House Schedules Relief Vote

WASHINGTON (AP)

• Under intense pressure from angry Republicans, House Speaker John Boehner agreed Wednesday to a vote this week on aid for Superstorm Sandy recovery.

The speaker will schedule a vote Friday for \$9 billion for the national flood insurance program and another on Jan. 15 for a remaining \$51 billion in the package, Republican Rep. Peter King of New York said after emerging from a meeting with Boehner and GOP lawmakers from New York and New Jersey. The votes will be taken by the new Congress that will be sworn in today.

Since the votes will be taken in the new Congress, the Senate also will have to approve the legislation. If the House, as expected, approves the \$9 billion flood insurance proposal, the Senate plans to move quickly in hopes of approving the aid on a voice vote Friday. The flood insurance money will help pay for claims by home and business owners with coverage.

Boehner's decision Tuesday night to cancel an expected vote on Sandy aid before Congress ended its session provoked a firestorm of criticism from New York, New Jersey and adjacent states where the money will go, including many lawmakers in his own party.

Red Cross Was One of First Responders in Wake of Hurricane, Deploying Volunteers from Across Nation

TWIN FALLS • If it were any other storm, the debris on the front yard wouldn't have caught Roger Hinton's attention.

He worked for the American Red Cross of Greater Idaho; he had responded to emergency situations before.

However, this wasn't your typical wreckage. The effects of Hurricane

Sandy left trees uprooted, siding peeled off homes and cars overturned and abandoned. Hinton was one of the thousands of Red Cross responders providing relief aid just weeks after the hurricane left its disastrous trail across the East Coast.

"There was this one car teetering on a slab of cement right by a house," he said. "It was kind of unreal."

On Oct. 29, Hurricane Sandy slammed the East Coast with winds of 80 mph and high tides much higher

than normal. Streets and subways flooded and millions of people were without electricity for days. Early estimates of Sandy's damage range from \$20 billion to \$60 billion.

The Red Cross was one of the first responders on the scene of the hurricane and immediately began deploying volunteers from across the nation to help with the effort. As of mid-December, the Red Cross had sent more than 15,300 trained disaster workers to provide

Report: Spark of Home Explosion Still Unclear

Oily rags possibly contributed to fire at legislator's home; cause officially undetermined.

BURLEY • A report released by the state fire marshal Wednesday concludes that oily rags at Rep. Fred Wood's home possibly could have self-ignited and caused a Sept. 29 explosion.

But investigators settled on no single cause for the incident, which injured Wood's wife, Amy, and damaged their house.

According to the report, the cause of the fire will be considered "undetermined" unless new or different evidence is discovered.

Amy Wood received second-degree burns during the fire that occurred in a gun vault room in the basement of the couple's southeast Burley home.

According to the report, the explosion lifted a 4-inch concrete ceiling up about 3 inches and outwards about an inch, enough to "see exterior daylight," above the 11- by 16-foot

Investors Buy Vacant Old Towne Building

The building's doors have been closed since Pandora's exited in September 2010.

TWIN FALLS • An Old Towne flour warehouse, renovated in the 1990s as a trendy brewpub, could again become a restaurant.

Twin Falls attorney Jeff Hepworth and his two partners in the new Downtown Renaissance LLC purchased the former Muggers Brewpub building at 516 Hansen St. S. in December, after a 2011 foreclosure and a June sheriff's sale put the building on the market.

One of his Downtown Renaissance partners is Jeff Williams of Twin Falls, Glanbia

Foods' CEO. The other is Hepworth's brother, J. Charles Hepworth of Boise. The three formed their new LLC in October, according to a document filed with the Idaho Secretary of State.

Jeff Hepworth predicted Wednesday that the new owners will secure a restaurant tenant before the end of 2013.

"I love the building. And I really hope that we can get someone in there. And I fully anticipate that they'll be successful because it's such a unique property, such a great atmosphere," Jeff Hepworth said.

Since 1996, three restaurants came and went in the 1916 building, unable to consistently draw enough business to sustain its high costs. Vacancies followed each departure. Once listed at \$1.1 million and later

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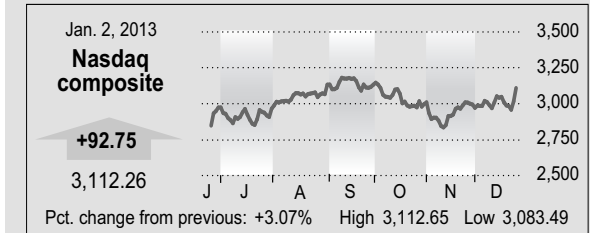
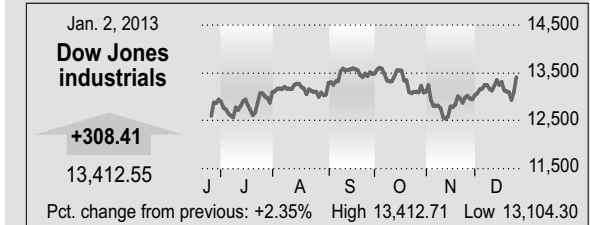

‘Cliff’ Deal Sends Stocks Up, but Problems Lurk

NEW YORK (AP) • The “fiscal cliff” compromise, even with all its chaos, controversy and unresolved questions, was enough to send the stock market shooting higher Wednesday, the first trading day of the new year.

The Dow briefly surged as much as 273 points in early trading. At mid-afternoon, it was up 219 points, or 1.7 percent, to 13,323.

The Standard & Poor’s 500 was up 24, or 1.7 percent, to 1,450. The Nasdaq composite was up 68, or 2.3 percent, to 3,088.

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Hidden History

No One Injured in Car, Plane Collision

TWIN FALLS • Mrs. Clarence Smith knew the airplane was in trouble when she saw it, so she kept her eyes on its lights until it passed overhead.

That night in 1955, the Smith family was on its way from their home in Twin Falls to a Christmas party in Jerome. As they crossed the Perrine Memorial Bridge in their Chevrolet station wagon, they spotted the lights of a plane coming at them, barely 500 feet off the ground.

Above them, U.S. Air Force Lt. Clyde Seller was preparing to make an emergency landing on Highway 93.

Seller was flying a T33 Air Force jet from Williams Air Force Base in Arizona to Mountain Home when his instruments failed at 40,000 feet. Unable to see lights at the Twin Falls Municipal Airport, Seller looked for another place to land.

He circled his jet three times over Highway 93 north of Twin Falls before deciding to bring it down on the highway. The Smith family spotted the plane southbound on its third pass.

Seller turned and made a northbound landing on the two-lane highway north of the bridge. According to news reports, Seller flew the jet under high-powered electric lines before touching the ground.

The 100-mph landing would have been perfect, if it hadn't been for the 40-mph station wagon in the road.

Mrs. Smith knew almost immediately



what had hit them.

“There was a flash of light, an explosion like a bomb,” Mrs. Smith told the *Times-News* after the wreck. “The car rocked violently but while things made by man were demolished, things made by God remained intact.”

Sellers tried to brake the plane. Smith — unaware of the aircraft behind him — wasn't in a big hurry.

When a crash was imminent, Seller tried to get airborne again, but he clipped the top of the car with a wing as he took off. The car lost its roof and rear left door, and the plane lost a wing tank.

No one in the wreck suffered serious injuries.

The photos that accompany this story were taken by KLIX-TV (Channel 11) film director Vic Graybeal a few months after

the station went on the air. The new television station — a sister station to KLIX radio — was the first in Twin Falls. The KLIX stations were split in 1957, when Utah businessman Abe Glasmann bought the pair, then sold off the radio station. The television station then became KMTV — for Magic Valley Television.

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Weather in a Word: COLD

It's cold and it will remain cold as we close out the week and head into the weekend. The reason for all these cold temperatures is something called an inversion. Normally, as you increase in altitude, the air temperature gets colder. But with an inversion, there is a thin layer of atmosphere where the air temperatures stays the same or gets warmer as you go higher. You can feel these sometimes when you go skiing. The base of the mountain can feel colder than the top or middle of the mountain thanks to one of these temperature inversions.

With mostly clear skies during the evening, snow on the ground, and this inversion above us, the cold air is trapped and will be with us into the weekend. Temperatures at night will fall to near zero or even sub-zero. There will also be wind chill near

10 below.

Highs today through Friday will be from the upper teens to the low 20s. Although very cold, there is little in the way of snow in the forecast for the next several days. With the inversion holding on through the weekend there could be times of fog and even a few light snow showers from time to time. This won't amount to too much.

As for any big snow makers, we don't see any for the next several days.

House Fires Displace Magic Valley Residents

TWIN FALLS • Some Magic Valley residents entered 2013 not with a bang but with spark.

Fire officials across south-central Idaho responded to three house fires, two of which temporarily displaced residents and prompted assistance from local agencies.

On Tuesday, the Twin Falls City Fire Department responded at about 8:45 p.m. to a house fire just outside the city limits at 3263 E. 3225 N.

The fire started after a blanket fell onto a light bulb used to heat a water line in the garage, said Battalion Chief Brian Cunningham.

The fire caused an estimated \$200 in content loss and about the same in property damage, Cunningham said.

The following day, three engines and a battalion chief engine responded to another house fire at 719 3rd Avenue North in Twin Falls, Cunningham said.

The fire started near an overloaded electrical plug, climbed up the walls and extended into the attic, he said.

“There were several things plugged into the same outlet, two of which are space heaters, and it overheated the electrical service all together,” Cunningham said. “The home wasn’t designed for that much load.”

While no one was hurt,

five people, two cats and nine dogs — including a new litter — were unable to return to their home. The American Red Cross of Greater Idaho responded to the fire to assist the family with shelter and funding for food.

The Burley Fire Department responded to a fire smoldering in an attic around 1:40 p.m. Tuesday, said Fire Capt. Ryan Taylor.

Two engines were on scene for close to two hours, Taylor said. The fire caused an estimated \$600 in damages.

“The house had some insulation in the attic from shorted-out wires,” he said. “We had to make a hole and start pulling out the smoldering insulation from the roof.”

Red Cross volunteers also responded to the Burley fire, according to a news release.

The house fires continued into Wednesday night when a call came in at 4:54 p.m. for a fire underneath a Twin Falls house.

City spokesman Josh Palmer said three fire engines were on scene at the 100 block of Carney Street.

The extent of the damage was not immediately clear Wednesday evening. Everyone was out of the house when firefighters arrived. The caller reported a male subject was defrosting pipes earlier in the day, but a cause of the fire was not available by press time.

sold for close to \$650,000, the brewpub was sold at public auction in June to creditor Bank of the West for \$366,000.

Hepworth declined to say how much the latest buyers paid.

The 1990s restoration left some brick walls exposed and employed a good deal of dark wood, for a classy but comfortable pub setting. Sun Valley’s Scott Featherstone of Trail Creek Brewing Co. operated the second microbrewery there before leasing the space to Pandora’s Restaurant. The doors have been closed since Pandora’s exited in September 2010.

Hepworth — whose law firm is in the renovated former Gem State Paper & Supply warehouse across the street — said he and his Downtown Renaissance partners made a purchase offer on the Muggers building in September, when a potential call center was seeking a Twin Falls location. After making the offer, they learned the call center would go to another city, he said.

Downtown Renaissance had an option to back out but decided to move forward anyway.

Why? “We love the building,” Hepworth said.

But the partners waited until the judicial foreclosure’s right-of-redemption period expired in December before closing the deal.

California-based Bank of the West filed its quitclaim deed with Twin Falls County on Dec. 11.

“We’re searching for tenants as we speak. We’ve had some very meaningful discussions from some restaurant operators,” Hepworth said Wednesday, adding that Downtown Renaissance has been contacted by three parties. “One or two are probably not good leads; one of them is a real solid lead.”

The partners prefer to find a tenant rather than sell.

“A restaurant operator would be much more successful if they didn’t try to own,” Hepworth said.

The Glanbia Foods corporate headquarters under construction in nearby downtown should make the property more attractive to restaurateurs, he said.

Jeff Hepworth has had a hand in the Muggers Brewpub building before.

He, developer Todd Blass and attorney Gary Slette — as Three Amigos LLC — bought the 20,000-square-foot building in December 2004, then sold it in June 2005 to Featherstone, the Sun Valley brewmeister who would operate Trail Creek Brewing there.

“And we were sorry that it didn’t last,” Jeff Hepworth said.

TWIN FALLS • Though they’re just a couple of days old, three south-central Idaho babies already have a claim to fame.

They’re the first babies born at three local hospitals in 2013.

Emit Kasai Lirette-Quigley arrived at 3:15 a.m. on New Year’s Day at St. Luke’s Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls.

help, according to the agency’s website.

Hinton oversees the Red Cross’ response program in eight counties in south-central Idaho. In early December, he was one of 15 Idaho Red Cross volunteers and staffers to go to New Jersey.

For three weeks, Hinton worked logistics at one of the Hurricane Sandy supply warehouses off the New Jersey shore. He helped allocate water, Chap-Stick, emergency meals and thousands of other supplies into loading trucks and emergency vehicles to be sent out

to distribution sites.

While most folks in the west saw continual images of ripped up streets and damaged infrastructure, Hinton said that the entire area affected by the hurricane was not that extreme.

“The media wants the best image,” he said. “But you can go to many of the neighborhoods and not notice any damage.”

Yet, there still remains thousands of hours of clean up and billions of dollars are still needed to help finish relief efforts, Hinton said. While there may not be trees lying in the streets, homes still need assistance repairing water damage and city infrastructure will need to be built from scratch.

“The stench on some of these homes from the Hudson River was unbelievable,” he said. “I can’t forget it.”

Hinton worked with the New York Police Department and New York Fire Department to help direct emergency and supply vehicles to the right location. During his three weeks in New Jersey, Hinton said he left feeling impressed with the Red Cross emergency response program.

“We were doing stuff over there that I have never had to do with the Red Cross over here,” he said. “I learned that the Red Cross had vehicles that I didn’t even know existed. The whole trip was an experience.”

gun room where the explosion occurred. The house’s patio roof then collapsed on the concrete slab.

Previously, Fred Wood described the room as a secure storage area where he keeps valuables, including guns, cameras, binoculars, collectible magazines and jewelry. It also included smokeless gunpowder and gun-cleaning solvents.

“I had absolutely nothing unique in there that anybody who reloads their own ammunition doesn’t have,” he said in October.

According to the report, the room had wooden shelving built around the majority of the interior wall space. There were two metal gun safes with guns in them and many other guns in cases

leaning up against the shelves or on the shelves in the room, the report reads.

There were all calibers and types of ammunition, gun cleaning supplies, black powder cans, bulk smokeless powder and large amounts of corks in cardboard boxes along with other unknown contents in the room.

The report states Wood went hunting about a week before the explosion and cleaned the guns with rags in the room on the Sunday prior to the incident. That was the last known time anyone had been in the room.

When investigators inspected the scene, no samples were taken and no single ignition source was determined, according to the report.

The report states it’s “possible the rags may have self-heated until they ignited” and because of the contents

in the room, caused the explosion.

The report also notes spray cans of WD-40 and other cleaning solvents that may have been flammable.

This isn’t the first time the rags have been mentioned as a possible fire source. Burley Fire Chief Keith Martin suggested the rags as the culprit early in the investigation.

The report details the events just before the explosion. Fred Wood had been using a grill on the patio to cook dinner. The couple had just sat down for dinner when they heard a noise and he went downstairs to the gun room door.

The report states Wood could feel pressure against the door and did not open it. Meanwhile, Amy Wood went out onto the patio to see if the noise was coming from there, and was injured when the explosion lifted a

portion of the slab up and flames from the fire engulfed her.

The report concludes heating and electrical appliances were not a factor in the fire. No ground-level rooms at the single-story home had indications of fire damage, and other rooms in the basement “had very little damage,” the report states.

According to the report, the home was insured.

Amy Wood was released from the University of Utah’s Burn and Trauma Center about three weeks after the explosion. After a short stay in Salt Lake City, they moved to a second home in Boise, where they plan to stay until the end of the 2013 legislative session.

Fred Wood could not be immediately reached for comment Wednesday evening on the report.

Lyle “Doc” Wonderlich was born Feb. 24, 1923, to father, John Coleman Wonderlich, and mother, Daisy Dean Magaw Wonderlich, at the farm home near Bloomington in Osborne County, Kan.

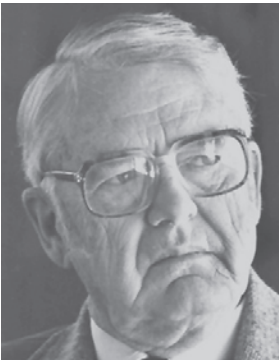
He attended school in a one-room rural school house during grades one through eight, riding his pony to school during the lower grades and later his horse, Molly. He graduated from the Alton, Kan., high school as valedictorian of his class in 1941. He received his pre-medical education at the University of Kansas and Yale University. He enlisted and served in the Army Medical Corps from 1943 to 1945, and graduated from the University of Kansas Medical School in 1947.

Immediately after graduation from medical school, he married Wilma June “Butch” Todd on June 17, 1947; they then traveled to Salt Lake City, Utah, where Doc was to serve a rotating internship at the University of Utah. His internship was served at Salt Lake County General Hospital during 1947 and 1948. After completion of his internship, Doc and Butch returned to his hometown area and set up a general practice in Osborne, Kan., from the spring of 1948 to the spring of 1949, at which time Doc moved to Concordia, Kan., to provide anesthesia services at St. Joseph’s Hospital. In 1951 during the Korean Conflict, he enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Force Medical Corps as a first lieutenant. He served as chief of the anesthesia department at Keesler Air Force Base Hospital in Biloxi, Miss., until his discharge in the fall of 1952 with the rank of captain.

Doc then entered a residency program in anesthesiology at the Fitzsimmons Army Hospital, whose residency program was under the supervision of the University of Colorado in Denver. After completing this residency program, he moved his family to Twin Falls to practice anesthesiology at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital (which later became Magic Valley Regional Medical Center) in the spring of 1954. He received his certification from the American College of Anesthesia in 1955 and became a Diplomate of the American Board of Anesthesiology in 1957.

Doc was in the private practice of anesthesiology at MVRMC and, early in his practice, traveled each Saturday to Gooding, Idaho, to assist in pulmonary surgery at the Gooding TB hospital. Before he retired from MVRMC, he assisted in establishing the Same Day Surgery Center at the hospital. After retiring from MVRMC, Doc served as a locum tenen for Comp Health Medical Services. At this point, he retained medical licenses in 13 states. He completely retired from the practice of anesthesiology in 1995 at the age of 72.

Doc and Butch owned and bred many championship horses on their RoseAcre Farm west of Twin Falls. He was a charter member of the American Paint Horse Association, serving on its executive committee and receiving the association’s Distinguished Service Award in 1989. He and Butch were inducted into the Paint Horse Hall of Fame earlier this year. He was also a charter member and past vice president of the American Paint Horse Foundation. He is a past president and director of the Idaho Paint Horse Association, as well as past vice president of the Idaho Quarter Horse Association, director of the Idaho Horse Council and a member of the Back Country Horsemen.



Doc was a Master Mason in Twin Falls Lodge 45. He became a 33-degree Inspector General Honorary on Nov. 3, 2007, in the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite Orient of Idaho. He was very active in the Southern Idaho Learning Center of the Scottish Rite, serving for 18 years on the management board. Doc was an active member of the Episcopal Church of the Ascension for 58 years, serving as a lay reader and Eucharistic minister.

Federal Regulators Say Delay Made Yellowstone River Oil Spill Worse

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) • Delays in Exxon Mobil Corp.’s response to a major pipeline break beneath Montana’s Yellowstone River made an oil spill far worse than it otherwise would have been, federal regulators said in a new report.

The July 2011 rupture fouled 70 miles of riverbank along the scenic Yellowstone, killing fish and wildlife and prompting a massive, months-long cleanup.

The damage could have been significantly reduced if pipeline controllers had acted more quickly, according to Department of Transportation investigators.

The report, provided to The Associated Press by the office of Montana U.S. Sen. Max Baucus, marks the first time federal regulators have highlighted specific actions by Exxon as contributing to the severity of the spill.

The spill released about 63,000 gallons of crude into the river near the city of Laurel. That damage would have been reduced by about two-thirds if controllers in Houston isolated the rupture as soon as problems emerged, investigators said.

Instead, as Exxon personnel weighed

the appropriate response, crude drained from the severed, 12-inch pipeline for another 46 minutes before a control valve was finally closed. Exxon spent \$135 million on its response to the spill, including cleanup and repair work.

Spokeswoman Rachael Moore said the company will continue to cooperate with Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration and “is committed to learning from these events.”

The report chalks up the immediate cause of the spill to floodwaters that damaged the pipeline and left it exposed. Debris washing downriver piled up on the line, increasing pressure until it ruptured.

The “volume would have been much less” and the location of spill “would have been identified far more quickly” if Exxon’s emergency procedures had called for the immediate closure of upstream valves, investigators said.

The report also faulted Exxon for lacking a plan to notify pipeline controllers that the river was flooding. Exxon workers were not blamed, however, for steps taken in the lead-up to the spill.

Exxon’s field observations and “depth

of cover survey took reasonable precautions to address the flooding of the Yellowstone River it the spring and early summer of 2011,” the investigators wrote.

City officials in Laurel had warned Exxon that the riverbank was eroding. The company, however, continued to run crude beneath the Yellowstone after finding that a section of pipeline leading away from the river was still buried more than 6 feet deep. The report did not address concerns raised by Baucus, a Democrat, and other lawmakers over whether existing pipeline regulations do enough to prevent spills at river crossings.

Under current rules, companies must bury pipelines 4 feet beneath a riverbed and inspect them periodically. Those rules are being reviewed, and Baucus said Wednesday that “transparency and oversight are critical to making sure we never have to go through the devastation of the Yellowstone River oil spill again.”

Landowners along the river have sued Exxon, saying the company didn’t do enough to prevent the spill and should have shut down the line during flooding. Exxon is fighting the lawsuits.

African Leaders Face Rebel Threat

DAMARA, Central African Republic (AP) • More than 30 truckloads of troops from Chad line the two-lane highway just outside of Damara, supporting Central African Republic government forces who want to block a new rebel coalition from reaching the capital.

In a display of force, the turbaned fighters hold their rocket-propelled grenades and other weapons they threaten to use if the rebels seeking to oust President Francois Bozize push this far south.

Gen. Jean Felix Akaga, who heads the regional force known as FOMAC, says a push on Damara, just 45 miles north of the capital, would be “a declaration of war” on the 10 Central African states.

“For us, Damara is the red line that the rebels cannot cross,” Akaga said Wednesday. “If they attack Damara, we will attack.”

The multinational force brought journalists up to Damara, where they touted the strength of the Chadian troops, who along with forces from Republic of Congo and Gabon are helping to stabilize the area.

The rebels, though, appear to be holding their positions after taking a string of towns including Sibut, which is 70 miles further north from Damara.

Back in 2003, troops under Bozize seized the capital amid volleys of machine-gun and mortar fire, and he then dissolved the constitution and parliament. Now a decade

later it is Bozize who himself could be ousted from power.

On Wednesday, he announced through a decree read on state radio that he was dismissing his son, Francis, as defense minister. Chief of Staff Guillaume Lapo also was being replaced.

The president already has promised to form a coalition government with rebels and

to negotiate without conditions. It’s a sign of how seriously Bozize is threatened by the rebel groups who call themselves Seleka, which means alliance in the Sango language.

Bozize says there’s one point not up for negotiation: he does not intend to leave office before his term ends in 2016.

Our Decadent Democracy

Connoisseurs of democratic decadence can savor a variety of contemporary dystopias. Because familiarity breeds banality, Greece has become a boring horror. Japan, however, in its second generation of stagnation is fascinating. Once, Japan bestrode the world, jauntily buying Rockefeller Center and Pebble Beach. Now Japanese buy more adult diapers than those for infants. America has its lowest birth rate since at least 1920 — family formation and workforce participation (which last year hit a 30-year low) have declined in tandem. But it has an energy surplus, the government-produced overhang of housing inventory is shrinking and the average age of Americans' cars is an astonishing 10.8 years. Such promising economic indicators, however, mask America's democratic decadence, as explained by the Hudson Institute's Christopher DeMuth (The Weekly Standard, Dec. 24):

Deficit spending once was largely for investments — building infrastructure, winning wars — which benefited future generations, so government borrowing appropriately shared the burden with those generations. Now, however, continuous borrowing burdens future generations in order to finance current consumption. Today's policy, says DeMuth, erases “the distinction between investing for the future and borrowing from the future.”



December's maneuverings made clear that most Americans will be spared the educational experience of fiscal cliff-related tax increases and spending cuts, which would have been a small but instructive taste of the real costs of the entitlement state. Still, December's maneuverings taught three lessons.

First, there will be no significant spending restraint. Democrats — you know: the people respectful of evidence and science — even rejected a more accurate measurement of the cost of living that would slightly slow increases in myriad government benefits. Accuracy will be sacrificed to liberalism's agenda of government growth.

Second, Barack Obama has (as Winston Churchill said of an adversary) “the gift of compressing the largest amount of words into the smallest amount of thought.” His incessant talking swaddles one wee idea — raising taxes on “millionaires and billionaires,” including couples earning less than half a million. He has nothing pertinent to say about the steadily worsening fiscal imbalance that will make sluggish growth — under 3 percent — normal.

Third, one December winner was George W. Bush because a large majority of Democrats favored making a large majority of his tax cuts permanent. December's rancor disguised bipartisan agreement: Both parties flinch from cliff-related tax increases and spending decreases. But neither the increases nor decreases would have tamed the current \$1 trillion-plus budget deficit nor made a discernible dent in the 87-times-larger unfunded liabilities of the entitlement state.

This state cannot be funded by taxing “the rich.” Or even by higher income taxes on the middle class. Income taxes cannot fund the government liberals want, and they dare not seek the consumption and energy taxes their entitlement architecture requires. Hence, although Republicans are complicit, Democrats are ardent in embracing decadent democracy. This consists not just of infantilism — refusing to will the means for the ends one has willed — but of willing an immoral means: conscripting the wealth of future generations.

As economists Glenn Hubbard and Tim Kane explain in National Affairs quarterly, America's political system “cannot govern the entitlement state” that “exists largely to provide material benefits to individuals.” Piling up unsustainable entitlement promises — particularly, enactment of Medicare in 1965 and the enrichment of Social Security benefits in 1972 — has been improvident for the nation but rational for the political class. The promised expenditures, far in excess of revenues, would come due “beyond the horizon of political consequences.”

“Our politicians,” say Hubbard and Kane, “are acting rationally” but “politically rational behavior is now fiscally perverse.” Both parties are responding to powerful electoral incentives to neither raise taxes nor cut spending. Hence, “the clash over raising the debt limit that gripped Washington during the summer of 2011 was just the beginning, not the end, of our fiscal woes.”

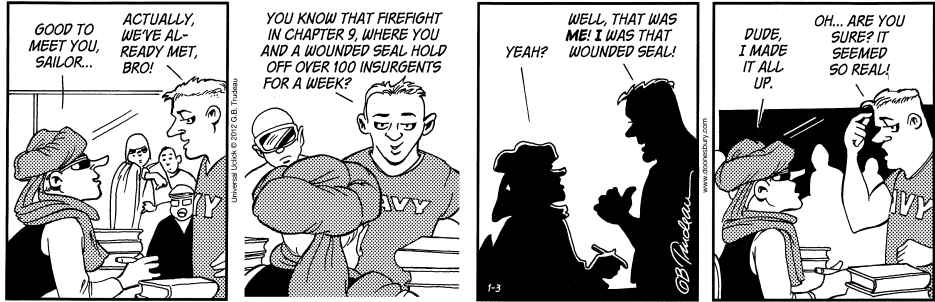
But the perils of the entitlement state are no longer (in Hubbard's and Kane's words) “safely beyond the politicians' career horizons.” Furthermore, a critical mass of Republicans reject the careerists' understanding of “politically rational” behavior. These Republicans have a different rationale for being in politics. The media, which often are the last to know things because their wishes father their thoughts, say the tea party impulse is exhausted. Scores of House Republicans and seven first-term Republican senators (Rand Paul, Mike Lee, Pat Toomey, Ted Cruz, Ron Johnson, Marco Rubio and Tim Scott) will soon — hello, debt ceiling — prove otherwise.

Why can't the plow direct the blade toward the center of the street and at least let me out of my driveway without having to gun the engine to break through the drift?

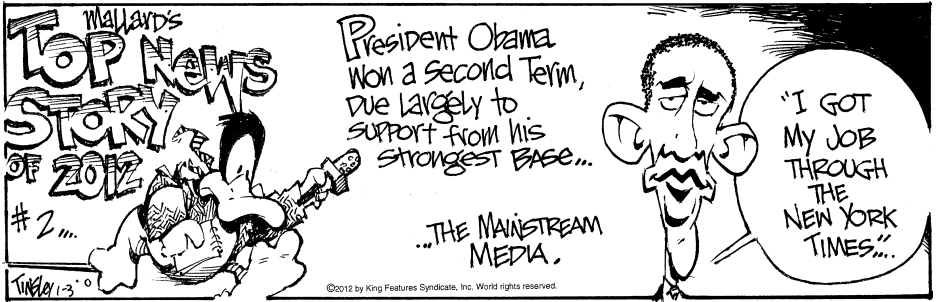

Former Councilwoman Pushes for Further Brain Injury Research

TWIN FALLS • In three months, a former Twin Falls city councilwoman traveled more than 8,000 miles to raise awareness about brain injuries.

Pam Dowd went to more than 20 states, visiting brain injury rehabilitation centers and families of patients recovering from brain injuries.



Dowd

The Boise resident, who lived in Twin Falls for more than 30 years, left on Sept. 22 and traveled across the country in a 34-foot motorhome.

Now that she's back from her cross-country trip, Dowd is working to form a nonprofit organization called Brenna's Hope Foundation.

Dowd's daughter, Brenna, died in 2011 at age 28.

She suffered a medically unexplained anoxic brain injury in May 2010 after retina repair surgery.

"We fought for her recovery for 16 months," Dowd said.

There was a time when Brenna could walk using a LiteGait machine. But flu season hit, and she couldn't leave her room.

Dowd said the paperwork made it look like her daughter wasn't progressing, so she was cut off from therapy.

Brenna suffered a sudden cardiac arrest and spent five days at a hospital.

"We brought her home to die," Dowd said. Her daughter passed away about 30 minutes after arriving home.

Last winter, Dowd wrote a book called "Condemned to Die: Ask Me How. Tell Me Why."

She said after she was finished, she wanted to meet families she'd talked with online who are caring for relatives with brain injuries.

"I knew when I lost my daughter that Brenna would expect her mom to make a difference," Dowd said.

The Next Step

Last week, Dowd filed paperwork with the Idaho Secretary of State to establish Brenna's Hope Foundation.

She plans to submit information to the Internal Revenue Service to gain 501(c)(3) status.

The nonprofit organization will focus on research possibilities for recovery and rehabilitation for hypoxic-anoxic brain injuries. A hypoxic-anoxic brain injury happens when oxygen flow to the brain is restricted. Hypoxic means a partial loss of oxygen and anoxic means a complete loss of oxygen.

"I think we have so much we need to do and can do for this type of brain injury," Dowd said.

She's looking for board members from around the country who have a passion for the topic and have time to commit to an unpaid position.

Dowd said she won't draw a salary from running the foundation, and money will go toward research.

In addition to efforts to create a nonprofit foundation, she wrote a children's book and is currently looking for an agent.

A Three-month Trip

Dowd's cross-country journey took her all the way to Washington, D.C., where she met with U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo in November.

Her recommendations to Crapo include supporting the reauthorization of the Traumatic Brain Injury Act with \$37 million in funding.

Dowd has requested that part of the funding be focused on hyperbaric oxygen therapy to treat hypoxic-anoxic brain injuries.

Some doctors say it's an experimental treatment, she said, but "we have to start somewhere."

"There's so much we can do," Dowd said.

She'd would like to see the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services revisit the rules on Medicare regulations about the length of time allowed for rehabilitation. There are 1.7 million new traumatic brain injuries in the U.S. every year. That's five times more than the number of breast or prostate cancer diagnoses, Dowd said, and yet there are a lot of unknowns about brain injuries.

Helping brain injury patients takes commitment from family members, too.

"I really don't believe that any facility can do it all alone," she said.

Home Invasion Sentencing Delayed

TWIN FALLS • The sentencing for a Twin Falls man who pleaded guilty to a Buhl home invasion robbery was delayed until Monday afternoon.

John Valenciano, 19, was originally to be sentenced Wednesday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court. However, Judge Richard Bevan moved the sentencing date to allow Valenciano's attorney, Ted Williams, to review additional court documents.

Valenciano, Dylan Con-

terras, 20, Luis Sotelo, 20, and a 16-year-old boy were all arrested on charges relating to a robbery at the home of Leo and Judy Ray in Buhl. The Rays own Fish Processors of Idaho.

In November, Valenciano pleaded guilty to charges of robbery and kidnapping.

During Wednesday's meeting, Williams said Valenciano requested to be sentenced that day. Williams said Valenciano didn't want to continue delaying the case.

"He wishes to go through with this today," Williams said. "I can't in good conscience go through with that."

Due to the holiday weekend, Williams said he was unable to adequately go over court documents with Valenciano.

"I can appreciate that you don't to delay this any further," Bevan told Valenciano. "You need time to go through with this with your counsel in detail."

Valenciano is now scheduled to be sentenced Jan. 7.

Homicide Rate Relatively Low Again in Utah

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • With 49 homicides in 2012, Utah's position of having one of the lowest murder rates in the country remains intact. The statewide total is down slightly from the previous year, when 52 homicides were recorded, according to a tally kept by the *Salt Lake Tribune*. There were 45 murders in 2010 and 43 in 2009.

FBI crime reports show Utah's murder rate has been among the lowest in the country for years.

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Lawmakers Still at Odds over Borrowing Limit

WASHINGTON • Only hours after Congress adopted a bill to avert the “fiscal cliff” of tax increases and spending cuts, lawmakers on Wednesday began to clash over the limit on federal borrowing, inaugurating the next phase of Washington’s permanent fiscal war.

Republicans said they will press their demand that spending be reduced dramatically in exchange for allowing any more U.S. borrowing. But top Democrats insisted that their goal of raising the \$16.4 trillion federal debt ceiling is non-negotiable.

The government has reached its debt limit and has about two months to go before it exhausts “extraordinary measures” being used to fund federal operations. Not raising the debt ceiling probably would prompt a default on U.S. government debt and at least a short-term financial crisis.

Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., on Wednesday called for the Senate take the lead and address the debt ceiling by early next month with legislation that would significantly trim spending.

“Democrats now have the opportunity — and the responsibility — to join Republicans in a serious effort to reduce Washington’s out-of-control spending,” McConnell said.

On to the Next Fiscal Crisis

FEDERAL AGENCIES STILL WAITING TO SEE HOW BUDGET CUTS PLAY OUT

WASHINGTON • The fiscal pact Congress reached hours into the new year will delay \$109 billion in automatic across-the-board spending cuts for two months. But it will make a down payment on those reductions that will affect federal operations this year and next.

The eleventh-hour agreement to avoid a “fiscal cliff” of higher taxes put off the major cuts known as a sequester until March 1, when another showdown is expected over the federal debt limit and how much to reduce the size of government.

Congress and the White House agreed to find \$24 billion to pay for the delay, divided between spending cuts and a tax change that allows Americans holding traditional retirement plans to convert more of them to Roth IRAs, a process that requires tax payments up front.

The remaining \$12 billion in cuts to domestic and defense agencies will not take effect until at least March 27, when the stopgap budget funding the government expires. The first \$4 billion in cuts must come by Sept. 30, the end of the fiscal year, and the remaining \$8 billion in fiscal 2014, which will start Oct. 1.

The cuts will be rolled into budget deliberations on Capitol Hill, and no one knows what agencies and programs they will affect. Out of a discretionary spending budget of \$1.04 trillion, \$12 billion is relatively small. But it’s not a rounding error.

“There will be a few select cuts that will be painful,” said Patrick Lester, fiscal policy director at the Center for Effective Philanthropy. “We won’t know for months

what those cuts are, which makes them easy to do.”

William Dougan, president of the National Federation of Federal Employees, said \$12 billion “spread across the government doesn’t sound like a lot of money, but it depends on how it’s spread out.”

Even if each agency took a hit, some “will still be looking at furloughs and even [reductions in force] as a possible solution,” he said. Those are some of the near-certain actions many agencies have said they would take if they had to make the across-the-board cuts Congress imposed in 2011 to force itself to reckon with the federal deficit.

On Wednesday, government and union leaders said that threat, just two months away, is making them nervous.

Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said Congress has “prevented the worst possible outcome by delaying sequestration for two months.”

But he warned that the “the specter of sequestration” threatens national security.

“We need to have stability in our future budgets,” Panetta said in a statement. “We need to have the resources to effectively execute our strategy, defend the nation, and meet our commitments to troops and their families after more than a decade of war.”

WASHINGTON (AP) • Onward to the next fiscal crisis. Actually, several of them, potentially. The New Year’s Day deal averting the “fiscal cliff” lays the groundwork for more combustible struggles in Washington over taxes, spending and debt in the next few months.

President Barack Obama’s victory on taxes this week was the second, grudging round of piecemeal successes in as many years in chipping away at the nation’s mountainous deficits. Despite the length and intensity of the debate, the deal to raise the top income tax rate on families earning over \$450,000 a year — about 1 percent of households — and including only \$12 billion in spending cuts turned out to be a relatively easy vote for many. This was particularly so because the alternative was to raise taxes on everyone.

But in banking \$620 billion in higher taxes over the coming decade from wealthier earners, Obama and his Republican rivals have barely touched deficits still expected to be in the \$650 billion range by the end of his second term. And those back-of-the-envelope calculations assume policymakers can find more than \$1 trillion over 10 years to replace automatic across-the-board spending cuts

known as a sequester.

“They didn’t do any of the tough stuff,” said Erskine Bowles, chairman of Obama’s 2010 deficit commission. “We’ve taken two steps now, but those two steps combined aren’t enough to put our fiscal house in order.”

In 2011, the government adopted tighter caps on day-to-day operating budgets of the Pentagon and other cabinet agencies to save \$1.1 trillion over 10 years.

The measure passed Tues-

day prevents middle-class taxes from going up while raising rates on higher incomes. It also blocks severe spending cuts for two months, extends unemployment benefits for the long-term jobless for a year, stops a 27 percent cut in Medicare fees paid to doctors and prevents a possible doubling of milk prices.

The alternative was going over the cliff, an economy-punching half-trillion-dollar combination of sweeping tax

increases and spending cuts. Despite the deal, the government partially went over the brink anyway with the expiration of a two-year cut in Social Security payroll taxes of two percentage points.

Action inside a dysfunctional Washington now only comes with binding deadlines. So, naturally, this week’s hard-fought bargain sets up another crisis in two months, when painful cuts to the Pentagon and domestic programs are set to kick in.

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CSI Teams Gear Up for Tough Snow, SLCC Trip

TWIN FALLS • Over the last three years, the College of Southern Idaho men’s basketball team has gone 4-0 in Salt Lake City against the Bruins, and 2-2 in Ephraim, Utah, against Snow Community College. Six and two — sounds good. How hard could an upcoming road-trip against Snow, tonight at 7:30 p.m., and SLCC, Saturday at 5 p.m., possibly be?

CSI has beaten one of those teams each of the last three years at a neutral location in the Region 18 tournament. But one of the six road wins has come by double digits, and four have been by four points or fewer.

“We have our work cut out for us,” head coach Steve Gosar said. “It’s hard to get a split, and extremely difficult to get a sweep, but at some point, if we are going to get a conference championship, we have to find a way to make up a game on North Idaho.”

At 1-1 in conference play, already looking up at No. 13 Northern Idaho (14-1, 2-0), the Golden Eagles simply don’t have much room for error. This whole figuring out how to play on the road thing is going to have to be picked up on the fly.

“We have to get on the road and get two wins,” center Billy Reader said. “It’s one of the toughest road spurts in our league. If we can get these it puts us a cut above in our league.”

Reader, like all teammates not named Sebastien Michineau, does not speak

from experience of playing in the Scenic West. He’s going off what the coaches tell him. So far, that hasn’t worked so well — Gosar has been quick, recently, to point out that his team “doesn’t listen and learns by experience, unfortunately.”

But while Snow and Salt Lake may be the most hostile road environments many CSI players have faced so far, they won’t be the first they’ve seen in 2012-13.

Their 4-3 road record does not provide much confidence in the team’s ability to learn from experience. Yet Golden Eagles players say it will be different this time — transfers like Reader and Kareem Storey have played in front of larger, more inhospitable crowds in Division I. Trevor Ritchie has seen a few at the Colorado School of Mines. All three think the team is mentally prepared this time — the trick is tricking the mind.

“In a hostile place, we have to create our own energy,” Storey said.

Essential to playing well on the road, it can be argued, is blocking out all of the peripheral distractions and the sense of engulfing antagonism — sometimes real, other times imagined — and focus on the opponent, and perhaps more appropriate to how CSI views things — its principles.

“That’s what it always comes down to,” Gosar said.

But both upcoming opponents figure to make that a sizeable challenge.

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TWIN FALLS • Four days before the rest of the world resolved to change, the College of Southern Idaho women’s basketball team held a late-night team meeting in their Tucson, Ariz., hotel.

It was just hours after a 17-point loss to Pima College, dropping CSI to 6-9, that head coach Randy Rogers decided he’d seen enough.

“We did some soul-searching,” Rogers said. “I wanted to let (the players) know that some of the struggles are my fault and I needed to do a better job of preparing them. The kids were like ‘hey coach, you don’t need to take the heat for that, we are on the floor playing these games.’ I gave them a reason to say ‘hey look, we all need to play better.’”

No. 20 Snow College not only ranks 13th in the country in home attendance, it's 30th in 3-point shots made per game (7.5), 36th in 3-point percentage (37.6) and 18th in free throw percentage. Translation: They can shoot.

"At any time, they have four to five shooters on the floor," Ritchie said. "Our bigs will have to sprint out and get hands up on wings and chase them around screens; we have to get hands up."

Considering the Golden Eagles recently yielded 14 3-point makes at home to Idaho Select, there's plenty of cause for concern.

The Badgers are led in scoring by 6-foot-5 wing Connor Van Brocklin (16.7, 38 percent on 3-pointers), 5-foot-10 Nick Gruninger (12.6, 96 percent free throw), 6-foot-6 Brock Smith (10.4, 38 percent on 3-pointers) and Cheick Tidiane Sane (85.6 percent field goal).

Salt Lake (10-2, 1-0), however, beat Snow 74-70, and may actually be the more impressive team this year despite being unranked. The Bruins are 13th in the country in points per game (88.4), 28th in steals and 14 in assists. By all accounts, they play a free-flowing up-tempo game. SLCC has the two leading scorers in the conference, 6-foot-1 point guard Skyler Harford (19.8) and 6-foot-6 forward Sai Tummala, both sophomores.

"The little point guard from Salt Lake (Harford), he is really tough and can take over any game," Ritchie said. "But for the most part, each team has a bunch of role players where everybody knows what they are supposed to do and they do it."

Last year, for the first time in three seasons, the CSI women's team was swept on its two gameroad trip against SLCC and Snow College, both close losses. Thursday against Snow (5:30 p.m.) and Saturday against Salt Lake (3 p.m.) mark the sixth and seventh consecutive out-of-town games for the Golden Eagles, who will be looking to ride the momentum they captured in their most recent game, a win against Cochise (Ariz.).

Snow (7-8, 1-0) is a team CSI players said can be taken advantage of inside, though skilled outside.

"We have to disrupt their guards and frustrate them," combo guard Adriana Dent said.

The Badgers are known for running a lot of different offensive sets to maximize their outside shooting touch (33.5 percent on 3-pointers, 36th in country). Snow is led in scoring by Becca Rees (12 ppg) and Jordi Willden (10.5).

No. 20 SLCC (9-5, 1-0) is led by Utah transfer, 6-foot-4 post Rachel Morris, who tops the conference in scoring at 13.9 points per game. She also averages eight rebounds a contest.

Playoff Picks: Packers a Good Bet this Time

Six days after Adrian Peterson blistered them for nearly 200 yards and helped lift his team to a stunning playoff berth, the Green Bay Packers get another taste of "A.D."

This time, they will deal with "All Day" Peterson at Lambeau Field. And in the playoffs.

The stakes are similar to last week for the Vikings, who would have been out of the playoffs had they lost to Green Bay, which already owned the division title. The venue, obviously, is different.

If that seems like a big edge for the Packers, well, they lost their last two post-season home games, both to the Giants, who went on to win the Super Bowl each time. They dropped a 31-14 verdict to Minnesota after the 2004 season, the only time in 104 matchups these NFC North rivals have met in the playoffs.

So Green Bay is 1-3 in recent home playoff games on the tundra. That doesn't diminish the challenge facing Minnesota, an 8-point underdog.

"It put us in a spot that we've been wanting to be, wanted to get here since April 23 of last year when we

started OTAs," Vikings quarterback Christian Ponder said of the win over the Packers that got them a trip to Green Bay, where they lost 23-14 in the regular season.

"It's going to be tough going to Lambeau. Obviously it's an environment that's tough to play in, but we're hoping that a lot of our Vikings fans travel, just like there were some Green Bay fans at home this past week."

The shorter week won't matter to either side considering they faced off last weekend. At least it gives the Packers less time to watch video of the horror show their defense put on trying to slow down Peterson.

They'll do a better job this Saturday night.

BEST BET: PACKERS, 31-20

INDIANAPOLIS (PLUS 6½) AT BALTIMORE

This could be Ray Lewis' final game; he announced Wednesday his plan to end his 17-year career that certainly should land him in the Hall of Fame.

There are much better ways to finish than chasing around the Colts' offense, which will be a difficult chore for the Ravens' defense. With Lewis sidelined for nearly three months with a triceps injury

and Terrell Suggs not resembling the Defensive Player of the Year he was in 2011 as he plays while still recovering from an Achilles tendon injury, Baltimore can't count on shutting down opponents.

In previous seasons when the Ravens were a defensive power, Andrew Luck might be reduced to an over-matched rookie. Not now.

UPSET SPECIAL: COLTS, 23-17

CINCINNATI (PLUS 5) AT HOUSTON

The Texans stumbled into the playoffs, losing three of four and blowing home-field advantage and a bye in the AFC. Cincinnati, on the other hand, won seven of its last eight with a staunch defense.

Houston made the post-season for the first time last year and promptly knocked off the Bengals in the wildcard round. Both teams are improved this season, and the key could be which side protects its quarterback better. Houston has J.J. Watt and Antonio Smith providing pressure on the quarterbacks. For Cincinnati, it's Geno Atkins and Michael Johnson.

Houston will do it better.

That's because — at least through 16 games — CSI doesn't have the offensive firepower to simply out-talent opponents.

Outside of Patrice Toston, who is second in the conference in scoring at 12.5 points per game, the Golden Eagles have learned the hard way that they can't lean on their offense, especially their outside shooting. CSI ranks 120th in the country in 3-point field goal percentage, making 26.4 percent of their long balls. In fact, in three of their eight losses, the Golden Eagles shot a combined 4-for-64 from downtown.

"We've just had to figure out different ways to get buckets," Rogers said.

But defense and effort are the women's new favorite words after their three game desert soul-quest/road-trip, and it's likely what will make or break the season. Their 160th ranking in points allowed per game (65.7) is so 2012.

"I just think that with the way they're working and not quitting, us getting better, we are going to see much improved results on that end," Rogers said.

If the CSI women have turned the corner on defense, it won't necessarily be the result of a two-hour emotional release, but the chemistry that created the opportunity for catharsis.

From early September on, CSI players have let it be known they're a tight-knit group.

"It's crazy to watch a team that is so close, everyone is close," Rogers said. "This team gets along better than any I've been around. I know kids can get frustrated if they don't play, but we talked about that, about how to contribute if you're not playing. I've never had a meeting like that where everybody just talked, and no one was like 'we are you talking bad about her?' There were no negatives, it was really cool."

Now that the Golden Eagles are healthy, with 15 women ready to contribute, the question becomes — if you believe that chemistry

has helped the team realize change — is how long can it hold if players are left out of the rotation. One approach Rogers has talked about is playing as many of his players as he can to both ensure effort is maximized and discontent — even if internalized — is minimized. But CSI players don't expect any problems to pop up, especially now. They're just expecting to win a whole lot more games.

"We are all sisters," Franklin said. "The team is doing really good actually; we are really close and it shows on the court."

And just hours before the rest of world toasted farewell to 2012, CSI was practicing, having already embarked on a new beginning.

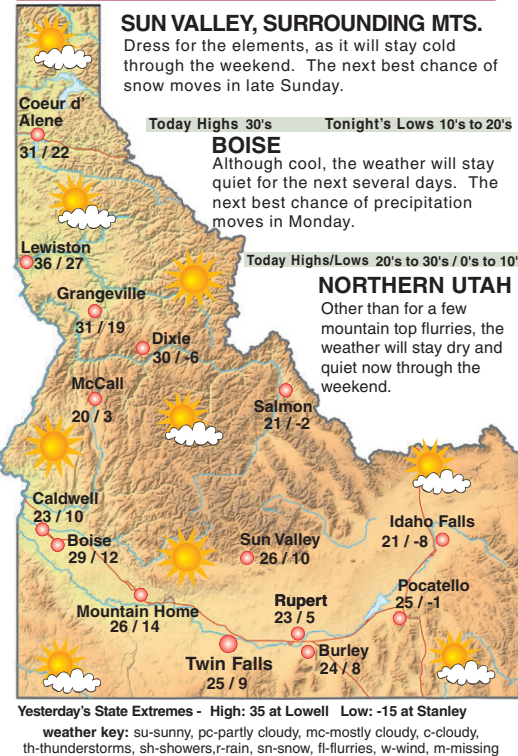

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RAY LEWIS TO RETIRE AFTER PLAYOFFS

OWINGS MILLS, Md. • Ray Lewis spent 17 seasons in-stilling fear in his opponents while serving as an inspirational leader for the Baltimore Ravens.

Now he's poised and eager to become a full-time dad.

Lewis announced Wednesday he will end his brilliant NFL career after the Ravens complete their 2013 playoff run.

Lewis has been sidelined since Oct. 14 with a torn right triceps. The 13-time Pro Bowl middle linebacker intends to return Sunday to face the Indianapolis Colts in what will almost certainly be his final home game.

"Everything that starts has an end," the 37-year-old Lewis said. "For me, today, I told my team that this will be my last ride."

Lewis will walk away from the game because he wants to spend more time with his sons. While working to return from his injury, Lewis watched two of his boys play on the same high school football team in Florida. He intends to see Ray Lewis III perform as a freshman next year for the University of Miami, where the elder Lewis starred before the

Ravens selected him in the first round of the 1996 draft.

"God is calling," Lewis said. "My children have made the ultimate sacrifice for their father for 17 years. I don't want to see them do that no more. I've done what I wanted to do in this business, and now it's my turn to give them something back."

That's why Lewis will pull off his No. 52 uniform for the last time after the Ravens lose or claim their second Super Bowl title.

"It's either (that or) hold onto the game and keep playing and let my kids miss out on times we can be spending together," Lewis said. "Because I always promised my son if he got a full ride on scholarship Daddy is going to be there, I can't miss that."

Lewis was the AP Defensive Player of the Year in 2000, the same season he was voted Super Bowl MVP following Baltimore's 34-7 rout of the New York Giants. Lewis was also Defensive Player of the Year in 2003, and is the only player in NFL history with at least 40 career sacks and 30 interceptions.

"I never played the game for individual stats," Lewis said. "I only played the game to make my team a

better team."

Lewis has been with the Ravens since they moved from Cleveland. After being drafted 26th overall in Baltimore's first draft, Lewis be-

came a fixture at middle linebacker — and a beloved figure in Baltimore. He remained that way even after his alleged involvement in a double-murder in Atlanta in

early 2000.

In June of that year, a judge approved a deal allowing Lewis to avoid murder charges and jail time by pleading guilty to a misde-

meanor and testifying against two co-defendants. Within a year, Lewis was in the Super Bowl, leading the Ravens to their only NFL championship.

Playoffs Loom, Manning Still Looking to Improve

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. • Here's one that won't come as a surprise: Peyton Manning writes down his New Year's resolutions on index cards.

"My dad, since I was a kid, he's been telling us, 'Write them down,'" Manning said.

Though he refused to divulge what's on those cards, or what his lifetime success rate has been with those resolutions, he hasn't left much doubt about what his day-to-day goals on the football field were for 2012, the year of his comeback.

Work hard. Improve. Keep building chemistry.

Those are the only ways to get to the ultimate goal — winning the Super Bowl, which is something Manning and the Denver Broncos

are now favored to do.

Yet to hear Manning tell it, even if the Broncos do win it all, there will still be room for improvement — quite a tall task for a quarterback who compiled some of the best numbers of his career and a team that finished tied for the league's best record at 13-3.

"I'm not sure you can do it all in one season," Manning said Wednesday, after the Broncos, the AFC's top-seeded team, practiced for the first time during their bye week. "I think we've done a good job of being the best that we possibly can in this short period of time."

What began as a season of mystery for Manning — How would his body react after missing more than a year with the neck injury? How would his new teammates respond to him? — has

turned into one of his very best campaigns.

He threw 400 completions for 4,659 yards and 37 touchdowns, completed 68.6 percent of his passes and finished with a 105.8 passer rating — all franchise records and ranked second best of the 14 years he's played in the NFL.

He is in the mix for his fifth Most Valuable Player award, votes for which are being counted this week. On Wednesday, he received his second AFC offensive player of the week honor this year. It marked the 23rd time he's received that over his career, tied with Tom Brady's most ever.

"To be able to come out and participate like he's done, to be one of the top quarterbacks in the league, it's unbelievable," receiver Demaryius Thomas said. "He had an injury that not

many people come back from."

His latest award came on the strength of a 23-for-29, 304-yard, three-touchdown game against Kansas City on Sunday. The highlights were his touchdowns to Eric Decker and Thomas, who stretched out (in Decker's case) or up (in Thomas' case) to make one-handed grabs on balls Manning put in places where only they, and not the defensive backs covering them, could catch them.

Were they passes he would've thrown to those receivers in Week 1?

"Probably would have thrown them earlier, not sure if we would've completed them," Manning said. "It's hard to say. But there's no question, it would be just downright disappointing if we had not improved throughout the season."

Anglers on the Ice

With Magic Dam repairs finished, water is rising in Magic Reservoir and the ice fishing season started strong.

SHOSHONE • Ignore the rumor about an empty reservoir, and gather your ice fishing gear.

For the past two months, the phone has rung all day long at West Magic Resort, owner Don Hartman said. Callers worry that Magic Reservoir must be empty because of repairs at Magic Dam.

Not so. The water level is rising, and nearby residents are already hauling fish through the ice.

“The locals are just knocking them dead out there,” Hartman said Dec. 27.

They’re fishing 50 to 75 yards off the main boat ramp on Magic Reservoir’s west side, he said, in 5 to 8 feet of water under 5 to 10 inches of ice. They’re catching rainbow trout of typically 3 pounds, and perch are coming out of the reservoir at 65 to 100 fish per day per person, he said.

In fact, the ice fishing is much better now than in high-water winters because more fish are sharing less space, Nate Norris said. He owns East Magic Resort, which operates a bar, maintains a parking lot for ice anglers and, on some days, offers a rope tow for its sledding hill.

“The lake is low, but it’s been this low in the winter-time in the last 15 years probably six times,” Norris said.

Yes, that’s about right, said Lynn Harmon, general manager of Big Wood Canal Co., though a normal water level for late December is 30,000 to 50,000 acre-feet in Magic Reservoir. An acre-foot is enough water to cover 1 acre one foot deep.

The reservoir held 54,000 acre-feet before the canal company began releasing water in mid-November for repairs to a damaged hydraulic line. The line leads to the outlet gate at the head of the tunnel that releases water from Magic Dam. The level fell as low as 12,500 acre-feet for two or three days, but the repairs are complete now and the water has been rising since Dec. 7.

On Dec. 27, Harmon said, the reservoir held 17,191 acre-feet of water, which is 9 percent of its capacity. And it’s gaining at least 100 to 150 acre-feet a day.

Along the reservoir’s edges, the rise may cause a few feet of open water, he said, but that doesn’t affect the safety of ice farther from shore.

IDAHO AIR

A heavily researched new book details the history of Idaho’s backcountry airstrips.

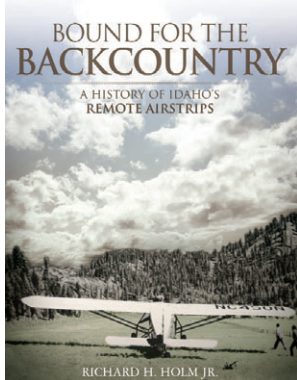

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls pilot Steve Mulberry flipped through an Idaho author’s thick new book on backcountry aviation, pausing at a 1970 photo from a mountain airstrip.

“This is the Twin Otter I used to fly in Alaska — I can’t believe it,” said Mulberry, 59, who reported for his job as an Alaskan bush pilot three days after his Boise State University graduation in 1975.

In the 557-page hardcover “Bound for the Backcountry: A History of Idaho’s Remote Airstrips” (Cold Mountain Press, \$59.95), those moments of recognition might be plentiful for any pilot with experience in the Idaho backcountry. Written by Richard H. Holm Jr. of Boise and McCall, the book chronicles the personalities and aircraft important to nearly a hundred of Idaho’s isolated airstrips.

“Almost with every picture I recognize something — it brings back a memory,” Mulberry said, spotting pilots’ names and aircraft models as he scanned the



pages. “This is a real great history; I don’t think you’ll ever find a history like this.”

These days Mulberry flies a 747 for United Airlines, and photos of Idaho wilderness share space on his cell phone with his cockpit photography of Siberia’s snow-crust-ed peaks. He’d returned from Hong Kong two days earlier and would head for Sydney, Australia, next.

But Mulberry still owns a Cessna 185, a model suited to the heavy loads and short takeoffs and landings of Idaho mountain flying. He takes his sons airplane camping every summer — in 2012, for instance, at the remote Warm Springs airstrip on the South Fork of the Payette River. He flies war veterans into the backcountry for

Wounded Warrior programs, and he donates plane time to search for lost snowmobiles, lost hunters and missing aircraft.

Mountain flying is dangerous. It requires humility

and a knowledge of the limits of both pilot and aircraft. And it’s dreadfully hard to make a living at it, Mulberry said.

“You can’t eat scenery,” he

Craters of the Moon Grooms its Winter Trails

CAREY • With about 10 inches of snow on the ground, Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve on Monday began grooming its winter trails — one of southern Idaho’s best destinations for snowshoers.

Here, winter brings a stunning transformation: Roads and parking lots disappear, but even thick snow can’t erase the rugged volcanic landscape. With protruding lava rocks of-

fering dramatic contrasts, craters and cones become a study in black and white, a place of profound solitude.

The price for using Craters’ winter trails? Absolutely free.

The monument charges no entry fees from November to mid-April. Don’t have snowshoes? You can borrow a pair for the day from the visitor center for free, or pay a suggested \$5 donation if you like.

If it’s your first time on snowshoes — or you brought

children along — start with the 1.5-mile loop trail that begins and ends at the visitor center. Its gentle grades are fine for all but the smallest children, and you’ll see a lot of varied terrain in that strange and beautiful landscape.

The Ranger’s Lessons

Choose a Friday afternoon in January or February for that loop trail, and you can make the walk in the company of

Build a Low-cost, Energy-efficient Emergency Stove

If social media are any indication, then it seems that an increasing number of people worldwide — particularly in developed nations — view the current economic instability, political uncertainty, widely published natural disasters and that pesky Mayan “Long Count” calendar as signs of an “end time.” These folk refer to themselves as the “Doomsday Preppers” or simply as “Preppers.”

While I don’t subscribe to this philosophy, it just makes sense to have an adequate supply of food, water, energy, monetary and medical supplies sufficient to meet your family’s needs should things suddenly and unexpectedly “go south.” This was certainly not the case with most of the people who found themselves in the path of Hurricane Sandy. Recent natural disasters have shown that even here in America, our local, state and federal relief agencies are often not able to respond soon enough or adequately enough to provide for the massive need generated by these events.

With that realization, I did a quick inventory of our personal on-hand resources and discovered to my dismay that if we were not able, for whatever reason, to make our weekly resupply trips to the local stores, we’d be in serious trouble; sadly, we’re not in

the minority in this regard. How long could you sustain your clan if these resources were suddenly cut off for one week, two weeks or longer?

Not knowing exactly where or how to begin, I decided to focus my efforts initially in just one area. Since power outages are fairly common at this time of year due to ice or snow storms and vehicle-utility accidents, I began to research alternative ways to heat water and cook food should we find ourselves without electrical power for an extended period. On the plus side, as campers, we have several trustworthy Coleman cook stoves and lanterns in the garage. Since they utilize small, readily available metal propane bottles, I headed to the store and bought six extras for emergency use only. We have a fireplace in the living room, so I called and had a cord of wood delivered. Should the need arise, we can now prepare cooked meals and wash water, as well as heat a small living area upstairs for a time — not great, but it’s a start.

While perusing the American Preppers Network website recently, I

made a chance discovery that set my thrifty Scottish genes a jigging. For less than \$10 at your local Ace Hardware, Home Depot or Lowe’s, you can buy all the materials needed to construct your very own Rocket Stove. These are, in essence, small, fuel-efficient fireplaces. Heated gases traveling up the flue create an updraft that draws in fresh air to efficiently burn the fuel. They can be constructed out of various sizes of steel/aluminum cans or, in my case, inexpensive bricks. Their true advantage lies in their ability to utilize wood scraps, paper, cardboard or biomass; whatever is lying around or can be scrounged on or near your property.

As an experiment, my granddaughter Amy and I built one last Saturday. On

our initial attempt and despite the 20 degree temperatures, we had a coffee can of water boiling and a pan of Spaghetti-Os bubbling in about 20 minutes using scrap wood and yard wastes. With practice and fine tuning, I’m sure we’ll refine our cooking techniques and recipes. This stove has excellent applications for efficient Dutch oven cookery as well.

The lake froze a few days before Christmas, Norris said, and he expected more people to venture out for ice fishing from the New Year’s weekend on.

Ice was 5-10 inches thick over the whole reservoir, said Hartman, whose resort offers a restaurant, bar, RV park, convenience store, cabin rentals, tackle shop and ice auger rentals.

“I don’t have water in the RV park, but that won’t stop the ice fishermen,” he said.

“The ice fishermen will stop at nothing.”

Snowmobiling on the frozen reservoir is popular, too.

“It’s actually quite fun,” Hartman said. “It’s like a drag strip out there; there’s nothing you can run into, and nothing you can hurt.”

Planning an ice fishing adventure at Magic Reservoir? Don’t park on nearby residents’ private property, Hartman said. There’s a plowed parking lot for anglers adjacent to the main airstrip by West Magic Resort (westmagicresort.com).

said, echoing advice he heard as a young flier. Still, those long-ago years were a wonderful life. “I savor every moment of the mountain flying. That was the best.”

You’ll find a lot of that sentiment in Holm’s book.

• • •

As a University of Idaho student, Holm, now 30, got interested in the state’s backcountry history. As a pilot, he does seasonal air taxi work such as regional charter flights and delivering river rafters to their put-in destinations, particularly on the Middle Fork of the Salmon River. The two interests combined in his “Bound for the Backcountry,” whose narrative backdrop is “how aviation ... shaped what we think of as wilderness areas.”

The book’s early chapters put Idaho’s remote flying into the context of 1930s fire suppression; the shift of backcountry homesteads from serving minors to attracting hunters and anglers; the explosion of whitewater river sports; and The Wilderness Act of 1964.

But the bulk of this thick volume is devoted to heavily researched accounts of individual strips: how and why they were built, who was involved and any interesting tales — funny or tragic — attached to them.

“It’s very, very good and comprehensive of the origination of a lot of ranches,” said pilot Dick Waite, 86, of Hagerman, who has flown over Idaho for 67 years. “It’s a great book that Richard did.”

One of the book’s most tragic tales involves a blown cylinder on a DC-3 148Z’s right engine above the Selway River in 1979. The flaming engine tore away from the wing, and the right landing gear dropped. The pilots maneuvered the wounded aircraft through the walls of the Selway canyon, Holm writes, but when the left wing struck a tree they lost all control.

The images captured by a newspaper photographer hiking up the Selway show the outline of the DC-3 and smoke trailing from the falling engine below it. The crash killed both pilots and

eight of the 10 passengers.

But the history has its heroes, too.

Among them is helicopter pilot Rod Snider, who descended through thick smoke, flames, airborne embers and intense heat and wind — over and over — to rescue trapped smokejumpers four at a time in 1961 near Grangeville. Holm tells the story with enough technical detail for aircraft-savvy readers to appreciate the difficulty of the feat, but with all the humanity that another reader might crave.

“It’s more dangerous flying than you’re going to find in other places, and as a result there are a lot of accidents back there,” Holm said in a telephone interview.

In general, pilots who operate in Idaho’s backcountry are humble, understated folks, he said. It takes that to fly in these conditions: heat and altitude that lower aircraft performance, heavy loads, tight canyon maneuvers, smoke.

“They do some pretty amazing things — these people who have been at it for 30 years,” Holm said.

• • •

A key figure in Twin Falls’ aviation history makes an appearance in Holm’s account of a crew who bailed out of a B-17 bomber during World War II over the Middle Fork of the Salmon River. Charles Reeder — who in 1941 started Reeder Flying

Service in Twin Falls — made a daring night landing at Indian Creek to help in the crew’s 1943 rescue.

“... the only way he could identify the airstrip was the reflection of the snow between the trees,” Holm writes.

Mulberry played a role at the Falconberry Ranch homestead on Loon Creek, a large tributary to the Middle Fork of the Salmon River.

Dr. John Hatch of Idaho Falls, who owned the Falconberry property for decades, decided in 1977 that a tennis court would be just the thing for his remote ranch. Mulberry — a family friend home from a summer of Alaska flying and the new owner of a Cessna 185 — made 149 landings there to shuttle sacks of cement for the tennis court, Holm writes.

Waite shows up near the end of “Bound for the Backcountry,” as Holm details 16 Travel Air 6000 aircraft that were flown in remote Idaho.

“Without a doubt the Travel Air Model 6000 became an icon of the Idaho backcountry to many residents, fishermen, hunters, smokejumpers and foresters,” Holm writes. “These high performance airplanes were rugged and could carry large loads in and out of short, rough-surface airfields with little trouble.”

One of those, a 1929

plane that spent part of the 1940s carrying supplies and people for an Idaho mining operation, now hangs out in a hangar at the Gooding airport as a showpiece. Waite, who owns that airplane and two others, also has a hangar and private airstrip — built about 23 years ago — at his Hagerman house.

For 40 years, the 1944 Twin Falls High School graduate provided ground and air transportation for river rafters. In 2004 Waite received the Federal Aviation Administration’s Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award, which recognizes safe flight operations for 50 or more consecutive years.

“Dick and his connections were an invaluable resource for me when I wrote the book,” Holm said.

• • •

As Mulberry flipped pages, he paused on one describing the highest airstrip ever used in the Idaho backcountry. Its average runway elevation: 8,233 feet.

“Oh my gosh, Hoodoo Meadows,” Mulberry said. “I landed there years ago ... when I was young and foolish.”

Holm’s book retells many of the stories Mulberry heard years ago as a fledgling flier idolizing Idaho’s older pilots.

“I knew a lot of the people in here personally,” Mulberry said. “There’s so much of this stuff that could be lost forever, and this captures it.”

interpretive park ranger Lennie Ramacher. The monument’s guided snowshoe walks are also an engaging nature lesson on how the animals of Craters of the Moon escape, hibernate or adapt to survive heavy snows.

His mini-lessons on animal behavior offer beginners a chance to catch up or catch their breath. And they’re interspersed with snowshoe pointers — like avoiding exposed rocks, or zigzagging up a slope, or stepping over cross-country tracks in deference to skiers.

Craters of the Moon last winter moved those short, guided snowshoe walks from Sundays to Fridays, hoping to capitalize on some school districts’ move to a four-day school week. But participation was light, so this winter the park is asking for reservations for the guided snowshoe walks.

Longer-standing and more popular are Craters’ two- to four-mile Saturday walks preceded by a classroom session. Scheduled throughout January and February, those usually fill up in advance and often have a waiting list.

Snowshoe Anytime

But now that winter’s here in earnest, you can come any day of the week to snowshoe either the 1.5-mile dedicated trail or the seven miles of groomed cross-country ski trails. Pick up a free, color-coded map at the visitor center that indicates where you’ll encounter the easiest and most difficult grades.

“It’s a fun place to snowshoe, because it’s very, very open,” said Scott Wardrum of Los Angeles, who spent three hours snowshoeing at Craters in early 2012 on his way to rendezvous with skiing buddies in Montana. You can see for miles, and there’s enough trail to lead you away from anyone else who’s out on the snow.

Snowshoe Destination

The visitor center at Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve is open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. every day, except federal holidays. You can borrow a pair of snowshoes there for free — or donate the suggested \$5. And park entry is free during winter.

The outlook: The park’s main loop road closed to vehicles in mid-December — much later than normal — to become a cross-country ski and snowshoe trail for the season. Craters has a big new grooming machine, and on Monday the staff began to compact the trails. (Until this week, skiers and snowshoers broke their own trails.)

“We do a lane for the Nordic folk, and we do a lane for the skate skiers,” said Doug Owen, education specialist at Craters.

Trails: A dedicated 1.5-mile snowshoe loop trail; plus seven miles of groomed cross-country ski trails, also open to snowshoers. The winter trails will be groomed a couple of times a week.

Guided snowshoe walks: 1-2:30 p.m. on Fridays in January and February; free. You’ll snowshoe with a ranger on the 1.5-mile loop, looking for fox or red squirrel tracks and learning about animals’ winter survival. No snowshoe experience is required, but participants should be at least 8 years old. Make an advance reservation; meet at the visitor center and be prepared to spend an hour and a half outdoors.

Winter snowshoe adventures: 9:30 a.m. to about 2 or 3 p.m. on Saturdays in January and February (except Jan. 19 and Feb. 16); free. This is a longer trip preceded by an orientation in the visitor center. Make advance reservations, and bring a sack lunch. Participants should be at least 8.

Caution: Climbing cinder hills on snowshoes is fine, but don’t roam across uneven lava flows. If you’re interested in going off-trail, ask at the visitor center about the terrain under the snow.

Special date: On Feb. 16, Craters of the Moon plans a winter festival with snow sculptures, sledding, two or three snowshoe hikes, perhaps a cross-country ski clinic, a snow maze, snowboarding, food and perhaps a snowman contest.

Spring black bear controlled hunt seasons start April 15. Leftover tags go on sale April 1.

Information on 2013 spring hunts is available in Idaho's 2012 big game rules brochure. Hunters also may check with Idaho Department of Fish and Game offices or vendors for new controlled hunt numbers, or online at fishandgame.idaho.gov/cms/hunt/rules/ug/.

Hunters may apply for controlled hunts at any hunting and fishing license vendor, Fish and Game office; with a credit card by calling 1-800-55HUNT5; or online at fishandgame.idaho.gov/apps/ch/apply.cfm. The nonrefundable application fee for each species is \$6.25 for residents and \$14.75 for nonresidents. An additional fee is charged for telephone and Internet applications.

Hunters must have a 2013 Idaho hunting license to apply.

Robin Most-seen Bird in Annual Count at Ashland

ASHLAND, Ore. (AP) • For the third year in a row, the robin was the most-seen bird in an annual count by birdwatchers around Ashland.

More than 6,700 robins were spotted in an area with a 15-mile diameter during the Christmas Bird Count. Second was the dark-eyed junco with more than 1,800 and third was the golden-crowned sparrow with more than 700.

The Mail Tribune reports

three dozen birdwatchers in nine groups tallied a total of more than 16,000 birds in 119 species.

The count is sponsored by the National Audubon Society. Results from 2,200 counts around the country are compiled at Cornell University.

Organizer John Bullock said the number of starlings around Ashland has declined — from more than 2,500 in 2011 to less than 600 in the latest count.

What Are the Rules about Baiting?

Question: I've heard it's against the law to scatter corn or grain to attract ducks or geese. Please explain the rules about baiting.



You are absolutely correct. Agricultural lands offer prime waterfowl hunting opportunities. Waste grain and corn spilled on the ground or in fields as a result of normal agricultural harvesting of crops provides an important food source for wintering waterfowl and upland game. When weather becomes colder this waste grain is highly sought out by ducks and when used to attract birds to shoot is a violation of the baiting law. This law applies to scattering grain or food to attract any migratory waterfowl.

State and federal migratory bird hunting laws specifically prohibit placing, distributing or exposing feed, salt or any grains to lure birds to or over an

area where hunters will attempt to shoot them. It is also unlawful to use the vegetation from agricultural crops to conceal a blind if it exposes, deposits or distributes grain or other feed. A baited area remains off-limits to hunting for 10 days after all grain and other feed has been completely removed.

The rule indicates it is unlawful to hunt in an area where baiting or feeding has impacted the normal flight patterns of birds in the area. This means even though you are not standing in a baited field, birds flying to and from a nearby baited area would be unlawful to shoot. A minimum distance from baited areas has not been identified in the law, but hunters should be aware

they must be more than one mile away from an area ducks or geese are being fed. In some cases due to the terrain, flight patterns and proximity to refuges or private land, hunting distances may exceed several miles.

Hunting is allowed over agricultural fields with standing crops or flooded standing crops. Hunting is also allowed in fields harvested by normal agricultural or soil stabilization practices. These "normal practices" are recognized by the State Extension Specialists of the Cooperative State Research, Education, and Extension Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

What this means is you can hunt ducks, geese and doves in fields harvested by normal agricultural methods. You cannot hunt in area where you or someone else has scattered grain for bait. It is also unlawful for you to

hunt in an area you should have reasonably known was baited as evidenced by the large amount of grain or feed present.

If convicted in federal court of hunting waterfowl over an unlawfully baited area, you could be assessed up to \$15,000 in fines and spend up to six months in jail. If you place bait or direct the placement of bait, you face fines up to \$100,000 as an individual or \$200,000 as an organization and up to one year in federal prison.

Spring Steelhead Season Opens

JEROME • The spring steelhead season opened Jan. 1 on the:

- Salmon River from its mouth to the posted boundary 100 yards downstream of the Sawtooth Fish Hatchery weir, near the town of Stanley.
- Little Salmon River from its mouth to the U.S. Highway 95 Bridge near Smokey Boulder Road.
- Snake River from the Washington state line at the confluence of the Snake and Clearwater rivers upstream to Oxbow Dam.
- Clearwater River main stem and Middle Fork Clearwater River from its mouth to Clear Creek.
- North Fork Clearwater River from its mouth to Dworshak Dam.
- South Fork Clearwater

River from its mouth to the confluence of American and Red Rivers.

- Boise River from its mouth to the Barber Dam.

The season runs through April 30 in most areas, except:

- On the Salmon River from Lake Creek Bridge to Long Tom Creek, about a quarter mile upstream of the Middle Fork, the season ends March 31.
- On the Little Salmon River the season runs through May 15.
- On the Boise River upstream to Barber Dam, the season ends May 31.

Steelhead are in the Boise River only when stocked by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. Here steelhead are defined as rainbow trout longer than 20 inches with a clipped adipose fin.

This year about 1,000 steelhead were stocked in the Boise River. Barbless hooks are not required in the Boise, but anglers must have a steelhead permit to fish for and keep steelhead.

The steelhead limit is three per day and nine in possession. The statewide limit for the spring season is 20 steelhead. Once limits are reached, the angler must stop fishing, even catch-and-release.

Steelhead anglers must have a valid Idaho fishing license and steelhead permit. Steelhead anglers may use only barbless hooks, and may keep only hatchery steelhead marked with a clipped adipose fin. All other steelhead must be released unharmed.

In the boundary waters on the Snake River between

Idaho and Oregon or Washington, an angler with a valid 2013 Idaho fishing license and steelhead permit may fish where the river forms the boundary between Idaho and Oregon or Washington, but may not fish from the shoreline or in sloughs or tributaries on the Oregon or Washington side, including wading. An angler may have only the limit allowed by one license regardless of the number of licenses held.

Don't forget to buy a 2013 fishing license and steelhead permit before heading out.

Judge Lets Wolf Season Resume

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) • Wolf hunting and trapping can resume near Yellowstone National Park after a Montana judge on Wednesday blocked the state from shutting down the practice over concerns that too many animals used in research were being killed.

The restraining order from Judge Nels Swandal allows hunting and trapping to resume in areas east and west of the town of Gardiner in Park County.

State officials closed the gray wolf season in those areas on Dec. 10. That came after several wolves collared for scientific research were killed, drawing complaints from wildlife advocates.

The move prompted a lawsuit from sporting groups and a state lawmaker from

Park County, Rep. Alan Redfield, who said the public was not given enough chance to weigh in on the closures.

In his order, Swandal sided with the plaintiffs. He said the lack of public notice appeared to violate the Montana Constitution and threatened to deprive the public of the legal right to harvest wolves.

He ordered the state “to immediately reinstitute and allow hunting and trapping of wolves in all areas of Park County.”

A Jan. 14 hearing was scheduled in the case. The other plaintiffs are Citizens for Balanced Use, Big Game Forever, Montana Outfitters and Guides Association and Montana Sportsman for Fish and Wildlife.

A spokesman for the state,

Ron Aasheim, said Montana wildlife commissioners followed proper public notice requirements before issuing the closures.

Wildlife advocate Marc Cooke said the lawsuit over the 60-square-mile closure area revealed the “irrational hatred” of some hunting and trapping supporters.

“You have 145,000 square miles in Montana, and they’re fighting over a measly 60 square miles of land that is critical habitat for these animals. To me, it’s very vindictive,” he said.

Montana had an estimated 650 wolves at the end of 2011. Through Wednesday hunters reported killing 103 of the animals and trappers had killed at least 30 more.

State officials lifted quotas on wolves across most of

Montana this spring in hopes of decreasing a predator population blamed for livestock attacks and driving down elk numbers in some areas.

But park officials said at least seven Yellowstone wolves — including five wearing tracking collars — were shot by hunters in Montana, Idaho and Wyoming. Also shot were four collared wolves originally from the park but now living outside it. Three more shot in the vicinity of the park had unknown origins and were not wearing collars, park officials said.

The current season marks Montana’s first experience with wolf trapping since the animals lost their endangered species protections last year under an order from Congress.

Conservationists Save Wyoming Forest Area

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) • A conservation group was able to preserve part of a national forest in western Wyoming with an \$8.75 million buyout of oil and gas leases secured by last-minute donations, including \$750,000 from the founder of online stock broker TD Ameritrade.

The Trust for Public Land was running well short of funds ahead of a Dec. 31 deadline to purchase the development leases near the headwaters of the Hoback River. The gift last week from former investment executive Joe Ricketts helped close the gap.

Ricketts owns a nearby fly-fishing retreat, the Lodge at Jackson Fork Ranch. He previously gave \$1 million to the trust.

“This was a nail-biter right up to the very end. It was a wonderful way to ring in the new year,” Deborah Love, the conservation group’s Northern Rockies director, said Wednesday.

The buyout secures 58,000 acres of leases where Houston-based Plains Exploration and Production planned to drill 136 gas wells.

About 85 percent of those leases are located inside Bridger-Teton National Forest. The rest are on private land.

The conservation group plans to donate the leases in the forest back to the U.S. Forest Service so they can be permanently retired as provided for under the 2010 Wyoming Range Legacy Act.

Several environmental groups including the Wyoming Outdoor Council, American Rivers, Citizens for the Wyoming Range, and The Wilderness

Society also were involved in the three-month fundraising campaign.

“It was the kind of thing that warms your heart really when you see how important a place like this is to their community,” Love said.

The private land leases underlie two ranches and a subdivision in the Bonduant area and several of those surface owners made donations. In all, contributions came in from about 1,000 people, including many in the Jackson area, she said.

About 250 people attended a Dec. 21 fundraiser in Jackson that featured Wyoming bands and local microbrews. The event raised about \$13,000. An additional \$1,500 came from members of a Rock Springs steelworkers union.

Love on Wednesday identified the effort’s single largest donor, who previously had remained anonymous, as Swiss billionaire Hansjorg Wyss.

Wyss, who recently moved to Wilson, gave \$4.25 million through his foundation in the early phases of the buyout effort.

“The number of donations and the breadth of the coalition shows just how much support there is for keeping the Hoback as it is today, and open to everyone for hunting, fishing, and hiking,” Wyss said through Wyss Foundation spokesman Matt Lee-Ashley.

Wyss also has donated tens of millions to conservation causes in Idaho, Montana, Nevada and Utah. He aided the 2010 buyout of Montana logging tracts with \$35 million.

PXP officials did not return a message seeking comment.

USDA AGREES TO IMPROVE BISON RECORDS REQUESTS

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • The federal agency responsible for protecting animal and plant health has agreed to improve how it responds to public-records requests after a Montana wildlife advocacy group claimed the agency regularly put off responses to Freedom of Information Act queries.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture’s Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service will now provide an explanation when it claims that unusual circumstances prevent the agency from responding to FOIA requests within the statutory limits.

The agency’s responses also will include a phone number or website to track requests, and its staff will be

trained on responding to requests, according to the settlement agreement approved by U.S. District Judge Donald Molloy on Dec. 21.

A Montana wildlife advocacy group sued APHIS in March 2012 over delayed responses to public-records requests and a failure to turn over all requested documents related to wild bison from Yellowstone National Park.

The Buffalo Field Campaign’s six requests between 2011 and 2012 involve records from APHIS programs dealing with bison disease and population control, and include tracing reports for diseased cattle in Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

The advocacy group said in its lawsuit that the federal

agency was unresponsive to its requests or used an “unusual circumstances” exception to repeatedly delay responding to requests. When the agency finally did respond, some documents were withheld, the advocacy group said.

The Freedom of Information Act requires an agency to respond to a public-records request within 20 working days. There is an exception that allows a government agency facing unusual circumstances to extend that deadline by 10 working days.

The circumstances can include the need to search for records from several offices, the need to consult among different groups or the sheer number of records requested.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

“The world is content with setting right the surface of things.”
— *Cardinal John Newman*

I’ve always liked the deceptive element to bridge, so this hand, which I was shown from the National Swiss Teams Final a few years ago, was especially pleasing.

Against the contract of three no-trump West led the spade six, and the chances of success did not look rosy, with the blockages in clubs and diamonds, not to mention a wide-open heart suit.

With limited practical chances, South thought a little deception might come to his aid. He tried the effect of the spade nine from dummy, and when the eight appeared on his right, he overtook with the king. Cashing the diamond ace and queen brought down the jack, and declarer could now lead a low club from hand.

For West, it looked exactly as if his partner held the doubleton spade eight, and South had begun with the bare ace-king in that suit. It seemed unnecessarily dangerous to let declarer reach dummy to cash his good diamonds, so he rose with the club ace and, after long consideration, produced his “safe” spade exit.

Now South went up with dummy’s jack and cashed the diamonds. At this point declarer already had nine tricks, but West was so disconcerted when the spade jack held, that he discarded a club on the run of the diamonds, As a result that suit also came in without further loss, giving South no fewer than 12 tricks!

The play to trick one is certainly a useful tool to add to your armory.

In 1990, ousted Panamanian leader Manuel Noriega surrendered to U.S. forces, 10 days after taking refuge in the Vatican's diplomatic mission.

In 1993, President George H.W. Bush and Russian President Boris Yeltsin signed the START II missile-reduction treaty in Moscow. (However, the agreement ultimately fell apart.)

Ten years ago: Taking a brief timeout from his two-week vacation, President George W. Bush visited Fort Hood in Texas, where he rallied Army troops as the nation faced the prospect of war with Iraq. David West-erfield, the man who'd kidnapped and murdered 7-year-old neighbor Danielle van Dam, was sentenced to death by a judge in San Diego. No. 2 Ohio State won its first championship in 34 years, beating No. 1 Miami 31-24 in the Fiesta Bowl.

Five years ago: Sen. Barack Obama won Democratic caucuses in Iowa, while Mike Huckabee won Republican caucuses. After nearly 27 years in prison, Texas inmate Charles Chatman was set free by a judge because of new DNA evidence showing he'd been wrongly convicted of rape. In the Democratic caucuses, President Barack Obama ran unopposed.
