TWIN FALLS • When students turn in a handwritten assignment at Xavier Charter School, they know it has to be in cursive.

In an era when some schools don't teach this style of handwriting anymore, it's still part of the curriculum at the Twin Falls public charter

"We actively teach it in third and fourth grade as a subject," said Xavier co-founder and lead teacher Becky Baird.


Xavier — which has students in kindergarten through 12th grades uses a European, classical model of education.

Baird said the school keeps cursive in the curriculum because "it is truly an art form" and a valuable discipline for students.

### IBM's Results Lift Dow Average to a 5-year High

**NEW YORK (AP)** • Strong earnings from tech giants nudged the stock market to a five-year high Wednesday. Investors drew encouragement from a vote by the House of Representatives to let the government keep paying all of its bills for another four months.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 67.12 points to close at 13,779.33. Other indexes made slight gains. The Standard & Poor's 500 index inched up 2.25 points to 1,494.81, while the tech-heavy Nasdaq composite rose 10.49 points to 3,153.67.

## Was Dowdle Bill Really a Scoundrel?

**ROCK CREEK •** William F. Dowdle has always been portrayed as a no-good, thievin' drunk.

Dowdle was caught trying to sell a stolen horse at Rock Creek Stage Stop in 1875 and was jailed for days underground in a cellar behind Stricker Store. Passersby mocked him, chanting "Dowdle Bill" outside his cell. He was convicted of theft and sentenced to several years in the territorial prison.

The whole time he was in prison, he plotted revenge against the men who captured him. Blood would run in the streets, Dowdle promised.

Or so the story goes.

Dowdle did return to the stage stop after his release from prison — supposedly to kill stage stop operator Charles Trotter and cowboy E.D. Wilson. But, when Dowdle got there, one of the men was sick in bed and

the other was out of town.

Disappointed, Dowdle spent the rest of the day drinking in the saloon.

After some time, Dowdle stepped out of the saloon and started shooting at people. He narrowly missed hitting Charlie Walgamott, Trotter's brother-in-law and clerk at the general store.

Walgamott returned fire, killing Dowdle.

Dowdle's body was paraded around town as people rejoiced and sang. Travelers waiting in a stagecoach were appalled at the barbaric nature displayed by Rock Creek locals.

This is what legends are made of, said Ted Dunaski, who is married to Dowdle's great-great niece Lori.

Dunaski has a hard time reconciling the story with what he knows about Dowdle.

Dowdle once risked his own life to save an Indian boy during a massacre, proving that Dowdle was not a "complete scoundrel," Dunaski said.

Dunaski says he is looking for clues to who Dowdle was and how he ended up at Rock Creek.

Dowdle was born in Alabama in 1938. His family converted to Mormonism, and was one of the first Mormon families to move west. Dowdle was a cook by trade and worked for a freight company.

Dowdle, or at least part of him, is buried at a small cemetery just west of Stricker Ranch, south of Hansen. A grave-robbing incident decades ago may have resulted in a separate interment for part of his remains.

## Slightly Warmer toward End of the Week

weak disturbance will bring moisture and slightly warmer temperatures to southern Idaho today and for the end of the week. This system will weaken the inversion that has kept us so cold but won't completely destroy it. We could also see some light snow and even a few locations getting a wintery mix of sleet or pockets of freezing drizzle for the first half of today. The precipi-





tation is not expected to amount to much. Most will see just a slight coating of snow if they see any at all. The main area of concern with this system will be in southern Twin Falls County and northern Nevada around Jackpot. If you have to travel south today

on 93, be aware of possible slick roads.

Temperatures won't be as cold as they have been. In fact, temperatures will be about 10 to 15 degrees warmer than they have been with highs today in the low 30s. Overnight temperatures will also be warmer. Instead of the teens and single digits in the morning, lows will be near 20.

A cold front will swing through Idaho this weekend, perhaps Saturday night and into Sunday. This will bring another round of snow and even a possible wintery mix. Temperatures will get colder again but not as cold as it has been the past two weeks.

## Crapo Part of Effort to Extend Anti-violence Bill

**WASHINGTON** • U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho, pushed this week to restore the key federal program that protects women against domestic violence, stating at a press conference Wednesday and on Twitter that "We will get this done."

With Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt. – chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee — Crapo is a co-sponsor of the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act, introduced Tuesday in the Senate.

The original act became law in 1994 and was extended in 2000 and 2005. But it expired in 2011 and, although both the House and Senate passed VAWA bills last year, the two chambers were unable to settle their differences. Congressional Democrats have now sought to dimin-



publican objections by removing a provision that would increase

visas for immigrant victims of domestic abuse.

The Senate bill was joined Wednesday by an identical measure in the U.S. House. In a press release following his comments that day, Crapo stated incidents of abuse in Idaho drive his support for the law.

"This month alone, there have been four deaths in Idaho as a result of domestic violence," Crapo said in the release. "These tragic events serve as a reminder that we are far from ending abuse, though we have made great progress and will continue to make great progress."

The main points of contention last year were provisions in the Senatepassed bill that increased protections for American Indians, gays and immigrants.

The new bills retain those protections but remove one provision that would increase what are called U visas available to immigrant victims.

House Republicans last year said that step was unconstitutional because the Senate imposed a fee to pay for the visa expansion and all revenue-raising measures must be initiated by the House.

Leahy said he still supported the visa increase but "we introduce the bill today without that provision in order to remove any excuse for House inaction."

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid said Tuesday that the bill in his chamber will be a legislative priority this year.

The 1994 act provides funding for legal assistance for victims, enforcement of protection orders, transitional housing aid and youth prevention programs. Supporters say the annual incidence of doviolence mestic has dropped more than 50 percent since VAWA became

Obstacles still remain to an agreement. In particular, Republicans have objected to a measure in the Senatepassed bill that would allow Native American courts to prosecute non-Indians accused of committing abuses on Indian land. The House bill that passed last May also omitted Senate references to gays, lesbians, bisexuals and transgenders.

The training is sponsored by the Massachusetts-based State Legislative Leaders Foundation and runs today through Saturday in Austin, hosted by Texas Speaker Joe Straus. The group also holds annual meetings for speak-

"Previous speakers have told me that it's very good training, will broaden my perspective and at least one of them said I needed that,"

said Bedke, R-Oakley, after announcing his absence to the House on Wednesday.

His predecessor, Rep. Lawerence Denney, R-Midvale, went to the orientation six years ago.

"Let's put it this way: The whole time he is at this training he will be outside his comfort zone," Denney said. "One of the things I remember is role playing. I was the union boss, which was totally out of my category. But it's fun and it's a learning experience."

The three days of training is paid for by the foundation, which is funded by Who's Who of Corporate America.

Among the sectors on the foundation's Advisorv Council are agriculture, communications, energy, entertainment, finance, insurance, media, retail, technology, telecom and transportation. Manufacturers of automobiles, beer, cigarettes, computers, drugs, liquor, software, textiles and wine, among others, help fund the group.

The group was founded in 1972, with a grant from the Ford Foundation.

House Education Committee that would ask the State Board of Education to adopt a rule requiring the teaching of cursive handwriting.

Right now, it's up to each school district to decide whether to teach cursive.

In south-central Idaho, many districts — including Twin Falls, Kimberly, Jerome and Wendell continue to teach it to students starting in third grade.

Cursive isn't included in the new national curriculum guidelines called "Common Core Standards," but students are expected to receive keyboarding instruction by the time they leave elementary school.

Idaho is among 45 states slated to adopt the more rigorous standards during the 2014 school year.

At Kimberly Elementary, Principal Craig Maki said it's a school philosophy that students still need to know

how to write in cursive and be able to read documents in that style of handwrit-

Teresa Jones, principal at Horizon Elementary in Jerome, said cursive is still taught. But there's much less emphasis on it than in past years.

That's because so many things have been added to the curriculum over the last few years, she said.

Wendell Elementary Principal Kevin Rogers said it's hard to fit in cursive lessons since teachers are focusing on core subject areas such as English and math.

"One of the difficulties we have is to find the time to continually practice a lot," he said.

That's something Buhl teachers don't have to worry about. Cursive isn't taught anymore at Buhl Elementary.

Superintendent Byron Stutzman said students learn handwriting skills, but instruction focuses on printing.

At Xavier, Baird said some students find it easier and faster to take notes in

class using cursive.

"Even when it's not required, some of them choose to," she said.

Baird said students are going to type papers as they advance to higher grade levels, but there's still a need for legible handwriting.

In the Twin Falls School District, elementary schoolers use cursive for some creative writing assignments.

By the time students get to high school, they use it occasionally for assignments turned in during the day, said Elementary Programs Director Ted Popplewell.

However, virtually all larger projects in high school are completed using a computer.

Popplewell described himself as an "old-school person" who likes cursive and understands its importance.

He recalls teaching cursive as a classroom teacher and is interested to see what will happen to the form of handwriting over the next 10 years.

## SISTER OF CONVICTED KILLER TELLS JUDGE ABOUT ABUSE

**BOISE** • The sister of a convicted killer who waived his right to appeal his death sentence says they both endured horrific childhood abuse at the hands of their mother.

Cheri Cox was in Boise's Court District Wednesday to testify in the competency hearing of Joseph Edward Duncan III, who was sentenced to death in 2008 after admitting he kidnapped and tortured two northern Idaho children before killing one of them in Montana.

Duncan gave up his appeals, but his attorneys fought on his behalf and last year the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals ordered U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge to hold a retrospective competency hearing to determine if Duncan was mentally competent back in 2008 when he gave up his right to appeal.

Cox testified about what it was like growing up with Duncan in their childhood home. Cox said she and her four siblings were frequently beaten by their mother while she ranted that men were worthless, and described her mother as a crazy woman who attended church obsessively, every day.

Prosecutors did not question testimony Wednesday that Duncan's mother was abusive, and The Associated Press could not immediately find contact information to reach her for comment.

Duncan, who was the second-youngest of the five children, was passive in the face of the beatings, Cox said.

"When she was beating on you, if you fought back, it was worse," Cox said. "In his case, he just took what she gave and kind of whimpered off into his bedroom."

Their father, who was in the military and often deployed, was frequently the subject of their mother's derision.

Cox said she left home at 17 and saw Duncan only once after that, several years later when he was a patient at a Washington state psychiatric hospital.

Years later, her sister called to see if she'd heard or seen from Duncan because no one had talked to

him in some time. Cox responded that she hadn't. She was boating just a week or so later when she heard Duncan's name

during a radio news story. "And then I heard my brother had been arrested for the," she said, pausing,

"thing in Idaho." Duncan's defense team also called Duncan's former attorney, John Adams, to the stand.

Adams represented Duncan during his state court trial for the murders of Brenda and Slade Groene and Mark McKenzie, crimes that Duncan ultimately pleaded guilty to as part of a plea deal that left him with six consecutive life sentences.

"He was a broken man," Adams said about his first impression of Duncan. "He was frightened and desperate and confused ... It was often hard to follow what he was talking about because he was talking about things that weren't relevant."

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## Idaho's Rare Earth Abundance Could Prove Advantage

IDAHO FALLS • When Emma Edwards Green designed Idaho's state seal in 1890, she gave emphasis to the mining industry by depicting a miner with a shovel and pick along the right side of her painting.

She later wrote, "... as mining was the chief industry, and the mining man the largest financial factor of the state at that time, I made the figure of the man the most prominent in the design."

Today, 123 years later, past is prologue as the world's hunger for rare earth minerals has again put the spotlight on the state's mining industry.

Many industry experts believe Lemhi County could hold the key to unlocking the answer to the world's rare earth minerals shortage. The minerals — sporting names such as neodymium, lanthanum and cerium — are used in everything from cellphones to military

## Rare Earth Deposits in Idaho

**Vein/lode rare earth element deposits •** Found as veins in the monazite in the rock. Mainly neodymium (used for magnets) and thorium (used like uranium).

**Placer rare earth element deposits** • Ore deposits formed in water (like gold). Mainly lanthanum (used for studio lighting/projector lights) and cerium (used in televisions).

**Phosphate deposits** • Trace elements found in the shale, but nearly impossible to remove.

weapons, as well as green energy technology.

It's likely that only California, Alaska and Wyoming top the Gem State in the amount of rare earth minerals within their borders, said Virginia Gillerman, an economic geologist for the Idaho Geological Survey.

Those resources continue to become more valuable as China, which produces more than 90 percent of the world's rare earth minerals, has warned it will curb its exports.

An Arkansas-based mining company, U.S. Rare

Earths, is searching for the buried treasure within the rock near the Idaho-Montana border.

U.S. Rare Earths did not respond to repeated requests for comment.

"We know from geology

that there are rare earths out there ... (but) no one has ever really started looking out there (before U.S. Rare Earths) because it costs a heck of a lot of money to get (rare earths out of the ground)," said Russ Bjorklund, Salmon-Challis National Forest minerals program manager.

## History in Idaho

The nation's hunt for uranium began in 1945 after the end of World War II.

That exploration turned up an interesting discovery in Lemhi Pass: thorium — considered a safer, more abundant alternative to uranium in nuclear fuel, Gillerman said.

At that time, the need for thorium was minimal and extraction was stopped. But prospectors didn't realize that spidered through the rock, alongside the thorium, were rare earth minerals that decades later would be some of the world's most coveted resources.

"Early studies by the U.S. Geological Survey concluded that this district had the largest thorium resource in the nation and also hosted an equal amount of rare earths," according to a January 2011 Idaho Geological Survey journal article.

Also discovered throughout Idaho were large deposits of neodymium, lanthanum and cerium — used in magnets, studio lighting and projector lights and televisions, respectively, Gillerman said.

But mining those minerals remains difficult and expensive, preventing it from happening any time soon.

"Like any mining project, a company has to prove there is enough in the ground to make it economically worthwhile to extract — and that they can extract it cost-efficiently," Gillerman said.

### Exploring Lemhi County

"A couple of years ago, prices (for rare earths) spiked up and everybody got excited, talking about shortages," Gillerman said. "(The necessity of mining in Idaho) depends on whether China sells them to us."

The minerals are accessible, but the price has to be right. All 15 rare earth elements are mixed together in the rock near the Idaho-Montana border. To separate them requires

an expensive chemical process.

"You need a high price for the elements to even justify (separating them)," Gillerman said.

Until that tipping point is reached, U.S. Rare Earths continues exploring the area. It submitted three plan-of-operations (proposals) to the Salmon-Challis National Forest, two of which have been approved.

The company has started drilling core samples, which are used to pinpoint the mineral veins, in one area, Bjorklund said.

Neither Gillerman nor Bjorklund knew if the company found what it was looking for.

The next step in the company's quest for rare earths is to apply to mine, Bjorklund said. But Gillerman said rare earth mineral mining in Lemhi County is a ways off.

"We're still far out from any actual production," she said. "We don't even have a good estimate of the volumes of minerals yet."

## GROUPS OFFER ENDORSEMENT OF MEDICAID EXPANSION

BOISE • Several Idaho health care organizations support optional Medicaid expansion in the state because they say it will save money, grow the economy and improve the health of state residents.

But many Canyon County lawmakers have expressed skepticism about offering Medicaid, the federal lowincome health care program, to more Idahoans. They're not sure the federal government will be able to make good on its promise to fund the expansion, which would begin in 2014. Gov. Butch Otter said he wants the state to study the option for another

year before taking action.

The Idaho Hospital Association says the expansion would save the state \$620 million over 10 years. An Idaho Hospital Association analysis also concludes the optional expansion would add 16,000 jobs and bring in \$615 million in sales, property and income tax over 10 years.

The IHA wants to work with other medical associations that support the plan so they can convince law-makers and residents that the optional expansion would be good for Idaho's residents and economy.

"For the majority of legislators, their gut reaction to Medicaid expansion is that that wouldn't be a good idea," IHA Vice President of Government Relations Toni Lawson said, "but we think if they look at the data they might reconsider.

"We'll certainly be looking for ways to move this forward this year instead of waiting."

Other groups that support the optional Medicaid expansion are:

- The Idaho Medical Association
- The Idaho Primary Care Association
- The Idaho Academy of Family Physicians
- The Boise Metro Chamber of Commerce

With the Affordable Care Act, commonly known as "Obamacare," states have the option of expanding Medicaid with federal dollars beyond the expansion required by the law.

With the required expansion, also set to start in

2014, 70,000 low-income Idaho residents would be added to Medicaid, according to the state Department of Health and Welfare. With the optional expan-

sion 80,000 more Idahoans would be eligible for the government health insurance program, for a total of 150,000 more residents on Medicaid.

## Symbol of Argentina's Decaying Navy Sinks in Port

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) Argentina's defense chief expressed shame Wednesday after a Navy destroyer sank at its moorings, putting on display the declining fortunes of a once-

The ARA Trinidad led Argentina's 1982 sea war against Britain, but has long been mothballed and used for spare parts to sustain what's left of Argentina's Navy.

A Navy statement said that a pipe burst, flooding the ship below decks. Defense Minister Arturo Puricelli denied that cuts to the fleet's maintenance budget were to blame. He said negligence or "sabotage" were possible and demanded a complete investigation.

"When the president asks me, I'll be ashamed, frankly, to tell her that a boat sank while tied to the dock," Puricelli told Radio 10. "There has to be a wellfounded reason for this."

Opposition congressmen blamed a decade of disinvestment in Argentina's military, and said the country is illequipped to defend its seas.

"That a boat sinks in port due to a lack of maintenance reveals the deterioration and abandonment of our fleet, vital to the defense of a sovereignty that our president never loses an opportunity to proclaim to the world, but which we are very far from being able to defend,"

Congressman Gustavo Ferrari said.

Ferrari presented a study last year concluding that Argentina's army, air force, coast guard and navy were all badly underfunded.

Several Navy ships have had trouble operating: the warship Espora was stuck in South Africa last year for lengthy repairs, and breakdowns kept the destroyer Argentina from completing a mission in Brazil. The icebreaker Almirante Irizar is still in repairs after a 2007 fire.

Puricelli acknowledged the delays, but said nearly \$100 million has been spent on repairs.

Meanwhile, Argentina's 3,100-mile coastline is being protected by a fleet that has been reduced to three destroyers, two other warships, several patrol boats, two scientific vessels, an icebreaker and the Libertad, the tall ship used to train cadets that was detained for months in Africa last year as collateral for unpaid debts.

## **Ache Indians** in Paraguay Hold Bow and **Arrow Festival**

KUETUVY, Paraguay (AP) • Enjoying a menu of tapir, armadillo and chicken's feet, a community of Ache Indians in Paraguay's jungle is celebrating the recovery of a small piece of their tribal land and honoring its archers - the best in the country.

"We are the champions at shooting the bow and arrow; this is what the representatives of other aboriginal peoples say," Ache teacher Sinforiano Chevugi told The Associated Press in Kuetuvy, a former plantation that about 45 Ache families occupied 12 years ago. In 2010, Paraguay's Congress gave them formal title to the land.

In 2011, for the country's bicentennial, Paraguay held a national bow-and-arrow shooting contest that was won by the Ache team, a source of pride among the tribe's members and a motive for the weekend celebration.

The Ache are hunter-gatherers whose population of roughly 1,200 is distributed in five villages in eastern Paraguay. Ache de Kuetuvy, the second-largest village, is located in virgin jungle in Canindeyu province.

The Ache's Asiatic features and light eye color have drawn the interest of U.S. and European anthropologists.

Villagers celebrated the anniversary of their arrival in Kuetuvy by slaughtering a cow as well as collecting fruit, hunting wild animals and by cooking up dishes of tapir, armadillo and chicken feet. For dessert, a sweet dish was made from the juice of palm tree trunks.

They also celebrated the recent success of their exports to the United States of shade-grown, organic yerba mate, a drink brewed from the leaves of the rainforest holly tree.

Emiliano Mbejyvagi, president of the national federation of Ache communities, said the money earned from the exports will be invested in improving Kuetuvy.

## **Clinton Takes on Lawmakers on** Benghazi Attack

WASHINGTON (AP) • Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton delivered fiery rejoinders Wednesday to Republican critics of the Obama administration's handling of the deadly attack on a U.S. mission in Benghazi, facing off with lawmakers who included potential 2016 presidential rivals.

At times emotional and frequently combative, Clinton rejected GOP suggestions in two congressional hearings that the administration tried to mislead the country about the Sept. 11 attack that killed Chris Stevens, the U.S. ambassador to Libya, and three other Americans. She insisted the State Department is moving swiftly and aggressively to strengthen security at diplomatic posts worldwide.

In her last formal testimony before Congress as America's top diplomat — but perhaps not her last time on the political stage - Clinton once again took responsibility for the department's missteps and failures leading up to the assault. But she also said that requests for more security at the diplomatic mission in Benghazi didn't reach her desk, and reminded lawmakers that they have a responsibility to fund security-related budget requests.

Three weeks after her release from a New York hospital admitted for complications after a concussion - Clinton was at times defiant, complimentary and willing to chastise lawmakers. She tangled with some who could be rivals in 2016 if she decides to seek the presidency again.

Her voice cracking at one point, Clinton said the attack and the aftermath were highly personal tragedies for the families of the victims who died — Stevens, Sean Smith, Tyrone Woods and Glen Doherty — as well as herself.

Clearly annoyed with Republican complaints about the initial explanation for the attack, she rose to the defense of U.N. Ambassador Susan Rice, who was vilified for widely debunked claims five days after the attack that protests precipitated the raid rather than terrorism.

Clinton said, "People were trying in real time to get to the best information." And she said her own focus was on looking ahead on how to improve security rather than revisiting the talking points and Rice's comments.

Sen. Ron Johnson, R-Wis., pressed her on why "we were misled that there were supposedly protests and something sprang out of that, an assault sprang out of that."

"With all due respect, the fact is we had four dead Americans," she said, her voice rising and quivering with anger as she and Johnson spoke over each other.

"Was it because of a protest? Or was it because of guys out for a walk one night decided they would go kill some Americans? What difference, at this point, does it make? It is our job to figure out what happened and do everything we can to prevent it from ever happening again, Senator."

If Johnson's comments drew an irritated response from Clinton, she notably ignored Sen. Rand Paul, R-Ky., when he said he would have fired her if he had been in charge and found that she had not read cables from her team in Libya

## Immigration Fallout from Saying No to 'Obamacare'

WASHINGTON (AP) • Governors who reject health insurance for the poor under the federal health care overhaul could wind up in a politically awkward position on immigration: A quirk in the law means some Û.S. citizens would be forced to go without coverage, while legal immigrants residing in the same state could still get it.

It's an unintended consequence of how last year's Supreme Court decision changed the Medicaid provisions of President Barack Obama's health care law. The overhaul expanded the federal-state program for low-income and disabled people. The Supreme Court made the Medicaid expansion optional for states, which complicated

Arizona officials called

attention to the problem last week, when Republican Gov. Jan Brewer opted to accept the Medicaid expansion. Brewer had been a leading opponent of the overhaul, and her decision got widespread attention. State budget documents cited the immigration glitch as one of her reasons.

"If Arizona does not expand, for poor Arizonans below (the federal poverty line), only legal immigrants, but not citizens, would be eligible for subsidies," the documents

That's because the immigrants would be eligible for government-subsidized private insurance, while low-income citizens would not. The Obama administration confirmed Arizona's interpreta-

## Pentagon Opens Combat Roles to Women

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • The Pentagon is lifting its ban on women serving in combat, opening hundreds of thousands of front-line positions and potentially elite commando jobs after generations of limits on their service, defense officials said Wednesday.

The changes, set to be announced Thursday by Defense Secretary Leon Panetta, will not happen overnight. The services must now develop plans for allowing women to seek the combat positions, a senior military official said. Some jobs may open as soon as this year, while assessments for others, such as special operations forces, including Navy SEALS and the Army's Delta Force, may take longer. The services also will have until January 2016 to make a case to that some positions

should remain closed to women. The groundbreaking move recommended by the Joint Chiefs of Staff overturns a 1994 rule prohibiting women from being assigned to smaller ground combat units.

Officials briefed The Associated Press on condition of anonymity so they could speak ahead of the official announcement.

There long has been opposition to putting women in combat, based on questions of whether they have the necessary strength and stamina for

certain jobs, or whether their presence might hurt unit cohesion.

But as news of Panetta's expected order got out, members of Congress, including the Senate Armed Services Committee chairman, Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., announced their support.

"It reflects the reality of 21st century military operations," Levin said.

Panetta's move comes in his final weeks as Pentagon chief and just days after President Barack Obama's inaugural speech in which he spoke passionately about equal rights for all. The new order expands the department's action of nearly a year ago to open about 14,500 combat positions to women, nearly all of them in the Army. Panetta's decision could open more than 230,000 jobs, many in Army and Marine infantry units, to women.

In addition to questions of strength and performance, there also have been suggestions that the American public would not tolerate large numbers of women being killed in war.

Under the 1994 Pentagon policy, women were prohibited from being assigned to ground combat units below the brigade level. A brigade is roughly 3,500 troops split into several battalions of about 800 soldiers each. Historically, brigades were based farther from the front lines and they often included top command and support

The necessities of combat in Iraq and Afghanistan, however, propelled women into jobs as medics, military police and intelligence officers that were sometimes attached - but not formally assigned – to battalions. So while a woman couldn't be assigned as an infantryman in a battalion going out on patrol, she could fly the helicopter supporting the unit, or move in to provide medical aid if troops were injured.

And these conflicts, where battlefield lines are blurred and insurgents can lurk around every corner, have made it almost impossible to keep women clear of combat.

Still, as recent surveys and experiences have shown, it will not be an easy transition. When the Marine Corps sought women to go through its tough infantry course last year, two volunteered and both failed to complete the course. And there may not be a wide clamoring from women for the more intense, dangerous and difficult jobs including some infantry and commando positions.

In the Navy, however, women have begun moving into the submarine force, with several officers already beginning to serve.

### Government Employees Lead Drop in U.S. Union Rate to Record Low

Labor unions lost ground among government workers in 2012 as Republican-led efforts curtailed collective bargaining rights in several U.S. cities and states, and total union membership fell to a record low.

Labor unions represented 35.9 percent of government employees, down from 37 percent in 2011, according to data released today by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. A record low 11.3 percent of all U.S. workers were union members, down from 11.8 percent in 2011, the govern-

"Public employment has become the heart of the American labor movement," Gary Chaison, a labor professor at Clark University in Worcester, Mass., said Wednesday in an interview. Still, "in two or three years, most cities in the U.S. with over a million population will be considering bankruptcy just to escape pension obligations. Every large city will be a Detroit, every smaller city will be Stockton, California."

Public workers are fighting political leaders in states such as Wisconsin, where Gov. Scott Walker, R, supported legislation in 2011 curbing the bargaining rights of some government unions. The law sparked protests at the state Capitol and a 2012 recall election, in which Walker turned back a challenge from Milwaukee Mayor Tom Barrett, D.

### Jordanians Vote for Newly **Empowered Parliament**

Jordanians voted Wednesday for a parliament with wider authority, as the king cedes some of his powers to try to prevent simmering dissent from boiling over into a full blown Arab Spring uprising.

The new legislature will choose the prime minister and run day-to-day affairs, powers that used to reside with King Abdullah II. Foreign policy and security matters remain in the hands of the king. Abdullah has introduced the reforms in a measured manner, trying to manage the pace of change.

Critics charge that the reforms are too mild and the election is not enough of a change. The main opposition group, the Muslim Brotherhood, boycotted the voting.

The 2011 Arab Spring uprisings in the region set off a wave of demonstrations in this usually placid U.S. ally. They have included unprecedented calls for the king to step down, raising alarms about the depth of the unrest. The protests in Jordan have not been on the scale of the uprisings that toppled leaders in Egypt, Libya, Yemen and Tunisia, or the bloody civil war in neighboring Syria.

Nearly 300,000 Syrian refugees have fled to Jordan, some suspected of links to the Syrian regime. Some in Jordan worry that they could be a destabilizing element.

# Sign Code as a Weapon

Amendment, stifling speech about its violation of the Fifth Amendment, as it was properly construed until 2005.

Founded in 1934, Central Radio maintains communication, sonar and camera equipment on vessels at Norfolk Naval Station. The business is located in a building designed for its needs near the waterfront. Company Vice President Kelly Dickinson says, "We can drive five minutes and be on board a ship." But Old Dominion University is nearby and covetous. It wants the land on which Central Radio sits, and through ODU's Real Estate Foundation is well along toward seizing it by inciting the city government to wield the power of eminent domain. Condemnation proceedings against Central Radio have moved to the compensation phase. Dickinson says the compensation will be insufficient to enable the business to construct a comparable building, let alone buy land for it. ODU, whose plans for the neighborhood remain interestingly vague and may include a shopping center, is exploiting the judicial evisceration of the Fifth Amendment's takings clause, the history of which is this:

The Constitution's authors, who did not scatter adjectives carelessly, said property may be taken for "public" uses, meaning things — roads, bridges, buildings, etc. — directly owned by government and used by the general public. In 1954, however, in a case arising from what was then complacently called "urban renewal," the Supreme Court expanded the category of "public use" to include the "public purpose" of curing "blight," a concept of enormous elasticity when wielded by rapacious city governments. In 2005, in the Kelo case from New London, Conn., the court radically attenuated the "public use" restriction on takings. The court held, 5-4, that a city government can seize an unblighted neighborhood for the supposed "public" purpose of turning it over to a private business that, being wealthier than the previous owners, would be a richer source of tax revenues for the taking government.

In this appalling decision, the majority serenely said governments could be restrained by public opinion aroused against abuses of eminent domain. Now, however, Norfolk's government is suppressing Central Radio's speech protesting what the city is doing.

In their desperation, the company's executives hung from their building, facing busy Hampton Boulevard, a 375square-foot banner proclaiming:

50 YEARS ON THIS STREET

78 YEARS IN NORFOLK

100 WORKERS

THREATENED BY EMINENT DOMAIN! In the banner's lower right-hand corner is a circle with a

red slash through the words "Eminent Domain Abuse." Today that circle is all that is visible. The city, acting on a

complaint by ODU's Real Estate Foundation - the entity  $trying \ to \ seize \ the \ company's \ property-says \ the \ size \ of \ the$ full sign violates Norfolk's sign code. Norfolk's behavior is unconstitutional because:

The city's sign code, which is of rabbinical complexity, has been capriciously enforced – some banners on city and private buildings violate the code's size restrictions. The code is more permissive regarding signs with particular content (e.g., government messages or religious symbols), which violates First Amendment jurisprudence prohibiting content discrimination. The sign code is suddenly being more evenhandedly enforced but only because, a city official has admitted, since Central Radio began protesting, "people are watching." Furthermore, any content-based speech restriction must pass judicial "strict scrutiny" by establishing that it is necessary to achieve a compelling governmental interest, but the government's only interest in restricting Central Radio's speech is to make it easier for the government to throw its weight around.

We have seen this before. A few years ago, a St. Louis man whose property was being seized under Kelo's permission for government theft adorned his building with a sign similar in size and message to that of Central Radio's. The city government tried to silence him with sign restrictions as flawed and capriciously enforced as Norfolk's are. An alderwoman explained with ruinous candor: "If this sign is allowed to remain, then anyone with property along any thoroughfare can paint signs ... to influence passersby and with no control by any city agency."

The St. Louis man trounced the city in his sign dispute, helped by the Institute for Justice, a little platoon of libertarian litigators who roam the country putting leashes on misbehaving governments. Because IJ is representing Central Radio's First Amendment rights, Norfolk may have to content itself with traducing only one rather than two provisions of the Bill of Rights.

### Trapping is Sanctioned **Animal Cruelty**

It's ironic that your Jan. 17 front-page teaser, "Rupert Trapper Beats Cabin Fever," was directly beneath a list of activities prohibited by Idaho's animal cruelty law.

Anyone who did to domestic animals what trappers do regularly to wild animals would be subject to prosecution. Numerous studies have shown that animals caught in leghold traps suffer serious injuries as they struggle to escape.

I'm glad that Jared Boley checks his traps within the legally required 72-hour maximum, but even three days is a long time to leave an animal terrified and struggling in a trap.

Your story states that Mr. Boley uses snares "designed to quickly strangle" the animals caught in them. They may be "designed" to kill quickly but, in fact, they do not. In a study done in Newfoundland in 1994, snowshoe hares caught in snares (of a size intended for them) took an average of 18 minutes to be strangled to death. It is reasonable to conclude that larger animals take even longer.

Mr. Boley's claim that trapping boosts populations of game birds is an often-repeated myth. About 20 years ago, the Department of Fish and Game tried to increase pheasant populations in southeastern Idaho by trapping all the predators it could in a large area there. The result was virtually no increase in pheasants. The department later concluded that it was a change in farming practices, not predators that had caused a decline in pheasant numbers. A former Fish and Game officer who was working in the field at that time told me that the department "can't show you any studies that show any benefit to wildlife from trapping."



## Women Catch up to Men on Lung Cancer Risk

U.S. women who smoke today have a much greater risk of dying from lung cancer than they did decades ago, partly because they are starting younger and smoking more that is, they are lighting up like men, new research shows. Women also have caught up with men in their risk of dying from smoking-related illnesses. Lung cancer risk leveled off in the 1980s for men but is still rising for women.

"It's a massive failure in prevention," said one study leader, Dr. Michael Thun of the American Cancer Society. And it's likely to repeat itself in places like China and Indonesia where smoking is growing, he said. About 1.3 billion people worldwide smoke.

The U.S. has more than 35 million smokers — about 20 percent of men and 18 percent of women. A study, led by Thun, tracked smoking-related deaths through three periods - 1959-65, 1982-88 and 2000-10 — using seven large population health surveys covering more than 2.2 million people.

Among the findings:

- The risk of dying of lung cancer was more than 25 times higher for female smokers in recent years than for women who never smoked. In the 1960s, it was only three times higher. One reason: After World War II, women started taking up the habit at a younger age and began smoking more.

A person who never smoked was about twice as likely as a current smoker to live to age 80. For women, the chances of surviving that long were 70 percent for those who never smoked and 38 percent for smokers. In men, the numbers were 61 percent and 26 percent.

-Smokers in the U.S. are three times more likely to die between ages 25 and 79 than nonsmokers are. About 60 percent of those deaths are attributable to smoking.

Women are far less likely to quit smoking than men are. Among people 65 to 69, the ratio of former to current smokers is 4-to-1 for men and 2-to-1 for women.

-Smoking shaves more than 10 years off the average life span, but quitting at any age buys time. Quitting by age 40 avoids nearly all the excess risk of death from smoking. Men and women who quit when they were 25 to 34 years old gained 10 years; stopping at ages 35 to 44 gained 9 years; at ages 45 to 54, six years; at ages 55 to 64, four

-The risk of dying from other lung diseases such as emphysema and chronic bronchitis is rising in men and women, and the rise in men is a surprise because their lung cancer risk leveled off in 1980s.

## After Shootings, States Rethink Mental Health Cuts

DES MOINES (AP) . Dozens of states have slashed spending on mental health care over the past four years, driven by the recession's toll on revenue and, in some cases, a new zeal to shrink government.

But that trend may be heading for a U-turn in 2013 after last year's shooting rampages by two mentally disturbed gunmen.

The reversal is especially jarring in statehouses dominated by conservative Republicans, who aggressively cut welfare programs but now find themselves caught in a crosscurrent of pressures involving gun control, public safety and health care for millions of disadvantaged

In many states, lawmakers have begun to recognize that their cuts "may have gone too deep;' said Shelley Chandler, executive director of the Iowa Alliance of Community Providers. "People start talking when there's a crisis."

About 30 states have reduced mental health spending since 2008, when revenues were in steep decline, according to the National Alliance on Mental Illness. In a third of those states, the cuts surpassed 10 percent.

As a result, nine staterun psychiatric hospitals were closed and another 3,200 beds for mental health patients were eliminated, dramatically reducing treatment options for the poor and people in the criminal-justice system. Thousands of patients were turned onto the streets.

Making matters worse, the cuts came as unemployment was rising, causing more people to lose private insurance and forcing them to shift to public assistance.

The steepest drop by percentage was in South Carolina, where spending fell by nearly 40 percent over four years an amount that Republican Gov. Nikki Haley has called "absolutely immoral."

Now Haley, who took office in 2011, has pledged to bolster a mental health system that dropped case workers, closed treatment centers and extended waiting lists. She also wants to expand remote access to psychiatrists through video conferencing.

Both Pennsylvania and Utah have put aside plans to scale back their mental health systems.

And Kansas, which cut mental health spending by 12 percent from 2008 to 2011, announced this month a new \$10 million program aimed at identifying mental health dangers.

"I don't think we're well set as a state at all to be able to deal with these intensive cases" of mental illness, acknowledged Kansas Gov. Sam Brownback, usually an avid proponent of downsizing social programs.

The sudden pause reflects anxiety from last year's shootings in a Colorado movie theater and a Connecticut elementary school. Although little is

known about the mental health of either gunman, the attacks have shaken state legislatures that until recently didn't intend to consider more social spending. In some cases, gun-rights advocates are seeking mental health reforms as an alternative to

more gun laws.

Jon Thompson, spokesman for the Republican Governors Association, said many budget-cutting governors are having second thoughts, including whether to reform mental health policies "to further invest in the safety of their citizens?





## GAY RIGHTS MEASURE TO RETURN

**BOISE** • An annual effort to include gay and transgender people in Idaho's laws that ban discrimination in employment, housing, education and public services will return to the Statehouse this session.

Add the Words, Idaho is an advocacy group for the new law. The group's cochair, Mistie Tolman of Meridian, said she is "testing the water" to see what new lawmakers will think about the legislation. Thirty of the House's 70 members are freshmen this year. Tolman said she doesn't know if an effort to introduce the legislation will come in the House or the Senate.

### If You Go Human Rights Discussion

Add the Words, Idaho and other groups will host an Idaho Human Rights Act Education Panel at noon Feb. 6 in the Idaho Statehouse Auditorium in Boise.

"It could be there's a little more willingness to stand up and vote their conscience," Tolman said about lawmakers this year. "We do have a lot of hope. It does seem a lot of the legislators think people shouldn't be fired for being

The proposed legislation has previously failed to get a hearing in the Senate State Affairs Committee. It adds the words "sexual orientation" and "gender identity" to the Idaho Human Rights Act.

Recently, Sandpoint and Boise adopted city laws that ban discrimination against lesbians, gays, bisexual and transgender people. But Add the Words advocates say 1 million state residents still don't have those protections.

Sen. Cherie Buckner-Webb, D-Boise, wants to sponsor an Add the Words bill this year. She said the legislation would be good for the economy because it opens doors for all workers.

"It makes good business sense to have a community that's welcome to the best and the brightest," Buckner-Webb said.

The Add the Words campaign this year will point to a survey commissioned by the American Civil Liberties Union of Idaho in December 2011. Conducted by Moore Information, it shows most Idahoans support bans on discrimination against gays and lesbians. According to the survey, 81 percent of Idaho voters "believe that it should be illegal to fire someone just because they are gay (or) transgender" and 76 percent say it should be illegal to deny housing for people just because they are LGBT.

## Proposal Would Limit Who Can Vote for **County Commissioners**

**BOISE** • You may see fewer names on the ballot the next time your county commissioners are up for election.

Sen. Branden Durst, D-Boise, introduced legislation to limit the election of county commissioners to the districts in which they reside. On Wednesday, the Senate State Affairs committee voted to print his bill, and will hold a public hearing on the proposal.

Currently, commissioners must live in different districts within the county, but voters within the county have a say on all three commissioners, regardless of where voters live.

Durst wants to change that so the only people who can vote for a district's commissioner are the people who live within that district.

The reason, he said, is to prevent small town residents' voices from being overshadowed by residents in urban communities. He cited the example of people who live in Hansen or Kimberly being out-shouted by people who live in Twin

This way, people can pick the commissioner who will represent their community, and not be beholden to any

other communities in the county, Durst said.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Leon Mills said he understood where Durst was coming from, but disagrees with the idea. Commissioners represent the whole county, Mills said, who lives in Twin Falls.

"Are we going to limit the prospective area that I'm the county commissioner of?" Mills said.

He also pointed out that each district within the county has an equal number of residents.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Terry Kramer lives in Castleford, and Commissioner George Urie lives in Hansen.

Jerome County Commis-Charlie Howell sioner agreed.

"I think the system the way it is is fine," he said.

Regional representation within a voting area isn't a new struggle to Idaho.

Last year, a proposal to regionalize community college trustees failed in the House Education Committee. And while Idaho counties must have a commissioner from each of three districts, cities have the option of creating districts for city council members. Twin Falls doesn't have that requirement.

## AAA: Ban Cellphones for Idaho's 18-under **Drivers**


BOISE (AP) • An automobile group says Idaho should consider banning cellphone use by drivers 18 and under, on grounds it will make the state's roads safer.

AAA of Idaho's Dave Carlson made the pitch Wednesday after his group surveyed Idaho residents.

Carlson argues that protections for teens are necessary because they are overrepresented in fatal and injury crash statistics.

## The 19 Best Armchair Adventures: Banff Film Festival Comes to Idaho

KETCHUM • A few years ago two Australian friends who had never kayaked on the open ocean did the unthinkable: They paddled 3,300 kilometers across the Tasman Sea in an unsupported 62-day journey filled with 10-meter waves, massive storms and shark-infested waters.

They turned their adventure into an award-winning film, "Crossing the Ditch," which went on tour with the 2010 Banff Film Festival.

Eager for another adventure, the two turned their sights to Antarctica where they attempted to be the first to ski unsupported to the South Pole and back.

"If we are going to succeed we should probably learn how to ski," Justin Jones told his friend.

Now Jones and James Castrission have turned that adventure into a new film titled "Crossing the Ice." It picked up multiple awards, including Banff's Grand Prize and People's Choice awards at the Banff Film Festival in November.

And local armchair adventurers will be able to see it on Feb. 1, when the Banff Mountain Film Festival World Tour 2013 comes to the nexStage Theater, 120 S. Main St. in Ketchum.

The film festival will serve up 19 films focusing on mountain culture, travel, human interest and a wide array of sports over two nights: Friday, Feb. 1, and Saturday, Feb. 2.

They range in length from minutes to an hour long.

"For me, the Banff Mountain Film Festival is the essence of why we enjoy living in Idaho so much - quality of life, great opportunities for a wide variety of outdoor sports, fresh water and clean air," said Michael Boge, who has hosted the festival in Ketchum, Coeur d'Alene and Sandpoint for the past dozen years.

Tickets are \$14, available in advance at Backwoods Mountain Sports, The Elephants Perch and Chapter One Bookstore. They're \$15 at the door.

Proceeds from tickets go to the Friends of the Sawtooth National Forest Avalanche Center and the Satipo Kids Project, which supplies 34 Peruvian children with the text-

## New Space Missions Promise Exciting Year Ahead

pace hardware has become so integral to our technological civilization that most space launches go practically unnoticed. (Indeed, not a month will pass in the year ahead without someone, somewhere sending something beyond the stratosphere.) But there are some especially notable missions to keep an eye on in 2013.

The International Space Station will receive five cargo deliveries (including a second visit from private



launch firm SpaceX's Dragon), undergo four crew changes and grow substantially with the addition of its largest module to date (a new lab) and a robotic arm.

China will begin to occupy its Tiangong 1 space station with the launch of three astronauts in June, including one woman.

Beyond low Earth orbit, the Lunar Atmosphere and **Dust Experiment (LADEE)** will, among other things, attempt to discover the cause of a faint glow witnessed above the moon's surface by the Apollo astronauts more than 40 vears ago.

China will attempt to land the Chang'e 3 rover on the moon at year's end, the first lunar surface mission since Russia's Luna 24 sample return lander in 1976.

The Mars Atmosphere

and Volatile Evolution orbiter (MAVEN) will begin its flight to the Red Planet in late November or early December, on a quest to discover why Mars has been losing its water and atmosphere for much of its existence.

Although unlikely to receive much fanfare, I'm eagerly anticipating the August launch of the European Space Agency's Global Astrometric Interferometer for Astrophysics (GAIA) probe. This mission, orbiting in Earth's shadow about

a million miles anti-sunward, will accurately triangulate the distances and motions of around a billion of the nearest stars in the Milky Way, producing the most accurate 3-D map of our galaxy to date.

now and then a thud as heavy snow fell off tree boughs.

Lentz skied effortlessly along Rogers Road despite the snowmobile tracks left in the snow that seemed to make my kick-andglide efforts bumpy. Now and then Lentz went over the edge of the road, cutting an "S" into the side of the hill.

There are four types of crosscountry skiing: classic or trail, telemark, backcountry and skate

Lentz, 69, a telemark skier, has been skiing for 20 years.

"I bought some skis and when I retired I started skiing more,"

"I scrounged up just enough snow for this," Vandermeulen said.

Holding the rope attached to the saddle, the skier cuts from side to side behind the running horse. At the Feb. 9-10 races, each skier will attempt to spear rings on his arm, too, and each missed jump or gate or ring adds to the team's finish time.

On Saturday, the gates and

jumps were challenge enough. While Vandermeulen has "logged about a thousand miles behind a snowmobile," he said, he had never skied behind a horse. Neither had Sun Valley skier Michael Porter.

Don't choke up on the rope; stay on the end for maximum tension and a strong pendulum effect, advised Bellevue skier Chase Gouley, a man with some skijoring credibility.

"But I can't give you all my tricks," Gouley added, laughing.

Casey Meggers of Hansen, who hauled three ranch horses to Bellevue, would pull Vandermeulen on the first run of the day.

"If he gets going too fast, I'll just straight-line it," Vandermeulen said.

But he turned out an amazing first-time performance of tight, neat turns, sucking up his knees at the crest of every jump to stay on the ground.

A skier in the air - or one whose skies aren't turned toward the next gate by the top of the jump — will drop the

rope. There's no negotiation

with a gallop. On his first run of the

practice course, Gouley lost the rope on the second jump.

"She's running good!" he said, rejoining the riders, skiers and dogs gathered around a flat-bed truck. "I was late and in the backseat."

After a couple of starts and stops behind Meggers' horse, Porter had some skijoring technique figured out. When you come around a corner, expect a little jerk, he reported. "But if you can get through that, everything's great. It's pretty smooth sailing."

Infectious fun for a calm, sunny afternoon.

"What are you thinking, Danny? You hooked?" Bellevue horsewoman Michelle Bobbitt asked.

"Yeah," Vandermeulen said, later adding: "It's a good honest sport."

Skijoring first-timer Brittney Snyder, a Sun Valley rider, sighed as she returned from a run. "I want to do this all day."

But on each race day, each horse may run the course only twice, Bobbitt said. Skiers, on the other hand, may enter multiple events and ski the course as many times as they want.

So in most years, there aren't horses to spare. A skier is wise to line up a teammate instead of signing up alone.

"I've been Facebooking a lot of friends in Washington and Montana, trying to get them to bring horses," Bobbitt said.

In past years, competitors have traveled from Montana, Colorado and Oregon. Organizers expect some Utah cowboys and skiers this year.

On Saturday, riders cooled off Meggers' horses after each run. But the quarterhorse ridden by Becky Warner of Twin Falls seemed to share Snyder's do-it-all-day enthusiasm.

"She's mad that I'm making her walk," Warner said.

Skijoring

sign-ups will be 6-10 p.m. Feb. 8 at McClain's Pizzeria in Hailey. Or, sign up at the race site before 11 a.m. on Feb. 9.

About the course: The horse and rider pull the skier through a straight track, 700 to 1,000 feet long, with a series of jumps, gates and ring stands.

"The jumps range from 3 to 5 feet. The gates are just like ski racing gates," Peterson said. "The ring stands are specifically designed stands with 6-inch rings hanging about four feet off the ground off the side track. The skier must spear the rings and have them all on his arm when he reaches the finish line.

"We are the first and only race that incorporates a rider ring," he added. "Stretching high over the track, the rider must also spear a ring while riding."

The fastest combined time of both days wins in each division. And this is fast. The

horses reach speeds of 30 or

40 mph, Bobbitt said. For spectators: Admission is \$5; children 10 and younger get in free. Food and beverages will be for sale. Dogs must be on

leashes at all times.

At 7 p.m. Feb. 9, a raffle, auction and dance will follow the racing. Organizers had not yet announced a location for the evening; check www.woodriveresja.com for updates.

**Entry fees:** Entry ranges from \$25 for juniors to \$150 for open division, Peterson

The prize money: Teams compete for \$5,000 in prize money, Bobbitt \$3,800 is split between winning teams in the open division and \$1,000 between winners in the sport division, and \$100 goes to the team with the fastest time each day. Also, the winning teams receive 80 percent of all entry fees, she said.

Prepare to compete: Horses used for roping – and ones accustomed to pulling a calf to branding shouldn't have trouble taking to skijoring.

But if your horse isn't used to a rope moving across its rump and hips,

practice pulling things say, a child on a sled - to introduce the feeling of a rope attached to the saddle and the noise of snow crunching behind the horse, advised Hansen horse owner Casev Meggers. Or, have someone walk behind the horse mov-

ing the rope back and forth. Also, Bobbitt runs her mare to get it in shape for skijoring.

Expect to be the skiing half of a skijoring team instead? Get pulled behind a snowmobile to get the hang of it, several skijoring veterans advised.

"There's no pulling skier Chase against it," Gouley said.







The NEC tournament from Yokohama, held this time last year, featured a Swiss tournament followed by a knockout for the eight surviving teams. The quarterfinal matches started with a defensive problem on the very first deal that might look easy — but at the table these things are never as simple as you might think.

In one room, where the auction had petered out in two notrump, declarer won the spade lead and cashed his other high spade to unblock the suit, before playing a club toward dummy — perhaps making the position easier to defend than was necessary. East made the critical play for the defense when he ducked this trick, won the next club, and cleared the diamonds by playing ace, king and a third round. When declarer won the diamond queen and played a heart, West climbed up with the heart ace and cashed out the diamonds for down one.

Ducking the club might look like an instinctive play, but it was not one that was found at many other tables. For example, when defending three no-trump after a spade lead and a club play at trick two, East in the other room fell from grace by winning the first club and returning a low diamond. Declarer won in dummy and unblocked spades, crossed to the club jack, and cashed out dummy's spades, then ran the clubs with the aid of the finesse and had nine tricks.

ANSWER: Did you feel compelled to bid by doubling or by bidding one diamond because you had enough points for an opening bid? That is understandable, but when fixed, stay fixed — for the time being. If the opponents come to a stop in spades, you can balance with a double; otherwise, stay silent, and don't make a bad situation worse. Overcalls should be five-card suits or much better four-carders than this.



## Seau's Family Sues NFL over Brain Injuries

Add Junior Seau's family to the thousands of people who are suing the NFL over the long-term damage caused by concussions.

Seau's ex-wife and four children sued the league Wednesday, saying the former linebacker's suicide was the result of brain disease caused by violent hits he sustained while playing football.

The wrongful death lawsuit, filed in California Superior Court in San Diego, blames the NFL for its "acts or omissions" that hid the dangers of repetitive blows to the head. It says Seau developed chronic traumatic encephalopathy (CTE) from those hits, and accuses the NFL of deliberately ignoring and concealing evidence of the risks associated with traumatic brain injuries.

Seau died at age 43 of a self-inflicted gunshot in May. He was diagnosed with CTE, based on posthumous tests, earlier this month.

An Associated Press review in November found that more than 3,800 players have sued the NFL over head injuries in at least 175 cases as the concussion issue has gained attention in recent years. The total number of plaintiffs is 6,000 when spouses, relatives and other representatives are included.

Scores of the concussion lawsuits have been brought together before U.S. District Judge

Anita B. Brody in Philadelphia. "Our attorneys will review

it and respond to the claims appropriately through the court," the NFL said in a statement Wednesday.

Helmet manufacturer Riddell Inc., also is a defendant, with the Seau family saying Riddell was "negligent in their design, testing, assembly, manufacture, marketing, and engineering of the helmets" used by NFL players. The suit says the helmets were unreasonably

dangerous and unsafe. Riddell issued a statement

saying it is, "confident in the integrity of our products and our ability to successfully defend our products against challenges."

Seau was one of the best linebackers during his 20 seasons in the NFL, retiring in 2009.

"We were saddened to learn that Junior, a loving father and teammate, suffered from CTE," the family said in a statement released to the AP. "While Junior always expected to have aches and pains from his playing days, none of us ever fathomed that he would suffer a debilitating brain disease that would cause him to leave us too soon.

"We know this lawsuit will not bring back Junior. But it will send a message that the NFL needs to care for its former players, acknowledge its decades of deception on the issue of head injuries and player safety, and make the game safer for future generations."

Plaintiffs are listed as Gina Seau, Junior's ex-wife; Junior's children Tyler, Sydney, Jake and Hunter, and Bette Hoffman, trustee of Seau's estate.

## NCAA Announces Problems with Miami Investigation

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) • After nearly two years, the NCAA has finally announced some of the wrongdoing discovered during the investigation of Miami's athletic compliance practices.

The alleged rule-breakers: former NCAA emplovees.

NCAA President Mark **Emmert** revealed Wednesday that the Miami investigation is on hold after the governing body for college sports in this country discovered "a very severe issue of improper conduct" specifically that the attorney for former booster and convicted Ponzi scheme architect Nevin Shapiro was used to "to improperly obtain information ... through a bankruptcy proceeding that did not involve the NCAA."

The NCAA does not have subpoena power. At least one of the people deposed by attorney Maria Elena Perez — who represented Shapiro – as part Donna Shalala said.

of his bankruptcy case appeared under subpoena, and his testimony would not have been otherwise available to NCAA investigators. The investigators who were involved are no longer with the NCAA, Emmert said. "How in the world can

you get this far without it being recognized that this was an inappropriate way to proceed?" Emmert That's the question that

the NCAA wants answered, and fast.

Miami has been bracing for the arrival of its notice of allegations - the charges it will have to defend itself against during the sanctioning phase of the NCAA probe.

Those allegations are now on hold until an outside review of the NCAA's procedures, specifically in this case, are completed.

"As we have done since the beginning, we will continue to work with the NCAA and now with their outside investigator hoping for a swift resolution of the investigation and our Miami President case,"

## Duke Routed by No. 25 Miami 90-

CORAL GABLES, Fla. • With a steady din coming from the sea of orange behind the visitors' basket, No. 1-ranked Duke had a tough time making a shot.

The Blue Devils went more than 8 minutes without a field goal in the first half Wednesday night, and a sellout became a blowout for No. 25 Miami, which delighted a boisterous crowd with a 90-63 victory.

The defeat was the thirdworst ever for a No. 1 team, and Duke's worst in nearly

five years. Durand Scott scored a season-high 25 points for the Hurricanes, and Kenny Kadji added a season-high 22. Shane Larkin had 18 points, 10 rebounds and five assists, and Durham, N.C. native Julian Gamble had 10 rebounds and four blocked shots.

Miami (14-3, 5-0 Atlantic Coast Conference) beat a No. 1 team for the first time, taking control with a stunning 25-1 run midway through the opening half. The Blue Devils missed 13 consecutive shots despite numerous good looks, while

four Hurricanes hit 3-pointers during the run that transformed a 14-13 deficit into a 38-15 lead.

Duke (16-2, 3-2) fell to 0-2 when playing on an opponent's court. The Blue Devils' other loss came at North Carolina State, a defeat cost them the No. 1 ranking.

They regained the top spot this week but seemed rattled by the capacity crowd, only the 10th in 10 years at Miami's on-campus arena. Students began lining up for seats outside the arena almost 24 hours before tipoff, a rarity for the attendancechallenged Hurricanes.

But South Florida loves a winner, and the Hurricanes are alone atop the league standings. They won their sixth consecutive game and beat Duke for the second straight time - but only the fourth time in the 19-game

Miami had been 0-6 against No. 1 teams. Coach Jim Larranaga also beat a No. 1 team for the first time.

Seth Curry, Tyler Thornton and Quinn Cook went a combined 1 for 29 for the Blue Devils, who shot a season-low 30 percent. Rasheed Sulaimon led them



## Super Bowl or Super Brrr? Big Game Coming to N

So with the Super Bowl coming to New York next year, and with local temperatures stuck in the teens, the WABC-TV meteorologist was all set to look ahead.

"Football fans like a little winter weather," she offered on a windy Wednesday.

OK, but exactly how win-

Try this long-range reckoning for the matchup at MetLife Stadium, from the soon-to-be printed Farmers' Almanac: "An intense storm, heavy rain, snow and strong winds. This could seriously impact Super Bowl XLVIII."

Predicts editor Pete Geiger: "This is going to be one for the ages."

"Hey, it goes with the territory," he said by phone from Lewiston, Maine.

Way too early to say for sure what awaits fans and players in the first outdoor Super Bowl at a cold-weather site. It'll be held Feb. 2, 2014, at the building shared by the Giants and Jets in East Rutherford, N.J.

The record low for a Super Bowl kickoff is 39 degrees when Dallas beat Miami in

January 1972 at Tulane Stadium in New Orleans. It will be a lot warmer back in the Big Easy when the Baltimore Ravens and San Francisco 49ers tangle in less than two weeks. They'll be inside the Superdome.

The NFL was aware next year's Super Bowl could be a super brrr.

"Creating a plan for staging a Super Bowl in winter weather is not reinventing the wheel," NFL senior vice president for events Frank Supovitz said two years ago. "Super Bowls have often been played in cities that can experience winter storms, including Detroit, Minneapolis ..."

"Coordinated snow and ice removal plans for travel routes, major event facilities, the stadium campus, and parking have always been part of our planning protocol," he said then.

Remember, no city is immune to rugged weather. Even though Green Bay and Pittsburgh played inside Cowboys Stadium two years, snow and ice blanketed the lead-up events.

Besides, a blizzard isn't likely. The National Weather Service said the average high in nearby Newark, N.J., on Feb. 2 is 39.8 degrees and the low is 24.2. The average precipitation on that date going back to 1931 is about oneeighth of an inch.

The only significant precipitation during a Super Bowl came in February 2007 at Miami. Playing in a rainstorm, Indianapolis and Chicago committed four turnovers in the first quarter.

Expect ticket sales to be brisk next year, StubHub spokesman Glenn Lehrman said. Ticket prices are running about \$3,100 for the Ravens-49ers game, and Lehrman predicted the 2014 Super Bowl would create the largest demand "we've ever had."

"I think people want to be part of a first-time experience. Whatever it is," he said.

Lehrman said because so many people live on the East Coast — within driving distance of the stadium, not needing pricey hotel rooms cold weather wouldn't have a chilling effect.

It certainly had an effect in New York on Wednesday. The radio hosts on WFAN began their noontime show talking about the weather; at De Witt Clinton Park in Manhattan, the artificial turf fields often occupied by pickup football games were empty.

But for a chance to see a Super Bowl, fans might sit for a few hours in a raw
