## Gooding Girl Still Recovering from Shooting

**GOODING** • Friends of a Gooding girl who was shot earlier this month while out on a family hunting trip have set up a bank account to benefit her family.

Family friend Teresa Smith said India McHan, 10, is still in the intensive care unit at Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in

Boise. She's been there since the incident on Oct. 12.

Smith said the family was up in the mountains for a hunting and camping trip. India was sitting on a log with her father, Eric McHan, she said.

"All of a sudden she was hit," Smith said.

The next minute Eric McHan

was racing down the mountain to get cell-phone service so he could call 911, she said.

From the mountain, India was taken by air ambulance to Saint Alphonsus. Associated Press reports say she was shot in the groin; Smith said the family isn't sure where the shot came from.

The Elmore County Sheriff's Office is investigating the incident. The sheriff could not be reached for an update Monday due to a separate trial currently under way in the county.

Smith said for now the family isn't concentrating as much on how the shooting happened, but rather on their daughter's recovery.

"It's going to be a long process,"

## Identifying City of Rocks Body Could Take Months

**BURLEY** • A DNA confirmation of whether skeletal remains found this month are of missing Rupert woman Norine Boyd could take six months or even longer.

Cassia County Coroner Craig Rinehart told the Cassia County commissioners during Monday's county business meeting that DNA collected from a partial skeleton found at the City of Rocks National Reserve earlier this month has been sent to the University of Texas at El Paso.

Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd said evidence was found near the remains that indicates the body may belong to Boyd, who went missing in December 1988. Her car was found in March 1989 near the Twin Sisters rock formation.

Rinehart said there will not be any charge for the DNA tests.

Rinehart said DNA swabs were taken from Boyd's three sons to will give officials a familial comparison.

# Crimes Against Wildlife

The victims aren't human, but many other aspects of a poaching case are approached in the same way.

**TWIN FALLS** • When a person commits a crime against another, someone calls police. When a home is burglarized, an alarm alerts the authorities.

But when a trophy bull elk is harvested out of season or a yearling moose is shot from a roadway, who reports it?

"We don't have anybody to report to us when something bad happens to them," said Gary Hompland, regional conservation officer for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

Welcome to the world of fish and wildlife crimes, where the victims are rarely human yet the crimes affect every Idahoan.

"They're actually a crime against all the people of Idaho," he said. "All the citizens of Idaho own these animals."

And the best way to catch these criminals, Hompland said, is by word of mouth.

"We have a public, sportsman or non-sportsman, who are genuinely concerned about Idaho's natural resources," he said. "We rely on their eyes and ears when they're out fishing, hunting or recreating."

If something seems like it's not right, Hompland said, the public should notify a Fish and

Game officer.

### Hard to Track

Officers have an idea of how bad the poaching problem is in south-central Idaho, but the statistics are nebulous.

Fish and Game does keep statistics for its citations, warnings and unsolved cases, Hompland said. But the number of reported violations are probably a fraction of what actually occur.

Everything from weather to animal populations, to the number of potential witnesses affects the number of reported violations, he said. "Sometimes it's just a reflection of not as many people in the field," he said.

Hompland said one of the biggest reasons people violate Fish and Game laws is opportunity.

"If there's not very many animals that opportunity is reduced and the number of reports we get drops," he said.

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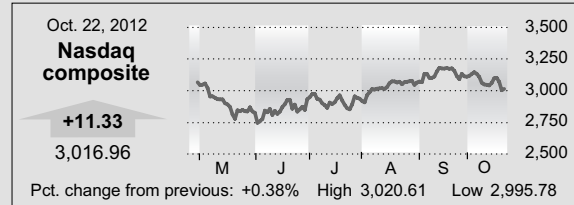
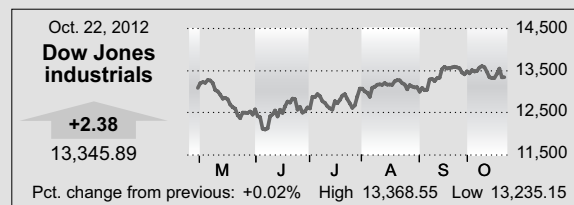

Disappointing Earnings Weigh Down Stock Market

NEW YORK (AP) • It's been a disappointing earnings season. The stock market turned lower Monday afternoon as investors absorbed more underwhelming third-quarter earnings reports.

The overhang of the presidential election in two weeks didn't help. Investors are wary of making big moves before they know who's going to be the next president.

The Dow was down 83 points to 13,261 shortly before 3 p.m. The Standard & Poor's 500 index was down nine to 1,424 and the Nasdaq composite index fell five to 3,001.

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Curious Mind A Multi-layered Magic Valley



Can you tell me what geological event caused the change of color in the north side cut through the canyon wall on the Clear Lakes grade near Buhl?

All of the rock is volcanic rock," said geologist Art Small. "Basalt is one of the most common of volcanic rocks and is generally thought to be re-melted oceanic earth crust as opposed to re-melted continental crust."

"Volcanic rocks are extruded or exploded from the molten core of the earth from a depth of a few to perhaps 100 miles down." "The gray rocks above and the brown rocks below are the same rock type, basalt, which forms as hot, fluid lava is erupted from volcanoes and then cools and crystallizes, said College of Southern Idaho Professor of Geology Shawn Willsey. "Basalt contains appreciable amounts of iron."

The brown basalt on the bottom is much older (about 4 million years old) and has therefore been extensively weathered and the iron has been oxidized to give the rock a very different color than when it first formed, Willsey said. The color changes are

related to the elemental and mineral composition of the rock and not later alteration, Small said. "The red bands in the lower basalt are probably caused by recent oxidation of the iron."

Just above the Olivine Tholeiitic basalt is a thin, light-colored layer of volcanic ash. "This is probably similar to the explosive ash from the Mount St. Helens explosion and probably fell on a shallow lake or slow-moving stream," Small said.

There is a textural difference between the bottom portion of the younger basalt and its upper portions, Willsey said. "The base of the younger, gray basalt has rounded structures called pillow lavas and indicates the la-

va originally was flowing into a body of water, perhaps the ancestral Snake River for a short period of time. There is also a layer of sand and gravel (stream/river deposits) just below the pillows."

The upper rock unit is probably Banbury basalt and is classic basalt, Small said. "It looks like there are about eight separate flows of this basalt."

Willsey said, "In contrast, the gray basalt above is much younger (about 300,000 years old) and erupted from Flat Top Butte, the prominent hill which towers a few miles north of the Perrine Bridge." Flat Top Butte is a shield volcano, which means 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit lava poured off its flanks over a distance of 40 miles.

"As this rock is much younger and Idaho is in an arid climate, very little oxidation of the iron has occurred," he said.

The most prominent plateaus are situated along the Snake River where they have been measured over a mile in thickness. The Snake River Plain was created by a volcanic hotspot that now lies underneath Yellowstone National Park, the headwaters of the Snake River.

Amy Wood Released from Hospital

TWIN FALLS • The wife of an Idaho state legislator has been discharged from a Salt Lake City burn center after being injured in a September explosion.

On Monday, Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley, said his wife, Amy, was released from the hospital last week. The couple is staying in a Salt Lake

area hotel as she continues to undergo treatment.

Amy Wood received second degree burns on her arms and neck. According to Fred Wood, Amy's right arm is completely healed, and her left arm is expected to heal within a week. She received skin grafts on some of her burns, and those areas will take longer to heal, he said.

"She's doing extremely well," Fred Wood said.

Earlier this month, Burley Fire Chief Keith Martin said the explosion was likely caused by oil rags spontaneously combusting.

Fred Wood said he and Amy expect to arrive in Boise within the next few days.

The Woods plan to stay at their second home in Boise until the end of the 2013 legislative session next spring. By then, the damaged part of their Burley home should

be rebuilt. Wood is unopposed in the general election.

"We certainly wish to thank the whole community in the Mini-Cassia area and the whole state of Idaho for all their support, their thoughts and prayers," he said.

violations, Hompland said, Fish and Game officers use many of the same methods as traditional police.

"The forensic science is pretty much the same," he said. "We can do ballistics, hair, blood, DNA, all of those things help but there's nothing like good old detective work."

In some cases, officers travel out of state to solve cases. In one case, officers traveled to Palouse, Wash., to find a man who allegedly poached a trophy bull elk in Twin Falls County - and on top of that, officers claim he bought an in-state license rather than one for non-residents. The case against Rodderick Q. Rosen is currently making its way through Twin Falls County 5th District Court, with a preliminary hearing scheduled for Oct. 26.

In another recent, still unsolved case, Fish and Game regional conservation educator Kelton Hatch said an acquaintance of his was out hunting and came upon an elk carcass near Tuana Gulch.

"We found it was an early harvested animal," Hatch said.

And outside of the Magic Valley, Fish and Game officers are looking for help with a poached yearling bull moose in the Copper Basin area of the Big Lost River.

Tags for that trophy species are hard to get. But Hompland said those limits

help with population goals, public safety and ensuring the hunt is fair for everyone, he said.

"There's basically 100 years of history behind it," he said.

'You Either Did or Didn't'

Once Fish and Game officers catch someone who has violated the law, Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb, said it's not too difficult to prosecute poachers.

"When they catch them the proof isn't that tough," he said. "You either did or didn't kill out of season."

Loeb's said his office doesn't do much investigating on these cases since the evidence is already in the hands of Fish and Game officers.

Rather than treating the cases like violent crimes, Loeb said poaching is more akin to a theft case.

"The evidence has to come from what you find at the scene, statements by people, witnesses. If you

look at it that way it makes sense," he said.

Educating newcomers and young hunters has been the most effective tool so far in reducing the numbers of new poachers, Hompland said. Eventually, people's attitudes change, but changing

cultural beliefs is difficult. "You've got an 11- or 12-year-old hunter education student who knows what's right or wrong, but it's hard for them to stand up to Uncle Bill who says, 'This is the way we do this,'" Hompland said.

asked if any possible criminal case will be handled by Cassia County or the Rupert Police Department.

Kidd said if evidence shows that something happened to the person at the City of Rocks, which is lo-

cated in Cassia County, the sheriff's office would pursue the criminal case.

Right now, Kidd said there is only a missing person's case filed with the Rupert Police Department.

Rupert Det. Jeff McEwen and Diane Gines, a reserve officer and retired criminal analyst, discovered the remains in a rugged section of

the park that was covered by brush. The two were at the scene to secure GPS coordinates for a future search when a dog trained in detecting human cadavers gave indication of the remains.

Rinehart said officials in Boise will continue to go over the remains "with a fine-tooth comb" looking for any evidence of trauma.

# Survey: Outdoor Recreation Good for Idaho Economy

**TWIN FALLS** • With the winter months approaching, Elevation Sports is already seeing some early birds hunting for deals on ski gear.

Store owner Ryan Kober said he anticipates more customers who mostly ski in the area to come in to get maintenance work done on their ski equipment.

And then, there are customers who just want to chat about the upcoming season.

“We kind of embrace the hang out type of atmosphere,” Kober said.

He took over the Twin Falls business in 2007 when the previous owner wanted to retire.

“I just had a passion for skiing and wanted to continue that here in Twin,” he said.

A recent statewide poll reflects that outdoor recreation is good for Idaho businesses, such as Elevation Sports.

Results released by the Idaho Outdoor Business Council show 92 percent of respondents said recreation activities in the state’s forest, wildlife areas and parks are an “essential part of Idaho’s economy.”

The survey, conducted by Moore Information, reached 400 voters statewide.

Survey results also echo a finding from the National Outdoor Industry Association.

Idaho’s outdoor recreation economy supports 37,000 jobs, according to the survey. And it also produces \$2.2 billion annually in retail sales and services around the state.

Olin Gardner, who owns Idaho Guide Service with his wife Shelley, said he’s not too concerned with the results of various outdoor-related surveys.

He’s on the “front lines” in the industry by providing services for about 30 years, he said.

“Every year, we’ve had growth,” Gardner said.

The company provides canoeing, rafting, kayaking and scenic motorboat tours on the Snake and Salmon rivers.

Gardner said the season

just ended a few weeks ago. Although most customers were from the United States, visitors came from all around the world.

For Kober, one challenge in running an outdoor recreation business is online sales. He said a lot of people come into local stores to look at items. But many end up buying equipment online.

“Your local, smaller stores are impacted by that,” Kober said.

It’s not a big deal for small purchases, he said, but makes a difference when people buy more expensive items such as skis.

Kober said he’d like to see legislation that would

allow Idaho to collect state sales tax for online purchases.

Although Elevation Sports matches online prices, Kober said the current system doesn’t allow for an even playing field for small businesses to compete.

At A Happy Camper — a Twin Falls store that sells outdoors and camping equipment — business was down over the summer.

“This year, there wasn’t a huge business because of the fires,” owner Donna Arrington said.

She said people couldn’t get into some camping areas due to closures.

Now, Arrington is getting ready for Christmas sales.

“We just finished with hunting season, so it’s slow,” she said.

Arrington said customers are generally looking for equipment that will help them “enjoy the outdoors with their family.”

Despite south-central Idaho’s outdoor opportunities, Kober said the area is “way under-utilized” by recreationalists.

For instance, Kober said there are a lot of good places to go rock climbing.

“It’s almost like the hidden secret of the area,” he said.

Kober is starting to see an uptick in interest in rock climbing and said fall is a great season to give it a try.

## Unemployment Drops in Idaho, Area Counties Mixed

**TWIN FALLS** • Unemployment in south-central Idaho stayed largely steady in September, while it declined month-to-month in the state as a whole.

That’s according to preliminary numbers released Friday by the Idaho Department of Labor.

Idaho’s decline from 7.4 percent unemployment to 7.1 percent marks the state’s lowest rate since May 2009, but also continues a four-month trend of a shrinking labor force — meaning not all of the decrease is due to employers hiring more people. It was the first August-to-September labor force decline tracked in Idaho since the 1986 recession.

Locally, the data was mixed. Some counties such as Jerome and Lincoln saw declines that matched the state’s. Others, including Twin Falls and Minidoka, stayed steady from the month prior, and Blaine and Gooding counties rose slightly.

Camas County, due to its small population, has seen large statistical swings in unemployment. The county’s unemployment rate dropped 3 percentage points to 10.8 percent in September. That’s the highest unemployment among the eight counties.

Idaho’s statewide decline matched a similar drop in unemployment nationally, and marked 11 full years that the state has boasted a lower unemployment rate than the United States as a whole, according to the Department of Labor release.

The Department of La-

bor characterized the month’s patterns as “a sign of slow but sustainable growth that could persist even in the face of economic setbacks.”

### More Hiring, More Dropping Out

It was a good month for hiring, the agency reports. Month-to-month, September payrolls grew at a faster rate than during the past five years and even ahead of the economic expansion from 2003 to 2007.

With 1,200 workers hired, total employment reached its highest level in four years at 720,600, ending a two-month employment slide.

But another 500 people stopped looking for work, meaning more than 6,000 people have now dropped out of the labor force since May. The Idaho Department of Labor records only two periods of time when a greater number of people gave up on employment: from October 2008 to May 2009 when 9,100 dropped out, and from December 1979 to August 1980 when 8,700 left the work force.

Nonfarm, construction and manufacturing job totals remain closer to how they were years or even decades ago. According to Labor department officials, total jobs are not likely to fully recover from the recession until 2015.

Unemployment benefit payments were down 36 percent from the year before, with an average 15,000 people claiming payments in September 2012. Total unemployment was estimated at 55,000 people.

## Panel: Small Businesses Must Prepare for Changes under Health Care Reform

**TWIN FALLS** • It’s been more than two years since the health care reform law passed, but Stephanie Jaskowski still has questions.

As the financial director of Blaine Manor Extended Care, Jaskowski said she’s worried about the rising costs of health insurance for her 42 employees.

“Costs are going up and we are raising our deductibles,” she said. “There haven’t been a lot of costs savings.”

In the middle of sifting through health insurance premiums, sections of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act are about to go into effect, which could affect what she offers to her employees.

On Thursday, Jaskowski and a handful of other small business owners at-

tended a health care reform forum to learn more about how the law will affect their business in the future.

The message wasn’t all positive. *The Idaho Business Review*-sponsored panelists explained that while the reform law helps address several problems inside the health care system, it doesn’t drive down costs or increase access.

For example, businesses that have fewer than 50 employees that choose to not offer health insurance will be hit with a \$2,000 fine for every full-time employee. However, the fine doesn’t count the first 30 employees.

“Businesses are going to have to change their strategy,” said Stephen Cille, a forum panelist and CEO of Ataraxis, a professional employer organization based in Boise. “You can hire as many part-time jobs as you want.

Employers don’t have to pay anything for it as long as they remain under 30 employees, so they can hire as many part-time workers to make up for the full-time equivalent.”

However, choosing not to provide health insurance could hurt recruiting competitive employees, said Marnie Packard, manager of Idaho Government Relations.

“This is not a financial decision; this is a recruiting decision,” she said. “Businesses need to start figuring what they want to do in the future now.”

For Jaskowski, she agrees that Blaine Manor’s premiums are expensive but doesn’t know if they will drop in the future.

“There isn’t a lot of incentive to grow,” she said. “Small employers are being forced to strategize, and we’re still figuring out what that will mean for us.”

## Extended Unemployment Benefits to End Dec. 30

**TWIN FALLS** • Unemployment benefits for more than 6,000 Idahoans will run out on Dec. 30, removing their safety net in the middle of winter, the Idaho Department of Labor announced.

The department sent out notices about the end of the extended benefits this past week, urging the 6,100 people affected to make full use of the job-finding tools the agency has available.

Unemployment insurance in Idaho usually lasts 10 to 26 weeks. But since

2008, federal funds have covered extended benefits that, at their peak, provided another 27 to 73 weeks of payments. Those benefits have been trimmed back over time to a maximum of 14 to 37 weeks of extended payments, and will stop entirely at the end of this year.

Since 2008, the state has paid out about \$1.3 billion in regular state benefits. Another \$900 million in extended benefits has been shared by 95,000 Idaho workers, according to the announcement. Currently, about 150 people a week are

exhausting their extended benefits without finding work.

Tools the Idaho Department of Labor is promoting to unemployed Idahoans include workshops on creating quality resumes and online applications, training resources to upgrade work skills, job interview assistance including how to deal with questions about gaps in work history, advice on overcoming barriers to employment and tips on using social media to network into a new job.

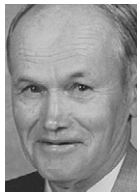

## Arlo Ervin Jones

**DILLON, Mont.** • Arlo Ervin Jones passed away in Helena, Mont., on Friday, Oct. 5, 2012.

Arlo was born Dec. 14, 1916, in Stanrod, Utah, the second of seven children to Ervin and Melinda Jones. He attended grade school in a small one-room school house on the Utah/Idaho border.

After graduating from eighth grade, Arlo left home and went to work because, as he said, "his folks had too many other kids to feed." He first worked for this uncle, Val Jones, at Stanrod and then, at age 16, worked in the Utah desert northwest of the Great Salt Lake as a "Camp Jack," moving sheep camp and cooking for the sheepherders. By age 17, he went to work for Wesley Ward at Almo, Idaho. He worked on the main ranch from autumn to spring, and during the summer he would trail packhorses up Independence Mountain in the Albion Range to resupply the sheep camps that ranged in the high alpine meadows. Three years later, it was at the Ward ranch that Arlo first met Atha, the love of his life. They were married five years later on Nov. 6, 1941, in Burley, Idaho. It was a love affair and marriage that would last 67 years.

Arlo and Atha started their life together working first for Arlo's parents and then managing and leasing ranches in Bridge and Ellis, Idaho, and finally, Dell, Mont. In April 1958, Atha and Arlo bought their own cattle ranch south of Dell, where they worked and lived for the next 30 years raising registered Hereford and Angus-Hereford cross cattle. Arlo worked tirelessly, along side of Atha, to build a ranching life together while raising five children.

Arlo was one of the original five organizers of the Snowline Grazing Association along with Jim and Lloyd Munday, Willis Jones and Tom Nolan. In 1965, these five men secured a loan through FHA and bought the Montgomery Ranch near the Montana/Idaho border. The ranch included 52,000 acres of deeded land and leased forest, state and BLM property and provided summer grazing for 4,000 head of cattle. The association was comprised of 40 members with some members living as far away as Ennis and Sheridan, Mont. For most of the 23 years that Arlo owned rights in the association, he served either as president or on the board of directors.

It was through frugal management and hard labor that Arlo built a respectable cattle ranch. Few could claim to have worked harder or longer than Arlo. In 1988, Arlo and Atha sold the ranch and moved to their "retirement ranch" on the Beaverhead River north of Dillon, where Arlo continued to ranch and run cattle on a smaller scale well into his 80's. They lived in Dillon until November 2008 when, due to Atha's health, they moved to Aspen Gardens, an assisted living center in Helena. After Atha's



death in January 2009, life simply wasn't the same, for there was a huge void that couldn't be filled.

A self-made man of humble beginnings, Arlo was an authentic cowboy, a respected cattleman and an accomplished horseman riding well into his 80's. Above all, Arlo was a man who believed in an honest day's work for an honest day's pay. Though work and responsibilities only allowed him to complete the eighth grade, he understood and valued the importance of an education and made sure that his daughters completed their college degrees.

Arlo will be remembered as a devoted husband, wonderful father and grandfather, responsible steward of the land, good neighbor, frugal manager, a gentleman and a tough, resilient man of his word. He was forthright, honorable and humble with a pragmatic view of the world. Arlo had an endearing sense of humor, a twinkle in the eye, and was a tender, sensitive individual. Although failed cataract surgery blinded him in one eye leaving him with limited sight, he had 20/20 vision for what was most important in his life — his family. Arlo lived his life to a higher standard and, as a result, he leaves behind a family that is better for his love and guidance. We shall remember him as a great man who lived a life of dignity and honor. He will always be a champion in the hearts of those who knew and loved him. ## Obama's Best-Kept Secrets

One thing that has struck me about the debates so far is how little President Barack Obama has conveyed about what I think are his two most innovative domestic programs.



While I don't know how Obamacare will turn out, I'm certain that my two favorite Obama initiatives will be transformative.

His Race to the Top program in education has already set off a nationwide wave of school reform, and his Race to the Top in vehicles — raising the mileage standards for U.S.-made car and truck fleets from 27.5 miles per gallon to 54.5 mpg between now and 2025 — is already spurring a wave of innovation in auto materials, engines and software. Obama mentioned both briefly in the last debate, but I want to talk about them more, because I think they are the future of progressive politics in this age of austerity: government using its limited funds and steadily rising performance standards to stimulate states and businesses to innovate better economic, educational and environmental practices.

While it is too scary for Obama to tell people in so many words, his races to the top in schools and cars are both based on one brutal fact: "The high-wage, medium-skilled job is over," as Stefanie Sanford, a senior education expert at the Gates Foundation, puts it. The only high-wage jobs, whether in manufacturing or services, will be high-skilled ones, requiring more and better education.

In the Race to the Top in schools, Education Secretary Arne Duncan has built on the good works of his predecessor, Margaret Spellings, and President George W. Bush, who put in place No Child Left Behind. Though never perfect, No Child Left Behind was still a game-changer for education reform because it gave us the data to see not only how individual schools were doing.

The purpose of Race to the Top, Duncan explained to me, was basically to say that if we now live in a world where every good high-wage job requires more skill, we need to get as many of our schools as possible educating their students "to college- and career-ready standards," measured against the best in the world, because that is whom our kids will be competing against. "We have to educate our way to a better economy," Duncan argues. "The path to the middle class today runs straight through the classroom."

So, Race to the Top said to all 50 states, we have a \$4.35 billion fund that Washington will invest in the states that come up with the best four-year education reform plans that have these components: 1) systems for data-gathering on student performance, dropout rates, graduation rates and post-graduation college and vocational school success, so schools are held accountable for what happens to their students; 2) systems for teacher and principal evaluation and support, as well as systems to reward great teachers, learn from their best practices and move out those at the bottom — essentially systems that help elevate teaching into an attractive profession; 3) systems that propose turning around failing schools by changing the management and culture; 4) systems that set college- and career-ready, internationally benchmarked standards for reading and math. It is too early to draw any firm conclusions, but Duncan points to some early positives. Some 4,500 state and local teachers' union affiliates have signed onto their state's reform proposals, showing they want to be partners. Roughly 25 percent of the turnaround schools, Duncan said, "have already showed double-digit increases in reading or math in their first year and about two-thirds showed gains."

Although, over the two years of the program, 46 states submitted reform blueprints — and only the 12 best won grants from \$70 million to \$700 million, depending on the size of their student populations — even states that did not win have been implementing their proposals anyway. And because 45 states and the District of Columbia adopted similar higher academic standards (known as the "common core") for reading and math, "for the first time in our history a kid in Massachusetts and a kid in Mississippi are now being measured by the same yardstick," Duncan said.

As for Obama's doubling of vehicle mileage by 2025, it's already driving more innovation in Detroit. The auto industry's main newspaper, *Automotive News*, used to be a sad collection of stories of failing dealerships and excess inventory," notes Hal Harvey, the chief executive of Energy Innovation. "Now it is one technology story after another, all aimed at increasing fuel efficiency. Engines, transmissions, electrical systems, advanced materials are all in the midst of new revolutions. Finally the engineers are back at work!"

Carl Pope, the former executive director of the Sierra Club, notes that Mitt Romney rejects Obama's auto Race to the Top and is vowing to import more oil from the Canadian tar sands through the Keystone XL pipeline. "So Romney wants to throw away our cheapest, cleanest oil — the stuff we make in Detroit through greater mileage efficiency — and replace it with the world's most expensive and dirty oil from the Canadian tar sands," says Pope. "That's a swap only the Koch brothers could dream up."

Yes, the costs for cars with higher miles per gallon will rise a touch, but the savings will be manifold that amount. The EPA projects families will save \$1.8 trillion in fuel costs and reduce oil consumption by 2.1 million barrels per day by 2025, which is equivalent to half of the oil that we currently import from OPEC countries every day. It will cut 6 billion metric tons of greenhouse gases over the lifetimes of the vehicles sold through 2025 — more than the total amount of carbon dioxide emitted by the U.S. in 2010.

But remember: It's all a secret. Don't tell anyone.

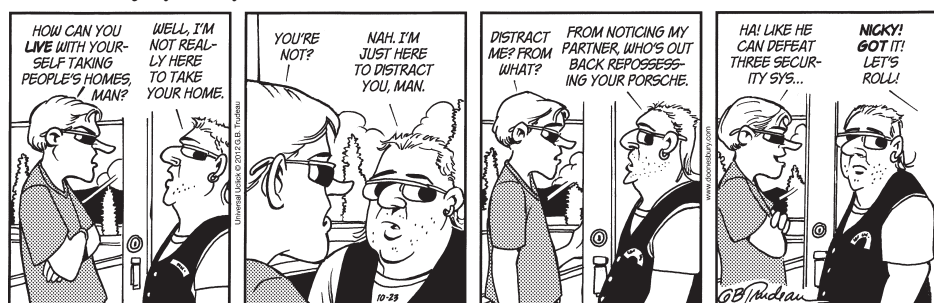

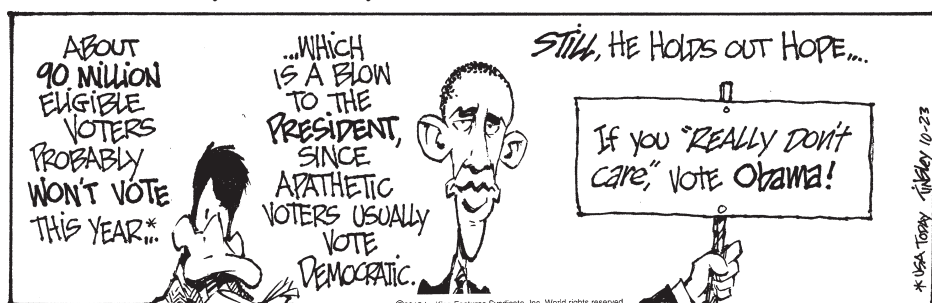
I returned home anxious to see Idaho on a similar course. The laws passed by our Legislature encourage our education

# Retirement Worries Grow; 30-somethings Most Uneasy

**WASHINGTON** • Younger Americans in their late 30s are now the group most likely to doubt they will be financially secure after retirement, a major shift from three years ago when baby boomers nearing retirement age expressed the greatest worry.

The survey findings by the Pew Research Center, released Monday, reflect the impact of a weak economic recovery beginning in 2009 that has shown stock market gains while housing values remain decimated.

As a whole, retirement worries rose across all age groups — roughly 38 percent of U.S. adults say they are “not too” or “not at all” confident that they will have sufficiently sized financial nest eggs, according to the independent research group. That’s up from 25 percent in 2009.

But the concerns are increasing the greatest among younger adults approaching middle age, whose equity in their homes represents most of their net worth. About 49 percent of those ages 35-44 said they had little or no confidence that they will have enough money for retirement, more than double the 20 percent share in that age group who said so in 2009.

Baby boomers born between 1946 and 1964 also reported having more retirement anxieties than before, but now to a lesser degree compared to their

younger counterparts. About 43 percent of Americans ages 45-54 expressed little or no trust in their retirement security, up from 33 percent in 2009. Among Americans ages 55-64, the share expressing little or no confidence was 39 percent, up from 26 percent.

Broken down by smaller groups, the Pew analysis found that retirement worries peaked among adults in their late 30s; a majority, or 53 percent, of Americans ages 36 to 40 lacked confidence that they will have large enough nest eggs. Just three years ago, it was baby boomers ages 51 to 55 who had the most anxiety over whether their income and assets would be sufficient.

Richard Morin, a senior editor at Pew who co-authored the report, said the shift in attitudes was somewhat surprising.

“I think most people would expect those on the cusp of retirement — ages 55 to 64 — would be the most concerned about financing their retirement, (so) the finding that the peak is now occurring among adults roughly 20 years younger is notable,” he said. “Moreover, the wealth data showing those approaching or in early middle age had lost the most in the past decade suggests that their concerns are not misplaced.”

Morin said that it is hard to predict whether 30-somethings will continue to express the most retirement worries in the years to come, but said it was a “real

possibility” given that housing values aren’t expected to fully recover anytime soon.

The latest findings come as the presidential campaigns focus most often on retirement issues such as Social Security and Medicare when appealing to older voters. In recent weeks, President Barack Obama has pounded Republican challenger Mitt Romney and his running mate, Rep. Paul Ryan, saying their plan to replace Medicare with vouchers won’t keep up with health care costs.

Ryan has sought to reassure seniors by saying that he and Romney won’t alter Medicare for those in or near retirement.

An Associated Press-LifeGoesStrong.com poll in late 2011 also found that concerns about retirement were increasing across all age groups, a reflection of the continuing hard economic times.

According to the Pew report, the inflation-adjusted net worth of Americans ages 35 to 44 fell roughly 56 percent from 2001 to 2010, the sharpest decline for any age group and more than double the 22 percent rate of decline for boomers ages 55 to 64.

Net worth, also referred to as wealth, is the sum of all assets such as a house, car, stocks and 401(k)s, minus the sum of all debts including mortgage, credit card debt, car and tuition loans.

In dollars, the median

wealth of Americans ages 35 to 44 fell by \$56,029 to \$43,698 over the past decade.

In contrast, those ages 45 to 54 and 55 to 64 lost about \$50,000. The median wealth of those 65 and older over the past decade increased slightly — the only age group to experience a gain.

The 35 to 44 age group has been hit the hardest in terms of wealth because they were the ones most likely to have purchased a home at bubble prices during the housing boom, only to see values shrivel in the housing bust.

This younger to middle-aged group also largely stayed out of the stock market from 2001 to 2010 and as a result missed out on the stock run-up that began in 2009, according to Pew’s analysis of Federal Reserve data.

The S&P 500 index peaked above 1,500 in October 2007 but then fell to a closing low of 676.53 in March 2009. It has risen significantly since then, closing above 1,200 in December 2010 and is now back above 1,400.

Broken down by education and income, adults holding a high school diploma or less were less likely to express confidence in their retirement finances than college graduates, 53 percent vs. 71 percent. Those with family incomes of less than \$50,000 also were less confident compared to those making \$100,000 or more, 51 percent vs. 79 percent.

## The Competitive Edge

The bells are ringing, and the halls are cluttered once again with a myriad of rushing faces. School is back. Students

abound, all eager to engage in their next social encounter, or to hurry off to the various classes. And with the return to steady education comes that familiar influx of preparations, preparations geared to hopefully push you right on through the doors to your next educational experience, college. The thrust is afoot, and students concerned about their futures happily devour the many opportunities that continue to grow in local schools around the valley. Now, as a student myself, I truly appreciate the assistance on this road to higher education, as I currently prepare my Common App for college applications this fall. However, while many schools are assembling the best possible packages for their students, is there something we are missing?

One of the most commonly asserted opportunities present in our local public schools are dual credit courses. These courses allow students to receive a grade for their high school transcript for a particular class, while also receiving college credits through our local CSI campus. This popular option is definitely beneficial, but it has also shadowed a possibly more favorable option: advanced placement courses.

The name brings back memories for students of a different age who may remember these classes as the compilation of the school’s elect: geeks, nerds and dweebs. But it seems that in our modern college world, College-Board’s rewarding high school option is no longer only for the intellectual elite. Actually, it’s becoming an increasingly standard part of a high school student’s schedule in schools across the country. Why? Because AP courses present the opportunity to experience “college,” and become better prepared for the actual courses soon to be taken on campus. And for the millennial generation who understands the importance of experience, this is a real bonus in education. However, these unique benefits aren’t only recognized by the students taking them. College admissions sift through thousands of applicants as each autumn season comes around again. While tromping through mountains of hopes and dreams laid at their desks in neat little packets, admissions workers have to ensure that acceptance is granted to the best of the applicants. At competitive schools, that means the fine details count. One of those details, specifically, is the amount of AP courses taken. In fact, it holds its own section in the Common App. AP courses present a new level of difficulty to students, and the fruits of such labors represent a well-developed, and well prepared individual to colleges choosing which students to accept. That is why it’s so imperative for schools across the country to offer as many as possible.

Dual credit, it’s a nice option. The problem is, dual credit classes are

traditionally easier classes. They don’t really demand the same work ethic and preparation that make the AP courses so revered. In recognizing this, many colleges only accept these classes as electives, regardless of the credit, or do not accept them at all, unlike AP courses. The dual credit option is a great opportunity for those pursuing an in-state education, but a relatively ineffective resume builder for those individuals hoping to pursue anything else. The biggest issue with dual credit? Because of it’s naturally easier nature, it deters students from the highly beneficial AP courses they could take otherwise, and therefore deters schools from supporting those programs.

That’s the difficulty: Our promotion of AP courses in the valley is generally low. While that may be an umbrella statement, it’s generally true for most of the schools in our community. Neighboring states, and even some Idaho schools, generally offer a good amount of AP options. Most attempt to offer the AP core classes to their students. Why then are our schools here not implementing those very same AP programs? While there are some AP programs available in a few high schools around the area, most offerings are few and fairly limited. Some schools even have a total of zero AP offerings in our valley. The issue? When our students, such as myself, go in to apply for college, it’s simply baffling to compete with those individuals who have reaped the rewards of 10 AP course offerings. And who can blame colleges? After all, regardless of a high school’s listed offerings, it’s near impossible not to desire a well-prepared and well-educated student who has clearly proved their intelligence, over the other student, who has had no such challenge to adequately prove the same competence.

In college these modern days, it’s all about the competitive edge. There are more perfect ACT scores and more involved individuals every day. It’s the little details that put us students forward into the “market,” to really sell ourselves to universities. We need that edge to be able to be successful in our college applications and in our ambitious desires for higher education.

As the bells ring again, and the halls flood once more with a rushing myriad of faces, filled with both knowledge and potential, it comes time for that definitive push to elevate our students towards success.

But right now, we’re just lacking some of the academic prominence that assists with such successes. Dual credit: It’s a great local option. But we must remember to sustain and revive the essential excellence found in that good old class of geeks and nerds, who found themselves at a forefront of educational excellence, preparation and college readiness.

# Lawyers Want Congress To Investigate Boy Scouts

True to their motto, the Boy Scouts tried to be prepared. For months, they braced for the backlash sure to follow the court-ordered release of voluminous confidential files detailing decades of alleged sex abuse by leaders.

Now the files are public, lawyers are calling for a congressional investigation and the Boy Scouts of America finds itself embattled.

The files released last week are old — dating from 1959 to 1985. Many of the alleged abusers listed in the files may well be dead. And the Scouts, while apologiz-

ing for past mistakes, have significantly improved their youth protection program in recent years.

Still, release of 14,500 pages on alleged abusers is an unwelcome development for an organization struggling to halt a decades-long membership drop while incurring criticism for its policy of excluding gays.

“It does pose a challenge for the Scouts, whether they’re going to be able to win back the confidence of the public,” said David Finkelhor, director of the Crimes Against Children Research Center at the University of New Hampshire.

“I’m sure for some period of time, there’s going to be a concern.”

The Scouts say they don’t have data to document trends regarding abuse within their ranks, a source of frustration to experts who’d like to track the impact of the new policies. Two lawyers — Kelly Clark and Paul Mones — note that the Scouts are a congressionally chartered organization and are now asking Congress to investigate the effectiveness of the child protection program.

Wayne Perry, the Scouts’ national president, said he’d welcome any inquiry.

“We’ll be there,” he said

Monday. “We’ll talk about where we fell short in the past and where we are today and how important it is to protect kids.”

Many people posting their views on social media questioned the Scouts’ recently reaffirmed policy of excluding gays while seemingly shielding child abusers in their midst.

“It’s a double whammy for the Boy Scouts right now because they’re already under the gun because of the gay issue,” said Thomas Plante, a professor at Santa Clara University who researched the Roman Catholic Church’s clergy sex abuse scandal.

# Plea Drops Rape Charge, Keeps Video Voyeurism

**TWIN FALLS** • An Oregon man pleaded guilty to video voyeurism charge in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on Monday and a rape charge against him was dropped.

Rojelio Rosales Rosales, 53, was indicted by a Twin Falls County grand jury on Feb. 22 on charges of rape, felonious administering of drugs and video voyeurism.

On Sept. 1, a jury acquitted Rosales on the charge of drugging the woman, but was hung on the rape and video voyeurism charges.

The woman, who was known to Rosales, said

Rosales was making dinner at her house the evening of Sept. 30, 2010, the night of the alleged attack.

In her testimony, the woman said Rosales repeatedly filled up her wine glass in the kitchen while she couldn’t see him. The woman testified she had a few glasses of wine, but didn’t feel it was enough to be drunk.

The woman testified to being sick all night and having a memory of Rosales in her room. She said she felt him touch her, and later he began taking pictures of her.

Rosales is scheduled to be sentenced on the voyeurism charge on Dec. 17.

(AP)** • President Barack Obama sharply challenged Mitt Romney on foreign policy in their final campaign debate Monday night, saying, “Every time you’ve offered an opinion you’ve been wrong.” The Republican coolly responded, “Attacking me is not an agenda” for dealing with a dangerous world.

Romney took the offensive, too. When Obama said the U.S. and its allies have imposed crippling sanctions on Iran to halt nuclear weapons development, the Republican challenger responded that the U.S. should have done more. He declared repeatedly, “We’re four years closer to a nuclear Iran.”

Despite the debate’s stated focus on foreign affairs, time after time the rivals turned the discussion back to the slowly recovering U.S. economy, which polls show is the No. 1 issue for most voters.

They found little agreement on that, but the president and his rival found accord on at least one international topic with domestic political overtones — Israel’s security — as they sat at close quarters 15 days before the end of an impossibly close election campaign. Each stressed unequivocal support for Israel when asked how he

would respond if the Jewish state were attacked by Iran. “If Israel is attacked, we have their back,” said Romney — moments after Obama vowed, “I will stand with Israel if Israel is attacked.”

Both also said they oppose direct U.S. military involvement in the efforts to topple Syrian President Bashar Assad.

The debate produced none of the finger-pointing and little of the interrupting that marked the presidential rivals’ debate last week, when Obama needed a comeback after a listless performance in their first meeting on Oct. 3.

But there was no mistaking the urgency. The two men frequently sniped at one another even on issues where they agree, and reprised their campaign-long disagreements over the economy, energy, education and other domestic issues despite ground rules that stipulated the debate cover international affairs.

On the Middle East, Romney said that despite early hopes, the ouster of despotic regimes in Egypt, Libya and elsewhere over the past year has resulted in a “rising tide of chaos.” He said the president has failed to come up with a coherent policy to grapple with

change sweeping the Middle East, and he added ominously that an al-Qaida-like group has taken over northern Mali.

Anticipating one of Obama’s most frequent campaign assertions, Romney said of the man seated nearby, “I congratulate him on taking out Osama bin Laden and taking on the leadership of al-Qaida. But we can’t kill our way out of this. ... We must have a comprehensive strategy.”

More than a half hour later, Obama returned to the subject, saying that Romney had once said it wasn’t worth moving heaven and earth to catch one man, a reference to the mastermind behind the 9/11 terror attacks.

He said he had decided it was “worth heaven and earth.”

Obama said he had ended the war in Iraq, was on a path to end the U.S. combat role in Afghanistan and has vowed to bring justice to the attackers of the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi last month — an assault that killed the U.S.

ambassador to Libya and three other Americans.

He also jabbed at Romney’s having said during the campaign that Russia is the United States’ No. 1 geopolitical foe.

“Governor, when it comes to our foreign policy you seem to want the policies of the 1980s, just like you want to import the social policies of the 1950s and the economic policies in the 1920s,” Obama said.

## Otter Wants Answers for Power Line Decision

**BOISE (AP)** • Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter asked Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar to send federal officials to Idaho to explain the federal Bureau of Land Management's decision for a 1,100-mile high-voltage transmission line route that Otter says disregards collaborative efforts in Idaho on route selection.

The *Idaho Statesman* reported that Otter wrote Salazar on Oct. 10 with concerns about the proposed Gateway West transmission line. Otter said the preferred alternative selected by the BLM and released earlier this month tossed out routes through the Morley Nelson Birds of Prey Conservation Area south of Kuna and instead selected routes through private land.

"Ultimately, BLM headquarters choose to disregard these collaborative efforts and selected preferred alternative routes that do not have the support of the state, local communities, or state and local staff," Otter wrote.

## Food Pantry Opens To Feed BSU Students

**BOISE (AP)** • For about 15 years, St. Paul's Catholic Student Center at Boise State has served a meal after Mass to anyone from campus in need of one.

The service started in the St. Paul's basement with a pot of beans and a loaf of bread. It's a bigger production now: three fresh-baked loaves and two pots of soup.

"We've worn out quite a few bread makers," said Teresa DeVino, assistant to the campus ministry at the Diocese of Boise.

Beginning Tuesday, St. Paul's will be offering more help to hungry students.

An on-site food pantry called The Horse's Bit will be open twice a week to anyone who shows a BSU ID. People

will be able to pick up supplies to fix their own meals.

"The name stands for a bit of help, a bit of hope, a bit of food," said DeVino. "If we can do anything to make it easier for students to stay in school, we will."

The pantry is a collaboration of several campus and community groups, including Crosswalks Campus

Ministry, St. Vincent de Paul and food banks in Boise and Meridian.

Even the Church of the Nazarene in Filer is gathering food donations for the project, said Ben Moore of Crosswalks.

The food pantry is a response to a growing need among students who are struggling to pay their bills.

## Idaho Power Requests Do-over on FERC Ruling

**BOISE (AP)** • Idaho Power Co. wants federal regulators to reconsider their September ruling forbidding utilities from rejecting electricity from wind farms during certain periods of low demand.

The state's biggest utility on Monday told the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission its Sept. 20 order was premature and disregards negative impacts on ratepayers.

Idaho Power and other utilities have been scuffling with wind farms over whether utilities can curtail contractually-required purchases at times when few customers need electricity.

Fearing that state regulators would side with the utility, wind companies asked FERC to intervene.

Idaho Power now says FERC should have waited until the Idaho Public Utilities Commission had ruled on the matter before jumping in.

Peter Richardson, a lawyer for wind farms, contends the utility is just renewing efforts to skirt its obligations.

## Idaho Sues Ed Overhaul Donors

**BOISE (AP)** • Idaho Secretary of State Ben Ysursa filed a lawsuit late Monday in state court to force disclosure of donors who contributed to a nonprofit supporting public schools chief Tom Luna's education overhaul.

Ysursa has threatened for days to take the case to court. He filed a 13-page lawsuit in 4th District Court in Boise against a group called Education Voters of Idaho.

The group has so far chipped in more than

\$200,000 that was ultimately used to pay for campaign ads supporting the education changes being challenged at the ballot box next month.

EVI founders have resisted disclosing its donors, saying they're protected by federal law, and accused Ysursa of singling out the group.

Citing Idaho's 38-year-old Sunshine laws governing campaign finance, Ysursa wants a judge to identify EVI as a political committee and disclose donors who gave

more than \$50.

"The voters made it clear, when they passed the Sunshine initiative, that public disclosure is an essential element of Idaho elections," Ysursa said. "The citizens want to know where the money comes from and how it's spent. My job is to enforce that law."

Ysursa said Monday that similar demands were made of other groups, including the Idaho Education Association.

# Gesser Introduced as Interim Idaho Coach

**MOSCOW** • Two years ago, Jason Gesser was coaching a high school football team. On Monday, he was introduced as the interim head coach at Idaho.

Gesser, 33, will coach the Vandals in their remaining four games, replacing Robb Akey, who was fired on Sunday. Gesser said he would like to be considered for the permanent job.

Gesser teared up and he struggled to speak as he recalled how Akey plucked him two years ago from East-side Catholic High in Sammamish, Wash., to be the Vandals' running backs coach. Gesser was promoted to offensive coordinator prior to this season.

"He gave me a chance to become a college coach and a coordinator. I owe my life to the guy," Gesser said. "This is not an easy situation."

Akey was 20-50 as head coach of the Vandals, including 1-7 this season. Idaho was blown out 70-28 by Louisiana Tech on Saturday.

That loss prompted the change, athletic director Rob Spear said Monday.

He said he spoke with university President Duane Nellis shortly after the loss to Tech and the decision was made to fire Akey.

"We've been evaluating the program the entire season," Spear said. "At the end of the day, his record was 20-50."

Spear indicated that Gesser will have an opportunity to land the job on a full-time basis, but also said he plans a nationwide search and will make a decision on a new coach as soon as possible.

Asked if he had a list of candidate names, Spear said: "Sure I do." He declined to disclose them.

Idaho plays in the Western Athletic Conference, which is dropping football after this year. The Vandals will play as an independent next season, and Spear is trying to get them into a conference.

Idaho has a bye this week, and then hosts San Jose State.

Gesser was a star quarterback at nearby Washington State. His time at Idaho is his only college coaching experience.

"Obviously, I want to become a head coach," Gesser said. "That's something I get a chance to do now."

He said he would be disappointed in himself if he did not try to earn the permanent job.

Asked about rising from the high school ranks to an FBS head coaching job in two seasons, Gesser described the trip as "very, very, very, very crazy." "Things are going fast," he said.

He said the circumstances were not ideal, but that college football is a business.

"One of my friends may have to fire me," he said. "It's a business."

Gesser believes the Vandals, who have beaten only New Mexico State this season, can win some of their remaining games. He said Akey would want the team to come together and play its best. The Vandals also have games at BYU, at Utah State and home against Texas-San Antonio.

He acknowledged that at this point he is an interim coach.

"But it may be my only time as a head coach," Gesser said. "I've got to take it for what it is worth."

"I'm going to recruit here and coach here for the next five weeks," Gesser said. "I'll do it like I was going to be here

Assistant head coach Pete Kaligis will serve as interim head coach this week and will lead the Cowboys against No. 21 Boise State on Saturday.

Last week, the Mountain West Conference reprimanded Christensen for his postgame conduct, saying it violated the league's sportsmanship rules. Christensen has apologized.

Christensen confronted Falcons coach Troy Calhoun on the field after Air Force's 28-27 victory.

He accused the Falcons of faking an injury to their starting quarterback in the fourth quarter so they could set up the next play without taking a time out. Air Force took the lead on the next play when backup quarterback Kale Pearson scored on a bootleg.

Wyoming athletic director Tom Burman said in a written statement that the decision to suspend and fine Christensen was in the best interest of the university and the athletic department. "The reputation of our University and of our athletics programs is of the utmost importance," he said.

He said another consideration was the well-being of the players. "I think it is important to send the right message to them in terms of taking responsibility for your actions," Burman said. "This has been a difficult time for

Three teams faced off Monday at Carey High School, vying for two available spots in the postseason. Raft River and Challis are in, while Shoshone was the left without a seat in the Class 1A-I state playoffs.

Shoshone (3-5) — which beat Raft River last Friday just to force this three-way tie for fourth place in the Snake River Conference — ends its season after losing to Challis and Raft River.

Raft River defeated Challis, giving the Trojans (3-5) the league's fourth seed into the playoffs and a first-round game at 7 p.m. Friday at Grace (7-1).

"We're excited. It's good for us to be in the playoffs for once," said Raft River quarterback Tanner Anderson, who leads the Trojans to the playoffs for the first time in three years.

Challis (3-5) is the fifth seed and will play Friday at Rimrock (3-5).

Monday's action began with a coin flip, designating Challis and Shoshone to go first. The Oklahoma-style playoff gives each team a possession starting at the 40-yard line.

Neither team could score through two series, so it moved to a Kansas-style playoff starting at the 10-

yard line. On third-and-goal from the 9, Challis quarterback Brandon Hamilton passed to Craig Olson, who slipped a tackle at the 5-yard line and zipped into the end zone.

Shoshone failed to match in its possession. The Indians' running back Hector Diaz lost four yards on first down, then quarterback Garrett Sant threw two

straight incompletions before getting sacked on fourth down.

"Defensively we played well and offensively we stunk," said Shoshone head coach Sant. "It was poor execution and everybody had a part in it — blocking was a part, quarterback didn't throw real well, receivers didn't always run great routes and the coach

didn't call good plays, either!"

Shoshone played Raft River in the second matchup. Despite committing 30 yards worth of penalties, Raft River scored on its first possession. Trojans QB Tanner Anderson connected on a 25-yard touchdown pass to Misael Maldonado on third-and-22.

"I just kind of threw it up there, to be honest," Anderson said. "I saw that kid coming at me, so I just threw it up there and said a little prayer as I went down, and it worked out."

On Shoshone's try, the Indians moved the ball with pass completions to Brayden Barratt and Edgar Ramos, but the drive stalled on the 18-yard line when Raft River stuffed a quarterback keeper on fourth-and-two.

"We made a few adjustments today from what we did (in Friday's loss to Shoshone), but not a lot. If anything we simplified what we were going to do," said Raft River head coach Brian Poole.

In the final contest, both Raft River and Challis failed to score on their first possessions. But on its second try, Raft River efficiently rode its option running attack on a 10-yard TD drive, capped by a 1-yard TD surge by Emmet Boden.

The Trojan defense then stopped the Vikings on four straight plays to seal the higher seeding.

# Cycling Officials Strip Armstrong of Tour Titles

**GENEVA** • Seven lines of blanks. From 1999 to 2005. There will be no Tour de France winner in the record book for those years.

Once the toast of the Champs-Elysees, Lance Armstrong was formally stripped of his seven Tour titles Monday and banned for life for doping.

As far as the Tour is concerned, his victories never happened. He was never on the top step of the podium. The winner's yellow jersey was never on his back.

The decision by the International Cycling Union

marked an end to the saga that brought down the most decorated rider in Tour history and exposed widespread cheating in the sport.

"Lance Armstrong has no place in cycling, and he deserves to be forgotten in cycling," said Pat McQuaid, president of the governing body. "Make no mistake, it's a catastrophe for him, and he has to face up to that."

It's also devastating for Tour de France organizers, who have to carve seven gaping holes from the honor roll of the sport's biggest event and airbrush Armstrong's image from a sun-

baked podium on the Champs-Elysees.

No more rides through Paris for the grim-faced cancer survivor bearing the American flag. No champagne. From the sport's perspective, it's all gone.

"We wish that there is no winner for this period," Tour director Christian Prudhomme said Monday in Paris. "For us, very clearly, the titles should remain blank. Effectively, we wish for these years to remain without winners."

Armstrong's fiercely defended reputation as a clean athlete was shattered by the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency

two weeks ago, when it detailed evidence of drug use and trafficking by his Tour-winning teams. USADA released its report to show why it ordered Armstrong banned from competition back in August. Monday's judgment by the UCI was just the necessary next legal step to formalize the loss of his titles and expel him from the sport.

It will likely also trigger painful financial hits for Armstrong as race organizers and former sponsors line up to reclaim what are now viewed as his ill-gotten rewards, though the cyclist maintains he never doped.

In 1935, mobster Dutch Schultz, 34, was shot and mortally wounded with three other men during a gangland hit at the Palace Chophouse in Newark, N.J. (Schultz died the following day.)

In 1980, the resignation of Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin was announced.

In 1983, 241 U.S. service members, most of them Marines, were killed in a suicide truck-bombing at Beirut International Airport in Lebanon; a near-simultaneous attack on French forces killed 58 paratroopers.

In 1987, the U.S. Senate rejected, 58-42, the Supreme Court nomination of Robert H. Bork.

In 1992, Japanese Emperor Akihito began a visit to China, the first by a Japanese monarch.

In 1995, a jury in Houston convicted Yolanda Saldivar of murdering Tejano singing star Selena. (Saldivar is serving a life prison sentence.)

**Ten years ago:** Gunmen seized a crowded Moscow theater, taking hundreds hostage and threatening to kill their captives unless the Russian army pulled out of Chechnya. President George W. Bush signed the biggest military spending increase since Ronald Reagan's administration — a \$355.5 billion package. Broadway librettist Adolph Green died in New York at age 87. The San Francisco Giants edged the Anaheim Angels, 4-3, to tie the World Series at two games each.

**Five years ago:** Evacuations due to out-of-control wildfires in Southern California topped 500,000; President George W. Bush declared a federal emergency for seven counties. Shuttle Discovery and its crew of seven thundered into orbit for a complex space station construction mission.

**One year ago:** Libya's interim rulers declared the country liberated, formally marking the end of Moammar Gadhafi's 42-year tyranny. A 7.2-magnitude earthquake strikes eastern Turkey, killing some 600 people. Tim Tebow rallied the Broncos for two touchdowns in the final 2:44 of the fourth quarter to force overtime, and Matt Prater's 52-yard field goal gave Denver an improbable 18-15 victory over the stunned Miami Dolphins. The Texas Rangers evened the World Series at two games apiece, shutting out the St. Louis Cardinals 4-0.

To be third in hand at favorable vulnerability after two passes is a delightful position. You know that your left-hand opponent has a good hand, so you can make life as difficult for him as you dare.

Here, West had a good club suit and virtually no defense, so he opted for the three-level preempt, which worked very well. North's takeout double was clear, and South was happy enough to bid his reasonable five-card diamond suit. That ended the auction.

After cashing two rounds of clubs, West had to decide what to do next and found a good play, the opportunity for which crops up quite frequently if you are on the lookout for it. He switched to the spade THREE.

Declarer won with the ace and no longer had a winning line. As soon as East got in with a red-suit trick, he could play another spade, establishing his own queen, which he could cash when he was next on lead.

Declarer now cashed the diamond ace and played hearts. East took his ace and led a second spade. Declarer won and continued with hearts, hoping that East had four hearts and three diamonds, but West ruffed with his diamond seven, and three diamonds went down a trick.

Note that if West had switched to the spade jack, that would have sunk the defense, for East would not have been able to continue the suit when he got in.



Rinehart said DNA swabs were taken from Boyd's three sons to will give officials a familial comparison.

Associated Press reports say she was shot in the groin; Smith said the family isn't sure where the shot came from.

The Elmore County Sheriff's Office is investigating the incident. The sheriff could not be reached for an update Monday due to a separate trial currently under way in the county.

Smith said for now the family isn't concentrating as much on how the shooting happened, but rather on their daughter's recovery.

"It's going to be a long process," Smith said. "The doctors are hopeful and pleased."

Smith said the McHan family expects India will be in the hospital for at least four to six more weeks.

"It just depends," she said. "She's continuing to do well every day."

India recently had her fifth

surgery and had been heavily sedated, Smith said.

Though the family thought India would be covered by health insurance, that didn't turn out to be the case, Smith said.

Smith describes India as an outgoing, kind and lovable person, in a strong, faithful family with five other children.

Smith said Eric McHan described his daughter as loving to ride her motorcycle, a good artist and pianist.

He also wanted to express gratitude for the thought and prayers offered to his daughter.

"They have felt the strength from those prayers," she said.
