20 Years for Man behind Machete Attack

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls judge had harsh words for a man convicted of attacking another man with a machete during his sentencing hearing Monday. Martin Hernandez-Vargas "This is one of the worst aggravated battery cases I've seen in my time as a judge in this community." Twin Falls County 5th District Judge **Randy Stoker**

continues to deny his guilt and has a right to do so, said Twin Falls County 5th District Judge Randy Stoker. But Hernandez-Vargas minimized his crime and flat-out attempted to deceive the court during sentencing and the jury during the trial, Stoker said. Stoker also said it is clear Hernandez-Vargas has problems with violence and alcohol. "This is one of the worst aggravated battery cases I've seen in my time as a judge in this community," Stoker said.

Stoker said he wanted to send a message to Hernandez-Vargas and the community, sentencing him to eight to 20 years in prison.

TWIN FALLS • Homework. It's a word that makes many students cringe, but educators are looking for ways to make it more relevant.

Brady Dickinson, principal at Canyon Ridge High School in Twin Falls, said the quality of homework assignments is more important than the quantity.

"The focus is more on making homework meaningful," he said.

Canyon Ridge doesn't have a policy about how much homework should be assigned.

And Melissa McGrath, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Education, said that's the case at the statewide level, too.

"It is completely up to local school boards to regulate this if they so desire," she wrote in an email to the *Times*-*News*. "In most cases, the school board does not even get involved and leaves it to the individual school administrator or classroom teacher to regulate."

JEROME • The Jerome School District will take a supplemental levy renewal measure to voters in March.

The amount – \$650,000 each year – won't change. The school board voted unanimously Tuesday night to pursue a two-year measure.

In the past, the school district went to voters with a ballot measure each year.

Superintendent Dale Layne said the board talked about pursuing a higher amount for the levy, but decided against it.

"We did look at raising it, but also understand the economic conditions right now," he said.

Jerome voters have supported a supplemental levy for about 13 years. The amount has stayed the same for 10 years.

One of the driving factors behind seeking the same amount in March, Layne said, is the way this year's budget is looking.

The school district was originally slated to spend \$750,000 in fund balance this year on operating expenses.

Layne said the district probably won't have to spend that much anymore. That's because it will receive a little more state funding than anticipated due to an enrollment increase.

The school district does have expenses this year that weren't originally included in the budget. Those support new classified positions and additional bus routes.

The two power plants stand side by side, on the north side of the river at the base of Shoshone Falls. Water is piped from the top of the falls, through the rock to the power houses below. The falling water turns large turbines in the power houses to generate electricity.

The power plants generate a total of 12 megawatts. Perrine first talked about

building a power plant at

Shoshone Falls in 1900,

when he persuaded Harry

Hollister, from Chicago, to

invest in the hydroelectric

project. Perrine then filed a

claim for 3,000 cubic feet

per second of water from

each side of the Snake River.

The claims were first intend-

ed for irrigation water, then

later used for the plant. Construction of the tunnel for the pipe, or penstock, began the following year. Crews blasted rock from the base of the canyon and tunneled upward.

In August 1907, water was released into the penstock, and 500 kilowatts of electricity were produced by the power plant. A second generator was installed in 1909, increasing production to three megawatts, the same as it produces today.

"The huge turbine wheel

sound like the purr of a satisfied tomcat," wrote the Twin Falls Times when the Perrine plant came on line.

Macy's Employee Arrested for Stealing \$20,000

TWIN FALLS • A sales manager at the Twin Falls Macy's store was arrested on a grand theft charge last week for allegedly stealing thousands of dollars from the store.

On Dec. 14, Twin Falls police responded to Macy's to speak with the employee, identified as Robert Lisle Bordwell of Twin Falls.

A regional loss prevention director told police the accounted store for \$10,906 from fraudulent returns Bordwell, 34, allegedly made. According to a police report, the loss prevention director said Bordwell admitted to other thefts that hadn't yet been accounted for. According to the report, the alleged thefts began in December 2011. Store employees found Bordwell allegedly made 60 different returns without receipts from August to December 2012.

The report also states Bordwell can allegedly be seen on surveillance video taking cash from the dinnerware department in the store.

"Bordell admitted to the thefts from the store," the report states. "Bordell admitted to scanning returns in which he would use tags from merchandise and override the receipt and take cash from the register."

Then, the report states, he allegedly would scribble a signature to make it look like a customer made the return. Bordwell would then allegedly pocket the cash value of the return, the report states.

Jerome Man Pleads Guilty to Child Sex Abuse

JEROME • A Jerome man pleaded guilty Monday to two counts of sexual abuse of a minor under 16.

Jesse Arlee Smith was accused of abusing two girls while he watched them for their parents last year.

According to court documents, Smith and his girlfriend, who are known to the girls, ages 7 and 10, were paid to watch them by their parents. According to the documents, when the parents arrived home, the 10-year-old girl told her parents Smith touched her inappropriately. In a later interview, the 7-year-old also said Smith touched her inappropriately. According to the court

documents, the parents of the 10-year-old girl took her to a hospital for an exam the night of the alleged abuse. The documents state the exam showed abrasions on her genitals.

Smith originally faced six total charges – three counts of lewd conduct with a minor under 16 and three counts of sexual abuse of a minor under 16. As part of a plea deal, Smith pleaded guilty to two of the sexual abuse charges and one count of injury to a jail in a separate case.

Smith is scheduled to be sentenced for all three charges Feb. 4 in Jerome County 5th District Court.

Hernandez-Vargas was first charged after Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies responded in May to a call about a disturbance at an address south of Kimberly. They found a 53-year-old man with traumatic injuries to his head and face. According to their report, the victim's injuries - including an apparent broken jaw and a large cut – appeared to be caused by a sharp weapon.

The victim in the case was forced to stop working at the dairy where he was employed for more than 15 years and move to Arizona to live with family. That's because it became too difficult to manage his injuries and diabetes on his own, Twin Falls County Senior Deputy Prosecutor Stan Holloway said during Monday's hearing.

Holloway said the victim's injuries were so bad that the prosecutor's office arranged to have an autopsy done, but was able to cancel after the victim's "miraculous" recovery.

Holloway suggested that Hernandez-Vargas spend 12 to 30 years in prison and pay a substantial amount of restitution.

"This defendant blames anyone and everyone other than himself for the injuries suffered by (the victim)," Holloway said.

Defense attorney Ben Andersen argued that Hernandez-Vargas should serve three to 12 years in prison and be recommended for the therapeutic community program. He also asked Stoker to consider retaining jurisdiction in the case for a year while Hernandez-Varpeutic community program to see if he would be a candidate for probation in a year. Andersen said he recognized the sentence should not be too short, but said it

should also not be too long. "In looking at retribution, the harsher punishment is more appropriate where the victim is vulnerable and totally innocent," he said.

Andersen pointed out that the victim admitted to pushing Hernandez-Vargas first during their fight, that neither man clearly remembered what happened that night, and that both were intoxicated.

Hernandez-Vargas spoke at the hearing. He repeatedly said he never planned nor expected the incident to happen or to escalate.

"I started praying every single day asking to God to please allow me to remember what happened," he said.

Hernandez-Vargas told the court Monday that he began to remember more details after the trial was over, and proceeded to tell a different story of the events than he testified to in court.

"Right now I feel so confused because I don't understand how it's possible everyone believed him and not me," he said. "I understand he got injured but I am telling the truth. I want to believe in truth and justice."

After Hernandez-Vargas spoke, Stoker said he did not believe the entire truth about what happened during the May incident came out during the trial, but that he believed the evidence in the case supports the guilty verdict.

"I'm convinced it wasn't a self-defense case by any stretch of the imagination," he said.

BURLEY • The choices look pretty grim for Burley officials who may face a \$1 million penalty if they decide to pull the city out of the Idaho Independent Intergovernmental Authority, a program that pools cities' monthly premiums in a health insurance fund.

If the city stays in the pool, it will face a 36 percent increase in premiums in January, which officials say they can't afford.

"It needs to fold because it's not what it was suppose to be," City Councilman Russ Mallory said during a Tuesday discussion on the matter.

The council made no decision regarding the insurance program Tuesday.

The cost of the additional pool premium is \$188,251.

Officials sent a letter to the pool's board of directors stating the city could not meet the additional premium. The IIIA board includes Mark Mitton, city administrator for Burley.

The IIIA has ordered actuary studies on what would

At a Glance: Self-Insurance

What is it?

A city that becomes self-insured acts as its own insurer for its employee health benefits. The benefits are funded through the city, and the city manages and pays out any claims made by its workers.

Why do it?

Supporters cite several advantages. Self-insurance allows cities to oversee what types of claims are being made and thus base their deductibles, rates and preventative health care on those claims. If cities band together to buy insurance, they're more likely to get a more affordable plan.

What are the risks?

Most self-insurers tend to have a small employee pool, thus limiting the cash they have available to cover claims – especially expensive ones. High-risk claims are unpredictable, and one year of expensive claims could severely set back a self-insured city and drive costs back up.

The IIIA board will meet in January and likely make a decision about whether to continue operating the pool.

Mitton said the state insurance department could find the pool insolvent and shut it down.

He said he told the board that Burley does not have the money budgeted to pay the increase in premiums.

"To amend your budget you have to have extra revenues. We're not the federal government; we can't just turn on the printing presses," Mitton said.

After the increase the city would be paying 65 percent more for health insurance premiums than it did 13 months ago.

The city's second option is to pull out of the pool and face the penalty, which includes an additional cost of \$85,050 to put the city's 75 employees on



a traditional health insurance plan, based on a recent quote.

The rub there is the quote could expire before the city makes a decision and there is risk the cost could go up on that plan as well.

City Attorney Dave Shirley said he has been in contact with legal counsel from the insurance pool's other cities and no one has made decisions yet. Thirty-nine cities across the

state, including Burley, Paul, Oakley Jerome, Shoshone, Ketchum and Hailey, joined the program after leaving more traditional insurers like Blue Cross to save money.

The group was hit with 11 claims in its first 40 days of operation. As a result, pool members have to kick in extra to shore up the account.

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Snowstorm Causes Problems for Rockies

DENVER (AP) • A storm that has dumped more than a foot of snow in the Rocky Mountains was causing problems for travelers as it spread across the Plains on Wednesday.

The main east-west route across Colorado, Interstate 70, was closed from east of Denver to the Kansas line because of poor visibility due to blowing snow. Smaller highways were also closed in eastern Colorado.

Drivers in Iowa and Nebraska were warned to be careful or stop driving altogether starting Wednesday evening as the Plains gets its first major winter storm of the season.

Light snow is also expected at Chicago's O'Hare International Airport on Thursday, and strong winds could make visibility poor. That, combined with low clouds, could cause delays at the nation's second-busiest airport, National Weather Service forecaster Jamie Enderlen said.

Iowa officials advised drivers to avoid most roads from Wednesday night through noon Thursday, but native Laurie Harry, a manager at a Casey's General Store, expects to drive to work Thursday morning.

"If I need to get into work, I'll be here," she said. "We've had snow before. Iowans know what to expect. We're used to it?"

Denver by midday Wednesday. At the height of the storm, Denver's airport, the nation's fifth-busiest, reported delays averaging 30 minutes because of snow and ice, but operations have since returned to normal.

The snow is a gift for ski resorts in Colorado, Utah and Arizona right before the busy holiday week. The snow might also tempt backcountry skiers, but it prompted some avalanche warnings in Colorado and Utah.

The moisture is also a re-

lief after an extended wildfire season in Colorado. Drought conditions persist especially in the mainly agricultural eastern half of the state.

Farmer Fred Midcap welcomed the snow even though 25 mph winds were blowing some of it away from his land near Hudson in northeastern Colorado.

"The snowflakes are mostly going sideways," he said.

Midcap doesn't plow his land, a move intended to help improve the soil, and said the stubble left over from this year's weak millet crop will help hold some of the snow in place, hopefully setting up for a better growing season next year. If the snow keeps coming, it will also provide some welcome insulation to his winter wheat crop before the coldest weather of the season.

In Arizona, two recent storms had combined to blanket the mountains north of Flagstaff with 2 feet of snow, and about 20 inches in Flagstaff and along the Mogollon Rim.

Sun Valley Mayor Dewayne Briscoe said the break-in that was discovered earlier this year when documents went missing was never fully investigated.

The Idaho Mountain Express reported there's a difference of opinion over why the probe was halted. Sun Valley Police Chief Cam Daggett says he thought somebody else

would pursue the matter after the mayor's office asked his department to hand over evidence to the Blaine County Sheriff's Office.

But Briscoe says he never directed Daggett to end his probe.

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Teen Arrested in Oct. Stabbing

TWIN FALLS • Another teenager has been arrested in an October attack that injured two people.

According to court documents, the 17-year-old allegedly helped Nicholas Gray, 20, attack another man with a knife.

Arraigned Monday, the teen was charged with aggravated battery and conspiracy to commit aggravated battery. He was held on \$5,000 bond, and a preliminary hearing is scheduled for Dec. 28.

Jeffrey W. Allred, 23, and Roberto Garza Jr., 20, were also charged with one count of aggravated battery with use of a deadly weapon or instrument for the alleged attack. And another 17-yearold boy has been charged with aggravated battery and criminal conspiracy in the case.

Besides the knife, rocks were thrown at one point during the fight, and a female was hit in the head and began bleeding profusely, police concluded. The male victim under-

RUSH ON GUNS, ARMORED **BACKPACKS FOLLOWS SHOOTING**

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • The reaction to the Connecticut school shooting can be seen in gun stores and self-defense retailers across the nation: Anxious parents are fueling sales of armored backpacks for children while firearms enthusiasts are stocking up on assault rifles in anticipation of tighter gun control measures.

A spike in gun sales is common after a mass shoot ing, but the Connecticut tragedy has generated record sales in many states. Colorado set a single-day record for gun background check requests the day after the Connecticut mass shootings, and some online retailers are removing assault rifles from websites in part because of diminishing supplies.

Nevada saw more requests for background checks in the days after the shooting than any other weekend this year. Some gun shop owners are even holding back on sales, anticipating only more interest and value after President Barack Obama on Wednesday tasked his adCity, S.D., gun seller specializing in assault-style rifles, said he has about 50 of the weapons in stock but he's not actively trying to sell them and has even turned off his phone.

"It's a madhouse," said Akers, owner of Rapid Fire Firearms. "Any time they have one of these shootings or an election, it gets that way. I don't even want to sell them right now because I won't be able to replace them for probably six months. ... The price is only going to go up higher."

At least three companies that make armored backpacks designed to shield children caught in a shootings also are reporting a large spike in sales and interest.

The body armor inserts fit into the back panel of a child's backpack, and they sell for about \$150 to \$300, depending on the company.

The armor is designed to stop bullets from handguns, not assault rifles like the one used by the Connecticut shooter. The manufacturers and some parents say that while they don't guarantee ing in a car crash, these increase your odds of surviving being shot," said Kerry Clark, president of Texas-based Backpackshield.com.

Ken Larson, 41, of Denver, already had an armored backpack for himself and convinced his wife to buy one for their 1-year-old after the Connecticut shooting on Friday, when a gunman stormed Sandy Hook Elementary in Newtown and massacred 20 first-graders and six adults.

"It's a no brainer. My son's life is invaluable," Larson said. "If I can get him a backpack for \$200 that makes him safer, I don't even have to think about that. Where is my credit card?"

Though Larson knows the backpack won't guarantee his son's safety when he starts school, he says it's a worthy precaution.

"Kids already carry backpacks. When there is a shooting, you run for your life," he said. "Having it right there and on when he runs for his life gives him more safety."

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Pot Provider Reaches Post-conviction Plea Deal

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • A medical marijuana provider who had vowed to fight his convictions on federal drug charges, even as he faced more than 80 years in prison, has reached a post-conviction plea agreement that could mean he spends as little as five years behind bars.

The agreement filed in U.S. District Court in Helena dismisses six of eight drug-related convictions against Chris Williams, as long as he waives his right to appeal his conviction and sentence.

"With the rest of my life literally hanging in the balance, I simply could not withstand the pressure any longer," Williams said in a statement.

Under the agreement filed Tuesday, Williams remains convicted of possessing a firearm in connection with drug trafficking and possession with intent to distribute marijuana. The firearm charge carries a mandatory minimum fiveyear sentence, while the distribution charge calls for a sentence of up to five years. The agreement also calls for prosecutors to ask U.S. District Judge Dana Christensen to dismiss a \$1.7 million forfeiture requirement.

State Dept. Security Chief Resigns After Benghazi Report

WASHINGTON (AP) • Three State Department officials resigned under pressure Wednesday, less than a day after a damning report blamed management failures for a lack of security at the U.S. diplomatic mission in Benghazi, Libya, where militants killed the U.S. ambassador and three other Americans on Sept. 11.

The resignations came as lawmakers expressed anger and frustration over the findings of an independent review panel, and the State Department struggled to find a balance between protecting its diplomats while allowing them to do their jobs connecting with people in high-risk posts

Obama administration officials said those who had stepped down were Eric Boswell, the assistant secretary of state for diplomatic security, Charlene Lamb, the deputy assistant secretary responsible for embassy security, and Raymond Maxwell, the deputy assistant secretary of state who oversees the Maghreb nations of Libya, Algeria, Tunisia and Morocco. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they weren't authorized to discuss personnel matters publicly. Some of the three may have the option of being reassigned to other duties, the officials said.

The department declined immediate comment on the resignation of the officials whose decisions had been criticized in the unclassified version of the Accountability Review Board's report that was released late Tuesday.

The board's co-chairman, retired Adm. Mike Mullen, told reporters that the board had not determined that any officials had "engaged in willful misconduct or knowingly ignored his or her responsibilities," But Mullen, a former Joint Chiefs of Staff chairman, added, "We did conclude that certain State Department bureau level senior officials in critical levels of authority and responsibility in Washington demonstrated a lack of leadership and management ability appropriate for senior ranks in their responses to security concerns posed by the special mission." Mullen said the mission's security fell through bureaucratic cracks caused in part because buildings were categorized as temporary. The report said that budget constraints had caused some officials to be more concerned with saving scarce money than in security.

Co-chairman Thomas Pickering, a retired ambassador, said the personnel on the ground in Benghazi had reacted to the attack with bravery and professionalism. But, he said, the security precautions were "grossly inadequate" and the contingent was overwhelmed by the heavily armed militants.

"They did the best they possibly could with what they had but what they had wasn't enough," Pickering said.

Pickering and Mullen spoke shortly after briefing members of Congress in private. Lawmakers from both parties emerged from the sessions with harsh words for the State Department. "They failed to anticipate what was coming because of how bad the security risk already was there.... They failed to connect the dots," he said. "They didn't have adequate security leading up to the attack and once the attack occurred, the security was woefully inadequate."

Obama to Send Congress Gun Proposals in January

WASHINGTON (AP) • Declaring the time for action overdue, President Barack Obama promised on Wednesday to send Congress broad proposals in January for tightening gun laws and curbing violence after last week's schoolhouse massacre in Connecticut.

Even before those proposals are drafted, Obama pressed lawmakers to reinstate a ban on military-style assault weapons, close loopholes that allow gun buyers to skirt background checks and restrict high-capacity ammunition clips.

"The fact that this problem is complex can no longer be an excuse for doing nothing," Obama said in his most detailed comments on guns since Friday's killing of 20 schoolchildren and six adults in Newtown, Conn. "The fact that we can't prevent every act of violence doesn't mean we can't steadily reduce the violence."

Gun control measures have faced fierce resistance in Congress for years but that may be changing now because of last week's violence. Since then, Obama has signaled for the first time in his presidency that he's willing to spend political capital on the issue and some prominent gun-rights advocates on Capitol Hill -Democrats and Republicans alike - have expressed willingness to consider new measures.

Still, given the long history of opposition to tighter gun laws, there is no certainty the legislation Obama backed Wednesday or the proposals he will send to Congress next month will become law. Obama tasked Vice President Joe Biden, a longtime-gun control advocate, with overseeing the administration-wide process to create those proposals. Bevond firearms' restrictions, officials will also look for ways to increase mental health resources and consider steps to keep society from glamorizing guns and violence.

Obama's January deadline underscores the desire among White House officials to respond swiftly to the Newtown shooting. Obama aides worry that as the shock of the shooting fades, so, too, will the prospects that pro-gun lawmakers will work with the White House to tighten restrictions. Emphasizing the need to take action, Obama said eight people have been killed by guns across the U.S. since the Newtown shooting.

The president has called for a national dialogue on gun violence before, after other mass shootings during his presidency. But his rhetoric has not been backed up with concrete action. And some of the gun measures Obama has signed lessened restrictions on guns, allowing people to carry concealed weapons in national parks and in checked bags on Amtrak trains. The president bristled at suggestions that he had been silent on gun issues during his four years in office.

FBI: Escaped Inmates Took Cab Near Chicago Jail

CHICAGO (AP) • Two convicted bank robbers who pulled off a daring overnight escape from a high-rise Chicago jail had changed from their prison garb by the time they hopped into a cab outside the lock-up, investigators said Wednesday as they expanded their manhunt for the men.

said at least three homes in the suburbs south of Chicago where one of the inmates once lived were searched Tuesday, and a suburban strip club where Conley worked confirmed that investigators had visited.

Investigators believe the men had been at a home in Tinley Park, 25 miles southwest of Chicago, just hours before police SWAT teams stormed it. A law enforcement official said the home was that of Conley's mother and that after the woman refused to let the escapees in, the men used a rock to break a window. Many questions remained about how the two managed to pull off such an escape from the federal prison in the heart of downtown Chicago. At the top of the list is how they could have smashed a gaping hole into the wall at the bottom of a 6-inch-wide window without being heard or seen by correctional officers. Another question is why, in the federal facility that houses some 700 inmates, the correctional officers apparently did not check on the two men between the 10 p.m. headcount and one at 5 a.m. And what was done between the 5 a.m. headcount and 7 a.m. when the rope was spotted?

Authorities were raiding houses and combing through records looking for anybody with ties to the inmates who climbed out a jail window and descended 20 stories using a makeshift rope.

The FBI said surveillance footage from a camera near the Metropolitan Correction Center shows Kenneth Conley and Joseph Banks getting into a cab at about 2:45 a.m. Thursday – about two hours after guards were supposed to do a bed check and four hours before workers spotted the rope dangling from the jail. The pair had changed from their orange jail-issued jumpsuits into light-colored pants and light-colored shirts, the FBI said.

The FBI was offering a \$50,000 reward for information leading to the apprehension of Conley and Banks, with the manhunt focused mainly on Chicago and its suburbs.

US Army Seeks Death Penalty in 16 Afghan Killings

SEATTLE (AP) • The U.S. Army said Wednesday it will seek the death penalty against the soldier accused of killing 16 Afghan villagers in a predawn rampage in March, a decision his lawyer called "totally irresponsible."

The announcement followed a pretrial hearing last month for Staff Sgt. Robert Bales, 39, who faces premeditated murder and other charges in the attack on two villages in southern Afghanistan. Prosecutors said Bales left his remote southern Afghanistan base early on March 11, attacked one village and returned to the base, then slipped away again to attack another nearby compound. Of the 16 people killed, nine were children.

No date has been set for Bales' court martial, which will be held at Joint Base Lewis-McChord south of Seattle. His civilian lawyer, John Henry Browne, told The Associated Press he met with Army officials last week to argue his client shouldn't face the possibility of the death penalty, given that Bales was serving his fourth deployment in a war zone when the killings occurred.

"The Army is not taking responsibility for Sgt. Bales and other soldiers that the Army knowingly sends into combat situations with diagnosed PTSD, concussive head injuries and other injuries," Browne said. "The Army is trying to take the focus off the failure of its decisions, and the failure of the war itself, and making Sgt. Bales out to be a rogue soldier."

Bales' wife, Kari Bales, said in a statement Wednesday that she and their children have been enjoying their weekend visits with Bales at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, and she hopes he receives an impartial trial. "I no longer know if a fair trial for Bob is possible, but it very much is my hope, and I will have faith," she said.

An Army criminal investigations command special agent testified earlier that Bales tested positive for steroids three days after the killings, and other soldiers testified that Bales had been drinking the evening of the massacre.

Prosecutors, in asking for a courtmartial trial, have pointed to statements Bales made after he was apprehended, saying his comments demonstrated a "clear memory of what he had done, and consciousness of wrongdoing?

Mountain Out of a Molehill

he poet Carl Sandburg supposedly was asked by a young playwright to attend a rehearsal. Sandburg did but fell asleep. The playwright exclaimed, "How



could you sleep when you knew I wanted your opinion?" Sandburg replied, "Sleep is an opinion."

So is nonvoting. Remember this as the Obama administration mounts a drive to federalize voter registration, a step toward making voting mandatory. Attorney General Eric Holder considers it self-evidently alarming that 60 million adult citizens were not registered in 2008. He wants Washington to register everyone automatically. "The arc of American history," he says, "has bent towards expanding the franchise." But the fact many people do not register to vote is not evidence that the franchise is restricted other than by voters' inertia.

Holder's argument for trusting Washington, which does so many things badly, to superintend elections capably should be judged against this loopy statement by him: "We should rethink this whole notion that voting only occurs on Tuesday." This year, voting began in some states in September; as much as 40 percent of votes were cast before Election Day; 12 states allow online registration. Assistant Attorney General Thomas Perez, head of Holder's civil rights division, rightly says that voting too often is "an endurance contest" involving a long wait in line, frequently because of questions about voters' registrations. But the Heritage Foundation's Hans von Spakovsky, a former member of the Federal Election Commission, says:

"One of the reasons that state voter registration rolls are in such poor shape today – with large numbers of voters who are dead, have moved or are noncitizens - is because of the restrictive standards imposed by the federal government in 1993 by the National Voter Registration Act. That law made it very difficult to remove ineligible voters. Local jurisdictions were sued so often by the Justice Department when they tried to remove ineligible voters, many stopped trying to clean up their lists at all. That is why there are many places around the country where the number of registered voters is greater than the Census says there are individuals of voting age?

Notice the perverse dialectic by which Washington aggrandizes its power: It promises to ameliorate problems exacerbated by its supposedly ameliorative policies. Notice, too, the logic of Perez's thesis that "our democracy is stronger when more people have a say in electing their leaders." Therefore the public good would be served by penalizing nonvoting, as Australia, Belgium and at least 10 other countries do. Liberals love mandates (e.g., health insurance). Why not mandatory voting? In 1960, 62.8 percent of age-eligible citizens voted. In the 13 subsequent presidential elections, lower turnouts than this have coincided with the removal of impediments to voting (poll taxes, literacy tests, burdensome registration and residency requirements). Turnout has not increased as the electorate has become more educated and affluent and as government has become more involved in Americans' lives. There are four obvious reasons for nonvoting. One is contentment. Americans are voluble complainers but are mostly comfortable. Second, the stakes of politics are agreeably low because constitutional rights and other essential elements of happiness are not menaced by elections. Those who think high voter turnout indicates civic health should note that in three German elections, 1932-33, turnout averaged more than 86 percent, reflecting the terrible stakes: The elections decided which mobs would rule the streets and who would inhabit concentration camps. Third, the winner-take-all allocation of electoral votes in 48 states - an excellent idea, for many reasons means many state races without suspense. (After their conventions, Barack Obama and Mitt Romney campaigned in just eight and 10 battleground states, respectively.) Fourth, gerrymandered federal and state legislative districts reduce competitive races. Because the likelihood of any individual's vote mattering is infinitesimal, and because the effort required to be an informed voter can be substantial, ignorance and abstention are rational, unless voting is cathartic or otherwise satisfying. A small voting requirement such as registration, which calls for the individual voter's initiative, acts to filter potential voters with the weakest motivations. It has been said that for every complex problem there is a solution that is clear, simple and wrong. Washington soon may seek a complex "solution" - pre-emption of states' responsibilities; federal micromanagement of elections; eventual coercion of lackadaisical citizens to the non-problem of people choosing not to vote.

FTC Tightens Rules on **Kids'** Online Privacy

WASHINGTON • Websites and mobile apps will have to get parental permission to collect photos, videos and a wide array of other information that children expose online under federal guidelines released Wednesday.

The Federal Trade Commission's update to child online privacy laws comes after a two-year debate over how far the government should go to protect the privacy of children 12 and younger without curbing the practices of a thriving Web economy that relies on data for advertising.

Media and Silicon Valley giants such as Facebook and Disney have fought plans that they say would be difficult to implement and would stifle innovation. The FTC's chairman and public interest groups have said an explosion of tracking tools and the swift adoption of smartphones and tablets in homes and schools have rendered the 1998 Children's Online Privacy Protection Act too weak.

The revisions, the FTC said, seek to clarify that much of today's most popular uses of the Web should be more closely guarded when done by children.

"The commission takes seriously its mandate to protect children's online privacy in this ever-changing technological landscape," FTC Chairman Jon Leibowitz said. "We think these rules are balanced and very, very strong."

The amendments require companies to get permission from parents to collect a child's photographs, videos and geolocational information - all content that social media, online games and mobile devices have made easy to share.

Companies such as Google and Viacom must also have a parent's consent before using tracking tools, such as cookies, that use IP addresses and mobile device IDs to follow a child's Web activity across multiple apps and sites. Amassing that data could help a marketing company stitch together detailed profiles of children to be used to deliver tailored advertisements, a practice that should be spared on children, some privacy groups say.

Sorting out the layers of responsibility for companies that share information with each other proved especially difficult. Originally, the FTC proposed that apps such as Facebook, Twitter and Google be broadly liable for the practices of their thousands of partner sites across the Web.

With the "like" function, blue Twitter bird and Google Plus social networking button plastered all over the online world, those companies argued, they often are unaware when their partner sites collect and share data about children.

Sides Clash as Cliff Approaches

WASHINGTON (AP) • Fiscal cliff talks at a partisan standoff, President Barack Obama and House Speaker John Boehner swapped barbed political charges on Wednesday yet carefully left room for further negotiations on an elusive deal to head off year-end tax increases and spending cuts that threaten the national economy.

Republicans should "peel off the war paint" and take the deal he's offering, Obama said sharply at the White House. He buttressed his case by noting he had won re-election with a call for higher taxes on the wealthy, then added pointedly that the nation aches for conciliation, not a contest of ideologies, after last week's mass murder at a Connecticut elementary school.

But he drew a quick retort from Boehner when the White House threatened to veto a fallback bill drafted by House Republicans that would prevent tax increases for all but million-dollar earners. The president will bear responsibility for "the largest tax increase in history" if he makes good on that threat, the Ohio Republican declared.

In fact, it's unlikely the legislation will get that far as divided government careens into the final few days of a struggle that affects the pocketbooks of millions and blends lasting policy differences with deep political mistrust.

Boehner expressed confidence the Republicans' narrow so-called Plan B bill would clear the House on Thursday despite opposition from some conservative, anti-tax dissidents, but a cold reception awaits in the Democratic-controlled Senate.

As for a broader agreement, officials said there had been little if any progress toward closing the gap between the two sides in the past two days, even though aides to the president and Boehner have remained in contact.

On paper, the two sides are relatively close to an agreement on major issues, each having offered concessions in an intensive round of talks that began late last week.

MEXICO CITY (AP) • The world's happiest people aren't in Qatar, the richest country by most measures. They aren't in Japan, the nation with the highest life expectancy. Canada, with its chart-topping percentage of college graduates, doesn't make the top 10. A poll released Wednesday of nearly 150,000 people around the world says seven of the world's 10 countries with the most upbeat attitudes are in Latin America. Many of the seven do poorly in traditional measures of wellbeing, like Guatemala, a country torn by decades of civil war followed by waves of gangdriven criminality that give it one of the highest homicide rates in the world. Guatemala sits just above Iraq on the Unit ed Nations' Human Development Index, a composite of life expectancy, education and per capita income. But it ranks seventh in positive emotions. 'In Guatemala, it's a culture of friendly people who are always smiling," said Luz Castillo, a 30-year-old surfing instructor. "Despite all the problems that we're facing, we're surrounded by natural beauty that lets us get away from it all." Gallup Inc. asked about 1,000 people in each of 148

PARK BECOMES **SOUTH KOREA'S FIRST** FEMALE PRESIDENT

SEOUL • Park Geun Hye was elected president of South Korea, becoming the first woman to lead Asia's fourth-biggest economy more than 30 years after her father's reign as dictator ended with his assassination. Park, 60, of the ruling New Frontier Party, led main opposition nominee Moon Jae In, 51.7 percent to 47.9 percent with 94.2 percent of the vote counted, the National Election Commission said on its website as of 12:55 a.m. local time. Moon, 59, conceded defeat, saying he was sorry he couldn't fulfill the expectations of his supporters.

The never-married daughter of the nation's longestserving dictator will lead a country with one of the world's most entrenched gender gaps. She must confront a slowing economy, widening income disparity and re-en-



gagement with North Korea after the totalitarian state's rocket launch last week.

"Park's victory is historically symbolic," said Lee Nae Young, a political science professor at Korea University in Seoul. "Voters decided she will offer the most stable leadership to navigate the country through a global recession, and mounting internal and external uncertainties, especially in foreign affairs and national security."

Park will take office on Feb. 25, when President Lee Myung Bak's single fiveyear term ends.

"This is your victory," she told a crowd in Seoul. "You've opened a new era and I will carry your trust deeply in my heart."

But even more exciting, perhaps, is new technology from Columbia Sportswear called Omni-Heat. Bibby compared it to blankets that astronauts use in space to protect them from fire.

"It's designed to keep the body heat in by reflecting your own body warmth back to you," she said. "The inside of the material almost looks like a disco ball, and it comes in different colors and styles." A typical Omni-Heat jacket costs about \$250, 'and that's for a good, heavy-weight coat. It's suitable for the climate in southern Idaho, especially when the wind blows," Bibby said. Back at Elevation Sports, Kober said customers have sought goosedown jackets and "super-light, insulated active wear" the past few years. "And," he added with a grin, "customers want to look good. You can't forget the fashion side of it." Over at Wal-Mart in Jerome, zone merchandise supervisor Patty Phillips said customers prefer snow bibs, bubble coats and three-in-one coats. Snow bibs, she said, are combinations of chesthigh snow pants and suspenders that offer great protection for skiers, snowmobilers and snowboarders. And then there are those puffy, air-filled bubble coats that offer added warmth and won't squash your pocketbook. They typically sell for about \$20. "Bubble coats are really light and warm, and are a cheaper brand that more people can afford," Phillips said. Three-in-one coats are a good choice, too, Phillips said. They typically have inner and outer layers that zip together to accommodate changing weather conditions and temperatures. Some also have vests.



Lower Limits on Trout

Take Effect Jan. 1

JEROME • The limit on trout will go down to two per day in some streams and urban ponds on Jan. 1, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission adopted the rule in November. The goal is to increase opportunity for more anglers to catch stocked fish and to reduce the boom-and-bust cycle with the stocking program, a department release said.

Affected waters are Big Elk Creek, Crooked Creek and Red River in the Clear water Region; Parkcenter Pond, Weiser Community Pond, McDevitt Pond and Wilson Ponds in the Southwest Region; Edson Fichter limit is removed on smallmouth bass in Magic Reservoir; and in the Southeast Region the bass limit is removed in the Treasureton Reservoir.

In the Upper Snake Region the limit is removed on rainbow trout and hybrid trout in the South Fork Snake River tributaries. The limit on brown trout is two, with none under 16 inches. In Henrys Lake Outlet, the 400-yard section from the USGS gauge to the Henrys Lake Dam opens to fishing.

These changes take effect Jan. 1.

Over in Burley at Idaho Water Sports, thin is in, explained sales associate Connor Young, who has worked at the store for five years.

"Nowadays, winter coat technology has advanced so that coats are now warm but thinner," he said. "People will pick up the coats and realize that they are not bulky. The coats have become lighter and thinner, but just as warm in a lot of cases."

But the key to staying warm is layering, he stressed.

"A lot of the new technology involves outerwear, but the base layers beneath are just as important," he said.

Consider such base-layer materials as Gore-Tex, Thinsulate and PrimaLoft, which all wick excess moisture and keep warmth in, Young advised.

At Big 5 Sporting Goods in Twin Falls, manager Rachael McGilvrey is hot on layers, too.

"Layers are a great idea, because people are not going to want a huge, bulky jacket to keep warm," she said. "The technology of clothing has advanced over the years so that you can now get a lot more warmth in lighter-weight garments."

At sportsman's Warehouse in Twin Falls, sales associate Amanda Bibby touted the latest and great est base layer called Red Ram, fashioned from 100 percent merino wool.

"It's really soft and light-

Phillips suggested. And augment all of the clothing with hats and gloves, which brings us to our next category ...

The Little Stuff

Back at Big 5, McGilvrey ticked off the most critical apparel for enjoying time in the snow.

"Definitely hats and gloves are needed to enjoy the outdoors," she said. "Hats and gloves will keep the heat in, because you don't want heat escaping from the top of your head or the tips of your fingers, and they both keep you warm and dry."

Young seconded the statement.

"If your feet are cold, put on a hat," he said. "Seventy percent of your body heat is lost through your head, hands and feet. Keeping your noggin warm allows you to keep the rest of your body warm."

At Elevation Sports, Kober pointed to \$25 fleece-lined wool caps as most popular, but not necessarily because of their warmth and comfort.

"Most people just want the caps to look good on them," he said.

To keep hands nice and comfy, he suggested down gloves "because they are light and still very warm." At \$47 a pair, Manzellabrand down gloves are the most popular, he said.

And don't forget your feet, Kober added.

"A good pair of socks is priceless," he said. "Wool socks are especially good because they wick away moisture, regulate temperature, don't bunch up and don't build up odor."

And now, *before* we go out and buy a bunch of stuff, here's how to avoid some mistakes ...

Avoiding Mistakes

First off, Kober stressed, make sure everything fits.

That means, for instance, purchasing baselayer underwear that hugs the skin.

Or so advised Bibby at Sportsman's Warehouse: 'You really want those base layers to fit close to the skin, or they won't do their job. You can fit coats a bit bigger, but the base layers have to be snug."

Then there's your water proof clothing – essential, Kober said, to enjoying most snow-related activity.

"People really need to keep their gear (including apparel) working well every year, because most people don't buy new items every year," he said.

Kober suggested periodically applying water repellent such as Nikwax to water-resistant clothing and drying those garments in the dryer.

"You should dry your water-resistant clothing in a heat source like a clothes dryer to help reactivate the water repellency," he said, explaining that typical laundry detergent degrades the effectiveness of water-repellent fabric.

• Federal officials say the population of wood storks has rebounded to the point that they can be classified as threatened instead of endangered, but some environmentalists object to the proposed new status.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service plans to list its proposal for wood storks in the federal registry next week, pointing to marked improvement since the species was listed as endangered in 1984.

"This is a good day for the wood stork, and a good day for conservation," Dan Ashe, director of the Fish and Wildlife Service, said in a written statement. "Thanks to great efforts from our conservation partners, the species is making real progress toward recovery."

Changing the storks' status to threatened is largely a symbolic move. No conservation or protection measures for the species would be removed. But opponents of the change, who will be able to offer comments and data to support their case, say it is a step toward a full delisting.

No one doubts that biologists' counts of wood storks mean there has been a resurgence of the birds, which have white feathers and a long bill. In 1984, an estimated 4,742 pairs of the birds were counted; today the population range is believed to be 7,086 to 8,996 pairs. But much of the return of the birds has come outside South Florida, where they once thrived.

"We're not diminishing the gains that are made in north Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. Storks are nesting there in greater numbers than in the past," said Jason Lauritsen, director of Audubon's Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary. "But there is a reverse side to the coin, that they're not mating in South Florida like they were in the past."

In 1984, more than 90 percent of the wood storks believed to be in the southeastern U.S. were in South Florida. That ratio has decreased as the birds migrated elsewhere. In the Corkscrew sanctuary outside Naples, for example, Lauritsen said there were estimates that a colony of wood storks in the 1910s numbered 100,000 and that in the 1960s, there were believed to be around 12,000 of the birds.

In five of the past six years, though, none have been recorded there.

"The threats are still there. They're not recovering in their historic range, they're going somewhere else because they haven't fixed it," said Lauritsen, an animal ecologist. "It's not a good time to start looking at writing off South Florida as an

essential element for recovery of the species."

Besides Florida, Georgia and South Carolina, wood storks also are found in North Carolina and Mississippi.

Chuck Underwood, a spokesman for the Fish and

Wildlife Service, said he didn't disagree with environmentalists who say there is more work to be done to protect the species. He said the proposal is simply an acknowledgement that progress has been made.

ORDINANCE NO. 2012-4

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PAUL, MINIDOKA COUNTY, IDAHO; AMENDING PAUL CODE SECTIONS 8-2-2, 8-6-3 B., 8-6-4 I., 8-13-3, 8-13-4, 8-13-11 AND 8-18-3D; AND PROVIDING FOR A NEW SECTION 8-13-1, PROVIDING FOR ZONING REVIEW PRIOR TO ISSUANCE OF A BUILDING PERMIT, ELIMINATING ZONING PERMITS AND PROVIDING FOR ZONING REVIEW AND AN APPROVAL PROCESS AND PROVIDING DEFINITIONS FOR SAME; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Paul as follows:

SECTION 1: The portion of Paul Code Section 8-2-2 under the heading "Zoning Permits and Certificates" shall be amended to read as follows:

"ZONING PERMITS REVIEW AND CERTIFICATES":

- Certificate Of Occupancy: A document issued by the building official authorizing the occupancy and use of completed buildings, structures or premises and the proposed use thereof for the purpose of ensuring compliance with the provisions of this title and other adopted codes and regulations.
- Certificate Of Zoning Compliance: A document issued by the zoning official which may be issued separately or attached to an occupancy permit, business license or building permit, which is for the purpose of carrying out and enforcing the provisions of this title. A building permit <u>once issued as herein provided</u> may serve as a zoning permit<u>, if needed</u>. Notice Of Noncompliance: A document issued by the zoning
- administrator indicating that a use or structure is nonconforming to the district regulations or is not in conformity with other conditions or requirements of this title.
- Zoning Review: A zoning review is the review process described in Paul Code Sections 8-13-1 and 8-13-3
- SECTION 2: Paul Code Section 8-6-3 B. shall be amended to read as follows:

8-6-3 SUPPLEMENTAL GENERAL PROVISIONS:

B. Temporary Buildings And Concession Stands: Temporary buildings, construction trailers, equipment and materials may be used in conjunction with construction work in progress, but such temporary facilities shall be removed upon completion of the construction work. Temporary living accommodations shall not be permitted at a construction site unless approved by the administrator, proper permits are obtained and approved, and the temporary unit is removed immediately upon completion of the construction project. Storage of such facilities or equipment beyond the completion date of the project shall require a zoning permit approval authorized by the administrator as set forth in Paul Code Section 8-13-1. Concession stands may not be located on private property in any residential zone.

SECTION 3: Paul Code Section 8-6-4 I. shall be amended to read as follows:

8-6-4: PROVISIONS FOR COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL USES

Enforcement Provisions: The administrator, prior to the issuance of a granting zoning permit approval as set forth in Paul Code Section 8-13-1, may require the submission of statements and plans indicating the manner in which dangerous and objectionable elements involved in processing and in equipment operations are to be eliminated or reduced to acceptable limits and tolerances

SECTION 4: Paul Code Section 8-13-1 is hereby repealed in its entirety. In its place shall be the following:

8-13-1: ZONING REVIEW REQUIRED:

- No building or other structure shall be erected, moved, added to or structurally altered, nor shall any building, structure, or land be established or changed in use without review and approval by the Zoning Administrator.
- Prior to approval of any building permit, the Building Official will

B. Temporary Buildings And Concession Stands: Temporary buildings, construction trailers, equipment and materials may be used in conjunction with construction work in progress, but such temporary facilities shall be removed upon completion of the construction work. In this deal, from the 2002 European Championships, Peter Schaltz, South for Denmark, ended in four hearts on the auction shown.

After the lead of the diamond king, taken by dummy's ace, declarer played a trump to the jack and ace. Norberto Bocchi cashed his diamond queen and continued with a third, letting East ruff in with the heart queen to promote the setting trick in trumps via an uppercut.

In the other room, after the same opening, although the Italian North-South identified their heart fit, the Italians chose three no-trump as their final contract, played by North, Lorenzo Lauria.

East led the diamond 10, West played the queen and Lauria ducked. North won the diamond continuation and played a heart to the jack and ace. He won the third diamond and led another heart, allowing East's queen to hold. As East had no diamond to return, Lauria ended with 10 tricks. The critical moment in the defense was that on the third diamond, East had to discard his heart queen, and that would have left declarer without resource.

Curiously, if West ducks the first diamond (normally sound technique in these positions), Lauria can always make the hand. He wins cheaply, leads a heart up, and East cannot unblock his queen — or West later gets endplayed in diamonds to concede a second heart trick. And if East plays low on the first heart, declarer puts in the jack, wins the second diamond, and ducks a heart to East's bare queen, as happened at the table.

MAKING THE GRADE Twin Falls resident hopes to make good on promising MMA career.

TWIN FALLS • Brandon Hempleman, 25, isn't bashing heads just to get out of his parents basement.

Hempleman, a Twin Falls resident, is the No. 13 ranked flyweight (130 pounds or lighter) mixed martial arts fighter in the world with 10 career bouts (9-1), and he thinks he's close to making it big.

"(Teammate Czar Sklavos (7-2) and me) have proven we can be UFC fighters, now it's a game of playing the right moves," Hempleman said. "The money is going to come, there is no stopping this?

Indeed, the money would be nice, Hempleman said after his Tuesday workout. Getting a professional contract with one of the many large fighting organizations would mean the single father could take care of his two children the way he wants without working fulltime on his father's dairy farm.

"I'm losing money as a fighter right now," Hempleman said. "I've put all my eggs in one basket. If I don't make it"

A former gymnast whose logged thousands of training hours since his first amateur fight at the age of 19, Hempleman is convinced his break is right around the corner.

His team, Team Sklavos is coached by Carl Sklavos, once a world champion kick-boxer who finished his career undefeated and has three promising fighters -Hempleman, Sklavos' son, Czar, and former Minico wrestling standout David Burgara. Czar Sklavos, 30, recently won a fight after getting his jaw broken in two and is dealing with a detached retina that could sideline him for the next few weeks.

These guys are serious.

"These kinds of things are very difficult, but this is what you have to do to make it," Carl Sklavos said. "You have to constantly fight through injury. The money they make now does not pay the bills. It's tough, dog-eatdog, but they are fighting to Please see GRADE, S2

Andersen Changes Directions, Heads to Wisconsin

Gary Andersen publicly pledged his allegiance to Utah State not long ago. Now he's on the verge of becoming Wisconsin's coach.

Wisconsin reportedly will hire Andersen to replace Bret Bielema, who left the Badgers earlier this month to take the Arkansas job.

The news about Andersen broke Tuesday night and neither Utah State nor Wisconsin had anything of ficial to announce about Andersen on Wednesday. The delay is at least in part tied to laws in Wisconsin that require a state job to be posted for at least two weeks before it can be filled. The two-week posting was up at the end of business on Wednesday.

The school was expected to introduce Andersen at a news conference Thursday, but a snowstorm might change those plans.

The 48-year-old Andersen just completed his fourth and best season at Utah State. The 18thranked Aggies finished 11-2 with a bowl victory against Toledo and won the Western Athletic Conference.

It's been a remarkable rise for a program that had been near the bottom of major college football for years, and stuck in distant third in its own state behind BYU and Utah. The Aggies won nine games in the previous four seasons before Andersen took over. The last football coach to finish his tenure in Logan, Utah, with a winning record was Phil Krueger who went 21-12 from 1973-75.

Andersen drew interest from California, Colorado and Kentucky last month, but decided to pass on those opportunities and received a contract extension from Utah State.

"The interest I have received is a compliment to the quality young men in this program," Andersen said in the statement released Nov. 30. "I love Cache Valley, this university and these young men, and I am humbled and excited to continue to be the coach here. The leadership of President (Stan) Albrecht and Mr. Barnes, as well as the support from the fans

and community, are big reasons why this is the right place for myself and my family at this time."

That was before Wisconsin had an opening. Bielema announced he was leaving on Dec. 4, three days after the Badgers won their third straight Big Ten title and trip to the Rose Bowl.

As late as last week, before Utah State played in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, Andersen was saying he was committed to the Aggies.

"I love the kids I get to coach here. ... The kids I have in the program, it just was not time. I look them in the eye and I need to be where I'm at," he told the Idaho Statesman newspaper.

When Wisconsin called, Andersen changed his mind.

It's a tough spot in which many coaches find themselves. It's imperative for recruiting purposes to show unwavering commitment to your current school. But when a coach does jump to another job, he looks like a liar.

"If you can, it's good to not say anything," former

Arkansas and Mississippi coach Houston Nutt said. "It's almost now impossible because there's so much information out there."

Washington State coach Mike Leach said he felt his only obligation was to his employer and his team.

"I think you handle it honestly with the people you work for, but by the same token you don't let the media or public into your personal business," he said.

Apparently, many in Utah were caught off guard by the Andersen-to-Wisconsin news.

"I can't believe this ... " Utah State receiver Alex Wheat posted on his Twitter account when word started to spread.

"I hate rumors.." tight end DJ Tialavea tweeted.

A few hours later, that changed.

"Coach A just called me. Explained the situation. No hard feelings. I have nothing but respect for the man. We must fight on. (hash)AggieNation," Wheat posted.

"Just got that phone call always have and always will love ya coach!" Tialavea tweeted

first time since 2007, earning at least a wild-card berth in the NFC playoffs, and keeping alive the slim hopes of winning the NFC West.

There is a lot of good that could come Seattle's way with a victory. But you won't find Carroll or his players speaking much about what lies ahead.

"You don't bring up the playoffs until the playoffs get here," Seattle cornerback Richard Sherman said. "You're still in the regular season and we're playing trying to win the rest of these games and see where the chips fall."

If Seattle (9-5) can get a victory over the 49ers on Sunday or in the season finale against St. Louis, it would be its second playoff appearance in Carroll's three seasons. Yet this one would be far more deserved.

When the Seahawks won the NFC West in 2010, they became the first division champion with a losing record at 7-9. It took a victory over St. Louis in the finale that season for the Seahawks to win the division on a tiebreaker, but Seattle at least justified its spot in the playoffs by upsetting then-Super Bowl champion New Orleans in the wild-card round.

But that playoff trips was at the infancy of Seattle's roster remodel that Carroll and general manager John Schneider have been constructing. It was a mix of new faces and what the duo inherited that won the division in 2010.

This group that's pushing for a playoff spot has all been molded under the watch of Seattle's decision-making duo. While that 2010 team made the postseason, they were still flawed. The offense still had Matt Hasselbeck at quarterback, but his long-term future with the team was in doubt. The defense still relied on experienced veterans that were not getting any younger.

Seattle had yet to find its unique, long cornerbacks in Sherman and Brandon Browner that make the rest of its defense work. They hadn't given fifth-round pick Kam Chancellor an opportunity to be a starting safety. Golden Tate was inconsistent at wide receiver and the Seahawks had not found a plan that worked to best use running back Marshawn Lynch.

Those problems are now solved as is the biggest question, the quarterback. Russell Wilson has been the best quarterback by passer rating in the NFL since Seattle's Week 7 loss at San Francisco. Lynch is second in the NFL in yards rushing behind only Minnesota's Adrian Peterson and the Seahawks have the second-best scoring defense in the league.

"It all begins with the quarterback. Russell is playing an extremely high level right now and it's just the maturity and growth that we've all come to grow with him in this offense as a whole and rally behind the things that he does well," Seattle receiver Doug Baldwin said. "At the beginning of the season we were kind of searching for that and now that we're putting it together you've been able to see it the past two games with us putting up 50 points."

Health, Depth Both Key to Denver's Success

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. • On almost a daily basis, John Fox needs about as little time to roll through the Broncos injury report as it takes cornerback Chris Harris to return an interception 98 yards for a touchdown.

In a league where injuries can make or break a team's season, it's Denver's lack of them, along with its ability to replace the few players who do go out, that has turned the Broncos into legitimate Super Bowl contenders with a nine-game winning streak.

Led by starting-caliber performances from Harris and running back Knowshon Moreno, Denver (11-3) heads into the final stretch of the season looking pretty much the way the front office envisioned the roster on opening day.

"All in all, I'd say our personnel department's done an outstanding job," Fox said. "You try to pick your best 53 and have confidence that all of them can play when called upon."

Moreno ran for 118 yards on 22 carries against the Ravens last Sunday. He has rushed for 391 yards since filling in for one of Denver's few injured stars, Willis Mc-Gahee, who went down with a knee injury on Nov. 18.

On the other side of the

ball, Harris had the longest interception return for a touchdown in Denver's regular-season history on Sunday. His 98-yard return down the sideline was his second score this year. Both have come since he replaced Tracy Porter at cornerback opposite Champ Bailey.

"He's a tough cover guy in practice, whether he's going against (Brandon) Stokley, (Eric) Decker, or (Demaryius) Thomas, it's been that way all season," said Peyton Manning, whose own health, top on Denver's list of preseason concerns, has held up so far this year. "With our secondary, there have been some good challenges."

Moreno was a first-round draft pick who lost his job and was working on the scout team as recently as four weeks ago. Harris was an undrafted free agent from Kansas.

Mix in 10-year veteran Dan Koppen at center and 15-year veteran Keith Brooking at linebacker and the picture is clear: By staying patient with the players they have and keeping a sharp eye on who's available in the free agent market, the Broncos haven't gone backward on the few occasions when they've lost starters.

"There's never a week you can let up, never a day you can ease up," said the team's leading tackler, Wesley Woodyard, whose linebacker position has endured the most flux this year, with an injury to Joe Mays and the nine-game suspension of D.J. Williams.

Woodyard said having depth isn't only a help when players go down.

"You've always got to be at your best because the guy behind you is just as good as you, and everyone wants to be in there," he said. "They can make plays, too. You've got to be focused and be on your game every week."

Nobody personified that idea better than Moreno. The fourth-year veteran was relegated to the scout team, set back by the lingering effects of a knee injury and a lost fumble during Week 2, which sent him to the bottom of the depth chart.

Only when McGahee got injured did Moreno get another chance.

Growing more confident with each week he's in the lineup, Moreno is finding and moving toward the holes more quickly. Last week, he had his second straight 100yard game, the highlight of which came when he hurdled Ravens safety Ed Reed.

"Just being prepared and working," Moreno said when asked how he handled the eight straight weeks he was inactive on game day. "Just basically playing my role. Also, if I wasn't going to play on Sundays, I was going to give it my all in practice. It was just having faith that maybe down the road I'd get my chance again."

Harris was also just a guy looking for a chance.

A starter for most of his four years at Kansas, he spent three long days during the draft and his phone never rang.

Only when the draft was over did he get a call from the Broncos, asking him to come to camp as a free agent. He was a long shot to make the roster, but quickly showed he can play. He has also shown a knack for the ball: Harris' 98yard pick and return against Joe Flacco adds to a 46-yard interception return for a score Oct. 15 against San Diego.

Harris has cemented himself in the starting job that initially belonged to Porter, who hasn't been active since Oct. 7, shortly before doctors began trying to regulate the medicine he uses to control seizures. Porter returned to practice Nov. 22.
