Feces-filled Home in T.F. **Prompts Child** Injury Charge

TWIN FALLS • After finding a home allegedly full of drug paraphernalia and animal feces, Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies decided a child was in imminent danger and charged a

woman with injury

to a child. According to a police report, on Jan. 15 Twin Falls County deputies, SWAT members and investigators along with other law enforcement agencies all re-



sponded to a home in the 1500 block of Maple Street to serve a search

Tina Louise Deane, 49, was charged with injury to a child. After a court appearance Feb. 4, Deane was released and a pretrial hearing was scheduled for March 19.

The police report describes a large residence where many people lived with four dogs and a cat.

"I observed animal feces throughout the entire house," a deputy wrote in the report.

Deputies also allegedly found drugs, drug residue and drug para-

phernalia throughout the house. Police found one room with a sign that stated the room belonged to Deane and no one else should enter.

"Inside the bedroom I observed garbage and clothing all over the floor and bed," the deputy wrote in the report. "The bed had so much stuff on it that it could not be slept

According to the report, plastic baggies in the room had a white residue in them that deputies recogmethamphetamine. as

Motion to Repeal **Insanity Ban** Denied

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls judge has denied a request to repeal Idaho's ban on insanity pleas.

Twin Falls County Chief Public Defender Marilyn Paul filed the motion on behalf of her client, Damon Azure, on Sept. 27, 2012. Azure is accused of murdering his brother in February 2012.

Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies were called to 3500 E. 4070 N. at about 11:20 a.m. Feb. 12, to check on a report of a possible vehicle-pedestrian accident. When


they arrived, they reportedly found Seanachan Azure lying in a pool of blood. Damon Azure was allegedly in a nearby car, where deputies reported finding a handgun and ammunition.

According to 5th District Judge Randy Stoker's Jan. 30 order denying the motion, prosecutors and Paul agreed to postpone a hearing on the motion until the U.S. Supreme Court made a decision on whether to grant a hearing on another Idaho case involving a murder.

In that case, Joseph Delling killed two people and attempted to murder a third, saying he was guided to kill by internal voices. He pleaded guilty to two counts of second-degree murder on the condition that he could appeal the matter to the Idaho Supreme Court. The five Idaho justices unanimously upheld the ban on the insanity defense, and in December 2012, the U.S. Supreme Court denied Delling's request for a further appeal.

COVERING THE COSTS OF FOSTER CARE

As lawmakers weigh additional financial help for foster parents, two Magic Valley families share their own experiences.

TWIN FALLS • When Mary Jo and Marvin Gartner decided to take in a foster child 15 years ago, they knew expenses would be tight.

The child would need clothes, shoes and plenty of other supplies. While they received a stipend from the state, some months became tighter than usual. Yet, the couple says the rewards of being foster care parents outweigh the challenges of staying in the system.

"People don't do foster care for the money," Mary Jo Gartner said. "The money covers the base costs?

State lawmakers are current -

ly discussing those costs, mulling a budget request to raise Idaho's foster care

reimbursements. In January, the Legislature's Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee listened to a proposal from the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare to grant \$500,000 in extra foster care reimbursement funds. The committee hasn't set a specific date this session to finalize its decision on that budget. The budget then will be considered

by the full House and Senate. Money shouldn't be the reason to take in a foster care child, but increasing reimbursements could help attract more families who have an interest, said Susan Baca, a resource parent training consultant for Magic Valley Youth and Adult Services.

"It can be a challenge," she

In Idaho, foster families are paid \$300 a month for children ages 0-5 years old, \$339 for ages 6-12, and \$453 for ages 13-18. The proposed budget would increase the reimbursements to \$329, \$366 and \$487, respectively.

Raising the monthly stipend would help cover the hidden costs of taking care of a foster child, said Breana Arnell of Oakley, a foster parent of two.

Multiple trips to counselors, doctors and, sometimes, probation officers can quickly add up, she said.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 7.22 points to 13,986.52 on Wednesday, after trading slightly lower for most of the day. The Standard & Poor's 500 rose 0.83 point to 1,512.12. The Nasdaq composite was three points lower at 3,168.48

Time Warner rose \$2.05, or 4.1 percent, to \$52.01 after the company said its net income grew 51 percent in the last three months of 2012 even as revenue was largely unchanged. Marathon Oil Corp. fell 32 cents, or 0.9 percent, to \$34.40 after its fourth-quarter net income fell 41 percent on higher exploration costs and

'Owyhee' Means Hawaii

Twin Falls County Historic Preservation

TWIN FALLS • Say "Hawaii" out loud. Now say it again, this time without pronouncing the "H."

The Hawaiian Islands were discovered by British Capt. James Cook in 1777. Cook named Hawaii "Sandwich Islands" after the Earl of Sandwich, but the name did not stick for long.

After Cook left Hawaii, he explored and mapped the northern Pacific coastline to the Bering Strait, looking for the famed "Northwest Passage" that would connect the Pacific and Atlantic oceans in the Arctic. Failing to find the Northwest Passage, Cook returned to Hawaii, where he was killed by natives in 1779.

From then until the Panama Canal was completed in 1914, Hawaii was a regular stop for trade ships that sailed around Cape Horn. In the years after Cook's death, many Hawaiians boarded ships as crew members or fur trap-

The fur trade with China was huge at the turn of the 19th century. John Jacob Astor — the richest man in America at the time — wanted to capitalize on the fur industry in the Pacific Northwest, but there were no ports along its coast. Astor thought that he could gain control over the fur trade by establishing a fort at the mouth of the Columbia River. In 1810, Astor hired Wilson Price Hunt to lead an expedition over uncharted territory west of St. Louis to Ft. Astoria.

In 1811, Hunt and his group were the first Euro-Americans to travel through what would become southern Idaho.

Astor's ownership of Ft. Astoria was short-lived. During the War of 1812, Astor sold the fort to the British-owned North West Co., and Ft. Astoria then became Ft. George.

Donald Mackenzie, one of the explorers in the Hunt party, returned to Idaho in 1818 with a group of fur trappers that included three natives from Hawaii – or Owyhee, which was the early, phonetic spelling of Hawaii. The three Hawaiians left Mackenzie's group during the winter of 1819-1820, and disappeared into the mountains, never to be seen again.

The fate of the men is not known, but most historians assume they were killed by Indians.

In honor of the men, the area where the men disappeared was became known as "Owyhee."

Snow Returns to the Magic Valley

hope you have enjoyed our little taste of spring we have had over the past few weeks. I know Meteorologist it felt nice and may have gotten many of you thinking, "Winter may actually be over." All I have to say to that is, "not so fast my friends." I would keep that snow shovel and snow blower handy as we head into Friday and the weekend as a winter storm is very possible.

Today will be the calm be-



fore the storm, as we wait for an upper-level storm system to arrive tonight into Friday. Clouds will be on the increase today, especially during the afternoon as the storm system approaches from the west and south. In the Magic Valley, the snow appears likely to fall after

midnight into the early morning hours of Friday. Snow showers will con-

tinue for most of the day Friday. The higher elevations across southern Twin Falls and Cassia counties could see almost a foot or more of snow, with Twin Falls to Burley getting 3 to 6 inches of snow. As you go north of the Snake River, places like Jerome, Shoshone, Rupert and Fairfield could see from 1 to 3 inches of snow. This storm has a more southerly track across Nevada and Utah. Historically these storms can bring several inches of snow across the southern Magic Valley. Be aware of all weather advisories and warnings.

Chickens Tabled at Burley Meeting

BURLEY • The Burley City Council tabled a decision Tuesday on whether to allow a limited number of rabbits and chickens in city limits.

The discussion was tabled to allow a company representative from Hy-Line North America to come to a meeting and speak with council members.

The council discussed adding a chicken-free quarter-mile or half-mile buffer zone around Hy-Line to prevent the spread of any diseases among the birds.

The council received a petition signed by 80 city residents saving they did not object to people having rabbits and chickens within city boundaries.

Heyburn resident Jim Bryant, who owns rental property in Burley, said the ordinance could make it more difficult to rent his property if neighbors start housing chickens.

Administrator Mark Mitton said he spoke with city officials from several cities with ordinances allowing the animals, including Oakley, Ammon and Moscow. Most questioned why Burley would even consider the ordinance.

"They said if they could get rid of them, they'd do it," Mitton said.

If the council moves forward with an ordinance, Mitton said, members should consider putting a registration process in place "because we will get complaints."

The council also discussed putting a clause into the ordinance requiring a person to remove his or her animals if there are two or more complaints.

No definitive terms were decided on by the council.

The city currently prohibits keeping horses, cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, rabbits, chicken or poultry, except baby chickens less than 4 weeks of age.

STUART FREEBORN, MAKEUP ARTIST BEHIND YODA, DIES

LONDON (AP) • Stuart Freeborn, a pioneering movie makeup artist behind creatures such as Yoda and Chewbacca in the 'Star Wars' films, has died. He was 98.

LucasFilm confirmed Wednesday that Freeborn had passed away, "leaving a legacy of unforgettable contributions." 'Star Wars' director George Lucas said in a statement that Freeborn was "already a makeup legend" when he started working on 'Star Wars'.

"He brought with him not only decades of experience, but boundless creative energy," Lucas said. "His artistry and craftsmanship will live on forever in the characters he created. His 'Star Wars' creatures may be reinterpreted in new forms by new generations, but at their heart, they continue to be what Stuart created for the original films."

Freeborn's granddaughter, Michelle Freeborn, said he died Tuesday in London from a combination of ailments due to his age. Michelle Freeborn, who lives in Wellington, New Zealand, said her grandfather was "like a hero" to her and inspired her and her late father to get into the movie business, too.

Freeborn's six-decade career led him to work on many classics, including Stanley Kubrick's '2001: A Space Odyssey! Born in London in 1914, Freeborn was the son of a Lloyds of London insurance broker. He told a BBC documentary last year that he resisted pressure to follow in his father's footsteps, because "I felt I was different."

He began his film career in the 1930s, working for Hungarian-born director Alexander Korda, and honing his makeup skills on stars including Marlene Dietrich and Vivien Leigh. After air force service during World War II, he worked on British cinema classics including 'The Life and Death of Colonel Blimp' and David Lean's 1948 version of 'Oliver Twist'.

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BRENNAN'S CIA BID **CHANCE TO STRIKE** BACK AT CRITICS

WASHINGTON (AP) • A Senate hearing on John Brennan's nomination to head the CIA could lay bare some parts of the secret war against al-Qaida: lethal drone strikes from covert bases against even American terror suspects, harsh interrogation methods and long detention of suspects without due process.

Some of the practices produced revulsion among some in Congress and the public, but the outcry has been muted because Brennan and others say that these harsh and secretive methods have saved American lives.

Those issues will be front and center in the Senate Intelligence Committee hearing Thursday for Brennan - a chance for him to answer criticism that he backed the detention and interrogation policy while he served at the CIA under President George W. Bush, charges that stymied his first attempt to head the intelligence agency in 2008.

In answers to questions from the Senate Intelligence Committee before the hearing, Brennan said he was "aware of the program but did not play a role in its creation, execution, or oversight," and added that he "had significant concerns and personal objections" to the interrogation techniques. He wrote that he voiced those objections to colleagues at the agency privately.

Brennan also described how individuals are targeted for drone strikes, saying whether a suspect is deemed an imminent threat — and therefore appropriate for targeting – is made "on a case-by-case basis through a coordinated interagency process" involving intelligence, military, diplomatic and other agencies.

He defended the missile strikes by Predator or Reaper drones as a more humane form of war. Aides have portrayed him as cautious in their use, restraining others at the CIA or military who would use them more often, even though as the White House's counterterror czar he has presided over an explosion of drone strikes in Pakistan, Yemen and Somalia. Less than 50 strikes took place during the Bush administration while more than 360 strikes have been launched under President Barack Obama, according to the website The Long War Journal, which tracks the casualties.

Administration officials say Brennan would further limit the use of drones by the CIA and leave the majority of strikes to the military. The CIA's drone strikes primarily focus on al-Qaida and Taliban targets in the tribal regions of Pakistan, while the military has launched strikes against al-Qaida targets in Yemen and Somalia. The CIA also carries out strikes in Yemen from a base in Saudi Arabia, including one that killed three American citizens: Anwar al-Awlaki, his 16-year-old-son and Samir Khan.

IRVING, Texas (AP) • Caught in an ideological crossfire, the Boy Scouts of America is retreating until May from a decision about whether to ease its policy of excluding gays. Whatever the organization eventually does, it's likely to anger major constituencies and worsen schisms within Scouting.

The delay, which the Scouts attributed to "the complexity of this issue," was announced Wednesday after closed-door deliberations by the BSA's national executive board. Under consideration was a proposal to ease the longstanding ban on gays by allowing sponsors of local troops to decide for themselves on the membership of gay Scouts and adult

Mexico Seeks Culprits in Rape of 6 Spaniards

Armed, masked men who raped six Spanish tourists in the Mexican resort of Acapulco spared the lone Mexican woman in the group because of her nationality, adding yet another macabre twist to the case that has further hurt the resort's already battered reputation.

It was unclear whether the group of 12 Spaniards who fell prey to the attack had been targeted because of their nationality in the three-hour ordeal at a rented house on a tranquil beach dotted with restaurants, small hotels and rental homes. Most of the six men and six women live in Mexico City and were vacationing in Acapulco. The five attackers burst into the house and held the group at gunpoint, said Acapulco Mayor Luis Walton. They tied up the six men with phone cords and bathing suit straps and then raped the six women.

Walton said the Spaniards had been "escorted," apparently under police protection, out of Acapulco on Tuesday. -AP

arguments against a constitutional amendment to require balanced budgets are various and, cumulatively, almost con-



clusive. Almost. The main arguments are: The Constitution should be amended rarely and reluctantly. Constitutionalizing fiscal policy is a dubious undertaking. Unless carefully crafted, such an amendment might instead be a constant driver of tax increases. A carefully crafted amendment that minimizes this risk could not pass

until Republicans have two-thirds majorities in both houses of Congress, which they have not had since 1871.

Furthermore, requiring a balanced budget would incite creative bookkeeping that would make a mockery of the amendment and the Constitution. For example, New York, which like 48 other states (all but Vermont) has some sort of requirement for a balanced budget, once balanced its by selling Attica Prison to itself: A state agency established to fund urban redevelopment borrowed \$200 million in the bond market, gave the money to the state, and took title to the prison. The state recorded as income the \$200 million its agency had borrowed, declared the budget balanced, then rented the prison from the agency for a sum adequate

to service the \$200 million debt. There is, however, one sufficient argument for a balanced-budget amendment. It is: George Mason University's James Buchanan.

This Nobel laureate economist, who died last month at 93, pioneered the "public choice" school of analysis, the premise of which is in the title of his 1979 essay "Politics Without Romance." Public choice theory applies economic analysis - essentially, the study of how incentives influence behavior - to politics.

Public choice analysis began in the 1960s, when Washington's social engineers were busy as beavers building a Great Society, and confidence in government reached an apogee that prudent people hope will never be matched. Public choice theory demystified politics by puncturing the grand illusion that nourishes government growth. It is the fiction that elected politicians and government administrators are more nobly motivated, unselfish and disinterested than are persons acting in the private sector.

Buchanan extended the idea of the profit motive to the behavior of politicians and bureaucrats, two groups seeking to maximize power the way many people in the private sector maximize monetary profits. Public-sector actors often do this by transactions with rent-seekers - private factions trying to maximize their welfare by getting government to give them benefits, such as appropriations, tax preferences and other subsidies.

Critics have dismissed as mere anti-government ideology the injection by public choice theory of realism into the analysis of collective action through politics. Such critics cling to a comforting - and, for advocates of ever-bigger government, a convenient — theory. It is that in politics and government, people, acting as voters or legislators or administrators, do not behave as people do in markets they supposedly are not responsive to incentives for personal aggrandizement. Actually, Buchanan's theory supplanted an ideology — the faith in government as omniscient and benevolent. It replaced it with realism about the sociology of government and the logic of collective action. The theory's explanatory and predictive power, Buchanan wrote, derives from its "presumption that persons do not readily become economic eunuchs as they shift from market to political participation."

Concerning the cold logic of power maximization, Buchanan was as unsentimental as Machiavelli, whose "The Prince," the primer on realism that announced political modernity, appeared exactly half a millennium ago, in 1513. Concerning the naturalness of self-interested behavior — its foundation in unchanging human nature Buchanan stood in a line of thinkers that includes James Madison, the foremost realist among the cohort of realists we call the Founders


Six days after Buchanan died, House Republicans provided dismal (and redundant) validation of public choice theory. Rep. Mick Mulvaney, R-S.C., supported by Majority Leader Eric Cantor and Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan, proposed offsetting just \$17 billion of the \$60 billion aid for victims of Superstorm Sandy, and doing so by cutting just 1.63 percent from discretionary government spending. Rep. Hal Rogers, R-Ky., chairman of the Appropriations Committee, said this would "slash and burn" important programs, and the measure failed because 71 Republicans opposed it.

The political class is incorrigible because it is composed of — let us say the worst — human beings. They respond to incentives of self-interest. Their acquisitiveness is not for money but for the currency of power, which they act to retain and enlarge. This class can be constrained, if at all, not by exhorting them to become disinterested but by binding them with a constitutional amendment.

While a privilege may be amended, modified or rescinded, a right cannot. Rights, however, must be guarded carefully. This is the purpose of the Bill of Rights (the first 10 Amendments to the Constitution): to make it easier to guard essential rights.



Report: Idaho Should Take Lead in Nuclear Research

BOISE • After statewide meetings and months of research, a committee tasked with studying Idaho's nuclear industry has finalized its report.

On Wednesday, the Leadership in Nuclear Energy Commission presented its findings and recommendations to House and Senate environment committees. The message: Idaho should take a leadership role in nuclear research and energy development.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter put together the commission last year to study Idaho's nuclear future and make recommendations on Idaho's path forward on nuclear research

Jeff Sayer, director of the Department of Idaho Commerce, introduced the commission's report, which includes the history of Idaho's nuclear industry, the commission's findings, and recommendations.

The biggest priority is protecting the environment, Sayer said. With that in mind, Idaho needs to realize that Idaho Falls isn't the only area affected by INL's activities.

"It's not just about eastern Idaho. It's about Magic Valley. It's about tribal lands," Sayer said. Those protections are non-negotiable, the report says.

The committee pointed to once-common waste disposal practices, such as injecting waste solids into the ground a disposal method that contaminated the aquifer.

Admiral John Grossenbacher, director of the Idaho National Lab, pointed out that practices

have changed, and that the problems caused by harmful practices are almost solved.

So how do we know what we're doing today is

"We have to trust, but verify," he said. That means further research and continuing study on the best practices for handling nuclear waste.

Here are the six general recommendations:

 Continue to work cooperatively with the U.S. Department of Energy and other impacted states to address remaining environmental risks and continue cleanup at the INL site.

• Exercise leadership as the U.S. government formulates federal energy and nuclear waste management policies.

• Capitalize on Idaho's nuclear technology competencies by supporting the growth of existing nuclear businesses, the corresponding infrastructure, and the attraction of new nuclear businesses.

• Invest in infrastructure to enable the INL and Idaho universities to successfully compete for U.S. and global research opportunities.

• Develop and promote the Center for Advanced Energy Studies as a regional, national and global resource for nuclear energy research.

 Strengthen and expand nuclear education and workforce training offerings.



"He's very strong, very mature, big kid," Petrino said in his national signing day press conference Wednesday afternoon in Moscow. "He just needs to work on his foot quickness and his technique. Maybe he hasn't played against as tough of competition as some of these other kids we signed, so it will be big for him to get in here and get learning this summer and get better."

Thompson plans to do just that.

"I'm excited to get up there this summer, work out, meet my teammates and start helping to build a winning season," Thompson said.

A 6-foot-5, 305-pound offensive tackle, helped Minico average 405 yards of offense and 33.9 points per game over the past two seasons. He was a two-time All-Idaho first team selection as the Spartans went 15-5 with two consecutive Great Basin Conference championships.

Petrino expressed the importance of recruiting within the state of Idaho.

"We've got to get the best kids in Idaho every year and I'm very excited about this class," Petrino said.

Minico High head coach Tim Perrigot believes Thompson is the first Minico player to ever sign a Football Bowl Subdivision scholarship offer directly out of high school.

"What I've enjoyed is watching him become a better person and a better football player," said Perrig-

Thompson is the first player from Idaho's District IV to receive a FBS scholarship directly out of high school since 1996, when Glenns Ferry's Ross Farris signed with Boise State for the Broncos' first year of what was then called Division I-A football.

"U of I is such a good fit for Brett," said Amber Thompson.

Bruins Clinch GBC Boys Title

BURLEY • Alec Meyerhoeffer came off a screen by Damon Jones and drilled a 3-pointer with 10 seconds remaining to lift Twin Falls to a 43-42 Great Basin Conference road win over Burley Wednesday.

The Bruins, ranked No. 5 in the state media poll, moved to 15-4 overall, capped a perfect 10-0 conference season and clinched the No. 1 seed for the Class 4A District IV tournament, which gets under way next

"We knew this was our biggest game up to this point of our season. We know we're going to have bigger games, too. We definitely want to play (the district tournament) at our

house," Meyerhoeffer said. Twin Falls struggled against Burley's zone defense most the night, shooting just 30 percent. But on their final offensive play, the Bruins came out of a timeout down two points looking for Meyerhoeffer.

"(Burley's) defender dropped off a ton and I thought I was open," said

Meyerhoeffer. "I hadn't really made a bunch of 3s this game, but I felt confident enough to shoot it. Anyone could have made that shot if they were that wide open."

Meyerhoeffer, who finished with 14 points and seven rebounds, didn't have a superb shooting night, finishing 5-for-13, but he started feeling it in the second half, especially when he buried a 30-footer during the third quarter.

"I don't even know where I'm at sometimes. I just see if I'm open and I shoot the ball," Meyerhoeffer said.

Both teams came up with clutch plays during a tense fourth quarter, but Burley wasn't able to answer the Bruins' final dagger.

After Meyerhoeffer's 3pointer, Burley immediately called timeout. According to coach Jack Bagley, the Bobcats executed their drawn-up play, with Scott Pilling dishing to Brandon Hosteen rolling off a screen in the lane. But Hosteen's shot at the buzzer fell off

the rim. "It's a tough call for an official to call a foul in that situation. ... We got the shot we were looking for," said Bagley.

The game was far different than the Bruins' 19point blowout last month.

"We definitely knew it wasn't going to be a blowout here because they have some loud fans here and they get energy from their fans," said Meyerhoef-

Braylan Bean, a junior who came off the bench during Burley's senior night, led the Bobcats in scoring with 14 points. Hosteen finished with eight points, six of which came on clutch drives to the hoop in the fourth quarter.

"Burley was more aggressive tonight," said Twin Falls coach Matt Harr. "That's the first team since Highland that has beat us up and down the floor. They beat us on their transition, especially in the fourth quarter."

Bagley said he was disappointed at losing the game and, more importantly, the No. 1 district tournament seed — but he was pleased with a better effort compared to the last meeting with Twin.

"We didn't back down to them. Last time I think we were intimidated by them on their court. This time we competed and didn't back down," Bagley said. "Hopefully this game will give us confidence to know we can play with these guys. If we achieved anything tonight, hopefully we achieved that."

Twin Falls finishes its regular season with a nonconference home game Friday against Highland. Burley (14-5, 7-2) finishes its season at Canyon Ridge on Friday.

NOTES: In a pregame ceremony, Burley senior Kody Coltrin received the annual Curtis Hall memorial scholarship. Hall is a 2000 graduate of Burley High who lost his life while serving his country in Iraq, and each year his family honors him through the scholarship.

Early on, the Bucks looked as though they might be able to break through in Salt Lake City after losing 10 straight, their last win coming in October 2001.


They led by 12 in the first quarter, with Ilyasova having the hot hand early.





TWIN FALLS • As the snow piles up, thousands of cross-country skiers dust off their skies, brew hot cocoa and pack up the car. Crisp winter landscapes, bright blue skies and inexpensive trail fees lure newcomers to slip on gaiters, click into skis, buckle up snowshoes and head off on a quest for fresh air and adventure.

The goal for many outdoor enthusiasts is to uncover an exciting and distinctive path to explore. In Idaho, an expansive winter wonderland, are many unique and awe-inspiring trails. In a single weekend, one can kick and glide across the moon, stride past towering rocks or telemark through the pines.

In the evenings, skiers might soak their bones in one of the region's hot pools; after all, Idaho is listed as the

state with the highest hot spring density and is home to 232 hot springs. Cross-country skiing and snowshoeing celebrate the tranquility of nature and the visual joy of a scenic landscape

- but also offer a full-body workout.

Depending on individual form, enthusiasts can burn between 400 and 700 calories an hour. Of course, caloric ex-

penditures vary widely. If you are new to either of these winter sports, cross-country skiing and snowshoeing have a quick learning curve and low rate of injury, and the motions are akin to the body's natural movements. With inexpensive (or free) groomed trails that are easily accessible, the opportunity for the entire family to get outdoors, partake in a bit of exercise and build winter memories is only a kick and glide away.



Situation Update: Status of the Sporting Arms Industry

nless you've spent the past few months living on the dark side of the moon, you're well aware of the national debate being waged about the Second Amendment.

This heated dialogue precipitated by the Sandy Hook shootings, the President's response with 21 hastily issued executives orders, and Sen. Dianne Feinstein's latest Assault Weapons/Magazine Restriction Ban — is not the subject of this week's column. Instead, I would like to address the immediate and long-term implications that these governmental interventions are having on the firearms industry and our 300 million gun-bearing American households.

The most immediate effect was to trigger a nationwide panic-driven buying spree. The counters and shelves of sporting goods stores, stocked to overflowing with an almost unimaginable assortment of firearms and accessories, factory ammunition and reloading components just several months ago, are now as bare as poor Ole Mother Hubbard's cupboard. This is a national phenomenon, not simply a local response. In my 59 years — through all the concerted attacks on firearms, ammunition and the Second Amendment that I've witnessed - I have never seen a universal response that even came close to this one.

In this assessment, I



first visited and chatted with a number of local sporting goods managers. Afterward, to develop a more representative sampling, I solicited as much information as I could from all the national whole salers, distributors and industry media folk who responded to my inquiries.

Here's the lowdown,

starting with factory loaded ammunition. Current factory production capacity for all the major calibers is now allocated. Projections call for a nationwide shortage of all major caliber ammo over the next nine months — .22LR through .50 BMG. All plants are producing as much ammo as possible at approximately 1 billion rounds weekly astonishing for a nation not engaged in a major war. It's important to understand that the industry procurement pecking order is to supply the military first, law enforcement second and the civilian market last.

With respect to reloading components, Remington, Winchester, CCI and Federal primers are all going to ammunition manufacturers first. There is currently no new production stock available for civilian reloading purposes. And industry officials said it could be six to nine months before

things get caught up.

Pistol magazines are largely unavailable or not currently available for backorder. MAGPUL - a primary manufacturer of quality synthetic AR magazines - is backordered by 1 million units and doesn't expect any large quantities to be available for civilian consumers anytime soon.

All of the major revolver, pistol and long gun manufacturers are either currently working at full capacity or making adjustments to increase production as quickly as possible. Here's a sampling of what some of the biggies are reporting:

Smith & Wesson: Running at full capacity turning out 300+ guns per day, primarily M&P pistols.

Ruger: Plans to increase from 75 percent to 100 percent in the next 90 days.

Colt: Production increasing weekly; bottlenecked by bolt carrier supply shortages.

LWRC: Making only AR's, running at full capacity, but can't get enough gun-quality steel to make barrels.

Springfield Armory (pistols, M1A's, M14's): Only company that can meet demand, but backordered 30-45 days.

These are heady times indeed. Stay informed and don't be shy about standing proud for your sport and your constitutional right to keep and bear arms.

Light Goose Season Opens Next Week

JEROME • While most hunting seasons are now closed, the spring "light goose" season is poised to open.

Beginning Saturday, Feb. 16, the hunt stretches across portions of southern and eastern Idaho. The season on Ross's and snow geese runs through March 10 in Areas 2 and 3. The bag limit is 10 per day and 20 in possession.

Area 2 includes Bingham County west of the west bank of the Snake River and the American Falls Reservoir bluff; and Power County north of Interstate 86 and west of the west bank of the Snake River and the American Falls Reservoir bluff.

Area 3 includes Ada, Boise, Canyon, Cassia, Elmore, Gem, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka, Owyhee, Payette, Twin Falls and Washington counties.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game reminded hunters that Fort Boise, including Gold Island, and Payette River wildlife management areas and the part of Roswell Marsh Wildlife Habitat Area south of state Highway 18, and the Snake River Islands Unit of the Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge, are closed during the spring light goose season from Feb. 16 through March 10.

In addition, the restrictions on hunting waterfowl with a shotgun capable of holding more than three shells, unless it is plugged with a one-piece filler, and on the use of electronic calls do not apply during this light goose season.

Only nontoxic shot approved by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service may be used while hunting waterfowl. For a list of approved shot go to: www.fws.gov/migratory-birds/CurrentBirdIssues/nontoxic.htm.

Minnesota Cancels Moose Hunting as Population Plummets

MINNEAPOLIS • Minnesota canceled its moose hunting season Wednesday, citing a precipitous decline in the moose population, as researchers try to get a handle on why the iconic symbol of the north woods appears to be faring worse here than elsewhere across its range.

The population has dropped 35 percent over the past year and 52 percent from 2010 to an estimated 2,760 moose left in northeastern Minnesota, according to the annual aerial survey conducted by the Department of Natural Resources in January. That's down from an estimated 4,230 moose last winter. Minnesota's moose numbers were estimated as high as 8,840 in 2006.

"So it's just a plummeting population here," DNR Commissioner Tom Landwehr told reporters.

While moose might not die out completely in Minnesota, the population could be too small well before 2020 to accurately estimate, said Steve Merchant, the DNR's wildlife populations and regulations manager. He

noted the big drop in just the past year.

"That's a steep slope, and it comes down to that very few animals left, very shortly," Merchant said.

Researchers are conducting studies to better understand why moose are dying out in Minnesota. Scientists suspect some combination of higher temperatures, parasites, diseases, contact with deer and changes in forests in northeastern Minnesota. A separate moose herd in northwestern Minnesota is now so tiny that the DNR no longer conducts surveys there.

DNR officials said it isn't clear why moose are struggling more in some places than others. New England has a much larger moose population and the range there may be expanding, although numbers may be declining in some northeastern states. The population appears to be holding its own or growing in parts of North Dakota. But some Rocky Mountain states are experiencing declines. While Canada's moose population remains large, it's been falling across the border in Ontario.

Idaho Power Discounts Camping Fee for Seniors, Disabled Veterans

TWIN FALLS • Idaho Power said Wednesday it has begun a three-year pilot program to provide discounted fees to service-disabled military veterans and to seniors at the company's parks.

Any service-related disability will qualify an individual to receive a 50 percent discount on overnight camping fees, the company said. People 60 and older will receive \$2 off per night in the peak season, April 1 through Oct. 31, at any of

Idaho Power's parks where overnight camping is allowed.

"We want to thank veterans, and this is an opportunity to do that. Similarly we feel a senior discount further encourages families to visit our parks and enjoy what Idaho has to offer," Fred Noland, senior biologist for Idaho Power, said in a company press release.

Day-use areas are free at all Idaho Power parks. The company charges overnight camping fees at its parks in Hells Canyon and at devel-

oped sites at C.J. Strike Reservoir.

To qualify for the discounts, visitors will need a driver's license or other official identification. Those taking advantage of the disabled veterans' discount will also need an Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation Veteran's document, Oregon Parks and Recreation Department Veteran's document, or a copy of their Veteran's Administration document stating such disability.

Visitors can indicate on

their fee envelopes that they are paying the discounted fee through the company's Veterans Program or Senior Program by checking a box. Fee collectors may request proof of identification when they do their campsite inspection rounds.

The 14-day stay limit still applies, and the first-comefirst-served policy remains in effect.

Fearing for the sheep's and visitors' safety, park managers moved Bam Bam to an enclosed state facility near Wheatland in 2009.

Sinks Canyon Superintendent Darrel Trembly says Bam Bam will be mounted by a taxidermist and put on display in the park's visitor center.

Calif. Officials to Research Coyote Hunting Laws

SACRAMENTO, Calif. • The state game commission on Wednesday declined to intervene in a controversial coyote hunting contest, although members did ask for a legal opinion on whether the board has authority to regulate contests in the future.

Hunters are set to fan across Modoc County on Saturday and Sunday to see who can kill the most coyotes in a contest sponsored by a gun club. The winner will get a silver belt buckle.

Animal welfare advocates argued before the Fish and Game Commission that the hunt is inhumane, and wanton slaughter is contrary to scientific wildlife management practices that show the predators play an important vermin-control role in the ecosystem.

"It's ethically indefensible and suggests wildlife has no value other than targets in an outdoor shooting gallery," said Camilla Fox, executive director of Project Coyote.

Fish and Wildlife Director Chuck Bonham said it's legal in California for hunters to kill wildlife that causes crop or livestock damage.

The board took no action because the hunt was not on the agenda. However, newly elected commission President Michael Sutton asked staff to clarify the board's authority to regulate the contests.

Fox said after the meeting that it's an open question whether coyotes to be targeted along the California border with Oregon have caused damage.

"It's a question the department should be looking at. How often is damage demonstrated?" Fox said.

A letter previously sent to the agency said 20 organizations want to protect a wolf known as OR7, which became the first in the state in nearly a century when it wandered across Oregon and into California a year ago. They fear other wolves could be in the area.

Opponents of the coyote hunt fear that participants won't be able to readily tell the difference between a coyote and a wolf.

OR7 is larger than a coyote, but because it mingles with coyotes, animal advocates wrote letters and collected petition signatures asking the state to call off the coyote hunt.

The gray wolf is a federally protected species in California, and wildlife authorities are in the process of determining whether state protections should be offered as well. Bonham said wildlife of-

ficials will be at the hunt to educate participants about the physical differences between a wolf and a coyote.

The ability to hunt pred-

ators is important to ranchers, said Margo Parks of the California Cattlemen's Association. She said coyotes are responsible for \$4 million in damages annually.

"OR7 is a poorly disguised excuse to further chip away at hunting rights," she said.

When West led the heart king against six spades, declarer took it and played the two top trumps, both defenders following. He then turned to the club suit. If East had held the last trump, the slam would have been made. East could ruff in whenever he chose, but he would have no heart to return. Declarer could then discard both his heart losers on dummy's clubs. But today it was West who ruffed the third club, and he cashed two hearts to put the slam two down.

Since you are booked to lose a trump trick, even if the spade suit breaks 3-2, the critical trump trick must be lost to East, who is known to be the safe hand. After winning the heart lead, you should play a trump toward your hand and win with the ace. You then return to dummy with a diamond to lead another trump. When the queen appears from East, you must duck. You can then win East's return, draw the last trump, and discard your two heart losers. This play is indicated because hearts are known to be 6-1. Had West not bid, the line found at the table would probably have been best.

Incidentally, you would make the same sort of play if your trumps were A-Q-7-6-3. After finessing the spade queen, you would return to dummy to lead a second round of trumps. Whenever the spade king appeared from East, you would duck it, keeping West off lead for the duration of the deal.
