## ACCUSED SHOOTER: THERE WAS ANOTHER GUNMAN

**TWIN FALLS •** A man accused of shooting his brother claims he did fire a gun, but so did an unknown man in a black sweatshirt who ran from the scene.

Juan Jimenez, 31, reportedly told police that he “closed his eyes and shot, two to three times,” after Jorge Alvarado pointed a gun at him outside his home.

Police say Jimenez shot and injured Alvarado on Saturday evening, Feb. 9, outside a Twin Falls home in the 100 block of Tyler Street.

Jimenez was arraigned Monday, Feb. 11, in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on a charge of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon enhancement.

A police report filed with the arraignment offers more details on what Jimenez, Alvarado and witnesses say occurred.

Police responded to the home at about 7:15 that evening for a call of shots fired.

They arrived to find a wounded Alvarado sitting on the tailgate of a Chevrolet Avalanche, according to the report. Police say there was blood on the truck and on the snow-covered ground nearby.

While still at the scene, “Mr. Alvarado pointed directly at Mr. Jimenez and said Mr. Jimenez was the person who shot him,” police recorded in the report.

From there, the brothers’ stories differ greatly.

According to the report, Jimenez told police that Alvarado showed up at his house with a “big gun,” which he said Alvarado pointed at him. He told police he shot at the ground to get Alvarado to go away before closing his eyes and firing, the report states. Jimenez said Alvarado then fell to the ground. Jimenez said he then went to call police, the report states, but an unknown man got out of an unknown car and fired three more times.

Later in the interview, Jimenez told police he believed other unknown people were there to kill him, the report states.

At different points, Jimenez told police that he threw the gun and that

# Senate Blocks Hurlock

**Hurlock says law should reflect unwritten requirements so others don’t go through what she did.**

**BOISE •** After a lengthy debate, the Senate voted 19 to 16 to reject the appointment of Joan Hurlock to the Idaho Fish and Game Commission.

Hurlock, who lives in Buhl, was the second female commissioner appointed to the Idaho Fish and Game Commission. Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter appointed Hurlock to the commission in June. Last

week, the Senate Resources and Environment Committee voted 5-4 not to recommend confirming Hurlock to the commission.

Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, sponsored that recommendation on the floor of the Senate, arguing she had no experience.

Former Fish and Game commissioner Sen. Jeff Siddoway, R-Terretton, wasn’t present at last week’s testimony, but said during floor debate he met Hurlock last summer and was unimpressed

with her experience.

“The passion for children is there. This is an intelligent woman. She is well informed. She’s a quick study. She has all of those elements that make her good on almost anything,” he said. But, he concluded, “her passion for hunting and fishing, I submit to you, is not there.”

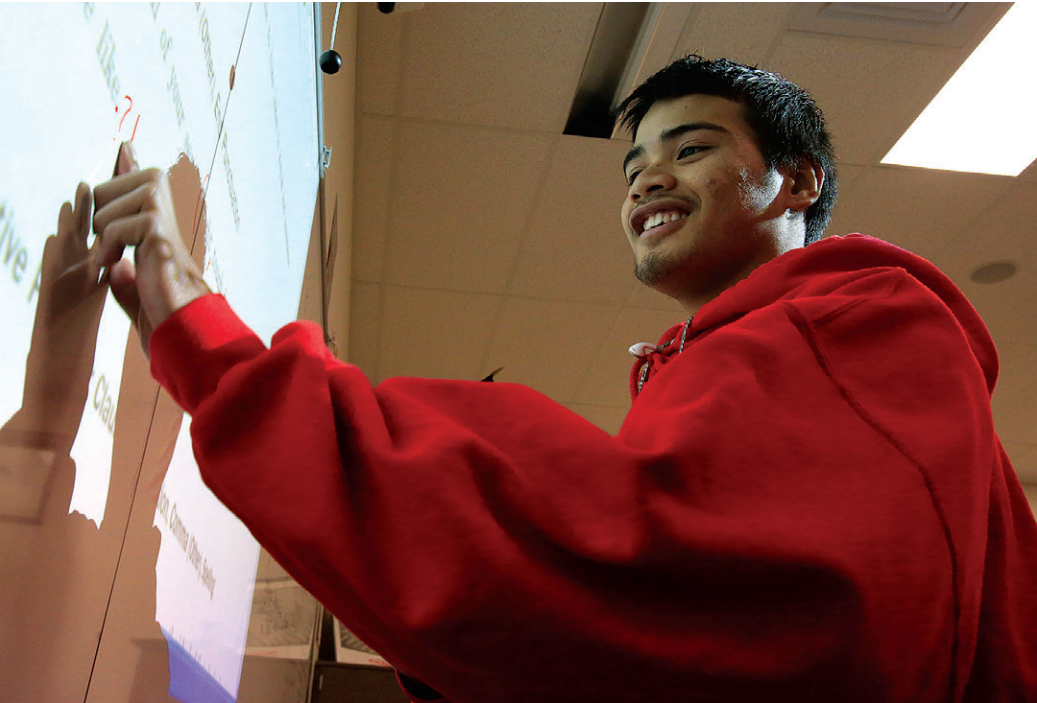
Sen. Jim Patrick, R-Twin Falls, said Hurlock lives in his district and is a “breath of fresh air” on the commission and pointed out that the eight-person selection committee unanimously

asked. A few hands shot up.

One student went up to the whiteboard, grabbed a whiteboard marker and started adding missing punctuation to a sentence.

Classmates pointed to the board and told him what else he needed to change.

As more students raised their

hands to volunteer to correct a sentence, English as a Second Language teacher Sara Toledo gave each a chance to come up to the whiteboard.

The class includes refugee students from about six different countries, Toledo said.

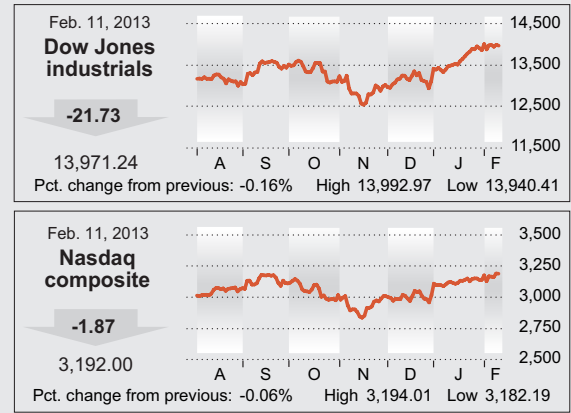
THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

Markets Trend Downward

**NEW YORK (AP)** • U.S. stocks drifted lower in thin trading Monday, pulling the Standard & Poor's 500 index back from a five-year high.

The broad-market index edged up slightly last week, enough to put it at its highest level since November 2007. With little in the way of market-moving news Monday, the S&P 500 slipped 0.92 of a point to close at 1,517.01. Seven of the 10 industry groups within the S&P 500 dropped.

Now, with major indexes near record highs, many think the stock market's six-week rally is ready for a pause.

**TWIN FALLS** • After four years at the *Times-News*, Publisher John Pfeifer will leave to pursue career opportunities in Chicago. His last day will be Feb. 20.

Pfeifer, 55, came to the *Times-News* in 2008 as advertising director and as general manager at the *Elko Daily Free Press* in Elko, Nev. In 2010, he was promoted to publisher of the *Times-News* and the *Elko Daily Free Press*.

Pfeifer accepted a job as vice president of sales development and training for the Community Publication Division of GateHouse Media Inc.

“Starting something new is always exciting; saying good-bye to friends always painful. I’ve enjoyed the time I’ve spent in Twin Falls and Elko and leave behind a phe-

nomenal team whose greatest accomplishments are still in the future,” Pfeifer said. “The opportunity to take on a new and great job closer to family and to return to the Chicago area as a base of operations is too good a combination to pass up.”

During his time in Twin Falls, Pfeifer served on the board of directors of the Crisis Center of Magic Valley, served as a member of the Twin Falls School District budget advisory committee, was a member of the Twin Falls Rotary Club, an active member of the Twin Falls Church of the Nazarene and a board member of Love INC Magic Valley.

Of Pfeifer’s community involvement, Twin Falls School District Superinten-

dent Wiley Dobbs said, “For the past two and a half years, Mr. Pfeifer volunteered to sit on the Twin Falls School District community Budget Advisory Committee. ... Mr. Pfeifer spent countless hours attending the 7 a.m. meetings, examining the budget of the TFSD and the state and formulating the plan to move forward with a supplemental levy. ... Once the Budget Advisory Committee made the decision to recommend moving forward with a levy, Mr. Pfeifer took the lead in presenting the information to the Board of Trustees and requesting they accept the committee’s recommendation in 2011 and again in 2013. Following the board approval of the recommendation, John also volunteered to help present information to various community organizations.”

As a result of his efforts in 2011, Region IV Superinten-

dents nominated Pfeifer for the Idaho Association of School Administrators (IASA) Leadership for Public Education Award. He received the award that summer.

“We are truly grateful and humbled by the support and leadership of Mr. Pfeifer,” Dobbs said. “His role has been critical to the success of public school education in Twin Falls. We will truly miss John and wish him well in his new professional endeavors.”

I would love to learn more about some of the historic buildings in Shoshone. There are two old wooden buildings across the street from each other — one is white and says “The Animal House” and one is yellow and looks like it might be a former hotel.

The white building was a Basque boarding house owned by Carlos Berriochoa,” said Shoshone City Clerk/Treasurer Mary Kay Bennett. “I have only known it as a boarding house.” She said Nicki Richards bought it and had a pet supply business at 115 N. Greenwood St. for a short time. It has been vacant ever since.

One of at least five boarding houses was a few blocks from the big train depot.

Pete Mendiola owned a

N. Greenwood St., east from the old boarding house, was a lodge where the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and the Rebekahs met.

“I am not sure what it was before that,” Bennett said. “I do know when we started our square dance organization we started taking lessons there, which was in the early 1980s.” She said Richards also owns that building.

According to “Shoshone and Her People” published by the Shoshone Chamber of Commerce, the Junction City Lodge No. 16 was brought to Shoshone on Aug. 6, 1886 by Charles W. Wernicke, Joseph F. White, Thomas McMahon, Charles Seavers, and I.B. Perrine. Opal Rebekah Lodge No. 74 was organized and instituted on July 29, 1922. Meet-

# Idaho Legislature: What's on the Docket

**BOISE** • Monday marked the 36th day of the 2013 Idaho Legislative session, which is the deadline for most committees to submit legislation for consideration. While certain privileged committees may introduce legislation after the deadline, the benchmark in the session prompted a flurry of bill introductions last week and Monday.

So what haven't we seen yet? Here's a short list.

- **A personal property tax proposal:** While the governor suggested a multi-year phase-out in his Janu-

ary State of the State address, lawmakers are still looking over the details of what a personal property tax repeal might look like, and how it will affect local government budgets. Last week, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter suggested that repeal might not come this session.

- **Local option tax:** Another part of the governor's proposal is looking into a local option tax to help offset the loss from personal property tax repeal and open up another revenue source for taxing districts. The suggestion surprised lawmakers, and has mixed support.
- **Reclaiming federal lands for the state:** A Janu-

ary presentation by Utah State Rep. Ken Ivory generated a lot of buzz. The topic: How his state challenged the federal government to turn over federally controlled lands to the state. It's not the first time the idea has come up in Idaho, but now there is serious talk of taking action.

- **Add the Words:** In early February, Democratic lawmakers announced plans to introduce legislation to add the phrase "sexual orientation and gender identity" to the Idaho Human Rights Act. Proponent Sen. Cherie Buckner-Webb, D-Boise, said sponsors aren't yet sure if they'll introduce the bill in the Senate or the House, but

whichever chamber they choose, it will likely show up in one of the two state affairs committees.

- **Pre-abortion ultrasound requirement:** Will they or won't they? Last year, Sen. Chuck Winder, R-Boise, introduced legislation that would require ultrasounds before abortions. After a heated fight in the Senate, the House quietly killed the bill, and Winder said he didn't plan on introducing it again. But there were plenty of other co-sponsors, many of whom are still in the Legislature.

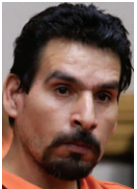
### Hearing Postponed for Buhl Infant Sex Abuse Case

**TWIN FALLS** • A preliminary hearing that requires prosecutors to prove they have enough evidence to take the case to trial was delayed for three weeks in the case of a Buhl man police say attempted to rape a 1-year-old baby.

Miguel Angel Medina-Mariscal appeared in court Monday, Feb. 11, and through a Spanish interpreter asked that the hearing be delayed.

According to a police report, a woman said she saw Medina-Mariscal watching pornography in the presence of the baby, then touch the baby with his genitals. He faces charges of lewd and lascivious conduct with a minor under 16 and disseminating material harmful to minors.

Until Thursday, Feb. 7, Medina-Mariscal was being held on a \$1 million bond for

a fugitive warrant case out of California. On Feb. 7, prosecutors dropped the case.

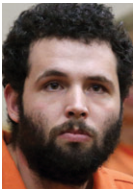
Medina-Mariscal remains in Twin Falls County Jail on the lewd conduct charges.

Highs will get back up into the upper 30s, and we expect to see more in the way of cloud cover as a weak disturbance prepares to move through later tonight.

On Wednesday, we will have clouds, some sunshine and temperatures warming up to the upper 30s and low 40s. We don't expect much, if any precipitation in the lower valleys, but some of the higher elevations could see some light snow showers. This disturbance could produce some snow, mostly



in the South Hills and Albion mountains, but amounts, if any, should be very light.

Friday and Saturday will be nicer with mostly sunny skies and temperatures near the mid-40s.

Another system looks to work through southern Idaho Sunday into President's Day. We don't expect much in the way of snow or precipitation.

Temperatures will turn cooler with highs falling back into the mid to upper 30s.

T.F. Women’s Clothing Store Makes Mission of Breast Cancer Awareness

**TWIN FALLS** • Business owner Liyah Babayan is kicking off an effort to inform every woman who walks into her store about breast cancer.

The owner of Ooh La La Fashion Boutique — a downtown Twin Falls store — began the initiative earlier this month and plans to continue throughout the year.

“Our goal is to create an atmosphere of open dialogue,” Babayan said.

Store employees are wearing buttons to bring attention to the “ASK ME” Project through the Comprehensive Cancer Alliance for Idaho.

“People will say, ‘Ask me about what?’” Babayan said.

She’ll also have brochures to hand out about the early detection of breast cancer, as well as information about the financial resources available to help women pay for breast and cervical cancer screenings.

If customers aren’t comfortable having a dialogue or don’t have time, she said there will still be a “silent dialogue” through statistics posted around the boutique.

Patti Moran, a member of the cancer alliance’s board of directors, said it’s the first year the “ASK ME” project has been implemented.

The group is initially working with health districts in south-central Idaho and northern Idaho.

Moran said the idea was adapted from a project that started in New York and was replicated in Washington.

“The idea is one-to-one communication to promote screening,” she said. She said volunteers don’t need to learn a lot of information — just where to point people to learn more.

“We try to keep it really simple,” she said.

VALENTINE’S DAY THE MAGIC VALLEY WAY

**From dog bows to massages, Valentine’s Day revs up the area’s businesses.**

**TWIN FALLS** • Lee Yocham, his baseball-style cap turned backward and earrings sprouting from his lobes, is standing in line at the Magic Valley Mall GameStop on a recent Saturday with his girlfriend, Kari Otto.

With just a slight bit of enticement, Yocham launches into a brief story about, well ... what else? Valentine’s Day.

It was about this time last year the then 18-year-old Twin Falls gaming addict was suffering the ultimate downer. His PlayStation 3 console had gone belly up and he was wondering how to replace it before his gaming skills eroded.

Otto came to his rescue.

“I was depressed and upset that my game system broke, so she went out and bought one for me for Valentine’s Day,” Yocham recalled.

For Otto, it was a no-brainer.

“You get to know your partner, so I bought it for him on Valentine’s Day because I knew he would like it,” the 19-year-old said.

Yocham returned the favor by buying Otto several video games. This Valentine’s Day, he aims to be even more romantic: He’ll take his sweetheart to the Magic Valley Mall video arcade, where he has developed a deft touch on the machines.

“She likes the arcade, because I’m really good with the claw machine,” Yocham said. “She wants me to take her and win some stuffed animals.”

It’s not your typical Valentine’s Day candy-and-flowers tale, but businesses across the Magic Val-

ley are offering less traditional ways for sweethearts to show their love — and consequently see a spike in their sales.

Take T-Mobile in the Magic Valley Mall, for instance. The business offers an annual Valentine’s Day two-for-one cell phone sale that really jazzes customers and staff.

Explained store manager Sheldon Lara: “We get pretty excited for it because it’s big for us, especially when it’s slow after the holidays. We go from selling two phones a day to selling 20 to 30 phones per day on Valentine’s Day and the day after.”

That’s about 40 percent of the store’s February sales goal, Lara said.

Though spa director Heidi Block at Planet Beach — A Contempo Spa in Twin Falls can’t quantify increased sales this precisely, she said area men flock to the Blue Lakes Boulevard business this time of year to buy spa memberships and gift certificates for their partners. Planet Beach offers 13 different automated skin care, relaxation and weight loss serv-

ices to pamper its customers.

“Women come into the spa for their regular visits, then go home and tell their husbands that that’s what they want,” Block said. “I see a ton of men looking for something for their wives around Valentine’s Day, and we end up selling a lot of one-month unlimited packages as a special.”

At the Dragonfly Salon & Spa in Burley, Valentine’s Day-related activity boosts owner Lorna Phillips’s February business by about 40 percent. The salon/spa offers tanning, massage, facials, hair styling and nail art.

“Holidays are always a great time of year for us, and Valentine’s Day is the biggest next to Christmas,” Phillips said. “Gift cards are a huge business for us, and clients can choose what services they want to use them for.”

Valentine’s Day also jumps starts post-Christmas business at Pier 1 Imports in Twin Falls. In fact, sales have been so strong that much of the store’s initial merchandise specifically for the day had been sold by Feb. 2.

Sales lead Rachel Johnson at-

tributed 15 to 20 percent of all February sales directly to the holiday and said it accounted for a 20 percent total sales increase for the month over January.

“We have people come in specifically for Valentine’s Day,” she said, noting that about 70 percent were women, 30 percent men. “Men will come in and say: ‘My wife saw this online and she wants it.’”

Magic Valley resident Margaret Brookman was in the store recently, but not just for Valentine’s Day — though the thought prompted her interest. She said she would be most interested in locating Valentine’s gifts for her sisters and her mother, who turns 100 in March.

“I’d want something really fun and maybe utilitarian, or not, for them,” she said, picking up a replica bird’s nest with colored eggs she said her mom would like. “That’s why I come in here to find fun and unique things that lift my spirits.”

Jerome resident Jim Blamires accompanied his wife to Pier 1 on a recent sunny Saturday and saw much he thought she’d like — table-top displays, homey flags, whimsical rabbits and frogs.

“She would just buy anything that had to do with Valentine’s Day,” he said. “They are just little things to have around the house.”

Speaking of rabbits and frogs, humans aren’t the only recipients of special treatment on Valentine’s Day.

Karen Wells, owner of Four Paws Salon in Jerome, has been styling dogs for Valentine’s Day for the past four years. Business picks up about 50 percent during the three weeks before the holiday, she said.

“People start coming in toward the end of January to get their dogs ready for Valentine’s Day,” said Wells, who figured she grooms close to 50 dogs over the

Babayan said she was thinking for a couple of years about doing something to help out. And she'd like to see other local businesses get involved.

Since Ooh La La Fashion Boutique caters to predominately women as customers, she said it would be "reckless and irresponsible" to not provide information and encouraging screenings.

Babayan — who is in her late 20s — said some young people assume that breast cancer is a kind of myth or something that happens to older people.

And among certain cultures, she said, the dialogue about breast cancer is uncomfortable and there's a fear surrounding the topic.

"Breast cancer carries a taboo unlike any other illness, disease and medical conversation," Babayan said.

Existing Efforts

Through its 900 Women Project, St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center is also working to improve breast cancer screening rates.

Patient safety officer Susan Morris — also the program director — said that back in 2004, Idaho ranked last in the country for the number of women getting regular mammograms. The statistic prompted conversation.

"It was fairly concerning to us," she said.

Under the 900 Women Project, the goal is to have a 10 percent increase in the number of area women screened each year for breast cancer.

That translates into about 900 more women.

The 900 Women Project provides financial assistance to women under age 50 who aren't covered by Medicare or other health care programs. There are four funds — all dependent on donations — through the St. Luke's Magic Valley Health Foundation.

Alice Elwood, major gifts and planned giving officer, said there has been enough funding to fulfill the requests they've received.

There have been more than 2,100 screenings through the 900 Women Project since it started.

Even though mammography rates have increased at St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center, Idaho still ranks last in the country.

ally get shoppers for Valentine's Day the last three days before the actual day," he said.

Down the road about 30 miles or so, a certain Magic Valley hot springs spa suffers no such Super Bowl competition in February. In fact, Valentine's Day works miracles at Miracle Hot Springs in Buhl. Office manager Amber Olsen estimated that sales of online gift cards increased

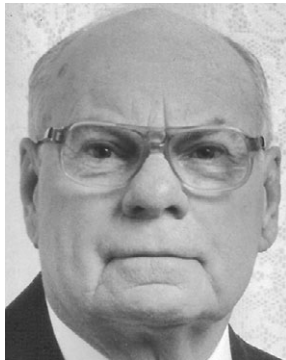

POPE BENEDICT XVI RESIGNS

Bombshell sends troubled church scrambling.

VATICAN CITY (AP) • With a few words in Latin, Pope Benedict XVI did Monday what no pope has done in more than half a millennium, announcing his resignation and sending the already troubled Catholic Church scrambling to replace the leader of its 1 billion followers by Easter.

Not even his closest associates had advance word of the news, a bombshell that he dropped during a routine morning meeting of Vatican cardinals. And with no clear favorites to succeed him, another

surprise likely awaits when the cardinals elect Benedict's successor next month.

"Without doubt this is a historic moment," said Cardinal Christoph Schoenborn, a protege and former theology student of Benedict's who is considered a papal contender. "Right now, 1.2 billion Catholics the world over are holding their breath."

The move allows for a fast-track conclave to elect a new pope, since the traditional nine days of mourning that would follow a pope's death doesn't have to be observed. It also gives Benedict great sway over the choice of his successor.

Though he will not himself vote, he has hand-picked the bulk of the College of Cardinals — the princes of the church who will elect his successor — to guarantee his conservative legacy and ensure an orthodox future for the church.

The resignation may mean that age will become less of a factor when electing a new pope, since candidates may no longer feel compelled to stay for life.

"For the century to come I think that none of Benedict's successors will feel morally obliged to remain until their death," said Paris Cardinal Andre Vingt-Trois.

Benedict had said as recently as

2010 that a pontiff should resign if he got too old or infirm to do the job, but it was a tremendous surprise when he said in Latin that his "strength of mind and body" had diminished and that he couldn't carry on. He said he would resign effective 8 p.m. local time on Feb. 28.

"All the cardinals remained shocked and were looking at each other," said Monsignor Oscar Sanchez of Mexico, who was in the room at the time of the announcement.

As a top aide, Benedict watched from up close as Pope John Paul II suffered publicly from the Parkin-

son's disease that enfeebled him in the final years of his papacy. Clearly Benedict wanted to avoid the same fate as his advancing age took its toll, though the Vatican insisted the announcement was not prompted by any specific malady.

The Vatican said Benedict would live in a congregation for cloistered nuns inside the Vatican, although he will be free to go in and out. Much of this is uncharted territory. The Vatican's chief spokesman, the Rev. Federico Lombardi, said he isn't even sure of Benedict's title — perhaps "pope emeritus."

Military Weighs Cutbacks in Drone Programs

LANGLEY AIR FORCE BASE, Va. (AP) • The Pentagon for the first time is considering scaling back the massive buildup of drones it has overseen in the past few years, both to save money and to adapt to changing security threats and an increased focus on Asia as the Afghanistan war winds down.

Air Force leaders are saying the military may already have enough unmanned aircraft systems to wage the wars of the future. And the Pentagon's shift to Asia will require a new mix of drones and other aircraft because countries in that region are better able to detect unmanned versions and shoot them down.

If the Pentagon does slow the huge building and deployment program, which was ordered several years ago by then-Defense Secretary Robert Gates, it won't affect the CIA drone strikes in Pak-

istan, Yemen and elsewhere against terror suspects. Those strikes were brought center stage last week during the confirmation hearing for White House counterterror chief John Brennan, President Barack Obama's pick to lead the CIA.

3 Dead in Courthouse Shooting

WILMINGTON, Del. (AP) • A gunman who spent years in court battles over custody disputes opened fire Monday in the lobby of a Delaware courthouse, leaving two women dead before being fatally shot, authorities said.

"He walked right up to the first victim and shot her point-blank right in the chest. He then turned around and shot a second woman who was approximately 10 feet away," said Bill Heriot, who says he was waiting to enter the New Castle County Courthouse on Monday morning. He said the heavy-set man, who

appeared to be in his 50s, pulled out a semiautomatic pistol and fired a single shot at each victim.

Heriot said the shooter then exchanged gunfire with police before falling to the floor.

Fugitive Ex-LA Cop Charged with Murder

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP) • A fugitive ex-Los Angeles police officer was charged Monday with murdering a Riverside officer in a potential death penalty case, but hundreds of tips triggered by a \$1 million reward failed to end the manhunt.

Christopher Dornier was also charged with the attempted murder of another Riverside officer and two Los Angeles Police Department officers, Riverside County District Attorney Paul Zellerbach said.

The LAPD officers and the Riverside officers were fired on in two separate shootings early Thursday after Dornier, 33, became the target of a

manhunt following the killing in Irvine of a former LAPD captain's daughter and her fiance the previous weekend.

"By both his words and conduct, he has made very clear to us that every law enforcement officer in Southern California is in danger of being shot and killed," Zellerbach said at a news conference guarded by four officers armed with rifles.

Authorities obtained a no-bail arrest warrant, which allows Dornier to be apprehended anywhere, Zellerbach said.

Meanwhile, U.S. border inspectors warned that the search for Dornier has created unusually heavy traffic backups at California border crossings into Mexico.

Baja California state police agents were given photographs of Dornier and warned to consider him armed and extremely dangerous.

Authorities said they were investigating more than 700 tips after offering a \$1 million reward for information leading to the arrest of Dornier.

Obama Poised to Skirt Congress to Seal Legacy

WASHINGTON • When President Obama delivers his State of the Union address tonight, the biggest question he'll face will be how to get an ambitious second-term agenda through a divided Congress.

The answer: Go around it.

On climate change, gun control, gay rights, and even immigration, the White House has signaled a willingness to circumvent lawmakers through the use of presidential power. Already, plans are being laid to unleash new executive orders, regulations, signing statements and memorandums designed to push Obama's programs forward and cement his legacy, according to administration aides and allies.

"The big things that we

need to get done, we can't wait on," said White House senior adviser Dan Pfeiffer. "If we can take action, we will take action."

The tactic carries political risk, beyond the backlash it will spark from congressional Republicans. Advisers say the president, who already faces charges from Republicans that he is concentrating too much power in the White House, remains cautious about getting too far ahead of public opinion. And executive orders can be overturned by a future president much easier than legislation can.

What's more, Obama will still need to work through Congress to deal with some of the nation's biggest concerns, including tax and spending issues as well as changes in the immigration system.

## Is There Any Solution to the Bloodshed in Syria?

Should the U.S. intervene to stop the bloodshed in Syria? I find myself torn between four different perspectives — from New Delhi, Baghdad, Tel Aviv and the U.N.



Last week, I met with a group of Indian strategists here at the Institute for Defense Studies and Analyses to talk about how America should withdraw from Afghanistan and navigate the interests of India, Pakistan and Iran. At one point, I tossed out an idea to which one of the Indian analysts responded: That was tried before — “in the 11th century.” It didn’t work out well. That’s why I like coming to Delhi to talk about the region. Indian officials tend to think in centuries, not months, and they look at the map of the Middle East without any of the British-drawn colonial borders. Instead, they only see old civilizations (Persia, Turkey, Egypt), old faiths (Shiites, Sunnis and Hindus) and old peoples (Pashtuns, Tajiks, Jews and Arabs) — all interacting within long-set patterns of behavior.

“If you want to understand this region, just take out a map from the Ganges to the Nile and remove the British lines,” remarked M. J. Akbar, the veteran Indian Muslim journalist and author. It takes you back to the true undercurrents of history that have long ruled the Middle East “and to interests defined by people and tribes and not just governments.”

When you look at the region this way, what do you see? First, you see that there is no way the U.S. can keep Afghanistan stable after we draw down — without working with Iran. Because of the age-old ties between Iranian Shiites and the Shiite Persian-speaking Afghans of Herat, Afghanistan’s third-largest city, Iran always was and always will be a player in Afghan politics. Shiite Iran has never liked the Sunni Taliban.

“Iran is the natural counter to Sunni extremism,” said Akbar. It’s in Iran’s interest to “diminish the Taliban.” That’s why America and Iran were tacit allies in unseating the Taliban, and they will be tacit allies in preventing the reseating of the Taliban.

So from India, the struggle in Syria looks like just another chapter in the long-running Sunni-Shiite civil war. Syria is a proxy war between Sunni-led Saudi Arabia and Qatar — two monarchies funding the Syrian “democrats,” who are largely Syrian Sunnis — and Shiite Iran and the Shiite-Alawite Syrian regime. It’s a war that never ends; it can only be suppressed.

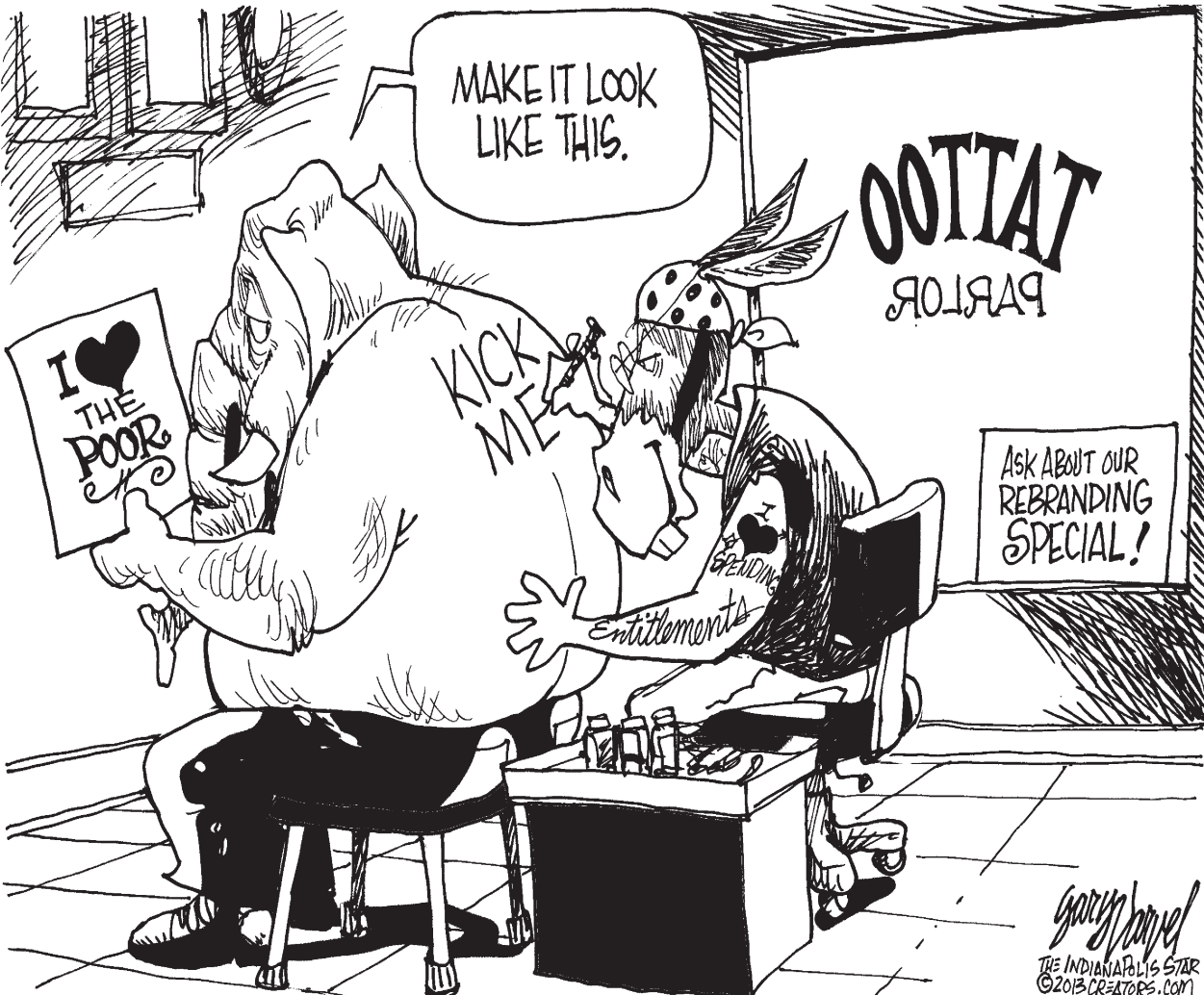
Which is why in Israel some Israeli generals are starting to realize that, if Syria is a fight to the death, it could pose as great a strategic threat to Israel as Iran’s nuclear program. If Syria disintegrates into another Afghanistan — on Israel’s border — it would be an untamed land, with jihadists, chemical weapons and surface-to-air missiles all freely floating about.

Can that collapse be avoided? From Washington, some hoped that by quickly toppling the regime of Bashar Assad in Damascus, the West and the Sunnis could “flip” Syria from the Iranian-Soviet orbit to the Sunni-Saudi-American orbit. I’m dubious. I doubt that Syria can be flipped in one piece; it will break apart in the air into Sunni and Alawite regions. And, if we did manage to flip Syria, Iran would try to “flip” predominantly Shiite Iraq and Bahrain into its camp.

Some Arab diplomats at the U.N. argue, though, that there is a middle way, but it would require the U.S. to lead: First, mobilize the Security Council to pass a resolution calling for the creation of a transitional government in Syria with “full powers” and with equal representation of Alawites and Sunni rebels. If the Russians could be persuaded to back such a resolution (not easy), it could break the stalemate inside Syria, because many regime loyalists would see the writing on the wall and abandon Assad. The stick would be to tell the Russians that, if they don’t back such a resolution, the U.S. would start sending weapons to the secular/moderate rebels.

Can there really be such a policy between George W. Bush’s “all-in” approach to transforming Iraq and Barack Obama’s “you-touch-it-you-own-it-so-don’t-even-touch-it” approach to Syria? One should study Iraq. The lesson of Iraq is that deep historical currents were at play there — Sunnis versus Shiites and Kurds versus Arabs. The December 2010 Iraqi elections demonstrated, though, that multisectarian parties and democratic rule were possible in Iraq — and actually the first choice of most Iraqis. But America would have had to keep some troops there for another decade to see that shift from sectarianism to multisectarianism become even remotely self-sustaining. Syria is Iraq’s twin. The only way you’ll get a multisectarian transition there is with a U.N. resolution backed by Russia and backed by a well-armed referee on the ground to cajole, hammer and induce the parties to live together.

It’s the Middle East, Jake. If you will the ends, you’d better will the means. You can’t change the politics “unless you say you’ll stay for a hundred years,” insists Akbar. But no one wants to play empire anymore. In which case, he argues, it’s always best not to stay long in any of these countries — five months, not five years. Five years, says Akbar, is just long enough for people to hate you but not fear or respect you, let alone change their long-held ways.

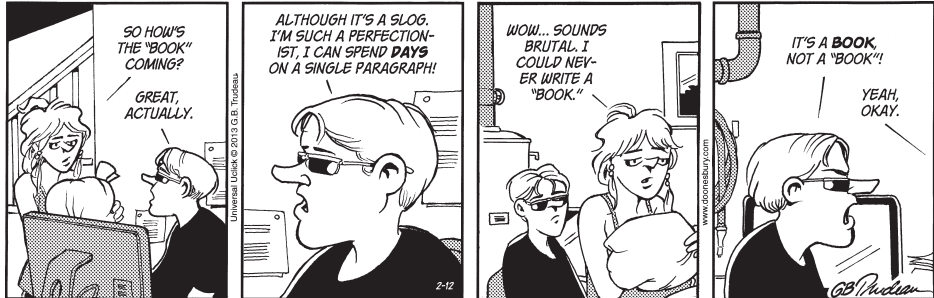

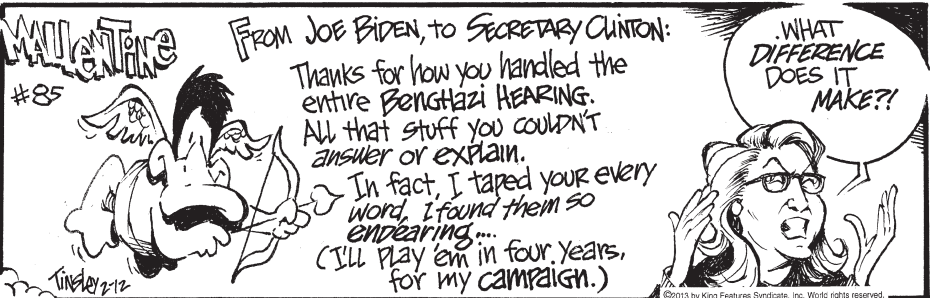

# Amish Concerned about Planned Railroad

**COLSTRIP, Mont. (AP)** • David Borntreger and his family moved from Missouri to a remote corner of south-eastern Montana in 1997 to escape the increasing pressures of the modern world. Borntreger, his brother, Levi, and their families are members of a small Amish settlement about 120 miles east of Billings. They raise cattle and sheep on their farm along the banks of the Tongue River. Their children attend school in two small school-

houses. The Amish don't use electricity, so they construct their buildings without the aid of power tools, and they work the land with horse-drawn implements. "We came west because it's not as thickly populated," David Borntreger said. "Besides having a liking to go to the West, we thought it would be a good opportunity here to have our children grow up on agriculture land. We were hoping we could have a lifestyle from agriculture."

Now that simple lifestyle is threatened by a proposed railroad owned by a coal giant and two of the world's wealthiest men. The proposed line would bisect their land and cause disruption to farm and ranching operations, the Borntregers said. The proposed Tongue River Railroad would open Montana's vast Otter Creek Coal Tracts to strip mining. According to the project's supporters, the railroad would haul an estimated 20 million tons of coal annually

from Arch Coal Inc.'s planned mine near the Northern Cheyenne Indian Reservation to Midwest power plants. Critics say domestic demand for coal is dwindling, and they fear the proposal is aimed at shipping Otter Creek coal to export terminals on the West Coast bound for Asian markets. Arch Coal owns the Otter Creek coal leases, one-third of the railroad and 38 percent of a proposed Longview, Ore., coal export terminal.

# Trial Begins for Mont. Quarterback

**MISSOULA, Mont. (AP)** • The rape trial of a former University of Montana quarterback is about a woman who was betrayed by someone she trusted and not about the school's football program, a prosecutor said Monday in his opening statement. The case against Jordan Johnson has drawn attention to the school's handling of sex assault cases. Johnson is accused of assaulting the woman as they watched a movie together at her home last year. Johnson has said the sex was consensual. Prosecutor Adam Duerk told the jury the woman tried to stop Johnson after they began kissing in her bedroom, but he forced himself on her. "This case is about a young woman who was horribly betrayed," Duerk said. The woman's housemate will testify that the woman appeared distraught after

she emerged from the room and then became hysterical after giving Johnson a ride home, the prosecutor said. Johnson's attorney, Kirstin Pabst, made reference in her opening statement to comments by former U.S. Rep. Pat Williams on the eve of the trial that the university's recruiting system let "thugs" into the program. "Jordan is the opposite of the ignorantly generalized football thug," Pabst said. Williams, a member of the Board of Regents that oversees the university system, has said he was not referring to Johnson. Another Johnson attorney, David Paoli, noted while questioning potential jurors that three people had indi-

cated on their questionnaires that they knew someone who was the subject of a false rape report.

# Unions Hold Immigration Rally in Vegas

**LAS VEGAS (AP)** • Immigration activists in Las Vegas are hoping to capitalize on the momentum President Barack Obama brought when he spoke on the topic here last month. Two unions teamed up Monday to hold a rally at the Cashman Center convention hall in North Las Vegas. Around noon, the Nevada State AFL-CIO brought those workers together with students, immigration advocates and labor leaders for an hour-long demonstration. One of the nation's largest unions, the AFL-CIO has scheduled rallies in 14 cities to encourage Congress to approve comprehensive reform.

# Speed Limit Changes through Carey

TIMES-NEWS

**CAREY** • Speed limit adjustments will be made on U.S. Highway 93 through Carey beginning Wednesday, Feb. 13, the Idaho Transportation Department announced. The new speed limits will become effective as signs are replaced.

The changes are:

- U.S. 93 through Carey: For traffic on U.S. 93 through Carey, there will be no changes to speed-limit zones in the south portion of town. The first change will be a reduction of the length in the 25-mph zone that begins at the Little Wood River Bridge and ends immediately south of the Little Wood Reservoir Road intersection.

tion. The speed limit then increases to 35 mph.

- U.S. 93, north end of Carey: Additional changes take place on the north end of Carey, beginning with the reduction of the 35-mph speed limit. The 55-mph speed zone will extend farther south to near the top of the hill north of the Bureau of Land Management Fire Station. The 65-mph zone also will extend closer to town, ending just north of the Lakeview Drive intersection.

The speed limit is changing as a result of an engineering traffic study conducted last fall. Study results and speed limit recommendations were discussed extensively with the Carey

mayor and city council before being approved for changes. Traffic studies determine the speed at which 85 percent of the vehicles already travel, and base adjustments were made accordingly to promote steady flow and increased safety.

An average of 1,400 to 2,300 vehicles per day travel through the city, with peak volumes occurring in the summer.

The speed limit change conforms to the 2012 state law that gives ITD jurisdiction over highway speed limits within city limits based on engineering speed studies. ITD already sets speed limits for rural sections of all state, U.S. and interstate routes.

he put the gun on a recliner in his home, according to the report.

Alvarado was taken to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center and treated for eight wounds. The nature of all eight wounds was unclear Monday evening.

During a police interview at the hospital, Alvarado said Jimenez called him and told him to come to Jimenez's house, the report states.

Alvarado said he got out of his vehicle, heard a bang and felt pain, but didn't realize what happened, according to the report. When he heard two more bangs he fell to the ground, the report states.

According to the report, police found a Ruger .380 handgun on the recliner in the house where Jimenez told them it would be. The handgun could hold six rounds but was empty, the report states; police said they also found six spent casings, all from a .380 handgun.

Alvarado also directed police to the location of another handgun, a 9mm Ruger in the center console of the Chevrolet.

In the report, police describe a neighbor, Rhett Levitt, telling police he heard six shots. According to the report, Levitt told police he saw two men and a vehicle outside but could not identify the men due to the darkness.

Levitt said he saw one person on the ground and one person standing. Then the person on the ground stood up as the other person walked into a house, Levitt said. The person who stood up then threw something toward the open door of the vehicle before sitting on the tailgate, Levitt said.

If convicted, Jimenez faces up to 30 years in prison. His bond has been set at \$150,000, and a preliminary hearing is scheduled for Feb. 22.

# Utah Lawmakers Reveal Pollution Bills

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** • The greater Salt Lake region has been choking under back to back episodes of severe pollution this winter, and lawmakers are introducing legislation to tackle the problem.

Democrats in the state Legislature previewed a package of bills Monday that focuses on expanding access to public transit and requires businesses and public agencies to find ways to reduce

pollution, among other proposals.

The legislation is still being crafted and the text of the proposals has not yet been made public, but lawmakers, all Salt Lake City-area Democrats, held a news conference Monday to introduce the ideas.

Republican lawmakers say they're planning their own air quality bills this session and are open to proposals that come before them from

the minority party.

Last week, state air quality regulators adopted more regulations to tackle the bad air, including emissions controls on hamburger grills and aerosol products, and protesters fed up with the smog delivered a petition with thousands of signatures to the governor asking for action.

The Utah Department of Environmental Quality has issued red air quality alerts

for northern Utah 22 days this year, and the public has been very vocal on the issue, Rep. Patrice Arent said at the Monday news conference.

Arent said the bills her party is offering will help reduce pollution, but the problem will still have to be tackled on many sides.

One of Arent's proposals would require all state agencies to come up with a plan to reduce polluting activities.

# Education Reform Bills Approved in the Senate

**BOISE (AP)** • The Senate Education Committee agreed Monday to introduce three revised bills aimed at giving Idaho school boards authority to reduce teacher salaries and more bargaining leverage during contract talks with the teachers union.

The three measures mirror versions introduced in the same committee last month. They were submitted again Monday to reflect changes brought about by six hours of negotiations between school board officials, the teachers union, lawmakers and other education stakeholders.

The bills, being pushed by the Idaho School Boards Association, would change the nature of negotiations

that occur each year on so-called master contracts — the broad agreements that cover salaries and benefits, as well as issues such as length of school year and teacher duties outside the classroom.

Karen Echeverria, ISBA executive director, said the version introduced Monday would allow for two-year extensions on master agreements dealing with non-salary issues. Salaries and benefits, she said, would be negotiated annually. Not everything in the revised bills has the support of the Idaho Education Association.

"We knew there were going to be issues we simply were not going to be able to agree upon," Echeverria said of the talks.

classes at Canyon Ridge High School in Twin Falls.

So how does co-teaching work? A teacher in a core subject area — such as English or math — is paired with an ESL teacher. They teach a class together to help students who are English language learners.

"The idea is that they're helping students meet academic standards and language standards as well," Principal Brady Dickinson said.

Last year, the Twin Falls School District received a three-year state grant to help ELL students.

The district receives \$100,000 per year. The bulk of that — \$75,000 — goes toward the co-teaching program.

Canyon Ridge tried out the teaching model last year, but more effort then was centered on training teachers.

This school year is the first that the program is in full swing.

It's Toledo's second year co-teaching. This year, she's teaching classes such as English, U.S. history and biology.

"It's going really well," she said.

Toledo said the system allows English language learners to get both the academic credits they need and language support.

The refugee students are excited about what they're learning and are more comfortable participating in class, she said.

Toledo said the goal is to eventually transition students into general education classes with their peers.

Canyon Ridge has seven co-taught classes: two for English, one for social studies, two for math and two for science.

The science classes are mixed, containing both

ELL students and native English speakers.

Dickinson said the ESL teacher makes sure concepts are explained in a way that all students understand.

The co-teaching model is working, he said, and has led to gains in student achievement.

ELL students who didn't pass the Idaho Standards Achievement Test in math last school year showed growth when they took it again in the fall.

A Canyon Ridge ESL teacher — who is now retired — heard about a co-teaching model during a conference. That led to a conversation about what it might look like at Canyon Ridge.

The school's demographics and achievement gap made it the "prime candidate for the grant," Dickinson said.

Once the co-teaching program kicked off last school year, he asked for teachers in core subject areas to volunteer for the program.

Dickinson said he was looking for teachers who would embrace the co-teaching model.

"You really need buy-in," he said.

Toledo said a challenge is the dynamic of having two teachers in the classroom and making sure students know there's equality.

Besides teaching a class together, co-teachers also have a shared planning time.

Patti O'Dell, associate superintendent for the Twin Falls School District, said one issue with co-teaching is that it's more expensive.

"Without the grant, we wouldn't be able to do it," she said, adding that it will require creativity to sustain the program.

Dickinson said he hopes there will be a way to keep co-teaching in place and expand the program to include more teachers in future years.

### CANYON RIDGE: PART III

# FROM THE GROUND UP

The Canyon Ridge varsity sports programs may be flagging, but the groundwork being laid at the middle school means good days are ahead, according to coaches and administrators.

This is part III of our program building series focusing on the factors Canyon Ridge and other new schools must deal with when building successful teams. Part III focuses on the importance of middle school programs.

TWIN FALLS • Canyon Ridge does things differently.

In the hope of one day making their athletic programs more competitive, they're doing more.

Of all the coaches and athletic directors interviewed across the region and state for this series, none emphasize middle school athletics as much, or in the same way as Canyon Ridge.

"Our program head coach is the head of the program, six through 12th grade," Principal Brady Dickinson. "He is in charge of the program from middle school up. Those coaches are truly assistants for him."

Robert Stuart Middle School is Canyon Ridge's feeder school. Unlike other multi-school towns across the state, there is no school of choice and coaches can work directly with the middle school without having to worry about the appearance of recruiting. While there is lack of competition to attract middle school student-athletes, there is the chance for greater continuity from middle school to high school at both Canyon Ridge and Twin Falls.

The Riverhawks are taking advantage.

"We understand that our programs are built from the middle school up," Activities Director Kim Wray said. "In the last couple of years we have put the pressure on the coaches, that this is part of your job. In order for us to be where we need to be, this has to be part of your job."

Canyon Ridge football and boys basketball programs each have an assistant coach whose primary duty is to work with the coaches and players of the basketball and football teams at the middle school.

Head basketball coach Jacoby Fox calls the position the director of operations. Wray calls it a middle school coordinator.

With many of the high school athletic programs struggling with a dearth of skilled players, the hope is that the Canyon Ridge assistants ensure that fundamentals are the focus, and

certain drills implemented to streamline the transition to high school.

"We are at a point where we are spending more time then you should typically have to spend on fundamental basketball at the high school level. So that was something, the first and foremost thing that needed to be addressed when I was hired so that the (student-athletes) could be more fundamentally sound, to create that foundation," Fox said. "My first year as head coach we got down into the middle school and started implementing things so that they would be known by the time they got here to us."

In his first year as head coach, Fox acted as the middle school assistant. He nearly burned out. So Fox copied the football team, which began using an assistant at the middle school the year prior, hiring Lyle Hudelson, also the head softball coach, as Canyon Ridge's Director of Basketball Operations.

Fox said that the Roger Stuart basketball teams, like those at Vera C. O'Leary Middle School on the east side of Twin Falls, are split into two groups at each grade. Each is making progress, but not as much as he'd like — not yet, at least.

"They are getting better," Fox said. "Coaches work an hour of fundamentals a day. The kids are actually coming around and can do the things we ask them to do in ninth grade. But our talent is not as cohesive (because of the split teams)."

All the other programs at Canyon Ridge work with the middle school, sharing drills and concepts, but football is the only other sport with a middle school coordinator. The relationship is in its third year.

It could pay dividends at the high school level soon, as last year's Roger Stuart's eighth grade team finished 6-2 and its seventh graders 5-4.

"We have a really good group of kids coming up," head football coach Justin Alsterlund said. "We also expect our number to go up at the freshman level. We could get 40 to 50 kids this year, which is pretty good compared to other schools that are struggling to get kids out and field teams."

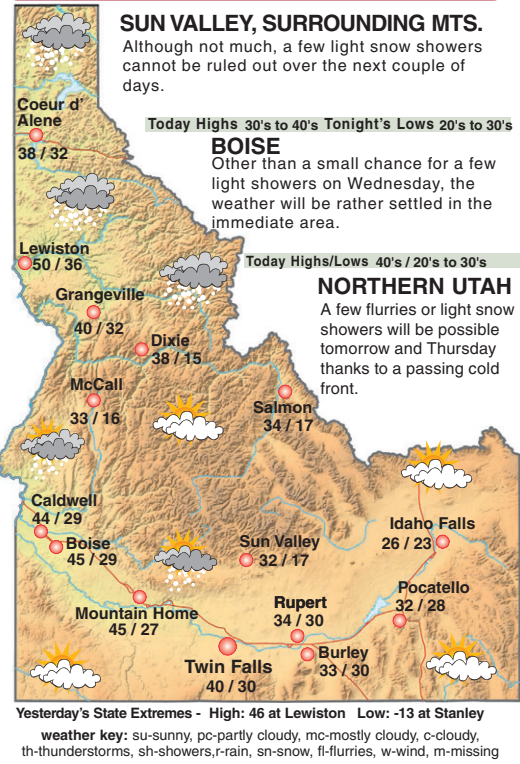

Column: 'I Had an Idea I Wasn't Going to Make It'

Detroit manager Jim Leyland arrived at the Tigers' training camp Monday in Lakeland, Fla., exactly 50 years after he first showed up there as a pencil-thin 18-year-old prospect.

If you were expecting sepia-tinted memories about a kid from Ohio basking in the sunshine and seeing his dream laid out in front of him, well, you don't know Leyland. Or at least not well enough.

"Remember going over to watch the big-league guys as soon as I got there and saw the caliber of play. And shortly after that, I had a good idea I wasn't going to make it — not as a ballplayer, anyway," he recalled during a telephone interview.

He was right. Leyland's first paycheck was for \$125, "and that was for two weeks," he chuckled. He went on to become, in his own words, "a Double-A backup, flunky catcher" who never hit better than .243.

"Hung around for seven years in the minors and they (the Tigers organization) decided the rest for me. First, they made me a player-coach and then one of the fellas who was supposed to manage the rookie league team wandered off somewhere, so they said, 'Why don't you give it a try?' That was 1971," he added. "So things worked out pretty good."

Leyland is so understated it's easy to get the impression that his career and all that success — almost 1,700 wins, three manager of the year awards, a World Series title and runner-up finish in 2012 — were little more than a string of happy accidents. In truth, for most of his career, Leyland was rarely in the right place at the right time long enough for lightning



to strike.

He spent his first 11 seasons managing in five different towns at different levels of the minors, occasionally stuck with teams so bad that a half-dozen errors and 10 walks per game were routine. He endured eating in truck stops and being stranded on two-lane highways alongside buses with flat tires at 4 o'clock in the morning. When Leyland finally made it to the major leagues in 1982, with an assist from close pal and then-White Sox manager Tony La Russa, it was as a third-base coach.

"It didn't take long to see just how good he was, but I knew a little about that when we got him," La Russa said. "I managed against Jim the first time in Triple-A in 1979, and we did it a lot more than I wanted to after that. He's got a real passion for competing."

Turns out Leyland has a passion for more than just competing, though the rest of us rarely see it. La Russa laughed out loud when told how the only story Leyland recounted about his first visit to Lakeland was realizing he wasn't a good enough ballplayer to carve out a living for long.

"That's perfect," said La Russa, who retired after the 2011 season. "Jim's a funny guy, engaging and interesting and fun to be around — when it's just coaches and players. He likes to sing, too, but almost nobody knows it, because he takes being the leader of the team seriously, at least when he thinks it's time to compete. ... So not

being nostalgic, not wanting to sound distracted, that's Jim, too. It just means he's already in compete mode."

Those who don't know Leyland as well should wish he cut himself more slack. He often comes off as a baseball lifer buffeted by a series of headwinds who loves the game a lot more than it loved him back.

Leyland got his first big-league managing job in Pittsburgh and lost the NL Championship Series three years in a row. Tougher still was hanging on after the cost-conscious Pirates' organization effectively gave up, letting guys like Bobby Bonilla and Barry Bonds slip away, before they started cutting to the bone. Leyland eventually migrated to Miami, where he hoisted the World Series trophy and gave a brief emotional speech.

"This is for all the minor league managers, the guys in the instructional leagues. So don't give up."

But the very next season, the Marlins did, conducting a fire sale that left Leyland shaking his head and eventually fleeing to the Colorado Rockies. After a season there, convinced he'd let himself, his ballplayers and the organization down, Leyland walked away from the game.

"We've talked a lot over the years and believe me, he left money on the table there," La Russa said. "But every year, Jim and I would have the same discussion about managing, with the same questions: Are you fired up to do the job? Is the club responding to your leadership? Do you have the confidence of the front office and ownership? I'm pretty sure Jim didn't sign up for this year until he checked his gut." General manager Dave

Dombrowski, who met La Russa and Leyland when he was a young front-office assistant in Chicago three decades ago, is certain all the stars are aligned. He knows few managers could get over the way Detroit was clobbered by San Francisco in the series last year and that none would come back any hungrier. "If most of what you know about Jim is seeing him talking after games — giving

short, gruff answers — you wouldn't know how much baseball means to him," said Dombrowski, who first met Leyland when he was a young front-office assistant with the White Sox. "He's seen just about everything and he still loves everything about it. He just doesn't always come across that way." And that's the only shame. To make ends meet at various times, Leyland stamped out

windshields at a General Motors plant, delivered mail and hauled construction materials around. But even now that he's flush and in control of one of a handful of serious contenders, he isn't about to loosen up. "I never thought all those days ago about making it or not making it," Leyland said. "I'm just happy they kept me around long enough to find a way I could stick."

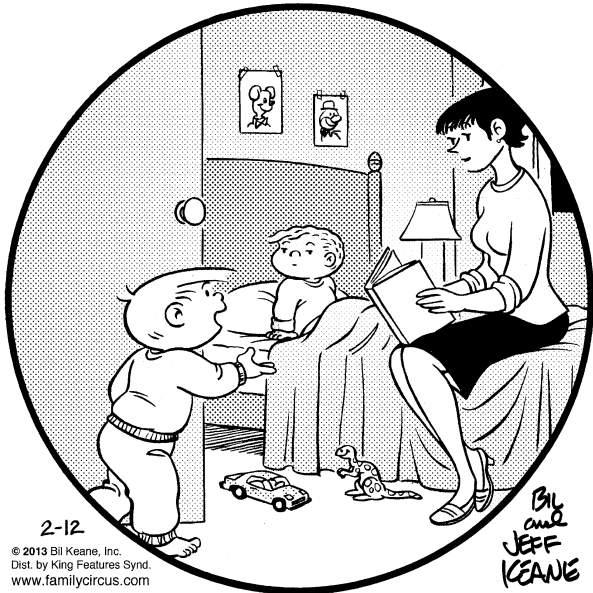

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

On this deal from the 2007 NEC event, both tables in a match between Japanese and Polish squads reached three no-trump. For Japan Akihiko Yamada led a diamond and declarer took the first trick and cleared the clubs. The defense set up the diamonds, but declarer could run his clubs and knock out the spade ace. When diamonds proved to be 4-4, South had nine tricks.

In the other room, Cezary Balicki led a fourth-highest heart four. (Where the opponents do not use Stayman, then when in doubt a major is generally best.) Declarer won the first heart to take the club finesse. Adam Zmudzinski won his king as Balicki dropped the club 10. In this position the partnership conventionally play a variety of signal known as the Smith Echo to suggest that West would be happy with a switch. Naturally, Zmudzinski shifted to diamonds, and Balicki won his king and returned a low card. When Zmudzinski ducked the second diamond, declarer's diamond ace fell on air. Now when the defenders got in with the spade ace, they could cash out for down one.

Nicely done by the defenders; but declarer had opened the door to them by playing on clubs before spades. South wants to keep East off lead for just this reason, and the losing club finesse will surely give the defense the chance to find the killing shift. However, if the cards lie as they do, no shift can hurt declarer when West takes the spade ace.

Since you have no extras, you have no reason to invite game. You would raise to three diamonds if one of your small diamonds were the queen.
