### Hansen District to Discuss Next Steps after Levy Failure

**HANSEN** • The Hansen School District remains undecided about how to proceed after a proposed supplemental levy failed to pass last week.

"I'm not ready to talk about

it," Superintendent Susan Scherz told the Times-News on Friday. She's hoping board members will have a better grasp of the situation after they meet tonight, March 18.

The district asked voters to pass a two-year, \$190,000 supplement levy that would help maintain its staff, salaries and benefits. But feelings were mixed in the community, she said. The levy would have cost taxpayers \$17.60 per year for every \$10,000 in home value.

Voters rejected the proposed levy 51 percent to 49 percent. Staffing cuts are a possibility, ter the ballots were counted March 12. But, she continued, she wants to do everything she can to avoid such measures.

Scherz told the Times-News af-

The district has 29 teachers and around 370 students.

Hopefully, she said, today will provide some answers.

**RENO, Nev. (AP)** • Officials in a rural northeastern Nevada county have approved a pilot project designed to keep sage grouse off the endangered species list by killing ravens with poisoned eggs and by reducing wildfire threats through grazing.

Elko County commissioners say the program set to begin on the 15,000-acre Devils Gate Ranch is needed because wildfires and ravens pose the biggest threat to the imperiled chicken-sized bird. They say fires destroy sagebrush the birds rely on, while ravens are by far its most common predator.

It's the first such privatelocal government agreement to stave off a federal listing, commissioners said, and was prompted by concern that listing the large grounddwelling bird could result in federal restrictions on grazing, mining, oil and gas drilling, and other activities on public land.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced in 2010 that sage grouse across the West deserved protection under the Endangered Species Act. The agency pledged to make a final listing decision by late 2015.

Sage grouse populations have fallen 90 percent in the past century, and habitat has declined 50 percent.

"We think it's a program that will sweep the West, but we don't think the federal government will support it. They've bought into the claims of environmentalists," Commissioner Grant Gerber said. "We think it's mainly going to be a private initiative and local-county initiative."

Commissioners attribute the bird's decline to dramatic increases in wildfires and ravens. Livestock reduce cheat grass and other fuels on the range that feed fires, they say, and some of the worst fire seasons on record occurred after the government sharply reduced grazing on public lands in recent decades.

"If we don't control the ravens and don't stop the fires, the sage grouse are in real trouble," Gerber said.

The Idaho-based Western Watersheds Project criticized the plan, saying it will destroy sage grouse habitat. The organization called for the removal of livestock, the closure of two-track roads and a ban on new oil and gas drilling to conserve the bird's habitat.

"Their fixation on killing and poisoning native wildlife and turning lands back into a dustbowl is really twisted," said Katie Fite, the group's biodiversity director. "It's a big distraction from ranchers having to be held accountable for limiting their cattle and sheep herd impacts to sagebrush habitats on public lands."

Ted Koch, state supervisor of the Fish and Wildlife Service in Reno, agreed with the county that wildfires and ravens are factors in the bird's decline.

But his agency views habitat loss and fragmentation as the most serious threat to sage grouse in the West, he said, and considers the spread of invasive species such as cheat grass as its biggest threat in the Great



RAMALLAH, West Bank (AP) • President Barack Obama will find a disillusioned Palestinian public, skeptical about his commitment to promoting Mideast peace, when he visits the region.

Obama's trip, beginning Wednesday, appears aimed primarily at resetting the sometimes troubled relationship with Israel. But

winning the trust of the Palestinians, who accuse him of unfairly favoring Israel, could be a far more difficult task.

After suffering disappointments during the first Obama administration, Palestinians see little reason for optimism in his new term. The White House announcement that Obama will not present any new



peace initiastrengthened their conviction that the U.S. leader isn't

prepared to put the pressure on Israel that they think is necessary to end four years

of deadlock in negotiations. "Obama is coming for Israel, not for us," said Mohammed Albouz, a 55-yearold Palestinian farmer. While Israel is preparing to give Obama the red-carpet treatment, there are few signs of excitement in the West Bank. Large posters of Obama hung in Ramallah last week were quickly defaced, and a small group of activists called "The Campaign for Dignity" plans on releasing black balloons into the air in a sign of mourning when Obama

### Supreme Court to Mull Law Requiring Documents to Vote

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • The Supreme Court will struggle this week with the validity of an Arizona law that tries to keep illegal immigrants from voting by demanding all state residents show documents proving their U.S. citizenship before registering to vote in national elections.

The high court will hear arguments today over the legality of Arizona's voter-approved requirement that prospective voters document their U.S. citizenship in order to use a registration form produced under the federal "Motor Voter" voter registration law that doesn't require such documenta-

This case focuses on voter registration in Arizona, which has tangled frequently with the federal government over immigration issues involving the Mexican border. But it has broader implications because four other states – Alabama, Georgia, Kansas and Tennessee

### Obamacare Debate Not All about Health Care

o one living in Idaho or in other states should be unaware how the cost of health care, and insurance for it, has ballooned in the last few decades, driving



people into individual ruin and straining businesses and other organizations (and economic recovery). A brush with a hospital is flirtation with bankruptcy — and it has meant bankruptcy for many. That's true even for the insured, who find their protections eroding each year. And the number of uninsured sits at about 16 percent of all people nationally, 18 percent in Idaho (21 percent among those 64 and younger). This is an enormous problem.

There is no one cause and no one answer. One tactic intended to help, one that makes use of a marketplace, is an insurance exchange: An organization allowing buyers of insurance to shop around, compare costs and benefits and get assistance, in a way they haven't been able to. Such a plan was built into the 2010 Affordable Care Act, and in it states were given the option to set up exchanges.

That's the background for House Bill 248, which would establish by the state of Idaho an exchange aimed at helping consumers of health insurance to locate and buy appropriate policies. Alternatively, the feds would establish one in Idaho. The bill passed 41-29, after more than seven hours of debate.

You might suppose that long debate, one of Idaho's longest legislative debates in decades, would have centered on the problems and costs of health care and insurance. You would suppose wrong.

The bill's stated "purpose and intent" begins, "It is the public policy of the state of Idaho to actively resist federal actions that would limit or override state sovereignty under the 10th amendment of the United States constitution. Through this legislation, the state of Idaho asserts its sovereignty ..."

That framing overwhelmed the debate. The need of Idahoans for affordable health care and insurance, whether the exchange was a good solution, whether this specific model might be improved upon: These were touched upon almost not all. The course of debate suggested the health (in effect, the safety) of Idaho's people wasn't of significant interest. Maybe the closest graze came from the conservative Rep. JoAn Wood, who aptly noted the absence of strong consumer protections in the

The "sovereignty" of Idaho seemed the lone general concern – that, and taking potshots at anyone federal.

There were a few somewhat contrary voices on sovereignty, such as Rep. Frank Henderson of Post Falls who noted how local governments often work with federal requirements without much trouble. And Rep. Neil Anderson, R-Blackfoot, who delivered one of the most courageous debates in the Idaho Legislature in years by declaring "We are still the United States" and that the federal government should be seen as a partner, while instead "we've almost wound up in this adversarial role." (Will he be thrown out of the House Republican caucus for that heresy?)

In those hours of debate, talk of wolves and roadless areas (in the context of federal and state control) roamed free. The only health-related specific subject was abortion, more precisely abortion-related "freedom of conscience" (for people opposed to abortions, not those seeking to have them).

Health care? Crushing financial catastrophe? The well-being of Idahoans and their ability to live in some measure of financial security? Evidently, not the Idaho Legislature's concern.

### The Wasteful Approach to Detention

he U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency released "several hundred" immigrants from detention facilities across the United States late last month in an effort to stay within its budget amid "fiscal uncertainty" related to the socalled sequester. More immigrants are expected to be freed soon. This is a good thing: The agency detains about 400,000 men, women and children per year, most of whom pose no threat to the United States.

Sequester fallout or not, the releases prove what critics have said for years: Detention — an arduous, sometimes lengthy and even dangerous experience — is not always necessary.

My 81-year-old uncle Joseph was taken into custody at the Miami airport in October 2004 after he requested asylum. Joseph was a throat cancer survivor with high blood pressure and an inflamed prostate. Although he had a valid visa and passport, and the airport is only about 15 minutes from my home, where my husband and I were ready to receive him, Joseph was sent to a detention facili-

ty. Rather than being released into our care until his status could be determined, he was jailed — and his prescribed medications were taken away. He died five days later. My uncle was neither a flight risk nor a danger to society.

Detention is also not a fiscally responsible method of law enforcement: It costs taxpayers as much as \$164 a day to detain immigrants, the National Immigration Forum noted in August. Some alternatives, including home visits, cost as little as \$14 per day,

the group says. Many who are detained have relatives who are U.S. citizens or residents. Some, while incarcerated, have been in contact with civic and religious organizations that would shelter and support these people through their deportation or asylum cases. So why not let them? The American Bar Association noted in 2010 that 84 percent of detained immigrants — including children and people with mental and

physical disabilities — were going through the deportation process with no legal counsel. Although it is a fundamental principle of this country that everyone should get a fair hearing in court, thousands of would-be immigrants languish in detention centers for months without appearing before a judge.

Part of the problem lies with the 1996 Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act, which expanded the categories of immigrants required to be detained upon arrival in the United States categories that include those known to be terrorist suspects but also those who arrive without documentation or with fraudulent papers. Congress has required that a certain number of beds more than 30,000, as of fiscal 2012 - be made available for detainees. But the requirement has been interpreted by immigration officials and some lawmakers as a "bed mandate" - requiring tens of thousands of immigrants to be detained every day simply because the beds have been made available. Customs officials are effectively prevented from making detention

decisions based on their agency's needs. Until the mandate is repealed, the government will continue wasting millions of taxpayer dollars detaining broadly defined classes of people — many of whom, like my uncle, have demonstrated no reason to be locked up.

Congress is holding hearings this week and next on immigration enforcement. Immigration and homeland security officials have already been criticized by some lawmakers for releasing a small percentage of their most vulnerable, lowrisk detainees last month. One hopes that lawmakers will engage in discussions more substantive than "giving illegals a free pass." The country must take on real issues, such as eliminating the outdated bed mandate, so that immigrants who pose no danger to U.S. communities can wait for their day in court under more humane and less costly conditions.

### Idaho Should Not Delay Funding Medicaid Expansion

Increasing the income limit for Medicaid eligibility will provide affordable timely access to health care for many Idahoans. The funding has already been set aside in the federal budget for states to expand Medicaid. By delaying an entire year, Idaho loses available funding for this program. On this date:

In 1766, Britain repealed the Stamp Act of 1765.

In 1837, the 22nd and 24th president of the United States, Grover Cleveland, was born in Caldwell, N.J.

In 1913, King George I of Greece was assassinated in Thessaloniki.

In 1937, some 300 people, mostly children, were killed in a gas explosion at a school in New London, Texas.

In 1938, Mexican President Lazaro Cardenas nationalized his country's petroleum reserves and took control of foreign-owned oil facilities.

In 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed an executive order authorizing the War Relocation Authority, which was put in charge of interning Japanese-Americans, with Milton S. Eisenhower (the younger brother of Dwight D. Eisenhower) as its director.

In 1959, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the Hawaii statehood bill. (Hawaii became a state on Aug. 21, 1959.)

In 1962, France and Algerian rebels signed the Evian Accords, a cease-fire agreement which took effect the next day, ending the Algerian

In 1965, the first spacewalk took place as Soviet cosmonaut Alexei Leonov went outside his Voskhod 2 capsule, secured by a tether.

In 1974, most of the Arab oil-producing nations ended their embargo against the United States.

In 1980, Frank Gotti, the 12-year-old youngest son of mobster John Gotti, was struck and killed by a car driven by John Favara, a neighbor in Queens, N.Y. (The following July, Favara vanished, the apparent victim of a gang hit.)

In 1990, thieves made off with 13 works of art from the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in Boston (the crime remains unsolved).

Ten years ago: A jury in Corpus Christi, Texas, cleared Bayer Corp. of liability in a \$560 million lawsuit that accused the pharmaceutical giant of ignoring research linking the cholesterol-lowering drug Baycol to dozens of deaths. In Salt Lake City, Brian Mitchell and Wanda Barzee were charged with aggravated kidnapping, sexual assault and burglary in the abduction of Elizabeth Smart, who was found with them six days earlier. (Although both were initially found incompetent to stand trial. Mitchell was eventually convicted of kidnapping and sexual assault, while Barzee pleaded guilty to kidnapping and unlawful transportation charges.) Olympic gold medal figure skater Sarah Hughes won the Sullivan Award as the

nation's top amateur athlete. Five years ago: Democrat Barack Obama confronted America's racial divide headon with a speech in Philadelphia in which he urged the nation to break "a racial stalemate we've been stuck in for years." German Chancellor Angela Merkel earned a standing ovation from Israel's parliament with a speech that included a tribute to the victims of the Holocaust. Oscarwinning filmmaker Anthony Minghella ("The English Patient") died in London at age

One year ago: Mitt Romnev scored an overwhelming win in Puerto Rico's Republican presidential primary, trouncing chief rival Rick Santorum.

With the spring national championships currently taking place in St Louis, Mo., this week's deals all come from last year's championships in Memphis, Tenn.

Sometimes you need the cards to lie just so to give yourself a chance to make your contract. And when they do, the satisfaction for you (plus the irritation caused to your opponents) is all the more. Today's deal provides just such an example. Nobody did anything too out-

rageous in the bidding, but four hearts was an uncomfortable contract for North-South. When West led a low club (suggesting a five-card suit in her methods), East decided to win and shift to a trump, reasonably assuming her heart queen was a dead duck. Notice that the club spots would have allowed South to set up the club eight for an extra winner had East played either her high or low club. Declarer won the trump in hand, ruffed a club, ducked a spade around to West, then won the trump return in hand and ruffed a second club. At this point, East was out of clubs, so declarer could next play the spade king to force East to win. Since that player had no clubs to lead, she could do no better than play her low spade. This allowed declarer to ruff, then draw the last trump, and run the diamonds for four tricks.

In the end, South scored six trump tricks (four in hand and two ruffs in dummy) plus four diamond winners.
