Lawmaker Asks Idaho for 37 Acts of Kindness

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BOISE • A quiet wave of kindness is sweeping through the Idaho State House.

Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, is asking friends and colleagues to do 37 small acts of kindness in memory of his son, Ritchie Hill.

Ritchie died in 2004 shortly after his 28th birthday. Ritchie, a non-smoker, succumbed to lung cancer, leaving behind a wife and three children. Since then, the Hill family has commemorated his Jan. 27 birthday together, with Ritchie's brothers joining Sen. Hill and his wife in Boise. The celebration often centered on service acts, Hill said in a Wednesday interview.

This year, the other children couldn't make the trip, so Hill's wife thought of the 37 acts. Ritchie would

Worker Pleads Guilty in Dairy Cow Abuse Case

TWIN FALLS • A man accused of animal abuse has pleaded guilty just before his trial Wednesday morning in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

Jesus Garza, 25, was charged with one count of animal abuse after hidden camera footage of reported animal cruelty at Dry Creek Dairy was released by Los Angeles-based Mercy for Animals. Dry Creek Dairy is located just southwest of Murtaugh.

The court was in the process of choosing a jury when Garza pleaded guilty.

Defining Animal Cruelty

The Idaho Legislature defines cruelty to animals as one of the following:

- The intentional and malicious infliction of pain, physical suffering, injury or death upon an animal.
- To maliciously kill, maim, wound, overdrive, overload, drive when overloaded, overwork, torture, torment, deprive of necessary sustenance, drink or shelter, cruelly beat, mutilate or cruelly kill an animal.
- To subject an animal to needless suffering, inflict unnecessary cruelty, drive, ride or otherwise use an animal when same is unfit.
- To abandon an animal.

To negligently confine an animal in unsanitary conditions or to negligently house an animal in inadequate facilities; to negligently fail to provide sustenance, water or shelter to an animal.

Early Life in Minidoka City

The town was a jumping-off point for travelers and settlers on their way west.

MINIDOKA • In the early 1900s, the oldest village in what would become Minidoka County was the city of Minidoka.

The town, originally the county seat, was first an Oregon Shortline Railroad siding and a jumping-off point for travelers and settlers on their way west.

"The vast stretch of sagebrush as far as the eye could see and the town, consisting of the usual railroad buildings augmented by a hotel, small store, saloon and a one-room school house, promised little that first day of our arrival in the early spring of 1899," wrote Ida Carlson, an early Minidoka city resident, in an article that appeared in the *Minidoka County News'* 1955 Golden Anniversary Edition.

Government land was being offered to settlers under several federal government acts including the

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


Boeing Leads Dow Lower; Other Indexes Mixed

NEW YORK (AP) • More problems for Boeing's 787 sent the aircraft maker's stock down sharply early Wednesday, dragging the Dow Jones industrial average lower.

Boeing's stock sank \$2.74 to \$74.20, a loss of 4 percent. The Dow was down 30 points at 13,504 as of 1:32 EST on Wednesday. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell less than one point to 1,472, while the Nasdaq composite climbed five points to 3,116.

Canal Water Was Used for More than Irrigation

TWIN FALLS • Since the early 1960s, winters have been a little easier on canal company workers.

Before then, workers spent the winters keeping the canal system free of ice — not so farmers could irrigate, but so that folks in Twin Falls could have drinking water.

“Running winter water was a costly and miserable task,” wrote Al Peters, who served as Twin Falls Canal Co. general manager for almost 30 years.

In his memoirs, Peters cited one employee who lost his sight and one hand when he attempted to throw a stick of dynamite on an ice jam.

Besides accidents, there was “much suffering from the exposure to the cold and icy waters,” Peters wrote.

Drinking water for early residents first came from Rock Creek, south of town. But by 1905, the demand for water surpassed the supply. The Twin Falls

Waterworks Co. then contracted the new canal company to provide water for the town.

Townfolk weren't the only ones who needed domestic water. Farmers and ranchers on the Twin Falls irrigation tract needed water for their homes and livestock year-round.

Since water wells were scarce then, the canal company encouraged those on the tract to dig cisterns to store water from the canal. Most cisterns were 10 feet deep and eight feet in diameter.

Water quality issues surfaced nearly immediately. Canal water came from the Snake River at Milner Dam, some 25 miles east of Twin Falls, and with it came fish, frogs and sediment.

In 1908, the Twin Falls News stated that with fresh water sources available, “there is no reason we should drink mud.” In 1912, Twin Falls residents voted to establish a municipal water system that improved water pressure, but not water quality.

In 1918, voters approved a new water system and an infiltration plant opened

south of town in 1919.

During the next two decades, the canal company dug seepage tunnels and thousands of drainage wells on the tract. At the same time, domestic water wells were dug where needed.

The canal company continued to supply water to Twin Falls, but not willingly. In the 1930s, an effort was made to shut down the canal system during the winter to save water reserves, but Twin Falls objected. It took another 30 years before the city developed an independent water supply and the canal company was able to halt the delivery of water during the winter.

Man Arrested for Shooting Arrows near Child

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls man was arrested Friday after police allege he shot arrows into a recliner near where a child was sitting, then attacked the child's mother.

Twin Falls police responded to a call in the 300 block of Third Avenue East in Twin Falls about a battery. When they arrived, they spoke with a woman who said Adam Newbry, 22, shot several arrows into a chair near where

her daughter was sitting. Newbry then allegedly grabbed her by the neck and slammed her against a wall, said the woman — not related to Newbry.

According to the police report, the woman came out of her room to check on her 7-year-old daughter and saw five arrows embedded in a chair about one foot away from another chair where her daughter was sitting.

The woman said she pulled the arrows out of the chair and told Newbry it

wasn't right to shoot arrows in the direction of her child, the police report states.

The report states Newbry then allegedly got up from his chair, grabbed her by the throat, and slammed her against the front door and a wall several times. Police said they saw red marks around the woman's neck. Another woman at the scene confirmed the story and said she pulled Newbry off the first woman, the report states.

When police spoke to

Newbry, he said the woman pulled the arrows out of the chair, then pointed one at him as if she might stab him, the report states. He said he then tried to grab the woman's shoulders to push her out of the closed front door, the report states. The report noted that Newbry is much larger than the woman.

Police arrested Newbry for simple battery and transported him to the Twin Falls County Jail. A pretrial conference is scheduled for Feb. 26.

Before the trial was scheduled to begin, Garza, his attorney and prosecutors met with 5th District Magistrate Judge Calvin Campbell at 8:30 a.m. in another courtroom to discuss several issues.

Kent Jensen, Garza's attorney argued that one of the video clips prosecutors planned to show was prejudicial. Jensen described the video, saying it showed a cow that fell, but it was not Garza's fault.

"Cows in this big of a facility are falling all the time," Jensen said.

Then, the video shows Garza and others making crude gestures and statements about the cow, Jensen said. Jensen said Garza can also be seen

"lifting" the tail. Prosecutors and Campbell later described Garza's action as twisting, pulling or yanking on the tail.

Jensen argued that the comments made in the video would prejudice the jury against Garza.

"There's no abuse statutes that I can see talking about crude or obscene language around cows," Jensen said.

Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Rosemary Emory argued that the crude statements would help the state prove Garza had malicious intent with his actions.

"The statements in the

video go directly to his intent and his state of mind," she said.

Campbell watched the video clip then ruled in the favor of prosecutors, saying the jury would be able to watch the video.

Emory said prosecutors planned to show 10 video clips during the trial.

About an hour later, while a jury waited, Garza decided to plead guilty after reaching a deal with prosecutors.

In the deal, prosecutors will argue that Garza should spend 180 days in jail, with 80 days suspended since he's already spent about 100 days in jail awaiting trial. Prosecutors will also argue that Garza should be sentenced to two years of supervised probation and that he should not be allowed to work around animals.

Reclamation Act of 1902, which promised opportunities for irrigation on the tracts of land.

Students and staff headed to the Albion State Normal School got off the train at Minidoka and traveled by a stage owned by Hardy Sears.

The stage crossed the Snake River on the Howell ferry, six miles south of Minidoka, according to Carlson's article.

Sears, a Civil War confederate, was one of the earliest settlers of Albion and later purchased the hotel in Minidoka, which he operated with the help of his wife and daughters.

One of Sears' daughters, Julia Cook, recalled her life at the turn of the century in an audio recording made in 1977 by Alvin and Rosa Holmes.

The recording and tapes from other early homesteaders are available to check out or purchase from the Minidoka County Historical Museum.

Cook said her parents moved to Minidoka in 1894 and bought the hotel, stage line and franchise for the mail. The mail was taken from Minidoka by stage to Albion and from there delivered to the rest of Cassia County.

"During the winter the ice was a hazard and the mail had to go and often my brothers used a sled," Cook said.

When the ice on the river was too thin to hold horses, she said, the family's dog, Carl, would pull the mail across the ice on the river.

Other times, Cook's brother carried the mail bag on his back on the ferry to get it across.

But life wasn't all work, Cook recalled.

"We had a neighbor who had a store and he'd take up all the furniture out on the porch and bring in a box. They'd sit up on the box with a violin for the dances," Cook said.

Cook was the waitress at the Sears Hotel, but she preferred the duties of chambermaid and taking care of the rooms.

The guests in the dining

room wore ordinary working clothing and didn't leave tips, she said.

"We ran across interesting people," Cook said, but there wasn't any vandalism. And a gentleman always remained a gentleman, she said.

The family had an ice house and did their own laundry and carried their own water for years, she said.

Most of the cooks at the hotel were of Chinese descent.

The general store offered everything from a toothpick to lotions and hardware.


Cook said because the town was a railroad stop, the city saw its share of tramps and hobos.

Tramps would want to work, she said, while a hobo would ask for a handout.

In 1904, the village incorporated.

The first newspaper was the *Minidoka Herald* and Cook was chosen to christen the first copy during a ceremony in 1905.

At its peak the city had 55 businesses. But in 1906, a large fire destroyed businesses and homes across half the city. Minidoka never fully recovered.

have been 37 years old this year, Hill said.

"Ritchie was known for helping others and loved reaching out to those in need," Hill wrote in a Facebook post. "It would be a great way to celebrate a life worth celebrating."

The individual acts don't have to change the world, Hill said. His family is focusing on small acts throughout his neighborhood, like making a blanket for a neighbor who also lost his son.

"They're not big things," he said.

Others replied to Hill's online request with service

ideas of their own. One person donated coats, and another shoveled a neighbor's driveway. Multiple legislators commented on or "liked" the post.

Sen. Marv Hagedorn, R-Meridian, wrote online that the plan was a "great tribute." On Wednesday, Hagedorn said he liked the idea of service for the sake of service, not for accolades or attention. That's the whole spirit of Hill's request, Hagedorn said, and a good reminder that everyone could be more kind.

Hill said he was touched by the response and outpouring of love for Ritchie.

"It's very gratifying to know that people still remember him," he said.

Obama Unveils \$500 Million Gun Violence Package

WASHINGTON (AP) • Braced for a fight, President Barack Obama on Wednesday unveiled the most sweeping proposals for curbing gun violence in two decades, pressing a reluctant Congress to pass universal background checks and bans on military-style assault weapons and high-capacity ammunition magazines like the ones used in the Newtown, Conn., school shooting.

A month after that horrific massacre, Obama also used his presidential powers to enact 23 measures that don't require the backing of lawmakers. The president's executive actions include ordering federal agencies to make more data available for background checks, appointing a director of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, and directing the Centers for Disease Control to research gun violence.

But the president, speaking at the White House ceremony, focused his attention on the divided Congress, saying only lawmakers could enact the most effective measures for preventing more mass shootings. "To make a real and lasting difference, Congress must act," Obama said. "And Congress must act soon."

The National Rifle Association promptly took issue with Obama's proposals, and even supportive lawmakers said the president's gun control measures face long odds in Congress.

"Attacking firearms and ig-

norning children is not a solution to the crisis we face as a nation," the NRA said in a statement. "Only honest, law-abiding gun owners will be affected and our children will remain vulnerable to the inevitability of more tragedy."

Idaho's Response

Idaho's four-person, Republican congressional delegation each offered reactions Wednesday to President Obama's gun control proposal. Here are excerpts of statements released by the four.

Sen. Mike Crapo:

"Any discussion about restricting the Constitutional rights of law-abiding Americans deserves, at minimum, a full and public debate in Congress. Burdening law-abiding citizens of this country with additional gun restrictions is not the answer to safeguarding the public from further attacks."

Sen. Jim Risch:

"I am troubled by the continuing efforts of this president to legislate by executive order when his responsibility under the Constitution is to execute laws enacted by the legislative branch. All proposed legislation should be put before the people's elected representatives, fully debated in Congress and then voted on under the specific procedures clearly provided by our Constitution."

Rep. Mike Simpson:

"I haven't yet had a chance to fully review the many executive orders President Obama signed today, but I have long been concerned about the use of executive orders to push forward proposals that should be considered in Congress. I will take time over the coming days to fully review each of the executive orders and consider them with the Constitution and the concerns of my constituents foremost in my mind."

Rep. Raul Labrador:

"Our Founding Fathers believed the right to bear arms was essential to the cause of freedom. Those same Founders also gave the executive branch the authority to enforce the laws protecting this right and our security—and this is the authority the President asserts today. I will review these proposals to ensure that the President's actions and proposals do not violate our constitutionally protected right to bear arms. I will also thoughtfully consider whether the laws we currently have on the books can be better enforced to safeguard our lives and our liberty."



Some Questions for Chuck Hagel

Senate hearings on the nomination of Chuck Hagel to be defense secretary will be a distinctive Washington entertainment, a donnybrook without drama. He should be confirmed: Presidents are due substantial deference in selecting Cabinet members because they administer presidential policies and, unlike judicial appointments, they leave when their nominators do. Hagel will be confirmed because Sen. Chuck Schumer, after hesitating theatrically enough to propitiate supporters of Israel, of whom there are many among his New York constituents, will not oppose Hagel. Opposition would end Schumer's hope to make the nation nostalgic for Harry Reid by succeeding him as Senate Democratic leader.

Still, the hearings will be sound and fury signifying renewed interest in national security policy, which can be illuminated by Hagel addressing questions like these:

— In 1997, 28 years after you returned from Vietnam with two Purple Hearts, we heard a May 27, 1964, taped telephone conversation in which President Lyndon Johnson said to his national security adviser, McGeorge Bundy: “I don't think it's worth fighting for and I don't think we can get out.” Johnson also said: “What in the hell is Vietnam worth to me? What is Laos worth to me? What is it worth to this country?” At the time, there were only 16,000 U.S. forces in Vietnam, where there had been only 266 U.S. deaths. The U.S. deployment would peak at more than 500,000 in 1969 and 58,000 would die there. How did this tape, and Vietnam generally, shape your thinking?

— Your critics say that you managed to be wrong on Iraq twice, by supporting the 2003 invasion and by opposing the 2007 surge. If the surge had not happened, what would have happened in Iraq?

— How many sorties, including attacks on Iran's air defense systems, would be required to significantly degrade and delay Iran's nuclear program? Can Israel mount such an air campaign alone? Would you favor U.S. cooperation, with intelligence and special munitions?

— Did you refuse to sign a 2006 letter urging the European Union to declare Hezbollah a terrorist organization because you consider that designation inaccurate? From your 2009 endorsement of U.S. negotiations with Hamas, can we conclude that you oppose the policy of not negotiating with terrorists?

— You call our sanctions against Cuba “outdated,” “unrealistic,” “irrelevant” and “nonsensical.” What Cuba policy would you recommend?

— Do you agree with Defense Secretary Leon Panetta's judgment that cuts under sequestration would “hollow out the force”? Can you give examples of procurements or deployments that justify your description of the Defense Department as “bloated”?

— The Navy has 9 aircraft carriers. Aircraft carrier groups are the principal means of projecting U.S. power. And they are very expensive. How many should we have? How is your calculation influenced by the fact that seven weeks ago China for the first time landed a fighter jet on the deck of an aircraft carrier?

— Congress' power to declare war has atrophied since it was last exercised (against Bulgaria, Romania and Hungary on June 5, 1942). Should Congress authorize America's wars?

— In 2011, President Obama, using a passive syntax, said our military “is being volunteered by others to carry out missions” in Libya. The original rationale for this — before mission meander embraced regime change — was “R2P,” the responsibility to protect civilians. Do you support applying this doctrine to Syria? If removing Moammar Gaddafi was an important U.S. interest, why was it, and when did it become so? Do you dispute the illegality of Obama's ignoring the War Powers Resolution that requires military interventions to end after 60 days, absent congressional approval?

— Speaking of the imperial presidency, do you believe that the use of drones to target specific individuals means presidents have an unreviewable power to kill whomever they define as enemies? Do you favor “signature strikes” wherein drones attack not identifiable individuals but groups of young males whose characteristics match the “signature” of terrorists?

— In 1949, one of NATO's founders said its purpose was “to keep the Americans in (Europe), the Germans down and the Russians out.” What is its purpose now? Given that U.S. military spending is three times larger than the combined spending of NATO's other 27 members, is it not obvious that those nations feel no threat?

Bonus question: Might fewer than 54,000 U.S. forces in Germany suffice to defend that country, or Western Europe, from whatever threat they are there to deter?

Time to Define a Wildlife Ethic for Idaho

I sent this letter to Fish and Game's director and commissioners:

At the Wildlife Summit last August, it was noted how very lucky we are here in Idaho to have the diversity of wildlife that we have. And because Idaho's wildlife belongs to all of us, we all share a duty to conserve wildlife and their habitat. Conserving must carry some need for respect, but I fear that there are “harvest” practices that do not require respect, sportsmanship or ethics. Allowing wildlife derbies to take place is anything but respectful.

Seventy years ago, Aldo Leopold described and defined a land ethic. I believe it is time for an open discussion about a wildlife ethic. The Boone and Crockett Club, an old and respected sportsmen's group, provides a good model. Boone and Crockett advocates fair chase defined as: “the ethical, sportsmanlike, and lawful pursuit and taking of any free-ranging wild, native North American big game animal in a manner that does not give the hunter an improper advantage (my emphasis) over such

animals.”

If we are honest with ourselves, we will see that trapping and baiting give the “hunter” a huge advantage. And these days with the array of vehicles that can facilitate the hunt, the motorized hunter has even more advantage. The Boone and Crockett Club's website explains that conservation of natural resources is fundamental in hunting. “The hunter engages in a one-to-one relationship with the quarry and his or her hunting should be guided by a hierarchy of ethics related to hunting, which includes the following tenets: (1) Obey all applicable laws and regulations. (2) Respect the customs of the locale where the hunting occurs. (3) Exercise a personal code of behavior that reflects favorably on your abilities and sensibilities as a hunter. (4) Attain and maintain the skills necessary to make the kill as certain and quick as possible. (5) Behave in a way that will bring no dishonor to either the hunter, the hunted, or the environment. (6) Recognize that these tenets are intended to enhance the hunter's experience of the relationship between predator and prey, which is one of the most fundamental relationships of humans

and their environment. Isn't it time to begin this conversation?

community. This is where school concerts take place, drama students perform, elementary students have physical education classes, and assemblies are held. This is also the building the community utilizes for recreation, performances and activities.





Palmer said it's still unclear what caused the collision or why the semi was stopped on the tracks.

Woodside School Selected for Bilingual Teaching Program

HAILEY • Within a couple of years, Woodside Elementary School will be home to only dual immersion students.

In a split 3-2 vote, the Blaine County School District's board of trustees decided Tuesday night that the Hailey elementary school will become a dual immersion magnet school.

Trustees Kathryn Graves and Paul Bates voted against the motion.

District spokeswoman Heather Crocker said Wednesday that the change is anticipated for fall 2014.

The change means that about 150 Woodside Elementary students who aren't in the dual immersion program will go to either Bellevue Elementary or Hailey Elementary instead.

In addition to the magnet school, one dual immersion class per grade level will re-

main at Ernest Hemingway Elementary School in Ketchum.

Nicole Ching, co-president of the Parent Teacher Association at Woodside Elementary, said she loves the dual immersion program but is disappointed that Woodside won't have general education students.

"I'm kind of saddened by this, actually," she said.

Her two children — a son in kindergarten and a daughter in fourth grade — are both in the dual immersion program.

Ching said she likes that her children can play with nondual immersion students at Woodside Elementary.

The dual immersion program, she said, already feels like such a separate program and having a magnet school will make that more pronounced.

Woodside Principal Brad Henson wasn't available to comment Wednesday.

Through the school district's 12-year-old program, students learn in both English and Spanish.

It's the only program of its kind among south-central Idaho schools.

Due to significant growth in dual immersion enrollment, Blaine County school officials began talking more than a year ago about the future of the program.

In 2001, there were just 60 dual immersion students. Now, there are more than 600 in kindergarten through the fifth grade.

And there are about 200 in middle and high school.

In discussions about the future of the program, the school board chose from two main options: Create a magnet school at Woodside Elementary or have one classroom of dual immersion per grade level at each of Blaine County's four elementary schools.

Crocker said now that a

decision has been made, the next step is meeting with all stakeholders — starting with employees — to talk about the actions and possibilities.

Ching said she has heard some parents with non-dual immersion students at Woodside Elementary are planning to transfer their students to a different school next school year to help them adjust. That's before the magnet school setup will take effect.

At Woodside, Ching will also be the only parent left on the PTA's board since other parents don't have children in the dual immersion program.

She said she's thankful her children go to school in Blaine County and she's sure things will work out in the long run.

T.F. Schools Move Forward with Security Upgrades

TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls School District is working with the police department on ways to improve school security.

District spokeswoman Beth Pendergrass said district officials are looking at safety procedures after the shooting last month at a Newtown, Conn., elementary school.

The school district formed a new ad hoc safety committee that's working to review and update school safety plans.

Director of Operations Carl Voigt said the target completion date is before the end of this school year. But efforts to improve security are ongoing, he said.

Twin Falls city spokesman Joshua Palmer said the police department is working with the school district to update maps for the schools.

What they're finding, he said, is that a lot of tempo-

rary buildings — such as portable classrooms — aren't included on current maps.

"They're really going through each school property with a fine-tooth comb to map those out," he said.

Within the next week, Twin Falls School District officials will issue master keys to the police department that will provide access to all school buildings.

That idea came from police, Voigt said. A master key will be kept in each patrol car.

"One of the things that came out of Newtown is that the school was so secure from the outside that there was difficulty for law enforcement to get into the building," he said.

Voigt said there will be an agreement with the police department that keys can only be used in emergency situations.

"We felt that it was a reasonable request and it would aid the police department in what they do," he said.

The four school resource officers — who work at the middle and high schools — already have master keys.

Another plan is to install a safe, lockable storage system at each of the four middle and high schools that would allow school resource officers to keep a gun in their office.

Officers would only keep a gun secured in their office while they're in the school building.

"The police department is working on getting an appropriate storage system," Voigt said.

Currently, each school resource officer has an AR-15 rifle that's secured in their police car while they're on duty at schools, he said.

As another safety measure, school officials plan to install devices in each student-occupied room that make it easier to lock doors in an emergency.

In most Twin Falls schools, classroom doors only have key access from the outside. In a lockdown

situation, that would mean the teacher would have to take the classroom key, step into the hallway to lock the door, go back into the classroom and finally pull the door shut.

With the device, Voigt said, teachers can leave their doors locked by default, then move a latch from the inside to actually engage the lock and secure the door.

Voigt said it makes the process of securing a classroom faster and easier. Also, teachers don't have to put themselves in harm's way by stepping into the hallway.

School district officials plan to buy 1,000 school safety devices, which cost about \$7.50 each.

"I think they're a good step in the right direction," Voigt said.

New Head of Bonneville Power Administration Chosen

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) • The U.S. Energy Department has picked the Bonneville Power Administration's deputy administrator to lead the nonprofit federal power marketing organization.

The agency announced Wednesday that Bill Drummond will replace BPA Administrator Steve Wright, who is retiring after 12 years as head of the agency.

One of four power marketing administrations that the Energy Department oversees, BPA markets power from Columbia River hydroelectric dams and the region's one nuclear plant.

The agency also operates most of the area power grid, distributing wind energy and other energy to the Pacific Northwest and elsewhere.


Before joining BPA, Drummond managed the Western Montana Electric Generating and Transmission Cooperative in Missoula, Mont., for 17 years.

He has spent 30 years in the energy industry.

Drummond led the Public Power Council

from 1988 to 1994. The council is an association of Northwest publicly owned utilities.

The 2013 high school football schedules are taking shape, revealing several intriguing matchups. When it comes to scheduling games, the Minico High football program won't shy away from a challenge. The Spartans have a tradition of seeking unique contests. Last year it was a road trip to California to play McClymonds High from inner-city Oakland. This year, the Spartans won't travel outside Idaho, but they will play two out-of-state schools. Minico is one of the original

schools to participate in the Rocky Mountain Rumble, an annual event at Holt Arena in Pocatello which matches up an Idaho school vs. an out-of-state opponent. The Spartans will return to the Rumble this fall, playing Park City (Utah) on Aug. 30. The following week, Sept. 6, Minico will host Sky View out of Smithfield, Utah. But the marquee game on Minico's schedule will be Sept. 27 when it takes a road trip to Coeur d'Alene, a Class 5A powerhouse. "They can't find enough games in the north," Perrigot said, "so in order to fill their schedule they had to do whatever they can, and they feel it's better to pay to help someone come up than to not have a game." Coeur d'Alene might be Minico's toughest opponent. The



JEROME • A night after getting thumped by Burley, the Jerome boys basketball team had an unenviable task: slow down Weber State commit McKay Cannon and his Shelley Russets, one of the better 3A teams in the state. For a quarter-and-a-half, the Tigers did just that, keeping the game in within double digits despite yielding a buzzer-beater tip-in at the end of the first half. But, perhaps a result of playing back-to-back nights, Jerome completely shut down on both ends of the court in the second half, eventually falling 69-30 to the visiting Russets. The Tigers failed to create good shots on offense, and they gave up a veritable layup line in transition off turnovers — Jerome had 14 — and did not contest outside shots on the perimeter. More important than revenge, the College of Southern Idaho women's basketball team needs a home win. 



For those fans clamoring to see someone new in the Super Bowl, the NFC is giving you what you want.

Sorry about the AFC.

Yep, same old, same old is ahead, with the New England Patriots hosting the Baltimore Ravens for the second straight conference championship game Sunday. With a similar result, too.

New England (13-4) is a 9-point favorite to reach its sixth Super Bowl in the Tom Brady-Bill Belichick era. The Patriots' quarterback and coach are 3-2 together in the big game, but the last two appearances have been losses to the Giants.

That surely must irk the two men who otherwise have dominated the last 12 NFL seasons.

The Patriots have never lost an AFC title game at home (4-0, three of those in those 12 seasons). They certainly came close last January when Lee Evans couldn't hold onto a pass in the end zone in the final moment that would have sent the Ravens to their second Super Bowl and first since the 2000 season, when they won it all.

New England will move the ball on Baltimore (12-6) and could resort to running it more often than in the past. Not only is Stevan Ridley a 1,000-yard rusher, something very rare for the Patriots, but the Ravens aren't nearly as stout as they once were at stopping the run. With the emergence of Shane Vereen and consis-

tency of Danny Woodhead if he is healthy, the Patriots are deep in the backfield, too.

Where the Ravens could prosper is in a revitalized pass rush. Terrell Suggs finally is approaching his top defensive player status of 2011 after returning from a partially torn Achilles tendon. Paul Kruger already is a dynamic sack guy.

Ray Lewis' pending retirement adds an emotional boost for Baltimore.

But in the end, New England's offense will be too persistent, too sharp and too deep for Baltimore to stop. Look for Wes Welker, Bran-

don Lloyd and Hernandez to have strong games, and for the Patriots' defense to keep Joe Flacco, Ray Rice, Anquan Boldin and Baltimore's dangerous offense from doing too much damage.

And look for the Patriots to be in New Orleans next month. PATRIOTS, 30-24

San Francisco (minus 4) at Atlanta

Had the Falcons kept the rout going against Seattle in last Sunday's divisional round, the spread here would be different. But Atlanta (14-3) nearly blew it, raising questions among the odds makers about how good the Falcons really are.

They're plenty good, as their last-minute rally to Matt Bryant's 49-yard field goal to beat the Seahawks

proved. The issue: San Francisco (12-4-1) simply is better.

Of the remaining four teams, the 49ers are the most balanced. They have the best defense by far; only Seattle's unit really challenged them among all the playoff qualifiers.

Atlanta will struggle to run against Patrick Willis, Justin Smith, NaVorro Bowman and Co. So the Falcons will take to the air, a wise decision when you have playmakers Tony Gonzalez, Roddy White and Julio Jones.

Problem is, the Niners' secondary is as good as any, even if the interceptions were down this season. And the pass rush, sparked by Aldon Smith (19½ sacks), is formidable.

Where San Francisco has an edge over last year, when it lost at home to the Giants for the conference crown, is in its passing game. Second-year QB Colin Kaepernick has added a dynamic dimension with his strong arm, escapability and overall athletic skills. Michael Crabtree has developed into a dependable receiver with big-play abilities.

Add that to Frank Gore's running, and Atlanta's D will be overmatched. 49ERS, 23-16

Story of Te'o Girlfriend Death Apparently a Hoax

SOUTH BEND, Ind. • A story that Notre Dame football star Manti Te'o's girlfriend had died of leukemia — a loss he said inspired him to help lead the Fighting Irish to the BCS championship game — was dismissed by the university Wednesday as a hoax perpetrated against the linebacker.

Notre Dame athletic director Jack Swarbrick said Te'o told coaches on Dec. 26 that he had received a call while at an awards ceremony from the phone number of his late girlfriend, Lennay Kekua.

By Te'o's own account, she was an "online" girlfriend.

Swarbrick said they also talked by telephone.

Swarbrick said that, based on a report from an investigative firm hired by the school, he believes Te'o was duped into an online relationship with a woman whose death was then faked by the perpetrators of the hoax.

"Nothing about what I have learned has shaken my faith in Manti Te'o one iota," Swarbrick said at a news conference Wednesday night after Deadspin.com reported in a lengthy story that it could find no record that Kekua ever existed.

Te'o said in a statement: "This is incredibly embar-

assing to talk about, but over an extended period of time, I developed an emotional relationship with a woman I met online. We maintained what I thought to be an authentic relationship by communicating frequently online and on the phone, and I grew to care deeply about her.

"To realize that I was the victim of what was apparently someone's sick joke and constant lies was, and is, painful and humiliating," he said.

"In retrospect, I obviously should have been much more cautious. If anything good comes of this, I hope it is that others will be far more guarded when they engage with people online than I was."

Swarbrick said investigators' report indicated those behind the hoax were in contact with each other, discussing what they were doing.

Deadspin reported that there was no record of Lennay Marie Kekua dying with the Social Security Administration, that a record search produced no obituary or funeral announcement. She supposedly attended Stanford but there is no mention of her death in the Stanford student newspaper.

The website reported Stanford registrar's office has no record that a Lennay Kekua ever enrolled.

RUPERT • Jared Boley carries a plastic bottle of red fox urine in his truck's coffee cup holder. I discovered this as Boley, his dad, Russell Boley, and I rode together around Rupert on Saturday on an adventure. Colleague Drew Nash, who photographed the day's activities, followed us in a company pickup.

Jared Boley is an outdoors type of guy. The Rupert resident is husky, sports a bushy goat-ee, smokes and doesn't seem to need a lot of outerwear when he's outside in 10-degree temperatures. He works full time as a ditch rider for the Minidoka Irrigation District.

And he traps animals in his spare time. For the past five years, he's been pursuing his avocation one or two days a week during the trapping season, which runs from Nov. 1 to March 31. Boley, 28, traps for three primary reasons: to eradicate troublesome, destructive animals on nearby farmland, to make money selling pelts and to get outdoors.

"Trapping helps cure cabin fever," he said. "I'm not a big skier or anything, so this helps me get out of the house. I've also lost 40 pounds since I began trapping, with all the walking we have to do."

There were no cabins in sight on Saturday. Just mostly sunny skies and enough chill to freeze mini-icicles to my mustache.

Our first stop was Lloyd Wetland, about five miles from central Rupert. After we'd hiked for about 10 minutes from the wetland entrance sign, Boley found a snow-covered spot to set his first trap — a "snare." These circular, noose-like traps are designed to quickly strangle red foxes, coyotes and other medium-sized animals.

As Boley grappled with the trap in the cold and snow, his dad hovered nearby to help out where he could.

"That's another thing about trapping in the field — there's a whole lot of improvising and inventing to do," said Russell Boley, 54, a native Murtaugh resident who drills water wells for a living.

Russell, who accompanies his son on many trapping expeditions, recently returned to Murtaugh because he couldn't find work after

seven years in Hilo, Hawaii. He's been trapping for a year.

"I was always hearing from Jared about his trapping adventures," Russell said. "I like learning more about the animals' habits and trying to outwit them, and I just enjoy the outdoors."

The younger Boley ended up setting three snares over a half-acre Saturday morning, though with the foot or so of snow on the ground he was not particularly confident any of them would work.

"I'd be elated to see one animal in a snare tomorrow," he said.

He planned to check the snares on Sunday and again on Wednesday. By state law, animal traps must be checked every 72 hours, and

The Dawn Patrol

Sun Valley Resort's new Ski Patrol 101 lets a few lucky skiers tag along as a crew gets the mountain ready for the day.

SUN VALLEY • Mitch and Clint Flippo normally consider the Christmas holidays an excuse to sleep in.

But their heads were off their pillows in their Elkhorn home as soon as the alarm sounded one recent Saturday. Heck, they would've slept with the ski helmets on, if they could have.

The two brothers, ages 13 and 10, were about to join a small group of people enrolled in Sun Valley's first Ski Patrol 101.

Ski Patrol 101 is Sun Valley's new bid to show guests what America's oldest tenured ski patrol does to get America's first destination ski resort ready each day.

"It's a great look behind the scenes," said Sun Valley Ski Patrol supervisor Mike Lloyd. "We show kids and adults what needs to happen every day for us to open the mountain for skiers and boarders to have a good time."

A sliver of moon is still hanging

Ski Patrol 101: Skiers and boarders at Sun Valley Resort can enter a lottery for Ski Patrol 101 at a kiosk in River Run Lodge. Two lucky names will be selected for each Saturday throughout the season. Each winner is allowed to bring a friend. A ski pass or lift ticket is required.

Ride the groomer: You need not be a skier or boarder to enter a lottery to ride The Beast, Sun Valley's state-of-the-art snow groomer. Rides are offered on the Beast beginning at 4 p.m. Thursdays through Saturdays. Enter the lottery at The Beast kiosk next to the Ski Patrol 101 kiosk in River Run Lodge.

Snowmaking tours: Sun Valley also offers free tours of its snowmaking headquarters at 11 a.m. Wednesdays and Saturdays. Lift tickets and intermediate ski ability are required. Sign up at the River Run desk.

over Baldy as the boys, their mother, Elise Flippo, Hailey residents Merritt Baldwin and Ashley Watson and I meet patroller David Schames in the mountain operations office shortly after 7 a.m.

"I just saw the program advertised and thought it would be fun to try," says Baldwin, who, like the Flippos, won a berth for himself and a friend in a free drawing offered weekly.

We board the gondola in the dark and soon find ourselves gazing

down on the twinkling lights of Ketchum. We can see the headlights of two snowmobiles zigzagging up the Hershey Highway that leads from Lower College to the Lookout lift. A snow groomer chugs underneath us, its bright lights flooding Roundhouse Lane.

The boys and their mother want to know whether Schames ever sees any wildlife on the mountain. Certainly, he replies. A moose and its calf gave skiers a thrill Christmas

Jared Boley said he takes that responsibility most seriously.

"You're obligated to those animals to check them," he said. "It doesn't matter if it's raining, snowing or 90 below, you have to check them. My conscience weighs on me big time if I can't make it out to an animal."

Weighing on Boley, too, is the controversy surrounding his avocation. He knows he and other trappers — even those with a conscience — aren't loved by animal rights organizations such as People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) and the Animal Liberation Front.

But Boley doesn't let animal activists dissuade him; he's in the right, he contended.

"If they were actually out here doing it, they'd see that the animals are not being crippled," Boley said. "They're misinformed and let their feelings about what they are told overwhelm their good sense."

Jared and Russell Boley searched the wetland next for a good spot to set a couple of coil spring or "foothold" traps. Jared Boley uses these to incapacitate, but not deliberately injure, red foxes and coyotes and is especially careful to use only coil spring traps if he

suspects pet dogs are in the area.

After finding a suitable location, father and son set and secured the traps into the frozen ground by a metal chain, then placed a layer of dry grass clippings over the spot to keep the traps from

freezing. They sometimes then sprinkle some of that red fox urine over the site to mask human odor and lure animals.

Jared Boley uses a .22-caliber pistol to quickly kill animals trapped in footholds. So far this season, he's shot one raccoon and one mink.

The young trapper, who also hunts rabbits, partridges, pheasants, ducks, geese and deer, said trapping helps these animals survive. The reason? Fewer predators.

"You give these other animals such as rabbits and partridges a break, a better chance

to survive," he said.

In addition to the snare and coil spring traps, Boley also uses conibear — or "body-gripping" — traps and cage traps. He's caught about 15 animals in cages.

"I'll use the cage traps to catch domestic animals that

have gotten loose or to catch problem animals for farmers," he said.

Area farmers call Boley several times a month to help them eradicate nuisance animals such as skunks, raccoons, rockchucks, foxes, coyotes, beavers and muskrats. Boley performs the services for free.

"I just ask that they allow me to trap on their land," he said. "It's a give and take. I get something out of it, and so do they."

Boley and his dad were to get nothing out of this day, though. They stopped in the early afternoon to check already-set traps on private farmland about seven miles from Rupert. They discovered the three coil springs they had set — meant specifically for coyotes — had caught nothing, and someone had even stolen one of them.

The Boleys were clearly disappointed, but ready to get at it again. They expected to return to Lloyd Wetland the next day and the following Wednesday to check the traps they'd set.

If their traps yield an animal, they know Lady Luck intervened.

"You really have to figure out the animals' habits," Jared Boley said. "You can't just set out a trap and expect the animal to wander in there."

And sometimes even the red fox urine won't help.

morning, wandering across Lower River Run right in front of the lodge as early-bird skiers lined up to get the first chair up.

A bear hangs out near Olympic Ridge, although it's probably in hibernation at this time of the year, he continues. About 12 elk used to hang out near

Frenchman's Gulch. Foxes, which delight in catching pieces of granola bars that kids drop beneath the chairs on Dollar Mountain, are making a comeback after dying off due to mange. And patrollers have spotted mountain lion tracks on Baldy this year.

"We have not, however, spotted the lion and we're not likely to, given the lion's elusive nature," he adds.

By the time we disembark from the gondola, a red streak sandwiched between two clouds has appeared in the east, announcing daybreak.

"It's kind of a cool time. You get to see the moon set as the sun's rising. It makes a nice photograph," Schames tells us, prompting the bunch to begin pointing their cell-phones at the sky.

•••

I expect to shiver in the dawn as we board the Christmas chair bound for the top, especially because it's a balmy 1 degree at bottom. But it's 9 degrees at top, and I don't even have to pull my turtle-neck over my face.

We file into the Ski Patrol Hut, likely one of the oldest buildings still in Sun Valley's inventory of multimillion-dollar trophy lodges. Built in Sun Valley's early days, which date back to 1936, it opens onto the morning sunlight which hits Christmas Bowl before kissing the rest of the mountain. Some of the 10 feet of snow that's topped Baldy already this year has covered the west side, encroaching onto the roof.

Prayer flags are strung across one side of the building. Rescue toboggans with wire baskets to hold passengers — designed by Nelson Bennett, one of Sun Valley's first patrol directors — sit in a line ready to be taken to various parts of the mountain.

Inside, two dozen patrollers are beginning to gath-

er, filling coffee mugs that hang on the wall as Syringa the avalanche dog bounces from patroller to patroller looking for a rub behind the ears. Schames mixes some cocoa for the boys and we settle in to listen to the day's report, including a list of the runs that have been specially groomed for the holiday crowd.

The day before, a skier who hiked up the mountain by the light of the full moon was knocked senseless when he ran into a cable used to pull snow groomers up steep hills. It is an ongoing problem, Lloyd notes.

Snow safety supervisor Rich Bingham advises the troops that the temperatures will top out in the teens. Avalanche risk is moderate, he concludes.

Bryant Dunn tells the patrollers that Sun Valley hosted 7,251 skiers the day before.

"It was a big day, but they're spreading out all over the mountain," he says. "This is going to be our busiest day of the year, so get ready for that."

Oh, and someone needs to check out a thin patch of snow on top of Christmas Ridge where last night's wind turned up some rocks.

That someone turns out to be us.

•••

While Baldwin and Watson head off with Lloyd, the Flip-

pos and I accompany Schames to inspect what resembles a small minefield of rocks at the far end of Christmas Ridge. We can tell Schames is reluctant to rope it off. But, we agree, that part should be closed for the safety of guests — and the bottoms of their boards.

Schames shows the boys how to raise the cushion hugging one of the chairlift poles to adjust it for the increasing amount of snow that has fallen. Then he escorts them down the bumps lining Christmas Ridge to one of the gates opening onto the Bowls.

The boys yank on the "closed" rope several times as hard as they can. Finally, they succeed, the rebound of the rope coming loose sending them sprawling on the snow.

One gate open for skiers to head into the Bowls.

We ski down the bumps to the next gate and repeat the process.

"Looks like your boys have a future as ski patrollers," I tell Elise Flippo as the boys need only a few yanks this time to open the gate.

"Mamas, don't let your babies grow up to be ski patrolmen," Schames interjects, borrowing a line from Waylon and Willie.

Schames was raised in Connecticut, but his family skied Sun Valley when he was a boy. He moved to Sun Valley in 1975 where he worked for the snowmaking department until 1979. He returned to Sun Valley six years ago — this time as a ski patroller.

"You have to enjoy adventure if you want to be a patroller," he tells us. "You never know what you're going to spend the day doing when you come to work."

•••

At the bottom of Christmas,

Schames shows the boys how to string a safety rope across the cat track to prevent anyone from going down into Guntower Lane while the snow groomer works its way back from the Seattle Ridge area.

"We'll catch the chair and ski back down to reopen it," he tells us.

By 9 a.m. when the resort opens, we've accomplished what we set out to do. But Schames isn't finished with the boys. He straps avalanche beacons around their chests and takes them to the avalanche beacon practice park, which sits near the bottom of Christmas Bowl.

There he activates the beacon system so the boys can practice trying to find a beacon that's buried below the snow.

"This is how we find people — we come here and practice all the time," he tells them. "Of course, if we were digging for a person, we'd have shovels and problems and a dog out here — she's faster than any of us at locating people."

•••

Other ski patrols, including the one at Schweitzer near Sandpoint, are aware of Sun Valley's program and are considering incorporating such a program into their own routine, said Schweitzer patroller Michael Boge.

Mom and the boys were elated with their experience.

"It was neat coming up on the mountain and seeing the moon set as the sun rose," Mitch Flippo said. "And I liked that I got to open and close gates and try the avalanche deal. I think it would be fun being a ski patrolman."

"It's a once-in-a-lifetime experience to be able to ski with the patrol," Elise Flippo said.

Sure Cure for Cabin Fever: Cottontails and the .17 HMR

I'm a true believer in free agency: If someone wants to stand out in the middle of a frozen reservoir all week-end jigging for pan fish, then I say, "More power to him." But when the temperatures drop into the single digits and the walls start to close in on us, the grandkids and I grab our rimfire rifles and head for the lava flows just outside of town to chase bushytails.

Our favorite technique is to still hunt the brush-entangled edges of the rimrock. Here we hope to catch the cottontails napping on the crumbling basalt ledges just above their burrows.

Years ago, before Mother Nature starting taking out annual withdrawals of my vision and hearing, an old Remington Nylon 66 semi auto and well-used Ruger Single-Six were my go-to bunny guns. Nowadays, I favor a superbly accurate CZ 452 bolt action chambered in the sizzling .17 HMR rimfire cartridge to make clean kills on the reclusive cottontails that we commonly encounter at 30- to 50-yard distances.

This able cartridge combined with the increased magnification and light-gathering ability of the kids' Weaver and Burris rimfire scopes help my budding hunters practice precise shot placement rather than indiscriminately spraying the target area with lead — a practice so common with their peers.

For years I had generally been satisfied with the performance of my conventional Winchester Super-X and Federal High Velocity .22 LR ammunition. The accuracy was there in spades, but even a carefully placed head shot would send the rabbit kicking and cartwheeling around. Dramatic for sure, but this drama sometimes presented a problem. More often than I'd like to recall, a fatally wounded cottontail would reflexively kick itself back into its burrow or down into a crevasse where it couldn't be retrieved. As a sportsman, you can understand why this was unacceptable to me.

Shooting the Bull

Since shot placement wasn't the issue, the solution seemed obvious: Hit 'em with more horsepower. But what firearm and cartridge would best serve our needs? I really don't like to use a shotgun for this style of rabbit hunting, and the small-caliber centerfires so popular today are too much gun for the suburban areas we hunt. After some online research and discussions with the folks at my local gun shops, I decided to give the relatively new .17 HMR rimfire a try.

Developed by the bullet-making giant Hornady Manufacturing, working in conjunction with the Marlin and Ruger firearms companies, the diminutive .17 HMR set the rimfire world on its ear when it was introduced in 2002. It is currently the fastest rimfire in history — with velocity of 2,300-2,500 fps. That easily trumps the .22 LR's 40 grain bullet running at about 1,300 fps and the .22 WMR's hottest 30+ grain loads smoking out at around 2,200.

Now those numbers look great on paper, but what about the real-world performance of this speedster? In a word: impressive.

Several years ago, the grandkids and I tore back the Christmas wrappings on three beautiful CZ 452 bolt gun/scope combos that I had bought at bargain prices. These rifles are wonderfully machined, incredibly accurate, and when their 17- or 20-grain bullets connect with a bunny, it's lights out! There is no postmortem kicking and thrashing, and we have yet to lose a single precious rabbit.

When cabin fever strikes this month, why not bundle up the kiddies, grab your .17 HMR's and hit the bunny trails? It'll be good for what ails you, I promise.

The forest is seeking public comment on proposed projects for which it's seeking grants from the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation. Each year the state provides funding for public land agencies through a grant application process; the money is raised through the sale of boating, recreation and off-road vehicle stickers. Fairfield Ranger District

Boardman Bridge: Replace existing footbridge with a single-span footbridge. Currently the bridge allows access across the South Fork Boise River from Forest Road 227 (Ketchum-Featherville road) to an extensive single-track motorized trail system and allows access across the river for the Idaho Department Fish and Game to the Lightfoot Hot Springs elk feeding station. This bridge is also used by horse riders, hikers and permittees.

Baumgartner Campground: Replace the aging drinking water system with new underground pipe and faucets as well as repair and replace campsite furniture, fire rings and barriers. Expand the length of parking spurs, where possible, so the campground will better accommodate RVs.

Motorized trails: Complete up to two miles of trail re-routes; conduct early-season maintenance and tree removal on more than 300 miles of trails; trail tread repairs, brushing, short trail re-routes and other heavy

trail maintenance on motorized and non-motorized trails; and continue maintenance and educational patrols into the fall hunting season.

Snowmobile equipment: Replace two older snowmobiles and a trailer. This equipment is used to maintain snowmobile trails, aid in avalanche forecasting and perform educational patrols.

Trail signs: Purchase and install winter and summer trail signs. Summer signs will inform visitors about trail names, numbers and distance to destinations. Winter signs will mark snowmobile routes with snow poles and reassurance markers (orange diamonds).

Pioneer-Cabin Trail 122, High Ridge Trail 124 and Federal Gulch 169-Timber Draw 313 Loop Trail improvement: On the Pioneer-Cabin, decayed log retaining walls will be replaced and over a dozen failed water bars will be reconstructed as rolling grade dips. A rock turnpike, just past the trail junction with Johnstone, will be extended by about 500 feet, providing a dry pathway and preventing further damage to the wet meadow. Gullied and braided sections of trail running through the meadow will be restored. On the Federal Gulch-Timber Draw loop, six step-down fords will be constructed at stream crossings to prevent water erosion, and portions

of a half-mile section of steep trail will be realigned to reduce climbing grades. On High Ridge, a 2.6-mile section of trail will be restored to a 24-inch width.

Placer 141 to Castle Trail 140 improvements: Realign four trail sections, totaling 1/2 mile. The four sections will be moved out of riparian areas onto dry sidehills. On Castle Creek Trail, where realignment is not an option, two 50-foot turnpikes will be constructed to protect spring areas. The upper two-thirds mile of Castle Creek Trail will be realigned, moving it out of an open south-facing meadow into a forested west-facing slope. Signage along both trails and at the trailheads will be added.

Partners for Trails Project: This will couple volunteers from The Wood River Bike Coalition, Sawtooth Pony Club, Community School and Sage School with experienced trail construction leaders to tackle projects and perform heavy maintenance on more than 116 miles of trails in Greenhorn, Adams Gulch and Fox Creek drainages. All projects will be "tire-, hoof- and foot-friendly" and reduce the need for trail maintenance over time. Includes constructing "step down" and ramp-style rock stream fords, constructing two log span trail bridges at the beginning of Greenhorn Trail 156 and at Mahoney Creek Trail 821, replacing water bars with rolling grade dips, rehabilitating braided sections of tread, realigning short trail sections out of riparian areas, replacing the outdated area trail maps at Adams Gulch and Fox Creek trailheads and providing a new map at Greenhorn Trailhead.

Don't Forget to Report on Deer, Elk, Pronghorn Tags

JEROME • Hunters who submit their hunt reports by Jan. 18 will be entered in a drawing for one of 10 Super Hunt tags, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

Ten hunters will be randomly drawn from among those who have filed all their mandatory hunter reports for deer, elk and pronghorn tags by midnight Jan. 18. This is the last chance to be entered in the drawing.

The 10 hunters selected will be able to select one tag for either deer, elk or pronghorn. They will have to buy the tag at the usual price for controlled hunts, but the tag will allow them to hunt in any open unit or any open hunt for that species.

The tags can be in addition to any other controlled or general hunt tag for that species. They are being offered as an

incentive to hunters to file their mandatory reports promptly.

To make sure that all your reports have been filed, or to file a report, check this website: <http://fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/hunt/?get=Page106>. Fish and Game also has a 24-hour, toll-free phone line to speak to a live operator; call 1-877-268-9365 to file reports 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

To file, hunters need to know their tag numbers or hunting license numbers, the number of days they hunted, the game management units they hunted in, the date they harvested, and the number of antler points on the animal they harvested, or the length of the horns for pronghorns in inches.

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

ASK THE OFFICER

Question: I see fewer and fewer young hunters in the field. What's the Idaho Department of Fish and Game doing to recruit new hunters and anglers?

Answer: Recruiting young anglers and hunters is a top priority for the department, and many activities are developed and sponsored specifically for young sportsmen and women. Last summer department staff sponsored more than 16 youth fishing clinics across the Magic Valley utilizing a specially equipped trailer called the "Take Me Fishing" trailer. Children utilizing "Take Me Fishing" clinics were provided with equipment and fished without licenses. Our Free Fishing day activities at Hayspur and Hagerman fish hatcheries gave away fishing equipment and "hooked" several hundred children on fishing as a lifetime sport.

"Trout in the Classroom" provides aquariums, chillers and trout for children in middle school classrooms to learn about the life cycle of fish as well as the business of aquaculture. Fifty-five classrooms in 15 Magic Valley schools taught children about the life cycle of trout. The course starts with trout eggs and ends with live trout planted in a local pond for angling recreation. Recruiting young hunters is also a priority for the department. In the Magic Valley last year, volunteer instructors completed 55 hunter and bowhunter education classes and certified about 1,800 students. An additional 35 field days were needed to certify students taking hunter education online.

Many hunting seasons for big game and turkeys have been developed specifically

to allow young hunters a special controlled hunt or liberal opportunities to take either sex deer on many general deer hunts. The intent behind the liberal opportunity is to provide young hunters a highly successful hunting opportunity while accompanying their parents or other adults who are generally restricted to antlered-only animals.

The department has also sponsored adult mentored youth hunting opportunity with a special mentored youth hunting license. This license allows a non-resident youth to accompany a licensed adult at prices similar to resident youth. The accompanying adult must have a tag for the same species, valid in the same area. Department-trained hunting mentors also took about 50 young hunters on special hunts for turkeys, pheasants and deer.

A new program this year called "Hunter Passport" is designed to allow someone who has never hunted anywhere previously to purchase a passport permit and appropriate tags to hunt in Idaho with a mentor without having to complete hunter education. The new Hunter Passport is valid only for first-time hunters and is valid for one calendar year. The Hunter Passport will be available for age-appropriate permits and tags beginning with children age 8. The cost of the Hunter Passport is \$1.75 with additional fees for required permits and tags.

The intent of the Hunter Passport program is to allow those individuals who have never hunted before to try it with a mentor before they make a large investment in time and equipment. My bet is they will get hooked on hunting.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE SALE AND ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR LOCAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 2012-1 OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT AND COLLECTION OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS LEVIED IN SAID LOCAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT; PROVIDING FOR THE HANDLING OF FUNDS RECEIVED FROM SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS AND THE CREATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF LIENS IN CONNECTION WITH THE SALE AND ISSUANCE OF BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE CREATION OF A LOCAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT BOND FUND AND INTEREST FUND; PRESCRIBING DETAILS CONCERNING THE FOREGOING; PROVIDING FOR A REASSESSMENT OF ASSESSMENTS AND THE REISSUE OF BONDS; REPEALING CONFLICTING PROCEEDINGS; ORDERING PUBLICATION; PROVIDING IRREPEALABILITY; PROVIDING SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Twin Falls, Idaho (the "City"), has taken the requisite legal action preliminary to and in the creation of Local Improvement District No. 2012-1 of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho, for the purpose of providing for the financing of certain improvements in said Local Improvement District No. 2012-1 (the "District") as hereinafter designated, and has, in Ordinances Nos. 3040 and 3041, passed and approved respectively by the City Council on November 5, 2012, and December 3, 2012, created said District and levied valid special assessments on certain real property in said District to defray the cost and expenses of said improvements, all pursuant to Chapter 17, Title 50, Idaho Code, as amended; and

WHEREAS, the property to be assessed of said District, from which the funds are to be received from the levy of said assessments in order to make payments on the hereinafter mentioned Bond, is as described on Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof; and the improvements made within the said boundaries of the District include the acquisition and construction of various sewer system, pre-treatment system, water system, related utility extensions, road and other facilities and related improvements and related improvements and costs (the "Project") ; and

WHEREAS, the total estimated cost and expenses of said improvements in said District are in the amount of up to \$32,509,000, of which the sum of \$-0- is estimated to be paid from state, federal, county, city or other sources and the remaining amount, up to \$32,509,000, which shall be paid from the proceeds of Bonds (defined below) secured by the levy of special assessments in said District and payments on certain related Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho Revenue Allocation Bonds Series 2013A (the "Revenue Allocation Bonds") which shall be deemed a credit on payments of the Bonds and therefore a credit against the related payment of installment payments on the District's assessments, and from any interest earnings on Bond Funds; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Chapter 17, Title 50, Idaho Code, as amended, the City of Twin Falls, Idaho (the "City"), is authorized to pledge the unpaid portion of the aforementioned special assessments in said District for the payment of the Bonds hereinafter authorized, and to provide for the payment of said unpaid portion of the special assessments in installments; and

WHEREAS, the City, on behalf of the District, has negotiated for the sale of the Local Improvement Bonds, Series 2013, for Local Improvement District No. 2012-1 (herein the "Bond" or "Bonds") with Zions First National Bank (the "Purchaser") in the amount of up to \$32,509,000; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to said negotiation, the Purchaser has agreed to accept from the City on behalf of the District future prepayments on the Bonds on any date hereafter prior to maturity as set forth hereinafter and to re-amortize and re-calculate thereafter the remaining installments of principal and interest due from the City on the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to said negotiation, the City, on behalf of the District, has determined it is in the best interests of the City and the District to award the sale of said Bonds to the Purchaser, at the price of par and accrued interest to date of delivery, if any, and at the initial interest rate not to exceed 5.50% per annum for the Bonds as shown in Exhibit "B," attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, which interest rate is subject to adjustment as provided in Section 6.0 hereof and Exhibit "B" hereto, and it is deemed desirable now to authorize the issuance of said Bonds and to confirm the sale thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO:

Section 1.0 Assessments; Interest; City to Send to Property Owners Notice of Any Annual Installment Payment Due. Subject to the provision for crediting payments on the Revenue Allocation Bonds and the requirements for payment on thirty (30) days' notice described below in this Section, the assessments within the District levied by Ordinance No. 3041 (the "Assessment Ordinance"), and which have not been paid, shall be payable in as nearly as may be possible twenty (20) further substantially equal amortized annual installments of principal and interest, which shall be due on or before the 25th day of March, in each of the years 2014 to 2033, inclusive, and shall bear interest on the unpaid amount thereof from the date of the Bond, at the annual rate of interest not to exceed 5.50%, subject to adjustment as provided in Section 6.0 hereof and Exhibit "B" hereto. The first of such amortized annual installments of principal and interest and costs of administration shall be payable commencing on March 25, 2014, and thereafter on the 25th day of March until principal is paid in full, the annual installments and the interest on said unpaid assessments being payable in lawful money of the United States of America, at the Office of the City Treasurer of said City, all as otherwise provided in Ordinance No. 3041 levying said assessments. Said amortized annual installments are estimated to at least equal the payments due on the Bonds.

Payments made on the Revenue Allocation Bonds shall be a credit against payments on the Bonds and, therefore, the installment payments of assessments will be conditional. The condition for payment of the Bonds and for collection of the installment payment of the assessments will be any shortfall in the collection of tax increment plus the payment by Chobani Idaho, Inc., formerly Agro-Farma Idaho, Inc. (the "Owner") pursuant to the Development Agreement dated November 3, 2011 as amended ("Development Agreement") between the City and Owner resulting in insufficient proceeds to meet the periodic payment obligations on the Revenue Allocation Bonds. Installment payments on the assessments will correspond in amount and interest rate to the payments on the Revenue Allocation Bonds. To the extent that a payment is made on the Revenue Allocation Bonds, the same will constitute a credit against the payment of the Bonds and the corresponding installment payment of the assessment.

Upon notice from the holder of the Bonds, the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Twin Falls Idaho (the "Agency") or Trustee of the Revenue Allocation Bonds as to the happening of the condition, the City Clerk will give the assessed property owners 30 days written notification that the corresponding installment payment of the assessment is due and payable on the next March 25, and shall be in an amount equal to the deficiency in payment of the Revenue Allocation Bonds from the tax increment, net of any payments received under the Development Agreement, prorated amongst the assessed property owners in the proportion each owner's assessment bears to the total. If the payment of the tax increment recovers and there are sufficient proceeds to meet the periodic payment obligation of the Revenue Allocation Bonds, the condition requiring the payment of the Bonds from the assessment payments will no longer be in force until such time, if any, another shortfall in tax increment payments occurs.

Subject to the foregoing three (3) paragraphs, all installment payments shall be due on March 25, in each of the years 2014 to 2033, inclusive, which is an annual date at least five days prior to the date a payment on the Bonds becomes due. The installment payments shall be paid to the City Treasurer at the Twin Falls City Hall. Installment payments will be delinquent twenty (20) days after due.

Subject to and as when required as set forth above, the City Clerk shall send to each property owner in the District that is presumed to have elected to pay its assessment by installment an annual notice of any assessment installment payment that is due and the terms of payment set out in this Ordinance and in Ordinance No. 3041, and shall file an affidavit of such mailing in the office of the City Treasurer.

Section 2.0 Bond Fund and Interest Fund; Reserve Fund. There are also hereby created the Bond Fund for Local Improvement District No. 2012-1 (herein the "Bond Fund") and the Interest Fund for Local Improvement District No. 2012-1 (herein the "Interest Fund") as more fully described hereinafter. For the purposes of securing the issuance of the Bonds, all installment payments of assessments levied under the District, including all principal of and interest on such assessments and any penalties accrued shall be collected by the Treasurer of the City and deposited in the Bond Fund or Interest Fund as hereinafter provided. All monies in the Bond Fund and Interest Fund are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the Bonds. In addition, a Reserve Fund is established which shall be deemed funded through the reserve fund for the Revenue Allocation Bonds, to be held and administered by the Trustee for the Revenue Allocation Bonds in the amount of the Reserve Fund Requirement as defined in the Bond Resolution for the Revenue Allocation Bonds.

Section 3.0 Collection and Application of Funds. The City Treasurer shall be, and he or she hereby is, authorized and empowered, and it shall be his or her duty to receive and collect for said District all assessments levied to pay the costs of said improvements, the installments thereof, the interest thereon, subject to the credit for payment on the Revenue Allocation Bonds, and the penalties accrued, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the whole of the unpaid principal which becomes due and payable immediately because of the failure to pay any installment, whether of principal or interest, when due, and to pay and disburse such payments to the person or persons lawfully entitled to receive the same, in accordance with the laws of the State of Idaho and all the ordinances and resolutions of said City. In connection therewith, the Treasurer shall cooperate and work with the Trustee for the Revenue Allocation Bonds in the determination of any lack of payment of tax increment for the Revenue Allocation Bonds net of payment on the Development Agreement and the collection and enforcement of the said assessment installment payments and all actions taken with respect thereto. Any monies received constituting the payment of principal of said unpaid installments of assessments for the District shall be placed in the Bond Fund and shall be used as soon as they are available therefor for the purpose of paying, in regular numerical order, the principal of the Bonds for said District when the same is due, and for no other purpose whatsoever, and as security for such payment the Bond Fund is hereby irrevocably pledged. All monies constituting the payment of interest on said unpaid installments of assessments for the District shall be placed in the Interest Fund and shall be used as soon as they are available therefor for the purpose of paying the interest on the Bonds of said District when the same is due, and for no other purpose whatsoever, and as security for such payment said Interest Fund is hereby pledged. Money in the Bond Fund of said District shall be accounted for separate and apart from the bond funds of any other local improvement districts, and from any other funds of said City, and shall from time to time, as received, be deposited in such bank or banks as are designated as depositories of public monies for the funds of said City under the depository laws of the State of Idaho for the deposit of public funds or invested as provided by law. Interest received on such funds so deposited or invested shall be placed to the credit of the fund from which it is earned.

Section 4.0 Delinquent Assessments. If the owner of any lot or parcel of land assessed for said improvements shall be delinquent in the payment of any assessment installment of principal or interest due, it shall be the duty of the City and its officers to cause the registered owner of the Bonds to be immediately notified of such delinquency, in writing, and if such delinquency shall not be paid within ten (10) days after the date of such delinquency, then the City at its own expense and in cooperation with the registered owner(s) of the Bonds and the Trustee for the Revenue Allocation Bonds, shall forthwith collect the assessment and foreclose the special assessment lien against the property in the manner now or hereafter provided by the Local Improvement District Code (Title 50, Chapter 17, Idaho Code, as amended) of the State of Idaho for the collection of said assessments and the foreclosure of said lien, or otherwise as provided by law. In addition, the Treasurer may take such actions as necessary to cause delinquent certificates to be issued in accordance with Title 50, Chapter 17, Idaho Code, as amended.

Section 5.0 Assessment Lien. The assessments and the interest thereon have been and shall continue to constitute, and are hereby declared to be, a lien in the several amounts assessed against each lot or tract of land hereinbefore specified, which lien shall be superior to the lien of any mortgage or other encumbrance, whether prior in time or not, and shall constitute such lien until paid.

Section 6.0 Authorization and Description of Bonds. For the purpose of financing said improvements in the District, there shall be issued in the name of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho on behalf of the District, one or more Local Improvement Bonds, Series 2013, for the City of Twin Falls, Idaho, Local Improvement District No. 2012-1 (herein the "Bond" or "Bonds") in the aggregate principal amount of up to \$32,509,000, which amount is not in excess of the contract price and the expenses of said improvements and related financing costs, and which Bonds shall be dated the date of issuance and delivery of the Bonds ("Closing"), and shall be in authorized minimum denominations of \$100,000 and integral multiples of \$1,000 and bear interest on the unpaid principal thereof until paid at the initial interest rate not to exceed 5.50% per annum, with said interest rate to be recalculated and adjusted as described in Exhibit "B" hereto, with amortized principal and interest payable in twenty (20) substantially equal annual installments of principal and interest on April 1 of each year, commencing April 1, 2014, and ending April 1, 2033, both principal and interest being payable at the Office of the City Treasurer of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho, subject to the conditions set forth in Section 1.0 hereof. The Bond shall be in substantially the form of and shall bear interest at the rate as set forth in Exhibit "B" hereto consistent with the commitment of Purchaser dated November 28, 2012. The annual installments of amortized principal and interest shall be calculated as approximately equal installments of principal and interest amortized over 20 years, and are subject to re-amortization and re-calculation each year on April 1 of any subsequent year or the interest rate is adjusted as provided in Exhibit "B" hereto if and to the extent prepayments on or redemption of any of the Bonds are made pursuant to Section 7.0 herein.

Section 7.0 Redemption. The District hereby reserves the right to prepay and redeem any of the Bonds, at the redemption price of par and accrued interest thereon, in whole or in part, at its option on any date hereafter prior to maturity. The District shall receive and permit prepayment of assessment installments only in accordance with the Assessment Ordinance and credits on Bond payments for payments on the Revenue Allocation Bonds shall only be applied in connection therewith to the extent such Revenue Allocation Bond payments have already been made. Bonds to be prepaid or redeemed shall be selected by the Bond Registrar and shall, in the event less than all of the outstanding Bonds are to be redeemed, insofar as can be done taking into consideration the denominations of the outstanding Bonds, be in even dollar increments of \$1,000 or multiples thereof. Bonds called for redemption shall be redeemed at a redemption price equal to the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest to the redemption date. Notice of any intended redemption shall be given not less than thirty (30) nor more than sixty (60) days prior to the redemption date by first-class mail, postage prepaid, to the registered owner of any Bonds to be redeemed at the address appearing in the bond register described in Section 9.0 hereof. The requirement of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be complied with when notice is mailed as herein provided, regardless of whether or not it is actually received by the owner of the Bond. Interest on a Bond shall cease to accrue on the date fixed for prepayment and redemption unless the Bond is not prepaid and redeemed upon presentation made pursuant to such call. Notice having been given in the manner hereinbefore provided, the Bond shall become due and payable on the redemption date so designated, and upon presentation thereof at said office, the District will pay the Bond. Following any such prepayments and redemptions, all subsequent annual installments of principal and interest which are outstanding on any remaining unpaid or unredeemed portion of the Bonds shall be reamortized and recalculated, as new equally amortized annual payments of principal and interest, taking into account any prepayments and redemptions previously made, and a revised Schedule I shall be prepared and shall govern and be incorporated into the future annual payment terms for the remaining Bonds.

Section 8.0 Execution of Bonds. The Bonds shall be payable to the registered owners thereof and shall be executed and signed as follows:

A. If facsimile signatures are to be printed on the Bonds, then pursuant to Sections 59 1018 through 59 1023, Idaho Code, the Mayor, the City Treasurer, and the City Clerk shall each forthwith file with the Secretary of State of the State of Idaho, his or her manual signature certified by him or her under oath.

B. The Bonds shall be signed on behalf of the City with the manual or facsimile signature of the Mayor; the Bonds shall be countersigned with the manual or facsimile signature of the Treasurer and attested with the manual or facsimile signature of the Clerk; and the Bonds shall bear the manual or facsimile of the seal of the City. The certificate endorsed on the Bonds shall be executed with a manual or facsimile signature of the Clerk. The Bonds bearing the signatures of the officers in office at the time of the signing thereof shall be the valid and binding obligations of the City on behalf of the District, notwithstanding that before the delivery thereof and payment therefor, any or all of the persons whose signatures appear thereon shall have ceased to fill their respective offices. The Mayor, Treasurer and Clerk, at the time of the execution of the Bonds and a signature certificate appertaining thereto, each may adopt as and for his or her own manual or facsimile signature the signature of his or her predecessor in office in the event that such manual or facsimile signature appears upon the Bonds.

Section 9.0 Bond Registration. The Bonds shall be registered for payment as to both principal and interest. The City Treasurer is appointed bond registrar (herein the "Registrar" or "Bond Registrar") and shall maintain books for the registration, transfer and conversion of the Bonds, including a listing of all registered owners of the Bonds and their correct addresses (the "Bond Register"), and shall authenticate the Bonds and do all things authorized by the Idaho Registered Public Obligations Act, Chapter 9, Title 57, Idaho Code. The Registrar shall register or permit to be transferred or discharged from registration any Bond presented for such purpose subject to said Act and such reasonable regulations as the Registrar may prescribe and after the City is reimbursed for any tax or governmental charge payable in connection therewith. For the purposes of said Registered Public Obligations Act, this Bond Ordinance shall constitute a "system of registration" within the meaning, and for all purposes, of said Act.

Section 10.0 Ownership of Bonds. The City and its officers shall treat the person in whose name the Bond is registered as the absolute owner, whether or not such Bond shall be overdue. All payments made as provided in this Ordinance shall be valid and effectual to discharge the liability upon the Bonds to the extent of the amount so paid.

Section 11.0 Form of Bonds. The Bonds for said District shall be in substantially the form as set forth on Exhibit "C" hereto.

Section 12.0 Sale of Bonds; Interest of Bondowners. The Bonds herein authorized, when executed, shall be issued to the Purchaser thereof or his lawful designee(s). The sale of the Bonds to the Purchaser, is hereby authorized and approved in accordance with this Ordinance and in accordance with a Purchase Commitment dated November 28, 2012 with Purchaser which is hereby authorized, ratified and approved. The exact amount of Bonds to be executed and delivered to Purchaser shall not exceed \$32,509,000. The City on behalf of the District shall cause the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds to be immediately transmitted to the Trustee for the Revenue Allocation Bonds as consideration therefor and applied to the payment of costs of issuance, the repayment of the District's Interim Warrant, Series 2012 issued to finance the Project and applied as required under the resolution of the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho authorizing the Revenue Allocation Bonds to establish a reserve fund and for payment of other costs of the Project. The sale of the Bonds herein authorized to said Purchaser, at the price of par and accrued interest to the date of delivery, if any, is hereby ratified and confirmed; and when issued, said Bonds shall transfer to the owner thereof all the rights and interest of the City in and with respect to every assessment against the property in said District liable to assessment for such local improvements and the liens thereby created against the property in said District liable to assessment for such local improvements and the liens thereby created against the property of the property owner assessed as shall not have availed itself of the provisions of law in regard to the redemption of his property from the lien or such assessment and shall authorize the owner or owners of said Bonds to receive and have collected the assessment or assessments embraced in any such Bond through any of the methods provided by law for the collection of assessments for local improvements; and the City hereby pledges to such owner or owners of said Bonds the exercise of all lawful corporate powers in the collection of the assessments for the redemption of said Bonds.

Section 13.0 Bondowner Remedies. Any owner of the Bonds, may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other appropriate proceeding in any court of competent jurisdiction, protect the liens and other obligations created by this Ordinance, the Assessment Ordinance and other related ordinances on the proceeds of said assessments, and may by suit, action, mandamus or other appropriate proceedings enforce and compel the performance of any duty imposed upon the City by the provisions of this Ordinance, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the segregation of assessments and the proper application thereof.

Section 14.0 Reassessment. Pursuant to Section 50 1720, Idaho Code, the City hereby covenants with the Purchaser and with all subsequent owners of the Bonds that if ever the assessments of the District have failed to be valid in whole or in part for want of form or sufficiency, informality, irregularity or nonconformance with the laws governing such assessment, the City shall, to the extent permitted by law, reassess such assessments and enforce their collection in accordance with the provisions of the law existing at the time the reassessment is made. The City further covenants that when for any cause, mistake or inadvertence the amounts heretofore assessed shall not be sufficient to pay the cost and expenses of the improvements made and enjoyed by owners of property in the District, the City shall make reassessments on all property in the District sufficient to pay for such improvements. Such reassessment shall be made and collected in accordance with the provisions of the law existing at the time of its levy.

Section 15.0 Reissuance of Bonds. The City additionally covenants with the Purchaser and the subsequent owners of the Bonds, pursuant to Section 50 1725, Idaho Code, that if the City on behalf of the District shall ever default in the payment of principal or interest or if the Bonds shall have been declared invalid or void by order or decree of court, the City on behalf of the District shall, to the extent permitted by law, reissue the Bonds at the same rate of interest and in such amount as will cover the principal and interest due on the Bonds, and the Bonds upon which there has been default or which have been declared invalid or void shall thereupon be surrendered and canceled. The lien created by the levy of assessments heretofore made for the District shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 16.0 Filing for Tax Deed. Pursuant to Sections 63 1005 and 63-1006, Idaho Code, as amended, any bondholder may file with the County Treasurer of the Twin Falls County, Idaho, a written request for notice of the issuance of a tax deed on property upon which said lien for assessments located in said Local Improvement District on behalf of which his Bond was issued. Said request, if made, shall be in the form prescribed in said Sections 63 1005 and 63-1006, Idaho Code, as amended.

Section 17.0 Prepayment of Assessments. As provided in the Notice sent to property owners within the District pursuant to the Assessment Ordinance, and in accordance with Section 50 1715, Idaho Code, as amended, any prepayments of assessments after January 6, 2013, must include the full principal amount of the unpaid assessments plus any applicable penalties and all accrued interest through the date of payment of the same, plus additional interest thereon, at the initial rate of interest of 5.50% per annum (subject to adjustment as hereinbefore stated) from the date of the last installment of assessment due through a date which is one (1) year after the next interest date on the Bonds.

Section 18.0 Conflicting Actions Repealed; Publication. All ordinances, resolutions and parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance, to the extent of such conflict, are hereby repealed, and this Ordinance or a summary thereof shall be published as required by law.

Section 19.0 Ordinance Is a Contract and Irrepealable; Variation of Terms of Bonds or Installment Payment of Assessment by Certificate at Closing. The provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a contract between the City and the registered owners of the Bonds so long as principal and interest thereon remain unpaid. After the Bonds are issued, this Ordinance shall be and remain irrepealable until the Bonds and the interest thereon shall be fully paid and discharged, as herein provided. The terms and conditions for the Bonds or the installment payment of assessments of the District may be altered or varied pursuant to a terms certificate signed by the City on behalf of the District and the Purchaser at the time of issuance and closing of the Bonds.

Section 20.0 Severability. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall in no manner affect any remaining provision of this Ordinance.

Section 21.0 Emergency. An emergency existing therefor, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage, approval and publication and second and third readings hereof have been duly and properly waived by the City Council.

1. Interest rate: (a) An initial rate until five (5) year after issuance of the Bonds to be calculated based on the associated LIBOR rate + 4.00% per annum, subject to adjustment and recalculation as set forth in (b) below;

(b) On the 5th anniversary of the issuance of the Bonds and every 5 years thereafter, at the District's option, the interest rate shall be recalculated based on the associated LIBOR rate + 4.00% per annum fixed for up to 5 years, provided further that upon payment in full of the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho Revenue Allocation Bonds, Series 2013B, at the District's option, the interest rate on the Bonds shall bear interest at an interest rate fixed for the remainder of the 5-year period based upon the associated LIBOR rate + 3.50% per annum, on the principal balance owing, which interest rate shall then be recalculated every 5 years thereafter on the same reduced basis. Payments on certain revenue allocation bonds of the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho shall be credited against payment on this Bond as provided in the Bond Ordinance defined below, and this Bond is also payable as to principal and interest from and is secured by the irrevocable pledge and dedication of the funds to be derived from the collection of special assessments on real property in said District, which special assessments were levied by Ordinance No. 3041, passed and approved by the City Council of the City on December 3, 2012, and the unpaid portion of which has been pledged to the payment of this Bond, pursuant to Ordinance No. 3045 passed and approved by the City Council of the City on the 14th day of January, 2013 (the "Bond Ordinance"), all in accordance with and under the authority of Chapter 17, Title, 50, Idaho Code, as amended. The assessments made and levied to finance the costs and expenses of the work or improvements authorized by the provisions of the Local Improvement District Code, or any law of the State of Idaho, are by statute made a lien upon and against the property in said Local Improvement District upon which such assessment or assessments were made and levied from and after the 3rd day of December, 2012, which lien is superior to the lien of any mortgage or other encumbrance, whether prior in time or not, and shall constitute such lien until paid. Pursuant to Sections 63-1005 and 63-1006, Idaho Code, as amended, a bondholder may file with the County Treasurer of the Twin Falls County, Idaho, a written request for notice of the issuance of a tax deed on property located in said District, upon which said lien for assessments exists. The City hereby obligates itself, and is bound under the terms and provisions of said law, to cause said assessments to be properly collected, and to apply the proceeds of said assessments to no other purpose than to pay when due, the principal of and interest on this Bond.

The owners and holders of such bonds shall be entitled to complete enforcement of all assessments made for the payment of such bonds. A copy of this section shall be plainly written, printed or engraved on the face of each bond so issued."

Subject to the requirements of the Bond Ordinance, the District hereby reserves the right to prepay and redeem any of the Bonds, in whole or in part, on any date hereafter prior to maturity. Bonds to be prepaid or redeemed shall be selected by the Bond Registrar and shall, in the event less than all of the outstanding Bonds are to be redeemed, insofar as can be done taking into consideration the denominations of the outstanding Bonds, be in even dollar increments of \$1,000 or multiples thereof. Bonds called for redemption shall be redeemed at a redemption price equal to the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest to the redemption date. Notice of any intended redemption shall be given not less than thirty (30) nor more than sixty (60) days prior to the redemption date by first-class mail, postage prepaid, to the registered owner of any Bonds to be redeemed at the address appearing in the bond register described in Section 9.0 of the Bond Ordinance. The requirement of the Bond Ordinance shall be deemed to be complied with when notice is mailed as therein provided, regardless of whether or not it is actually received by the owner of the Bond. Interest on a Bond shall cease to accrue on the date fixed for prepayment and redemption unless the Bond is not prepaid and redeemed upon presentation made pursuant to such call. Notice having been given in the manner hereinbefore provided, the Bond shall become due and payable on the redemption date so designated, and upon presentation thereof at said office, the District will pay the Bond. If any prepayments and redemptions are made pursuant to Section 7.0 of the Bond Ordinance, or the interest rate is adjusted as provided in Section 6.0 and Exhibit B of the Bond Ordinance, a revised Schedule I shall thereafter be prepared and attached to this Bond in accordance with Section 7.0 of the Bond Ordinance and it shall govern any future annual payment dates and amounts on the remaining Bonds.

It is certified that this Local Improvement Bond is authorized by and issued in conformity with the requirements of the Constitution and statutes of the State of Idaho.

It is further certified, recited and declared that all acts and things required to exist, to happen and to be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this Local Improvement Bond necessary to constitute the same legal, binding and valid obligations of the City on behalf of the District, in accordance with the tenor and terms of this Bond, have existed, have happened and have been performed in due time, form and manner; and that the aforesaid special assessments have been legally levied, and that this Bond does not exceed the amount of unpaid assessments as set forth in the Bond Ordinance.

This Bond is issued upon the above terms and conditions, to which each taker and owner hereof consents and agrees, and it shall be subject to the specific provisions stated herein.

ORDINANCE NO. 3044

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, AMENDING TWIN FALLS CITY CODE 10-7-14 BY PERMITTING PARKING LOT SALES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, THAT TWIN FALLS CITY CODE 10-7-14 IS AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

"10-7-14: Outside Storage and Display

No outside storage or display of merchandise is allowed beyond the front sidewalk adjacent to the primary business building or outside of screened areas except in the M2 zoning district and except for the display of vehicles, motor homes, travel trailers, recreational vehicles, pickup shells and large implements where offered for sale or rent and except for the seasonal display of living plants and materials such as Christmas trees, pumpkins, bedding plants, etc. All refuse areas shall also be visibly screened from adjacent streets and properties.

(A) Notwithstanding the above outside display restriction, a retail business may apply for a "parking lot sale" permit for the temporary outside display of retail merchandise. Parking lot sale permits are subject to the following conditions:

1. Up to eight (8) temporary parking lot sale permits shall be allowed on a lot or parcel in a calendar year, with not more than two (2) per quarter.
2. A parking lot sale permit shall be issued for not more than five (5) consecutive days. Parking lot sale permits issued in different calendar year quarters shall have a minimum of seven (7) days between permits.
3. Retail merchandise may only be temporarily displayed on private real property and only on the same lot, parcel or shared parking as the primary business building to which the parking lot sale permit has been issued.
4. Retail merchandise shall not be temporarily displayed within required landscape areas or in any other area that creates a site obstruction or other traffic obstruction or hazard.
5. Retail businesses that share a lot, parcel or parking with other businesses may apply for a parking lot sale permit if a parking lot sale site plan has been prepared by the applicant and the site plan has been approved by an authorized representative of each business sharing the same lot, parcel, or parking. Approval signatures shall be provided to the Planning Department with the permit application along with name and contact information for the authorized representatives who provided the approval.

(B) Parking lot sale permit applications shall be submitted to the Planning Department not less than two (2) weeks prior to the planned parking lot sale. The Administrator may approve parking lot sale permit requests that comply with the standards contained herein."
