What's Next?

TWIN FALLS • After the celebrations and disappointments of Tuesday night election results, newly elected legislators in Magic Valley are looking to the 2013 legislative session.

They have a lot on the to-do list. In the next several months, elected officials have to make big decisions on education, Affordable Care Act options, the state budget and personal property tax.

Though voters defeated Propositions 1, 2 and 3, the Legislature can pass parts of the ed-

ucation reform package in different forms. Rep. Donna Pence, D-Gooding, said she hopes stakeholders – such as teachers, school boards and government officials – can sit

down before the session begins and discuss common ground. Pence said she can see Proposition 3 –

which dealt with technology, laptops and online courses — coming back with more local control. Instead of giving every school district the same laptops or money for technology, for example, Pence suggested turning that money into technology grants and awarding money to districts that need it.

"It's targeted for what the specific school needed," Pence said.

Propositions 1, 2 and 3, legislators

Senator-elect Jim Patrick, R-Twin Falls, said he could see open negotiations for teacher contracts making a comeback.

But Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, said legislators should have a cooling-off period before discussing re-implementation.

Bell did say she thinks teachers should receive their earned merit pay — which hasn't yet been doled out.

Miller and Pence Win Legislative Races

HAILEY • After absentee ballots held up the counting process, Blaine County released its final election results early Wednesday morning.

Its votes determined the fortunes of two Idaho House races, as well as several ballot items within the county itself:

The Legislature

For the first time since 2004, District 26 residents will be represented by at least one Republican in the Statehouse.

Republican Steve Miller beat Democrat John Remington for the open House seat in the district – previously dubbed District 25, but still covering Blaine, Camas, Gooding and Lincoln counties.

TWIN FALLS • Now that voters have overturned all three Students Come First laws, educators are left with a lot of unanswered questions.

Voters voiced strong opposition to Propositions 1, 2 and 3 during Tuesday's election.

Public schools chief Tom Luna released a statement Wednesday about the election results.

He wrote that although Idaho residents have "expressed concerns," he said he doesn't believe anyone wants to go back to the old educational system.

"I am as committed as anyone to finding a way to make this happen," he said in the statement. "We must find a way because our children's future is at stake."

Melissa McGrath, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Education, said the department wouldn't comment further Wednesday.

Propositions 1 and 2 each failed by roughly 58 percent.

Proposition 3 — which would have provided a laptop for every public high school teacher and student — was rejected by nearly 67 percent of voters.

Earlier this month, the state announced an eight-year, \$180 million contract with Hewlett-Packard to provide laptop computers to high schools.

The contract with HP is now

void following Tuesday's election outcome.

It also means a stop to the \$9 million in technology funding per year to school districts, the online class graduation requirement and Dual Credit for Early Completers program.

In 2011, legislators passed the Students Come First package of education reform laws. It's just the second year school laws were in place.

Despite Tuesday's election results, area school district superintendents say it's business as usual for teachers and students in classrooms.

Dow Loses 313 in **Post-election Sell-off**

NEW YORK • Wall Street greeted a second Obama term the way it greeted the first. Investors dumped stocks Wednesday in the sharpest sell-off of the year.

The Dow closed down 312.95 points, or 2.4 percent, at 12,932.73 — its first close below 13,000 since Aug. 2.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 33.86 points, or 2.4 percent, to 1,394. The Nasdaq composite index lost 74.64 points, or 2.5 percent, to 2.937.29.

Hidden History

THE TOWN OF ROCK CREE

ROCK CREEK • Yes, there was life here before I.B. Perrine and his irrigation system.

A town was born where Rock Creek exits the South Hills near the intersection of the Kelton Road and the Old Oregon Trail.

But this town may not be the Rock Creek you are thinking of.

In 1863, the Rock Creek Stage Station was established by the Ben Holladay Stage and Freight Line. The Rock Creek Store was built next to the station in 1965 by James Bascom. For a short time, the store was the only trading post on the Oregon Trail between Ft. Hall and Ft. Boise.

German emigrant Herman Stricker purchased the store from Bascom in 1876 and homesteaded the surrounding acreage on Rock Creek. The Stricker family operated the store until 1897.

A small piece of the property is now owned by the Idaho State Historical Society, and is known as

Rock Creek Station and Stricker Homesite - or "Stricker Ranch" for short.

Meanwhile, about two miles upstream from Stricker Ranch sits what little is left of the all-butforgotten town of Rock Creek.

According to most accounts, Rock Creek began shortly after the stage and freight line came through the area. The town had a post office by 1871, and a school by 1878. By 1900, 146 people lived in the greater Rock Creek area, including those at Stricker Ranch.

The area was populated mostly by cattle ranchers and farmers.

One notable resident was John F. Hansen, originally from Denmark. Hansen moved to Idaho in 1876, after reading a published letter written by local pioneer James Iverson.

"In this land of eternal sunshine lies opportunity for all in a health giving climate unequaled anywhere," Iverson said of Rock Creek.

Hansen first settled in the Oakley area, where he taught school. He later farmed near Cottonwood Creek.

Eventually, Hansen moved to Rock

Creek, where he opened a store. The town also boasted a pool hall, hotel and a candy store.

Just after the turn of the 20th Century, I.B. Perrine founded the city of Twin Falls and the Twin Falls Irrigation Tract. Soon, the railroad entered the area along the south side of the Snake River.

In 1905, a townsite was being surveyed along the railroad, seven miles east of Twin Falls and seven miles north of Rock Creek. Investors made Hansen an offer he couldn't refuse: if he would relocate his store from Rock Creek to the new town, they would name the town after him.

Hansen moved his store, and the investors made good on their promise.

Lawrence Tiffany, 54, of Jackpot died from injuries sustained in the crash. According to a report from ISP, Tiffany attempted to turn left onto 1700 East in his 1996 Dodge pickup when he

failed to yield to oncoming traffic.

Tiffany's vehicle was struck by a 1999 Freightliner semi driven by Chris Larson, 49, of Townsend, Mont.

Larson was headed south and Tiffany was driving northbound when the crash occurred, the report states.

Larson was not injured, according to the report. Traffic was reduced to one lane for nearly four hours as crews worked to clear the roadway.

ISP is still investigating the crash.

LINCOLN COUNTY SHERIFF KEEPS JOB, COMMISSIONER UNSEATED

TWIN FALLS • Lincoln County voters decided to keep their sheriff Tuesday night, but unseated an incumbent county commissioner.

Republican Cresley Mc-Connell unseated incumbent independent Charles Ritter from his county commissioner position.

McConnell, 44, said he shook a lot of hands and visited as many people he could during his campaign. As a county commissioner, McConnell said he hopes to work with fellow commissioners and Lincoln County residents to restore peace and good order to the county. Mc-Connell said the county is facing lawsuits from former employees and he hopes to avoid more in the future.

"Counties have monies that are budgeted and any time there's a lawsuit and over-expenditure, an you've got to take some money from somewhere else," he said.

This is McConnell's first time running and first time serving in public office.

The 1987 Shoshone High School graduate said he's been married for 25 years and has two children, one who is a senior at Dietrich

High School and one who is serving in the military and stationed at Fort Drum in New York.

During his campaign, McConnell said he heard many problems the public has and he hopes they'll learn more about county government and attend commissioner meetings to try resolve the issues.

Ritter did not immediately return a phone call from the Times-News Wednesday afternoon.

Lincoln County Sheriff Kevin Ellis, a Republican, handily beat his two write-in competitors, Mike Bright, a Republican, and the county's emergency management coordinator, and independent candidate Daniel Ward, who got 9 and 4 percent of the vote respectively. Bright challenged Ellis in this spring's Republican primary, but also lost to the sitting sheriff then.

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

Former Texas Coach Royal Dies at Age 88

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) • A son of Depression-era Oklahoma, Darrell Royal came to Texas to take over a sleeping giant of a football program. Over 20 years, his folksy approach to sports and life, his inventive wishbone offense and a victory in the "Game of the Century" – where a U.S. president declared his team national champion – made him an icon of college football.

Royal, who won two national championships and turned the Longhorns into a national power, died early Wednesday at age 88 of complications from cardiovascular disease, school spokesman Bill Little said. Royal also suffered from Alzheimer's disease.

Royal didn't have a single losing season in his 23 years as a head coach at Texas, Mississippi State and Washington. Known for their stout defenses and punishing running attacks, his Texas teams boasted a 167-47-5 record from 1957-1976, the best mark in the nation over that period.

"It was fun," Royal told The Associated Press in 2007. "All the days I was coaching at Texas, I knew this would be my last coaching job. I knew it when I got here."

It almost didn't happen. Royal wasn't Texas' first choice.

Texas was coming off a l-9 season in 1956 — still the worst in program history and wanted a high-profile punter, and he credited hard work and luck for his success on the field and later as a coach. He had a self-deprecating style and a knack for delivering pithy quotes – or "Royalisms" – about his team and opponents.

"Football doesn't build character, it eliminates the weak ones," was one of Royal's famous lines.

"Luck is when preparation meets opportunity," was another.

"He was a guy who was so strong and so determined and so direct about things," said former Texas quarterback James Street. "He was that way to the very end."

Royal and assistant Emory Ballard changed the football landscape in 1968 with the development of the wishbone, which features a fullback lined up behind the quarterback and a step in front of two other backs. The innovation nearly flopped. After a tie and loss in the first two games that season, a frustrated Royal inserted backup Street to take over. "Coach Royal grabbed me and he looked for a minute as if he were having second thoughts about putting me in. Then he looked me straight in the eye and said, 'Hell, you can't do any worse. Get in there," Street said

Texas won its next 30 games. Soon, rival Oklahoma and other schools started using the wishbone as well. "The University of Oklahoma joins the rest of the nation in celebrating the life's work of Darrell Royal," said Oklahoma athletic director Joe Castiglione. "We've truly lost an icon – a champion, an innovator and an educator." The national title season in 1969 included what was dubbed the "Game of the Century," a come-from-behind, 15-14 victory by the top-ranked Longhorns over No. 2 Arkansas to cap the regular season. In Texas lore, it ranks as the greatest game ever played. President Richard Nixon, an avid football fan, flew in by helicopter to watch. Afterward, Nixon greeted Royal with a plaque in the Texas locker room proclaiming Texas the national champion. The Longhorns also were named national champions by United Press International in 1970, a year in which Texas lost its final game to Notre Dame in the Cotton Bowl and finished 10-1. Royal was among the first football coaches in the nation to hire an academic counselor - sometimes referred to as a "brain coach" in that era - to ensure athletes went on to graduate. He also set aside a fund for a special "T" ring, which players received upon graduation. Royal also served as Texas athletic director from 1962-1979. "I want to be remembered as a winning coach, but also as an honest and ethical coach," Royal said in 1975. The youngest of six children born to Katy and B.R. "Burley" Royal, he grew up in tiny Hollis, Okla., where he chopped cotton as a young boy for 10-cents an hour to help his family through the Depression. His mother died before he was 6 months old, and he lost two sisters to a fever epidemic.

She loved to tell stories around the campfire, and be the bear in the bush – shaking the branches to scare the grandkids in the wilderness. She will be rewith fond membered memories.

coach to turn things around. The Longhorns were rebuffed by Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd and Michigan State's Duffy Daugherty, but both coaches encouraged Texas to hire the 32-year-old Royal, who was lying in bed the night he got the call summoning him to Austin.

"Edith, this is it, this is the University of Texas," Royal told his wife.

Royal led the Longhorns to a 6-3-1 record in his first season, but he was so sickened by Mississippi's 39-7 thrashing of his team in the Sugar Bowl that he gave away the commemorative bowl watch he received.

Under Royal, Texas won 11 Southwest Conference titles, 10 Cotton Bowl championships and national championships in 1963 and 1969, going 11-0 each time. The Longhorns also won a share of the 1970 national title, earning him a national stature that rivaled that of Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant and Ohio State's Woody Hayes. Royal was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1983.

A public memorial ceremony is scheduled for noon Tuesday at the Frank Erwin Center basketball arena. Royal will be buried at the Texas State Cemetery in Austin, an honor typically reserved for the state's military and political leaders.

On Saturday, the Longhorns will honor Royal at their home game against Iowa State by wearing "DKR" stickers on their helmets and by lining up in the wishbone formation, which Royal used to such great success, for their first offensive snap.



One component of the law phased out a form of continuing contracts that essentially served as tenure for teachers. New teachers have received one- or two-year contracts.

The law also limited the scope of negotiations between school districts and teachers unions to salaries and benefits. And negotiations had to take place during open sessions.

Dave Gibson, president of the Twin Falls Education Association, said the "no" vote on Proposition 1 will have a huge impact on negotiations and contracts.

Teachers union representatives and Twin Falls School District officials were already talking about the possible impact of the election during spring negotiations sessions.

Will Teachers Get Bonuses?

Proposition 2 covered pay-

for-performance for teachers.

A timeline released last week by Luna's office shows funding will go out to school districts and public charter schools Nov. 15.

Then, administrators are scheduled to distribute money to teachers from Nov. 15 to Dec. 15.

Luna told the *Times-News* last month that if educators earned a bonus, "it's absolutely critical that they get it."

But when a total of about \$38 million goes out later this month, "it still doesn't guarantee that teachers who earn the money are going to receive it," he said.

In a Nov. 1 email to school districts, Luna said he was working with the Idaho attorney general's office to answer whether districts will have the authority to distribute the bonus money.

In Jerome, Layne said the future of pay-for-perform-ance is a big issue.

He said the district will have to get a legal interpretation about whether to move forward with distributing merit pay to teachers.

Gibson, also the co-chairman of the Twin Falls School District's pay-for-performance committee, said the money teachers earned last

year will still be paid out.

But Dobbs said he has heard it both ways — that payments will go out and that they will not go out.

Local Reactions

Gibson, a music teacher at Morningside Elementary School, said his initial reaction to the election results is that "we had essentially the result that we expected."

"It seems to me that it was a pretty important issue on the ballot," he said.

Gibson said Students Come First wasn't just an issue for teachers or partisan voters.

It affected everyone, he said, and is an issue "about education and about children."

"It should have been a clear message to the Legislature that they need to go about this in a different way," he said.

He said he still wants to see education reform, and that union members want to work with legislators.

Jerome teacher Jay Ostler said he wasn't surprised by Tuesday's votes. He said it's his personal opinion that everyone is on the same page as far as putting students first – and election results don't change that.

But there's obviously a difference in opinion about how that should be done, he said.

Ostler said there's sometimes a tendency to forget that the people who know students best are the ones teaching them on a day-today basis.

Gooding Superintendent Heather Williams said the election results were consistent with what she was hearing in the community.

"We're really uncertain about how it will impact a lot of day-to-day operations," she said.

Dobbs said the main issue with the legislation among educators he talked with is "the way the laws were conceived in isolation."

As for the coming weeks, Dobbs said school district administrators are waiting for direction from the state.

It's unclear at this point what will happen with the money that's attached to the Students Come First laws.

School districts are already in the middle of their budget years.

Dobbs said what happens with funding associated with Propositions 2 and 3 "has us more than a little nervous."

He said he hopes there won't be any drastic changes in funding, because it could be "very detrimental to the school system."

In Castleford, Superintendent Andy Wiseman said they're in a "wait and see mode" on direction from the state.

"I think at this point we're a little bit unsure as far as what the state's action might be," he said.

Former Teen Detention Worker Charged

BOISE • The former safety and security supervisor at the Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections facility in Nampa has been charged with sexually abusing a juvenile offender.

Julie McCormick was charged with felony lewd conduct with a child under the age of 16 on Friday in Canyon County's 3rd District Court. A statement from the Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections said she was fired from her job at the Juvenile Corrections Center-Nampa in August after seven years with the department. The detention center is designed to house about 84 male and female juveniles between the ages of 13 and 20.

It was not immediately

clear if McCormick had an attorney, and she could not be immediately reached.

Officials with the Idaho Department of Juvenile Correction declined to comment on the details of the case, saying it was a personnel matter. But spokesman Monty Prow released a prepared statement saying the charges came after the department asked the Nampa Police Department to investigate. "IDJC is committed to providing safe and secure facilities for juveniles and staff that deliver the best opportunity for rehabilitation and competency development for juveniles committed to our care," the statement said.

The department did not say if the investigation came as a result of allegations raised in a whistleblower lawsuit brought by a group of current and former department employees.

Woman Faces Intimidation Charge in Murder Case

BOISE • A woman who police say tried to harass a witness who testified against her mother in a murder trial faces a felony witness intimidation charge.

The Idaho Statesman reports that 39-year-old Stacie Lynn Duval was arrested Friday but left jail on a \$50,000 bond.

She's scheduled to appear in 4th District Court on Thursday.

Duval is the daughter of 59-year-old Katherine Lea Stanfield, who was convicted in June of first-degree murder for killing a 2-yearold Wyatt Fesler in the daycare she operated. The boy was the son of Duval's boyfriend at the time.

Police say Duval tried to harass an 80-year-old witness who testified for the prosecution at Stanfield's trial.

Stanfield in August was sentenced to life in prison, and must serve at least 10 years before the possibility of parole.

Prosecutors said Stanfield violently slammed the boy's head into a hard object three times in December 2009, apparently over his unwillingness to take off his coat.

Feds Ask for Extension on Waste Cleanup at INL

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • The U.S. Department of Energy has asked Idaho officials for an extension of one year on deadlines involving cleanup of high-level radioactive waste at the Idaho National Laboratory in eastern Idaho.

The *Post Register* reports in a story published Wednesday that the federal agency failed to meet a September deadline to begin treating the waste at the Integrated Waste Treatment Unit, and it will also miss a Dec. 31 deadline to submit a schedule for processing the

waste.

The 900,000 gallons of waste came from processing spent nuclear fuel from U.S. Navy ships. Plans call for converting the waste into a solid form and removing it from the INL. Currently it's stored in tanks at the INL's Idaho Nuclear Technology and Engineering Center.

"We've had technical issues'' with the treatment of this waste, DOE spokesman Brad Bugger said. "We will eventually complete these milestones." Officials said the delay was caused because nonradioactive material clogged a filter at the Integrated Waste Treatment Unit.

The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality is taking public comments on the request for the extension.

"We recognize that this is a mixed-waste radioactive unit, it's challenging to complete the process," said Department of Environmental Quality spokesman Brian Monson.

Missing the deadlines

means the state could start imposing fines of \$10,000 a day, though Monson said no decision has been made on that.

"We're very hopeful that the facility is going to get up and running," Monson said. "That's what everybody is looking for."

Because the extension request is for a year or more, it automatically triggered the public comment period in Idaho.

"We remain optimistic that the extension will be granted," Bugger said.

Voters Approve Amendment on Hunting and Fishing

BOISE• Idaho voters have agreed to amend the state constitution to protect forever the right to hunt, fish and trap.

As returns trickled in Tuesday night, it was clearly early on HJR2 would gain wide support in a state where hunting and fishing are immensely popular and important drivers of local economies.

By early Wednesday morning, with 59 percent of Idaho's 947 precincts reporting, the constitutional amendment had won support from 74.3 percent of voters. Results showed that not a single county came close to voting down HJR, though no results had been reported from central Idaho's Blaine County, which served as the epicenter of some of the opposition generated by the measure.

Idaho now joins 13 other states that have added similar language into their state constitutions.

Idaho lawmakers have made several attempts to approve a constitutional amendment preserving the right to hunt, fish and trap. But each time, the idea was opposed by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission. This year, however, the commission endorsed it. The Idaho Department of Fish and Game did not take an official position.

The amendment, approved by Republicans and Democrats alike during the 2012 Legislature, is worded in a way that enables IDFG to continue managing hunting and fishing and to set regulations on trapping. In making their case for the constitutional amendment, supporters claimed protections are essential to preserving the right to hunt, fish and trap for future generations. They also see a constitutional amendment as a necessary firewall against efforts by out-of-state animal rights activists or changing public attitudes to curtail those activities.

"We live here in Idaho because we like the outdoors ... and all this does is protects for future generations that ability to go out and hunt and fish or trap," said Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, who led the legislative effort to get the question on the ballot.

The amendment collected yes votes from more than 80 percent of voters in several counties, including Benewah, Bingham, Butte, Cassia, Clearwater, Franklin, Fremont, Jefferson, Jerome, Lewis, Lincoln, Madison, Minedoka and Oneida.

Despite the overwhelming support at the ballot box, the measure had detractors — especially with the inclusion of trapping.

Critics say trapping remains cruel and inhumane and a means of taking wildlife that doesn't enjoy the same overwhelming public support as hunting and fishing.

On the other end of the opposition spectrum, academics said the Idaho constitution was never intended to protect activities like hunting, fishing or trapping. State or federal constitutions, they say, are best used to protect the rights shared by all citizens, such as voting or freedom of speech.

America's 57th presidential election revealed that a second important national institution is on an unsustainable trajec-



tory. The first, the entitlement state, is endangered by improvident promises to an aging population. It is now joined by the political party whose crucial current function is to stress the need to reform this state. And now the Republican Party, like today's transfer-payment state, is endangered by tardiness in recognizing that demography is destiny.


Perhaps Mitt Romney lost the 2012 election on Sept. 22, 2011, when, alarmed by Texas Gov. Rick Perry's entry into the Republican nomination race, he rushed to Perry's right regarding immigration, attacking the DREAM Act. He would go on to talk about forcing illegal immigrants into "self-deportation." It is surprising that only about 70 percent of Hispanics opposed Romney.

As it has every four years since 1992, the white portion of the turnout declined in 2012. In 2008, Barack Obama became the first person elected president while losing the white vote by double digits. In 2012 — the year after the first year in which a majority of babies born in America were minorities — Hispanics were for the first time a doubledigit (10 percent) portion of the turnout. Republicans have four years to figure out how to leaven their contracting base with millions more members of America's largest and fastest-growing minority.

Romney's melancholy but useful role has been to refute those determinists who insist that economic conditions are almost always decisive. Americans are earning less and worth less than they were four years ago; average household income is down \$3,800; under the 11 presidents from Harry Truman through George W. Bush, unemployment was 8 percent or more for a total of 39 months but was over that for 43 Obama months. Yet voters preferred the president who presided over this to a Republican who, more than any candidate since the Great Depression, made his economic expertise his presidential credential.

Voters littered the political landscape with contradictions between their loudly articulated discontents and their observable behavior. Self-identified conservatives outnumber self-identified liberals 2-1 in a nation that has reelected the most liberal president since Lyndon Johnson and his mentor Franklin Roosevelt. A nation said to be picnicking on the slope of a volcano, with molten anger bubbling just below its thin and brittle crust, has matched a rare record of stability in its central political office: For only the second time — the first was the Virginia dynasty of the third, fourth and fifth presidents, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison and James Monroe — there will be three consecutive two-term presidents.

A nation vocally disgusted with the status quo has reinforced it by ratifying existing control of the executive branch and both halves of the legislative branch. After three consecutive "wave" elections in which a party gained at least 20 House seats, and at a moment when approval of Congress has risen - yes, risen - to 21 percent, voters ratified Republican control of the House, keeping in place those excoriated as obstructionists by the president the voters retained. Come January, Washington will be much as it has been, only more so. Obama is only the second president (Andrew Jackson was the first) to win a second term with a reduced percentage of the popular vote, and the third (after James Madison and Woodrow Wilson) to win a second term with a smaller percentage of the electoral vote. A diminished figure after conducting the most relentlessly negative campaign ever run by an incumbent, his meager mandate is to not be Bain Capital. Foreshadowing continuing institutional conflict, which the constitutional system not only anticipates but encourages, Speaker John Boehner says of the House Republican caucus: "We'll have as much of a mandate as he will? The electoral vote system, so incessantly and simplemindedly criticized, has again performed the invaluable service of enabling federalism - presidents elected by the decisions of the states' electorates - to deliver a constitutional decisiveness that the popular vote often disguises. Republicans can take some solace from the popular vote. But unless they respond to accelerating demographic changes - and Obama, by pressing immigration reform, can give Republicans a reef on which they can wreck themselves – the 58th presidential election may be like the 57th, only more so. This election was fought over two issues as old as the Republic, the proper scope and actual competence of government. The president persuaded – here the popular vote is the decisive datum - almost exactly half the voters. The argument continues. As Benjamin Disraeli said, "Finality is not the language of politics?

"It's a long list why I think (Romney) would have been better for Wyoming," Mead said. "As I viewed the presidential election, I saw that Congress hasn't passed a budget. Our debt and deficit continue to go up, unemployment remains too high. And I don't think the current administration has a full appreciation of what the value of affordable American energy is to the economy?"

Mead said he had been impressed by Romney's emphasis on a sound energy policy, including his recognition of the value of coal.

Wyoming's in-house state fiscal analysts last month projected that coal production in the state is on pace to decline 8.7 percent, or about 40 million tons, in 2012. While coal from the Powder River Basin has a history of lowcost energy production, the analysts reported that it faces increased competition from natural gas while older power plants in the nation face increasing federal environmental regulations.

Federal figures released this summer projected that the share of U.S. electricity coming from coal was expected to dip below 40 percent this year, the lowest level since the government began collecting data in 1949. Four years ago, it was 50 percent, and by the end of this decade, it is likely to be near 30 percent.

Coal stocks fell Wednesday with Obama's re-election. His administration has proposed new environmental regulations on coal-fired power plants

try to block federal coal leases in the Powder River Basin on the grounds that burning coal mined there would contribute to global warming. The groups have failed to get traction in the courts so far.

Connie Wilbert, field organizer for the Sierra Club in Wyoming, said Wednesday her group fundamentally supports Obama's approach.

Mead also said he disagrees with Obama's signature health care overhaul, the Affordable Care Act. Mead led Wyoming to join other states in a federal lawsuit challenging the law that resulted in the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling this summer upholding most of the law.

Mead says he intends to decide by next month whether to recommend to state lawmakers that the state expand eligibility for Medicaid, a joint statefederal health program.



Ex-prosecutor Gets Prison Deal in Vegas Drug Case

LAS VEGAS • A former prosecutor-turned-fugitive who once handled the high-profile Las Vegas drug cases of celebrities Paris Hilton and Bruno Mars was sentenced Wednesday to a reduced term of 12 to 30 months in prison term following his return from Mexico.

David Schubert, 49, fled there to avoid jail after pleading guilty in a crack cocaine possession case. In court Thursday, he didn't apologize as he stood for sentencing before Clark County District Court Judge Carolyn Ellsworth, defense attorney Louis Schneider said.

"He feels as if he shouldn't have even been there," Schneider said later.

Instead, Schubert told the

judge he felt he'd been treated exceptionally harshly for his March 2011 arrest with \$40 in rock cocaine and an unregistered handgun in his car.

Ellsworth revoked a sentence that she imposed in February that would have Schubert serve nine months in county jail as a requirement of probation. But she also cut his prison term from a possible 16 to 40 months, gave Schubert 40 days credit for time served and ordered him enrolled in a prison substance abuse program.

Schneider said Schubert was grateful for the reduced sentence and opportunity for treatment and said he hopes to resume practicing law in the future. Schubert's law license was suspended by the state Supreme Court just before he fled to Mexico on Sept. 21. He was ar-

rested at the border Sept. 30 while re-entering the U.S. after spending time in the Mexican coastal resort towns of Rosarito Beach and Ensenada.

Thom Gover, the deputy Nevada state attorney general who prosecuted the case, called Schubert's revised sentence appropriate.

"If the interest of justice and rehabilitation is the goal, one to 2 1/2 years is enough," Gover said.

The sentence was first reported Wednesday by the Las Vegas Review-Journal.

Schubert resigned from the Clark County district attorney's office after his March 2011 arrest and pleaded guilty in September 2011 to felony unlawful possession of a controlled substance. Felony conspiracy, weapon and drug use charges were dropped under a plea deal that avoided trial.

Schubert expected mandatory probation and a chance to wipe the felony conviction from his record. But Ellsworth rejected the plea deal in February, berating Schubert as "a disgrace to his oath as a prosecutor and a lawyer? and declaring that Schubert wouldn't get special treatment.

Among the high-profile cases Schubert handled were plea deals that spared both Hilton and Mars from serving jail time.

Hilton, 30, was arrested in August 2010 after police said 0.8 grams of cocaine fell out of her handbag following a Las Vegas Strip traffic stop. The celebrity socialite successfully completed a year of probation on misdemeanor cocaine possession and obstruction

charges.

Mars, 26, was cleared in January of a felony cocaine possession charge after staying out of trouble for a year and meeting other conditions of a plea deal. The Grammy-winning pop star, whose real name is Peter Hernandez, acknowledged in court in February 2011 that he had 2.6 grams of cocaine after a

performance at a Hard Rock Hotel & Casino nightclub.

Schubert told the Review-Journal during a jailhouse interview last month that he was ready to accept responsibility in his case.

"I did what I did, and I accept the consequences," he said. "But I don't feel I was treated fairly by the system."

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) . Elections officials across Utah on Wednesday counted thousands of provisional and absentee ballots cast by voters in the general election - the results of which won't be known for two weeks — but said they doubted the election's winners and losers would change despite the sheer number of ballots still to be processed.

Two big Utah races were particularly close, with Democratic Rep. Jim Matheson declaring victory in the 4th Congressional District over Saratoga Springs Mayor Mia Love by just 2,646 votes. Utah voters also were divided over whether some of the state's severance tax revenue from mining, oil and gas companies should be deposited into a rainy-day fund, with 51 percent voting in favor

How many ballots remained to be processed statewide wasn't known Wednesday, but in Salt Lake County, the number reached nearly 43,700.

Vote totals go before a canvassing board on Nov. 20.

Utah's general election ended with a Republican rout in just about every major race. The GOP secured wins for Gov. Gary Herbert, U.S. Sen. Orrin Hatch and three of the state's four congressional seats and expanded its already wide lead in the state Legislature, capturing four seats previously held by Democrats.

But in Utah's most hotly contested U.S. House race, Matheson and Love traded leads throughout election night before Matheson declared a narrow victory. Love conceded shortly thereafter, but The Associated Press has not called the race.

Thomas said he would be surprised if the results were reversed by the addition of provisional and absentee ballots, largely because of the high number of votes that remain to be counted in Salt Lake County.

"Love didn't do as well as she wanted to in Salt Lake County, and with the majority of ballots outstanding there, I would be surprised if those results make any difference," he said.

Nearly 12,000 provisional ballots remained to be counted in Utah County, where Love did very well, but only 2,184 of those are in District 4, according to Scott Hogensen, chief deputy clerk auditor.

The other two counties represented in District 4 - Sanpete and Juab - reported 691 ballots and 176 ballots still to be processed, respectively.

Salt Lake County Clerk Sherrie Swensen noted that so many people dropped off their vote-by-mail ballots at polling sites that the county had to send out additional ballot bags to collect them. At the main office, election workers fielded 12,000 telephone calls on Tuesday alone.

Overall, Salt Lake County saw a record number of people voting Tuesday, she said, even if the final number hasn't yet been tallied.

KETCHUM • Boulder Mountain rises majestically from the valley floor northwest of Sun Valley, its prominent summit a fixture among the rugged, multicolored mountain range carrying the same name.

As impressive as the peak is, however, discovering what lies behind it will easily become the highlight of any adventure into the area. 4x4's and ATVs can negotiate.

My wife, son and I recently visited the area and opted to park at the trailhead and walk the route's four miles to what remains of Boulder City. Soon after the hike's onset, we received our first peek into the past when we found two log structures, walls still standing, nestled into the forest near Boulder Creek.

After hiking another mile through the trees, we followed the road as it leaves the creek, breaks out into the open and makes a couple of short switchbacks before angling upward along the drainage's west side. Jeff Gabardi, mining engineer for the Sawtooth National Forest, notes that the original road to Boulder Basin remained near the creek as it climbed upward, but in Please see GHOSTS, O2

Idaho conservationist tells story of survival inside a land he was trying to protect.

Dark Side of the Moo

TWIN FALLS • Twelve years ago, Mike Medberry thought he was going to die in the wilds of one of his favorite projects the Craters of the Moon National Monument.

But Medberry, now 56, survived and lived to write about it. The memoir is titled "On the Dark Side of the Moon: A Journey Toward Recovery" (Caxton Press, \$14.95), and Medberry will be in Twin Falls on Nov. 17 to read from the book.

In the spring of 2000, while hiking with friends on a rainy and blustery day, Medberry had a stroke that left him paralyzed and unable to speak, see or think clearly. Medberry said the stroke dropped him, and as he lay on lava rock, his friends hiked on unaware.

What unfolds is a blend of what Medberry remembers after waking up alone and unable to move, and flashbacks to his childhood.

"Inert on the lava, I tried to take inventory. I looked at the world with one good eye. Why was everything so bleary through the other? My right eye was wet and



hurt like hell. It felt huge, like the monstrous eye of a Cyclops. I must have smashed it on the lava. How long had I lain there? Minutes, seconds, hours? I had no idea."

In one flashback, readers learn that Medberry's father had a stroke before he died.

The memoir also touches on the reason the hikers were there: to help ensure 750,000 acres would be added to the already designated 54,000acrenational monument.

Medberry was eventually rescued a day later. The same time he was flown to a nearby hospital, Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt, on

behalf of President Clinton, came to support the addition of the acres.

Medberry had followed a healthy lifestyle, he said, and the thought of having a stroke wasn't even a concern. "I didn't have any warning signs."

Medberry's recovery was intensive, and he said he had to learn how to walk, write and speak again.

"I realized what it was like to be paralyzed, and it's an awful experience, Medberry said. "Learning how to walk was the most joyous experience."

Three Meteor Showers Span the Holiday Season

hile space is largely a vacuum, some places in the solar system are less empty than others. If you're thinking "asteroids," don't be misled by Hollywood's depictions: From the densest part of the main asteroid belt, odds are the nearest asteroid would be too far away to see with the unaided eve.

Comets occupy an even emptier quarter of the solar system, a hollow sphere-shaped region called the Oort Cloud, far outside the planets' orbits. But when comets swoop sunward, their surface ices vaporize, liberating bits of mostly pea-gravel-sized rocks to spread out along the comet's orbit.

If a comet's path cross-



es Earth's, we plow into its debris trail annually, producing a meteor shower. Some showers originate with wellknown comets, like last month's Orionids, from Comet Halley. Others come from more obscure parents, like next week's Leonids, issuing from

Comet Swift-Tuttle. While the Leonids will likely produce 20 meteors per hour at best, the timing of this year's shower is good. The peak will arrive around 1 a.m. next Friday night (just as Earth's rotation is turning Idaho into the oncoming stream), and

the moon will have set hours earlier, leaving a dark sky for the fainter meteors.

Conditions are also favorable for the strongest shower of the year, December's Geminids. Although the peak arrives

before sunset on Dec. 13, with up to two meteors per minute there should still be plenty to see in the predawn hours of Dec. 14, again without a moon to interfere. The Geminids also tend to produce numerous bright meteors. January's Quadrantids complete the trifecta. The peak, at 6 a.m. Jan. 3 (a half hour before the start of morning twilight), could rival the Geminids, although a last-quarter moon will interfere. Next column: Planets

Wolf Trapping Seasons **Open This Month**

JEROME • Trappers and hound hunters will be out in the wilds of Idaho this month, so outdoorsmen with pets or bird dogs should know how to release a pet that is caught in a foothold trap or neck snare, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game suggests.

The state's wolf-trapping seasons open this month.

Wolf-trapping rules have changed since the 2012 Big Game Seasons and Rules brochure was published. For new trapping rules, see the

Trapping season opens Feb. 1 through March 31 in Unit 10A of the Dworshak-

Elk City Zone. All other zones are closed to trapping, Fish and Game said.

Trappers must complete a required wolf-trapping class before they can buy wolf tags.

Licensed trappers may buy up to five wolf-trapping tags per season. In addition, up to five wolfhunting tags may be purchased per calendar year. Unused wolf-hunting tags may be used to tag trapped wolves in wolf zones with an open trapping and hunt ing season, Fish and Game said. Bag limits are not the same for all the wolf zones. and started near Big Cottonwood Creek, where the bighorn sheep typically Fish and Game biologists

want to monitor the movements of this relatively small herd of bighorn sheep to better assess the fire's effects on this population. To report a sighting, call the wildlife staff in the department's Jerome office at 324-4359.

the 1950s it was re-routed along the rocky, open slope. This placement of the road on a steady grade was made to facilitate the hauling of large quantities of low-quality "waste" ore from the mines above for eventual delivery to Utah for processing. This venture essentially marked the last chapter in the region's mining history.

While the view along the open mountainside is superb, we ended up splitting our focus between the vista of the drainage and the anticipation of the occasional tree along the road that offered some respite from the warm September sun. The final steep section of the route offered much more shade; adding to the cooling effect was several hundred yards of road with spring water flowing down its cobbled base.

The level terrain of the journey's final mile, even after noting the lack of contour lines on a topographic map, still came as a surprise - such broad, flat valleys are rarely found at 9,000-foot elevations. Rocky ridges surround but don't crowd the basin, with several connecting to Boulder Mountain, which now stood to our southwest, rather than to the north where we'd left the pavement a few hours earlier.

Soon after entering the valley, we spotted several crumpled piles of lumber, likely cabins, lying near the road along with an upright trough-looking feature. Just around the corner from those ruins stand the remains of a couple of other structures, log walls still interlocked but slumped by

The hiking trailhead lies one mile past this sign but can be accessed only by vehicles able to ford Boulder Creek.

After negotiating the three-mile climb into the basin, take the left fork to explore the ghost town and mill; the right fork enters a cirque holding Boulder Lake and a few other mining claims. Motorized vehicles accessing the region are required to remain on existing roads.

port written by Victoria Mitchell that the Idaho Geological Survey published 15 years ago, the total recorded production for the mines in Boulder Basin between 1884 and 1949 amounted to nearly 8,000 tons of ore and several hundred tons of old tailings. The processing of this raw material yielded 610 ounces of gold, 111,620 ounces of silver, 48,094 pounds of copper and 1.3 million pounds of lead. Between 1884 and 1894, one estimate put production value at \$1 million for a block of claims known as the Golden Glow group.

The wealth didn't come without difficulty, however. The survey report notes that the area was characterized by "complex and divided ownership" and marked by complications brought on by

When he was able, he returned to Craters of the Moon.

"It was a place of refuge to go into the wild country and think," Medberry said. "I needed that solitude."

Wilderness Precautions

Mike Medberry hopes his book will help others take precautions in the wilderness.

• One of the things Medberry does now that he didn't before: carry aspirin with him.

• Though he prefers to hike with others, he said, if you are hiking by yourself be sure to let people know where you are going and when they should expect you back. He also leaves a note with this information in his car.

 Always stay well hydrated before and during a hike. A day before he went hiking at Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve in 2000, Medberry competed in a half-marathon. He suspects dehydration might have played a role in his stroke.

• Lennie Ramacher, interpretive park ranger and volunteer coordinator at Craters, said the best plan is the one made before you hike. Always tell someone where you are going if you are hiking alone, and it is a good idea to have first aid training and medical supplies.

• Pace yourself and watch the weather, Ramacher said, especially at the monument. During the summer the heat is amplified off the black lava rock, and in the spring and winter, storms can spring up quickly on the plains

time and gravity. We speculated that a two-story building once featured some sort of commercial enterprise.

While we were unsure of the identities of this collection of a half-dozen buildings comprising Boulder City, several hundred yards away stands the area's most easily recognizable attraction. Built into the side of the mountain where rocky cliffs meet the basin's flat ground, an ore-processing mill still endures in testament to the mining district's heyday. While much of the structure's interior has collapsed, the building's skeleton remains in the form of solid beams, upright lumber and weathered outer walls. A cylindrical boiler sits adjacent to and in line with the mill, causing us to wonder about the difficulty of transporting such a heavy piece of equipment, even in sections, up the road nearly a century ago.

Two steel cables anchored near the mill are strung to the landscape above where a few mine tailing piles still dot the mountainside. Finally, after a closer inspection, we spotted several mineshaft openings, their tunnels punched into the mountain at hopeful angles for intersecting veins containing precious metals.

... The quest for wealth buried inside the mountains at Boulder Basin dates back to 1879 with the filing of the first mining claim. In a re-

litigation and bankruptcy.

In one instance, a partnership formed in the 1930s between J.A. Schultz and a Canadian firm ended in futility and rancor. Schultz, who at the time leased several claims, wrote that besides the foreign entity breaking Idaho business and mining laws, it "refused to give men a bathhouse or change house, kept powder in where the men eat, refused to pipe water for drinking." Amidst other assertions, "approxi-mately 10 diamond drill holes were put down, all shallow holes, all missed vein except one, due to their engineers rotten figuring. All told, a waste of money."

The fact that Boulder Basin combines a scenic landscape with such rich history - part of which visitors can still put their hands on - makes the spot a unique locale.

Ed Kennedy, backcountry recreation manager for the Sawtooth National Recreation Area, said the Forest Service is happy to offer the area to motorized and nonmotorized users alike.

"It's a beautiful alpine basin, but the wet meadows and archaeological features are fragile," Kennedy said, reminding visitors to respect the environment and those seeking the same experience.

Spoons and Steelhead on Idaho's Salmon River

RIGGINS • The bright orange and brass spoon wobbled only for a few seconds along an eddy line in the Salmon River when it stopped dead.

Then, line began peeling off my level-wind reel at a sizzling speed as the drag sang.

"Steelhead on!" I yelled up the beach. My wife knew immediately to get the net out of the drift boat.

We had been pulling plugs from the boat, but I wanted to mix it up with a little spoon fishing while we stopped on a sandbar for lunch.

The steelhead made a run downstream and so did I, leaving a trench of deep footprints in the soft sand.

After a 15-minute battle that took me up and down the beach, the beautiful keeper steelie was in the net.

Fishing for steelhead with spoons and spinners is exciting but often ignored by anglers.

Plugs and Bait

Some anglers get bored pulling plugs in a drift boat.

Hotshotting an area and plan to drift downstream to another plug-pulling area, don't quit fishing. Pick up the spoon rod and cast and retrieve as you drift. You never know. Catching fish means having a line in the water.

Starting Out

"Spoons are an art form," says Carmen Macdonald, a veteran salmon and steelhead angler and representative for Luhr Jensen lures.

"There's a pretty simple goal. You want to get the lure in the strike zone," says Macdonald, who is familiar with Idaho's Salmon River.

When it comes to fishing spoons and spinners, you've got to pick apart the river pretty much the same way as plug and fly anglers.

Rivers, like the Salmon, pretty much have the same characteristics up and down the waterways.

Rapids to Tailout

You've got rapids and a pool with a bunch of roily water. Then it mellows out with a nice stretch of flatwater 4 to 8 feet deep above the tailout. The water just off the bot-

Ariz. Game and Fish Intervenes in Lead Ammo Lawsuit

PHOENIX (AP) • The Arizona Game and Fish Department has filed a motion to intervene in a lawsuit seeking to regulate lead ammunition in the Kaibab National Forest.

Conservations groups contend the U.S. Forest Service has a duty to ensure that endangered California condors and other birds aren't killed by ingesting spent lead ammunition.

The Sierra Club, Grand Canyon Wildlands Council and Center for Biological Diversity want the Forest Service to place a mandatory ban on hunting with lead ammo in northern Arizona.

Arizona Game and Fish has been encouraging hunters to use non-lead ammunition. The agency says that is the best approach for long-term success of the condor program in the Southwest.

About 75 condors fly in a range that stretches from Arizona's Grand Canyon to southern Utah's Zion National Park.

Few Things in Life Are as Satisfying as a Good, Sharp Knife

WICHITA, Kan. • My fourth-grade teacher, Mrs. Meisner, sometimes borrowed my pocket knife because it was the sharpest in her class.

Now, as then, I've considered a good knife as essential to my outdoors lifestyle as a nice gun or good fly rod.

That dedication to quality cutlery got a bit expensive lately, but more on that later.

I come from a family of knife-guys. Dad was seldom without his Barlow. Grandpa carried the same Old Timer for at least 35 years.

To them, knives were a basic and versatile tool, used for things like stripping the insulation from wire, cutting baling twine or peeling a pond-side apple.

Dad handing me my first knife was a rite of passage, one that came with the conditions I not use the knife unwisely, keep it clean and razor-sharp.

"A dull knife is just a stick," is a family saying.

So for about three decades I lived up to those expectations, carrying any of the dozen or so knives I'd accumlated. But none were appreciated more than another.

That changed in 2000 when a friend at Remington sent me one of their famed Bullet knives. She said it was a highly-valued collectable to be stored away.

No chance.

To me collectable knives make as much sense as a collectable hammers. Both are tools made to be used . especially that particular knife.

It was love at first slice the first time I took the Bullet knife afield. With a fourinch blade it was big enough to do serious work but small enough to be easily carried in a front pocket.

When opened, the knife locked as tight as Fort Knox. The blade ends in a perfect taper and narrow enough for intricate cutting. It's a breeze to get to hair-shaving sharp.

So for about 11 years the knife was with me about any time I was afield.

The knife's versatility let it work well on everything from doves to bull elk and cut through everything from fine tippet to thumb-thick saplings. I honestly appreciated the

knife about every time I used it, too.

But in 2011 someone decided it should change owners.

So through the last hunting seasons and well into this summer, I made-do with those old knives I'd collected. All had their flaws when compared to the stolen knife.

Using them was like going striper fishing with a Zebco 202 or trying to duck hunt with coon dog. Using a knife wasn't fun.

Off and on since the theft, I'd gone online to see if the same model of Bullet knife was for sale. They were, but at collectables prices.

But after trying to clean a batch of teal with an inferior blade in September, I pulled up a special knife site and paid just under \$100 for a simple folding pocket knife.

I felt guilty when I hit "send," and second-guessed the decision several times a day . until the knife arrived.

It is like the first in all ways, including how it makes me feel when I make a quick, clean cut through thick rope or trim unwanted fat from a piece of wild game.

I'm sure you don't understand, but it's like making a perfect cast with a good flyrod, and that good feeling that's an important part of whatever outing is at hand.

Like I said, I've always had an unusually deep appreciation for a very good knife.

A New Storm Bears Down On Sandy-Battered N.Y.C., N.J.

NEW YORK (AP) • A nor'easter blustered into New York and New Jersey on Wednesday with rain and wet snow, plunging homes right back into darkness, stopping commuter trains again and inflicting another round of misery on thousands of people still reeling from Superstorm Sandy's blow more than a week ago.

Under ordinary circumstances, a storm of this sort wouldn't be a big deal, but large swaths of the landscape were still an open wound, with the electrical system highly fragile and many of Sandy's victims still mucking out their homes and cars and shivering in the deepening cold.

Exactly as authorities feared, the nor'easter brought down tree limbs and electrical wires, and utilities in New York and New Jersey reported that nearly 50,000 customers who lost power because of Sandy lost it all over again as a result of the nor'easter.

"I know everyone's patience is wearing thin," said John Miksad, senior vice president of electric operations at Consolidated Edison, the chief utility in New York City.

As the nor'easter closed in, thousands of people in low-lying neighborhoods staggered by the superstorm just over a week ago were urged to clear out. Authorities warned that rain and 60 mph gusts in the evening and overnight could topple trees wrenched loose by Sandy and erase some of the hard-won progress made in restoring power to millions of customers. "I am waiting for the locusts and pestilence next," New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie said. "We may take a setback in the next 24 hours." Ahead of the storm, public works crews in New Jersey built up dunes to protect the stripped and battered coast, and new evacuations were ordered in a number of communities already emptied by Sandy. New shelters opened. In New York City, police went to low-lying neighborhoods with loudspeakers, urging residents to leave. But Mayor Michael Bloomberg didn't issue mandatory evacuations, and many people stayed behind, some because they feared looting, others because they figured whatever happens couldn't be any worse than what they have gone through already. "We're petrified," said James Alexander, a resident of the hard-hit Rockaways section of Queens. "It's like a sequel to a horror movie." All construction in New York City was halted - a precaution that needed no explanation after a crane collapsed last week in Sandy's high winds and dangled menacingly over the streets of Manhattan. Parks were closed because of the danger of falling trees. A section of the Long Island Expressway was closed in both directions because of icy conditions. Airlines canceled at least 1,300 U.S. flights in and out of the New York metropolitan area, causing a new round of disruptions that rippled across the country. The city manager in Long Beach, N.Y., urged the roughly 21,000 people who ignored previous mandatory evacuation orders in the badly damaged barrier-island city to get out Forecasters said the nor'easter would bring moderate coastal flooding, with storm surges of about 3 feet possible Wednesday into Thursday – far less than the 8 to 14 feet Sandy hurled at the region. The storm's winds were expected to be well below Sandy's, which gusted to 90 mph

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Election Day Indicates Nation Is Deeply Divided on Politics, Issues

This was another paradoxical election. An increasingly conservative Republican Party held onto the majority of seats in the House, while Democrats retained the White House and Senate, Wisconsin elected a gay senator, Maine and Maryland approved same-sex marriage, and Washington state and Colorado legalized marijuana.

The Democratic governor of Colorado, John Hickenlooper, said the will of the people has to be respected, but warned smokers not to celebrate: federal law still says marijuana is an illegal drug.

The people have spoken, but the messages of Election Day are not easily heard in the cacophony of our political cuture. Americans have conflicting thoughts. If anything, our political divisions are deepening over time. We have a divided government because we are a divided people. This is who we are.

Contrary to what the president famously declared when he came to prominence in 2004, and which he echoed early Wednesday in his victory speech, there really does seem to be a Red America and a Blue America, each seeing a markedly different reality. That's why seven in 10 Democrats say the economy is getting better, while nearly six in 10 Republicans say it's getting worse, according to exit polls. Somehow, Vermont, which reelected a socialist senator, is part of the same country as Oklahoma, where voters on Tuesday passed a measure to eliminate all affirmative action in state hiring and contracting.

When President Obama took a stage in Chicago in the wee hours of Wednesday morning, he described the country's stark ideological disconnect as an outcome of our political blessings: "Democracy in a nation of 300 million can be noisy and messy and complicated," he said. "We have our own opinions. Each of us has deeply held beliefs. And when we go through tough times, when we make big decisions as a country, it necessarily stirs passions, stirs up controversy."

Fiscal Cliff Combines Tax Hikes, Spending Cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) • So just what is this "fiscal cliff" that has the financial markets rattled and economists and policymakers alike in a tizzy over the potential for sending the economy into another tailspin?

It's a one-two punch of expiring Bush-era tax cuts and major across-the-board spending cuts to the Pentagon and domestic programs that could total \$800 billion next year, based on Congressional Budget Office estimates.

The cliff is the punishment for previous failures of a bitterly-divided Congress and White House to deal with the government's spiraling debt or overhaul its unwieldy tax code.

The largest component of

the cliff comes with the expiration of tax cuts enacted in 2001 and 2003 and extended two years ago in the wake of President Barack Obama's drubbing in the 2010 midterm elections.

It also includes sharp spending cuts imposed as a consequence of the failure of last year's deficit-reduction supercommittee to reach agreement. There are other elements, chiefly a 2 percentage point cut in payroll taxes orchestrated by Obama and unemployment benefits for the longterm jobless that would disappear.

A Congressional Budget Office study in May estimated that the fiscal cliff would force tax hikes and spending



THE ACES ON BRID

"The past cannot be cured." - Queen Elizabeth I

Against three no-trump, West leads the spade queen. How do you plan to make nine tricks?

Outside the diamonds, you have five top tricks. So you need a minimum of four diamond tricks to make your contract. Suppose you win the spade lead with the ace and finesse the diamond jack. If the finesse loses, the spade return will mean that you won't make nine tricks unless the diamond 10 drops. This would be the case even when the diamonds were 3-3, for the entry to the diamonds has been removed.

Accordingly, the best approach is to win the first spade (for fear of a club shift) and play a diamond to the king. Then continue by overtaking the diamond jack with dummy's ace, even if West has followed with a small card. Here, since the diamond queen has put in an appearance, you can simply dislodge the diamond 10 from East's hand and make nine tricks: two spades, two hearts, four diamonds and a club.

If the diamonds had been 3-3, the third round of diamonds would have established the suit, with the spade king as the entry to cash them. Notice that you will succeed when either defender begins with a singleton or doubleton diamond queen or 10. As we have seen, dummy's 9-8-7 is then good enough to allow you to knock out the remaining diamond honor, letting you collect four diamond tricks and the contract. This gives you a better than two-thirds chance to make your game.

2. When you thank us for our service or pay for our meal, it is really appreciated. We also appreciate packages and notes.

3. Please don't tell us that wars are a waste of dollars or lives or were fought for oil. What we hear is that, in your opinion, our best friend died for nothing. We know many people disagree with war, but it's better to keep your opinions to yourself.

4. Many of us now have PTSD. If you see us acting anxious or moving away from crowds, turning our backs to the wall or fidget ing, simple kindness or a little distraction will be appreciated. Talk to us about something interesting and give us some breathing room.

5. Please remember that 15 percent of those who serve in the military are women, and some have been in combat. It's better to ask, "Are you a veteran?" rather than, "Was your husband a soldier?"

6. As with any person who has a disability, please do not stare at us. We can be sensitive about our scars or injuries and would prefer not to be asked to relive a difficult experience by being quizzed about what happened. Please also understand that war injuries today are very different than in the past and are often not visible. It is not OK to tell someone they "don't look disabled" or appear to need help.

Those of us with disabilities appreciate light conversation and assistance if we look like we are in need.

It was my pleasure to serve our country.

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

"I had always said that if Hawaii offered me there's where I wanted to be, but when it happened I couldn't really believe it," said Passi, who last week was named the Region 18 Player of the Year. "Every little girl growing up in Hawaii wants to play for UH one day. It's a dream come true."

The Rainbow Wahine, as Hawaii's women's teams are known, are currently 21-2 and ranked seventh in the nation, according to the most recent



AVCA coaches' poll. Hawaii competes in the Big West in all sports but football.

Passi said she'll pay her own way and redshirt next season and has an understanding that she'll have a scholarship for her final two years of eligibility. That could be adjusted based on Hawaii's needs for next season, however.

"There are a lot of great schools, and it's all about finding the right fit. This is a perfect fit," said CSI coach Heidi Cartisser. "We asked if she was really sure about it, but this is what she's always wanted to do."

Passi is 10th on CSI's all-time kill list at 754 and counting, and could get as high as sixth with 42 kills at the national tournament. Her killsper-set count of 3.33 is just outside the top 10 all-time, though her 3.83 this season is sixth on the singleseason list.

Notre Dame in the Rose Bowl? Maybe

College football's most storied program, playing on its grandest stage.

Notre Dame in the Rose Bowl. It could happen.

While most fans are focused on the four-team race to the BCS championship game, another intriguing Bowl Championship Series sidebar is developing. Will the Rose Bowl, if given the opportunity, invite Notre Dame? The Fighting Irish have only played in the Granddaddy of Bowls once before — in 1925.

"There is still so much that can happen, and of course the biggest story out there is whether we would take Notre Dame, but there is a lot to play out before it starts to become a serious conversation within our group," Rose Bowl spokeswoman Gina Chappin said Wednesday.

Here's how those conversations becomes serious.

If Oregon wins the Pac-12 and finishes first or second in the BCS standings, the Ducks will pay in the BCS national championship game.

Depending on where the Ducks finish, that would give the Rose Bowl either the first or second pick among the four BCS games to replace one of its contractually bound champions with an eligible at -large team.

The Big Ten and Pac-12 are longtime and lucrative partners with the Rose Bowl, and game organizers would prefer to keep their partners happy and dip back into those conferences for replacement teams.

"Whenever we can protect our relationship with the Pac-12 and the Big Ten,

that is very important to us," Chappin said.

To be eligible for an atlarge spot, a team must be ranked in the top 14 of the final BCS standings and have nine victories. No. 13 Oregon State (7-1) is in 11th-place heading into Saturday's game at No. 16 Stanford. The Beavers also play California, Oregon and Nicholls State on Dec. 1 (provided they aren't in the Pac-12 title game).

If Oregon State finishes 10-2, assuming a loss to the Ducks, the Beavers should have no problem being BCS eligible, very possibly in the top 10. And because Oregon State last played in the Rose Bowl in 1965, the Beavers would check a second important box for the selection committee.

"Have they played in our game recently?" Chappin said.

Bowl organizers love inviting teams who haven't been to their game in a long time, because fired-up fans gobble up tickets.

It would get interesting if Oregon State loses twice between now and the end of the season.

At 9-3, the Beavers could still slip into the BCS top 14. But at that point, they might not look so appealing to the Rose Bowl. Especially, compared to Notre Dame.

There are other factors that could influence the Rose Bowl's decision. If Wisconsin wins the Big Ten, the Rose Bowl would probably like to avoid a rematch of a regularseason game between the Badgers and Beavers.

Or, if not Notre Dame, how about this possibility: A Rose Bowl reunion of old conference rivals Nebraska and Oklahoma.

"There are so many variables that go into the conversation of the matchup. It's not a conversation we have a lot," Chappin said. "We're at a position right now where it's too early to focus on the what-ifs."



was I in the library or drinking with my friends," Reader said. "Those choices affected me drastically. It was definitely the college life and I fed on it. I surrounded myself with the wrong group, the group that didn't have the same responsibilities as me, a student athlete. They were going out and partying four nights a week and trying to go to school, but my life wasn't the same. I was trying to live a double life."

Reader was forced out at Montana. Over the summer, he searched for a landing spot. He learned that his

uncle, Doug, played with some guy named Steve Gosar. He went over to the house of Ritchie, who was also trying to find a place to play after leaving Colorado Mines. He learned that Ritchie's trainer worked with Gosar in the past, and both Reader and Ritchie were on Gosar's radar. It made too much sense for both players to go to Twin Falls together.

It didn't take long to commit.

"In three days we were on a plane to Idaho," Reader said. "In another two days we signed."

The process was easy not just because of the fit -aquiet town with a great program - but because Reader's vision of how it could work was so clear.

"We wanted to come here, win a championship, and get the looks we'd get on a winning team and get ourselves ready to get back to that next level," Reader said. "It's a chance to go and re-establish myself at the Division I level."

Off the court, Reader is proactive about taking the steps to change. He's also getting support this time, including a counselor arranged by Gosar and his staff.

"I'm sure if I had gone outside my comfort zone that I built for myself I'd still be at (Montana), but the fact is I didn't seek help," Reader said. "The big thing here is getting over my pride, ad-

mitting that I have problems and seeking help. The coaches have been great."

With a second chance, Reader is embracing his role as leader, where he hopes he can impart some wisdom upon his teammates – many of whom have endured tough circumstances themselves.

"As a captain, one of the things I'm trying to work is breaking down some of these walls with teammates," Reader said. "My road, my journey, there are a lot of dark spots that these guys don't know and can understand and get a better perspective from me if I opened up to them. I've definitely been to hell and back, but I'm in a good place now,

and hope I can rub off on these guys."

It seems to be working. Reader has the credibility to speak up and be heard, and his ferocious desire to win, according to teammates, is contagious.

"He pushes you 100 percent and he will definitely call you out if you're not going hard," sophomore guard Jon Pulsifer said. "He will tell you if you aren't moving your feet on defense. There is just tons of stuff that he provides that we pick up on, and we all want to make it to Division I level like he was at."

A level Reader could return to if he completes his transformation.
