Schools React to \$180M Laptop Contract

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TWIN FALLS • For Twin Falls High School biology teacher BJ Price, using mobile devices in the classroom isn't anything new.

His students use their own devices — such as smartphones, iPads and iPods — to do schoolwork.

Price also has computers in the back of his classroom. And in a couple of years, each student could each have access to a laptop.

State officials announced Tuesday that

Hewlett-Packard was awarded an eight-year, \$180 million contract.

Under Students Come First reforms, every Idaho public high school teacher and student will receive a HP ProBook Notebook 440s.

Will the Contract Announcement Affect the Conversation about Prop. 3?

The contract announcement comes just two weeks before the Nov. 6 election when voters will be asked to decide on the future of Stu-

dents Come First. The technology portion of the laws is on the ballot as Proposition 3. The \$180 million contract with Hewlett-Packard is void if voters vote "no" on Proposition 3.

Opponents of the law believe voters will still say "no" and proponents think the laptop announcement will answer any questions voters might have had in a positive way.

Mike Lanza, chairman of the "Vote No on Propositions 1, 2, 3" campaign, said he's confident that voters will overturn the law.

When it comes to HP, he said the company

Spice Trial Delayed

More charges filed: The suspects are now charged with conspiracy to launder money and several counts of engaging in monetary transactions in criminally derived property.

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POCATELLO • The trial for several Twin Falls residents accused in a federal synthetic drug case has been delayed again, this time until February of next year.

The trial for Allen, Gary and Stephanie Nagel along with Joshua Cserepes, all of Twin Falls, was scheduled to begin Nov. 5. It is now scheduled to begin Feb. 11, 2013, at the U.S. Courthouse in Pocatello.

The four were accused of distributing synthetic marijuana, known by "spice," "Hayze" and other names. All were arrested along with Joshua and Shyloh Becker of Tigard, Ore., as part of a national synthetic drug operation called "Operation Log Jam," according to details provided by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Idaho.

According to court documents filed Tuesday, the trial was delayed because the defense counsel needed additional time to investigate the charges, review the case and prepare for trial. The motion went unopposed by prosecutors.

New charges were also brought against Allen Nagel and Joshua Becker. Both are now charged with conspiracy to launder money and several counts of engaging in monetary transactions in criminally derived property.

If convicted, the punishment for conspiracy to launder money is not more than 20 years in prison and/or a \$500,000 fine along with no more than five years of supervised release.

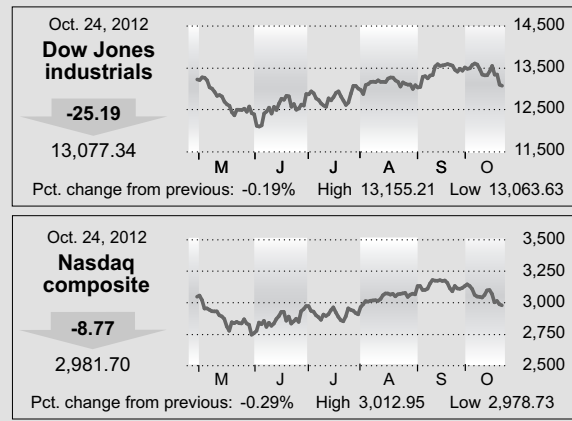

Stocks Stabilize on Wall Street After a Sell-off

NEW YORK (AP) • The steep losses finally stopped Wednesday as the stock market turned calm, a day after one of its biggest sell-offs of the year. Major indexes wavered between slight gains and losses in afternoon trading.

The Dow Jones industrial average climbed 23 points to 13,126 as of 2:30 p.m. The Standard & Poor's 500 index edged up two points to 1,415 while the Nasdaq composite index rose two points to 2,992.

HIDDEN HISTORY: THE CONVICTION – AND ESCAPE – OF LYDA SOUTHARD

TWIN FALLS • She claimed she wasn't a monster, but a jury of her peers disagreed.

Lyda Southard, the Twin Falls woman who is said to have killed four husbands and a brother-in-law over the course of five years, maintained her innocence to the day she died.

Charged with the poisoning of the five men, Lyda denied killing anyone. The men died of typhoid fever, Lyda said on the witness stand in the Twin Falls County courtroom.

Lyda — who was born Anna Eliza Trueblood in 1892 — claimed to be a typhoid-carrier.

The 1921 murder trial, which was covered by the *New York Times*, stunned the nation. The motive, prosecutors said, was the men's life insurance money.

Although arsenic had been found in the exhumed remains of all five men, there was no evidence directly linking Lyda to any of the deaths. Knowing the evidence against Lyda was circumstantial, Twin Falls County Attorney Frank L. Stephan brought in Idaho State Attorney General Roy L. Black to assist in the prosecution.

Attorneys from the Twin Falls law firm of Guthrie and Mills represented Lyda.

Judge William Babcock presided.

After a lengthy trial, Lyda was found guilty of the second-degree murder of her fourth husband, Edward F. Meyer, foreman of I.B. Perrine's Blue Lakes Ranch. In November 1921, Lyda — known by then as "Lady Bluebeard" — was sentenced to 10 years to life in prison.

Lyda was moved from her jail cell on the fourth floor of the Twin Falls County Courthouse to the state penitentiary in Boise. She occupied one of the few cells in the women's quarters of the old pen until her escape a decade later.

Lyda managed to charm prison trustee David Minton, a machinist imprisoned for theft, about a year before he was released. Minton constructed two metal rose trellises in the prison workshop. Lyda was allowed to plant rose bushes just outside her cell window and used the trellises to train the roses up the prison wall.

Soon after his release, Minton purchased a car from a dealership in Boise, and on the night of May 4, 1931, waited for Lyda outside the prison.

That night, Lyda removed a bar from her cell window and wiggled through the narrow opening. She attached the bottom of one rose trellis to the top of the other to form a ladder, then using the ladder, climbed over the prison wall. Using a garden hose and a rope made of braided bed sheets, Lyda

eased herself to the ground outside the prison wall.

Minton and Lyda drove to Colorado, where they parted ways. Police caught up to Minton — who eventually disclosed Lyda's location in Denver — and returned him to Idaho.

Lyda, who had since married her sixth husband, continued to elude police. Finally, with the help of her new husband, police captured Lyda on July 30, 1932. Harry Whitlock soon had his marriage to Lyda annulled.

Lyda was returned to her cell in the Idaho State Penitentiary, and remained there until she was paroled in October 1941. She lived in Oregon and Utah, and eventually married her seventh husband, Hal Shaw, who disappeared several years later.

Lyda died of a heart attack in 1958 in Salt Lake City. She is buried in Twin Falls at Sunset Memorial Park under the name Anna E. Shaw.

TFSD to Take Over Food Services for Catholic School

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TWIN FALLS • When the school's full-time cook retired this fall, St. Edward's Catholic School turned to the Twin Falls School District for help.

Starting Nov. 1, the school district will provide food services at the Twin Falls private school.

The school district's board of trustees approved an agreement earlier this month.

Food service director Susan Henderson said St. Edward's Catholic School is small enough that it's hard for employees to buy food in bulk and get better prices.

"I think the kids will have a better variety and healthier foods," she said.

Out of St. Edward's 140 students, about 40 currently eat school lunches.

Henderson said students will be able to participate in a free breakfast program through the school district.

Since the Catholic school

serves preschoolers through fifth-graders, Henderson said many students enroll at a Twin Falls middle school after that.

"It's just a community effort to help them out," she said.

Twin Falls Superintendent Wiley Dobbs told the school board earlier this month that the agreement won't cost the school district anything.

"We need it to be self-sufficient," he said.

The school district will receive federal reimbursement for each meal served to students at the Catholic school.

"In turn, that pays for food and labor," Henderson said.

Two part-time employees who prepare meals at the school will soon be on the school district's payroll.

During the next few weeks, St. Edward's employees will continue to serve lunches to students.

St. Edward's principal Alie Pelayo said there won't be any change under the agreement. The school, she said, still participates in the feder-

al food program.

Food services will just be under the umbrella of the Twin Falls School District.

Pelayo told the school board earlier this month that the school had one full-time cook, but she retired this fall.

Federal Regulations

One challenge for the school, she said, was handling the added workload that came with the new federal school lunch requirements.

"It's just more than one person can do," she told board members.

The more stringent lunch requirements took effect in July.

Changes include more fruits and vegetables, whole grains, calorie limits for meals and only nonfat flavored milk.

Henderson told school trustees that students are throwing a lot of food away and generating more waste.

The Twin Falls School District serves about 8,000

meals each school day.

It's not the first time the district has agreed to help out other schools with food services.

The district has provided school meals at Wings Charter Middle School since 2010.

Colleen Fillmore, USDA Idaho child nutrition director, said partnerships with school districts and smaller nearby schools "are certainly not uncommon."

"We have had that happen throughout the state," she said.

Every year, school districts go through a renewal process with their state sponsor.

They have to send in agreements with other schools and get approval for all individual sites.

Fillmore said Twin Falls School District representatives did contact the state department about the agreement with St. Edward's Catholic School.

The agreement "is really going to help both sides," Fillmore said.

Grants Available for After-school Programs

BOISE • The Idaho State Department of Education will award \$1.8 million in grants to fund after-school programs next school year. Now is the time for

school districts and other organizations to apply. Interested applicants are strongly encouraged to attend a free bidder's workshop.

It's scheduled for 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Nov. 1 at the Red

Lion Hotel Canyon Springs in Twin Falls.

Grant funding is available through the federal 21st Century Community Learning Centers program.

The state currently funds 98 after-school centers, which serve 6,567 students daily.

has a good reputation. And the "Vote No" group doesn't have a problem with the computers or the company chosen, Lanza said.

The issue is the top-down mandates on school districts, he said, noting that districts didn't ask for one-to-one mobile computing devices.

"Many districts already have a technology component in their curriculum," Lanza said.

Ken Burgess, campaign manager for "Yes for Idaho Education," said the contract helps bring a little more clarity to what was a concept in the past.

"I suppose it will help voters make a more informed decision about Proposition 3," he said.

The "Yes for Idaho Education" group supports the Students Come First laws.

After Tuesday's laptop contract announcement, Burgess said voters know exactly what the device will be, and there's a definitive cost attached to the one-to-one mobile computing device initiative.

"That cost issue was part of question mark in peoples' minds," he said.

Also, Burgess said the fact HP is a U.S.-based company with strong Idaho ties "has some strong value to it."

The one-to-one device is only a piece of Proposition 3.

The law also includes \$9 million per year distributed to school districts for classroom technology, the requirement that high schoolers have to

take two online classes in order to graduate, and the Dual Credit for Early Completers Program.

How Are School Officials Reacting to the Contract Announcement?

Twin Falls superintendent Wiley Dobbs said school districts were notified they'd receive laptop devices, so yesterday's announcement wasn't a surprise.

"It lines up with what we had heard from the (technology) task force," he said.

One new piece of information, though, was how much the state will pay per laptop.

"The price came in better than I thought," Dobbs said.

It will cost the state \$292.77 per student or teacher. That figure includes wireless infrastructure and employee training.

Dobbs said he's waiting on a more specific timeline of when teachers and school administrators will receive laptops.

Originally, the devices were supposed to go out this month or in November.

Melissa McGrath, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Education, said about 6,500 laptops will now go out early next semester.

If voters keep the Students Come First technology law in place, one-third of high schools at a time will receive laptops starting during the 2013-14 school year.

Jerome superintendent Layne wrote in an email to the *Times-News* that school districts didn't know if the laptop would be a

Windows-based operating system or Apple based.

Since it's Windows based, Layne said Jerome teachers are "very familiar with these systems."

"There won't be much of a learning curve for our high school teachers with the selected device," he said.

What Happened during the Bidding Process?

The Idaho Division of Purchasing negotiated with five total vendors before awarding a contract to Hewlett-Packard.

Bill Burns, Administrator for the Idaho Division of Purchasing, confirmed the number of vendors Wednesday. He said he's asking those who want more information to file a public records request.

Earlier this year, the state put out requests for proposals for laptop devices.

Only three vendors responded and just one met the qualification requirements, the Associated Press reported in June.

The state put a stop to the bidding process. Instead, state officials negotiated directly with vendors.

What if the Laptops Get Damaged?

Parents: If your child damages or loses their laptop, you won't have to pay for it.

McGrath said the contract with HP covers those costs.

That means the state will pay for the expenses, not parents or school districts.

What About School Districts That Already Have Mobile Devices?

In Castleford, the school district bought every high school teacher and student an iPad this fall.

Earlier this month, superintendent Andy Wiseman told the *Times-News* the district

will receive a check from the state instead of laptops.

Assistant principal Clint Evans said school administrators are happy with the decision to move forward with buying one-to-one mobile devices.

McGrath said schools — like Castleford — that already have one-to-one devices will still receive wireless Internet access under the contract with HP.

In Buhl, every high school teacher also received an iPad this fall from the school district through grant funding.

But they'll still receive laptops from the state.

Bill Fields, technology director for the Buhl School District, said the iPads are more of a teaching tool.

"It's a great device to teach with," he said. "It's not a great device to create content with."

The other charge is punishable by not more than 10 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine for each count along with three years of supervised release.

All involved already face a host of charges including conspiracy of possession with intent to distribute a controlled substance analogue, conspiracy to distribute a controlled substance analogue, conspiracy to sell, offer for sale and transport drug paraphernalia and face hundreds of years in

prison and hundreds of thousands of dollars in fines if they are convicted on all counts.

A new indictment accuses Allen Nagel and Joshua Becker of concealing the "illegal nature and sources of their acquired proceeds" through store notices and labels stating the substances were "pot-pourri" or other items not for human consumption and states the two stocked their stores with "quasi-legitimate and legitimate items" like tobacco-related products in order to appear to be a legal smoke shop.

In a September interview

with the *Times-News*, Nagel admitted to some mistakes but said he would continue to fight the charges against him.

In interviews over the years with the *Times-News*, Nagel placed responsibility for the misuse of the substances he allegedly sold on the buyers and argued law enforcement should focus on them rather than businesses.

In the current case, Allen Nagel and Joshua Becker are scheduled to be arraigned by video on the new charges on Oct. 31. A pretrial conference by phone is scheduled for Jan. 31, 2013.

SHORTFALL FORCING WATER RATE HIKE

KIMBERLY • Kimberly will be forced to adopt new water rates to keep the city's budget afloat. The move will hit many residents in the pocketbook, elected officials acknowledged Tuesday.

The city collected nearly \$50,000 less in water fees during fiscal year 2011-12 than anticipated. The shortfall was due largely to residents cutting back on water usage since installation of meters about a year ago.

Under a proposed new rate structure discussed Tuesday during a public hearing, residents would pay a monthly base rate of \$34.43, plus a usage rate of \$1 per 1,000 gallons.

The proposed new rate structure would mean higher monthly bills for most residents, although some could see a reduction because of a 50 percent cut in the usage rate.

Most residents who testified during the public hearing said they opposed the rate change.

An increase in water rates would force residents to reduce usage further, some said. That

in turn could prompt the city to increase rates yet again, setting in motion a vicious cycle.

"That's always going to happen," resident Dale Hammond told the City Council.

"You keep upping the rates and (usage) will drop again next summer. I noticed in Kimberly this summer a lot of brown lawns," he said. "The more you (increase rates), the less water people are going to use."

Kimberly residents paid a flat rate of \$30.06 per month until installation of a metered water system about a year ago when the city switched to a rate structure based largely on usage.

Adoption of a base rate that stays the same regardless of usage guarantees the city a consistent revenue stream throughout the year, said Diane Sauer of the Idaho Rural Water Users Association.

"Basing a water rate strictly on usage is a little risky because it's at the whim of the customer and also contingent on the weather," she said.

Sauer analyzed Kimberly's water rates and came up with a proposed new structure at the City Council's request.

The council didn't take any

action on her recommendation Tuesday, but is expected to in the near future.

Kimberly residents use an average of about 12,000 gallons of water per household per month. So under the proposed change, the average user would pay about \$46.43 per month compared to about \$40 under the current system.

Council members said they understand residents' frustration over the prospect of higher rates, but must make sure that collections match expenses.

"We can't continue to operate on a shortfall," Councilwoman Connie Sowka said.

Council members have water bills too, they reminded residents.

"My rate will go up quite a bit, so I don't consider this lightly," Councilman Brandon Hoobler said.

The goal is to adopt a rate structure that's fair and equitable for residents, while staying within the city's budget, Mayor Tracy Armstrong said.

America, Finally Home?

The death of George McGovern on the eve of the presidential candidates’ foreign policy debate underscored a momentous political reversal spanning four decades. McGovern’s nomination for president in 1972, a consequence of the Democratic Party’s recoil against the Vietnam War and the riotous convention four years earlier, made the country uneasy about his party regarding national security. Four decades later, however, voters may be more ambivalent about America’s world role than at any time since the 1930s.



Hence the sense of tediousness Monday evening. The candidates — who really do not differ all that much about foreign policy, although they constantly pretend otherwise — sort of argued for 90 minutes about matters concerning which most voters do not really care very much, although they occasionally pretend otherwise.

Forty Octobers ago, McGovern’s slogan was “Come home, America,” and he lost 49 states. Today, his slogan probably summarizes the foreign policy thinking, to the extent there is any, of at least a plurality of Americans, and perhaps a majority. Which is why Barack Obama thrice insisted he is hot for “nation-building” here at home. And about 35 minutes into the supposed foreign policy debate, Mitt Romney pirouetted into praise of Medicaid reforms in Arizona and Rhode Island, and then professions of love for teachers. In a time when consensus is elusive, the candidates agreed on the imperative need to do something to lower Americans’ standard of living by making imports from China more expensive. Obama explained that he waged a war of regime change in Libya not, as he said at the time, because of a humanitarian responsibility to protect Libyans from Moammar Gaddafi, but rather because Gaddafi “had more American blood on his hands” than anyone then living.

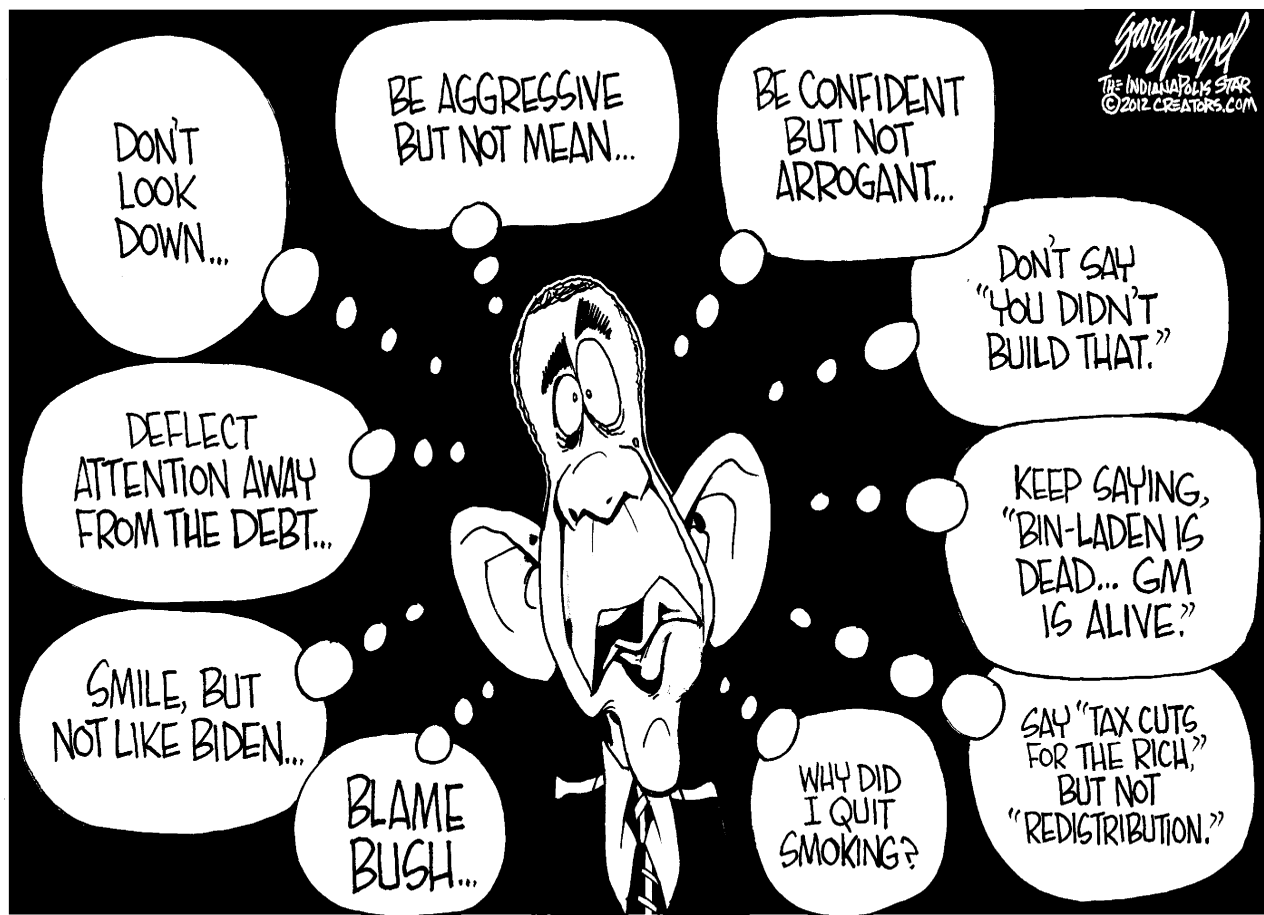
So it turns out this war actually was a delayed response to the 1988 bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 over Lockerbie, Scotland. Romney has said he wants somehow to give Syrians “who share our values” — Syria’s Jeffersonian caucus? — heavy weapons “to defeat Assad’s tanks, helicopters and fighter jets.” In the debate he spoke of organizing “responsible parties within Syria” but without America being “drawn into a military conflict,” and without enforcing a no-fly zone. Deploring the “rising tide of chaos” in the Middle East, Romney vows to “move the world away from” Islamic extremism.

Russia is a third-world country with an extraction economy — it extracts oil, gas and minerals from the ground and caviar from sturgeon — but Romney says it is our “number one geopolitical foe,” although he says the biggest threat to America is a nuclear Iran. Both candidates agree that preventing a nuclear Iran is worth a fourth (counting Libya) U.S. war in that region. Romney thinks America should have “a military second to none,” which it will have until the next dozen or so largest militaries merge.

The remarkable fecundity of the George W. Bush administration rolls on. Its domestic policy of incontinent spending enkindled the most potent protest movement — the tea party — since the overlapping movements against the Vietnam War and for civil rights legislation. And Bush’s foreign policy helped to move the nation in McGovern’s direction. President George H.W. Bush hoped that his 100-hour Gulf War against Iraq would banish the “Vietnam Syndrome,” which made Americans hesitant about military interventions. His son’s intervention produced an Iraq Syndrome that we should hope will be more durable than its Vietnam predecessor, which McGovern nurtured.

McGovern was the second major-party nominee with a Ph.D., which he earned at Northwestern University under Arthur Link, the foremost biographer of the first such nominee, Woodrow Wilson. McGovern’s anti-war passion — in September 1963 he became one of two senators (Oregon’s Wayne Morse was the other) to oppose U.S. involvement in Vietnam during the Kennedy administration — was honorably acquired in the next great war: He flew 35 missions over Germany, where half the B-24 crews did not survive and suffered a higher fatality rate than the Marines on the Pacific islands.

In 1917, Wilson inserted America into the whitewater rapids of world politics. In 1972, with the Cold War still being waged, McGovern prematurely suggested retrenchment. Four decades and 10 presidential campaigns later, however, the nation is near a semi-McGovern moment. Both of today’s candidates seem to know this.

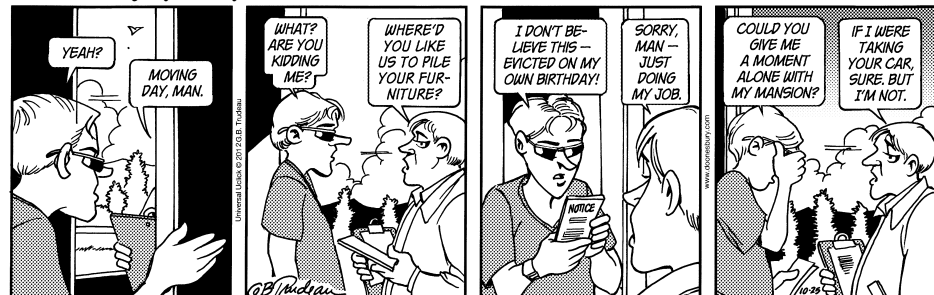

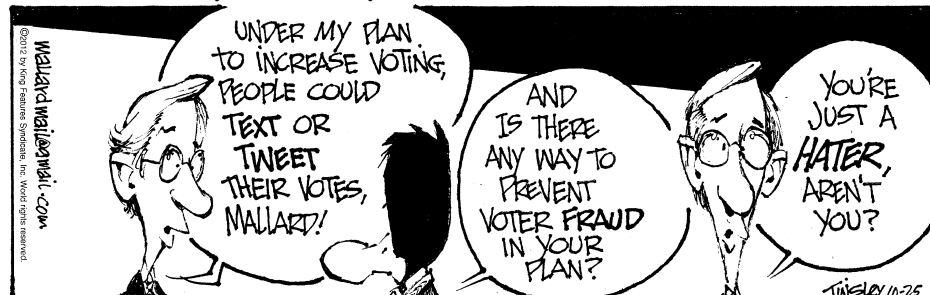

Jewelry Store Owner in Court

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls business owner who was accused of having illegal drugs in his store after a July raid by federal, state and local agents was in court Tuesday.

Daniel Churchman, 54, the owner of Churchman Jewelry and Idaho Artistry located at 153 Main Ave. W., was in Twin Falls County 5th District Court

for a pretrial hearing for a misdemeanor drug charge.

Felony charges of possessing a controlled substance with intent to manufacture or deliver, possession of a controlled substance and theft by receiving, possessing or disposing of stolen property were all dismissed by prosecutors in August.

According to a police report, officers allegedly found about an ounce of

marijuana along with a digital scale and grinder, 1.5 grams of cocaine and about 1.5 pounds of spice in Churchman's store. A loaded .22-caliber handgun was also reportedly found in a safe behind the cash register, the report states. The report states Churchman allegedly had two hydrocodone pills, but it was unclear whether he had a prescription.

Churchman was also in court Tuesday for a driv-

ing under the influence charge.

In both cases he is scheduled for a second pretrial conference on Dec. 4 and a jury trial on Dec. 12.

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AVISTA OFFERS BUYOUTS TO MORE THAN 900 WORKERS

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) • Avista Corp. is offering more than 900 non-union workers a buyout in an effort to help the utility cut its 2013 budget by about \$14 million.

Avista spokesman Dan Kolbet said 919 of the utility's 1,550 employees will have until Dec. 14 to decide, and will learn by Dec. 21 if they've been chosen for the buyout.

Kolbet said Avista hasn't

set a target number of people it would like to take the buyouts, which are not being offered to workers with skills hard to replace.

Employees are being offered two weeks severance pay per year worked for the company and a 12-week departure incentive.

Avista provides power to 600,000 business and residential customers in Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Twin Falls Turns Off Irrigation System

TWIN FALLS • The city of Twin Falls started turning off its pressurized irrigation stations as early as Wednesday, according to an announcement from the city.

That's somewhat earlier than a previous timeline, which estimated it could take two to three weeks after Oct. 20 for the stations' reservoir ponds to drain.

The system, used by some residences in the city, pressurizes Twin Falls Canal Co. water for lawn irrigation. That leaves more precious

potable water from underground aquifers in the city's drinking water system for homes and businesses to consume.

The canal company has turned off the water supply to the stations and the reservoirs have drained more quickly than expected, city spokesman Joshua Palmer said Wednesday.

Regardless of what water source residents use, the city is advising its citizens to turn off and winterize their sprinkler systems. With overnight temperatures now around freezing, doing so

will protect the sprinkler systems.

To do so:

- Close the main valve that connects household irrigation systems to the city's system. This valve is usually located on the property near the sidewalk in an in-ground box.
- Use an air compressor to blow the remaining water out of the irrigation lines.
- Turn off all automated sprinkler systems.

Local landscaping businesses will also winterize sprinkler systems for a small fee.

UTAH BOARD BACKS FIRST U.S. OIL SANDS PROJECT

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Utah gave its final approval Wednesday for the first commercial tar sands project in the U.S., handing a victory to a Canadian company that aims to start producing 2,000 barrels of oil next year in the start of what could grow into a larger operation. The Utah Water Quality Board upheld the decision of state regulators and turned back an appeal from a Moab-based environmental group that vows to take up its fight in the state courts. Living Rivers has fought the project every step of the way, arguing that tar sands mining will contaminate groundwater in a largely undeveloped area of Utah's Book Cliffs region that drains into the Colorado River. State regulators and the company insist the eastern Utah desert is so dry there is no significant groundwater to pollute. An administrative law judge agreed, sending a recommendation for approval to the Water Quality

Board, which held hours of arguments before upholding a crucial state permit Wednesday by a vote of 9-2. U.S. Oil Sands Inc. has said it was raising the money it needs to start digging after working since 2005 to obtain or defend its state approvals. Executives said they planned to produce oil from a 62-acre mountaintop pit starting in late 2013. The Calgary, Alberta-based company holds leases on 50 square miles of Utah trust lands sprinkled with gooey bitumen, a tar-like form of petroleum. "This is a good project that U.S. Oil Sands wants to do," company attorney Christopher Hogle said Wednesday, adding that a citrus-based solvent will leave the oil-soaked sands as clean as beach sand. "It's generally regarded as safe in food." Skeptics said the company had refused to divulge its secret recipe and that the solvent could release petroleum toxins into the ground.

Living Rivers said snowmelt and infrequent rain can saturate the project site at times during the year, in a region that receives 12 inches of precipitation a year. "This mine is the first of its kind," Living Rivers attorney Rob Dubuc said. "Nobody really knows what the impacts will be. This is not the time to rush ahead without knowing what we're doing." Both sides argued over Utah's definition of groundwater — and how much needs to exist to qualify for protection. State regulators assert no groundwater exists in the area except at extreme depths isolated from the demonstration pit, and they issued the company a groundwater discharge permit without requiring active monitoring of any trace of water. U.S. Oil Sands said its mining process will extract 96 percent of solvent from tailings for recycling, making the project environmentally friendly.

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Gazans Blast Israel with Rockets, Draw Airstrikes

JERUSALEM (AP) • Hamas militants in the Gaza Strip fired dozens of rockets and mortar shells into southern Israel on Wednesday in the heaviest bombardment on the area in months, drawing ominous Israeli threats of retaliation and dangers of escalation.

The violence came a day after a landmark visit to Gaza by the emir of Qatar. Israeli officials suggested the visit, the first by a head of state to the Hamas-ruled territory, emboldened the militant group.

The rocket fire began shortly after the emir left Gaza late Tuesday and continued through the night. Israeli officials said more than 80 projectiles were fired, and Hamas claimed responsibility for many of the attacks.

Israel responded with a series of airstrikes on rock-

et launchers, killing two Palestinian militants, according to Gaza medical officials. Two other Palestinians were killed Tuesday. Many people spent the day indoors, while others stayed in close proximity to the makeshift cement shelters found in the streets of southern Israeli towns. In one farming community, shrapnel covered trees and a children's playhouse in a backyard.

"Sometimes it feels like a scene out of the movie 'Platoon,' something out of the Vietnam war. We can stay at home and just hear the noise of the war," said Tamara Cohen, a resident of the border community of Ein Habesor whose children, ages 9 and 5, spent the night in a fortified "safe room" in their home.

Israeli leaders threatened tougher action against the rocket fire.

Sudan Blames Israel for Military Factory Explosion

KHARTOUM, Sudan (AP) • Sudan claimed Wednesday that Israeli airstrikes caused an explosion and fire at a military factory south of the capital, Khartoum, killing two people.

Minister of Information Ahmed Belal Osman told reporters that four aircraft hit the Yarmouk Complex, setting off a huge blast that rocked the capital before dawn. "Four planes coming from the east bombed the Yarmouk industrial complex," Belal said. "They used sophisticated technology." He didn't elaborate further.

"We are now certain that this flagrant attack was authorized by the same state of Israel. The main purpose is to frustrate our military ca-

pabilities and stop any development there and ultimately weaken our national sovereignty," Belal said.

Belal said the complex produces conventional weapons. He said his country has the right to respond. In a letter to the U.N. Security Council, Sudan's representative called the attack a "blatant violation" of the U.N. charter and called for condemnation from the world body.

Belal also said a technical team is inspecting remains of the missiles used in the attack which he said suggest Israel is behind the bombing. He didn't provide any evidence.

Israeli officials did not respond to requests for comment on the latest allegation.

Suit Alleges Fraud at Countrywide

NEW YORK (AP) • The latest federal lawsuit over alleged mortgage fraud paints an unflattering picture of a doomed lender: Executives at Countrywide Financial urged workers to churn out loans, accepted fudged applications and tried to hide ballooning defaults.

The suit, filed Wednesday by the top federal prosecutor in Manhattan, also underscored how Bank of America's purchase of Countrywide in July 2008, just before the financial crisis, backfired severely. The prosecutor, Preet Bharara, said he was seeking more than \$1 billion, but the suit could ultimately recover much more in damages.

"This lawsuit should send another clear message that reckless lending practices will not be tolerated," Bharara

said in a statement. He described Countrywide's practices as "spectacularly brazen in scope."

He also charged that Bank of America has resisted buying back soured mortgages from Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, which bought loans from Countrywide. Bank of America spokesman Lawrence Grayson said the bank "has stepped up and acted responsibly to resolve legacy mortgage matters."

The lawsuit accused Countrywide, and later Bank of America, of selling thousands of Hustle loans to Fannie and Freddie. The lawsuit says that the Hustle program continued through 2009.

According to the lawsuit, Fannie and Freddie didn't review loans before they purchased them. Instead,



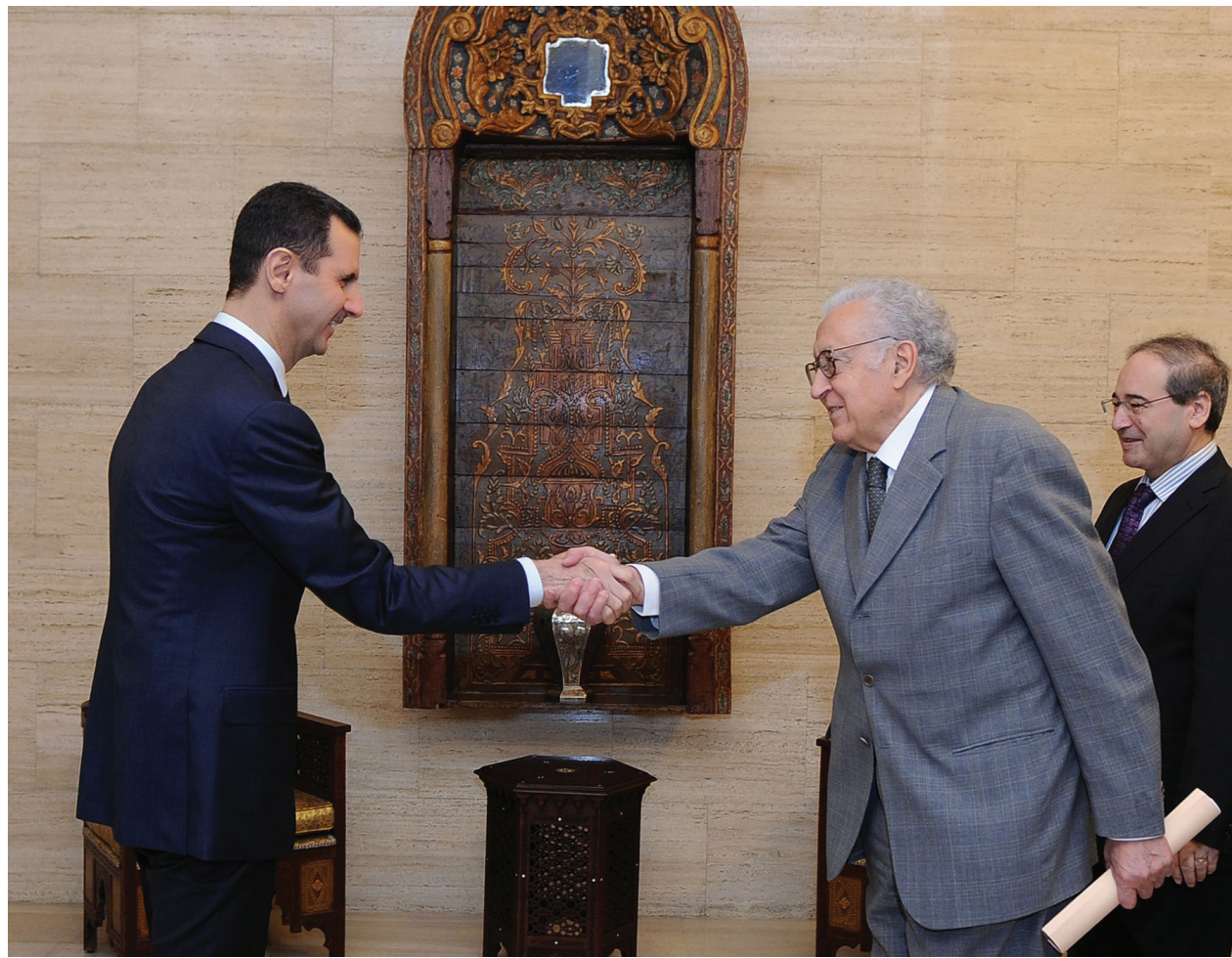

they relied on banks' statements that the loans met certain qualifications.

Taxpayers have spent \$170 billion to keep Fannie and Freddie afloat, and it could

cost \$260 billion more to support the companies through 2014 after subtracting dividend payments to taxpayers, according to the government.

U.N. Endorses Syrian Holiday Truce

BEIRUT (AP) • The U.N. Security Council gave unanimous backing Wednesday to a four-day truce proposed by the international mediator for Syria to mark a major Muslim holiday after he warned that the failure of yet another cease-fire plan would only worsen the fighting.

Yet even this modest effort — the international community's only plan for scaling back the violence — appears doomed. Previous cease-fire missions have failed, in part because neither Syrian President Bashar Assad nor rebels trying to topple him had an incentive to end their bloody war of attrition. Both sides believe they can still make gains on the battlefield even as they are locked in a stalemate, and neither has faith in negotiations on a political transition.

Lakhdar Brahimi, the U.N.-Arab League envoy to Syria, has proposed that both

sides lay down their arms during the Muslim holiday of Eid al-Adha, which begins Friday. The Security Council is normally divided on Syria, but Assad allies Russia and China joined other council members in endorsing the idea of a temporary truce that is meant to pave the way for talks on ending Syria's 19-month-old conflict.

The response on the ground ranged from lukewarm to downright rejection. Syrian government officials said they were still studying the idea, while Syria's political opposition said it was skeptical of the regime's promises. A rebel commander dismissed the plan as irrelevant and a radical Islamist group fighting alongside the rebels said it won't comply with any truce.

As Brahimi briefed the Security Council, the death toll since the start of the conflict in March 2011 crossed the

threshold of 35,000, activists said, and more violence was reported across the country.

Brahimi told the Security Council by video conference from Cairo that he hopes a truce will allow humanitarian aid to reach war-stricken areas and start transition talks, said U.N. diplomats who spoke on condition of anonymity because the meeting was private.

However, months of horrific bloodshed and deep distrust between the combatants make it unlikely they will embark on the path outlined by Brahimi. The Syrian opposition says it won't negotiate unless Assad resigns, something the Syrian leader refuses to do.

"The Syrian regime throughout its reign and up until now signs everything but violates everything," Haitham Maleh, a veteran Syrian opposition leader, said after he and others met with

Arab League chief Nabil Elaraby in Cairo. Maleh said there is concern the regime would exploit a cease-fire to take back rebel-held territory. The opposition will not accept any political solution that does not include Assad leaving his post, he said.

Still, the international community has little else to offer. There is no appetite for military intervention, while harsher U.N. action against the regime has been blocked by Russia and China, two Security Council members with veto powers.

U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said she supports Brahimi's cease-fire so that "Syrians could celebrate in peace."

"We'd like to see the violence come to an end, there's no doubt about this, and we'd like to see a political transition take hold and begin. We've been calling for that for more than a year," she added.

GOP Candidates in Close Races Disavow Rape Remark

WASHINGTON (AP) • Just as Mitt Romney and other Republicans had cut into the Democrats' advantage with female voters, a tea party-backed Senate candidate's awkward remark — that if rape leads to pregnancy it's "something God intended" — has propelled the emotional issue of abortion back to the political forefront. It's put GOP candidates in tight races, from the presidential candidate on down, on the defensive.

Divisive social issues are hardly what most GOP can-

didates want to be discussing in the few days remaining until elections largely hinging on jobs and the economy. Almost immediately after Richard Mourdock's comment, Republican candidates distanced themselves from the Indiana state treasurer — though by varying degrees.

The Romney campaign said Wednesday that the presidential nominee disagreed with Mourdock but stood by his endorsement of the Senate candidate. There were no plans to drop a

Romney testimonial ad for Mourdock that began airing in Indiana on Monday. Mourdock's comment in a Tuesday night debate came in answer to a question on when abortion should or should not be allowed. Said Romney spokeswoman Andrea Saul: "We disagree on the policy regarding exceptions for rape and incest but still support him."

Reaction was quick from GOP senators and candidates rejecting Mourdock's statement. Massachusetts Sen. Scott Brown, struggling to

hold onto his seat against a challenge from Democrat Elizabeth Warren, said he was "a pro-choice Republican and that's not what I believe and I disagree with what he said." In Wisconsin, former Republican Gov. Tommy Thompson, who faces Democratic Rep. Tammy Baldwin, called Mourdock's comments "really sad."

As for Mourdock, the National Republican Senatorial Committee stood by its candidate and argued that his words were being taken out of context.

FACEBOOK SHARES POST BIGGEST SINGLE-DAY GAIN

NEW YORK (AP) • Facebook's stock gained the most in a single day Wednesday since it began trading in May, a sign that the social media company's complicated relationship with Wall Street may be getting better.

It's been a rough five months since the social network's initial public stock offering, and it's too early to tell whether investors' optimism is here to stay. But on Wednesday they latched on to clear signs of growth in the company's third-quarter earnings report. Several analysts upgraded the stock.

Besides posting quarterly results that inched past Wall Street's expectations, Facebook on Tuesday also gave details for the first

time on how much money it made from mobile ads. This has been a concern since before its IPO. Although the majority of 1 billion people who use Facebook each month now access it using a mobile device, the 8-year-old company was created in the age of desktop computers, for Web pages. Facebook now calls itself a "mobile-first" company, but it only started showing mobile ads earlier this year.

On Tuesday, Facebook said that nearly \$153 million of its \$1.26 billion revenue came from mobile advertisements. The rate of advertising revenue growth also accelerated since the second quarter.

Shares of Facebook Inc.,

which is based in Menlo Park, Calif., rose \$3.73, or 19 percent, to close at \$23.23 on Wednesday. It's by far the stock's biggest one-day gain, in percentage terms, since Facebook went public on May 18. Still, shares are still off 39 percent from the company's IPO price of \$38.

In his upgrade of Facebook, Citi Investment Research analyst Mark Mahaney said that for the first time since the IPO, investors see a reasonably priced stock combined with accelerating growth at the company. He raised his rating to "Buy" from "Neutral" and increased his target price to \$35 from \$30.

The analyst noted that advertising revenue grew at a faster pace at Facebook, at a time when rival Google Inc. saw a slowdown. Google surprised investors last week with weaker-than-expected earnings that showed its ad revenue growing at the slowest pace in three years.

Tuesday's strong report doesn't mean that Facebook is out of the woods. Later this month, and then again on Nov. 14 and Dec. 14, more employees will be allowed to sell their holdings as restrictions on selling, typical in the months after an IPO, expire.

If shares flood the market on those days, it could weigh on Facebook's stock.

Iran Weighs Tougher Line in Nuclear Talks

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) • Iran is weighing a more confrontational strategy at possible renewed nuclear talks with world powers, threatening to boost levels of uranium enrichment unless the West makes clear concessions to ease sanctions.

Such a gambit — outlined by senior Iranian officials in interviews this week — could push Iran's nuclear program far closer to the "red line" set by Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for possible military options.

But it also suggests that economic pressures and diplomacy have pushed Iran to the point of considering an ultimatum-style end game in efforts to seek relief from the U.S. and European sanctions, which have targeted Iran's vital oil exports and its ability to use international banking networks.

Mansour Haghghatpour, deputy head of Iran's influential National Security Committee in parliament, told The Associated Press that the headline negotiating formula under consideration would put Western negotiators on notice that failure to ease sanctions could open the way for uranium enrichment above 20 percent — currently the highest level acknowledged by the Islamic Republic.

That would mark a dramatic move toward the threshold for warhead-grade material at about 90 percent and certainly bring a sharp escalation in calls for military action from Israel and others in the West. Iran denies it seeks nuclear weapons, but there have been suggestions it could ramp up uranium enrichment for future projects such as nuclear-powered submarines.

"The West now has a chance to strike a deal with

Iran," Haghghatpour told the AP in an interview.

There are no immediate plans to resume nuclear talks between Iran and a six-nation group including both Tehran's foes and allies: the permanent U.N. Security Council members plus Germany. Full-scale negotiations have been on hold since the last round ended in stalemate in June.

At the time, the West stuck to its major demands: Iran must stop enriching uranium to 20 percent purity, shut down its underground Fordo enrichment site and ship its 20 percent stockpile out of the country. In return, Iran was offered civilian plane spare parts and 20 percent-enriched nuclear fuel for its medical research reactor in Tehran.

But there was no move to ease sanctions — which have grown even tighter since the last negotiating session. To Iran, the proposed package was a nonstarter. Many compared it to swapping diamonds in return for peanuts.

So far, Iran has publicly repeated its positions that it was willing to bargain over 20 percent enrichment as part of step-by-step moves to lift sanctions. Iran also wants an international pledge that it has the "right" to make its own nuclear fuel — at least at lower levels for its energy-producing reactor.

The tougher line outlined by officials has not been made public, and it's still unclear whether it will be adopted as a negotiating position. But the fact it's under review suggests Iran is eager for a sweeping deal to lift sanctions and could try to jolt the West with a now-or-never choice: Roll back the sanctions or face a stepped up Iranian nuclear program.

TWIN FALLS • Under thick, gray clouds, the hunters accumulate quietly, expectantly, on farmland south of Twin Falls.

With its damp gusts, this cool Saturday morning is just right for bird dogs. "Perfect scenting conditions," says dog handler Dr. Paul Biagiotti, then adds that colder would be better.

Soon there's a long line of trucks on this field's deeply cracked mud, and it's awash in hunter orange and

hope.

The 17 teens and preteens here — in orange caps that say "Idaho Hunter Education Program Graduate" — are participating in the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's fourth annual youth pheasant-hunting clinic in Magic Valley. Each accompanied by a guardian, they'll rotate through four stations manned by Fish and Game employees, dog owners and local gun club members.

Last year's youth pheasant clinic was in Cassia County, but this one is on land owned by Twin Falls

Deer Begin to Migrate in Some Units

Cold weather and snow have pushed deer into the lower portions of some units, an Idaho Department of Fish and Game biologist said.

"We're hearing reports that deer migration in unit 43 (north of Fairfield) is well under way," Regan Berkley said. "It usually is one of our more popular hunts. Hunters in that area probably want to be in the lower elevations to harvest deer that migrate through there."

Many of the unit's deer already have descended the mountains in search of food, she said, noting it's a little earlier than usual.

"The same is true for units 48 (west of Idaho Highway 75) and 49 (east of Highway 75)," Berkley said. "Hunters will want to pay attention for deer signs in those units."

If you haven't harvested a deer yet, be patient. The general hunt goes through Oct. 31.

What else? Bear season goes through the end of October, too, while mountain lion and wolf hunts last all winter, Berkley said.

Coming up: A spike hunt for elk will open Nov. 1 in the Smoky Mountain Zone. It's a week-long, any-weapon hunt but open only to hunters who already have tags, as no more tags are available, Berkley said.

DECLO • Some skiers, when they think of their sport, might picture speeding down a mountainside or maneuvering their skis on open cross-country terrain. Nick Redder has a different view: a lot of twists, turns and jumps.

The 17-year-old Declo adrenaline junkie on Oct. 27 will compete at the seventh annual Rail Jam, sponsored by Idaho Water Sports and held in its parking lot in Burley. Snow will be trucked in from Pomerelle Mountain Resort to give skiers and snowboarders the chance to demonstrate tricks, for which they'll earn points.

"It's a pre-season chance to get together with other skiers," Redder said, noting he became interested in freestyle from watching friends on the slopes.

For Redder, who has attended previous rail jams, it also is a chance for him to show off skills he's learned during the summer with his buddy and Idaho Water Sports team captain, 23-year-old Ben Orton of Burley.

"We'll spend a lot of time practicing during summer," Orton said. "We'll go to

Pocatello, to the foam pits, and spend a lot of time on trampolines. From there we'll go do backcountry powder landings, then in parks that have harder landings."

By this time, the tricks have become old hat because they've practiced all summer, Orton said. Redder isn't afraid to try something new.

"That's the one thing about Nick that sets him apart from the other guys," he said. "Most of the time when he tries something, he can get it right the first time about every time. It's pretty impressive."

What about injuries? A few times Orton has been hurt freestyling, he said, noting that last year he missed participating in the rail jam because of injuries.

Redder said he's never been seriously injured, though he suffered a few cuts and bruises. He credits Orton for the tricks he's learned. When the snow flies, the pair often head to Pomerelle Mountain Resort for fun on the slopes.

"Everything I've learned I've learned from Ben," Redder said. Orton, on the other hand, said he taught himself how to freestyle.

which compensates landowners for allowing hunter and angler access — and chose to limit that access to youth hunters.

Dozens of other people, too, will spend their Saturday morning here to ensure the sport of pheasant hunting will endure.

•••

Twin Falls 11-year-old Steel James is first up at the clay-shooting station. Among the observers are his dad and a boy who went through hunter's education with Steel and plays on the baseball team that Steel's dad coaches.

When Steel misses the first flying target, shooting coach Tara Ortmann is all business — correcting foot placement, hip movement, weight distribution — so there's no room for embarrassment. She's a board member of Twin Falls' gun club and an NRA-certified coach.

After Steel's second miss, Ortmann tells him to slow down on the trigger. After his third, Travis Shepherd offers encouragement.

"Very nice. Nice form. He's close," says Shepherd, a Jerome County Rod and Gun Club member who's operating the clay target thrower.

And after the fourth miss, it's another boy's turn with the shotgun. While 11-year-old baseball player Tyson Strunk of Twin Falls gets into position, the men discuss Steel's form: He's not following through, they say. He's stopping the gun's movement when he pulls the trigger.

"It's like throwing a football to a wide receiver," says Cody Bair, who accompanied a Burley boy to the clinic. "You've got to throw where he's gonna be, not where he's at."

Tyson shatters his first clay pigeon, and Steel's father, Chance James, cheers. "I can't help it. I'm a coach," James says.

•••

To the young hunters clustered around his field-dressing demonstration, Regional Conservation Officer Gary Hompland is describing his recipe for pheasant Parmesan: a thin, pounded breast fillet dredged in egg and seasoned crumbs, fried, baked with marinara sauce and grated Parmesan, then paired with angel-hair pasta and red wine.

"Am I drooling? I'm sorry," Hompland says.

Jerome Hansen, Fish and

Game's regional supervisor, is lifting a strainer full of breaded pheasant nuggets from hot oil to serve with mustard.

"There's a lot of meat on a pheasant," Hansen says to a couple of hunters. Another option for this meat: wild rice and cream of mushroom.

One of those listeners, Twin Falls 12-year-old Hunter Roethig, clearly has been paying attention. He can repeat the field-dressing instructions in detail. And how will he eat his first pheasant?

"Like a feast," Hunter replies, then deliberates before settling on deep-fried, with lots of seasonings. "I'm going to gut it all myself, and then I'm going to deep-fry it."

Jerome dad Juan Tellez wants his son to eat the birds he kills — "I want him to learn all the ropes of it," he says — so they're watching the demonstration together.

"It's weird. They use egg and milk together," says Jonathan Tellez, 10, a young cook who specializes in omelets.

The egg-milk combination isn't typical in the Tellez family's Hispanic dishes, Juan explains, but they're always trying recipes from other cuisines.

"I'm going to be the first one to do it," Jonathan says.

•••

At another station, Regional Wildlife Manager Randy Smith is explaining pheasants' biology and habitat.

"They are a product of agriculture," Smith says. "If we didn't have agriculture in Magic Valley, we wouldn't have ring-necked pheasants."

On his pickup's tailgate, he props a poster with four aerial photos of Minidoka and the town's surrounding farmland, taken in 1951, '68, '78 and '87.

By the 1960s, irrigation had created incredible pheasant habitat — ditchbanks, odd weedy patches — and the big bird populations to match. The '60s were the heyday of Idaho pheasant hunting.

"It was nothing to go home from football practice and get your three roosters on the way home," adds listener Jerry Lee Young, who grew up in Twin Falls in the '60s.

But by the time the '78 Minidoka photograph was taken, farmers had become more efficient in their use of both water and land, eliminating fields' odd, unused

corners. And as conversion to wheel lines and pivot irrigation continues, more pheasant habitat disappears.

Another big change in Idaho agriculture is hurting pheasant numbers, Smith says: In alfalfa fields, which are ideal for pheasants' spring nesting, farmers used to do their first cutting in about the second week of June. Now, he says, "they're cutting in mid-May and they're cutting every 30 days."

A pheasant hen needs about 35 days for egg laying and incubation. Pheasants do re-nest — that is, start a new nest if the first one is destroyed — but the ditchbanks where hens might have re-nested are more rare now.

"It's a tough life out here for pheasants," Smith says. So Idaho allows hunting of males only. "It's not the good old days anymore, but we still have plenty of pheasants to hunt."

•••

The morning's climax, of course, is the chance to shoot live birds.

In this case, they're farm-raised pheasants released one at a time from small cages, then tracked a short distance by a bird dog, a pair of young hunters with shotguns — each loaded with a single shell right before firing — and the dog's handler. The handler coaches the hunters to aim high, away from the dog.

"These dogs make terrible pets, but they're hunting fa-

natics," says Steve Money, gesturing to the whining German shorthaired pointer on his leash.

Money and his fellow High Desert Pointing Dog Club members, their dogs stimulated by nearby cages of pheasants, are waiting to head into the fields with the next pairs of hunters.

Filer sisters Natausha Banks, 15, and Brynlee Banks, 12, are paired with 20-year-old Logan Knopp, the dog club's youngest member, and his German wirehaired pointer. Both girls miss their shots at

two pheasants.

"No bird! No bird!" Knopp shouts, signaling the pointer to return.

Despite the misses, the attempt was the day's best moment, Brynlee says. What was going through her mind? "That I could actually show off a little if I got it, and show my mom," she says.

But when the sisters return from their second trip into the fields, Natausha has a pheasant and a radiant smile. "Well, it felt really good. It was like an unforgettable feeling almost," she says.

Dad Bruce Banks photo-

graphs his daughters posing with Knopp and his dog, the vibrantly colored bird hanging by its feet from Natausha's hand. But Banks makes sure Brynlee's accomplishment gets noticed, too: "The little sister has been hitting the clay pigeons better," he says.

Today's organizers want each hunter to experience success before the morning is over, so the last few birdless youth get to keep trying. And soon there's a bird in Brynlee's hand, too.

Both of the sisters' pheasants, Banks says, will go home for Sunday dinner.

Wildlife Summit Report Available Online

JEROME • A report summarizing the three-day Idaho Wildlife Summit in late August is now available on the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's website, fishandgame.idaho.gov.

The report summarizes input from more 500 participants. The summit facilitated conversation among Idaho hunters, anglers, trappers and other wildlife conservationists. Discussions covered the status and direction of wildlife management; the need to keep it relevant to the changing interests of Idahoans; and what they expect from state wildlife management.

Participants heard and responded to pre-

sentations and videos. They had opportunities to provide input at the seven Idaho venues and by participating in live online chats.

The report also includes an executive summary of a telephone survey of 1,059 randomly selected Idaho residents conducted earlier this year for Fish and Game.

"Because of technical issues, some online input needs additional analysis, and an accounting of costs will be completed when all the bills come in. Both will be posted on the website when they become available," a department release said.

Additional online content includes videos of the speakers and the panel discussion.

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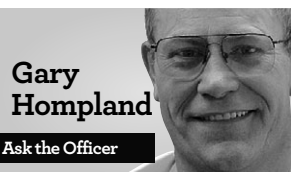
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Finding a Place to Hunt

Question: "I'm new to the Magic Valley and was looking for places I might be able to hunt or fish. Can you provide any help?"



Gary Hompland
Ask the Officer

Answer: There are several ways to locate suitable hunting and fishing areas. To simplify my explanation I will break down the answer into access to public land and private land.

- Several brands of GPS mapping software are available to help you identify landownership while in the field or at your computer. Local offices of the U.S. Forest Service or Bureau of Land Management also sell maps that show public and private land. The Idaho Department of Fish and Game's "Hunt Planner" found on its website also contains digital maps with public land identified.

The Wildlife Tracts program consists of small parcels of BLM and Bureau of Reclamation land managed for wildlife habitat. Maps of these areas can be obtained at Jerome's Fish and Game office, the Reclamation office in Burley, or BLM offices in Twin Falls and Burley.

- Private land can be difficult to access for hunting and fishing. Locating and contacting landowners can be especially problematic. A visit to the county assessor's office is the best way to identify the landowner of a specific parcel in question.

Another option to access some private land is from a Fish and Game program called Access Yes. Sportsmen pay for this program mostly through the Superhunt tag

lottery. Landowners wishing to sign up to allow public access to or through their property can submit a proposal to Fish and Game to pay the landowner for public access.

A citizen committee reviews all Access Yes proposals submitted by landowners and ranks them in priority for best access opportunities and most efficient use of the funding. The final decision lies with regional staff to finalize a contract with the landowner.

Properties enrolled in Access Yes do allow public access; however, many also have restrictions such as prohibiting motorized vehicles, camping or campfires, or restricted dates when public access is not allowed.

Sportsmen can obtain Access Yes information as well the department's "Hunt Planner" at our website listed below. In addition, hard copies of the Access Yes information for their respective regions can be obtained at Fish and Game offices in Jerome, Nampa, Lewiston and Coeur D'Alene.

A Morning Walk with the (Celestial) Dogs

As the new owner of an energetic Lab cross puppy, my morning routine now includes a 6 a.m. walk with our furry family member, and a good look at the pre-dawn fall sky. Four of the sky's six canine constellations are currently accompanying us on our morning stroll.

The brightest star in the heavens, Sirius, sits at the throat of Canis Major, due south, 30 degrees up. The Big Dog appears as a slightly skewed, nearly vertical rectangle with Sirius at its upper right corner.

A bit more than 20 degrees to the upper left of Sirius is Procyon, brightest star of Canis Minor. Procyon and the fainter star to its upper right comprise the Little Dog — a celestial dachshund. "Procyon" translates to "before the dog," as its rising (currently just before 1 a.m.) precedes Sirius' appearance by less than half an hour.

With Orion (and his three belt stars) lying to the right of the Big and Little Dogs, it's easy to imagine ancient hunters, with dogs at their sides around a communal fire, picturing a hunter overhead with his canines close behind.

The other two morning dogs share the faint constellation of the Hunting Dogs, currently in the northeast,

15 degrees to the right of the now-vertical handle of the Big Dipper. Like Canis Minor, Canes Venatici comprises two stars, unequal in brightness. Although this constellation originated as a club, a 9th century Greek-to-Arabic mistranslation transformed it into dogs, subsequently named Asterion ("Little Star," the brighter of the two) and Chara ("Joy," directly above) by 17th century Polish astronomer Johannes Hevelius.

The remaining two celestial canines are undomesticated cousins: Vulpecula, the Fox, is a faint group near the middle of the Summer Triangle, high overhead at 8 p.m. Lupus, the Wolf, is a southern grouping only

partially visible in the late-spring evening sky.

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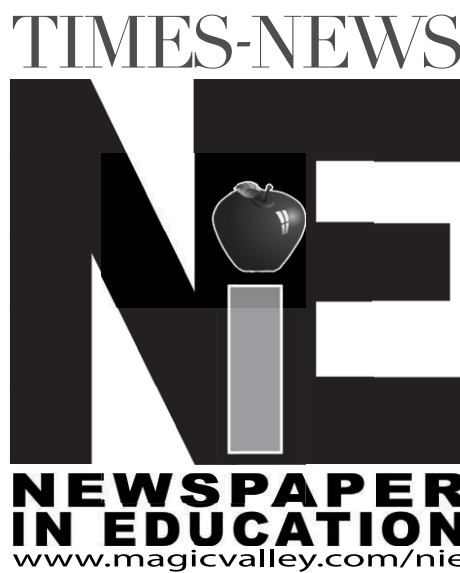

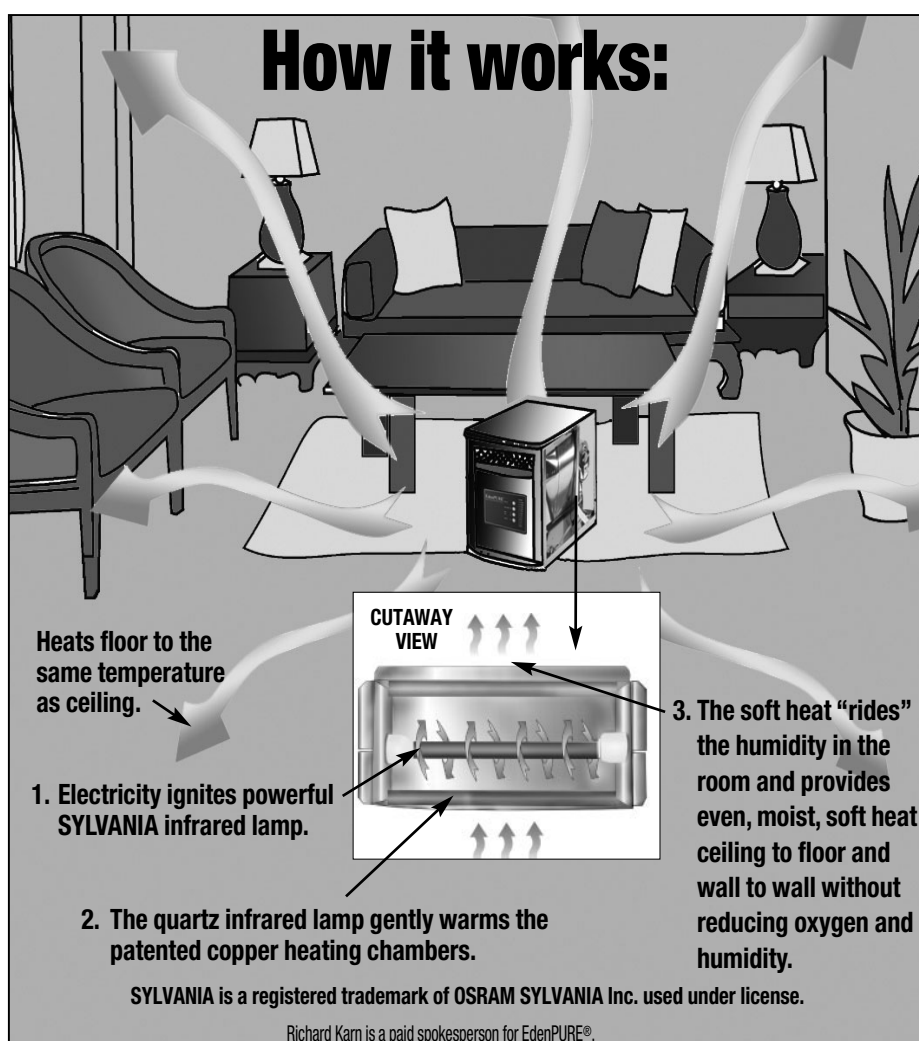

Paul Kurtz, Debunker of Paranormal Claims, Dies

Paul Kurtz, who became a national leader in efforts to debunk paranormal phenomena and pseudoscience — what he called "insidious" gimmicks that had blossomed into a industry profiting on ignorance — died Oct. 20 at his home in Amherst, N.Y. He was 86.

He had a heart arrhythmia, but the immediate cause of death has not been determined, said his son, Jonathan Kurtz.

Kurtz taught philosophy for 25 years at the State University of New York at Buffalo and drew broader influence through his thousands of media appearances promoting the need for skepticism and rational thinking. He counted among his supporters the astronomer Carl Sagan, authors Isaac Asimov and Martin Gardner, and the behaviorist B.F. Skinner.

Kurtz, who wrote and edited dozens of books, oversaw a sprawling organization that included the Amherst-based Center for Inquiry, the Committee for Skeptical Inquiry (formerly the Committee for the Scientific Investigation of Claims of the Paranormal) and the publishing house Prometheus Books. He also edited the Humanist, a magazine published by the Washington-based American Humanist Association.

Kurtz once defined his vision as defending "the philosophy of skepticism — especially as an antidote for public gullibility — and the values of the secular and humanist outlook." His influence and prominence grew with the spread of cultlike religious movements in the 1970s as well as the purported psychic abilities of the spoon-bending media sensation Uri Geller.

"There is always the danger that once irrationality grows, it will spill over into other areas," he told the *New York Times* in 1977.

A Chance at Perfection

TWIN FALLS • This week, the College of Southern Idaho volleyball team has a chance to do something special.

With wins over Colorado Northwestern this afternoon and Utah State-Eastern on Saturday, the Golden Eagles would complete a perfect Scenic West Athletic Conference season.

“That’s a little goal of ours along the way,” sophomore outside hitter Keani Passi said.

That little goal hasn’t been accomplished by any Scenic West team since Salt Lake did it in 2007, and the last CSI team to pull it off was the 2003 squad. But that’s small potatoes compared to the larger goal: be the last team standing in West Plains, Mo., in three weeks’ time.

They’ve already wrapped up the conference title, hosting rights and the top seed for next week’s Region 18 Tournament. None of that is enough to sate their hunger for the top prize in junior college volleyball.

“That’s just how this team is,” said CSI coach Heidi Cartisser. “When we told them they were conference champions, their reaction was, ‘But we still have two games left.’ We

told them they had it wrapped up and the reaction was basically ‘Oh. Nice job, guys.’”

There hasn’t been a shred of complacency in this team, but the coaching staff continues to ramp up the pressure. The team has been scrimmaging itself in practice for the past several weeks, using an additional rule where four attack errors by either side results in an automatic loss (and subsequent consequences) regardless of the score.

This week, Cartisser implemented another rule: docking points for being in the wrong position, not transitioning between defense and attack or simply not following through with the play.

“Everything is fine; we’re just trying to keep getting more out of them,” Cartisser

Woods Prepares for Next Stage

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) • Tiger Woods has already rated 2012 as a good year.

He won't consider it a great year, because it's missing one essential ingredient — a major victory — but he's becoming more confident that 2013 can be.

"I've always said winning one major championship turns a good year into a great year," he said on Wednesday ahead of the CIMB Classic, his first event in Malaysia in 13 years. "We place so much emphasis on them. It's very similar to what tennis has with the Grand Slam events. Guys can have seven, eight, nine-win seasons, but if they don't win a Slam, it's not a great year.

"I remember playing back in '99; I had a really good run there, won a bunch of tournaments, but didn't win a major championship until the last one, the PGA. That all of a sudden changed the whole year."

Asked about the doping scandal involving Lance Armstrong, Woods said golf couldn't be compared with cycling, not only because it was more individual, but also because of its ingrained code of honor.

"This is a sport where we turn ourselves in on mistakes," he said. "A ball moves in the trees, the guys call penalties on themselves. I think that's one of the neat things about

our game, and I think with the (anti-doping) testing, it's only enhanced that respectability throughout all of sport."

Woods is back at The Mines Resort and Golf Club for the first time since he won the individual and team titles at the 1999 World Cup.

That, by his standards, was one of many great years until his life and career spi-

raled out of control in 2009 because of a string of infidelities that led to the breakdown of his marriage.

His three wins on the PGA Tour this season have restored the confidence that was missing during his long title drought — 27 starts in official tournaments — and he says he's "absolutely" targeting more major titles to challenge

Jack Nicklaus' record of 18. He's also got Sam Snead's record for most wins on the tour still in his sights. He moved into second place this year.

"There are things that are certainly more important, and fatherhood is No. 1," he said. "Golf has always been a high priority in my life, but family has always been No. 1.

Dangerous Way for Kids to Emulate Pros

What looks like the NFL's nightmare played out on a football field an hour from Boston nearly six weeks ago. In a Pop Warner game between rivals Southbridge and Tantasqua, five kids between the ages of 10 and 12 were concussed, all on the losing team.

"Disturbing," is how Jon Butler, Pop Warner's executive director, described it. It gets worse. The score at the end of the first quarter was Southbridge 28, Tantasqua 0. It was 52-0 at the final whistle.

Winning coach Scott Lazo told the league committee that investigated the game he didn't notice the injuries. "It was a football game, not a Hallmark moment," he said to the *New York Times*. Losing coach Erik Iller defended his decision to keep playing by saying he wanted his kids to score so they could "leave with something."

"From what we were able to put together, it was a combination of things, as bad events often are," Butler said over the phone Tuesday. "There were two coaches who ignored several Pop Warner rules and, evidently, officials lost control of the game early. "All we can do right now is reassure parents is that this is not typical at all," he added. "It doesn't in any way exonerate the people involved. All of us are upset about that."

After a hearing last week before the Central Mass Pop Warner league, both the coaches and association presidents were suspended for the rest of the season and put on probation through 2013. The three officials who worked the game were permanently banned.

The comforting thing — or not — is that Pop Warner is one of the most responsible youth sports programs around. It trains coaches to recognize concussion symptoms, provides guidelines about when players should be pulled from games, and after a preliminary study this summer concluded more devastating hits were delivered in practices than games, officials implemented a rule limiting contact drills to two of the six hours of practice allowed each week.

Even Dr. Robert Cantu, who is co-director of the Boston University Center for the Study of Traumatic Encephalopathy, called several Pop Warner initiatives "good first steps." "In this case, the punishments handed out seemed appropriate and I'm encouraged that the officials were held accountable for this debacle, too," Cantu said. "You get crazy, one-sided games in a lot of sports, but in most of those, the mercy rule is applied to protect kids' psyches. In football, it's even more important, because what you're protecting is their bodies and brains."

There's no mercy rule in the NFL, and not much more mercy, even at the top. During Commissioner Roger Goodell's tenure, the league has begun to address concussions with better information, stricter protocols and changes in the rules. But none of it has discouraged Goodell from moving games to Thursday night, pushing to increase the regular season to 18 games and launching a PR campaign that could be charitably described as disingenuous. A new commercial featuring Tom Brady and Ray Lewis reassures parents the league is concerned about player safety — without ever mentioning concussions — and earlier this month, the commissioner turned up at a youth football gathering in Virginia to promote the league's "Heads Up Football" program, designed to teach kids and coaches tackling skills to minimize head and neck injuries.

But the science on concussions suggests all those measures combined will reduce the numbers only so much. Cantu acknowledged what happened at that game in Massachusetts last month was an anomaly. "I hope it was nothing more than an isolated event," he said. "But it points out the dangers of brain trauma in a stark way. I hope no other game results in five concussions. But from what we know, from what I see increasingly in my practice, there are plenty of other games where concussions are taking place as well."

WHEREAS, The City of Jerome provides utility for domestic wastewater services; and
WHEREAS, owners of real property being provided domestic wastewater service by the City of Jerome are responsible for all deposits, fees, and charges for such service; and
WHEREAS, the city charges and fees require an increase in same to maintain the proper level of domestic wastewater services; and
WHEREAS, the city charges and fees for domestic wastewater services reflect only the amount necessary for the provision of same and proper capital reserve accounts.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO AS FOLLOWS:
13.20.020: MONTHLY CHARGES; SCHEDULE:

The monthly wastewater collection and treatment service charges for each property owner, residential, commercial, or industrial in nature, shall be determined by the cubic feet of water used plus a fixed monthly base fee. Monthly bills shall be sent to the property owner. The owner of real property to which wastewater treatment and collection services are provided shall be responsible for the payment of all deposits, charges and fees required by this chapter which are not paid by the time water or wastewater treatment services are terminated to that real property. Each owner of real property to which wastewater treatment and collection services is provided shall receive written notice of termination of water service to such real property at least ten (10) days prior to the termination of such services, which notice shall also contain the amount of all delinquent charges and fees. The following rate schedule shall determine service charges and fees:

- A. The city administrator, or his/her designee shall classify all residential, commercial, and industrial users into appropriate user classes according to the user's wastewater characteristics. Service charges for residential and commercial users shall be derived from the rate schedule stated in this section:

For industrial users with high wastewater strength (400+ mg/L), high flows (generally 10,000+ gallons per day), and/or unique wastewater characteristics as determined by the city administrator or his/her designee, the base monthly fee will be determined based on an Equivalent Residential Unit (ERU) as calculated utilizing the formula below. The usage fee will be per the user class above based on Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS), unless a higher rate is justified based on unique wastewater characteristics or impacts to the city's collection and treatment systems.

ERUs = Flow * 0.0155 + BOD * 0.164 + TSS * 0.0324 + Phos * 0.39

Flow = Average daily flow (gallons/day)
BOD = Average Biochemical Oxygen Demand (pounds/day)
TSS = Average Total Suspended Solids (pounds/day)
Phos = Average Phosphorous load (pounds/day)

For larger industries with individual discharge permits with the city, the city may negotiate with the industry to develop a monthly base fee based on the equivalent residential units permitted and a usage fee that is based on flow and wastewater strength (including biochemical oxygen demand, total suspended solids, and phosphorous).

A. The monthly wastewater collection and treatment service charge for each property owner or user, domestic, commercial, or industrial in nature, whose water consumption is not metered shall be fixed by the city council based upon the rate established in the rate schedule above and the cubic feet of water discharged into the collection system as determined by the city administrator; provided, however, that in the case of single-family residential dwellings, with unmetered or unavailable water discharge data, cubic feet of water shall be deemed to be four hundred (400) cubic feet per month for dwellings with less than three (3) permanent residents; and eight hundred (800) cubic feet per month for dwellings with three (3) or more residents.

REVISION AND ADJUSTMENT OF CHARGES:
The city shall annually review the user charges for wastewater collection and treatment. Adjustments shall be made by resolution as needed to ensure that adequate revenue will be acquired to balance expenditures for wastewater collection and treatment and to maintain an equitable system of user charges. (Ord. 622 4, 1979: prior code 23-41(F))

This Ordinance shall be effective following passage and publication as required by law.

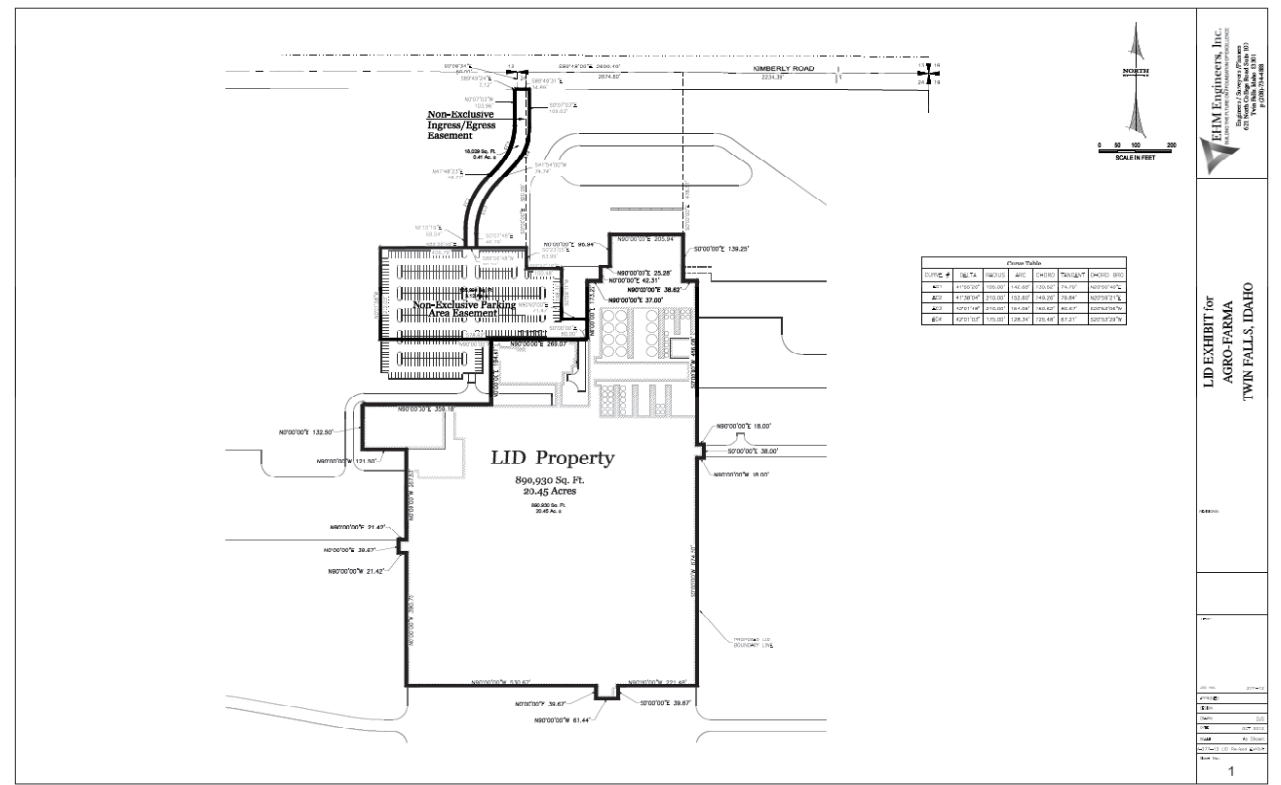

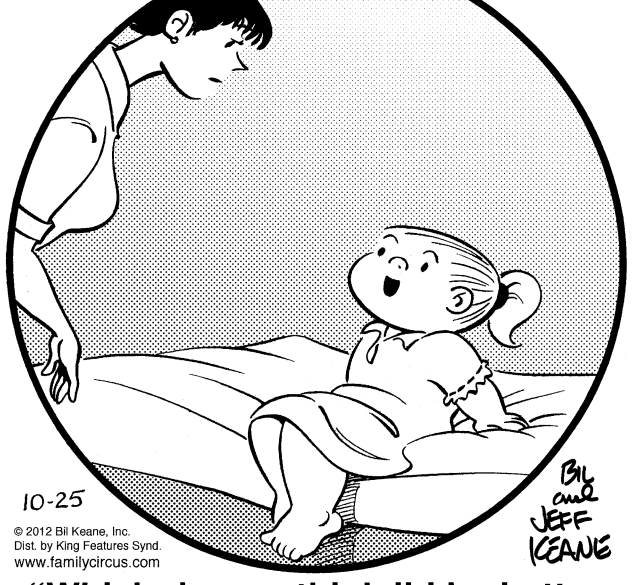

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"But what is Freedom? Rightly understood, A universal license to be good."
— *Hartley Coleridge*

Today's problem comes in two parts. Let's look at the opening lead first: What would be your choice as West here? You shouldn't seriously consider leading partner's suit. He didn't bid it voluntarily — you dragged the bid out of him, and when he had the chance to double a club cuebid, he did not do so. Declarer rates to have six spades and four diamonds, so a club lead could be straight into a tenace. A top heart looks safe, but a trump is best, hoping to protect your holdings in all the outside suits. A trump will not always be safe, but the odds favor it not doing anything for declarer that he might not be able to do for himself. And you might kill a diamond ruff in dummy. And today it would defeat four spades.

But let's see what the expert declarer did in four spades on the lead of the heart king. He won, cashed the spade ace and king, then led a diamond from dummy to his queen and West's ace. West was forced to return a diamond which declarer won in dummy, unblocking his eight, and played a third diamond to his nine and West's 10, East pitching a discouraging club. What could West do now? Hoping that the diamond six would not prove an entry, he played the heart queen. Declarer ruffed, played the spade queen and another spade, and could win the club return with the ace, then cross to the diamond six to discard the club queen. Contract made!

ANSWER: The auction has made it clear that you rate to be facing a very weak hand with long clubs and short spades. If so, where do you think you want to play? I'd guess a club part-score — wouldn't you? If your partner has six clubs to the jack, he may take four tricks in his own hand in clubs and offer you none in a spade contract.
