TWIN FALLS • On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council approved a petition to create a local improvement district for Chobani.
LIDs are small taxing districts that provide funding for infrastructure affects property owned by Chobani, said City Manager Travis Rothweiler. But unlike most improvement districts, this LID includes improvements that extend beyond Chobani's property, such as wastewater and road improvements.

## Panel:Small Businesses Must Prepare for Changes under Health Care Reform

TWIN FALLS • It's been more than two years since the health care reform law passed, but Stephanie Jaskowski still has questions. As the financial director of Blaine Aanor Extenced Care, Jaskowski sai she's worried about the rising costs of "Costs are going up and we are raising our deductibles," she said. their business in the future. The message wasn't all positive. The Idaho Business Review-sponsored panelists explained that while the reform law helps address several problems inside the health care system, it doesn't
For example, businesses that have fewer than 50 employees that chooseto not offer health insurance will be hit with a $\$ 2,000$ fine for every full-time employee. However, the fine doesn't count the first 30 employees. "Businesses are going to have to change their strategy", said Stephen Cilley, a forum panelist and CEO of
Ataraxis, a professional employer organization based in Boise. "You can hire as many part-time jobs as you want.

Employers don't have to pay anything for it as long as they remain under 30 part-time workers to make up for the full-time equivalent."
However, choosing not to provide health insurance could hurt recruiting competitive employees, said Marnie Packard, manag
ment Relations.
ment Relations.
"This is not afi
arecruiting decision"" she said. "Busi nesses need to start figuring what they want to do in the future now."
For Jaskowski, she agrees that Blaine Manor's premiums are expensive but doesn't know if they will drop in the future.
"There isn't a lot of incentive to grow, she said. "Smail employers are
being forced to strategize, and we're still figuring out what that will mean for us."

While it is too scary for Obama to tell people in somany words, his races to the top in schools and cars are both based on one brutal fact: "The high-wage, medium-skilled jobis over", as Stefanie Sanford, a senior education expert at the Gates Foundation, puts it. The only high-wage jobs, whether in manufacturing or services, will behigh-skilled ones, requiring more and better education.
Inthe Race to the Topin schools, Education Secretary Margaret Spellings, and President George W. Bush, who put inplace No Child Left Behind. Thoughnever perfect, No Child Left Behind was still a game-changer for education reform because it gave us the data to see not only how indiidual schools were doing.
The purpose of Raceto the Top, Duncan explained tome, was basically to say that if we now live in a world where every good high-wage job requires more skill, we need toget "to college- and career-ready standards", measured agains the best in the world, because that is whom our kids will be competing against. # Retirement Worries Grow; 30 -somethings Most Uneasy

WASHINGTON • Younger
Americans in their late 30s
are now the group most
likely to doubt they will be
financially secure after re-
tirement, a major shift from
three years ago when baby
boomers nearing retirement
age expressed the greatest
worry.
The survey findings by
the Pew Research Center,
released Monday, reflect the
impact of a weak economic
recovery beginning in 2009
that has shown stock mar-
ket gains while housing val-
ues remain decimated.
As a whole, reterement
worries rose across all age
groups - roughly 38 per-
cent of U.S. adults say they
are "not too" or "not at all"
confident that they will
have sufficiently sized fi-
nancial nest eggs, according
to the independent research
group. That's up from 25
percent in 2009.
But the concerns are in-
creasing the egreatest among
younger adults approaching
middle age, whose equity in
their homes represents
most of their net worth.
About 49 percent of those
ages $35-44$ said they had
little or no confidence that
they will havee enough mon-
ey for retirement, more
than double the 20 percent
share in that age group who
said so in 2009.
Baby boomers born be-
tween 1946 and 1964 also
reported having more re-
tirement anxieties than be-
fore, but now to a lesser de-
gree compared to their

True to their motto, the Boy Scouts tried to be prepared. For months, they braced for
the backlash sure to follow the backlash sure to follow
the court-ordered release of voluminous confidential files detailing decades of alleged sex abuse by leaders. Now the files are public, lawyers are calling for a congressional investigation and
the Boy Scouts of America the Boy Scouts of Ame The files released week are old - dating from 1959 to 1985. Many of the alleged abusers listed in the files may well be dead. And the Scouts, while apologiz-
ing for past mistakes, have
significantly improved their youth protection program in recent years.
Still, release of 14,500
pages on alleged abusers is pages on alleged abusers is an unwelcome development
for an organization struggling to halt a decades-long membership drop while incurring criticism for its policy of excluding gays. "It does pose a challenge for the Scouts, whether they're going to be able to
win back the confidence of the public," said David Finkelhor, director of the Crimes Against Children Research Center at the Uni-
versity of New Hanpshire

She said she felt him touch her, and later he began taking pictures of her. Rosales is scheduled to be sentenced on the voyeurism charge on Dec. 17.

To be third in hand at favorable vulnerability after two passes is a delightful position. You know that your left-hand opponent has a good hand, so you can make life as difficult for him as you dare.
Here, West had a good club suit and virtually no defense, so he opted for the three-level preempt, which worked very well. North's takeout double was clear, and South was happy enough to bid his reasonable five-card diamond suit. That ended the auction.

After cashing two rounds of clubs, West had to decide what to do next and found a good play, the opportunity for which crops up quite frequently if you are on the lookout for it. He switched to the spade THREE.
Declarer won with the ace and no longer had a winning line. As soon as East got in with a redsuit trick, he could play anoth er spade, establishing his own he was next on lead.

Declarer now cashed the diamond ace and played hearts. East took his ace and led a second
spade. Declarer won and continspade. Declarer won and contin-
ued with hearts, hoping that East had four hearts and three diamonds, but West ruffed with his diamond seven, and three diamonds went down a trick.
Note that if West had switched to the spade jack, that would have sunk the defense, for East would not have been able to continue the suit when he got in.
