Canyon West Set for Construction

TWIN FALLS • Construction on Canyon Park West, the 200,000-square-foot outdoor mall planned for the canyon rim, is set to begin in a couple of weeks, starting with the relocation

of a section of Fillmore Street. Twin Falls Community Development Director Mitch Humble said the roadway will remain open throughout construction. He said the rebuild is necessary before buildings can go up.

'We're going to have to do a study of the sub-base, put the curbs at the right grade and make sure the water that flows on the road

washes off and doesn't sink in," Humble said. "It will just be a little more direct route from one side to the other side of the property rather than snaking through it."

According to the sales kit on the Canyon Park website, the new shopping center will feature six anchor shops, 19 medium size shops, 28 small size shops and two restaurants. The Times-News has previously reported that one of the anchor shops will be Kohl's.

But Humble said there have been no building permits requested for the new project.

A local television station reported this week that Canyon Park West tenants will also include Bed Bath and Beyond, Men's Warehouse,

Sports Authority, Petco, Starbucks, Noodles and Company and Chipotle.

"We've heard some of those names thrown around but they've never given us any documents or plans like that," said Humble. "Every (document) we've ever seen has no names on

A spokeswoman for EHM Engineers, among those overseeing the project, said they can't comment on future tenants, but those mentioned in the television report are inaccurate. Project Administrator Tina Luper said the faulty information came from a demo map the company uses to show prospective clients.

Search for F&G Commish Is Starting from Scratch

TWIN FALLS • People are already applying to be the Magic Valley's newest Fish and Game commissioner — and the governor's office hasn't even started formally taking applications.

Earlier this year, the state Senate rejected Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's last appointee for the commission seat, Joan Hurlock. Doing so has caused the lengthy appointment process to start over, said Jon Hanian, Otter's spokesman.

Appointing a commissioner starts with applicants filling out and submitting an application to the governor's office. Once the submission period closes, the applications are submitted to a selection committee appointed by the governor, Hanian said.

The committee then whittles the list down to three candidates which are then sent to the governor. Once Otter chooses an applicant, the final hurdle is getting approval from the Senate.

During Hurlock's Senate hearings, arguments centered on the qualifications needed to be a Fish and Game commissioner.

Currently, the only requirements to be a commissioner are to be a resident of the appointed region and "be well informed and interested in wildlife conservation and restoration."

The governor's office isn't suggesting that the qualifications should be changed, Hanian said. However, if Otter was, any changes would need



Remembering the Historic Buildings Lost Over the Years

TWIN FALLS • Many century-old buildings have been preserved in the historic downtown district. But unfortunately, several magnificent buildings have been lost over the years.

One of the first buildings constructed in the original townsite of Twin Falls was the Hotel Perrine, located in the center of town on the west corner of Shoshone and Main.

Sources debate the identity of the designer of the building. Some say the hotel was designed by planner E.L. Masqueray, the man responsible for the diagonal orientation of the townsite's streets. Others say it was designed by architect J. Flood Walker. Both men were associated with the 1904 Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis.

The grand hotel opened in

December 1905. The three-story building

was constructed in a U shape, with a second-story balcony facing Main. The hotel occupied the second and third floors, while the ground floor was filled with businesses.

The hotel was a model of prosperity in its day. It featured an atrium and a formal dining room. Each hotel room had running water, electric lights, steam heat and a telephone.

A steam engine-driven Case threshing machine behind the hotel ran an Edison producing generator, enough electricity to power the hotel and businesses in several blocks each direction.

Twin Falls grew rapidly over the next few years.

By 1910, Bickel and Lincoln schools were bursting at the seams. Across Shoshone Street from the city park, a new school was built next to the courthouse, which was also under construction.

Twin Falls High School opened in February 1912. By the 1912-1913 school year, there were more than 1,700 students enrolled in the new school. It was hailed as the best equipped high school in the Northwest.

By 1921, the school accommodated both senior and junior high school students. In 1925, Vera C. O'Leary was appointed principal of the junior high school students.

When high school students were moved to the new high school on Filer Avenue East in 1952, the old school became known as Twin Falls Junior High School. In 1963, the junior high

was renamed "Vera C. O'Leary Junior High School" in honor of O'Leary, who, due to declining health, was unable to continue as principal.

Over the years, the building deteriorated faster than it could be repaired. Eventually, the third floor was condemned. For several semesters dur-

ing 1976 and 1977, the build-

ing was closed by the fire department. Junior and high school students alike attended the newer building in double shifts, until a sprinkler system could be installed inside O'Leary.

The old building limped along until 1978, when it was replaced by a new O'Leary Junior High on Elizabeth Boulevard.

The Hotel Perrine survived until 1968, when the building was replaced with a new bank. The old Twin Falls High School was demolished in 1980 to make way for the county judicial building and jail.

Legislature Plans to Adjourn Today

BOISE • Pack your bags, lawmakers. The Legislature is poised to adjourn today.

After a public hearing, a whirlwind budget committee meeting, and almost no discussion, the Idaho Legislature passed a compromise education bill and introduced a new education budget. Both the House and Senate plan to consider the new budget today, wrapping up the last piece of unfinished business for this session.

Wednesday's action centered on two bills: A compromise bill that put into code a controversial part of the original education budget, and a new public education budget that was almost entirely unchanged from the one voted down last week.

The legislative session stretched into April after the Senate voted 17-18 to kill the original \$1.3 billion education budget bill. The debate was less about the money

and more about the process by which the budget bill was passed. Opponents expressed concern that two pieces of the budget - technology grants and teacher merit pay – were reincarnations of the overturned Students Come First laws. Those who voted no on the budget said because voters rejected the laws, those two budget items should have gone through the policy committees, where they would be subject to public hearing.

That hearing was held Wednesday morning, with everyone who signed up to testify supporting the two measures. Colleen Johnson, principal of Paul Elementary School, drove to Boise to testify in favor of the technology grants, citing student excitement over an iPad pilot project at her school.

"The most apparent benefit is high student engagement and excitement for learning," Johnson said. "When students are excited to learn, teachers are excited

Both the Senate and House suspended rules to pass that compromise bill today.

The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee also met Wednesday afternoon to hammer out a brand new education budget, which remained unchanged from the one voted down. Though not everyone was thrilled with the numbers, some of those who opposed the original budget acknowledged that this is a compromise, and they were happy with the new process. The Senate and House will consider the new budget legislation this morning.



US Missile Defense Shield to Counter NKorea Threat

WASHINGTON (AP) • In the face of escalating threats from North Korea, the Pentagon said Wednesday it will deploy a missile defense system to Guam to strengthen the Asia-Pacific region's protections against a possible attack.

The delivery of the missile shield system comes as Defense Secretary

Chuck Hagel labeled North Korea's recent rhetoric as a real, clear danger and threat to the U.S. and its Asia-Pacific allies. The Pentagon chief said the U.S. is doing all it can to defuse the situation.

Deployment of the Terminal High Altitude Area Defense System is the latest step the U.S. has taken to bolster forces in the region in a farreaching show of force aimed at countering the North Korean threat.

The Pentagon already has sent dispatched bombers, stealth fighters and ships.

Tensions have escalated between North and South Korea in recent weeks. The communist North has vowed to increase production of nuclear weapons materials, and threatened a pre-emptive strike against the U.S. Hagel told an audience at the National Defense University that there is a path to peace on the troubled Korean peninsula, but it doesn't include making nuclear threats or taking provocative actions.

The land-based missile defense system includes a truck-mounted launcher, tracking radar, interceptor missiles, and an integrated fire control system. The Pentagon said the system will boost defenses for American citizens in Guam, a U.S. territory, and U.S. forces stationed

Taliban Attack Afghan Courthouse, Leaving 53 Dead

KABUL (AP) • Insurgents wearing Afghan army uniforms launched a suicide attack and stormed a court house Wednesday in a failed bid to free Taliban inmates, killing at least 44 people, half of them shot in the basement. Nine attackers were killed.

The attack — one of the deadliest in the more than 11-year-old war – began about 8:30 a.m. when nine men wearing suicide vests drove into the capital of Farah province in western evading Afghanistan, checkpoints by using army vehicles, according to the provincial police chief. The standoff ended some eight hours later when the last gunman was killed.

Insurgents have stepped up assaults targeting the Farah provincial government in recent months as they vie for control of an area bordering Iran to the west and Helmand province to the east. Farah has become increasingly volatile as the site of a growing drug trade after military offensives in neighboring areas.

"The Taliban seem to be exploiting the opium harvest and the unpopular eradication efforts by the government to further establish their presence," Fabrizio Foschini, of the independent research group Afghan Analysts Network, said in a recent blog.

Militants have staged high-profile complex attacks across Afghanistan in a bid to show their strength and undermine confidence in the central government.

Since Fierce Clash, Egypt's Crisis Takes New Turn

CAIRO (AP) • It has come to be known as the "Battle of the Mountain": a ferocious fight between members of Egypt's Muslim Brotherhood and their opponents near the group's Cairo headquarters. In a country that has already seen crisis after crisis, it could mark a dangerous turning point in the political turmoil.

The aftermath of the fighting is raising worries that the confrontation between Islamists,, who dominate power in the country, and their opponents is moving out of

anyone's control. The riot on March 22 revealed a new readiness of some in the anti-Brotherhood opposition to turn to violence, insisting they have no choice but to fight back against a group they accuse of using violence against them for

months. The fight featured an unusual vengefulness. Young protesters were seen at one point pelting a Brotherhood member with firebombs and setting him aflame. Others chased anyone with a conservative Muslim beard, while Islamists set up checkpoints

Mohammed Morsi. Opposition activists warn the moves are the opening of a campaign of intimidation to

silence Morsi's critics. The presidency says the prosecutor is just enforcing the law and that Morsi's office has nothing to do with the moves. Morsi's supporters say they are showing restraint against extreme provocation.

Expanding Hallowed Ground at West Point Cemetery

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP) • The West Point Cemetery has

The West Point Cemetery has taken in graduates of the Long Gray Line from the age of the cavalry charge to the dawn of drone strikes. Headstones etched with names like Custer and Westmoreland stand near plots with freshly turned earth

And after almost two centuries, the 12-acre cemetery is close to full. The U.S. Military Academy and its graduates are taking steps to make more room with new niches for cremated remains and an eventual expansion of the burial grounds. The work will update a resting place for more than 8,000 people — the most hallowed ground at the nation's the most venerable military academy.

"I would challenge you to find more valor in a smaller amount of space," says cemetery administrator Kathleen Silvia, who notes that 16 Medal of Honor recipients lie here.

Marquee names here include Lt. Col. George Custer, U.S. commander in Vietnam Gen. William Westmoreland



and — buried just this winter — Gulf War commander Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf. But it's the rows of graves of never-famous soldiers that give the cemetery its quiet dignity.

Walking among the headstones recently, Silvia — who was among the first female West Point graduates in 1980 — points out Revolutionary War-era dead and stoops

down to tidy the marker for a recently deceased colonel she admired. Though a military cemetery since 1817, not all the graves are uniform. A few older ones are extravagant. Egbert Viele, a Civil War veteran, rests in a two-story pyramid guarded by two stone sphinxes. It is said that his fear of being entombed alive was so

great that his mausoleum was

rigged with a buzzer. There is no record of it being used.

The grounds on a tree-sheltered promontory near New York's Hudson River are reserved for West Point graduates and cadets, soldiers who die while assigned to the academy, and immediate family members. Some 140 to 200 people are laid to rest here each year.

he real vocation of some people entrusted with delivering primary and secondary education is to validate this proposition: The three R's — formerly reading,



'riting and 'rithmetic - now are racism, reproduction and recycling. Especially racism. Consider Wisconsin's Department of Public Instruction. It evidently considers "instruction" synonymous with "propaganda," which in the patois of progressivism is called "consciousness-raising."

Wisconsin's DPI, in collaboration with the Orwelliannamed federal program VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America; the "volunteers" are paid), urged white students to wear white wristbands "as a reminder about your privilege, and as a personal commitment to explain why you wear the wristband." A flyer that was on the DPI website and distributed at a DPI-VISTA training class urged whites to "put a note on your mirror or computer screen as a reminder to think about privilege," to "make a daily list of the ways privilege played out" and to conduct an "internal dialogue" asking questions such as "How do I make myself comfortable with privilege?" and "What am I doing today to undo my privilege?"

After criticism erupted, the DPI removed the flyer from its website and posted a dishonest statement claiming that the wristbands were a hoax perpetrated by conservatives. But, again, the flyer DPI posted explicitly advocated the wristbands. And Wisconsin's taxpayer-funded indoctrination continues, funded by more than Wisconsin taxpayers. In Delavan-Darien High School's "American Diversity" curriculum, students were urged to verify white privilege by visiting a Walmart toy section and counting the white and black dolls. After objections, the school district is reconsidering this curriculum.

Such distractions from the study of calculus and literature are encouraged by CREATE Wisconsin (the acronym stands for Culturally Responsive Education for All: Training and Enhancement), which is funded with federal tax dollars from IDEA, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. The disability being rectified here is, presumably, the handicap of insufficient guilt - arising from false consciousness - about white privilege.


Today the school systems in 20 states employ more nonteachers than teachers. The Friedman Foundation for Educational Choice reports that between 1950 and 2009, while the number of K-12 students increased 96 percent, fulltime equivalent school employees increased 386 percent. The number of teachers increased 252 percent, but the number of bureaucrats — including consciousness-raising sensitivity enforcers and other non-teachers - increased 702 percent. The report says states could have saved more than \$24 billion annually if non-teaching staff had grown only as fast as student enrollment. And Americans wonder why their generous K-12 financing (higher per pupil than all but three of the 34 Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development nations) has done so little to improve reading, math and science scores.

Higher education, from which much of such diversity and sensitivity nonsense trickles down, cries poverty while spending lavishly on administrative overhead irrelevant to its teaching and research missions. The Manhattan Institute's Heather Mac Donald notes that in 2011, while the University of California at San Diego was pruning academic offerings, it created a "vice chancellor for equity, diversity and inclusion" to augment a diversity apparatus that included an assistant vice chancellor for diversity; faculty advisers, staff, graduate and undergraduate diversity coordinators and liaisons; a director of development for diversity initiatives; the Committee on Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation Issues; the Diversity Council; the Campus Council on Climate, Culture and Inclusion; and much more. Perhaps tens of millions could be diverted from progressive gestures to academic purposes by abolishing on every American campus every administrative position whose title contains the words "diversity," "equity," "race," "ethnicity," "sustainability," "green," "gender," "inclusion," "identity," "interconnectivity," "globalization," "climate," "campus climate," "cross-cultural" or "multiculturalism."

No corner of the country is immune to propaganda pretending to be pedagogy. Lincoln Brown of KVEL Radio in Vernal, Utah, says one student from the University of Utah showed him required reading that told students to "list ways your family may have colluded with or benefited from the exploitation of African-Americans." Another reading was titled "White Privilege - Unpacking the Invisible Knapsack."

Twenty-five years ago, President Reagan, paraphrasing Education Secretary William Bennett, said: "If you serve a child a rotten hamburger in America, federal, state and local agencies will investigate you, summon you, close you down, whatever. But if you provide a child with a rotten education, nothing happens, except that you're liable to be given more money to do it with." But only until the soaring tuitions and taxes that fund this featherbedding for administrators of political correctness create a critical mass of parental and taxpayer disgust.

State Cancels Perrine Bridge Project Again

TWIN FALLS • For the second year in a row, the Idaho Transportation Department has cancelled plans to resurface the Perrine Bridge.

The work scheduled to start next week won't happen now. Instead, the agency will seal the existing driving surface using new technology, likely in 2014 or 2015, according to Wednesday press release.

The newer method should shorten the duration of the work and lessen the impact on traffic and bridge activities compared to a full roadway replacement, the ITD release stated.

The alternative method is being used on select bridges to reduce the impact from weeks to days. However, the change in scope will require a new contract prior to completing any work, according to the release.

"We hope to complete additional assessment of the bridge as a whole, pre-

pare the surface sealing and repackage the work with additional maintenance projects over the next year or so," ITD Bridge Manager Matt Farrar said in the re-

During the coming months, ITD will complete additional inspections of the Perrine Bridge in preparation for the next contract for the driving surface and structural maintenance.

The first inspection is today. A portion of the inspection will close one southbound lane of U.S. Highway 93 across the bridge between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. so crews may use a reach-all truck to inspect the underside of the bridge

The resurfacing project had originally been planned for summer 2012, but was pushed back to avoid conflicts with a community event in September and to allow overhauls of 11 other bridges to finish before

'Forgotten' Child Porn Case Rediscovered in Idaho Falls

Case sat two years in a **Bonneville County** Sheriff's Office evidence room.

IDAHO FALLS • Tucked away in a secured evidence room, files from a child pornography investigation sat untouched for nearly two years.

It was simply forgotten.

An employee at The Computer Guy repair shop discovered possible child pornography on a customer's computer and reported it to the Bonneville County Sheriff's Office on March 14, 2011.

A sheriff's investigator executed a search warrant for the computer's hard drive and found approximately 118 videos containing child pornography, Bonneville County Sheriff Paul Wilde said.

The investigator interviewed the computer's owner, a 37-year-old Idaho Falls man, March 22, 2011, at the law enforcement building.

The hard drive was confiscated as evidence and it and a copy of the interview were put in storage, Wilde said.

No arrest was made. No charge was filed.

Nothing else happened until earlier this year when the Post Register learned of the case and brought it to Wilde's at-

Until then, Wilde was unaware the case hadn't been prosecuted.

"I take the responsibility," Wilde said. "We dropped the ball. It's been brought to our attention and we're taking care of it."

After learning of the mistake, sheriff's office representatives called the federal investigator at U.S. Department of Homeland Security, who then turned the case over to the U.S. Attorney's Office, Wilde said.

The case finally was submitted to the federal investigator Feb. 15.

It remains under investigation and Wilde said he expects an indictment.

"He will be arrested eventually," Wilde said.

Details on how the lapse occurred remain sketchy. Wilde won't allow the detective who investigated the case to comment while it's pending.

Wilde said his detective tried to turn the case over to the local federal investigator at Homeland Security. But the investigator reportedly told the detective he was too busy and to submit it at a later

Wilde said his detective thought the federal investigator would call for the

He never did.

After learning of its failure in the investigation, the Bonneville County Sheriff's Office completed an audit of past cases, Wilde said. No other cases were found to have been misplaced or forgotten.

"This is not something that generally happens," Wilde said. "I don't remember a case ever being forgotten and set aside like this."

Child pornography possession is a serious offense. At the federal level, it carries a maximum punishment of up to 10 years in prison, a fine up to \$250,000, and a minimum prison term of five years with up to a lifetime of supervised release.

If prosecuted at the state level, it's punishable by up to 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine with no mandatory minimum, Bonneville County Prosecutor Bruce Pickett said.

Wilde said that if the feds don't issue an indictment, he'll bring the case to Pickett's office for charging.

According to the Idaho State Repository, the suspect in this case has no prior felony convictions. He also is not a registered sex offender in Idaho.

In Idaho, the statute of limitations for possession of child pornography is five years, meaning the prosecution process has to be started within that time frame, Pickett said.

That clock started ticking more than two years ago.

Wilde made no excuses when questioned about the delay. He said he's "truly sorry for the mistake."

"Yes, it's a major case. Yes, it's an issue that's come up," Wilde said. "But it's not dropped and the evidence is not lost."

Coal Out, Renewables in with NV Énergy's New Plan

LAS VEGAS (AP) • Nevada's largest utility plans to begin closing four coal-fired power plants northeast of Las Vegas and invest more money in renewable energy.

NV Energy officials said the closures long sought by a neighboring tribe, U.S. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid and others are scheduled to begin by the end of next year.

A summary of the plans being presented to state lawmakers on Wednesday concludes the move could cost ratepayers nearly 4 percent more over the next 20 years - with some individual annual rate increases bigger than that over the course of the project.

But company officials said the "emission reduction and capacity replacement plan" dubbed "NVision" will allow for accelerated development of wind, solar and geothermal energy as well as natural gas. They also project the investments will produce thousands of construction jobs over the next dozen years.

"Environmental regulatory uncertainty and aging coal generation facilities have intersected at this point in time to necessitate forward thinking innovative plans and solutions to address Nevada's future energy needs," the plan summary said.

Reid, D-Nev., most recently repeated his call for closing the plants during his annual address to the state Legislature in Carson City last month.

The Las Vegas Sun first reported details of the closure plans, which would divide the new investments roughly 60 percent for natural gas and 40 percent for renewables.

NV Energy spokeswoman Jennifer Schuricht said Wednesday the plans would be formalized in an amendment to Senate Bill 123 to be presented by the end of the day to the Senate Energy Labor and Commerce Committee.

NV Energy Vice President Tony Sanchez said they plan to close three of four units by 2014 at the 553 megawatt Reid Gardner coal plant in Moapa about 40 miles northeast of Las Vegas. The fourth unit would remain operating until 2017.

The plans drew a mixed response from conservationists, consumer advocates and tribal leaders.

Dan Jacobsen of the Attorney General's Bureau of Consumer Protection fears the expedited closure plan will cost ratepayers more than the current plan to close Reid Gardner entirely in 2020. He anticipates rates increasing up to 8 percent within 10 years while NV Energy benefits from not only the new construction projects but also reimbursement for retiring the coal-fired generating plants.

"This is in effect a guarantee that the company gets to keep adding to their profits," he told the Sun.

Bob Fulkerson, executive director of the Progressive Leadership Alliance of Nevada based in Reno, also expressed skepticism.

"We must stop putting coal pollution in the air, but we also need to make sure NV Energy doesn't use this as an excuse to take even more money from ratepayers to pad its already enormous profits," Fulkerson said Wednesday.

Dry March Worsens Drought in SE Montana

Drought conditions in southeastern Montana have worsened due to an unusually dry March, with extreme conditions reported for most of Yellowstone and Treasure counties.

Billings is at the center of the drought, with the first three months of 2013 the seventh-driest since tracking began at Billings Logan International Airport 79 years ago.

Precipitation in March was just a quarter of the average amount, just .26 of an inch compared to a 1.06-inch average, the Billings Gazettereported Tuesday.

Chickens Ruffle Feathers in Burley

BURLEY • As the city of Burley considers allowing chickens inside its city limits, some residents are raising concerns that the city doesn't have enough resources to enforce the possible new ordinance.

The Burley City Council discussed the proposed ordinance at their meeting Tuesday, April 2. In its current form, it would allow a maximum of five chickens at a city residence as long as they were contained in a

Roosters would not be allowed inside the city and the chicken coops would have to be at least 10 feet from any structures and neighbors. The city currently bans residents from keeping horses, cattle, hogs, goats, sheep rabbits and poultry.

Councilman John Craner explained that the ordinance would include varying fines: \$25 for a firsttime violation, \$50 for a second violation, and a third violation would qualify as a misdemeanor with a \$300 fine and possible jail

"If you're going to raise chickens in the city of Burley, you're going to be responsible," Craner said. "If we're going to do this, I suggest that we have something that is enforceable and that has some teeth in

However, the discussion turned heated when resident Merlin Smedley asked to offer a comment on the ordinance.

Smedley accused the city of not enforcing the current ordinances already in place, including failing to control its dog population.

"We don't have an enforcer now," he said. "If we allow this, then we're going have a pig and we're going to have a horse and cow. At this rate, we're going to have a farm community in the city."

Resident and Hy-Line employee Pete Brown also spoke out against approving the ordinance.

"I live in a city," he said. "If I wanted to live around farm animals, I would live in the country."

Brown also spoke to clarify a prior discussion during the last council meeting. Councilman Steve McGill used Brown's residence as a location of a house that had neighbors with chickens and hadn't complained.

"I did complain, I am against poultry inside the city limits," he said.

City Administrator Mark Mitton countered that the city does enforce its ordinances but city staffers are often tasked with juggling more than one job.

"We euthanize 20 to 40 dogs every week," he said. "Enforcement is the most important part."

When Smedley continued to interrupt the council's discussion to voice his objections to the ordinance, Mayor Terry Greenman asked him to calm down or leave the meeting.

After a lengthy discussion on the enforcement concerns, the council decided to table voting on the ordinance.

Sawtooth's New West Division

TWIN FALLS • The everchanging face of the Sawtooth Conference is morph-

ing yet again. The 1A-II high school football conference encompassing Districts IV, V and VI is switching its divisional alignments for 2013, coaches from multiple schools have confirmed with the

Times-News. Originally set up as a north-south split when the conference expanded to more than a dozen teams in 2010, the conference will go to an east-west split along

district lines next season. All six District IV participants - Carey, Castleford, Dietrich, Lighthouse Christian, Murtaugh and Richfield – will be in the western division, while District V and VI schools will play in the eastern half of the league. The top four teams

in each division will meet in a ninth week game to determine the conference's four state quarterfinal berths.

The primary concern was cutting down on travel distances, though it would help some schools more than others.

"Mackay's not too far but Clark County (Ashton) is quite a trip," said Carey athletic director Lee Cook, who recently relinquished his longtime position as a football assistant coach. "It'll help with travel, but that's never been a big issue with us. It seems like once you get on the bus, yes it might be 30 or 40 miles further, but I don't see that it's the big issue. Out-of-school time? Yes, but the expense of being on the bus isn't a big factor."

Former north division schools Carey, Dietrich and Richfield take on two additional divisional games, but the nondivision games they

would have played in place of those generally require a greater travel distance than any of their conference adds.

In a two-year cycle, playing all teams home and away, Carey stands to travel almost 400 fewer miles than in years past — that's adding the three new divisional teams and dropping former division teams Mackay and Clark County, as well as nondivision North Gem (Bancroft), the team Carey figures to drop to compen-

sate for the new opponents. Castleford, meanwhile, would have its divisional travel cut in half over two years (approx. 550 from 1,025) by picking up Carey, Dietrich and Richfield in exchange for North Gem, Rockland and Sho-Ban (Fort Hall).

"We made the same proposal when we joined the conference, but they all went (the other way)," said Castleford coach Tracy Vulgamore. "This time North Gem did it, and we were going to back it. It just makes sense to have the District IV teams together and cut down on the travel."

There's an added perk to the mix: Realigning the divisions makes for a far more competitive division, involving all the District IV squads. At least five of the six teams are expected to challenge for those four cross-divisional spots come October.

"The only thing we were considering was that we thought that maybe the stronger teams were in our division if you look at overall strength," Cook said. "North Gem will be pretty good (in the east) ... but Lighthouse, Carey, Dietrich and Castleford are all legitimate teams and maybe Richfield as well. It's going to be important to place in your conference. Every win is going to valu-

Firing Coach Not Enough at Rutgers



he easy part was getting rid of Mike Rice, something Rutgers had little choice in doing once the governor of New Jersey and the king of basketball weighed in on his videotaped transgressions.

Gov. Chris Christie wasn't going to have Rice remain as basketball coach at the state's flagship university, and quickly let it be known where he stood. So did LeBron James, in a tweet to his 7.8 million followers that was even more direct.

"If my son played for Rutgers or a coach like that he would have some real explaining to do and I'm still gone whoop on him afterwards!" James tweeted. "C'mon."

C'mon, indeed. You don't need to be a governor or a superstar to be outraged at the video of Rice kicking, shoving and shouting homophobic insults at players in practice. Anyone who watched the out-of-control coach abuse his young players likely came away with the same angry thought.

Anyone other than Rutgers athletic director Tim Pernetti, that is.

Oh, sure, Pernetti and university president Robert Barchi are on board now, expressing regret after firing Rice about how they handled the coach's initial punishment in December. Pernetti flat out said he was wrong, while Barchi released a statement saying he, too, had an epiphany of sorts after actually watching the tape Tuesday.

Apparently Barchi's change of heart came after he saw Rice throwing balls at players and calling them the kind of names that get people in fights at playgrounds around the country. For reasons known only to him, Barchi signed off on a punishment for Rice that included a three-game suspension and anger

management courses without even bothering to watch the videotape back in December.

Had he done his job then, maybe Rutgers wouldn't be where it is now.

Their decision at the time didn't result in any great outcry because Pernetti and Barchi didn't say what exactly Rice had done to earn his suspension – which convenient ly ended just before the school's Big East opener against Syracuse. Followers of the program were mostly perplexed about why their coach would have to sit out for what was vaguely referred to as inappropriate conduct and language.

I can't imagine what they were thinking when they went down the list of possible punishments. The physical abuse alone was a fireable offense, but the anti-gay slurs took it to a whole new level.

Three games and anger management courses? At a university where just three years ago, a student killed himself after his roommate used a webcam to spy on him kissing another man in his dorm.

My only guess is they

My only guess is they thought the Rice video wouldn't surface. There can be no other explanation, because what is seen on the tape is so inflammatory that no reasonable person — much less leaders of our youth — could justify allowing Rice back on the court with the kids he was seen abusing.

And if they're that clueless in today's world of viral video then they need to go, too.

For botching the first punishment, yes. Maybe, too, for hiring Rice in the first place.

This was a coach so highstrung that he once knocked out his own father's tooth in a pickup game, a guy who coached on the edge and thought nothing of going over it. Other schools were scared away by his intensity, but Pernetti was so impressed that he said he viewed him as a "life coach" as well as a basketball coach when he hired him.

Pernetti said at the time he loved Rice's intensity, loved the way he interviewed. But maybe he should have paid more attention to what Rice said about himself in the Asbury Park Press after he was hired.

"When we go to practice, my formula is always to attack our best players," Rice told the paper. "Because they're the ones who need it the most, because they're the ones that have to do it at a higher level every night. They're the ones who are game-planned against. If you don't accept my energy, my intensity, my urgency, you're not going to do very well with me. Is my way of coaching right? No, but it works for me."

Or this nugget from his father — a former coach himself — that appeared in the Courier News of Bridgewater, N.J., about the same time.

"Sometimes Mike gets a little too intense with his teaching," Mike Rice Sr. said. "If you don't work as hard as he thinks you should, he lets you know it. I tell him, "Good thing you're not in the NBA; someone would throw you over the bleachers.' He tells me, "You were always way too soft on players."

The pressure to win in big-time college sports can be suffocating, so maybe Pernetti felt compelled to take a chance on a coach whose last team at Robert Morris had nine technical fouls in just one season. He went for the hard-charging coach, hoping an up-and-comer like Rice could light a fire under a program in desperate need of a turn-around.

It backfired horribly, and now there's a price to pay.

What is especially troubling is that neither Pernetti nor Barchi seemed inclined as late as Tuesday to get rid of Rice even as the video aired on ESPN and the ensuing firestorm threatened to envelop the program.

Rutgers will be a better place with a new coach who respects players and doesn't engage in homophobic name calling. Rice himself seemed to understand that when he spoke contritely outside his house Wednesday about the mistakes he made and the embarrassment he caused the university and his family.

No need to stop there, though. Not with the way this whole thing was botched.

It's time to replace the people at the top, too.



Officials Facing Dilemma with Video Review

It happens seemingly every game of the NCAA tournament, most of the season, for that matter: Officials blow their whistles, huddle, then head over to the TV

monitors to review a play.

Looking to see if the clock is right, a shot was a 3pointer or if an elbow to the head warrants a flagrant foul, they watch the replays from all angles as coaches and players huddle, fans in the stands and TV wait for the action to start again.

The goal is to make sure the officials get the calls cor-

But in the process of trying to be right, they're also disrupting the rhythm of the games, dampening excitement and possibly giving some coaches the advantage of an extra timeout.

"It's bogging the game down too much, particularly with what we're actually for," looking said Turner/CBS analyst Steve Kerr, who will call his third straight Final Four in Atlanta this weekend.

Instant replay has been a part of college basketball

since 1986, when the 3point shot also debuted. The initial purpose was for replays to be used to correct timing and scoring errors and was later expanded to look at whether a player was behind the line on a 3-point

shot and flagrant fouls. Coaches, players and fans have debated the use of instant replay pretty much since the day it was put in place and scrutiny seems to have increased this season as officials have gone to the monitor more and more.

One of the biggest complaints, particularly during the NCAA tournament, has been about officials stopping games to check the game clock, then adding a few tenths of a second back.

A small amount of time like that can make a big difference when the clock is under a second because officials judge whether a player can catch and shoot or not based on certain time increments.

But if they're stopping the game with 5 or 10 seconds left and adding 0.2 seconds to the clock, that's a bit excessive for some.

"That's something that should be talked about," said Reggie Minton, deputy executive director of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. "I'm not sure I'm an expert on these electronic timers that these officials have that are somewhat triggered by them, but at some point we need to trust the timing mechanism we have and those that are running them that we trust they are going to do the right thing. If it's obvious something was missed and we're talking about seconds, then I think we make sure that is corrected. But there maybe is an over-concern about a tenth here and a tenth there?

Stopping the clock also may give some teams an unfair advantage, giving a coach what's essentially an extra timeout to diagram a play while the officials look at the replay monitor.

In the second round of the NCAA tournament, Davidson was leading Marquette by a point when it lost the ball out of bounds against the Golden Eagles press. Marquette didn't have a timeout left, but the officials gathered around the monitor to get the game clock right, giving coach Buzz Williams a chance to call his players over to draw

up a play. The officials added 1.2 seconds to the clock - to 6.7 — and Marquette's Vander Blue scored on a lastsecond layup to give the Golden Eagles a 59-58 win and avoid the upset.

"Unfair advantage," Davidson coach Bob McKillop said after being asked about Marquette getting what was essentially an extra timeout. "Maybe (in that situation) they shouldn't let them huddle."

In the West Region semifinals, Arizona coach Sean Miller got extra time to set up a play after officials stopped the game to check the time on a 3-point shot by Ohio State's LaQuinton Ross. The officials added a tenth of a second to the clock, but Arizona couldn't hit the tying shot in the final 2.1 seconds.

Kansas had a similar situation late against Michigan in the South Region semifinals, when a review at the scorer's table gave Jayhawks coach Bill Self extra time to set up a final shot. Like Arizona, Kansas couldn't pull it off and lost in overtime.

Armstrong to Make Splash in Return

AUSTIN, Texas • Lance Armstrong is looking to make a splash with a return to competition.

The disgraced cyclist is signed up to swim three events this weekend at the Masters South Central Zone Swimming Championships at the University of Texas. Armstrong spokesman Mark Higgins says Armstrong will compete in the 40-44 age group in the 500, 1,000 and the 1,650 yards.

U.S. Masters Swimming is not covered under the same drug testing rules of the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency, which banned Armstrong for life from its sanctioned events.

Rob Butcher, executive director of masters swimming, says the organization does not drug test and encourages all adults to swim. Armstrong had been pursuing a post-cycling career in triathlons before he was banned by USADA for performance-enhancing drug use.

Cuban Says He is Willing to Draft Griner

LOS ANGELES • Dallas Mavericks owner Mark Cuban says he would consider drafting Baylor All-American Brittney

Cuban told reporters before Tuesday night's game between the Mavericks and the Lakers that if Griner is the best player available, "I will take her." The 6-foot-8 Griner finished her college career as the

NCAA leader in blocked shots and the second-leading scorer in women's college basketball history.

Cuban says he has already thought about it and "Right now, I'd lean towards yes, just to see if she can do it. You never know unless you give somebody a chance."

Cuban said Griner would have to make the team and he isn't "opposed to giving her the opportunity." He adds: "That'd sell out a few games."

USC's Hire of FGCU's **Enfield Creates Buzz**

LOS ANGELES • Southern California athletic director Pat Haden says he wants to make basketball relevant at the Pac-12 school known for its powerhouse football program.

So he went out and hired Andy Enfield of Florida Gulf Coast, who has been one of the most buzzed-about coaches since making the Eagles the first No. 15 seed to reach the round of 16 in the NCAA tournament. They upset No. 2 seed Georgetown and No. 7 seed San Diego State before losing to Florida.

Haden says USC didn't spend much time considering Enfield, who entered the job search late, but that the private school did a thorough job of checking him out.

Enfield says the whole process was quick, but that when he realized he wanted to join the Trojans, that's all it took.

Big East to Become American **Athletic Conference**

basketball tournament revenue.

NEW YORK • The current Big East will be called the American Athletic Conference starting next season.

The conference announced the decision Wednesday after university presidents approved the new moniker earlier in the day.

The Big East football schools were in need of a new name after they agreed to let seven basketball schools break away from the conference to start a new league this summer to be called the Big East. In return, the football schools received about \$100 million of a \$110 million pot the league had accumulated in recent years from exit and entry fees and NCAA

The American Athletic Conference will have 10 members in its first season: Rutgers, Louisville, Connecticut, South Florida, Cincinnati, Central Florida, Memphis, Houston, SMU and Temple.

Rutgers and Louisville are likely leaving after 2013 and are set to be replaced by Tulane, East Carolina and Tulsa in 2014. Navy is scheduled to join in 2015 for football only, and the conference will begin playing a league championship football game.



TWIN FALLS • The littered remains of fluorescent orange clay pigeons glowed in

the distance. "Pull!" said a student standing with a shotgun tucked firmly into his shoulder, as he squeezed the

trigger. A second later: the crack of a shell and another clay pigeon shattered, joining pink, red and yellow casings

on the ground. It was the first day of practice for Cretula Perdi-Xavier tore, Charter School's trap and skeet club, and many students were already on the mark. That's because many aren't new to shooting.

Jurnee Eccles, an eighthgrader, said: "Shooting is a fun hobby of mine." The 13year-old was excited to compete and improve.

Shooters takes five shots from each station for a total of 25 shots.

In skeet, you have stations along a semicircle, but you have two trap houses - a "high house" at the left end, and a "low house" at the right end — with the clays crisscrossing.

A typical sporting clay course consists of 10 to 15 shooting stations, but unlike trap and skeet, clays fly out at varying trajectories, angles, speeds and distances.

"I think it's a really awesome thing to have at our school; some schools don't

like the idea of these clubs," Eccles said. "I'm surprised our school let us have it."

Tyler Morrison, 14, a ninth-grader at Xavier, joined the league last year and liked it so much he decided to return.

It's Spring: Time for a Rimfire Rodent Safari to Benefit Farmers

t's often said that familiarity breeds contempt, and I know lots of farmers and ranchers - all too familiar with the burrowing activities of ground squirrels, prairie dogs and other varmints who harbor considerable contempt for these furry little beasties.

It is not only the loss of valuable livestock feed or crops that troubles these working folk, but the real dangers to life, limb and machinery posed by the complexes of holes and tunnels excavated by these critters. Though wide-scale poisoning programs have been used in the past to control large pest populations, the amount of collateral damage inflicted on non-target species (hawks, eagles, pets, etc.) fairly begged for more species - and outbreak - specific controls.

This is where you and I may be of service.

In some circumstances, the most appropriate and effective pest-control agent is a small group of skilled and conscientious riflemen operating under landowner supervision. Case in point: Each spring my brother Dave, his children and I are invited out to Russ Bloom's expansive Sun River, Mont., ranch to, as he likes to put it, "thin out this year's crop of pasteur pups (prairie dogs) and ground rats (squirrels)."

I made my annual pilgrimage to Big Sky country last week during our spring break.

It was the perfect time to witness the meltdown of the last remnants of this winter's snow and the simultaneous emergence of the sweet, green high-plains

grasses and ravenous rodent hordes.

Even though the shifting afternoon winds and seefor-miles ranges are the niche of the hot centerfire .17's and .22's, we prefer sneaking "up close and personal" and sniping the energized varmints with our standard and magnum rimfire rifles and handguns. Bulk-boxed high-velocity .22 LR ammunition provide all the accuracy and knockdown energy needed to handily dispatch the beerbottle-sized ground squirrels out to about 100 yards. Died-in-the-woollong riflers tote the "hyper loadings" exemplified by the likes of CCI's Stinger, their

smoking Velocitor and today's high-speed champ, Mexico's own Aquila Super Maximums belting out a 30 gr. solid at a blistering 1,750 fps. Ole!

As potent as these LR loadings are, the magnum .17HMR and .22 WRF extend the practical ranges another 50 yards and do provide considerably more slap. Our limited experience also suggests that the larger-diameter .22 bullets prove to be much more lethal than the flyweight 17-20 gr. .17HMR slugs.

Our unanimous favorite: Remington's 33 gr. V-Max .22WMR load. But don't look for it now; this marvelous loading has recently been replaced by the equally devastating 40 gr. AccuTip-V in the Big Green's Premier Gold Box line.

Even the snappiest rimfire is less effective if improperly aimed, so most experienced

optics on their rifles and handguns. Careful pre-hunt sighting in sessions coupled with shot-steadying bipods, fixed or collapsible shooting sticks can make even difficult shots doable. Slings serve double duty by steadying tricky offhand shots and keeping your hands free to tote your shooting/walking sticks and spotting scope.

Idaho's Youth Turkey Hunt Begins April 8

JEROME • Youths who are 10 to 15 years old on April 8 may participate in Idaho's general season youth hunt for turkeys

All youth turkey hunters must have a valid hunting license, and they must be accompanied by a licensed adult 18 or older who must be close enough to be within normal conversation or hearing range without shouting or the aid of electronic devices.

The general season youth turkey hunt runs April 8-14.

Idaho's general spring turkey hunts open April 15 and run through May 25. Dates vary for controlled hunts, listed in the Upland Game brochure from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

The free brochure which includes turkey hunting seasons, rules and maps of wild turkey distribution across Idaho - can be

found at all Fish and Game offices and at license vendors statewide. It's also on the Fish and Game website at http://fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/docs/rules/u plandTurkey.pdf in PDF format.

Hunters also can use the website's Idaho Hunt Planner, where detailed maps are available.

Hunters may buy two turkey tags - one general and one extra tag — for the spring season before May 26. Resident adults pay \$19.75 for the first tag and \$12.25 for an extra tag. Discounted tags for youth, seniors and disabled veterans are \$10.75. Nonresident turkey tags cost \$80, except for junior mentored tags priced at \$19.75.

Forest Officials Warn of Hazards

It could be dangerous traveling into burned areas.

SALMON • The Salmon-Challis National Forest warned that there may be hazards in traveling into or near areas that burned in 2012.

"Forest visitors must be prepared to stay longer than expected due to changing circumstances. Weather conditions such as precipitation and wind can rapidly change con-

ditions on the ground. Wind can blow trees across roadways, and precipitation can wash debris across roadways blocking access," a forest press release said. "Preparation for the unexpected is the best plan a forest visitor can have."

So consider:

- Adequate food, water, clothing, sleeping bags and other provisions in case of inclement weather and extended stay.
- Chain saw and fuel, handsaw and shovel, in case trees or other

debris block roads.

- Tell someone where you're going and when you plan to be back.
- Communications that will work in the area you plan to travel (cell phone, satellite phone or satellite emergency notification

Of particular concern is the Salmon River Road, from North Fork to Corn Creek Boat Launch. The Mustang Complex Fire burned along about 55 miles of the Main Salmon River, adjacent to the

Salmon River Road. There is potential for rocks and other debris to slough onto the roadway and into the river.

"Forest employees are already observing rocks and dirt sloughing onto the Salmon River Road," said Jim Tucker, operations staff officer. "These observations are typical during the springtime. We expect the conditions to be magnified this year due to last summer's fire activity."

In addition to debris and blockages on forest roadways, visitors may also encounter waterways that have a brown or black color — due to fine sediment that runs off the hillsides and into streams and

The Sawtooth National Recreation Area, Sawtooth National Forest, is proposing to issue a new special use permit authorizing Syringa Networks, Inc. (Syringa) to continue to operate and maintain an existing buried fiber optic cable line located in the Big Wood River Valley north of Ketchum, Idaho. The current permit expires August 18, 2013. The new permit would be for a 30 year term. The Sawtooth National Forest is soliciting public input regarding this proposal during this 30-day opportunity to comment or object. The 30-day comment period commences with this legal notice's published date in the Twin Falls Times-News and it will be the only opportunity to comment on this proposal.

The buried fiber optic cable was installed in 2003. It is part of the State of Idaho's Rural Networks Initiative. The segments of fiber optic line authorized in this permit are adjacent to Highway 75 for approximately ½ mile near Lake Creek on the Ketchum Ranger District (NW1/4, Sec. 36, T5N, R17E) and adjacent to from the Sawtooth National Highway boundary at North Fork (NW1/4, Sec. 10, T5N, R17E) to Horse Creek (Sec. 4, T6N, R15E); and from Horse Creek along the historic Galena Toll Road to Galena Summit (Sec. 7, T6N, R15E).

This solicitation for public comment serves two purposes. First, it helps serve the purpose of "scoping" under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) regulations (40 CFR 1500-1508). Scoping is a public involvement process used to determine the scope of issues to be addressed and identify issues related to a proposed action. Second, it provides those interested in or affected by this proposal an opportunity to make their concerns known before a decision is made by the Sawtooth National Forest, Responsible Official, All comments received in Supervisor, Rebecca Nourse. response to this solicitation, including names and addresses of those who comment, will be considered part of the public record on this proposed action and will be available for public inspection. Those who provide timely comments will be eligible to appeal the decision pursuant to the 36 CFR part 215

Today's Highlight:

On April 4, 1968, civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr., 39, was shot to death as he stood on a balcony of the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tenn. (James Earl Ray later pleaded guilty to assassinating King, then spent the rest of his life claiming he'd been the victim of a setup.)

TODAY IN **HISTORY**

On this date:

In 1818, Congress decided the flag of the United States would consist of 13 red and white stripes and 20 stars, with a new star to be added for every new state of the Union.

In 1841, President William Henry Harrison succumbed to pneumonia one month after his inaugural, becoming the first U.S. chief executive to die in office.

In 1850, the city of Los Angeles was incorporated.

In 1859, "Dixie" was performed publicly for the first time by Bryant's Minstrels at Mechanics' Hall in New York.

In 1912, China proclaimed a republic in Tibet, a move fiercely opposed by Tibetans. **In 1933,** the Navy airship

USS Akron crashed in severe weather off the New Jersey coast with the loss of 73 lives.

In 1949, 12 nations, including the United States, signed the North Atlantic Treaty in Washington, D.C.

In 1960, Elvis Presley recorded "Are You Lonesome Tonight?" in Nashville for RCA Victor.

In 1973, the twin towers of New York's World Trade Center were officially dedicated. (The towers were destroyed in the terrorist attack of Sept. 11, 2001.)

In 1975, more than 130 people, most of them children, were killed when a U.S. Air Force transport plane evacuating Vietnamese orphans crash-landed shortly after takeoff from Saigon.

In 1983, the space shuttle Challenger roared into orbit on its maiden voyage. (It was destroyed in the disaster of January 1986.)

In 1988, the Arizona Senate convicted Gov. Evan Mecham of two charges of official misconduct, and removed him from office. (Mecham was the first U.S. governor to be impeached and removed from office in nearly six decades.)

Ten years ago: U.S. forces seized Saddam International Airport outside Baghdad. Sammy Sosa of the Chicago Cubs became the 18th player to hit 500 career homers, connecting for a solo shot in a 10-9 loss to Cincinnati.

Five years ago: Texas authorities started removing the first of more than 400 girls from a compound built by a polygamist sect. Lisa Montgomery was sentenced to death in Kansas City, Mo., for killing Bobbie Jo Stinnett, a mother-to-be, and cutting the surviving baby from her womb. Pirates seized the French luxury yacht Le Ponant and its 30 crew members off the coast of Somalia. (The crew was released a week later; six alleged pirates ended up being captured.)

One year ago: Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney unleashed a strong attack on President Barack Obama's truthfulness, accusing him of running a "hide-and-seek" re-election campaign in an address to newspaper editors and publishers. A federal judge sentenced five former New Orleans police officers to prison for the deadly shootings on a bridge in the chaotic days following Hurricane

The world is full of stories of bridge deals where a ridiculous play succeeded, or the correct play failed. In today's example, West was not only a fine player, but also a practical joker. Moreover, he was playing against two of his least favorite opponents, both of whom could be relied on to bid accurately, but neither of whom possessed a detectable sense of humor.

A competitive auction saw North-South reach four hearts after flirting with a slam-try. When West led his singleton diamond, he could see that prospects of defeating the game would hinge on whether his partner had both the ace and king of diamonds. If so, the defenders could surely take two diamonds and two trump tricks.

Alas for West, when East won his diamond ace and continued with the diamond queen, it was South who had the diamond king. It was easy for the defenders to take three tricks, but where would the fourth come from? East surely had no more than one trump.

Inspiration dawned! The defenders might prevail if East had the singleton heart king. West ruffed the second diamond with his heart ace and led his small trump to his partner, giving him the entry to cash the diamond jack for one down.

At the end of the deal, West leant forward and apologized for accidentally wasting his heart ace. "If I had ruffed low, would we have beaten them two tricks?" he asked, and was rewarded when South started banging his head on the table.

You'd surely remove the double to two hearts. If that is what you would do, then you should bid two hearts yourself immediately, emphasizing your extra shape and lack of suitability for defense.
