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Donors Give Big Money to Props 1, 2, 3

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TWIN FALLS • New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg gave \$200,000 to Idaho's education reform fight. He was one of the largest single donors to the campaign.

Who else is putting into the battle over Propositions 1, 2 and 3?

According to campaign finance

reports due Oct. 31, more than a million dollars that pay for Idaho campaign advertising come from out-of-state organizations and individuals. And Idaho billionaires are also getting in on the action.

revealed its donors after three weeks of fighting Secretary of State Ben Yursa.

Some of the biggest donors: New

York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg (\$200,000), Wyoming billionaire Foster Friess (\$5,000), Oregon retired oil tycoon John Bryan (\$5,000), former ambassador to Uruguay Frank E. Baxter of California (\$5,000), California investment manager William Oberndorf (\$10,000) and DC-based Republican Governors Public Policy Committee (\$50,000).

The committee had Idaho donors, too, including Albertsons heir Joseph Scott (\$250,000), Clear

Springs Foods from Buhl (\$10,000), Simplot (\$5,000) and Hagadone Hospitality Co. of Coeur d'Alene (\$15,000).

Yes for Idaho Education received most of its support from in-state GOP politicians, most notably Idaho Falls billionaire Frank Vandersloot's company Melaleuca. Melaleuca donated \$541,000 in four installments between the dates of Oct. 12-27.

Twin Falls Plans for Future Water Use

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TWIN FALLS • Water and wastewater treatment might be out of sight, out of may for most citizens. But it's a big issue for Twin Falls officials.

On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council got a chance to see how the water system works, visiting water treatment plants and pumps in the Snake River Canyon.

As the city moves forward with forming its strategic plan for growth, officials are looking at expanding water and wastewater facilities.

They're trying to decide what those improvements should look like and how they're going to pay for it.

Why Is Improvement Needed?

When Chobani announced last year that Twin Falls was the location for a new yogurt factory, the company agreed

Woman Stable after Shooting Accident

IDAHO FALLS • The daughter of a Cassia County magistrate judge is doing well after an accidental shooting.

Hailey Hodges is the oldest daughter of Cassia County 5th District Magistrate Judge Mick Hodges.

Authorities say Hailey Hodges' husband, the son of a Democratic state lawmaker, shot Hodges accidentally with a rifle following a day of hunting.

Ian Malepeai is one of three children of Idaho Senate Minority Leader Edgar Malepeai of Pocatello, who is retiring from the Legislature this year.

According to sheriff's reports, Malepeai was removing a 7 mm rifle from his pickup truck just after 7 p.m. when it discharged, sending a bullet into Hailey Hodges' buttocks.

Bonneville County sheriff's deputies say Hailey Hodges was transported to a hospital in the region.

She's reported in stable condition.

Judge Hodges said he spoke to his daughter, a Twin Falls High School graduate, and she was doing well and was making jokes about the incident soon afterward.

"She is doing well and thanks everyone for their prayers," he said.

Jerome Citizens Advise on Wastewater Issues

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JEROME • The city of Jerome is forming a new citizen advisory committee to look at options for improving the wastewater treatment plant.

The "Blue Ribbon Committee" meets for the first time tonight and community members are invited to attend.

Mayor John Shine said city officials are looking to take a bond to voters during the May election to pay for facility improvements.

But a firm date for the election — or exact bond amount — hasn't been set yet by Jerome's city council.

Under the city's budget, \$43 million is the maximum amount for a future bond.

Shine said he talked with environmental engineering firm Keller Associates about the best way to approach residents about a bond.

Firm representatives suggested a citizen

Thompson Trial Starts in Rupert

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RUPERT • Two men's hands were on the gun that cut Michael Kenneth Blair's life short last December southeast of Paul.

One of the hands belonged to Blair, the other to Michael Jared Thompson, who faced a jury Wednesday on a charge of involuntary manslaughter.

The trial continues today. Whose finger actually squeezed the trigger — sending a bullet into Blair's head — is one of the facts the jury will have to unravel. Wednesday, they heard the twisted tale of four friends out on a night on the town that was filled with stiff alcohol, loud arguments and a gun that was taken out as a threat.

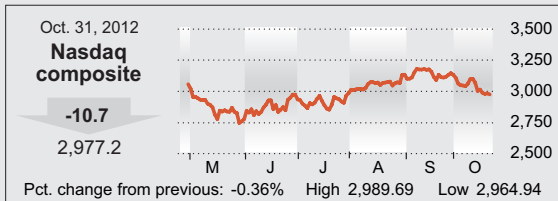
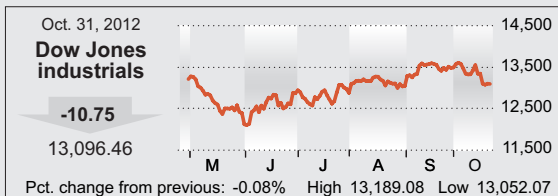

Stocks Mixed after Historic Closure

NEW YORK (AP) • Stocks closed mixed on Wednesday in their first session since Hurricane Sandy forced a historic two-day shutdown of trading.

The Dow Jones industrial average slipped 10.75 points to 13,096.46. The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose, but barely — up 0.22 of a point to 1,412.16.

Investors were nervous that a flood of orders after two days of pent-up demand from customers might lead to volatile trading. But stock prices barely budged at the opening, and stayed within a tight range throughout the day.

Welcome to November

Our stretch of mild Indian summer weather comes to an end as we start the month of November. High temperatures the last four days ranged from 67 on Sunday to the mid-70s on Wednesday, but that is all changing today thanks to a cold front moving through southern Idaho.

Temperatures should cool today by almost 15 to 20 degrees, as our highs should be from the upper 50s to low 60s. The front brings mostly cloudy skies and even a little bit of a breeze out of the west-northwest between 10 and 15 mph, with occasional gusts near 20 in the afternoon. There is a slight chance we see a scattered shower during the day, but most of the time it should remain dry. The cooler, more seasonal temperatures continue into Friday and the weekend with highs in the mid-50s to near 60 degrees.

October was the 11th straight month of above normal temperatures. Our departure from the monthly average temperature was almost one degree. Precipitation for the month was below average by 31 hundredths of an inch, continuing our precipitation deficit of 84 hundredths of an inch for the year.

SAFE ROADS FOR THE WASHINGTON SCHOOL

TWIN FALLS • A new grade school was built on the edge of town in 1916.

Washington School was handy for families living on the outskirts of Twin Falls. But its convenient location — at the intersection of Addison Avenue, Blue Lakes Boulevard and Shoshone Street — led to its eventual demise.

The town grew rapidly in its first dozen years, prompting the construction of Washington School just outside the city limits. Back then, Addison and Blue Lakes marked the north and east edges of town.

The school sat at the northeast corner of North Five Points, where Albertsons supermarket sits today.

As Twin Falls continued to grow, so did the traffic on the three streets in front of Washington School.

Many of the school's students needed to cross two of the streets before and after school — and many walked home for lunch at noon.

A stoplight was eventually installed at the intersection and teachers were assigned traffic duty. In 1959, the Twin Falls Police Department took over the duty. A student safety patrol

was created to assist the traffic cop at the intersection. Lynn Brandon was part of that safety patrol in 1972.

“There were no buses at Washington School when I went there,” said Brandon. “We all walked to school.”

The safety patrol consisted of sixth-grade students who had good grades and showed responsibility, he said.

Members of the safety patrol wore red caps and orange Sam Browne belts, and carried long poles with red flags at the end.

Every school day, morning and afternoon, the safety patrol would position themselves at each of the five corners of the intersection. The traffic cop, whom Brandon remembers only as “Johnny,” would insert a key into a control box on a pole at the school corner. When turned, the key triggered the stoplights, bringing all traffic to a halt.

The student lieutenant would give the order and the safety patrol would lower their flags into the lane of oncoming traffic, while other students scurried safely across the intersection.

In 1975, Washington School was torn down and replaced by Sawtooth Elementary School in a neighborhood with less traffic.

When built, the Twin Falls

Times called Washington School one of the most modern schools in Idaho, complete with a basement heat plant, a stage and assembly room, three storage rooms and two “toilet rooms.”

The first three schools in Twin Falls — Bickel, Lincoln and the first Twin Falls High School — were two-story, red brick buildings. Washington School broke this pattern with its gray stucco walls and single-level construction. The school was built in a unique “L” shape.

High school students on Shoshone Street who could see the grade school from their building's second-floor windows dubbed Washington School “The Tombstone.”

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Mexican National Gets 26 Years for Selling Meth

BOISE • A man who was convicted of intent to distribute methamphetamine in the Magic Valley was sentenced to more than 26 years in federal prison Tuesday.

According to an announcement from U.S. Attorney Wendy Olson, Jorge Cruz-Vizcarra, 38, a Mexican national, was sentenced to 26 years and 10 months for possession of meth with intent to distribute and possession of a firearm in furtherance of a drug trafficking crime.

U.S. District Judge Edward J. Lodge imposed a 21-year, 10-month sentence for the meth charge and a five-year consecutive sentence on the firearm charge.

Cruz-Vizcarra must forfeit assets and proceeds derived from the crimes, including firearms and money. He pleaded guilty to the charges on July 2.

According to the announcement, Cruz-Vizcarra admitted that he, co-defendant Lamberto Arroyo-Mora and others agreed to distribute meth in the Magic Valley. Cruz-Vizcarra admitted he agreed to sell a pound of meth for \$13,000 on Jan 13. The same day, detectives from Idaho State Police, the Jerome County Sheriff's Office and the Jerome Police Department served a warrant at Cruz-Vizcarra's Jerome home.

Officers found two pounds of meth, five firearms and \$4,300 in cash, the announcement states.

Police also seized two vehicles, the

announcement states.

In the same case, Arroyo-Mora, 30, and Jorge Cruz-Gonzalez, 19, both Mexican nationals who lived in the Jerome area, were sentenced in August for conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine.

Arroyo-Mora was sentenced to four years and two months in prison and Cruz-Gonzales was sentenced to seven months.

The charges in this case stem from a three-month investigation by ISP into drug trafficking in the Jerome area, the announcement stated.

The case was investigated by the Idaho State Police, with assistance from the Jerome County Prosecutor's Office, Jerome County Sheriff's Office and the Jerome Police Department.

Minidoka County Prosecutor Lance Stevenson has the burden of proving Thompson's actions were reckless, careless, negligent and contributed to the death. On Wednesday, he said Blair's hand was on top of Thompson's and never touched the gun.

Defense attorney Keith Roark said Blair took his own life.

The jury and two alternate jurors, consisting of 11 women and three men, heard testimony from eyewitness Kaylee Jones, who was in the back seat of Thompson's black crew cab pickup that night.

The shooting, Jones said, occurred as they rode home to Thompson's house with Thompson at the wheel.

According to Jones, Blair and a second female, Kristin Crull, had been fighting at the bar and the argument heated up during the short drive to Thompson's house.

Jones said Thompson was tired of hearing the fighting and allegedly told the two, "If you don't shut up I'm going to shoot one of you," as he held the gun in a holster "to amplify the threat."

Blair laughed at the statement, Jones said. Then, she said, she saw Thompson holding the gun out of the holster, upside down across the center console of the pickup and angled toward the roof of the backseat.

The gun, she said, wasn't pointed at anyone.

Jones said Blair, who was sitting behind Thompson, slid over to the center of the backseat and said, "If you're going to shoot someone it might as well be me and end my miserable existence."

Jones said Blair then grabbed the gun and put the barrel in his mouth. Jones turned her head away and "in a split second" there was a "deafening explosion." Then, she said, Blair's head fell in her lap.

She did not see whose finger was on the trigger.

After Crull told Thompson to pull the vehicle over,

Jones testified that Thompson made the comment that Blair had pulled the trigger himself.

The jury will also have to sort out a dizzying array of evidence on what happened after the shooting and what relevance it has to Blair's death.

According to Jones' testimony, after the shooting Thompson stopped the pickup in his driveway and got out of the driver's side door. Crull told Jones, who was screaming, to calm down. Jones said at that point she got out of the pickup and started running down the road toward Idaho Highway 27. She eventually made it to Burley, where she picked up her children and then went and gave a statement to the Cassia County Sheriff's Office.

According to Thompson's neighbors, Crull drove the pickup into a field and began hitting wheel lines with the pickup.

Thompson wrote in a statement the next day that he did not have his phone and walked to a neighbor's house to call police and tell them someone had taken off with his vehicle.

The jury heard testimony from two dispatchers who took that call, as well as a call from another neighbor reporting the vehicle crashing into wheel lines.

The calls brought several deputies to the scene, who testified as well.

One deputy pulled over Crull, who was covered in blood and driving Thompson's pickup, and placed her under arrest for driving under the influence before discovering Blair's body on the floorboards of the backseat.

Minidoka County Chief Deputy Vic Watson testified that when he questioned Thompson, his story changed during the course of the interview. First he said he was not driving and did not put the gun into play in the cab of the pickup. Later, Watson said, Thompson's statement that he wrote said he did both.

Stevenson said he expects to finish with the state's witnesses by noon on Thursday.

to partner with the city for infrastructure improvements.

Those improvements are paid for by Chobani, with tax-increment financing.

In June, city manager Travis Rothweiler and city engineer Jackie Fields told the *Times-News* the city isn't prepared to take on another industrial water user. Already, the city is at 90 percent of its capacity for wastewater.

The improvements Chobani paid for were "low-hanging fruit," Fields said in

June. The next step is likely larger updates.

While the city can accommodate its current industrial users, like Glanbia and ConAgra, updates are needed for more big-time water consumers.

"We tried to stay in a spot where we're meeting all of our existing commitments," Fields said in June. "But going after a new large water user, or water producer, we don't have the capacity to do that right now."

How Will We Pay for It?

There are three options for paying for improvements to

the water and wastewater plants, Rothweiler said. The city could ask the public to consider a bond, find the resources internally or pursue public-private partnerships with companies that want move to or expand in Twin Falls.

Those options aren't mutually exclusive, Rothweiler added.

"It would be far too premature for us to say we are going to ask for a bond or we're not going to ask for a bond," he said.

Rothweiler declined to cite a cost range estimate, saying there are too many moving pieces to accurately project how much improvements

could cost.

When Will We Know?

Rothweiler is hopeful the dialogue will start to take shape by the early months of 2013.

Council members are crafting a strategic plan, which takes into account resident input and the infrastructure needs of the city, to plan how Twin Falls will grow over the next 20 years.

That, coupled with a facilities plan, will determine the direction the city takes next. "It's all going on right now," Rothweiler said.

The next strategic planning meeting is Nov. 8.

advisory committee.

"We realized that we need to start putting together a campaign and to inform the voters," Shine said.

Jerome officials are working with Keller Associates to put together a master plan for the wastewater treatment plant.

Shine said one of the city's primary missions is to attract new businesses and industries in order to create

jobs and boost the economy.

The city can't do that if there are limitations in wastewater capacity, he said.

Proposed improvements are also linked closely to sewage overflow issues at the wastewater plant that occurred more than a year ago.

In early 2011, the wastewater treatment plant's membrane filtration system was clogged by a foreign substance.

Since then, city officials have been working with the U.S. Environmental Protec-

tion Agency to address concerns.

Originally, the plan was to take a bond for wastewater improvements to voters during next week's election.

But the city council voted over the summer to hold off so there will be more time to come up with a plan for improvements.

The citizen committee will help look at different bond options.

For instance, one proposal — the minimum bond amount — would just satisfy EPA mandates. That option

wouldn't include adding capacity to the wastewater treatment plant.

Jerome's citizen committee is open to anyone who wants to participate.

Shine said he invited a number of people who are active in the community and interested in economic development.

City spokeswoman Zoe Monahan said Jerome officials expect 10 to 20 people will participate.

The group will likely meet three times, twice this month and once in December.

Return Donna Pence to the State Legislature

District 26 was one of the few not affected by redistricting, and we don't see any reason why its representative should change, either.

The race pits Democrat incumbent Donna Pence against Republican challenger Lee Barron.

Pence earns our endorsement because of her history of working quietly behind the scenes. Her years as an educator give her insight into education issues. And, most importantly, she has a history of supporting economic growth in Idaho. Her work on legislation that would give tax exemptions to agriculture processing businesses shows foresight and a deep commitment to supporting the Magic Valley's largest economic driver: agriculture. However, she was not able to get her legislation through the entire process this past session. The proposed bill cleared the House by a 62-6 vote but never received a hearing in the Senate.

Pence said a lot of crops get shipped elsewhere to be processed. She envisions Idaho-grown grains, for instance, being kept in state to be processed into flour, providing another layer of jobs to go with the Magic Valley's largest economic sector: agriculture. That's a vision we can get behind.

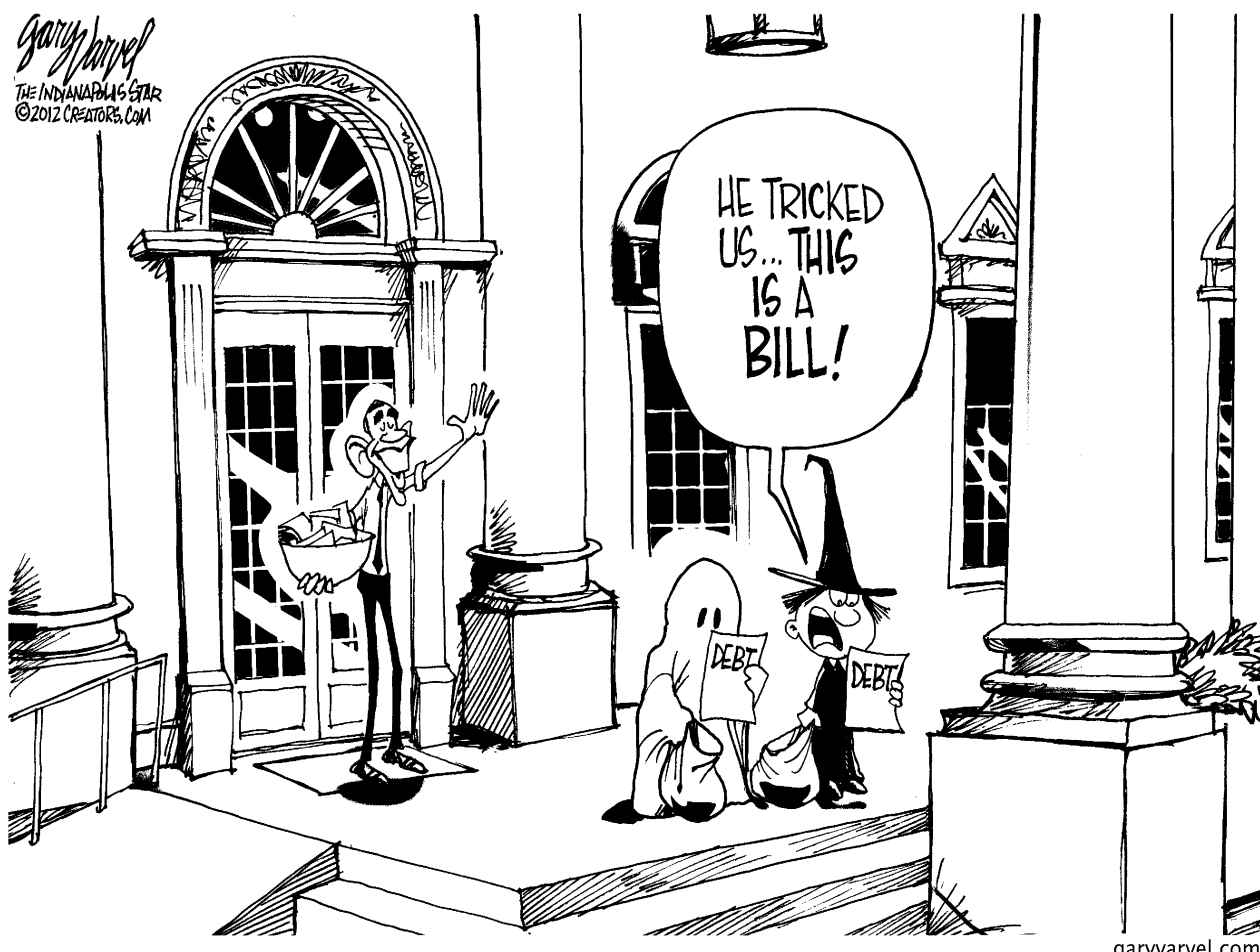
She also supports agriculture on a more basic level, making aquifer recharge a priority.

Barron, meanwhile, spent much of his time talking about the Students Come First propositions, which he said he supports. But he confused us, saying later he supported local control from school boards. We asked how he could support both local control and large state-mandated programs, but Barron didn't answer, simply giving the blanket remark, “It's a step in the right direction.”

We'd prefer the Legislature's direction be a bit more logical than that.

Barron also spoke about the way counties are represented. He didn't like that Camas County, for instance, didn't have a representative currently living within its borders. He wanted to see representation based on counties — with at least one senator and one representative from each county — rather based on population, as mandated by a 1964 U.S. Supreme Court decision.

While we empathize with residents of Camas County, we thought this priority was misguided. We'd prefer our legislators focus on issues that brighten Idaho's prospects the economy, infrastructure and education — rather than court cases from nearly 50 years ago.

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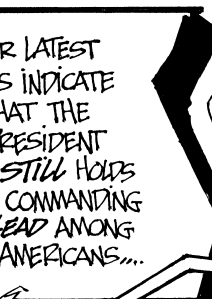
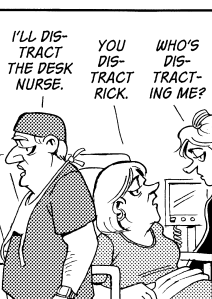
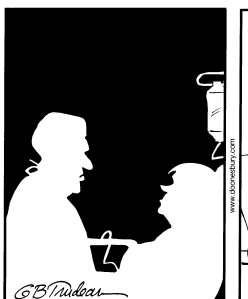
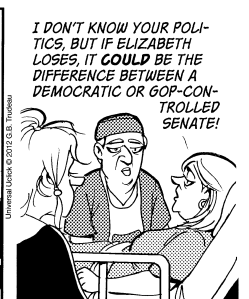
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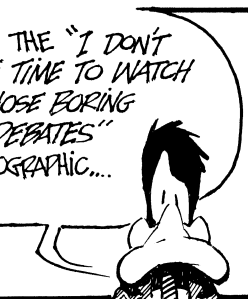
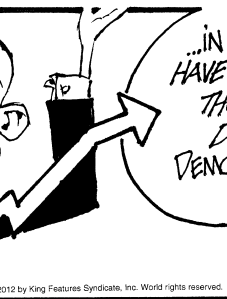
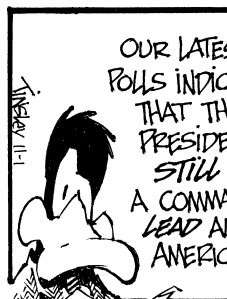
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Prosecutors Prepare Case against Lish

TWIN FALLS • As the preliminary hearing nears for a man accused of stabbing another man to death, prosecutors are working to build their case.

On the morning of Oct. 6, Cayde Lish, 21, was arrested on a voluntary manslaughter charge for the death of 24-year-old Jeremiah Paiz.

Lish was arraigned on the charge in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on Oct. 9. A preliminary hearing was initially scheduled for mid-

October, but was delayed until Nov. 23.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb said his office staff has a lot of work ahead.

Prosecutors look at evidence from the scene and reports from experts, witnesses and police to help build their case, he said.

"We discuss evidence with witnesses and plan the strategy of how we're going to put the case on," he said.

Prosecutors also have to work with police to make sure no further investigation is needed as the preliminary

hearing gets closer.

"In a bigger case there's always something further that needs investigated," he said.

At a preliminary hearing, prosecutors must show a judge that there is enough evidence to take the case to trial.

Loeb said he'll have to prove that the incident more than likely happened and the person accused more than likely did it.

At a trial, Loeb said, prosecutors must prove to a jury that the crime happened beyond a reasonable doubt.

"That's the highest stan-

dard," Loeb said.

In the case against Lish, Loeb said he couldn't talk about anything new that has come up during the investigation.

Lish's attorney, Keith Roark, was at a Minidoka County jury trial Wednesday and unavailable for comment.

If convicted, Lish, will face a maximum of 30 years in prison — 15 for voluntary manslaughter and 15 for a weapons enhancement. Lish is being held in the Twin Falls County Jail on \$250,000 bond.

JAILS REIMBURSED FOR HOUSING IMMIGRANTS CONVICTED OF CRIMES

TWIN FALLS • Several south-central Idaho counties have been awarded reimbursement funds for housing undocumented immigrants who have been convicted of crimes. Twin Falls County received nearly \$11,000 from the federal State Criminal Alien Assistance Program to help recoup some of the costs of housing undocumented immigrants who have been convicted of a felony, or two or more misdemeanors and are incarcerated for four or more consecutive days.

Twin Falls County Jail Administrator Doug Hughes said the inmates for whom the jail gets reimbursed are not just people waiting to be deported or on border patrol holds, but are going through the court system.

"It's not a deportation thing," he said. "They've been in the U.S. illegally and been convicted of crimes."

Hughes said the jails spends about \$62 per inmate per day on housing and this reimbursement is a

small fraction of what is spent on inmates.

Twin Falls County has applied in the past and been awarded money, he said.

"It goes back into the jail," he said. "There's a whole list of things it can be used for. The last couple of years, it's been used for security enhancements, technical training and things like that."

In an announcement released Tuesday, Justice Benefits, Inc. stated the company assisted Twin Falls County in getting the research and applying for the federal program, which the Dallas, Texas company described as "little known."

According to the announcement, Magic Valley counties were part of 890

out of 3,140 eligible local entities across the United States that successfully applied for the funds.

In Jerome County, Jail Administrator Dan Kennedy said the jail received just more than \$17,000 as reimbursement for housing undocumented immigrants who have been convicted of crimes.

"If I had to guess, I'd say it's 20 percent of the jail population," Kennedy said.

Kennedy said housing costs are about \$40 to \$45 per inmate each day depending on security or special needs.

Kennedy said the jail has already put the funds from the federal government to

good use.

"I have a brand spanking new criminal transport van sitting in the parking lot," he said.

Kennedy said the van was being used as a demonstration by the company that built it and the county got the van at a discount. The normal price for the vans is about \$50,000, he said.

"We bought it for \$22,000," he said. "The \$17,000 will go to that, then the rest will be offset with our budget."

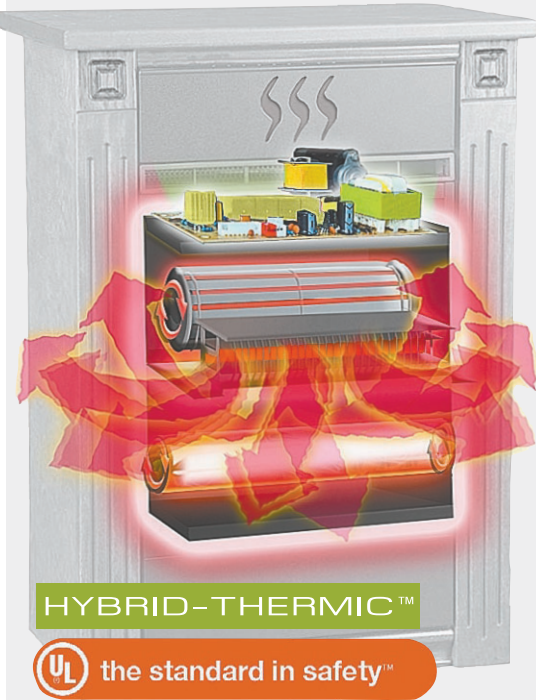

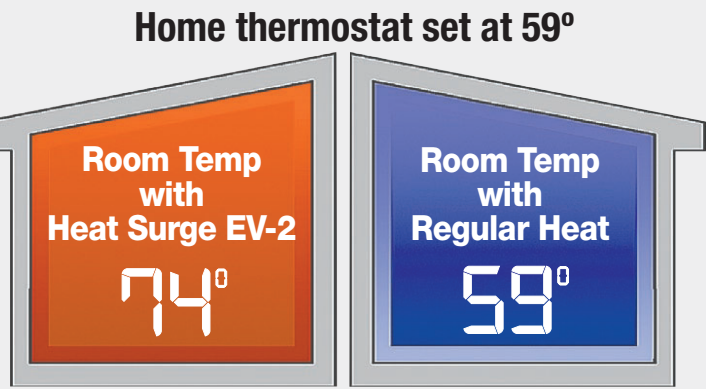

Obama and Christie Tour Battered New Jersey by Helicopter

SEA BRIGHT, N.J. • President Barack Obama and Gov. Chris Christie, opponents in electoral politics but united in dealing with the devastating aftermath of superstorm Sandy, toured parts of southern New Jersey on Wednesday, seeing flooded streets, flattened houses and busted piers.

Obama's visit came as New Jersey remained in emergency mode, fighting for recovery on two fronts. In the north, National Guard troops brought supplies to Hoboken, where as many as 20,000 people remained stranded because of flood waters. In the south, the storm has severely damaged the beaches and barrier islands, the heart of the state's critical tourism industry.

Christie greeted Obama when the president arrived in Atlantic City on Air Force One and the pair went off on a helicopter tour followed by a visit to the Brigantine Beach Community Center, which is serving as a shelter. "The main message I wanted to send is the entire country has been watching what's been happening. Everybody knows how hard Jersey's been hit," Obama said, according to pool reports of his visit.

Even though Christie has been a surrogate for Mitt Romney, Obama's GOP opponent in next week's presidential vote, the New Jersey governor again praised Obama. In recent days and during numerous televised appearances, Christie, known for being pugnacious, has been unstinting in his praise for the man he has roundly attacked in campaign appearances.

"Thank you for coming, sir," said Christie, who ruled himself out of the race for either spot on this year's Republican national ticket. "We took a whole tour of the coast. He got a chance to see the destruction along the coast of New Jersey," Christie said, adding later: "I want to thank the president for coming here today. It's really important to have the president of the United States acknowledge all the suffering that's going on here in New Jersey and I appreciate it very much. We're going to work together to make sure we get ourselves through this crisis and get everything back to normal."

Chinese Think Tank Encourages End to One-Child Policy

BEIJING (AP) • A Chinese government think tank is urging the country's leaders to start phasing out its one-child policy immediately and allow two children for every family by 2015, a daring proposal to do away with the unpopular policy.

Some demographers see the timeline put forward by the China Development Research Foundation as a bold move by the body close to the central leadership. Others warn that the gradual approach, if implemented, would still be insufficient to help correct the problems that China's strict birth limits have created.

Xie Meng, a press affairs official with the foundation, said the final version of the report will be released "in a week or two." But Chinese state media have been given advance copies. The official Xinhua News Agency said the foundation recommends a two-child policy in two provinces from this year and a nationwide two-child policy by 2015. It proposes all birth limits be dropped by 2020, Xinhua reported.

"China has paid a huge political and social cost for the policy, as it has resulted in social conflict, high administrative costs and led indirectly to a long-term gender imbalance at birth," Xinhua said, citing the report.

But it remains unclear whether Chinese leaders are ready to take up the recommendations. China's National Population and Family Planning Commission had no immediate comment on the report Wednesday.

Airports and Stock Exchange Reopen; At Least 62 Dead

NEW YORK (AP) • Two major airports reopened and the New York Stock Exchange got back to business Wednesday, while across the river in New Jersey, National Guardsmen rushed to feed and rescue flood victims two days after Superstorm Sandy struck.

For the first time since the storm slammed the Northeast, killing at least 62 people and inflicting billions of dollars in damage, brilliant sunshine washed over the nation's largest city — a striking sight after days of gray skies, rain and wind.

At the stock exchange, running on generator power, Mayor Michael Bloomberg gave a thumbs-up and rang the opening bell to whoops from traders on the floor. Trading resumed after the first two-day weather shutdown since the Blizzard of 1888.

New York's subway system was still down, but Gov. Andrew Cuomo said parts of it will begin running again on Thursday. And he said some commuter rail service between the city and its suburbs would resume on Wednesday afternoon.

Kennedy and Newark Liberty airports began handling flights again just after 7 a.m. New York's LaGuardia Airport, which suffered far worse damage and still had water on its runways, remained closed.

It was clear that restoring the region to its ordinary frenetic pace could take days — and that rebuilding the hardest-hit communities and the transportation networks that link them could take considerably longer.

About 6 million homes and businesses were still without power, mostly in New York and New Jersey. Electricity was out as far west as Wisconsin and as far south as the Carolinas.

The scale of the challenge could be seen across the Hudson River in New Jersey, where National Guard trucks rolled into heavily flooded Hoboken to deliver ready-to-eat meals and other supplies and to evacuate people from their condo high-rises, brownstones and other homes. The mayor of the city of 50,000 issued an appeal for people to bring boats to City Hall to help with the evacuation.

Amid the despair, talk of recovery was already beginning.

"It's heartbreaking after being here 37 years," said Barry Prezioso of Point Pleasant, N.J. "You see your home demolished like this, it's tough. But nobody got hurt and the upstairs is still livable, so we can still live upstairs and clean this out. I'm sure there's people that had worse. I feel kind of lucky."

As New York began its second day after the megastorm, morning rush-hour traffic was heavy as people started returning to work. There was even a sign of normalcy: commuters waiting at bus stops. School was out for a third day.

The Brooklyn-Battery Tunnel, connecting Brooklyn to Manhattan, and the Holland Tunnel, between New York and New Jersey, remained closed. But bridges into the city were open, and city buses were running, free of charge.

Disney's \$4B 'Star Wars' Deal Spotlights Iger's Bet

LOS ANGELES • By adding "Star Wars" and "Indiana Jones," Walt Disney Co., in agreeing to buy George Lucas's Lucasfilm for \$4.05 billion, is pressing Chief Executive Officer Robert Iger's \$15 billion bet on creative franchises.

Lucas, 68, the sole owner, will get half in cash and the rest in stock, making him a major investor in the film, theme park and TV company, according to a statement Tuesday from Burbank, California-based Disney. The first of a new trilogy of "Star Wars" films will be released in 2015, Disney said.

The deal furthers Iger's pursuit of marquee content in an era marked by technology changes, such as \$8-a-month video streaming and free game downloads, that disrupted Hollywood's traditional revenue sources.

"Technology has proved more friend than foe to great storytelling," Iger said in an interview. "It allows us to distribute in ways we never

thought would have been imaginable." Disney paid \$7 billion for animation studio Pixar in 2006 and bought Marvel Entertainment in 2009 for \$4.2 billion, adding the creators of "Toy Story" and "The Avengers" to the company's library.

The Lucas acquisition brings the "Star Wars" films, which have generated \$4.54 billion in global ticket sales — second only to Warner Bros.' "Harry Potter," according to Box Office Mojo. The "Indiana Jones" films have collected \$1.95 billion.

Lucas, who will be a creative consultant on the "Star Wars" films, will receive about 40 million Disney shares, becoming the second-largest non-institutional shareholder with about 2.2 percent of the company, data compiled by Bloomberg show.

S. Sudan Rebel Group Threatens to Reignite Ethnic Conflict

JUBA, South Sudan • A new South Sudanese rebel group threatens to reignite violence in Jonglei state where at least 1,600 people died in ethnic clashes last year, according to the United Nations and Archbishop Daniel Deng.

A 3,000-member militia led by David Yau Yau, a former theology student and candidate for governor, has killed at least 100 government troops since August, the Geneva-based Small Arms Survey, a research group, said in a report Wednesday. South Sudan's army said 24 of its soldiers died in an Aug. 23 ambush.

"If the David Yau Yau group splits out and begins to attack other communities, then that is very dangerous," Deng, who leads a government-appointed committee to negotiate peace among rival ethnic groups, said in an Oct. 26 interview.

The violence in Jonglei, an eastern state bordering Ethiopia where Total SA has a stake in an oil exploration concession, has marred South Sudan's year-old independence from the north. The authorities in Juba, the capital, accused Sudan of airdropping weapons to the militia within sight of a UN peacekeeping mission post in Pibor County on Sept. 22.

UN million spokesman Kouider Zerrouk said that while peacekeepers saw a "white, fixed-wing aircraft" drop as many as eight packages, the UN couldn't identify the contents or who dropped them. Sudan's army has denied supporting Yau Yau or any rebel group in South Sudan.

The UN Mission in South Sudan, which has about 130 peacekeepers in Pibor County, is "increasingly concerned" that violent inci-

dents believed to be carried out by Yau Yau's militia and aligned armed youth who have avoided disarmament "constitute a threat to the peace process," Zerrouk said in an e-mailed response to questions on Monday.

Army spokesman Colonel Kella Dual Kueth said Yau Yau's militia attacked two towns in Pibor County on Monday, killing a woman and a child. "It was random shelling," he said.

Kueth dismissed the threat from Yau Yau, saying that "he has just a small group, and we will find him and deal with him."

The militia attacked a home in Akobo County on Oct. 25, wounding four people, Simon Duoth, commissioner of neighboring Uror County, said the following day in an interview in Yuai, the county capital.

Abuses committed by the government's Sudan People's Liberation Army, or SPLA, in a campaign to disarm the warring Murle and Lou Nuer ethnic groups helped Yau Yau, a Murle, to recruit fighters, according to Jonah Leff, author of the Small Arms Survey report. New York-based Human Rights Watch and Amnesty International have said they documented widespread abuses including rape, beatings and torture in Pibor County.

"For many Murle, the principal enemy is no longer the Lou Nuer but the SPLA," according to the Small Arms Survey report.

Human Rights Watch, in an Aug. 23 statement, said the "authorities have not taken sufficient steps to curb the violations or hold abusive soldiers accountable."

Zerrouk said the government has taken some action to address the allegations, including making arrests in rape cases and recalling units involved in the abuses.

Known to many as the one-child policy, China's actual rules are more complicated. The government limits most urban couples to one child, and allows two children for rural families if their first-born is a girl. There are numerous other exceptions as well, including looser rules for minority families and a two-child limit for parents who are themselves both singletons.

professor of sociology at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, said the report holds extra weight because the think tank is under the State Council, China's Cabinet. He said he found it remarkable that state-backed demographers were willing to publicly propose such a detailed schedule and plan on how to get rid of China's birth limits.

"That tells us at least that policy change is inevitable, it's coming," said Cai, who was not involved in the drafting of the report but knows many of the experts

who were. Cai is currently a visiting scholar at Fudan University in Shanghai. "It's coming, but we cannot predict when exactly it will come."

Though the government credits the policy with preventing hundreds of millions of births and helping lift countless families out of poverty, it is reviled by many ordinary people. The strict limits have led to forced abortions and sterilizations, even though such measures are illegal. Couples who flout the rules face hefty fines, seizure of their prop-

erty and loss of their jobs.

Many demographers argue that the policy has worsened the country's aging crisis by limiting the size of the young labor pool that must support the large baby boom generation as it retires. They say it has contributed to the imbalanced sex ratio by encouraging families to abort baby girls, preferring to try for a male heir.

Many today see the birth limits as outdated, a relic of the era when housing, jobs and food were provided by the state.

Waterboarding Critic Named Co-Chair of Mitt Romney's Intelligence Transition Team

WASHINGTON • Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney has often endorsed the idea of using "enhanced interrogation techniques" if he is elected and doesn't believe that waterboarding is "torture," but he chose the GOP's most fervent critic of such methods to be the co-chair for intelligence personnel in his transition team.

Philip Zelikow, the longtime diplomat and former counselor to Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, has been named one of two officials in charge of planning for the intelligence side of a potential Romney administration as part of the Romney

campaign's "Project Readiness," multiple sources with direct knowledge of the project confirmed. Zelikow, who was also the executive director of the 9/11 Commission, co-chairs the intelligence team with former New Jersey Governor and 9/11 Commission co-chairman Tom Kean.

Zelikow is another GOP senior foreign-policy hand from the realist camp in the top ranks of the Romney transition team. The head of the national security team is former Deputy Secretary of State and former World Bank President Bob Zoellick, a pick that roiled neo-conservatives and hawks inside the Romney campaign when it was announced in August.

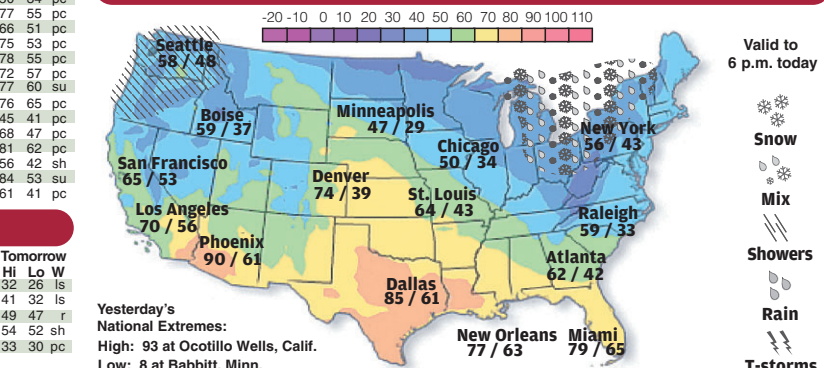

Record-high Surge Is Too Much for New Jersey's Berms

HACKENSACK, N.J. • The dozens of tide gates, berms and levees in the Meadowlands were no match for the record-high surge of seawater propelled by Hurricane Sandy that devastated Moonachie,

Little Ferry and other low-lying towns along the Hackensack River. Local officials had said previously that water had broken through a levee at the height of the storm late Monday night. But state officials Wednesday said the water was so high it simply poured

over the anti-flooding structures in the region. "The level of flooding that occurred overtopped any flood management structure ever built in the district," said Brian Aberback, a spokesman for the state Meadowlands Commission. "To our knowledge the tide

gates we monitor were all operational and remained operational," he said. "Some tide gates were clearly overtopped by the sea surge and others were flooded on the land side by water overtopping berms." A record surge of 11.9 feet was set late Monday night at the mouth of the Hackensack

River in Newark, easily eclipsing the previous record, a 7.9-foot surge that came when a nor'easter tore through the region in December 1992, according to National Weather Service data. A combination of gale-force winds, high tides and a full moon pushed a wall of

water from the Atlantic Ocean into Newark Bay and up the Hackensack and into its tributaries. It spread through the Meadowlands and eventually poured into streets, backyards and homes in Moonachie, Carlstadt, Little Ferry and other communities, prompting evacuations.

with his daughter, 9-year-old Shaynee. A smaller buck darted across the road, but the listening pair heard no

gunshot. The foursome was aiming to fill first-year hunter Teigan's deer tag, Mike Jr.

"They walked two miles today trying to get on that buck," the Hagerman man said. "He kept giving them the slip."

Fairfield's Old Memories Blanket Soldier Mountain

FAIRFIELD • Family stories weave across the face of Soldier Mountain like the tracks left in the snow by their skis.

Tracy Gill's family has been skiing on Soldier for at least 30 years. Her oldest daughter was on the ski patrol, and her youngest taught in the ski school. Tracy and her husband, Michael, were both active in the 4-H Ski Club. Now they are bringing their grandchildren to slopes their family has skied for years.

Soldier Mountain "is a vital part of our community," she said.

Kristi Schiermeier of Bruneau not only learned how to ski here in the sixth grade, she met her husband, Don, here. He was a ski instructor, and friends set them up on a blind date.

"It's such an amazing mountain," Kristi said. "It has sentimental value."

The Schiermeiers owned Soldier Mountain for two years before selling it to Hollywood actor Bruce Willis in the late 1990s. In early October, Willis donated it to a recently formed nonprofit organization.

Three of the group's five board members — Will Varin, Jamon Frostenson and Russell Schiermeier — grew up in Fairfield, graduated from Camas County High School and learned to ski at Soldier Mountain. The other two board members, William Wardwell and Robert Thomas, are attorneys with Varin in Boise and skiers who have expertise working with nonprofits.

...

On Oct. 26, Varin and Frostenson were at Soldier Mountain making sure the ski area was moving ahead with renovations and repairs for the upcoming ski season. A fine dusting of snow speckled the mountains surrounding the lodge. Further up the mountain, where the ski lift descended until it was more than mere lines, the snow was thicker.

Varin, Frostenson and Schiermeier were friends who stayed in touch after they graduated, but now because of the mountain they have been seeing a lot more of each other.

"It's brought the Fairfield boys back," Varin said.

Jamon Frostenson's tie to the mountain goes all the way back to his grandfather, Bob Frostenson, one of Sol-

dier Mountain's founders.

"I feel really privileged to have this opportunity; it's something you always thought about grow up," Jamon said. "We'd always speculate what we'd do as we rode the ski lift, and now we get to try out those ideas." Jamon still lives and farms in Fairfield on land that his

ancestors farmed since 1905.

In 1948, Bob and his friend Harry Durall founded Soldier Mountain after watching the 1948 Winter Olympic tryouts in Sun Valley. To start the business back then cost \$10,000. In 1953, Durall sold his portion of the ski area to Bob Frostenson's brother, Sten Frostenson,

and Levard Hansen.

From the beginning the ski area's owners wanted it to be a place for families, and today that is still the goal.

Kristi and Don Schiermeier, parents of board member Russell Schier-

meier, were up at the lodge on Oct. 26, volunteering their time to make sure repairs were made and renovations done. For the past 76 days they have been staying in a motor home parked in front of the lodge.

"We wanted to help keep Soldier going," Kristi said. So far 200 gallons of paint

have been used to transform the army-green buildings to match the lodge's colors. The bathrooms are being renovated and recarpeted.

"I painted over paint that I painted 15 years ago," Kristi said.

She called Willis' donation of the mountain to Fairfield a huge gift.

"I think he realized it was a part of the local history of the community," Kristi said.

Varin said he learned how to ski at Soldier Mountain when he was 3. This is also where his father learned to ski.

When he heard that Willis was looking to donate the mountain to a local nonprofit, he knew just whom to approach to form one.

Varin, Jamon Frostenson and Russell Schiermeier, though they did not all graduate the same year, were all student body presidents and their classes' valedictorians. And they all grew up skiing the mountain.

On the board, they do not get paid and all their time is volunteered. There are about 50 full-time paid employees during the ski season, and during the summer a skeleton crew of five to 10 people.

"We don't own it. It's the nonprofit entity that owns it; it's a community-owned mountain," Varin said.

An Oct. 11 town hall meeting to inform the community of the changes was well attended, Varin said. In a town with a population of 400, about 100 people showed up.

Where the Elk Are — And Where They Aren't

High numbers of bull elk have been harvested as of late, according to Jeff Frost of Intermountain Taxidermy and Worldwide Adventures in Twin Falls. A number of the animals have been brought into his shop.

"The colder temperatures and snowfall in some of the hunting areas around Stanley and Challis are contributing to hunter success on elk," he said.

Deer harvest: Mule deer are starting to show signs of the rut, Frost said, especially in the high desert units, "with good numbers of bucks being taken in 45 and 43," he said. "Unit 44 has especially produced some great deer this week."

Rifle hunt: Things don't look as good for rifle elk hunters in units 54 and 47, Frost said. They're experienc-

ing a difficult time filling their tags.

"The warmer temperatures in the immediate forecast are not going to make things easier for hunters," he said. "But don't let that slow you down, as southern Idaho still continues to be one of the best hunting areas in the West."

US Forest Service Waives Fees during Veterans Day Weekend

TWIN FALLS • The U.S. Forest Service is waiving fees at most of its day-use recreation sites over the Veterans Day holiday weekend, Nov. 10-12.

The fee waivers — the fourth this year — are offered in cooperation with other federal agencies under the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act.

“This is our way of saying thanks to the brave men and women — past and present — who put their lives on the line every day to keep us safe at home,” U.S. Forest Service Chief Tom Tidwell said in a statement. “We encourage veterans, their families and all visitors to take time out over the holiday weekend to enjoy the benefits that na-

ture provides at forests and grasslands throughout the country.”

That offer is more relevant to Magic Valley residents who plan to travel on the holiday weekend than to ones who plan to stay near home.

Currently, no campground fees are being charged in any of the Sawtooth National Forest’s campgrounds, Twin Falls-based spokeswoman Julie Thomas said last week.

“Due to weather conditions our high-elevation campgrounds are closed early,” Thomas said.

“One thing to note: They have closed the gate at Lake Cleveland due to wet conditions,” she added.

have back it back in local hands,” Varin said.

pace with his grandfather, climbed back to the pickup. He hadn’t been able to line up a shot likely to kill the buck cleanly and quickly — the kind of shot Mike Sr. insists on.

“There’s always tomorrow. Well, for a few more days anyway,” Mike Jr. said.

Back at their camp trailers in Bear Gulch, Teigan said he’d abandoned his trophy ambitions.

“Now I’m just looking for one to shoot,” he said.

...

No wonder Teigan aspired to a trophy buck. That’s the way the Walkers do it.

They goad each other to shoot the small ones, but nobody wants to.

More than rivalry is behind that.

“Once you pull the trigger, your hunt’s over,” Mike Jr. said, rubbing his hands over the stove’s gas flame in his small camp trailer.

The Walkers live for this — a month of archery hunting, then a month of rifle hunting, then winter’s predator hunts — and it’s disappointing to fill a tag too early in the season. Their own tags, or those of the family members they accompany. If someone draws a tag for a late hunt, others get to live the life longer, too.

“It’s just the way to center,” said Mike Jr., an Idaho Power Co. machinist. “You get out, you leave the world behind and you think about what’s important.”

His family, like anyone’s, has problems. “Even in our hardest times, we got along in the month of October, no matter what,” he said.

This time of year, Idaho Power doesn’t see much of Mike Sr., a generation specialist for the utility. By Friday, he’d spent 16 days this fall on an archery elk

and the two children waited on narrow benches inside Mike Jr.’s trailer, knee to knee with a visiting reporter and her companion. Soon the propane furnace overheated the tiny trailer — at least for hunters still wearing heavy layers — and the door was opened to the wide night.

While the Walkers ate their supper from paper bowls by lantern light, the thunk of a truck crossing a cattle guard announced the approach of friends. It was a big red Ford, so they

knew exactly who to expect.

A man wearing a camo-and-orange hat that read “FREAK” climbed the steps into Mike Jr.’s trailer, and two more men poked their heads through the door.

Without preliminaries, the five men launched into animated discussion of the bucks that got away and how many wheel tracks they saw in the snow. Leaning together over a map, they talked with intimate knowledge of these hills’ creeks and trails and landmarks — such as two 4-by-4 posts on the Nevada line, rubbed raw by bucks — and each spot seemed connected to some shared memory.

Before long, the two groups had an agreement to join forces at 6 a.m. the next morning. They’d all like to see Teigan bag that trophy.

With an uncompromising dedication to detail, Meriwether outfitted his Corps of Discovery with the food stuffs, medical supplies, navigational implements, tools and armament that sustained this band of brothers as they sailed, paddled, rode and safely trudged the 4,000 largely uncharted miles from Camp Dubois at the confluence of the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers to the Pacific Coast and back during two unspeakably grueling years.

Fortuitously, Meriwether shared his mentor’s good sense by choosing his old army buddy, William Clark, as his co-commander.

While it’s unlikely that we’ll experience any of the dangers and privations faced by the L&C trekkers, wisely choosing our hunting equipment will not only enhance our comfort and safety afield, it will boost our chances for success this season.

Here are some of our readers’ top recommendations for waterfowling gear and accessories:

Firearm Accessories

While most manufacturers market specialty waterfowl guns decked out in pricey camo patterns, you can easily mask your scattergun’s glaring blue, glossy walnut

or silhouetting matte black finish by applying several coats of contrasting bowhunting spray paint. Inexpensive adhesive cloth camo tape and self-clinging camo wrap secret my gaudy guns from the discriminating eyes of the webbed-footed ones.

Attaching a removable carrying sling or slipping your gun into a floating gun case with a shoulder strap allows hands-free shuttling of your scattergun to and from the blind; these inexpensive items are worth their weight in gold.

Decoys and Accoutrements

A gaggle of readers recommended large, spacious floating decoy bags harnessed with wide, easily adjustable shoulder straps. The adjustable straps help position the bulky load close to your shoulders and prevent the weighty sack from thumping your buttocks and the backs of your legs as you slog along. Additionally, the lightweight bag floats beside you as you set and remove your decoy spread. Primos and Avery were the top choices.

Many hunters also recommended that you adapt your decoy numbers and groupings to imitate the patterns displayed by the birds aggregating in your hunt area. And for added success, place several Mojo-type swing-wing decoys among your conventional dekes; it really enhances the

attractiveness of your spread.

‘Out of Sight, Out of Mind’ Blind

Wonderful hides can be crafted by supporting a suitable width/height of commercial burlap concealment cloth or plant matting around your position. Secure it with colored wire or string and blend with natural materials; you’re shielded from view as you move into shooting position or fidget around in your cramped quarters awaiting the next flight.

Clean, Lubricate, Protect

Waterfowl hunting is a “dirty” business. In the field your firearms are constantly exposed to wet, muddy and — later in the season — freezing temperatures: the perfect storm for firearm failures. Now is the perfect time to detail strip your shotgun and carefully remove any accumulated powder fouling, grime and

corrosion from the bolt and firing assembly. Then apply liberal amounts of Uncle Sam-approved Break-Free CLP to clean, lube and protect Ole Betsy. I promise you that it’ll keep your guns running faithfully at all temperature extremes; it’s really great stuff.

Don't Forget to Report on Deer, Elk, Pronghorn Tags

JEROME • Here’s a timely reminder for hunters: You’re required to file a report on your deer, elk and pronghorn hunts within 10 days after harvest — or within 10 days after the end of the hunt if you did not harvest.

Hunters are required to file a report for each tag they bought whether they went hunting or not, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

Fish and Game has a 24-hour, toll-free phone line to speak to a live operator when filing reports: Call 1-877-268-9365 seven days a week.

Or go to the Fish and Game website to file a report: fishandgame.idaho.gov/cms/hunt/harvest_report/.

To file, hunters need to know their tag numbers or hunting license numbers, the number of days they hunted, the game management units they hunted in, the date they harvested and

the number of antler points on the animal (or for pronghorns, the length of the horns in inches).

Why all the data? It’s valuable to Fish and Game for managing big-game populations, the department said.

Hunters who have not filed their reports will be sent a reminder postcard in mid-November. Some hunts are still open at that time, a few until the end of December.

Nevada Deer Management Policies in the Crosshairs

RENO, Nev. (AP) • Hunkered down near a stand of brilliantly colored aspen trees, Ralph McMullen watched an approaching herd of mule deer through the scope of his rifle.

There were bucks among that herd in the foothills of the Ruby Mountains, including a couple of big ones with nice racks of antlers. He let them pass, focusing his attention instead on a younger animal.

“I decided to go for the smaller buck,” McMullen told the *Reno Gazette-Journal*. “I’ve gotten my trophy bucks in the past. Now, I’m more in it for the meat.”

He pulled the trigger, dropped the deer and became one more successful hunter during Nevada’s 2012 deer season.

During a year that saw a major increase in the number of deer allowed to be hunted in the Silver State, the rifle season will soon wrap up across most of Nevada. It’s about to begin along the Carson Range, the Pine Nut Mountains and other points of western Nevada.

Accounts differ on how the season is going, and that’s no surprise considering the level of controversy — stretching from the rugged hunting grounds of the backcountry to the halls of the state Capitol — that continues to dog management of Nevada’s mule deer.

“It’s a passionate thing,” Ken Mayer, director of the Nevada Department of Wildlife, said of an issue that had him fired by former Gov. Jim Gibbons in 2010 and led to a political reshaping of the appointed panel that oversees state wildlife, hunting and fishing policy.

Mayer was rehired as director and the makeup of the Nevada Wildlife Commission was altered in July 2011 by Gov. Brian Sandoval, with the issue of mule deer management central to all of the changes.

“It hasn’t gone away,” Mayer said of the ongoing controversy.

Earlier this month, a further signal of change came with Sandoval’s appointment of Karen Summers Layne — president of the Las Vegas Humane Society — as the newest member of the wildlife panel.

Deer Tags Increased Substantially

In May, the new wildlife commission OK’d a 66 percent increase in the number of mule deer tags issued to Nevada and out-of-state hunters in 2012, from 14,919 to 24,795. Typically, nearly 40 percent of hunters succeed in bagging a deer, wildlife officials said.

Biologists justified the increase, accompanied by increases in the number of hunting tags issued for elk, antelope and bighorn sheep, in part because of back-to-back winters of first wet, then dry conditions. The heavy winter of 2010-11 nourished abundant plants for deer and other big game to feed on, while the mild winter of 2011-12 allowed more young animals to survive.

Biologists estimated the number of mule deer in Nevada to be 112,000, up from 109,000 last year. The number of bucks — a key measurement biologists use to gauge the status of a deer population and the level of hunting it can support — was put at 35,000.

This year’s deer tag increase followed a decision in May 2011 by the Gibbons-appointed wildlife commission to reduce tags issued by 25 percent. The commission’s majority at the time described the decrease as needed to protect a dwindling deer herd and accused Mayer and colleagues of seeking to increase hunting numbers to raise revenue.

The makeup of the commission has changed, as has the number of deer to be hunted. But the arguments remain the same.

“We’re overharvesting,” insists Scott Raine, the wildlife commission’s former chairman and the last remaining Gibbons appointee still serving on the panel.

Raine said he expects this year’s deer harvest to be relatively healthy — largely due to the curtailed 2011 hunt — but said the large numbers hunted this year will ultimately hurt the herd.

“Next year, especially, we’re going to start to feel the effects,” Raine said. “We’re going to have some major problems.”

Raine, owner of a market in Eureka, talks to hunters daily and said they’re not happy with the situation this year. Among their concerns, Raine said, is a spike in the number of hunters in the field, a problem he links to the increased 2012 tags.

“Today, I probably talked to eight or 10 hunters, and they all have an opinion. So far, I have yet to hear a positive one about what’s going on,” Raine said. “I hear a lot of people say they would just as soon not hunt if there’s this many people and so few deer.”

Raine insists the modeling used to estimate Nevada’s mule deer population is based on false assumptions or conjecture and that the numbers are far lower than cited.

“They’re just wild guesses,” he said.

Predators Still Topic of Debate

Raine and other critics continue to insist Mayer and his biologists fail to adequately consider the impact mountain lions and coyotes have on deer they prey upon. The Gibbons-appointed panel repeatedly pushed for more aggressive programs to kill the predators, usually over the objection of state biologists who said the move wasn’t supported by science.

“It’s a huge problem, and it’s swept under the rug because it’s not in vogue, politically, within the Department of Wildlife,” Raine said.

Predators are the biggest problem facing mule deer, agrees Las Vegas resident Cecil Fredi, president of Hunter’s Alert, a sportsmen’s group now promoting a letter-writing campaign urging Sandoval to again make substantial changes in how the Department of Wildlife is run.

Mountain lions alone, Fredi argues, are killing more deer

than Nevada herds can handle.

“What is it? It’s predators,” Fredi said. “But it’s not politically correct to kill one animal to help another.”

Fredi also accused the department of increasing tags to bring in more money.

“There’s no doubt,” Fredi said. “They’re managing for money.”

Mayer stands by his department’s numbers when it comes to the size of Nevada’s mule deer population, which he said is “stable and increasing.”

Predators might be a factor, but they’re only one of many, Mayer said. A far more significant one is continued loss of deer habitat to wildfire, invading vegetation and development, he said.

“It’s about habitat. It’s about predation. It’s about development on the range. It’s about what Mother Nature provides. It’s a real complex deal,” Mayer said. “I think we have the best team in the West to figure these things out.”

The idea that the state can “stockpile” bucks by reducing hunting is flawed, Mayer said. Too many bucks are also unhealthy for a deer population and can increase fawn mortality when they dominate important habitat, he said.

Mayer acknowledges that he is growing weary of constant attacks by “self-proclaimed wildlife experts.”

“It’s clear they have a personal passion but don’t understand wildlife science,” Mayer said. “I think it just comes down to control. They want to be in control.”

Revenue Grab Denied

Mayer and colleagues bristle at the notion that they would recommend an increase in hunting as a means to increase revenue through sale of hunting tags, licenses and associated fees.

“The numbers are what they are. We just look at the biology, strictly at the biology,” said Tony Wasley, the Department of Wildlife’s mule deer expert.

“Our job is to make biologically based recommendations, not to second-guess social expectations,” Wasley said. “Nowhere in the department’s entire tag quota decision process is there a step that involves any financial considerations. This is never done. Biologists will not sacrifice herd health for the sake of money.”

Critics often point to deer numbers in the late 1980s, when conditions combined to boost the population to unprecedented levels, topping out at more than 251,000 in 1988, Wasley said. Nevada then experienced a lengthy drought followed by a deadly winter in 1992-93, both of which dramatically reduced the deer population.

Today’s numbers, Wasley said, are closer to what should be expected on average.

“Everybody wants to set the bar unrealistically high,” he said.

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Alaska Trumpeter Swans Filling Historic Range

ANCHORAGE, Alaska • It was likely easier than ever to see a migrating trumpeter swan this year, as the big white birds continued a remarkable comeback from near extinction in the Lower 48 states and much of their Alaska habitat, a federal wildlife biologist said.

“They still have not recovered to their full range that they once occupied prior to the 1880s, but they’ve done fantastically in Alaska,” said Deborah Groves, who has counted Alaska swans since 1990.

A 1968 Alaska census found just 2,847 of the birds. Random sampling in 2010 estimated 25,347 — a nearly ninefold increase.

Trumpeters are known for their distinctive call that the Cornell Lab of Ornithology calls “hollow, nasal honking.” The Alaska Department of Fish and Game says it’s deep, like a French horn.

With 7-foot wingspans, trumpeters are North America’s largest waterfowl. Males average 28 pounds, females 22 pounds, and eggs are up to 5 inches long, the department says.

The birds were hunted throughout the 1800s for meat and feathers, which made fine quill pens. By the early 1930s, Groves said, there were only 69 known trumpeters in Yellowstone National Park.

Hunting ended and biologists made a happy discovery when they began bird work in Alaska: A remnant population of a couple of thousand trumpeters remained, Groves said.

Alaska biologists did their first formal trumpeter survey in 1968, another in 1975 and every five years since then.

“They were increasing almost exponentially for a while,” Groves said.

Biologists in 2005 detected a continued boom, even though they suspected the habitat of the birds was saturated. By 2010, the count

switched to sampling rather than a census because of the trumpeters’ wide range.

“It’s nice to have that problem,” Groves said.

The population may finally be leveling off. Biologists detected a 7 percent increase between 2005 and 2010. Growth slowed in the

Copper River Basin near Glennallen but remained high in areas such as the vast Yukon Flats, the wetlands where the mighty Yukon River changes direction from northwest to southwest.

Eventually, Groves said, the expanding swan popula-

tion will expand to less bountiful wetlands.

Severe weather is a factor that limits population growth among young birds.

“It takes almost 150 days or more to go from nest-building, laying eggs, incubating, rearing the young, to the point where the young can fledge,” she said. “In Alaska, they’re butting right up against breakup and freeze-up with that time period.”

She’s not sure what effect global warming might have had on the population growth or the range of the birds.

“It probably has had some effect and it certainly could have an influence in the future,” she said.

The population has been limited by a loss of winter habitat in estuaries of the Pacific Northwest. At the same time, she said, swans have learned to take advantage of farm fields.

“That’s an issue now,” she said.

Trumpeters technically are game birds, but Groves has not heard suggestions for a resumption of hunting.

3rd Australian Soldier Awarded Victoria Cross in Afghanistan

CANBERRA, Australia (AP) • Taliban bullets tearing up the earth around his boots and zipping past his ears left Australian Cpl. Daniel Keighran in no doubt about the risks he was taking each time he broke cover to deliberately draw enemy fire.

His actions on Aug. 24, 2010, near the village of Derapet in central Uruzgan province helped his 40-man joint Australian-Afghan army patrol escape an ambush by 100 insurgents with a single casualty and on Thursday earned him the British Commonwealth's highest military award, the Victoria Cross.

The 29-year-old gold miner from the Outback town of Kalgoolie, who remains an army reservist, is the third Australian to earn the ultimate accolade for valor in the 11-year-old Afghan campaign. A New Zealand commando also won the Victoria Cross in 2007 and a British paratrooper was given a posthumous award the same year.

Keighran's citation said he broke cover on several occasions to draw "intense and accurate fire" in a bid to find where enemy guns were positioned and to direct return fire from an exposed ridge.

Keighran also broke cover to draw fire away from a wounded Australian, his friend Lance Cpl. Jared MacKinney, so that their comrades could treat him. Keighran also helped clear insurgents from a landing area and enabled MacKinney to be evacuated by helicopter. MacKinney, 28, did not survive.

"I think training took over. There was a situation and that's the way I reacted," Keighran told reporters after receiving the medal at a ceremony at Australia's Government House.

"But ... I won't talk about that today. I'll leave that for another day," he said, refusing to give de-

tails of the battle.

Keighran revealed he only explained to his wife Catherine Keighran the circumstances behind the medal two weeks before the presentation.

"It's not that I couldn't talk about it ... I suppose that's just the way I am. I'm quite private in that regard and what we did overseas," he said.

Prime Minister Julia Gillard revealed that Keighran told her in a conversation on Wednesday that he could tell how far bullets were from his head by the different sounds that they made.

"They were spectacular acts of bravery," she said.

Australian Defense Force Chief Lt. Gen. David Hurley said Keighran's actions "turned the fight in our favor" during some of the most intense combat Australians had experienced in Afghanistan.

"Cpl. Keighran acted with exceptional clarity and composure that spread to those around him, giving them confidence to operate effectively in an extremely stressful and dangerous situation," Hurley said.

A total of five Australians were decorated for their actions in the battle, which later became controversial.

An Australian military inquiry in February rejected allegations by a soldier who fought in the battle that Mackinney had died unnecessarily because the U.S.-led coalition provided inadequate air support.

The allegations, made in an email and published in several Australian newspaper, fueled fears that the United States was more concerned about avoiding Afghan civilian casualties than protecting the lives of coalition partners.

Australia has 1,550 troops in Afghanistan and is the largest military contributor to the campaign outside NATO. A total of 39 have died.

U.S., E.U. to Ethnic Serbs: You Have a Home in Kosovo

PRISTINA, Kosovo (AP) • U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton toured a Serbian Orthodox church in Kosovo on Wednesday as she pressed America's close ally to step up its minority outreach while trying to convince ethnic Serbs that they have a home in Europe's youngest nation.

At the St. Nicholas Church in Kosovo's capital, a site of anti-Serb riots eight years ago, Clinton greeted members of the Serb minority who've returned to Kosovo after years abroad despite continued interethnic tensions. In Pristina, she also joined the European Union's foreign policy chief, Catherine Ashton, in seeking to advance talks between Serbia and its former province so both can one day join the 27-nation EU.

The U.S. hopes Kosovo will also become a member of NATO, and hopes stability across the region will end a process of Balkanization that began with the breakup of Yugoslavia two decades ago and which minority groups in Bosnia and Kosovo threaten to continue.

One stumbling block is the fate of 60,000 Serbs in northern Kosovo who reject their national government's authority, and instead seek independence or incorporation into an expanded Serbia. Washington and Brussels say neither is possible, and are hoping future agreements between Kosovo and Serbia on issues such as freedom of movement, joint customs control, utilities and government services will convince ethnic Serbs they'll be protected in Kosovo and not cut off from friends and family across the border.

"The United States is firmly committed to Kosovo's sovereignty and territorial integrity, and to seeing the rule of law extend throughout Kosovo," Clinton said unequivocally, speaking to reporters alongside Ashton and Kosovo's Prime Minister Hashim Thaci. "We oppose any discussion of territory changes or reopening Kosovo's independent status. These matters are not up for discussion. The boundaries of an independent, sovereign Kosovo are clear and set."

But she said Kosovo's government and people needed to embrace changes if they are to move forward more than decade after NATO bombed Serbia to stop a war between Kosovo's predominantly ethnic Albanians and Serbs who consider the area the cradle of their statehood and the Christian Orthodox religion. Mentioning the statue of her husband, President Bill Clinton, in Pristina's downtown nearby a store named "Hillary," Clinton called Kosovo's future a deeply personal cause.

Although the United States is only helping in the normalization process with Serbia, Kosovo remains a bastion of pro-American sentiment and the U.S. voice there carries weight. Clinton urged Kosovo's leaders to address the concerns of Serbs so an environment emerges where "people of all backgrounds have a chance to succeed."

But she stressed that ethnic Serbs needed to step forward as well and embrace their country, calling for "not only changes by the government, but also by the people."

BUHL • When the season first unfolded and the Buhl Middle School girls basketball team saw that Declo would be its first opponent, the Raiders weren’t confident they would win.

After just two practices the team was hit with terrible news. On Oct. 21, their beloved coach Brian Rodig had died.

Two days later, with new coach Stu Peterson at the helm, they were playing with purpose, said seventh grader Sage Eckert, which helped them win the game 27-25.

“Declo is a tough team,” Eckert said. “But we came together and played as a team. Brian’s family was all here and watching us play and it was like he was here.”

Although Rodig, 50, had spent just two practices with this team, his time with Buhl youth sports was extensive and many on the team had been coached by him before.

It didn’t matter if it was rodeo, soccer, T-ball, football, basketball, baseball, golf or cheering from the stands, Rodig and his wife Mylyn had dedicated countless hours to not only their own children’s teams but the entirety of Buhl.

Rebuilt Boise State Threatening to Bust BCS Again

Boise State is at it again. Coach Chris Petersen’s Broncos are quietly piling up victories with a team that underwent a major reconstruction. “Boise State’s always been pretty good at football for whatever reasons,” Petersen said Monday. And wouldn’t you know it, the Broncos are threatening to bust into the BCS. There’s a twist this time. After all those seasons Boise State was shut out of the best bowl games in favor of brand name teams from more high-profile conferences, now it’s the benefit of the doubt the Broncos are getting from poll voters that might push them onto the big post-season stage in their last season in the Mountain West. The Broncos were one of the most debated and divisive teams in the country the last few years. Good, but how good? Boise State

fans felt the Broncos got overlooked and slighted. Others felt they were overrated, a product of a weak schedule and sympathetic media coverage. The Broncos kept the debate

raging by winning, a lot. Since Petersen took over in 2006, Boise State is 80-7 and has twice made it to — and won — BCS games. But the last two seasons, with one of the best teams in the country, quarterback Kellen Moore and the Broncos had to settle for bowl trips to Las Vegas, while teams such as Virginia Tech, Michigan, Arkansas and Ohio State were handed at-large BCS bids. Moore, Doug Martin and about a dozen other Broncos from those teams have now moved on to the NFL. The Broncos have had as much turnover, not just quality but quantity, as any team in the nation this season. Boise State opened the season with a 17-13 loss at Michigan State, and hasn’t lost since, winning seven straight. The defense has been one of the nation’s best, allowing 311 yards per game. The new stars are line-backer J.C. Percy and defensive

Seattle Brings Democracy to MLS with GM Vote

SEATTLE • Inside a voting stall adorned with all the usual trappings of the election process, Bill and Chris Schlittenhart let their voices be heard.

The Schlittenharts spent their time before a recent Seattle Sounders home game helping decide the fate of general manager Adrian Hanauer, whose future employment as the man in charge is now in the hands of season-ticket holders and fan supporters.

"It makes more of a complete team. We're all part of the team," Chris Schlittenhart said. "It's not a matter of other people telling us what we can do."

Among the bylaws the club instituted when the franchise started was a stipulation that every four years the performance of the general manager would be put to a vote of season ticket holders and members of the Sounders fan alliance. All season-ticket holders, or those who pay \$125 per year to be part of the fan alliance, get to have a say in the direction of the organization, which means voting to keep Hanauer or kick him out of office.

For some franchises in other corners of the world,

this is common practice. In North America, it's unheard of.

Consider it a bit of democracy in the sporting world.

"I've gotten calls from other owners of other teams in other sports who tell me I'm out of my mind," Sounders majority owner Joe Roth said. "Which tells me it's probably a pretty good idea, actually."

There are no stump speeches for Hanauer to make or political ads. The product he's put on the field, coupled with incredible fan support not seen in a North American soccer market since the early days of the NASL, can be seen as a strong enough argument for giving Hanauer another four years running the organization.

Seattle again smashed attendance records this season, averaging 43,144 per game. The Sounders drew more than 66,000 for a home game against rival Portland and reached the MLS playoffs for the fourth straight season. In four MLS regular seasons, the Sounders are 59-32-37 with a playoff trip each year, not to mention three U.S. Open Cup titles and a fourth appearance in the Open Cup final this year.

Yankees RHP Rafael Soriano Opts out of Contract

Rafael Soriano appears poised to leave the New York Yankees, and Ervin Santana is headed to Kansas City.

Soriano opted out of the final year of his \$35 million, three-year contract Wednesday and will likely seek a long-term deal in free agency. The right-hander had 42 saves for the Yankees last season after longtime closer Mariano Rivera tore knee ligaments in early May.

Soriano was set to make \$14 million next season and had until Wednesday to opt out. Instead, New York will

pay him a \$1.5 million buyout. The Yankees can make him a qualifying offer of \$13.3 million before Friday's 11:59 p.m. EDT deadline and if Soriano signs with another team, they will get draft compensation.

"I'm not surprised because (agent) Scott Boras told me he was confident he could get him 15 times four (years), \$60 million. If that's the case, it would be a good deal for Soriano," Yankees president Randy Levine told The Associated Press. "I hope that's what's real in the marketplace."

Soriano, who will be 33 in December, signed his hefty

contract with New York before the 2011 season after notching a career-high 45 saves with Tampa Bay. He began his stint with the Yankees as a setup man, then took over as closer when Rivera was injured.

The Kansas City Royals made their first move toward shoring up their shaky rotation, acquiring Santana from the Los Angeles Angels for minor league reliever Brandon Sisk.

Santana was an All-Star in 2008 and threw a no-hitter in 2011, but struggled with the long ball this year. He allowed a major league-worst 39

homers and went 9-13 with a 5.16 ERA — although he showed improvement in the second half of the season.

"We were able to scout Ervin during the entire year, specifically the second half," Royals general manager Dayton Moore said. "His August and September were really good. From a statistical standpoint, he was very good."

Moore said the Royals are paying "the majority" of Santana's \$13 million deal. The Angels had exercised their \$13 million option before trading the Dominican veteran and cash to the Royals.

"He was fun," Christensen said. "We didn't want to play without him there but we decided that (Brian) wouldn't want us to give up so we played our last game and won."

Trieg's mom, Tracie Christensen, said Buhl youth sports won't be the same without Rodig.

"He was just someone who did so much and was involved in so much," she said. "You'd go to your kids football games, baseball and basketball games and there he would be, too."

Looking forward, Christensen said although no one

can fill Rodig's shoes, she anticipates his example will inspire others to step forward.

Michelle Pato, thinks so, too. Pato and her husband help coach and coordinate the community's youth soccer program.

"Buhl doesn't have an athletic district and so it's up to volunteers to get involved. I know just for soccer we have to get teams organized, coaches lined up, t-shirts and trophies ordered, the fields painted and take care of equipment, and Brian and Mylyn helped with so much, I don't know how they did it all," Pato said. end Demarcus Lawrence.

The offense, with new starting quarterback Joe Southwick, is coming along, though it's not nearly as potent as it was in recent years.

The Broncos are tied for 59th in yards per play (5.8). But they've only lost 12 turnovers, and are seventh in the nation in turnover margin at plus-11.

Simply put, Boise State is good again, though a familiar problem persists: Strength of schedule. The Broncos don't have a victory against a ranked team, and the Mountain West isn't quite what they hoped it would be when they decided to leave the Western Athletic Conference a few years ago.

The Sagarin computer rankings rate Boise State's schedule 78th-best among Division I teams.

It's the reason why next season Boise State will be on the move again, joining the new Big East, where the Broncos will have access to an automatic bid for the last year of the Bowl Championship Series.

The Broncos face what

looks to be a challenge on Saturday when San Diego State (6-3, 4-1) visits. After that they travel to Hawaii, and play Colorado State at home, before finishing the season at Nevada, another potentially tricky hurdle.

Despite the so-so competition, Boise State has been ranked for most of the season, and should continue to rise in the rankings — even if only slightly — if it keeps winning. The Broncos have become a reliable commodity, the type of team that voters can trust. So while Louisiana Tech and a bevy of quality Mid-American Conference teams struggle for attention and poll votes this season, Boise State keeps rolling along.

Though, to be fair, Boise State's schedule rates better than any of those other potential BCS busters.

Boise State will have a tough time getting a top-12 ranking in the final BCS standings, which along with a conference title, could give the Broncos an automatic BCS bid. They have taken that route to the BCS before. But if they can get into the final top 16 and be ranked higher than a champion from one of the au-

tomatic qualifying conferences, the Broncos are in.

The Big Ten's struggles are aiding Boise State's cause. Nebraska is the only team ranked in the BCS top 25. The Cornhuskers are a spot behind the Broncos at No. 20. If they win out all the way through the Big Ten championship game, the Huskers will probably pass Boise State. If not, it will be tough for any other Big Ten team to do so. Aside from postseason-ineligible Ohio State, Nebraska (6-2, 3-1) is the only Big Ten team with less than three losses.

The irony, of course, is this Boise State wouldn't stand a chance against the ones Petersen rolled out the last two seasons. Those Broncos could play with any team in the country, but the system left them without a spot, sent them to pound Utah and Arizona State in late December, instead getting to prove themselves against another top-10 team.

This season, Boise State could wind up in the BCS with a team that might not be capable of matching up against a highly rated opponent.

Say this about the Broncos, they are always interesting.

point of starting the season traveling in the hopes of building chemistry.

"It's great bonding time," Gosar said. "It's a great time for guys to mesh, develop a little bit of identity and character."

CSI will roll out the same starting lineup it had in the preseason home exhibition against Carroll College last week, which includes three of the four team-selected captains: Billy Reader (c), Trevor Ritchie (c), Sebastian Michineau (c), Jaysean Paige and Montigo Alford. Gosar believes his defense, through his guards, will jump-start the offense in transition, which may be the primary mode of scoring until the team masters the motion offense.

"Our point guards are a real strength for us," Gosar said. "They initiate the offense and defense. We'll always be best served when they are really aggressive."

The CSI women will travel to Casper, Wyo., this weekend to play Gillette College and Casper College, the latter of which the Golden Eagles defeated in a scrimmage earlier in the season.

"I wish we hadn't beat Casper," coach Randy Rogers said. "They have all the tools to be the best team in the country. They can stretch the floor, have good athletic guards, big players and wings that can put pressure on the rim and spot up and shoot."

The Golden Eagles will be without Elodie Roussas, who suffered a knee sprain but had a negative MRI. Julia Duffurerna will be held out with concussive symptoms, while Stephanie Toumson is out with a foot infection. Rai Franklin will also be out, and Alli Furniss limited.

Rogers knows that the trip signifies the start of a long process for his young team.

"We bond if we win," Rogers joked. "But it's good for (them) to understand the level they're playing at. Also, when you spend that much time on one bus, they ask questions they wouldn't normally ask. It's also good for studying, believe it or not, so they get their assignments done."

BULLS 93, KINGS 87

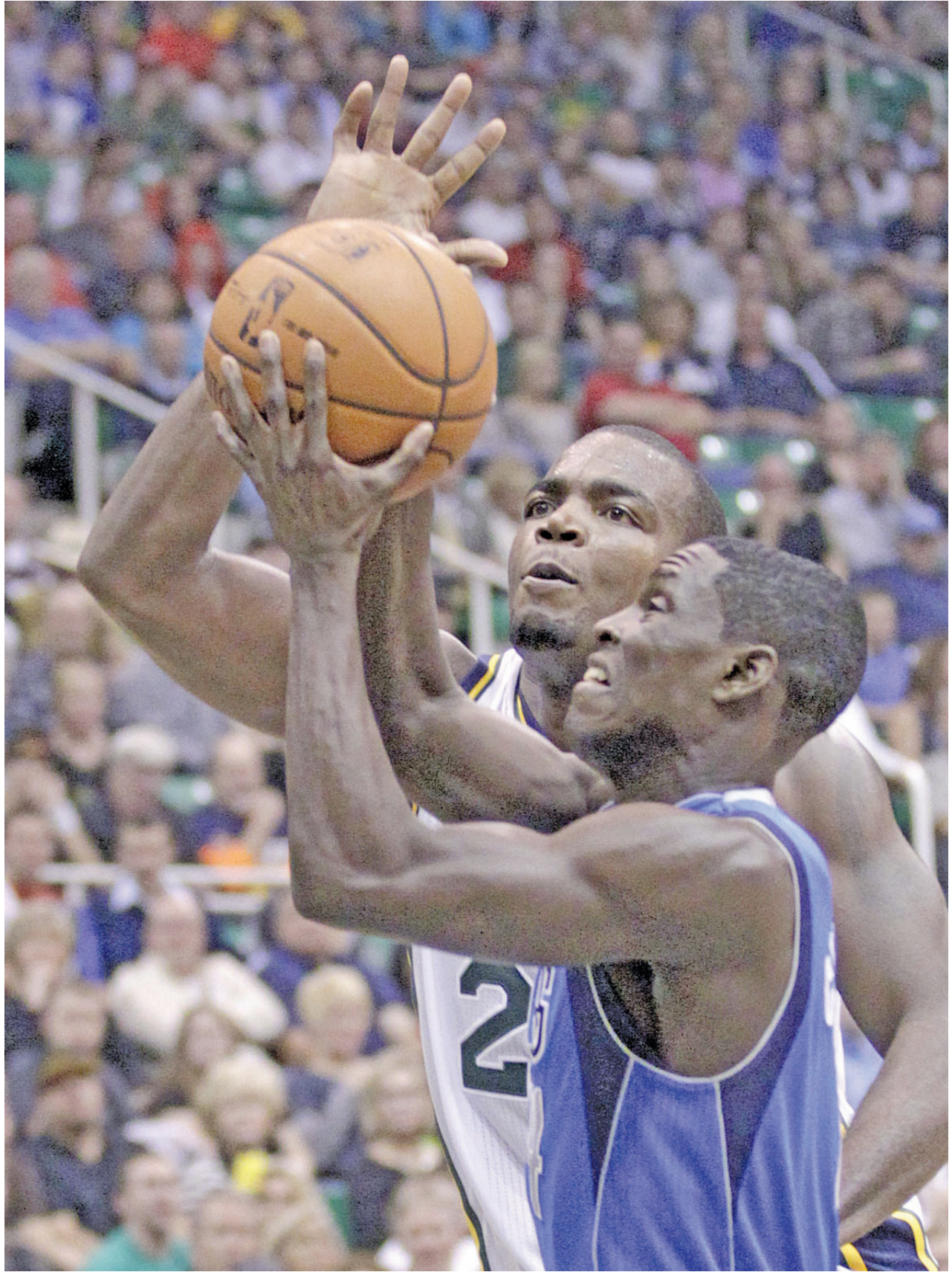

College Picks: LSU Win Could Leave SEC out of BCS

A BCS championship game without a Southeastern Conference team?

It could happen, and LSU could be the cause.

The fifth-ranked Tigers host No. 1 Alabama on Saturday, another huge game in a rivalry that has become the biggest event in college football.

"It's obvious when you walk into the room that certainly we're playing a different team," LSU coach Les Miles said this week. "It's a little fuller, and there's a little more attention to detail. That's the way it's supposed to be."

The SEC has won the last six BCS championships, and the Crimson Tide has been rolling toward a third BCS title game in four seasons.

Last season, losing 9-6 in overtime to LSU at home didn't keep Alabama out of the championship game, which it won 21-0 in an all-SEC rematch with the Tigers.

But last year, Alabama got a break when LSU was the only unbeaten team in major college football. Matched against other one-loss teams, specifically Oklahoma State, the Tide got the nod.

Right now, a second chance doesn't seem likely. There are three undefeated teams right behind the Tide in the BCS standings.

Alabama is the only remaining unbeaten team in the SEC. A loss to LSU — or any loss for that matter, though this is the biggest hurdle — would likely drop the Tide behind the other highly ranked unbeaten teams. That is assuming Kansas State, Oregon and Notre Dame all stay unbeaten.

Even more potentially

problematic for Alabama, a loss to LSU puts the Tide behind the Tigers in the SEC West race. With a victory, LSU would become the SEC team best positioned to play in the national title game. Georgia and Florida would also be in the mix if either could win the SEC championship with only one overall loss.

But with one loss, the SEC champion is going to need help in the form of losses by at least two of the other big three.

This might seem like heresy to SEC fans, but in some ways it would be fitting. Only the SEC can keep the SEC from winning a national title. It's this scenario that made SEC Commissioner Mike Slive push for a playoff.

As for the other three unbeaten, this weekend is a mixed bag.

No. 2 Oregon (fourth in the BCS standings), plays at No. 18 Southern California. Even with the Trojans (6-2) not living up to their advanced billing, this will be the Ducks' toughest challenge yet.

No. 3 Kansas State (second in the BCS) is home to face Oklahoma State (6-2). Using two freshmen quarterbacks hasn't stopped the Cowboys from being one of the best offenses in the country. They lead the nation in yards per game at 586, and figure to be a good test for a tough Wildcats defense.

No. 4 Notre Dame (third in the BCS) has what looks to be the easiest game, with Pittsburgh (4-4) coming to South Bend, Ind. But the Fighting Irish have played close games all season, and the Panthers seem to be making progress under first-year coach Paul Chryst.

Sliding AFC West Teams Collide

NEW YORK • It might be less of a collision and more of a mere bump in the night when the Chargers and Chiefs meet on Thursday night.

Both teams are in free-falls. San Diego started out 3-1 and now has lost three straight, looking progressively worse in each outing. A 7-6 loss at Cleveland was the low point.

Unless, that is, the Chargers manage to lose at home to Kansas City, which has crashed to the bottom of the AP Pro32 rankings and has dropped four in a row, six of seven. San Diego (No. 22, AP Pro32) is an 8-point favorite.

The way the Chargers are playing, there aren't many teams that would be underdogs against them. Their passing game is falling apart both throwing the ball and defending it. They have trouble protecting Philip Rivers, whose performances have been spotty, and they miss big-play receiver Vincent Jackson, now with Tampa Bay.

"We've not been able to put together the kind of consistency we need to," said coach Norv Turner, whose job security is teetering. "Usually, it's a different thing in each situation where you have an opportunity to make a big play. You only get so many in a game."

Opponents get more chances against Kansas City than most others, though. The Chiefs, who go back to starting Matt Cassel at quarterback with Brady Quinn out with a concussion, have a stunning 25 turnovers (13 interceptions, 12 fumbles); next worst in the AFC is Buffalo with 17.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

In 2007, trials were held to determine the second U.S. Open Teams spot, and the squads captained by Seymon Deutsch and Rose Meltzer met in the quarter-finals. On the deal that followed, Bart Bramley and Sidney Lazard for the Deutsch team came off better.

Bramley and Lazard are one of the few pairs who have stuck with a version of Standard American more common in the '60s and '70s, but they have no shortage of inspiration in both the bidding and the play. Against three no-trump, Bramley led the spade two (standard fourth-highest leads) and Lazard played the king, which held. West's lead, coupled with the bidding, suggested that South held four cards in each major, and dummy's diamond suit looked likely to provide six tricks.

Any guesses as to which card Lazard played back at trick two? Yes, it was a club — but which one? He chose the king, and when that held, followed up with the club eight. To declarer, it appeared that for his club-king switch, East must also hold the ace. So she rose with her queen, and now the game ended two light, courtesy of four club tricks plus the two top spades.

Lazard's play could hardly cost. With any needed finesse in the red suits working for declarer, a shift to clubs might cost over-tricks, but it was virtually impossible for it to cost the contract.

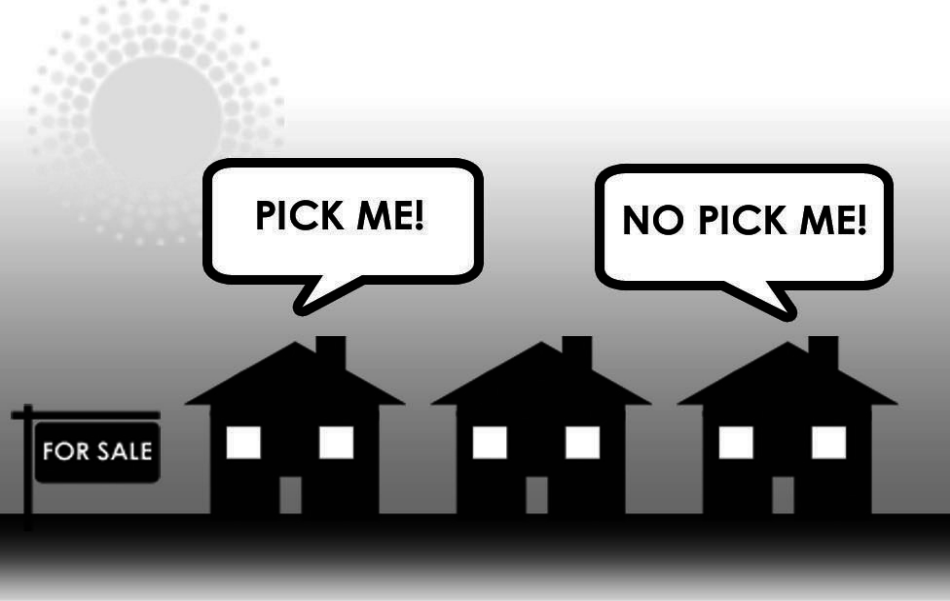

ANSWER: It is a matter of partnership agreement (or dispute) whether an advance by fourth hand into a major shows a minimum of four cards or five. Certainly, one should not bid a bad four-card major here; my belief is that a five-card holding is the norm. Either way, the most practical option is to bid one no-trump and wait for partner to introduce a major if he has one.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1765, the Stamp Act went into effect, prompting stiff resistance from American colonists.

In 1861, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln named Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan General-in-Chief of the Union armies, succeeding Lt. Gen. Winfield Scott.

In 1870, the United States Weather Bureau made its first meteorological observations.

In 1936, in a speech in Milan, Italy, Benito Mussolini described the alliance between his country and Nazi Germany as an "axis" running between Rome and Berlin.

In 1944, "Harvey," a comedy by Mary Chase about a man and his friend, an invisible six-foot-tall rabbit, opened on Broadway.

In 1950, two Puerto Rican nationalists tried to force their way into Blair House in Washington, D.C., in a failed attempt to assassinate President Harry S. Truman. (One of the pair was killed, along with a White House police officer.)

In 1952, the United States exploded the first hydrogen bomb, code-named "Ivy Mike," at Eniwetok Atoll in the Marshall Islands.

In 1954, Algerian nationalists began their successful rebellion against French rule.

In 1968, the Motion Picture Association of America unveiled its new voluntary film rating system: G for general, M for mature (later changed to GP, then PG), R for restricted and X (later changed to NC-17) for adults only.

In 1972, author and poet Ezra Pound died in Venice, Italy, at age 87.

In 1979, former first lady Mamie Eisenhower died in Washington, D.C., at age 82.

In 1989, East Germany reopened its border with Czechoslovakia, prompting tens of thousands of refugees to flee to the West.

Ten years ago: A federal judge approved most provisions of an antitrust settlement between Microsoft and the Justice Department. A Russian spacecraft carrying two cosmonauts and a Belgian astronaut docked with the international space station. Queen Elizabeth II's surprise revelation that she knew butler Paul Burrell had taken some of Princess Diana's possessions for safe-keeping prompted prosecutors to drop theft charges against the servant.

Five years ago: British college student Meredith Kercher, 21, was found slain in her bedroom in Perugia, Italy; her roommate, American Amanda Knox and Knox's Italian boyfriend, Raffaele Sollecito were later convicted of killing Kercher, but both had their guilty verdicts overturned. (Rudy Guede, a petty criminal who was convicted separately, remains imprisoned.) Retired Air Force Brig. Gen. Paul Tibbets, who'd piloted the B-29 bomber Enola Gay that dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, died in Columbus, Ohio, at age 92. Less than a week after workers ratified a new contract, Chrysler announced 12,000 job cuts.

One year ago: Europe's days-old plan to solve its crippling debt crisis and restore faith in the global economy was thrown into chaos by Greek Prime Minister George Papandreou's stunning decision to call a referendum on the country's latest rescue package. (Papandreou dropped the referendum plan two days later.) Embattled Los Angeles Dodgers owner Frank McCourt and Major League Baseball reached an agreement to sell the troubled franchise. Dorothy Rodham, 92, mother of Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton and former President Bill Clinton's mother-in-law, died in Washington.
