The member committee was appointed by C.L. Gov. "Butch" Otter to submit a recommendation on how the state should establish an online health insurance marketplace.

The group's recommendations now move to the governor. Otter has until Nov. 16 to declare a final decision to the federal government.

Under the recently upheld Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, all states must have an exchange but have the choice of managing their own or relying on a federally facilitated exchange.

NEW YORK (AP) • Stocks closed mostly lower Friday after investors found little to like in weak corporate earnings reports and news of only tepid growth in the U.S. economy in the third quarter.

Stocks rose in the morning before a mild midday sell-off, then recovered somewhat in the afternoon.

The Dow Jones industrial average managed a gain of 3.53 points to close at 13,107.21 after spending much of the day in the red.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 1.03 points to 1,411.94 and the Nasdaq composite rose 1.83 points to 2,987.95.

Horticulture Club vice president Roy Galindo said club members wanted to honor Kiesig and say "thank you."

"It was just something nice to do for him," he said. Kiesig didn't know about the message until about a week ago.

He said he overheard students talking about it, but there were some murmurings before that.

"Some of them have hinted that there was something special about the maze this year," he

Kiesig said he knew the students "were up to something," but didn't know what.

"I thought it was kind of cool," he said about the message.

Horticulture Club president Desiree Benkula said they didn't use GPS to cut out the design this year. Instead, she said she "stepped out the whole

"It was a lot of work," she said.

Both Galindo and Benkula have yet to see an aerial photo of the corn maze, so they don't know how their design turned

there has been an image or words in the corn maze.

"Every year, there's some sort of design," Kiesig said.

Several years ago, students decided on a Halloween theme, with shapes of ghosts and pumpkins.

Three years ago, the

theme was "Trails of the Drunken Sailor." Students put in random paths throughout the corn maze.

Some years, there have been more formal mazes with lots of straight lines and dead ends.

"It just depends on how we felt at the time," Kiesig said.

One proposal on the table for a future year is a world map.

Kiesig said the goal is to "keep doing unique things" with the maze while keeping it interesting and affordable for community members.

About the Corn Maze

Since the first CSI corn maze 10 years ago, the size has fluctuated over the years.

The first year, it was only five acres. At its largest, the corn maze spanned 20 acres.

This year, it's somewhere

in between — a little more than 12 acres.

The corn maze has been open seven nights a week this month.

Benkula said they also host large groups, such as schools or churches, at the maze.

"It's definitely a big time commitment," she said.

Years ago, the Horticulture Club ran the maze all seven nights a week. "It didn't take us long to

realize there was a better way," Kiesig said.

Now, they get help from a few other CSI clubs. And it gives a chance for students in the clubs to raise money.

Months of Preparation

Once the corn maze closes after Halloween, Magic Valley Compost will come in to chop the corn. The company donates the compost back to the Horticulture Club.

"They've been a big supporter since this started, too," Kiesig said.

The fields sit empty through the winter, until they're plowed and cultivated in the spring to get ready to plant corn.

After the corn is planted, he said it's usually 12-18 inches tall around the Fourth of July.

"That's when we actually go in and cut the maze out," Kiesig said.

said more than 100 Burley property owners signed up to participate in the voluntary LID program, which was established in March

The city council later extended the deadline for the LID to allow more property owners to sign up.

"We didn't get any bidders on the project because the contractors didn't want to have to go all over town," Haynes said. "So now we have to start all over."

Haynes said the project will not be put out to bid again until next spring due to the weather.

"It will be in limbo until then," Haynes said.

When the LID was established, the city council approved opening up the parameters of the project to include the entire city

and to keep participation on a voluntary basis.

The voluntary district differs from a traditional LID, where costs for improvements are added to the property tax of everyone within the district.

The council agreed to set aside \$150,000 a year for the project, which would cover 10 percent of each project's costs.

The benefits of participating in the LID for property owners are lower costs on their projects due to the city's large-scale bidding process and the option to finance the project through the city. Property owners choosing this option are allowed to make monthly payments to the city. A lien is then placed on the property to secure repayment.

Although the city council opted not to restrict the parameters of the project in this LID, under LID rules,

the city could establish an LID with narrower parameters and make participation in the project mandatory.

Haynes said the city's building inspector went around to all the participants and got the measurements of each project, which included sidewalks, gutters and driveway approaches and the information was given to the potential contractors. But, when the contractors looked over the jobs they found each participant had differing amounts and types of things they wanted to accomplish and the individual jobs were spread throughout the city.

Also, because it was a voluntary LID the participants still had the opportunity to back out of the project after the contractor made a bid, making it less appealing for the contractor, Havnes said.

"It just really got more complicated than we'd thought. It became really complex," Haynes said.

Haynes said one option the council may look at in the future is narrowing the parameters of the project to one area at a time so it's easier and more desirable for the contractors.

Haynes said another possible reason the city didn't receive bids on the project is the contractors were very busy this past summer.

"That's good news for the city," Haynes said.

In 2010, city officials grappled with ideas for getting the city's aging sidewalks in repair.

At the time, it was estimated up to 30 percent of the city's sidewalks needed replaced at an estimated total cost of \$1.3 million.

Some Burley neighborhoods do not have sidewalks at all.

drains, where no funding exists.

A lot of cities, including Jerome and Twin Falls, have ordinances in place making property owners responsible for the construction and repair of sidewalks. Enforcement, however,

is another issue. It's my understanding

that we can ask a property owner to repair a sidewalk, but we can't force them to do it, said Mike Williams, who works as an assistant to the Twin Falls city man-

Williams said the city has its share of sidewalks in disrepair.

In an effort to make progress on about onethird of the city of Burley's sidewalks in disrepair, city officials opted in 2011 to create a voluntary citywide local improvement district. More than 100 property-owners signed up for the LID, but no contractors bid on the project because it was so widespread. The city will put it out to bid again in the spring. The voluntary LID dif-

fers from a traditional LID where costs for improvements are spread among taxpayers in the district. Under the voluntary

LID, the property owners benefit from the largescale bidding process and can take advantage of city financing. A lien is then placed on the property by the city. But, the voluntary na-

ture of the LID made contractors skittish. They worried that property owners would back out after the contractors placed a

Jerome's city ordinance allows the city council's majority vote to order construction of sidewalks on any street and assess the cost to the property after receiving a petition submitted by a majority of land owners on the block.

Hulsey, who has been Jerome's administrator for only a few months, said the topic of sidewalk replacement has not been recently discussed by city officials.

the committee on the pros and cons of setting up an exchange.

Included in the discussions were concerns over rising health care costs that an exchange could bring and handing over control to the federal government.

"We know the costs are going to rise," said Rep. John Rusche, D-Lewiston and committee member. "The only way I can foresee having control is to pursue a statebased exchange."

On the other end of the panel, Wayne Hoffman, director of the Idaho Freedom Foundation, urged the committee to resist implementing any section of the health

care reform law.

Hoffman argued that Idaho should not implement any facet of the health care reform law. He pointed to the federal government's approval of Japanese internment camps during World War II as an example of why the federal government can't be trusted.

Hoffman compared the federal government to an abusive spouse.




Alex LaBeau, president of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, disagreed with avoiding setting up an exchange.

YSURSA'S DISCLOSURE LAWSUIT BACK IN IDAHO STATE COURT

BOISE • A lawsuit to force a group touting public schools chief Tom Luna's education overhaul to reveal its still-secret financiers was returned to state court after Secretary of State Ben Ysursa argued a ploy to move the matter to federal court was a desperate delay tactic.

The nonprofit group, Education Voters of Idaho, sought the venue shift late Thursday, to help it fight Ysursa's demands that donors of \$200,000 to broadcast campaign ads be identified before voters weigh in Nov. 6 on whether Luna's education changes survive.

Just after noon Friday, Ysursa's attorney and the group's lawyer, Christ Troupis, filed papers agreeing to contest the lawsuit in 4th District Court.

Still, a hearing on Ysursa's complaint — originally set for Friday at 1:30 p.m. — was postponed. That's because Troupis demanded that 4th District Judge Deborah Bail be removed from the case.

On Friday afternoon, 4th District Judge Mike Wetherell was assigned to replace Bail, and the hearing was rescheduled for 1:30 p.m. Monday.

"It's still our goal and our hope that we'll get preelection disclosure," deputy secretary of state Tim Hurst told The Associated Press.

In promoting the shift to U.S. District Court, Troupis argued EVI, a non-profit 501(c)4 group, has the constitutional right to

conceal its donors' identities to protect their First Amendment free-speech rights.

Troupis didn't return a phone call Friday seeking comment on why he jettisoned Bail from the case — or why he so quickly agreed to return to the Ada County Courthouse to contest matters.

That's something Ysursa demanded, on grounds the shift to federal court was a desperate gambit simply to buy time for Education Voters of Idaho to continue to hide donor identities until after voters cast their Nov. 6 ballots.

It was "an eleventh-hour attempt to prevent application of State law to require disclosure of their campaign contributors before the conclusion of the general election, now only

eleven days away," wrote Ysursa's lawyer, deputy Idaho attorney general Michael Gilmore.

Luna's education changes limit union bargaining power, promote teacher merit pay, and require online classes and student laptop computers — if they survive the polls in less than two weeks.

In challenging Education Voters of Idaho's secrecy, Ysursa is taking on a cadre of powerful Idaho political players.

The group's leaders include Phil Reberger, chief of staff to former Gov. Dirk Kempthorne, and Debbie Field, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's campaign manager. Reberger hasn't returned phone calls seeking comment; Field has declined to comment, citing the law-

Congress Too Polarized, Inept to Protect Its Own Power

ongress is on an extended election hiatus, yet there has been no noticeable decline in its productivity. As polarization and legislative gridlock have worsened in recent years, the nation's great legislative body has withered, losing not only popular support but the ability to exercise its constitutional powers.

The result has been a troubling expansion of executive and judicial power. An example is President Barack Obama's decision in June to end the deportation of some illegal immigrants who came to the United States as children. In 2011, he had rejected calls to circumvent Congress to bring relief to young immigrants. "You have to pass bills through the legislature, and then I can sign it," Obama said at the time. His reversal may have been justified on the merits, but it can be rationalized only by congressional dysfunc-

Executive agencies such as the Environmental Protection Agency, which is poised to issue its own carbondioxide emissions standards for power plants, devise policy with little fear of being overruled by Congress (the courts are another issue). Environmentalists who think this is a satisfactory arrangement may want to contemplate how such executive power would be used in a potential Mitt Romney administration. Even the Federal Election Commission, itself a parody of gridlock, takes the law into its own hands. If you wonder what legislation led to the explosion of undisclosed campaign donations to shadowy groups, the answer is "none." In fact, the McCain-Feingold legislation, passed in 2002, requires disclosure of such contributions, and the Supreme Court's Citizens United ruling explicitly presumed that disclosure would inhibit corruption. The FEC, however, had issued its own "interpretation of law" in 2007 that quietly gutted the law's requirements.

The effects of congressional inaction radiate well beyond Washington. We have previously cited the economic costs of gridlock, including the blow to recovery delivered by last year's debt-ceiling debacle, a black eye self-administered by the House of Representatives. Similarly, congressional gridlock delayed a Federal Aviation Administration reauthorization bill last year, costing the government \$300 million in airline taxes and leaving 4,000 federal workers furloughed for two weeks. Tens of thousands of private-sector construction workers went without work or pay as well.

When ideology and incompetence combined to weigh down a House highway bill this year, state and local governments across the nation paid a price in stalled projects, heightened uncertainty and decaying infrastructure.

U.S. SUPREME COURT SETS ASIDE WYOMING TEEN'S SENTENCE

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) • The U.S. Supreme Court has vacated the life sentence of a Wyoming teenager convicted in the 2009 home invasion killing of a Sheridan businessman.

It's now up to the Wyoming Supreme Court to decide how to proceed in the case of Wyatt Bear Cloud.

Bear Cloud was 16 at the time of the slaying of Robert Ernst. Bear Cloud received a flat sentence of life in prison in the murder while the other two teens were sentenced to life without parole. Wyoming law mandates sentences of either life in prison or life without parole for juvenile offenders convicted of first-degree murder.

Bear Cloud's public defenders asked the U.S. Supreme Court to review his case after the court this year threw out mandatory life sentences for juvenile offenders. The court's ruling, in a case called Miller v. Alabama, didn't forbid such sentences but required sentencing judges to consider other options. The high court on Oct. 1

sent Bear Cloud's case back to the Wyoming Supreme Court for reconsideration. One option could be to send the case to district court for a new sentencing hearing.

A proposed bill to bring state law into line with the U.S. Supreme Court decision failed to pass the Legislature's Joint Judiciary Interim Committee on Thursday.

Greg Phillips, Wyoming attorney general, said Friday he urged the committee to adopt the change. "To be in compliance with United States Supreme Court precedent, I think we need to change the law," he said.

Dave Delicath, a lawyer with the Wyoming Attorney General's Office, had argued that Bear Cloud's original sentence should stand. He said Thursday his office is working with the Legislative Service Office and the state public defender's office to propose changes to state law for juvenile murder cases.

"That decision in Miller said that a trial court may sentence a juvenile to life without parole, but the trial court has to have some other option so there can't be an automatic sentence of life without parole for a juvenile," Delicath said.

Although Bear Cloud wasn't sentenced to serve life without parole, his lawyers argued that was the practical effect of his sentence because his only chance for release was commutation by a state governor.

Trial courts now must conduct hearings at which the defendant can produce evidence about factors such as their maturity, intelligence and potential for

"The purpose behind that is so that the judge who's making the sentencing decision has a more realistic understanding of whether this person can be rehabilitated in the future," he said.

Dharminder Vir Sen, another teen convicted in the Ernst killing, has an appeal pending before the Wyoming Supreme Court. His lawyers argue the Miller v. Alabama decision should prohibit his sentence of life without pa-

Authorities say Vir Sen, who was 15 when Ernst was killed, was the triggerman. The third defendant, Dennis Poitra, Jr., was 18 at the time.

Matt Redle, Sheridan County Attorney, prosecuted the cases. He said it's too early to say whether his office would argue that Bear Cloud should be sentenced again to life in prison if the state Supreme Court sends the case back. "We'll cross that bridge when we come to it," he

Idaho Lawmaker Files for Bankruptcy — Again

BOISE (AP) • State lawmaker and tax protester Rep. Phil Hart has filed for bankruptcy - again - prompting a federal tax foreclosure case against him to be put on hold.

Hart filed for bankruptcy in Idaho's U.S. District Court on Wednesday, almost two months after he voluntarily dropped his previous bankruptcy case.

Hart, a Republican from Athol who lost his bid for a fifth term in the Idaho House in the May primary election, stopped filing federal income tax returns in 1996 while he unsuccessfully pursued a federal lawsuit challenging the constitutionality of the federal income tax. He lost that lawsuit, and the Internal Revenue Service is seeking to collect more than half a million dollars in back taxes, penalties and interest, partly by foreclosing on his log home.

Hart recently lost a separate tussle with the Idaho State Tax Commission, which said he owed more than \$53,000 in past-due state income taxes and missed the deadline to appeal the amount. The Idaho Supreme Court ruled in June that Hart did miss the deadline, putting an end to his appeal of that case. The high court also ordered him to pay nearly \$10,000 for the state's legal fees.

Kathryn Keneally, assistant attorney general with the U.S. Department of Justice, notified the judge overseeing the foreclosure case about Hart's newest bankruptcy filing. In the court document, she pointed out that because it was Hart's second bankruptcy filing in less than a year, the judge could decide to limit the hold on the foreclosure case to just 30 days.

But Friday, U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge decided against that, instead putting the foreclosure case on hold until the bankruptcy is settled or the bankruptcy judge decides the foreclosure can move forward.

Hart voluntarily dismissed his previous bankruptcy case in August, after agreeing with the bankruptcy trustee that he was ineligible for Chapter 13 because his total amount of unsecured debt exceeded the limits under the bankruptcy code. Chapter 13 bankruptcy allows people to reorganize their finances and pay down debt over several years.

Hart indicated that he would try to convert the case to another type of bankruptcy or dismiss it. But his latest bankruptcy filing is also under the Chapter 13 code, and his initial court documents indicate his circumstances are much the same as when he filed the first time: Hart is still claiming to have less than \$50,000 in assets and to owe between \$500,000 and \$1 million in liabilities.

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Study: Flood of Money Leaves China

BEIJING (AP) • Chinese investors evaded government controls to move more than \$600 billion out of the country last year and the outflow is increasing, fueling economic and political risks as communist leaders prepare for a handover of power, a Washington-based monitoring group says.

The study by Global Financial Integrity gives backing to anecdotal signs of huge, unreported movements of Chinese money out of the country. Experts say the outflows are driven by public frustration with a banking system that subsidizes state companies at the expense of savers and by businesses profiting from loopholes in the government's pervasive economic controls.

Chinese companies are widely believed to move money abroad both to invest and to "round trip"back into the country disguised as foreign investment to win tax breaks and other incentives. Chinese families move money abroad to gain a better return than they can from state banks that pay low deposit rates.

Last year's outflow was part of a \$3.8 trillion flood of capital that left China over 11 years, Global Financial Integrity said. It said the amount rose from \$172.6 billion in 2000 to

\$602.9 billion in 2011.

The group said it was unclear how much of the money came from corruption or other crimes but it said the illicit outflow could aggravate economic and political strains by aiding tax evasion and widen-China's sensitive wealth gap.


The study "raises serious questions about the stability of the Chinese economy," the group said in a statement.

"The social, political, and economic order is not sustainable in the long-run given such massive illicit outflows," said Dev Kar, the group's chief economist and a co-author of the report, in the statement.

Global Financial Integrity, a program of the Center for International Policy, studies illegal cross-border flows of money and promotes measures to stop them.

Some commentators have suggested the outflows reflect a loss of faith by China's financial elite in the communist government but others say much of the money is sent back into the country disguised as foreign investment.

"While the funds could be earned through bribery, kickbacks, or other illicit activities, they may well be earned through legitimate means," said Global Financial Integrity.

Frankenstorm Targets Delaware

WASHINGTON (AP) • When Hurricane Sandy becomes a hybrid weather monster some "Frankenstorm" it will smack the East Coast harder and wider than last year's damaging Irene, forecasters said Friday.

The brunt of the weather mayhem will be concentrated where the hurricane comes ashore early Tuesday, but there will be hundreds of miles of steady, strong and damaging winds and rain for the entire Eastern region for several days, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The hurricane has killed at least 20 people in the Caribbean, and just left the Bahamas. It is expected to move north, just off the Eastern Seaboard.

As of Friday morning, federal forecasters were looking closer at the Delaware shore as the spot it will turn inland and merge with a wintry storm front. But there is a lot of room for error in the forecast and the storm could turn into shore closer to New York and New Jersey and bring the worst weather there.

Wherever Sandy comes ashore will get 10 inches of rain and extreme storm surges, Louis Uccellini, NOAA's environmental prediction director, said in a Friday news conference. Other areas not directly on Sandy's entry path will still get 4 to 8 inches of rain, maybe more,

he said. Up to 2 feet of snow should fall on West Virginia, with lighter snow in parts of Ohio and Pennsylvania, regardless of where Sandy first

A wide swath of the East, measuring several hundreds of miles, will get persistent gale-force winds in the 50 mph area, with some areas closer to storm landfall getting closer to 70 mph, said James Franklin, forecast chief for the National Hurricane Center.

Candidates, Spouses Focus on New Hampshire

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) • Politicians like to say campaigns are a marathon, not a sprint. But New Hampshire is turning into a relayrace, with presidential candidates and their spouses handing off the baton to each other over the next few days.

Jill Biden, wife of Vice President Joe Biden, kicked things off Friday, stopping by campaign offices in Concord, Berlin, Conway and Laconia. She'll be followed in quick succession by President Barack Obama on Saturday and the vice president on Monday. First lady Michelle Obama had been scheduled to speak at the University of New Hampshire on Tuesday but cancelled because the school is closing due to the approaching storm.

Meanwhile, Republican

will campaign in the state on Monday, and Romney plans to hold a rally Tuesday evening in the Manchester area.

Republican vice presidential nominee Paul Ryan made two trips to New Hampshire in late September, but Romney hasn't been in the state since Sept. 6, the same day Obama, Biden and their wives campaigned in Portsmouth. Biden has been back twice since then; Obama returned for a rally last week.

The activity underscores the degree to which New Hampshire's four electoral college votes are valued in what is expected to be a close election.

And while the Obama campaign has logged more high-profile visits recently, the Romney campaign insists it has momentum

Meningitis Cases Rise to 338 across U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) • Federal health inspectors say staffers at a pharmacy linked to the deadly meningitis outbreak over the past year documented dozens of cases of mold and bacteria growing in rooms that were supposed to be sterile. The fungus that sickened 338 people across the

U.S., causing 25 deaths. In a preliminary report on conditions at the pharmacy, The Food and Drug Administration said Friday that even when the contamination at New **England Compounding** Center exceeded the company's own safety levels, there is no evidence that staffers investigated or corrected the problem.

The New England Compounding Center's lawyer said Friday the pharmacy "will review this report and will continue our cooperation with the FDA."

Compounding pharmacies like NECC traditionally fill special orders placed by doctors for individual patients, turning out a small number of customized formulas.

McGovern Celebrated as 'Conscience of Our Nation'

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) • Three former Democratic presidential candidates paid personal respects Friday to George McGovern, whose 1972 campaign for president galvanized the party's liberal wing and ushered in a new generation of political activism.

Walter Mondale, John

Kerry and Gary Hart – who like McGovern all spent time in the Senate before unsuccessful runs for the White House – led a crowd of hundreds of mourners. Hart was the only one of the three to speak at the funeral.

"George McGovern was a voice of conscience for our nation in our time," Hart said. Those who were uncomfortable with McGovern called him a liberal as an insult to try to imply he was weak, Hart added, but "he was larger than any political label, particularly a demonized one."

McGovern died Sunday at age 90 after a brief stay in hospice care.

Landfills Brimming with Oil Drilling Waste

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) • The amount of chemically tainted soil and other drilling waste produced in western North Dakota's thriving oil patch has been growing so quickly that the special landfills where it's disposed are filling up and the state will soon need more of them, state health officials say.

Data obtained by The Associated Press show the amount of so-called oilfield special waste has increased nearly 5,100 percent over the past decade, to more than 512,000 tons last year.

The more than 1 billion pounds of oilfield waste produced this year is roughly the weight of the sunflower harvest in North Dakota, which is the nation's top sunflower producer.

The growth of oilfield special waste "is just incredible," said Steve Tillotson, assistant director of the North Dakota Health Department's waste management division.

Trucks are hauling oilfield waste to facilities "24 hours a day, seven days a week," Tillotson said.

Oil companies increasingly are moving drilling waste off well sites, as more stringent regulations have been put in place, said Tillotson and Bruce Bogenrief, general manager of Sawyer Disposal Services, which runs an industrial waste landfill near Sawyer in north-central North Dakota.

"In the past, a lot of it was

put on site," Bogenrief said. More "teeth in the regulations" has prompted companies to pay to haul the waste to approved facilities for environmental and liability reasons, he said.

"Tonnage-wise, it's going off the chart," Bogenrief said of the amount of oil waste being hauled to the special landfills

Only five facilities in North Dakota are permitted to accept oilfield special waste, which includes chemically treated rock, soil and other solid material brought to the surface during oil well drilling.

Tainted earth from oil spills also is shipped to the facilities that use massive clay- and plastic-lined pits

to prohibit polluted material from leaking into water sources.

Existing oil waste disposal sites are nearing capacity and companies have been considering building more than a dozen similar facilities, said Scott Radig, the state Health Department's waste management director.

Judge Won't Intervene in Suit over Donation

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • A federal judge on Friday said he won't intervene in a state lawsuit between Democrat Steve Bullock and Republican Rick Hill over the legality of a \$500,000 donation to Hill's campaign for governor.

The ruling is a win for Bullock, the attorney general, who is suing Hill in state court to force the former congressman to return the donation from the Montana Republican Party.

U.S. District Judge Charles Lovell denied a request by conservative groups to find Bullock in contempt for filing the lawsuit. Lovell also denied Hill's request to counter state District Judge Kathy Seeley's temporary order preventing Hill from spending the donation or airing ads purchased with it before a Monday hearing.

At issue are the state's campaign contribution limits that Lovell ruled unconstitutional on Oct. 3. The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals blocked Lovell's ruling Oct. 9.

Between those dates, the state Republican Party gave Hill the donation. Hill says it was legal for him to take the \$500,000 when there were no limits, while Bullock argues he must give it back now that the appeals court has reinstated the

\$22,600 limit from all political parties.

The Bullock campaign welcomed Lovell's quick ruling. It argued Hill, as the only statewide candidate holding onto such an infusion of cash, needs to "do the right thing" and return the money.

Hill campaign spokesman Brock Lowrance said the campaign continues to comply with Seeley's order and will wait for Monday's hearing, but the campaign late Friday also appealed Lovell's decision to the 9th Circuit.

"Steve Bullock is using the courts to try and win an election, so in turn we are going to continue to make our case before the courts," Lowrance said.

Conservative groups, businesses and individuals who sued to throw out the campaign contribution limits asked Lovell to find Bullock's lawsuit in contempt of Lovell's order throwing out the contribution limits. They also asked Lovell to force Bullock to pay for ads that restore the damage to Hill's reputation.

Lovell wrote in his order denying that request that his ruling on the limits was not enforceable once the 9th Circuit took action, so Bullock's conduct could not have violated it.


Activists Protest Chimp Permit

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

Maybe this is the year.

James' Miami Heat are on top of the league and got even stronger this summer, but nobody loaded up like the Lakers, who acquired Dwight Howard and Steve Nash.

One team or the other has appeared in the last six NBA Finals. Now, with more help than either has ever had, James and Bryant both will face title expectations — and a sense they're due for that long-awaited showdown with each other in June.

"If we see that matchup, Kobe vs. LeBron, I think it would break all the records," Lakers Hall of Famer and ES-PN analyst Magic Johnson said. "I think the viewership would be off the charts."

It's no guarantee, of course. The Oklahoma City Thunder might still be best in the West, making a James-Kevin Durant rematch in the finals just as likely as James-Bryant. Or maybe the Boston Celtics, who came so close to knocking out the Heat last year, can finish the job this time even after Ray Allen ditched them to join James on South Beach.

But even the guys chasing the King concede how difficult it will be to dethrone

"I think everyone knew if he won one that it's going to be hard for everybody. ... I'm hoping there's enough good teams, and we can be one of them, that we can knock him off," Celtics coach Doc Rivers

"The good news is he's the clear target. We know who we're going after, there's no doubt about that. But he's awful good. He's a good guy, he's great for the league and he's a great player. That's good for everything. But now let's beat him."

The Celtics get the first shot, visiting the Heat in Tuesday's season opener. The Lakers open later that night against Dallas, and for a change all eyes at Staples Center won't be only on Bryant.

The Lakers acquired the NBA's best big man in Howard after surprisingly adding Nash, long one of the league's best point guards, earlier in the summer. Just like that, a team that couldn't get out of the second round the last two years put itself right back in the hunt for what would be Bryant's sixth championship.

"We're all determined to get there for sure," Bryant said. "The hunger from Dwight and Nash can definitely, definitely help our energy."

Howard's departure from Orlando was lengthy and messy, finally completed in August. James and Bryant were in London preparing to play in the Olympic semifinals on the day the trade was completed, and news of the deal overshadowed their victory en route to the Americans' second straight gold medal two days later.

For James, the gold was the completion of one of basket-

onship, the Olympic gold medal, and the regular season and finals MVP awards in

the same season. Once Jordan got to the top, he was never really knocked from it, save for one partial season after he returned from playing baseball during his first retirement. James, now considered the league's best player, has similar designs on a lengthy run.

"In a sport like this, I think the ultimate goal and the only goal is to win," James said. "You prepare to win. It doesn't happen all the time. Of course not. But that should be your mindset. Prepare strength after both were slowed by injuries in the playoffs, and the Big Three is now surrounded by Allen, the league's career leader in 3-

pointers, and Rashard Lewis. League executives are convinced of a trip back to the finals, with 96.7 percent of responses in NBA.com's GM survey picking the Heat to win the Eastern Conference. Miami got 70 percent of the vote to repeat as champion, and James was the choice of two-thirds of the responders to add another MVP award to his collection.

NHL Cancels Games through November

NEW YORK • The NHL lockout has forced the cancellation of all games through the end of November.

The NHL announced Friday that 326 regularseason games from Oct. 11 through Nov. 30 were lost - more than 26.5 percent of the schedule. The news came one day after a league-imposed deadline passed for a deal with the players' association that would allow for a full sea-

"The National Hockey League deeply regrets having to take this action," deputy commissioner Bill Daly said in a statement. "By presenting a proposal to the NHLPA that contemplated a fair division of revenues and was responsive to player concerns regarding the value of their contracts, we had hoped to be able to forge a longterm collective bargaining agreement that would have preserved an 82game regular season for our fans. Unfortunately, that did not occur.

"We acknowledge and accept that there is joint responsibility in collective bargaining and, though we are profoundly disappointed that a new agreement has not been attained to this point, we remain committed achieving an agreement that is fair for the players and the clubs - one that will be good for the game and our fans."


Rain 11 T-storms

The dispute is all too similar to the 2004-05 lockout that led to the cancellation of that entire season - the first time a North American professional sports league lost a complete campaign to a labor dispute.

Reaching a new deal potentially became even tougher Friday, because the NHL pulled off the table its most recent offer to the players – one that included a 50-50 split of hockey-related revenues.

"The league officially informed us today that they have withdrawn their latest proposal and have cancelled another slate of regular-season games," union executive director Donald Fehr said in a statement. "This is deeply disappointing for all hockey fans and everyone who makes their living from hockey, including the players. But it comes as no surprise."

Whether any of the canceled games can be rescheduled in the event of a quick settlement remains to be seen.

here is nothing as amazing as this," Phil Schiller, Apple's senior VP of world wide marketing said when announcing the new iPad. Really? Nothing? Not the birth of a child? Not sobriety after years of addiction? Not the release of having been forgiven?

Newer, bigger (or in this case, smaller!), faster, with more "features" (most of which the average consumer never uses) is the stuff of the American dream: about "stuff!" Distinguishing between wants and needs becomes increasingly difficult as the luxuries of the past become necessities of today.

Contrast this to Jesus' challenge for his followers to pursue his road of downward mobility: "...whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant and



whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve." (Mark 10:44-45). His whole life was the perfect demonstration of the power of Love.

Then, as now, against voices that lure us with messages like "Money is power" and "He who dies with the most toys, wins" Christians are challenged to have the same mind in us that was in Christ - humility and obedience to God.

We are both challenged and equipped (through grace) to follow his example of sacrificial love. Not

only are we to be prayerful people,

obedient to God, we are to care for God's creation and "the least of these." We are to be conduits for God's redemptive justice within the world.

In order to fully live, we are not to shrink from pain but to be of good courage in pursuing God's vision for the world. We experience the peace that passes understanding when we minister with (not to) others.

When the voices urge us to buy more, forgive less, take revenge, label people, or act as bullies we have another small, clear voice that speaks the truth to us. He speaks to us from his life, from the cross, on the road to Emmaus, and he speaks now.





torn down to accommodate a bowling alley. Two years later, on Aug. 9, 1914, the church borrowed \$800 for the purpose of erecting a church building at 307 Madison St. E. in downtown Kimberly.

It's the same building members meet in today, though over the years it has seen some change.

In the 1920s, for instance, the church purchased stadium chairs from the Idaho Theater to replace the sanctuary's wooden chairs. In 1947, the church acquired a building from the Hunt internment camp; it was attached to the back of the church to add space for classrooms. Another remodeling of the sanctuary, in the 1980s, included installation of stained glass windows, which were replaced in the late 1990s after the church was vandal-

But it's not only the building that has been revisited,

Daugherty said. "We've grown quite a bit," he said. "We've got a vibrant youth and family ministry. We recently hired a new youth pastor, and so we've spent the last five years putting together a family ministry of children and youth that glorifies God."

Daugherty has been with the church since 2008, first as youth pastor and since Oct. 1 as lead pastor. His predecessor, Steelman Borden, was lead pastor for 15 years, retiring this fall.

That's another thing that has changed, said member

and church elder Jim Call: Pastors are staying longer than they used to. They also buy their own houses, while back in the day the congregation purchased houses for the ministers.

Cuban Dissident Eloy Gutierrez-Menoyo Dies

HAVANA (AP) • Eloy Gutierrez-Menoyo, who went from rebel commander fighting alongside Fidel Castro to a foe launching commando raids against the island before settling inside Cuba as a moderate, pro-dialogue dissident, died early Friday. He was 77.

Born Dec. 8, 1934, in Madrid, Spain, Gutierrez-Menoyo was the son and brother of men who fought against the Spanish dictator Gen. Francisco Franco. The family moved to Cuba in 1945.

Gutierrez-Menoyo opposed Cuban strongman Fulgencio Batista in the 1950s, and he formed and commanded the Second Front of Escambray, a rebel group that operated alongside but independently of Castro's guerrilla forces. Although he had arrived in Havana as one of the triumphant "Commanders of the Revolu-Gutierrez-Menoyo quickly broke with Castro and by 1961 was in exile in Miami helping form Alpha 66, an armed commando group dedicated to the violent overthrow of Castro's government. In December 1964, Gutierrez-Menoyo returned to Cuba with an armed band to launch an uprising, but they were captured after a month.

Gutierrez-Menoyo spent 22 years in Cuban prisons, losing vision in one eye and hearing in one ear. He was freed in 1986 through a petition of the Spanish government after an international campaign for his release.

He went into exile, first briefly to Madrid, and then a year later to Miami, where he ultimately adopted a position of peaceful dialogue with Castro's government and founded

Cambio Cubano. A former wife, Gladys, and their three sons together, live in Miami. His daughter by an earlier marriage, Patricia Gutierrez-Menoyo, lives in San Juan, Puerto Rico

Syrian Toddler Feared Dead

Reunited with His Parents NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) • No one knows how long little Bushr Al Tawashi wandered alone in the rubble of

his home in the Syrian capital before rebel fighters found the toddler and handed him over to another family to look after. Now, the 2-year-old is back with his parents - who believed he had been killed.

In their chaotic haste to escape fighting between government troops and Syrian rebels, Bushr's parents had assumed the boy was picked up by other members of their extended family who were staying with them when clashes broke out last summer in the Damascus suburb of Al Kaboun. Heavy fighting prevented

the parents from going back to search for Bushr once they arrived at a refugee camp and realized he was missing, said Stella Constantinou, a Cypriot lawyer.

Believing he did not survive the shelling, the boy's grief-stricken father, Machhour Al Tawashi, and his wife, Arin Al Dakkar, arrived in Cyprus on Aug. 6 along with their two other sons, ages 4 and 6, in search of asylum. Word the boy was safe eventually reached the parents, who now live in the coastal town of Limassol. "You can imagine how they

felt when they were told their son was alive after bearing all this guilt thinking that he was dead," Constantinou said.

Al Tawashi told The Associated Press through an interpreter that someone had recognized Bushr since everyone knows each other in their tight-knit community, and called the family in Cyprus to deliver the good news. The family then sought Constantinou's help to bring him to this Mediterranean island, which lies 65 miles east of Syria.

Al Tawashi's sister, who had joined the family in Cyprus, volunteered to return to Damascus on Sept. 9 to take care of the child until arrangements for his return could be made. She is now being prevented from leaving the Syrian capital, the lawyer said.

Bushr's father traveled to the Lebanese capital of Beirut, where he was reunited with the boy at the Cypriot Embassy. He brought Bushr back to the island on Thursday.

"I can't describe how I felt when I saw him, just overjoyed at seeing him again," Al Tawashi said Friday. "At first he didn't recognize me, but then we embraced and he started calling out 'Father,

At the beginning of the year I discovered my 14year-old brother has been peeping on my sister. When my parents found out, they sent him to counseling, but my sister is still pretty

scarred from it. Today, when I was in the bathroom, I realized my brother was peeping at me through a hole in the wall. I feel extremely violated, but because he is only 14, I don't know what to do. How can we get him to stop, and how can my sister and I feel comfortable in our house again?

SCARED OF MY BROTHER THE PEEPER

DEAR SCARED: You and vour sister should be able to feel comfortable in your own home. Tell your parents that the counseling your brother received hasn't worked, then show them the hole he has been peeping through. Clearly, whatever consequences there were for his actions the first time were not enough to discourage his behavior. Your sister may need counseling to get beyond it.

The hole should be repaired – and until it is, tape a small mirror over it so that if he tries to peep again, all he will see is his own eyeball. And tell your sister to do the same.

DEAR ABBY: Mv boyfriend, "Carl," and I have been together for six months. We're both 29. We live together, work for the same employer and each have one child.

My problem is, we argue constantly. We fight about the kids, money, chores, etc. The smallest thing can turn into a major battle. Do you think it's too early to be fighting so much? I feel obligated to make it work because my son's father and I broke up before he was born. and he has now become attached to Carl and his daughter. Please help!

- TORNIN TORRANCE, CALIF. **DEAR TORN:** Yes, it's too

early to be fighting this way. It was also way too early to start living together. Couples counseling may help you and Carl resolve your issues but only if he is willing to work on them as you are. If that isn't the case, you should move on QUICKLY, before your son forms an even stronger attachment. At this point, it can be done without the expense of a lawyer.

DEAR ABBY: My mom pays me \$3 a week to do chores around the house. I take out the garbage, do the dishes, vacuum and set the table every night. I'm frustrated that I'm being paid such a small amount for doing a ton of work.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"Still you are not satisfied, Still you tremble faint reproach; Challenge me I keep aside Secrets that you may not broach." — D.H Lawrence

In today's deal, South might have looked for a slam after the two-no-trump rebid. Over the forcing rebid of three spades, North can cooperate with slam interest or sign off in no-trump or spades with a minimum in context.

As it was, though, it was just as well that South restrained himself, because even 10 tricks proved quite difficult to accumulate. West led the heart queen and declarer rightly refused to play dummy's king on the first two rounds. (If West held Q-J-10x-x, East's ace would appear on the second round and dummy's king would be worth a trick.)

But how would you continue the play when the defenders take three heart tricks and East then switches to a club? You win in dummy and run the trump nine successfully. When you lead dummy's last trump and finesse the queen, West shows out. What now? You must aim for a trumpcoup end-position where vou hold A-J of trumps in your hand and the lead is in dummy. Because of the shortage of entries to dummy, you must cross your fingers and lead a diamond to the 10, ruff a club, re-enter dummy with the diamond queen, and ruff another club. When you cross to dummy's diamond ace, East follows suit, and you have reached the required two-card end position. Your A-J of trumps sits over East's K-8 and the lead is in dummy. You can play a club and take the rest whatever East does.

ANSWER: Your quick tricks might suggest bidding three notrump here — but, in fact, two no-trump will suffice. That shows 18-19 in a balanced hand and lets partner in on the decision whether to play in a part-score or a game. A call of three clubs would be cowardly; and on a spade lead, it might play equally badly because of the risk of heart ruffs.




