Wednesday night as snow and ice coated the Magic Valley.

While most of the day was quiet, dispatchers at the Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center — which covers Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Twin Falls counties — said they were extremely busy early Wednesday

evening with slide offs and rollover crashes.

As temperatures continued to drop, Twin Falls city spokesman Joshua Palmer said city staff would make sanding and plowing city streets a high priority through the night and into this morning.

Patrol officers and the city street crew would be out all night reporting hazardous road conditions, he said. Certain roads, including Blue Lakes Boulevard and Addison Avenue, are considered high-priority, he said.

Palmer said many priority streets had packed snow, or melted snow that froze again as temperatures fell.

Post: Crapo Drank Vodka before DUI

BOISE • U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo of Idaho is headed back to Washington, D.C., to participate in negotiations over averting the so-called fiscal cliff and doesn't plan to immediately provide details about what led to his arrest early Sunday on suspicion of drunken driving.

But court documents filed with his case in Alexandria, Va., allege Crapo had "consumed several shots of vodka," the *Washington Post* reported Wednesday.

Crapo reportedly told the officer who pulled him over that he had had the vodka hours before his traffic stop. The *Times-News* could not confirm details of the court filings Wednesday.

The Republican lawmaker's spokesman in Boise, Lindsay Nothern, told the Associated Press that Crapo was traveling Wednesday after spending Christmas with family in Idaho Falls.

The three-term senator is accused of registering a 0.11 percent blood-alcohol level on a breath test after running a red light in Alexandria, where the legal limit is 0.08.

Nothern says Crapo plans to eventually provide more information about his arrest. He provided no timeframe but indicated it could be several days.

DESPITE BUDGET WOES, LODGE STILL WELCOMES HOMELESS

TWIN FALLS • There's a blue house on Shoup Avenue designed not to grab your attention.

There's no sign on the front door to alert drivers that it's a place for help. Nor is there a large parking lot to draw in strangers.

It's a modest house with a simple purpose: offer housing to homeless individuals wrestling with mental illnesses.

The facility is run by Community Organization for Rehabilitative Efforts, a nonprofit offering semi-independent residence for chronically ill homeless in south-central Idaho.

The facility — or lodge, as its residents call it — has been open in Twin Falls for nearly 30 years but works to keep a low profile in the community, said Kathie Moore, the lodge's director.

“We're proud of what we do here every day,” Moore said. “But our residents don't want to be treated or looked at as different. There's still a stigma but mental illness can come at any person.”

Want to Give?

Due to increased budget cuts, CORE is currently accepting donations to help cover its operating costs. A bank account has been set up at Well Fargo at the Addison Avenue branch in Twin Falls.

Moore doesn't handle her residents' care, though she does check in with their case managers. Residents have access to a shared kitchen for a snack or cup of coffee whenever

they like. And three house cats keep the residents company as they play with toys littering the hallway floors.

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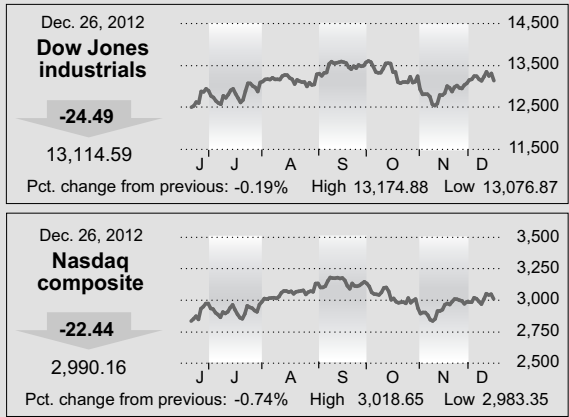
THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

Retailers Pull Stocks Lower on Poor Holiday Sales

NEW YORK (AP) • For the stock market, this week hasn't been the most wonderful time of year.

U.S. stocks fell Wednesday for the third trading day in a row. Disappointing holiday sales weighed heavy on retail companies, and the unwelcome "fiscal cliff" package of higher taxes and lower government spending loomed nearer.

The Dow Jones industrial average slipped seven points to 13,131 as of 3:08 p.m. Eastern. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell six to 1,421 and the Nasdaq composite lost 17 to 2,995.

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HIDDEN HISTORY

TWIN FALLS • Where there are children, there must be a Christmas celebration — and a Christmas tree.

But in 1904, there were no pine trees to be found within 50 miles of the new town. Clumps of juniper could be seen growing in the foothills south of Twin Falls, so two young men volunteered to find the most beautiful juniper on the hillside for the community's first Christmas party.

Back in town, the absence of snow threatened the holiday spirit.

"Day after day, the children looked hopefully at the blue, unclouded sky," wrote local pioneer Anna Hansen Hayes. "Surely it would snow soon." But the white flurries stirred by the cutting wind were simply flurries of dust that winter, Hayes said in a story written for the *Idaho Territorial Centennial* 50 years ago.

Enthusiasm ran high nonetheless, "perhaps to mask the homesickness which had threatened most of them in

this dust-ridden land," she said.

Twin Falls was only a few months old. But by Christmas that year, nearly 100 children, school-aged and younger, lived within the town site. There was no formal school in town.

Local residents donated \$600 for the construction of a one-room school house in September 1904. The Twin Falls Investment Co. donated two building lots for the school at the intersection of Idaho Street East and Third Avenue East. The school was built with donated labor, and was completed just in time for the Christmas party.

Paper ornaments and strings of popcorn and cranberries were prepared for the Christmas tree. One woman provided candles and a dozen glass ornaments from what must have seemed like a past life. And plans were made for Santa Claus to attend the party.

As promised, Sam Hamilton and Fred Eichoff headed out of town to cut down a juniper in the South Hills, fully expecting to be gone overnight. But they hadn't ridden far in their horse-drawn wagon when Hamilton spotted the perfect Christmas tree growing in a gully.

It was an 8-foot sagebrush.

Eichoff laughed at the suggestion, but Hamilton was out of his seat and had the sagebrush cut down before Eichoff had a chance to object.

The men knew they would be scolded by the women in town and ridiculed by the men. But somehow that sagebrush seemed more fitting than a juniper, Hayes said.

That night, Hamilton and Eichoff sneaked back into town with the sagebrush and placed it in the new school house. After the jokes subsided the next morning, the women in town went to work on the tree.

The Christmas tree was stunning that year, according to Hayes.

Officials Investigating Apartment Fire in E. Idaho

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • Authorities are still trying to figure out the cause of a fire that damaged a downtown Idaho Falls apartment building.

The blaze broke out Monday and caused dozens of people to flee the Bonneville Apartments. As many as 13 people were treated for

smoke inhalation and minor injuries at the local hospital.

Most of the fire damage was confined to a second-floor apartment and hallway, and some residents were able to return to the building Monday evening.

Nampa Woman Dies in Crash on Icy I-84

NAMPA (AP) • Authorities say a Nampa woman has died after two vehicles collided on an icy interstate.

Idaho State Police say 73-year-old Imogene Robinson died at the scene of the crash Tuesday evening at milepost 37 on Interstate 84 near Nampa.

Robinson was the passenger in a car driven by 51-year-old Johnny Robinson. They were traveling west on the interstate when the driver lost control and the car slid sideways.

A 39-year-old Wilder man driving a pickup truck struck in the same direction struck the Robinsons' vehicle and pushed it into the median.

State police say in a Tuesday statement it is unknown whether the occupants were wearing seat-belts.

It was not immediately clear whether Johnny Robinson or Paul Simcox, the driver of the pickup, were injured.

Foreclosures Down in 2012 in Idaho's Big Market

BOISE (AP) • The number of homes once foreclosed and now being resold is on the decline in two of Idaho's biggest housing markets, according to recent 2012 figures.

The news comes as figures also show the housing market in the Boise/Nampa area to be among the fastest to rebound nationwide.

In the last year, sales of foreclosure properties in Ada and Canyon counties totaled about 1,900, down from 4,100 the previous year, according to housing research firms such as RealtyTrac.

At the same time, the number of short sales — when a home is sold for less than the amount owed on the mortgage — is becoming just as common as foreclosure sales. In the market, figures show 2,100 homes were sold short last year, compared to 2,200 in 2012.

Real estate agents say the reduction in foreclosures is likely due to a shrinking inventory and a shift in strategy among banks for unloading distressed properties.

Coming into 2012, lenders declared it the year for short sales, said Rick Bennett, an agent with Keller Williams Realty Boise.

There just weren't as many foreclosed homes on the market. Waves of foreclosed homes have already been sold, and some banks

may waiting to put foreclosed homes on the market or taking longer to foreclose on people for various reasons, agents said.

Banks also realized they could make more money if they let a homeowner sell low rather than trying to sell a house themselves, often at a loss of tens of thousands of dollars, Bennett said.

"There was kind of a switch in thinking ... and a lot more cooperation with postponing foreclosure," said Judy Trimble, a real estate agent with Woodhouse Group in Eagle.

Banks must approve short sales, and it's a notoriously long process. One agent said it has taken his clients from 42 days to 19 months before keys changed hands.

Short sales also have advantages for the property owner. Short sales can do less damage to a homeowner's credit and to the real estate market by keeping the house from languishing as a foreclosure property.

Banks recently started to pre-approve short sales, giving buyers and sellers more confidence that their hopes wouldn't be dashed, Trimble said.

"It still isn't easy" — a short sale takes much more documentation and time than a plain vanilla home sale," she said.

Footprints Lead Police to Alleged Burglar

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • Police in Idaho Falls say footprints in the snow led them to the home of a man who had burglarized parked cars.

Officers followed the footprints that went from vehicle to vehicle parked along the street Monday morning until they ended at a residence.

There, officers arrested 20-year-old Cade Thomas Dixon on a charge of burglary. He was booked in the Bonnevile County Jail.

Police say Dixon tried to enter more than 100 vehicles. Most were locked, though a small amount of cash and a GPS unit were taken from two of the vehicles.

Idaho Supreme Court Rules for Utility in Tax Fight

BOISE • A divided Idaho Supreme Court has sided with PacifiCorp in the utility's tax fight against the state that officials say will likely shift millions worth of assessments to other classes of property owners.

Justices issued their 3-2 ruling on Monday after months of deliberations, with the majority concluding a 2010 state court judge's decision in favor of PacifiCorp "was not clearly erroneous and was supported by substantial and competent evidence."

In addition to PacifiCorp, whose unit Rocky Mountain Power operates in Idaho, the outcome will also likely affect past tax bills of Idaho Power Co., which has also challenged its assessments in recent years.

At stake is about \$11.6 million in disputed payments to counties that now may have to be returned to the utilities.

In their 32-page decision, a majority of justices decided the Idaho State Tax Commission's chance to dispute the reliability of PacifiCorp's expert witness testimony about the value of its properties — and the resulting tax bill — had come and gone when its lawyers failed to raise the issue when the case was heard two years ago in 4th District Court in Ada County.

"If evidence is incompetent, it is the opponent's obligation to object to that evidence when offered for admission," Justice Warren Jones wrote. "This court will not consider objections to the admission of evidence that are not preserved in the record and that are raised for the first time on appeal."

Justices Daniel Eismann and Joel Horton sided with Jones on the decision.

In Idaho, operating properties such as power lines, gas pipelines and railroads are assessed centrally by the Tax Commission as a single unit — not separately by each county like real property.

This dispute centered on competing methods for determining the value of a utility's properties.

With PacifiCorp prevailing, Ada County could have to repay \$1.8 million and Bannock County may have to come up with nearly \$1 million for the utilities, according to State Tax Commission estimates.

Smaller counties also face obligations: \$328,000 for Oneida County and \$414,000 for Payette County, home of the Idaho Power's new Langley Gulch gas plant.

Idaho Association of Counties executive director Dan Chadwick said on Wednesday the counties have a couple of options: They could either issue a refund to utilities, or they could issue a credit against their future tax obligations, to make up what they owe.

Either way, other taxpayers will have to make up the difference.

Chadwick said he believes the decision does leave the Tax Commission the opportunity to challenge PacifiCorp's aggressive method of valuing its properties in the future, as long as it does so in a timely fashion.

Chadwick said the dissenting opinion, from Chief Justice Roger Burdick and Justice Jim Jones, offers a roadmap.

They "left the door open for future discussion of this issue," Chadwick said.

Citing precedents set in similar cases including in Montana, Burdick and Jones concluded PacifiCorp had failed to prove it was entitled to a nearly 21 percent reduction in the taxable value of its property, under the approach it took to reduce its tax bill in Idaho.

"I would hold, as have our sister states in similar circumstances, that PacifiCorp has failed to carry its burden of establishing entitlement to an additional deduction," Jim Jones wrote. "I would reverse the district court's holding adopting PacifiCorp's cost

valuation."

Liz Rodosovich, a Tax Commission spokeswoman, said officials weren't immediately available for comment.

PacifiCorp spokesman Jeff Hymas also didn't immediately return a phone call seeking comment.

But the utility has said any tax savings its Rocky Mountain Power unit in southeastern Idaho reaps from the Supreme Court decision would be passed on to electricity ratepayers.

CUBA HAS MUCH TO LOSE AS ALLY CHAVEZ BATTLES CANCER

HAVANA (AP) • Cubans who were tuned in to the nightly soap opera on a recent Saturday received a sudden burst of bad news, from the other side of the Caribbean.

State TV cut to the presidential palace in Caracas, Venezuela, where President Hugo Chavez revealed that his cancer had returned. Facing his fourth related surgery in 18 months, he grimly named Vice President Nicolas Maduro as his possible successor.

The news shocked not only Venezuelans but millions of Cubans who have come to depend on Chavez's largesse for everything from subsidized oil to cheap loans. Venezuela supplies about half of Cuba's energy needs, meaning the island's economy would be in for a huge shock and likely recession if a post-Chavez president forced the island to pay full price for oil. Despite the drama, the news likely wasn't a surprise to Cuba's Communist government, and not only because Chavez has been receiving medical care on the island.

Havana learned important lessons about overdependence when the 1991 collapse of the Soviet Union threw the country into a deep crisis. Trying to avoid the consequences of a similar cut, the Cuban government has been diversifying its portfolio of economic partners in recent years, looking to Asia, Europe and other Latin American nations, and is only about half as dependent on Caracas as it was on the former Soviet Union.

One of the country's top goals has been to make the island's struggling economy less dependent on a single benefactor. Under the leadership of Chavez, who regularly calls former Cuban President Fidel Castro his ideological father and has followed parts of the Communist leader's governance playbook, Venezuela has sent billions of dollars a year to Cuba through trade and petro-aid.

Last month, authorities announced a deal with a subsidiary of Brazil's Odebrecht to manage a sugar refinery, a rare step in an industry that has long been largely off limits to foreign involvement. China has invested in land-based oil projects, and along with Canada is a key player in Cuba's important nickel industry. Spain has ventures in tourist hotels and tobacco, while French company Pernod Ricard helps export Cuban liquors. And since 2009, Brazil has been a partner in a massive project to modernize and expand the port at Mariel, west of the capital.

But while Havana says it wants to boost foreign investment, obstacles remain. The approval process for investment projects can be long and cumbersome, and pilferage, disincentives to productivity and government intervention can cut into efficiencies. Foreign companies also pay a sky-high payroll tax.

Feinberg, who wrote a report on foreign investment in Cuba published this month by the U.S. think tank the Brookings Institution, said that while a number of foreign companies are successfully doing business with the island, others have run into problems, sending a chilly message to would-be investors. In particular he noted the recent cases of a government takeover of a food company run by a Chilean businessman accused of corruption, and contentious renegotiations of a contract with Dutch-British personal and home care products giant Unilever amid shifting government demands.

FAMILIES EVACUATE AREA NEIGHBORING NICARAGUA VOLCANO

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) • Nicaraguan authorities say they've ordered the evacuation of some 300 families living on the flanks of the country's highest volcano after it began spewing hot gas and ash on Tuesday. Federal government spokeswoman and first lady Rosario Murillo told a local radio station that a yellow alert was declared Wednesday in a 1.8-mile radius around the San Cristobal

volcano to allow the evacuation of residents who would be at highest risk during a significant eruption.

Murillo said 15 eruptions had been recorded over the last day at the volcano northeast of the capital of Managua. She said the volcano has emitted regular small eruptions, but larger ones are unpredictable. Authorities had wanted to move the closest residents away from the volcano as a precaution.

Winter Weather Ravages Much of US

BOSTON • A powerful winter storm that spawned tornadoes from Texas to Alabama, killing at least six people and leaving thousands without power, is bringing heavy snow to the Midwest and threatening rain and high wind in the East.

A blizzard warning stretches from northeastern Arkansas to Cleveland, Ohio, where almost 14 inches of snow is expected to fall by Thursday, according to the National Weather Service. Winter storm warnings are in effect from Illinois into Maine.

"The storm right now is over Tennessee and heavy snow is falling over southern Illinois, Indiana and Ohio," said Gary Best, a meteorologist with Hometown Forecast Services in Nashua, N.H. "On the other side, to the east, there is heavy rain and thunderstorms from Florida, Georgia and into North and South Carolina."

On Tuesday, 532 flights nationwide were canceled and 900 have been scrubbed so far Wednesday, according to Flight Aware, a Houston-based airline tracking service. Most of Wednesday's cancellations are in Indianapolis,

Dallas-Fort Worth, Chicago, Washington Dulles, New York's LaGuardia and Cleveland, the company said.

Wind and rain along the coast will probably tie up air traffic from Charlotte, N.C., to New York City, while the heavy snow causes problems at airports across the Midwest, Best said.

Homes, hospitals and businesses were damaged from Texas to Florida by tornadoes and high winds from the storm yesterday, and at least 16 people were injured, according to the U.S. Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Okla. The Associated Press reported at least six

people killed.

More than 243,000 homes and businesses were without power at about 8 a.m. Wednesday Eastern time, most of them in Arkansas, according to data compiled by Bloomberg from utility websites and company spokesmen. Entergy Arkansas, the state's largest utility, reported 191,293 customers blacked out. An additional 16,525 were without power in western Arkansas and nearby counties in Louisiana and Texas, American Electric Power's Southwestern Electric Power reported on its website.

Coastal North Carolina has the largest chance of being

raked by tornadoes and high winds Wednesday, according to the Storm Prediction Center. The area has a 15 percent chance of experiencing a tornado and 46 percent chance of being buffeted by strong winds.

High wind warnings have also been issued from New York City to eastern Massachusetts, including Boston.

Two inches of rain may fall in New York City overnight. There is a threat of coastal flooding in New York and Long Island during high tide later Wednesday, according to the weather service. Tides may be 3 to 5 feet above normal from 8 p.m. to midnight.

"Widespread flooding of vulnerable shore roads and/or basements due to storm tide and wave action," the weather service said. "Road closures may be needed."

A flood watch has also been posted for eastern Pennsylvania and western New Jersey, including Philadelphia and Trenton, where as much as two inches of rain may fall, flooding roads and sending streams out of their banks.

The storm will also bring snow to Canada, where Toronto is forecast to receive about 4 inches and parts of southern Ontario as much as 6 inches, according to Environment Canada.

US Economy Could Handle Short Fall Over 'Cliff'

WASHINGTON (AP) • The economic threat that's kept many Americans on edge for months is nearing reality — unless the White House and Republicans cut a budget deal by New Year's Day.

Huge tax increases. Deep cuts in domestic and defense programs. The likelihood of sinking stock prices, reduced consumer spending and corporate layoffs. The risk of a recession within months. Still, the start of 2013 may turn out to be far less bleak than feared. For one thing, the two sides may strike a short-term agreement before New Year's that postpones spending cuts until spring. President Barack Obama and members of Congress return to Washington

Thursday. Even if New Year's passed with no deal, businesses and consumers would not likely panic as long as some agreement seemed imminent. The \$671 billion in tax increases and spending cuts could be retroactively repealed.

And the impact of the tax increases would be felt only gradually. Most people would receive slightly less money in each paycheck.

"The simple conclusion that going off the cliff necessarily means a recession next year is wrong," says Lewis Alexander, an economist at Nomura Securities. "It will ultimately depend on how long the policies are in place."

It's always possible that negotia-

tions between President Obama and Republican congressional leaders will collapse in acrimony. The prospect of permanent tax increases and spending cuts could cause many consumers and businesses to delay spending, hiring or expanding.

Without any agreement at all for months, the fiscal cliff would cause the U.S. economy to shrink 0.5 percent in the first half of 2013 and fall into recession, the Congressional Budget Office estimates.

But most economists expect a deal, if not by New Year's then soon after. Businesses and consumers will likely remain calm as long as negotiators seem to be moving toward an agreement.

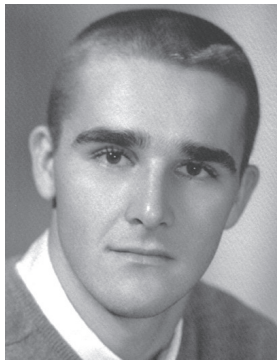

Door-opener to America

At the end of this year in which election results reinserted immigration into the political conversation, remember that 2012 is the 150th anniversary of “the first comprehensive immigration law.” This is how the Homestead Act of 1862 is described by Blake Bell, historian at the Homestead National Monument of America near Beatrice, Neb., one of the National Park Service’s many educational jewels that make the NPS one of just two government institutions (the other is the U.S. Marine Band) that should be exempt from any budget cuts, for all eternity.

In 1862, the grim year of Shiloh and Fredericksburg, Congress would have been forgiven for concentrating only on preventing national dismemberment. Instead, while defiantly continuing construction of the Capitol dome, Congress continued nation-building. It passed the Pacific Railroad Act to provide for the movement of people and goods to and from the new lands in the West, the Morrill Act to build land-grant colleges emphasizing agriculture, and, most important, the Homestead Act, whose provisions were as simple as the problem it addressed was stark.

What today is called the Great Plains was at that time identified on maps as the Great American Desert. Under the act, \$18 dollars in fees entitled homesteaders to farm 160 acres to which they would acquire title for no further cost after five years. Or after six months if they paid \$1.25 an acre. (Union soldiers could deduct their time in uniform from the residency requirement.) The act was intended to attract immigrants from abroad — immigrants who would put down roots. For this purpose it provided all requirements for citizenship.

Until then, Bell writes, the states had been “the primary overseers of immigration.” And as an immigration commissioner of New York later testified to Congress, large numbers of immigrants would “come regularly to this country every spring” but would take themselves and their earnings back to Europe in the autumn, not paying taxes and depressing American wages.

The Naturalization Law of 1802 required immigrants to receive certificates (“first papers”) proving that they had declared upon arrival their intention to become citizens. After five years, an immigrant could take the certificate and two witnesses to a courthouse and be naturalized. This law addressed the worry that Europe was deliberately exporting the wretched refuse of its teeming shores — people of (in a Kentucky congressman’s words) “the most turbulent and factious tempers,” accustomed to monarchies and sorely in need of Americanization.

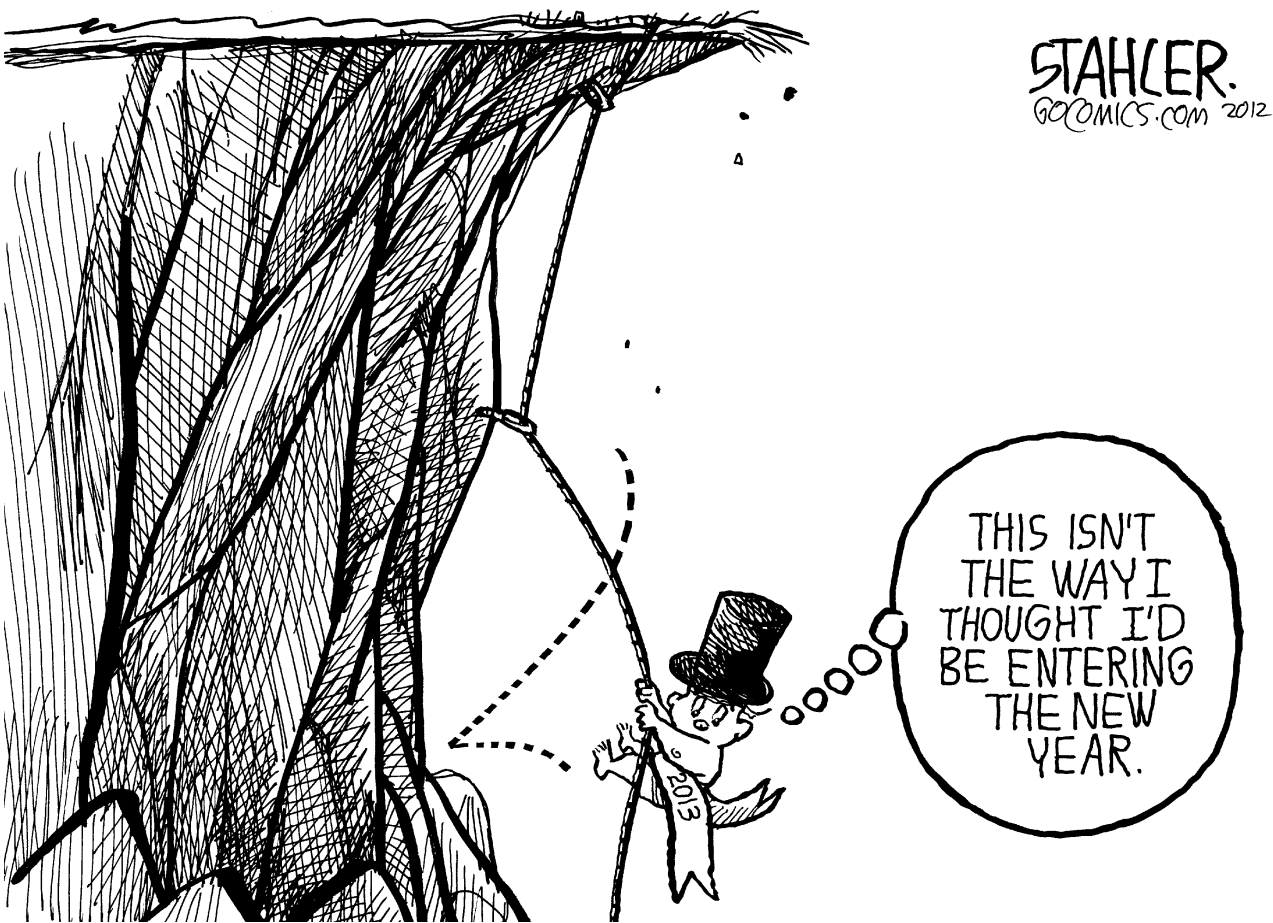
By 1850, the United States had acquired, by hook or by crook (including Indian “removal” and the morally dubious but indubitably beneficial war with Mexico), vast quantities of land. Most of it was uninhabited, unless you counted, as few did, Indians. In 1862, with many citizens fighting, noncitizens were needed to (in an Illinois congressman’s words) “go upon these wild lands” to increase the nation’s wealth.

Bell calls the Homestead Act “an accommodating immigration law” because its requirement that the land be farmed for five years was the amount of time required to become a citizen, and because it began the assimilation of immigrants into American law. The spirit of the act was optimistic. As the *New York Times* said, it would attract “the common people of Europe” who are free from the prejudices of “the aristocratic and snobocratic classes.” Under the Homestead Act, which continued in effect in Alaska until 1986, more than 270 million acres — approximately 422,000 square miles or 2.5 Californias — were privatized. The truth-tellers at the National Archives say most homesteaders came from near their homesteads — Iowans moved to Nebraska, Minnesotans to South Dakota, etc. Furthermore, speculators, railroads and other sharpies snapped up most of the land: Of 500 million acres dispersed by 1904, only 80 million went to homesteaders. Small farmers settled more land under the act in the 20th century than in the 19th.

Still, Bell rightly notes that the act was an immigration law in effect as well as intent. By 1870, the foreign-born population of Wyoming and Montana was 39 percent; of Dakota Territory’s, 34 percent; of Nebraska’s, 25 percent. And the peak years of national immigration, 1905-14, were the peak years of homestead claims.

Skeptics will say that the Homestead Act, which welcomed immigrants to a sparsely populated continent, is irrelevant to today. Skeptics should consider not only that immigration is still an entrepreneurial act but also that as the entitlement state buckles beneath the weight of an aging population, America’s workforce needs replenishing.

Russian Orphans Held Hostage

The following editorial appeared recently in the Washington Post:

The adoption of children from abroad is fraught with emotions, and adoptions from Russia are no exception. Russia is the third-most favored place for adoptions by U.S. families, after China and Ethiopia. The adoptions have often led to bruised feelings of national pride. At the same time, many of the children enjoy a better life than if they had languished in Russia’s grim institutions. It was with an eye toward improving the

process of such adoptions that the United States and Russia approved a bilateral agreement in November.

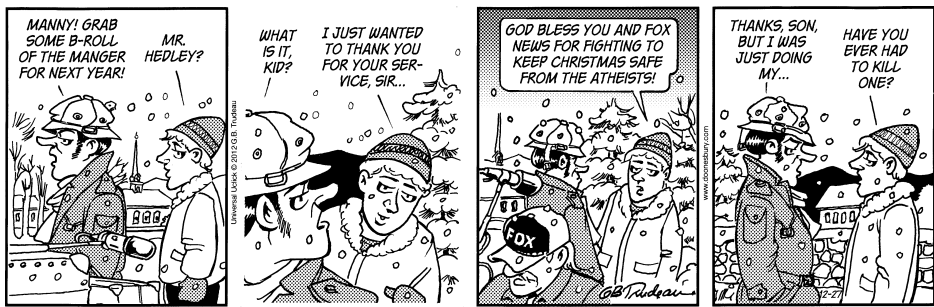
However, last week the lower house of the Russian parliament, the State Duma, threatened to upend this agreement. The chamber passed a bill that would outlaw the adoption of Russian children by Americans. The bill now goes to the upper chamber, the Federation Council; from there, it would go to President Vladimir Putin for his signature. Putin said at a Dec. 20 news conference that he supports the thrust of the bill but has not decided whether to sign it.

The Duma’s abrupt action was taken in retaliation for U.S. legislation, approved by Congress and signed by President Obama, that denies visas and other privileges for Russian officials who abuse human rights. The measure is named after a Russian lawyer, Sergei Magnitsky, who died of maltreatment in prison after exposing tax fraud by Russian officials. Putin and the Russian elite have been fuming about the Magnitsky bill for months. In the rush to retaliate, the Duma has acted against Russia’s own best interests. The legislation would deny hundreds of

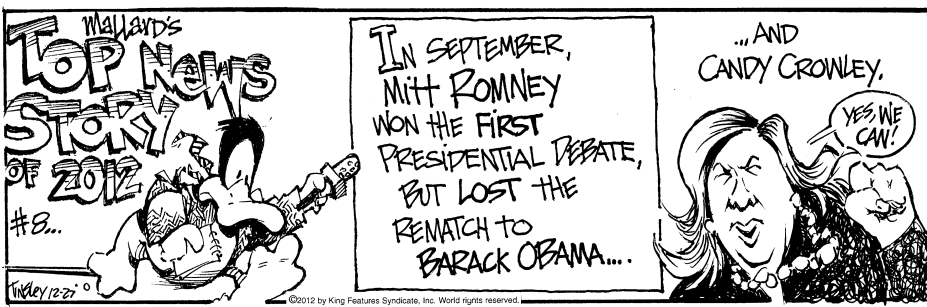
children an opportunity each year to escape the dire condition of Russian orphanages. Although Putin says of caring for these children “we must do it ourselves,” the simple fact is that many of them will not be adopted by Russians, and they often suffer in primitive facilities.

More broadly, the point of the Magnitsky bill is to name and shame those who violate human rights in Russia. This is a goal that Russia should welcome, a step toward rule of law and a healthy society. Instead, the Duma has picked up a cudgel more likely to hurt Russia than the United States.

Obesity Levels Drop Among Preschoolers

Obesity rates fell among U.S. preschool-age children in 2010, reversing a trend of the past decade, according to the first national study to spot a decline in the condition among young kids.

The rate of obese 2to 4-year-olds from low-income families dropped 1.8 percent in 2010 from 2003, while it fell 6.8 percent for those who were extremely obese, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported in a research letter published Tuesday in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Researchers attributed the decline to greater awareness of health problems caused by obesity as well as an increase in breastfeeding, which studies have shown can reduce the risk. Obesity even at such a young age can

set up children for diabetes, heart disease and even premature death, said Heidi Blanck, a study author.

“We’ve flipped from going up to really now showing a decrease,” Blanck, acting director of the Division of Nutrition, Physical Activity and Obesity at the Atlanta-based CDC, said in a Friday interview. “It’s a modest decrease but at least we’ve changed the direction. We’re optimistic that with recent investments and recent initiatives we’ll continue to see these numbers decline.”

Previous studies had shown that obesity levels may have reached a plateau in various age groups, she said. Researchers used data from the Pediatric Nutrition Surveillance System, which includes about 50 percent of children eligible for U.S.-funded maternal and child health and nutrition pro-

grams. The study included 27.5 million 2to 4-year-olds from 30 states and the District of Columbia.

The children were considered obese if their body mass index, a measure of height and weight, was at or above the 95th percentile for kids of the same age and gender, while extreme obesity was defined as having a body mass index at or above 120 percent of the 95th percentile. That means, a 3-year-old boy of average height who weighs 37 pounds or more would be considered obese, while a 3-year-old boy of average height who weighs 44 pounds or more would be extremely obese.

The prevalence of obesity dropped to 14.94 percent in 2010 from 15.21 percent in 2003, according to the report. It was still higher than 13.05 percent in 1998. While the percentage of

preschoolers with extreme obesity declined to 2.07 percent in 2010 from 2.22 percent in 2003, it was still higher than 1.75 percent in 1998. Of the 2.4 million included in the study in 2010, there were 359,222 obese and 49,772 extremely obese U.S. preschoolers, Blanck said. During the time the children in this study would have been breastfeeding, the number of low-income infants nursing jumped more than 10 percent, she said.

“The trends of obesity and extreme obesity among U.S. low-income, preschool-aged children changed around 2003,” Blanck said. “I am optimistic that continued efforts to support nursing mothers and improved obesity prevention resources for parents and the nation’s childcare centers and early education setting will help keep this downward trend a reality.”

Lost, Blind Dog Finds Way Back to Alaska Owners

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) • Blind and alone in Alaska winter temperatures that dipped 40 degrees below zero, a lost 8-year-old Fairbanks dog wasn’t given much of a chance to make it home.

But after walking 10 miles to the edge of a local musher’s dog yard, Abby the brown-and-white mixed breed was found and returned to her owners, a family that includes two boys and one girl under the age of 10.

The dog that the family raised from an animal-shelter puppy went missing during a snowstorm on Dec. 13, and the family never expected to see her again, The Fairbanks Daily News-Miner reported.

“It’s a miracle, there’s no other words to describe it,”

said McKenzie Grapengeter, emotion choking her voice and tears coming to her eyes. “We never expected to have her to be returned safe and alive.” Musher and veterinarian Mark May said he came across the dog while running his team on Dec. 19, but didn’t stop to pick her up.

“It ran with us for about a mile on the way home before she fell off the pace, but I had a big dog team so I couldn’t grab it,” he said. “I said, ‘boy I hope it finds somebody’s house.’”

The next day, the dog turned up at May’s house.

“It was sitting there, all the way from 14 mile on the winter trail down into this neighborhood, I guess by just sniffing, so I picked it up and brought it in.”

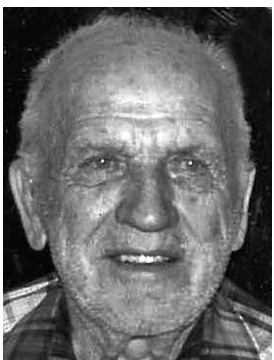

India Wakes Up to Child Malnutrition

BANSWARA, India • Stung by the realization that it faced a child malnutrition crisis worse than in most African countries, India is finally waking to the scale of the problem.

Progress is still slow and political will still patchy, but there are signs that a new approach to fighting malnutrition is just beginning to reap dividends.

Efforts to improve rural health and education have combined with an expansion of a child welfare program that employs nearly 2 million village health workers to focus on maternal and infant health and nutrition. A rural jobs plan has helped raise wages in the countryside and new programs are educating adolescent girls, nearly half of whom will marry before age 18, about feeding and hygiene.

There are indications it could be starting to pay off. An independent survey of malnutrition in 100 of India’s least-developed districts released in January showed the first signs of progress, with the proportion of underweight children falling to 42 percent, a drop of 11 percentage points.

Even more dramatic are preliminary data from the western state of Maharashtra released last month, showing a decline in the number of children who were stunted, to 22.8 percent from 39 percent in 2006, thanks to a government program aimed at the needs of infants and mothers.

“We are confident that there is a good story in the making,” said Victor Aguayo, head of UNICEF’s India nutrition program. “There is excitement that what can happen, is happening.”

Maharashtra is home to India’s financial capital, Mumbai, and is the country’s economic powerhouse. Still, malnutrition rates did not begin falling significantly until the state government started showing the political will to tackle the problem head-on.

Nationally, the wake-up call came in 2007 with the realization that a decade-and-a-half of buoyant economic growth had scarcely dented child malnutrition rates, which remained higher than the average in sub-Saharan Africa. Nearly half of Indian children under age 5 were stunted and underweight for their age, a government survey released that year showed, permanently impairing their mental and physical development.

But in a country where many middle-class Indians find the subject of malnutrition rather boring, it took the idea that India was underperforming — not just compared with Africa but also with neighbors like Bangladesh — to embarrass the government into action. In 2007, Prime Minister Manmohan Singh called it a “national shame” and a failed strategy began to be reevaluated. “India as a nation had been overemphasizing economic growth in the hope it would somehow solve the problem,” Aguayo said. But growth has not been equitably distributed, and experts argue that the health sector has been neglected.

Hagerman Starting Small for Long-term Basketball Success

HAGERMAN • Hagerman girls head basketball coach Darren Van Hofwegen thinks he has a blueprint for sustainable basketball success in Hagerman.

Building off last year's state tournament appearance with a 10-2 start in 2012-13, Van Hofwegen wants to make winning the norm — not susceptible to talent fluctuations that leave him with teams full of girls with little basketball experience upon entering his program. Taking what he learned as a coach at 1A-II Timberline (Weippe) prior to getting the Pirates job, Van Hofwegen created a youth basketball league late in the fall.

"We wanted to start one here and see how many people would jump on it," Van Hofwegen said. "We did it at

Timberline, and it could pay off down the road."

He wanted to give local children, many of whom have few opportunities to play organized basketball prior to middle school, the chance to try the sport, see if they like it, and perhaps learn a few things.

Judging by the excitement and skills displayed by Hagerman kids at halftime of a recent home game — it's working.

"I get to have fun and play with a lot of kids," 10-year-old Carter Norstebon said. "So far we've won all of our games."

More than 60 kids in grades K-4 from the Hagerman area take part in two hours of drills and fundamentals training for about two hours a week — with intra-squad scrimmages at halftime of weekend home games at the high school.

"When we got here, we

looked at the incoming kids to the junior high team and they didn't know how to pivot, just basic basketball stuff," Van Hofwegen said. "We had to get them touching the ball."

While it could take a decade to see if the league sparks an increased interest in basketball, it's already forging new mentorship-oriented friendships in the town.

The league — full of both boys and girls — is coached by both boys and girls Hagerman basketball players, including Clint Clifford, Riley White, Kade Kress, Riley Sauer, Cody Douville, Larissa Knight, Hayley White, Aly Sauer, Jessica Regnier, Megan Bean, Kylie Locklar, Brianne Crist, Brandalyn Sartain, Marisa Palermo and Justin Kepler — about two coaches per team.

"They will listen to high school kids very quick," Van

Hofwegen said. "So far it's been very positive."

Van Hofwegen and boys coach Kevin Cato lead the drills and teaching, but the league wouldn't work without the high school players.

"We weren't sure how committed they'd be to this," Van Hofwegen said. "They're volunteering, and they've already got a lot on their hands. But they would show up bright and early in the morning after a game, some of them banged up."

Regnier, one of the Pirates' best players, says she embraces the chance to give back, even if it feels a little strange at times.

"It's amazing to get to know the little kids and get to know what it's like to be in a coach's shoes," Regnier said. "I think the way they are reaching out to these young athletes, it will really help them out. They won't

Peyton Manning, Peterson make Pro Bowl

NEW YORK • Sensational comebacks have Peyton Manning and Adrian Peterson headed for the Pro Bowl. Also selected Wednesday to the NFL's all-star game was Redskins rookie quarterback Robert Griffin III.

Manning missed all of the 2011 season with neck and back problems that required several operations. He then signed with Denver as a free agent and has led the Broncos on a 10-game winning streak to take the AFC West. "I know there's great players out there in the NFL, but there's some great players on this team this year that deserve to go," said Manning, who ranks fourth in league passing, has thrown 34 touchdowns and 11 interceptions.

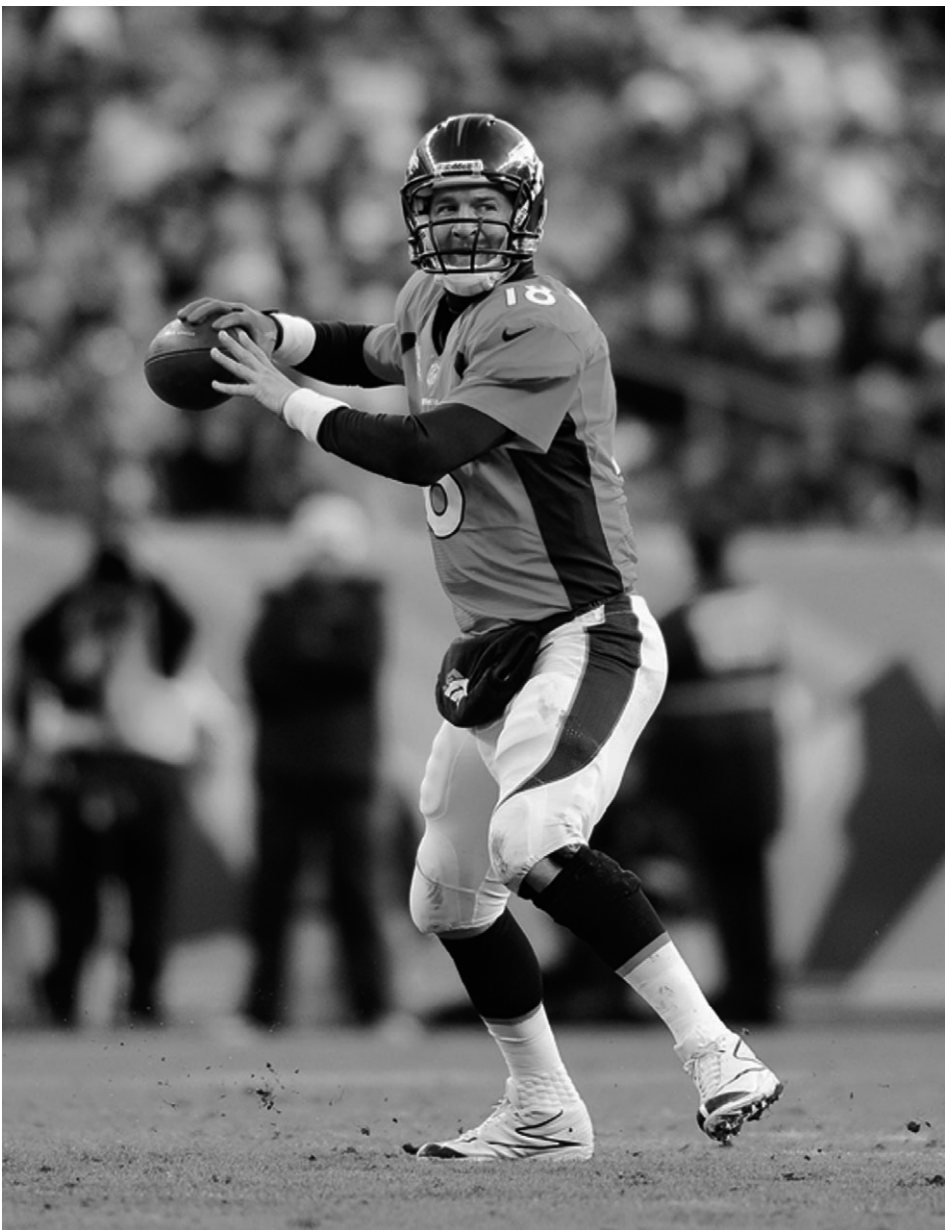
Four other Broncos made the AFC roster: DE Elvis Dumervil, linebacker Von Miller, CB Champ Bailey and tackle Ryan Clady.

Minnesota's Peterson tore up his left knee on Christmas Eve last year, underwent major surgery, then was back for the season opener. He's gone from uncertain to unstoppable, running away with the rushing title with a career-high 1,898 yards and lifting the Vikings toward an NFC wild card.

"Coming into the season after going through the rehab process, I just told myself that I wanted to lead my team to a championship and make sure that I contribute and do my part," Peterson said. "I've been doing it."

Griffin is one of three rookie QBs who had superb debut seasons, along with Andrew Luck of Indianapolis and Russell Wilson of Seattle. Luck and Wilson weren't voted to the Pro Bowl by players coaches and fans, although their teams are in the playoffs; Griffin can get to the postseason if Washington beats Dallas on Sunday.

"You can't play down those kind of things," Griffin said. "I've always said my whole football career that

Another record setter will be heading to Honolulu for the Jan. 27 Pro Bowl: Detroit WR Calvin Johnson.

Johnson broke Jerry Rice's single-season yards receiving record and has 1,892 yards with a game left.

Peterson Ready to Help Vikings Chase Playoff Berth

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. • It's all right there for Adrian Peterson now.

One more game in his remarkable comeback season, and the only thing that remains on the line is everything.

A win against the rival Green Bay Packers on Sunday would put his Minnesota Vikings into the playoffs for the first time since the 2009 season. The milestones of 2,000 yards and Eric Dickerson's single-season rushing record are there to be had as well, along with a potential MVP award that would cement his standing among the league's great players.

"It's such a big game when you look at everything that can be accomplished," Peterson said Wednesday. "I'm looking forward to it, man. Most importantly, getting into the playoffs, securing that with a win against Green Bay. Having an opportunity to hit 2,000, having an opportunity to break Eric Dickerson's record in the same game, it would be great to accomplish."

Perhaps the only thing more improbable than the Vikings (9-6) sitting one victory away from a playoff berth is that they have been carried there by Peterson, who tore two ligaments in his left knee just over a year ago. He has already racked up a career-high 1,898 yards rushing this season, leaving him 102 away from becoming the first player to hit 2,000 yards on a reconstructed knee.

His inspiring recovery has galvanized a team that has been teetering on the edge of elimination the last four weeks and has put some of the biggest names to play the position in his corner as he runs toward history. Dickerson is on record as saying he hopes Peterson falls a little shy of his 2,105 yards rushing in 1984, but everyone from Jim Brown to Terrell Davis to Chris Johnson — the last running back to rush for 2,000 yards — have come out in support of his pursuit.

"So impressed by everything (at) Adrian Peterson has done this year," Detroit Lions great Barry Sanders tweeted recently. "Big fan of E.D. But really pulling for AP to break the record. Good luck!"

Peterson needs 208 yards on Sunday to break Dickerson's record, a number that would be considered close to impossible for

most running backs in this pass-happy league. But Peterson has topped that twice in the previous four games. He's also rushed for more yards against the Packers than any other team, including 210 yards at Lambeau Field on Dec. 2. "I wouldn't say I'm rooting for him to get it, but I want him to do the best that he can do," said Johnson, who developed a bit of a rivalry with Peterson a few years back when both laid claim to the title of the best running back in the league. "It's just a nice story from where he got hurt last year. I sent him a text to see how he was doing and stuff like that. I wish him the best and whatever he does, I congratulate him on it and I'll be happy for him."

Peterson has been humbled by all the support and is understanding of Dickerson's stance, but there is one player he wishes he could sit down with before he plays one of the biggest games of his career — Walter Payton.

"What inspired you to be the best?" he wishes he could ask the Bears great, who died in 1999. "How did he deal with success and fame? If he could do anything different, what would it be? What would he have done?"

Peterson speaks to Vikings coach Leslie Frazier about Payton. Frazier was a teammate of Payton's and has routinely said he sees striking similarities between the two, on and off the field.

His name is up there with Tom Brady and Peyton Manning in the MVP discussion, and an MVP win for Peterson would break a string of five straight given to quarterbacks. He's certainly showing that an offense can be successful while relying heavily on the running game and validating the Vikings' decision to invest heavily in him with a lucrative contract extension before last season.

"I definitely want to keep the running backs highlighted," Peterson said. "It's started to turn into more of a spread, quarterback-friendly NFL. But just keep letting them know that there are going to be running backs that can do this."

"Just give young guys the inspiration to try to be better than me. Just inspire them to get on top of their game to be better so that running backs continue to prosper in this league and have coaches and organizations respect us so we can continue to not only play the game we love, but take care of our family."

Broncos to Finish Season in Style

The difference Peyton Manning has made in Denver actually is measurable.

Try from 8-8, which the Broncos were a year ago in winning the AFC West, to 12-3. Try losing their final three games of 2011 and sneaking into the back door of the playoffs to winning their last 11 and moving into the postseason as the NFL's best team.

Those are the numbers, along with Denver (No. 1 in the AP Pro32) being a 16-point favorite over Kansas City (No. 32, AP Pro32), which is 2-13.

What Manning has brought to the Broncos in swagger, confidence and performance that has been impressive even by the four-time league MVP's standards.

Don't look for any temporary respite in any of those areas against the weak Chiefs.

"We talk about that a lot, not coasting, pedal downhill," coach John Fox said. "I appreciate him. I think that's a big reason why he's accomplished what he's accomplished, whether it's here or in Indianapolis. He's a tremendous competitor, doesn't let up. I think that's how you need to be to be successful."

Few teams have been more successful this season than the Broncos. Kansas City has no chance Sunday.

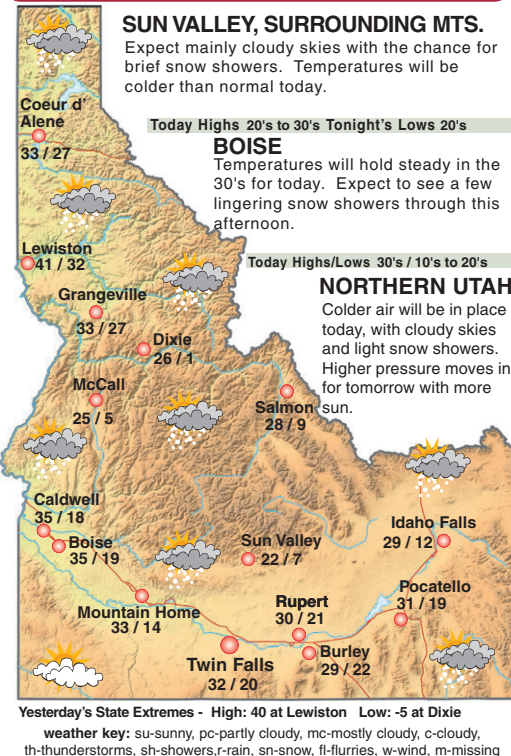

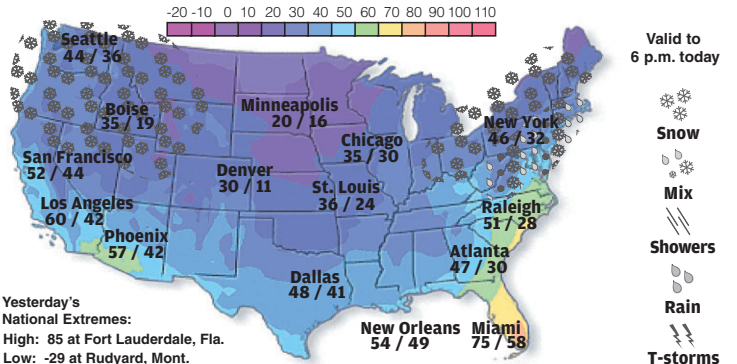

The fact that Man City edged crosstown rival Manchester United on goal differential only made the title that much sweeter for the Blues.

COUNTRY OF THE YEAR: Carrying on with the royal theme, the award goes to ... Britain, for putting on a stellar Olympics that included perhaps the most inspiring races of the year — Mo Farah's sweep of the 5,000 and 10,000 meters — among a bevy of gold medals for the host country. The British also claimed the Tour de France (Bradley Wiggins) and U.S. Open tennis championship (long-suffering Andy Murray), while contributing to Europe's historic Ryder Cup rally.

HOTTEST SPORT: For its glowing presentation of the Daytona 500, the award goes to ... NASCAR. It helps to be a sport that relies on flammable liquids, but no one expected the biggest race of the year to turn into Devil's Night. Seattle's Richard Sherman Continues to Wait on Appeal

RENTON, Wash. • Richard Sherman hung around the Seattle Seahawks locker room on Wednesday getting ready for practice as though it was any other week during the regular season. But it wasn't typical. Not with the looming decision about his appeal of a four-game suspension where no one seems to know a timetable for a decision that could have a significant impact on just how deep the hottest team in the NFC can go in the playoffs. "It's not weird at all. Either the truth is going to come out or it's not," Sherman said. "That's pretty much all that it comes down to."

It's an uneasy situation for the Seahawks. They don't want to go blindly into the season finale against St. Louis with the firm belief their star cornerback — who was surprisingly left off the NFC Pro Bowl roster — would be available.

Sherman practiced Wednesday, which could be his final practice until very late in the postseason or early in the 2013 season. Seattle coach Pete Carroll planned to rotate additional players in at Sherman's spot in case the awaited decision on his appeal for violating the league's policy on performance-enhancing substances is upheld this week.

"We don't know what's going to happen, so we're not going to go blindly into it. We're going to get our guys in the rotation a little

differently," Carroll said. "It won't change much though. He's going to get some work today, and the other guys will get work as well, but we have it in our minds that we have to be preparing for that."

Sherman missed two practices last week while he traveled to make his appeal. News first broke of the failed tests by Sherman and teammate Brandon Browner after Seattle's 24-21 loss to Miami on Nov. 25.

Sherman's appeal was based on errors in the chain of custody of his sample and that there were mistakes made by the tester. He's been outspoken in believing the NFL is not following proper procedures as laid out in the collective bargaining agreement.

Sherman reiterated those thoughts Wednesday and expressed a desire to pursue his case further in court, even though it wouldn't help him get back on the field this season if the suspension is upheld.

"I can't get back playing regardless. I can just sue the league, and that's probably what I'm going to do if they suspend me," Sherman said.

If Sherman's suspension is upheld he will go out with one of the finest games of his career. The emerging star grabbed his seventh interception of the season, was credited with four passes defended, and returned a blocked field goal 90 yards for a touchdown in the Seahawks' 42-13 rout of San Francisco on Sunday night.

According to STATS, LLC, Sherman is tied with

Pittsburgh's Keenan Lewis for the NFL lead with 23 passes defended. He is tied for second in interceptions, and his burn rate — amount of catches allowed versus times targeted — of 46.2 percent is the seventh-lowest in the league for cornerbacks targeted at least 60 times.

Those numbers make his Pro Bowl omission puzzling. But players who test positive for PED violations aren't eligible to be on the Pro Bowl roster. Even before the Pro Bowl rosters were announced, Sherman didn't seem to care about getting a trip to Hawaii.

"It don't mean nothing," Sherman said. "I bet you I'll be on the first-team All-Pro. That means more to me."

Seattle still has one more week before Browner returns from his suspension, and its secondary depth could be severely tested this week if Sherman's suspension is upheld. Walter Thurmond, the first to step in for Browner, has missed the past two games with a hamstring injury and didn't practice Wednesday. Veteran cornerback Marcus Trufant went through a full practice Wednesday for the first time since before Week 13, but has mostly played covering slot receivers in passing situations this season and not on the outside.

If Sherman's suspension is upheld and Thurmond isn't healthy, the Seahawks could be starting rookie Lane and second-year Byron Maxwell against the Rams.

10. Getting to Know Auger Falls — Finally

Springwater flows into the churning Snake River from Auger Falls' high banks. Wide trails offer solitude in a stunning canyon environment, and a growing network of wetlands attracts waterfowl. But until the *Times-News* spotlighted the new park in April, not many walkers ventured in to this piece of urban wilderness.

Long inaccessible to the public, Auger Falls and the Snake River Canyon land on its southern bank are now in Twin Falls city ownership and open for recreation. But walkers, runners and cyclists are only slowly coming to know this noisy and beautiful stretch of white-water right under their noses.

9. Satisfying a Craving for Really Big Sagebrush

Rugged and graceful, the branches of basin big sagebrush stretch several feet above hikers' heads. In the rare spots where many grow together, you can wander through the shade of an otherworldly forest. It's an extraordinary sight, a novelty even to eyes that are accustomed to unbroken miles of sagebrush desert.

I saw a cluster of enormous sagebrush once and remembered it for years — but could never find the spot a second time. So I appealed to Pattie Courtney, a natural resource specialist for the Bureau of Land Management.

After an April scouting trip into the foothills southwest of Rogerson, she knew just the place to satisfy my longing. Lucky for you: It's also an ideal destination for an afternoon drive and a short hike.



8. Touring the Moon on Snowshoes

Roads and parking lots disappear, but even thick snow can't erase the rugged volcanic landscape at Craters of the Moon National Monument. With protruding lava rocks offering dramatic contrasts, craters and cones become a study in black and white, a place of profound solitude.

That transformation was

tardy last winter at Craters. But by mid-January, park workers finally had enough snow to groom the monument's winter trails — one of southern Idaho's best destinations for snowshoers. And in early February, I strapped on snowshoes for the first time and walked on the moon.

7. Hanging Out at a South Hills Deer Camp

October was winding down as I flagged down a four-some of hunters in the South Hills. It was the Walkers of Gooding and Hagerman, aiming to fill first-year hunter Teigan Walker's deer tag. They were headed for camp, hoping for another glimpse of antlers in the last moments of light.

I waited during an unsuccessful pursuit, then joined the family inside their tiny camp trailer as they prepared a one-pot meal by the dim light of a propane lantern and talked about the hunting lifestyle they love.



6. Crossing the Lava to a Native Plant Paradise

The 180-acre Carey Kipuka, largely overlooked by the public but fascinating to scientists, is a low island of volcanic soil and vegetation within a sea of much younger lava inside Craters of the Moon. That rough, black landscape isolates the kipuka from some wildlife, most casual explorers and all domestic livestock grazing.

The result: a minimally disturbed sagebrush community where native plants thrive.

Yes, it's a subtle pleasure — one best appreciated by those who've spent their springs cataloguing native bloom sightings. And you'll have to get there on foot, across almost a mile of jagged rock, as I did in June.

5. Enjoying Lakeside Solitude

Independence Lakes — four pools high on Mount Independence east of Oakley — offer a high-elevation destination for Idaho backpackers, day hikers and horsemen that's unmatched south of the Snake River.

My husband and I are among the many callers who ask the Sawtooth National Forest each spring

Citizen Scientists Wait for Wings to Unfold

HAGERMAN • Pat Weber stopped walking and tilted her head to expose her right ear to the noise.

"I hear a wood duck," Weber said.

Three other bird watchers with her also stopped and listened, some putting their binoculars to their eyes.

A small pond filled with ducks was only a few yards away. The quacks of ducks greeted the group, a hushed conversation with the voice of the mallard rising above the rest like it was laughing at a joke told by the others.

This sound made Weber smile.

"I still to this day, when I hear those mallards, I chuckle inside," she said.

Then the birders continued on their way, stopping

now and then to identify and record a small bird in the bare trees above them.

...

On Dec. 16, about 25 bird watchers from the Prairie

Falcon Audubon met early in the morning at the rest stop south of Hagerman near the Hagerman Wildlife Management Area. They came from as far as Hailey and

Shoshone, driving in early-morning snowstorms that passed through the area. Now they stood in the parking lot, black binoculars hanging from their necks and small packs clinging to their sides and backs.

They then broke into smaller groups of four or five people and dispersed in different directions to record bird species and numbers for the 113th annual Christmas Bird Count that takes place throughout the Americas Dec. 14 through Jan. 5. This count is the longest-running citizen science survey in the world, according to the National Audubon Society, and provides critical data on population trends.

Weber said she became involved with bird watching in 1982. Back then, Weber said, she didn't know a bird

Riding the Beast that Grooms Bald Mountain

SUN VALLEY • The Christmas crowd has begun to arrive in Sun Valley, their Volvos and SUVs beginning to cover every square inch of pavement in the town that lies at the foot of Bald Mountain.

But only two telemark skiers are making their way down Lower River Run — and with good reason. Night is rapidly falling, and soon the only ones making their way down — and up — Baldy will be the Nightcrawlers.

That's a name given to the men and machines who groom Bald Mountain each night, tilling it with rows of corduroy that are ranked among the best in the ski world.

Tonight I am among them, thanks to a program Sun Valley instituted last year called "Ride the Beast." Each week four lucky people's names are drawn from a lottery, giving them the opportunity to ride one of Sun Valley's state-of-the-art snow groomers as they manicure the snow.

It's a ride most skiers and boarders would give up, well, a powder day for.

Some resorts charge guests for the opportunity to ride a snow cat. But Sun Valley offers rides in its Beast for free. And what a Beast it is.

The Prinoth Beast — developed to groom glaciers — is the biggest groomer on earth. It's so wide, so powerful and so fast that it makes the oldest yellow

snow cats look like pussycats.

With a tiller that's 4 feet wider, the half-million-dollar machine can cover

Ask Fish and Game: Ice Fishing

Question: Is there enough ice for ice fishing anywhere?

Answer: Though lakes and reservoirs may be ice-covered, they may not all be safe yet for ice fishing, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said. Anglers must use their own discretion when deciding whether the ice is thick enough for ice fishing.

Early-season ice anglers should check ice before walking far from shore, a Fish and Game release said. Drill a hole and measure thickness. Four inches of solid ice — not mushy or porous — is generally considered safe.

Fish with a partner, take extra dry clothes and take a throw rope along just in case.

Some experienced ice fishers suggest carrying a screwdriver or other sharp instrument on a lanyard around the neck. It would

give a person who has fallen through something to grip the ice with to help pull themselves out, or at least something to hang onto as they await help.

Anglers also should pay attention to weather trends. If the weather warms up, ice may become less safe for fishing. And remember the reservoirs are filling through the winter, so be careful around the shoreline as the ice is often thin on the edges.

from a rock.

“I think we might have a Bohemian waxwing,” Weber said, her binoculars to the sky.

“Can you see the cinnamon?” Jette Morache asked Weber, referring to the distinct color of the bird’s face, nape and undertail coverts.

Morache was in charge of recording the birds the group saw, and every so often she had to stop, hunched over, holding the paper over her leg to write.

“I think we have a green-winged teal,” said Jan Simpkin, a biology professor at the College of Southern Idaho.

“Redhead,” Simpkin called out as Morache took note.

“That’s my favorite part about birding, ‘What’s that bird with a red tail called?’” Simpkin said, referring to a red-tailed hawk.

Simpkin said her fascination with birds started with the parakeet she had as a child.

Jeff Yeo, a wildlife ecologist from Shoshone, said he took an ornithology class in college.

“I’d walk to school and identify birds and plants; it made it more fun,” Yeo said.

• • •

As the companions came to a small overlook they could see large houses in the dis-

tance, and suddenly a flock of geese Canada geese emerged from a field below and dotted the overcast sky.

“That’s part of bird watching: You just stop and things unfold,” Weber said, as the honks of hundreds of geese passed overhead.

As they passed a babbling spring gushing from rocks covered in mint and golden-rod moss, a rock wren perched on the hill next to the group. The rock wren’s fluffy breast feathers fluttered as it popped up and down on its legs tweeting at the bird watchers.

“Usually we don’t get good sightings of wrens,”

Weber said.

As they hiked toward another pond, the prehistoric squawk of a great blue heron pierced the silence as it rose skyward, its long legs dangling.

Then a flurry of small birds exploded from a seemingly unoccupied tree next to them, and Simpkin identified them as finches and robins without peering through her binoculars.

When the quartet made their way to the end of the birding trail, they turned around. They thought they would spot a few owls in this area near rocky cliffs, but they found only white drop-

pings on the leaves and grass below the trees.

Bits of snow wafted from the grey clouds, and a slight breeze picked up.

Suddenly Weber shouted: “Oh, there’s a kinglet! Right, right on the branch.”

“Good job, Pat,” Simpkin said, as the birders celebrated the find before taking lunch in their vehicles.

They still had about five hours of bird watching left in the day before everyone planned to convene for dinner in Hagerman.

“It would have been nice to see an owl,” Morache said.

“Well,” Weber said, “we still might.”

about snow levels on the Independence Lakes trail. Again and again, we can’t wait to get there.

On an August backpacking trip, we met a lot of other Magic Valley folks who feel the same way.

4. Going Afield for Chukars in the Bennett Hills

Chukar hunting is tough, and it’s done in steep, rocky territory. But Magic Valley’s chukar hunters are addicted to it.

In November, I followed Paul Biagiotti, Mike Scott and their bird dogs into the Bennett Hills north of Bliss. In two hours of walking, one shot was fired and one bird fell.

But it’s pretty clear that for these men, the dogs and the desert and the company of another hunter are enough.



3. Admiring Autumn’s Aspens Amid Dramatic Scenery

For the reporting and photography in a September feature on Fall Creek trails, I hiked through brief hail and a long rain shower.

I intended to camp in a meadow that’s about 4 1/2 miles — and a climb of a couple of thousand feet — from the Fall Creek trailhead. But when I trudged into the meadow, I found that the spring-fed creek I’d counted on for the night’s water was almost dried up. With water bottles near empty, I had to move on. My dismay was quickly erased by the increasing beauty of a rain-freshened forest.

In this Pioneer Mountain drainage northeast of Ketchum, golden aspen leaves catch the sunlight against a backdrop of high granite peaks, hanging valleys and numerous waterfalls.

2. Drinking in the Scene from Hyndman Peak

Invest even a little in the Hyndman Creek Trail, and you’ll earn scenic payoff



right away. But it keeps getting better, too. This trail in the Pioneer Mountains northeast of Hailey is a something-for-everyone experience.

For casual hikers: a trail that starts out easy for more than two miles, climbing gently through aspen groves and flower-filled meadows with views of mountain slopes.

For backpackers: delightful creekside spots for tents, with your choice of peaks for the next morning’s hike.

For ambitious dayhikers: challenging climbs through varied scenery, and a chance to reach the summit of Idaho’s ninth-highest peak in one day without climbing gear. (On my June dayhike, I was almost that ambitious, but not quite.)



1. Exploring Beauty in Basalt

An extraordinary world lies hidden inside the narrow, deep incision that snakes across a basalt field north of Shoshone.

Thousands of years of erosion have sculpted wildly fantastic shapes in the walls of the Big Wood River’s native channel, as water-borne stones scoured and ground and polished the softer basalt. Those who’ve peered over the edge — or hiked into the depths — speak of the spectacle in awe.

Informally dubbed Black Magic Canyon, the sculpted riverbed downstream of Magic Dam is dry and hikeable at certain times of year. And the most astonishing formations lie east and southeast of Kinzie Butte, in a remote section of sagebrush-and-lava desert that’s sometimes too muddy to access and always dangerous.

To see the spectacle — as I did in January — you absolutely must call ahead to the Big Wood Canal Co. in Shoshone, to ask about water releases from Magic Reservoir. Those incredible channel walls could become a death trap for any hiker caught in the riverbed when the dam opens.

five more acres per hour than a regular groomer, saving man hours and machine hours. Yet its fuel-efficient engine uses the same amount of fuel per acre — a good thing, as it consumes about 65 gallons during an eight-hour shift.

“It’s the next best thing to driving a spaceship,” says Ransom Bleyer, who works for Sun Valley’s mountain department. “These machines are pieces of art.”

Joining me for the evening is Doug Fisher, a Twin Falls man who sells farm equipment and is equally fascinated with Sun Valley’s groomers. He drove a snow cat for Sun Valley the winter of 1975-76 when Sun Valley groomed its mountain with old Tuckers — little more than four-wheel-drive trucks with tracks.

That was a low snow year, Fisher recalled, so groomers shoveled snow into “the boat” and spread it on the cat track so skiers could get off the mountain.

“It was a lot like driving farm equipment but on an incline,” he recalled. “They liked me because I skied here. They could tell me to go to such and such and I’d get there, while others would get lost. I loved driving the first cat in the morning because they loaded it with hot doughnuts to take up to the Lookout Restaurant. I’d help myself now and then to those \$3 doughnuts.”

• • •

As the eight groomers wait for the Sun Valley Ski Patrol to finish closing the mountain, Sun Valley’s grooming manager, Kerry O’Brien, lists an ever-expanding list of runs the resort wants groomed for Christmas visitors.

“We’re supposed to be getting 10 to 13 inches of new snow through this storm cycle. We’ll see probably 3 to 5 tonight, 3 to 5 tomorrow,” he says. “We’re going to try not to make snow through the holidays.”

Indeed, it has already started snowing outside; big flakes are piling up on the 8-plus feet of snow that has already fallen since November, making Sun Valley one of the best-covered ski resorts in North America.

My chauffeur for the evening, Jeff Dent, flips on the humongous 3-foot-long windshield wipers as we back the futuristic silver metallic Beast out of the garage behind Bald Mountain’s gondola.

We take our place behind four other groomers heading up Lower River Run, their lights barely visible through the falling snow.

“When the snow came

down all at once early in the season, it was a little hard to get around. Once it’s packed down it’s a lot easier,” Dent says.

We move uphill at 7 mph, the Beast’s 550-horsepower engine cranking like that of a semi-truck.

The steep incline forces me back in my seat, straining my neck. It feels strange to be heading uphill for someone used to skiing downhill. But it’s the norm for Dent.

He’s been grooming Sun Valley’s ski mountain since 1975, having come to Sun Valley from Seattle to ski in 1972 when he was 24 and leaving his construction job in 1973 to become an official Sun Valley ski bum.

He took the job as a groomer when he realized it was “the best job in the ski area,” affording him the opportunity to work from 4 p.m. to midnight and catch a little shut-eye before returning to the mountain in the morning to ski.

“I was here when Doug Fisher was here,” he says. “The cats were primitive then. And we actually groomed very little then compared to what we groom now. We couldn’t climb anything. We’d go down a run and up the cat track and go down again in big circles. The only run that got groomed every night was College.”

Now groomers always groom at least 20 runs; often they add a few extras, such as Can Can and Janss Pass in Frenchman’s Gulch.

• • •

The Beast lurches onto the Roundhouse Lane cat track. With a slight move of what resembles a video game joystick, Dent pivots the Beast and we head up the cat track to College.

The snow is blowing horizontally right into the windshield, coming down so hard that it’s difficult even for someone like myself, intimately familiar with the

mountain, to tell exactly where we are.

When the snow or fog is thick, Dent says, he positions his light on the corner of the Lookout Restaurant. Once there he trains it to the right searching for a pole on Warm Springs that will steer him in the right direction.

“Sometimes it feels like I’m doing this with my eyes closed,” he says.

He pauses. “All right, Karen, hold on and I’ll give you a really fun ride.”

Dent dips off the I-80 cat track at an angle and it feels as if we’re racing down Warm Springs, one of the steeper runs on the mountain. Only the seat belt keeps me from going through the Beast’s large picture window. But I feel quite comfortable in the cab, with its temperature set at 70 degrees.

Abruptly, Dent pivots the Beast and we head back uphill. We want to test how well we can climb given the new snow, he explains. If we start to slide, they’ll have to use a cat with a winch attached to a cable along Warm Springs Face to groom the run.

Dent has never had an accident. But another groomer was caught in a slide in the Bowls. Another time, a groomer caught fire.

“I’ve never gotten scared. But there are times I’ve paid attention,” he says. “Last year when we got a little rain in March and then it froze, that got interesting.”

At top it looks as if we’re going to plow right into the Lookout Restaurant. Then Dent pivots the Beast and we head down again, turning this time onto a cat track that leads to Race Arena. I feel as if we’re heading off the edge of the world momentarily as he points the Beast down into Race Arena and heads for what used to be the super pipe. Since Sun Valley filled it this summer, the groomers now call it “flat pipe.”

The snow hitting the

windshield looks like sparklers. Dent dims the lights for a moment so I can gaze upon the lights of Ketchum twinkling in the snow. On a clear night, Dent can see the lights of Hailey and Bellevue from the top of the mountain. Heck, he can even see the lights of Twin Falls in the distance.

“And we get some pretty nice sunsets up here, as well,” he adds, making me a little envious as the mountains typically block sunsets.

• • •

I can’t help but salivate as I eye the fresh corduroy. Dent says he doesn’t critique his work the next day.

“No matter how well you groom it, you can always find something that’s not quite perfect if you look hard enough,” he says.

But he pauses as he spots something that’s not perfectly manicured. “I am going to have to go back over that. I don’t want you stubbing your toe tomorrow.”

At 65, Dent recently got a new hip. But his doctor has cleared him to begin skiing again after the Christmas crowd leaves, and he can’t wait. The pain-free hip will also give him a chance to resume backpacking and bike riding come summer.

But he has no thoughts of retiring.

“Usually by May, I start thinking about skiing again — it makes me feel like Peter Pan,” he says. “And I can’t wait to come back and get to work. I want to be up here.”

Dent finishes Warm Springs after four hours and deposits me at the top of the gondola. I step down the tracks onto the snow below and weigh whether I should stop in at the historic Roundhouse for a quick bite to eat.

I’d like to finish out the full shift; it’s been a memorable evening with man and Beast. But, darn, I have too much work — and a house full of company — awaiting.

Mountain Goats Make Return to Central Oregon

BEND, Ore. (AP) • The mountain goat population appears to be growing on Central Oregon's Mount Jef-ferson, two years after Ore-gon and the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs re-turned the high-climbing animals to the peak.

A second release this summer helped increase the number of Rocky Mountain goats on and around the 10,495-foot volcano.

The *Bend Bulletin* re-ports the goats seem to be successfully breeding and caring for new young.

"That population definite-ly increased considerably this last year," said Steven George, district wildlife biologist with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife.

George said nanny goats typically produce twins when they are receiving good nutrients and are generally healthy, and aerial surveys show several pairs of kids.

Half of the mountain is on the Warm Springs Indi-an Reservation and the oth-er half lies within the Willamette National Forest.

The ODFW and the tribes in July 2010 released 45 mountain goats onto a flank of Mount Jefferson in a remote section of the 640,000-acre reservation.

In July, the state agency and the tribes released an addi-tional 24 goats, said Doug Calvin, program manager for wildlife, parks and en-forcement with the tribes.

Three mountain goats died shortly after the 2010 release — two in falls and one possibly in a cougar at-tack. Calvin said he be-lieves none of the goats re-leased this year have died.

There are no plans for more releases, he said. "We've got a pretty good start on the population," Calvin said.

Overhunting wiped out the goats in the 1850s. They were prized for their horns and hide but not their meat.

Oregon began a program to reintroduce mountain goats in the Willowa Moun-tains in Eastern Oregon, starting with five goats from northern Washington.

Eastern Oregon now boasts a strong mountain goat population, with about half of the 800 mountain goats statewide found in the Elkhorn Mountains near Baker City. ODFW and the tribes plucked goats from the Elkhorns for release onto Mount Jefferson.

A separate program 10 years ago succeeded in rein-troducing bighorn sheep to the Mutton Mountains.

Perihelion: An Annual Floating 'Holiday'

Here's an astronom-ical trivia ques-tion: On which national holiday is Earth closest to the sun? Probably the most fre-quently given (and incor-rect) answer is Indepen-dence Day.

It's not Earth's distance from the sun that makes hot weather in July; it's the tilt of its rotational axis. In sum-mer, the North Pole tilts to-ward the sun, causing sun-light to arrive from more nearly overhead, spreading out less on the ground. Plus, longer days give the sun more time to heat our hemisphere.

Earth's oblong (elliptical) orbit brings it closest to the sun around New Year's Day, but the exact date varies from year to year. Earth was at perihelion (closest point



to the sun) around 5 p.m. on Jan. 4 in 2012; in 2013 it will be around 10 p.m. on New Year's Day.

The other planets (mostly Jupiter) tug on Earth with their gravity, but not enough to change its orbital position by three days from one year to the next. The main cause for this varia-tion is the moon. Linked by their mutual gravitational attraction, Earth and the moon tumble through space like a lopsided dumbbell. Their common center of mass — the barycenter — lies about 1,100 miles be-neath Earth's surface. It's

the barycenter that follows a near-perfect elliptical path around the sun annually.

The Earth-moon system rotates around its barycen-ter 13.36 times per year. In some years Earth is on the sunward side of the barycenter at perihelion, and in other years it's not. This causes around a two-day variation in the date on which earth is closest to the sun. The quadrennial addi-tion of a leap day expands the range of possible peri-helion dates to just over three days, from late on Jan. 1 to early on Jan. 5.

Polar Bear Trade, Hunting Spark Controversy

WASHINGTON • The polar bear was a mile away and be-gan running toward the dog sled, quickly closing the dis-tance on the frozen Arctic waters of Canada's Resolute Bay. One of Mark Beeler's Inuit guides released two dogs to distract it while Beel-er, a skilled bow hunter, quickly shot three arrows, piercing the animal's heart and lungs.

"You're thinking, I can't believe I paid this much money to be this close to a dangerous bear!" said Beeler, who was less than 15 yards from the nearly 10-foot-tall adult male when it came down.

The guides skinned the bear on site, quartered the meat to bring back to their village and gave the bear's fat and intestines to the dogs as a reward. Beeler remembers the experience as if it were yesterday. But it was four and a half years ago, and his polar bear trophy is stuck in Canada, blocked from im-port into the United States because a month after Beel-er's hunt, the Interior De-partment listed the polar bear as "threatened" under the Endangered Species Act.

While Beeler had filed im-mediately for an import per-mit, the bear he shot — its wet-tanned hide, bleached skull, claws and penis bone — remains in cold storage at an exporter in Calgary, at the cost of about \$200 a year.

It is one of 41 pelts taken by American hunters in the spring of 2008 and still stored in Canada. Both U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service of-ficials and many lawmakers support letting them in, though legislation allowing their one-time import is stalled in the Senate.

At the same time, U.S. of-

ficials are pressing for a ban on the global commercial trade in polar bear parts. The proposal — which will come up for a vote in March when the Convention on Interna-tional Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) convenes in Bangkok — has divided polar bear advocates and pits the United States against Canada.

There are between 20,000 to 25,000 polar bears living in the wild in Canada, the United States, Russia, Den-mark and Norway, according to the most recent analysis, which was conducted in the early 1990s. Scientists pre-dict these numbers will drop sharply within a few decades as summer sea ice shrinks. Of those nations, only Cana-da allows sport hunting.

About 800 bears are killed each year in subsistence hunting: Roughly 400 to 500 of them are exported annually for sale, most of them from Canada.

Polar bears currently can be traded as long as the ex-ported country certifies the existing harvest is sustain-able; the United States is trying for the second time to prohibit the commercial trade altogether.

"Can you have a sustain-able harvest of a population when the best available sci-ence says that they will suffer a 66 percent decline by the middle of the century?" Fish and Wildlife Service Director Daniel Ashe said in an inter-view. He said that protecting the reproducing adults will help buffer against future cli-mate impacts. "What we're trying to do is to get ahead of the curve in this case rather than waiting until the polar bear is on the verge of extinc-tion before addressing these other factors."

But some environmental-ists such as Sybille Klenzen-dorf, who directs the species

conservation program for the World Wildlife Fund in the United States, said inter-national policymakers can help the bears more by fo-cusing on curbing climate change and offshore drilling in the Arctic.

"We really want to address the threats that are most ur-gent to save the species," Klenzendorf said. "The ban on international trade is not at the top of that list."

Still, there is no question the global trade of polar bears is increasing, fueled by demand from China and Russia. The number of polar hides offered at auction has risen from 60 in 2010 to 225 in 2012, according to the ad-vocacy group Natural Re-sources Defense Council (NRDC), while the average sales price rose from \$2,186 to \$5,211 during that period.

This rise in demand is spurring poaching in Russia, though authorities lack pre-cise numbers.

Andrew Derocher, a Uni-versity of Alberta biological sciences professor and polar bear expert, said the ques-tion of whether to ban the polar bear commercial trade is challenging.

Hunting quotas in Canada are set by territorial and provincial officials rather than federal ones, and li-censes are reserved for abo-riginal Canadians, though they can sell the licenses and bear parts to others. Hunting quotas have risen recently:

AN ORDINANCE DELETING SECTION 8.16.060 OF THE SHOSHONE CITY CODE; ADOPTING NEW LANGUAGE FOR "UNLAWFUL BURNING" AS NEW SECTION 8.16.060 OF THE SHOSHONE CITY CODE; OUTLINING PROHIBITED ACTS; REQUIRING A PERMIT FOR OUTDOOR BURNING; PROVIDING FOR TIMES FOR OPEN BURNING; PROVIDING FOR EXCEPTIONS TO PERMIT REQUIREMENT; SETTING A PENALTY SCHEDULE; AND SETTING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Whereas, the City of Shoshone is now within the Shoshone City & Rural Fire Protection District;

Whereas, uniformity throughout the Shoshone City & Rural Fire Protection District is important to the quick and efficient combating of fire;

Whereas, the City of Shoshone has not before required a permit for open burning within the City limits;

Whereas, open burning, without inspection and approval of a fire department official, presents the possibility of loss of life and/or destruction of property within the densely-populated and close-set buildings, of the City of Shoshone; and,

Whereas, to protect the public safety, health, and welfare of the people and buildings of Shoshone,

Be It Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Shoshone, that:

Unlawful Burning: It shall be unlawful for any person to suffer, cause, or permit any open burning within the City of Shoshone except as allowed by a permit issued by the Shoshone City & Rural Fire Protection District. Fire-burning permits are not required for open fires used for the preparation of food. Fires for recreational purposes must be under the control of a responsible person and enclosed in a manner, form, and place, as approved by the Shoshone City & Rural Fire Protection District.

Permit shall be issued by the Shoshone City & Rural Fire Protection District if the proposed burning is in compliance with the Idaho Department of Health & Welfare regulations for air pollution, the International Fire Code, and will not endanger life and/or property.

Open burning (with a permit) shall be allowed only from the hours of 6 am to 5pm.

Penalties. The penalties for violating this ordinance are increased with the frequency and time-period. A violation of this ordinance shall be an infraction and punished as shown in the fine-schedule below:

First offense \$50.00

Second offense within 12 months of the first offense \$75.00

Each subsequent offense within 12 months of the first offense \$100.00

Each offense for which a person is found in violation shall include, In addition to the fine listed above, any and all applicable court costs.

ORDINANCE NO. 3042

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, AMENDING DEFINITIONS, AMENDING THE REQUIREMENTS FOR PERMITS, REQUIRING APPLICATIONS TO THE TWIN FALLS FIRE DEPARTMENT, MODIFYING AUTHORIZED DATES OF SALE AND HOURS OF USE, REGULATING SHORT-TERM STORAGE OF FIREWORKS, REQUIRING COMPLIANCE WITH THE STATE FIREWORKS ACT, PROVIDING FOR CONFISCATION OF ILLEGAL FIREWORKS BY THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR POSSESSION AND USE OF FIREWORKS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO:

Section 1: That Twin Falls City Code §6-9-2 providing for Definitions is repealed, and replaced with the following New §6-9-2 as follows:

"6-9-2: DEFINITIONS:

FIREWORKS:

Any combustible or explosive composition, or any substance or combination of substances, or article prepared for the purpose of producing a visible or audible effect by combustion, explosion, deflagration or detonation. Fireworks include items classified as common or special fireworks by the United States bureau of explosives or contained in the regulations of the United States department of transportation and designated as UN 0335 1.3G or UN 0336 1.4G. The term "fireworks" shall not include any automotive safety flares, toy guns, toy cannons, caps or other items designed for use with toy guns or toy cannons, party poppers, or other devices which contain twenty-five hundredths (.25) of a grain or less of explosive substance.

Fireworks shall not include model rockets and model rocket engines and their components which are designed, sold and used for the purpose of propelling recoverable aero models.

Fireworks shall not include flares, noisemakers or signals designed and used for the purpose of protecting the public.

DANGEROUS FIREWORKS: Includes any of the following:

- (A) Skyrockets and bottle rockets, including all similar devices employing any combustible or explosive material which rise in the air during discharge;
- (B) Roman candles and similar devices, including cakes, repeaters and multiple tube devices loaded in such a way as to propel pyrotechnic effects into the air;
- (C) Aerial display shells containing pyrotechnic effects or salutes producing displays or reports in the sky generally fired or propelled from a cylindrical or spherical shell casing;
- (D) Snakes or other effects which are ignited or burn containing bichloride of mercury;
- (E) Sparklers more than ten inches (10") in length or one-quarter inch (1/4") in diameter;
- (F) Sky Lanterns, Fire balloons or balloons of any type which have burning material of any kind attached thereto or which require fire underneath to propel them.

SAFE AND SANE FIREWORKS: Includes any of the following "nonaerial" common fireworks:

- (A) Any fireworks such as ground spinners, fountains, sparklers, smoke devices or snakes designed to remain on or near the ground and not to travel outside a fifteen (15) foot diameter circle or emit sparks or other burning material which land outside a twenty (20) foot diameter circle or above a height of twenty (20) feet. Nonaerial common fireworks do not include firecrackers, jumping jacks, or similar products;
- (B) Cylindrical fountains with inside tube diameter not exceeding three-fourths inch (3/4");
- (C) Sparklers and "dipped sticks" not more than ten inches (10") in length or one-fourth inch (1/4") in diameter with pyrotechnic composition not exceeding four grams (4g) each. Sparklers or "dipped sticks" described in this section shall be burned individually and shall not be conjoined, banded, attached or affixed to additional sparklers or "dipped sticks" while ignited;
- (D) Snakes which do not contain bichloride of mercury;
- (E) Whistles, without report and which do not dart or travel above the ground during discharge containing no picric or gallic acid."

Section 2: That Twin Falls City Code 6-9-3 is amended as follows:

"6-9-3: PERMITS:

- (A) Dangerous Fireworks Permit: It shall be unlawful for any person in the city to import, export, offer for sale, sell, possess, keep or store or permit the keeping or storing of any dangerous fireworks for any use or purpose, except that a person holding a dangerous fireworks permit issued pursuant to the terms and conditions of this chapter may use dangerous fireworks for a safely supervised and conducted public display of fireworks. Said fireworks may be stored for a period not exceeding ten (10) days immediately preceding the date of said public display, provided the fireworks are to be used exclusively for the public display.
- (B) Safe And Sane Fireworks Permit: No person, without having a valid safe and sane fireworks permit issued pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth in this chapter, shall import, export, offer for sale, sell, possess, keep or store, or permit the keeping or storing of any safe and sane fireworks for any use or purpose sell, or offer for sale any fireworks. Safe and sane fireworks may be stored for the entire calendar year if a current, valid permit for that calendar year has been obtained by applicant and all other conditions of this chapter have been met. A short-term storage facility as defined by Idaho Code 39-2608 (2) may be used for the storage of safe and sane fireworks for a period of sixty (60) days prior to, and fifteen (15) days after, any authorized dates of sale provided within this chapter."

Section 3: That Twin Falls City Code 6-9-4 is amended as follows:

"6-9-4: APPLICATION FOR PERMITS:

- (A) Safe and Sane Fireworks Application: Any reputable person in reasonable pursuit or furtherance of any legitimate personal, business or charitable purpose, desiring to engage in the sale of safe and sane fireworks within the city shall first make written application to the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department, for a safe and sane fireworks permit. Each applicant shall pay to the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department, a fee of ~~one hundred twenty five dollars (\$100.00)~~ (\$25.00) at the time the application is filed. The applicant shall pay to the Twin Falls Fire Department a fee of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) for inspection of temporary fireworks stands.
- (B) Dangerous Fireworks Application: Any reputable person in reasonable pursuit or furtherance of any legitimate personal business or charitable purpose desiring to make a public display of dangerous fireworks shall first make written application to the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department, for a dangerous fireworks permit. Each applicant shall pay to the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department, a fee of one hundred ~~twenty five dollars (\$100.00)~~ (\$125.00) at the time the application is filed. No permit fee shall be refunded. The applicant shall also reimburse the city for all reasonable expenses incurred in investigating to determine whether the permit should be granted."

Section 4: That Twin Falls City Code 6-9-5 is amended as follows:

"6-9-5: REQUIREMENTS FOR APPLICATION FOR PERMITS:

Each applicant for a safe and sane fireworks permit or a dangerous fireworks permit shall file his application with the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department. Each application shall show the following:

- (A) Name and address of applicant.
- (B) The purpose for which the applicant is primarily existing and for which it was organized.
- (C) The names and addresses of the officers, trustees and/or directors, if any, of the applicant.
- (D) The location where the applicant requests permission to sell safe and sane fireworks or display dangerous fireworks.
- (E) When and where the applicant was organized and established, or, if a natural person, the applicant's age.
- (F) The location of the applicant's principal and permanent meeting place or places.
- (G) If applicant is storing safe and sane or dangerous fireworks, applicant must apply to the planning and zoning administrator, and the planning and zoning administrator must forward written approval and the special use permit (if required) to the fire department, and building department, indicating that the permit request is in compliance with all zoning requirements for an H-1 occupancy pursuant to title 10 of this code. The written approval and special use permit (if required) must be submitted to the fire department, and building department prior to approval of the fireworks permit. ~~The fire department shall issue to the applicant the fireworks and special use permit (if required) simultaneously.~~
- (H) Two (2) complete plot plans, indicating where the building is located in relationship to property lines and any other buildings, and two (2) complete floor plans of the building, indicating all proposed uses, must be submitted to the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department. The drawings shall be to scale.
- (I) The maximum amount of safe and sane fireworks to be stored shall be indicated on the application. Such amount shall be specified in pounds.
- (J) The applicant's state sales tax permit number.
- (K) If the applicant is an entity other than sole proprietorship, the name and general description of the business activities of each parent or subsidiary company, business or entity, and a general description of the ownership organization of each parent or subsidiary, if any.
- (L) Such other information as the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department, may require on a standard form submitted to all applicants and which is reasonably necessary to protect the public health, safety and welfare."

Section 5: That Twin Falls City Code §6-9-6 is amended as follows:

"6-9-6: PERMIT CONDITIONS:

- (A) Investigation and Recommendation For Permits: The public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department, ~~shall~~ may cause an investigation to be made of each application and applicant.
- (B) Grant Or Denial Of Permits: The public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department, shall have the power in its discretion to grant or deny any application, subject to such reasonable conditions, if any, as it shall prescribe so long as the denial of the application or any conditions imposed on the granting of the application are reasonably necessary for protection of the public health, safety and welfare.
- (C) Terms of Permits: A safe and sane fireworks permit or a dangerous fireworks permit, issued pursuant to this chapter, shall be valid only within the calendar year in which issued. A permit shall be valid only for the specific premises or location designated in the permit. However, subject to reasonable conditions necessary for protection of the public health, safety and welfare, an applicant may be granted permits for more than one premises or location within the city. No permit shall be transferable or assignable.
- (D) Time of Application For Safe And Sane Fireworks Permit: Each application for a permit to sell safe and sane fireworks at retail shall be filed with the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department, ~~on or before June 1 of the calendar year for which the permit is sought~~ a minimum of thirty (30) days prior to a date on which the retail sale of safe and sane fireworks is authorized under this chapter.

- (E) Appeal of The Public Safety Department, Fire Inspection Division Twin Falls Fire Department, Decision: If the applicant is aggrieved by the decision of the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department, the applicant may appeal such decision to the board of appeals of the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department Administration, within seven (7) days of notice of the decision of the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department. The applicant must, in writing, appeal to the board of appeals of the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department Administration, and set forth the reasons therefore why the applicant should not be denied a license. ~~The board of appeals of the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department Administration~~, shall set the time and place for a hearing a reasonable period of time subsequent to applicant's written notice of appeal. Notice of such hearing shall be personally served upon the applicant, or mailed postage prepaid to the applicant at his/her last known address, at least three (3) days prior to the date of the hearing. The order of the board of appeals of the public safety department, fire inspection division Twin Falls Fire Department Administration, shall be final.

- (F) Miscellaneous Permit Conditions For The Storage Of Safe And Sane And Dangerous Fireworks:

- 1. Minimum occupancy separation shall be required pursuant to the international building code.
- 2. Exits shall comply with the international building code.
- 3. Portable fire extinguishers shall be installed in the building as required by the international fire code.
- 4. Automatic fire extinguisher systems shall be in accordance with the international building code.
- 5. License or permit holders shall maintain records of all transactions involving safe and sane fireworks regarding the sale and acquisition of such fireworks.
- 6. Conspicuous signs shall be placed and posted at intervals not less than fifty feet (50') inside and outside of the building with the language:
Warning - No Smoking
- 7. All provisions as currently adopted by the city pursuant to the international building code and international fire code shall be required."

Section 6: That Twin Falls City Code §6-9-8 is amended as follows:

"6-9-8: DATES FOR SALE AUTHORIZED DATES OF SALE AND HOURS OF USE:

~~Nonaerial common fireworks~~ Safe and Sane, "nonaerial common fireworks" may be sold at retail beginning at twelve o'clock (12:00) midnight June 23, and ending at twelve o'clock (12:00) midnight July 5 and beginning at twelve o'clock (12:00) midnight December 26 and ending at twelve o'clock (12:00) midnight January 1. The authority having jurisdiction may at its discretion extend each period of sales by not more than five (5) days. Safe and Sane, "nonaerial common fireworks" shall only be used or discharged within the City of Twin Falls between the hours of eight o'clock (08:00) A.M. and twelve o'clock (12:00) midnight June 23 through July 5 and December 26 through January 1.

Exception: In addition to the hours of use specified in this chapter, Safe and Sane, "nonaerial common fireworks" may be used or discharged within the City of Twin Falls between the hours of twelve o'clock (12:00) midnight and one o'clock (01:00) A.M. on January 1."

Section 7: That Twin Falls City Code 6-9-9 is amended as follows:

"6-9-9: REGULATIONS FOR FIREWORKS STANDS:

Temporary fireworks stands from which safe and sane fireworks are to be sold shall be subject to the following provisions:

- (A) All retail sales of safe and sane fireworks shall be permitted only from within a temporary fireworks stand, and the sale from any other building or structure is hereby prohibited.
- (B) The stand in which the fireworks will be stored or sold shall not be located within twenty five feet (25') of any other building or within one hundred feet (100') of any gasoline station or flammable liquid dispensing device or installation.
- (C) All such stands shall meet the requirements of the building code of the city and all lighting circuits and other electrical equipment shall meet the requirements of the electrical code of the city.
- (D) The stand shall have exit doors at least thirty inches (30") wide at both ends of the structures and one additional door for each twenty five feet (25') of rear wall in excess of twenty five feet (25'). All doors shall open outward from the stand and all doorways shall be kept free and clear from all supplies and materials at all times.
- (E) Each stand shall be provided with a minimum of two (2) ~~2 1/2 gallon water type~~ fire extinguishers with a 2A minimum rating, in good working order and easily accessible for use in case of fire, which shall be kept in immediate proximity to the location where the fireworks are retailed.
- (F) There shall be at least one supervisor, twenty one (21) years of age or older, on duty at all times. All fireworks shall be effectively kept away from any kind of self-service by the public, and shall be placed in a location which is unavailable and inaccessible to members of the public in capacities other than as legal customers.
- (G) No person employed as a watchman shall be permitted to remain inside of any stand when it is not open for business.
- (H) "NO SMOKING" signs shall be prominently displayed both inside and outside the stand. No smoking shall be permitted within the stand or within twenty five feet (25') of the stand.
- (I) No temporary stand shall be erected before June 10 of any year. The premises on which the stand is erected shall be cleared of all structures and debris not later than twelve o'clock (12:00) noon on July 27.
- (J) No fireworks shall be discharged in or within twenty five feet (25') of any fireworks stand.
- (K) No person shall allow any rubbish to accumulate in or around any fireworks stand or permit a fire nuisance to exist.
- (L) ~~No fireworks shall remain unattended at any time regardless of whether the fireworks stand is open for business or not. If any fireworks are stored, they shall only be stored at such places as are approved for storage of fireworks by the director of public safety of the city, or his representative.~~ Fireworks shall not be left in the stand when it is not open for business unless the stand is locked or secured. If fireworks are not stored in the stand they shall be stored in compliance with section 39-2608, Idaho Code.

(M) No stand shall have a floor area in excess of seven hundred fifty (750) square feet."

Section 8: That Twin Falls City Code 6-9-11 is repealed and replaced by a New 6-9-11 as follows:

"6-9-11: SHORT-TERM STORAGE.

A short-term storage facility may be used for the storage of Safe and Sane, "non-aerial common fireworks" for a period of sixty (60) days prior to, and fifteen (15) days after, any authorized retail sales date. The Twin Falls Fire Department shall be notified of the address or location of all short-term storage facilities when fireworks will not be stored in a temporary fireworks stand. If the short-term storage facility is not within the boundaries of the jurisdiction having issued the retail sales permit the permittee shall notify the authority having jurisdiction where the storage is to take place.

Short-term storage is allowed in any of the following, provided it is locked or otherwise secured: a temporary fireworks stand, truck, trailer, or other vehicle. A truck, trailer or other vehicle used for short-term storage must remain at least twenty-five (25) feet from the stand during any time the stand is open for business, but may abut the stand when it is closed. A truck, trailer or vehicle used for short-term storage must be at least twenty-five (25) feet from any other inhabited building. Short-term storage may occur in a locked or secured shed, garage, barn or other building or storage container which is detached from an inhabited building and contains no open flames, including heating and lighting sources. ~~The Twin Falls Fire Department may, in its discretion, allow short-term storage to occur in an attached garage with a one (1) hour fire wall separating the garage from any inhabited area."~~

Section 9: That Twin Falls City Code 6-9-10 is amended as follows:

"6-9-12: DUTY TO COMPLY:

It shall be the duty of every person issued a fireworks permit to comply with all the provisions of the ~~Idaho state fireworks act~~ Idaho State Fireworks Act of 1997 and this chapter. The conviction of violation of the aforesaid Idaho state fireworks act or any of the provisions of this chapter by the permittee, or by any of its agents, employees or officers shall constitute a cause, in and of itself, to deny any subsequent application for a permit.

Section 10: That Twin Falls City Code §6-9-13 is amended as follows:

"6-9-13: REVOCATION OF PERMITS:

Any permit issued hereunder shall be subject to revocation by the ~~city council~~ City Council for violation by the holder, his agents or employees, of any of the provisions contained herein or of any law of the state of Idaho or United States pertaining to fireworks, provided that at least one day notice of hearing upon said revocation shall be given to said holder by personal service or by leaving a copy of notice at the place of business of the holder."

Section 11: That Twin Falls City Code §6-9-14 is amended as follows:

"6-9-14: CONFISCATION OF ILLEGAL FIREWORKS:

~~The director of public safety~~ Chief of Police, or his agents, or employees, may confiscate any fireworks that are imported, exported, sold, offered for sale, given away, possessed, stored, displayed, or discharged in a manner violating any provision of this chapter."

Section 12: That Twin Falls City Code §6-9-15 is amended as follows:

"6-9-15: PENALTY:

The possession or discharge of dangerous fireworks without a dangerous fireworks permit shall be an infraction punishable by a fine of one hundred dollars (\$100.00). The use or discharge of safe and sane fireworks outside the designated dates of sale and hours of use specified within this chapter shall be an infraction punishable by a fine of one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

All other violations of this chapter shall be a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of up to three hundred dollars (\$300.00) and imprisonment for a period of time not to exceed six (6) months, or both."

Section 13: That this ordinance shall be effective upon passage and publication.

Today is Thursday, Dec. 27, the 362nd day of 2012. There are four days left in the year.

Today's Highlight:
On Dec. 27, 1932, New York City's Radio City Music Hall opened to the public in midtown Manhattan. (Opening night, consisting of several hours of live acts, was considered a disaster, prompting the owners to shift to a format of showing a movie followed by a stage show.)

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1512, King Ferdinand II issued the original Laws of Burgos, which were intended to regulate the treatment of indigenous people on Hispaniola by Spanish settlers.

In 1822, scientist Louis Pasteur was born in Dole, France.

In 1831, naturalist Charles Darwin set out on a round-the-world voyage aboard the HMS Beagle.

In 1904, James Barrie's play "Peter Pan: The Boy Who Wouldn't Grow Up" opened at the Duke of York's Theater in London.

In 1927, the musical play "Show Boat," with music by Jerome Kern and libretto by Oscar Hammerstein II, opened at the Ziegfeld Theater in New York.

In 1945, 28 nations signed an agreement creating the World Bank.

In 1947, the original version of the puppet character Howdy Doody made its TV debut on NBC's "Puppet Playhouse."

In 1949, Queen Juliana of the Netherlands signed an act recognizing Indonesia's sovereignty after more than three centuries of Dutch rule.

In 1968, Apollo 8 and its three astronauts made a safe, nighttime splashdown in the Pacific.

In 1970, the musical play "Hello, Dolly!" closed on Broadway after a run of 2,844 performances.

In 1979, Soviet forces seized control of Afghanistan. President Hafizullah Amin, who was overthrown and executed, was replaced by Babrak Karmal.

In 1985, Palestinian guerrillas opened fire inside the Rome and Vienna airports; 19 victims were killed, plus four attackers who were slain by police and security personnel. American naturalist Dian Fossey, 53, who had studied gorillas in the wild in Rwanda, was found hacked to death.

Ten years ago: A defiant North Korea ordered U.N. nuclear inspectors to leave the country and said it would restart a laboratory capable of producing plutonium for nuclear weapons. But the U.N. nuclear watchdog said its inspectors were "staying put" for the time being. A suicide truck-bomb attack destroyed the headquarters of Chechnya's Moscow-backed government, killing 72 people. Clonaid, a company founded by a religious sect that believes in space aliens, announced it had produced the world's first cloned baby, a claim subsequently dismissed by scientists for lack of proof. Oscar-winning director George Roy Hill died in New York at age 81.

Five years ago: Opposition leader Benazir Bhutto was assassinated during a suicide bomb attack in Pakistan following a campaign rally. Kenya held an election pitting incumbent president Mwai Kibaki against opposition candidate Raila Odinga; both candidates ended up claiming victory in a vote that observers said was seriously flawed. (Kenya was racked by weeks of ethnic violence; Kibaki and Odinga ended up forming a coalition government.)

One year ago: Tens of thousands of defiant Syrian protesters thronged the streets of Homs, calling for the execution of President Bashar Assad shortly after his army pulled its tanks back and allowed Arab League monitors in for the first time to the city at the heart of the anti-government uprising. Sen. Ben Nelson of Nebraska, a conservative Democrat, said he would retire from the Senate rather than seek a third term. Abstract expressionist painter Helen Frankenthaler, 83, known for her bold, lyrical use of color, died in Darien, Conn.
