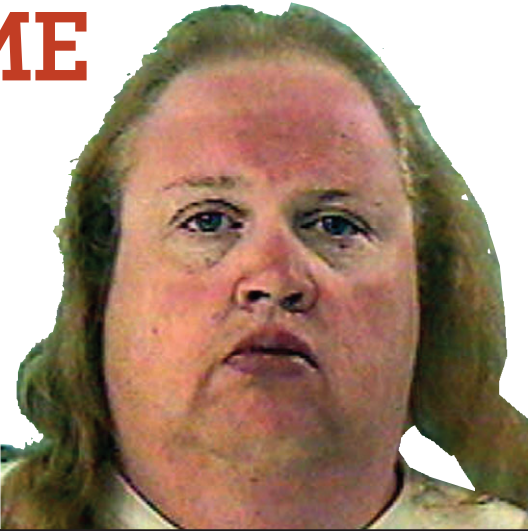

## 1 Suspect Detained in Gooding Homicide Case

**GOODING** • Gooding police say one suspect in the weekend killing of a 24-year-old man is in custody in Salt Lake City.

Police are still searching for a

second suspect, said Gooding Police Chief Jeff Perry.

“He’s not in the area,” Perry said of the second suspect. “We don’t believe he’s even in the state.”

Perry said both suspects’ names will likely be released today.

An autopsy Monday, March 4,

confirmed the victim, Alejandro Perez Lopez, died from stab wounds.

According to police, Lopez — suffering from severe wounds — was dropped off early Sunday, March 3, at North Canyon Medical Center in Gooding. Lopez later succumbed to his wounds at the hospital.

Gooding police are treating the case as a homicide. Perry said security footage at the hospital helped police locate a black Toyota pickup used by two adult males to drop off Lopez.

Perry said he did not know when the suspect who was arrested in Salt

Lake City will be returned to Idaho. He’ll have to go through a formal extradition process, Perry said.

## T.F. Council Mulls \$38M Bond for Wastewater

**TWIN FALLS** • The Twin Falls City Council could vote next week on a ballot measure that would ask Twin Falls residents to pass a \$38 million wastewater improvement bond. The council heard a presentation from the two co-chairs of the 37-member wastewater citizen advisory committee.

Co-chairs Lori Ward and Chris Reid made the presentation, which answered several questions from the City Council:

- Yes, the city should make improvements to the facility. Ward said the current low cost of borrowing money was one factor.
- Yes, a revenue bond should be

## WHAT’S IN THE NEW HEALTH EXCHANGE LEGISLATION?

**BOISE** • The Idaho Legislature has a new state-based insurance exchange bill to consider.

On Monday, the House Health and Welfare Committee voted to print a revised insurance exchange bill. David Hensley, chief of staff for Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter, presented the bill, which sets up an independent, non-government

oversight board for the exchange.

**Why Introduce Another Bill?**

This combines three things: The original bill introduced by Otter’s staff in early February, a trailer bill introduced by freshman Rep. Luke Malek, R-Coeur d’Alene, and additional input from other legislators. Instead of introducing multiple amendments or trailer

ills, the governor’s office rolled everything into a new piece of legislation.

**What’s New in This Legislation?**

In addition to Malek’s trailer bill, which added more legislative oversight to the insurance exchange board, this adds three voting members to the board, all of whom are legislators: one appointed by the Speaker of the House, one appointed by

the Senate President Pro Tem and one appointed by the minority party.

**Will This Get More People on Board?**

Those who oppose the health insurance exchange, like House Majority Caucus Chairman John Vander Woude, R-Nampa, remain opposed, regardless of the additional legislative oversight.

(On Monday, Vander Woude offered the only “no” vote during the print hearing.) But this new bill is likely to catch some of those who were on the fence, including the 15 freshmen who signed on to Malek’s trailer bill.

**What Happens Now?**

Forget the three hours of public testimony and six-hour Senate debate we saw in Feb-

ruary. Because it’s a new bill, we’re starting that all over again. The first round of public testimony starts 7 a.m. Thursday morning in the Lincoln Auditorium at the Capitol. There’s another public hearing 7 a.m. Friday. If the House Health and Welfare Committee votes to pass the bill, the House as a whole will then consider it; if it passes there, it moves to the Senate for more public hearings and floor debate.

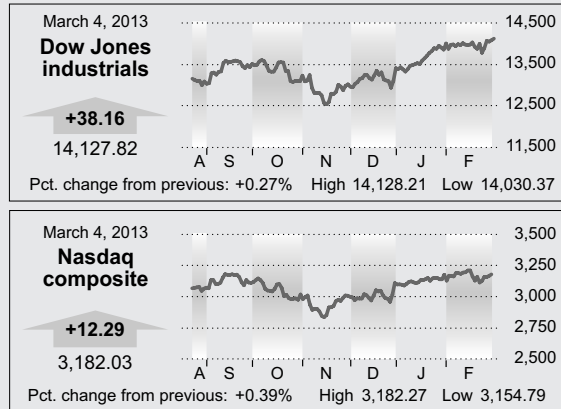
THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

Stocks Grind Toward Record

**NEW YORK (AP)** • Investors brushed off early jitters about a potential slowdown in China and pushed the Dow to its highest close of the year.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 38.16 points, or 0.3 percent, to 14,127.82. The index is a fraction of a percentage point away from its record close of 14,164, reached on Oct. 9, 2007.

Stocks dropped at the opening bell and stayed lower most of the morning amid concern that new steps introduced by the Chinese government to cool the booming housing market in the world's second-largest economy.

# Curious Mind How to Dispose of Used Needles

**My husband has been an insulin dependent diabetic for 14 years. We have never found a place to take his used needles. In fact, we have been told to tape them in a container with duct tape and throw them in the garbage. This has been a horrible nightmare; just the thought that someone could go through people's trash, find needles and use them is just heartbreaking. Children and other people could become infected; other's lives could be changed forever. Does Twin Falls plan on providing a service soon that will take used needles?**

## Sun, Warmer Temperatures Return to the Area

The sunshine was nice but you could feel the slight chill in the air during the day Monday. The good news: We will see a warm up take place today and into Wednesday. This warm up will be associated with an approaching system coming in off the Pacific Northwest coast today and arriving in southern Idaho late tonight through Wednesday and into Thursday.

Before the storm arrives, expect some nice weather today. It will be mostly sunny and temperatures warming into the upper 40s to the low 50s. Part of this warm up is thanks to some breezy winds out of the east-southeast. Sustained winds will range from 10-20 mph with possible gusts near 25-35 mph.

The signs of the next system approaching become noticeable tonight into Wednesday. High clouds will be possible overhead by later this afternoon and evening. Don’t expect much of the precipitation to arrive until early Wednesday



morning. Temperatures will be near or slightly below the freezing mark Wednesday morning that some could see snow or a rain-snow mix. By the afternoon, temperatures return to the 50s in the Magic Valley with mostly scattered light rain showers possible.

A few rain and snow showers linger Thursday as we get a little cooler to the low to mid 40s, but should see improvement in the weather Friday and into the weekend. We have to keep an eye on a passing system Friday into Saturday.

- bleach or another disinfecting solution.
  3. When the container is full, make sure the lid is on tight and apply heavy tape such as duct tape or packing tape to ensure the lid remains sealed.
  4. Take the sealed container directly to the nearest transfer station and alert the employee on duty you are disposing of used needles and syringes.
- There is no charge to drop off a sharps container at the 10 Southern Idaho Solid Waste transfer stations around the Magic Valley, Jensen said.
- “All health care providers must dispose of biohazard waste according to strict guidelines,” said Cheryle Becker, administrator of the health district’s public health divi-

sion. “Contract providers collect this type of waste, including needles, from hospitals and doctor’s offices. These are taken to special facilities and are destroyed. One such agency is Larsen Miller out of Boise.”

Kerrie Chapman with St. Luke’s Family Medicine also recommends the household guidelines for disposal.

# Budget Writers Set \$1.3B Schools Spending Plan

**BOISE** • Teachers stand to see wages bolstered under a plan approved Monday by legislative budget writers who favored unwinding a 2-year-old freeze on the system that helps set their pay, as well as directing millions to local districts to reward employees who help improve student performance.

The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee passed the \$1.3 billion spending plan for fiscal year 2014, a 2.2 percent increase over last year, on a 15-5 vote.

This budget, which still must be approved by the Legislature, unfreezes Idaho's "steps and lanes" grid system that pays teachers according to years of service and level of education, at a cost of \$11.3 million.

It also dedicates about \$13 million for local districts to reward employee achievement, restores about \$15 million to base salaries and hikes first-year teacher minimum pay to \$31,000, from \$30,500.

The panel's majority rejected a separate plan that left the freeze intact, while giving districts more money to spend at their discretion provided it didn't go to personnel.

Rep. Shirley Ringo, D-Moscow and a former high school math teacher, said the freeze, enacted in 2011 to

save money, has resulted in experienced teachers with master's degrees potentially sacrificing a significant share of their wages, some \$9,000 over the past three years, according to her calculations.

"We need to shine a lot on how we compensate our experienced teachers. I think we haven't given them enough," Ringo said. "Still, looking at the two motions, restoring the steps means a great deal."

Foes of this public education budget, by far the largest in Idaho at about 47 percent of state spending, objected to unfreezing the grid system, which some conservatives object to because it pays teachers based on their years in the business, not classroom performance.

Sens. Cliff Bayer, R-Boise, worried this measure was unfair to other state employees whose wages aren't slated for an increase. By Bayer's estimate, state funding for teacher pay would rise 6 percent, under the plan that cleared the committee.

"We're just putting money... where I see too much of a displacement here all at once," he argued.

The failure of the "Students Come First" overhaul at the polls on Nov. 6 unraveled Superintendent of Pub-

lic Instruction Tom Luna's plan to increase merit bonuses to \$61 million in 2014, from \$38 million paid out in 2013.

On Monday, however, Luna said he was pleased this 2014 budget now includes \$13 million for teachers and administrators where students meet objective measures of growth in districts with school board-approved achievement plans.

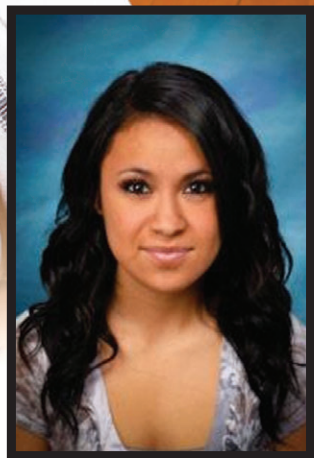

## Girl Scouts Look to End Sales Tax on Cookies

**BOISE (AP)** • More money from the sale of Thin Mints and Tagalongs by Girl Scouts in Idaho would go back to troops under a tax break proposal making its way through the House.

The House Revenue and Taxation Committee voted Monday to introduce legislation to end the 6 percent state sales tax charged on Girl Scout cookies.

That tax — now at 22 cents per box — generates about \$140,000 annually.

If the tax-break is approved, Girl Scout lobbyist Julie Hart said troops in central and southern Idaho would keep cookie prices at \$3.75 per box. She said the scouts would use the extra money to support scholarships to help low-income girls take part in organization.

She said 48 other states already exempt the annual cookie sales from the state sales tax.

# Idaho Celebrates Its 150th Territorial Anniversary

**BOISE** • The beat of Shoshone Paiute drums, Civil War re-enactors and about 700 Idahoans filled the Capitol lawn Monday as state leaders marked the 150th anniversary of the creation of the Idaho Territory.

Both chambers of the Idaho Legislature packed the Capitol steps on the sunny afternoon to celebrate the state's sesquicentennial year and give a tribute to President Abraham Lincoln, who signed the

Act of Congress creating the Idaho territory on March 4, 1863, carving it out of Washington Territory in the midst of the Civil War.

The event featured a performance of "America" from Sen. Cherie Buckner-Webb, D-Boise, remarks from former Lt. Gov. David Leroy and a speech from Lincoln impersonator Steve Holgate.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter also took the stage, telling the crowd he believes Idahoans still have much in common with their territorial ancestors. Liberty and freedom, he

said, are values the state's people still hold dear.

"Idaho's people are no different today than they were in 1863," he said. "They had then, as we have now, an obligation and an opportunity to be the architects of our own destiny, and honor and share the goals and values our forefathers built upon this great state."

Idaho became a state in 1890.

The noon event drew proud Idahoans including Boise Brig. Gen. Richard Turner, 59, who said he turned out to show he's honored to serve his

country in the Idaho National Guard.

Parents and their kids attended the ceremony — some if only for a history lesson.

"I thought, 'What a perfect opportunity to be able to shed some history on the kids,'" said Alisha Carothers, 29, who brought her children Braxton, 9, and Shyann, 8, to the event. "It's going to be a long time until they see another event like this."

The ceremony kicked off a yearlong sesquicentennial celebration for the Gem State.

On Monday, Idaho law-

makers also renamed the Capitol's largest meeting room after Lincoln, as a way to commemorate the 16th president's legacy of preserving the Union and helping end slavery.

Throughout the next several months, local communities and the state's Historical Society will sponsor a series of projects to commemorate the anniversary.

That includes the Historical Society's "Essential Idaho: 150 Things that Make the Gem State Unique," exhibit, to open at the Idaho Historical Museum on Tuesday. The city of Lewiston will host a number of sesquicentennial events throughout the spring and summer months, including a lecture series on Lewiston history.

# Woman Dies after Nurse Refuses to Perform CPR

**BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP)** • A nurse's refusal to give CPR to a dying 87-year-old woman at a California independent living home despite desperate pleas from a 911 dispatcher has prompted outrage and spawned a criminal investigation.

The harrowing 7-minute, 16-second call also raised concerns about the nature of the living arrangements for seniors at a time when their numbers are growing in the U.S. and calls for legislation to prevent a repeat of what happened Feb. 26 at the Glenwood Gardens in Bakersfield.

The woman collapsed in the dining room of the re-

tirement home that offers many levels of care. She lived in the independent living building, which state officials said is like a senior apartment complex and doesn't operate under licensing oversight.

"This is a wakeup call," said Assemblywoman Mariko Yamada, chair of the California Assembly Aging and Long-term Care Committee. "I'm sorry it took a tragedy like this to bring it to our attention."

Yamada cautioned that while it's not yet known whether intervention would have saved the woman's life, "we want to investigate because it has caused a lot of concern and alarm."

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • Republicans controlling the House moved Monday to give the Pentagon more money for military readiness while easing the pain felt by such agencies as the FBI and the Border Patrol from the across-the-board spending cuts that are just starting to take effect.

The effort is part of a huge spending measure that would fund day-to-day federal operations through September and head off a potential government shutdown later this month.

The measure would leave in place automatic cuts of 5 percent to domestic agencies and 7.8 percent to the Pentagon ordered by President Barack Obama on Friday after months of battling with Republicans over the budget. But the House Republicans' legislation would award the Defense and Veterans Affairs departments their detailed 2013 budgets while other agencies would be frozen at 2012 levels — and then bear the across-the-board cuts.

The impact of the new cuts was proving slow to

reach the broader public as Obama convened the first Cabinet meeting of his second term to discuss next steps.

The Pentagon did say it would furlough thousands of military school teachers around the world and close commissaries an extra day

each week. And Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano said the spending cuts were causing delays in customs lines at airports.

# LONG WAIT IN KENYA VOTE; 19 DEAD IN MOMBASA

**MOMBASA, Kenya (AP)** • Kenya's presidential election drew millions of eager voters who endured long lines to cast ballots Monday, but the vote was marred by violence that left 19 people dead, including four policemen hacked to death by machete-wielding separatists.

Officials urged voters not to be intimidated by the violence amid fears the impending election results could spark another round of the ethnic-related bloodshed in which more than 1,000 people died after the 2007 vote.

The election is the first presidential poll under a new constitution designed to prevent the ethnic violence of 2007-08. Enthusiastic voters formed long lines around the country, and election officials estimated turnout at 70 percent of 14 million registered voters.

The voting got off to a bloody start when a group of 200 separatists set a trap for police in the coastal city of Mombasa in the pre-dawn hours, Inspector General David Kimaiyo said. Four police were

hacked to death with machetes, coast police boss Aggrey Adoli said.

The separatist group — the Mombasa Republican Council — had threatened election day attacks, and Kimaiyo said police were planning a raid "that will see the end of the MRC."

The MRC believes Kenya's coast should be an independent country. Their cause, which is not defined by religion, is fueled by the belief that political leaders in Nairobi have taken the coast's land for themselves, impoverishing indigenous residents.

In addition to the attack in Mombasa, police blamed the MRC for three deadly attacks in nearby Kilifi. An Associated Press reporter visited a morgue and saw four dead young men wearing red bandanas — a sign of the MRC — who had been shot to death.

An AP tally of the violence found that four police and three MRC members died in Mombasa, while six government officials, four MRC members and two civilians died in the three attacks.

# US Cardinals Want Answers

**VATICAN CITY (AP)** • Cardinals said Monday they want to talk to Vatican managers about allegations of corruption and cronyism within the top levels of the Catholic Church before they elect the next pope, evidence that a scandal over leaked papal documents is casting a shadow over the conclave and setting up one of the most unpredictable papal elections in recent times.

The Vatican said 107 of the 115 voting-age cardinals attended the first day of pre-

conclave meetings, at which cardinals organize the election, discuss the problems of the church and get to know one another before voting.

The red-capped "princes" of the church took an oath of secrecy and decided to pen a letter of "greeting and gratitude" to Benedict XVI, whose resignation has thrown the church into turmoil amid a torrent of scandals inside and out of the Vatican.

"I would imagine that as we move along there will be

questioning of cardinals involved in the governing of the Curia to see what they think has to be changed, and in that context anything can come up," said U.S. Cardinal Francis George.

The Holy See's administrative shortcomings were thrust into stark relief last year with the publication of documents stolen from Benedict's desk that exposed the petty infighting, turf battles and allegations of corruption, nepotism and cronyism in the highest ech-

elons of the Catholic Church.

The pope's butler was convicted of stealing the papers and leaking them to a journalist; he eventually received a papal pardon.

The emeritus pope, meanwhile, remained holed up at the papal residence at Castel Gandolfo, his temporary retirement home while the discussions on picking his successor kick into gear in Rome.

No date has been set yet for the conclave and one may not be decided on officially for a few more days.

### 48 Syrian Soldiers Killed in Iraq Ambush

**BAGHDAD (AP)** • Dozens of Syrian soldiers who had crossed into Iraq for refuge were ambushed Monday with bombs, gunfire and rocket-propelled grenades in an attack that killed 48 of them and heightened concerns that the country could be drawn into Syria's civil war.

The fact that the soldiers were on

Iraqi soil at all raises questions about Baghdad's apparent willingness to quietly aid the embattled regime of Syrian President Bashar Assad.

The well-coordinated attack, which Iraqi officials blamed on al-Qaida's Iraq arm, also suggests possible coordination between the militant group and its ideological allies in Syria who rank among the rebels' most potent fighters.

### Study Finds Declining Life Span for US Women

**NEW YORK (AP)** • A new study offers more compelling evidence that life expectancy for some U.S. women is actually falling.

The research found that women age 75 and younger are dying at higher rates in nearly half of the nation's counties — many of them rural and in the South and West.

# Intermountain Gas Asks State Regulators to Allow Surplus Sales

**BOISE** • Intermountain Gas wants the state's permission to sell surplus liquefied natural gas to non-utility customers.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission is taking comments through March 18 on the request, which will not affect customer rates and may actually lower them, according to a notice from the PUC.

Intermountain Gas expects to have excess capacity at its Nampa facility for the next few years. Under the proposal, the company would first satisfy utility customer demand, then sell any extra natural gas and share half of the sales revenue with its utility customers.

Contracts with any non-utility customers would include protections for Intermountain Gas and its regular customers from any financial risk stemming from the sales.

## Idaho Health Insurers Pile Up Surpluses

**BOISE** • Idaho's two major health insurance companies are using money from double-digit rate increases to build savings and investment accounts that now top \$600 million.

Similarly rising stockpiles among insurers doing business in Washington have raised concerns by its insurance commissioner that the surpluses are more than the companies need. He wants legislation to let him consider the size of the stockpiles when he sets rates.

Oregon's insurance regulator already has that authority and has used it to reduce rate increases.

But no one appears to be making such an argument in the Gem State. Blue Cross of Idaho and Regence BlueShield of Idaho say the savings and investments aren't a valid reason to charge their members less. They say the surpluses will protect them, and their members, in the event of a surprise wave of claims or a surge in medical prices, and in the face of a grab bag of unknowns coming with national health care reform.

"In the risk business, surplus is the key to survival — and consumer protection," Regence's sister company in Washington said.

Blue Cross of Idaho had about a \$485 million surplus at the end of 2012, up 84 percent since 2008. The company reported \$1.23 billion in revenue in 2011, the latest year for which data are available.

Regence BlueShield's surplus totaled \$146 million in 2012, up 35 percent from 2008. Its 2011 revenue was \$466 million.

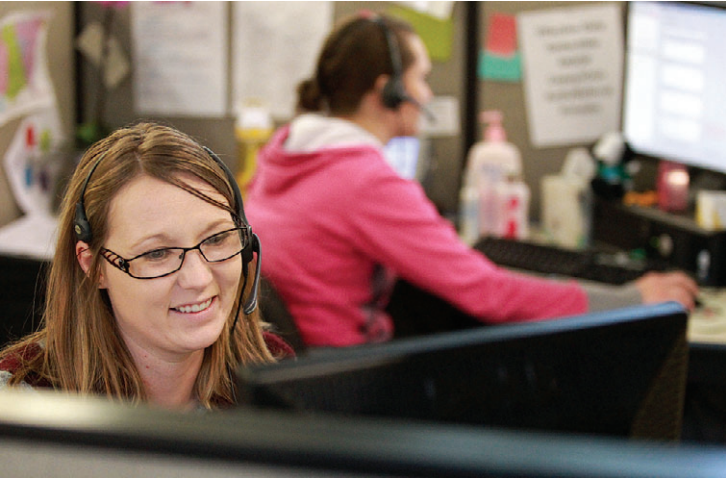

## Idaho Has Highest Percentage of Minimum-wage Workers

**COEUR D'ALENE** • Tamitha Murphy knows she had a lot of company when she made minimum wage.

"I do know that a lot of people make minimum wage, and I was one of them not long ago," the clerk at Ady's Convenience and Car Wash in Post Falls said.

That's why Murphy is thankful for her \$8-an-hour job.

"I'm more happy here, and I like my job," said Murphy, who formerly worked at a fast-food restaurant.

Idaho was No. 1 in the nation for the percentage of hourly workers — 7.7 percent — who

made the state's minimum wage of \$7.25 or less in 2012, according to a report released on Wednesday by the Idaho Department of Labor.

Three of every four jobs the Idaho economy created last year were in the service sector, where the minimum wage jobs are, according to the report.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor statistics estimated that 31,000 of Idaho's 404,000 hourly workers were paid the minimum wage last year. That was an increase of 12,000 from 2011 when 5 percent of the state's hourly workforce made the minimum wage or less. That ranked Idaho 30th in 2011, while Georgia was No. 1 at 9.6 percent.

Idaho's jump from 2011 to 2012 was easily the largest of any of the 16 states that posted increases. Nationally, 4.7 percent made minimum wage or less in 2012, down from 5.2 percent in 2011.

Idaho's increase was likely due to more part-time workers, teenagers entering the workforce and the need for secondary incomes, according to the report.

Steve Wilson, president and CEO of the Coeur d'Alene Chamber of Commerce, said the report underscores the need and importance of economic development efforts to recruit and support firms tied to sectors such as manufacturing and technology.

"Skilled jobs pay more," Wilson said. "Manufacturing and tech-

nology companies need and hire more skilled workers. To improve the overall economy, we need to grow (in those areas). We should start by listening to and working with those companies that are here now, nurturing their growth. We must take the necessary steps to assure for a skilled workforce."

Larry Kenck, of Post Falls and the new chairman of the Idaho Democratic Party, said the wage statistics show why his group plans to focus on efforts that create good-paying jobs.

"Not the type of jobs that it takes three to pay for the mortgage," he said.

Kenck said the wage situation has a ripple effect because when people don't have disposable income, businesses also feel the pinch.

He said state leaders should be held accountable for Idaho's "terrible" minimum wage statistic, which is felt most by the working class.

most in the U.S., requiring health insurers to keep a minimum of money set aside — an amount that’s calculated using a secret formula. That amount is intended to tell regulators that the company isn’t going broke.

The Blue Cross Blue Shield Association wants its 38 member companies, which include Blue Cross of Idaho and Regence, to keep almost twice the legal minimum. Blue Cross now has about five times as much and Regence BlueShield about four times as much.

A large surplus means “the financial solvency of a company is more protected, though defining ‘large’ surplus is not really easy,” said Tom Donovan, deputy director of the Idaho Department of Insurance, in an email. “It depends on the nature of the business, risks insured, investment risk, credit risk, reinsurance arrangements, etc. If one were to say there was a con to a ‘large’ surplus, it might be that premiums were ‘too high.’”

### Idaho in Context

The state can’t tell an insurance company that its premiums are too high because it’s socking away a certain amount of that premium toward its surplus. There is no “too much” surplus under the law.

The Affordable Care Act sets a 20 percent cap on how much premium money a company may use for its own purposes, including salaries and surplus. Blue Cross of Idaho and Regence BlueShield have been well under the 20 percent limit in the past.

The insurance chiefs of Idaho’s neighboring states to the west are either fighting to get or already have the power to look at surpluses in deciding whether rates are fair.

In Washington, Regence BlueShield’s surplus is about \$1.05 billion, according to the insurance commissioner. Premier Blue Cross’ surplus is about \$1.15 billion.

“Insurance companies aren’t supposed to have a loss,” said Rich Roesler, a spokesman for Washington Insurance Commissioner Mike Kreidler. “But once you hit a billion dollars, that’s pretty hard to justify. You’ve got families out there struggling to pay premiums (and) rates going up far exceeding the inflation rate. ... It’s hard to square the fact that premiums have gone up and up and up, while surpluses go up and up and up.”

The health care reform law also gives Idaho and other states an ability to say whether double-digit rate increases are reasonable. Both of Idaho’s nonprofit insurers and a few out-of-state companies, including Oregon’s PacificSource, filed rate increases last year that ranged from 10 percent to 26 percent.

Without considering surpluses, Idaho’s regulators ruled that most of the rate hikes were fair. The regulators looked mainly at how much Idahoans

were costing insurers in hospitalizations, prescription drugs and visits to the doctor. The state decided insurers were right to ask members to pay more when they were using more, and costlier, services.

### Insurers: We Need More

Nearly one in five Idahoans lacks insurance, in many cases because they can’t afford a health plan. One goal of national health care reform is to get everyone insured. Another is to keep insurers from jacking up prices for sick people.

These changes mean a larger surplus is needed to cover more members who likely have more health risks, according to insurance spokespeople.

“To help put it into context, our 2011 capital reserve level was approximately \$860 per member for the year,” said Georganne Benjamin, a spokeswoman for Regence BlueShield of Idaho’s parent company, Cambia Health Solutions. “When you compare that number against the fact that one ambulance ride in Idaho costs anywhere from \$700 to \$1,000, depending on which part of the state you are in, the current capital reserves amount for Regence BlueShield of Idaho can quickly be depleted should an untimely health event occur.”

Blue Cross set aside about \$91 million of what members paid in premiums in the past four years for its surplus. The average member has been contributing \$56 a year to the surplus, said spokeswoman Karen Early.

The surplus also benefited from \$94 million in good investments and \$35 million in a 2009 tax credit.

Early said Blue Cross of Idaho made just one-third or one-half of the margin that for-profit insurers such as Humana, Aetna, United and Cigna made in 2011.

The company has a duty to the people it covers to be ready for medical costs to grow each year — and for more members to use more services, she said. “When you go back 10 years, things didn’t look so good,” Early said. “You have to plan through good periods to get through bad periods.”

Roesler, the Washington spokesman, doesn’t think that’s a fair argument.

“If claims are going up and that’s the reason they need surplus — well, frankly, that’s why you have rates,” he said.

Insurance companies also routinely carry “reinsurance” policies to protect them from paralyzing losses on huge claims. Because the health care reform law makes it illegal for insurers to put lifetime caps on medical claims, Blue Cross of Idaho now carries insurance that kicks in at \$2 million in claims. The company had 14 people with claims exceeding \$1 million last year, Early said.

Having enough money, but not too much, is a balancing act, insurers say. The companies aren’t out to stockpile cash at the expense of their members, Regence’s Benjamin said. That would be self-destructive.

company develops and when to hire more workers.

There has to be a way to

do that, said Fort.

“If seasonal employees could work for another call center or different place and learn different skills, marketable skills, and improve communication and learn even if it is just for that time, we could make it better,” Fort said.

The ultimate goal is to help cut the Magic Valley’s unemployment rates.

“We’re focusing on improvement,” said Arrossa.

“We need to remember we’re all a team in this area.”

“Out here in our communities it isn’t a statistic at all; it is real families of hard-working Idahoans who need fair wages and a fair shot at prosperity to give their children the bright futures they deserve,” Kenck said.

Idaho’s percentage of minimum wage earners in 2012 was its highest mark in the decade that the labor bureau has been releasing the estimates. The state’s previous highest percentage was in 2010 at 7.6 percent, which ranked Idaho 16th.

The report does not have a breakdown on the statistics by county.

In addition to having the highest percentage of minimum wage earners, Idaho is among the states that offer the lowest minimum wage. Idaho is among 23 states where the minimum wage is the same as the federal level of \$7.25.

While Murphy is only making 75 cents above Idaho’s minimum wage of \$7.25, she said she has felt the difference in her financial situation and, perhaps more importantly, her self-esteem.

“I wasn’t as happy when I was making minimum wage,” she said.



## The Scary Hidden Stressor

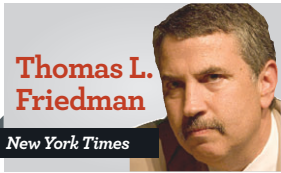
In her introduction to a compelling new study, “The Arab Spring and Climate Change,” released Thursday, the Princeton scholar Anne-Marie Slaughter notes that crime shows often rely on the concept of a “stressor.” A stressor, she explains, is a “sudden change in circumstances or environment that interacts with a complicated psychological profile in a way that leads a previously quiescent person to become violent.” The stressor is never the only explanation for the crime, but it is inevitably an important factor in a complex set of variables that lead to a disaster.

“The Arab Spring and Climate Change” doesn’t claim that climate change caused the recent wave of Arab revolutions, but, taken together, the essays make a strong case that the interplay between climate change, food prices (particularly wheat) and politics is a hidden stressor that helped to fuel the revolutions and will continue to make consolidating them into stable democracies much more difficult.

Jointly produced by the Center for American Progress, the Stimson Center and the Center for Climate and Security, this collection of essays opens with the Oxford University geographer Troy Sternberg, who demonstrates how in 2010–11, in tandem with the Arab awakenings, “a once-in-a-century winter drought in China” — combined, at the same time, with record-breaking heat waves or floods in other key wheat-growing countries (Ukraine, Russia, Canada and Australia) — “contributed to global wheat shortages and skyrocketing bread prices” in wheat-importing states, most of which are in the Arab world. Only a small fraction — 6 percent to 18 percent — of annual global wheat production is traded across borders, explained Sternberg, “so any decrease in world supply contributes to a sharp rise in wheat prices and has a serious economic impact in countries such as Egypt, the largest wheat importer in the world.”

The numbers tell the story: “Bread provides one-third of the caloric intake in Egypt, a country where 38 percent of income is spent on food,” notes Sternberg. “The doubling of global wheat prices — from \$157/metric ton in June 2010 to \$326/metric ton in February 2011 — thus significantly impacted the country’s food supply and availability.” Global food prices peaked at an all-time high in March 2011, shortly after President Hosni Mubarak was toppled in Egypt.

Consider this: The world’s top nine wheat importers are in the Middle East: “Seven had political protests resulting in civilian deaths in 2011,” said Sternberg. “Households in the countries that experience political unrest spend, on average, more than 35 percent of their income on food supplies,” compared with less than 10 percent in developed countries.



Everything is linked: Chinese drought and Russian bushfires produced wheat shortages leading to higher bread prices fueling protests in Tahrir Square. Sternberg calls it the globalization of “hazard.”

Ditto in Syria and Libya. In their essay, the study’s co-editors, Francesco Femia and Caitlin Werrell, note that from 2006 to 2011, up to 60 percent of Syria’s land experienced the worst drought ever recorded there — at a time when Syria’s population was exploding and its corrupt and inefficient regime was proving incapable of managing the stress.

In 2009, they noted, the U.N. and other international agencies reported that more than 800,000 Syrians lost their entire livelihoods as a result of the great drought, which led to “a massive exodus of farmers, herders, and agriculturally dependent rural families from the Syrian countryside to the cities,” fueling unrest. The future does not look much brighter. “On a scale of wetness conditions,” Femia and Werrell note, “where a reading of -4 or below is considered extreme drought; a 2010 report by the National Center for Atmospheric Research shows that Syria and its neighbors face projected readings of -8 to -15 as a result of climatic changes in the next 25 years.” Similar trends, they note, are true for Libya, whose “primary source of water is a finite cache of fossilized groundwater, which already has been severely stressed while coastal aquifers have been progressively invaded by seawater.”

Scientists like to say that, when it comes to climate change, we need to manage what is unavoidable and avoid what is unmanageable. That requires collective action globally to mitigate as much climate change as we can and the building of resilient states locally to adapt to what we can’t mitigate. The Arab world is doing the opposite. Arab states as a group are the biggest lobbyists against efforts to reduce oil and fuel subsidies. According to the International Monetary Fund, as much as one-fifth of some Arab state budgets go to subsidizing gasoline and cooking fuel — more than \$200 billion a year in the Arab world as a whole — rather than into spending on health and education. Meanwhile, locally, Arab states are being made less resilient by the tribalism and sectarianism that are eating away at their democratic revolutions.

As Sarah Johnstone and Jeffrey Mazo of the International Institute for Strategic Studies conclude in their essay, “fledgling democracies with weak institutions might find it even harder to deal with the root problems than the regimes they replace, and they may be more vulnerable to further unrest as a result.” Yikes.

## How Much Should BP Pay?

The following editorial appeared in Monday’s Washington Post:

How much should BP pay for the carelessness that led to the disastrous Deepwater Horizon oil spill in 2010?

Last week the giant oil company, the federal government and some Gulf Coast states started wrangling over that question. The parties gathered in New Orleans to begin a federal civil trial, the first phase of a process that will determine the size of the Clean Water Act fines the company must pay.

If the court finds that BP was merely negligent, the company could pay as much as \$3.5 billion in fines. If the judge finds that BP was

grossly negligent, the company could have to pay as much as \$17.6 billion.

Whatever the figure, it would be on top of the \$20 billion to \$30 billion that BP already has distributed or committed to pay. It would also settle only one of many outstanding legal claims against the company. BP is still liable to pay for the environmental injury it caused, according to the results of a process called the Natural Resources Damage Assessment. Gulf states also recently demanded a whopping \$34 billion in economic damages. Given all of these, the Economist calculates, BP’s total Deepwater Horizon payout could reach an incredible \$90 billion.

A bill anywhere near that large is impossible to justify. Millions of barrels of oil

spewed for weeks into one of the world’s most productive fisheries, the full effects of which are still the subject of heated debate. Environmentalists fret about what extant oil will do to already eroding coastal wetlands, as well as the gulf’s complex food chain. BP must pay to clean up the environmental damage it did. This is important both to ensure that restoration efforts have the funding they need and to avoid encouraging others to take unwarranted risks.

But, in establishing BP’s punishment, federal and state governments shouldn’t try to extract excessive punitive fines. Even if BP is found to have been grossly negligent, it does not follow that it must face the harshest punishment the law allows. The principle of fair-

ness does not justify treating the company like a piggy bank for gulf-state budgets, discounting the mobilization of men and money the company directed following the spill. Neither does good sense. The government should welcome economically useful investment and enterprise, and seeking a maximal punishment for BP would do the opposite, discouraging even firms that would behave more responsibly than BP did in the run-up to the Deepwater Horizon blowout.

Instead of unending court proceedings, the parties should strike the proper balance in a settlement of their various claims. The sooner the better; restoration efforts get only harder the longer the wrangling continues.

# Gooding Council Wants Water Bond on Sept. Ballot

**GOODING** • Gooding City Council members voted unanimously to place a revenue bond on the September ballot to improve the city’s water system.

That decision came after spending 40 minutes in executive session to discuss the water system. They did not set a bond amount.

The decision comes less than a week after a 5th District judge dismissed the city’s request for judicial confirmation of a \$9.45 million bond to improve the city’s water system.

Mayor Duke Morton said the council chose to go into executive session because they were responding to the recent litigation.

“Choosing to appeal was an option, but obviously we didn’t choose that,” he said.

The council will continue to discuss the revenue bond during its upcoming City Council meetings.

Council members also agreed to start work on moving its city and rural fire department to a new location.

The move would be to a donated piece of land near Montana and 21st St., just southeast of where the department is located now,

said Fire Chief Brandon Covey at special meeting also on Monday night.

The project is still in the early planning stages. No timeline or price estimates have been made, Covey said.

“I would like to see the project broken into certain projects over three to four years,” he said.

Morton said he would like to see the project move forward.

“Let’s kick the snowball off the hill,” he said.

One possible challenge is land access. Currently, the land is owned by the county. If the city were to start building anything on it, one option would be to annex the property.

“Let’s start looking into that, to see what it would take,” Morton said.

In the meantime, Covey said he wants to start clearing the land to get ready to level it.

“We’re going to have to find some funding,” he said.

During the council’s regular meeting:

The council voted to waive a water deposit fee for McDonalds.

placed on the ballot. The committee decided that a revenue bond exists for just this kind of project and that the project will benefit those who pay for it, Ward said.

• The amount of money and what it will pay for: If passed by voters, the \$38 million bond will nearly double current wastewater capacity. The project will accommodate the city for the next 20 years, Ward told the council. The money will cover improvements to getting waste to the facility.

• Format: Most residential sewer users can expect to see about a \$5.21 increase on their monthly bill, Ward said. That’s about 27 percent above current rates. Ward said the increase would still place Twin Falls in the bottom half of sewer rates for cities around the state.

• When: Ward said the committee believes the current capacity issues and low interest rates are good reasons to put the bond on the May ballot, rather than waiting for November.

When asked by Councilman Jim Munn what the consequences of not acting were, City Manager Travis Rothweiler stressed that the city is currently at its wastewater capacity.

Without improvements, Rothweiler said, the city can’t allow a single additional wastewater permit.

“To stop is essentially to decline,” Ward said in her presentation.

Rothweiler said having the facility at capacity makes it more difficult to manage. It will be difficult to ensure the plant remains in compliance with codes, he said.

Councilwoman Rebecca Mills-Sojka questioned if there was enough time to educate the public and get the word out about the bond was on the May ballot.

Reid said the committee believed it would most likely become more expensive to borrow money in November. The committee also worried about the bond becoming political among candidates on the November ballot. Reid said the committee believed that having the bond on the May ballot would get the ball rolling on the long process of improvements.

# Rape Solicitation Trial Delayed

**TWIN FALLS** • A trial for a man accused of using Craigslist classified ads to solicit other men to rape a woman has been delayed again. It was scheduled to begin next week.

Justin Matthew Crawford, 32, appeared in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on Monday, March 4, for a pre-

trial hearing.

At the hearing, Crawford’s attorney, Lynn Dunlap, said he needed time to get a new mental evaluation for Crawford. Dunlap said the original doctor moved out of state and won’t return for the trial unless he gets “substantial compensation.”

Dunlap said his client

couldn’t afford the price and he didn’t think Twin Falls County should foot the bill either, so he was looking for a new doctor who could perform an evaluation and attend the trial.

Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecutor Julie Sturgill said the state agreed with the delay since it needs time to find its

own mental health expert who will counter the defense.

A trial is now scheduled for June 19-21. A pretrial hearing is scheduled for June 10.

Crawford was charged with solicitation of rape and solicitation of burglary after police said he posted an ad on Craigslist claiming to be the woman and asking to be raped in her home. The *Times-News* does not identify victims of sexual assault.

# Trials Merged in October Stabbings

**TWIN FALLS** • Trials for two men accused of an October stabbing that injured one man have been merged into one trial next week.

The trial for Jeffrey Allred, 23, and Roberto Garza Jr., 20, is scheduled to begin at 8:30 a.m. March 12.

Both men are charged with one count of aggravated battery with use of a deadly weapon or instrument.

At about 4:30 a.m. Oct. 28, deputies investigated an altercation involving several people at 1790 Blake St. N. in Twin Falls.

According to court documents, authorities responded for a call about a man who was stabbed in the stomach.

As officers arrived, they noted seeing pools of blood in the street near the home. A knife was reportedly found in the front yard of the home, the documents state.

The court documents detail a verbal altercation that then turned physical.

According to the documents, rocks were thrown at one point during the fight and a 17-year-old female was hit in the head and began bleeding profusely. The girl was taken by air ambulance to a Boise hospital where she recovered.

The girl was later charged with aggravated battery with a deadly weapon and conspiracy to commit aggravated battery. A trial is scheduled for her for April 24.

Two 17-year-old boys were also charged in the

alleged attack.

One pleaded guilty to one count of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, while a charge of conspiracy to commit aggravated battery will be dropped by prosecutors. He’s scheduled to be sentenced April 8.

The other 17-year-old boy was charged with aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, aggravated battery causing great bodily harm and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

In January, Nicholas Gray, 20, also accused in the case, pleaded guilty to one count of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon while his conspiracy charge was dropped.

According to court documents, Gray became angry when he learned the 17-year-old girl was hit by the alleged victim, then gathered the group to attack the alleged victim.

The group traveled to a party where the alleged victim was. During the altercation, police say the man was beaten severely and stabbed in his abdomen and chest. When police arrived at the scene, officers reported numerous pools of blood in the street. At some point during the fight, the 17-year-old girl was hit in the head with a rock.

The male victim underwent emergency surgery for a stab wound. Upon waking, he identified Allred and one of two 17-year-old males as two of his attackers, according to police. The man said he thought four people attacked him, but told police he lost consciousness fairly quickly during the fight.

# Senate Committee Advances Religious Student Group Bill

**BOISE (AP)** • Idaho’s public universities would be barred from denying official recognition and other benefits to religious student groups seeking to restrict leadership positions only to those truly committed to their faith, under a bill making its way through the Senate.

Along party lines Monday, the Senate State Affairs Committee approved legislation supporters say is designed to protect religious-based clubs from arbitrary discrimination, specifically among groups seeking a statement of faith from their leaders. The bill does not set the same criteria on club membership.

Several Boise State University students affiliated with two campus Christian clubs argued religious groups by nature must have leaders who believe in the tenets of the faith.

But they say their attempts to incorporate faith statements into bylaws has conflicted with university policy, threatening official campus recognition status and the access to the benefits afforded to other student groups.

“Religious beliefs are the purpose of the group,” said Nate Jensen, a member of

the Intervarsity Christian Fellowship at BSU. “These groups are discriminated against if they are not permitted to have student leaders who didn’t stand for the same beliefs.”

The bill is now headed to the full Senate, and along with it an opinion from the Idaho Attorney General concluding the legislation doesn’t create conflicts with the Idaho Constitution.

Specifically, the bill would prohibit any of Idaho’s four public universities from enforcing policies to deny religious student groups benefits afforded to other campus clubs based on the religious club’s mandate that leaders “adhere to its sincerely held religious beliefs or standards of conduct.”

But among officials from Idaho’s college campuses, the legislation is unnecessary and creates the likelihood for discrimination against groups that don’t want or need faith statements from leaders.

Kent Nelson, general counsel for the University of Idaho, said colleges already have policies in place barring discrimination student groups from discriminating in its membership or leadership.

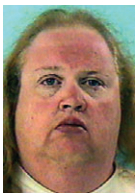
# Buhl Woman’s Trials Delayed for Mental Health Evaluation

**TWIN FALLS** • Trials for a Buhl woman accused in two fraud cases have been canceled pending a mental health evaluation to decide whether she’s mentally fit for trial.

Lisa Dawn Holley, 44, and her husband, Michael Holley, 54, were charged with two counts of grand theft by deception after allegedly falsely claiming their daughter was being treated for cancer, then raising funds for her treatment.

In October, prosecutors charged Lisa Holley with an additional count of grand theft by deception. Prosecutors say Holley falsely claimed she was pregnant with triplets and received more than \$1,000 in cash and goods from church

members in Buhl.

Holley told the *Times-News* she has documentation of the pregnancy from her doctor, which she will produce in court.

During a motion hearing on Monday, March 4, Lisa Holley’s attorney Tim Williams said he’s been concerned about Lisa Holley’s understanding of court proceedings and the charge against her.

Williams said medication may have contributed to Holley’s comprehension issues.

A trial will not be rescheduled unless Holley is found to be competent to stand trial.

Prosecutors agreed to the delay.

A mental evaluation has also been ordered for Michael Holley. No hearings are scheduled in the case against him.

# UTAH LAWMAKERS ADVANCE GUN PUSHBACK BILL

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** • Utah lawmakers have advanced a bill that declares Utah alone is able to regulate firearms in the state.

The proposal is one of several high-profile firearms bills in the Legislature this year, and legislative attorneys and critics said it’s very likely a court will find the law unconstitutional if it passes.

The bill’s sponsor, Rep. Brian Greene, R-Pleasant Grove, said the measure is an assertion of state’s rights and individual liberty, and he doesn’t believe it’s unconstitutional.

A House Committee approved the bill 7-2 Monday morning, with two Democrats voting against. It now goes to the full House for consideration.

The bill states that any employee or officer at the federal, state or local level, may not enforce any federal laws or regulations related to guns within Utah.

Similar legislation has been sprouting up in other states in response to President Barack Obama’s call for increased gun control after recent mass shootings.

Greene told lawmakers on Monday that states are “waking up” after years of encroaching federal regulations.

“States are beginning to push back,” Greene said. “There are 26 other states that in this 2013 legislative session have introduced a bill similar to mine.”

In January, Obama signed executive orders addressing mental health issues and providing authorities more training, among other provisions. Other proposals,

which would need to be passed by Congress, call for a ban on assault weapons and high-capacity ammunition magazines.

The plan has attracted strong criticism from gun rights supporters.

Greene said his bill is necessary to push back against federal overreach and defend the U.S. Constitution. But such measures, which make it a state crime to enforce federal law, have been ruled unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Greene’s bill originally said that any federal officer who attempts to take guns away from Utah residents could be arrested by local law enforcement and charged with a felony. Lawmakers stripped that language from the bill two weeks ago after expressing concerns that it could lead to a chaotic situation, with federal and local law enforcement squaring off while an agent is confronting someone accused of having an illegal firearm.

An analysis by legislative attorneys still notes that the bill will likely be found unconstitutional.

Greene said his bill aligns with Utah’s constitution, which says the Legislature can regulate firearms in the state, while Second Amendment reads as a “blanket prohibition” on federal firearm regulations.

Rep. Brian King, D-Salt Lake City, disagreed and said the U.S. Supreme Court has recognized the federal government can regulate guns and said he won’t vote for a bill that legislative attorneys say would very likely be found unconstitutional.

# Gonzaga Ranked No. 1 in AP Top 25 for First Time

**SPOKANE, Wash.** • The to-do list for the Gonzaga basketball team got shorter Monday: For the first time, the Zags were ranked No. 1 in The Associated Press Top 25 poll.

Sweet, but it may get bumpier from there.

Next: Avoiding the potholes that have stopped every other No. 1 this season, then finding a way to the Final Four.

"It's an honor that people would think this highly of all of us in the program," coach Mark Few said in a prepared statement Monday afternoon. "It's great for the program, great for the school, great for the city of Spokane and the region and the entire Northwest."

"We still have a lot more to accomplish starting this weekend in Las Vegas and moving forward to the NCAA tournament," said Few, who reportedly went fishing on Monday. "We're looking forward to the rest of the season and making it last as long as we can."

The fact that Few would skip perhaps the biggest day in program history to go fishing says much about the priorities of the coach who helped build and has sustained Gonzaga's success. Few has repeatedly said he enjoys the balance between work and family time that Gonzaga provides, a major reason he has not left for a bigger program.

Students celebrated the No. 1 ranking on the downtown campus Monday, and the food services department wheeled out a 20-foot cake that said "Congratulations Zags."

Staying No. 1 has been tough this season, with Gonzaga the fifth school to hold the spot after replacing Indiana this week. The others were Duke, Louisville and Michigan.

"We don't believe there is any jinx," assistant coach Tommy Lloyd said earlier Monday. "Obviously, it's a dream for us, the ultimate accomplishment."

Gonzaga, a small Jesuit school in Spokane, is where

crooner Bing Crosby went and where John Stockton threaded pinpoint passes. It has the best record in Division I at 29-2 following weekend wins against BYU and Portland. The Hoosiers, beaten by Minnesota last week, dropped to No. 2.

"We're not necessarily in pursuit of a ranking," Lloyd said. "We're trying to get to the NCAA tournament. When that's over, as coaches we can look back and realize what an accomplishment it is and how difficult it is."

The Zags are the 57th school to be ranked No. 1 since the AP poll began in January 1949. The school is considered a mid-major and reached No. 2 for the first time last week. Now it will play for the first time at No. 1 on Saturday night in the West Coast Conference semifinals.

The school received 51 first-place votes from the 65-member national media panel, 44 more than Indiana. Duke, winners over Miami after a loss to Virginia, remained third with five first-place votes.

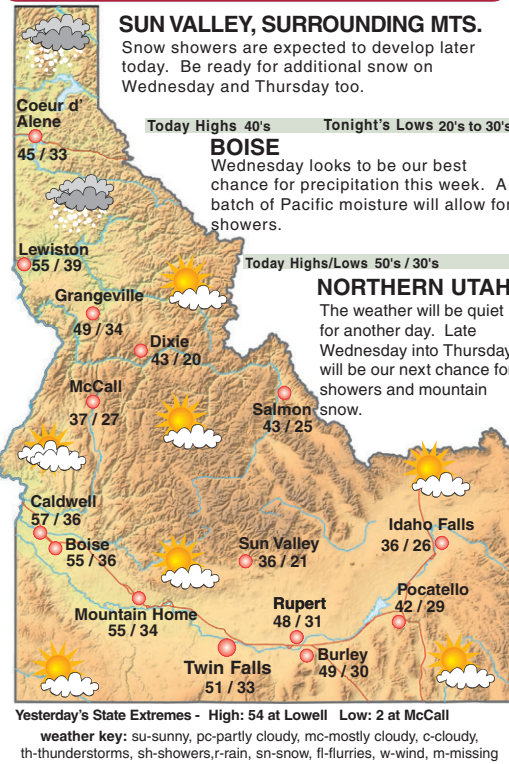

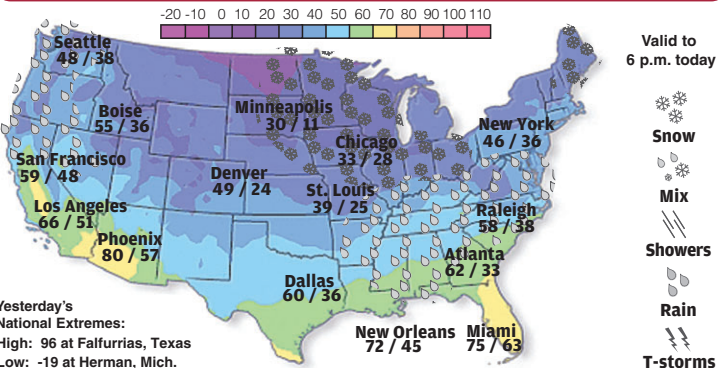

last 11 seasons. The Broncos have finished in the top-20 of the Associated Press poll nine times during that span and won nine conference titles since 2002. Over that nine-year period, the Broncos have produced a record of 129-15 (.896), appeared in 11 consecutive bowl games and won seven of those postseason contests. Boise State head coach Chris Petersen is 84-8 since taking over the Boise State program in 2006. "With our neutral site (Dallas) game versus Oklahoma State in 2014, the addition of Pitt and Syracuse to the ACC and now this series, we feel we are putting our football program in the best possible position to compete in the new BCS beginning in 2014," Spetman added. Florida State will also start playing Notre Dame on a rotation basis as part of the Irish's commitment to play five Atlantic Coast Conference teams each year. Notre Dame has agreed to join the conference in all sports, but football. Depending on conference realignment moves, the Irish could be playing ACC schools as early as next year. Florida State finished 12-2 and No. 10 in The Associated Press' final poll of the season, but played a schedule that included two weak lower-division, Football Championship Subdivision, schools that severely damaged its strength of schedule. The Seminoles play only one FCS school, Bethune-Cookman, in 2013 with its other nonconference home games against Idaho and Nevada. Since Jimbo Fisher became head coach in the 2010 season, Florida State is 4-0 against lower-division schools, having outscored them by a combined 245-19.

Defending against four hearts, West led the club king, then thoughtfully shifted to the spade jack, appreciating that he would need to set up winners for his side before declarer could establish the diamond suit for discards.

Declarer played low from dummy and won his spade ace. It looked logical to draw trump next, then play a spade to the king, followed by another spade. East won the trick and exited with the spade nine, ruffed by declarer in dummy.

Declarer could now deduce that West had a singleton diamond and so played a low diamond from dummy. If West won the trick, he would have to concede a ruff-and-discard by leading a club, whereas if East rose with the diamond king he, would be the one endplayed.

Note that East might have exited with the fourth diamond instead of leading the fourth spade. Now to make the contract, declarer must duck this trick, which will leave West endplayed to give the ruff-sluff again. If declarer takes the diamond ace, then East will be able to get in again and cash his two winners.

The contract can be defeated only by an initial spade lead. (However, the play is quite complex if declarer wins the spade king, draws trump, then plays a club. The defenders must win and play a diamond, and when declarer takes the trick and plays a spade, East must go up with the queen to swallow his partner's 10).

ANSWER: Whatever form of scoring is in use, and whatever the vulnerability is, this is a hand where you want to balance to show the majors, using DONT, Cappelletti, Landy or Meckwell. Passing out one no-trump rates to see declarer wrapping up seven-plus tricks on a minor-suit lead. Facing any sort of fit in hearts or spades, you won't go for a number — and might make your contract.

**DEAR ABBY:** My husband and I are expecting our first child (a boy) later this year. How do I teach my son to enjoy solitude and his own company? Too many people today turn on the radio or TV because they can't appreciate the quiet.

I want my little one to have loving friends, but also periods of quiet, reflective fun time by himself. My husband and I grew up with siblings, but he hates solitude while I find lots of activities to do by myself. I am never lonely. What's the difference between solitude and loneliness?

**DEAR SOLITARY WOMAN:** The difference between solitude and loneliness depends on how an individual handles being alone. Some people find silence threatening, while others — like yourself — need it to recharge their batteries.

For your son to be at ease when he's alone, ration his television time. Read to him so he'll learn to appreciate the entertainment books provide. Give him items to play with that foster creativity, such as clay, paints and paper, a cardboard box he can pretend is a playhouse or a spaceship. (You may find he prefers it to whatever toy the carton contained.) If he's encouraged to use it, his imagination will flourish.

**DEAR ABBY:** My father-in-law, "Earl," is an alcoholic and an avid gun enthusiast. He owns many weapons; I don't know the exact number. He has been accumulating ammunition at an accelerated rate because he's afraid that large clips will soon be banned. He drinks to excess and becomes beligerent and angry when drunk.

Last summer, during one of his moments of inebriation, he shot a gun into the air as a "surprise" to the eight family members who were sitting within two to 10 feet of him. 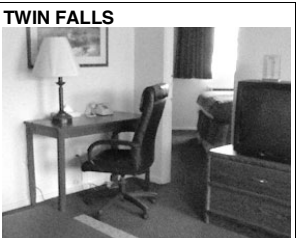

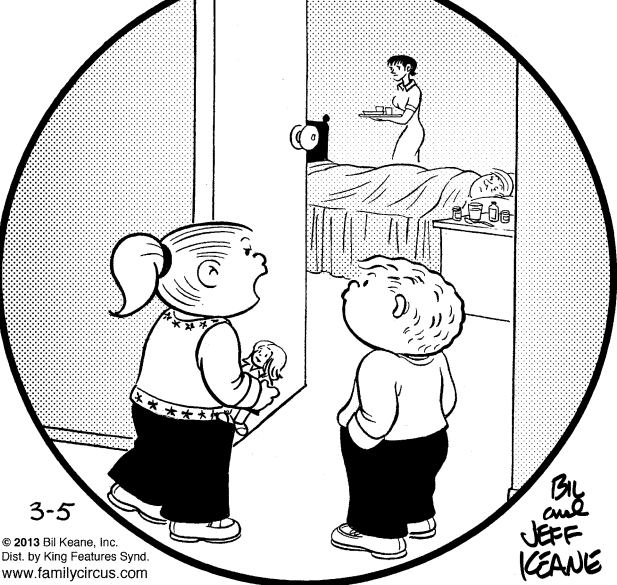

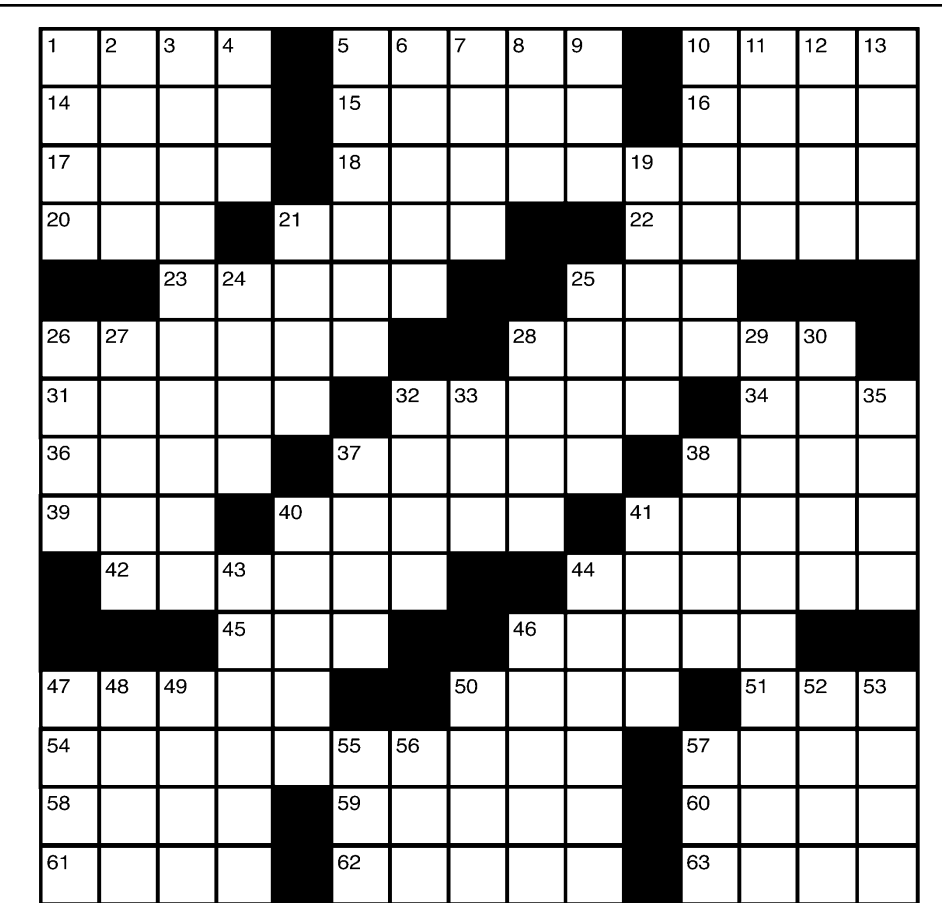
