

# Guardsman's Aid Leads to State Award

**TWIN FALLS** • A Twin Falls man will soon receive the Idaho Cross, the highest state award that can be presented to a member of the National Guard.

In late January, Idaho National Guard Sgt. Jesus "Jesse" Gonzalez was driving his daughters back home from a basketball game when he saw an SUV run several stop signs, then pass them on the wrong side of the road.

"I said, 'Look at this knucklehead," Gonzalez said. "I tried to speed up to catch them and finally we got to the last intersection and she was parked across the intersection, flashers on. There was a gentleman talking to her. I told my daughters, 'I hope everything's ok."

Gonzalez approached the Jeep Commander and inside was Shaunna Coit, her body twisted in a seizure, helpless.

In April 2011, Coit, a Filer resident, had surgery to remove her thyroid gland. During the surgery, Coit's parathyroid glands were damaged.



### Stocks Edge Up Ahead of Thanksgiving Break

NEW YORK (AP) • The stock market crept higher Wednesday ahead of the Thanksgiving holiday. Major market indexes got a slight lift after news broke of a cease-fire agreement between Israel and Hamas in the Gaza Strip.

The truce was announced by Egypt's foreign min-ister and confirmed by Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. A week of fighting has killed more than 140 Palestinians and five Israelis.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose three points to 1,390. Bank stocks and utilities fell the most, while industrial companies rose the most, but no category moved more than 0.5 percent.

### Police: Twin Falls Man Drove Drunk, Backed into Cop Car

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls man has been charged with driving under the influence and resisting arrest after he allegedly backed into a Twin Falls police car, then was tased by officers.

On Monday at about 1:16 a.m., Twin Falls Police Officer Jaime Harper was driving in the 1700 block of Kimberly Road when she noticed a vehicle pull out of the parking lot of the Pressbox Sports Bar in Twin Falls.

According to a police report, officers saw the vehicle straddle the white dashed line of both westbound lanes, then veer to the far outside lane.

After two marked police cars began following the vehicle with their overhead lights on, the vehicle allegedly turned north on Locust Street and ran a red light. According to the report, the vehicle then pulled into the parking lot of the Twin Stop Chevron at 1509 Kimberly Road.

The two officers told the driver, later identified as Ryan Adam Bowman, 22, to show his hands, the report states. At that point, the report states, Bowman allegedly started the engine and backed into one of the police cars. He then allegedly ignored the two officers' commands to stop the car and the two attempted to break the side window of the vehicle to stop it from continuing backwards, the report states.

According to the report, Officer Timothy Arrandondo was able to break the window, reach in and remove the keys from the car. Arrendondo's hand was lacerated on the broken glass, the report states.

Bowman allegedly continued to refuse to get out of the vehicle. Harper physically

removed him from the car and attempted to get him in handcuffs, but Bowman continued to struggle with Harper and resisted attempts to be put under arrest, the report states.

At that point, Arrendondo deployed his Taser, which incapacitated Bowman. According to the report, the officers could smell alcohol on Bowman's breath and his eyes were bloodshot and glassy. The report states Bowman was examined by paramedics, then taken to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center for a blood draw, which he submitted to. According to the report, Bowman had minor abrasions which were cleaned and

Bowman was transported to the Twin Falls County Jail and held on \$2,500 bond. He pleaded not guilty to both charges in court on Wednesday. A pretrial conference is scheduled for Jan. 2.

trict. He was hired as a teacher at the high school and became the town's first football coach.

Twice in the late 1920s, Barry took the Buhl High School girls' basketball team all the way to the national championship, each time missing the win by just two points.

Barry's ambition wouldn't be contained at school, even during the Great Depression. He refused to give up after his first business failed and by the mid-1930s, he owned real estate and insurance businesses, an ice cream parlor and the Buhl *Herald*, all while continuing to teach.

In 1936, Barry decided to enter politics, much to the dismay of his college sweet heart and wife, Harriet.

His father had been a Republican, "so it was only natural that he should be a Democrat," says his biography.

Barry served in the Idaho State House of Representatives, then ran for lieutenant governor in 1940. If he failed to be elected, Barry promised Harriet that he would retire from politics.

bought a service station and hardware store on Addison Avenue West, and later bought a lumber company across the street. He also invested in a young block manufacturing plant in Jerome called Cinder Products Co.

Barry lost the election

The following year, Barry

and, in 1941, moved his

family to Twin Falls.

Barry wrote his own advertising column in the Times-News, ending the column each week with his slogan "Harry Barry ain't mad at nobody."

Eventually, Barry sold the service station and hardware store, but kept Harry Barry Lumber Co.

In November 1954, Harry and Harriet Barry traveled to Kansas to visit some old friends from college. While there, they decided to drive to Oklahoma to see the Will Rogers Memorial. The road was slick from rain, and an oncoming truck slid into the Barrys' car, killing all five in the car. The driver of the truck was also killed.

The Barrys are buried in the Buhl Cemetery.

After Barry's death, Harry Barry Lumber Co. merged with the block manufacturing company that he had invested in, forming Volco Inc.


Watkins isn't scheduled to enter a plea on his felony burglary and grand theft charges until a preliminary hearing Dec. 5.

The District 26 legislator, just re-elected this fall to a fifth term, was cited for not staying in her lane of traffic in the accident.

According to the Associated Press, Blaine County Sheriff Gene Ramsey said Pence's 2010 Toyota Prius went off Idaho Highway 75 about five miles south of Bellevue on Nov. 15.

Ramsey told the Idaho Mountain Express the power pole was sheared off, causing \$5,000 in damage. Two other vehicles struck the downed power lines and sustained about \$1,000 in damage each.

"What started as a small family project has turned into a worldwide project. I feel I am watching a child grow," said Tawny Archibald Campbell, a former Oakley resident who lives in Spesbach, Rheinland-Pfalz, Germany, with her deployed military husband, Sgt. Joseph Campbell.

The program is in its seventh year and was started by Campbell's younger brother, Ian Archibald, as an Eagle Scout project.

Dozens of organizations, churches and schools chip in each year making ornaments, donating candy, decorating paper bags and writing letters to the service members. The bags are shipped to Germany and handed out at airports, hospitals and sent downrange.

"We spend 12 -16 hours a

day from Dec. 3 to Jan. 5 at the airport in Ramstein so we can meet every flight heading downrange and those coming home," Campbell said. "It is an honor to be one of the last civilians they meet heading out, and one of the first they meet coming home.

"We meet them with a smile and a bag and as grateful as they are for the gift, we feel as though we are always getting the better end of the deal. It fills up your emotional cup for the rest of the year. You forget about the stress leading up to all this and just focus on the smiles. Not much can be better than that."

Back in Idaho, the volunteers share the same feelings. Makalia Hensen, a student at Burley Junior High School, said this was her first year helping assemble bags for the project.

"I like helping with this and I'm thankful for them allowing us to have freedom," she said.

"If it makes the difference to one service person it makes all this chaos worthwhile," said Erin Hansen, who helped with the assembly.

Ray Archibald, Tawny's father, said the goal is 15,000 bags this year.

"Over the seven years we've received donations from all 50 states and 14 countries," Archibald said.

During the first year of the project Archibald went to Germany to help hand out bags. There, he got to hear reactions to the surprise gifts.

"One soldier told me when they are deployed they expect to get letters and things from family and friends," Archibald said. "But, to get a letter from someone they don't know like this makes them know they are doing what they are supposed to be doing."





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

Coit's first seizure came three days after her surgery. After that, doctors put her a on a combination of 39 pills a day. Some had to be crushed, some taken with food, and some taken in the middle of the night, Coit said.

Eventually she decided to join a fitness boot camp class to get back some of the strength she lost after surgery.

Sometimes during workouts, Coit said, she noticed her hands and feet would feel tingly. Still, doctors told her not to worry.

"It's so rare," she said. "The odds that all four (glands) were damaged are one in a million."

After a gym class the night of Jan. 24, Coit's hands and feet began to tingle as she drove. Still, she felt it couldn't be a seizure. Then her fingers began to curl in and she knew her calcium levels were dropping and a seizure was coming.

"I waited a little too long," she said. "My hands are the first thing to go."

Coit said she decided the best thing to do was to drive herself to the hospital.

"I just thought, 'Oh, I'm not stopping," she said.

Coit remembers passing a car near the intersection of Wendell Street and Falls Avenue. By the next intersection, her eyes had clamped shut and she couldn't see.

"I couldn't put the car in park. I couldn't even get out of the car," she said.

Coit hoped her car, which careened through the intersection, would catch someone's attention and they would call 911.

Before she knew what was happening, Gonzalez reached into her car, threw it in park, undid her seatbelt, picked her up and carried her to his car.

Gonzalez raced to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center, parking near the emergency room entrance. At first, Gonzalez said he thought hospital staff didn't believe he had an emergency.

"Then I got her all taken out of the car. The nurse heard her screaming and they prioritized it," he said.

Coit was rushed in and received a calcium infusion

that saved her life.

"Within 15 minutes I was fine again," she said.

After she felt better, Coit asked the nurses who the man who brought her in was. No one knew.

Coit only knew the man had a daughter and dog and found out from hospital staff that he had a bright yellow Ford Mustang.

The next day, Coit posted the story on Facebook and asked people to be on the lookout for a yellow Mustang.

Within about a day, one of Coit's Facebook friends saw Gonzalez's car, followed it and put a note on it after he parked at the National Guard Armory.

"It's funny, I'm always try to be aware of my surroundings," Gonzalez said. "A lady came out and she was following me and I was like 'who in the heck is following me, I hope it's not someone trying to pick a fight?"

Gonzalez found the note later in the day when he left work.

"She said, 'If you're the guy who saved my friends' life then give me a call," Gonzalez said.

Soon, the two got in touch and Coit arrived at Gonzalez's office.

"I didn't know how bad her situation was," he said. "She came into the office and talked for a while. She kind of made me cry a little but. That's when I thought, maybe I did do something."

Since then, Coit said she's been careful about when she's alone. She now wears a medical identification bracelet that says if she needs calcium. She still takes about 20 pills a day and

there's still no way to check if her calcium levels are dropping.

"I have to guess, does my calcium feel high or low," she said.

She carries liquid calcium, which can buy her some extra time in case of an emergency.

Looking back, Coit said she will always be thankful for Gonzalez's actions.

"It still blows my mind," she said. "There's not many people who would do that."

Coit's brother, a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force, got the ball rolling on the award for Gonzalez, she said. He looked up what kind of award a military member can get for helping someone in a civilian setting, she said.

Col. Tim Marsano, spokesman for the Idaho National Guard, said this week that he just learned Gonzalez would get the award.

"It's a great story and we're proud of him. In a nutshell, it's the highest Idaho award that can be presented to a member of the National Guard. It's usually for lifesaving actions. It's pretty rare that we give them out - maybe once every 18 months to two years," Marsano said. "He's a really fantastic guy and Twin Falls should be proud to have him as a resident down there."

### **Cassia Regional Begins Facility Expansion**

**BURLEY** • Cassia Regional Medical Center officials will add two modular buildings to their facility to relieve space constraints.

It's a prelude to a larger overhaul next year of the hospital's emergency and radiology departments, according to a news release.

Feeding America, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and the Southern Baptist Convention are also part of this week's efforts.



Cross country athletes who follow conventional wisdom ease back on their daily running mileage in the weeks preceding their most important event, in this case the 4A state meet.

The *Times-News* Cross Country Runner of the Year, once a ranch-hand, is rawhide tough – he wasn't going for conventional or easy, he was going for the win.

Twin Falls' cross country runner Jeremy Stark was so displeased with his fourth-place finish in the 4A District IV meet in October, he opted to stay off the sofa, get on his feet and turn common sense on its head.

"Losing districts, that motivated me," Stark said. "I was running before school, after school, everything you aren't supposed to do. I wanted to show everybody that I was a better runner than I was at districts. (Wood River's District IV winner) Chase England has a target on his back; I really wanted to beat him."

Stark beat England by less than a second, 16:31.50 to 16:32.20.

"I had Chase by 20 seconds in the first lap, and then came around the corner and Chase passed me in the second lap," Stark said. "Going down the last quarter mile I just took off. I held nothing back at the end."

The adrenaline surging through Stark's veins likely narrowed his focus, making the final leg an almost supernatural experience.

"I just passed a couple of kids and I can remember people screaming at me," Stark said. "I felt really good actually, I just kept chucking on and finished."

Stark's fourth-place photofinish was 48 spots and almost a minute-and-a-half better than his 2011 showing at state.

But the miles he put in the two weeks before the state meet do not explain the huge gains he made from his sophomore to junior seasons.

### Still a lot to be thankful for in sports

he bad stuff is easy. You read about it almost every day; hear it discussed endlessly by the talking heads on radio and television.

But if sports is a microcosm of society – and it is then there's a lot of good going on, too. And, as we celebrate Thanksgiving, here are some things to be thankful for this year that have nothing to do with wins and losses, the World Series or the Super Bowl:

A COACH'S FIGHT: Circumstances. That's what Indianapolis Colts coach Chuck Pagano called his health problems when he came in the locker room after a win against Miami a few weeks ago and addressed his team for the first time since unexpectedly being hospitalized just as his first season as head coach was beginning. The circumstances are that Pagano has leukemia, an insidious disease that's difficult to beat no matter how hard you fight. In an moving speech that you have to watch to fully appreciate, Pagano vowed to dance at the weddings of both his daughters and to host more than one Super Bowl trophy before he's done fighting. "It's already beat. It's already beat," Pagano told his team.

DRUG BUSTERS: It would have been easy for Travis Tygart and his investigators at the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency to simply give up on nailing Lance Armstrong. Federal prosecutors already had, and if they couldn't build a case against Armstrong, hard to imagine the doping agency doing any better. But Tygart pressed on, eventually building a case that tore apart the facade Armstrong had created, detailing a widespread and systematic doping scheme on a level not seen before in organized sports. Yes, he took down an American sports hero



and damaged his charitable work, but Tygart also sent a message that a level playing field is important. Sports will be a cleaner and better place because of it.

BROOKLYN REBORN: No, the Dodgers aren't returning. Suddenly, though, Brooklyn is a sports town again, thanks to a new, \$1 billion arena and a Russian billionaire who parked his basketball team there. The New York Islanders will also be moving there in 2015, assuming, of course, that the NHL lockout is resolved by then.

**BRITISH INVASION:** Bradley Wiggins became the first Briton to win the Tour de France, while Andy Murray became the first British man to claim a tennis major in 76 years when he won the U.S. Open. Perennial alsorans, the British had a spectacular sporting summer the country will never forget, including a London Olympics that surpassed expectations at every turn.

VIN SCULLY: He would be a national treasure, but the people of Los Angeles like to claim him as their own. For more than 60 years, Scully has broadcast the Dodgers, and his gift to the new Dodger owners was the announcement that he will come back for at least one more year at the age of 85, calling games as he always does, solo in the announcer's booth. In the interests of full disclosures, I was one of those kids in LA who went to sleep at night with a transistor radio underneath my pillow, growing up listening to Vinny.

RORY TIME: For years, golf fans waited for a rival to the great Tiger Woods,

Jacksonville Jaguars in Jacksonville, Fla., Thursday. only to be disappointed by every David Duval who came along. Rory McIlroy is the anti-Tiger, an accessible and grounded superstar from the town of Holywood in Northern Ireland who hits the ball incredible distances, all with an inner joy that Woods will never have. McIlroy has his own reason to be thankful, with tennis star Caroline Wozniacki as his constant companion.

BOXING: Even if you don't like the sport, you have to love the stories. Johnathon Banks learned everything he knew about boxing from Emanuel Steward, so much so that when Steward died a few weeks ago, Banks took over as trainer of heavyweight champion Wladimir Klitschko. He was in Klitschko's corner in Germany for his win over Mariusz Wach and then flew to Detroit for a memorial service for Steward. A few days later he was in Atlantic City, where he revived his own career with a shocking knockout win Saturday night over Seth Mitchell. That could put him in line for a title shot against, you guessed it, Klitschko, the man he trains. Only in boxing. "All I can think is how grateful I am for Emanuel Steward,"

Banks said. LABOR PEACE: OK, the NHL is in lockout mode, and the prospect of another lost season is a gut check to hockey fans everywhere. But there will be no lost games in the NFL for much of the next decade, the NBA has a new long term deal and the only thing owners and players in baseball are worried about is how many zeroes the new contracts have. And, of course, there are decent referees on the field again in the NFL, even if they do happen to

swear at times. CONCUSSIONS: Good things are happening in the fight against the once silent epidemic of concussions on sports. Brains are being analyzed, millions of dollars are being poured into research, and there's an awareness about the danger of hits to the head that could save lives everywhere from your child's soccer field to the stadiums of the NFL. Unfortunately, it's too late for thousands of former players who are paying for the blows to their head every day of their lives – something the NFL refuses to own up to.

DEATH OF THE BCS: Our long national nightmare is almost over. The Bowl Championship Series is, for all intents and purposes, dead, killed off by a fan revolt at the age of 16. It will be replaced in 2014 by a four-team playoff that, while not perfect, will help legitimize the national championship game. Meanwhile, a possible Notre Dame against Alabama title game this season could be one of the biggest ever.

**OPPORTUNITIES:** Forty years ago this summer, Congress passed and President Nixon signed into law a bill that changed sports forever. Title IX opened up opportunities for women to play sports that were once unimaginable, and it's a gift that will keep on giving for generations to come. When Title IX was enacted, fewer than 30,000 female students participated in sports in colleges and universities, a number that has now increased nearly six-fold. Some 3 million girls participate in high school athletics today, 10 times the number who played sports in 1972. Women may never make big breakthroughs in professional sports, but the resources now devoted to female sports means your daughters and granddaughters can dream of

doing things in sports they could never do before.

SPORTS EXTRA: You pay for it more than you realize, every time the cable or satellite bill is due. The Yankees cost you money, and so do the Knicks. There are so many new sports networks popping up that each want their share of the pie that the bill will keep going up until customers finally revolt. What you once got for free now costs a lot, but what a bargain it really is. The variety of sports on television is astonishing, even more so to the generations that grew up before ESPN, when watching sports meant a few football games and Saturday's baseball game of the week - and having to get up to turn the channel to watch it.

We're living in a world where the options for sports fans are greater than ever. We can watch basketball on the decks of aircraft carriers, hockey on the infield of old baseball parks, and the NFL from soccer stadiums in London. Instead of being parked in front of a TV we can feed our seemingly insatiable sports fix on laptops, tablets and even smartphones. If that's not enough it's easier than ever to have a little something riding on the game, whether in form of a wager or a fantasy team payout.

Still there's nothing like a Saturday morning spent watching the kids play soccer or, at my house, a Thanksgiving Day street football game with relatives of all ages. Even in an era of amazing technology, there's room at the local playground for a pickup game of hoops, and grass at the park to toss a baseball around.

So enjoy the turkey and the NFL on TV as well. Save room for the pumpkin pie, and yet another game to feast your eyes on. There's a lot to be thankful for.

STANFORD, Calif. • During the football team's most recent "movie night" held before every game, Stanford coach David Shaw quieted his players to announce that the women's basketball team had beaten top-ranked Baylor. The room erupted in excitement, and Shaw shushed everybody again to make one more statement.

"I said, 'OK, now it's our turn," Shaw said. "It was just kind of like, 'OK, yeah?"

The trend started on the Hawaii hardwood, moved onto the football field in Eugene and finally floated all over Twitter, where Stanford players put the perfect label on an unforgettable weekend: Revenge of the Nerds.

Tara VanDerveer's team ended Brittney Griner and the Lady Bears' 42-game winning streak. Shaw and his players outsmarted No. 1 Oregon 17-14 in overtime Saturday to complete a dramatic double, and "Nerd Nation" - as athletes across all sports on this quant Silicon Valley campus call themselves - enjoyed giant I-told-you-so celebration.

The victories went well beyond the Cardinal getting payback on the programs that ruined each team's national title hopes last season. Both showed that success can still be reached well after Andrew Luck and Nnemkadi Ogwumike – the No. 1 overall draft picks in each sport - have left The Farm.

"I think it was special," Shaw said Tuesday. "You could draw a parallel to say that the women's basketball team lost one of the best players in the country, but they want to prove that they're a good team. We can say that we fall into that category also, whereas we lost the best player in the country in our sport, and we also want to prove to ourselves as well as to other people that we're a good football team that can compete against anybody."

Consider it done.

Along with losing Luck to the Indianapolis Colts, three other Stanford players were selected in the top 42 picks in April's NFL draft, and both starting safeties and wide receivers are also on NFL rosters or practice squads now. Taking down the previously undefeated Ducks at amped-up Autzen Stadium has surprisingly put the Cardinal (9-2, 7-1) in control to host the Pac-12 Conference championship game - something a Luckled team never did – if they can beat No. 15 UCLA on Saturday.

VanDerveer is still learning how her team will play over the course of the season after losing Ogwumike to graduation and the WNBA's Los Angeles Sparks. The Hall of Fame coach has talked to her team since training camp about what the football program has been able to accomplish long after its leader left, citing examples of defense and unselfishness that go beyond any one player.

The women's team got even more pumped up when they were informed over the public address system during pregame warm-ups against Hawaii on Saturday that the football team had upset Oregon.

"When they did it, they could hear us cheering from Hawaii," said VanDerveer, whose Cardinal (5-0) beat

Baylor 71-69 and eventually captured the Rainbow Wahine tournament in Honolulu to become the top-ranked team in the latest Associated Press poll. "When we won, we could hear them cheering from Oregon."

The rigorous academics, adjacent facilities and shared dining halls naturally bring Stanford athletes closer together. The football and women's basketball teams, however, have grown even tighter behind the rallying cry of Nerd Nation.

"It's sort of like a conspiracy," joked junior forward Chiney Ogwumike, the younger sister of Nnemkadi.

Football players first began to embrace the stereotype when former coach Jim Harbaugh brought a more physical, run-first style to the program and opponents often teased that a team full of future venture capitalists, engineers and even politicians couldn't be tough. The women's team took it a step further last season, when the Ogwumike sisters created a spoof video called "Nerd City Kids" that included football players. The video went viral all over YouTube and social media.

Ogwumike said she has even lobbied for a banner to be placed at the campus' entrance that reads: "Welcome to Nerd City?

"It's having a little chip on our shoulder, but also acknowledging that the culture around here for athletics is a little bit different and embracing that," Mohawk-wearing middle linebacker Shayne Skov said.

Players for each team said the departure of their transcendent teammate drove players to prove the program went beyond any one player

 – a sentiment both Luck and Nnemkadi Ogwumike used to share with anybody who would listen, though few often did.

Now more than ever, no longer can anybody - including coaches - be complacent. No longer can the team depend on its most dominating player to steal a victory, and nobody's talents - or flaws can be covered up.

"Knowing that people are kind of like, what are you going to do without Neka? Everybody just kind of like comes together," forward Taylor Greenfield said. "We have so many more and so many different weapons this year and so many opportunities for other people to step up, so I think people are more excited."

Past failures also have pulled the programs together.

The Stanford women's basketball team has reached the Final Four the last five years – losing to Baylor in its latest appearance - and never won the title. Van-Derveer – not one to mix words - said her team is showing stronger signs of progression in November than it did in recent seasons. For instance, she said none of the players even knew they were No. 1 until she told them.

The football team's only regular-season loss the previous two years had come against Oregon. Beating the seemingly unstoppable Ducks after two years of torment has made the victory even sweet er - perhaps especially for those no longer around.

"Great game by the Cardinal in Eugene," said former Stanford athletic director Bob Bowlsby, now the Big 12 Conference commissioner. "Sure fouled up the national championship picture."

The same explanations for Stark's massive improvements lead one to believe there's more to come.

Stark pushed himself in the off-season, spending 20 days in the mountains of Colorado, and training at altitude at an elite cross country camp. Naturally, his fitness and stamina improved, but so did his leg speed.

"He came in in fantastic shape and after that it's just maintenance," Twin Falls cross country and track coach Marty Grindstaff said. "It's all about the miles, and Stark put in the miles."

Learning from former Twin Falls second place cross country runner Erik Harris, now at BYU, Stark knew that in order to follow in his footsteps -which he did all too often at Bruins practices and meets - he'd have to outwork everyone.

"I trained with Eric, and he was always pushing for more." Stark said. "Do one more 400-meter, one more 800-meter, kick this last mile as hard as you can. He would do anything to make the team better."

And this year, it was teammate Matthew Schenk who made Stark better. Schenk, a junior who finished 17th in state, was faster than Stark in 2011. And while

Schenk suffered, he didn't give up his top spot without a fight - and that battle will go on into their senior years.

"Jeremy's work ethic is awesome, he never really takes a day off," Schenk said. "Eric never took a day off either and went after it. We push each other, but we're still friends."

Stark credits his father for inspiring his love for running, even though he wasn't a competitive runner himself. But it was the time Stark spent with his brother in Texas as a middle schooler that helped build Stark's work ethic - fence post by fence post, pulled weed by pulled weed. Stark helped his brother launch a hunting ranch when he was in eighth grade.

"It was fun, but I worked hard," Stark said. "It was every day after school. I still ran, too."

And don't expect that to change for Stark, who has a chance to build on his cross country success in track and go for state next fall. In fact, if the trendline of the past is any indication, he'll probably work harder.

"Running is pretty much my life, my hobby, pretty much consumes me," Stark said. "I love it, the competition; it pushes me to get to the top. I'd love to get a scholarship to go run somewhere."

### Irish Trying to Turn USC Rivalry Their Way

The Notre Dame-USC rivalry has been defined by dominance over the last four decades. Two of college football's most celebrated teams have alternated long runs of success in the series that have coincided with the ups and downs of the programs.

When the Fighting Irish and Trojans meet for the 84th time on Saturday in the Los Angeles Coliseum, Notre Dame will be playing for a spot in the national championship while USC will be trying to salvage a disappointing season.

The Irish appear primed to turn the rivalry back in their direction after a decade of USC ownership.

During Southern California's most recent dynasty, coach Pete Carroll's Trojans reeled off eight straight victories against the Irish from 2002-09, the longest winning streak by USC in the series.

In 2010, Brian Kelly's first season as Notre Dame coach, the Irish snapped that streak, 20-16, with the help of a memorable dropped pass that would have been a sure touchdown. USC came right back and won last season in South Bend, Ind., 31-17, to make it nine out of 10.

"Well, it's not a great rivalry right now," Kelly said this week. "We haven't won enough games. They've had the upper hand on this. We need to make this a rivalry."

From the mid-80s through the mid-90s, it was USC that was trying to make it a rivalry. As USC struggled to hold its place among the elite programs in college football, the Irish often contended for national titles under Lou Holtz and went 12-0-1 against the Trojans.

Thatnumberhelpsexplainthe relatively short tenures of coaches Ted Tollner (1983-86) and Larry Smith (1987-92) at USC.

Lane Kiffin is hoping his USC career is more like Carroll's than Smith's, but it has certainly been a tough season for the Trojans. They started the season, their first after a two-season, NCAA-imposed postseason ban, ranked No. 1, and with the presumptive Heisman Trophy front-runner in senior star quarterback Matt Barkley.

Maybe expectations were too high for a team that lacked depth and had some question marks on both lines. But few would have predicted that USC would head into its finale

unbeaten No. 1 team in the country, two victories from its first national championship since 1988.

The Fighting Irish started the season unranked. The last team to start out of the rankings and reach No. 1 was Missouri in 2007. The Tigers lost their final game before the bowls, falling to Oklahoma in the Big 12 title game, and lost a chance to play for the national title.

But maybe we shouldn't be so surprised about the Irish. Holtz, Dan Devine, Ara Parseghian and Frank Leahy all won national championships in their third season as Notre Dame coach, all beating USC along the way.

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# Forgotten Georgia in Thick of Championship Race

A**THENS, Ga.** • When Oregon and Kansas State both went down, Aaron Murray whooped it up as much as any Georgia fan.

He knew what that meant for the Bulldogs -a shot at the national championship.

"I've never screamed so much at the television and prayed so much in my life," Georgia's star quarterback said Tuesday. "It was definitely an exciting night. We were screaming, high-fiving, hugging, group hugs. It was a lot of fun."

Funny thing, though. Outside of this state, hardly anyone is talking about the Southeastern Conference's other title contender.

Instead, everyone is gushing about the possibility of two storied programs – Notre Dame and Alabama – playing for No. 1.

Georgia, it seems, is just an afterthought.

"We don't mind being the underdogs," Murray said. "We know what we have to do, and that's win games. If we do that, we'll be good to go."

Indeed, while it may appear the third-ranked Bulldogs are trying to sneak in the back door, they have exactly the same path to the championship as the topranked Fighting Irish and second-ranked Crimson Tide.

Win out. Win it all.

For Georgia, it starts with Saturday's regular-season finale against state rival Georgia Tech (6-5). The Bulldogs have won 10 of 11 in

the series and are a twotouchdown favorite to extend that domination against the high-scoring Yellow Jackets. Still, coach Mark Richt is working hard to ensure his team doesn't get caught looking ahead to the SEC championship game against Alabama the following week.

He's gone to some rather extreme measures to keep the one-game-at-a-time mentality. Richt refuses to even say whether he was watching last Saturday night when Kansas State got blown out by Baylor and Oregon lost in overtime to Stanford, allowing Georgia to jump to No. 3 in the BCS standings. If anyone tries to bring up

If anyone tries to bring up Alabama or the BCS, Richt won't even respond. "I had to hang up on my

mom," he said, only halfjoking.

Richt insists there's been no discussion with his staff about what might happen beyond the Georgia Tech game, and he said there's no need to remind his players it's business as usual. "We meet every day to talk about how we're going to handle the week: who we're playing next, what kind of challenges they bring, what we're going to do on a daily basis to get ready for them," Richt said. "That's all we do." After Saturday, the picture could be even clearer.

Notre Dame (11-0) is favored by a touchdown against disappointing Southern Cal, which will be further hampered by the absence of star quarterback Matt Barkley. He won't play because of a sprained right shoulder, forcing the Trojans to give freshman Max Wittek his first career start. Alabama (10-1) opened as a 33point pick over hapless Auburn, which is winless in the SEC and wrapping up its worst season in decades.

If all three favorites win, Notre Dame is assured of a spot in the Jan. 7 BCS championship game in Miami. The SEC title game between Alabama and Georgia (10-1) would essentially serve as a national semifinal.

Of course, nothing is assured in this sport.

Just ask Oregon and Kansas State.

"Not to get negative," said Georgia linebacker Christian Robinson, pondering the idea of losing to the Yellow Jackets with so much on the line, "but it could be horrible. It could be everything we didn't want this season to be about. People would pile on everything negative they could think about us.

"We have an opponent coming here that probably hates us more than any other opponent. And it's probably mutual."

It's stunning that Georgia (10-1) had clawed its way into this position considering what happened on Oct. 6.

The Bulldogs rolled into South Carolina for a crucial game between two unbeaten teams — and got blown out. They were behind 21-0 at the end of the first quarter and lost 35-7, scoring a meaningless touchdown in the closing minutes just to avoid a shutout.

According to STATS LLC, no team that has finished No. 1 in The Associated Press poll or claimed the Bowl Championship Series title with such a lopsided loss on its record. The worst defeat by a champion came in 1983, when Miami dropped its opener to Florida 28-3 but rebounded to win its last 11 games, including an upset of then-No. 1 Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

Georgia dropped to No. 14 in the AP poll after the debacle in Columbia, which most thought was too far back to have any shot at No. 1. But the Bulldogs bounced back with five straight wins, most notably a 17-9 triumph over Florida, and kept climbing as one unbeaten team after another fell in defeat.

"After South Carolina, especially, we had to take a step back and realize that we can control our future," tight end Arthur Lynch said. "We haven't looked ahead."

Now, even though the Bulldogs are one of just three teams that controls its own destiny, they're not breaking from the philosophy that has served them well.

So this week, it's all about Georgia Tech.

"No matter what the records are, or what's happening, nothing changes the fact that if we lose to them, it's a living hell for the next 365 days," Lynch said. "It's what fuels me and gets me motivated. If you're not motivated for this game, you probably shouldn't come to Georgia. You always have to beat Tech."

### Little Things Adding up for Notre Dame's Golson

decade by USC (7-4). Ready to help Notre Dame advance to the BCS title game with a win.

Kelly said he bases that opinion by the maturity Golson has shown as he's improved throughout the season, playing in tough venues such as Michigan State and Oklahoma and rallying the Irish from a two-touchdown deficit in the fourth quarter against Pittsburgh to a tripleovertime victory.

"All of those things go into Saturday and all of those will be positives for him going into the USC game," Kelly said.

Golson said he is feeling more comfortable because of all he's learned and he has learned to manage the clock better so he doesn't have to rush each play.

"I think I've progressed a lot," he said.

Golson keeps doing a lot more of the little things right and it's leading to more big plays for the Irish. He waited until the last second to pitch the ball to set up Cierre Wood's 68-yard touchdown run on the fourth play against Wake Forest. He had TD passes of 50 and 34 yards against Wake Forest, and the second came after a nice pump fake.

Slowly, Golson has turned what had been an at-best average offense into one that opponents are increasingly having trouble slowing down.

"He's a guy that makes explosive plays," Kelly said. "He's got the ability to throw it. He can run the football. He's elusive. I think we're seeing a guy that's growing each and every week."

Through Notre Dame's first five games, Golson was 67-of-111 passing for 827 yards with three touchdown passes and three interceptions, with a pass efficiency rating of 126.46. He also had run for 40 yards on 27 carries.

In the last five games, after sitting out against BYU with a

concussion, Golson is 84-of-145 passing for 1,091 yards with eight touchdowns and two interceptions, a pass efficiency rating completion rate of 136.58. He's also run for 202 yards on 53 carries – and that includes just one carry in the win over Wake Forest.

The Irish have improved during that span from 71st in the nation in total offense, averaging 398.4 yards a game, to 50th, averaging 419.7.

"He's definitely on the right path to providing us the offense that we need," Kelly said.

The coach admitted he hasn't run Golson as much as he'd like because he still needs to get stronger.

"He still needs another coat of armor on him. He needs another year in the weight room and he needs to get thicker. We want to be judicious when we run him," Kelly said. "We've got to run him. He's better when he runs, physically and mentally. He loves to run."

Golson is the fourth quarterback in Notre Dame history to start his career with nine straight victories. He would have 10 straight if he hadn't been benched the first three plays against Miami. The school record is 11 wins by Bob Williams during the national championship season of 1949. Last week, the focus was

working on footwork and communicating with teammates, calling plays and then checking into different plays. Kelly had Golson watching film of Peyton Manning and other quarterbacks.

"Manning is probably one of the great communicators, his ability to get into plays and check and do it efficiently," Kelly said. "We try to use some of the greats to show some things that could be helpful."

As for the pressure of playing at USC with Notre Dame eager to win its first national championship since 1988, Golson said he's taking the same attitude he's taken all year of focusing on the opponent and not worrying about the big picture.

"As far as I'm concerned, my head is down, my foot's on the gas, I'm never going to look up and lose focus," he said. "My thing is just keep your head down and keep pushing it."

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

decorated combat veteran, Staff Sgt. Dwight L. Smith Jr. seemed the perfect soldier. Until, New York Times



that is, he visited his family in Delaware last Christmas and, as he later told the police, "clicked on." Inexplicably one morning, while driving his bright red Hummer on a public street, he ran down a 65-yearold woman, Marsha Lee, as she walked her dog, according to police accounts. Then, as a witness watched, he got out and threw Lee, injured and screaming, into the back seat and drove off.

Lee's body, naked except for socks, was found discarded in a wooded area half a mile away. Her head had been bashed in with a heavy, sharp object, perhaps a rock. The police later established that she had been raped.

Police officers searched frantically for the Hummer, and that evening they arrested Smith as he drove such a vehicle, still spattered with blood. A police affidavit says that Smith admitted to the slaying that night, explaining that he had decided that he "wanted to kill someone."

Lee was much loved in the community, for she had devoted herself nearly full time to local causes like an animal shelter and a home for the elderly. Her funeral was one of the biggest anyone can remember in Delaware, and the town has honored her by giving her street a second name: Marsha Lee Way. Her husband, Scottie Lee, declined to speak to me at the request of prosecutors. But family friends see this as straightforward: a case of a young man committing an act of pure evil.

Smith, now 25, is in prison, and a trial is still more than a year off, but this may emerge as the pre-eminent American case exploring whether soldiers' brain injuries and trauma overseas can lead to crimes committed later. The basic question is whether Lee, as she walked her dog on a quiet street here, became an indirect casualty of our foreign wars.

About half a million American soldiers have suffered from brain-rattling concussions in Afghanistan or Iraq, and one result is an epidemic of traumatic brain injuries and post-traumatic stress disorder. We're seeing many more suicides among recent veterans than among earlier generations, probably because of repeated, extended deployments in combat, coupled with an increase in improvised explosive devices and concussions.

The organizations that work tirelessly to provide for the less fortunate.


The people who dedicate themselves to educating our children.

Romney's Take on Election

### Results Doesn't Add Up

"It's a proven political strategy, which is, give a bunch of money from the government to a group and guess what? They vote for you."

- Mitt Romney, speaking privately to donors, Nov. 14, 2012

We had thought we wouldn't have to fact-check Mitt Romney again, or at least for a while. But his private remarks this week to a group of donors require some closer examination. The quote above makes it sound as though the Obama campaign was handing out "walking around money" to get out the vote.

Instead, Romney was speaking of what he called "gifts" to specific demographic groups, such as "forgiveness of college loan interest" to voters under the age of 29, "free health care" to African Americans, "amnesty" to the children of illegal immigrants (to lure Latinos) and "free contraceptives" for young, college-age women.

Republicans have quickly distanced themselves from Romney's remarks, which struck many as tin-eared or sour grapes. (Latinos, for instance, also might have been turned off by Romney's harsh rhetoric on immigration during the primaries.) It is also worth recalling that Romney in the presidential debates said the opposite about many of these so-called "gifts," frequently suggesting he had virtually the same policies.

We will leave the political analysis to others, but we wondered: How do Romney's assertions stand up to the facts revealed in the national exit polls?

Let's compare how Barack Obama did in 2008 versus 2012 among the groups mentioned by Romney, using the exit polls from the two elections. The figures below show the percentage of votes that Obama received. (We used the data for non-married women because the sample size for single women ages 18-22 is too small to be useful.)

Voters ages 18-29 (percent of overall vote: 19 percent in 2012, 18 percent in 2008)

2012: 60 percent; 2008: 66 percent

African-Americans (percent of overall vote: 13 percent

in 2012, 13 percent in 2008)

2012: 93 percent 2008: 95 percent **Hispanics** (percent of overall vote: 10 percent in 2012, 9 percent in 2008)

2012: 71 percent; 2008: 67 percent

**Non-married women** (percent of overall vote: 23 percent in 2012, 20 percent in 2008)

2012: 67 percent; 2008: 70 percent

First of all, the data shows that Obama's percentage of the vote declined for three of these groups — among young voters, African-Americans and non-married women. His share of the vote went up (marginally) for Hispanics.

There was not much difference in the percentage of the overall vote for these groups, either. You can see slight increases among the youth, Hispanics and unmarried women, but that is well within the margin of error for the poll — which is plus or more minus 3 percent.


Indeed, considering the margin of error, the only significant shift was the six-percentage-point drop in support for Obama among voters ages 18 to 29. As Romney noted, young voters "turned out in large numbers, a larger share in this election even than in 2008," but their actual voting pattern completely undercuts Romney's assertion. He managed to win a larger share of those voters than John McCain did in 2008.

In some critical battleground states, Obama did boost his share of the vote, such as a 14 percentage-point gain among Hispanics in Colorado and a five percentage-point gain among voters ages 18-29 in Florida. But that seems more a function of a superior get-out-the-vote operation.

Romney's analysis of the election results is not borne out by the actual election data. In effect, Obama reassembled a slightly less robust version of the coalition that first elected him four years ago — and Romney failed to get enough votes to overcome that.

We don't mean to knock a man when he's down. But Romney's comments suggest that his understanding of the election results needs some serious rethinking.

mental health services for these soldiers and veterans. The administration and members of Congress talk a good game about honoring young men and women who went to war, but they don't allocate the resources necessary to care of them. A result is certainly disability and suicides. Could it also include brutal crimes like this one?

"I know my child," said Smith's father, Dwight Sr., a 49-year-old manager in the Philadelphia schools. "This isn't my kid. He was a goofy kid. This isn't the same man that I sent over."

The father was sitting morosely in his dimly lit dining room, the curtains all drawn. In the corner of the room was the purple heart that Dwight Jr. earned in Afghanistan, and in the living room just beyond was his wedding photo and a military portrait. It's impossible to reconcile that beaming young man in the photos with the one who murdered and raped Lee.

"This is a tragedy for two families," Smith added. "I just don't think my son was ready to come back in regular society."

Smith thinks that his son's mind became poisoned by war, and Dwight Jr. seems to think that as well. I couldn't get access to him in prison, but in a recent handwritten letter to his father (which is posted with the online version of this column), he wrote:

"I am going to be honest with you dad. I have killed a lot of men and children. Some that didn't even do anything for me to kill them. Also some that begged for mercy. I have a problem. I think I got addicted to killing people. I could kill someone go to sleep wake up and forget that it ever happened. It got normal for me to be that way. I never wanted to be this way. I just took my job way to serious. I took things to the extreme. Anyone can tell you that I changed. It is like being a completely different person."

If Smith did indeed randomly kill civilians in Iraq or Afghanistan, I could find no record of that. What is clearer is that he was exposed to concussions while in combat, apparently at least two of them. One occurred when he was in Iraq and his Humvee was thrown into the air in an explosion. He was not visibly injured.

Then, in March 2011, a mortar shell landed near him in Afghanistan and blew him 15 feet in the air, shattering a ceramic plate in his body armor, according to his

mong the things for which Americans can, on this feast day, be thankful is Washington's resolve to temper severity with mercy: It will seriously - this time we really mean business, we are not going to be Greece, or worse, Illinois - restrain spending but will not balance the budget on the backs of popcorn eaters. Growers of this essential snack may yet retain their subsidy, lest the price of a tub of the stuff at the movies soar by a nickel, even a dime. Can't have that. Or this: "I," said Terry List, "would not recommend to my pupils to become a teacher in Michigan" because a proposed pension reform would delay her retirement past age 47. Under Michigan's mandatory evaluation system, all the teachers in Hazel Park School District were given the top rating - "highly qualified" - yet the high school was given an "F" for student achievement.

Ignoring William James' admonition that one should do an unpleasant duty every day just to stay in moral trim, millions of voters did not dutifully vote. In a burst of ennui, turnout declined for the first time in 16 years. Who says you cannot make a souffle rise twice? Barack Obama was re-elected. Having spent four years making a sow's ear out of the silk purse of public support with which he began his presidency, he won by essentially vowing for his new term what an NBA player promised his new team: "We'll turn the program around 360 degrees." Joe Biden called his boss's decision to kill Osama bin Laden the most "audacious plan" in 500 years. Pick vour counterexamples. Tina Brown applied her editor's magic to Newsweek, R.I.P. If only she



now could become editor of The New York Times. In a radio broadcast, a Times food columnist said government should "protect us from things from which we can't protect ourselves." He meant sugar. Michael Bloomberg, scourge of big sodas, undoubtedly agrees. Angela Prattis, the lunch lady of Chester Township, Pa., was threatened with a \$600 fine for giving sandwiches to hungry children but was told she might get permission after a hearing that could cost her \$1,000. Gallup and The American Research Group estimate consumers will average \$764 to \$854 per person on Christmas spending. Much will be spent on imported merchandise, mostly from China. China is America's largest global competitor economically, our largest creditor and largest emerging military adversary. I invite readers of this letter to make a concerted effort this year to pursue a strategy of keeping dollars at home, to help our own community, our neighbors and our own interests.

As you plan your spending, consider supporting local artists and crafters. Give gift certificates to locally owned shops, delicatessens, barbers, beauticians, spas, health clubs, eateries and entertainment venues. Hire a carpenter, plumber, roofer, draper, cabinet maker, tiler, rug installer or painter to spruce up your home or grandma's or your kids' homes. When buying mass-produced merchandise, check the labels; buy American. If you're giving a pet, visit the animal shelter first.

Most books in stores are U.S. published. Because times are tough, consider gift certificates to local grocery stores, auto service centers or clothiers. There are 40,000 of us in Twin Falls, more than twice that across the Magic Valley. Imagine if we kept our 800 Christmas dollars circulating locally among our neighbors and locally owned small businesses. That would be a \$32 million boost to Twin Falls alone and two to three times that for the entire valley. And you wouldn't be sending the money to chief executive officers in corporate headquarters in another state, or overseas, or to a country building a military largely focused against us. Does your Christ mas tree really need another foreign-made gadget under it that will be forgotten by spring?

Buy Local. Buy American. Peace on Earth. Merry Christmas.



### *The Best Tax Deduction to Chop*

hat's the least defensible special break in the U.S. tax code? With so many distortions to choose from, it's hard to



name just one. If forced to pick, I might say the deduction for state and local taxes, which cost \$67 billion in fiscal 2011, according to the congressional Joint Committee on Taxation.

This one overwhelmingly benefits upper-income households in a handful of upper-income states, while rendering the entire nation's finances less transparent. It's also a potential source of friction in the "fiscal cliff" negotiations between President Obama and the Republicans (but we'll get to that in a moment).

Taxpayers have been allowed to deduct state and local income and property taxes since the federal income tax began in 1913. (Sales taxes have at times been deductible, too, but that's a relatively minor issue.) The theory is it's unfair to make people pay twice for the public services they receive. That's doubtful, though, since, despite some overlap, federal taxes support different services than state and local.

What the deduction does is enable higher-income states and localities to tax — and spend — more than they otherwise would, while shifting some of the cost to other states. It also encourages them to collect revenue in forms that are easier to deduct on federal returns.

Two states, California and New York, reaped almost 30 percent of the deduction's value in 2009, the latest year for which I could find Internal Revenue Service data. Other states that benefit disproportionately include Connecticut, New Jersey, Illinois, Massachusetts and Maryland.

In 2009, 73 percent of the deduction's benefits went to taxpayers with annual incomes above \$100,000, according to the Congressional Budget Office; fully 20 percent of the benefits went to taxpayers with annual incomes above \$1 million.

Starting to notice a pattern? Basically, what we have is a significant federal tax subsidy for "blue" state governments. These also happen to be the states having the most difficulty living within their means, what with their expensive urban school systems, bloated pension liabilities and all. Yet they have an incentive to close their budget gaps by raising income taxes rather than reining in spending, because the deduction helps them pass the tab to other states, most of them red.

California Gov. Jerry Brown addressed his budget woes through a referendum this year to boost the top income tax rate, just as Illinois Gov. Pat Quinn pushed an income tax rate increase through his legislature last year.

Now you're beginning to understand how this seemingly innocuous tax break distorts financial flows within and among the 50 states, as well as between the states on the one hand and Washington on the other.

As for negotiations over a "grand bargain" between President Obama and the Republican House, the state and local tax deduction complicates that process, too.

The main bone of contention is the federal income tax rate on top earners, currently 35 percent. Obama says it is going to be hard to raise enough revenue without returning that rate to 39.6 percent, the level during Bill Clinton's presidency.

Republicans insist that eliminating deductions and tax breaks could bring in more revenue without raising rates — while getting most of the money from the wealthy, just as the president wants to do.

In fact, the Tax Policy Center, a nonpartisan Washington think tank, has shown that eliminating all itemized deductions while cutting rates 20 percent across the board and eliminating the alternative minimum tax would raise \$1.9 trillion over 10 years. That's \$300 billion more than President Obama is seeking from Congress. Of course, not even the Republicans are proposing such a sweeping reform, which would certainly make the tax code more efficient - but also wipe out breaks for charitable giving and mortgage interest that enjoy wide red-state support, too. And the president himself has suggested limiting deductions in combination with rate increases, perhaps by capping the rate at which deductions may be claimed. But because its impact is so heavily concentrated in blue states, the state and local deduction creates an asymmetry: Democrats have an extra reason to insist on raising rates, and Republicans have an extra incentive to demand loophole-cutting. Perhaps it's just coincidence, but I have noticed that those most skeptical of the loophole-closing approach include Sen. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., and House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif. So let's all say a Thanksgiving prayer for a successful negotiation – and remember that even a very grand bargain would still leave our state and federal tax and budget systems in need of major reform.

I read on the Internet the story of the Declo, Idaho, fourth-graders who picked their own "incentive" for reaching reading goals and of the students who were given a punishment rather than an incentive.

My heart physically ached at the thought of the humiliation imposed upon students for not learning as fast as others. What type of teacher would allow this to happen? What type of teacher does not understand the difference between incentive and punishment? And would ask her students to pick an incentive and allow them to choose a punishment and not use that moment to teach them the difference between the two?

This teacher failed the

students in one of the worst ways I can imagine. If I were a parent of any student in that class, I would immediately remove them from the teacher's influence. And if I were a parent of any student who was involved in the face painting, I would have them not only apologize in a written letter to the other students but also volunteer two hours a week for the rest of the school year to tutor the students who did not reach the reading goal. Perhaps that way they could all learn not only about humiliation and incentives but about compassion, encouragement and, most importantly, character.

public defender, Bradley V. Manning. Smith was hospitalized, flown back to the United States, and given a diagnosis of a traumatic brain injury with post-traumatic stress disorder.

Jasmin Smith, a 29-yearold German woman who is now his wife, and was then his girlfriend, recalls seeing him in the hospital shortly after his return. "He was in a wheelchair," she said. "His hand was shaking. He looked pretty bad. He didn't say anything for 15 or 20 minutes. At the beginning, he didn't even recognize me."

She says they celebrated his apparent recovery by marrying two months later. But the recovery seemed fleeting, she says, for he began to abuse alcohol and prescription painkillers and would sometimes fly into violent rages.

"He was always angry about little things," Smith said. "He would throw laptops, punch holes in walls." Smith says that he did once choke her and, fearing for her safety, she flew back to Germany. "I didn't tell him I was leaving, because I was scared."

Dwight Sr. says his son called then, despondent. "Dad, I don't know what's wrong with me," the father quoted his son as telling him. "I just get mad. I can't help myself." Eventually, after he promised to control himself, Smith did return to his base at Fort Drum, N.Y., and they resumed married life. Two months later, on the day of the murder, they were at Dwight Sr's home for Christ mas vacation. Jasmin says that her husband asked her to

go jogging in the morning, but she declined. Then he left the house – and allegedly killed and raped Lee.

He seemed relatively normal when he returned, Jasmin Smith told me, and they went Christmas shopping that afternoon. After he was arrested that evening, she spoke briefly to her husband; she says that his only explanation for the crime was that he had become enraged while running that he wasn't physically fit enough. Sometimes since, she says, he has suggested that he blacked out and can't remember exactly what happened. He also says that he wants to apologize to Lee's family. Rape hasn't been part of the typical pattern of crimes committed by returning soldiers with TBI or PTSD. But Dr. Bennet Omalu, an expert on brain injuries who is also a clinical professor of pathology at University of California, Davis, told me that TBI could indeed lead to such sexual violence. Indeed, Omalu said he had recently performed an autopsy on an elderly woman who had been randomly raped and murdered by an Iraq war veteran.

Frankly, I hesitated to write this column. I feel strongly that we as a nation have let down our veterans, failing to provide the mental health services they need, and we owe them better. But I can't be sure that the murder of Lee is related to these failures. In the end, I decided to go ahead because here's a young man with no adult criminal record who was promoted rapidly within the military and then suffered brain injuries. And then on his return he allegedly committed a horrific rape and murder that do not make any sense - not to me, not to you, not to his family.

### States' Health Exchanges: Too Much to Chew?

ith a growing number of state leaders saying they will leave it to the federal government to handle a crucial element of President Barack Obama's healthcare law, even supporters of the statute are wondering if the administration is up to the job.

So far, the administration has released few details about the complex computer systems needed to operate exchanges for states that don't want to run them. The exchanges - online marketplaces for consumers and small businesses to buy insurance - are supposed to be up and running by Oct. 1, 2013, for coverage that begins in January 2014.

Joel Ario, who until a year ago was the federal official overseeing development of the exchanges, said that while he is optimistic, he isn't certain that the federal government will be ready by October.

"Anybody who tells you for sure . . . is illinformed, because this is still a work in progress," said Ario, who is now a healthcare consultant.

But Michael Hash, director of the office of health reform at the Department of Health and Human Services, said, "We have the contractors in place, and we're on track to meet the deadlines that are necessary to make the exchanges operational."

Under the law, states have three options: They can set up the exchanges themselves, create them in partnership with the federal government or cede control to federal authorities.

The exchanges are fundamental to the law's goal of expanding insurance coverage. Millions of people who aren't covered by employer-sponsored health plans will get federal subsidies to buy insurance through their state's exchange. Those whose incomes aren't low enough for subsidies could still benefit from the competition among insurers that the exchanges are designed to foster.

States that decide to set up their own exchanges must inform the federal government by Friday. So far, about 14 have indicated definite interest, with six more likely to do so. States that decline to set up their own exchanges have until Feb. 15 to decide whether to pursue a federal partnership or have Washington take over the entire chore.

At least 13 states have announced their intention to leave the job to the federal government. They include Alabama, where Gov. Robert Bentley, a Republican, became the latest to join those ranks Tuesday.

government has an interest in persuading as many states as possible to agree, at minimum, to a partnership. That's because the aspects that the states would handle are labor intensive and customized to each state - making them more difficult for federal authorities to deal with. These tasks include deciding which health plans can be sold on the exchanges and monitoring plans' compliance, as well as providing out reach and assistance to consumers.

The latter will require setting up large call centers and walk-in offices, with staff members trained in the minutiae of insurance regulation. Bruce Caswell, who

runs the health-services segment of Maximus - a Reston, Va.-based firm that works on large government data systems and is bidding on a federal contract to assist the exchanges - suggested that the federal government may have to rely heavily on private contractors.

He recalled setting up a call center with hundreds of consumer-assistance staff members in Texas when that state moved 2 million people into different programs under Medicaid, the state-federal health insurance program for the poor and disabled.

"We had to find a facility, outfit it, recruit and train staff, take in all the work, and then shut it down six or seven months later," he said. "That's the kind of agility that would be difficult without a public-private partnership."

Ario, the former federal official, estimated that at most, the federal government could oversee consumer assistance and plan management for about half the states. If the number exceeded that, he said, "it would be an incredible resource drain."

Health and Human Services officials disputed that. They said the administration's reason for encouraging states to take charge of plan management and consumer assistance is to leverage their expertise and give them the largest possible role - not to relieve the federal government of a potential burden.

Meanwhile, experts say that one of the toughest jobs for the federal government in states where it operates the exchanges fully or in partnership will be building the system that figures out whether applicants are eligible for federal subsidies or Medicaid.

The system, for which the government has contracted with the healthcare technology firm CGI, will have to be customized to seamlessly work with each state's existing Medicaid enrollment system.



with her abject sorrows and fears. We see Lincoln tenderly stroking the head of his young son Tad. The tensions of the War Department and its communication center, the Telegraph Office, are somberly depicted for the first time in American cinemagraphic history. The story takes place just two years after a much less aged and troubled Lincoln lobbied and signed the bill creating Idaho Territory in early 1863. The movie closes with a scene set in the Cabinet Room on the evening of April 14, 1865. Just three hours earlier, though not referred to in the film, Lincoln had invited Idaho Territory's Congressman William Wallace to attend Ford's Theatre with him that night. The Idahoan could not go. Mrs Wallace was ill. Lincoln, the movie, is an important slice of history, well depicted and worth enjoying. It even has its own surprise ending, as Congressman Stevens is shown in his bedroom with the official tally sheet of the House vote just concluded. Though powerful scenes punctuate the story, it sometimes does not track smoothly as a cohesive whole. Day Lewis' Lincoln is a stooped, stressed figure, who resorts to humor at questionably appropriate times simply to stay sane. He barely survives the human devastation and political casualty of the Civil War. But Lincoln is also the master of both men and monumental



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events whom we see and hear deliver the powerful Second Inaugural Address on the Capitol steps, in the most realistic such scene ever filmed.

# **Bomb Blasts Tel Aviv Bus**

**TEL AVIV, Israel •** A bomb exploded aboard an Israeli bus near the nation's military headquarters in Tel Aviv on Wednesday, wounding 27 people, delivering a major blow to diplomatic efforts to forge a truce to end a week of fighting between Israel and Gaza's militant Hamas rulers. Thousands of Palestinians fled their homes in Gaza fearing Israeli airstrikes. Hours after the bus blast, U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, who is shuttling across the region in truce talks, arrived in Cairo and met with Egyptian President Mohammed Morsi, who is mediating between Israel and Hamas to end the fighting that has killed more than 140 Palestinians and five Israelis.

The blast, which left the bus charred and its windows blown out, was the first bombing in Tel Aviv since 2006. It appeared aimed at sparking Israeli fears of a return to the violence of the Palestinian uprising last decade, which killed more than 1,000 Israelis in bombings and shooting attacks and left more than 5,000 Palestinians dead as well. Hamas has carried out dozens of suicide bombings that have killed hundreds of Israelis.

While Hamas did not take responsibility for the attack, it praised the bombing.

# **Russian Man Takes on Corrupt Officials**

**YARABAIKASY, Russia** • When Eduard Mochalov tried to have the people who stole his cattle and pig farm brought to justice, he spent eight months in jail on charges he says were cooked up. He appealed to Vladimir Putin and even set himself on fire outside the Kremlin in protest, but still couldn't draw attention to his cause as his farm slowly fell into disrepair.

Now, Mochalov has found a new life as a crusading journalist investigating corruption in his native region, fueled by tips from disgruntled businessmen and government workers. Undeterred by a system where the law is selectively used to protect the powerful and crack down on critics, Mochalov has quickly earned cult status — not to mention the ire of countless local officials — throughout the small province of Chuvashia.

Roughly once a month, he publishes a free newspaper called *Vzyatka*, or *The Bribe*, which rails against what it calls "Chuvash kingpins" who steal from the province's budget. Headlines include "The governor of Chuvashia's family business" and "If nobody's been found guilty, that means they're already in power." The paper has proved so popular that with a print run of 20,000 he has trouble meeting demand.

While official corruption has been rife in Russia since czarist times, frustrations over such graft have skyrocketed under President Putin's rule.

### Report: Wis. Temple Shooter Had no Drugs in System

MILWAUKEE • A white supremacist with a history of alcohol problems had no drugs in his system when he walked into a Sikh temple in suburban Milwaukee this summer and fatally shot six people before killing himself, according to a toxicology report released Wednesday.

There were small amounts of alcohol in Wade Michael Page's heart, but because there was none in his bloodstream the alcohol may have been produced after Page's body tissues began breaking down, a Milwaukee County pathologist said.

"It is impossible to tell if the ethyl alcohol level is due to alcohol ingestion or a product of decomposition," Agnieszka Rogalska said in an email.

Page's sister had told investigators that in the year preceding the rampage,

her brother developed a bloated appearance that made her wonder if he'd been drinking recently. She also said Page seemed to grow more intense over the past year, as if he had lost his wit and sense of humor, according to an in-

vestigative report. Page, 40, opened fire Aug. 5 before a service was to start at the Sikh Temple of Wisconsin in suburban Milwaukee. He killed six people and wounded four others before he was shot in the abdomen during a firefight with police. He died after he shot himself in the head.

The Milwaukee County medical examiner's office, which released the investigative report, officially ruled his death a suicide.

Page's sister told authorities her brother didn't use drugs but had a history of alcohol problems. He was cited several times over the years for his drunken behavior, and was convicted in Colorado of drunken driving in 1999 and in Texas in 2004 for drunkenly kicking holes in an El Paso bar's walls.

Page had gotten several tattoos associated with the white supremacy movement, including the number 14 on his left shoulder and the number 88 on his right one, according to an Aug. 6 autopsy report that had been kept under seal until the FBI completed its investigation Tuesday. In white-supremacist circles, "14" represents the 14 words in a popular skinhead mantra. The number "8" points to "H" as the eighth letter of the alphabet, and 88 is a reference to, "Heil Hitler."

He also had tattoos of skulls and crossbones on one forearm, flames on his lower leg and the words "Suffer" across his shoulders and "Pride" on his upper chest. He also had four letters that abbreviate a profane statement tattooed on the knuckles of his left hand.

### Abortions Fall 5 Percent, Biggest Drop in a Decade

**NEW YORK** • U.S. abortions fell 5 percent during the Great Recession in the biggest one-year decrease in at least a decade, according to government figures released Wednesday.

The reason for the decline wasn't clear, but some experts said it may be because of better use of birth control during tough economic times. Their theory is that some women believe they can't afford to get pregnant.

"They stick to straight and narrow ... and they are more careful about birth control," said Elizabeth Ananat, a Duke University assistant professor of public policy and economics who has researched abortions.

While many states have aggressively restricted access to abortion, most of those laws were adopted in the past two years and are not believed to have played a role in the decline.

Abortions have been dropping slightly over much of the past decade. But before this latest report, they seemed to have leveled off.

Strip," Hamas spokesman Fawzi Barhoum told The Associated Press.

Bassem Ezbidi, a West Bank political analyst, said it was unlikely Hamas itself was behind the attack, since it would not want to risk losing any of the international support it gained in recent days.

"If Hamas wants to target civilians it would do so by firing rockets, but not by buses because such attacks left a negative record in the minds of people. Hamas doesn't need this now," he said.

On the other hand, Hamas may be interested in signaling to Israel that a renewed bombing campaign is possible, particularly as thousands of Israeli ground troops massed on the Gaza border awaiting a possible invasion should cease-fire talks fail.

A tiny militant group, the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command, claimed responsibility for the bus bombing but offered no evidence to back up the claim. The Damascus-based group has few followers in the West Bank and Palestinian groups often claim attacks they haven't carried out.

The Tel Aviv bombing came after a night of more than 30 Israeli airstrikes over Gaza that hit government ministries, smuggling tunnels, a banker's empty villa and a Hamaslinked media office.

Some 10,000 Palestinians sought shelter in 12 U.N.-run schools, after Israel dropped leaflets urging residents to vacate their homes in some areas of Gaza to avoid being hit by airstrikes, said Adnan Abu Hassna, the U.N. Relief and Works Agency spokesman.

The influx of displaced people came a day after the head of UNRWA, Filippo Grandi, warned that the agency urgently needed \$12 million to continue distributing food to the neediest Gazans. The agency runs schools, shelters and food programs for hundreds of thousands of Palestinian refugees and their descendants in Gaza.

The bus attack took

place around noon on one of the coastal city's busiest arteries, near the Tel Aviv museum, the district courthouse and across from an entrance to Israel's national defense headquarters.

The blast was from a device placed inside the bus by a man who then got off, said Yitzhak Aharonovich, Israel's minister of internal security,

He said the explosion took place while the bus was moving. Blood splattered the sidewalk at the site of the explosion, with glass scattered around.

"I was sitting in the middle of the bus. We were about to pull into a station and suddenly there was a huge explosion," said Yehuda Samarano, 59, from his hospital bed where he was being treated for shrapnel wounds to his chest and leg. "I flew from my seat. Everything became white and my ears are still ringing now."

Police set up roadblocks across the city trying to apprehend the attacker.

"We strongly believe that this was a terror attack," said police spokesman Micky Rosenfeld. He said three of the 27 wounded were moderately to seriously hurt.

In Gaza, the bombing was praised from mosque loudspeakers, while Hamas' television station interviewed people praising the attack as a return of militants' trademark tactics.

Clinton said the U.S. "strongly condemns" the bombing, which she called a "terrorist attack."

Israel and Hamas had seemed on the brink of a truce deal Tuesday following a swirl of diplomatic activity also involving U.N. chief Ban Ki-moon and Egypt's Morsi. But sticking points could not be resolved as talks – and violence – stretched into the night.

Clinton shuttled among the sides, meeting Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu in Jerusalem Tuesday night, then Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas in the West Bank the next morning before heading to Cairo. After talks withC Clinton, the Egyptian president met with Ban.

# Jailed Amish Cannot Attend Ohio Wedding

**CLEVELAND** • Defendants convicted in beardand hair-cutting attacks on fellow Amish lost a bid Wednesday to leave jail to attend a family wedding after prosecutors argued they might flee or commit similar attacks while on furlough.

U.S. District Court Judge Dan Polster, who presided at the trial of 16 Amish convicted in the attacks, ruled against requests by five of the nine locked-up Amish, who are awaiting sentencing on Feb. 8. Seven other defendants remain free pending sentencing.

The judge agreed with prosecutors that anyone released from jail might become a fugitive or pose a danger to others.

Those asking to attend

the Thanksgiving Day wedding in Bergholz in eastern Ohio included two brothers and an uncle of the bride. Prosecutors say the bride and groom are "unindicted co-conspirators" in the case.

In September, a jury convicted the 16 of hate crimes in last year's attacks, which prosecutors say stemmed from religious disputes among Amish. The convictions are being appealed.

The defendants seeking jail furloughs "participated in late-night violent assaults on unsuspecting victims, some of whom were family members," the government said in opposing furloughs. "They have shown no remorse for their conduct and were even recorded talking about how they would have committed even more assaults had they known that they

y would be arrested."

As for the bride and groom, "Lizzie Mullet and Ferdinand Miller are unindicated co-conspirators – they are not simply relatives of the defendants," prosecutors said.

The government said the bride joked about and discussed the possibility of more assaults in a phone conversation with her jailed brother. According to the government, another recorded conversation showed the groom suggesting to his father that more attacks be carried out.

"If we can get through this, then we can go get more beard hair," Ferdinand Miller said, according to prosecutors.

A defense attorney said he accepted the ruling.

"It was certainly worth the effort to make the motion, but I do understand the judge's concerns," said J. Dean Carro, attorney for Lester Miller, the bride's uncle.

The defense doesn't deny that the hair-cuttings took place. But it contends that the Amish are bound by different rules guided by their religion and that the government shouldn't get involved in what amounted to a family or church dispute.

Sam Mullet Sr., the leader of the group and among those locked up along with two sons who asked for jail furloughs, was convicted of orchestrating the cuttings in an attempt to shame mainstream members he believed were straying from their beliefs.

His followers were found guilty of carrying out the attacks, which terrorized the normally peaceful religious settlements.

Twenty-nine percent of Russians believe that civil servants only care about using public funds to enrich themselves, a more than nine-fold increase since Putin took power in 2000, according to the Levada Center, an independent polling agency. Corruption was a key motivation behind the unprecedented series of huge protests against Putin in Moscow last winter and spring, and remains a key rallying point for the opposition. Recently, the Kremlin has attempted to siphon off popular anger by launching a major crackdown on corruption, which has cost several high-level officials their jobs. In Chuvashia, a sleepy rural region 400 miles east of Moscow best known for its felt boots, Mochalov devotes all his energy to campaigning against local corruption. That makes him unusual in Russia, especially in the provinces, where few journalists seriously investigate officials and those who do frequently face violent reprisal. Chuvashia is one of the three most corrupt regions in Russia, according to the country's top investigative agency, but few cases make it to court. Officials in Chuvashia did not immediately respond to requests for comment on this story. "If they brought charges based on my investigations, they'd have to arrest the entire provincial government," said Mochalov, as what remained of his abandoned hog barn's roof crumbled around him. What started as an attempt to end the legal struggles over his farm has become an all-consuming mission. The newspaper's high costs – each print run costs \$3,150 - have essentially forced Mochalov to give up his farm: He sold all

his livestock and equipment years ago, and rents out some of the buildings to local services like banks and post offices.

The rest lack heat and electricity, if they are still standing at all. One barn is filled with rotting bales of hay; a corrugated iron shed fight corruption." He put his faith in Dmitry Medvedev, who served as president from 2004 to 2008 when Putin had to step aside because of term limits – but

The new data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that both the number and rate of abortions fell 5 percent in 2009, the most recent statistics available from most states.

Nearly all states report abortion numbers to the federal government, but it's voluntary. A few states – including California, which has the largest population and largest number of abortion providers – don't send in data. Experts believe there are more than 1 million abortions performed nationwide each year, but because of the incomplete reporting, the CDC had reports of about 785,000 in 2009.

For the sake of consistency, the CDC focused on the numbers from 43 states and two cities — those that have been sending in data without interruption for at least 10 years. The researchers found that abortions per 1,000 women of childbearing age fell from about 16 in 2008 to roughly 15 in 2009. That translates to nearly 38,000 fewer abortions in one year.

Mississippi had the lowest abortion rate, at 4 per 1,000 women of childbearing age. The state also had only a couple of abortion providers, and has the nation's highest teen birth rate. New York was highest, with abortion rates roughly eight times higher than Mississippi's. New York is second only to California in of abortion number providers.

Nationally since 2000, the number of reported abortions has dropped overall by about 6 percent and the abortion rate has fallen 7 percent, but the figures essentially leveled off for a few of those years.

By all accounts, contraception is playing a role in lowering the numbers.

Some cite a government study released earlier this year suggesting that about 60 percent of teenage girls who have sex use the most effective kinds of contraception, including the pill and patch. That's up from the mid-1990s, when fewer than half were using the best kinds.

Experts also pointed to the growing use of IUDs. The IUD, or intrauterine device, is a T-shaped plastic spermkiller that a doctor inserts into a woman's uterus. A Guttmacher Institute study earlier this year showed that IUD use among sexually active women on birth control rose from under 3 percent in 2002 to more than 8 percent in 2009.

IUDs essentially prevent "user error," said Rachel Jones, a Guttmacher researcher.

Ananat said another factor for the abortion decline may be the growing use of the morning-after pill, a form of emergency contraception that has been increasingly easier to get. It came onto the market in 1999 and in 2006 was approved for non-prescription sale to women 18 and older. In 2009 the age was lowered to 17.

Underlying all this may be the economy, which was in recession from December 2007 until June 2009. But well afterward, polls have shown most Americans remained worried about anemic hiring, a depressed housing market and other problems. next to it has nearly collapsed.

Shortly afterward, men burst into his office with armed guards and presented tax papers supposedly showing that Mochalov had sold them the farm. When he filed a legal appeal, prosecutors filed charges against him instead, accusing him of having obtained credit illegally to buy the farm.

After spending eight months in jail awaiting trial, Mochalov was released on time served and later succeeded in restoring his legal ownership. By then, however, the farm had already fallen into disrepair.

Mochalov set about trying to bring the raiders to justice. First he tried the legal route, but to no avail. Appeals to Putin and the government also produced nothing. Then he staged protests, including the 2007 Kremlin fire stunt, which caused little physical harm aside from a few scars on his hands. The disused barn where he stores newspapers is full of banners left over from demonstrations imploring pro-Kremlin political parties to "help us Russia is considered to be one of the most corrupt countries in the world. Transparency International's Corruption Perceptions Index ranks Russia 143rd out of 183 countries, level with

Nigeria and below Pakistan. The Levada survey that showed a dramatic jump in public perceptions of official greed polled 1,559 people in person over five days in June; it had a margin of error of plus or minus 3.4 percent.

Mochalov puts the newspaper together in a pokey office smelling of stale varnish at the back of a truck repair shop. He prints it in a neighboring province, since no printer in Chuvashia will go near it. He has only two colleagues, a journalist and a village woman who helps hand the paper out at factories, and he writes many of the articles himself under pseudonyms.

To his frustration, however, no charges have been filed against the officials exposed in *The Bribe*. Russian officials frequently turn a blind eye to corruption stories in the press.

The Bribe has nonetheless struck a chord in Chuvashia, whose president earlier this year proposed creating a blacklist of print media "that write untruths." Several officials mentioned in the newspaper have sued him for damaging their repbegan his campaign to get his farm back by blocking off a highway with tractors. Earlier this year he spent 15 days in jail for throwing eggs at government buildings at a protest.

That unusual style is earning him fans far and wide. Last month, he traveled to Moscow to meet Alexei Navalny, one of the main leaders of the opposition, who made his name through his own efforts to expose corruption in the government and stateowned companies. In messages posted on Twitter, Navalny described Mochalov and his journalist assistant as "incredibly cool people" and "real heroes," and wondered how he has "managed not to get whacked yet."


Mochalov says he is undeterred by any possible reprisal, legal or otherwise. Recently, prosecutors began to investigate a seemingly innocuous article about the Chuvash language for allegedly inciting racial hatred, although no charges have been filed. He also shrugs off the threat of physical violence. Russia is the ninth most dangerous country in the world to be a journalist, according to the Committee to Protect Journalists, a New York-based watchdog. Since the collapse of the Soviet Union, 53 journalists have been murdered



### NY Judge Rejects 9/11 Suit **Against United Airlines**

NEW YORK • United Airlines cannot be held responsible for the hijacking of an American Airlines flight and the collapse of a third World Trade Center building after the twin towers fell in the Sept. 11 attacks, a federal judge ruled Wednesday.

The airline was not responsible for the collapse of 7 World Trade Center because it had no connection to American Airlines Flight 11 or its hijackers, except that it had shared responsibility for a security checkpoint in Portland, Maine, that screened two of the terrorists, U.S. District Judge Alvin Hellerstein said. Regardless of their air carrier, all passengers at the time passed through the checkpoint.

Terrorists flew two commercial jets into the trade center towers on 9/11. Among them were Mohamed Atta and Abdul Aziz al Omari, who had passed through the Portland airport on their way to Boston, where they boarded Flight 11. Some debris from that jet's crash into the north tower

pierced the facade of 7 World Trade Center, start ing fires that caused the 47-story building, erected in 1987, to fall seven hours later.

The corporation that owns 7 World Trade Center sued various aviation defendants, including United, saying their negligence led to the building's destruction.

The judge said United could not have foreseen the chain of events that led to the building's collapse and bore no responsibility for ticketing, passenger check-in and boarding for the flight Atta and al Omari took to Boston, much less responsibility for the operation of the flight itself.

Other than shared authority for the lone security screening checkpoint at Portland International Jetport, "United had no connection to Flight 11 or its hijackers," the judge said.

He said it was "not within United's range of apprehension that terrorists would slip through" the Maine checkpoint, fly Boston, proceed to through another airline's security screening, board that air carrier's flight, hijack it and crash it into a skyscraper, causing another building to collapse.

Bud Perrone, а spokesman for Silverstein Properties, said the plaintiffs were disappointed by the ruling but looked forward to their prospects in a different lawsuit against United over security lapses that led terrorists to hijack United Flight 175.

"We are determined and look forward to presenting the facts before a jury, which will decide whether the defendants' insurance companies should finally be forced to pay up in order to finish the rebuilding of the World Trade Center," he said.

A message left with a lawyer for United Airlines was not immediately returned.

In dismissing a similar claim against Consolidated Edison Co. a year ago, the judge said it was unreasonable to think Con Ed could foresee the "strange, improbable, and attenuated chain of events that led to 7 World Trade Center's collapse."

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

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
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# Girl Shot on Bus Was 'Loving, Helpful'

Guzman, known as Jina to her family and friends, died later died at a Miami hospital.

"Feels like just yesterday I saw her running around in her Pamper, dancing and modeling for the camera," mother Ady Guzman said. "Times and moments spent with Jina are memories I will cherish and keep in my heart forever."

The boy was also charged with carrying a concealed weapon. He waived his right to appear in court Wednesday morning and will remain in a juvenile detention center. He is not being identified by The Associated Press because of his age.

Messages left with juvenile division officials and the alleged shooter's mother Wednesday were not immediately returned.

Police have not released further information about the shooting. Miami-Dade Police spokeswoman Aida Fina-Milan said based on the charges "it appears to have been an accident."

Eight other children, including Guzman's 7-yearold sister, were on the bus but were not harmed. Authorities took the children and the bus driver to a police station to be interviewed.

Guzman attended the charter middle school Palm Glades Preparatory Academy. Her sister went to nearby Summerville Advantage Academy.

The teen suspect attended Somerset Academy.

TIMES-NEWS M23 Rebels Vow to Take Congo

GOMA, Congo • The M23 rebels pressed ahead with their seizure of territory and towns in eastern Congo on Wednesday and said they intend to topple the government of President Joseph Kabila.

The rebels took control of the eastern Congo town of Sake in a bid to move toward the provincial capital of Bukavu.

"Kabila has to go. We want our country back," said M23 Col. Vianney Kazarama to cheers from thousands gathered at the stadium in Goma, which was seized by the rebels on Tuesday. "We are now going to Kinshasa. No one will divide this country."

Nearly 3,000 Congolese army soldiers and police defected to the rebels in Goma on Wednesday and turned in their weapons at the stadium rally.

Even as the rebels consolidated their gains, the presidents of Congo, Rwanda and Uganda called on them to give up the territory they now control.

The M23 is made up of hundreds of officers who deserted the Congo army in April this year. Neighboring Rwanda has supplied trained soldiers and weapons, according to a report by United Nations experts to be published Friday.

The speed with which the M23 has seized Goma and the surrounding countryside, rich in minerals, exposes the weakness of President Joseph Kabila's government, 978 miles to the west in Kinshasa, say experts.

"It's a setback for Kabila. He wasn't even capable of reforming the army and the fall of Goma demonstrated that," said Felix Bafilemba. "It marks the beginning of the end for Kabila's regime."

Strewn with bodies, burned out vehicles and abandoned tanks, the road between Goma and Sake showed evidence of Tuesday's fighting.

NEWARK, N.J. • Newark Mayor Cory Booker said he and a Twitter follower will try living on food stamps for at least a week.

The idea stemmed from a back-and-forth conversation between Booker and a woman who goes by the name TwitWit and uses the handle @MWadeNC. They began talking about the idea Sunday night while discussing the role the government should play in funding school breakfast and lunch programs.

Booker said Tuesday he intends to follow through with the plan. TwitWit said it is "great idea" but wants more information on how it will be carried out.

During their Twitter exchange, TwitWit wrote, "nutrition is not the responsibility of the government." The conversation soon changed to food stamps.

"why is there a family today that is "too poor to afford breakfast"? are they not already receiving food stamps?" TwitWit wrote.

"Lets you and I try to live on food stamps in New Jersey (high cost of living) and feed a family for a week or month. Ugame?" Booker responded. "sure, Mayor, I'm game,"

TwitWit wrote back.

"Great. Lets do this. I hope you live in New Jersey. Lets film it and see how we do," Booker responded. He later wrote, "We will have to get a referee - DM me your number so we can see if we can work out details."

Booker, a prolific Twitter user who has 1.2 million followers, said Tuesday evening he is committed to living on the equivalent of food stamps, but could not say how he will approximate the benefits, execute the idea or how long it will last.

The average monthly food stamp benefit was \$133.26 per person in New Jersey in fiscal year 2011, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"We're going to set up the rules," Booker told reporters. "And that's what we're researching right now. This will not be a gimmick or a stunt."

Booker said he wants the challenge to be a chance "for us to grow in compassion and understanding" and dispel stereotypes.

In an interview with The Associated Press Tuesday night, TwitWit said she is a 39-year-old married mother of two from North Carolina. She spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because she said she has received threats since her

Twitter discussion about food stamps.

She said she is willing to participate in the challenge but wants to know the ground rules before committing. She has not heard from Booker's office and is upset she has not been included in the research process.

"To hear he's planning and setting things up, it makes me feel like I'm a little bit of a prop in the game," she said.

She thinks she and Booker should approximate living on food stamps for a month. TwitWit said she does not

oppose food stamps. But if more taxpayer money is allocated for food stamps, she believes, more people will require them.

"There is going to be a lot more of us needing those food stamps if it doesn't stop," she said.

She thinks many people

are mischaracterizing her conversation with Booker, which initially centered on funding school meals.

"I don't have a vendetta," she said, and urged people to work together. "I'm looking at things from a different angle."

TwitWit, who describes herself on Twitter as an Army veteran who is "fight ing against any and all forms of socialism/communism," said her own family is barely getting by and is "six months away from being in debt and on welfare ourselves." She is between jobs and said her husband is in the computer field.

"Most of us are in the same boat," she said. "Some of us just aren't getting the assistance."

This is not her first Twitter interaction with Booker. She said Booker started following her in 2007. She had never heard of him before.

M23 soldiers in vehicles patrolled the streets of Sake, 17 miles south of Goma. As in Goma, most residents accepted the rebels' presence.

"We only want peace," said Innocent Rumabo in Sake

Other resident complained of rapes carried out Tuesday night.

"I know two women who were raped, there are more in the area," said one Goma resident who insisted on anonymity for fear of retaliation.

In neighboring Uganda, the presidents of Uganda, Rwanda and Congo resolved to put pressure on the M23 rebels to give up territory they have captured, according to a statement released at the end of the emergency talks.

"Even if there are legitimate grievances by the mutineering group known as M23, they cannot accept the expansion of this war or entertain the idea of overthrowing the legitimate government of (Congo) or undermining its authority," said presidents Joseph Kabila of Congo, Paul Kagame of Rwanda and Yoweri Museveni of Uganda, in a statement issued late Wednesday.

"Therefore the M23 must immediately stop this offensive and pull out of Goma," said the presidents' statement is sued in Kampala. This resolution was to be immediately communicated to the M23 leadership, the statement said.

Kabila said he was willing to negotiate directly with the M23 rebels, a reversal from his previous refusal to talk with the rebels.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • The mother who reported her son to police after he amassed what she feared were weapons to attack a southwest Missouri movie theater during a "Twilight" showing said he had recently asked her if he was a failure.

Tricia Lammers made her first public statements Tues day since the arrest last week of her 20-year-old son, Blaec. Authorities said he admitted that he was planning to attack the theater in Bolivar and then a nearby Wal-Mart store, where he'd been

tors determined he recently purchased two assault rifles and 400 rounds of ammunition.

at the National Alliance for Mental Illness in Springfield, Tricia Lammers said her son had undergone inpatient treatment. She said her son has shown signs of Asperger's syndrome, borderline personality disorder and other conditions

"He didn't ask to be born different. He grew up his whole life in (his sister) Kristyn's shadow. He wanted to be successful and be somebody," she said, KOLR-TV reported. "Just two weeks ago he asked me – both my kids still call me mommy – he said, 'Mommy, do you think I'm a failure?' I said, 'No, Blaec, I don't."

She added that she loves her son, but that she loves her community just as much.

According to the arrest report from the 2009 incident, which was released earlier Tuesday, Blaec Lammers went to the Walmart store with a knife and a rubber mask looking for an "easy victim" after watching the horror film "Halloween." Lammers, then 17, said watching the main character killing people "got him to thinking," the arrest report said.

Lammers told authorities he watched a store clerk for more than two hours. He said he was planning to follow the clerk into a storage room and kill him when he heard his name over the public address system and his father calling out to him, according to the report. No charges were filed in that case.

Lammers was arrested Nov. 15 after his mother contacted police, telling them she was concerned that her

son "may have intentions of shooting people" during the opening weekend of the final installment of the popular "Twilight" series.

According to a police, Lammers' mother said she believed he had amassed weapons similar to those used by the gunman who attacked a theater in Aurora, Colo., in July during a showing of the latest Batman movie. That attack killed 12 people.

Lammers was questioned Nov. 15 and authorities say he told them he bought tickets to a Sunday "Twilight" screening in Bolivar and planned to shoot people there.



"I rode to the top of Quigley Canyon the other day and it was like riding a monster truck — it blew through everything. Even as big as they are, they have all-aluminum frames so they only weigh about 30 pounds," he said last winter.

Fat bikes, as they're called, are somewhat new to Idaho. But they're thriving in Alaska, where mountain bikers tinkered to come up with the ultimate bike to ride the 1,049-mile Iditarod sled dog race course from Anchorage to Nome.

• In winter, Craters of the Moon National Monument waives its \$8 entrance fee and turns its loop drive into trails for both skiing and snowshoeing. when the road is

open. The trick to this hill is in the timing. At least two to three feet of snow must have fallen to provide enough of a blanket to cover the brush and provide a good run, but if too much snow falls or drifts, the roadway may be closed south of the hill. Drive 18 miles north of Gooding on Highway 46 and look for the parking area.

• In the 1950s, military maneuvers used to be practiced on a plot across from Balanced Rock east of Castleford. Today, Tank Hill is a great place for tubing. As long as the hill is covered in plenty of the white stuff, the terrain is steep and easily accessible. The area also is used by dirt bikers, so be on the lookout for wheel ruts in your tubing path. From Buhl, take Main Street west and turn right on Burley Avenue, then follow the signs for about 15 miles.

• Several trails, restroom facilities, a warming lodge and picnic tables make Diamondfield Jack Snowplay Area widely used for tubing. From Hansen, turn south on Rock Creek Road and continue a mile past Magic Mountain Resort to the large parking lot on your right.

### Snowkite

Snowkiting or kite skiing — where riders harness themselves to a giant kite, letting it pull them over the snow and through the air — is one of the fastest growing extreme sports. The kite can take a rider up a mountain or across a snow-covered plain, harnessing the power of the wind.

Those who kite ski usually start with a small kite, steering it by a bar where two strings are attached. As they progress, they advance to larger kites, some up to 275 square feet.

Popular places for kite skiing include the flat alfalfa fields south of Bellevue, open mountain meadows north of Ketchum or the Snowmobile Park at milepost 131 along U.S. Highway 20 west of Fairfield.

The Camas Prairie provides the perfect setting for the sport. James Kreyssig said in 2010: "Wind, rolling hills and a spacious area void of trees and power lines are major components of this sport. I understand people as far away as Europe have heard of Camas County."



# Avalanche Prep

The tools with which to gauge and prepare for avalanche risk have increased right along with the increased use of the backcountry by skiers, boarders, snowshoers and snowmobilers.

One of the chief ways to keep track of avalanche danger is the Sawtooth National Forest Avalanche Center's daily advisories, at sawtoothavalanche.com. Users can access the current advisory and read past advisories to get a history of the snowpack. The webpage also includes accident reports, videos, photos, safety tips and the weather forecast. An advisory is also available by phone: 208-622-8027.

Center director Simon Trautman said ratings describe five levels of danger: low, moderate, considerable, high and extreme. Considerable and above describe conditions that pose a danger to humans — enough so to make professionals nervous in the backcountry, he said.

High danger signals that natural avalanches are likely. Those don't require a human to trigger but can occur spontaneously, Trautman said. It usually takes a few days for a danger level that high to drop.

Backcountry users should always have an avalanche probe, shovel and transceiver, snow rangers say. The latter helps find someone buried under the snow by transmitting pulsed signals that rescuers can track.

This fall, Hollywood actor Bruce Willis donated Soldier Mountain Ski Area to a recently formed nonprofit organization, which is doing repairs and renovations to prepare for the season. Will Varin, one of the group's five board members, said they're also working on implementing cat skiing in the backcountry to give people access to ungroomed and more advanced terrain powder.

"We are really focusing on



Ice Fishing

Whoever said fishing was for warm weather obviously hasn't tried ice fishing — an exciting, albeit cold, angling experience.

Idaho offers a number of places to ice fish, and one of the region's most popular is Magic Reservoir. If you're in Twin Falls, try something closer to home: Dierkes Lakes, inside the Snake River Canyon near Shoshone Falls. Wherever you go, check first with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game (fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/fish/ ) for fishing reports and a guide to ice fishing on lakes and reservoirs.

Remember:

• Check for thickness before venturing onto the ice at any lake. Don't walk onto ice less than 4 inches thick; some prefer 6 inches.

• Stay away from milky-colored ice; clear ice is strongest.

• Drill as you go, checking for thickness.

• Bring ice picks and rope.

• Be cautious of weather patterns.



Magic Mountain south of Hansen has

excellent trails for cross-country skiing.

The High Desert Nordic Association regularly skis several trails within the South Hills Cross Country Ski Trails system there. A major perk: Day use is free. For a detailed trail map, visit the group's Web site at skihdna.org.

Another popular place to crosscountry ski is the Blaine County Recreation District's series of Nordic trails three miles north of Ketchum. There is a day fee, but trails are suitable for novice to expert.

An underutilized gem is the sevenmile main-road-turned-ski-loop in winter at Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve, where skiers can watch for signs of wildlife along the trail. To the side of the groomed trails, you may see rabbit, fox, coyote and red squirrel tracks. The monument, southwest of Arco, waives its \$8-per-vehicle entry fee during winter. Evan Park rides a snow bike down the Magic Mountain slopes in 2009.

Try snow biking and you'll be going downhill on a bike that has skis instead of tires.

But don't worry. An instructor at Magic Mountain Resort, which rents snow bikes for the day, will teach you how to maneuver before you head up the slope. Instruction is mandatory, said Suzette Miller, co-owner of Magic Mountain.

"We get a lot of couples up

here," she said. "What's more romantic than sitting by a fire together, breathing the fresh air, being in the lodge?" Nothing, except maybe riding the ski lift together, snow bikes in tow.

You can rent a snow bike for \$35 a day; one-hour instruction included. Contact: Gary or Suzette Miller at 736-7669, or magicmountainresort.com. getting the ski school and ski programs back on the mountain," Varin said.

Soldier Mountain's target opening date is Dec. 20 but depends on snowfall. It's 10 miles north of Fairfield on Soldier Creek Road.

Daily lift tickets are \$35 (tax included) for adults; \$19 for youth (ages 7-17) and seniors (62-69); and free for children (6 and younger) and seniors (70 and older). A single lift ride is \$10, and there is a military and college discount of \$5 off any regular ticket. Also available are season passes (for example, \$289 for an adult if purchased before Nov. 30, and \$349 after that date) and fouror eight-day punch cards for skiing and snowboarding.

# **DOLLAR MOUNTAIN HAS ITS DAY**

**SUN VALLEY** • Dollar Mountain has become the Coney Island of skiing in Idaho.

The smaller mountain lay in the shadows of its bigger sister — the world-famous Bald Mountain — for years. But last year it became the go-to playground as Sun Valley Resort endowed it with a super pipe and added terrain park rails and jibs to those it had built the year before.

This year the ski hill gets even more attractions as Sun Valley expands the super pipe, adds a dozen more terrain park features and builds a skier/boarder cross course designed with family fun in mind.

The super pipe will be expanded from 18 feet to 22

### Sun Valley Details

Sun Valley plans to kick off its 77th winter season on Thanksgiving Day, weather permitting. The resort hopes to have limited terrain open on Baldy and Dollar Mountain and will open additional terrain as fast as possible. **Early:** Passes for Bald Mountain will be discounted through Dec. 16: \$66 for adults, \$50 for seniors 65 and older, \$48 for military and \$38 for children 12 and younger. Dollar Mountain passes are \$39 for adults, \$35 for seniors, \$32 for children and \$30 for military. Children 4 and younger ski for free on Dollar Mountain with a paying adult. Regular: During the regular season through March 31, Bald Mountain passes are \$95 for adults, \$66 for seniors, \$60 for military and \$54 for children. Dollar passes are \$54 for adults, \$45 for seniors, \$40 for military and \$39 for children. Late-season discounts kick back in again April 1. Discounts: There are discounts for half-day tickets and for those who have season passes at other resorts. Sun Valley also participates in the 5th Grade Ski or Ride Free Program. And Magic Valley residents can buy cards entitling them to discounts on lift passes. Information: Check sunvalley.com for lodging and pass specials and specials for college students. New this year: Ski Patrol 101. Skiers and boarders of intermediate level or above are invited to enter a drawing, with the winner and a friend getting the opportunity to join the Ski Patrol at its Friday-morning safety meeting. The guests will get to watch the sun come up from the top of Bald Mountain and make first tracks with patrollers as they set up safety fencing and do other tasks necessary to get the mountain open.

"We're not looking for candidates for ski patrol

feet to meet Olympic specifications for Sun Valley athletes training for the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia, said Jack Sibbach, director of marketing for Sun Valley. The pipe also attracts freestyle competitors from Bogus Basin in Boise, Twin Falls and even out of state.

The pipe is one of only a few pipes in the country that meet Olympic standards, said Mike Bettera, marketing director for Snow Park Technologies, which designs pipes and rail features for ski resorts throughout North America.

The terrain park also features two dozen new rails, bringing the total number of play features to 76. One new feature resembles a roller coaster on rails, said Mike Fitzpatrick, assistant director of marketing for Sun Valley.

And the skier/boarder cross course will be extended and designed to make it more family-friendly.

Children and adults can learn to ski or board the new features through special lessons, including Dollar Mountain's Sunday in

#### the Park.

Those who prefer to watch the high-flying hijinks will enjoy the Rev Tour competition in March. The competition ranks just below the popular X Games, Sibbach said. And collegiate championships will be held on Dollar Mountain, March 4-9.

#### A powder day on Baldy.

The tubing park, meanwhile, will be moved from Dollar Mountain to Lower River Run on Bald Mountain to allow for the extension of the family cross.

The old half pipe on Lower Warm Springs has been filled in, which will allow skiers and boarders to make turns below Race Arena again. Two new Adventures Trails have been added to those that were created last year: The Pine Marten Plunge will weed its way through the woods below Seattle Ridge Lodge as skiers make their way to Broadway Avenue. The Deer Hollow Trail will veer off Gun Tower Lane, which ferries skiers to Seattle Ridge.

But it is an exciting opportunity to be around the avalanche dogs and ski patrol," said Ski Patrol supervisor Mike Lloyd.

**Also new this year:** The opportunity to ride the chairlifts up Bald Mountain to ski the backcountry with guides from Sawtooth Mountain Guides.

Trips will be offered off Seattle Ridge down into the Greenhorn Gulch area a few miles south of Ketchum, said Ketchum District ranger Kurt Nelson. The guides are also permitted to take paying guests off the Warm Springs side just to the south and west of The Burn, an area burned during the 2007 Castle Rock Fire.

The backcountry tours are out of bounds and therefore not under the control of Sun Valley Resort and its ski patrol, cautioned Lloyd. "If you get hurt back there, you will have to get out of there yourself or rely on Blaine County Search and Rescue to come get you, as our patrollers are busy assuring safety inbounds."

## **Planetary Alignments Are Nothing To Get Worried About**

t was inevitable. With a mere month remaining before the ballyhooed cataclysm/cosmic consciousness shift/what-have-you precipitated by the "end" of the Mayan calendar on Dec. 21, e-mails are making the rounds purporting to provide evidence of impending events.

One particularly silly email depicts Mercury, Venus and Saturn in a perfect line above the Great Pyramids in Giza, one hour before sunrise on Dec. 3. It further states that such an alignment occurs only every 2,737 years.

Planetary alignment is a staple of the apocalypse prophecy business. An alignment on May 5, 2000, (within the same year as Y2K!) was supposed to produce a variety of geologic upheavals. Before that, the "Jupiter Effect" was supposed to induce the San Andreas Fault to cut loose on March 10, 1982, when all the planets lay on the same side of the sun.

The fact that both dates passed without incident seems not to have fazed the doomsayers.

In fact, Mercury, Venus and Saturn will be visible in the pre-dawn sky of Dec. 3. Unlike the e-mail's graphic, they won't appear equally bright and won't lie in a perfect, near-horizontal line (from either Giza or Idaho). Looking eastsoutheast around 5:30 a.m., Venus will be the first thing you notice, brilliant white. To the upper right of Venus is Saturn; to the lower left is Mercury. Mercury, dimmer than Venus, will slightly outshine Sat-

urn. In both Egypt and Idaho, they'll lie in a slightly doglegged, near-vertical line.

There was indeed a similarly tight grouping of these three planets 2,737 years ago, with Mars in their midst to boot. But that was hardly the last time Mercury, Venus and Saturn lay near one another: On Oct. 4, 2011, they spanned only 9 degrees.

he big players for this winter are going to be El Nino or the lack thereof. It's going to be what we call a more neutral winter out in the Pacific. That means neither an El Nino nor a La Nina.

One of the key factors forecasters look at in determining long-range weather outlooks are the temperatures off the coast of Peruin the Pacific. Those temperatures are important in determining the upcoming weather pattern.

Unlike the summer, where we had a large area of high pressure over the Western part of the United States, we should see that high pressure shift up into Alaska, and that would allow for colder temperatures.

Because of those factors your KMVT Weather Authority forecast team is predicting cooler than average temperatures across the Pacific Northwest. The eastern half of the country should see warmer than normal temperatures. As far as rain and snow goes, we think we will see a normal year with an increased risk of storms impacting southern Idaho during November and December.

Keep in mind: This is a forecast. Just because we're calling for colder than average temperatures this winter and even average precipitation, doesn't mean we're not going to see those periods where temperatures could be a little bit above average and we could have a few dry streaks throughout the winter.

## Plan Ahead for Your Holiday Drive

TWIN FALLS • Whether you're on your way to see family today or preparing for a Christmas trip next month, holiday travel in Idaho means traversing winter weather.

Here are a few suggestions from the Idaho Transportation Department to stay safe and be prepared.

Be smart about that drink: ITD is partnering with Idaho law enforcement agencies to fight impaired driving with both education campaigns and high-visibility enforcement patrols through Sunday.

Last year, impaired driving contributed to 1,456 crashes and 66 fatalities on Idaho highways, according to the department.

Partygoers should plan their ride home ahead of time – designating a sober driver or arranging a safe ride home with someone else. Drivers and motorcycle riders are advised to wear their seatbelts and helmets to protect against impaired drivers.

"If you know someone who is about to drive while impaired, take his or her keys and help make other

safe travel arrangements," Kevin Bechen with ITD said in a statement.

Check the road ahead: ITD has added yet another way to receive road condition updates through its 511 program. Simply register through 511.idaho.gov, and you can receive reports on your preferred travel routes through email, text messaging or Twitter.

The Twitter option is new. The department tested the reports starting this March and has now opened the tool up for public use.

(Of course, you will need to have a Twitter account to use it.)

"Improvements to the system allow direct delivery of information, based on what drivers need, when they need it, and how they need it," Tony Ernest, manager of the system, said in a statement. "At the same time, we remind drivers that Idaho has enacted a new texting law."

According to ITD, only Minnesota and Iowa offer similar automated Twitter feeds as part of their 511 services.

ITD urges motorists using the 511

site or phone system on the road to check it before operating their vehicle or ask a passenger to do it. It is unsafe to check mobile devices while driving, and Idaho lawmakers banned texting and similar communications while driving this year.

Prepare yourself and your car: Winter conditions increase the importance of a well-maintained vehicle. Keep car windows, mirrors and lights clear of snow and ice. Make sure tires and brakes are Please see ITD, H2

tion year. "The Thanksgiving table will be a battleground," says Andrew Marshall, 34, of Quincy, Mass.

Like many extended families across the country, Marshall's includes Democrats and Republicans, conservatives, liberals and independents. And so, like many families that count both red and blue voters in their ranks, they're expecting fireworks. Things had already gotten so bad on Facebook, the family had to ban political banter.

The Forest Service sells tree-cutting permits for \$5 for trees under 10 feet tall and \$10 for trees less than 20 feet tall. Even if you factor in the gas for the trip, the overall price is usually cheaper than buying a precut tree. Depending on height, a Douglas fir sold from a grocery store parking lot can easily range from \$25-\$50.

But trekking up to the Sawtooth National Forest isn't for the faint of heart. Cold and icy weather can make driving on the windy roads dangerous. You also need to bring a sharp saw and have a vehicle capable of carrying the tree back to your home.

My Christmas tree guide, Karl Fuelling, graciously agreed to help me throughout the process. Fuelling has been a forester for the Forest Service for more than 20 years. As I tried to keep up with his long strides in the deep snow near Magic Mountain Resort, Fuelling pointed out the various kinds of trees I could cut down.

If you know where to look, he said, you can have your pick of lodgepole pine, known for its excellent needle retention and candlelike shape. There are a few Douglas firs sprinkled throughout the national forest, but due to their popularity, they're harder to find. I wasn't committed to finding any particular tree and after 20 minutes of climbing in the snow, I was ready to cut down just about anything - which is why I was thankful Fuelling finally pointed to a lone subalpine fir.

"It's a little taller than 10 feet but that's OK," Fuelling said with a smile. I think he wanted to see if I could actually carry the thing back to the truck by myself.

Sawing the tree down was easy. Lugging it back to the truck was another story. I sheepishly accepted a pair of gloves and carried the tree through the blazed freshly trail. Branches flicked in my face and the notebook I had stuffed in my back pocket fell out without me even noticing.

What surprised me was how easily my measurements were skewed in the forest. The tree I cut down raise as pets, though four of them died of known causes.

Where, I ask, is the Turkey Day equivalent of "2000 Miles"? Or even "Christmas in Hollis"?



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## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"Men are not hanged for stealing" horses, but that horses may not be stolen."

John Armstrong, aged 56, died of a brain hemorrhage just days after returning from representing England in the 2008 European Championships. He and his partner, John Holland, finished in second place in the Butler rankings (for average IMPs won) quite an achievement for a pair from a team that finished in 12th place.


Armstrong was on the team that won the Silver Medal in the 1987 Bermuda Bowl World Championships — Britain's best performance since taking Gold in 1955. And he was also on the teams that produced Britain's most recent best Open results in European Championships — runner-up in 1987 and winner in 1991. (The British Open Team's previous win was back in 1963.) Today's hand is from that 1991 victory.

Armstrong, the declarer in three no-trump, could see eight tricks — he must come to at least two in hearts — but where to go for the ninth? Britain was on Vugraph at the time and the commentators made an assortment of erudite suggestions. But John's solution was simple: He won the club lead and continued with ace and another spade. East won with the king and returned a club. John now ran the heart jack, which East could not afford to win. When the heart jack held, declarer played a third spade. West took the queen, but with the heart ace still in dummy, John could not be denied access to his established spade jack. Contract made.





## TODAY IN HISTOR

#### On this date:

In 1718, English pirate Edward Teach - better known as "Blackbeard" - was killed during a battle off presentday North Carolina.

In 1862, Giuseppe Verdi's opera "La Forza del Destino" had its world premiere in St. Petersburg, Russia.

In 1928, "Bolero" by Maurice Ravel was first performed, in Paris.

In 1930, listeners of the British Broadcasting Corp. heard, for the first time, radio coverage of an American college football game as Harvard defeated Yale, 13-0.

In 1935, a flying boat, the China Clipper, took off from Alameda, Calif., carrying more than 100,000 pieces of mail on the first trans-Pacific airmail flight.

In 1943, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Chinese leader Chiang Kai-shek met in Cairo to discuss measures for defeating Japan. Lyricist Lorenz Hart died in New York at age 48.

In 1954, the Humane Society of the United States was incorporated as the National Humane Society.

In 1965, the musical "Man of La Mancha'' opened on Broadway.

In 1967, the U.N. Security Council approved Resolution 242, which called for Israel to withdraw from territories it had captured the previous June, and implicitly called on adversaries to recognize Israel's right to exist.

In 1975, Juan Carlos was proclaimed King of Spain.

In 1986, Elzire Dionne, who gave birth to quintuplets in 1934, died at a hospital in North Bay, Ontario, Canada, at age 77.

In 1990, British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, having failed to win re-election of the Conservative Party leadership on the first ballot, announced her resignation. Ten years ago: At the NA-TO summit in Prague, Russian President Vladimir Putin told President George W. Bush the United States should not wage war alone against Iraq, and questioned whether Pakistan and Saudi Arabia were doing enough to fight terrorism. The Bush administration eased clean air rules to allow utilities, refineries and manufacturers to avoid having to install new antipollution equipment when they modernized their plants. Five years ago: Retailers lured shoppers to stores and online on Thanksgiving Day ahead of the traditional Black Friday kick-off. A gunman shot and killed his ex-wife, their three children, ages 12, 10 and 6, and himself in a park in Laytonsville, Md. French rail workers who'd staged a nine-day-old strike voted to return to the job. One year ago: Baseball players and owners signed an agreement for a new labor contract, a deal making baseball the first North American professional major league to start blood testing on human growth hormone and expanding the playoffs to 10 teams by 2013. Ryan Braun was voted the NL MVP after helping the Milwaukee Brewers win their first division title in nearly 30 years. Death claimed France's former first lady Danielle Mitterrand at age 87 and Svetlana Alliluyeva, daughter of Soviet dictator Josef Stalin, at age 85. Soldier-turned-soap opera star J.R. Martinez and his professional partner, Karina Smirnoff, were named champions of season 13 of ABC's "Dancing with the Stars?"


