## LESS JUNIPER, MORE GROUSE?

**BURLEY** • When Richard Ward first heard about the project to restore 32,000 acres of sage grouse habitat, he dug in his heels.

The Cane Springs rancher doubted that grazing allotments in the Jim Sage Mountains area needed juniper removal. However, federal and local officials were looking to him and 19 other permittees for support in order for the project to move forward.

"All of us had to get on board and sign off that this was a good thing," Ward said. "It took us two years before we got on board. In the end, the more I looked

into it, the more I thought it would be a good thing."

The plan is to remove Utah juniper plants that encroach into sagebrush habitat, said Sam Lawry, western farm bill coordinator for Pheasants Forever, the organization sponsoring the project.

If juniper invades into vital sage grouse habitat, killing the sagebrush, it destroys the birds' winter and summer food supply, Lawry said.

Protecting and sustaining sage grouse habitat is important because the bird is currently listed as a candidate for the endangered species list. U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service officials have until 2015 to make a final listing decision.

Listing the bird would put ranchers like Ward into a stalled limbo on whether or not he could continue grazing on public lands. So before officials make a final decision, federal and state agencies are working to improve sage

grouse habitat management.

"Once these junipers become established, they out-compete sage grouse," he said. "We're hoping this shouldn't take more than three years to complete."

The juniper removal project involves partnerships with seven different local and federal agencies, including the Idaho Department of Fish and Game and the U.S. Bureau of Land Management.

"It's kind of a small, isolated sage grouse population but it has been growing," said Randy Smith, regional wildlife manager for Fish and Game. "This will give it a shot in the arm that they need."

This isn't the first time wildlife officials and conservationists have pushed to remove juniper from the Jim Sage Mountains.

In 2004, the BLM attempted to remove juniper in an effort to reduce fire fuel and restore sagebrush habitat.

However, Hailey-based Western Watersheds Project filed a lawsuit against the BLM, saying the agency failed to follow federal policy. A district court judge agreed with Western Watersheds and the effort was dropped.

The agency has recently approved the project after completing an environmental review of the area, Lawry said. This means the juniper removal can begin immediately once a contractor is selected.

For Ward, the project will not only improve sage grouse habitat but improve vegetation for his cattle.

"We have been doing some conservation efforts for a while, so we thought we would step it up a little bit," Ward said. "We hate to see those junipers get too thick. When they get too thick, they cut everything out. There's nothing grows under them, no value for the cattle and the sage grouse!"

## Man Stumbles, Falls in Canyon

# The Reaction of Kindness

Afterward, I sat down at the kitchen counter for coffee with his aunt. She apologized for her "bad" daughter's behavior. It made a big impression on my young friend. He found out that kindness worked better than a judgmental reaction.

Sometimes a client in our place of business may have a little misunderstanding. All they need is for someone to listen to them with respect. Most people are really nice people when we get under the surface of their anger.

While good listening is a form of kindness, so is affirmation to someone when they do their job well. Appreciation goes a long way.

Let's stop and think of someone in our life who could use a compliment. They have become so reliable in performing their tasks that we take them for granted. Sometimes a sincere "thank you" can really brighten up their day and make all their efforts worthwhile.

Another unsung hero may be an exceptional teacher who inspired us to do something special in our lifetime. Show him or her heartfelt gratitude with a thoughtful gesture of kindness. # ISP Investigates Hazardous Leak

**RUPERT** • Idaho State Police were investigating a small leak of some sort of hazardous material onto Interstate 84 Sunday.

According to a Sunday evening press release, at about 2 p.m. an ISP commercial vehicle specialist

stopped a truck and trailer for a traffic violation on eastbound I-84 at milepost 215, about one mile west of the Minidoka/Cassia county line.

While inspecting the commercial vehicle, the specialist found a small leak near the front of the trailer. Traffic was then blocked for about

one hour until the vehicle could be moved to a more secluded location.

The truck and trailer were placed in a gravel pit operated by the Idaho Transportation Department until the company responsible for the shipment patches the leak, according to ISP. Absorbent material was being used to

contain the liquid.

ISP had not yet determined Sunday what leaked from the container. When contacted by the *Times-News*, ISP officials did not have the name of the company shipping it. Updates from the agency are promised as the investigation continues.

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# Conservation Group Drops Salmon River Dredging Lawsuit

**BOISE (AP)** • An Idaho conservation group has dropped its lawsuit challenging state approval of a plan to dredge a stretch of the Salmon River for gold.

The Idaho Conservation League on Wednesday filed paperwork in 4th District Court voluntarily dismissing its petition for judicial review, backing away from its lawsuit because Mike Conklin of Grangeville scrapped his plans to dredge the river.

"We are pleased that Mr. Conklin has voluntarily abandoned his proposal to dredge mine the bed of the Salmon River," Jonathan Oppenheimer of the environmental

group said in a statement. "The case highlighted the risk that Idaho's rivers face from the growing threat of suction dredge gold mining."

Conklin said he declined to mine that part of the river because tests failed to produce gold.

ICL sued on Oct. 10, not long after Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and the rest of the Idaho Land Board approved an exclusive mineral lease for Conklin to suction dredge a half-mile section of the Salmon River for gold and garnets. Conklin in mid-September was awarded a five-year lease by the state land board for exclusive ac-

cess to a half-mile stretch of river downstream of Riggins.

In its lawsuit, ICL argued the state needed to approve a reclamation plan before approving suction dredge leases. ICL officials said they also won state assurances that if Conklin changed his mind, he would have to go through the entire lease process again.

"We look forward to working with the Idaho Department of Lands, the Idaho Land Board and others to protect the Salmon River, consistent with its unique and outstanding value to all Idahoans," Oppenheimer said.

Health System sent its application to become an ACO to the federal government earlier this year. If approved, the new model could be in place by January 2013.

## What Is This?

If you feel like you haven't heard much about ACOs, you're not alone.

ACOs have been overshadowed in Idaho as officials debate whether to set up a health insurance exchange and expand Medicare eligibility. Nationwide, only 150 organizations have been set up as ACOs since the law was passed.

But they're important because they can be part of the solution in keeping health care spending down, said David Pate, chief executive officer for St. Luke's.

"The reason we want to do this is because we believe we have to learn how to exist in a different model," he said. "The current model rewards those who provide services regardless of the outcome, pays just as much for high and low value services."

According to the health care reform law, an ACO would need to manage the needs of at least 5,000 Medicare beneficiaries for at least three years. If it fails to meet the standards set by the federal government, it can lose its incentives and even be stripped of its ACO status.

## So What Is This New Model?

No one really knows yet. With only seven pages devoted to ACOs, there's not a clear example of what the model should look like.

St. Luke's might have to absorb a financial loss the first few years while it learns to transition to an ACO, Pate said.

"I don't expect to be successful right away. I think of this as our tuition," he said. "This is how we get ready, we got to learn how to do that."

However, the law does provide some guidelines.

There are 33 measures that ACOs must track to show they are keeping costs down.

"Right now, we're not measuring any of them," Pate said. "We think that's a good thing to start doing."

## Isn't This Just a Newfangled HMO?

The goals of ACOs are extremely similar to health maintenance organizations (HMO) that were popular in the 1980s and 1990s.

HMO models received criticism due to their control over patient referrals, which limited patient options.

While an ACO model only applies to Medicare recipients, the new program allows more room for patient choice. St. Luke's must inform its Medicare beneficiaries they are participating in an ACO and that the provider will receive benefits for improving the quality of each beneficiary's care. However, the beneficiary is not tied to that ACO like one would be in an HMO.

"In HMOs, the focus was just on cost. In fact, it was a very short-term approach," Pate said. "The difference

with accountable care is that you take that long-term approach and go, 'Look I may have to spend money to make that person healthier rather than just not doing anything.'"

## What's Next?

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services is currently reviewing St. Luke's application to be an ACO. If approved, the health system would begin implementing the new model by January 2013.

"We know health care is still too unaffordable in Idaho," Pate said. "We're trying to change models in Idaho, so that's why we're doing this."

## Han Suyin, Chinese-born Author of 'A Many-Splendored Thing,' Dies at 95

Han Suyin, a prolific Eurasian author who generated controversy with her hagiographic view of China's Cultural Revolution and who may be most remembered for her bestselling semi-autobiographical novel that inspired the Hollywood melodrama "Love Is a Many-Splendored Thing," died Nov. 2 at her home in Lausanne, Switzerland. She was 95.

Her death was confirmed by her daughter, Yung Mei Tang.

The China-born Han worked many years as a

physician, but her writing provided her most enduring, complicated and provocative legacy. She published almost two dozen novels, nonfiction books and memoirs — and countless essays for mainstream newspapers and magazines — that were often set against the backdrop of historical and generational upheaval in Asia.

Her career as a writer spanned World War II, China's revolution, the Korean War, Communism's rise and the decline of colonialism in East Asia, and included panegyric biographies of Chinese leaders such as Mao Zedong and Chou Enlai.

In her writing and frequent lecturing, most of which took place during the Cold War, Dr. Han cultivated an image of someone capable of unraveling and demystifying for Western audiences the political and social developments of the East.

At Beijing's Yenching University in the mid-1930s, she studied alongside many who formed the first and second generations of China's Communist party leaders in China.

"Every year the school used to put on the 'Messiah' and it's very funny when I look at some of the people I

know in China today, important Communist Party members, and to remember them sitting there in the choir with me singing the 'Messiah' is quite wonderful," she told *The Washington Post* in 1982.

## Campbell, 1st Black Olympic Decathlon Winner, Dies

**GAINESVILLE, Ga. (AP)** • Milt Campbell, who became the first African-American to win the Olympic decathlon in 1956 and went on to play pro football and become a motivational speaker, has died, his family said. He was 78.

Linda Rusch, Campbell's partner of 13 years, said Campbell died Friday at his home in Gainesville, about 55 miles northwest of Atlanta. She said he had been fighting prostate cancer for a decade.

"He was extremely disciplined," Rusch told The Associated Press on Saturday. "He had huge passion. For you to win the gold you have to be so self-motivated and so self-disciplined. And you have to have a very strong mind."

"He literally had to train himself to have this incredible mind, to be such a positive thinker," she added. "He carried that way of life throughout his whole entire being."

A native of Plainfield, N.J., Campbell was a rising high school senior when he won the silver medal in the decathlon at the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki, finishing second to Bob Mathias. The Americans swept the decathlon that year. Four years later, Campbell won gold at the Olympic Games in Melbourne, Australia.

"World record holder Rafer Johnson was hampered by injury, but even in

full health he probably couldn't have beaten Milt Campbell in Melbourne," according to The Complete Book of the Summer Olympics by David Wallechinsky.

Campbell had hoped to qualify for the Olympic team as a hurdler, but he finished fourth during tryouts.

"I was stunned," Campbell said in the book. "But then God seemed to reach into my heart and tell me he didn't want me to compete in the hurdles, but in the decathlon."

The 6-foot-3, 217-pound Campbell, who attended Indiana University, was drafted in 1957 by the Cleveland Browns, where he played one season in the

same backfield as Jim Brown. Campbell then played for various teams in the Canadian Football League until his football career ended in 1964.

Campbell was inducted into the National Track and Field Hall of Fame in 1999 and was honored this year by the International Swimming Hall of Fame. In 2000, the New Jersey Sportswriters Association named Campbell its New Jersey Athlete of the Century.

In June, he was inducted into the New Jersey Hall of Fame along with nine others, including actor Michael Douglas, author Joyce Carol Oates and the late New York Giants owner Wellington Mara.

## Do Independents Stand a Chance in Idaho?

In 1928, a man named A.L. Freehafer was elected to the Senate from Payette County. (Back then each county elected a senator and at least one representative.)

We don’t know much about him, but we do know that he had served a couple of terms two decades previous, and one more after the election of 1930.

We also know this: He was elected in 1928 as an independent, not as a member of any party. That is a rarity in Idaho. Every Idaho legislator elected in the years since, including Freehafer himself in 1930 (as a Democrat), has been elected either as a Republican or a Democrat.

Such are the odds for any candidate choosing not to run under the umbrella of one or the other. Usually, non-major party candidates aren’t a big deal in terms of the vote count, picking up a sliver of the vote. If a major party candidate isn’t opposed by the other major party, a third-party or independent candidate might collect a quarter or even more of the vote. But close calls have been almost nonexistent.

But before we cross to the far side of Election Day, take note of a legislative race that’s not on most radar screens, and after the fact might or might not be of interest. On election night, cast a glance over to District 7 and the Senate contest between Republican Sheryl Nuxoll, of Cottonwood, and independent Jon Cantamessa, of Wallace.

Those candidate addresses give you a sense of the size of this district: Immense, from the outskirts of Sandpoint down to where northern becomes southern Idaho. It is also hard to get around, since so much of it is in backcountry with winding highways, if those. Newly created this decade, it will be a hard district to represent.

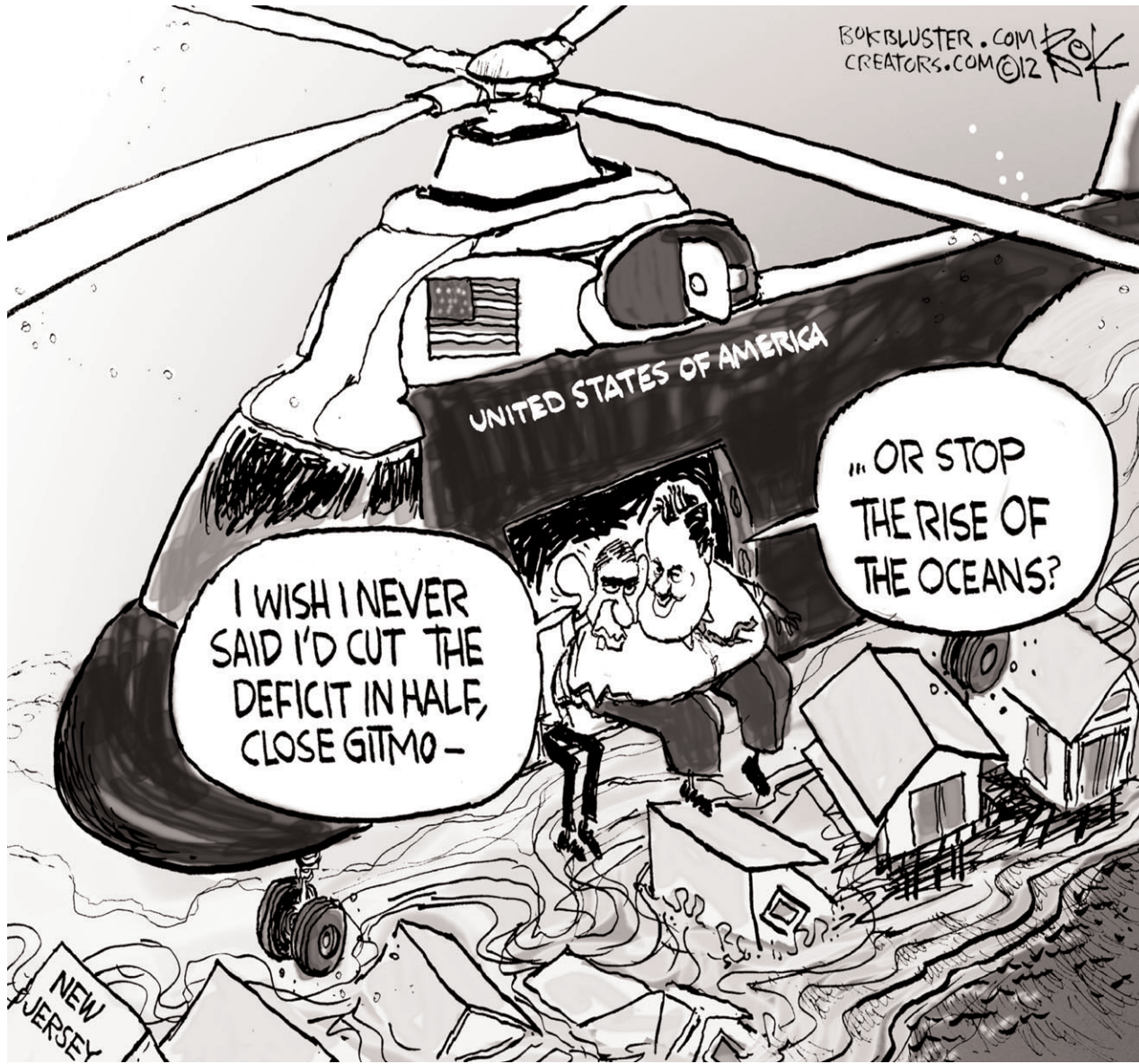
The more or less incumbent — she currently is a senator — is Nuxoll, now wrapping up her first term. In 2010 she defeated an incumbent Republican in the primary and easily won in the general in her old district, which takes in much of the southern part of the new one. She is well positioned in the Idaho County and Clearwater County communities, with deep family and other connections. She has made a few missteps as well, though, such as sending campaign-like mailers on the state dime to not just current constituents, but to people in the northern part of the newly-formed district.

Cantamessa has his base of strength too, in the northern part of the district; he has been a Shoshone County commissioner (his brother is running to replace him), and has been involved with a mass of regional organizations. His family has operated a grocery at Wallace since 1925.

Like Freehafer, Cantamessa has some background with major parties. When he was elected to the Shoshone commission in 2004, he ran as an independent against both a Republican and a Democrat. Seeking re-election in 2006 and 2010, though, he did so as a Democrat. But he has picked up support from other quarters. His web site carries endorsements from Phillips Baker, CEO of Hecla Mining and Republican Senator Joyce Broadsword (she’s not on the ballot this year), whose district is close by.

District 7 is Republican territory, and Nuxoll may win easily. But this is an unusual case, and Cantamessa a more-advantaged candidate than usually runs as an independent. Keep a watch here for an indicator of how well, or not, an independent candidate for the Idaho Legislature can do.

This year, once again, Americans are confronted with the distinct possibility that the winner of a tight presidential race might not be the candidate who received the most votes.

The reason for this, of course, is our electoral college system. It can lead and has led to elections in which the top vote-getter does not prevail, a bizarre result in a country with a deep allegiance to majority rule and “one person, one vote.” George W. Bush governed as the popular-vote loser in his first term as president. This year, some political analysts speculate

that President Obama might claim that dubious distinction in his second term. In an election so close, it’s even conceivable that Mitt Romney could win the White House but not the popular vote.

The prospect of different winners in the popular and electoral votes is but one of the system’s imperfections. Only a few swing states, large or small, end up mattering during election season, with the rest ignored. That can distort not only campaigning but policy: This year, both candidates have pandered to the small and declining coal industry, because it matters in Ohio, Pennsylvania and Virginia, and never mind that it is the most dangerous fuel in an era of climate change.

But it’s easier to identify the electoral college’s flaws than to devise a defect-free alternative. Yes, a direct popular vote would be fairer, in principle. Yet it could lead to difficult national vote counts, or a proliferation of fringe and regional candidates, each trying to capture the White House with the largest share of a fractured vote. These problems could be cured by the creation of a national election apparatus and a runoff system. However, France’s recent experience, in which a far-right party has made it to the second round, is not reassuring. There are other possible fixes, but the more complex the change, the less likely that reform would be adopted. Any reform already faces a steep

climb in the Senate, since the same small states that benefit from the electoral college would presumably be in a position to block it.

The electoral college is the system the country has — and has had for centuries — an institution that should be adjusted only with extreme care. Meanwhile, if Tuesday’s election produces a split between the popular and the electoral votes, Americans should keep their cool. Both candidates accepted and played by the current rules, byzantine as they are. The popular vote will be a byproduct of a contest in which both sides spent time, energy and money to win the most electoral votes. As in every presidential election since George Washington’s first, the candidate who achieves that constitutionally prescribed goal will be the legitimate president-elect.

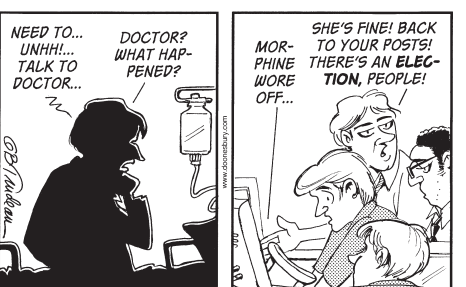
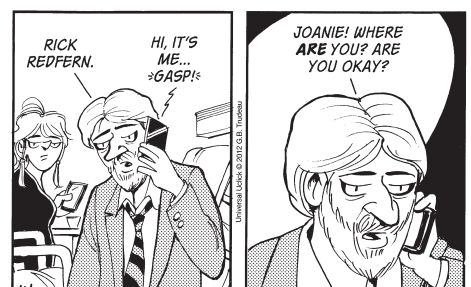

# Hearing Begins for Suspect in Afghanistan Massacre

**SEATTLE (AP)** • The U.S. soldier accused of carrying out one of the worst atrocities of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars is due to appear in a military courtroom Monday, where prosecutors will for the first time lay out their case that he slaughtered 16 people, including children, during a predawn raid on two villages in the Taliban's heartland.

Staff Sgt. Robert Bales, a father of two from Lake Tapps, Wash., is accused of slipping away from a remote outpost in southern Afghanistan early on March 11 with an M-4 rifle outfitted with a grenade launcher to attack the villages of Balandi and Alkozai, in the dangerous Panjwai district of Kandahar Province.

The massacre left 16 dead — nine of them children, and 11 of them members of the same family. Six others were wounded, and some of the bodies set afire.

Monday marks the start of a preliminary hearing, called an Article 32 hearing, before an investigative officer charged with recommending whether Bales'

case should proceed to a court-martial. The hearing is scheduled to run as long as two weeks, and part of it will be held overnight to allow video testimony from witnesses in Afghanistan.

"This hearing is important for all of us in terms of learning what the government can actually prove," said Bales' attorney, John Henry Browne. "The defense's job is to get as much information as possible. That's what our goal is, in preparation for what is certainly going to be a court martial."

Bales, 39, is an Ohio native who joined the Army in late 2001 as his career as a stockbroker imploded. An arbitrator entered a \$1.5 million fraud judgment against him and his former company that went unpaid, and his attempt to start an investment firm in Florida also failed.

He was serving his fourth combat tour after three stints in Iraq, and his arrest prompted a national discussion about the stresses posed by multiple deployments.

# Despite Storm Damage, Election Officials Hopeful

**NEW YORK (AP)** • Power generators are being marshaled, polling locations moved and voting machines hurriedly put into place as officials prepare to hold a national election in storm-ravaged sections of New York and New Jersey barely a week after Superstorm Sandy.

Organizers expressed guarded confidence Sunday that the presidential vote will proceed with no major disruptions in most areas hit by the storm, though it was unclear whether the preparations would be enough to avoid depressed turnout in communities where people still lack power or have been driven from their damaged homes.

Some voters will be casting ballots in places different from their usual polls.

In Long Beach, N.Y., a barrier-island city that was inundated with water during the storm, the number of polling places will be cut to four, down from the usual 11. Residents of the devastated borough of Sea Bright, on the New Jersey shore, will have to drive two towns over to vote.

But with two days to go until Election Day, officials in both states said Sunday that they were overcoming many of their biggest challenges.

Hundreds of emergency generators have been rushed into place to ensure power at polling places, even if the neighborhoods around them are still dark. Electric utilities were putting a priority on restoring power to others and had assured election officials they would be up and running by Monday.

Of the 1,256 polling locations in New York City, only 59 needed to be moved or

closed, said Valerie Vazquez, a spokeswoman for the city's Board of Elections. Most were in coastal areas of Brooklyn and Queens or other neighborhoods where buildings normally used for voting had been turned into shelters.

Some New York City leaders remained worried. Mayor Michael Bloomberg noted that the polling-place changes would affect some 143,000 New Yorkers.

"Over the next day, it's going to be critical that the Board of Elections communicate this new information to their

poll workers," he said.

The board, which is independent of the mayor's office, has historically had problems opening all voting locations on time, even in a normal year, the mayor noted.

Just east of the city, in Nassau County, Elections Commissioner William Biamonte warned that some voting locations would have a "paramilitary look," with portable toilets, emergency lighting and voting machines running off a generator.

# Judge Extends Early Voting in Florida County

**ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)** • A judge extended early voting hours in one Florida county Sunday after Democrats sued to allow more time in a presidential battleground state where more than 4 million ballots have already been cast. The move was one of many legal skirmishes in the tight contest between Barack Obama and Mitt Romney to deal with inevitable disputes over balloting.

Some Florida voters stood in long lines Saturday, the last scheduled day of early voting. The judge ruled on a lawsuit filed late Saturday in Orange County after an early voting site was shut down for several hours. The Winter Park library was evacuated when a suspicious package — a cooler — was found outside. It was later detonated by a local bomb squad.

Orange County is part of the state's Interstate 4 corridor, a populous "swing" region that often determines the outcome of close elections.

A spokesman for the state Republican Party said it would not challenge the decision.

The Florida conflict was just the latest to emerge in a presidential race whose winner may be determined by how many people take advantage of early voting. Thirty-four states and the District of Columbia now allow early balloting, including Florida, whose 29 electoral votes make it the largest of the closely fought battlegrounds.

Early voting has been central to the Obama campaign's efforts to win Florida and other swing states. More Democrats than Republicans tend to vote early, and a sizable advantage among early voters in Florida in 2008 helped Obama defeat Republican rival John McCain.

# RIVALS STRESS DIFFERENCES DURING FINAL DAYS OF CAMPAIGN

**DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)** • Two days from judgment by the voters, President Barack Obama and Mitt Romney raced across competitive battleground states on Sunday, stressing differences on the economy, health care and more while professing a willingness to work across party lines to end gridlock in Washington.

"You have the power," Obama, the most powerful political leader in the world, told thousands of cheering supporters in New Hampshire as the race moved toward a close finish.

Boos from Romney's partisans in Cleveland turned to appreciative laughter when the Republican nominee began a sentence by saying, "If the president were to be elected," and ended it with, "It's possible but not likely."

After a campaign that began more than a year ago, late public opinion polls were unpredictably tight for the nationwide popular vote. But they suggested an advantage for the president in the state-by-state competition for electoral votes that will settle the contest.

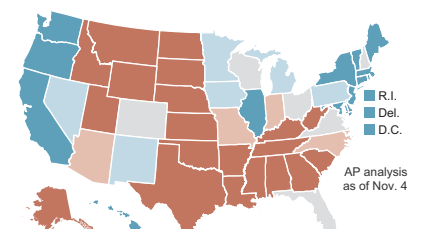
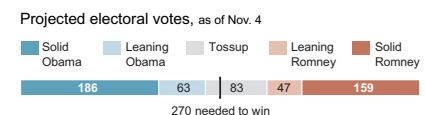
Conceding nothing, Romney set his first foray of the fall into Pennsylvania. The state last voted for a Republican presidential candidate in 1988, but the challenger and his allies began advertising heavily in the campaign's final days.

"He's offering excuses. I've got a plan" to fix the economy. "I can't wait for us to get started," Romney said in a new television commercial, possibly the last of the campaign, as he appeared in Iowa, Ohio, and Virginia as well as Pennsylvania.

In Des Moines, he said he would meet regularly with "good men and women on both sides of the aisle" in Congress. Later, in Cleveland, he said of Obama, "Instead of bridging the divide, he's

# Union Workers Strike at Supermarket Chain

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)** • Union workers at Raley's supermarket chain, which operates more than 100 stores in California and Nevada, went on strike Sunday after last-ditch efforts to reach a new contract failed.

The strike, which marked the first against Raley's in its 77-year-history, came after all-day talks Saturday. A midnight deadline was extended at the request of a federal mediator, but talks broke down around 2 a.m.

Sunday, said Mike Henneberry, a United Food and Commercial Workers Union spokesman.

"The company's position is fairly breathtaking. They really haven't changed much of any of their positions in the 15 months that we've been in talks," Henneberry said.

Union workers were staffing picket lines outside most of the chain's stores by 6 a.m. Sunday, he said.

Raley's spokesman John

Segale said that despite the strike and the picket lines, all of the company's stores were open Sunday as usual.

"It is unfortunate that after 15 months of talks and nearly 60 negotiation sessions, we were not able to agree on a new contract since it is clearly understood that we must reduce our operating costs to become more competitive against non-union retailers," Segale said.

The two sides have been at

odds over a proposed wage freeze, elimination of premium pay for Sunday shifts and health care benefits.

Raley's says it needs to cut costs in the face of a weak economy and competition from nonunionized companies that also sell groceries, such as Wal-Mart Stores Inc.

"We are under some fierce competition and we must reduce our costs to allow us to compete in the future," Segale said.

But union officials say the

chain has not agreed to a full audit of its finances, and has been bargaining in bad faith since contract negotiations began.

"They have decided what their position is and they're not going to change that," Henneberry said.

West Sacramento-based Raley's is a privately owned company that employs

13,000 people at 115 stores in California and 13 in Nevada operating under the Raley's name, as well as Bel Air Markets, Nob Hill Foods, Food Source and Aisle 1 Fuel Stations, according to its website.

The United Food and Commercial Workers says it represents 7,400 of the chain's employees.

## Money Matters Dominate Montana's 2012 Election

**HELENA, Mont. (AP)** • The Montana 2012 election season has been dominated by battles over money that promise to continue long after Election Day — thanks largely to the anonymous backers of a Virginia-based non-profit that Gov. Brian Schweitzer is now calling a "criminal organization."

Less than a week before the election, Schweitzer rallied a crowd against anonymous political money and American Tradition Partnership. The governor said the group is engaged in using "dirty, secret, corporate and foreign" money in a conspiracy to influence Montana elections.

"I'd be surprised if this doesn't end with some people in jail," Schweitzer told enthusiastic backers of an initiative on the ballot that opposes constitutional rights for corporations and declares their money is not protected speech.

The brouhaha served as a caper to an election year that has been as much about the influence of money as it was about candidates.

The state's race for governor ended in a court bat-

tle over a previously unheard of \$500,000 donation, federal courts tossed state laws governing money in politics in an ongoing tussle balancing free speech vs. political corruption, and mailboxes were flooded with exaggerated attack fliers. Money flooded into the race between U.S. Sen. Jon Tester and Denny Rehberg in an endless barrage of attack advertisements that no voter was able to miss.

Perhaps no group embodied the fight over campaign finance spending and laws than the secretive American Tradition Partnership. Originally launched in 2008 as Western Tradition Partnership by two Bozeman Republicans, it has since moved to the Washington D.C.-area and fought in court for two years to avoid requirements that it disclose its political spending and fundraising.

On Thursday, a district judge said he will sanction the group for failing to provide court-ordered records that state attorneys argue will show ATP is masquerading as a non-profit to avoid disclosure and election laws.

## BSU Falls Out of BCS Standings, AP Poll

**NEW YORK** • The Boise State Broncos suffered a close loss at home against the San Diego State Aztecs, and their spots in various college football polls suffered along with them.

The Broncos are unranked in the BCS standings and in the Associated Press Top 25 poll. However, BSU is still in the *USA Today* coaches' poll (No. 24) and in the Harris Interactive poll (No. 23).

After being tested for the first time this season Alabama and Oregon have held their spots at the top of The Associated Press college football poll.

A thrilling Saturday produced some great finishes but no upsets and few changes among the highest ranked teams.

Alabama, which scored late to beat LSU 21-17, is No. 1 for the 10th straight week. Oregon beat Southern California 62-51 and is No. 2 for the seventh consecutive week.

## What We Learned: State Quarterfinals

**E**leven football teams from District IV entered last weekend with visions of a state championship dancing in their heads.

Six of them had those dreams dashed, and only five remain.

That doesn't mean that all six that lost were pretenders or anything of the sort. In fact, we learned a little bit about just about every team.

Here's some of what we picked up on this last week.

**1. Dietrich is for real. No, seriously.**

I asked several coaches for their opinions ahead of last weekend's Castelford-Dietrich game. To a man, they leaned toward Castelford, in part because the Wolves' size figured to pose problems for Dietrich, and in part because the Blue Devils (outside of Carey in September) had largely played nobody on their way to be-

ing the last unbeaten team in the division. I agreed.

We all whiffed, big-time.

Dietrich proved itself to be both fast enough and physical enough, if not "big" enough, to systematically dismantle Castelford and make a statement to the rest of the division that it's a real threat to challenge for the title. Now a road trip to Salmon River beckons, but the Blue Devils are riding high on confidence after beating a team that's every bit as good as the one they'll face this week.

**2. Even the best 8-man football teams are usually a play away from disaster.**

Hagerman was already behind the 8-ball against Butte County on Friday night, but the second Kade

Kress' ankle gave out you just knew it was over for the defending state champions. Hagerman has good players at just about every position, but Kress was the anchor on both sides — quarterback and middle linebacker. Already down their backup quarterback, it was just too much to overcome.

Regardless of how good an 8-man team you can assemble, there's only so much you can do when one of the leading players sustains a game-ending injury. When it's the reigning state player of the year, forget about it. Marcus Emerson played admirably, but at that point the horse had already bolted.

**3. District IV is getting closer in the 4A ranks, but can't match the rest of the state yet.**

The scoreboard might not suggest it, but Minico and Twin Falls (and by proxy Jerome, which was a Great Basin Conference co-

champion but got bounced in a Kansas City playoff) were closer to the upper echelon of 4A football than they've been in a few years.

The Bruins held their own on the road with 2011 finalist (and currently No. 2-ranked) Middleton until the Vikings finally broke away in the fourth quarter. Minico battled against a quality Skyview team, but the Spartans couldn't get anything going with their bread and butter Wing-T ground game.

Last year the Bruins were beaten at home by a bad Preston team and Minico wasn't ready for life without Brady May, falling against Hillcrest. It won't give any solace to the seniors on either side, but the gap appears to be closing.

**4. Soft schedule or no soft schedule, Declo and Gooding are legit.**

It was also a landmark victory for the Aztecs (7-3, 5-1 Mountain West).

## Steelers Rally Past Giants 24-20

**EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J.** • Isaac Redman ran for 147 yards, and scored the winning touchdown from a yard out with 4:02 remaining Sunday as the Pittsburgh Steelers rallied past the New York Giants, 24-20.

The Steelers (5-3) snapped New York's four-game winning streak by overcoming some uncharacteristic sloppiness and dominating the second half.

Temporary relief from the destruction of Superstorm Sandy was what New York's fans sought, and the Giants (6-3) provided it for a while. But they couldn't stop Redman or touchdowns of 51 yards for Mike Wallace and 4 yards for Emmanuel Sanders on passes from Ben Roethlisberger.

The Steelers arrived in New Jersey hours before the game, which might have accounted for their carelessness. They had the fewest giveaways in the NFL entering the game, but were neglectful with the ball and in pass coverage; cornerback Keenan Lewis had 87 yards on two pass interference penalties, and they wasted some great kick returns, too.

### COLTS 23, DOLPHINS 20

**INDIANAPOLIS** • Andrew Luck broke the NFL's single-game rookie record by throwing for 433 yards in leading Indianapolis.

Luck was 30 of 48 with two TDs and broke Cam Newton's previous mark of 422 yards set last season. And it came on the day coach Chuck Pagano returned to Lucas Oil Stadium for the first time since being diagnosed with leukemia.

Indy (5-3) has won three straight.

Miami (4-4) got another strong performance from Ryan Tannehill, too. He went 22 of 38 for 290 yards with one TD.

The rookie quarterbacks traded jabs all day, but Luck's 36-yard TD pass to T.Y. Hilton gave Indy a 20-17 lead, and Adam Vinatieri's 43-yard field goal with 6:03 left broke a 20-20 tie.

### BUCCANEERS 42, RAIDERS 32

**OAKLAND, Calif.** • Rookie Doug Martin rushed for a franchise-record 251 yards and four touchdowns and Ahmad Black intercepted a Carson Palmer pass after Oakland had cut an 18-point deficit to three late in the fourth quarter.

Martin, who was born in Oakland, had a memorable homecoming for the Bucs (4-4) by scoring on runs of 1, 45, 67 and 70 yards in the second half as he gashed what had been an improved run defense for the Raiders (3-5).

Martin, the 31st pick in April out of Boise State, became the first back since at least 1940 to score on three TD runs of at least 45 yards in one game, according to STATS LLC.

### PACKERS 31, CARDINALS 17

**GREEN BAY, Wis.** • Tom

Crabtree had a 72-yard touchdown that was Green Bay's longest of the season, and Randall Cobb added two scoring catches.

The Packers (6-3) finished with a season-high 176 yards rushing on 39 carries, the first time in a month they've cracked the century mark.

James Jones also had a touchdown reception, and Green Bay goes into its bye week with a four-game winning streak.

The break comes at a good time for the Packers, who lost Clay Matthews, Jordy Nelson and Bryan Bulaga to injuries.

John Skelton was 23 of 46 for 306 yards, his most passing yardage since last December, but Arizona (4-5) lost its' fifth straight.

### TEXANS 21, BILLS 9

**HOUSTON** • Matt Schaub threw two touchdown passes and Arian Foster ran for 111 yards against Buffalo's NFL-worst rushing defense.

Andre Johnson caught eight passes for 118 yards and Foster scored for the fifth straight game for Houston (7-1).

Mario Williams had a sack and five tackles in his return to Reliant Stadium after he signed with the Bills (3-5) in the offseason. The Texans made Williams the No. 1 pick in the 2006 draft and he's still Houston's career sacks leader (53).

Schaub won for the 10th time in 11 starts. He completed 19 of 27 passes for 268 yards.

### PANTHERS 21, REDSKINS 13

**LANDOVER, Md.** • Cam Newton completed 13 of 23 passes for 201 yards with a touchdown and ran eight times for 37 yards and a score as Carolina snapped a five-game losing streak.

The Panthers (2-6) were in desperate need of a win after a series of close defeats that had players questioning whether the team had any leadership. Newton responded with one of his best games of the season, including a 19-yard touchdown pass to Steve Smith and an 82-yard completion that set up a score.

Robert Griffin III was 23 for 39 for 215 yards, ran 11 times for 53 yards and was sacked four times as the Redskins lost their third straight and fell to 3-6.

### BEARS 51, TITANS 20

**NASHVILLE, Tenn.** • Brian Urlacher became the latest Chicago defender to return an interception for a touchdown and Jay Cutler threw three TD passes to Brandon Marshall.

Cornerback Charles Tillman forced four fumbles and Chicago created five turnovers while winning its sixth in a row.

The Bears (7-1) scored a franchise-record 28 points in the first quarter. They took control by forcing three turnovers in the first 13 minutes and turning them into 14 points. Urlacher went 46 yards for his score.

The Titans (3-6) lost their second straight with Chicago

fans taking over LP Field, booing any video highlights featuring the rival Green Bay Packers and frequently chanting "Let's go, Bears."

Tennessee's lone highlight when Chris Johnson scored on an 80-yard run in the fourth quarter.

### SEAHAWKS 30, VIKINGS 20

**SEATTLE** • Marshawn Lynch ran for 124 yards and a touchdown, rookie QB Russell Wilson threw three first-half touchdowns, and Seattle overcame 182 yards rushing by Adrian Peterson.

The matchup between the top two rushers in the NFL — Peterson and Lynch — didn't disappoint with Peterson having his best game since 2008.

Lynch ran for a 3-yard TD in the third quarter, while Wilson threw TD passes of 11 yards to Sidney Rice, and TDs of 6 and 11 yards to Golden Tate for the Seahawks (5-4).

Peterson and the Vikings (5-4) had 197 yards rushing in the first half, but only had 46 yards rushing in the second half. Quarterback Christian Ponder was 11 of 22 for 63 yards.

### BRONCOS 31, BENGALS 23

**CINCINNATI** • Peyton Manning overcame a pair of interceptions by throwing three touchdown passes.

Trindon Holliday also returned a kickoff a Broncos-record 105 yards for a touchdown.

Manning improved to 8-0 career against Cincinnati (3-5), which has lost four in a row for the first time in two years. This win didn't come so easily.

The four-time MVP threw a pair of interceptions — one in the end zone — that led to 10 points and a 20-17 Cincinnati lead early in the fourth quarter.

That's when the Broncos (5-3) have been at their best.

Manning threw a 1-yard touchdown to tight end Joel Dreessen that put Denver back ahead. After Andy Dalton underthrew a pass under pressure that was picked off by Champ Bailey, Manning put it away with a 4-yard pass to Eric Decker with 3:36 remaining.

### RAVENS 25, BROWNS 15

**CLEVELAND** • Joe Flacco threw a 19-yard touchdown pass to Torrey Smith with 4:26 as Baltimore won its 11th straight game inside the AFC North.

Smith caught Flacco's strike and spun away from cornerback Joe Haden as the Ravens (6-2) beat the Browns (2-7) for the 10th consecutive time. It was also Baltimore's 15th straight win following a loss, and helped the Ravens shake off a 30-point loss to Houston two weeks ago.

Baltimore improved to 5-0 after a bye week under coach John Harbaugh, who is 10-0 in his career against Cleveland.

Phil Dawson kicked five field goals for the Browns.

Our water system recently violated a drinking water requirement. Although this incident was not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened and what we did (are doing) to correct this situation.

A routine inspection conducted on February 23, 2012 by the DEQ found several things that we deficient. The well casing for well # 1 was not vented and not sealed. The pump house for well #1 was not clean or in good repair and needs and an overflow. Need a sample site plan and wells that are no longer in service need to be abandoned. Need injection pump for liquid chemicals.

As required by Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) Ground Water Rule, we were required to take action to [correct this deficiency/address the fecal-indicator positive source sample]. However, we failed to take this action by the deadline established by [insert primacy agency name].

## TODAY IN HISTORY

## On this date:

In 1605, the “Gunpowder Plot” failed as Guy Fawkes was seized before he could blow up the English Parliament.

In 1781, the Continental Congress elected John Hanson of Maryland its chairman, giving him the title of “President of the United States in Congress Assembled.”

In 1872, suffragist Susan B. Anthony defied the law by attempting to cast a vote for President Ulysses S. Grant. (Anthony was convicted by a judge and fined \$100, but she never paid the fine.)

In 1911, aviator Calbraith P. Rodgers arrived in Pasadena, Calif., completing the first transcontinental airplane trip in 49 days.

In 1940, President Franklin D. Roosevelt won an unprecedented third term in office as he defeated Republican challenger Wendell L. Willkie.

In 1968, Richard M. Nixon won the presidency, defeating Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and American Independent candidate George C. Wallace.

In 1974, Ella T. Grasso was elected governor of Connecticut, becoming the first woman to win a gubernatorial office without succeeding her husband.

In 1987, Supreme Court nominee Douglas H. Ginsburg admitted using marijuana several times in the 1960s and 70s, calling it a mistake. (Ginsburg ended up withdrawing his nomination.)

In 1990, Rabbi Meir Kahane, the Brooklyn-born Israeli extremist, was shot to death at a New York hotel. (Egyptian native El Sayyed Nosair was convicted of the slaying in federal court.)

In 1992, Malice Green, a black motorist, died after he was struck in the head 14 times with a flashlight by a Detroit police officer, Larry Nevers, outside a suspected crack house. (Nevers and his partner, Walter Budzyn, were found guilty of second-degree murder, but the convictions were overturned; they were later convicted of involuntary manslaughter.)

In 2009, a shooting rampage at the Fort Hood Army post in Texas left 13 people dead; Maj. Nidal Hasan, an Army psychiatrist, was charged with premeditated murder and attempted murder.

Ten years ago: In midterm elections, Republicans won control of the Senate and strengthened their hold on the House while claiming a majority of the governors' races. Securities and Exchange Commission Chairman Harvey Pitt resigned under pressure after a series of political missteps that had embarrassed the White House. Randy Johnson won his record-tying fourth straight National League Cy Young Award.

Five years ago: Hollywood writers went on strike, forcing late-night talk shows to immediately start airing reruns. Police in major Pakistani cities fired tear gas and clubbed lawyers protesting President Gen. Pervez Musharraf's emergency rule. Talk show host Oprah Winfrey promised to “clean house” after a dorm matron was accused of abusing students at Winfrey's school for disadvantaged South African girls. Joe Torre was introduced as the new manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers, less than three weeks after walking away from the New York Yankees.

One year ago: Former Penn State defensive coordinator Jerry Sandusky, accused of molesting eight boys, was arrested and released on \$100,000 bail after being arraigned on 40 criminal counts. (Sandusky was later convicted and sentenced to 30 to 60 years in prison for sexual abuse of 10 boys over a 15-year period.)



# THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

*"A throw of the dice will never eliminate chance."*

In a recent Junior European Championship, the Greek team, sitting North-South here, put in a serious entry for the luckiest board not only of the tournament but of the decade! The defense can cash out spades against three no-trump, while five clubs appears to have two top spade losers and an inevitable heart loser.

At the table, though, North's conservative bid of four clubs set South up for his inspired bid of four diamonds, naturally raised by North to five diamonds. Remarkably, the 4-3 fit is the only available game for North-South because of the spade ruff in the short trump hand. When West led a spade, East won the king, cashed the next spade, then played a heart.

However, declarer simply refused the heart finesse and ruffed a spade in dummy, bringing his total to 11 tricks: four diamonds, five clubs, the heart ace and the spade ruff. Of course, he needed to guess the trumps well, since when he led the third spade from hand and West ruffed in with the jack, declarer still had to find the trump 10, but he did so.

Note that if East had played back a heart before cashing the spades, it prevents the ruff in dummy. However, declarer would simply have taken the heart ace, drawn trumps, and discarded two spades on dummy's clubs before setting up a heart. Similarly, if the opening lead had been a minor, South would have cashed three rounds of trumps and again discarded his spades on dummy's clubs.
