Soldier Bo Jones Given Promotion

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls native Terence "Bo" Jones, who was injured while serving in Afghanistan earlier this year, has been promoted.

Jones, a specialist in the U.S. Army, was promoted to the rank of specialist E-4 Tuesday, which is the next rank in his career, his father, Tim Jones, said.

The ceremony was held at 3 p.m. at the command formation at the San Antonio Military Medical Center at Brooke Army Medical Center, he said.

"He was very proud and happy," Tim Jones said. "It was a very good day for him."

Tim said Bo has been eligible for the promotion for a while but just recently got the orders from Fort Wainwright in Fairbanks, Alaska. Bo is part of the 1st Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division based there.

Tim said Bo is hoping to become an Army recruiter.

Bo continues to work on driver's training and core training for his prosthetic legs, Tim said. The family hopes to be back in Twin Falls for Christmas, but making the trip will depend on Bo's health.

Bo lost both of his legs in an IED explosion and nearly lost his left arm while on foot patrol in southern Afghanistan on Feb. 7. Doctors at a German hospital were able to stabilize his arm enough that it could be saved. The percussion from the blast also shattered Jones' pelvis and he underwent extensive surgeries to clear debris from his wounds.

DECLO TEACHER FACES ETHICS INVESTIGATION

Teacher Allowed Students to Scribble on Classmates' Faces Who Failed to Reach Reading Goal

DECLO • An ethics investigation against a Declo teacher begins today and could last a few months.

Summer Larsen, a fourth-grade teacher at Declo Elementary School, allowed students on Nov. 5 to scribble on the faces of six classmates who failed to reach a reading goal. The students wore the markings all day, some returning home with them still on their faces. It was intended as a reading incentive for the students, who got to choose their repercussions. The class decided the students could forgo recess instead of being drawn on, which three students chose.

But Larsen's actions have drawn the ire of parents and a formal complaint by the Cassia County School District to the Idaho State Department of Education's Professional Standards Commission.

Dan Sakota, chairman of the commission and math teacher at Madison Junior High School, said the complaint is on the commission's agenda as a preliminary matter for a meeting today and Friday in Boise.

ISDE spokeswoman Melissa McGrath said the commission

meets five to six times a year.

"They investigate complaints and then take any necessary action if they find an individual has violated state ethics code," McGrath said.

Action can include suspension or revocation of a license.

Once the commission makes a decision in the case the information becomes public record.

Sakota said it can take a few months to complete an investigation. The commission receives several complaints from across the

state every two months.

This week, the commission has three cases on the agenda.

Other Factors?

"She's a good teacher; it was just a poor decision," said parent Julie Garrard about the classroom marker incident.

Garrard, who has a teaching degree, hasn't taught a class in 20 years but volunteers frequently in Larsen's classroom. She also has a daughter in Larsen's class.

Hate Mail, Flaring Tempers Have Parents Worried

BURLEY • Declo parents expressed concern for their children's safety after a face-marking incident drew national attention earlier this month at the elementary school.

The Cassia County School District filed a professional ethics complaint against Summer Larsen after she allowed students in her fourth-grade class to scribble with markers on classmates' faces after they failed to achieve a reading goal.

On Tuesday, Gerri Lilienquist, president of the Declo Elementary School Parent-Teacher Organization, spoke to the Cassia County School Board on behalf of a group of concerned parents.

Lilienquist said comments posted online by people from across the country have parents worried about the safety of students.

After the incident, one parent entered the school without stopping at the school office, went into Larsen's class and yelled at her in front of the students.

"I understand there is a lot of anger and passion; I get that," Lilienquist said. "But there is so much anger and negativity, there is concern for the safety of our children."

Parent Cindy Hurst said she received anonymous letters from other parents at the school threatening her after she publicly criticized Larsen's actions.

"We do have a problem with safety but not just with our children," Hurst said.

Hurst said the hate mail she received shows the price someone pays for sticking up for their child.

"There is no policy that says a child should be defaced or assaulted by students for not achieving a goal," Hurst said.

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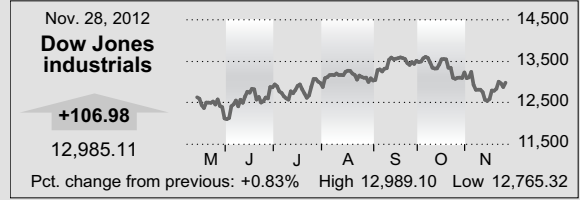

Stocks Higher on Hopes for a Deal to Avoid 'Cliff'

NEW YORK (AP) • Stocks gained on signs that lawmakers are edging towards a deal that would help the U.S. avoid the "fiscal cliff."

Indexes shrugged off an early loss and were higher in early afternoon trading. As of 3:30 p.m. the Dow Jones industrial average was up 95 points at 12,973. It had been down as much as 112 points shortly after the opening bell.

The Standard and Poor's 500 was up nine points at 1,408. The Nasdaq composite was up 20 points at 2,988.

Bisbee's Muse Arrives in Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS • Jessie Robinson was quite smitten with Clarence Bisbee when she met him in 1904.

Both Nebraska natives, Jessie was just 20 years old, and Clarence was 29.

Jessie wanted to become a kindergarten teacher. Clarence — or just "Bee" as Robinson called him — dreamed of becoming a photographer.

Jessie stayed close to home and studied at the Nebraska State Normal School. Clarence enrolled in a photography school in Effingham, Ill.

While there, Clarence met Charles Diehl, publisher and editor of the Twin Falls News. Diehl convinced him that the new city of Twin Falls was the place to go after graduation.

In January 1906, Clarence packed his camera and took a train to Shoshone. From Shoshone, he took a stagecoach

Twin Falls.

Clarence first set up shop in a 16-by-28 tent on Main Avenue. He later moved his photography studio to a commercial building downtown.

All the while, he courted Jessie from afar, sending her photographs of the natural wonders that would be part of their life together if she would come to Idaho.

In June 1910, Clarence traveled to Nebraska to bring Jessie home to Twin Falls. On the train ride back, they stopped in Salt Lake City to be married.

Two days later, the newlyweds were busy taking photographs of history in the making.

The two built a home on Walnut Street in 1911, but it soon acquired the name "Seldom Inn."

"Our business for years absorbed us both," Jessie later wrote in her journal. "Our recreation was the outdoors."

In 1914, the Bisbees hired architect E.H. Gates to build a home and studio

at the corner of Second Avenue East and Second Street East — now Hansen Street East. Over the door of the studio were the words "Life and Art Are One."

Clarence found inspiration in Jessie, and took thousands of photographs over his lifetime.

Jessie died in 1936. Three years later, Clarence closed the business the two had built together.

He lived the rest of his life in quiet obscurity, dying in 1954.

Bee and Jessie are buried side by side in the Twin Falls Cemetery.

Wet, stormy weather will set up across the Pacific Northwest and northern Idaho over the next several days. Rain will come in waves starting tonight and continuing through Sunday.

Most of the day today should be dry, but mostly cloudy as we will be between disturbances. A strong south-southwesterly flow

will also boost temperatures back up into the mid- to upper 50s. The next shot of rain arrives late Thursday night into Friday. This will set up a very wet stretch of weather Friday through Sunday afternoon.

up to more than an inch in many locations between Friday and Sunday afternoon. It will remain mild through the end of the week and weekend with highs in the 50s. Winds will also be gusty at times Friday through the weekend with gusts near 30 to 40 mph.

In the mountains above 6,000 feet, snow will be measured in feet, especially in the Wood River region where there is a winter storm warning in effect from 5 a.m. Friday

until 5 p.m. Monday. Two to five feet of snow are possible for Baldy and Galena Summit. For Magic Mountain and Pomerelle ski resorts, snow amounts could range from six to 12 inches by Sunday afternoon.

Garrard said a kindergarten student who can read can "easily" meet Larsen's goal — 10 Accelerated Reader points. But the entire class reads at a "lower reading level" and Larsen "thinks outside the box" in order to motivate the students, Garrard said.

Garrard sees the size of the class as one challenge.

"Ever since kindergarten, this class has been too big," she said of the 21-student classroom, which shrank this year compared with past years. "When you've got nine children in a class that can't get 10 Accelerated Reader points there is a problem."

In 2011, Cassia County voters shot down a \$41.5 million bond issue that would have built several new schools in the district and added classrooms at Declo Elementary School, plagued with overcrowding. It was the third try for the district to get a bond issue passed.

Mike Matthews, chairman of the Cassia County School Board, said Tuesday during a school board meeting that the Declo fourth-grade class is not the only large class in the district.

The number of teachers assigned to each school is based on student enrollment and is paid for through the state.

Reading scores were also one factor in Declo Elementary's merit-pay plan under the now-repealed Students Come First laws.

The school was one of three in Cassia County that did not qualify for merit pay for the 2011-12 school year. But Garrard said she's never heard teachers at the school talk about trying to achieve the incentive.

"I know teachers are under a lot of pressure," Garrard said.

Teachers at Cassia County schools that met both local and state goals could receive about \$2,500 each. But voters dumped the law this fall along with the rest of the Students Come First package. District Superintendent Galen Smyer said there were equality concerns with pay-for-performance and the danger of good teachers missing out on the extra pay, which would offset teacher salary cuts from two years ago.

Marbles When You're Good

Some parents at the Tuesday school board meeting questioned whether

Larsen's class is getting enough teacher instruction, since two-fifths of the students failed to meet the reading goals.

Garrard, in turn, describes a teacher who has sought out creative solutions to focus her students.

Garrard said Larsen implemented other motivational activities in her classroom that included a marble jar. Students earned marbles for good behavior and when the jar got full, they had a marble-jar party.

Good math scores earned a number on a bingo sheet, with a prize awarded at the end of the day.

"Overall, I think she's a phenomenal teacher and she was just trying to be creative," Garrard said.

Garrard said Larsen apologized to her students after the marker incident and bought them ice cream.

"She told them she'd never do anything like that again. She feels really bad," Garrard said.

Garrard said Larsen does push the students in the classroom and the students have to be held accountable for their choices.

"But, you shouldn't single out children. I think we all learned a lesson here," Garrard said.

Some parents expressed concern that someone may come from out of state to try to harm Larsen or school Principal Rebecca Hunsaker.

Lilenquist said the fourth-grade class is a large class, and parents have asked for extra help due to its size since the students were in kindergarten.

She said the students

are struggling with basic education and additional aides or teachers are needed.

Larsen's class had 21 students at the time of the incident. Lilenquist said the class size was reduced this year.

Fire at Jerome Little Caesars Damages Nearby Stores

JEROME • An early morning fire damaged several buildings in Jerome on Wednesday.

Jerome Fire Chief Jack Krill said Jerome Police were dispatched for a motion sensor security alarm at Little Caesars Pizza, 124 E. Yakima, shortly after 4 a.m.

When officers arrived they saw smoke in the building and called for the fire department.

"We got here and discovered a fire in the back of the store and quickly extinguished it," said Krill, who was still at the scene investigating at 1 p.m. Wednesday.

Krill said the fire was probably burning for at least two hours and caused massive smoke and heat damage to the building.

"We're guessing \$100,000 but that might be low," he said. "On top of that is loss of business."

Several neighboring stores were also damaged by soot. Krill said those buildings, including EZ Pay Money Loans, Tobacco Connection, American Family Insurance and State Farm Insurance, had no fire damage but smoke lingered

in the air, causing soot to coat the interior of the stores.

"The worst damage is the tobacco shop," he said.

The stores were closed for the day and Tobacco Connection may have damaged inventory, Krill said.

Western Cellular, which is on the other end of the strip mall from Little Caesars, did not have any noticeable damage, he said.

Little Caesars must be completely

gutted while the other stores need to be cleaned, Krill said.

Krill said Jerome Fire, Jerome Police and the state fire marshal were all investigating but could not say whether the fire appeared to be purposefully caused.

"Right now, I can't comment on an actual cause because we're still in investigation mode," he said.

Krill said the fire started in a storage area in the back of the store and some items being stored burned.

WATER PROJECT HEARING DELAYED

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Shoshone School Uses Hands-on Learning Method

SHOSHONE • Just outside his classroom door, fifth-grader C.J. Fitzgerald twisted a long piece of brown paper into what would become a tree trunk.

At first glance, the Wednesday activity looked like an art project. But it's part of a teaching method called "Storyline" that Shoshone Elementary School teachers are using for the first time.

As part of a schoolwide "zoo" project, each grade level studied a biome — a large geographical area — and the types of animals and plants that can be found there.

"What I really liked was learning about the animals," Fitzgerald said.

The 10-year-old is part of a fifth-grade class that's doing research about the desert.

The school will show off the results tonight with the grand opening of the zoo.

Students will share what they learned with their family and community members.

First-grade teacher Carrie Schutte said students grew academically as a result of the project.

She said her students are more excited to learn, engaging in higher-level thinking and improving their writing skills.

"It has freed them to be creative," she said.

Shoshone Elementary is the only Idaho school using the Storyline teaching method.

Mornings are spent on traditional instruction in core subject areas such as reading and math.

Afternoons are spent on real-world applications.

Principal Emily Nelsen said the project is based on the idea of a story.

Students each created a character and wrote a biography. They'll become that character during the zoo opening tonight.

They did research on their

biome and recreated the environment in their classroom.

Fourth-grade teacher Katie Rippee said the project incorporates a variety of academic subjects, including reading, writing, math and science.

Nelsen said students love the project and are designing their own way of learning. And it leads to more teamwork throughout the school.

"I think it has made the school more of a community," she said.

How They Got Started

Last school year, Nelsen heard about a school in Bend, Ore., that uses Storyline.

It sounded interesting, so the school's leadership took a trip to see how it worked.

Teachers then went through a week of training in June.

Storyline originated in Scotland during the 1960s and is a teaching method used at schools around the world.

"We picked it because we saw it would increase our writing abilities," Nelsen said.

Wrapping Up the First Project

During Storyline time Wednesday afternoon, students made final preparations for the zoo opening.

Fifth-grader Tara Siebers, 11, said her class made masks of different animals.

She learned there are hundreds of types of plants and animals in the desert.

So which animal caught her interest? The badger.

Nearby in Rippee's fourth-grade classroom, snowflakes made out of wooden sticks hung from the ceiling. Students worked

snowflakes are exactly the same.

Although the first project is coming to an end, it won't be the last time Storyline is used in Shoshone.

Nelsen said she wants the teaching method to continue. The school plans to launch another project this spring.

"I think everyone's really committed to it," she said.

Thousands Flee Their Homes in Ivory Coast

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast (AP) • Thousands of people in Ivory Coast continue to flee their homes because of ongoing land conflicts and residual tension from last year's post-election violence, according to a report released Wednesday.

The report from the Internal Displacement Monitoring Center said at least 24,000 people were displaced so far this year. An additional 40,000 to 80,000 are still displaced from the conflict, according to "conservative estimates" cited by the group.

The report was released on the two-year anniversary of the presidential runoff between ex-President Laurent Gbagbo and current President Alassane Ouattara. Gbagbo's refusal to cede office despite losing the election sparked more than four months of conflict that claimed at least 3,000 lives. The conflict initially displaced up to 1 million people, the highest number of people to be displaced in all of 2011, according to the study.

Nearly 75 percent of those still displaced by the post-election violence are living in the country's volatile western region, which has continued to experience sporadic violence in the 17 months since the crisis ended. Pro-Gbagbo militias hiding across the border in Liberia have allegedly launched a series of cross-border raids dating back to July 2011. An attack in June killed eight U.N. peacekeepers and at least 10 civilians.

But the report notes that tensions over land in the west originated decades before the conflict. Beginning in the 1960s, the government encouraged internal migrants and West African immigrants to farm the region, which is fertile in cocoa, timber and coffee. The allocation of plots to newcomers created friction with those who felt they had lost their ancestral land.

Congo Rebels Begin Retreat from Masisi

GOMA, Congo (AP) • Rebels believed to be backed by Rwanda began retreating from the territory they seized last week and pulled out of the region of Masisi, their military leader said Wednesday, in the first concrete sign that international pressure has stemmed the advance of the fighters.

Gen. Sultani Makenga, the military chief for the eight-month-old rebellion known as M23, said that his fighters intend to abide by an ultimatum issued by neighboring nations that called for their withdrawal from Goma by Friday. He said he had ordered his fighters to retreat along the southeastern axis from Masisi to Goma, and they will then leave Goma via the northern route to Rutshuru.

The M23 rebel group is made up of hundreds of soldiers who deserted the Congolese army in April. Since then they have occupied numerous villages and towns in mineral-rich eastern Congo, culminating in the seizing of the crucial, provincial capital of Goma last week.

Congo's government spokesman Lambert Mende, who is based in the country's capital over 1,000 miles to the west, confirmed that they had received reports of troops pulling out of Masisi.

"Yes, there are reports of movements (of their fighters out of Masisi) but we won't label it a retreat until it's over. They have played this game with us before, where they say they are moving and then find a reason not to," Mende said.

A regional bloc representing nations in the Great Lakes region of Africa had issued a deadline calling for M23 to retreat no later than Friday to 12 miles outside of Goma. They issued their ultimatum from Kampala, the capital of neighboring Uganda. In Goma, there was skepticism over the rebels' claim and confusion, after the leader of M23's political wing insisted that the fighters were not leaving the city of 1 million that is the economic heart of one of Congo's mineral-rich regions.

M23 Vice-Minister of the Interior Theophile Ruremasha told The Associated Press on Wednesday that Congolese President Joseph Kabila's government needs to meet their wide-ranging demands for them to leave the city.

A U.N. group of experts said in a detailed report last week that M23 is backed by neighboring Rwanda, which has provided them with battalions of fighters and sophisticated arms, like night vision goggles.

Palestinians Hope to Gain Leverage through U.N. Bid

RAMALLAH, West Bank (AP) • The expected U.N. vote Thursday to recognize a state of Palestine will be far more than symbolic — it could give the Palestinians leverage in future border talks with Israel and open the way for possible war crimes charges against the Jewish state.

The Palestinians want the 193-member General Assembly to accept "Palestine," on the lands Israel occupied in 1967, as a nonmember observer state. They anticipate broad support.

For Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas, the U.N. bid is a last-ditch attempt to stay relevant as a leader after years of failed peace talks with Israel,

at a time when his Islamic militant Hamas rivals are gaining ground.

The U.S. and Israel have tried to block the quest for U.N. recognition of Palestine, saying it's an attempt to bypass Israeli-Palestinian negotiations that broke down four years ago. The U.S. deputy secretary of state, William Burns, met with Abbas in New York on Wednesday, asking Abbas again to drop the idea and promising that President Barack Obama would re-engage as a mediator in 2013, said Abbas aide Saeb Erekat. Abbas told Burns it was too late.

Israel, meanwhile, appeared to back away from threats of drastic measures if the Pales-

tinians get U.N. approval, with officials suggesting the government would take steps only if the Palestinians use their new status to act against Israel.

The Palestinians say they

need U.N. recognition of a Palestinian state in the West Bank, Gaza and east Jerusalem, the lands Israel captured in 1967, to be able to resume negotiations with Israel.

NUMBERS DRAWN FOR THE RECORD POWERBALL JACKPOT

CHICAGO (AP) • The numbers have been drawn for the record Powerball jackpot and the wait for winners — if any — has begun.

The numbers drawn Wednesday night are: 5, 16, 22, 23, 29 and Powerball of 6.

A lottery official said late Wednesday that the jackpot increased to \$579.9 million by the time of the drawing, making the cash option \$379.8 million.

Americans went on a ticket-buying spree in recent days, the big money enticing many people who rarely, if ever, play the lottery to purchase a shot at the second-largest payout in U.S. history.

Among them was Lamar Fallie, a

jobless Chicago man who said his six tickets conjured a pleasant daydream: If he wins, he plans to take care of his church, make big donations to schools and then "retire from being unemployed."

Tickets were selling at a rate of 130,000 a minute nationwide — about six times the volume from a week ago. That meant the jackpot could climb even higher before the Wednesday night drawing, said Chuck Strutt, executive director of the Multi-State Lottery Association.

The jackpot had already rolled over 16 consecutive times without a winner, but Powerball officials said earlier Wednesday they believed there was a 75 percent chance the winning com-

bination will be drawn this time.

If one ticket hits the right numbers, chances are good that multiple ones will, according to some experts. That happened in the Mega Millions drawing in March, when three ticket buyers shared a \$656 million jackpot, which remains the largest lottery payout of all time.

Yvette Gavin, who sold the tickets to Fallie, is only an occasional lottery player herself, but the huge jackpot means she'll definitely play this time. As for the promises she often gets from ticket purchasers, Gavin isn't holding her breath.

"A lot of customers say if they win they will take care of me, but I will have to wait and see," she said.

John Kerry Stays Quiet as Cabinet Speculation Swirls

WASHINGTON (AP) • Sen. John Kerry is angling to be the nation's top diplomat by being, well, diplomatic.

The longtime Democratic lawmaker from Massachusetts has largely stayed quiet while President Barack Obama considers him for the next secretary of state. Kerry has asked his supporters to avoid overt lobbying of the White House on his behalf. And he's defended his chief rival for the post, Susan Rice, amid Republican criticism of her initial explanation of the attack on Americans in Benghazi, Libya.

Kerry's strategy reflects what people close to the senator say is his disdain for some aspects of Washington's personnel politics. But it also underscores his awkward role in the process. If Obama taps Rice for the job Kerry covets, the senator

would have to shepherd her difficult nomination through the foreign relations committee he chairs.

White House officials say Obama is still mulling over his pick to replace outgoing Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, though a decision is expected soon. Rice, who has a close relationship with the president, is widely viewed as the favorite. But Kerry's stock may be rising as GOP lawmakers threaten to hold up Rice's confirmation until they're satisfied with her answers about the early public statements about the Benghazi attack.

But don't expect Kerry or his allies to make his case to Obama as the president nears a decision, as is standard practice for people who are on a short list for a new job. People close to the senator

say he finds backroom lobbying for top jobs irritating and counterproductive. That view, they say, is shaped from his experience on both sides of the process: as a contender

for previous high-level jobs and as the one making the decision in 2004, when he tapped John Edwards as his running mate during his presidential bid.

A Cliff of Their Own Choosing

With a chip on his shoulder larger than his margin

of victory, Barack Obama is approaching his second term by replicating the mistake of his first. Then his overreaching involved health care — expanding the entitlement state at the expense of economic growth. Now he seeks another surge of statism, enlarging the portion of gross domestic product grasped by government and dispensed by politics. The occasion is the misnamed “fiscal cliff,” the proper name for which is: the Democratic Party’s agenda.

For 40 years the party’s principal sources of energy and money — liberal activists, government employees unions — have advocated expanding government’s domestic reach by raising taxes and contracting its foreign reach by cutting defense. Obama’s four years as one of the most liberal senators and his four presidential years indicate he agrees. Like other occasionally numerate but prudently reticent liberals, he surely understands that the entitlement state he favors requires raising taxes on the cohort that has most of the nation’s money — the middle class.

Mitt Romney as candidate and others before and since have suggested increasing revenues by capping income tax deductions. This would increase that tax’s progressivity, without raising rates that would dampen incentives. Obama’s compromise may be: Let’s do both. Remember the story of when the British Admiralty sought six new battleships, the Treasury proposed four, so they compromised on eight.

Those proposing higher taxes on the wealthy note that when the income tax began in 1913, the top rate was 7 percent. But in 1917, war brought a 67 percent rate. Between 1925 and 1931, the rate was 24 percent or 25 percent, but in only five of the subsequent 80 years — 1988-92 — was the top rate lower than it is today.

Republicans, however, respond that because lower rates reduce incentives to distort economic decisions, they promote growth by enhancing efficiency. Hence restoration of the higher rates would be a giant step away from, and might effectively doom, pro-growth tax reform. Furthermore, restoration of the Clinton-era top rate of 39.6 percent would occur in the very different Obama era of regulatory excesses and Obamacare taxes. Hence Republicans rightly resist higher rates.

Given liberals’ fixation with the affluent paying their “fair share,” it might seem peculiar that they are so vehemently against Paul Ryan’s “premium support” proposal for Medicare. Their recoil is, however, essential to the liberal project.

Ryan’s supposedly radical idea is that people should shop for health insurance, with government subsidizing purchases by the less affluent. This would introduce what soon will be inevitable — means testing, aka progressivity. But liberals reject it with a word the incantation of which suffices, they think, as an argument — “voucher.”

This is peculiar because perhaps the most successful federal program of the 20th century was essentially a voucher program. The purpose of the 1944 Servicemen’s Readjustment Act — aka the G.I. Bill of Rights — was to facilitate demobilization by helping men and women acquire educations and buy houses — and hence form families. The government did not build universities or houses. It, in effect, gave individuals conditional cash — vouchers — by helping to pay for home loans and college tuition.

Liberals’ strenuous objection to vouchers is that vouchers, as the functional equivalent of cash, empower individuals to make choices. It is the business of the liberals’ administrative state, staffed by experts, to make choices for inexperienced individuals. This is why, while Democrats in Washington are working to reduce the portion of Americans’ private income that is disposed of by private choices, two tentacles of the Democratic Party — the Indiana and Louisiana teachers unions — are currently in their states’ courts waging futile fights against school choice programs, lest thousands of low- and moderate-income parents be as empowered as millions of demobilized servicemen were.

Washington’s contentions about the “cliff” is producing a blizzard of numbers. The argument, however, is not about this or that tax rate but about the nature of the American regime. When the Republican House majority acts as though it has a mind — and a mandate — of its own, this is not Washington being “dysfunctional,” it is the separation of powers functioning as the Founders intended. Their system requires concurrent congressional majorities — one in the Senate, with its unique constituencies and electoral rhythms, another in the House, with its constituencies and rhythms. And at least 219 of the 234 House Republicans won in November by margins larger than Obama’s national margin.

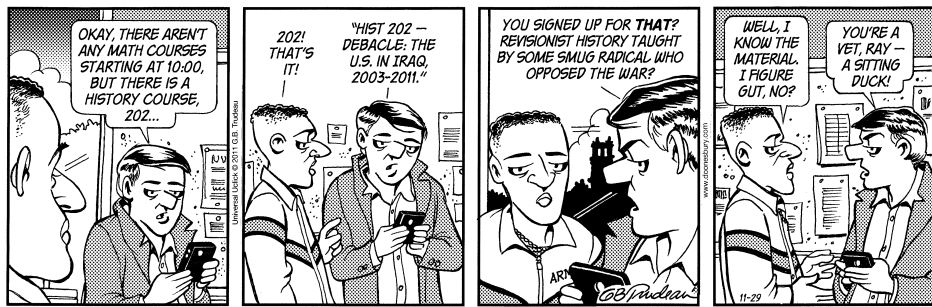

Counties Frustrated With Double-envelope Early Voting System

TWIN FALLS • Everyone who showed up for in-person early voting received the same instructions: Stuff your folded ballot in the small envelope, then stick the small envelope in the larger envelope.

That caused confusion for some early voters and extra cost for counties. A push to change the law failed in the

2012 legislative session, but some county clerks are hoping to resurrect the effort.

State law mandates that all absentee ballots have two envelopes.

During the last legislative session, the Secretary of State's office proposed a bill that, among other things, would have allowed in-person early voters to simply put their ballots in a box.

That bill didn't make it out of the House State Affairs

Committee, because not all the legislators were confident in the counties' abilities to securely handle the early ballots, said Deputy Secretary Tim Hurst.

But the double-envelope system is unnecessary and a hassle, said Twin Falls County Clerk Kristina Glascock.

On Nov. 5, the day before the general election, 20 county employees spent more than three hours

pulling the ballots out of the two envelopes, Glascock said. They also had to flatten the folded ballots so they would go through the machine.

The process is an additional cost. This election, Twin Falls County paid 50 cents per ballot for the envelopes. With 4,892 people voting early for the general election, that adds up to \$2,446 in envelopes alone. (That number doesn't in-

clude the ballots that were mailed out.)

For other counties, the cost is even greater. Ada County had nearly 20,000 early in-person ballots.

Even smaller counties get frustrated with the double envelopes.

"It's quite a chore to have to go through," said Jackie Fuqua, elections clerk for Gooding County. "And a lot of times people wouldn't understand."

Hurst said he isn't sure if the Secretary of State's office will introduce the bill again this session.

But Glascock said she still hopes the law will change.

"It just adds to the complication of voting," she said.



Idaho Man Asks Judge to Rule in School Fee Lawsuit

BOISE • A judge will hear arguments early next year on whether Idaho's school fees are unconstitutional.

Russell Joki, a former Nampa Schools Superintendent and teacher at the University of Idaho, sued the state in October in Ada County's 4th District Court contending that school fees for some classes, supplies and activities violate Idaho's constitutional promise of a free public education.

Last week Joki asked Judge Lynn Norton to issue a summary judgment — deciding the case without a trial — in his favor, and the judge will hear arguments on that motion Jan. 10.

The state has also filed a motion in the case asking that the lawsuit be dismissed. Attorneys for the state contend that Joki must first sue individual school districts before he can sue the state.

Joki, who has named several school districts as defendants along with the state, says several facts in the case are undisputed, including the fact that 4th District Judge Deborah Bail already ruled in 2005 that Idaho lawmakers had failed in their

constitutional duty to provide a public education by failing to provide adequate funding for school buildings.

Joki's attorney, former Idaho Supreme Court Justice Robert Huntley, has also submitted testimony from two experts backing Joki's claims.

Frank Gallant, an economist and the head of Gallant Analytics in Boise, says Idaho hasn't enacted any legislation that would fix the constitutional deficiencies in the state's education funding plan that Bail found back in 2005. In fact, Gallant claims in the court filing, just two years after Bail's ruling Idaho leaders used legislative slight-of-hand to pass the Property Tax Relief Act, which they passed off as a commitment to funding K-12 education but which actually further dismantled education funding.

Idaho's total public school expenditures have declined over the last 25 years from an average of just over 34 percent, Gallant said, to just over 23 percent.

"The fact is that, rather than providing legislation to render the current system of funding Education into a 'constitutional' status, the Legislature has, since the December 2005 ruling ...

further exacerbated the un-constitutionality of the education funding system of the State of Idaho by further debasement of funding available to schools," Gallant wrote.

Richard Slaughter, an economic consultant who served as Idaho's chief economist in the early 1980s and who testified as an expert witness in the earlier school funding lawsuit, also filed a report for Joki contending that school funding has dropped dramatically — so much that per-student support this year is equivalent to the per-student support level Idaho had in 1999.

"If the Legislature's system of funding was unconstitutional in 1999, as found by the Supreme Court in 2005, it is even more so today," Slaughter wrote in a filing with the court.

Assistant Chief Deputy Attorney General Brian

Kane, representing the state, has asked that the lawsuit be thrown out. Kane contends Joki's claims fall under Idaho's Constitutionally Based Educational Claims Act, under which plaintiffs must first try to resolve problems at the local level with state intervention coming only as a last resort.

The state maintains the act requires Joki to first sue his local school district — and not the state — and that because he hasn't taken that step, the lawsuit must be thrown out.

While the act grants the state the right to intervene in lawsuits against school districts if it so wishes, in this case neither the Legislature nor Idaho Schools Superin-

tendent Tom Luna are choosing to do so, Kane told the court. Rather, he said in a court filing, the state simply wants to remain on the service list for court filings so Idaho attorneys can monitor the case on the Legislature's and Luna's behalf.

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Blackfoot School Denies Request to Share Documents

BLACKFOOT (AP) • An eastern Idaho school district has turned down a request by a former teacher and Idaho Falls newspaper to make public an employment agreement and details of a contract payout worth more than \$105,000 earlier this year to the district's former superintendent.

The *Post Register* and former teacher Joyce Bingham asked Blackfoot School District 55 to release the agreement and documents related to the payout the district made to an unnamed source the day after Scott Crane's June 30 retirement.

The payment and the district's handling of Crane's exit have raised questions about who received the \$105,428 check and generated a lawsuit in state court alleging violations of state open meetings law.

School district officials have declined to release the documents, citing protections in state law for personnel matters. On Tuesday, the interim superintendent rejected another request through an affidavit filed in the lawsuit brought by Bingham.

In the affidavit, Chad Struhs wrote: "I contacted Dr. Crane and urged him to allow

the District to release the requested agreement (but) Dr. Crane declined to do so," the *Post Register* reported.

On Friday, a judge is scheduled to hear oral arguments on whether the documents should be made public.

The newspaper reports there is no immediate evidence linking the employment agreement and the contract payout. But Bingham's attorney, Jared Harris, and the newspaper are acting on the assumption the two items are related.

The *Post Register* also is seeking public response for an alleged breach of Idaho's open meeting laws. The newspaper claims the school board violated state law by making an agreement with Crane during a closed-door, executive session in April. That eight-minute meeting was called ostensibly to consider the hiring of a new employee. But during that session, the board executed an agreement with Crane, according to minutes from the meeting.

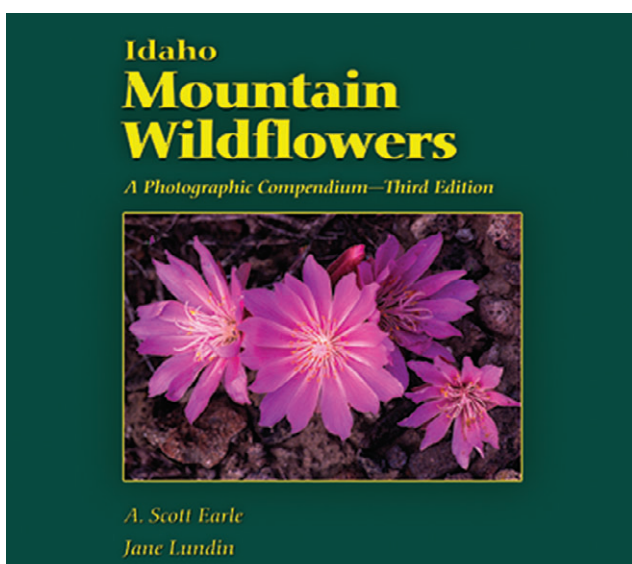
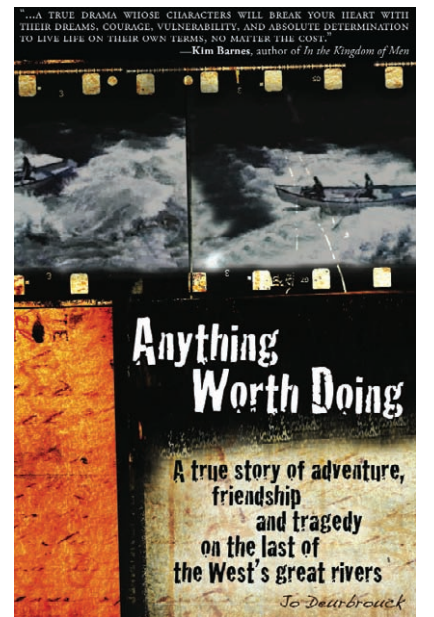

An Idaho Wildflower Book Worth its Weight

TWIN FALLS • To add a pound and a half to my backpack, the new piece of gear would have to be a valuable one.

And yes, A. Scott Earle's latest book is worth every one of its 25.6 ounces.

"Idaho Mountain Wildflowers: A Photographic Compendium" (Larkspur Books, \$19.95) boasts detailed, lovely images and balances its academic accuracy with engaging writing. The third edition, released in September, has grown to almost 500 images and descriptions, but in a compact 8.5-by-

8.5-inch, 248-page softcover. The photos are all in color, and the reproduction is sharp.

It's the best guide I've seen to the blooms that fascinate me on mountain trails.

For a casual beginner, the Bureau of Land Management's pocket-sized "Common Wildflowers of Southern Idaho" guide, released in 2008, is a good way to get started on wildflower identification. Its photos are arranged by flower color, not taxonomy, so you can quickly conclude whether that mystery bloom is in the pocket guide. But if it isn't, you're stuck — without information about its likely friends and relations.

Soon, you'll find that it's time to graduate to Earle's "Idaho Mountain Wildflowers." Arranged by family, this

Pocatello Center Begins Renting Yurts for the Season

POCATELLO • The Idaho State University Outdoor Adventure Center is now renting and taking reservations for the Portneuf Yurt System yurts and Camp Taylor cabins.

This year the Portneuf Yurt System features two new elevated yurt floors at Skyline and Catamount yurts. The other yurts are Bonneville, Inman and Jackson, all in the Portneuf Range just outside Pocatello.

The yurts are dome-

shaped structures with a skylight for watching the stars. Inside are bunk beds, a wood stove and lanterns. Two of the yurts — Skyline and Catamount — are at lower, relatively easy spots to access, while three — Bonneville, Inman and Jackson — are at higher elevations and require more strenuous access.

The yurt system is non-profit. Rental rates:

- For the 20-foot-diameter Skyline yurt, prices Sunday through Thursday

are \$32 per night for ISU students, \$42 for Idaho residents and \$52 for non-residents; Friday and Saturday nights are \$60, \$70 and \$80.

- For the 16-foot-diameter Jackson, Inman, Catamount and Bonneville yurts, prices Sunday through Thursday nights are \$23 per night for ISU students, \$33 for Idaho residents and \$43 for nonresidents; Friday and Saturday nights are \$52, \$62 and \$72.

After March 20 all yurt

rates are reduced by 50 percent.

The ISU Outdoor Adventure Center is also taking winter reservations for three Camp Taylor cabins on Scout Mountain; call for rental fees.

Gift Certificates for Idaho Sportsmen

JEROME • Gift givers can go to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game regional office at 324 S. 417 E., Suite No. 1, in Jerome and buy a gift certificate for a 2013 hunting and fishing license.

Why give a gift certificate instead of a license? Idaho residents 18 and older have to buy their own licenses because they need to show proof of residency.

Lifetime licenses cost from \$276.75 to \$1,113, depending on the age of the recipient. Seasonal licenses sell from \$7.25 for junior hunting to \$124.25 for the

Sportsman's Package. A hunting license costs \$12.75, a fishing license costs \$25.75, and a combination license costs \$33.50.

The Sportsman's Package includes hunting and fishing licenses, tags for deer, elk, bear, mountain lion, gray wolf, turkey, salmon and steelhead as well as archery and muzzleloader permits. That is a savings of more than \$70 compared with buying the items separately, a department release said.

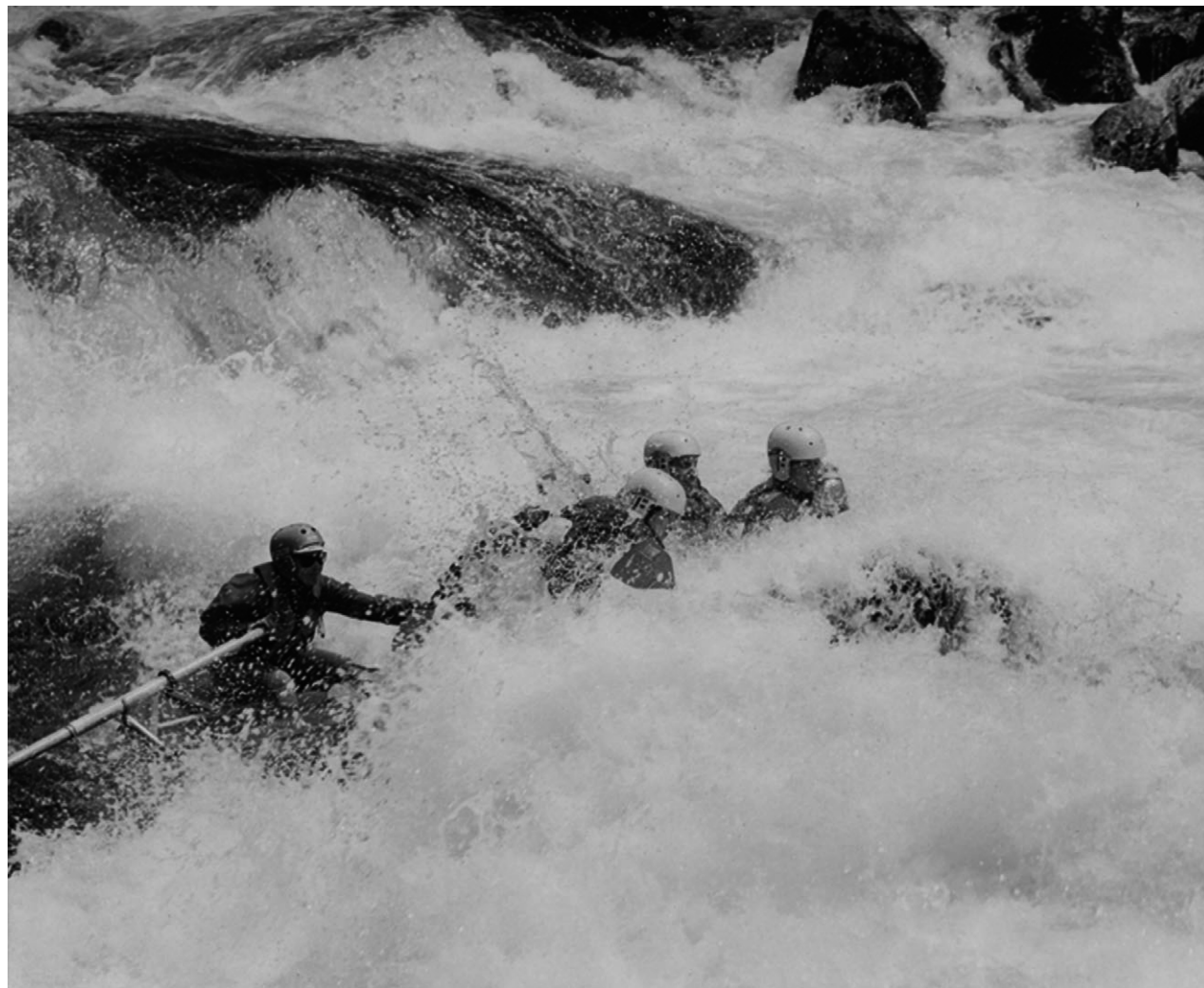

Dec. 2 book signing. The author, a Wood River High School teacher for three years in the '90s and a former whitewater raft guide, now lives in Idaho Falls. She's lived in Idaho for nearly 25 years.

"I love this place and I love the idea of another story for Idahoans to know themselves by, if that makes any sense. We don't have many," Deurbrouck told the *Times-News*. "The story I retell in the book might or might not come to be one of those, but it can't if folks don't hear about it and get the chance to decide whether it tells them something they recognize and value about being Westerners and Idahoans."

Though "Anything Worth Doing" largely celebrates an Idaho culture, that's not what Deurbrouck talks about when she travels.

In promotional appearances, she talks more about her conflicting thoughts on risks and freedom in high-risk sports — about the cost of the adventuring life but also the cost of choosing a more comfortable and secure life, she said in a telephone interview.

Her story is about wilderness raft guides Clancy Reece and Jon Barker, two of

those rare people who "never unchoose simple lives defined by such harsh and lovely bargains," Deurbrouck writes.

Reece and Barker believe that anything worth doing is worth overdoing, and they spend years living that philosophy on the West's rivers — in particular on Idaho's Salmon River, the longest undammed wilderness whitewater river in the lower 48 states.

Deurbrouck explores their lives and their river exploits with journalistic care. She clearly loves rivers, but you'll find disciplined writing instead of unrestrained exuberance in "Anything Worth Doing," which last week won a 2012 National Outdoor Book Award in the history/biography category.

She tells the story in first person, sharing her research process and her unresolved questions with readers. And she teaches a great deal about Northwest rivers — their history of transportation, irrigation, power production and recreation — without sounding like either a textbook author or a crusader.

"It gets you right in touch with what Idaho is, and without being a history book. These two men are delightful men," said Joann Jackson, 80, of Twin Falls, a retired English teacher who's been a friend of Deurbrouck

for decades. "I feel like I needed to get a towel and dry myself off while I was reading it. She just takes you right into it."

Jackson has never rafted the Salmon River — though her relatives do it every year — but she already has copies of "Anything Worth Doing" — other copies have left her house with friends.

"I keep getting copies of it and they sit on my table and they vanish. Everyone who comes in the house wants one," Jackson said.

Ron Abramovich, a hydrologist for the U.S. Natural Resources Conservation Service, said: "It's a great book summarizing some of the old river guides from Idaho. And Jo has a lot of facts and information in the early chapters about Idaho's rivers ... so it's an educational book as well."

Then his wife, Janice Abramovich, a Boise teacher and former ski coach, took the telephone to say that "Anything Worth Doing" was an exciting read, but informative too.

"It highlights the amazing whitewater we do have in the state, that we are the premier whitewater state ... and just how committed people are to the rivers," she said.

The skiing and rafting worlds overlap, Janice Abramovich said. They at-

tract adventure seekers who go to the fanatical side, obsessed with the steepest or deepest or biggest or longest.

Barker and Reece in 1988 set out on a source-to-sea voyage from the Salmon River's headwaters, a tiny creek south of Stanley, toward the Pacific Ocean. Janice Abramovich was struck by the book's description of their dory on the massive Columbia River among its wind-whipped whitecaps.

"I think it would have been terrifying with those winds, but they just kept going, come hell or high water," she said.

In those years, adventure recreation was losing its fringe status, Deurbrouck writes.

"Successful rafting companies now wooed clientele with slick brochures and polished, efficient office staff to answer the phones," she writes. "Guides were told to cut their hair, wear shirts, bathe, trim their beards."

And by then, being the "first" adventurer to do something required some creative definition of the task.

The two friends' 1996 project: a 24-hour speed record at the roaring peak of high water on the Salmon River. The outcome shook Idaho's river-guiding community.

What to Do When Your Dog Is Caught in a Trap

While bird hunting, my dog stepped in a foot-hold trap. Is it legal to set foot-hold traps or snares during the bird hunting season?

Yes. Hunters using dogs to pursue upland game, waterfowl, mountain lions and raccoons must be aware that other resource users, namely trappers, may be using the area.

Trapping in Idaho is legal when done according to the rules adopted by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission. Traps are set to harvest furbearing animals such as bobcats, beaver, muskrats and red fox. Traps and snares are also set for coyotes and raccoons classified as predators in Idaho.

Trap types can vary from foot-hold traps to Conibear kill traps. Snares are also legal. All traps must be tagged with the trapper's name and address or a unique trapper number assigned by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. All traps and snares must be checked by the trapper every 72 hours. Seasons for trapping or hunting furbearers vary by species but generally run from Nov. 1 to March 31.

Waterfowl hunters should use caution near water entry points such as otter slides or beaver dams. Beaver and otter sets may contain large foot-hold traps, cable snares or Conibear traps. Hunters must be aware trappers use scents, gland lures and animal urine to attract furbearers. These scents may also attract hunting dogs.

With a cool head and some preparation, most hunters can efficiently and effectively remove a foot-hold trap, conibear trap or snare. A dog in pain will yelp and bite anyone, including the owner. The first step is to cover and secure the dog's head and muzzle to stop it from struggling and prevent getting bit.

A coat or boot lace works well for this. The springs of a smaller foot-

hold trap may be compressed with your hands, while your body weight may be necessary to compress the springs of a larger trap. When the springs are compressed, open the jaws and remove the paw.

On a Conibear trap the springs must be compressed and locked before the trap can be removed. The springs of a Conibear may be compressed using your hands or a cord looped through the spring for increased mechanical advantage. On a snare, the sliding lock mechanism must be released or the cable cut to remove your pet.

Any of the new topical antiseptic treatments such as EMT gel could be applied to help close and disinfect a wound and promote healing. If the pet shows any signs of problems, a visit to your veterinarian would be in order.

Hunters can remove a dog accidentally caught in a trap but must know it is unlawful to destroy, disturb or remove traps or snares belonging to others. Once your dog is free from the trap you must leave the trap. If the trap is set in violation of Fish and Game rules, contact the nearest Fish and Game regional office.

Hunters and recreationists with dogs should take the time to become familiar with how these traps work in order to be able to effectively remove a trap. It may save your dog's life or prevent serious injury.

book's photos and descriptions invite the hiker to keep reading. Kneeling beside a bloom that you conclude is the elusive chocolate lily, you might also learn how to tell the difference between a sego lily and a white mariposa lily, or in which two Idaho counties you have a hope of finding a Columbia lily.

For the third edition, Earle and co-author Jane Lundin added more plants from northern Idaho's panhandle and more from higher elevations — as well as extensive coverage of the aster family, which now occupies 40 pages.

Who are the asters? The common sunflower, the robust and ubiquitous arrowleaf balsamroot and the big sage that we call sagebrush are all among them. But thanks to "Idaho Mountain Wildflowers," I've been able to add curly cup gumweed and rosy pussytoes to the list of asters I've identified on southern Idaho hikes.

Earle and Lundin don't limit their compendium to native species, but they frequently indicate which introduced species are benign, which are aggressive and which are now fully at home in Idaho.

A surgeon, Earle practiced in Sun Valley for a decade before moving to Cleveland. He eventually became a pro-

fessor of surgery at Case Western Reserve University's School of Medicine but still spent most of his vacations in Idaho's mountains.

After his 1990 retirement, Earle and his wife moved back to Sun Valley, where Earle spent years hiking with his camera.

"As my collection of wildflower images grew, I felt that I wanted to share the wildflowers and the mountains that I photographed with others," Earle wrote.

The first edition of "Idaho Mountain Wildflowers," in 2000, included about 300 images. But readers complained that they couldn't take the hardcover book hiking. So the second edition was in softcover, with nearly 100 more plants and flowers

from Earle's collection and that of Lundin, a Seattle school librarian who summured in Sun Valley.

"The descriptions would also take into account the many changes in taxonomy that botany was undergoing as a result of DNA molecular studies," Earle wrote.

One fascinating footnote in the third edition tells what the scientific name of poke knotweed has to do with a Hindustani insect's secretions. Others acknowledge taxonomy debates, or cultural differences in the uses of edible plants.

Idaho Steelhead Season Still Open

JEROME • The steelhead harvest season is open through Dec. 31 on the Boise, Clearwater, Salmon, Little Salmon and lower Snake rivers.

The steelhead limit on the Boise, Snake, Salmon and Little Salmon is three per day and nine in possession. The limit on the Clearwater is two per day and six in possession. Anglers may keep 20 steelhead for the season. Once limits are reached, the angler must stop fishing, even catch-and-release.

Waters open for steelhead harvest are:

- Boise River from its

mouth upstream to Barber Dam.

- Salmon River from its mouth upstream to the posted boundary 100 yards downstream from the Sawtooth Fish Hatchery weir, near the town of Stanley.

- Little Salmon River from its mouth upstream to the U.S. Highway 95 bridge near Smokey Boulder Road.

- Snake River from the Washington state line at the confluence of the Snake and Clearwater rivers upstream to Hells Canyon Dam.

- Clearwater River mainstem and Middle Fork from its mouth upstream to

Clear Creek.

- North Fork Clearwater River from its mouth upstream to Dworshak Dam.

- South Fork Clearwater River from its mouth upstream to the confluence of American and Red Rivers.

Anglers must have an Idaho fishing license and steelhead permit. Steelhead anglers may use only barbless hooks, except in the Boise River, and may keep only hatchery steelhead marked with a clipped adipose fin. All other steelhead must be released unharmed.

In the boundary waters

on the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon or Washington, an angler with a 2012 Idaho fishing license and steelhead permit may fish where the river forms the state boundary but may not fish from the shorelines, including wading or in sloughs or tributaries on the Oregon or Washington side.

'Outdoor Idaho' Episode Explores Sawtooth History

TWIN FALLS • One of the most photographed parts of the state poses for "Outdoor Idaho" television cameras for a new profile of the Sawtooth National Recreation Area, which celebrated its 40th anniversary this year.

"In a 'Sawtooth Celebration' we are trying to tell the story of the many caring individuals who worked to protect Idaho's most famous landscape," executive producer and host Bruce Reichert said in a release. "Part of that story is a political connection some 40 years ago between the White

Clouds and the Sawtooth mountains."

The new hour-long "Outdoor Idaho" episode premieres at 7 p.m. Dec. 2 on Idaho Public Television.

The SNRA encompasses the Sawtooth Valley, massive mountains, forests, high mountain lakes, a wilderness and the headwaters and rapids of the Salmon River. Before the establishment of the national recreation area that is overseen by the U.S. Forest Service, many Idahoans supported the creation of a national park, the show's release said. Threat-

ened with plans for a major mine and other development proposals, the debates over the landscape intensified. The growing discussions involved Idaho's congressional delegation, long-time conservationists, the newly organizing environmentalists, residents, ranchers, various commercial interests and recreationists. It affected a governor's race and brought national attention to Idaho.

"I fell in love with the Sawtooth Mountains back in the 1960s, when it was still called the Primitive Area. A

weeklong 50-mile hike out of Grandjean in grade school cemented my ardor for the Sawtooths," Reichert said. "Later, my high school buddies and I would get my folks to drop us off at Pettit Lake or Alturas Lake, then pick us up a week later at another location. I don't think I've missed a year without going back to this special place."

The show examines the roots of the SNRA, talks with people who were there during the debates on its management, and incorporates vintage footage and photographs.

Salmon Release is Step in Calif. River Restoration

FRESNO, Calif. • California's second-longest river once teemed with salmon that swam from San Francisco Bay to spawn near Fresno. But that was before the Friant Dam diverted the San Joaquin River to serve agriculture needs 62 years ago.

On Wednesday, biologists released two Chinook salmon 30 miles below the dam, a milestone in one of the most complex river restoration projects in North America.

The hope is the two fish continue their journey and spawn in the same gravel beds where swarms of their ancestors were so thick that locals said it seemed they could walk across the shallow river on their backs.

If all goes according to plan, in spring the newly hatched salmon will travel 320 miles back to sea along the Central California river.

"We hope that they imprint on the habitat and that area of the river, and as adults they'll be attracted to the same area," said Gerald Hatler of the California Department of Fish and Game. "That's our goal, but what we're doing now is largely experimental."

The \$800 million San Joaquin River Restoration Project stems from a 2006 settlement of a lawsuit filed by environmental groups to restore the river flows and salmon runs. The suit contended the government violated state law when water diversions into the Friant-Kern and Madera irrigation canals dried up the river and ended

spring and fall salmon runs.

"When you have an iconic species coming back, it's a signal the river is being restored," said Monty Schmitt, a scientist with the Natural Resources Defense Council, which filed the lawsuit.

The settlement involving farmers, fishing groups, environmentalists and the federal government guarantees that at least 350 cubic feet per sec-

ond of water will be released daily from the dam, which they calculate is enough to refill the 60 or so miles of river that had run dry.

"You can't put things back to the way they were originally," said Margaret Gidding of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, which built the dam. "Trying to create a connective river again is giving us quite a challenge."

What's New in Three-Year Fish Rule Book?

JEROME • The Idaho Fish and Game Commission last week adopted a three-year fishing seasons and rules brochure, covering 2013-15.

The change is based on 11 months of public interaction and responses to an angler survey conducted in 2011, state fishery manager Jeff Dillon told commissioners.

So what's new?

- In the Magic Valley Region, the length limit is removed on small mouth bass in Magic Reservoir; and in the Southeast Region the bass limit is removed in the Treasureton Reservoir, a Fish and Game release said.
- In the Upper Snake Region the limit is removed on rainbow trout and hybrid trout in the South Fork Snake River tributaries. The limit on brown trout is two, with none under 16 inches. In Henrys Lake Outlet, the 400 yard section from the USGS gauge to the Henrys Lake Dam opens to fishing.

- For the first time since 1999, anglers will be allowed to harvest kokanee in Lake Pend Oreille as a result of the success of the Lake Pend Oreille fishery recovery program. Anglers will be allowed to harvest six kokanee per day in Pend Oreille in 2013.

- In addition, the increase in kokanee has made it possible to move back toward trophy rainbow trout management. A size and bag limit will be reinstated for rainbows: six rainbow trout, only one more than

20 inches long; and the \$15-per-head angler incentive will no longer be in effect for rainbow trout. The \$15 incentive remains in place for lake trout in Lake Pend Oreille.

- Elsewhere in the Panhandle Region the limit on kokanee was lowered to six fish in Priest Lake and Upper Priest Lake. In Lake Pend Oreille anglers are allowed to harvest six kokanee and six rainbow trout — only one more than 20 inches long.

- Clark Fork river and tributaries; Pack River and tributaries; and Grouse Creek and tributaries will be closed to trout harvest from Dec. 1 to the Friday before the Memorial Day weekend.

- In Big Elk Creek, Crooked Creek and Red River in the Clearwater Region; in Parkcenter Pond, Weiser Community Pond, McDevitt Pond and Wilson Ponds in the Southwest Region; in Edson Fichter Pond in the Southeast Region; and in Becker Pond in the Upper Snake Region, the trout limit is reduced to two. The goal is to increase opportunity for more anglers to catch stocked fish and to reduce the boom and bust cycle with the stocking program, the Fish and Game release said.

The changes take effect Jan. 1. Anglers should consult the new 2013-2015 seasons and rules brochure, which will be available at all license vendors, at Fish and Game offices and on the Fish and Game website (fishandgame.idaho.gov) before January.

ORDINANCE NO. 1109****AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, AMENDING CHAPTER 13.20 SEWER CHARGES AND FEES; 13.20.020 MONTHLY CHARGES; SCHEDULE 13.20.060 OF THE JEROME MUNICIPAL CODE; REVIEW AND ADJUSTMENT OF CHARGES; ALLOWING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO ADJUST FEES FOR NON-CONSUMPTIVE POTABLE USAGE BASED UPON AN ADJUSTMENT SCHEDULE TO INSURE EQUITABLE BILLING PRACTICES; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE**

WHEREAS, The City of Jerome provides utility for domestic wastewater services; and
WHEREAS, owners of real property being provided domestic wastewater service by the City have ultimate responsibility for all deposits, fees, and charges for such service; and
WHEREAS, the city charges and fees require an increase in same to maintain the proper functioning of domestic wastewater services; and
WHEREAS, the City Administrator shall be empowered to adjust billing for meter size for non-consumptive potable usage to insure equity due to varying water meter sizes and respective commercial users;

WHEREAS, the city charges and fees for domestic wastewater services reflect only the actual cost for the provision of same and proper capital reserve accounts.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO AS FOLLOWS:

13.20.020: MONTHLY CHARGES; SCHEDULE:

The monthly wastewater collection and treatment service charges for each property owner, domestic, commercial, or industrial in nature, shall be determined by the cubic feet of water used plus a fixed monthly base fee. Monthly bills shall be sent to the property owner. The owner of real property to which wastewater treatment and collection services are provided shall be responsible for the payment of all deposits, charges and fees required by this chapter which are not paid in full at the time water or wastewater treatment services are terminated to that real property. Each owner of real property to which wastewater treatment and collection services is provided shall receive written notice of termination of water service to such real property at least ten (10) days prior to the termination of such services, which notice shall also contain the amount of all delinquent charges and fees. The following rate schedule shall determine service charges and fees:

A. The city administrator, or his/her designee, shall classify all residential, commercial, and industrial users into appropriate user classes according to the user's wastewater characteristics. Service charges for residential and commercial users shall be derived from the rate schedule stated in this section:

C. Where a customer can demonstrate that the purpose of an oversized meter is for irrigation or fully consumptive uses, then the City Administrator has the authority to bill based on the theoretical meter size that would be necessary for servicing just the non-consumptive potable usage based on the adjustment schedule below. Such a modification would be subject to review if at a later date additional data suggested that a larger meter would be needed.

- 1. For meters > 1" - Actual meter sizes can be reduced according to the following adjusted sizes:
 - Use 1" wintertime equivalent meter size for flows less than 1032 CF (a one inch meter is 1.78 times the area of a inch meter. 1.78*580 = 1032)
 - Use 1.5" wintertime equivalent meter size for flows between 1032 and 2320 CF (a two inch meter is 4 times the area of a inch meter. 4*580 = 2320)
 - Use 2.0" wintertime equivalent meter size for flows between 2320 and 4125 CF
 - Use 3.0" wintertime equivalent meter size for flows between 4125 and 9280 CF
- 2. For all single family residential use a wintertime equivalent meter size of 1".

For industrial users with high wastewater strength (400+ mg/L), high flows (generally 10,000+ gallons per day), and/or unique wastewater characteristics as determined by the city administrator or his/her designee, the base monthly fee will be determined based on an Equivalent Residential Unit (ERU) as calculated utilizing the formula below. The usage fee will be per the user class above based on Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS), unless a higher rate is justified based on unique wastewater characteristics or impacts to the city's collection and treatment systems.

ERUs = Flow*0.00135 + BOD*0.164 + TSS*0.0324 + Phos*0.39
Flow = Average daily flow (gallons/day)
BOD = Average Biochemical Oxygen Demand (pounds/day)
TSS = Average Total Suspended Solids (pounds/day)
Phos = Average Phosphorous load (pounds/day)

For larger industries with individual discharge permits with the city, the city may negotiate with the industry to develop a monthly base fee based on the equivalent residential units permitted and a usage fee that is based on flow and wastewater strength (including biochemical oxygen demand, total suspended solids, and phosphorous).

A. The monthly wastewater collection and treatment service charge for each property owner or user, domestic, commercial, or industrial in nature, whose water consumption is not metered shall be fixed by the city council based upon the rate established in the rate schedule above and the cubic feet of water discharged into the collection system as determined by the city administrator; provided, however, that in the case of single-family residential dwellings, with unmetered or unavailable water discharge data, cubic feet discharge shall be deemed to be four hundred (400) cubic feet per month for dwellings with less than three (3) permanent residents, and eight hundred (800) cubic feet per month for dwellings with three (3) or more residents.

B. Each nonresidential property owner not serviced by a public water supplier with water, but having a private well or water supply, shall install and maintain at his or its own expense a water meter capable of measuring the total gallons per day of water being used. The meter shall:

1. Be approved by the city administrator prior to installation;
2. Be installed within sixty (60) days of the receipt of approval for installation;
3. Be situated on property accessible to the city, its agents or employees daily between the hours of eight o'clock (8:00) A.M. and six o'clock (6:00) P.M.

13.20.060: REVIEW AND ADJUSTMENT OF CHARGES:

The city shall annually review the user charges for wastewater collection and treatment. Adjustments shall be made by resolution as needed to ensure that adequate revenue will be acquired to balance expenditures for wastewater collection and treatment and to maintain an equitable system of user charges. (Ord. 622 4, 1979: prior code 23-41(F))

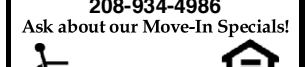

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

One aspect of the game that defeats beginners and intermediate players is the concept that every card means something. Take this deal from the second semifinal session of the Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs from Seattle last year, and focus just on East's cards and the North hand (dummy).

North-South were playing Precision, which led to an inelegant sequence ending in one no-trump rather than two diamonds. But it was up to East-West to punish them.

Using fourth-highest leads, West started with the club four: jack, queen, six. The club two went to the nine and 10, and the club three was returned to East's king. When West let the club eight hold the trick, East had to decide how to continue. Dummy had pitched a heart and two diamonds on the clubs; declarer had thrown a heart.

Should East play a spade, in case declarer started with the doubleton spade ace and five solid diamonds? Or should he play a diamond, in case declarer had the spade king and not the diamond king?

The answer came from West's decision to win the second club trick with the 10, not the ace. (He knows East has the club king from the play to the first two tricks, so he has a choice of plays from equals.) When he then returns the club three, not the ace or five, he has played his lowest card at each turn, signaling for a diamond through.

ANSWER: You might feel that you should breathe a sigh of relief and pass. But you have enough values to compete. You might easily have a 4-4 major fit or a relatively safe haven in a 6-1 club fit. Double for takeout and hope that partner has a convenient rebid. A bare club honor is almost as good as a small doubleton in terms of trump support.

More NFL Players Testing Positive for Amphetamines

NEW YORK • More NFL players are testing positive for amphetamines, a class of substances that includes the ADHD drug Adderall.

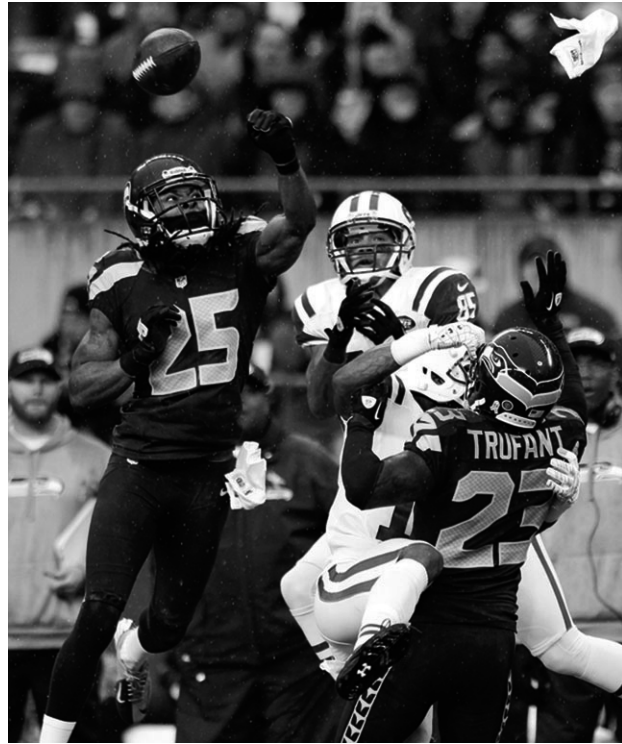
Since the start of last season, more than 10 players suspended for failing drug tests have publicly blamed it on taking the stimulant. And while the league doesn't identify the substance when a player is penalized, senior vice president Adolpho Birch acknowledges that the number of positives for amphetamines has increased.

Because the type of drug isn't disclosed under the NFL's agreement with the union, nothing prevents a player from claiming he took Adderall when, in fact, he tested positive for a steroid or another stimulant. The tests don't differentiate between Adderall and other amphetamines, Birch said, but he does believe Adderall abuse is on the rise in the league.

With many college students using the drug without a prescription to study deep into the night, he said, players come into the NFL accustomed to the idea of popping the pill for a boost.

"It's not a secret that it's a societal trend," Birch, who oversees law and labor policy for the league, said Wednesday. "I think we're starting to see some of the effects of that trend."

Players diagnosed with attention deficit hyperac-

tivity disorder, or ADHD, can apply for a therapeutic use exemption that permits them to take Adderall. An independent administrator reviews their medical history and diagnostic tests to approve or reject the application.

Several players who have tested positive said they had a prescription for Adderall but not an exemption. New York Giants rookie safety Will Hill said in October before starting his four-game suspension

number could be even higher among professional athletes, he said, because some traits of the disorder may actually help them in sports.

But Birch said the percentage of NFL players with exemptions was, in fact, lower than the expected number for the general population. That's a significant difference from Major League Baseball, where the percentage of players being treated for the condition is roughly 10 percent.

Dr. Pliszka is skeptical that people can develop ADHD as adults. To prove a diagnosis, he said, a player should be able to document he had trouble concentrating back in school.

Adderall is prescribed to help increase focus and reduce impulsivity in people with ADHD. For athletes, its benefits are different than what fans usually associate with performance-enhancing drugs.

"It's not going to help you hit harder, run faster — not at all like steroids," Dr. Pliszka said.

But like those college kids cramming for a final, NFL players can get a boost from the drug.

"It would absolutely give you a competitive advantage. Fatigue, focus, concentration, maybe aggression," said Dr. Michael Joyner, a sports physiologist and anesthesiologist at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. "And if they were using it during training, the ability to train harder, longer, the ability to have fewer bad days."

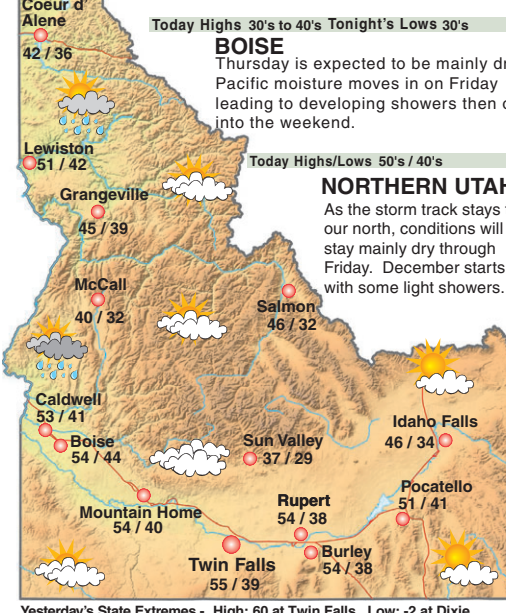

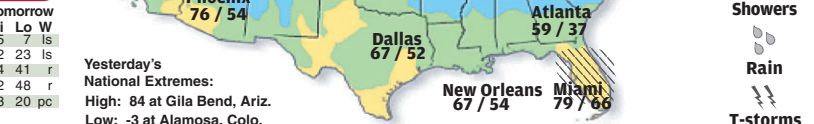

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COLLEGE PICKS: MAC Championship has BCS Implications

Time to put the BCS puzzle together.

There's not a lot of mystery going into championship weekend. Mostly, everything should simply fall into place.

The spot opposite Notre Dame in the championship game will go to Alabama or Georgia, whichever one takes the SEC title. The winners of the Pac-12, Big Ten and ACC championship games will each advance to a big game, as will the team that comes out on top in the Big East matchup between Louisville and Rutgers on Thursday night.

Florida and Oregon aren't playing this weekend, but both are safe bets to land at large bids to BCS games. Pencil in the Gators for the Sugar Bowl and the Ducks for the Fiesta.

The real BCS intrigue this weekend will happen at a most unlikely place: Detroit, where No. 18 Kent State and No. 19 Northern Illinois will be playing for the Mid-American Conference title Friday.

The MAC has never sent a team to the BCS, but it could benefit from the Big East's struggles this season.

BCS rules state that if a champion from a conference without an automatic bid, such as the MAC, ranks in the top 16 of the final BCS standings and is ranked higher than a champion from one of the AQ leagues, such as the Big East, that non-AQ champ is guaranteed a spot in the BCS.

Neither Rutgers nor Louisville was ranked in last week's BCS standings, so that opens the back door to a bid for the MAC champ.

Kent State was 17th and stands a good chance to move up one spot with a victory. UCLA is in 16th place and has to play at Stanford in the Pac-12 title game on Friday night.

"I won't talk about that at all," MAC coach of the year Darrell Hazell said about Kent State's BCS prospects. "I'll talk about Northern Illinois. If our guys don't focus on this Friday we won't have the opportunity to play in some of those big games."

"This is huge, huge game for this university."

Northern Illinois is 21st in the BCS standings and could also get into the top 16, but would need a little extra help. It's just as likely an NIU victory in the MAC title game will eliminate both the Huskies and the Golden Flashes.

Boise State, 20th in the standings, plays at Nevada on Saturday and can win a share of the Mountain West title. The Broncos also have a long shot chance at getting into the top 16, but it'd be tough for them to jump the MAC champion.

If a BCS buster does emerge, the biggest loser could be the Big 12.

No. 12 Oklahoma plays TCU on Saturday with a chance to close its season 10-2 (losses against Notre Dame and Kansas State) and earn a share of the conference title.

The Sooners can still win the Big 12 if they win and Kansas State loses to Texas. Still, there's room for both in the BCS unless space needs to be created for Kent State or one of the other potential BCS busters.

If the Golden Flashes (11-1), who lost to Kentucky by 33 early in the season and later won at Rutgers, do find their way into the BCS, expect it to be in the Orange Bowl.

The Orange Bowl has the last selection among the BCS bowls and it's not likely any other game will be rushing to take Kent State, or Northern Illinois (11-1) for that matter.

But rest assured those teams won't be picky.
