nov. 12.

TWIN FALLS • You may never look at organic food the same again.

Organic fruit or beans

may look like any other piece of fruit or any bag of beans, but it takes a lot of steps, documentation and paperwork - from farmers to haulers to distributors - for food to wear that State of Idaho Organic Certification

In 2002, the Idaho State Department of Agriculture received its accreditation as an organic certifying agency from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Organic Program. For organic certification, a food producer or handler must submit an application, pay a fee based

on last year's gross organic sales and undergo an onsite inspection and sometimes unannounced inspections.

On Oct. 11, agriculture investigator Kim Flynn traveled from Boise to Twin Falls to look at the organic side of Soranco Bean Prod-

ucts Inc. She does about 80 inspections a year across Idaho.

a Whole Ton of Paperwork

It usually takes Flynn two weeks after her inspection to put together her report. If all the company's organic requirements were met, it's certified as an organic handler with its certificate arriving in about six weeks. Even though only about 3 percent of Soranco Bean Products is organic, the inspection is still throughout. It lasted more than four hours with most of the inspection

spent inside the office of Toni Carlton, general manager of Soranco, talking about documentation.

Every year companies that either grow or handle organic products are required to undergo an inspection. It always starts with a meeting to go over a lot of paperwork that proves they are providing organic produce,

crops or meat. The paperwork provides traceability and protects the integrity of the organic product, Flynn said.

Here, the beans are not grown by Soranco, but by a certified organic grower. From the time they arrive on a truck until they leave, they are tracked with a form and signature.

When Gillaspy's high school friend Tina Mariani moved back to Idaho two years ago, the idea for the company start-

ed to form. Gillaspy welcomed Mariani back home with some of her wine jellies.

"I told her, 'Have you ever

thought of selling them?"" Mariani said.

With Gillaspy as the jelly maker and Mariani doing the paperwork, research and promoting, Tipsy Cellars Gourmet Jellies launched in moting, July. It already has a small Facebook following.

The jellies come in flavors like Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay, Merlot, White Zinfandel and Tipsy Huckleberry. From one bottle of wine, Gillaspy can make about six or seven 8-ounce jars, and 13 4ounce jars.

"I love it. It's phenomenal and it's locally made," said Paulette Scheer, owner of Angelic Expressions in Twin Falls.

Scheer was so impressed with the product that she has a display inside her salon and

Basically, Flynn said, Soranco needs to show that organic beans do not mix with the conventional beans the company also mills and packages. When conventional beans run across the milling line there has to be a complete cleaning — which can take six to seven hours — before the organic beans can run.

There is a similar process when milling organic and nonorganic beans. The 10 steps for clean-down between varieties must be initialed and dated.

The same goes for where beans are stored. And if an area needs to be furnigated for pests, documentation needs to show the organic beans were removed from the area.

"There's a lot of steps,"

If she were investigating a $\,$ ready-to-eat product like onions, she explained, the paperwork would be different and more abundant. It would include a section on just the water that is used and might include taking a sample.

The organization of all that paperwork determines how long the meeting lasts, and companies are charged by the hour.

Flynn sat across from Carlton typing information into a laptop. Also sitting in on the meeting was the company's quality assurance manager, Wayne Gause.

"What I have here is a copy of last year's inspection. You come out with zero issues, pretty impressive," Flynn said. "If there were any non-compliances or issues we would go over that, but there was not, so we'll go to section two: labeling."

There are strict guidelines for organic labels. For example, the ISDA has to be below who packed or handled it last. The USDA seal has to be bigger than the ISDA seal.

There are rules that Soran-

co has records for even though the rules themselves do not ask for them.

For instance, the rules state that there should not be any commingling with inorganic products during inbound and outbound transport. The rules don't state outright that the truck must be clean. But the company developed paperwork to show organic and conventional commingling does not occur.

"Documentation is documentation. I don't care if it's on a napkin," Flynn said.

The more organized the company is, the quicker the inspection goes.

Soranco keeps a lot of its own rules and documentation in clear plastic sleeves inside white binders. There's a binder on just packaging.

"How many binders do you got?" Flynn said with a laugh.

"I'm getting quite a collection," Gause said.

The organic certification program is supposed to give the consumer assurances regarding the term "organic" when it is used in the marketing and labeling of food products.

"The first year we did this it was confusing," Carlton said, but she added it's about maintaining the beans' organic integrity.

According to ISDA, certification also benefits Idaho producers by facilitating the development of out-of-state and out-of-country markets for their Idaho certified organic products.

The ISDA even goes through its own inspection by

"It was intimidating," Flynn said. The last inspection lasted a week of eight-hour days.

Organic crop inspections are usually done by Sept. 30 because producers and handlers want to qualify for the Organic Certification Cost Share Programs, which reimburse a portion of the costs of organic

certification. This is firstcome, first-served, Flynn said, but this year ISDA received enough money to reimburse everyone who applied before the deadline.

As the inspection at Soranco drew near its end, Flynn toured the Soranco's storage and milling sites. She stopped and talked with Mike Parks, mill operator, as the roar of beans being cleaned and sorted caused the two to stand close as he talked.

Flynn's walk-through of the storage and mills took less than an hour. Then it was back to the Soranco office to look over more files in cabinets.

When Flynn left that day she would give Carlton a receipt for all the documentation she provided - just another step in that never-ending documentation.

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Learning to Love the Beefy Flavor of Flank Steak

So you think you know steaks? And maybe you do.

But truth is, you probably only really know the particular cuts you buy over and over again. That's good, but there's a world of great beef out there to explore. And many of those cuts (and by the way, butchers are creating new ones all the time) are far more versatile than you

You could spend ages learning the different cuts of beef and the various names for each (there isn't nearly as much naming standardization as you would think). But I think it's better to simply pick a cut you haven't often prepared at home and start playing around with it. That's how I learned to love flank steak.

First, the basics. Flank steaks are lean cuts from the rear side of the cow and are characterized by rich, deep beefy flavor and a slightly chewy texture. Traditionally, London broils were made using flank steaks, though today any of the leaner, less tender cuts often are substi-

Flank steaks are easy to identify by sight because they are flat and have a long, horizontal grain that runs the length of the meat. These steaks are meant to be briefly

grilled or broiled to rare or medium-rare, then thinly sliced across the grain. The result is deliciously beefy and substantial.

Flank steaks also love to be marinated. And because they have a heartier texture, they can handle more acidic marinades for longer, even overnight.

When shopping for flank steaks, note that some grocers will label them "London broil?' Just note that they also sometimes label other cuts as "London broil," too. So when in doubt, it's best to

For the weeknight home cook, flank steaks are the perfect cut. They can be tossed with a marinade the night before and left in the refrigerator until dinner. And they cook in just minutes on the grill or under the broiler. As with all meat, flank steak should rest for 5 to 10 minutes after cooking before slicing to let the juices redistribute.

Balsamic-Pepper Flank Steak with Grilled Pears and Blue Cheese

For extra flavor, the mari-

nade can be mixed with beef broth, then boiled and reduced until thick (while the steaks cook), then drizzled over the finished dish. Start to finish: 30 minutes (plus marinating). Serv-

1/4 cup balsamic vinegar 2 cloves garlic

1 tablespoon black peppercorns Kosher salt

1 1/2 pounds flank steak 2 pears, peeled, halved and cored

Crumbled blue cheese, for topping

In a blender, combine the vinegar, garlic, peppercorns and 1 teaspoon of kosher salt. Blend for 20 seconds, then transfer to a wide, shallow bowl.

Add the steak to the marinade, turning to coat. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes.

When ready to cook, heat the broiler with a rack 6 inches from the heat. Line a rimmed baking sheet with foil, then coat it lightly with cooking spray.

Cut each pear half into 4 slices, then arrange them on one half of the prepared baking sheet.

Remove the steak from the marinade and set it on the other half of the sheet. Broil everything for 5 minutes, then use tongs

to flip the steak and pears. Broil for another 5 minutes for medium-rare.

Let the steaks rest for 10 minutes, then cut into thin slices against the grain. Divide the slices between 4 serving plates, then top each with pear slices. Top each serving with a bit of crumbled blue cheese.

Ground cardamom gives this simple fall-friendly crisp a sweet-spicy flavor that you will smell as much as taste. Don't worry too much about which type of oats to use in a recipe such as this. Though we prefer old fashioned rolled oats, feel free to use the "quick" variety if that's what you happen to have. The differences won't be tremendous.

Cardamom Cranberry Pear Crisp

Start to finish: 1 hour 15 minutes (15 minutes active). Servings: 8.

For the topping:



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1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, room temperature 1/2 cup packed brown 3/4 cup all-purpose flour 3/4 cup oats 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon salt For the filling:

8 pears, peeled, cored and sliced

8-ounce package frozen or fresh cranberries 1/2 cup packed brown

sugar 1/2 teaspoon ground cardamom

1/4 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons cornstarch

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What Happens when Cheese Fondue Becomes a Soup

This soup will help put a little meat on your bones. We wanted to know what would happen if we replicated the awesomeness that is cheese fondue, but as a soup. This is what we got.

We topped our soup with crumbled pretzels because we like the contrast between the rich and creamy soup and the salty, crunchy pretzels. But croutons - especially homemade and just lightly crunchy - also would be a delicious way to top this soup. Crushed corn tortilla chips would be great, too.

Pretzel Cheddar Soup

Start to finish: 45 minutes. Servings: 6.

- 4 ounces bacon, diced 1 medium yellow onion,
- diced 1 medium leek, white part
- only, diced 2 medium carrots, diced
- 2 stalks celery, diced 3 tablespoons all-purpose
- flour 1 tablespoon
- Worcestershire sauce 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 12-ounce bottle ale Pinch of cayenne 1 cup low-sodium
- chicken broth 1 cup milk
- 1 pound very sharp cheddar, grated Salt and ground black pepper

1 cup broken pretzels

In a large deep pot, such as a Dutch oven, cook the bacon over medium heat until crispy and browned, about 6 to 8 minutes. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the bacon to a paper towel, leaving the drippings in the pot.

Add the onion, leek, carrots and celery to the pot. Increase heat to mediumhigh and saute the vegetables until browned, about 10 minutes. Add the flour and stir to coat the vegetables. Stir in the Worcestershire sauce, Dijon mustard, ale and cayenne. Stir continuously while returning to a simmer.

Add the chicken broth and milk and mix well. Return to a simmer, then cover and lower the heat to medium. Cook until the vegetables are tender,

about 15 minutes. Working in batches,

transfer the mixture to a blender and puree until smooth. Return the soup to the pot over low heat, then stir in the cheese, a little at a time. Do not allow the soup to boil. Season with salt and black pepper. Ladle into crocks or bowls and serve topped with broken pretzels. A Bowl of Comfort — Chicken Soup with Dumplings

A basic chicken soup is fine for when you need warmth and comfort.

But what about those parblustery fall ticularly evenings when fine isn't sufficient? For those evenings, we have created this more robust take on the basic chicken soup, a version that oozes even more comfort and warmth thanks to the starches and savory ingredi-

First, the latter. We amplify the savory side of this soup by sauteing a half pound of mixed mushrooms. And for good measure, we also add a handful of dried porcini mushrooms. For starchy comfort, we top the soup with pillowy soft dumplings. And to tie it all together, we lace the dumplings with savory Parmesan cheese.

Want to make it vegetarian? Just substitute vegetable broth and leave out the chicken.

Mushroom and Chicken Barley Soup with Parmesan **Dumplings**

Start to finish: 45 minutes. Servings: 6.

For the soup:

- 1 ounce dried porcini mushrooms, chopped
- 2 tablespoons vegetable or canola oil
- 1 pound mixed sliced mushrooms
- 2 medium shallots, sliced 1 leek, white part only, sliced
- 1 pound boneless, skinless chicken thighs, cubed 1/2 cup pearled barley
- 2 teaspoons minced fresh rosemary 1 tablespoon minced fresh
- thyme Ground black pepper 6 cups low-sodium chicken

broth For the dumplings:

- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 2 tablespoons sugar 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

- Pinch cayenne pepper 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 eggs 1 1/2 cups buttermilk 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter,

melted

In a small bowl, combine the porcini mushrooms with 1 cup of boiling water. Set aside.

In a large deep pot, such as a Dutch oven, heat the oil over medium-high. Add the mixed mushrooms and sprinkle lightly with salt. Saute until browned, about 10 minutes. Add the shallots and the leeks and continue to cook until softened, 6 to 8 minutes.

Add the chicken and cook just until browned. It does not need to cook through. Add the barley, rosemary, thyme, a few grinds of black pepper, the broth and the porcinis with the soaking water. Cover and reduce the heat to maintain a simmer. Simmer until the barley is tender, about 45 minutes.

Meanwhile, prepare the dumplings. In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, baking soda, baking powder, salt, black pepper and cayenne. Stir in the parmesan. In another bowl, whisk together

the eggs and buttermilk, then the melted butter. Gently stir the liquid ingredients into the dry ingredients just until combined.

Drop the dumpling mix**ture** by the tablespoon onto the top of the soup. Cover, bring to a boil and

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Dinner in 35 Minutes: Lemon Lentil Soup

It takes no more than a slight chill in the air to send us searching for a weeknight soup recipe. We've used red lentils here; use yellow lentils and you'll serve what looks like a bowl of sunshine, made bright by the lastminute additions of lemon juice and preserved lemon.



Start to finish: 45 minutes. Servings: 6.

2 tablespoons olive oil 1 large yellow onion, diced 2 cloves garlic, minced

1 pound carrots, peeled and diced 2 potatoes, peeled and diced 1 canned chipotle pepper (in adobo sauce), minced

1 tablespoon adobo sauce (from canned chipotle peppers) 2 cups low-sodium chicken broth

1 cup heavy cream


Sliced scallions, to serve

In a large, deep pot over medium, heat the oil. Add the onion and garlic and cook until lightly browned, about 10 to 12 minutes. Add the carrots, potatoes and chipotle. Cook for 5 minutes, then add the adobo sauce and broth. Bring to a simmer and cook until the carrots and potatoes are tender, about 30 minutes. Working in batches, transfer the soup

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A Pumpkin Bread that Can Handle Any Add-in

For me, nothing signifies the end of summer as poetically and viscerally as seeing pumpkins in a patch. One look at that field and I start salivating for all of my favorite pumpkin dishes.

I love the earthy simplicity of pumpkin pie. And I feel like a pioneer when I wash the seeds that I have taken out of my carved pumpkin and roast them. No surprise, but that was always my favorite part of carving a pumpkin when I was a kid! Pumpkin and sage also dress up cheese grits this time of year, and I've even added pumpkin to chili. But I never thought of adding chocolate to pumpkin until last year.

For some reason, I became obsessed with baking chocolate pumpkin bread and asked everyone I knew if they had a good recipe. I was looking for a dense quick bread with a deep pumpkin flavor that could stand up to lots of add-ins. I love slicing a loaf of bread and seeing the cross-section of fruit and nuts and chocolate.

After I tried a few that were less than stellar, I mentioned my quest to an industry friend, who gave me a pumpkin muffin recipe that turned out to be excellent. I adapted it to make pumpkin bread, but you could easily use my version for muffins, as well. It is an oil-based quick bread and I use untoasted walnut oil, but you can use any neutral vegetable

I also reduced the sugar a bit and added light brown sugar and extra spices to give the loaf a deeper flavor that would stand up to the dark chocolate chips and walnuts that I used. When I make this bread closer to Thanksgiving, I add dried cranberries for a seasonal touch, but the bread also is good with the addition of golden raisins and dried cherries.

Finally, I decorate the top of the bread with whole wal-

nut halves or a layer of chopped walnuts. I love the look and the texture of this extra touch. It dresses up a simple loaf of quick bread and gives it a rustic, homemade but professional pres-

A note about pumpkin - I have tried every type of pumpkin, from roasting my own and making puree to testing all of the brands out there. I will never roast a pumpkin for baking again. The pulp was watery and did not have that concentrated flavor I love. I also suggest staying away from pumpkin pie "filling." I prefer Libby's pure pumpkin puree.

Pumpkin Bread with Dark Chocolate and **Walnuts**

Start to finish: 1 hour 15 minutes (15 minutes active). Servings: 2 loaves, 16

4 eggs

3/4 cup granulated sugar 3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

- 15-ounce can pureed pumpkin
- 1 1/4 cups walnut oil (not toasted)
- 3 cups all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons baking soda 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 generous teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon table salt 1/4 teaspoon ground dry ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 2 cups dark chocolate chips
- 2 cups lightly toasted walnuts, plus more for decorating the top
- 1 cup dried cranberries (optional)

Heat the oven to 350 degrees. Coat 2 standard loaf pans with baking spray. In a large bowl, beat together the eggs, both sugars, pumpkin and oil until smooth. In a second bowl,



whisk together the flour, baking soda, baking powder, cinnamon, salt, ginger and nutmeg. Add the dry ingredients to the wet and mix well. Fold in the chocolate chips, walnuts and cranberries, if using.

Fill each of the prepared loaf pans about three-quarters full with batter. Drop each on the counter a few times to release any air bubbles. Sprinkle additional walnuts over the top of each loaf, using your hand to gently press them into the batter. Place the pans on a baking sheet to make it easier to pull out of the hot oven.

Bake for 50 to 60 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted at the center of each loaf comes out clean. Let cool for at least 1 hour before slicing into thick chunks. Per serving: 590 calories; 320 calories from fat (54 percent of total calories); 36 g fat (8 g saturated; 0 g trans fats); 45 mg cholesterol; 64 g carbohydrate; 5 g fiber; 39 g sugar; 9 g protein; 390 mg sodium.





f there ever was a time for the Idaho Vandals to sit in front of the mirror and do a little soul searching, this week seems just as good as any.

Soul searching on yet another dismal season that is already lost midway through October.

Soul searching after a 38-7 whipping at the hands of a Texas State team that went 6-6 as a member of the Football Championship

Subdivision a year ago. And most importantly, a bit of soul searching on how they got themselves into

this mess in the first place. Because a mirror never lies — which in the case of the Idaho Vandals, is a cruel reality.

For the past two weeks, Idaho coach Robb Akey has been grasping at straws about a final new beginning and after his team's leagueopening win over New Mexico State, stated that the Vandals had a share of the WAC lead.

Without even putting up a fight, that beginning is gone and so is Idaho's brief stay at the top of the conference.

Both were easily conced-

ed in San Marcos, Texas, on Saturday against a betterprepared and better-

coached Bobcats team. Pegged as only 2-point favorites entering the contest, the Bobcats were seen as relative equals to the Vandals, at least in the eyes

of oddsmakers. On the field, as well as on the sideline, the teams were anything but.

"I really enjoy working hard," she says. "It's a challenge to me."



BYU Coaches Await Impact of Lowered Missionary Age

PROVO, Utah • Point guard Cooper Ainge just turned 19, yet if he knew a year ago what he knows now he'd be off on his church mission rather than in his first season as a Brigham Young basketball player.

That's the situation of many Mormon athletes after a new rule recently went into effect that lowers the age when members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints can go on a mission from 19 to 18. It's already affecting players deciding now whether to come to schools across Utah, and BYU particular.

Among those could be top high school recruit Jabari Parker, a Mormon who included BYU on his top five list earlier this month. He also plans to make official visits to Duke, Florida, Michigan State and Stanford.

A 6-foot-8 forward, Parker is one of the most prized recruits to come along in recent years.

While he has told some his plans were to attend college for a year then either go on a mission as his brother did, or jump to the NBA, the fact that he turns 18 in March could affect his thinking.

Coaches can't talk about specific recruits, but BYU basketball coach Dave Rose

acknowledged the new rule won't affect this year's team but could have a big effect on his 2013, 2014 and 2015 classes.

"For our coaching staff, it will be a process," said Rose, who has spreadsheets that slot missions along with scholarships available and the timing of such. "What it basically does is it gives every LDS player that has a desire to serve a mission another option. What we need to do is find out what they are planning on doing. My role here as head coach is to support their decision?

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has more than 55,000 fulltime missionaries worldwide, spreading information about their faith and doing humanitarian work. Most missions for men are two years.

still struggling to adjust to life in the Football Bowl Subdivision following back-to-back losses to Nevada and New Mexico, Texas State coach Dennis Franchione showed that minor talent deficits can be made up in a big way through preparation and coaching.

A longtime coach at the FBS level, Franchione, who abruptly left both Alabama and Texas A&M in controversial fashion before landing back at Texas State for a second tenure, thoroughly outcoached Akey in every sense of the word.

It was obvious soon after kickoff that Idaho had no clue on how to stop Texas State's option attack, and by the third quarter, the Bobcats broke the weakwilled Vandals.

In that penultimate frame, a kickoff following a Texas State field goal went unfielded as it bounced into the end zone and sat on the ground for several seconds before a Vandal finally realized what was happening and fell on it for a touch-

"This team is mentally checked out," I said to a friend and Idaho alum as we watched Texas State nearly recover a kickoff in Idaho's own end zone. All he could do was disappointingly nod in agree-

True to form, Idaho immediately gave the ball back after a three-and-out and decided that three quarters of embarrassment were enough as it allowed Bobcat running back Marcus Curry to run untouched through the heart of the defense for a 24-yard score to open the fourth three plays later.

While it would be easy to blame the players for quitting (again) in what should have been a winnable game, this one I'm pinning on the coaches. Well, them and the rest of Idaho's dysfunctional leadership.

There's a reason why the Vandals haven't won two games in a row since 2009.

There's a reason why Idaho has been outscored 138-20 after halftime this

And there's a reason why the program as a whole has

steadily regressed since 2009 - currently making it one of the laughingstocks of

Much of the blame falls on the shoulders of Akey and Athletic Director Rob Spear – two men who seem to be more occupied with sniping at each other through the media rather than working together to lift the Vandals out of the doldrums of the FBS.

After the North Carolina game, Spear said on the postgame radio show that performances like the Vandals' 66-0 loss don't help when trying to secure an independent schedule for next year.

Fewer than two days later, Akey spent the final 15 minutes of his weekly press conference with local media on a tangent about how the lack of a 2013 schedule hurts recruiting.

In a season where the perception of the program will likely have a significant impact on the Vandals' future at the FBS level, two of the athletic department's most influential leaders are working their hardest to deflect blame for Idaho's shortcomings instead of plotting a course and providing many of those who donate to the program with some much-needed transparency.

And through it all, Idaho President Duane Nellis continues to sit idly by as Akey and Spear each drill holes in Idaho's boat while openly complaining that the other isn't emptying the water buckets fast enough.

Seven games into 2012, it's clear that Idaho lacks several things on the field most notably wins, preparation and discipline.

Leadership, however, is the one overriding attribute missing from every level of Idaho's power structure.

It's a crippling deficiency in authority which has paralyzed the Vandals while the conference carousel spins, leaving Idaho at the end of a football cul-de-sac with little chance for escape.

Maybe this week, instead of wearing shirts under their pads that say "finish," the powers that be can add a little -ed onto the end of

At least then they'll no longer be trying to fool the man in the mirror.

Judge Wants to See NFL Bounty Documents

NEW ORLEANS • A federal magistrate judge has ordered NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell to provide the court with documents related to the league's bounty investigation of the New Orleans Saints.

The order by Magistrate Daniel Knowles on Tuesday came in response to suspended linebacker Jonathan Vilma's efforts to initiate the discovery process in his defamation case against the commissioner. Vilma has said the NFL has allowed him to review only a fraction of documents related to bounty matter.

Knowles issued a compro-

mise order in which only the court, and not Vilma, may see the documents – including reports of interviews with witnesses - before a subsequent order is made on whether to allow discovery to

NFL spokesman Greg Aiello said league officials have already discussed the order with Knowles and have agreed to comply.

The order comes a day after Vilma re-filed a related lawsuit in the same New Orleans federal court asking for his season-long suspension to be overturned. That lawsuit also has argued that the NFL has failed to fully disclose its evidence in the bounty investigation. The NFLPA filed a similar

request on behalf of three other current or former Saints players suspended in the probe: Saints defensive end Will Smith (four games), free agent defensive lineman Anthony Hargrove (seven games) and Cleveland linebacker Scott Fujita (one game).

The players' lawsuits contend that Goodell is incapable of acting as a neutral arbitrator in the bounty matter, in large part because his public statements soon after the NFL's investigation was made public last March indicated that he already had determined the guilt of the players before the disciplinary process

All four of the players are technically eligible to play this weekend because their appeals of their suspensions within the framework of the NFL's labor agreement are pending. Goodell has scheduled their appeal hearings for Oct. 23 and could rule soon afterward. In the meantime, the players are hoping U.S. District Judge Ginger Berrigan will ultimately issue a ruling that voids Goodell's decision to suspend the players and order a neutral arbitrator to handle any further discipline in the matter.

U.S. Men Reach W.C. **Qualifying Final Round**

KANSAS CITY, Kan. • Clint Dempsey had a pair of goals and assisted on Carlos Bocanegra's equalizer, and the United States rallied to beat Guatemala 3-1 Tuesday night and reached next year's final round of World Cup qualifying.

Facing their first elimination game in qualifying since 2000, the Americans needed merely a draw to advance to the six-team finals in North and Central America and the Caribbean. After Carlos Ruiz put Guatemala ahead in the fifth minute, Dempsey set up Bocanegra's goal in the 10th minute, then scored in the 18th and 36th. With 30 international goals, Dempsey tied Brian McBride for third-most in American history.


The U.S. (4-1-1), seeking its seventh straight World Cup appearance, topped its semifinal group with 13

TODAY IN **HISTORY**

On this date:

In 1610. French King Louis XIII, age nine, was crowned at Reims, five months after the assassination of his father, Henry IV.

In 1711, Jupiter Hammon, the first black poet to have his work published in America, was born on Long Island, N.Y., into a lifetime of slavery.

In 1807, Britain declared it would continue to reclaim British-born sailors from American ships and ports regardless of whether they held U.S. citizenship.

In 1912, Pope John Paul I was born Albino Luciani at Forno di Canale, Italy.

In 1931, mobster Al Capone was convicted of income tax evasion. (Sentenced to 11 years in prison, Capone was released in 1939.)

In 1933, Albert Einstein arrived in the United States as a refugee from Nazi Germany

In 1941, the U.S. destroyer Kearny was damaged by a German torpedo off the coast of Iceland; 11 people died.

In 1961, French police attacked Algerians protesting a curfew in Paris. (The resulting death toll varies widely, with some estimates of up to 200.)

In 1973, Arab oil-producing nations announced they would begin cutting back oil exports to Western nations and Japan; the result was a total embargo that lasted until March 1974.

In 1987, first lady Nancy Reagan underwent a modified radical mastectomy at Bethesda Naval Hospital in Maryland.

In 1989, an earthquake measuring 7.1 on the Richter scale struck northern California, killing 63 people and causing \$6 billion worth of damage.

In 1992, Japanese exchange student Yoshi Hattori was fatally shot by Rodnev Peairs in Baton Rouge, La., after Hattori and his American host mistakenly knocked on Peairs' door while looking for a loween party. (Peairs was acquitted of manslaughter, but in a civil trial was ordered to pay more than \$650,000 to Hattori's family.)

Ten years ago: Ira Einhorn, the '70s hippie guru who'd fled to Europe after being charged with murder, was convicted in Philadelphia of killing his girlfriend, Holly Maddux, and stuffing her corpse in his closet a quarter-century earlier. (Einhorn was later sentenced to life without parole.)

Five years ago: President George W. Bush, raising Beijing's ire, presented the Dalai Lama with the Congressional Gold Medal and urged Chinese leaders to welcome the monk to Beijing. Comedian Joey Bishop, the last of Sinatra's Rat Pack, died in Newport Beach, Calif., at age 89. Singer Teresa Brewer died in New Rochelle, N.Y.,

One year ago: Rolling through small Southern towns in a campaign-style bus, President Barack Obama pressed lawmakers back in Washington to start taking up pieces of his rejected jobs bill and mocked the Republicans who had shot it down in toto. Financier Carl Lindner Ir., who used his experience running the family dairy store to build a business empire whose reach included baseball, banks and bananas, died at age 92.

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
