

ABANDONED

FILER • With snow-covered pastures and the high price of hay, Twin Falls County range deputies have seen more abandoned and abused horses each

winter for the last several years. "In the summer months there's pasture grass," said Lt. Daron Brown, who oversees the special services division. "When winter hits it becomes more prevalent."

The cost of hay is high while the value of horses is low, he said. At livestock auctions horses can be sold for as little as \$20.

Recently, the sheriff's office was called for a mare that wandered onto a person's property.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman Lori Stewart, a horse owner herself, said unlike many abandoned horses she could tell this one had once been cared for.

This horse, which Stewart has named "Burr" for the prickly seed pods that became stuck in her mane, will be auctioned off Saturday, Feb. 16, at the Twin Falls Livestock Commission auction.

"She's in awesome shape," Stewart said.

Many abandoned horses have not been handled and can be skittish and less gentle than the mare currently in the care of the sheriff's office, Brown said.

The cost of hay to feed abandoned horses, about \$185 per ton, isn't in his office's budget, Brown said.

"It's not budgeted for but that doesn't mean we're not going to do it," Brown said. "We're not going to allow animals to starve."

Heider Pulls Bill on Student Ex-convicts

TWIN FALLS • Legislation that would have prevented students convicted of certain crimes from attending public school is off the table – for now.

On Wednesday, bill sponsor Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, pulled the legislation, which was scheduled for an afternoon public hearing.

If passed, the bill would have forced school boards to deny enrollment to students convicted of crimes of violence or any felony or misdemeanor that put the student in prison for a year or more. The bill *Please see* **HEIDER, A6**

WILL RECYCLING RAISE TRASH COSTS?

TWIN FALLS • Recycling efforts may mean less waste going to the landfill, but they could contribute to future rising trash collection rates.


Twin Falls City Council members once again discussed this concern while listening to a presentation from the Southern Idaho Solid Waste District during Monday's meeting, Feb. 11. SISW operates the area's landfill for seven south-central Idaho counties.

The rate issue was discussed several years ago among county, city and waste representatives. Back then, various representatives were trying to find the right balance in not penalizing increased recycling efforts while sending less material to the landfill.

Twin Falls' no-sort recycling program was less than a year old when SISW announced it would raise its rates.

At the time, city officials feared the increase was a reaction to less waste headed to the landfill. Today, council members are voicing concern that expanding the recycling program would increase the chance of future rate hikes.

"When they have fewer trucks going to the landfill, they are increasing fees," said Councilman Chris Talkington. Please see COSTS, A6

McDonald's Slump Hurts Stocks

NEW YORK (AP) • The Dow was held back by a slump in McDonald's stock Wednesday, leaving it short of a record.

The Dow Jones industrial average shed 35.79 points to close at 13,982.91. The Dow has gained 6.7 percent this year and is just 182 points below the record close of 14,164 it set in October 2007.

McDonald's was the biggest decliner in the Dow, losing \$1.10 to \$94, as investors worried that Americans will spend less on eating out following a rise in Social Security taxes at the beginning of the year.

TIME TO TELL THE CLOCK'S TALE

TWIN FALLS • The clock's chimes have been silent for some time now. Its hands are still.

But for decades, the landmark clock at the south corner of Shoshone Street and Main Avenue in Twin Falls kept the town on time.

The clock, made by O.B. McClintock Co. of Minneapolis, hangs from the corner of the old Twin Falls Bank and Trust building - now Wells Fargo Bank.

The clock juts out diagonally, high above the sidewalk, so that one of its four faces is visible from any direction.

The clock has been called a marvel by the men who have cared for it over the years.

"It is of historic significance to the community," said Jim Conder, who worked on the clock in the past. "I would hope to see some effort to bring it back to service."

Caring for such a clock is becoming a lost art, Conder said. Few of these clocks still run because timekeepers are scarce.

While the time is displayed on the street corner, the actual clockwork happens inside the bank building.

Nearly every week since 1917, someone would climb the stairs to a locked closet on the second floor to wind the "master" unit. The timekeeper would then synchronize the time displayed on the four "slave" units outside the building.

When wound, the spring would advance the master clock one cog every 60 seconds, and an electrical impulse would travel from the master clock to

"Max Phillips' caretaking of the part of the team who repaired London's Big Ben during the 1970s, Eaton added.

The Bank and Trust building was constructed around 1910, and the clock purchased for \$5,000 - was installed in 1917.

At some point, the clock ended up in a landfill, said Conder, relaying what was told to him by a custodian at the bank many years ago. The clock was removed during a remodel of the bank and mistakenly sent out with the trash.



Idaho Senate Panel OKs New Oil and **Gas Regulator**

BOISE (AP) Idaho's oil and natural gas industry is a step closer to getting new regulators after a Senate panel approved a shakeup of the state's Oil and Natural Gas Commission.

Currently, the Idaho Land Board, with Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and the attorney general, secretary of state, controller and public schools superintendent, regulate the industry.

A newly constituted panel, approved unanimously by the Senate Resources and Environment Committee on Wednesday, would have five governor-appointed members.

One person would have knowledge of drilling, another with geology experience and another technical expertise in water issues.

There would also be two landowners, one with and one without mineral leases.

The idea is to put decision-making in the hands of people with deeper knowledge of the issues, while reducing elected officials' conflicts of interest.

Magic Valley Freshmen GOP Offer **Conditional Support for State Exchange**

BOISE • What do you do when faced with two choices you don't like? Make a palatable third option.

Sixteen House Republican freshmen have joined forces to create a trailer bill to the governor's health insurance exchange legislation. That bill passed the House Health and Welfare Committee on Wednesday.

The bill, sponsored and largely authored by Rep. Luke Malek, R-Coeur d'Alene, adds more legislative oversight to the exchange, but leaves the governor's legislation largely unchanged and intact. Malek said he was compelled to pursue the legislation after being dissatisfied with both the governor's state exchange bill and the idea of the federal government running an exchange.

All 16 freshmen who at tended a Wednesday morning press conference said they were on the fence about supporting the exchange, but the changes in Malek's bill are enough to get them to vote for the governor's bill.

That shift offers a large block of yea votes for the governor's bill if the House trailer bill passes both the House and Senate. But the passage of Malek's bill is required for them to hop on board, the freshmen said.

All three of Magic Valley's freshmen (Reps. Lance Clow, R-Twin Falls, Clark Kauffman, R-Filer, and Steve Miller, R-Fairfield) were part of the coalition. Before, each had said separately that they were undecided about the exchange.

Clow said he struggled with the exchange, but Malek's bill ultimately eased many of his concerns.

"One of the things I personally realized as a freshman is making laws is not as simple as some people might think," he said.

Clow, Kauffman and Miller all met with the governor about the exchange, as did many of the other freshmen.

Here's a breakdown of additions to the bill:

• Would add two nonvoting members to the board: One appointed by the House Speaker and one appointed by the Senate President Pro Tem.

 Would make all meet ings of the board held in an open public forum, "and every effort shall be made to make such meetings televised or streamed in video and audio format."

 Would accept requests to bid on contracts to implement the exchange.

• Would mandate the board report to appropriate Senate and House policy committees on certain changes the board or Health and Human Services make, such as changes to bylaws and policies.

• Would mandate the governor proclaim Idaho won't be obligated to comply with HHS rules in the event HHS or Congress change the establishment date and the grant eligibility date.

During his presentation, Malek said the oversight gives the Legislature the power to repeal the exchange and hand it over to the federal government. That's not expressed in the bill, but Malek said it's implied by the legislative

oversight.

Vehicular Manslaughter **Trial Delayed in Gooding**

GOODING • A Gooding County vehicular manslaughter trial that was scheduled to begin next week has been delayed.

In late August, Shane Jeffery Haile, 25, was charged with vehicular manslaughter after an allterrain vehicle crash that killed Blanton McGee, 27, of Hailey.

On Tuesday, Feb. 12, the trial was rescheduled for April 10. A pretrial conference in the case is now scheduled for March 26.

Haile was also charged with driving a vehicle without the owner's consent, causing more than \$1,000 damage.

According to a Gooding County sheriff's report, deputies responded at about 1:50 a.m. Aug. 26 to a canal – Buckeye Ditch – at the end of Orchard Street West in Hagerman. Neighbors who re-

sponded to the crash before emergency workers arrived later described to deputies how they held McGee's head above the water and attempted to remove him from the vehicle, according to the report. Haile was removed from the canal on a sled and rope system by medical personnel.

According to the report, Haile had a head laceration, two broken kneecaps and a broken vertebra.

Both Haile and McGee were taken to North Canyon Medical Center in Gooding. McGee was later taken by air ambulance to Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise, where he died from his injuries.

According to the report, Haile and McGee left a party in Hagerman and took the ATV, which belongs to the party's host, without permission.

KIMBERLY • The city of Kimberly could soon return to normal staffing levels following some key departures.


The city council on Tuesday approved the hiring of Larry Hall as full-time administrator/treasurer with an annual starting salary of \$48,000.



"If you do decide to do something on your own, we want you to be familiar with our process because we believe it's better, faster, cheaper than anything you could do within traditional technology," Richards told the council.









The Brevity of Silent Cal

efore Ronald Reagan traveled the 16 blocks to the White House after his first inaugural address, the White House Washington Post curator had, at the new president's instruction, hung in



the Cabinet room a portrait of Calvin Coolidge. The Great Communicator knew that "Silent Cal" could use words powerfully - 15 of them made him a national figure - because he was economical in their use, as in all things.

Were Barack Obama, America's most loquacious president (699 first-term teleprompter speeches), capable of learning from someone with whom he disagrees, he would profit from Amity Shlaes' new biography of Coolidge, who she calls "our great refrainer" with an "aptitude for brevity," as when he said, "Infla-tion is repudiation." She says that under his "minimalist" presidency, he "made a virtue of inaction." As he said, "It is much more important to kill bad bills than to pass good ones." During the 67 months of his presidency, the national debt, the national government, the federal budget, unemployment (3.6 percent) and even consumer prices shrank. The GDP expanded 13.4 percent.


In 1898, at 26, he won his first of 10 public offices, a seat on the City Council of Northampton, Mass. Like Reagan, Coolidge benefited from being underestimated: The letter of reference he carried to Boston when elected to Massachusetts' General Assembly said, "Like the singed cat, he is better than he looks." Tougher, too. During the chaos of the 1919 Boston police strike, Gov. Coolidge electrified the nation with these 15 words: "There is no right to strike against the public safety by anybody, anywhere, any time."

Nine months later, Republican leaders in the famous "smoke-filled room" in Chicago's Blackstone Hotel decided to nominate for president Ohio Sen. Warren Harding, whose dreadful rhetoric ("not nostrums, but normalcy ... not surgery, but serenity") drove H.L. Mencken to rhapsodies of disgust: "It reminds me of a string of wet sponges; it reminds me of tattered washing on the line; it reminds me of stale bean soup, of college yells, of dogs barking idiotically through endless nights." The convention produced a rhetorically balanced ticket by stampeding for Coolidge as vice president. He wrote to his father: "I hope you will not mind."

Harding was a reprobate with bad judgment about friends but good instincts about policy. The former produced unpleasantness about Naval Petroleum Reserve Number 3, aka Wyoming's Teapot Dome. The latter produced prosperity.

When Harding died in August 1923, Coolidge had not seen him since March, but the new president, assisted by a splendidly named former congressman, C. Bascom Slemp, continued Harding's program of cutting taxes, tariffs and expenditures. "I am for economy. After that I am for more economy," said the 30th president, whose administration's pencil policy was to issue one at a time to each bureaucrat, who if he or she did not entirely use it up had to return the stub. Coolidge and Treasury Secretary Andrew Mellon advocated "scientific taxation," an early iteration of the supplyside economics theory that often lowering rates will stimulate the economy so that the government's revenue loss will be much less than the taxpayers' gain. Soon Coolidge was alarmed that economic growth was producing excessive revenues that might make government larger. He met his wife, the vivacious Grace, after hearing her laughter when she saw through a window him shaving while wearing a hat. Shlaes' biography would be even more engaging had she included this oft-repeated anecdote: When President and Mrs. Coolidge were being given simultaneous but separate tours of a chicken farm, Grace asked her guide whether the rooster copulated more than once a day. "Dozens of times," she was told. "Tell that to the president," she said. When told, Coolidge asked, "Same hen every time?" When the guide said, "A different one each time," the president said: "Tell that to Mrs. Coolidge." In 1924, after the lingering illness and death of his 16year-old son from blood poisoning, Coolidge demonstrated - if only our confessional culture could comprehend this - the eloquence of reticence: "When he was suffering he begged me to help him. I could not." Coolidge, says Shlaes, thought his office "really was one of 'president', literally one who presided." And "the best monument to his kind of presidency was no monument at all." This absence, however, is a kind of admonitory presence for him who said, "It is a great advantage to a president, and a major source of safety to the country, for him to know he is not a great man." The 1933 funeral service for this man of brevity lasted 22 minutes.



IDAHO DEQ WANTS \$300K TO STUDY FISH CONSUMPTION

BOISE (AP) • Environmenregulators tal want \$300,000 to study just how many fish Idaho residents really eat, to help determine toxics criteria meant to protect people's health without putting unduly strict limits on pollution that industry and others can legally discharge into the state's waterways.

Department of Environmental Quality Director Curt Fransen told the Senate Resources and Environment Committee Wednesday the issue arose last year.

That's when the federal **Environmental Protection** Agency rejected Idaho's human health criteria for nearly 90 toxic pollutants present in surface waters because it determined that the state's fish consumption estimates were too low.

Under the Clean Water Act, there's a calculation for how much toxics can be discharged in Idaho waterways by industry, municipalities and others, based on human fish consumption.

Fearing the EPA will set water quality standards that burden the economy, Fransen now wants to hire social scientists to survey people across Idaho, to find out just how much fish they consume.

"The basic notion is, there are toxic materials in water, it ends up in fish, and if people eat those fish, it ends up in people, creating a health risk," he said.

A survey would include not only tribal subsistence

fishers from Idaho's Indian tribes, as well as passionate recreational anglers in Idaho who use their pastime to fill their freezers.

The issue has a long history. In 2006, the state adopted an estimate that its residents eat about a pound of fish from Idaho waters monthly. Six years later, however, the EPA decided that wasn't high enough, Fransen said.

"They believe the fish consumption rates may be higher than the default we used," he said.

For instance, Oregon recently adopted a standard for consumption that was 10 times higher than Idaho's.

Lawmakers on the panel said the issue is very important to businesses.

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House OKs Lifting Cold-call **Ban on Telecoms** BOISE (AP) • The House

voted overwhelmingly for Idaho to lift a 13-year-old restriction barring phone and cable TV companies from calling existing customers to market new products or services.

Wednesday's floor vote was 65 to 5 to send the measure to the Senate.

A single Republican, Rep. Maxine Bell of Jerome, opposed the bill, which had also been panned by the Idaho attorney general's office as an unwanted intrusion on people's privacy.

House Introduces Bill Limiting **Overseas Voters**

BOISE (AP) • Voters who once lived in Idaho but now reside overseas could soon be barred from casting ballots in local elections.

The House State Affairs committee introduced legislation Wednesday that keeps former Idahoans who live abroad indefinitely from voting in city council or other municipal elections.

Federal absentee laws would allow those citizens to vote in national elections. The bill would not bar military personnel from voting in local races.

Coeur d'Alene Republican Rep. Kathleen Sims says the goal is to prevent voter fraud. In a neck-andneck 2009 city council race, at least four Canadians cast ballots. A lawsuit on that case was ultimately decided by the Idaho Supreme Court.

Sims introduced a similar bill last year to tighten standards for absentee ballots, but it died on the

House floor.

• Don't expect to see potbellied pigs among the list of acceptable urban pets in Coeur d'Alene any time soon.

Members of the city's General Services Subcommittee rejected a request on Monday to amend rules to allow porkers in more neighborhoods.

The Coeur d'Alene Press reports the request was submitted by Zak Adams, who lives in nearby Post Falls but wants to move his family to Coeur d'Alene.

Adams says his pet pig Penelope is no trouble and low maintenance.





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New Website Helps Idaho **Smokers** Quit

Idahoans have a new website to help them kick the tobacco habit, according to an announcement from the Idhao Department of Health and Welfare.

Starting today, visit quitnow.net/idaho for free online quitting services and to receive a free, four-week supply of nicotine patches, gum or lozenges.

The state is transitioning from an older website that also offered nicotine replacement products.

"Nicotine replacement therapy, combined with counseling, is very effective. Using a nicotine replacement therapy can double a smoker's chances of quitting smoking. Research also shows that the likelihood of staying quit for more than six months is increased when a smoker uses nicotine replacement therapy according to the directions," the announcement states.

Idahoans also can call the 1-800-Quit-Now QuitLine and receive a free, four-week supply of nicotine replacement therapy sent to the address provided. People younger than 18 must get a doctor's prescription. Five counseling sessions are provided through the QuitLine.

This new online service gives Idahoans dozens of free quitting tools and resources.

Some services include: • Quitting aids to help

decide the type, dose and schedule of nicotine replacement or other medication.

• A quitting guide workbook to help sick with a quitting plan.

• Quitting coaches who provide phone support.

• A private, online community that provices videos, activities, progress tracking and discussions with 25,000 active members.

170,000 tons of solid waste a year from seven area counties.

Bartlome said he runs the district on a skeleton crew to keep costs down, but he can't dip into reserves every year when there's less revenue coming in from the county.

"We also diverted 31,000 tons of waste last year," he said. "We cut wherever we can. We pride ourselves on efficiency."

"I think if you've been incarcerated in a state prison, you've become a hardened person," he said.

Heider said Wednesday he hasn't decided if he will amend the bill this session, or pull it permanently and try again next year.

"We've had to go over and impound entire herds of cattle," McFall said. "Twenty calves had to impounded because the owner couldn't af-

ford to feed them a couple years ago."

McFall said instead of letting a horse loose, owners who can't care for their animals should contact their local humane society or animal support group for help.

"Instead of letting it starve they'll turn it loose on BLM land," he said. "They don't realize that a domesticated horse won't do as well as a wild horse."

Fact Check: Obama's State of the Union Address

Every president announces a slew of initiatives in his State of the Union address. Here, in order of delivery, is a summary of the key proposals, pledges or priorities announced by President Barack Obama a year ago and what happened to them. Given election-year politics and conflicts with congressional Republicans, Obama's success rate on legislative proposals in 2012 is relatively poor at least until the year-end "fiscal cliff" negotiations.

The Proposals

Obama: "We should start with our tax code. Right now, companies get tax breaks for moving jobs and profits overseas. Meanwhile, companies that choose to stay in America get hit with one of the highest tax rates in the world. It makes no sense, and everyone knows it. So let's change it."

No progress has been made on reforming the tax code. Obama has repeatedly proposed changing tax breaks to reward companies that stay in the United States and punish those that

ty colleges, but the plan was scaled back to just \$2 billion over four years; only \$1 billion in grants have been awarded. After the State of the Union address, the president called for an \$8 billion fund called the "Community College to Career Fund." But the plan had gone nowhere. **Obama:** "Tonight, I am proposing that every state every state requires that all students stay in high school until they graduate or turn 18."

One state, Maryland, in the past year has adopted legislation that would eventually require students to stay in school until age 18, bringing the number to 22 states.

Obama: "At a time when Americans owe more in tuition debt than credit card debt, this Congress needs to stop the interest rates on student loans from doubling in July."

Congress acted to extend the 3.4 percent interest rate on federally subsidized Stafford loans for another year.

Obama: "Give more young people the chance to earn their way through college by doubling the number of work-study jobs in the next five years."

As part of this proposal, the president had hoped to add an additional 110,000 federal work-study jobs in fiscal year 2013. But not only was his plan not accepted by Congress but the program now is threatened with a cut of 50,000 jobs because of the looming automatic sequester.

33.5 Million View State of the Union Address in Washington

NEW YORK (AP) • The 33.5 million people who saw President Barack Obama's fifth State of the Union made it the smallest audience for the annual speech since Bill Clinton's last address in 2000.

The Nielsen ratings company said Wednesday it was down from the 37.8 million people who saw Obama's State of the Union last year. The 52.4 million people who watched his first address in 2009 were his largest audience.

Sixteen networks aired the speech Tuesday night. The 6.5 million people who saw it on NBC just barely gave the network bragging rights over CBS, which had 6.4 million viewers. Nielsen says ABC had 5.5 million viewers for the speech. It says 3.7 million people saw Obama on Fox News Channel, 3.6 million on CNN and 3 million on MSNBC.

OBAMA PROPOSALS FACE QUICK OPPOSITION

WASHINGTON (AP) • President Barack Obama set up high-stakes clashes with Republicans over guns, immigration, taxes and climate change in a State of the Union address that showcased his determination to mark his legacy. Republicans urged Obama to get out of campaign mode and offer more than "gimmicks and tax hikes."

At the center of looming confrontations in Washington is a fight over the very role of government, with Obama pushing a raft of new initiatives to improve preschool programs and voting, boost manufacturing and research and development, raise the minimum wage and lower energy use. "It is our unfinished task to make sure that this government works on behalf of the many and not just the few," he said.

Republicans who control the House and hold enough votes to stall legislation in the Senate were just as quick to declare that the government helps best by getting out of the way.

"An opportunity to bring together the country instead became another retread of lip service and liberalism," Senate Republi-

can Leader Mitch McConnell said Wednesday from the chamber floor, saying the president offered little more than "gimmicks and tax hikes."

"Last night's speech was a pedestrian liberal boilerplate that any Democratic lawmaker could have given at any time in recent history," McConnell said.

House Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan, the GOP's vice presidential candidate last fall, said Wednesday morning that Obama's leadership style stands in the way of bipartisan efforts to resolve problems like the ballooning deficit. "He seems to always be in campaign mode, where he treats people in the other party as enemies rather than partners," the Wisconsin Republican said in

> an interview on "CBS This Morning."

Ryan was asked if he supported House Speaker John Boehner's remark Tuesday that he didn't believe Obama "has the guts" to stand up to liberals in his own party on spending cuts. The morningafter comments came as Obama was to set off on a three-state trip, starting in North Carolina, to sell to voters the programs he outlined in his address. Obama hit the road frequently in campaign-style trips in December to appeal directly to voters for the approach that he favored, including new taxes, to avoid the socalled "fiscal cliff."

Republican critics have said the president should stay home and focus his attention on dealing directly with Congress on these issues. In the formal Republican response to Obama's address, Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., said, "More government isn't going to help you get ahead. It's going to hold you back."

Tears, Applause Expressed for Pope at Last Public Mass

VATICAN CITY (AP) • With a humble "Grazie" as bishops doffed their mitres and applause echoed through St. Peter's Basilica, a frail Pope Benedict XVI began his long farewell by presiding over Ash Wednesday services in a tearful, final public Mass.

"We wouldn't be sincere, Your Holiness, if we didn't tell you that there's a veil of sadness on our hearts this evening," said Cardinal Tarcisio Bertone, Benedict's longtime deputy, his voice breaking.

"Thank you for having given us the luminous example of the simple and humble worker in the vineyard of the Lord," Bertone said, quoting Benedict's own words when he first appeared before the faithful above St. Peter's Square after he was elected pope.

Smiling and clearly moved, Benedict responded, "Grazie. Now let us return to prayer" — his words bringing to an end the resounding applause that had grown in intensity over several minutes.

Then, in a rare gesture and sign of respect, the rows of bishops, some with tears in their eyes, removed their mitres. One prelate dabbed at his eyes with a handkerchief.

"Viva il papa!" someone in the crowd shouted as the pope slowly made his way down the steps of the altar, assisted by two clergymen. He then departed St. Peter's for the last time aboard a wheeled platform, sparing him the long walk down the aisle.

Ash Wednesday marks the start of Lent, the most solemn season on the church's liturgical calendar that ends with Holy Week, when the faithful commemorate the death of Christ and his resurrection on Easter Sunday. By this Easter, on March 31, the church will likely have

a new pope. In his final homily as pontiff, Benedict sent a clear message to his successor and those who will elect him of his hope for the future: a united church that isn't "defiled" by internal rivalries.

Each Christian, he said, is called to bear witness to the faith. "I think in particular of the attacks against the unity of the church, to the divisions in the ecclesial body," he said.

Earlier in the day, the scene was festive as Benedict took the extraordinary step of speaking directly to the faithful about why he had broken with 600 years of tradition and decided to retire on Feb. 28.

"As you know, I have decided to renounce the ministry that the Lord gave to me on April 19, 2005," Benedict told thousands gathered for the traditional Wednesday general audience. "I did this in full liberty for the good of the church." He expressed gratitude for the prayers and love of his flock, which he said he

"physically felt in these days that haven't been easy for me." And he asked them to "continue to pray for me, the church, and the future pope."

Benedict was greeted with a standing ovation when he entered the packed hall, and his speech was interrupted repeatedly by applause. A huge banner reading "Grazie Santita" – "Thank you Your Holiness" – was strung up and a chorus of Italian schoolchildren serenaded him with one of his favorite hymns in German – a gesture that moved the pope to thank them for singing a piece "particularly dear to me."

He appeared wan and spoke softly, but his eyes twinkled at the welcome.

Syrian Rebels Close In on Aleppo Airport

BEIRUT (AP) • Syrian rebels knocked down army defenses and moved in on the country's second largest airport Wednesday, reportedly killing more than 40 soldiers and bringing them closer to what could be their biggest conquest since the beginning of the civil war.

Control of Aleppo international airport and a military air base next to it would be a huge strategic shift for Syria's northeastern region, giving the opposition a potential air hub enabling aid and other flights.

Still, activists said it could

be days before the rebels would be able to push their way into the airport, 4 miles from the contested city center, and even then, it was unclear whether they would be able to retain control of the sprawling facility for long.

The country's air space is firmly controlled by the government, which uses its warplanes indiscriminately to bomb rebel strongholds.

The advance on the airport, which stopped handling any flights weeks ago because of the fighting, comes on the heels of other strategic gains.

LAPD Assesses the Last Days of Christopher Dorner

LOS ANGELES (AP) • There was no question. The man standing before Rick Heltebrake on a rural mountain road was Christopher Dorner.

Clad in camouflage from head to toe and wearing a bulletproof vest packed with ammunition, the most wanted man in America over the last week was just a few feet away, having emerged from a grove of trees holding a large, assault-style rifle. As teams of officers who had sought the fugitive ex-Los Angeles police officer since last week were closing in, Dorner pointed the gun at Heltebrake and ordered him to get out of his truck.

"I don't want to hurt you. Start walking and take your dog," Heltebrake recalled Dorner saying during the carjacking Tuesday. The man, who wasn't lugging any gear, got into the truck and drove away. Heltebrake, with his 3-year-old Dalmatian Suni in tow, called police when he heard a volley of gunfire erupt soon after, and then hid behind a tree. A short time later, police caught up with the man they believe was Dorner, surrounding a cabin in which he had taken refuge after crashing Heltebrake's truck 80 miles east of Los Angeles. A gunfight ensued in which one sheriff's deputy was killed and another wounded. Then, as the gunfire ended, the cabin erupted in flames. A charred body was found in the basement, along with a wallet and personal items, including a California driver's license with the name Christopher Dorner, an official briefed on the investigation told The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because of the ongoing probe. The coroner's

office is studying the remains to positively determine the identity. It was not clear how the cabin caught fire.

Recalling his encounter, Heltebrake said Wednesday that he wasn't panicked in his meeting with Dorner because he didn't feel the fugitive wanted to hurt him. "He wasn't wild-eyed, just almost professional," he said. "He was on a mission."

Dorner, 33, had said in a rant that authorities believe he posted on Facebook last week that he expected to die, with the police chasing him, as he embarked on a campaign of revenge against the Los Angeles Police Department for firing him.

The apparent end came in

Sparing the housekeepers ultimately would start the chain of events that would lead to his undoing.

One of the women broke free and called 911, Foy said, and the chase was on. Two game wardens quickly spotted the car on a meandering road along a scenic lake, and deputies planned to throw down spike strips to puncture the vehicle's tires, authorities said. The driver of the vehicle seems to anticipate the move, pulling close behind the school buses to give officers no space to drop the strips, Foy said. Dorner had warned even boasted - in the rant that he knew their tactics and techniques as well as the officers pursuing him. The purple



the same mountain range where Dorner's trail went cold six days earlier, after his pickup truck — with guns and camping gear inside — was found abandoned and on fire near the ski resort town of Big Bear Lake. His footprints led away from the truck and vanished on frozen soil.

Authorities for the most part looked at cabins boarded up for the winter, said Dan Sforza, assistant chief of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, and often didn't enter occupied homes where nothing appeared amiss.

That could have been how Dorner went overlooked in a cabin just across the street from a police command post set up to capture him. It wasn't immediately known how he got into the cabin or how long he'd been there.

With three killings behind him and law enforcement still on the hunt, Dorner didn't shoot them. Instead, he tied up the women and took their purple Nissan as he fled. Nissan then disappeared.

Heltebrake, a ranger who takes care of a Boy Scout camp nearby, said he just had lunch and was checking the perimeter of the camp for anything out of the ordinary when he saw someone emerge from the trees, and instantly recognized Dorner as the man on the news. Officers trying to find the fugitive quickly realized he must have turned onto a side road, but for a few minutes nobody involved in the chase knew he had changed vehicles. That was when officers saw Heltebrake's truck, and Dorner appeared to be behind the wheel. And then the shooting started.

Out of options after crashing the pickup, the driver made a break for a cabin and barricaded himself inside.

With the standoff under way, officers lobbed tear gas canisters into the cabin. A single shot was heard inside before the cabin was engulfed in flames, said a law enforcement official who requested



anonymity because the investigation was ongoing.

It wasn't known what kind of gas the officers used, but one common variety, CS gas, is carried by many officers for crowd control and is more prone to causing a fire if launched into a building, said Gregory D. Lee, a retired federal drug enforcement agent.

If the body found there proves to be Dorner's, the death toll from the rampage would be four, including a Riverside police officer.

Police said Dorner began his run on Feb. 6 after they connected the Feb. 3 slayings of a former police captain's daughter and her fiance with his angry manifesto.

Dorner blamed former LAPD Capt. Randal Quan for providing poor representation before a police disciplinary board that fired him for filing a false report. Dorner, who is ASSOCIATED PRESS

black, claimed he was the subject of racism by the department and was targeted for reporting misconduct.

Chief Charlie Beck, who initially dismissed his allegations, said he would reopen the investigation into his firing — not to appease the exofficer, but to restore confidence in the black community, which had a tense relationship with police that has improved in recent years.

Monitors Criticize Belgium on Zimbabwe Diamonds

A world monitoring group on conflict diamonds said Wednesday it wants restrictions on the sale of Zimbabwe diamonds tightened after calls to relax them by diamond companies in Belgium.

Belgium has argued the controls hurt revenue filtering down to ordinary Zimbabweans. But Global Witness insisted in a statement circulated Wednesday the European nation's interests were "closer to home" in its diamond center of Antwerp that promotes diamond gifts around St. Valentine's Day, marked Thursday.

The eastern Zimbabwe fields of Marange, where diamonds are mined, have long been mired in allegations of killings, human rights violations and corruption. The group warned against what it called "a love triangle" between Belgium, its diamond dealers and Zimbabwe.

"European Union members seeking to promote democracy and stability in Zimbabwe should avoid a menage-a-trois with Belgium and its diamond dealers this Valentine's Day," it said.

It said Belgium is pressing for a European Union embargo on the state Zimbabwe Mining Development Corporation, at the forefront of diamond sales, to be lifted at once.

Minn. Man Charged with Murder in Shooting Spree

A Minnesota man accused of standing in the street and firing at passing cars — killing a 9-year-old boy — had roughly 200 rounds of ammunition stuffed into his jacket pocket, a backpack and the fanny pack he wearing when arrested, prosecutors said Wednesday. Nhan Lap Tran, 34, was charged Wednesday with second-degree murder and other counts in Monday's shootings in the St. Paul suburb of Oakdale.

Fourth-grader Devin Aryal died in the shootings, and his mother and another woman were injured. Two other motorists escaped as they were being fired upon, according to the criminal complaint. Authorities said Tran, of Oakdale, admitted shooting at the vehicles but did not say why. A Washington County District Court judge ordered Tran to undergo a mental health examination. Tran has no criminal record, and authorities have said they don't know of any past mental health issues. - AP

Zumba Prostitution Case Back Before Court in Maine

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) • Working on an expedited schedule, the state Supreme Court heard arguments Wednesday on whether prostitution clients who are video-taped without their knowledge during sex acts have a right to privacy under state law.

A prosecutor urged the Supreme Judicial Court to reinstate 46 invasion-of-privacy counts against Mark Strong Sr., who's accused of helping a Zumba instructor run a prostitution business in the seaside town of Kennebunk.

Defense lawyer Dan Lilley said lawmakers never intended to protect prostitution clients or other criminals from surveillance.

The seven-member panel was asked to rule swiftly because jury selection in Strong's trial has been put on hold in York County.

York County Assistant District Attorney Patrick Gordon argued that the state privacy law that protects innocent people in bathrooms and locker rooms also protects people engaging in sex in a private setting.

"No one would argue for a minute that that person didn't expect privacy there. So why would it be any different if money changed hands?" he said.

Chief Justice Leigh Saufley cut him off, pointing out that there's a big difference in sex between "volunteer social companions" and those paying a prostitute for sex.

The entire panel proceeded to jump into the fray with skeptical questions about how far the state should go in conferring privacy rights and whether there should be an expectation of surveillance at certain businesses.

Gordon told the justices that sexual relations are "the most private, intimate thing that people can do" and that the state intended to protect the privacy of those acts. He said the law makes no distinction between paid or unpaid sex.

Jury selection in the trial of Strong, who faces 13 other counts that deal with promotion of prostitution, has been twice delayed by appeals to the state supreme court.

The first dealt with First Amendment issues raised about the closed-door jury selection process. The second deals with the dismissal of the invasion-of-privacy charges.

Fitness instructor Alexis Wright set up the video equipment and Strong watched from his computer, making thousands of still images from the live video stream, Gordon told the justices.

The justices must rule quickly to avoid starting over with a new jury pool because service ends for the current jury pool at month's end.

Wright will be tried at a later date.

Both Strong and Wright have pleaded not guilty.

EGYPTIAN WOMEN FIGHTING BACK AGAINST SEX ASSAULTS

CAIRO (AP) • Egyptian women are growing increasingly angry and militant as they deal with one of the unintended consequences of the Arab Spring: an epidemic of sexual assault that law enforcement has failed to contain.

The backlash, which includes self-defense courses for women and even threats of violent retaliation, is fueled by ultraconservative Islamists who suggest that women invite assault by attending antigovernment protests where they mix with men.

At marches against sexual harassment in Cairo, women have brandished kitchen knives in the air. Stenciled drawings on building walls depict girls fighting off men with swords. Signs threaten to "cut off the hand" of attackers.

The reaction comes at a particularly heated moment. While the latest wave of demonstrations against President Mohammed Morsi's rule has cooled in recent days, large protests have grown increasingly violent.

A hard-core minority of demonstrators has vowed to

take on the government, and police have responded with force. About 70 people have been killed in clashes with security forces since Jan. 25, the second anniversary of the revolt that deposed longtime autocrat Hosni Mubarak.

Harassment has long been a problem in this patriarchal society, and attacks against female demonstrators have occurred under the democratically elected Morsi, the military council that ruled before him and Mubarak, who governed the Arab world's most populous country for nearly three decades.

The new element, however, is the increasingly sexual nature of the violence.

Sexual assaults at protests, where women have been groped, stripped and even raped, have risen both in number and intensity in the past year, reaching a peak on the uprising's anniversary.

On that day alone, activists reported two dozen cases of assaults against women at demonstrations in and around Cairo's central Tahrir Square, one of which involved the rape of a 19-year-old. The United Nations responded by urging

the government to take action. Activists say the attacks are organized by opponents of the demonstrations, who aim to make protests seem less representative by removing women from the scene. To date, no specific groups have been charged.

Hard-line Islamists have seized on the issue to propose their own solution: limit female protesters to designated areas. On Monday, members of the human rights commission of the Islamist-dominated legislative assembly criticized women for rallying among men and in areas considered unsafe.

While they urged passage of a new law to regulate demonstrations and facilitate police protection, one prominent member said that women should not go to protests.


Little Change in Honduras Prison Where 362 Died

JUTICALPA, Honduras (AP) • On the 14th day of each month, Jesus Garcia joins other relatives to hoist a cardboard coffin and carry it in a macabre procession down a road to the prison where two cousins died with 360 other inmates in the worst prison fire in at least a century.

It's their way to demand justice in the deaths of Antonio and Franklin Garcia, who were among many left locked in their cells as fire raced through the wooden barracks on Feb. 14 last year, and the handful of guards on duty ran for their lives.

"We go to the jail, in a symbolic procession with a casket, to ask for justice, but we get no answers," Garcia said. "We go to the minister of human rights and she passes it along to the president and he passes it along to the first lady, but then nothing gets done."

A year after the fire in Comayagua, about 60 miles from Tegucigalpa, the investigation remains open and prosecutors have filed no charges. The burned cells and electrical system are still being repaired. While the government created a new agency told to replace the police in the prisons with specially trained guards, social workers and doctors, the three-person commission that started working last week was given no budget and has no office, according to its director, Agusto Avila.

Atlanta's High Museum Features Kahlo and Rivera

ATLANTA (AP) • A major exhibition opening in Atlanta explores the work of Diego Rivera and Frida Kahlo, the famed 20th century couple who shared influences ranging from Marxism to Mexican folk art but whose legacies could not be more different – her best-known work consisting of dramatic self-portraits, his celebrity stemming from public murals celebrating Mexican nationalism.

"Frida & Diego: Passion, Politics, and Painting" opens Thursday at the High Museum of Art in Atlanta, the only U.S. venue where it will be shown. Featuring more than 120 pieces, it is the largest exhibition ever of the husbandand-wife's work shown together and includes about a quarter of Kahlo's total body of work, according to the High.

Rivera and Kahlo were married for nearly 25 years a union that was both passionate and tumultuous – but their art is rarely shown together in a single exhibition because of the perceived differences in their styles, said curator Elliott King. By the time the two married in 1929, Rivera was already established as a creative figure, perhaps best-known for more than 200 public murals that depict scenes from Mexican history to promote cultural nationalism commissioned by the Ministry of Education. His outgoing personality added to his celebrity.

Kahlo was virtually unknown as an artist when the two met. She had suffered numerous broken bones — including a spine fractured in three places, a broken pelvis and broken collar bone — in a 1925 bus accident that also left her unable to have children. She was very private and used her small-format painting to channel her physical and emotional suffering.

Immediately upon entering the exhibition, the visitor encounters a blown-up larger-than-life photograph of the pair — Kahlo looking off to one side as Rivera, who's right behind her, stares over Kahlo's shoulder straight at the camera.

This proposal has met with resistance in Congress and no action has been taken.

Obama: "We should be working on comprehensive immigration reform right now."

Virtually nothing happened in the election year but prospects are much brighter for a deal this year.

Obama: "We've subsidized oil companies for a century. That's long enough. It's time to end the taxpayer giveaways to an industry that rarely has been more profitable, and double-down on a clean energy industry that never has been more promising. Pass clean energy tax credits. Create these jobs."

Obama made no progress on taking away tax benefits for oil companies which he has long advocated but did win an extension of wind energy tax credits as part of the fiscal cliff deal. **Obama:** "Here's a proposal: Help manufacturers eliminate energy waste in their factories and give businesses incentives to upgrade their buildings. Their energy bills will be \$100 billion lower over the next decade, and America will have less pollution, more manufacturing, more jobs for construction workers who need them. Send me a bill that creates these jobs."

This idea went nowhere in Congress, and no bill was passed.

Obama: "I'm sending this Congress a plan that gives every responsible homeowner the chance to save about \$3,000 a year on their mortgage, by refinancing at historically low rates."

Congress has balked at Obama's plan, but the White House is now considering taking action via an executive order.

Obama: "Tonight, I'm asking my Attorney General to create a special unit of federal prosecutors and leading state attorney general to expand our investigations into the abusive lending and packaging of risky mortgages that led to the housing crisis."

New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman was appointed to head the task force and in October it filed a civil suit against JP Morgan Chase alleging a "systemic fraud on thousands of investors." The task force also filed a lawsuit against Credit Suisse in November over an alleged \$11 billion scheme.

Obama: "Our most immediate priority is stopping a tax hike on 160 million working Americans while the recovery is still fragile. People cannot afford losing \$40 out of each paycheck this year. There are plenty of ways to get this done. So let's agree right here, right now: No side issues. No drama. Pass the payroll tax cut without delay. Let's get it done."

Republicans, who had balked at extending the payroll tax cut, caved quickly and extended it for another year in what was seen as a clean win for Obama. But the tax cut died a quiet death at the end of 2012 as part of the fiscal cliff negotiations. **Obama:** "If you make more than

Obama: "If you make more than \$1 million a year, you should not pay less than 30 percent in taxes."

Obama's proposal of a minimum tax for the wealthy was largely ignored by Congress.

Obama: "On the other hand, if you make under \$250,000 a year, like 98 percent of American families, your taxes shouldn't go up."

In the fiscal cliff negotiations, Obama did win a permanent extension of the Bush tax cuts for individuals making less than \$400,000 and couples making less than \$450,000 as well as a modest increase in taxes on wealthier Americans. That's not quite what he wanted, but we'll count it as a win.

Obama: "I ask the Senate to pass a simple rule that all judicial and public service nominations receive a simple up or down vote within 90 days."

No such idea especially with a time frame had been adopted by the Senate, though the time for debate has been reduced after there is already a bipartisan consensus for a final vote.

Obama: "In Syria, I have no doubt that the Assad regime will soon discover that the forces of change cannot be reversed, and that human dignity cannot be denied.... We will stand against violence and intimidation. We will stand for the rights and dignity of all human beings men and women; Christians, Muslims and Jews."

The Pentagon's top leaders recently revealed that they supported a plan advocated by then CIA director David Petraeus and then Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton to supply weapons to rebels fighting against the Syrian government in a brutal civil war. But the president rejected the idea, and there is little indication it will be revived. Syrian President Bashar al-Assad remains in power and a report for the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights estimates that at least 60,000 people have died in the conflict.

Horse-Meat Scandal Spreads, but Remains Too Local for Irish Town

BELFAST, Northern Ireland • "Be at the center" is the motto of the Irish town of Ballybay. As the scandal over horse meat masquerading as beef gallops across Europe, its founders may not have realized how true that would turn out.

An inspection last month found frozen hamburgers made by the town's biggest employer, Silvercrest Foods, contained 29 percent horse meat. Production was halted and Tesco, Britain's largest retailer, dropped Silvercrest as a supplier.

"This is just a small place and now people from all over are associating the area with horse meat," Evelyn Steen said as she prepared to tend 40 cattle on her farm in Ballybay. "We're very annoyed by it all. It's terrible."

As the scope of the contamination unfolds, the global and opaque nature of the food chain is being exposed to European consumers as never before. Irish Agriculture Minister Simon Coveney said Tuesday the scandal involves Poland, Romania and Cyprus as well as Britain and Ireland. Six French supermarket companies including Carrefour withdrew some products made by Findus Group this week after tests showed some beef lasagne included horse meat. Tesco apologized to customers on Monday after finding horse DNA in its discount spaghetti Bolognese the company said was made in a factory that also produced foods for Findus.

"It highlights the fragility of the international supply chain," said Bryan Roberts, an analyst at Kantar Retail in London. "The mind boggles at the complexity of it all."

The horse traces in the foods Silvercrest had been shipping is linked to raw material imported from Poland, the Irish government said. The Findus ready meals labeled as beef-based and containing horse were manufactured at a Luxembourg factory owned by French company Comigel, France's consumer and anti- fraud office DGCCRF reported on Feb. 9.

Comigel's meat supplier was Poujol, owned by Arcadie Sud- Ouest. Poujol had bought the frozen meat from a Cypriot trader that in turn sub-contracted a Dutch trader who sourced the meat from a slaughterhouse and a meat packer in Romania, according to the DGCCRF. Romanian Prime Minister Victor Ponta has said there was no evidence of wrongdoing at Romanian companies.

"As time goes on, the more obvious is that this is a European problem that involves a whole series of countries," Coveney told broadcaster RTE Tuesday. "It was because of the vigilance of our testing and control regime in Ireland that what is now a pan-European problem was exposed."

Meanwhile, for the 1,000 or so residents in Ballybay, County Monaghan, close to the border with Northern Ireland, the attention has been as surprising as it has been unwelcome.

In a past life, Ballybay was a horse trading center. During the First World War, a local family produced as many as 300 horses a week, many of them sold to the British Army, and the town thrived as blacksmiths, saddle and harness makers moved to the area, according to the town's website.

The 18th-century town later became known more as a center of the Irish linen industry, and now is more of stop-off point for bird watchers drawn to the local lakes. Ireland's food safety authority found horse DNA in the Silvercrest frozen beef burgers on Jan. 15. The company's parent, County Louth-based ABP, suspended all production at the facility two days later. The investigation is continuing.

A second meat plant in county Monaghan was found to have traces of horse in some of its products, the Agriculture Ministry said Feb. 5.

The Silvercrest plant with its painted steel sits opposite a graveyard at the northern-edge of Ballybay overlooking the town's main street. A spokeswoman for ABP declined to comment on the future of the facility, which employs 112 people.

A few hundred yards away, Latvian immigrant Artis Alksnis leaned against the wall of his barber's shop, smoking a cigarette. He opened the business a few months ago.

"When I heard this, I thought maybe it was a joke about the horse meat," said Alksnis. "But it's no joke. We rely on that factory. It employs a lot of people. Business is quiet already. If it stops, it will be very bad for the town. People will think it is a horse-meat town."

Cuban Cars Get Spruced up with Helpfrom Fla. Shop

HIALEAH, Fla. (AP) • Somewhere on the streets of Havana is a cherry-red Lada car rebuilt almost entirely with parts that arrived from Miami in a visitor's suitcases.

A year ago, the 20-yearold Russian-made automobile — a boxy but remarkably durable model — was in dire need of repair. The door handles were rusting, the tires on their last mile, the inner workings shot.

"It was in very bad condition," said Frank Torres, a Cuban-American living in Miami whose cousin owns the car back in Cuba.

Torres decided to help overhaul it. But he and his cousin either couldn't find the parts they needed in Cuba or encountered exorbitant prices. So Torres turned to a Russian auto parts store that recently opened in Hialeah, in a pocket of Miami-Dade County filled with cheap clothing stores and gas stations that sell freshly brewed cafe con leche.

There, businessman Fabian Zakharov is tapping into a niche market: Cubansubject to certain limits. It's one more example of the growing economic links between the United States and Cuba, political adversaries still intricately connected by those who left and

those who stayed behind. The average Cuban worker is paid about \$20 a month, making buying a new car impossible for most. Because of that and the trade restrictions, the streets of Havana are an automotive time capsule, filled with bulbous, tail-finned Detroit models from the pre-revolution 1950s and dowdy vehicles from the Cold War.

"This store is wonderful," said Alexis Reyes, a Cuban who has been living in Miami for two years and recently bought a part for a 30year-old Russian car his son drives back on the island. "It means those of us living here can buy the parts to maintain the cars of our family in Cuba."

Ladas began arriving in Cuba in the 1970s, when the country was closely allied with the Soviet Union.

Anti-violence Against Women Act Is Approved by Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) • By a robust bipartisan majority, the Senate voted Tuesday to renew the Violence Against Women Act with new assurances that gays and lesbians, immigrants and Native American women will have equal access to the act's anti-domestic violence programs.

The 78-22 Senate vote to reauthorize the two-decade-old act that has shielded millions of women from abuse and helped reduce national rates of domestic violence turns the focus to the House, where Republican leaders are working to come up with their own version.

"Over 160 million women across the country are watching and waiting to see if the House will act on this bill and finally provide them the protections from violence they deserve," said Sen. Patty

Murray, D-Wash.

The act expired in 2011, putting efforts to improve its many federal programs on hold. Last year both the Republican-led House and the Democratic-controlled Senate passed renewal bills, but they were unable to reach a compromise.

This year House Republicans, sensitive to their lackluster showing among women voters in the November election, have vowed to move expeditiously on the issue. House Majority Leader Eric Cantor, R-Va., has taken the lead in negotiating the terms of a House bill.

On Monday 17 House Republicans wrote Cantor and Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, urging immediate action. The act's "programs save lies, and we must allow states and communities to build upon the successes of current VAWA programs so that we can help even more people," they wrote.

The Senate bill, while promoted by Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., and other Democrats, is cosponsored by a Republican, Mike Crapo of Idaho, and garnered 23 Republican votes. All 20 women members of the Senate voted for the bill.

President Barack Obama, in a statement, praised the Senate for working across party lines to pass the bill and said: "the bill passed by the Senate will help reduce homicides that occur from domestic violence, improve the criminal justice response to rape and sexual assault, address the high rates of dating violence experienced by young women, and provide justice to the most vulnerable among us."



Americans, mostly recent arrivals in this country, who frequently go back to visit relatives on the island and bring food, toiletries and car parts.

In more than a year since the store opened, Zakharov said, he has sold parts for hundreds of Ladas and some Moskvich cars, the two Soviet-era vehicles that are mainstays on Cuban roads.

Despite the U.S. trade embargo that has been in place against the communist island since the early 1960s, what Zakharov and his customers are doing is legal and aboveboard. He is not exporting to Cuba; he is selling to customers in the U.S. like any other business. Those customers can send or take products to Cuba, Many were doled out strategically to doctors, diplomats, and sugarcane cutters who met production targets. Cubans who served on overseas missions and came back with hard currency were often allowed to buy them. While they are slowly being supplanted by Chinese and South Korean models, Ladas are now commonly used as police cars, taxis, government and military vehicles, and family cars.

Zakharov, who was born in Russia but grew up on the island, learned how to drive in one of two Ladas his parents own — a beige one that now has more than 125,000 miles on it. He would drive his father, a university professor, to work.



Backcountry Yurts Are a Winter Haven

IN THE BOISE MOUNTAINS

(AP) • Daybreak's rose-colored light glows over the snowy mountain peaks surrounding Stargaze Yurt in the Boise Mountains.

It's minus 6 outside, and the January air is so cold and clear it crystallizes and sparkles in the sunlight.

Each dawn in one of the Idaho City backcountry yurts brings amazing winter experiences, like the changing colors of a rose, pink and purple sunrise in snow country, the ultimate silence of the dead of winter and fresh animal tracks in silky snow.

A favorite sight each morning

on the way to the outhouse is the trail left by a nocturnal snowshoe hare.

The yurts provide an easy way for snowshoers and Nordic skiers to "camp" in the backcountry in the winter and take in these experiences in relative comfort.

You don't have to be a hardcore winter trekker like those pictured in a Patagonia catalog to see winter in a remote setting.

Despite the temperature out side, a glowing fire in a wood stove keeps the yurt around 70 degrees.

The yurts also are equipped with bunks, cookware, a propane stove, firewood and wood stove for easy and convenient overnight stays.

Visitors have to bring only personal items, sleeping bags and food.

It doesn't take much effort to crawl out of a sleeping bag in the morning when the wood fire is roaring to get sausage, eggs and hash browns sizzling in a frying pan over the propane stove.

After breakfast, it's time to think about chores. Yes, there are chores at the yurts, and they are a unique experience for urbanites.

You've got to haul snow and melt it over the wood stove for water for cooking, washing dishes and drinking. Remember to boil it for drinking.

You also have to bring in a load of firewood from the storage shed so you'll have a warm, Please see YURTS, O2

Not Every Culture Sees Orion as a Human Figure

n our Western tradition Orion - currently standing midway up from the horizon, due south, at 8:30 p.m. – is a hunter with broad shoulders, feet splayed, and a narrow waist of three stars (his eponymous belt). But some Native Americans saw a severed hand, with the belt stars tracing the wrist. Orion's left foot, brilliant blue Rigel, forms the index finger; his scabbard (the Orion nebula) marks the thumb; and Cursa (to the right of Rigel, the beginning of Eridanus, the River) is the pinkie.

In Lakota legend, the hand belonged to a chief who had refused to offer sacrifice. The spirits, angry with his defiance, sent Thunder People to tear off his arm and hide it. The chief's daughter promised to marry a young suitor, named Fallen Star, if he could find and return her father's lost limb. Fallen Star succeeded, married the daughter and replaced his disgraced father-inlaw as chief. So, although the hand was returned to its owner, it appears in the sky as a caution to those who might be tempted to neglect their ritual obligations.

The Lakota's neighbors on the northern Great Plains, the Hidatsa, offered a different origin for the severed hand. Long Arm, a sky chief and holy man, feared the supernatural powers of the twin nephews of Charred Body,

a hunter from the sky who came to earth. Long Arm put Lodge-Boy to sleep and kidnapped Spring-Boy, taking him to the sky. When Lodge-Boy awoke, he changed himself into a little boy and went to the sky lodge where Spring-Boy was captive. There the twins changed themselves into spiders and escaped through a hole. When Long Arm reached through the hole to catch them, they cut off his hand and put it in the sky as a warning to those below. Next column: Comet

cozy fire for your whole stay.

You need to shovel the deck and pathways to the outhouse and woodshed, but you get into a rhythm as the days go on.

Soon, it's time to head out on trails right out the front door. The yurts make great jumping-off points for hitting trails way off the highway.

They lead to woodsy hollows, open ridges and viewpoints that most folks wouldn't see in the winter. The snowy terrain seems endless - and what a way to spend the day.

Most skiers and snowshoers have their favorite yurts and terrain, but with six yurts to choose from in the area near Idaho 21 northeast of Idaho City, there's a chance to try out different ones each winter.

Each yurt has different characteristics that attract certain yurters.

The yurts are basically the same - circular, Mongolianstyle domed tents about 20 feet in diameter. They have plywood floors, canvasand-lattice sidewalls and a skylight.

They have bunks, chairs, a table, cooking area and pantry, and plenty of hooks to hang clothing and gear.

But yurt locations are different and near different terrain. They are located on unique knolls and ridges, and offer different experi-

Dogs: Allowed. Why people like it: The yurt sits on an open point with incredible views of the stars and night sky.

The wide-open views extend from Scott Mountain to Jackson Peak, Wolf Mountain, Steele Mountain, Pilot Peak and the Sawtooth Range.

At an elevation of 6,569 feet, many north- and westfacing slopes are great for Telemark skiing and snowboarding. Snowshoers have miles of

off-trail exploring. The trek to Stargaze Point above the yurt is worth the views.

BANNER RIDGE AREA Banner Ridge Yurt Dis-

tance: 2.5 miles. Trail: Groomed. Elevation gain: 750 feet. It's a steady climb to a ridge

where the terrain mellows out a little across the ridge. Dogs: Not allowed in win-

ter. Why people like it: The yurt offers beautiful views of the South Fork of the Payette River drainage.

Skiers who like groomed trails have an 8-mile ski loop to enjoy. Telemark skiers and snowboarders can explore the open bowls and slopes off the ridge near the yurt.

There are plenty of woodsy treks for snowshoers who enjoy the backcountry.

Elkhorn Yurt Distance: 3.5 miles. Trails: Groomed to about

200 yards of the yurt. Elevation gain: The climb

is the same as for Banner

ally secluded, this is the place. The 270-degree view to the east, south and west offers views of Jackson Peak, Wolf Mountain, Steele Mountain, the Trinity Mountains, Sunset Peak and Pilot Peak.

The open, rolling terrain below the yurt provides offtrail skiers a chance to practice without going far from the wood stove.

GOLD FORK TRAILS

Whispering Pines Yurt Distance: 2.4 miles. Trail: Groomed.

Elevation gain: 300 feet. It's a long, but gradual climb to the yurt.

Dogs: Allowed.

Why people like it: There's plenty of Nordic skiing on an 8-mile groomed loop. Snowshoers like the woodsy backcountry trekking and trails that crisscross through the forest.

The yurt is secluded and tucked under tall ponderosa pines.

Skyline Yurt Distance: 2.5 miles.

Trail: Groomed.

Elevation gain: 650 feet of steady climbing. Dogs: Allowed.

Why people like it: It's located on a knoll surrounded by pine trees right off the groomed Skyline Trail, a popular loop used by Nordic skiers and snowshoers.

The yurt also provides easy access to more than 20 miles of groomed trails and more marked Nordic trails.

It offers great views that some say are the best in the in the Crooked River drainage. There aren't too many hills for Telemarking, but you can ski the ungroomed trail from the yurt back toward the parking lot.

The yurt is in a woodsy area, but it sits on an open knoll with mountain views.

The parking lot is shared by skiers, snowshoers and snowmobilers.

Idaho City yurts

About them: There are six backcountry yurts about one to three miles from Idaho 21 parking lots. Each yurt sleeps six to nine people.

Getting there: The yurts are 56 to 63 miles from Boise. It's about 1.5 hours of driving time in winter.

Availability: Idaho City yurts are popular and weekends are booked through March. However, if you can break away during the week, there are openings available.

You can reserve a yurt nine months out, so it's important to start thinking about next winter.

Prices: From Nov. 1 to April 30, \$75 for a week night and \$90 for a weekend night.

From May 1 to Oct. 31, \$55 for a week night and \$65 for a weekend night.

(Weekday nights are Monday through Thursday. Weekend nights are Friday through Sunday.) There is a \$12 nonrefundable reservation fee charged at the time of booking.

Rentals are for up to six people. There is an additional \$12 fee per person, per night for more than six people, with a maximum of nine people allowed. Reservations: parksandrecreation.idaho.gov/activities/vurts

They are spread across 10 square miles in an area between Idaho City and Lowman near Beaver Creek and Mores Creek summits.

Plan several winters in advance and give each yurt a try. Here's a quick look at them:

BEAVER CREEK SUMMIT Stargaze Yurt Distance: 1.2 miles.

Trail: Not groomed. Breaking trail can be difficult.

Elevation gain: 680 feet. It's a steady climb all the way in from the parking lot and not for the faint-hearted.

Ridge Yurt because you pass the turnoff to that yurt. Once past that point, you continue on the groomed trail through rolling terrain. It's the longest trek of all the yurts.

Dogs: Not allowed in winter.

Why people like it: It's got a huge party deck. Well, that's part of it.

The Elkhorn Yurt is located off the Elkhorn Loop Trail for Nordic skiers who want to go the distance.

There is plenty of terrain for snowshoers who want to get off trail, too.

This yurt is the most remote of all the Idaho City yurts, and if you want to be reBoise National Forest. You can see Pilot Peak from the outhouse.

WHOOP UM UP TRAILS Rocky Ridge Yurt Distance: 1.75 miles.

Trail: Not groomed. Breaking trail can be difficult.

Elevation gain: 150 feet. Most of the elevation gain is right out of the parking lot. Most of the trail is level with a few gradual ups and downs. It's great for beginner snowshoers.

Dogs: Allowed.

Why people like it: It's easy terrain for off-trail snowshoe trekking. You'll find lots of rock formations

Feb. 23 at Canyon Crest Event Center in Twin Falls. Last year, the chapter raised \$20,000 for Ducks Unlimit ed at the Twin Falls event. Fehringer said members hope to raise just as much, if not more again this year.

What is Ducks Unlimited?

Ducks Unlimited was started by a group of sportsmen in 1937 during the Dust Bowl when waterfowl populations decreased dramatically.

Is it only for duck hunters?

Though a number of hunters join Ducks Unlimited, Fehringer said there are a lot of members who don't hunt.

"There's a fair number of people in Ducks Unlimited that like to see the birds and conserve them for future generations," Fehringer said.

On Jan. 22, members of the Magic Valley chapter met at Idaho Pizza in Twin Falls to plan for the upcoming banquet.

Julie Klundt attended the meeting. She and her husband, Waylon Klundt, have been members of Ducks Unlimited for 18 years.

"My husband's a duck hunter and I'm just a supporter," Klundt said. "They leave too early at o'darkthirty. Just knowing that they enjoy it and are having fun and it (Ducks Unlimited) keeps it going," Klundt said.

What is the mission of Ducks Unlimited and why is it important?

Ducks Unlimited's mission is habitat conservation.

The organization states that wetlands improve the overall health of our environment by recharging and purifying groundwater, moderating floods and reducing soil erosion. Wetlands also provide habitat to more than 900 wildlife species and provide recreation opportunities for people too.

Can youth get involved? Fehringer has recruited members of his family in the organization's cause.

His wife, two daughters and four grandchildren are all involved with Ducks Unlimited. Three of his grandchildren are part of the organization's Greenwing membership for children age 17 or younger.

The Magic Valley chapter had planned a cleanup in Hagerman Feb. 10 with both adult and youth members, but snow canceled the event.

How does Ducks Unlimited benefit Idaho?

"We also provide ongoing

technical assistance at Market Lake, Mud Lake, Niagara Springs and Hagerman Wildlife Management Area, as well as Camas National Wildlife Refuge," Colson said. In the Magic Valley, projects besides the Minidoka National Wildlife Refuge include four in Hagerman, one in Bliss and one in Declo. All but the Declo one are completed; it will start construction this summer.



Big Game Meetings Planned for March

JEROME • The Idaho Department of Fish and Game will hold three public meetings the first week of March in south-central Idaho regarding 2013 big game seasons and rules.

Meetings to gather comment will be held March 4 at The Community School at 1 Community School Drive in Sun Valley, March 5 at the Best Western Burley Inn and Convention Center at 800 N. Overland Ave., and March 6 at the regional Fish and Game office east of Jerome on U.S. Highway 93. The meetings will run from 5:30-7:30 p.m. each day.

Items of particular interest to the Magic Valley Region include four new hunts to reduce elk depredation.

Fish and Game officials ask the public to bring thoughts and ideas. Comments taken at the meetings will be summarized and presented to the Idaho Fish and Game Commission when it sets big game seasons at its March 19 meeting.

F&G Website Down for Move

BOISE • The Idaho Department of Fish and Game's website will be shut down for about 24 hours starting at 6 p.m. Friday, Feb. 15.

That's to allow several Fish and Game bureaus to move between offices in Boise.

The Idaho Fish and Wildlife Information System will also be down during the move. But it won't affect license, tag and controlled hunt application sales at vendors around the state and at id.outdoorcentral.us.

Fish and Game's communications, information systems, engineering, human resources and administrative staff will move to less expensive and more efficient offices in the Washington Group Plaza between Broadway and Parkcenter Boulevard for part of its operation.

Other staff offices, including public services, are in the main headquarters building on South Walnut Street.

Light Goose Season Opens Saturday JEROME • The spring light

goose season opens Saturday, Feb. 16, and will run through March 10 through much of southern and eastern Idaho.

The bag limit on Ross' and snow geese in areas 2 and 3 is 10 per day and 20 in possession.

Area 2 includes Bingham County west of the west bank of the Snake River and the American Falls Reservoir bluff; Power County north of Interstate 86 and west of the west bank of the Snake River, and the American Falls Reservoir bluff. (See the map on page 11 of the Waterfowl Rules Seasons and brochure.)

Area 3 includes Ada, Boise, Canyon, Cassia, Elmore, Gem, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka, Owyhee, Payette, Twin Falls and Washington counties.

Though inadvertently omitted from the waterfowl rules brochure, several wildlife areas are closed during the season, including the Fort Boise Wildlife Management Area including Gold Island, Payette River Wildlife Management Area and the part of Roswell Marsh Wildlife Habitat Area south of State Highway 18, and the Snake River Islands Unit of the Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge.

In addition, the restrictions on hunting waterfowl with a shotgun capable of holding more than three shells, unless it is plugged with a one-piece filler, and on the use of electronic calls do not apply during this season. Only nontoxic shot approved by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service may be used while hunting waterfowl. For a list of approved shot visit www.fws.gov/migratorybirds/CurrentBirdIssues/nontoxic.htm.

Hunters need a 2013 huntinglicense and a 2013 state migratory bird permit. Last year's federal duck stamp is still valid for spring 2013 hunting.

Despite Numbers, Burton Still Bullish on Boarding

DENVER • Three decades after snowboarders barged their way onto the mountain, Shaun White is a household name and the sight of an iPod-wearing teenager carving turns down the hills of a family resort doesn't even raise an eyebrow.

Those are good things, industry leaders say, because snowboarding is now firmly entrenched in the mainstream it once disdained.

Those are bad things, those leaders also say, because snowboarding is susceptible to the same ups-and-downs other snow sports face - especially since the Great Recession hit in late 2007.

Recent studies by industry groups show snowboarding is no longer growing at the relentless pace that defined much of its first 30 years. Sales in 2011-12 fell between 19 and 31 percent, depending on the region of the country studied. Participation fell 7.5 percent nationwide.

Jake Burton, the man who perfected the modernday snowboard and brought it to the masses back in the 1980s, recently sent a letter to his employees stating his concern about the trends but downplaying the wellcirculated idea that snowboarding is losing its edge.

"I take exceptions to some of the comments and people trying to reach conclusions," Burton said in an interview with The Associated Press at the annual Snowsport Industries America Snow Show. "Last year was an incredibly rough year for snow sports in general. It just didn't snow anywhere across the country. Skiing took a hit. Snowboarding took a hit. Everyone took a hit."

Indeed, warm weather and light snowfall around the country caused a big downturn in snow sports;

participation in alpine skiing also fell – by 11.4 percent, according to a study by RRC Associates, also known as the Kottke National End of the Season Survey.

Burton, however, also recognizes the need to be more active in bringing people into snowboarding.

"We were relying for so long on just this magnetism of snowboarding," he said. "Now, we've got to work harder to figure out how to get more kids in the products and more women into the sport. It's a wakeup call?

The SIA statistics show 65 percent of snowboarders are males, while 72 percent of the boys are between 13 and 34.

Eleven percent of skiers fall in the 6-12 age group, while that group makes up 10 percent of snowboarders.

There are no statistics for kids under 6. Burton wants to see on snowboards almost as soon as they can walk.

As the core group of Burton employees have grown older and had kids, they've looked for ways to realize that. Among them is a contraption called the riglet essentially a leash that parents can attach to their young children's snowboards to keep them close and help them stay upright.

The snowboards themselves are being built smaller, geared for young children. New, kid-sized terrain parks are also being added at some resorts. The main message here: Snowboarding is hard to pick up and the industry has to do more to help kids get involved.

Another factor in snowboarding's lower numbers is that all the edgy pastimes that used to be exclusively for snowboarders have made their way into the ski world, as well. Skiers ride on halfpipes, go down slopestyle courses. The curvier, sidecut technology that was once unique to snowboards made its way to skis, as has much of the sensible, young-looking gear that used to be exclusively for snowboarders.

While White goes for his third straight gold medal in the halfpipe next year at the Sochi Olympics, he'll share the halfpipe with skiers, who will make their debut there. Slopestyle is being introduced for both snowboarding and skiing. In short, action sports are, more than ever, the domain of both skiers and snowboarders, not only the latter.

"I think there was a huge wave of popularity for snowboarding, probably a decade ago," said Chris Stiepock, the vice president of ESPN's X Games events. "Then, the ski technology changed, so you had twin tips and skiers could start to ski backward and go into jumps backward."

Tom Wallisch, the 2012 Winter X Games champion in skiing slopestyle, represents the highest level of a growing number of athletes who experimented on skateboards and snowboards as a kid, but eventually found he could enjoy all the same opportunities on skis.





Bassist Rick Huxley of Dave Clark Five Dies

LONDON (AP) • Bass player Rick Huxley, one of the founding members of the Dave Clark Five, has died. He was 72.

Clark announced Huxley's death Tuesday, saying the news was "devastating."

Huxley played on the band's signature hits from the era when they briefly rivaled the Beatles in popularity. They were part of the British invasion that included the Rolling Stones, The Kinks and other bands.

Their best-known songs included "Bits and Pieces" and "Glad All Over." They enjoyed a large following in the United States after appearances on The Ed Sullivan Show, the Sunday night television show that also introduced the Beatles to American audiences.

The band, with a middle-of-the-road pop rock sound, was known for drummer Clark's driving beat and exuberant vocals. But it faded after several years when harder-edged bands such as Cream, the Jimi Hendrix Experience and the Doors rose to popularity. The Dave Clark Five broke up in 1970 after 12 years together.

They were inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 2008.

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Germany Considers Buying Armed Drones

BERLIN • The debate over the legality of drone warfare is stretching from Capitol Hill into the shadow of the Brandenburg Gate, as

Germany mulls buying armed drones for the

first time. Ever since World War II, Germany has been skeptical about military deployments, mindful of its own history of inflicting violence on others. New plans to equip the military with armed drones have caused an uproar this month in this pacifist country, with many Germans worrying that possessing the weaponry could lead them more quickly into conflict. Defense officials, meanwhile, say soldiers and civilians would be safer with drones to back them up. The debate is one that has only slowly taken shape in the United States, where drone technology has become essential to U.S. war and counterterrorism strategies in recent years while remaining deeply shrouded in secrecy. In Germany, by contrast, politicians, religious leaders and citizens have been preemptively dissecting the implications of weaponry that enables soldiers to make pinpoint strikes against terrorism suspects while sitting many thousands of miles away. "Once such technical devices are purchased, it'll be too late to discuss ethical questions," said Rainer Arnold, the spokesman for defense issues of the opposition Social Democratic Party. The discussion, which has dominated German talk shows and newspapers since a disclosure of the plans in response to parliamentary questioning late last month, comes at the same time that U.S. drone policy has been under the microscope. Starting under President George W. Bush and dramatically accelerated under President Barack Obama, drones have become a central pillar of CIA and U.S. military activities in the Middle East and North Africa. German Defense Minister Thomas de Maiziere, speaking in his first interview with an international publication since the controversy erupted, said he was "surprised" by the opposition to his proposal. "Ethically and legally there is no difference between a manned and an unmanned airplane," de Maiziere said. "Rationally, I don't fully understand the intensity of the debate," he said. "Politically, psychologically, it is easily explained. This is a surrogate debate on how the U.S. is using drones. And from the way the Americans use them, people are deciding negatively on the operating tool itself." He said the American practice of so-called targeted killings of terrorism suspects would be against the German constitution, which tightly restricts when the military is allowed to engage in combat. "Nobody will change the constitution for the usage of one type of weapon," he said, speaking in his office in the Bendlerblock, the operations center of the German Defense Ministry that once served as the planning lair of a failed plot against Hitler. "America has a different constitutional situation." Germany remains deeply cautious about going to war. After World War II, generations resolved to lock away the militarism that they

felt was ingrained in Prussian culture. The 1949 constitution bans preparations for wars of aggression — in fact, the only accommodation for military action is made in a "state of defense."

"In Germany we have a specific responsibility, with our history of two world wars launched by Germany and one peaceful revolution, to take up the role of searching for alternatives," said Renke Brahms, the peace commissioner of the Protestant Church of Germany.

To this day, men and women in uniform are treated with suspicion by many in broader society. Attitudes have slowly evolved since German reunification in 1990, with the first post-World War II combat deployment Get your local news, sports, weather, advertisments and classifieds

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in Kosovo in 1999, then in Afghanistan.

De Maiziere has pushed to make the armed forces' role in German society more like that of any other military since he took up his post in early 2011, including advocating the institution of a veterans' day. That proposal proved controversial because the country can't even agree on the definition of "veteran."

But the country still goes to war reluctantly. Germany held back from participating in the NATO aerial campaign in Libya that drove out leader Moammar Gaddafi, and it has given only non-combat support to France in its weeks-old deployment in Mali. Many here are cautious about anything that might make it easier to go fight.

"Having these weapons is temptation for politicians to use them. This is the experience with the U.S.," said Juergen Trittin, a leader of the Green Party, who is a candidate for chancellor. "The threshold for using military force, for using deadly violence, goes down with such an instrument, because the risks for using it go down."

Even some proponents of the technology say that they assume that the weapons, if purchased, could be used for strikes against terrorism suspects, not just for ordinary combat.

"When you buy a drone, you know what it's all about and what it can do," said Michael Wolffsohn, a professor emeritus at the Bundeswehr University Munich, which is affiliated with Germany's military. "It's the best humane instrument if and when you have to face the terrible decision to use force."

Germany has 60 unarmed surveillance drones currently deployed in Kosovo and Afghanistan, according to formal answers to parliamentary questions that were released last month. Several of them are Israeli-made Heron drones. An additional 347 drones are on German territory, mostly lightweight ones that can be launched by hand, according to the official answers. Those drones are used by both police and the military for surveillance.

German defense officials have said they would prefer to develop a European drone in concert with France, but that they would also consider leasing or purchasing off-theshelf ones in the short term, including American models.

Dassault, a French defense contractor, tested a stealth drone in December, but it is not ready for production. Britain flies U.S.made armed drones in Afghanistan, and Italy has sought to do so. Riverhawks Claim District Wrestling Title

TWIN FALLS • Throughout the day, as Canyon Ridge continued to pile up points in the 4A District IV tournament, head wrestling coach Justin Pehrson pretended not to hear the score updates from principal Brady Dickinson, even as his Riverhawks built a sizable advantage heading into the championship round.

"I covered my ears," Pehrson said. "He kept saving we had a good chance, we had a chance. I just had to focus on getting the kids through."

By the end of the day, Pehrson had the 4A District IV championship nestled tightly to his chest.

"This is going home (for the night)," he said.

The Riverhawks won their first team district championship in school history, besting second place Minico by close to 70 points. It had three individual district champions – Zaide Slotten at 126 pounds, Daniel Hernandez at 145 pounds and Ismael Andrade at 170 pounds, but so did Jerome, Wood River and Twin Falls.

Canyon Ridge won with its depth, with a tournament-high 17 placers.

"Keeping kids out was our goal to start with and it's really paid off," Pehrson said. "Today happened because everybody showed up and did their job. For some, their job was to not get pinned, for others it was to go all the way."

Slotten previously lost to Jerome's Julio Jara, but pinned him in the second round Wednesday with a powerhouse move.

"I'm not really surprised with how we wrestled today," Slotten said. "We were at our best today."

Hernandez, who has been up and down at junior varsity all year, outlasted Twin Falls' Braxton Perkins to win by decision.

"As long as you work hard, you can where you want," Hernandez said. "I honestly think I've always been a hard working kid. I just out-worked him. He ran out of gas."

Prior to districts, Hernandez' primary role was making teammates better in practice. It turns out, they were making him pretty good, too.

"The kid is fun to watch, he used to struggle a lot, I wasn't

sure if he would ever figure it out but he did and it was because of his work ethic," Pehrson said.

"Igot dinged twice for stalling but we just battled it out for the last 40 seconds," Bailey said. "It was a brutal match."

But it was also one of the

most entertaining. "They are fun to watch, but I'm guessing they aren't fun to be a part of," Pehrson said. At 220 pounds, Austin

Gilbert upset No.1 seed, Canyon Ridge's Cameran Bartlett, his former teammate at Jerome, pinning him with a half-nelson in the third round.

"At the beginning I was like, I'm not sure I can beat him, but I'm sure going to try," Gilbert said. "So I got through the first round and I almost got him to his back in first round and I was like, 'Okay, this is mine?"

Local Wrestling Figures React to Olympic Axe

WENDELL • Lawrence Gillette, coach of two-time defending Class 2A state wrestling champion Declo, was incredulous.

"That's crazy. How could they take it out? It's been around for centuries," he said.

"They" is the International Olympic Committee. "It" is wrestling, which was put on the chopping block Tuesday. Barring a change of heart or reinstatement via a vote later this year, one of the founding sports of the modern Olympic games will be absent after the 2016 games in Rio de Janeiro.

Already the wrestling community has banded together to lobby the IOC to reverse course. Still, it looks like wrestling will face a vote

against other sports waiting to be added (or re-added, like baseball and softball) in order to be preserved.

Golf and rugby sevens will debut in 2016.

"There is a lot of disappointment. It is one of the original Olympic sports, and so to cut that because of revenue shows what the Olympics are going to, which is 'How do we make money on this?" said Canyon Ridge coach Justin Pehrson. "In other sports there is a professional avenue, but in wrestling there isn't, so Olympics was the goal, the dream. It helps the kids push, and now that dream is in jeopardy of being gone."

Gillette said he hopes the decision is reversed, but that he also doesn't expect much effect on the sport's popularity at a local level. According to National Federation of State High School Associations figures, wrestling is the sixth most popular sport for boys at the high school level, with more than 272,000 participants nationwide.

It's also the third most successful medal sport for Americans at the summer games, behind swimming and track and field - two sports in which there are far more events in which to medal.

"I think it's sad that they're taking that sport away from the Olympics because that's the one thing that our college wrestlers had to look forward to after college. Now there's nothing. It hurts our sport," said Rick Stimpson, former District IV wrestling commissioner and current president of Idaway, a statewide nonprofit organization promoting amateur folk style wrestling in Idaho.

Even if the IOC proceeds and wrestling is formally dropped later this year, Stimpson sees a potential silver lining that could strengthen the sport.

"What it could do, if USA (Wrestling) reformed and took all that money and focus back into the collegiate style, it's going to put more focus back onto folk style and create more wrestling opportunities for our kids, which would benefit our state tremendously," he said. "If that happens, it's great for our state. If it doesn't, (the IOC's decision) won't affect our state at all."



Felix Hernandez Signs 7-year Deal with Mariners

SEATTLE • Fighting back tears while his hands trembled, Felix Hernandez signed a seven-year contract with the Seattle Mariners on Wednesday that made him the highest-paid pitcher in baseball.

Hernandez officially completed his new deal during a news conference. The \$175 million pact covered the final two years of his existing deal that was scheduled to run through the 2014 season and added five additional years through the 2019 season.

The contract is fully guaranteed, Mariners general manager Jack Zduriencik said. Hernandez also got a full no-trade clause, the first one ever given by the franchise.

Hernandez's representative, Scotty Pucino, said the no-trade was among the most important aspects of the contract.

"To the people in Seattle, to all the people in Seattle that trust me, that believe in me I will not disappoint anybody," Hernandez said, his voice cracking.



Jacques Rogge to Meet with Wrestling Leader

LAUSANNE, Switzerland • Facing a wave of criticism from around the world, IOC President Jacques Rogge will meet with the head of wrestling's governing body to discuss ways the sport can fight to save its place in the Olympics.

The IOC executive board dropped wrestling from the program of the 2020 Games on Tuesday, a decision which brought a sharp backlash from wrestling organizations and national ratified by the full International Olympic Committee in September, giving wrestling time to try to overturn a decision against a sport which dates back to the ancient Olympics and has been featured since the inaugural modern games in 1896.

Rogge said Wednesday he has been contacted by Raphael Martinetti, the Swiss president of international wrestling federation FILA, and was encouraged by the sport's resolve to make changes and fight for its place.

"We agreed we would meet at the first opportunity

reacted well to this disheartening news for them.

"They vowed to adapt the sport and vowed to fight to be eventually included in the 2020 slot."

Wrestling, which remains on the program for the 2016 Olympics in Rio de Janeiro, still has a chance to stay on the list for 2020 - if it manages to respond decisively to the wakeup call and convince the IOC to reverse course.

"This is not the end of the day. The door is not closed," IOC Vice President Thomas Bach of Germany said. "It's good to see the reaction of FILA to say, 'OK we have understood, we have to do something and we will present a plan for the future of wrestling? That is the right attitude."

Wrestling now joins seven other sports vying for one opening on the 2020 program: a combined bid from baseball and softball, karate, squash, roller sports, sport climbing, wakeboarding and the martial art of wushu.

The IOC executive board will meet in May in St. Petersburg, Russia, to decide which sport or sports to propose for 2020 inclusion. The final vote will be made at the IOC general assembly in September in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

Kentucky's Noel Out for Season with Torn ACL

LEXINGTON, Ky. • Kentucky received the news it dreaded Wednesday when freshman forward Nerlens Noel was declared out for the season with a torn ligament in his left knee.

Noel tore his ACL on Tuesday night when No. 25 Kentucky lost at Florida. An MRI revealed the injury, and the 6-foot-10 forward will have surgery in the next two or three weeks.

The projected recovery period is six to eight months.

Noel's injury deals a serious postseason blow for the defending national champions, who had appeared to be gaining some footing after struggling earlier this season while trying to blend in four freshmen. Leading the way defensively for the Wildcats was Noel, who began Tuesday first in the nation with 4.5 blocks per game.

The rookie took a positive approach to the diagnosis, posting on Twitter, "Minor setback for a MAJOR comeback! I love you all and can't thank y'all enough for the prayers."

Noel was hurt with 8 minutes left in the Wildcats' 69-52 loss to the seventh-ranked Gators. He ran into the basket support after blocking a layup from behind. Noel landed awkwardly, dropped to the floor and started screaming while clutching his knee.

Noel had eight points, six rebounds and three blocks before the injury.

"I met with Nerlens earlier today. The meeting was really positive, and I loved his attitude. The way he is already dealing with this injury lets me know that he is going to come back stronger than ever. ... Obviously this is not a career-ending injury and it's one that athletes bounce back from all the time."

The question is if Kentucky (17-7, 8-3 Southeastern Conference) can bounce back from the devastating loss.

With Noel out, 7-footer Willie Cauley-Stein now must man the post for Kentucky after spending most of the season as Noel's backup. Cauley-Stein missed four games last month after having a procedure on his left knee, an absence that meant even more minutes for Noel.

The Everett, Mass., native clearly relished the extra work, which gave him a chance to display an array of skills. Besides his shot-blocking prowess, Noel was averaging 10.6 points, 9.5 rebounds and 2.1 steals per game, with the latter two statistics both ranking 26th nationally.



ANSWER: You certainly have enough to drive to game, but your absence of aces should concern you in five clubs. Best is to bid three no-trump now and not worry about the spades. 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

Earlier, chief U.N. weapons inspector Hans Blix told the Council his teams had not found any weapons of mass destruction in Iraq. "Dolly" the cloned sheep was put down after premature aging and disease marred her short, six-year existence and raised questions about the practicality of copying life. Five years ago: A former student dressed in black walked onto the stage of a lecture hall at Northern Illinois University and opened fire on a packed science class; Steven Kazmierczak killed five students before committing suicide. Republican campaign dropout Mitt Romney endorsed John Mc-Cain for the party's presidential nomination. One year ago: A fire broke out at the Comayagua farm prison in Honduras, killing 361 inmates. "Linsanity" continued as Knicks sensation Jeremy Lin made a tiebreaking 3-pointer with less than a second to play to cap his finishing flurry of six straight points and New York rallied to beat the Raptors 90-87, extending its winning streak to six games. Malachy the Pekingese wobbled off with best in show at the Westminster Kennel Club in New York.

The tobacco industry has done a huge disservice to young people by marketing their products to them – and not just in the form of cigarettes, but also with flavored chewing tobacco, which is equally addictive. According to the U.S. Surgeon General, nearly 90 percent of smokers start by age 18.

In 2006, U.S. District Judge Gladys E. Kessler of Washington, D.C., ruled the major cigarette manufacturers were guilty of fraud and racketeering under the federal RICO Act. (When the tobacco companies appealed, the Supreme Court rejected it without comment.)

She wrote that for more than 50 years the tobacco industry "lied, misrepresented and deceived the American public, including smokers and the young people they avidly sought as 'replacement smokers; about the devastat -

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
