State Released from 'No Child' Requirements

TWIN FALLS • After months of waiting, Idaho schools will finally see relief from federal No Child Left Behind mandates.

The U.S. Department of Education approved Idaho's waiver, according to a Wednesday announcement.

That means schools will be judged under the state's new five-star rating system.

It's based on multiple measures of student achievement, including academic growth.

Minidoka County School District Superintendent Scott Rogers said he's excited about the

new system. He described it as a more productive way to look at accountability.

"It's a truer reflection of what kind of growth you see in a school district," he said.

Rogers said he has always had a problem with the "all or nothing" NCLB system.

It's a pass-fail system based on whether

third- through 10th-grade students meet set benchmarks on the Idaho Standards Achievement Tests.

Rogers said the federal law needs to be overhauled by Congress.

The Idaho State Department of Education applied for the waiver in February, among a number of states that sought to be exempted from the Bush-era program.

Just last month, spokeswoman Melissa McGrath told the *Times-News* that the state was still in negotiations with the U.S. Department of Education over parts of the application.

The new accountability system hasn't received

Expanded Drug Recall Touches Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS • Two Magic Valley medical facilities have received injectable drugs now part of an expanded recall, announced state public health officials.

The drugs came from the New England Compounding Center and were sent out to nine Idaho medical facilities, according to Idaho Department of Health and Welfare officials.

There have been two stages of the recall. The first involved epidural steroid injections suspected of causing a national outbreak of fungal meningitis. The second involves other injectable drugs produced by NECC.

St. Luke's Health System — including its Magic Valley facility

TWIN FALLS • Dozens of students headed off to work Tuesday to their dream jobs with police officers, daycares workers, hair stylists, chefs and the U.S. Armed Forces.

It was a chance for area students with disabilities to get a taste of what those jobs are like.

October is National Disability Awareness Month and the third Wednesday in October each year is Disability Mentoring Day, said organizer Sandy Hacking with the Idaho Department of Labor.

The Magic Valley Transition Team works with juniors and seniors in high school and people ages 18 to 21 to help transition them from high school to work or college, she said.

Wednesday, each of the 74 students who participated chose their top two dream jobs and staff worked to match them up with a person in

that field. Whether each student enjoys the job or not, the event is a positive experience, said organizer Ann Flannery.

TWIN FALLS • Two political action committees are raising money on both sides of the proposed Right to Hunt, Fish and Trap constitutional amendment, with opponents out-raising amendment supporters.

According to records on the Secretary of State's website, Pass HJR2a PAC turned in its financial disclosure report on Oct. 16.

Another political action committee, No on HJR2, is raising money to defeat the proposal. Opponents argue those rights aren't threatened, and the amendment could make it

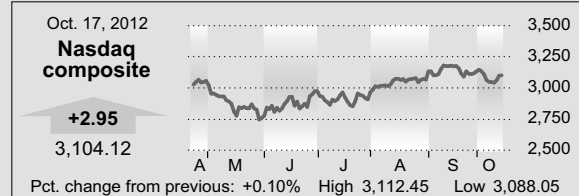
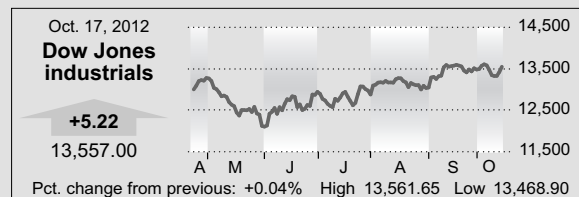

HIDDEN HISTORY

Bringing Lyda Southard to Justice

TWIN FALLS • If it hadn't have been for one Twin Falls County sheriff's deputy, Idaho's most notorious serial killer might have gotten away with murder.

Lyda Southard - who was born 120 years ago this week - is said to have poisoned four husbands and a brother-in-law, all by the time she was 27.

At the time, the story of the Twin Falls woman's dirty deeds - and her eventual capture and conviction - captivated the nation. Her story still appalls and fascinates today.

Lyda's nemesis, Deputy Virgil H. Ormsby, had no idea where the evidence would take him when he was instructed to investigate the sudden death of Edward F. Meyer, foreman of I.B. Perrine's Blue Lakes Ranch.

Meyer was a likable, hard-working man. Folks in Twin Falls were shocked when he fell ill and died in September 1919.

Many were also surprised to learn that the man had secretly married a local woman who had recently returned to town. The newlyweds didn't even live together; Meyer lived at Perrine's ranch in the Snake River Canyon, and his new wife Lyda stayed in Twin Falls, in a room at the Rogerson Hotel.

Lyda left town shortly after her husband's death.

An autopsy on Meyer's remains concluded that he died of typhoid fever, but rumors of foul play circulated around town more than a year later.

The rumors began to worry Twin

Falls County Prosecutor Frank L. Stephan and newly elected Sheriff E.R. Sherman. Thinking that their careers were on the line, the two assigned Deputy Ormsby to investigate Meyer's death.

Over the next few months, Ormsby backtracked through Lyda's life, putting the pieces of the puzzle together as he found them.

Lyda Meyer was well known in Twin Falls. Her father, William Trueblood, had moved his family to town from Missouri when Lyda was young. She graduated from Twin Falls High School and in 1912 married Bob Dooley, a young man who had followed her family from Missouri. After marrying Bob Dooley, Lyda gave birth to a baby girl.

In 1915, Bob's brother and business partner, Ed Dooley, who lived with them on their farm outside Twin Falls, died suddenly after taking out a life insurance policy payable to Lyda and Bob.

Then Bob Dooley died two months later, after taking out a life insurance policy payable to Lyda.

Lyda married another Twin Falls man in 1917. Shortly afterward, Lyda's 3-year-old daughter died. Distraught over her daughter's death, Lyda and her second husband, Billy McHaffie, moved from Twin Falls to Montana.

Ormsby retraced Lyda's path to Montana, where he discovered that McHaffie had died in 1918 - after taking out a life insurance policy. Unfortunately for Lyda, McHaffie had allowed his policy to lapse before his death. Lyda tried to pay the insurance premium after McHaffie died, but the payment was denied.

While investigating McHaffie's

death, Ormsby discovered that Lyda had married a Billings man by the name of Harlan Lewis in the spring of 1919. Lewis died four months later.

Ormsby went after Lyda with renewed determination after confirming that Lyda collected Lewis' \$10,000 life insurance policy.

Ormsby revisited the McHaffies' former home in Montana and discovered a large quantity of cut-up fly paper containing arsenic in the basement. Arsenic residue was found in a pot Lyda had used to boil the poison out of the fly paper before tainting her husband's food.

Back in Twin Falls, Sheriff Sherman arranged to have the bodies of Lyda's victims exhumed. Arsenic was found in all but her daughter's body, and a warrant was issued for Lyda's arrest.

Ormsby continued his hunt for Lyda until he found her living in Honolulu with her fifth husband, Paul Southard, a chief petty officer in the Navy. Ormsby escorted Lyda Southard back to Twin Falls, where she was convicted of the second-degree murder of Ed Meyer in November 1921.

Ormsby died in 1929, and is buried in the Twin Falls Cemetery. Lyda died in 1958 and is buried across the street from Ormsby in Sunset Memorial Park.

MAPLE RIDGE

Public Given Another Chance to Comment

JEROME • Jerome residents have one last chance to weigh in on a zoning change that would allow a developer to build multi-family housing units.

For phase II of the Maple Ridge Subdivision project, developers want a zone change from single family residential to multi-family residential.

City administrator Polly Hulse said there will be another public hearing Oct. 30.

The Jerome City Council was scheduled to take action Tuesday, but opted for one more meeting.

Colby Walter, one of partners at Keystone Construction, told the Times-News if the zoning change isn't approved, the company would have to wait to try again.

"I don't know that we're interested in waiting one more year," he said.

Keystone Construction manages the subdivision, lo-

cated off Tiger Drive. Walter said there are a lot of costs just to hang on to the property and keep up with maintenance.

He said he spent two years listening to feedback from residents and city officials about the proposed zoning change.

Earlier this month, city council members held a second reading of the ordinance for the zoning change.

Councilwoman Dawn Soto said she supported the subdivision project in the past. However, she has heard from residents who are opposed to it.

Soto said as the voice of her constituents, she'll vote against the project, but loves the concept.

Councilman Chris Barber said he feels the city would set a precedent for other subdivisions if the zoning change was approved.

It could lead to "spot zoning" for other subdivisions. He said he can't support the project.

Councilman Bob Culver said he won't support the project because the public doesn't.

Walter told the Times-News he felt blindsided by the fact that some council members were receiving feedback from residents outside the meetings.

He said he told the city's attorney that he wants a level playing field. If council members are hearing testimony, he said he needs to be able to respond.

Walter said a boost in Jerome's economy is needed and rejecting the rezoning proposal would "squash development efforts."

Councilman Dale Ross said last month that he'd support the rezoning proposal.

It gets back to economic development, he said, and it's important to have housing options for people who work in the area.

Ross said he understands some neighbors are concerned, but it's important to

look at how the project will benefit the city as a whole.

As for future zoning requests for subdivisions, he said the council can "decide what's right on a case-by-case basis."

Discussions about the second phase of the Maple Ridge Subdivision have been going on for about two years.

In March 2011, Jerome's City Council voted 3-1 to deny the zoning change.

Concerns with the initial proposal included the lack of street parking, traffic in the area and not enough variety in floor plans for the units.

Now, the project calls for 93 units, including single family homes, twin homes and four-plexes.

During a September city council meeting, subdivision owner Aaron Robertson said there's a lot of demand for smaller, less expensive homes.

That's what developers are being "forced to build from a market standpoint," he said.

Burley Rec Committee Discusses Future of North Park

BURLEY • The city of Burley's recreation committee will meet Monday with representatives from the Oregon Trail Recreation District Committee and Oregon Trail Botanical Gardens Foundation to talk about a master plan for Burley's North Park.

"It's really time to put the finishing touches on it," said Linda Petersen, member of the Oregon Trail Botanical Gardens.

The foundation began implementing improvements to the park at Ninth Street and Oakley Avenue in 2005 during the city's centennial.

"At that time, we took a survey of the people who lived in the area to see what they wanted at the park," said foundation member Linda Petersen during Tuesday's Burley City Council meeting. Donations from residents

and proceeds from the foundation's arts in the garden events were used to put in a swing set and sidewalks. Picnic tables have also been placed at the park.

"Over the years, the roots of the trees have dismantled the sidewalks," Petersen said.

A \$10,000 grant from General Mills was used to purchase a large playground set. The city has also put trees along the park's edge.

"We've been working on this for so long and we need

a definite plan," Petersen said.

Petersen said the group would like to see sidewalk installed all the way around the park, which encompasses a city block.

Burley Parks and Recreation Department head Brent Winn said there are issues at the park with large tree roots, which could destroy sidewalks.

At one time, Petersen said, there was a sidewalk in the form of a circle at the center of the park.

"I think it would be an asset," said Mayor Terry Greenman.

In Other Business

• Petersen, representing the

volunteers of the Mini-Cassia Child Protection Team, asked the Burley City Council to approve a proclamation that says the city strongly encourages area businesses to adopt child-safety standards that would keep sexually explicit materials out of children's view. The council did not take any action.

• The council tabled discussion on an ordinance to refinance the city's water and wastewater bonds.

• Janet Hansen, representing the Friends of the Burley Public Library, told the council Kathleen Hedberg will be honored during an open house at the library from 4 - 6 p.m. Oct. 18.

new employee on their hands, Flannery said.

"Employers find, 'wow, this person could work here,' regardless of the fact that they have a disability," she said.

Cody Emmons, a junior at Glenns Ferry High School, was paired with Twin Falls Police Crime Prevention Officer Dan Heil for a tour of the police department and a ride-along. Emmons said he was interested in police work in part because of the opportunity to drive a fast car, but also because of the public safety aspect.

"Have you seen the inside of a police station before?" Heil asked Emmons.

Emmons said he had, but never because he was in trouble with the law.

Heil explained to Emmons that he usually spends little time in the office.

"Arresting people and upholding the law is part of the job," Heil said. "But also, being a part of the community."

Across town, Bethany Perron, a junior at Jerome High School, and Brian Whitney, a senior at Burley High School, shadowed physical therapist Andrew Mix at Lifestyles Physical Therapy.

Perron said she wants to go into massage therapy or physical therapy because it's fun to help people.

"It's enjoyable to help other people with their needs," she said.

Mix told the two to be sure to take science and anatomy classes and to keep their grades up in order to have a

better chance of entering the competitive industry.

Mix's morning patient Ted Burgess, a former professional baseball player, agreed to let the teens watch as he got an ultrasound of his sore knee.

Mix said Burgess' injury was pretty straightforward and he was able to pinpoint a sore spot on the side of Burgess' knee.

Whitney said he knew a little bit about physical therapy before Wednesday but seeing the machinery involved was new.

"I definitely want to go in to it now," he said.

For about four years Andrew Silveria participated in STRIVE, a program in the Filer School District that teaches life skills to students 18 to 21 years old with autism and other developmental disabilities. Then this July, he was injured in a car wreck and lost all motor functions below his chest.

Late Tuesday morning, he sat in an empty conference room at the Magic Valley Arts Council and worked on the speech he would give to the Transition Team students when they returned from their job shadows.

Denise Bradberry, who worked with Silveria at STRIVE and now at Magic Valley Rehabilitation Services, helped him think of a few ideas.

Silveria joked that Bradberry roped him into giving the speech against his will. He planned to urge the students to think positively about their situations.

"Stop thinking of things you can't do," he said.

Having a good sense of humor also helps, he said.

— purchased products in the second category from NECC earlier this year to offset market shortages. But the hospital system removed the products before the items were recalled, and has since cancelled its relationship with the company, according to a St. Luke's news release.

State officials also named the Ambulatory Surgery Center of Burley as having received injectable drugs from NECC.

So far, there are no indications that patients of either medical facility are at risk.

None of the nine facilities statewide have reported any illnesses connected to the drugs, but facility officials are still contacting patients treated with the drugs and asking them to report any symptoms of infection.

Only two Idaho medical facilities received the epidural steroids suspected of causing the outbreak. Those facilities are Walter Knox Memorial Hospital in Emmett and Pain Specialists of Idaho in Idaho Falls.

Currently, one eastern Idaho resident is being treated for fungal meningitis tied to the national outbreak. Health officials report that he is re-

final approval yet. That could come this week during an Idaho State Board of Education meeting.

Unlike NCLB, the new system factors in student academic growth.

"I think it's a step in the right direction because it includes multiple measures," Kimberly School District Superintendent Luke Schroeder said.

He said students in the district have always done well when it comes to achievement.

"It's the growth now that we need to look at," he said.

Under the preliminary five-star ratings released earlier this fall, Kimberly middle and high schools received a 4, while the elementary school received a 2.

Schroeder said he's pleased

with how Kimberly High did. He said one of the measures in the rating system is how many students take advantage of advanced opportunities.

A lot of students are taking dual-credit classes, he said, and students did well on the SAT in the spring.

Under the state's accountability system, three- to five-star schools will be publicly recognized by the state.

But three-star schools will be required to develop an improvement plan for certain areas.

One- and two-star schools are those in which the state has identified areas that need improvement. Those schools will also develop improvement plans.

One possible obstacle to the new system: According to the Associated Press, several of its components were part of the controversial Students Come First education overhaul adopted by the Idaho Legisla-

ture in 2011, portions of which are subject to a voter referendum in next month's general election.

Should voters repeal Proposition 1 — which includes the guidelines for annual principal and teacher performance evaluations —

Luna and his staff would have to revisit its federal waiver, McGrath told the AP.

"We don't think the U.S. Department of Education would come back and take away the waiver," McGrath said. "But we would have to figure out a way to address that."

difficult for state agencies, the Legislature and voters to change wildlife management policies.

Both committees have in- and out-of-state financial support for the campaigns.

The No on HJR 2 PAC reported \$21,992.40 in contributions this year, but spent only \$2,292.70. That leaves them with a cash balance of \$19,749.70.

Some out-of-state donors have ties to Idaho, like second homes in Wood River Valley. Idaho-connected foundations donated big money to the campaign, including \$1,000 from the state chapter of the Sierra Club. \$5,000 came from the Steven Leuthold Family Foundation.

Pass HJR2a PAC received \$1,350.50 in donations, and spent \$400. Of the donations, \$500 came from Illinois-based Furtakers of America, Inc., and \$500 came from Nebraska Fur Harvesters.

But that PAC isn't the only source of financial support for passing HJR2. A Jerome County billboard that encourages voters to pass the amendment was paid for by Heider for Senate and the Idaho Trappers Association.

Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, crafted the Right to Hunt amendment during the 2012 legislative session.

On Wednesday, Heider said he wasn't connected to the Pass HJR2a PAC, but the fundraising disparity didn't concern him. He pointed out that in the Legislature, the amendment had support from both Republicans and Democrats.

"I don't even know why they'd be raising money to vote against it," Heider said.

Greg Moore, chairperson of No on HJR2, said that except for the Sierra Club and the family foundation, all donations came

from individuals. He said that negated fears of out-of-state groups chipping away at Idahoans' rights to hunt.

Though most of the contributions have come from Wood River Valley, the campaign


plans to advertise in Idaho's population centers, Moore said.

"I think that if we can get our message to enough people, both reason and compassion are solidly on our side," he said.

The Fed's Mission Reep

DALLAS • In the 1920s, in the wee small hours of the mornings, employees at the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas sang while they worked. One, Jack Culppeper, went into vaudeville, where he teamed up with a dance partner named Ginger. They married and performed as “Ginger and Pepper.” But show business marriages are perishable, so Ginger Rogers found another dance partner, Fred Astaire.

Richard Fisher, president of the Dallas Fed, who calls the legendary dance team “Fed and Ginger,” defends the Fed as an institution as vigorously as he questions its current policy. He prefers policies more suited to the Fed as it was before it acquired the burden — and temptation — of the dual mandate. Hence his praise for legislation by another Texan, Republican Rep. Kevin Brady.

Before the Fed was created 99 years ago, the U.S. economy was in recession 48 percent of the time; since 1913, it has been in recession only about 20 percent of the time. The Fed has done much good. It cannot, however, do every good thing, although Congress now seems to think it should.

In July, Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke testified to the Senate, where one of Fisher's Harvard classmates, the ineffable Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., clearly hoping the Fed would give the economy a pre-election boost, exhorted Bernanke: “The Fed is the only game in town.” Good grief.

Is Congress a spectator at the game of governance? Does it have anything to do with tax rates, spending levels and health care and other policies that have American businesses, in Fisher's words, “inundated with regulatory overload?” Expecting — no, mandating — the Fed to perform the irreducibly political task of managing economic policy means offloading legislative responsibilities. And this inevitably involves what James Bullard, Fisher's counterpart at the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis, calls the “creeping politicization” of the Fed, a worry Fisher shares.

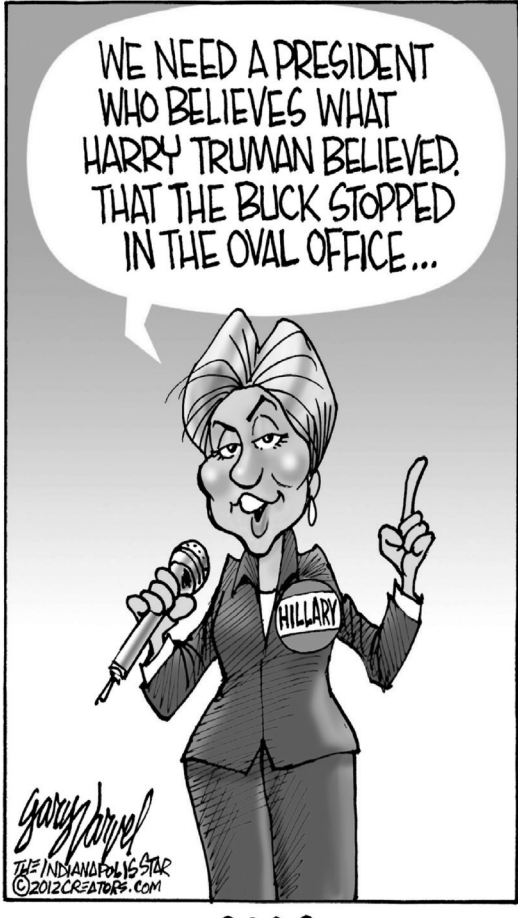
For the first 64 years of its existence, the Fed's mandate was price stability — preserving the currency as a store of value by tightly controlling inflation. But in 1977, Congress stipulated maximizing employment as the Fed's second mandate. Fisher thinks “a single mandate would serve our country best.” Brady's Sound Dollar Act, which has 48 House sponsors, would restore the single mandate, and make other changes Fisher favors. For example:

Fisher began his career with Brown Brothers Harriman, the private bank, and later was notably successful as founder and manager of several fund-management firms. He knows whereof he speaks when he speaks of capitalism. And of New York, which he enjoys calling “flyover country” with The New York Times as its “local newspaper.” He says the Fed, through its regional banks, was “designed for us to be Main Street's voice.” Brady agrees that today's membership on the policymaking Federal Open Market Committee — seven members of the Reserve Board, the president of the New York Fed, and rotating four of the presidents of the regional banks — gives excessive weight to New York and Washington. The Sound Dollar Act would give permanent FOMC voting rights to all 12 of the Fed bank presidents.

Two months after Schumer's exhortation, the Fed announced a “highly accommodative stance of monetary policy,” meaning expanding the money supply by buying \$40 billion of bonds every month for an undetermined number of years, lasting “for a considerable time after the economic recovery strengthens.” Bernanke was appointed by President George W. Bush; his second term expires Jan. 31, 2014, in what could be the second year of a third presidency. And the policy he has announced may continue when he departs.

“This is a ‘Main Street’ policy,” Bernanke says, about “trying to get jobs going.” The theory is that expanding the money supply will further drive down interest rates and this somehow will prompt hiring and investing. Fisher is skeptical, and fears that such government fidgets might exacerbate today's paralyzing uncertainties. America, he says, has the world's “most muscular business community” but capital is “on the sidelines” — \$1.4 trillion in excess bank reserves, \$2 trillion on the books of S&P 500 companies — because businesses “do not know what their cost structure is going to be.”

Thanks to prior “highly accommodative” policies, the economy's “gas tank is full, if not more” but it is unclear “who is going to step on the accelerator?” Perhaps no one will, as long as the Fed is regarded as “the only game in town.”

trail of blood to a residence near the intersection.

Deputies charged Martin Hernandez-Vargas, 38, of Visalia, Calif., with aggravated battery causing great bodily harm or disability for allegedly committing the crime.

Court documents state a machete with a wooden handle that had blood and hair on the blade was found on the passenger floorboard of Vargas' truck. Vargas allegedly told

deputies the victim began making unwanted sexual advances after the two drank beer together, and he wanted to get away from the trailer.

According to the report, the alleged victim's injuries — including an apparent broken jaw and a large cut — appeared to be caused by a sharp weapon. The deputy described the victim's face as being distorted.

The trial is scheduled to last until Friday.

Skydiver's Feat Could Influence Spacesuit Design

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) • Now that the dust has settled in the New Mexico desert where supersonic skydiver "Fearless Felix" Baumgartner landed safely on his feet, researchers are exhilarated over the possibility his exploit could someday help save the lives of pilots and space travelers in a disaster.

Baumgartner's death-defying jump Sunday from a balloon 24 miles above Earth yielded a wealth of information about the punishing effects of extreme speed and altitude on the human body — insights that could inform the development of improved spacesuits, new training procedures and emergency medical treatment.

A NASA engineer who specializes in astronaut escape systems said Baumgartner's mission "gives us a good foundation" for improving the odds of survival for professional astronauts, space tourists and high-altitude pilots and passengers.

"What I would hope is that, perhaps, this is just the first step of many, many advancements to come" in emergency bailouts, said Dustin Gohmert, who heads NASA's crew survival engineering office at the Johnson Space Center in Houston.

In an interview after Baumgartner became the first skydiver to break the speed of sound, Gohmert noted that researchers have spent decades working on self-contained space escape systems, with no significant advances since Joe Kittinger in 1960 jumped from 19.5 miles up and reached 614 mph, records that stood until Sunday.

Baumgartner's feat was sponsored by energy drink maker Red Bull, and NASA had no role. But Dr. Jonathan Clark, a former NASA flight surgeon who lost his wife, Laurel, in the space shuttle Columbia accident and dedicated himself to improving crew escape systems, was in charge of Baumgartner's medical team.

And he was thrilled at how much was learned. By going well beyond Mach 1, or the speed of sound, Baumgartner provided even more data than anticipated. Wearing a pressurized suit and helmet, he accelerated to an astonishing 834 mph and was supersonic longer than expected. The speed of sound at that altitude is close to 700 mph.

"It was Mach 1.24, which is really huge. I mean, that's a much higher level than we'd ever anticipated, so we learned a lot by going faster and higher," said Clark, who teaches at the Baylor College School of Medicine.

Clark said his team is still analyzing all the medical data — heart rate, blood pressure and the like — collected from sensors on Baumgartner's body.

During his descent through the stratosphere, Baumgartner went into an out-of-control spin for about 40 seconds, experiencing around 2.5 G's, or 2.5 times the force of gravity, before stabilizing himself.

Baumgartner's technique for righting himself may prove useful for companies like Virgin Galactic that are developing spacecraft that will take tourists up into space and right back down. These enterprises will need to have some sort of emergency escape plan.

"Perhaps in the future, someone might say, 'We want people to be in suits, some type of commercial space thing. We want them to be able to float around better and not in a seated position,'" Dan McCarter, a program manager at the company, said Wednesday.

The suit Baumgartner used was previously certified to 100,000 feet. "Well, we pretty much say now it's certified to 128,000 feet," McCarter said.

The suit was made by the David Clark Co. of Worcester, Mass.

ACCUSED 9/11 PLOTTER SCOLDS TRIBUNAL

QUANTANAMO BAY NAVAL BASE, Cuba (AP) • The self-styled terrorist mastermind of the Sept. 11 attacks lectured a military court on government hypocrisy Wednesday and wore a previously banned camouflage vest to his pre-trial hearing before being rebuked by the judge for his comments.

Khalid Sheikh Mohammed was in court as part of a weeklong hearing focusing largely on the secrecy rules that will govern legal proceedings against him at the U.S. base in Cuba.

Mohammed was allowed to wear a hunting-style camouflage vest with his white tunic and turban over the objections of prosecutors, who feared it might disrupt

the proceedings.

It had no apparent effect, but his five-minute speech denouncing the government's arguments about the need to protect national security transfixed the court and drew a reprimand from the judge.

Until that point, the 47-year-old Mohammed sat quietly through a day of courtroom arguments on proposed rules for handling classified evidence in the war-crimes case. When he finally spoke, it was to point out what he saw as the prosecution's hypocrisy for seeking to keep secret some details of what happened to him during years of captivity in the CIA's secret prisons.

Armstrong Out as Livestrong Head, Loses Multiple Sponsors

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) • Already an out-cast in cycling after a massive doping report, Lance Armstrong absorbed hits much closer to home Wednesday: to his wallet and his heart.

Armstrong was dumped by Nike, Anheuser-Busch and other sponsors, and he gave up the top spot at Livestrong, his beloved cancer-fighting charity, a week after an anti-doping agency released evidence of drug use by the seven-time Tour de France winner.

Armstrong stepped down as chairman of Livestrong in an attempt to minimize the damage caused by the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency's report. USADA banned Armstrong from the sport for life and has ordered that his Tour titles be stripped, which could come before the end of the month. "This organization, its mission and its supporters are incredibly dear to my heart," the cancer survivor said in a statement. "Today therefore, to spare the foundation any negative effects as a result of controversy surrounding my cycling career, I will conclude my chairmanship."

Minutes later, Nike dropped its personal sponsorship contract with him and issued a blistering statement that the company had been duped by his denials over the years.

"Due to the seemingly insurmountable evidence that Lance Armstrong participated in doping and misled Nike for more than a decade, it is with great sadness that we have terminated our contract with him. Nike does not condone the use of il-

legal performance enhancing drugs in any manner," the company said.

In 2001, the apparel company produced an anti-doping commercial, narrated by Armstrong, addressing allegations that he had used performance-enhancing drugs by mocking the question, "What am I on?" and answering that he trained on his bicycle "six hours a day."

Brewing giant Anheuser-Busch followed Nike's lead, saying: "We have decided not to renew our relationship with Lance Armstrong when our current contract expires at the end of 2012." Soon after, other sponsors also cut ties with him. Among them were Trek bicycles and Honey Stinger, a maker of foods and gels for athletes.

"We are in the process of removing Lance Armstrong's image and endorsement from our product packaging," a Honey Stinger spokesman said. An image of Armstrong's signature that was on the site's front page earlier in the day appeared to be gone late Wednesday.

The FRS Co., which makes energy, diet and health drinks, said Armstrong had resigned from its board.

If there was a silver lining in the day for Armstrong, it was that his major sponsors said they will continue to support the charity, which started as the Lance Armstrong Foundation 15 years ago.

Another longtime sponsor, sportswear maker Oakley, said it is withholding a decision until the International Cycling Union — the governing body for cycling — decides if it will fight USADA's

sanctions against Armstrong. UCI has until Oct. 31 to appeal USADA's sanctions against Armstrong to the world Court of Arbitration for Sport. If not, the penalties will stand.

Armstrong, who Forbes has estimated is worth about \$125 million, was not paid a salary as Livestrong chairman and will remain on the charity's 15-member board. The duties of leading the board will be turned over to vice chairman Jeff Garvey, who was founding chairman in 1997.

At the entrance to the Livestrong headquarters in Austin, autographed framed yellow jerseys from each tour win are mounted on a wall near the entrance. Armstrong had a conference call with employees on Wednesday to explain his decision. "I've been better and I've been worse," Livestrong President and CEO Doug Ulman quoted Armstrong as telling employees when asked how felt.

Armstrong denies doping despite USADA's report, intended to explain its decision in August to punish Armstrong. He claims to have passed hundreds of drug tests but chose not to fight USADA in one of the agency's arbitration hearings, saying the process was biased against him. Crisis management experts say the denials aren't enough to mitigate damage to Livestrong.

"From the brand perspective, Armstrong is done," said Kelly O'Keefe, a professor of brand strategy at Virginia Commonwealth University. "He's just a retired athlete with a tarnished image."

China Impatient Over Bashing in Debate

BEIJING • In the aftermath of a U.S. presidential debate that included blistering accusations about unfair Chinese economic practices, a commentary carried by China's state Xinhua newswire on Wednesday warned that targeting its country's products or currency would risk a trade war.

While the analysis was far from a statement of intent by senior Chinese leadership, and stopped well short of past media tirades sparked by foreign policy issues, it signaled fraying patience in Beijing with a U.S. presidential campaign that's featured criticism of China by both President Barack Obama and Republican challenger Mitt Romney. "If 'President Romney' was

determined to keep his words by throwing punitive tariffs against Chinese products exported to the U.S. market on Day One, then China perhaps would be forced to fight back, and then his administration would be very likely to be on its way to a global trade war," said the item, which was attributed to a writer named Liu Chang.

Chinese news organizations have published several pieces lately complaining about U.S. "China-bashing" this election season. During Tuesday night's debate, the word "China" came up 21 times, according to a transcript, as Obama and Romney alternated between pledging to confront the nation. Xinhua referenced Romney in which he said, "China has

Will New Cuban Migration Policy Improve U.S.-Cuban Relations?

MIAMI • While Cubans on the island celebrated a government announcement easing travel restrictions, some Cuban-Americans were skeptical the changes would have much impact on improving travel between the two adversarial nations.

While eliminating the need for a letter of invitation and an exit visa to travel abroad as well as the necessity for re-entry permits for Cubans who live outside the island and want to visit, the Cuban government still retained the right to limit travel for a broad swath of Cubans.

"I don't think it will make that much difference. It won't change much for me or my family," said Dr. Lisset Oropesa, who arrived in the United States in 2008 after studying in Belgium.

She was working in Brussels with the permission of the Cuban government when she was offered a scholarship to pursue a Ph.D. But she was told to return home first. Afraid that she might not be allowed to return to her studies in Belgium, she stayed.

"Now I'm considered a traitor," she said. "What I would like to see is for people like me to be allowed to go back to Cuba to visit." According to a 30-page document published Tuesday in Cuba's Gaceta Oficial outlining the changes in Cuba's migration laws that will take effect Jan. 14, Cubans who want to leave or enter the country can do so with a Cuban passport. But there will still be restrictions.

For example, those who have been "declared undesirable or expelled" can't go home, nor will those considered hostile to the "political, economic and social

principles of the Cuban state" be admitted.

Cubans in certain categories such as top sports figures, those considered essential to preserving the workforce in key scientific and technical areas, and military and government officials won't be able to obtain an "ordinary" passport and must request specialized passports from their supervisors. There is also a catch-all category that prohibits Cubans "for other reasons of public interest" from obtaining passports.

"We would note that the Cuban government has not lifted the measures it has in place to preserve what it calls the human capital created by the revolution. So the question is going to be whether those other requirements are going to continue to restrict the ability of the Cuban people to take advantage of this change," said Victoria Nu-

land, a U.S. State Department spokeswoman, in a Tuesday briefing.

If the reform were real, it wouldn't place restrictions on professionals, said Ger-

ardo de la Paz, who was at an air conditioning repair shop in Hialeah on Tuesday when the new policy was announced. "It's like laughing at the Cuban population. If

they say the brains who studied can't leave, then they're only going to let the workers, those who don't have an education and the delinquents leave."

Syria's Wealthy Feel Civil War Squeeze

CAIRO (AP) • Syria's wealthy, long cultivated by President Bashar Assad as a support for his regime, are seeing their businesses pummeled by the bloody civil war. Factories have been burned down or damaged in fighting. International sanctions restrict their finances. Some warn that their companies are in danger of going under, worsening the country's buckling economy.

Assad may not have lost the backing of Syria's business elite, but some are losing faith. Many of those who can have fled abroad, hoping to ride out the turmoil, which is now in its 19th month and is only getting worse as rebels and regime forces tear apart the country in their fight for power.

Several businessmen interviewed by The Associated Press say resentment is growing against Assad over the crisis —

but they also aren't throwing their lot in with the rebellion. They are hunkering down, trying to salvage their companies.

One young businessman said his family factory in the suburbs of Damascus was damaged Wednesday, with windows blown out and part of the ceiling was destroyed when warplanes hit rebels in a neighboring building. Its several hundred employees had to hide in the basement until fighting eased enough that they could be bused out to safety.

"I feel that they are both just as bad as each other," he said of the rebels and the government. "I could have died today because they (the rebels) were across the street from us and they (the planes) could have bombed us."

Syria's economy has been heavily hurt by the conflict, which activists say

has left more than 30,000 dead. Inflation has risen to at least 36 percent. The currency has dropped around 50 percent, now trading at 75 pounds to the dollar on the black market, according to the factory owner. The government estimates economic losses at \$34 billion — almost half the gross domestic product — though the opposition puts the losses at nearly three times that amount. Fuel shortages have become widespread as the regime burns through hard currency to import diesel and oil at the same time that it finances the war effort.

Though the economic blow has been hard, "we are not at the stage that the rug has been pulled from under the regime," said Anthony Skinner, head of Middle East and North African division at Maplecroft political risk consultancy.

Mohammed told the judge, Army Col. James Pohl, that "the government uses national security as it chooses," urging him to keep that in mind as he considers requests from defense lawyers and the American Civil Liberties Union to scale back the rules for evidence and testimony. "Many can kill people under the name of national security, and to torture people under the name of national security," the Arabic-speaking Mohammed said through a translator. "And detain their underage children under the name of national security?"

In an apparent reference to Osama bin Laden, Mohammed noted that "the president can take someone and throw them into the sea in the name of national security?"

He also made an oblique reference to Anwar al-Awlaki, the American-Yemeni militant killed in a September 2007 U.S. drone strike, and told the judge not to be affected by the "crocodile tears" of prosecutors when they refer to the nearly 3,000 people killed in the 2001 attacks. "When the government feels sad for the killing of 3,000 on Sept. 11, we also should feel sorry that the U.S. government ... has killed thousands of people," Mohammed said, before correcting himself to say millions of people.

"Your blood is not made of gold and ours is made of water. We are all human beings," he said. Pohl had allowed Mohammed to make the statement, but then said he wouldn't allow it to happen again.

Pakistanis Divided on Offensive After Taliban Shooting

ISLAMABAD (AP) • Despite widespread outrage over the Taliban shooting of a female teenage activist, Pakistani leaders and opinion makers are divided over whether the government should respond by targeting the militants' last major sanctuary along the Afghan border.

The U.S. has long pressed Pakistan to launch an operation in the remote and mountainous North Waziristan tribal area, home to enemies of Islamabad as well as to militants fighting U.S. troops in Afghanistan. The recent attack on 14-year-old Malala Yousufzai has given new momentum to the debate.

One side argues the government should harness anger over the shooting to build public support for a push into North Waziristan. The other claims more fighting isn't the answer and would trigger a violent backlash. They recommend peace negotiations and ending Pakistani support for the U.S. war in Afghanistan.

A Taliban gunman shot and critically wounded Malala on Oct. 9 as she was returning home from school in Pakistan's northwest. The militant group targeted her because of her vocal support for girls' education and criticism of the insurgents' behavior when they took over the scenic Swat Valley where she lived several years ago.

Pakistan's powerful army chief strongly criticized the attack shortly after it occurred, raising expectations that the military might be laying the groundwork for an operation in North Waziristan. The army conducted a concerted public relations campaign before it launched an offensive in Swat in 2009 by seizing on anger over a video showing a Taliban fighter flogging a woman who allegedly committed adultery.

"We refuse to bow before terror," Gen. Ashfaq Parvez Kayani said the day after Malala was attacked. "We will fight, regardless of the cost."

A prominent Pakistani politician urged the military to take on the Taliban in North Waziristan while addressing tens of thousands of people rallying support for Malala in the southern city of Karachi on Sunday.

"Move ahead and crush the Taliban, and 180 million people will be standing behind you," the head of the Muttahida Qaumi Movement, Altaf Hussain, told the crowd by telephone from London.

Pakistani Interior Minister Rehman Malik said last week that the government was considering a military operation in North Waziristan, although he backtracked a few days later.

The military has long recognized the threat posed by Pakistani Taliban militants holed up in North Waziristan but has been reluctant to launch an offensive there for several reasons.

The army has said its troops are stretched too thin by operations in other parts of the tribal region.

Taking a Stand for Haiti's Disabled

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti • Coralie Brutus, a 7-year-old with red hair ribbons, is not making the knees of her artificial legs bend the way she's supposed to. It's easier to walk stiff-legged with a crutch when running errands for her mother.

She deposits the clamshell container from lunch in a trash can. She checks on her baby brother. She leaves the cavernous gym at Handicap International's rehab center and reappears in a few minutes balancing a 7-Up bottle on her head.

"She's at the age that if she's going to improve, it's best to challenge her," whispers Gillian Fergusson, a Scottish physiotherapist, as she watches the girl. "It's better than letting her walk with a crutch for three years — and then trying to take it away."

So when it's Coralie's turn in the Haitian therapist-in-training working under Fergusson's supervision, the first thing he does is take away the crutch.

Hand in hand, the two weave their way through the equipment, the girl dutifully bending her artificial knees. Each step makes a soft click.

Coralie Brutus' disability has nothing to do with the earthquake that struck Haiti on Jan. 12, 2010, producing thousands of amputees almost overnight. Nevertheless, she's a beneficiary of the relief effort.

The earthquake poured attention, money and expertise into Haiti. Nearly three years later, thousands of quake victims have prosthetic limbs, orthotic devices and rehabilitation services that were once rare here. So have hundreds of people whose disabilities are sometimes worse and once were even less likely to get attention. They include children with cerebral palsy and spina-

bifida, adults with stroke and spinal cord injuries, and people with birth defects.

The earthquake is also advancing the country's disability rights movement. The destruction of 300,000 buildings is providing an opportunity for the ones built to replace them to be handicap-accessible. Hundreds of Haitians are learning new jobs as makers of prosthetics and as rehabilitation assistants.

The catastrophe may also have raised consciousness in a place where disabled people used to be called "kokobes" — good-for-nothings in Creole.

"The perception of people with disabilities changed a lot after the earthquake. Everybody realized they can become disabled at any time," said Claire Perrin Houdon, a manager at Handicap International. The charity, headquartered in Lyon, France, has provided more prosthetic limbs and rehabilitation to earthquake amputees than any other organization here.

About 223,000 people were killed and 300,000 injured by the disaster. Of those, about 4,000 had amputations. But, points out Gerald Oriol Jr., the country's 32-year-old secretary of state for the integration of people with disabilities, "before the earthquake there were already 800,000 disabled people in Haiti. We cannot forget them."

One of them was Coralie. She arrived at the center in May 2011, moving like a seal on two hands and deformed feet at the end of kneeless legs. That might well have been her lifelong form of locomotion. But when the Handicap International people saw her, they said there was an alternative.

The family was displaced by the earthquake and lived in a camp in a neighborhood called Cavadeux. Fergusson remembers the first time the girl stood on artificial legs.

"She had this surprised look on her face. She was the same height as the other children. She wasn't using her hands. It was so lovely!"

LOS ANGELES • More than 13 million people from Los Angeles to southern Italy are being asked to crouch under desks and tables today in an earthquake readiness drill that organizers say is the biggest ever.

Schools, hospitals, banks and other organizations have signed up to practice the survival technique known as "Drop, Cover and Hold On" at 10:18 a.m. in each time zone in the Great Shake Out conceived by the U.S. Geological Survey, according to the Southern California Earthquake Center.

Rather than take shelter in a doorway or run outside, participants are being told to drop to their hands and knees, take cover under a table or desk, and hold on to it until the shaking stops. In California, 9 million will be taking part, making it the largest si-

multaneous disaster-preparedness exercise in history, said Lucile Jones, a USGS seismologist.

"We rarely see law-of-the-jungle panic," said Jones, who's based near Los Angeles and is a veteran of the 1994 Northridge earthquake there that killed 60 and caused \$20 billion in damage.

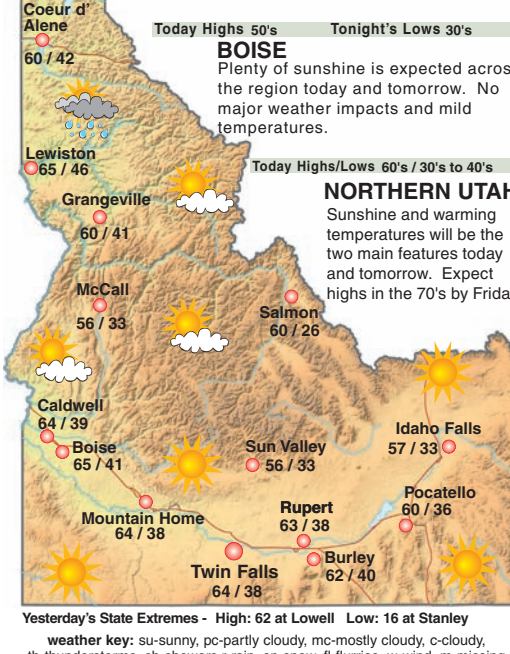

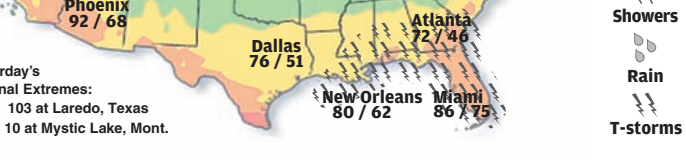

India's Top Court Lifts Ban on Tiger Tourism

NEW DELHI (AP) • India's top court lifted a ban on tourism in tiger reserves across the country but asked local governments to regulate visitors.

The Supreme Court had ordered a complete ban on such tourism in July while the government formulated new guidelines. It lifted the ban late Tuesday after the government announced new rules aimed at allowing tourism to co-exist with conservation.

According to the new rules, no new tourist facilities can be created in the tiger areas and only 20 percent of tiger habitats will be open to visitors.

India is home to more than half of the world's estimated 3,200 tigers, with most living in wildlife reserves set up since the 1970s.

Hundreds of hotels and shops operate inside India's

tiger reserves to cater to wildlife-watching tourists. The court had imposed the ban in July after a conservationist said critical tiger habitats should be kept safe from all types of human disturbances, including tourism.

Tour and travel operators argued that stopping tourism would encourage illegal wildlife trafficking as poachers will not be hindered by the presence of tourists.

The storm swept into Missouri from the southwest around midday Wednesday

and moved northeastward with winds estimated at 65 mph and higher. Trees and power poles were toppled in several communities. Tornado warnings were briefly issued north of St. Louis, but no funnel clouds were reported.

Twin Falls Angler Lands \$1,000 Trout

TWIN FALLS • When Shanon Harbaugh landed a rainbow trout just downstream from Centennial Park this summer, all she could do was laugh at the metal tag on the fish's lower jaw, which looked to her like a lip ring.

"I was thinking, 'Oh my gosh, you can't even go fishing without things being pierced,'" Harbaugh said. "My daughter had been asking to get her lip pierced, and here my fish had one."

But her catch of a jaw-tagged trout led to a \$1,000 prize in an Idaho Power Co. drawing. And invigorated by her big-ticket catch, Harbaugh was back at Centennial Park with her pole on Monday.

A small metal band was clipped onto the trout's lower jaw to identify it as a fish planted in the Snake River by Idaho Power. The stocking

and jaw-tag reward are components of an Idaho Power program that was proposed as mitigation during the company's relicensing process for its mid-Snake and C.J. Strike hydroelectric projects, the company said.

When she returned to the dock, Harbaugh called the toll-free number posted there, and her name was entered into the drawing that brought her \$1,000.

Each year, Idaho Power said, it stocks key stretches of the mid-Snake River with tens of thousands of rainbow trout. Some are fitted with jaw tags.

TWIN FALLS • Some of Idaho's hunts are over for the year, others have yet to begin. But while the hunts are as varied as the hunters, they all offer one thing in common: excitement.

Cyclocross Races Blend Brews, Brats and Bikes

HAILEY • Josh Ringelstetter always feels like throwing up after a cyclocross race because he pushes himself so hard.

But don't try keeping him away from Idaho's 8th Annual Crosstoberfest, Oct. 26-27 in Hailey. Not only is it too much fun, but there's plenty of beer involved.

"It's fun because your friends heckle you as you go by — they even have beer hand-offs," he said. "And there'll be something like a hundred different beers from 25 different breweries, so it'll be a nice match between bicycle racing and beer."

Idaho's longest running Crosstoberfest will take place in a new venue this year: on the old Cutter ranch, which borders the foothills on Hailey's east side.

The new venue should be easier than last year's course in the rolling hills around Elkhorn, said organizer Billy Olsen. It will feature a traditional cyclocross course, forcing riders to race 12 laps over pavement, wooded trails, grass, hills, ditches, logs and other obstacles that force them to dismount, carry their bicycle over or around the

obstacle and remount.

Mud is a hallmark of cyclocross races, but this year's course may be more dusty than muddy, thanks to the hot, dry summer.

"It's one of the best spectator-friendly courses we've had. Plus, it will be a great family event; there's even a playground park there," said Olsen, who owns the Power House Pub and Bike Studio in Hailey.

Some 2,000 riders are expected to compete for a race purse of \$5,000 plus award at the event, which is sponsored by Scott Sports. There will be men's, women's and youth heats and an award for Best Team Outfit.

The event has drawn a hundred children 6 and younger in the past.

The cycling will be augmented with the brews, brats and other Bavarian-style food, as well as live music from Up a Creek and folksinger Tom Archie.

Cyclocross is a cross between mountain bike racing, cross-country cycling and criterium racing. It has its origins in the early 1900s when European cyclists would race from one town to the next, cutting through farmers' fields,

What's Cyclocross?

Cyclocross bicycles are similar to racing bicycles with lightweight frames, narrow tires and drop handlebars, Billy Olsen said. But they have knobby-tread tires for traction and cantilever-style brakes for clearance. The top tube is flattened, allowing the rider to carry the bike on his shoulder.

Josh Ringelstetter says racing cyclocross taxes both his lungs and legs — "but it's a short race so the pain is short."

Hunters Find Success with Mature Bucks

According to hunters and Idaho Department of Fish and Game officials, deer harvest is looking good in south-central Idaho.

“Basically, success rates were up across the northern half of the region, which is where our check stations were set up this weekend,” said Regan Berkley, a Fish and Game biologist. “Things are looking really good out there.”

Cool weather: It didn’t take long for hunters to capitalize on cooler weather conditions this week, said Jeff Frost of Intermountain Taxidermy and Worldwide Adventures in Twin Falls. He had a line of hunters out his shop door, bringing their trophies to him to mount.

“Units 45 and 44 are really producing some nice trophies,” Frost said. “More activity has been seen in units 48 and 49 for deer.” But, he said, “antelope numbers have leveled off in the southern units.”

Mature bucks: Success rates were about 4 percent over last year in units 43 and 49, Berkley said, largely driven by more mature bucks, four-point or larger. That’s a bit surprising, Berkley said. “I was expecting to see more yearlings.”

She also said hunters are reporting seeing lots of deer in the field.

Up next: Elk hunts opened Monday. “Many of those are draw hunts,” she said. “We’ll have more information about elk harvest in the next couple of weeks.”

Muck-Luck: The Mud Lake Diaries

After what felt like an eternity, bouncing and weaving our way along the basalt-strewn double track, we finally arrived at the parking area and ground to a dusty stop.

The sights and sounds alone that greeted our sleep-deprived senses as we pushed against the dust-encrusted door hinges would have made the 100-mile pre-dawn journey worthwhile. Overhead, against the perfect black backdrop of deep space, the most brilliant suns of our Milky Way drew our eyes skyward. The staccato clamor of thousands of restless waterfowl in Mud Lake’s bordering marsh drew our ears westward; it was magical.

Over the years, mostly through trial and error, my hunting buddies and I have learned what styles of clothing and types of equipment make our hunting experiences more enjoyable, while improving our chances of harvesting

our quota of waterfowl.

As a result of these refined selections, many potentially good days afield have become banner days for us in our blinds. Please allow me to share some of these gear selections with you today.

Firearms and Ammo

Though traditional double and pump guns have a dedicated following, today’s reliable three-shot autoloaders rule the duck blinds and goose pits.

Several years ago I hesitantly swapped over my tried-and-true Remington 870 for a pristine 1970s 1100, and I’m not going back. Without the need to manually rack the forearm after each shot, I’m free to concentrate on keeping my

cheek welded to the stock as I track the bird’s flight and fire. Two additional rounds rest in the magazine instantly ready to break down a cripple or slap additional birds with the flick of my trigger finger. New models are pushing the \$1,200 mark, but the used gun market is flush with bargains selling for less than half that price. Be sure to check out your local gun shops and classified ads for your “new” gently used semi.

Over the years, I’ve tried just about every type of nontoxic shotshell to hit the market, and I keep coming back to Winchester’s economical Xpert High Velocity line. I’m only paying around \$11 per box for the 2 3/4-inch No. 2s that I favor for ducks and geese buzz-bombing our decoy spreads or passing overhead at extended ranges. The 3-inch and 3 1/2-inch loadings sell for just a few bucks more, and like their abbreviated brethren they really cold-cock those webbed birdies.

Clothing

Experienced waterfowlers generally tout a three-layer approach. The base layer consists of moisture-wicking polypropylene underwear in a season-appropriate thickness. On top of this, you can layer wool or polyester fleece shirts and pants for comfort and warmth. I like a breathable-waterproof, insulated, hooded jacket with lots of large Velcro or zippered pockets in contact with the elements. Ammo belt loops and a roomy game pouch are a real plus. A quality pair of rubberized or neoprene chest waders complete the outfit.

Be sure to look for my follow-up column; I’ll be highlighting the gear and goodies that have helped us hone a fine edge on our waterfowling preparations, and I’d also love to highlight the gear and techniques that work for you. Email me at rsimpson29@hotmail.com.

Another reason that makes this year’s hunt a special one: His father, also named Jake, died a few years ago, but the gun he used in the field was

passed down to his grandson.

Rambo said he’d like to see his son harvest a deer with the rifle. But even if he doesn’t the hunt promised to be a memorable one: “It’s a chance for us to spend time together,” he said. “The main thing is spending time with my son.”

And if they do bring home a deer? That’s food on the table.

“We hunt for meat, not for trophy,” Rambo said.

Idaho Power Stocks Snake River with 72,250 Rainbow Trout

TWIN FALLS • The fishing just got better for anyone angling for rainbow trout along the Mid-Snake River.

Idaho Power Co. released more than 72,000 fish into the river this week, the company said Wednesday.

It released 52,250 rainbow trout into C.J. Strike’s Cottonwood and Jack’s Creek accesses; 15,000 into the Lower Salmon Falls Reservoir near Bell Rapids; 3,000 at Centennial Park near Twin Falls; and 2,000 below Bliss Dam.

Idaho Power’s federal licenses to operate its hydroelectric facilities on the Snake River require the company to preserve and enhance recreational opportunities.

Some of the fish released this week were fitted with jaw tags that Idaho Power researchers use to evaluate the success of the stocking program. Tagged fish have been released in the river since the spring of 2007.

Fish released this week are about 10 inches long and were reared at private hatcheries in the Hagerman Valley, Idaho Power said. Those that aren’t

caught can grow up to six inches per year.

What if you catch a tagged fish? Record the tag number, date, the reward value (if any) and the approximate location. Then call 1-800-388-6011 and provide your name, mailing address, telephone number and whether the fish was kept or released.

Anglers who report tagged fish through the toll-free number are entered in a drawing for \$1,000 held in February and September. The most recent winner was a Twin Falls angler.

Corrections to the 2012 Light Goose Seasons

JEROME • Hunting methods for light geese have changed, and two light goose season closures were left out of the 2012 Waterfowl Seasons and Rules brochure, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

An exception was added to the rule that prohibits hunting waterfowl with any shotgun capable of holding more than three shells. This restriction does not apply to seasons on light geese — greater and lesser snow geese and Ross’s geese — that occur when all other waterfowl and crane hunting seasons, except falconry, are closed.

The exception applies to the light goose seasons in Areas 2 and 3 from Feb. 16,

2013, through March 10.

In addition, two closures for light goose seasons were omitted from the 2012 brochure:

In Area 3, Fort Boise and Payette River wildlife management areas, the Roswell Marsh Wildlife Habitat Area south of Idaho Highway 18, and the Snake River Islands Unit of the Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge are closed during the spring light goose season from Feb. 16 through March 10.

In Area 4, Fremont and Teton counties are closed during the fall light goose season from Oct. 13 through Jan. 25.

catching trout fitted with the jaw tags, which include information that helps Idaho Power researchers monitor the trout-stocking program’s success.

Harbaugh didn’t know about the program when she landed the fish — which she said was about 11 inches long — but her fishing partner did.

“My boyfriend knew about it. He told me it should have been his fish, because he had been fishing in that spot and we had just switched places when I caught it,” said Harbaugh, who kept the tag but released the fish.

She is the first woman to win the drawing since Idaho Power began the program in 2007, the company said.

When You Catch One

Idaho Power Co. encourages anglers who catch jaw-tagged trout to call 1-800-388-6011 and report the tag number along with the date of the catch and approximate location; their name, mailing address and telephone number; and whether the fish was kept or released. The caller’s information is entered into drawings held each February and September.

“The information is important to evaluating the success of our trout-stocking program,” Idaho Power biologist Ben Reingold said.

Blaine County Motorcycle Track Closes for Reclamation

BELLEVUE • A recreational motorcycle dirt track in Blaine County known as Stanton Crossing closed this week. The site is about two miles west of the junction of U.S. Highway 20 and Idaho Highway 75.

For many years the Idaho Transportation Department held a mineral lease with the Idaho Department of Lands to use the site to extract sand and gravel for highway projects. But ITD hadn't actively used the source for more than a decade, and over time an unauthorized motorcycle

dirt track developed on the leased area.

But no more. Reclamation of the site is required by the Idaho Surface Mining Act, as well as through terms of the ITD mineral lease, which expired in 2011.

ITD crews will bulldoze through disturbed areas of the site and seed native vegetation this month. Portions of the reclamation area will be fenced, and information about the closure will be posted.

Whose land is it? The Public School Endowment owns the land and its mineral rights, and the Idaho

Department of Lands manages them to maximize financial returns to public schools.

The Stanton Crossing track has been used by some organized track riders from Blaine, Camas, Gooding, Lincoln, Twin Falls and Cassia counties, ITD said. Two other public tracks in Blaine County, managed by the Idaho Mountain Dirt Riders Association and the Bureau of Land Management, remain available for use.

Pheasant Hunt to Open Saturday in Southern, Eastern Idaho

JEROME • The pheasant-hunting season opened Oct. 13 in northern Idaho's Area 1, but it opens in southern and eastern Idaho's Areas 2 and 3 on Oct. 20, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

Shooting hours start half an hour before sunrise and end half an hour after sunset in all three areas — except on Fort Boise, C.J. Strike, Montour and Payette River wildlife management areas, where shooting hours start

at 10 a.m.

The daily bag limit is three cocks, and the possession limit is six after the first day — except on wildlife management areas where pheasants are stocked, where the daily limit is two cocks and four in possession.

Pheasants are stocked on the Fort Boise, C.J. Strike, Payette River, Montour, Sterling, Market Lake, Mud Lake, Cartier Slough and Niagara Springs WMAs. Hunters

17 or older need a wildlife management area upland game permit (\$23.75) to hunt pheasants on those nine areas.

All pheasant hunters are required to wear hunter orange on wildlife management areas where pheasants are stocked. And all hunters must have a valid 2012 Idaho hunting license.

Idaho Department of Fish and Game Runs First Online Chat

JEROME • About 158 waterfowl hunters contributed 75 online questions during the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's first online chat on Oct. 12.

Fish and Game enforcement chief Jon Heggen and waterfowl biologist Jeff Knetter responded to questions on Idaho's hunting rules, waterfowl biology

and management during the two-hour live chat.

"We anticipated there would be some interest," Heggen said in a Fish and Game release. "Duck hunters brought a flurry of questions."

Participants also responded to polls, completed quizzes on their waterfowl knowledge, viewed the

results in real time and saw how their answers compared with others. For a replay, visit fishandgame.idaho.gov and look for the waterfowl chat link.

Fish and Game will plan more online chats. "We want to provide customer service in a new and interactive way," Knetter said.

Researchers Catch Rare Fish at Grand Canyon

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. (AP) • An endangered fish characterized by a long, high sharp-edged hump behind its head had been considered extinct from Grand Canyon National Park until researchers sampling for it in the lower part of the canyon caught one last week out of the Colorado River.

The catch marked the first documentation of the razorback sucker in the Grand Canyon in more than 20 years.

"It's an event, for sure. It's something that people are interested in," U.S. Bureau of Reclamation biologist Mark McKinstry told the *Arizona Daily Sun*.

The researchers had been using electricity to stun fish for short periods of time and sampling what

floated to the top. The razorback sucker was one of the biggest suckers in North America at 3 feet in length. It is one of six fish species that once existed only in the Colorado River basin.

McKinstry believes the fish that was caught traveled upstream some 50 miles from Lake Mead in Nevada.

The National Park Service now is taking another look at exactly what lives in the Grand Canyon. Some species have been impacted negatively by the creation of the Glen Canyon Dam in the early 1960s, the Grand Canyon Wildlands Council has said. The group estimated that a quarter of some 85 plants, insects, fish, birds and mammals are gone

from the Grand Canyon.

The razorback sucker had been the most widespread and abundant of the big-river fish in the Colorado River basin. The construction of the dam led to a loss of habitat. The suckers don't reproduce easily in temperatures below 50 degrees and are eaten by exotic fish, such as bullhead, carp and channel catfish.

Martha Hahn, science director for Grand Canyon National Park, said the suckers might someday get assistance from humans or a ride upstream to help them flourish in the river basin.

"The big thing is understanding. Why now? What's different now, and how do we maintain it," she said.

Mont. Officials Investigating Grizzly Deaths

KALISPELL, Mont. (AP) • State and federal wildlife officials are investigating the recent deaths of three grizzly bears in northwestern Montana.

Fish, Wildlife and Parks Warden Capt. Lee Anderson says he is looking for information about the death of a female grizzly bear whose

remains were found last week east of Kalispell.

The agency also is investigating the shooting deaths of a male grizzly bear in a chicken coop near Ferndale on Sunday and the shooting death of a female grizzly bear that was spotted next to a chicken coop last week north of

Columbia Falls.

Also, a bird hunter reported shooting at a female grizzly bear in what was described as a surprise encounter near Bigfork. The sow grizzly and her cub were found alive by officials. The sow did not appear to have life-threatening injuries.

Taking a Walk on Yellowstone's Weird Side

Weird stuff happens in Yellowstone National Park.

Unfortunately, unless you know a park ranger or someone happens to photograph or video the unusual happening and post it online, we have very little idea of just how much weird stuff occurs. It's certainly not something the park staff wants to talk about.

A tour into Yellowstone National Park to photograph the fall colors and with the hope of seeing some wildlife and hearing bull elk bugle presented a couple of odd moments for my wife and me that I will share with you. They may not rise to YouTube notoriety like the child being chased by a bison, but they still provide a glimpse into the oddities that occur in Yellowstone.

We came to the Slough Creek Road turnoff and saw a man climbing to the top of the stone outhouse in the parking area.

At first, he was perched on his haunches on the wall that acts as a shield to the door. I thought maybe he was going to leap onto the outhouse's occupant when they exited, thereby scaring the crap out of them when it was safe to

do so. But then he climbed stealthily atop the roof, glancing briefly toward the roadway as if to make sure we weren't park rangers. With that step, I had to assume he was looking for a better view of the surrounding landscape. That seemed odd, since he could have just walked up the hill behind the parking area to get the same view, albeit with many more steps.

As we rounded that corner and descended to the new bridge that's being built across the Lamar River, I swear we saw Santa Claus driving toward us in a bright red auto.

Yellowstone is no longer a quiet place in the fall. On Saturday, cars crowded Mammoth Hot Springs, Wyo., the park's headquarters as if it were a summer day.

People milled along the thermal feature walkways and crowded the grassy areas to watch grazing elk. A Speedo-clad swimmer strolled along the path from the nearby Boiling River as the temperature hovered around 72 degrees.

My wife and I estimated there must have been a minimum of 20 different nationalities represented that we alone came in contact with,

many of them young families with children. It's easy to forget that the park is such an international drawing card, even in the shoulder season of autumn. But there's some proof in the visitation numbers.

Here's what else we saw that was unusual, but which can't rival our minute of weirdness on the highway.

As cars slowed to pass next to a hulking bull bison as it wandered westward, one truck apparently got inside the bison's comfort zone. The bull made a hooking motion with his head, as if to gore the pickup, which narrowly scooted out of the way. Every car after that gave the bull a wide berth.

The unusual activities and odd occurrences were a reminder to drop the curtain that often shields the limited vision we employ in our daily urban lives. It also begs the question: What was Santa Claus doing in Yellowstone?



Grand Canyon Works Through List for River Trips

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. • The Grand Canyon boasts some of the most spectacular views in the world, revealing a rich geological history that few ever see from the Colorado River that formed it millions of years ago.

Those eager to watch rare animals emerge from the cliff sides, camp under the stars and get an adrenaline rush as they soar over rapids must get a permit if they want to lead one of hundreds of the trips available through a lottery each year.

One in eight will get one — a dramatic shift from a system that once had applicants waiting up to 27 years for that chance. While it's a gamble that results in more losers than winners, the National Park Service and rafters say there is renewed hope for those wanting to run private trips.

"Most people have some pretty good hope for this," said Steve Sullivan, river permits manager for Grand Canyon National Park. "In the old way, it squashed that."

Grand Canyon National Park has collected six years of data on the lottery system since it made the switch from the waiting list in 2006 and doubled the amount of private launch opportunities. Paying a rafting company for a commercial trip leads to a much faster launch for those wanting to snake down hundreds of miles of the

river, and joining another private river trip could, too.

But people like Tony Petrocco see value in picking his own crew and charting his own journey. He's a carry-over from waiting list and has been favored in a sense to win through the lottery, gaining extra points by transitioning. If he doesn't participate in a river trip by 2020, the Park Service will step in and boost his chances by either tripling his points or letting him pick a launch date within five years.

By that time, he'll be in his 60s, and will have waited 20 years for a permit. He's trying to cut that time short by applying for the lottery, looking for other trips to join and closely watching for cancellations. He just hasn't had any luck yet.

"You have to proactive versus digging your head in the sand," said Petrocco, of Marble, Colo. "It's a crapshoot, but what are you going to do?"

The Park Service conducts the lottery every February for launch dates the following year. The one in eight odds for the lottery don't factor in additional drawings held when trips are canceled or unclaimed and often have repeat applicants. Of the 449 launch opportunities for private boaters in 2013, nearly 3,630 applications were submitted. Additional trips were reserved for those who transitioned from the waiting list, which is down to

3,000 from 7,300.

About a quarter of applicants for private trips are from Colorado, followed by California, Arizona and Utah.

Wally Rist, who has logged 53 trips on the river and is president of the Grand Canyon Private Boaters Association, said flexibility is the key to getting a trip by teaming up with someone who already has a permit or picking the less popular dates. September has the highest demand.

"Even if it weren't a lottery, no matter what, there are just too many people

who want to go on a river trip to think they all have a right to get a private permit," said Rist, of Olathe, Kansas.

Allane Brine, of Prince George in the Canadian province of British Columbia, also transferred from the waiting list to the lottery system but favors the list. Brine believes it provides more certainty in a launch date that would work best for her family, which happens to be in the more popular months.

"Chances of me and my family ever going to the Grand Canyon are now slim

to none with this new system, unless we go with a commercial company and pay an absolutely ridiculous price," Brine said.

Commercial trips can cost more than \$3,000 a person, but the pricing depends on the season, the length of the trip and other things. The nearly 600 launch opportunities are allocated to businesses that contract with the Park Service and can include up to 32 people.

Private trips can last up to 25 days and have up to 16 passengers. Participation in

either trip is limited to once a year.

Dave Mortenson, of Kent, Wash., chose a date less desirable for most during the winter after he transferred from the waiting list. Icicles formed as water splashed on the shore, and the ropes on the boat were frozen during the trip, which he said was beautiful nonetheless.

His wife met him at the end of the trip and told him she had won a permit as a first-time applicant under the lottery system. They set out again earlier this year in much warmer weather.

Chasing Doves

SAN ANGELO, Texas • In a 40-year pursuit of fish and game across this great state, I've stayed in some dumps, and now I've hunted in a dump. Well, not really "in" the dump, but we were adjacent to a large municipal landfill.

Scattered thunderstorms turned the normally azure West Texas sky the color of an ugly bruise. We used a grain silo for cover. Piles of twisted metal littered the ground. It was like a post-apocalyptic dove hunt viewed through the dark lens of Ridley Scott or, judging from the number of birds, Alfred Hitchcock.

When we drove up to the silo at 4:30 p.m., at least 1,000 Eurasian collared doves left their perches on an adjacent barn. "Don't worry," said Sam Janca as the cloud of birds swirled past us on both sides, "they'll drift back in here."

Janca has a thriving West Texas hunting business (Double Barrel Outfitters) and guides for everything from doves and ducks to native deer and exotic big game. He found the collared dove hunt by accident. When the grain silo contents caught fire, thousands of pounds of sunflower seed and other bird delicacies were dumped on the 12-acre property.

Since this is a standard agricultural practice, baiting laws do not apply. More than 99 percent of the doves we saw were Eurasian doves, which have no protection under state or federal law, anyway. Janca holds his hunters to a 20-bird limit, hoping to make the unique situation last throughout the hunting season.

"We can do dove, duck or big-game hunts in the morning and collared dove hunts in the afternoon," Janca said. "We can continue to hunt collared doves, even after the season for native doves has closed. There is no closed season on Eurasian collared doves."

That recent hunt ranked in my top four list of odd-ball dove hunts. The first year I worked in Dallas, a guy invited me on an opening day dove hunt in the Trinity River bottom.

He had scoured city records and found an unincorporated area between Irving and Dallas, checked with city officials and discovered it was OK to hunt there. The doves, he said, were flying up and down the river, and we should have an easy hunt.

I met him before daylight and followed him down to the river. As soon as it was light, the birds were flying, so we got our shotguns out, loaded up and started shooting.

We were halfway to a limit when a police car drove up on the levee, its lights flashing. An ominous voice on a bullhorn instructed us to put down our guns and come to the levee. "Great," I thought. "I'll probably get arrested and lose my job."

At the levee, my companion pulled out his map and showed the officer our location. The policeman took one look, said, "You guys have a good day," and drove away. It took longer to get the second half of my limit, but not because the birds slowed down.

Years later, I was invited to an opening day hunt across Interstate 35W from Alliance Airport. Our host said the property was about 200 acres, but the action was best along the tree line closest to the interstate, about 300 yards from the boundary fence.

"Whatever you do," he said, "don't cross that fence. Ross Perot owns that property, and his security people will come by at some time this morning to make sure we're on our side of the fence."

I took that warning with a grain of salt, figuring the famous billionaire's security force had better things to do than monitor dove hunters.

The doves began flying at daylight and we shot a few before the early flurry tapered off. I was beginning to think it would be a slow hunt when I heard the distinctive "thump, thump, thump" of helicopter rotors in the distance.

Though purely unintentional, the helicopter stirred up doves that had landed in the brushy pasture and we got another flurry of shooting. About 30 minutes later, the helicopter came back by and we finished our limits.

Nevada's McKean Motor Car Designated as Landmark

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) • The McKean Motor Car at the Nevada State Railroad Museum in Carson City has been named a National Historic Landmark.

The designation announced Wednesday by Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar comes as Nevada prepares to celebrate its 148th anniversary of statehood next week. It will be in operation Oct. 26 for Nevada Day.

McKean motor cars were built from 1905 to 1920. The Nevada car, the only one of its kind still able to move under its own power, was used on the Virginia and Truckee Railway around the

turn of the 20th Century. It was retired in 1945 and later converted into a restaurant. It was donated in 1995 to the state railroad museum, where it underwent years of restoration.

Friends and family noticed it first, during a party at the Rathdrum home of Colleen and Jerry Flowers.

While watching the couple's herd of sheep glide back and forth inside a spacious pen on the Flowers' 5-acre property, some of the party guests saw something strange.

Among the sheep's legs and hoofs, there were four much smaller, daintier legs moving about the pen.

"There's a cat herding those sheep," said a surprised Darci Austin, one of the partygoers.

For hours, the tiny cat ran around the pen with the larger animals, a dozen Barbados sheep that look like

When the herd stopped moving, the cat would continue winding its way around the sea of spindly sheep legs, often rubbing up against them.

The sheep would then encircle the little animal, and one of the larger members of the herd would lower its head and move toward the cat.

At the same time, the cat would raise its head to the sheep's and the pair would gently butt and rub heads.

Austin and other partygoers said it was obvious there was an unusual, deeply affectionate bond between the animals.

"That cat could have gotten out of there at any time," Austin said.

Busy with party hosting

duties, homeowner Colleen Flowers was unaware of the furry friendship blooming in her backyard.

It wasn't her cat.

Flowers saw the stray animal in the sheep pen the day after the party and was surprised that when she and her husband called to it, it came to them.

"I gave it some food. It was hungry," she said.

The couple thinks the little cat was living out there with the sheep for a while and was likely drinking from a small pond not far from the pen.

They've had the herd for about 17 years, originally bringing the sheep home so they would eat allergen-producing knapweed that was growing in the Flowers' yard.

"We've bred a lot of ba-

bies," she said.

Flowers took the cat to the vet and paid for it to be vaccinated against diseases.

The veterinarian determined the cat is actually a 5-month-old calico kitten, a female.

Flowers isn't surprised her sheep took to the lone, and likely lonely, kitten.

"Several of them have had babies," Flowers said. "Other animals will take on a little one sometimes."

Flowers has put up signs and placed ads in the newspaper, in case the pet's owner is looking for it.

If no one comes forward to claim the cat, Flowers said she'll probably keep it.

"She purrs real loud. She's pretty smart. She's just extremely friendly," Flowers said.

Larry Sloan, Co-founder of 'Mad Libs' Publisher, Dies at 89

LOS ANGELES • Nonsense was big business for Larry Sloan, who co-founded a Los Angeles publishing company in the 1960s to print books that were blueprints for silliness.

The series of word-game books, "Mad Libs," became absurdly popular and marked its 50th anniversary in 2008. More than 110 million of the slim paperbacks have reportedly been sold.

Sloan, the last survivor of the trio of founders of Price Stern Sloan publishing, died Sunday at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles after a brief illness, said his daughter, Claudia Sloan. He was 89.

He was looking for a career that was more "distinguished" than being a Hollywood press agent, Sloan told Publishers Weekly in 1973, when he was by contacted by two men who had come up with the idea for "Mad Libs" — TV writer Leonard Stern and television personality Roger Price.

"In the early '60s, Larry Sloan, a dear friend from high school who had always been a grammarian par excellence, joined us as a partner and CEO," Stern wrote in an official "Mad Libs" history, "and we became the publishing company Price Stern Sloan."

Sloan "eventually became the business man behind 'Mad Libs,'" Stern told *The Washington Post* in 1994.

Working from offices in West Hollywood, Sloan directed the editing of manuscripts that often emphasized humor. As of 1973, the company had 150 titles — mainly original softcovers that sold for a dollar — and expected to gross about \$1.6 million that year.

"The VIP Desk Diary" was one of Sloan's successful early titles, which his daughter said he thought up after asking himself, "What would somebody's desk diary look like if they were the richest man in the world?" The book included wacky comments in his hard-to-read handwriting that riffed on pop culture. He also per-

sonally edited a series of "World's Worst" joke books.

Of the books he published, "How to Be a Jewish Mother" (1965) was a favorite. It came about after humor writer Dan Greenburg said: "I have to go and meet my shrink. I really should be doing a book about Jewish mothers because that's why I'm going to a shrink," Sloan recalled in 1989 in *Forbes* magazine.

In the late 1970s, Sloan discovered a hand-made "Wee Sing" book that led to the firm's popular line of "Wee Sing" books, audiotapes and videos for children, his daughter said.

After selling Price Stern Sloan in 1993 to what is now the Penguin Group, Sloan and Stern co-founded Tallfellow Press, a Beverly Hills-based company that publishes many business titles. Until recently, Sloan worked at the firm, which is run by his daughter.

He was born Lloyd Lawrence Sloan in 1922 in New York City to a lawyer and his wife, who later started a clothing business.

When his only sibling, Grenna, moved west to pursue acting, Sloan and his parents followed. He attended the University of California, Los Angeles, but left to join the Army during World War II and was stationed in the U.S. He also studied Chinese at Stanford University.

Upon returning to Los Angeles after the war, he was soon writing what his family called a "name-dropping, table-hopping column" for the *Hollywood Citizen News* and reporting for Hollywood magazines. As a press agent, he represented Carol Channing and Mae West, Stern once recalled.

During the decades Sloan lived in Malibu, he "never walked on the sand or went in the ocean," his daughter said, but could be counted on "to pull out a joke."

The twice-divorced Sloan is survived by Eleanor, his wife of 39 years; Claudia, his daughter from a previous marriage; four other children, Bonnie Smigel-Dern; Liz Fallert, Amy Harrison and Scott Harrison; and six grandchildren.

John Durkin, Victor in Close N.H. Senate Race, Dies

CONCORD, N.H. • Former U.S. Sen. John Durkin, a New Hampshire Democrat who won his seat in 1975 in one of the closest elections in Senate history, died Tuesday. He was 76.

Barry Conway, commander of the New Hampshire

Veterans Home, said Durkin died at Franklin Regional Hospital following a brief illness. Durkin, a senator from 1975 to 1980, had been living at the home since March 2011.

Durkin was elected to the Senate on Sept. 16, 1975, after a long fight that wound its way from New Hampshire to Washington and

back again. He told *The Associated Press* in a 2008 interview that he wouldn't wish the experience on his worst enemy.

"I'd much rather have read about it than have lived it," he said.

The initial vote tally in November 1974 showed Republican U.S. Rep. Louis Wyman winning by 335

votes. A recount put Durkin up by 10 votes, prompting an appeal to the state Ballot Law Commission, which was charged with making decisions on write-ins, strangely marked ballots and voter intentions. The panel argued about whether a vote for "crooks" should be counted for Durkin or Wyman; it ended up being thrown out.

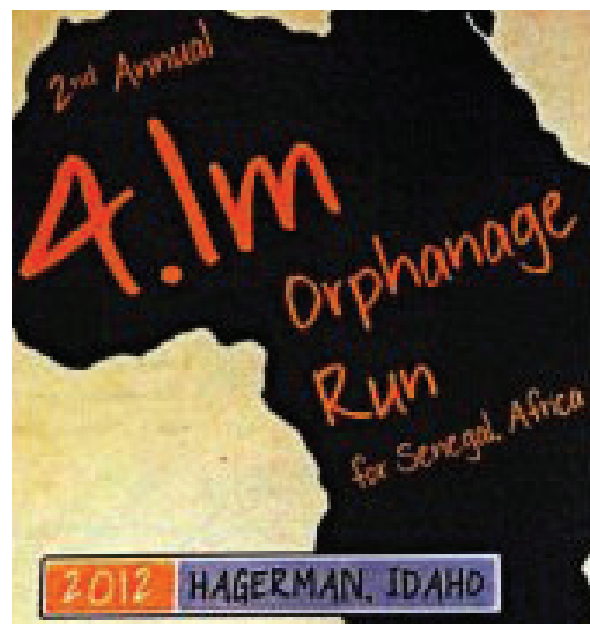

Kramer Being Investigated for Alleged Shoving

BOISE • Idaho State head football coach Mike Kramer is being investigated by police and the university for allegedly shoving a player to the ground two weeks ago in an incident caught on video.

The university and the Pocatello Police Department on Wednesday separately confirmed investigations. ESPN first reported the incident.

Senior wide receiver Derek Graves lodged a complaint with police on Sunday that he was pushed by Kramer dur-

ing an Oct. 3 practice.

Don Jackson, Graves' attorney in Montgomery, Ala., said Graves has suffered from neck and back spasms since the incident.

In the video, which was obtained by ESPN, Kramer runs toward a player on the field, puts his face close to his helmet, and then shoves him with two hands. The player falls backward to the turf, after which Kramer steps over his prone legs.

Graves used a separate recording device to make a copy of the video that he passed on to law enforcement officials,

Jackson said. The attorney said his office was contacted by Graves' family after they grew concerned about their son's safety.

"The most basic concern is the fact that their son was physically assaulted on a college campus by his college football coach," Jackson said Wednesday. "His coach's conduct was unacceptable. It's not acceptable for a college coach, or a coach at any level, to put his or her hands on a player in an aggressive way."

CSI Volleyball Eyes Potential Title Clinch

TWIN FALLS • This College of Southern Idaho volleyball team is tough to figure out.

The Golden Eagles are of a one-track mind when it comes to this season: national title of bust.

That makes for a good kind of expectation management from CSI coach Heidi Cartisser, particularly as her team essentially wrapped up the Scenic West Athletic Conference championship last weekend with wins at Salt Lake Community College and Snow College.

"It's been really strange, because when we beat Salt Lake and Snow, me and (husband/assistant coach Jim Cartisser) were celebrating because we're in the driver's seat now, and the girls are just like, 'Hey, we beat them, good job,'" Cartisser said. "Sometimes they don't realize what they're accomplishing because they're so focused on winning a national championship."

Third-ranked CSI can formally wrap up the title, top seed for the region tournament and hosting rights by beating North Idaho College on Friday in Coeur d'Alene.

The last time the Golden Eagles visited there, it was an unhappy visit that suddenly turned miraculous as they beat Salt Lake in five sets in the Region 18 Tournament semifinals after going down 0-2. They then routed the hosts in straight sets the championship match.

That makes two straight-setters in a row against the Cardinals for CSI, which is making three-set wins something of a habit. Eighteen of the Golden Eagles' 22 wins this season have come in straight sets.

"They're just really about getting in, getting their work

Gooding Boys Establish Themselves Among 3A Elite

TWIN FALLS • During the district soccer extravaganza a couple weeks ago, I came across Gooding boys soccer coach Roger Johnson.

His team was there, enjoying the spoils of yet another successful High Desert Conference campaign. The Senators got to watch from the sidelines with a first-round bye, while the other six teams sweated through the knockout first day of the district tournament.

Ever since Gooding broke through in 2009 and won the 3A championship, it hasn't been cyclical. Gooding doesn't rebuild, it just reloads. And it won't stop with this season.

"I've only got two seniors this year," Johnson told me, referring to those who play significant minutes. There are four on the team in total. I just shook my head and laughed. "The Machine" is well-oiled, indeed.

The two seniors that play big minutes are instrumental to the Senators' success. They are leading scorer Federico Mendez (he of the 33 goals and counting) and playmaker Angel Garcia. But the prospect of losing just two is scary, because Gooding has found underclassmen to help shoulder the load.

Ramon Bernal played defense most of the season, before Johnson moved him forward late in the regular season. He's gone gangbusters on the opposing goal. Ivan Sarabia and Jesse Cardenas seem like natural fits to link defense and attack.

The defense and goalkeeper haven't had a ton to do, but they've put out what fires they've encountered with minimal fuss. There's also more than 10 kids who could do a job if asked.

So why is it that a squad like Gooding can secure perennial-contender status while others tend to run up and down?

It could be that this is just an exceptionally good stretch for the Senators, but there are other factors at play. Johnson gets nearly 30 kids out year after year — part a product of winning, but part because the program builds from nearly all the kids getting playing time during the regular season when possible (only 18 can suit up for the state tournament).

Schaack said Kramer will coach Saturday when the Bengals (1-5) play at Northern Colorado.

"He will be on the sidelines," Schaack said.

Idaho State declined to make Kramer available for an interview.

This isn't the first time Kramer has been the subject of a player's claim of

physical aggression.

In 1995, Kramer, then head coach at Eastern Washington, was accused of slapping a player. Kramer denied it.

Before Kramer took the Idaho State job in 2010, he had been out of coaching for four seasons after being fired by Montana State in 2007 following at least five drug-related arrests of current or former players within a year.

Kramer later settled a wrongful dismissal lawsuit.

Graves' attorney said it was premature to speculate on potential litigation against Idaho State or Kramer but said the school should have known its coach was volatile.

"Things like this don't happen without some type of advance warning," Jackson said. "Clearly, if they'd done a little bit of investigation into his background, they would have determined there was the potential for this kind of thing."

Texas A&M Can Score a Victory for the Big 12

No. 20 Texas A&M has become a fascinating team.

The Aggies are thrilled to be in the Southeastern Conference, but their approach is still very much Big 12.

When Texas A&M hosts No. 6 LSU and the Tigers' nasty defense Saturday, the Aggies will get a chance to prove what so many Big 12 fans have thought all along: Those big, bad SEC defenses wouldn't look quite so tough if they had to face high-powered Big 12 offenses every week.

SEC fans scoff at this, insist defense wins championships, and point to the six straight national titles the conference has won as proof.

As with many arguments, there is truth on both sides. But the debate seems to be more heated than ever because there is such a clear style difference between the top teams in the SEC (Alabama, LSU, Florida and South Carolina) and those in the Big 12 (especially West Virginia, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State and Texas Tech).

Texas A&M can score a victory of sorts for the conference it left behind over the next few weeks.

The Aggies lead the SEC and are tied for sixth in the nation in total offense at 543 yards per game, behind fabulous redshirt freshman quarterback Johnny Manziel (aka Johnny Football). They average 47 points, run a fast-paced spread offense and are everything that makes fans (and coaches) of a more traditional approach to football cringe.

The Aggies lost 20-17 to open the season against No. 3 Florida, coached by former defensive coordinator Will Muschamp. Chalk one up for old-school football. Since then they've scored 88 points combined in victories against Arkansas and Mississippi, two teams that prove not everybody in the SEC plays big-time defense.

After LSU, A&M plays three straight road games

against Auburn, No. 15 Mississippi State and No. 1 Alabama.

Crimson Tide coach Nick Saban made news a few weeks back when he responded to a question about up-tempo offenses by suggesting there were safety issues to consider when teams run so many plays, especially for defenses that can't substitute as often.

"I just think there's got to be some sense of fairness in terms of asking, 'Is this what we want football to be?'" he said.

Aggies first-year coach Kevin Sumlin, who served as an assistant for seven seasons in the Big 12 before becoming the head coach at Houston, was asked about the fairness of the no-huddle. His dismissive response was, basically, his team plays by the rules.

Saban is not the only defensive-minded coach feeling a bit, well, defensive these days.

You can be certain that those on that side of the ball will push for some rules changes in the next few years to slow things down a bit. And you can be just as sure that the guys on the offense side will push back.

Whether it goes anywhere, who knows?

Grant Teaff, the former Baylor coach who now heads the American Football Coaches Association, said his group annually surveys coaches for ideas about tweaking rules.

"It's a legitimate concern our defensive coaches have about being able to substitute," Teaff said. "But that's part of the challenge. The game changes; offenses catch up to defenses.

"That's what football is. It's in a constant cycle of change."

Though defensive coaches are correct to contend it's been cycling in favor of offense for years.

"The thing I hear from my defensive friends is all defensive coordinators are either on the way in or on the way out (of a job)," Teaff said. "Defensive coordinator is a tough job in some leagues right now."

And the two best teams in the division, the San Francisco 49ers (No. 5 in the AP Pro32) and Seattle Seahawks (No. 9) face off in the city by the bay on tonight.

Even though they come off their worst performance of the season in a 23-3 home loss to the Giants, the Niners are 7-point favorites — despite the Seahawks coming off a stirring comeback victory against New England.

"You've got to dust yourself off and ride," 49ers coach Jim Harbaugh said. "Right now we have no choice. We have to get to Seattle right quick. We've got a football fight coming."

Much of that fight figures to be on the ground. Marshawn Lynch leads the NFC in rushing and is third in the league with 549 yards. Last year, he gained 107 against the 49ers and snapped San Francisco's string of 36 successive games not allowing a 100-yard gainer.

"Their running game is the bread and butter of their offense," Niners defensive coordinator Vic Fangio said.

For Seattle to pull slightly ahead in the NFC West race — the Seahawks, 49ers and Cardinals are all 4-2; the Rams are 3-3 — it must stymie the 49ers' running game. Frank Gore has 470 yards rushing and a 5.4-yard average, better than Lynch's 4.3.

With the way Alex Smith struggled against a Giants defense that hadn't been all that impressive beforehand, the Seahawks could present a huge challenge to San Francisco's passing attack at Candlestick Park.

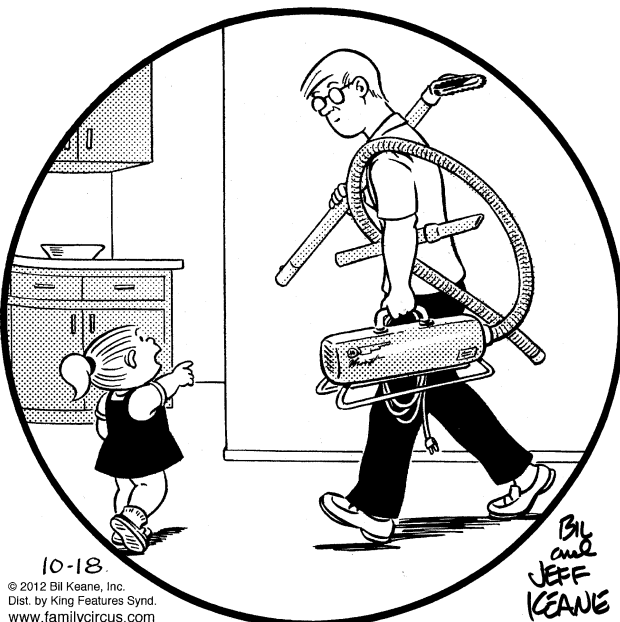

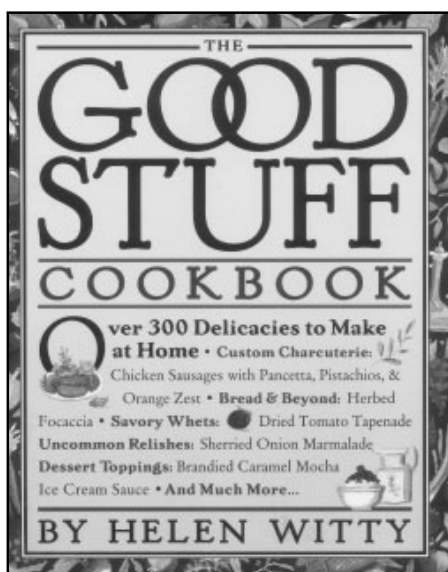

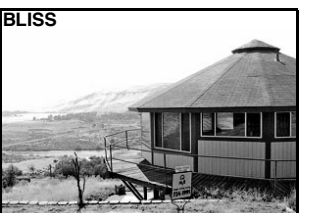

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

When the Open teams of England and Turkey met in the 2008 European Championships, Yalcin Atabey of Turkey had done well to reach five clubs as South. Those declarers who ended in three no-trump, whether North or South, were doomed to fail, as both East and West had natural red-suit leads.

In opposition were England's Hackett twins, Justin and Jason, and Justin led a heart against the club game. At first glance, there appear to be three losers — one in each of the red suits plus the spade ace. But with those excellent spade intermediates in dummy, the contract looks safe. Declarer will win the heart lead, enter dummy in trumps, and lead a spade to the king. West wins with the ace and leads a heart to East's king. East does best to return a diamond. However, a spade to the queen and a spade ruff set up the suit. It only remains to finish drawing trump and discard two diamonds from hand on dummy's spades.

Declarer began as prophesied. At trick three, Atabey led a spade to the king, which held, Justin ducking impassively. South continued with a spade to the 10. In with the jack, Jason returned a diamond, taken by dummy's ace. Atabey drew the remaining trumps, then confidently led the spade queen, on which he discarded a diamond, believing that East held the ace. But it was West who produced this card, and his diamond return saw the game drift two down.

ANSWER: Whether you play two clubs as forcing or not, that is the call you should make now. You have no idea what the correct strain or level for this hand is (or even if it is your side's hand), so make a natural call and wait to support spades at your next turn, suggesting very much this sort of hand.

Today's Highlight:
On Oct. 18, 1962, James D. Watson, Francis Crick and Maurice Wilkins were honored with the Nobel Prize for Medicine and Physiology for determining the double-helix molecular structure of DNA.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1812, during the War of 1812, the British ship HMS Frolic was captured off the Virginia coast by the crew of the USS Wasp, which was in turn captured by the HMS Poitiers.

In 1867, the United States took formal possession of Alaska from Russia.

In 1892, the first long-distance telephone line between New York and Chicago was officially opened (it could only handle one call at a time).

In 1912, black boxer Jack Johnson was arrested in Chicago, accused of violating the Mann Act because of his relationship with his white girlfriend, Lucille Cameron. (The case collapsed when Cameron refused to cooperate, but Johnson was later re-arrested and convicted on the testimony of a former mistress, Belle Schreiber.)

In 1931, inventor Thomas Alva Edison died in West Orange, N.J., at age 84.

In 1944, Soviet troops invaded Czechoslovakia during World War II.

In 1961, the movie musical "West Side Story," starring Natalie Wood and Richard Beymer, premiered in New York, the film's setting.

In 1969, the federal government banned artificial sweeteners known as cyclamates because of evidence they caused cancer in laboratory rats.

In 1972, Congress passed the Clean Water Act, overriding President Richard M. Nixon's veto.

In 1977, West German commandos stormed a hijacked Lufthansa jetliner on the ground in Mogadishu, Somalia, freeing all 86 hostages and killing three of the four hijackers.

In 1982, former first lady Bess Truman died at her home in Independence, Mo., at age 97.

In 2001, CBS News announced that an employee in anchorman Dan Rather's office had tested positive for skin anthrax. Four disciples of Osama bin Laden were sentenced in New York to life without parole for their roles in the deadly 1998 bombings of two U.S. embassies in Africa.

Ten years ago: The Vatican demanded that America's Roman Catholic bishops revise their hard-line crack-down policy on sexually abusive priests, saying that elements conflicted with universal church law. (In 2005, the U.S. bishops voted overwhelmingly to stick with the main points of the discipline plan.)

Five years ago: Former Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto returned to Pakistan, ending eight years of self-imposed exile; a suicide bombing in a crowd welcoming her killed more than 140 people, but Bhutto escaped unhurt. (However, she was slain in December 2007.) Former Joint Chiefs chairman William Crowe (krow) died in Bethesda, Md., at age 82. Manager Joe Torre, rejecting a pay cut, left the New York Yankees.

One year ago: Fifty wild animals were released by the owner of an eastern Ohio farm, Terry Thompson, who then committed suicide; authorities killed 48 of the creatures, while the remaining two were presumed eaten by other animals. The Republican presidential candidates laced into each other in their latest debate, held in Las Vegas; Mitt Romney emerged as still the person to beat, even as he was called out on the issues of illegal immigration, health care and jobs. Israeli soldier Gilad Shalit emerged from five years in captivity as Hamas militants hand him over to Egyptian mediators in an exchange for 1,000 Palestinian prisoners.
