## Trial Set in Manslaughter Case

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**TWIN FALLS** • A trial date has been set for Cayde Lee Lish, the 21-year-old man accused of stabbing Jerimiah Paiz, 24, to death in October.

Lish is scheduled to go to trial by jury on May 13. The trial, which could last 10 days, was scheduled during a hearing by phone Mon-

day afternoon in Twin Falls County 5th District Court. Judge Richard Bevan will preside over the trial.

Judge Randy Stoker withdrew from the case in December,

saying he was aware of the circumstances of the case and the alleged victim, and didn't feel comfortable being the judge in the case.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb had already passed the case to two special prosecutors from Ada County, George Gunn and Kai Wittwer. Loeb said too many people in his office had

a connection to Lish, Paiz or their families to prosecute the case without bias.

A pretrial conference is scheduled for May 6.

Lish is charged with voluntary manslaughter for the death of Paiz. Police say Lish stabbed Paiz multiple times following a verbal altercation outside Canyon Crest Dining and Event Center on Oct. 6.

## Idaho Dems Respond to State of the State

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**BOISE** • Progress is in motion, but we can do better.

That was the message of a joint speech given by House and Senate Democrats Tuesday morning, a day after Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter gave his State of the State address to the Legislature.

In the speech, House Minority Leader John Rusche, D-Lewiston, and Senate Minority Leader Michelle Stennett, D-Ketchum, applauded Republican leadership for addressing ethics and said they supported Otter's call for local option taxes to expand local governments' revenue options. They also lauded Otter's Hire One More Employee Act, which, among other features, gives incentives to employers to hire veterans.

But, Stennett and Rusche added, there's more work to do.

Democrats in the Idaho Legislature want to establish an independent ethics commission in addition to ethics training set up by House and Senate leadership. The Democrats tried to set up the commission last year, but the effort failed after joint working group meetings between Republicans and Democrats.

"We still stand by what we did last year," Stennett said.

And while Democrats have long pushed for a local option sales tax, Stennett said it shouldn't be used as a one-size-fits-all for the revenue reduction that would happen if the Legislature repeals personal property tax, as Otter wants to do.

The important thing, Stennett said, is to not decimate local government budgets while avoiding a tax shift onto homeowners and other taxpayers with a personal property tax repeal.

"That's not thoughtful legislating," she said. Both Stennett and Rusche called for an in-depth discussion on options for revenue replacement for local governments, and said the caucus hasn't taken a position on personal property tax repeal.

# DEMOLITION BEGINS at New Home for Cassia Courts

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**BURLEY** • After more than 10 years of preparation, Cassia County officials are less than a year away from completing a new judicial complex building.

The latest step was the start of the demolition of Burley's former Safeway grocery store. On Monday, construction workers began renovating the building to become the county's judicial complex.

County officials have pushed for a new judicial complex since 1999. However, after failing to convince voters to pass a bond to fund the project, the county decided to slowly save enough funds to pay for the project.

"We have officially signed the contract on Monday at 11 a.m. and demolition started right after that," Dennis Crane, commission chairman for Cassia County, said Monday.

The county purchased the 16,000-square-foot building at the corner of Overland Avenue

and 16th Street in Burley for \$60,000 in June 2011. The building is one block south of the county's historic courthouse.

Due to growth and security concern, that older building is no longer the best location for coun-

ty court needs, Crane said.

"These older courthouses have too many doors which make it difficult in these high-profile cases," Crane said. "There are too many chances for the good guys

### Timeline of a Judicial Complex

**July 1999:** Cassia County officials begin discussing funding options to build a new county judicial complex, including attempting to pass a bond or use a lease-back option.

**June 2011:** After failing to pass a bond, county officials begin saving enough money to fund purchasing and renovating a building for a county judicial complex. On June 27, county officials close a \$600,000 deal on the 16,000-square-foot former Safeway grocery store building. Cost to remodel the building is \$1.9 million.

**August 2012:** Architects finish design plans for the building.

**November 2012:** County officials approve a construction bid to Starr Corp.

**January 2013:** Construction officially begins on the building. Estimated completion time is late summer 2013.

**US Stocks Fall Ahead of Earnings Season Kickoff**

**NEW YORK** • U.S. stocks closed lower Tuesday as traders awaited the start of the corporate earnings season. The Dow Jones industrial average dropped 55.44 points, or 0.4 percent, to 13,328.85. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 4.74, or 0.3 percent, to 1,457.15. The Nasdaq composite index shed 7.01, or 0.2 percent, to 3,091.81. Alcoa reported its fourth-quarter financial results after the market closed, marking the unofficial kickoff to weeks of earnings announcements from U.S. companies. The aluminum maker said its revenue results exceeded the expectations of Wall Street analysts, while per-share earnings were roughly in line with expectations. Alcoa rose 20 cents, or 2.1 percent, to \$9.30 in late trading. Alcoa is traditionally the first of the 30 companies in the Dow average to report earnings.

**Northwest Nazarene to Open Twin Falls Campus**

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**TWIN FALLS** • Soon, there will be more master's degree options to choose from without leaving Twin Falls. Northwest Nazarene University is opening a Twin Falls center in a formerly vacant office building on Meadows Drive. NNU will offer master's degree programs in business administration and social work. The university will continue to offer counseling degrees. "Eventually, we hope to expand offerings to many more graduate programs," said Ron Galloway, NNU's associate dean for new site development. The Nampa-based private university recently received

an occupancy permit from the city of Twin Falls. The school's center is across the street from the College of Southern Idaho. "Our goal is to be in and offering classes to graduate students this spring," said Ron Galloway, NNU's associate dean for new site development. Northwest Nazarene University representatives visited with CSI officials in 2011 to talk about potentially expanding its offerings in Twin Falls. The local office isn't staffed yet, and Galloway said he doesn't know how many employees will be at the Twin Falls center. He said as students express interest in programs, classes will begin. Initially, the center will focus on of-

fering evening degree programs. Galloway said university officials hope to offer a nursing program in the future. They're also looking at the possibility of undergraduate degree completion programs for students who start at CSI. NNU doesn't have a plan to compete with CSI, Galloway said. The two schools have worked together for decades. Jeff Fox, CSI's executive vice president, said NNU has top-notch programs in education and counseling. CSI isn't necessarily partnering with the university, he said, but has a great relationship with the school. He said NNU's offerings will replicate some of the programs already offered locally through CSI's sister

institutions. South-central Idaho residents can choose from about 50 bachelors and master's degree programs locally through partnerships with Idaho's public four-year universities. Galloway said NNU is developing campuses in Twin Falls, Idaho Falls, Colorado Springs, Colo. and San Jose, Costa Rica, in addition to the university's existing sites in Nampa and Boise.

**One More Day of Warmth**



One more day of mild temperatures before the next shot of colder air arrives Thursday into the weekend. Today, temperatures will push into the low to possibly mid-40s in many valley locations, with mid- to upper-30s in the higher elevations and a mix of sunshine and clouds.

On Wednesday night, a strong cold front will start to work across Idaho and should arrive in the Magic Valley and Wood River region early Thursday morning. Precipitation at first could fall as a mix of rain and snow, but temperatures will fall and winds will increase gusting to 30 mph. The drive to work and school Thursday morning could be messy with moderate snow showers, blowing and drifting snow, and visibility problems. Snow amounts by Thursday evening could range from 3 to 6 inches across the Magic Valley. It's not out of the question that the South Hills and even the Albion Mountains could see 5 to 10 inches of snow. Travel during the day Thursday will be hazardous. Snow showers will continue Friday and temperatures will continue to get colder. Highs Friday will be in the low 20s and even upper teens by Saturday. The colder air will stick around as we go through the rest of the weekend and head into early next week.

**Wings in Winter**

In late December I tagged along with members of the Prairie Falcon Audubon Society for the annual Christmas Bird Count. I saw a lot of different birds — and a muskrat — in those four hours I spent walking with my group.

Though I tapped out around lunchtime, the groups went on and observed 99 species. Sarah Harris, president of the Prairie Falcon Audubon, said this is a record number for this count, which has been conducted for 38 years.

"I am certain that we would have broken 100 if snowflakes and rain drops had not interfered with our ability to see," Harris said in an email days after the count. Notable birds spotted that day included a higher than usual numbers of butes — both red-tailed and rough-legged. Some rare bird sightings included the greater sage grouse, horned grebe, mew gull, northern rough-winged swallow, barn swallow, winter wren and swamp sparrow. The group also tallied more American kestrels, Eurasian collared doves, mourning doves, California quail, double-crested cormorants, common goldeneye, American coot, belted kingfisher, northern flicker and cedar waxwings than ever before.



Throughout her long life, she recited endless poems, "ditties" and songs for her children, their cousins and many friends.

When they retired from the Forest Service, Helen and Ike moved to Garden Valley, where they lived for more than 30 years on Mills Mountain View Ranch, Ike's family home, overlooking the South Fork of the Payette River. It became a gathering place as it had been in years before for family and friends and a community they both loved. Helen was passionate about the development of the Garden Valley Library and was tirelessly and actively involved there and in the historic Syringa Club.

After Ike's death in 2001, Helen moved to Hailey, Idaho, where she enjoyed her family, old and new friends, and furthered her appreciation for the Silver Creek Preserve with countless "adventures," walks and picnics. # Do No Harm?

Having successfully pushed partial responsibility for public school funding to the local school district and the safe haven of the supplemental levy, the Governor suggested Monday that the state do much the same thing again — with cities, counties, colleges and all other local taxing entities.

The Governor wants to eliminate the business equipment tax, more commonly and more erroneously referred to as the personal property tax. When the tax is removed — and \$141 million is taken away from cities, counties and other local taxing districts — the Governor wants those tax districts to come to you and ask you to vote on whether you'd like them to maintain services that would otherwise be cut.

In short, the Governor wants to replace the personal property tax with a local option tax. Except the local option tax is the euphemism for a plan to create a tax rather than being a true replacement.

Interestingly, the Governor auditioned his proposal to eliminate personal property tax with the media last Friday and emphasized his commitment to “do no harm” to funds that local taxing bodies rely on. In his State of the State address three days later, Otter said that his proposal “isn't necessarily about using state revenue to make counties ‘whole.’” So much for do no harm.

Of course, the Governor did say that his budget would set aside \$20 million to pay cities and counties to ease the transition. Let's see: \$141 million goes away and is replaced by \$20 million. That's 14 cents on the dollar, clearly indicating that Monday's statement on not making counties whole was far closer to the truth than Friday's “do no harm.”

This is not to say that the local option tax is without merit. Currently allowed only in “resort” communities, we editorialized in its favor a year ago as a way of providing cities and counties to pay for something that their residents wanted enough to pay for. We like the emphasis on “option.”

Monday's proposal would make the local tax more of a necessity than an option. Just like local school districts have been forced into asking residents to approve supplemental levies to backfill state funding shortfalls, cities and counties would need to do the same to replace a net loss of \$121 million.

What does this mean for individual local governments?


On Monday, Twin Falls City Manager Travis Rothweiler estimated the city would lose up to \$1.3 million if personal property tax is eliminated. Of course, at 14 cents on the dollar, the city may get back a tidy \$182,000. So where's the harm in that?

Worse yet is the predicament in Camas County, which currently receives close to 40 percent of its budget from the personal property tax. With just more than 1,100 residents, there simply are no options — local or otherwise — that could possibly make up the shortfall.

Eliminate the personal property tax Mr. Governor? Perhaps.

Eliminate the personal property tax while doing no harm to local taxing districts, Mr. Governor? Not even close!

We hope the Legislature says “No” to the Governor's plan and demands from themselves a more thoughtful and far more thorough solution.



# A 'Zero Option' for Afghanistan

Afghan President Hamid Karzai's visit this week to Washington marks one of the final big decision points in America's 11-year Afghanistan war. This week's meetings are likely to determine the final U.S. footprint in Afghanistan after 2014, when all international combat operations are slated to end. And that residual number of U.S. forces could well be zero.

Recent reports suggest that the White House is looking at troop options ranging from 3,000 to as many as 15,000 stay-behind troops. Many think that the final figure will be well under 10,000. These numbers are much diminished from proposals seriously considered even 12 to 24 months ago of a long-term presence in the range of 20,000 to 35,000 troops. The realities of shrinking budgets and crumpled public support for the war have dramatically trimmed those expectations. In recent weeks, vigorous debate has been under way inside the administration in advance of Karzai's visit to sort out a minimalist approach that will protect long-term U.S. interests in the region, but do so with the absolute leanest outlay of dollars and troops.

Karzai comes to this week's discussions convinced that the United States desperately needs long-term military bases in Afghanistan. He sees an America without other viable options to maintain its regional influence, cajole Pakistan, threaten Iran or launch raids against nearby terrorists. Because of this, Karzai thinks that he holds all the cards in the upcoming negotiations. He is absolutely convinced that the United States has no workable strategic choice but to station substantial U.S. troops in Afghanistan after 2014. But Karzai has it wrong. There is strong sentiment in the United States to look at all the options. Here are five reasons why:

**Iraq.** The outcome of America's war in Iraq sets a strong

precedent for a similar “zero” U.S. military posture in Central Asia. Iraq has not become an Iranian puppet state nor descended into chaos since the United States withdrew all its military forces at the end of 2011. The United States maintains a robust diplomatic presence there — and presumably conducts intelligence activities — to protect its interests. Iraqi political decisions are often at odds with U.S. preferences; few think that a U.S. troop presence would change that reality. Iraq's failure to grant remaining U.S. soldiers legal immunity from Iraqi law doomed any possibility of a residual force there; the same could happen in Afghanistan, and withdrawal could be seen as an equally viable outcome by many Americans.

**Budgetary pressure.** With a debt crisis and crumbling infrastructure at home, enthusiasm on Capitol Hill for spending taxpayer dollars on foreign adventures is at an all-time low. The recent action to avert the fiscal cliff has delayed, but not fixed, the imbalance between U.S. spending and revenue. A perpetual flow of billions of aid dollars to Afghanistan after 2014 — for U.S. troops or for Afghans — will be a much tougher sell two years from now than it is today. And it is very tough today.

**War weariness.** By 2014, the United States will have been at war in Afghanistan for over 12 years. The connection between Afghanistan and the 9/11 attacks has frayed deeply since Osama bin Laden's death at the hands of U.S. forces in 2011. With over 2,000 Americans killed and another 17,000 wounded in over a decade of inconclusive fighting, most Americans are looking for an exit from a seemingly interminable war. Maintaining congressional and popular support for an unending de-

ployment of thousands of U.S. troops after 12 years at war will be supremely difficult, even more so if casualties continue.

**Stand-off capabilities.** The United States has powerful remote intelligence, surveil-

ing civil war that rent the country in the 1990s. The ability to see and strike terrorist groups that aim to attack the United States or its allies from within the region would be degraded. Al Qaeda could surge into growing un-

lance and strike capabilities that could only be dreamed of in the 1990s. These capabilities increasingly can be employed from “stand-off” distances, with a few flying from as far as the United States. Some of these capabilities require regional basing, but Afghanistan is not the only country that can provide low-visibility basing options. Drones have changed the face of warfare, and used in concert with U.S. intelligence into remote areas, they are increasingly lethal to terrorists.

**U.S. intelligence networks.** Eleven years of extensive quiet intelligence efforts partnered with Afghans (and Pakistanis) have created a deep web of friendly contacts that will be maintained long after 2014. In some ways, the post-2014 environment in the Afghanistan-Pakistan border area could evolve into a prolonged “intelligence war,” with hundreds of U.S. operatives and billions of covert dollars invested in preventing further terrorist attacks on the United States. Given its vital importance, this undertaking will endure — regardless of the size of the residual U.S. military presence.

U.S. President Barack Obama will have to weigh the substantial risks inherent in a “Zero Option” for Afghanistan. Absent the stabilizing influence of some numbers of U.S. troops, Afghanistan could slip back into chaos, experiencing a new version of the devastat-

governed spaces and perhaps re-establish a more prominent foothold. U.S. influence on a nuclear-armed Pakistan would undoubtedly lessen if U.S. troops were no longer stationed next door. And the potential for the United States to put pressure on Iran from U.S. forces posted near its eastern border would vanish. By any measure, it is a suboptimal posture for the United States in the region, but not necessarily an untenable one. Obama must consider all these risks as he sits down with Karzai to hammer out this last chapter of the war. Karzai would be wise to avoid overplaying his hand. Even though the Zero Option is not the best choice to protect American long-term regional interests, it certainly remains on the table. Overreach on Karzai's part could easily sour prospects for any sort of enduring U.S. military presence.

For Americans, the Afghanistan war is entering its final phase. Obama knows that this war will end on his watch. His legacy as president will inevitably be shaped by its outcome. Whether U.S. troops ultimately stay or leave Afghanistan after 2014 may now come down to just one week of tough bargaining. Each nation has a great deal at stake.



# Detective: Holmes Played Puppets after Arrest

CENTENNIAL, Colo. (AP)

• It was just hours after a deadly Colorado theater shooting, and James Holmes was not acting like a man accused of methodically planning the attack and booby trapping his apartment.

As a police detective interviewed the suspect they'd picked up outside the theater, he started pretending the paper bags on his hands — meant to preserve gunshot residue — were puppets.

The former neuroscience graduate student tried to jam a staple into an electrical outlet. He played with a cup on the table. At least two officers noted that his eyes were dilated.

The description came Tuesday as prosecutors try to show that Holmes should face a trial for the July 20 attack.

Defense attorneys say Holmes is mentally ill, and have used their questions to try to make that point. They haven't elaborated but plan to call at least two witnesses later in the week who could discuss Holmes' mental health.

The description of Holmes after the attack, given by police detective Craig Appel, seemed to undercut prosecutors' attempts to show Holmes as methodical, spending two months to assemble his arsenal.

The first recorded purchase: Two tear gas grenades, ordered online May 10.

Holmes also bought two Glock handguns, a shotgun and an AR-15 rifle, along with 6,295 rounds of ammunition, targets, body armor and chemicals, prosecutors said.

He dyed his hair bright orange, then bought a scope and plastic bullets on July 1, the visit and the new hair color documented in security video.

Finally, he purchased glycerin and potassium per-

manganate — chemicals that could combine to create fire and sparks — from a Denver science store. At some point, he also improvised napalm, as well as thermite, a substance which burns so hot that water can't extinguish the blaze.

Holmes' purchases were split between two planned attacks, prosecutors said — the theater shooting and a booby trapped apartment that would've blown up if anyone had entered.

The bottle of glycerin was meant to fall into the per-

manganate when the door to his apartment opened, to cause an explosion and then a fire, prosecutors said.

The manager of The Science Company, Steve Grebe, confirmed the purchase, noting the amount was small and the materials are common in junior high experiments.

The setup in Holmes' apartment had deadly potential, though. Parts of Holmes' carpet were soaked with gasoline and ammonium chloride, a white powder, was poured onto the floor in strips, FBI bomb technician

Garrett Gumbinner said.

"It would have ignited and the whole apartment would have exploded or caught fire," Gumbinner said.

He said the system had two other initiating systems. One was a pyrotechnics firing box that would have been triggered by the remote control unit of a toy car left along with a boom box set to play loud music. Gumbinner said Holmes told him he hoped the music would lure someone and lead them to play with the car, thereby detonating the explosives

The other initiating system was a model rocket launch box which operated by means of infrared light, but Holmes told investigators it wasn't armed, Gumbinner said.

The attempt at a distraction speaks to a plan to escape but the traps weren't triggered. Holmes, clad from head to toe in body armor, was found standing by his car outside the theater. He told investigators that the booby trapped apartment was an effort to pull police away from the theater.

## BLM Reviews Plan for NV Horse Sanctuary

RENO, Nev. (AP) • Federal land managers have identified a wide range of issues that must be addressed to move forward with a proposal to establish a wild horse ecosanctuary over 820 square miles in northeast Nevada, from the impact on neighboring mustangs, livestock and wildlife to fencing, water supplies and the local economy.

The one thing most of the thousands of commenters agree upon is that the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's current horse management policy isn't working.

The BLM issued a 228-page public scoping document on Tuesday that it will use to develop a range of alternatives to examine. The effort will be done in conjunction with the plan by Madeline Pickens and her group Saving America's Mustangs to develop the Northeast Nevada Wild Horse Ecosanctuary that has been described as part dude ranch, part Jurassic Park.

The idea is to give visitors an up-close look at free-roaming mustangs in the wild along with a taste of Western rural life, while at the same time keep horses BLM removes from the range from spending the rest of their lives in costly holding facilities, mostly in the Midwest.

Pickens and other backers say it could become a vacation destination that would help pump millions of dollars into the local economy.


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## Council: New Crosswalk Worthwhile if It Reassures Citizens

**TWIN FALLS** • City Council members said they should err on the side of safety when they approved a new crosswalk near a Twin Falls school.

Their unanimous Monday evening vote will create a new painted sidewalk at the intersection of Second Avenue North and Dierkes Street, near Magic Valley High School.

The idea was first broached in October, when Heidi Heil, who owns Serenity Funeral Chapel at 502 Second Ave. N., contacted the Idaho Transportation Department to request crosswalk markings.

City engineers at first concluded there wasn't a great need for a sidewalk at the location because of low pedestrian traffic and an existing crosswalk at Second Avenue North and Castleford Street, one block

northwest.

Monday, City Engineer Jackie Fields said a presentation to the city Traffic Safety Commission by students from Magic Valley High School encouraged the commission to recommend that the council approve the sidewalk.

Answering council questions, Fields said the crosswalk would cost about \$300 to install, plus maintenance over time.

Councilwoman Rebecca

Mills-Sojka said she would support the crosswalk even if it wasn't completely necessary, if it made the community feel safer.

Mayor Greg Lanting agreed, adding that it was important to remember that Second Avenue North is a state highway in that area, which affects traffic.

The cost of installing the crosswalk seems like a small amount if it saves one life in the next 20 years, he said.

The report states that Vielmas saw the woman, chased her downstairs and hit her on the side of her face, causing her to fall into a glass entertainment center. The woman said she passed out and called law enforcement when she woke up.

According to the police report, the other man at the scene had a similar story to the woman. The report states that Vielmas allegedly admitted to breaking the window and coming into

the home.

Vielmas was arrested and charged with domestic battery in the presence of children, battery and unlawful entry.

According to court records, if Michael Holley is found to be competent, the defense also asked the court to order an evaluation to

provide insight into his mental health.

A trial scheduled for Jan. 2 was cancelled because of the evaluation.

In October, prosecutors charged Lisa Holley with an additional count of grand theft by deception. Prosecutors say Holley falsely claimed she was pregnant with triplets and received more than \$1,000 in cash and goods from church members in Buhl. In a November interview with the *Times-News*, the Holleys

denied the charges and maintained Lisa was pregnant and miscarried.

A preliminary hearing, which has been delayed several times, is now scheduled for Friday in the latter case. Twin Falls County 5th District Magistrate Judge Randy Harris said the hearing will not be delayed again.

In a December hearing, Lisa Holley's attorney Tim Williams said he was working on a possible mental health evaluation for her.

## Trial Delayed for Blaine County Vehicular Manslaughter Case

Steven Tyler Jameson, of Bellevue, is now scheduled for a Blaine County jury

trial on April 4 according to online court records.

Steven Franco, 26, died after falling down a cliff at Magic Reservoir in June.

Blaine County Sheriff Gene Ramsey said Franco was knocked off the cliff when Jameson backed his

1999 Jeep Grand Cherokee toward the cliff edge.

Jameson was also charged with leaving the scene of an injury accident and driving without privileges.

Witnesses at the scene reported Jameson got out of the vehicle, looked over

the edge, got back in the vehicle and left the scene, Ramsey told the *Times-News* in June.

A pretrial conference is scheduled for March 18 and motion hearings are scheduled for Jan. 16 and Feb. 27, all in Blaine County 5th District Court.

**GOODING** • A formal hearing has been set for February to decide if the city of Gooding can bypass a public vote to take on long-term debt for a water improvement project.

City officials are asking a judge to deem the \$9.45 million project an ordinary and necessary expense for the city.

On Tuesday, Fifth District Judge John Butler scheduled a formal hearing for 9 a.m. Feb. 15.

The proceedings are expected to last for less than one day.

"The issue before the court is simple," Butler said during Tuesday's hearing.

About 20 people — including city officials and residents — attended the hearing, which was over in about 10 minutes.

Butler said it was his understanding that there wouldn't be any arguments or testimony heard Tuesday.

Resident Jo Ann Doerr

and a group of other citizens oppose the city's project and have hired an attorney.

They've filed a motion to dismiss the city's petition for judicial confirmation.

Gooding Mayor Duke Morton told the *Times-News* in December that the current water system has rotting pipes and high sediment levels.

It has caused poor water movement and flooding into some basements.

Butler said during Tuesday's hearing that he knows a lot of citizens are interested in the city's petition.

Anyone who wants to be heard, he said, needs to file a formal answer or motion to dismiss.

There's a deadline: 5 p.m. Jan. 22.

Butler cautioned those attending Tuesday's hearing that the formal court proceedings in February won't be like a public hearing at a city council meeting.

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## US Seared during Hottest Year on Record

**WASHINGTON** • America set an off-the-charts heat record in 2012.

A brutal combination of a widespread drought and a mostly absent winter pushed the average annual U.S. temperature last year up to 55.32 degrees Fahrenheit, the government announced Tuesday. That's a full degree warmer than the old record set in 1998.

Breaking temperature records by an entire degree is unprecedented, scientists say.

Normally, records are broken by a tenth of a degree or so.

"It was off the chart," said Deke Arndt, head of climate monitoring at the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, N.C., which calculated the temperature records.

Last year, he said, will go down as "a huge exclamation point at the end of a couple decades of warming!"

warmest year on record.

Scientists say the U.S. heat is part global warming in action and natural weather variations. The drought that struck almost two-thirds of the nation and a La Nina weather event helped push temperatures higher, along with climate change from man-made greenhouse gas emissions, said Katharine Hayhoe, director of the Climate Science Center at Texas Tech University. She said temperature increases are happening faster than scientists predicted.

# VEGAN? You Bet

Try these recipes, and you'll come back for more.

**KIMBERLY** • Question: How do you get traditional consumers to love vegan food?

Answer: Don't tell them it's vegan until after they've eaten it. (And, presumably, after they've made all those yummy sounds.)

Take it from Jill Skeem: "The biggest misconception for people is that healthy food doesn't taste good," she said.

Skeem should know. She is a rural Kimberly-based health counselor, educator and chef who also happens to be a morning host on 1310 KLIX Radio in Twin Falls. And she has just self-published her first hard-cover cookbook. It's called "Comfort Food gets a vegan makeover." This is actually Skeem's second cookbook. Her first, a smaller soft-cover volume titled "Jill's Real Food Cookbook," was published in 2004.

"Comfort Food" is a 149-page, full-color book containing 62 vegan recipes, about 95 percent of them Skeem's. The recipes — which contain no butter, cheese, meat or dairy products — are divided into eight categories: breakfast, appetizers, soups, sandwiches, main courses, side dishes, salads and desserts. Vegans and others, such as vegetarians and meat-eaters alike, may adore many of the recipes and have lots from which to choose.

Vegans, by the way, consume no animal products, including dairy. Vegetarians, meanwhile, don't eat meat, fish or poultry, but might eat dairy products such as cheese, eggs, yogurt or milk. Skeem's new book showcases




Author Jill Skeem makes a tempeh 'Reuben' sandwich from her cookbook.

recipes for baked oatmeal, beer-battered green beans, vegetable egg rolls, butternut squash ginger soup, tempeh Reuben and tofu marinara sub sandwiches, lasagna, shepherd's pie, polenta fries, coleslaw, Asian noodle and Greek couscous salads and, for dessert, baklava bites and cherry crumble.

And that's just a sampling. "Comfort Food gets a vegan makeover" has been in the works since March 2009 when Skeem and Magic Valley photographer/designer Jason Lugo teamed up to get the project going.

Skeem received the first copy of the 8-by-8-inch book on Dec. 27, about a month after she and Lugo finished it. She initially ordered 1,000 copies and

plans to order more. "I couldn't wipe the smile off my face when I received it and found that it was what I had expected," she said. "I feel like I have been pregnant for four years and have finally had the baby!"

Skeem maintained a torrid schedule as she and Lugo hammered out the book's illustrations and details. Most days after finishing her radio show at 10 a.m., she came home, loaded the car with food and other accessories and then drove to Declo to meet Lugo. They then spent six to seven hours photographing two or three food dishes.

"That was the hardest part," Skeem said.



## Cornmeal Waffles Are Good Breakfast-for-dinner Candidate

Add these to your breakfast-for-dinner file. We liked the texture and bits of crisped cheese. To accommodate palates that don't take kindly to chipotle, stir in that ingredient after half the waffles have been made. You'll need a round waffle iron that makes 6 1/2-inch, Belgian-style waffles.

Serve with a fried egg and Hatch enchilada sauce.

### Cornmeal Waffles With Cheddar, Chipotle and Scallions

Makes about eight 6 1/2-inch waffles.

- 3 or 4 scallions
- 1 tablespoon chipotle en adobo
- 6 tablespoons (3/4 stick) unsalted butter
- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup stone-ground yellow cornmeal
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 4 ounces shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- 2 large eggs
- 1 3/4 cups low-fat buttermilk

Place a baking sheet in the oven; preheat to

225 degrees. Heat the waffle iron.

**Trim the scallions**, then cut the white and light-green parts into very thin slices. Discard any seeds from the chipotle en adobo, then finely chop. Melt the butter in the microwave on LOW; cool slightly.

**Whisk together** the flour, cornmeal, sugar, baking powder, salt and baking soda in a mixing bowl.

**Add the cheese** and toss to coat and incorporate, breaking up any clumps.

**Whisk the eggs** in a large liquid measuring cup until blended, then whisk in the buttermilk and chipotle. Gradually whisk in the butter.

**Pour the liquid** ingredients into the flour mixture, whisking gently until evenly moistened.

Use a spatula to fold in the scallions. The batter should be thick.

**Grease the waffle iron** with nonstick cooking oil spray.

**Pour a generous** 1/2 cup of the batter into the center of the heated waffle iron. Spread the batter with a spatula to within 1/2 inch of the edges. Close and bake until deep golden brown. Transfer to the baking sheet. Repeat to use all the batter. Serve warm.

# Turkey Tenderloin Is a Versatile, Overlooked Meat

If you think you've done nearly everything a cook can with boneless, skinless chicken breasts, it might be time to talk turkey.

Other than the big bird at Thanksgiving and ground turkey when they're craving a virtuous burger, most people overlook turkey. And fair enough. Ground turkey can be dry and tasteless. And who has time to roast a bird (or even a massive breast) most nights of the week?

But the turkey tenderloin — a thick strip of meat cut from between the bird's breasts — turns out to be a convenient, delicious and healthy alternative. Because the tenderloin doesn't get much of a workout when the bird is alive, the meat is particularly tender. And like chicken breasts, it is incredibly versatile, taking well to the grill, skillet or oven, and working well with any flavor or marinade.

The tenderloins — which average anywhere between 8

ounces and 1 pound — also are agreeable to a variety of cuts. Slice them crosswise into medallions, lengthwise into tenders for breading and baking, or into chunks for stir-fry.

Because of their size, tenderloins also take well to being stuffed. Use a paring knife to cut a slit along one side into the meat (without going all the way through). This creates a pocket which can be filled with a blend of ricotta cheese, egg, herbs and chopped greens.

The real benefits of turkey tenderloins are the flavor and texture. Though they resemble chicken breasts, and can be used in just about any recipe that calls from them, the flavor is more robust and the texture more tender and moist.

You also save a few calories. A 4-ounce serving of turkey tenderloin has 130 calories and 0.5 grams of fat. The same serving of boneless, skinless chicken breast has 144 calories and nearly 6 grams of fat.

### Chopped Smoky Turkey Burgers with Manchego

Banish all notions of dried out ground turkey burgers. This technique produces truly moist burgers. In fact, when you form the patties, they will be very moist and messy. Once they hit the grill, they hold together fine. Start to finish: 20 minutes. Servings: 4.

- 1 large egg
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon mustard powder
- 1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- Pinch kosher salt
- 1 1/4 pounds turkey tenderloin, cut into large chunks
- 2 ounces prosciutto
- 4 hamburger buns
- 4 ounces manchego cheese

**Heat a grill** to medium. Oil the grates, or coat them with cooking spray.

**In a large bowl**, whisk together the egg, garlic powder, mustard powder, pa-

prika, black pepper and salt. Set aside.

**In a food processor**, combine the turkey and prosciutto. Pulse until the meat is well chopped but still chunky, about 10 seconds total. Scrape the sides of the bowl and pulse again if any large pieces remain unchopped.

**Transfer the meat** to the bowl with the egg mixture, then mix well. Form the meat into 4 loose patties. They will be moist and not hold together well.

**Use a spatula** to carefully place the burgers on the grill and cook, covered, for 4 to 5 minutes. Flip the burgers — they should be firm enough to move easily now — and cook for another 4 to 5 minutes, or until they read 165 degrees at the center. Top each burger with a quarter of the cheese, then serve on a bun.

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## Poached Eggs Great for Breakfast, Lunch or Dinner

The beauty of poached eggs is their versatility. Depending on what you pair them with, they can be breakfast, lunch or even dinner.

So for this quick and easy weekday meal, I serve them with a bed of arugula, a scoop of ricotta cheese — one of the most overlooked cheeses in the dairy case (it's good for more than just lasagna and stuffed shells!) — and a bit of buttered multigrain toast. It's simple. It's filling. And it could be breakfast, lunch or dinner.

Want it to be a bit more robust? Just about any cooked and cooled vegetables could be added to the arugula. Leftover roasted winter vegetables, such as butternut squash or carrots, would be great.

### Poached Eggs over Ricotta

Start to finish: 20 minutes.  
Servings: 4.

4 cups arugula  
2 cups ricotta cheese  
Zest of 1 lemon  
Kosher salt and ground black pepper, to taste  
1 tablespoon white or cider vinegar  
4 large eggs  
Truffle oil  
Minced fresh chives  
4 thick slices multigrain bread, toasted and buttered

Divide the arugula between 4 serving bowls. In a medium bowl, mix

together the ricotta and lemon zest. Season with salt and black pepper. Divide between the serving bowls, spooning it over the arugula. Set aside.

**Bring a large** saucepan of water to a low simmer. Add the vinegar. **Crack each egg** into a small glass. One at a time, gently and slowly pour each egg into the simmering water, bringing the lip of the glass right down to the water so that the egg slides in. Depending on the size of your pan, you may need to cook them in 2 batches. **Cook for 4** minutes, then use a slotted spoon to lift each egg out (letting excess water drip away). Nestle one egg into the ricotta in each serving bowl.

**Season the eggs** with salt and pepper, then drizzle with truffle oil and sprinkle with chives. Serve immediately with the toast.

### Buffalo Wing Burgers

4 servings.

#### For the burgers:

1/2 small yellow onion  
2 medium cloves garlic  
1 tablespoon unsalted butter  
1 tablespoon olive oil, plus more for cooking the burgers  
1/2 teaspoon kosher salt  
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper  
2 teaspoons hot sauce, preferably Frank's  
1/2 teaspoon dried thyme  
1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes  
1 1/4 pounds raw, coarsely ground turkey or chicken (white meat)  
4 whole-wheat potato hamburger buns

#### For the mayo:

1/2 lemon  
1/2 cup low-fat mayonnaise  
1 tablespoon hot sauce, preferably Frank's  
2 teaspoons honey  
1/2 teaspoon ground cayenne pepper

**For the burgers:** Mince the onion to yield 1/3 cup. Mince the garlic.

**Heat the butter** and oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Once the butter has melted, add the onion and salt, stirring to coat. Cook for 2 minutes, then stir in the garlic. Cook for about 8 minutes or until the onion has turned lightly golden, then add the black pepper, hot sauce, thyme and crushed red pepper flakes,

stirring to incorporate.

Transfer to a mixing bowl and cool for 5 minutes.

**Add the ground** turkey or chicken; use slightly dampened hands to gently combine the mixture. Form into 4 patties of equal size.

**Use a little oil** to film the bottom of the skillet (the same one used to cook the onion and garlic). Place over medium-high heat. Add the burgers and cook for 3 to 5 minutes or until browned on the bottom, then turn the burgers over and cook for 3 to 5 minutes or until cooked through; you can tell because the juices will run clear.

**While the burgers** are cooking, make the mayo: Squeeze a tablespoon of lemon juice into a medium bowl. Add the mayonnaise, hot sauce, honey and cayenne pepper, stirring to combine. The yield is a generous 1/2 cup. Refrigerate until ready to use.

**Spread a tablespoon** or so of the mayo on the inside tops and bottoms of the buns. Place the burgers on the bottom buns and complete the sandwiches with the top buns. Serve warm.

## A Healthier Take on Weeknight-friendly Risotto

I'm always searching for ways to make a healthier version of risotto, one of my favorite winter Italian dishes.

Risotto traditionally is made with starchy white rice. That starch is essential to producing a creamy, thick risotto. But I wanted a whole-grain version. Trouble is, brown rice doesn't release nearly as much starch during cooking, so substituting it often produces risotto that is thin and uninspiring.

It took me a few attempts, but I eventually figured out how to have my whole grains and my thick and creamy risotto. And it was simple. I just needed to add starch.

Once I had that down, then I needed to add flavor. For this recipe, I came up with two variations, one with Brussels sprouts and apple, another with asparagus and tomatoes. Both are incredibly delicious.

### Creamy Brown Rice Risotto Two Ways — With Brussels Sprouts and Apple or Asparagus and Tomatoes

Start to finish: 40 minutes (20 minutes active). Servings: 4.

1 cup short grain brown rice (or brown sushi rice)  
2 cups water  
1/2 tablespoon olive oil  
3 ounces prosciutto, chopped  
1 tablespoon minced fresh rosemary  
1 medium yellow onion, finely diced  
1 pound Brussels sprouts, quartered AND 1 firm tart apple, peeled and diced; OR 1 pound asparagus, trimmed and cut into 2-inch pieces AND 1/2 cup oil-packed sliced sun-dried tomatoes (drained)

1/2 cup white wine  
1 1/2 cups low-sodium chicken broth, room temperature  
1/2 tablespoon cornstarch mixed with 1 tablespoon water  
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
Salt and ground black pepper, to taste  
Purchased balsamic glaze, to serve

**In a medium** saucepan over medium-high heat, combine the rice and water. Bring to a boil, then cover, reduce heat to simmer and cook for 20 minutes.

**Remove the pan** from the heat, leaving it covered. The rice will not be completely cooked and there will be some water in the pan. Set aside.

**In a large skillet** over medium-high, heat the oil. Add the prosciutto and cook until crisp. Use a

spoon to transfer the prosciutto to a plate and set aside. Do not wipe out the skillet. Return the pan to the stovetop over medium-high heat and add the rosemary and onion. Sauté until starting to brown, about 4 to 5 minutes.

**Add the Brussels sprouts** and apple OR the asparagus and sun-dried tomatoes. Cook for about 5 minutes, then add the wine and stir vigorously for 1 to 2 minutes to deglaze the pan. Add the rice and any liquid in the pan. Add the chicken broth and stir well. Bring to a simmer and cook, stirring frequently to prevent sticking, until the liquid has thickened and reduced, about 10 minutes. Stir in the cornstarch mixture,

then cook for another minute. **Stir in** the cheese until melted. Season with salt and pepper. Top with crisped prosciutto, then drizzle with balsamic glaze just before serving.

## This Spaghetti Brings Out the Best in Brussels Sprouts

I keep finding new ways to appreciate Brussels sprouts. I love them roasted, but lately I've been shredding them. Thinly sliced, the sprouts can be quickly sautéed.

The method maintains their texture, their bright, slightly bitter taste and their nice green color.

This dish is a perfect example. The sprouts are mixed with caramelized onions and broken spaghetti. The ingredients are few and simple, but the dish is a complex mixture of flavors, with the sweet bite of the onions complementing the sprouts.

### Broken Spaghetti With Shredded Brussels Sprouts and Onions

4 servings.

8 ounces dried spaghetti, broken into approximately 2-inch lengths  
1 1/2 tablespoons olive oil  
2 teaspoons unsalted butter  
1 large onion, thinly sliced (8 ounces)  
8 ounces Brussels sprouts, trimmed, cut in half and thinly sliced  
Salt  
Freshly ground black pepper  
1/2 cup white wine, or homemade or no-salt-added chicken broth  
1/4 teaspoon sugar  
Freshly grated Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese, for garnish (optional)

**Cook the spaghetti** according to the package directions. Transfer the

cooked, drained spaghetti to a large serving bowl and toss with 1 tablespoon of the oil.

**While the spaghetti** is cooking, heat the remaining 1/2 tablespoon of oil with the butter in a large nonstick sauté pan or skillet over medium-high heat. Add the onions and reduce the heat to medium; cook, stirring every minute or so, for 8 to 10 minutes, until the onion is soft and the edges are lightly caramelized.

**Add the Brussels sprouts**, and season with salt and pepper to taste. Increase the heat to medium-high; cook, stirring frequently, for about 5 minutes or until the sprouts have softened but are still bright green. Add the wine or broth and the sugar; stir to combine. Cook for about 2 minutes, until some of the liquid has evaporated and the mixture is still moist but not soupy. Pour over the spaghetti in the bowl and toss to combine well. Taste, and adjust the seasoning as needed.

**Serve warm;** pass the cheese at the table for sprinkling, if desired.

Skeem's head following classes in which she counseled people on healthy eating.

"The students really wanted to eat healthier, but they just didn't know how," she said.

Skeem, who augments her vegan diet with some white-colored fish, was careful not to unintentionally turn off people who might view vegan or vegetarian recipes as just plain weird.

"I didn't want a health or nutritional book," she said. "I just wanted a book with healthier recipes people could easily make by making little changes in their lives."

The recipes — most of which take from 15 minutes to an hour to prepare — make little changes, too, by using vegetable-based ingredients such as brown-rice syrup, tempeh (cooked, fermented soybeans), seitan (wheat gluten), tofu and dulse (red algae).

"I felt like if I could make it close enough to real comfort food without saturated fat and cholesterol, why

wouldn't anyone want to try it?" she asked. "It's so exciting to know that people like your food and that's it's easy to make."

And easy to disguise.

### Tempeh 'Reuben' Sandwich

From "Comfort Food gets a vegan makeover" by Jill Skeem. Serves 2.

- 1 block tempeh, sliced lengthwise
- 2 tablespoons sauerkraut
- 4 slices rye bread or preferred bread
- Soy sauce
- Safflower oil
- For the dressing:**
- 1/3 cup Veganaise
- 2 tablespoons fruit-sweetened ketchup
- 1 teaspoon sweet pickle relish (optional)

**Heat 1 tablespoon oil** in skillet, saute tempeh until golden brown on one side. Add one drop of soy sauce prior to flipping tempeh; saute other side.

with oil, and grill. **Combine Veganaise,** ketchup and relish and mix well; chill 15 minutes prior to use. Spread generous amount of dressing on grilled bread; layer tempeh and sauerkraut on top.

- 1 cup onion, diced
- 1/2 teaspoon dried dill
- 1/2 teaspoon curry powder or turmeric
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon ginger juice, freshly squeezed
- 2-4 cups water

### Carrot Soup with Dill, Curry and Ginger

From "Comfort Food gets a vegan makeover" by Jill Skeem. Serves 2-4.

- 4 cups carrots, peeled and sliced

**Heat oil** in soup pot; saute onions with pinch of sea salt. Add dill and curry powder so the flavors bloom; saute 1-2 minutes. Add carrots; saute 1-2 minutes. **Cover carrots** with water, approximately 2-3 cups. Cover, bring to boil, then reduce to a simmer for 20 minutes or until carrots are

fork tender. **Blend soup,** then add 1/2 teaspoon sea salt; simmer 5 minutes. Taste to see if addi-

tional seasoning is needed. **Grate ginger,** and with fingers squeeze ginger juice into soup.

# Officials Talk Guns, Hold Big Buybacks

The national gun debate swelled Tuesday as Arizona and the nation commemorated the shooting rampage in Tucson, Ariz., two years ago that killed six people and left Rep. Gabrielle Giffords injured — an anniversary that comes on the heels of the mass killing at a Connecticut school. Following is a look at how some state and local leaders are taking action:

**CONNECTICUT** — U.S. Sen. Richard Blumenthal announced Tuesday he plans to introduce federal legislation that would require instant background checks for purchasers of ammunition. It is now illegal to sell firearms and ammunition to certain groups, including felons and the mentally ill. But background checks, Blumenthal said, are only required for the sale of firearms, not the bullets.

**UTAH** — A councilman Spring City wants all residents in the small town to be armed against possible aggressors. Councilman Neil Sorensen says he's drafting a measure that would recommend that a gun be in every household in the town of 1,000, about 90 miles south of Salt Lake City. The measure will go before the full council in February.

**COLORADO** — Following last summer's Aurora theater shooting, a vigorous debate on gun control is expected during the 2013 lawmaking session that starts Wednesday. Democrats now control both chambers of the Legislature so Colorado could see a flurry of measures to curb access to firearms — including a possible assault-weapons ban.

"I want to find a way to eliminate assault weapons, but I'm still trying to figure out how to do that," said Senate President John Morse, a former police chief.

**CALIFORNIA** — A one-day gun buyback program in Los Angeles brought in 2,037 firearms. Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa's office said the weapons collected Dec. 26 included 901 handguns, 698 rifles, 363 shotguns and 75 assault weapons. The buyback is usually held in May but was moved up in response to the Connecticut shooting.

# Judge Reduces Possible Sentence in WikiLeaks Case

**FORT MEADE, Md. (AP)** • A military judge on Tuesday reduced the potential sentence for an Army private accused of sending reams of classified documents to the WikiLeaks website.

Col. Denise Lind made the ruling during a pretrial hearing at Fort Meade for Pfc. Bradley Manning. Lind found that Manning suffered illegal pretrial punishment during nine months in a Marine Corps brig in Quantico, Va. She awarded a total of 112 days off any prison sentence Manning gets if he is con-

victed. Manning was confined to a windowless cell 23 hours a day, sometimes with no clothing. Brig officials say it was to keep him from hurting himself or others.

The judge said that Manning's confinement was "more rigorous than necessary." She added that the conditions "became excessive in relation to legitimate government interests."

Manning faces 22 charges, including aiding the enemy, which carries a maximum of life behind bars. His trial begins March 6.

# WHITE HOUSE RAMPING UP GUN DISCUSSIONS

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • Facing an end-of-the-month deadline, the Obama administration is calling gun owner groups, victims' organizations and representatives from the video game industry to the White House this week for discussions on potential policy proposals for curbing gun violence.

President Barack Obama has ordered an administration-wide task force to send him proposals by the end of January. The group, led by Vice President Joe Biden, was formed in response to last month's massacre of 20 children and six adults at a Newtown, Conn., elementary school. Biden will meet today with gun violence victims' groups and gun safety organizations. On Thursday, he will hold talks with gun ownership groups. He also plans to meet this week with representatives from the entertainment and video game industries.

# Giffords, Kelly Launch Gun Control Lobbying Effort

**TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)** • Former Rep. Gabrielle Giffords and her husband launched a political action committee aimed at curbing gun violence on Tuesday as her Arizona hometown paused to mark the second anniversary of a deadly shooting rampage that left her with severe injuries.

Tucson residents rang bells at 10:11 a.m. — the moment a mentally ill gunman opened fire on Giffords as she met with constituents in 2011, killing six people and leaving 12 others injured. Mayor Jonathan Rothschild rang a bell at a fire station 19 times — one for each victim.

At the same time, two politicians on opposite ends of the gun debate held dueling weapons buy-backs outside a police station. Such events have been held around the country since the shooting at a Connecticut school that revived the gun control debate.

City Councilman Steve Kozachik asked people to turn in their guns for a \$50 gift certificate from Safeway — the grocery store chain that owned the supermarket that was the site of the shooting. He wants to get guns out of people's homes and bring pressure on politicians to

change gun laws.

About 200 firearms, many of them old, some inoperable, were turned in during the event, Tucson police said. They were set to be destroyed later in the day. Kozachik said he handed out about \$10,000 worth of grocery gift certificates.

"We inherited the guns, and we had no use for them," said Jason Munday, who traded in two old rifles. "Figured we'd just get them out of the house."

In response to the event, a Republican outgoing state

senator organized a gathering outside the same station where about a dozen people offered cash for guns. Several people waved signs and held up money to approaching drivers to announce that they would buy their weapons.

Giffords also took a prominent role in the gun debate on the anniversary. She and husband Mark Kelly, a former astronaut, wrote in an op-ed published in USA Today that their Americans for Responsible Solutions initiative would help raise money to support

greater gun control efforts.

"Achieving reforms to reduce gun violence and prevent mass shootings will mean matching gun lobbyists in their reach and resources," the couple wrote in the column. They said that it will "raise funds necessary to balance the influence of the gun lobby."

The move was hinted at in Kelly's recent comments that he and Giffords want to become a prominent voice for gun control efforts.

The couple last week visited Newtown, Conn., where a gunman opened fire in an elementary school, killing 20 children and six adults in December. They also met with New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg, a billionaire who has spent some of his fortune in recent years on gun control efforts. The couple was expected to discuss the initiative in an interview airing Tuesday on ABC News.



**WASHINGTON (AP)** • Two years after a hostage video and photographs of retired FBI agent Robert Levinson raised the possibility that the missing American was being held by terrorists, U.S. officials now see the government of Iran behind the images, intelligence officials told The Associated Press. Levinson, a private investigator, disappeared in 2007 on the Iranian island of Kish.

edly denied knowing anything about his disappearance, and the disturbing video and photos that Levinson's family received in late 2010 and early 2011 seemed to give credence to the idea.

The extraordinary photos — showing Levinson's hair wild and gray, his beard long and unkempt — are being seen for the first time publicly after the family provided copies to the AP. The video has been previously released.

When South took advantage of the favorable vulnerability to overcall four spades (for which one could hardly blame him), North took him seriously and jumped to slam. No one had done anything ridiculous, but the final contract was hardly one that Lloyds of London would have had any interest in underwriting.

In fact the slam has almost no play — 12 out of 13 of West's cards defeat the slam, but can you criticize him for leading his singleton heart? I certainly cannot — and anyone who would is a results-merchant of the highest order!

Even after that start, declarer had to play perfectly to envisage a possible way home. He ruffed the first heart high, then led a low trump to the seven to ruff a second heart, and made his next critical play when he ducked a club. East won the first club and returned the suit, allowing declarer to win in dummy and ruff a third heart. Declarer drew the second round of trumps by leading the 10 to the jack to ruff a fourth heart with his last trump, and West was forced to under-ruff to preserve his diamond guard and master club. That only postponed the evil day: South crossed to dummy with the diamond ace to cash the spade ace and pitch his club, squeezing West in the minors.

This play is called a dummy reversal. Declarer scored seven trump tricks by ruffing four times in the South hand and drawing trump with the three-card suit.

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

# TODAY IN HISTORY

**On this date:**  
In 1788, Connecticut became the fifth state to ratify the U.S. Constitution.

In 1793, Frenchman Jean Pierre Blanchard, using a hot-air balloon, flew between Philadelphia and Woodbury, N.J.

In 1861, Mississippi became the second state to secede from the Union, the same day the Star of the West, a merchant vessel bringing reinforcements and supplies to Federal troops at Fort Sumter, S.C., retreated because of artillery fire.

In 1931, Bobbi Trout and Edna May Cooper broke an endurance record for female aviators as they returned to Mines Field in Los Angeles after flying a Curtiss Robin monoplane continuously for 122 hours and 50 minutes.

In 1945, during World War II, American forces began landing at Lingayen Gulf in the Philippines.

In 1951, the United Nations headquarters in New York officially opened.

In 1960, on his 47th birthday, Vice President Richard Nixon became a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination.

In 1968, the Surveyor 7 space probe made a soft landing on the moon, marking the end of the American series of unmanned explorations of the lunar surface.

In 1972, reclusive billionaire Howard Hughes, speaking by telephone from the Bahamas to reporters in Hollywood, said a purported autobiography of him by Clifford Irving was a fake.

In 1987, the White House released a Jan. 1986 memorandum prepared for President Ronald Reagan by Lt. Col. Oliver L. North showing a link between U.S. arms sales to Iran and the release of American hostages in Lebanon.

In 1993, the two owners of a fast food restaurant in Palatine, Ill., and five employees were found shot and stabbed to death. (Two suspects were arrested in May 2002; both were convicted in separate trials and sentenced to life in prison.)

# Saban Already Talking Next Year

**FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP)** • It's becoming a familiar January scene for Nick Saban.

The Alabama coach plastered a smile on his face for a series of posed photos next to the various trophies awarded to college football's national champions and then proceeded to talk about the challenges facing his team.

Maybe Saban let the Gatorade dry from the celebratory drenching before thinking about the 2013 season. Maybe.

"The team next year is 0-0," Saban, who is on a 61-7 run over the past five seasons, said Tuesday morning. "Even though I really appreciate what this team accomplished and am very, very proud of what they accomplished, we need to prepare for the challenges of the new season very quickly with the team we have coming back."

It didn't take Saban long to refocus after Monday night's 42-14 demolition of Notre Dame that secured a second straight BCS title, the Crimson Tide's third in four seasons and the seventh straight for Southeastern Conference teams.

Shortly after the game, he was already talking about getting back to the office by Wednesday morning.

Alabama players, meanwhile, finally were able to voice the "D-word." Center Barrett Jones said he had a Sports Illustrated cover from a couple of years ago after his last college game.

"It says, 'Dynasty. Can anybody stop Alabama?' I'll

never forget looking at that thing and wondering if we really could be a dynasty," said Jones, who mainly put it on the wall because he's featured. "I think three out of four, I'm no dynasty expert, but that seems like a dynasty to me. I guess I can say that now that I'm gone. Don't tell coach I said that."

The 2013 team will almost certainly be regarded among the preseason favorites to get back to the summit, even though three Tide stars — tailback Eddie Lacy, cornerback Dee Milliner and right tackle D.J. Fluker — could decide to skip their senior seasons and

turn pro.

Saban also emphatically tried to end speculation that he might return to the NFL, where he spent two years with the Miami Dolphins before returning to the SEC.

It was a question that really made him bristle during the 30-plus

minute news conference.

"How many times do you think I've been asked to put it to rest?" Saban said. "And I've put it to rest, and you continue to ask it. So I'm going to say it today, that — you know, I think somewhere along the line you've got to choose. You learn a lot from the experi-

ences of what you've done in the past. I came to the Miami Dolphins, what, eight years ago for the best owner, the best person that I've ever had the opportunity to work for. And in the two years that I was here, I had a very, very difficult time thinking that I could impact the organization in the way that I wanted to or the way that I was able to in college, and it was very difficult for me."

## Rose, Sugar Bowls Will Host 1st Semifinals

**KEY BISCAAYNE, Fla. (AP)** • The first semifinal games in the new college football playoff system will be played in the Rose Bowl and the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1, 2015.

The BCS conference commissioners announced the dates and rotation for all 12 years of the upcoming postseason format after a meeting in Key Biscayne on Monday, the day after the BCS championship game in Miami.

"It was not a one-year decision, it had to be a 12-year decision," BCS executive director Bill Hancock said. "Calendar issues, days of rest. Sugar and Rose were paired together because of the days of rest since they are playing the same day."

Whether they are hosting a semifinal or just a marquee bowl game, the Rose Bowl and the Sugar Bowl will always be played on Jan. 1, or Jan. 2 in years in which New Year's Day falls on a Sunday. In the eight years in which the Rose and Sugar do not host the semifinals, the four playoff teams will kick off on New Year's Eve or Saturday, Dec. 30.

Either way there will be a triple-header of major college football games, two semifinals and four other marquee bowl games, on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day starting from the 2014 season to the 2025 season.

"Those days will be long to college football," Hancock said.

## Viral Video Gets Norwegian NFL Tryout

Aside from his ability to boot the ball through the uprights from almost kind of angle or distance, Havard Rugland is a complete stranger to the American version of football.

And yet the 28-year-old Norwegian is suddenly pursuing a shot at making it to the NFL. And it's all because of a YouTube video.

Sound incredible? Well, so are some of the kicks and tricks Rugland can pull off with his powerful left leg.

That's why the video he put together for some friends has turned him into an Internet sensation, with

2 million views and counting. And that's why the same video turned into an audition tape, earning him a tryout last month with the New York Jets.

"I never would have thought it would come to this," he said during a recent phone interview from his home in southern Norway. "I put the film up mostly for friends and family. But as it turns out, there were a lot more people who liked it. It's overwhelming."

Must be, for someone whose only previous experience with football was the European soccer version, and who has only a sketchy familiarity with the rules of

the American game. Living in Aalgaard, a town with less than 10,000 people, he started kicking for fun about a year ago.

Having seen other online videos of people doing tricks with Frisbees and basketballs, he figured he'd make one with footballs to showcase his booming leg. He posted it online in mid-September, and three months later he was auditioning for the Jets.

So what is it about his four-minute video — "Kickalicious" — that has people so impressed? Well, the footage of him kicking field goals from 60 yards and soccer-style volleys

through the uprights is the least of it.

His more spectacular repertoire includes kicking the ball into a basketball hoop — nothing but net — and into the arms of people in moving cars, floating down a lake in a boat, or atop a hill.

For his grand finale, he casually punts one football into the air, then kicks a second ball off a tee so it hits the first one in midair.

"I'm probably the most satisfied with the last kick, which is the one I've received the most compliments about," Rugland said. "I needed eight tries before I pulled it off."



# Manning Goes with the Glove

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. (AP) • There's a new "Gloved One" — in Denver, at least.

Ripping a page from Michael Jackson's playbook, Peyton Manning has practiced for and played in the last two games with a sticky-feeling, orange-and-grey glove on his throwing hand.

Sure, Manning has earned his fair share of curious glances for donning cold-weather gear when the temperatures are in the 50s, as they were Tuesday at practice.

But in getting ready for the playoff push, which could include two games in sometimes-snowy Denver, Manning is leaving no stone unturned. And, as if on cue, a strong arctic storm is expected to roll into Denver on Friday night, bringing snow and bitter cold. The high for Saturday's playoff game against Baltimore is forecast to be 20 degrees.

Manning, who won his only Super Bowl playing barehanded in a rainstorm in Miami in 2007, said he hasn't given much thought to whether the glove would help him more in cold or wet conditions, each of which can make the ball harder, more slick and more difficult to grip.

"I really have not thought about it that analytically, if that's the word," Manning said. "It's a glove."

Of course, if Peyton Manning is wearing it, it's more than a glove — it's a topic of conversation.

A creature of habit who hasn't worn anything on his hands before this season, Manning conceded the glove is a concession to

the altered feel of his grip, especially in cold weather, after the multiple neck surgeries he underwent during his season out of football.

"I certainly don't think I would have had to wear the glove had I not been injured last year," he said. "It's part of my injury, some things that I've had to adjust. I'm in a different body, some things are different for me, so that's the reason for that as much as anything."

Manning could certainly use any edge he can get in cold weather.

He is 0-3 in playoff games in which the temperature at kickoff is less than 40 degrees. His numbers in those games hardly resemble the norm for a four-time Most Valuable Player with more than 59,000 yards to his credit. In the losses — 41-0 at the Jets, and 24-14 and 20-3 at New England — Manning has gone a combined 64 for 120 for 612 yards with one touchdown and seven interceptions. In two of the losses, his passer rating matched the temperature — never climbing out of the 30s.

To be fair, the last loss came a full eight seasons ago, in the divisional playoffs against the Patriots. Also, Manning has more than his share of cold-weather success in the regular season, going 7-5 with five 300-yard games. That includes Denver's regular-season finale against Kansas City on Dec. 30, the second game in which he tested out the glove, and the first NFL home game he's ever played with the temperature under 40. His former team, the Colts, played in a dome.

# Judgment Day for Steroids Era

NEW YORK (AP) • There's a chance the podium under the chandeliers in the gold-and-ivory-colored Vanderbilt Room of the Waldorf Astoria Hotel will go unused.

With the cloud of steroids shrouding the candidacies of Barry Bonds, Roger Clemens and others, baseball writers may fail for the only the second time in more than four decades to elect anyone to the Hall of Fame, rendering a news conference unnecessary.

About 600 people are eligible to vote in the BBWAA election, all members of the organization for 10 consecutive years at any point. Results will be announced at 12 p.m. Wednesday, with the focus on first-time eligibles that include Bonds, baseball's only seven-time Most Valuable Player, and Clemens, the only seven-time Cy Young Award winner.

Since 1965, the only years the writers did not elect a candidate were when Yogi Berra topped the 1971 ballot at 67 percent and when Phil Niekro headed the 1996 ballot at 68 percent. Both were chosen the following years.

"It really would be a shame, especially since the other people going in this year are not among the living, which will make for a

rather strange ceremony," said the San Francisco Chronicle's Susan Slusser, president of the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

Three inductees were chosen last month by the 16-member panel considering individuals from the era before integration in 1946: Yankees owner Jacob Ruppert, umpire Hank O'Day and barehanded catcher Deacon White. They will be en-

shrined during a ceremony at Cooperstown on July 28.

Also on the ballot for the first time are Sammy Sosa and Mike Piazza, power hitters whose statistics have been questioned because of the Steroids Era, and Craig Biggio, 20th on the career list with 3,060 hits — all for the Houston Astros. Curt Schilling, 11-2 with a 2.23 ERA in postseason play, is another ballot rookie.

The Hall is prepared to hold a news conference Thursday with any electees. Or to not have one.

Biggio wasn't sure whether the controversy over this year's ballot would keep all candidates out.

"All I know is that for this organization I did everything they ever asked me to do and I'm proud about it, so hopefully, the writers feel strongly, they liked what they saw, and we'll see what happens," Biggio said on Nov. 28.
