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BURLEY • It takes more than a little snow and some stiff wind to deter the Future Farmers of America.

Twenty-six tractors, lawnmowers, forklifts and backhoes filled with Burley FFA members paraded down Parke Avenue to Burley High School on Wednesday in celebration of National FFA week.

"This is the best day of the year," said Lex Godfrey, who teaches agricultural science at BHS, as he watched the tractors while standing in the stinging wind.

Beverly Searle, former member of the FFA advisory committee, provided an extra set of hands for the events scattered throughout the day.

"I think, especially for the boys, it's kind of a prideful thing to show off their tractors," Searle said.

There were 20 tractors in

the parking lot last year. This year there were 26.

"Everyone looks forward to driving their tractors to school," said Chrystal Godfrey, FFA member.

Burley FFA President Kelsey Rogers said the tractor tradition was started back in 2000-2001 by former FFA member McCord Larsen, who now serves on the advisory committee.

Larsen, now an attorney in Burley, said the idea wasn't exactly original, but he was

probably responsible for encouraging his fellow FFA officers to participate.

As an FFA member in high school, Larsen participated in the group's public speak-

ing activities.

"It definitely gave me some of the skills I use in my career today. We live in a community that is based on agriculture," Larsen said. "I

think a lot of people don't realize that FFA is the premier youth leadership organization in the country."

Larsen said most of the FFA officers from his senior year went on to have varied and successful careers.

"FFA is not just about production agriculture but all facets of it," Larsen said. "Agriculture is an important part of Idaho."

Man Found Guilty in Sexual Battery Trial

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TWIN FALLS • After a three-week trial where a man representing himself called dozens of witnesses, a jury returned its verdict to a full courtroom Wednesday evening.

In the case against a Twin Falls man accused of having a sexual relationship with a 16-year-old girl, the jury unanimously found Robert Brackett guilty on all counts except one. The jury was undecided on one count — sexual battery of a minor.

Brackett, 44, was found guilty of five counts of sexual battery of a minor and eight counts of possession of child pornography.

A sentencing hearing is

scheduled for May 3 in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

Brackett has been representing himself in the case and said he would be appealing the verdict.

Stocks Drop Following Stimulus Doubts

NEW YORK (AP) • The stock market posted its biggest loss this year on news that Federal Reserve officials suggested the central bank scale back its effort to keep borrowing costs low.

Several Fed policymakers worried that the bank's program of buying \$85 billion of bonds each month could eventually unsettle financial markets or cause the bank to take losses.

The S&P 500 index sank 18.99 points to 1,511.95, a loss off 1.2 percent. That's the biggest one-day drop since Nov. 14, 2012.

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T.F. Stalls over Marijuana Resolution

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TWIN FALLS • Legalizing marijuana isn't currently a threat in Idaho but that isn't keeping some state and local lawmakers from trying to pass increased opposition measures.

On Tuesday, the Twin Falls City Council discussed signing a resolution opposing the legalization of marijuana and urging the federal government to enforce existing drug laws. However, council members decided to hold off from making a decision until they heard both sides of the issue.

The council's discussion came on the eve of a Senate State Affairs Committee debate addressing an anti-marijuana resolution with almost the same exact wording.

In it, the resolution opposed legalizing marijuana in Idaho for any purpose, along with sending a letter to Congress to encourage the federal government to enforce federal drug laws in neighboring states.

What You Said

In response to the City Council's discussion to oppose legalizing marijuana in Idaho, some readers voiced support of legalizing medicinal marijuana on the *Times-News'* Facebook page. Here were some of the replies:

Marjorie Walker Hansen: Why would they oppose it? I hope they hear from people who truly need it, like glaucoma patients or people dealing with cancer.

Jared Henson: They would be ignorant to oppose this ... they need to educate themselves and stop being biased ... would you rather be loaded up on chemical pills that lead to all kinds of problems?

Laurel Rodney Haycraft: There are FAR worse substances out there, including alcohol, which is LEGAL.

Dr. David McClusky of Twin Falls testified in favor of the two proposals. From a medical standpoint, "there's no legitimacy for legalizing marijuana," he said, calling it a gateway drug. At the Mustard Tree Clinic in Twin Falls, McClusky said, he sees two or three meth users every week, most of whom started after using marijuana, he said.

Others from around the state testified against the two proposals, saying marijuana helps control pain, depression and other ailments.

Regardless of why people are using it — and how other states regulate it — cannabis is still illegal in Idaho. Since Oregon and California legalized medical marijuana and Washington legalized possession of marijuana in small amounts for adults older than 21, more cannabis has made its way into Idaho, said Detective Matt Gonzales with the Twin Falls Police Department.

The increase in marijuana possession citations isn't limited to border communities. Twin Falls has seen a significant increase, Gonza-

les said, mostly from people who buy it from friends who get it from medical marijuana dispensaries.

"It usually stems from Oregon or California," he said.

For the council, the resolution was brought to them just two weeks after listening to an anti-marijuana presentation from a representative of the Idaho Office of Drug Policy.

During the presentation, Elisha Figueroa warned of the dangerous impacts marijuana has on the health and safety on an individual and the community.

While she said that her office is confident Idaho legislatures won't pass any kind of legalization of marijuana, she expressed concern of marijuana becoming a voter referendum issue.

The council is now interested in listening to a presentation from a pro-marijuana organization like Compassionate Idaho, said Mayor Greg Lanting.

"We should listen to both sides of the issue before making a decision," Lanting said.

Another Round of Snow on the Way

The snow we received Wednesday was just round one with more snow likely as we go into the end of the week and the weekend. The next system arrives Friday night into Saturday morning and could have as much, if not more, snow than what we saw Wednesday.

Before the next system arrives, we will see dry conditions today with a mix of sunshine and clouds. Temperatures will warm to the upper 30s, which is about five degrees below average.

Tonight, a warm front will lift across the region. This will bring a chance of light snow to the area but shouldn't amount to more than an inch or two.

The warm front will also bring warmer, seasonal temperatures for Friday as highs get back into the low 40s. These warmer temperatures won't last as this warmer push of air is out ahead of a much stronger storm system that will be moving out of the Gulf of Alaska and arriving Friday night into Saturday.

Too early for specific snow amounts for Friday night into Saturday but what we do know is the potential is there for roughly two to four inches of snow if not more Saturday. Winds will also be very strong and gusty with some gusts of 40 to 50



mph. If you have travel plans for this weekend you will want to stay updated to this column.

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

The Toll of Solitary Confinement

Zero Dark Thirty, a nominee for Sunday's Oscar as Best Picture, reignited debate about whether the waterboarding of terrorism suspects was torture. This practice, which ended in 2003, was used on only three suspects. Meanwhile, tens of thousands of American prison inmates are kept in protracted solitary confinement that arguably constitutes torture and probably violates the Eighth Amendment prohibition of "cruel and unusual punishments."

Noting that half of all prison suicides are committed by prisoners held in isolation, Sen. Richard Durbin, D-Ill., has prompted an independent assessment of solitary confinement in federal prisons. State prisons are equally vulnerable to Eighth Amendment challenges concerning whether inmates are subjected to "substantial risk of serious harm."

America, with 5 percent of the world's population, has 25 percent of its prisoners. Mass incarceration, which means a perpetual crisis of prisoners re-entering society, has generated understanding of solitary confinement's consequences when used as a long-term condition for an estimated 25,000 inmates in federal and state supermax prisons — and perhaps 80,000 others in isolation sections within regular prisons. Clearly, solitary confinement involves much more than the isolation of incorrigibly violent individuals for the protection of other inmates or prison personnel.

Federal law on torture prohibits conduct "specifically intended to inflict severe physical or mental pain or suffering." And "severe" physical pain is not limited to "excruciating or agonizing" pain, or pain "equivalent in intensity to the pain accompanying serious physical injury, such as organ failure, impairment of bodily functions, or even death." The severe mental suffering from prolonged solitary confinement puts the confined at risk of brain impairment.

Supermax prisons isolate inmates from social contact. Often prisoners are in their cells, sometimes smaller than 8 feet by 12 feet, 23 hours a day, released only for a shower or exercise in a small fenced-in outdoor space. Isolation changes the way the brain works, often making individuals more impulsive, less able to control themselves. The mental pain of solitary confinement is crippling: Brain studies reveal durable impairments and abnormalities in individuals denied social interaction. Plainly put, prisoners often lose their minds.

The first supermax began functioning in Marion, Ill., in 1983. By the beginning of this century there were more than 60 around the nation, and solitary-confinement facilities were in most maximum-security prisons. In an article ("Hellhole") in the March 30, 2009, New Yorker, Atul Gawande, a surgeon who writes on public health issues, noted, "One of the paradoxes of solitary confinement is that, as starved as people become for companionship, the experience typically leaves them unfit for social interaction." And those who are most incapacitated by solitary confinement are forced to remain in it because they have been rendered unfit for "the highly social world of mainline prison or free society." Last year, *The New York Times* reported that of the prisoners sent to solitary confinement in California's Pelican Bay prison because of gang affiliation, "248 have been there for 5 to 10 years; 218 for 10 to 20 years; and 90 for 20 years or more."

Two centuries ago, solitary confinement was considered a humane reform, promoting reflection, repentance — penitence; hence penitentiaries — and rehabilitation. Quakerism influenced the design of Philadelphia's Eastern State Penitentiary, which opened in 1829 with a regime of strict solitude. In 1842, Charles Dickens visited it:

"I hold this slow and daily tampering with the mysteries of the brain, to be immeasurably worse than any torture of the body: and because its ghastly signs and tokens are not so palpable to the eye and sense of touch as scars upon the flesh; because its wounds are not upon the surface, and it extorts few cries that human ears can hear; therefore I the more denounce it, as a secret punishment which slumbering humanity is not roused up to stay."

In 1890, the U.S. Supreme Court said of solitary confinement essentially what Dickens had said: "A considerable number of the prisoners fell, after even a short confinement, into a semi-fatuous condition, from which it was next to impossible to arouse them, and others became violently insane; others, still, committed suicide." Americans should be roused against this by decency — and prudence.


Mass incarceration is expensive (California spends almost twice as much on prisons as on universities) and solitary confinement costs, on average, three times as much per inmate as in normal prisons. And remember: Most persons now in solitary confinement will someday be back on America's streets, some of them rendered psychotic by what are called correctional institutions.



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A Clearer Path to the Polls

The following editorial appeared in Wednesday's Washington Post:

Since November, President Obama has been promising to do something about extremely long voting lines and other shameful Election Day lapses. Last week, he began to make good on his pledge, unveiling "a nonpartisan commission to improve the voting experience in America," headed by Bob Bauer and Benjamin Ginsburg, the lawyers for Mr. Obama's and Mitt Romney's 2012 campaigns, respectively.

The Post's Nia-Malika Henderson and Felicia Sonmez report that critics are already attacking the idea. Conservatives question why the federal government needs to get more involved with voting. Voting-rights activists wonder why the president needs a commission when

he could champion any of the sensible reform proposals already sitting in Congress.

But the commission is a good idea, for at least two reasons.

First, the starting point for federal reform of election procedures, which are typically the responsibility of states and localities, is to establish evidence-based recommendations for state and local officials. That's what the commission will be charged with doing — not imposing mandates. Not that there isn't a good case for federal standard-setting, too; the commission's findings could well provide a solid base on which to contemplate a more active federal role.

Second, separating the politics of election reform from the policy has become extremely difficult. Only a few years ago, members of both parties embraced reforms such as

early voting. Now Democrats support changes to rules and procedures that would make it easier to vote, but Republicans oppose them, and some Republicans have actually tried to make voting more difficult. One voting-reform bill in the House has 167 co-sponsors — every one a Democrat. With a Republican co-chairman leading the president's commission, the resulting recommendations would be more likely to gain GOP support, for reasons of substance and of optics.

The commission's work, though, cannot be the end of the debate. Congress itself should consider establishing more basic standards in federal elections, ensuring that votes aren't collected and counted in unreasonable or inequitable ways from place to place. One need only look at Virginia's recent experience to see why. The last voter to cast

a ballot in Fairfax County had to wait until 10:30 p.m. — 3 1/2 hours after polls closed. Yet Virginia Republicans refused last month even some of the most obvious election reforms already used elsewhere, possibly for fear of encouraging more Democratic-leaning Virginians to vote.

If federal mandates are too much for Congress to accept, lawmakers could look to a bill Sen. Mark Warner, D-Va., and Rep. Gerry Connolly, D-Va., introduced last year that would establish a Race to the Top-like program for election reform, offering federal grants to states that adopt reform packages.

The policymaking window following the reelection of a president is probably the most favorable time for election reform. Mr. Obama's commission probably won't be enough — but it's a good start.

CREWS RESTORE HISTORIC CABIN

DARBY, Mont. (AP) • Sometime last winter, an aging pipe burst in one of the oldest buildings still standing in the West Fork.

It took some time before anyone discovered that water was leaking from the second floor of the ranger's house at the West Fork Ranger Station.

By the time it was found, there was mold growing on the logs, a portion of a maple tongue-and-groove floor was ruined and rust covered the old wood stove.

Bitterroot National Forest historian Mary Williams re-enacted the scene.

"I wasn't sure it could be saved," she said. "My first thought was we are going to have to tear it down."

But that was before members of the U.S. Forest Service's Region 1 Historic Preservation Team arrived on the scene.

"It turned out that this cloud would have a silver lining," she said.

Ole Tangen was a master craftsman when it came to building a log cabin worthy of meeting the worst Montana could throw its way.

"They say he was a notorious poacher, too," Williams said.

Almost 80 years ago, the man with skillful hands and a sharp eye, went to work building a cabin at the site that would become the national forest's West Fork Ranger Station.

Civilian Conservation Corps crews may have helped him hoist the logs into place on the two-story cabin that would house generations of rangers and other employees of the U.S. Forest Service.

The men in charge liked his work so much they hired him to build the very same style of cabin, with an open porch

and two stories, at McGruder and Moose Creek.

"He oversaw the log work on all of those cabins," Williams said. "They are all still standing today."

The cabin at West Fork was called the ranger's house.

C.K. "Lanky" Spaulding might have been the first man to live in the lonely cabin just a short walk off the West Fork of the Bitterroot River. He served as the ranger there for four years starting in 1931.

A man named Stanley Tiltson followed him for the next five years.

"Unfortunately, we don't know much of anything about either Spaulding or Tiltson," Williams said.

The man who followed became a legend of sorts in the West Fork area.

Sam Billings was a World War I veteran who saw action in the U.S. Army's first offensive at the Battle of Cantigny.

He was later gassed with phosgene while rescuing a wounded comrade.

Billings' first stint as forest ranger came on the Kootenai National Forest, where he was responsible for prosecuting some homesteaders called the Pinkham Creekers, who set forest fires in order to get some work to fight them.

IDL: Idaho Could Profit from Federal-land Takeover

BOISE (AP) • Idaho could profit handsomely if it were to win control of millions of acres of federal forest, rangeland and mineral deposits.

That's according to an informal Department of Lands' "napkin" analysis released Tuesday that says Idaho's proceeds from managing an additional 16.4 million acres could run \$51 million to \$75 million annually.

Idaho lawmakers are exploring their options, following Utah's and Arizona's 2012 gambits demanding Washington, D.C., surrender control of U.S. Forest Service, BLM and other federal territory.

Rep. Lawrence Denney and Sen. Monty Pearce, western Idaho Republicans, asked for the Department of Lands' analysis last month.

According to agency calculations, Idaho would generate most of its new revenue from timber sales.

Environmental groups have panned the state-takeover idea, however, saying it's promoted by fringe groups chafing at federal control.

Panel Dumps DUI Memorials Plan for Idaho Roads

BOISE (AP) • Idaho already has plenty of informal memorials to highway fatalities, erected by grieving family members.

But the state isn't slated to get an official, state-sponsored program to honor those killed by drunk drivers, after a House panel rejected the proposal on Wednesday.

Democratic Rep. Shirley Ringo of Moscow brought the plan to the House State Affairs Committee, saying erecting signs to remember victims could warn people about the dangers of driving while drunk.

Ringo was asked to promote the bill on behalf of former Rep. Rep. Tom Trail, who lost a family member in such an accident.

But committee members including Rep. Eric Anderson of Priest Lake worried a proliferation of signs, especially on rural highways where drivers are already on the lookout for wildlife, could be a dangerous distraction.

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
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
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
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
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Closed Roads, Visitor Centers Loom at Some National Parks

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) • Large areas of Yellowstone, Yosemite and Glacier national parks could remain closed to summer traffic weeks later than usual, while visitor centers and campgrounds at several other national parks might have to close under one group's scenario for steep federal budget cuts set to take place starting March 1.

The Coalition of National Park Service Retirees warns of specific closures at 11 national park sites. That includes delayed spring snow plowing in Yellowstone, Yosemite, Glacier and Alaska's Denali National Park. Seasonal road openings also would be delayed in Grand Canyon.

Visitor centers could close in at least three parks: Grand Teton and Mount Rainier national parks and Cape Cod National Seashore.

"The ripple effect will be felt across the entire economy. It's not just a state. It's not just a community," said Joan Anzelmo, a former Colorado National Monument superintendent who is spokeswoman for the retirees' group.

"We haven't seen anything like this before."

The Park Service didn't deny any of it was possible.

"The public should be prepared for reduced hours and services provided by National Park Service employees at 398 national parks, historic sites, monuments and memorials, parkways, trails, preserves and reserves, seashores and lakeshores, recreation areas and national battlefields," Park Service spokesman Jeffrey Olson said in a statement.

Wyoming is set to be especially hard-hit while many Americans begin to think about summer vacation plans. In Yellowstone, hundreds of miles roads are plowed each May as the park transitions from winter snowmobile season to the cars and RVs of summer.

Staffing cuts could delay plowing anywhere from two to four weeks, affecting more than 78,000 visitors and hurting tourism in nearby Jackson and Cody, the group said.

Other routes that wouldn't open on time in late May include Going to the Sun Road, the only road across Glacier National Park. Plowing delays also would postpone opening Yosemite's Tioga and Glacier Point roads up to four weeks.

In Denali, delayed plowing would postpone opening of a road and the park's Eielson

Visitor Center.

Meanwhile, he East Rim and West Rim drives in Grand Canyon would open later than usual in May and hours would be cut back at the Grand Canyon Visitor Center, according to the coalition.

Other cuts predicted by the group would include:

- Grand Teton would close its Jenny Lake Visitor Center, Laurence S. Rockefeller Preserve and Flagg Ranch Visitor Contact Station.
- Great Smoky Mountains National Park would close five campgrounds and picnic areas while cutting back on road maintenance and emergency response capabilities.

- Cape Cod National Seashore's Province Lands Visitor Center could close.

- The Natchez Trace Parkway in Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee would close 25 comfort stations one day a week.

- Mount Rainier National Park would close the Ohanapecosh Visitor Center.

The park service cuts are just a small portion of the federal budget "sequestration" set to take effect as a result of the latest episode of Congress and the White House not agreeing to more modest cuts.

p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 20, and jurors delivered their verdict just before 5 p.m.

After the verdict was read, District Judge Michael Crabtree thanked the jurors for their "exemplary service" during the trial.

During her closing argument Wednesday morning, Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecutor Julie Sturgill said it was clear that the state had proven Brackett had an illegal sexual relationship with the 16-year-old girl.

Sturgill described the alleged relationship as a "perfect setup" for Brackett that fell apart after an argument Brackett and the victim had in January 2011, which eventually led to the girl admitting to the relationship to staff at her high school.

In her argument, Sturgill said Brackett liked that the girl was a slightly ditzy 16-year-old romantic who wrote him poems. He knew she had a crush on him, Sturgill argued.

At the same time, Sturgill

argued that Brackett liked that the girl was smart enough to know she should keep quiet.

After thanking jurors for attending the trial, Brackett launched into his closing argument, which included accusations that detectives and prosecutors lied and manipulated evidence.

Brackett said he would "clear up lies" by Sturgill during his argument.

Repeatedly, Brackett said the jurors hadn't seen all the evidence in the case, nor had they heard the whole truth. Brackett argued several of his witnesses weren't allowed to testify and he was not allowed to put forth a full defense.

"Something's going on," he said.

At one point, Brackett pointed at Twin Falls Police Detective Eric Barzee and accused him of manipulating evidence and changing his testimony throughout the trial.

After Brackett finished, Sturgill began her final closing argument by saying the gist of what Brackett was arguing was that there was a statewide conspiracy

against him, including the judge, Ada and Twin Falls counties, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare and the Twin Falls Police Department.

"The only thing I can say is what arrogance to believe that all these people want to persecute Robert Brackett," she said.

Sturgill said the jury does not get to see everything involved in a case, including things that are irrelevant and hearsay — statements made outside court.

"Somehow there's a huge conspiracy against this very insignificant man," she said, responding to Brackett's argument.

Brackett repeatedly objected during Sturgill's argument and said she was assuming things that aren't in evidence. Crabtree overruled the objections and said that the jury should rely on their own memories of what the evidence in the case was.

"Robert Brackett committed these crimes and the state has proved it beyond a reasonable doubt," Sturgill said, completing her final argument.

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

"Agriculture is such a big thing," she said. "FFA week is about educating the world about the importance of agriculture in our lives."

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

CREWS SEARCH FOR VICTIMS IN EXPLODED KC RESTAURANT

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) • Search crews at the site of a massive explosion that destroyed a popular Kansas City, Mo., restaurant recovered a body Wednesday, and the mayor said the rubble could be concealing other victims.

Mayor Sly James declined to say whether the body was that of a man or a woman, though authorities have been looking for a missing woman who worked at JJ's restaurant and was seen there before the Tuesday evening blast. They previously said she was the only person still unaccounted for after the explosion and fire.

But James said at a news conference Wednesday that authorities

can't be "100 percent sure" they have accounted "for every single person that may have been at JJ's when the explosion occurred." The search started without a list of people who were in the building.

Crews using flashlights, cadaver dogs and heavy equipment were racing to finish the search ahead of a winter storm that was expected to bring heavy snow.

The explosion occurred after a construction crew apparently struck a natural gas line, touching off a blast that could be felt for nearly a mile. It shattered glass in nearby buildings and sent an ominous smoke plume above the outdoor shopping district.

Fifteen people were injured. Six

were still hospitalized Wednesday, James said.

The restaurant was a beloved fixture on the city's culinary scene for more than 27 years. Locals knew it as a prime after-work stop, though it won a broader reputation after receiving consistently high ratings from contributors to Zagat's restaurant guides, both for its food and its long wine list. The blast happened around 6 p.m. Tuesday, when the dinner crowd would have been filing into JJ's and the many other restaurants in the upscale Country Club Plaza shopping and dining district.

Fire Chief Paul Berardi said the precise cause of the gas leak is still under investigation.

Firefighters received a call about 5:15 p.m. that a construction worker had hit a gas line near the restaurant, and they conferred with employees of Missouri Gas Energy, which supplies the area. It wasn't clear Wednesday how hard firefighters or utility officials worked to evacuate the restaurant after gas was first noticed. Both James and Berardi said the fire department deferred to MGE since the utility would have more expertise in assessing the seriousness of the situation.

The fire department "does not do gas, MGE does gas," James said. "Everybody wants to know what happened. Everybody wants to blame someone. Everybody wants to

know details. That's not going to happen today."

A construction project had been going on across a narrow, one-way street from JJ's for seven years. But it was not clear Wednesday whether that work was connected to the contractor that MGE said had been underground. MGE planned to issue a statement later Wednesday. The Missouri Public Service Commission, which oversees utilities, launched an investigation into the blast, dispatching five employees to the site.

Commission Chairman Kevin Gunn said preliminary information indicates that gas pipelines had been marked as required.

Joe Biden Honors Police, Firefighters with Medals of Valor

WASHINGTON (AP) • The incident started with a search for a colleague who went missing in Florida's Osceola County Jail.

It ended when Reeshemah Taylor lunged at an inmate holding a gun to her head, throwing herself on top of her much larger attacker, disarming him and sparing countless lives in the process. Officials later said the inmate's plan that summer day in 2009 was clear: Walk out of the jail dressed as an officer and shoot anyone who got in his way.

That deadly scenario never played out, and Taylor on Wednesday received the Medal of Valor for her role in averting it, along with 17 other police officers, firefighters and public safety officers granted the nation's highest honor for risking their own safety to save or protect others.

There were more tears than smiles at the somber, bitter-sweet ceremony. Four of the recipients died in the line of duty, their actions remembered by family members and friends. Biden recalled the death of his own wife and daughter in a car accident, and he consoled the spouses and colleagues who accepted the awards on behalf of the fallen officers.

In Washington state's Kitsap County, Deputy Sheriff Krista McDonald tried to rescue two officers shot by an armed man they had spotted with a missing 13-year-old girl. McDonald shot the hostage-taker in the leg, but he killed the young girl and then himself.

"I have a theory that there's a fine line between bravery and stupidity," McDonald said after receiving the medal. "We put ourselves out there never knowing who's going to want to do us harm, or if it's the day that we might not come home."

NATO-Afghan Forces Kill 25 Insurgents

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) • NATO and Afghan forces have killed at least 25 insurgents and three of their commanders in separate operations around the country, Afghan and coalition officials said Wednesday.

The size and scope of the latest operations were an indication that the Afghan war is far from over after 11 years of conflict, even as U.S. and foreign forces begin rapidly withdrawing and handing the lead role for security to the Afghans.

The U.S.-led International Assistance Force has about 100,000 troops in the country, including about 66,000 from the United States. America is expected to pull out 34,000 of its troops within a year and its allies are also expected to scale back considerably. Afghan forces are to take the lead for security starting in the spring — months ahead of schedule.

An Afghan security operation on Tuesday in Mehterlam, the capital city of eastern Laghman province, killed 15 insurgents, the Interior Ministry said Wednesday. The ministry said the insurgent's commander, identified as Qari Almas, was also killed in the raid. Also Tuesday, joint operations by Afghan and coalition troops killed 10 insurgents in southern and eastern Afghanistan, NATO said. The coalition said five insur-

gents were killed in the lawless Andar district of eastern Ghazni province, three died in an operation in eastern Logar province, and two were killed in southern Helmand province. Both the Andar and Helmand killings were carried out by what NATO called "precision strikes," usually a reference to an airstrike.

An Afghan official said a NATO airstrike killed a senior Taliban commander in southern Helmand province on Tuesday. Ismail Khoutak, the director of the Joint Operations Center in the region, identified the insurgent as Kham Mohammed, also known as Shamssullah.

Police Add More Confusion to Pistorius Case

PRETORIA (AP) • The prosecution case against Oscar Pistorius began to unravel Wednesday with revelations of a series of police blunders and the lead investigator's admission that authorities have no evidence challenging the double-amputee Olympian's claim he killed his girlfriend accidentally.

Detective Hilton Botha's often confused testimony left prosecutors rubbing their heads in frustration as he misjudged distances and said testosterone — banned for professional athletes in some cases — was found at the scene, only to be later contradicted by the prosecutor's office.

The second day of what was supposed to be a mere bail hearing almost resembled a full-blown trial for the 26-year-old runner, with his lawyer, Barry Roux, tearing into Botha's testimony step by step during cross examination. Police, Botha acknowledged, left a 9 mm slug from the barrage that killed Reeva Steenkamp inside a toilet and lost track of illegal ammunition found inside the house. And the detective himself walked through the crime scene without wearing protective shoe covers, potentially contaminating the area.

Sen. Pete Domenici Acknowledges Son Outside Marriage

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) • Former Sen. Pete Domenici has disclosed that he fathered a secret child in the 1970s with the 24-year-old daughter of one of his Senate colleagues — a startling revelation for a politician with a reputation as an upstanding family man.

Domenici and Michelle Laxalt sent statements to the *Albuquerque Journal* that announced the relationship for the first time and identified their son as Nevada attorney Adam Paul Laxalt. They said they decided to go public with their decades-old secret because they believed someone was about to release the information in an attempt to smear Domenici.

"I deeply regret this and am very sorry for my behavior," Domenici, 80, said in his statement. "I hope New Mexicans will view that my accomplishments for my beloved state outweigh my personal transgression."

The *Journal* reported on the relationship in an article published Wednesday.

Domenici was the longest-serving senator in New Mexico history when he retired in 2008 after six terms. He was known for his unflagging support of the state's national laboratories and military installations, and he became a power broker for his work on the federal budget and energy policy. Domenici voted for the impeachment of former President Bill Clinton in 1998 after his affair with Monica Lewinsky, but his floor statement focused on the fact that Clinton had lied under oath, noting that the trial "has never been about the President's private sex acts, as tawdry as they have been."

But in the same speech, he cited the value of "truthfulness" and how it's the first pillar of good character.

Reached at his home in Washington on Wednesday, Domenici said he had nothing more to say. Domenici and his wife have been married more than 50 years and have eight children.

The scandal has all the elements of an inside-the-Beltway soap opera.

Michelle Laxalt is the daughter of former U.S. Sen. Paul Laxalt, himself a significant political figure in the 1970s and '80s as he served as Nevada governor and two terms in the Senate alongside Domenici.

Michelle Laxalt became a prominent lobbyist, Republican activist and television commentator after the affair. She said in the statement that she chose to raise her son as a single parent and that the two agreed that it would be a private matter.

"One night's mistake led to pregnancy more than 30 years ago," she said.

Laxalt's prominence in national politics occasionally put her in an odd position of publicly discussing the integrity of the man who is the father of her child.

In 2008, Domenici was reprimanded by the Senate ethics committee for his involvement in a scandal over the Bush administration's firing of eight U.S. attorneys.

The website for Adam Laxalt's law firm said he is a former U.S. Navy officer and lawyer who served in Iraq. He also worked for then-Sen. John Warner, R-Va., and as a special assistant to an undersecretary of state, according to the website.

He has also written a number of conservative columns against policies like Obamacare and the lifting of the military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy for gays for publications like the National Review Online, American Spectator and the Las Vegas Review-Journal.

MOMENT OF RECKONING FOR FRENCH TROOPS IN MALI

PARIS (AP) • It's crunch time in Mali for the French military.

Radical Islamist fighters spent weeks on the run from Malian cities under a French ground and air assault — but they're brazenly fighting back this week at French troops. The French, meanwhile, are tightening a dragnet against the al-Qaida-linked militants in one of their last remaining redoubts, mountain sanctuaries near Algeria's border.

France's government said Wednesday it's still hoping to pull out of its thorny Mali operation in the coming weeks. Defense analysts say that if France wants to make that work, and avoid getting bogged down in a protracted, Afghan-style occupation, now's the time to hit hard — dismantling the hideouts and killing all the insurgents they can — to crush what it fears is a growing terrorist threat that could spread to Mali's African neighbors and even as far as Europe.

French and Malian authorities on Wednesday sifted over the fallout from a nearly six-hour gunfight Tuesday, when about 30 jihadist fighters surprised a 50-troop French reconnaissance patrol about 30 miles south of the town of Tessalit in the Adrar des Ifoghas region, and opened fire with machine guns. The far-more-muscular French called in support from Mirage fighter jets, helicopter

gunships, and armored vehicles firing 105-mm cannons.

By the end, more than 20 insurgents and one French legionnaire were killed, French officials said.

The French operation in the area, code-named "Panthere," or panther, is continuing for a third day Wednesday.

President Francois Hollande insists that France — eager for African forces to help stabilize the impoverished West African country and its wobbly central government — is entering the final phase of its operation. But he says France will "go all the way" — that's to say, arresting

the last terrorist chiefs in northern Mali."

Defense analysts are blunter. The extremists "have their backs against the wall," said Francois Heisbourg, president of the International Institute for Strategic Studies think tank, and adviser to France's Foundation for Strategic Research. "They have been clobbered. And the best time to hit a guy is when he's on the ground on his back."

Heisbourg estimated there are about 1,200 to 2,000 radical Islamic fighters in three extremist movements in northern Mali: Al-Qaida in the Islamic Maghreb and its allies; the Movement for Unity and Jihad in West Africa, or MUJAO; and Ansar Dine.

The groups controlled northern Mali for 10 months until the French incursion began Jan. 11. Heisbourg cautioned that if rebel fighters headed south to Niger, home to higher mountains than the Ifoghas, it could present longer-term problems for counterterrorism forces. The French have backing from Malian soldier, as well as forces from nearby Chad who are seen as battle-hardened and used to operating in harsh desert terrain and working with local Tuareg tribes.

BP Civil Settlement Remains Elusive as Trial Draws Near

NEW ORLEANS (AP) • The U.S. Justice Department and the five Gulf coast states affected by a massive oil spill nearly three years ago have indicated they would like to settle their environmental and economic claims with BP PLC ahead of a trial scheduled to start next week.

The problem is that they haven't been able to agree on the possible terms of such an agreement. Months of negotiations have failed to resolve lingering differences — not just with the London-based oil giant, but among themselves. The Justice Department convened a meeting with Gulf Coast state officials in Washington late last week in an effort to hammer out an offer to resolve the outstanding civil claims, but an agreement wasn't reached, said a person familiar with the negotiations. The person spoke on condition of anonymity

because the discussions were confidential. Alabama Gov. Robert Bentley said reaching a settlement that satisfies all states' competing interests has been difficult.

"We just want to make sure we get our fair share," he said. "We had more economic damage than probably any state because of the loss of all the tourism we had in 2010. So it's very important that the people of Alabama are compensated for the losses related to the oil spill."

Bentley said representatives of his office attended the meetings in Washington last week, but he declined to comment on the talks.

"We are ready to go to trial," he said Wednesday.

An 11th-hour settlement still could be reached before the trial starts Monday — or even after it has begun — but it is not surprising that a deal has proved elusive thus far in

such a complex case, said David Uhlmann, a University of Michigan law professor and former chief of the Justice Department's environmental crimes section.

"It's extraordinarily difficult to negotiate any type of multiparty settlement, particularly when the sums involved reach into the tens of billions of dollars," he said. "The stakes are high. There are a lot of competing interests. Different parties may have different incentives to settle."

BP faces penalties under the Clean Water Act ranging from \$5.4 billion to \$21.1 billion, based on the government's estimate of how much oil spilled into the Gulf.

Among the company's motivations to settle before a trial would be to avoid the higher end of that range, which U.S. District Judge Carl Barbier could impose if he ruled the

company acted with gross negligence before the well blowout on April 10, 2010, that triggered an explosion, killing 11 workers and spawning the nation's worst offshore oil spill.

With so much money at stake, "It's a high-stakes gamble to go to trial," Uhlmann said.

BP didn't participate in last week's talks, and pledged this week to take the case to trial. In a statement released Tuesday, the company's general counsel, Rupert Bondy, said BP has been open to settlements on "reasonable terms" but was "faced with demands that are excessive and not based on reality or the merits of the case."

In its most recent quarterly earnings report, released earlier this month, BP said state and local governments have formally presented the company with more than \$34 billion in claims.

1st Calif. City Corruption Case Heading to Close

A scandal-ridden Los Angeles suburb was turned upside down by officials who felt they were above the law and collected paychecks for jobs that didn't exist, a prosecutor said Wednesday during closing arguments in a massive corruption case.

The city of Bell was nearly driven to bankruptcy by the outrageous actions of six former officials who are facing charges of misappropriating funds, Prosecutor Ed Miller said.

Legally, the officials could have paid themselves \$673 a month for what was a part-time job, since they didn't actually run the city, Miller said. But in addition to their council salaries of as much as \$80,000 a year, the officials appointed each other to commissions that did nothing and often met yearly just to increase their pay, he said. The most blatant was the creation of the Solid Waste and Recycling Authority, which Miller called "a fiction" designed to line the officials' pockets.

"They gave themselves raises which were not even drafted by a lawyer," he said. "Somebody just made this up out of the blue."

"You can't pay yourself for something that doesn't exist," he said.

Miller noted that the council members could have sought to legally amend the city charter "if they wanted pay raises for kissing babies and cutting ribbons." But they never did that, he said, because "they just didn't want anyone to know how much they made."

Those on trial are former mayor Oscar Hernandez, former vice mayor Teresa Jacobo, and former council members George Mirabal, George Cole, Victor Bello and Luis Artiga. All but one of the defendants served as mayor at some point. If convicted of various counts of misappropriation of funds, they could face sentences ranging from 11 to 20 years.

Bulgarian Gov't Resigns after Violent Protests

Elena Hristova, a 73-year-old retiree, had always paid her bills on time.

But when she received an electricity bill that amounted to 60 percent of her monthly pension, she'd had enough. So she joined a recent anti-government protest and did something she never had before: She burned an unpaid bill.

"I didn't have much money to live on," she said.

Hristova was among tens of thousands of Bulgarians who protested

energy costs, corruption and a general economic decline in what is already the European Union's poorest nation. As a result, the center-right government of Prime Minister Boiko Borisov resigned on Wednesday.

"Our power was handed to us by the people. Today we are handing it back to them," Borisov told lawmakers in Parliament before formally submitting the resignation of his Cabinet. "I cannot stand looking at a bloody Eagles' Bridge," he added, referring to the busy intersection in downtown Sofia where police and protesters had clashed Tuesday.

Jesse Jackson Jr. Pleads Guilty in Campaign Case

Former Rep. Jesse Jackson Jr., holding back tears, entered a guilty plea Wednesday in federal court to criminal charges that he engaged in a scheme to spend \$750,000 in campaign funds on personal items. He faces 46 to 57 months in prison, and a fine of \$10,000 to \$100,000, under a plea deal with prosecutors.

A few hours later, his wife, Sandra Jackson, pleaded guilty to filing false joint federal income tax returns that knowingly understated the income the couple received. She faces one to two years in prison and a fine of \$3,000 to \$40,000.

In a 17-page prosecution document, Jackson's wife admitted that

from mid-2006 through mid-October of last year, she failed to report \$600,000 in income that she and her husband earned from 2005 to 2011.

Before entering the plea to a conspiracy charge, Jesse Jackson told U.S. District Judge Robert L. Wilkins, "I've never been more clear in my life" in his decision to plead guilty.

Later, when Wilkins asked if Jackson committed the acts outlined in court papers, the former congress-

man replied, "I did these things." He added later, "Sir, for years I lived in my campaign," and used money from the campaign for personal use.

Jackson dabbed his face with tissues, and at point a court employee brought some tissues to Jackson's lawyer, who gave them to the congressman. Jackson told the judge he was waiving his right to trial.

"In perfect candor, your honor, I have no interest in wasting the taxpayers' time or money," he said.

Moon-Sized Planet Becomes Smallest Found Outside Solar System

SAN FRANCISCO • A planet the size of the moon has become the smallest found outside the solar system, scientists from the U.S. Kepler space mission said in a paper published Wednesday.

The new planet, called Kepler-37b, is probably rocky with no atmosphere or water, like Mercury, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration researchers said in the paper published in the journal *Nature*. It's one of three planets orbiting a star that's smaller, denser and cooler than the sun.

Discoveries of small planets had been handicapped by the limitations of scientists' instruments, said Thomas Bar-

clay, a research scientist at the NASA Ames Research Center in Moffett Field, California, and an author of Wednesday's report. Most stars aren't stable or bright enough for planets this small to be detected, he said.

"This was a great test case, and the fact that we found a planet this size on one of the few stars where we can find one hints that small planets like this may be extremely common," Barclay said in a telephone interview.

It's too early to say how many such planets there might be, he said. NASA's Kepler mission is designed to discover Earth-size and smaller celestial bodies in regions around their stars, particularly those where liquid water may exist. The space-

craft was launched in March 2009 and has found about 2,400 planet candidates.

The planet Kepler-37b was detected through comparing the light captured when it passed in front of its star to the star's usual light. The planet's star is well-characterized so scientists were able to determine its size with greater certainty, Barclay said.

The previous smallest planets discovered outside the solar system were orbiting a red dwarf, the most common type of star in the Milky Way. The red dwarf was about twice the size of Jupiter. The smallest of those planets was about 0.57 the times of the radius of Earth, or about the size of Mars, according to a NASA announcement from January 2012.

Obama Considers Weighing In on Gay Marriage Case

WASHINGTON (AP) •

The Obama administration is quietly considering urging the Supreme Court to overturn California's ban on gay marriage, a step that would mark a political victory for advocates of same-sex unions and a deepening commitment by President Barack Obama to rights for gay couples.

Obama raised expectations among opponents of the Proposition 8 ban when he declared in last month's inaugural address that gays and lesbians must be "treated like anyone else under the law." The administration has until Feb. 28 to intervene in the case by filing a "friend of the court" brief.

The Proposition 8 ballot initiative was approved by California voters in 2008 and overturned a state Supreme Court decision allowing gay marriage. Twenty-nine other states have constitutional amendments banning gay marriage, while nine states and Washington, D.C., recognize same-sex marriage.

An administration brief

alone is unlikely to sway the Justices but the federal government's opinion does carry weight with the court.

A final decision on whether to file a brief has not been made, a senior administration official said. Solicitor General Donald Verrilli is consulting with the White House on the matter, said the official, speaking only on condition of anonymity because the official was not authorized to address the private deliberations publicly.

While the Justice Department would formally make the filing, the president himself is almost certain to make the ultimate decision on whether to file.

Obama has a complicated history on gay marriage. As a presidential candidate in 2008, he opposed the California ban but didn't endorse gay marriage. As he ran for re-election last year, he announced his personal support for same-sex marriage but said marriage was an issue that should be decided by the states, not the federal government.

Printing out body parts? Cornell University researchers showed it's possible by creating a replacement ear using a 3-D printer and injections of living cells.

The work reported Wednesday is a first step toward one day growing customized new ears for children born with malformed ones, or people who lose one to accident or disease.

It's part of the hot field of tissue regeneration, trying to regrow all kinds of body parts. Scientists hope using 3-D printing technology might offer a speedier method with more lifelike results.

If it pans out, "this enables us to rapidly customize implants for whoever needs them," said Cornell biomedical engineer Lawrence Bonassar, who co-authored the research published online in the journal *PLoS One*.

This first-step work crafted a human-shaped ear that grew with cartilage from a cow, easier to obtain than human cartilage, especially the uniquely flexible kind that makes up ears. Study co-author Dr. Jason Spector of Weill Cornell Medical Center is working on the next step — how to cultivate enough of a child's remaining ear cartilage in the lab to grow an entirely new ear that could be implanted in the right spot.

Wednesday's report is "a nice advancement," said Dr. Anthony Atala, director of the Institute for Regenerative Medicine at Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center, who wasn't involved in the new research.

Three-dimensional printers, which gradually layer materials to form shapes, are widely used in manufactur-

ing. For medicine, Atala said the ear work is part of broader research that shows "the technology now is at the point where we can in fact print these 3-dimensional structures and they do become functional over time."

Today, people who need a new ear often turn to prosthetics that require a rod to fasten to the head. For children, doctors sometimes fashion a new ear from the stiffer cartilage surrounding ribs, but it's a big operation. Spector said the end result seldom looks completely natural. Hence the quest to use a patient's own cells to grow a replacement ear. The Cornell team started with a 3-D camera that rapidly rotates around a child's head for a picture of the existing ear to match. It beams the ear's geometry in-

to a computer, without the mess of a traditional mold or the radiation if CT scans were used to measure ear anatomy.

"Kids aren't afraid of it," said Bonassar, who used his then-5-year-old twin daughters' healthy ears as models.

From that image, the 3-D printer produced a soft mold of the ear. Bonassar injected it with a special collagen gel that's full of cow cells that produce cartilage — forming a scaffolding. Over the next few weeks, cartilage grew to replace the collagen. At three months, it appeared to be a flexible and workable outer ear, the study concluded.

Now Bonassar's team can do the process even faster by using the living cells in that collagen gel as the printer's "ink." The 3-D technology directly layers the gel into just

the right ear shape for cartilage to cover, without having to make a mold first.

The next step is to use a patient's own cells in the 3-D printing process. Spector, a reconstructive surgeon, is focusing on children born without a fully developed external ear, a condition called microtia.

They have some ear cartilage-producing cells in that tissue, just not enough. So he's experimenting with ways to boost those cells in the lab, "so we can grow enough of them from that patient to make an ear," he explained.

That hurdle aside, cartilage may be the tissue most amenable to growing with the help of 3-D printing technology, he said. That's because cartilage doesn't need blood vessels growing inside it to survive.

Kansas Homeowners Fight Brownback Plan to End Tax

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) • Brian Jones has been an admirer of Republican Sam Brownback's fiscal conservatism going back to Brownback's days as an anti-tax congressman in the 1990s. But now the real estate company owner from southeast Kansas finds himself in the odd position of fighting hard against the governor's plan for phasing out the state income tax.

Brownback has been lionized by the GOP right for trying to end the personal income tax, something not accomplished by any state in more than 30 years. In his two years in office, he has aimed to make Kansas a national testing ground for conservative theories about economic prosperity. But the push, which he began with a 24 percent cut in the top rate, now depends on wiping out deductions claimed by more than 300,000 homeowners. He suddenly confronts the conundrum that just because taxpayers want to get rid of taxes doesn't mean they're ready to give up favorite tax breaks.

"All of a sudden, on this one, he just kind of went off the deep end,"

Jones declared at a recent Statehouse rally against Brownback's proposals. The Kansas Association of Realtors spent \$195,000 in January alone on ads against the idea, which the group charges would slam the industry as well as people eager to own their own homes.

The governor insists that everyone will save in the long run. But his latest tax proposals are now stuck in the Republican-controlled Legislature, and some of his allies are worried they could be changed or, even worse, enacted in a way that would trigger drastic cuts to state programs, especially schools, potentially discrediting his vision. "Going from a slow-growth to a pro-growth state involves tax policy, and it's difficult," Brownback said recently.

Anti-tax crusader Grover Norquist said conservatives nationwide are avidly watching Brownback's effort. "This is a completely new world," he said. "There's no shame in being slow in moving from the thing you've been doing for 30 or 40 years."

Brownback spent 16 years in Con-

gress, most as a senator whose aw-shucks Midwestern manner softened a strong zeal for the supply-side economics of Reagan administration guru Arthur Laffer. Upon becoming governor, he began engineering a hard shift to the right for a state that had been led only recently by Democrat Kathleen Sebelius, now President Obama's Health and Human Services secretary. Under Brownback's tax plan, the lowest income tax bracket would gradually decline from 3.5 percent to 1.9 percent and the top rate from 6.45 percent to 3.5 percent. Rates would plummet further toward zero if the state economy grows as he expects. His administration projects at least several thousand new jobs a year and a boost in the state's population by 35,000 by 2020.

But last year's tax cut was so aggressive that big budget problems loom unless Kansas cushions the fiscal blow. In addition to rate reductions, it wiped out taxes on many small business owners entirely. Scrapping the two homeowner tax breaks, plus extending a sales tax that was scheduled to expire, would raise

about \$490 million of the \$850 million in revenue subtracted.

The Legislature is feeling the backlash about the homeowner deductions. A Senate committee voted to preserve the deduction for home property taxes. The full Senate expects to consider more changes next week. The 56-year-old Jones, president of a family real estate firm that started in 1905 in his hometown of Pittsburg, said the money shouldn't come at the expense of helping people buy houses and helping brokers like him sell them.

"We've helped him all the way through, and it's kind of like, why? Why have you done this now?" Jones said.

Another Republican, Martha Atlas, 63, says the two deductions save her at least \$700 in taxes a year on her three-bedroom ranch house in the Kansas City suburb of Prairie Village. She said she came to Kansas more than a decade ago in a down-sizing move but "I'd move back to Missouri tomorrow if this went away — no question," she said.

Lawmakers could consider put-

ting other tax breaks in the crosshairs, such as those benefiting religious or charitable groups, but those would generate their own political fires.

"Mathematically, something is going to have to give," said Republican Sen. Jim Denning.

The governor's administration contends that many homeowners would actually gain hundreds of dollars a year when the rate cuts are fully phased in. And that the state's surging economic activity will make up the revenue from the rate cuts long term.

Laffer, who has been a consultant for Brownback's administration, says the bountiful economic results of Brownback's plan, along with others favored by Republican Govs. Bobby Jindal in Louisiana, Mike Pence in Indiana and Pat McCrory in North Carolina, will be evident after the new system is in place and working.

"We have huge amounts of experimentation going on at the state level that will make a huge difference with the federal government," said Laffer.

BRITISH PREMIER VISITS INDIA; LAYS WREATH AT SITE OF MASSACRE

NEW DELHI (AP) • Britain's prime minister laid a mourning wreath Wednesday at the site of a notorious 1919 massacre of hundreds of Indians by British colonial forces, calling the killings "a shameful event in British history."

David Cameron was the first British prime minister to make a gesture of condolence at Jallianwala Bagh in the northwest city of Amritsar, but stopped short of issuing a formal apology for his country's actions 94 years earlier.

"This is a deeply shameful event in British history — one that Winston Churchill rightly described at the time as 'monstrous,'" Cameron wrote in the visitors' book at the site. "We must never forget what happened here. And in remembering we must realize that the United Kingdom stands for the right of peaceful protest around the world."

The park was the site of an attack by British colonial troops on unarmed Indians attending a rally calling for independence. More than 300 Indians were killed during the massacre, which galvanized the national independence movement and marked the beginning of the end of Britain's rule over the Indian subcontinent.

Queen Elizabeth II visited the same site in 1997 and laid a wreath there. She called the killings "distressing."

Cameron's visit to Amritsar came at the end of his trip to India. The trip was aimed at boosting trade and investment between the two countries in the areas of energy, infrastructure, insurance, banking and retail.

Egypt's Military Signals Impatience with President

CAIRO (AP) • Egypt's powerful military is showing signs of growing impatience with the country's Islamist leaders, indirectly criticizing their policies and issuing thinly veiled threats that it might seize power again.

The tension is raising the specter of another military intervention much like the one in 2011, when generals replaced longtime authoritarian leader Hosni Mubarak after they sided with anti-regime protesters in their 18-day popular uprising.

The strains come at a time when many Egyptians are despairing of an imminent end to the crippling political impasse between President Mohammed Morsi and his Muslim Brotherhood group on one side, and the mostly secular and liberal opposition on the other.

The tug of war between the two camps is being waged against a grim backdrop of spreading unrest,

rising crime and a worsening economy.

"In essence, the military will not allow national stability or its own institutional privileges to come under threat from a breakdown in Egypt's social fabric or a broad-based civil strife," said Michael W. Hanna, an Egypt expert from the New York-based Century Foundation.

"This is not an ideological army or one that seeks to destabilize civilian governance.... But it is also not an army that will sit by while the country reaches the tipping point on the path to civil strife."

The latest friction began when rumor circulated that Morsi planned to replace Gen. Abdel-Fattah el-Sissi, his defense minister and the army chief, because of his resistance to bringing the military under the sway of the Brotherhood-dominated government.

Experts Split on Detroit's Fiscal Recovery Options

DETROIT (AP) • In less than a month, Michigan Gov. Rick Snyder will decide whether the state will take over Detroit's broken finances and send in someone to oversee the city's fiscal recovery.

Regardless of Snyder's decision, the question may not be who can save Detroit, but how can Detroit be saved.

The city's options are limited, with experts split on what may be best: long-term, methodical restructuring with help from the state or cutting the city's losses now through municipal bankruptcy.

Detroit, with a population of about 700,000 residents, would be the largest city to file for Chapter 9 bankruptcy if that path is taken, according to James Spiotto, a municipal bankruptcy expert at the Chicago-based Chapman and Cutler law firm.

"Chapter 9 is meant to be the absolute last resort ... when all else fails and you are no longer capable of working with the state or anyone else to bring about a resolution," Spiotto said. "It would have an adverse effect on the credit market, not only for that municipality, but also for the state."

About 640 Chapter 9 bankruptcies have been filed since Congress enacted a revised Municipal Bankruptcy Act in 1937. Recent cities that have filed for bankruptcy include San Bernardino, Calif., which took that route in August after learning it had a \$46 million deficit.

The largest municipal bankruptcy filing in U.S. history involved Jefferson County, Ala., which had more than \$4 billion in debt when it filed in 2011. The most populous city in the U.S. to do so was the 290,000-resident Northern California community of Stockton, in June.

Detroit faces more than \$14 billion in long-term liabilities, has a near-zero cash flow and a skyrocketing budget deficit that now is listed conservatively at \$327 million, according to a state-appointed review team that looked at Detroit's books.

"Rome fell because it went broke, and France faced a national revolution when it went broke," said James McTevia, president of a Michigan-based firm that specializes in turnaround management. "If an emergency financial manager is not appointed immediately, the city should file for bankruptcy at once."

The review team found that Detroit was in a "financial emergency" and forwarded its report to the governor. Snyder said he would carefully review the team's findings before deciding whether to appoint an emergency manager. If he does, Detroit Mayor Dave Bing would have 10 days to request a hearing.

Bing, who opposes a state takeover, has said that without an influx of money from the state, any emergency manager would face the same frustrations he's endured. Bing also opposes taking the bankruptcy route, but he says

his restructuring plan approved last year by the state has been hindered by legal and other roadblocks.

"We have the plan, but we face significant challenges executing it in a timely manner," the mayor said Wednesday. "We are hindered by several factors, including the city charter, labor agreements, litigation, governmental structure, and a scarcity of financial and human resources."

Snyder called a news conference Thursday afternoon in Detroit to discuss the process. The governor's staff said he would not announce any decisions.

Bing, who was elected in 2009, has yet to say whether he will seek re-election.

Tom Barrow, an accountant who ran twice for Detroit's top office, said an emergency manager would usurp Detroit's control over city finances, spending and assets. Barrow, who lost to Bing in 2009, is considering another mayoral run this year.

Bankruptcy would keep the elected mayor and City Council in power, Barrow said.

"This is more about control than restructuring," Barrow said about the emergency manager option. "If we go into a Chapter 9 that will minimize the influence of the state. All of a sudden they become a secondary player."

"Under Chapter 9 the city runs itself, enters into agreements with creditors and

bondholders."

Those actions would be overseen by a bankruptcy judge. The city can pass a resolution for bankruptcy protection on its own, but that would have to be approved by the state and filed by an emergency manager, Barrow added.

A deal between Bing and Snyder nearly a year ago promised some state re-

sources and expertise if the city met certain milestones and deadlines. The City Council gave its OK to the agreement but was slow in approving some outside professional contracts tied to it.

The state, in turn, initially held millions of dollars in bond money in an escrow account that Detroit needed to meet payroll and pay some other bills.

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

During the spring and summer, Hulse is often a fixture in the area. Some of the work he has done:

- Spraying poison ivy and improving access for horseback riders, fishermen, hunters, hikers and birders.



Why Count Elk from the Air?

Question: I recently saw a helicopter flying over a group of elk in the Big Wood River valley. Has the Idaho Department of Fish and Game been counting elk in this area, and if so, how is this information used?

You are correct; we have been counting or classifying elk and deer using a helicopter.

Winter is an opportune time for wildlife biologists to count and classify most species of big game. Animals congregate in areas with lower snow depths, less tree cover and open south exposures. These factors make observing them from a helicopter efficient and effective.

Biologists aren't able to count every animal in a population, but they try to count the same areas under similar weather and snow conditions to obtain population trends. The information collected (calves



we best accomplish our objectives: change permit levels or season dates?"

Biologists use public opinions from open house meetings, plus biological information, to develop a department recommendation for next year's hunting season. This recommendation is then forwarded to the Idaho Fish and Game Commission. The ultimate authority for setting next year's hunting rules lies with the commission.

Use of a helicopter is expensive, but it's an effective method to survey and monitor the health of wildlife populations.

Park each weekend.

The 6,638-foot treeless Dollar Mountain with its 628 vertical feet of skiing has a storied history, serving as one of Sun Valley's first ski hills back in the day when many thought Baldy was too steep for the average skier.

Hollywood stars such as Gary Cooper skied here. Picabo Street won her first race here.

As high-speed quads began lining Bald Mountain, Dollar took on a role as a beginner's hill. It's still the place to learn to ski.

But in the past few years it's been made over with banked slalom courses, giant jumps sculpted by man and snow machine, a couple of skier/boarder cross courses, including an Olympic-sized skier course, and some 75 rails, boxes and barrels, including one shaped like a roller coaster.

This year terrain park managers built a 22-foot-long super pipe with the help of more than 8 million gallons of water turned into snow and the Zugg Pipe Monster — the largest pipe groomer in existence — designed by aeronautical engineers.

The pipe is one of only three in the nation designed to meet specifications for Olympic hopefuls.

• • •

All of these attractions have made Dollar a hopping place.

Freestylers with twin-tipped skis ride the smooth cylindrical walls of the super pipe, hopping out like grasshoppers from time to time as they grab their tips and spin 360s in the air.

Snowboarders cruise down the banked slalom courses carving their way around the banked turns.

Others sail off a ramp of snow onto several recycled oil barrels that have been painted with Sun Valley's logo in blue and yellow.

At 6, Baty is fast enough to have the makings of a downhill racer, says his ski instructor, Jani Sutherland, a children's specialist for Sun Valley Resort.

"He started skiing at 3 and he didn't want to turn; he wanted to go fast," she said.

But any notion of going straight takes a detour if he spots something he can jump. He especially loves the off-piste trails that run through the woods on the skier's right of Lower River Run, catching air as he sails back onto the groomed run below.

Given his zest for bumps, the boy began coaxing Sutherland to teach him how to ski the boxes and rails on Dollar when he was 4. Last year he began skiing in the super pipe, providing plenty of film fodder for his parents, Stan and Kristine.

Sutherland started him out in The Progression Park, an area set off to the side of Dollar Mountain that sports a tiny snow ridge on which he could learn to slide sideways. Tiny snow ramps teach people to catch air on jumps.

"When I started skiing, we made our own jumps," said Sutherland, who has taught skiing for 39 years. "But when Sun Valley started building this terrain park, I learned to do boxes, I learned how to turn. It's one thing to go straight over a jump and another to turn sideways as you go. It's a different feeling because you have to have that flat ski or you'll get caught on your edges. When that happens, you feel like someone's pulling you off. Sometimes you land on your feet; sometimes, on your tush."

When she felt he had the skills, she took Baty to some of the intermediate features on the mountain.

• • •

"Keep your hands in front and your body forward," Sutherland reminds Baty as he points his skis toward a ramp of snow leading onto a box.

"You'll get more air than if you're in the back seat. And you need some speed to clear the box."

Baty sails up the small ramp and does a 90-degree spin in the air, which allows him to slide sideways across the box. His body is centered over the balls of his feet, his skis are shoulder-width apart, his eyes are focused on the end of the rail.

He does another 90-degree spin as he jumps off the box, and heads toward a rail.

That rail cleared, he and Sutherland catch a chair and head back uphill. This time he heads for the easier of two skier/boarder cross courses, repeatedly veering off the cat track as he makes his way to the course to catch a few bumps.

Baty stands in one of the gates at the top of the cross course, watching as an older skier catches big air on one of the jumps. Then, as if some make-believe buzzer has sounded to herald the start of a race, he's off. He skims around one corner. His pint-sized body bobs up and down as he heads over rollers. Then he catches a foot of air on a jump.

A grin spreading across his face, he catches the chair again. At the top, he heads this time for the super pipe. A couple of older skiers duck into the half-cylinder and begin making sweeping turns up its smooth walls, flying above the rim where they grab their skis with their hands.

Baty follows suit, not clearing the rim but getting higher on the wall with each sweeping turn.

"He's a visual learner," Sutherland says. "He sees other kids doing things and he copies.

"He's a natural. He loves to jump."

Some group lessons take students through parts of the progression park if the instructors feel the students have the skills, said Aaron Fabish, a Sun Valley Snowsports supervisor. Occasionally, entire families request Terrain Park 101 instruction as part of a private lesson called "A Family Affair."

One of the best ways to learn is with one-on-one instruction, Fabish said.

"We give you the basics on how to enter and exit the park, and we take you through the progression. Our focus is on safety," he said. "But the cool thing about this is that it improves your regular skiing. Once we take you out of the terrain you're used to skiing or boarding on, you're bound to get better. Your balance improves, the way you stand improves."

weed-eating the area.

• Helping staff maintain and repair waterfowl nesting structures.

In a "Caught in the Act of Doing Good" recipient report, Fish and Game staffers described Hulse as "the perfect example of an ideal volunteer and of someone going out of their way to do something good without being asked, and ... a treasured asset for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game."

Mike Todd, a wildlife habitat biologist for Fish and Game, described Hulse as nice, personable and energetic, and praised his efforts.

"He saves us a tremendous amount of time and

Rehabilitation Project on the Niagara Springs WMA.

Despite all his time spent volunteering, Hulse said he was a bit surprised by the award.

"I don't do it for the recognition or awards," Hulse said. "I'm always helping people; my dad taught me you should always help people."

Artist-in-residence Celebrates Winter at Craters of the Moon

ARCO • Artists have played a part in national parks since the 1870s when famed Hudson River painters documented majestic landscapes of the West. It was through their art that the public came to see places destined to become the first national parks.

The tradition continues in many units of the National Park System. At Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve this winter, Shelley McCarl became the monument's second artist-in-residence.

McCarl teaches art in Boise and is a painter and pastel artist.

"In my landscape painting, I focus on exploring the interrelationship between land and light, and in capturing specific colors and angles of light under vari-

The public may see a display of both of these artists' works in the visitor center theater at Craters of the Moon this spring. Monument staff hope to host a new artist annually.

Forests Consider Weighted System for River Launch Lottery

TWIN FALLS • Rafters hoping to increase the chance of launching on the Salmon, Snake, Selway and Middle Fork of the Salmon Rivers may soon be able to gain "points" to increase their odds, the Forest Service said.

The opportunity to launch on a rafter's selected date on their preferred river is currently managed through the Four Rivers Lottery. The lottery system helps the managers of these wild rivers regulate visitor numbers and reduce impacts to the river campsites.

The lottery system is not currently weighted, but it could be soon — depending on public response to the latest proposal from the group that manages the four rivers.

"We know people want a way to increase their chances of launching on their preferred date," Trish Callaghan, Salmon-Challis National Forest recreation program manager, said in the press release. "This weighted lottery could begin as early as the 2015 application season and may be similar to what many states now do for their hunting season tag allocations for specialized hunts."

Komodo Attacks Tourist Guide in Eastern Indonesia

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) • A park official says a Komodo dragon has attacked a tour guide on a remote island in eastern Indonesia.

Komodo National Park official Heru Rudiharto said Wednesday a 8.2-foot-long lizard suddenly appeared and attacked Abdul Rachman who was guiding four Indonesian tourists near its nest.

Rachman failed to defend himself with a stick and the Komodo bit his

right calf before another guide came to help and drove it away.

Tuesday's attack was the second this month in the park. Two park employees were hospitalized after being attacked two weeks ago.

Endangered Komodo dragons are found in the wild on the eastern Indonesian islands of Komodo, Padar and Rinca. They can grow longer than 10 feet. Fewer than 4,000 are believed to be alive.







Michael Schwartz, Conservative Activist, Dies

WASHINGTON • Michael Schwartz, a conservative activist who served as chief of staff to Tom Coburn, R-Okl., in the U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate, died Feb. 3 at his home in Germantown, Md. He was 63. The cause was amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, also known as Lou Gehrig's disease. A son, Joseph Schwartz, confirmed the death.

Michael Schwartz spent his early career in public affairs with the Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights in Milwaukee. He settled in the Washington area in 1986 and worked over the years with conservative lobbying groups including the Free Congress Foundation and Concerned Women for America. Schwartz worked for Coburn in the House from 1995 to 2000 and in the Senate from 2004 to 2012.

The aide was known, at times, for making incendiary remarks about gays and calling for a "mass im-

peachment" of what he described as activist federal judges. The latter prompted Coburn, known for his conservative views, to issue a statement distancing himself from the remark.

After Schwartz's death, the senator said in a statement that his former chief of staff was "an extraordinary servant and faithful leader who showed everyone — by his life, deeds and words — that things that are unseen are the things that matter."

Schwartz was born Michael Duffy in Philadelphia on July 16, 1949, and later took the surname of his adoptive stepfather.

He was a 1972 graduate of the University of Dallas. He spent a period as an organizer for the antiabortion rights group Operation Rescue before joining the Free Congress Foundation, founded by Republican strategist Paul Weyrich. Schwartz was an early figure in the foundation's efforts to launch a conservative satellite TV network called National Empowerment Television in the early 1990s.



kid won't come along that's as equally as impressive, but he won't do all that Price does and that has me nervous, because he is weeks away from leaving us."

Price is a No. 4 seed in his division behind Tommy Bailey, his rival from Wood River who beat him in districts.

Unable to repeat after winning the district championship last year, Price wants to finish higher than his fifth place state finish last season at 145-pounds.

Even if Price, for whatever odd reason, failed to wrestle at state this weekend, his career impact at the school would be undiminished.

"Even at (Robert Stuart) he was not the greatest wrestler in the world but he was good with all of the kids," Pehrson said. "He worked hard to make everybody better, his behavior was always spot-on and grades always up. "He has just the right amount of attitude. In this sport you have to have attitude and be willing to step out there and say I'm better

than you. It's a business, but he takes a lot of pleasure in it."

His not-so-friendly rivalry with Bailey over the last six years epitomizes Price's career. The steely-eyed Canyon Ridge wrestler did not beat Bailey, always one of the top regional wrestlers in his weight class, until last year, when he beat him three times.

Bailey, a defensive wrestler, posed a challenge that was nearly an unreachable plateau for Price's high school career.

"He has made me learn to shoot better," Price said. "When we first started wrestling I was really defensive and couldn't get off bottom."

Price pinned Bailey last year.

How did Price improve so much?

"He has never been strongest kid, but he is solid, and he is the kind of kid that works the way you want kids to work," Pehrson said.

"He constantly looks for the best kid in room, and for years he has taken beatings and gotten better from those beatings."

Price also ran cross country and did offseason weight and wrestling room training. Perhaps at more storied programs with greater wrestling tradition, Price's work ethic and leadership aren't completely extraordinary, but for a program in search of an identity and a wrestler to show others how to approach the sport, Price casts a long shadow while leaving footprints in sight.

"I come to practice every day and work hard," Price said. "If they see me dogging it and saying I don't want to be here, they won't want to come. This year, they have been here from day one and have to stuck through it to the end."

Price's presence is likely a major factor in Canyon Ridge's improved retention of wrestlers, giving it the depth to win district.

Senior teammate, 170-pound district champion, Ismael Andrade, who Pehrson says has the body of a "Greek god," came out for wrestling just last season and was "terrible," according to Pehrson. He

took Price's lead from the get-go, made huge improvements, and became one of the core wrestlers in a year Pehrson calls a pivot "to even better things."

"At the beginning of season, we all got together and agreed that this had to be our year," Andrade said. "I think we finally made a foundation for what the program is going to be. It's a great start and it's going to be a great program in the future. The senior class, we show leadership and give them extra push they need."

With nine underclassmen accompanying the six seniors to state to face off against four No. 1 seeds and three No. 2 seeds, Pehrson contends that with the help of Price, Andrade and the other seniors, this week represents a launching point.

"What we know going into this is that we are a really young team and this is the first year of building something bigger," Pehrson said.

"Now we are taking our kids to get

Dietrich didn't come close to the 90 points it scored the last time it faced Carey, but in beating the Panthers in the IA-II District IV championship 58-49, they might be better prepared for a state championship run.

The Blue Devils (21-2), facing a Carey team playing loose and energized on defense, fell into an early 7-2 hole before going on a 25-14 run to end the half.

The Blue Devils, who've dominated to such a degree most of the year they hadn't been tested in too many low-scoring close games, made the shots and stops at the end of it, perhaps proving to themselves they have the late game mettle to win next weekend.

"I think this was a good test for us," guard Trey Dill said.

On Feb. 21, 1613, Mikhail Romanov, 16, was unanimously chosen by Russia's national assembly to be czar, beginning a dynasty that would last three centuries.

TODAY IN HISTORY**On this date:**

In 1513, Pope Julius II, who had commissioned Michelangelo to paint the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel, died nearly four months after the project was completed.

In 1862, Nathaniel Gordon became the first and only American slave-trader to be executed under the U.S. Piracy Law of 1820 as he was hanged in New York.

In 1885, the Washington Monument was dedicated.

In 1912, the Great Fifth Ward Fire broke out in Houston, Texas; although property losses topped \$3 million, no one was killed in the blaze.

In 1916, the World War I Battle of Verdun began in France as German forces attacked; the French were able to prevail after 10 months of fighting.

In 1925, The New Yorker magazine made its debut.

In 1945, during the World War II Battle of Iwo Jima, the escort carrier USS Bismarck Sea was sunk by kamikazes with the loss of 318 men.

In 1947, Edwin H. Land publicly demonstrated his Polaroid Land camera, which could produce a black-and-white photograph in 60 seconds.

In 1965, black Muslim leader and civil rights activist Malcolm X, 39, was shot to death inside the Audubon Ballroom in New York by assassins identified as members of the Nation of Islam.

In 1972, President Richard M. Nixon began his historic visit to China as he and his wife, Pat, arrived in Beijing.

In 1973, Israeli fighter planes shot down Libyan Arab Airlines Flight 114 over the Sinai Desert, killing all but five of the 113 people on board.

In 1986, Larry Wu-tai Chin, the first American found guilty of spying for China, killed himself in his Virginia jail cell.

Ten years ago: The owners of The Station nightclub in West Warwick, R.I., where 100 people perished in a fast-moving fire the night before, denied giving the rock band Great White permission to use fireworks blamed for setting off the blaze, although the band's singer insisted the use of pyrotechnics had been approved. Chief U.N. inspector Hans Blix ordered the destruction of dozens of Iraqi missiles with ranges that violated U.N. limits. Michael Jordan became the first 40-year-old in NBA history to score 40 or more points, getting 43 in the Washington Wizards' 89-86 win over the New Jersey Nets.

Five years ago: Serb rioters broke into the U.S. Embassy in Belgrade and set fire during protests against Western support for an independent Kosovo. President George W. Bush concluded his six-day African tour in Liberia, where he offered help to lift the country from years of ruinous fighting. A Venezuelan plane crashed in the Andes, killing all 46 on board. Author Robin Moore, who wrote "The French Connection" and "The Green Berets," died in Hopkinsville, Ky., at age 82. Former Arizona Gov. Evan Meacham, who was removed in a 1988 impeachment trial, died in Phoenix at age 83.

One year ago: Greeks were torn between relief and foreboding on the news that their country had received a new massive bailout — a \$170 billion rescue package created by the 17-nation eurozone, with conditions. Publisher Barney Rosset, 89, who introduced the U.S. to such underground classics as "Tropic of Cancer" and "Lady Chatterley's Lover," died in New York.
