# Jerome Man Indicted in Gun Smuggling Case

Suspect told Canadian Mounties the guns could be smuggled via snowmobile.

JEROME • A Jerome man

has been indicted in a federal

The indictment states that Canadian citizen Shawn Hartnell and Jerome resident Dylan Dowton "did knowingly, willfully combine, conspire, confederate and agree together with others" to export from the United States to Canada "defense articles" without obtaining a license.

An indictment against Hartnell states that Dowton and a woman told authorities they bought guns

be smuggled into Canada.

According to federal court documents, Hartnell wired \$10,000 to the couple to buy guns, then sold the guns to undercover Royal Canadian Mounted Police agents, telling them the guns could be smuggled over the border via snowmobile.

Online court records do not indicate that a woman has been indicted.

According to online court records, Dowton lives in the 400 block of Pheasant Road in Jerome County.

The indictment states that Hartnell wired \$10,000 to Dowton sometime on or between Dec. 5, 2012 and Feb. 5, 2013, instructed him to purchase six firearms and told him that the firearms would be smuggled into Canada. The indictment states Please see GUN, A10

# ty Officials Ready to Build Jerome Skate Park This Fall

JEROME • After several failed attempts to launch a skate park in Jerome, volunteers believe they could begin construction on the city's first skate park by this fall.

A lack of funding has slowed down the progress, said Kathy Markus, chairman of the Jerome Skate Park Coalition.

The coalition needs \$100,000 to build a 4,500-square-foot

skate park, Markus said. The group - which recently achieved a 501(c)3 status – would also like to raise \$100,000 to complete a second phase of the project that would increase the skate park to 9,000 square feet.

The group has already raised enough money to begin construction in the fall, she said. The goal is to open the park by spring 2014.

# Twin Falls City Council Urged Not to Oppose Legalizing Medical Marijuana

TWIN FALLS • The city of Twin Falls should not oppose legalizing marijuana use, a representative with Compassionate Idaho said during Monday's City Council meeting.

"Right now, people are having to choose between breaking the law or to live in pain," said Lindsey Rinehart, executive director of Compassionate Idaho, a group that works to raise awareness about legalizing medical marijua-

na in Idaho.

Rinehart argued in favor of legalizing medical marijuana, saying it was a safer and cheaper option to treat patients in pain.

The council is considering signing a resolution to oppose legalized marijuana. The resolution would urge the federal government to enforce all existing drugs laws.

The Idaho Senate attempted to pass a similar resolution during the legislative session, but the bill

stalled on a 13-21 vote.

Elisha Figueroa, administrator for the Idaho Office on Drug Policy, responded to the presentation by saying that legalized medical marijuana was compassion at too high of a cost.

She argued that medicinal marijuana dispensaries in other states are not marketed to sick patients but to young, white males with a history of drug use.

"Medicinal marijuana is not being marketed to your sick grandma in these states," she said.

The council did not make a decision during Monday's meeting. Mayor Greg Lanting reminded the public that the council was not asking to ban the use of marijuana in Twin Falls but urging the federal government to do its job.

Other council members also voiced their opinion following the presentation.

"I've spent some time as an officer and working with kids. ... I truly believe marijuana is a gateway drug," Councilman Don Hall said.



# Bottomless Lakes Are a Myth

I have heard that there is a lake in Idaho where they have not found the bottom. Is this true? What is Idaho's deepest lake and how deep is it?

've never heard of a lake with an unknown depth. There is no such thing as a 'bottomless' lake, as every lake must have a finite depth in order for it to hold water. If it was truly 'bottomless,' then all the water would continue to fall and drain out. I would guess people use the term to describe very deep lakes," said Shawn Willsey, College of Southern Idaho Professor of Geology.

Willsey and Tim Merrick with the U.S. Geological Survey's Idaho Water Science Center confirmed Idaho's deepest lake is Lake Pend Oreille, which is also the fifth deepest lake in the U.S. "It is 1,150 feet deep



and lies in a valley carved by the North American Ice Sheet during the last Ice Age about 20,000 years ago," Willsey said.

Lake Pend Oreille is known as Idaho's little ocean or inland sea.

"The U.S. Navy still uses Lake Pend Oreille for testing their submarine program," said Sean Vincent with the Idaho Department of Water Resources.

The lake was significant to the Navy during World War II. The Farragut Naval Training Station, located on the south end, was once the second largest naval training station in the U.S. The station is now Farragut State Park.

It is still used by the U.S.

Navy to conduct acoustic underwater submarine research. The significant depth gives acoustic properties similar to the open ocean.

Lake Pend Oreille is at the center of the northern Idaho Panhandle. The lake is 43 miles long and has 111 miles of shoreline, said Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Director Dennis Bowyer. It is one of the largest and deepest natural lakes in the western United States. The lake is surrounded by mountains with altitudes above 6,000

"Sandpoint is the largest community on the Pend Oreille," Bowyer said.

**NEW YORK • She** was the first crush for a generation of boys, the perfect playmate for a generation of girls.

Annette Funicello, who became a child star as a cute-as-a-

button Mouseketeer on "The Mickey Mouse Club" in the 1950s, ruled among baby boomers, who tuned in every weekday afternoon to watch her on their flickering blackand-white television sets.

Then they shed their mouse ears, as Annette did when she teamed up with Frankie Avalon during the '60s in a string of frothy, funin-the-sun movies with titles like "Beach Blanket Bingo" and "How to Stuff a Wild Bikini."

Decades later, she endeared herself to baby boomers all over again after she announced in 1992 that she had multiple sclerosis and began grappling with the slow, degenerative effects with remarkably good cheer and faith.

Funicello died on Monday at Mercy Southwest Hospital in Bakersfield, Calif., of complications from MS, the Walt Disney Co. said. She was 70 and had dropped from public view years ago.

"She really had a tough existence," Avalon told the Associated Press. "It's like losing a family member. I'm devastated but I'm not surprised."

Avalon said that when they were working together, she never realized how beloved she was. "She would say, 'Really?' She was so bashful about it. She was an amazing girl," he recalled.





# MARGARET THATCHER DIES AT 87

**LONDON (AP)** • Love her or loathe her, one thing's beyond dispute: Margaret Thatcher transformed Britain.

The Iron Lady, who ruled for 11 remarkable years, imposed her will on a fractious, rundown nation — breaking the unions, triumphing in a far-off war and selling off state industries at a record pace. She left behind a leaner government and more prosperous nation by the time a political mutiny ousted her from No. 10 Downing Street.

Thatcher's spokesman, Tim Bell, said the former prime minister died from a stroke Monday morning at the Ritz hotelin London.

As flags were flown at halfstaff at Buckingham Palace, Parliament and Downing Street for the 87-year-old, praise for Thatcher and her leadership poured in from around the world.

"Margaret Thatcher undoubtedly was one of the most remarkable political figures of the modern world," said Russian President Vladimir Putin.

President Barack Obama said many Americans "will never forget her standing shoulder to shoulder with President (Ronald) Reagan, reminding the world that we are not simply carried along by the currents of history. We can shape them with moral conviction, unvielding courage and iron will."

Queen Elizabeth II authorized a ceremonial funeral to be held for Thatcher at St. Paul's Cathedral in London next week with military honors.

For admirers, Thatcher was a savior who rescued Britain from ruin and laid the groundwork for an extraordinary economic renaissance. For critics, she was a heartless tyrant who

ushered in an era of greed that kicked the weak out onto the streets and let the rich become filthy rich.

"Let us not kid ourselves. She was a very divisive figure," said Bernard Ingham, Thatcher's press secretary for her entire term. "She was a real toughie. She was a patriot with a great love for this country, and she raised the standing of Britain abroad."

Thatcher was the first female prime minister in Britain's history. Her boxy, black handbag became such a part of her image that her way of dressing down ministers and opponents became known as "handbagging."

A grocer's daughter, she rose to the top of Britain's snobbish hierarchy the hard way, and envisioned a classless society that rewarded hard work and determination.

She was a trailblazer who at first believed trailblazing impossible: Thatcher told the Liverpool Daily Post in 1974 that she did not think a woman would serve as party leader or prime minister during her lifetime.

Thatcher was at her brashest when Britain was challenged. When Argentina's military junta seized the remote Falklands Islands from Britain in 1982, she did not hesitate, even though her senior military advisers said it might not be feasible to reclaim the islands.

In deciding on war, Thatcher overruled Foreign Office specialists who warned her about the dangers of striking back. She was infuriated by warnings about the dangers to British citizens in Argentina and the difficulty of getting support from the U.N. Security Council.

# Suicide Blast in Syrian Capital Kills at Least 15

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) • A suicide car bomber

struck Monday in the financial heart of Syria's capital, killing at least 15 people, damaging the nearby central bank and incinerating cars and trees in the neighborhood.

The attack was the latest in a recent series of bombings to hit Damascus in the civil war, slowly closing in on President Bashar Assad's base of power in the capital. Rebel fighters have chipped away at the regime's hold in northern

and eastern Syria, as well as making significant gains in the south, helped in part by an influx of foreign-funded weapons.

The blast was adjacent Sabaa Bahrat Square — near the state-run Syrian Investment Agency, the Syrian Central Bank and the Finance Ministry – and dealt a symbolic blow to the nation's ailing economy.

# Bid to Arm Teachers Stalls

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) • When a gunman killed 26 children and staff at a Connecticut grade school, Missouri state Rep. Mike Kelley quickly proposed legislation that would allow trained teachers to carry hidden guns into the classroom as a "line of defense" against attackers

Similar bills soon proliferated in Republican-led states as the National Rifle Association called for armed officers in every American

school.

Yet less than four months later, the quest to put guns

in schools has stalled in

many traditionally gunfriendly states after encountering opposition from educators, reluctance from some governors and ambivalence from legislative leaders more focused on economic initiatives.

The loss of momentum highlights how difficult it

can be to advance any gun legislation, whether to adopt greater restrictions or expand the rights to carry weapons. Since the Dec. 14 shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary

School in Newtown, Conn.,

legislators in at least four

states - Connecticut, Col-

orado, Maryland and New York — have passed significant gun-control measures. The Newtown attack came less than five months after a gunman killed 12 people and injured 70 at a Colorado movie theater.

So far, South Dakota is the only state to respond with a new law allowing school personnel to carry guns into and elementary high schools. Similar legislation is awaiting the governor's signature in Kansas. And Arkansas has enacted a new law allowing colleges to let staff with concealed gun permits bring their weapons

on campus.

But Kelley has shelved legislation that would have let Missouri school staff carry firearms if they have concealed gun permits.

His legislation never received a public hearing even though he is a House majority whip responsible for rallying Republican support for

Kelley, an NRA member, tried to cast the bill's demise in a positive light.

"It's done the No. 1 thing that I wanted, and that's to bring awareness to schools about some of their safety issues," he said.

# Twin Falls Urban Renewal Talks about Expansion into Old Towne

TWIN FALLS • The Old Towne area of downtown Twin Falls may be in line for

The Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency's board voted Monday to expand its revenue allocation area by 10 percent, into the old industrial park. Though still in the early planning stages, board members said overhauling public infrastructure will likely

be a priority.

"Improved parking lots, sidewalks, sprinkler systems, those are some things that are worth while to consider," said Cindy Bond, the board's vicechairwoman.

According to the board, the URA has two options for expansion: establish a new URA area or broaden the current one. Since the agency wouldn't be able to collect additional funding from opening a new area, the board discussed adding 60 acres to their existing, 608-acre tax-increment financing district. Despite providing a map of the expansion, board secretary Leon Smith said everything is preliminary.

"At this point we may not want to lock us into that because we want to see what infrastructure needs repair," Smith said.

Once completed, an infrastructure study of Old Towne will determine more concrete details of the proposed expansion, he said.

# Twin Falls Catching Up with Building Permits

TWIN FALLS • Builders are requesting more permits in Twin Falls now than in the past three years. While the flow of construction jobs is good for the economy, it's burdensome for the city's planning and zoning department, which officials say is understaffed.

"They're just being slammed over there with building permits," said Joshua Palmer, Twin Falls city spokesman. "We have a lot of permits coming in. It's a peak time in the season. We're seeing a really strong season in construction. There's a lot on the table, but they're able to cut

through them pretty effectively." Requests for permits were so low in 2011 the city had to lay off a full-time building inspector and a full-time plan reviewer. With construction picking up last year, the city was able to hire back one of the positions. That wasn't enough to deal with this year's construction boom. Now there are more than 60 builders waiting for the

city's approval to start construction.

"We're doing our best to keep up," said Community Development Director Mitch Humble. "Right now we saw a good number of permits come in the last month or two, compared to previous months."

Humble said he attributes the backlog to missing a full-time position during the economic upswing. Overall, he said, permit applications are up 17 percent from this time last

"Right now there could be a builder at the front desk," Humble said. "We're picking up. It's good for our economy

and for our community."

Despite the increase in builders on the waiting list, Humble said the usual four weeks it takes the city to approve commercial projects is the same. Residential building permits, which he said make up most of the list, are taking up to two weeks to approve in double the usual time.

"I know that our homes are a little slow," Humble said. "I don't know that our homes are that back (to normal) yet. When you're the guy waiting for the permit, it's never fast enough. Yes, we could be faster.

We're getting on top of it."

City and county building departments across the Magic Valley face different circumstances following the recession. Jerome County's top planning and zoning official said the county remained level throughout the recession.

"That's something that I hope I never have to deal with," said Jerome County Planning and Zoning Administrator Arthur Brown. "Generally we get our residential building permits out in less than a week."

# State Offers Automatic **Extensions on Income Tax**

TWIN FALLS • Idaho taxpayers may be eligible for an automatic, six-month extension to file their state taxes, the Idaho State Tax Commission announced.

But take note - it's not an extension of time to actually pay your taxes.

Taxes are due Monday, April 15. To qualify for an automatic extension of state income taxes without filing a written request, you must pay either an estimated 80 percent of what you owe for 2012 or the full amount of your 2011 state taxes by that date.

A valid extension will spare you the penalty for late filing, but the state will charge 3 percent annual interest on the unpaid portion of your taxes until you pay the full amount owed for 2012.

The worksheet on Idaho Form 51 — available through tax.idaho.gov - can help you estimate if you owe additional taxes. There are several ways to pay:

• Mail Form 51 with your check or money order to Idaho State Tax Commission, P.O. Box 56, Boise, ID 83756-0056. • Pay by credit card through the Tax Commission web-

site by clicking on "E-pay." • Make a payment at any Tax Commission office.

If you qualify for the extension, your Idaho return and the rest of any tax payment must be postmarked by Oct. 15. For further information call the Tax Commission at 800-

## Broadcasters Worry about 'Zero TV' Homes

LOS ANGELES • Some people have had it with TV. They've had enough of the 100-plus channel universe. They don't like timing their lives around network show schedules. They're tired of \$100-plus monthly bills.

A growing number of them have stopped paying for cable and satellite TV service, and don't even use an antenna to get free signals over the air. These people are watching shows and movies on the Internet, sometimes via cellphone connections. Last month,

the Nielsen Co. started labeling people in this group "Zero TV" households, because they fall outside the traditional definition of a TV home. There are 5 million of these residences in the U.S., up from 2 million in 2007.

Winning back the Zero TV crowd will be one of the many issues broadcasters discuss at their national meeting, called the NAB Show, taking place this week in Las Vegas.

While show creators and networks make money from this group's viewing habits through deals with online video providers and from advertising

Brown said Jerome County weathered the construction fallout partly because he hired one of the employees Twin Falls city let go in 2011.

"I've been here 20 years and I've never had to cut anybody," Brown said. "We've always had steady construction help us through the process."

Although Jerome County doesn't have a backlog of permits, Brown said cities have a more difficult permitting process that he doesn't have to deal with.

"I don't know how the department is running over there but I do know in cities it's more burdensome," Brown said. "They have more paperwork to go through and more departments they have to work with."

Brown noted waiting can be devastating to builders because of things like loan requirements that can require contractors to finish a project within a given timeframe.

"If you have unnecessary delays, that might cause the contractors to not be able to get their job done on time," Brown said. "People are trying to get their business up and house up and continue on with their lives and not be beat down by the requirements of their bank."

While builders could wait up to a month to get the green light in Twin Falls, Humble said the city is open for business.

"We welcome new folks who are coming in," Humble said.

**WASHINGTON** • Airline passengers are getting grumpier, and it's little

Airlines keep shrinking the size of seats to stuff more people onto planes. Those empty middle seats that once provided a little more room are now occupied, and more people with tickets are being turned away because flights are overbooked.


Private researchers who analyzed federal data on airline performance also said in a report being released Monday that consumer complaints to the Department of Transportation surged by one-fifth last year even though other measures such as on-time arrivals and mishandled baggage show airlines are doing a better job.

"The way airlines have taken 130-seat airplanes and expanded them to 150 seats to squeeze out more revenue I think is finally catching up with them," said Dean Headley, a business professor at Wichita State University who has co-written the annual report for 23 years.

"People are saying, 'Look, I don't fit here. Do something about this? At some point airlines can't keep shrinking seats to put more people into the same tube," he said.

The industry is even looking at ways to make today's smaller-than-a-broom closet toilets more compact in the hope of squeezing a few more seats onto planes.

"I can't imagine the uproar that making toilets smaller might generate," Headley said, especially given that passengers increasingly weigh more

than they use to. Nevertheless, "will it keep them from flying? I doubt it would."

In recent years, some airlines have shifted to larger planes that can carry more people, but that hasn't been enough to make up for an overall reduction in flights.

The rate at which passengers with tickets were denied seats because planes were full rose to 0.97 denials per 10,000 passengers last year, compared with 0.78 in 2011.

It used to be in cases of overbookings that airlines usually could find a passenger who would volunteer to give up a seat in exchange for cash, a free ticket or some other compensation with the expectation of catching another flight later that day or the next morning. Not anymore.

"Since flights are so full, there are no seats on those next flights. So people say, 'No, not for \$500, not for \$1,000," said airline industry analyst Robert W. Mann Jr.

Regional carrier SkyWest had the highest involuntary denied boardings rate last year, 2.32 per 10,000 passengers.

But not every airline overbooks flights in an effort to keep seats full. JetBlue and Virgin America were the industry leaders in avoiding denied boardings, with rates of 0.01 and 0.07, respectively.

United Airlines had the highest consumer complaint rate of the 14 airlines included in the report, with 4.24 complaints per 100,000 passengers. That was nearly double the airline's complaint rate the previous year. Southwest had the lowest rate, at 0.25.

Consumer complaints were significantly higher in the peak summer travel months of June, July and August when planes are especially crowded.

"As airplanes get fuller, complaints get higher because people just don't like to be sardines," Mann said.

The complaints are regarded as indicators of a larger problem because many passengers may not realize they can file complaints with Transportation Department, which regulates airlines.

At the same time complaints were increasing, airlines were doing a better job of getting passengers to their destinations on time.

The industry average for on-time arrival rate was 81.8 percent of flights, compared with 80 percent in 2011. Hawaiian Airlines had the best on-time performance record, 93.4 percent in 2012. ExpressJet and American Airlines had the worst records with only 76.9 percent of their planes arriving on time last

on their own websites and apps, broadcasters only get paid when they relay such programming in traditional ways. Unless broadcasters can adapt to modern platforms, their revenue from Zero TV viewers will be zero.

"Getting broadcast programing on all the gizmos and gadgets — like tablets, the backseats of cars and laptops — is hugely important," says Dennis Wharton, a spokesman for the National Association of Broadcasters.

Although Wharton says more than 130 TV stations in the U.S. are broadcasting live TV signals to mobile devices, few people have the tools to receive them. Most cellphones require an add-on device known as a dongle, but these gadgets are just starting to be sold.

Among this elusive group of consumers is Jeremy Carsen Young, a graphic designer, who is done with traditional TV. Young has a working antenna sitting unplugged on his back porch in Roanoke, Va., and he refuses to put it on the roof.

"I don't think we'd use it enough to justify having a big eyesore on the house," the 30-year-old says.

Online video subscriptions from Netflix Inc. and Amazon.com Inc. – which cost less than \$15 a month combined – have given him and his partner plenty to watch. They take in back episodes of AMC's "The Walking Dead" and The CW's "Supernatural," and they don't need more, he

He doesn't mind waiting as long as a year for the current season's episodes to appear on streaming services, even if his friends accidently blurt out spoilers in the meantime. With regular television, he might have missed the latest developments, anyway.

"By the time it gets to me to watch, I've kind of forgotten about that," he says.

For the first time, TV ratings giant Nielsen took a close look at this category of viewer in its quarterly video report released in March. It plans to measure their viewing of new TV shows starting this fall, with an eye toward

incorporating the results in the formula used to calculate

"Our commitment is to being able to measure the content wherever it is," says Dounia Turrill, Nielsen's senior vice president of in-

The Zero TV segment is increasingly important because the number of people signing up for traditional TV service has slowed to a standstill in the U.S.

Last year, the cable, satellite and telecoms providers added just 46,000 video customers collectively, according to research firm SNL Kagan. That is tiny when compared to the 974,000 new households created last year. While it's still 100.4 million homes, or 84.7 percent of all households, it's down from the peak of 87.3 percent in early 2010.

Nielsen's study suggests that this new group may have left traditional TV for good. While three-quarters actually have a physical TV set, only 18 percent are interested in hooking it up through a traditional pay TV subscription.

Zero TVers tend to be younger, single and without children. Nielsen's senior vice president of insights, Dounia Turrill, says part of the new monitoring regime is meant to help determine whether they'll change their behavior over time. "As these homes change life stage, what will happen to them?'

Cynthia Phelps, a 43year-old maker of mental health apps in San Antonio, Texas, says there's nothing that will bring her back to traditional TV. She's watched TV in the past, of course, but for most of the last 10 years she's done without it.

She finds a lot of programs online to watch on her laptop for free — like the TED talks educational series - and every few months she gets together with friends to watch older TV shows on DVD, usually "something totally geeky," like NBC's "Chuck."

The 24-hour news channels make her anxious or depressed, and buzz about the latest hot TV shows like "Mad Men" doesn't make her feel like she's missing out. She didn't know who the Kardashian family was until she looked them up a few years ago.

"I feel absolutely no social pressure to keep up with the Joneses in that respect," she

For Phelps, it's less about saving money than choice. She says she'd rather spend her time productively and not get "sucked into" shows she'll regret later.

"I don't want someone else dictating the media I get every day," she says. "I want to be in charge of it. When I have a TV, I'm less in control of that."

The TV industry has a host of buzz words to describe these non-traditionalist viewers. There are "cord-cutters," who stop paying for TV completely, and make do with online video and sometimes an antenna. There are "cordshavers," who reduce the number of channels they subscribe to, or the number of rooms pay TV is in, to save money.

Then there are the "cordnevers," young people who move out on their own and never set up a landline phone connection or a TV subscription. They usually make do with a broadband Internet connection, a computer, a cellphone and possibly a TV set that is not hooked up the traditional way.

That's the label given to the group by Richard Schneider, the president and founder of the online retailer Antennas Direct. The site is doing great business selling antennas capable of accepting free digital signals since the nation's transition digital over-the-air broadcasts in 2009, and is on pace to sell nearly 600,000 units this year, up from a few dozen when it started in

While the "cord-nevers" are a target market for him, the category is also troubling. More people are raised with the power of the Internet in their pocket, and don't know or care that you can pull TV signals from the air for free.

"They're more aware of Netflix than they're aware over-the-air is even available," Schneider says.

That brings us to truck driver James Weitze. The 31year-old satisfies his video fix with an iPhone. He often sleeps in his truck and has no apartment. To be sure, he's an extreme case who doesn't fit into Nielsen's definition of a household in the first place. But he's watching Netflix enough to keep up with shows like "Weeds," "30 Rock," "Arrested Development," "Breaking Bad," "It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia" and "Sons of Anarchy."

He's not opposed to TV per se, and misses some ES-PN sports programs like the "X Games."

But he's so divorced from the traditional TV ecosystem it could be hard to go back. It's become easier for him to navigate his smartphone than to figure out how to use a TV set-top box and the buttonladen remote control.

"I'm pretty tech savvy, but the TV industry with the cable and the television and the boxes, you don't know how to use their equipment," he says. "I try to go over to my grandma's place and teach her how to do it. I can't even figure it out myself."

# **Avon Cutting Hundreds** of Jobs; Leaves **Ireland**

**NEW YORK (AP)** • Avon is eliminating more than 400 positions and abandoning or restructuring smaller or underperforming businesses in Africa, the Middle East and Europe, including an exit from Ireland.

The company said Monday that the job cuts, which equate to about 1 percent of Avon's 39,100 employees, will occur across all regions and segments. It is part of a turnaround plan under CEO Sheri McCoy, with the goal of achieving mid-single digit percentage revenue growth and \$400 million in cost savings by 2016.

Avon expects to complete almost all the cuts before year's end.

The New York company will take charges of around \$35 million to \$40 million before taxes and expects annualized savings of between \$45 million and \$50 million.



# How We've Wasted Our Timeout

es, it's true — a crisis is a terrible thing to waste. But a "time-out" is also a terrible thing to waste, and as I look at the world today I wonder if that's exactly what we've



just done. We've wasted a five-year timeout from geopolitics, and if we don't wake up and get our act together as a country — and if the Chinese, Russians and Europeans don't do the same — we're all really going to regret it.

Think about what a relative luxury we've enjoyed since the Great Recession hit in 2008. We, the Europeans and the world's other major powers all have been able to focus almost entirely on healing our own economies — without having to worry about a major war or globe-rattling conflict that would snuff out our fragile economic recoveries or require extensive new defense spending. Relatively speaking, the world in the past five years has had a geopolitical timeout.

But now, everywhere you turn, you see different actors standing with their toes on red lines, seemingly ready and willing, even itching, to cross them at any moment. North Korea's boy king, Kim Jong Un, who seems totally off the grid, has ordered his strategic rocket forces to be on standby, ready to hit U.S. and South Korean targets at a moment's notice. Which is why you see the South Koreans starting to wonder aloud whether they should stay on this side of the red line and not be building their own nuclear bomb. Iran is also steadily getting closer to a similar combination of a homemade nuclear weapon and delivery system, and so far no sanctions have deterred Tehran. Meanwhile, Egypt is running out of money to buy bread for its people and is perilously close to crossing the red line into failed-state status, which would destabilize the whole region. At the same time, Syria's mad leader, Bashar Assad, having been given the choice of "rule or ruin," has chosen ruin for his country, which is also approaching state collapse, raising the prospect of jihadist militias picking through the rubble to obtain chemical weapons and sophisticated surface-to-air missiles - with no adult

Finally, the bailed-out eurozone states just had to bail out Cyprus — a bailout by the bailed-out — leading one to wonder just how many more Band-Aids the European Union has left. Maybe you can bail out Cyprus and its people will accept the haircut on their bank accounts, but we are one thin red line away from Spaniards' waking up one morning and asking why they should keep their money in euros in their banks, when there is a real possibility they could get a similar haircut.

Warren Buffett likes to say that if you ever walk by a bank and there is a long line of people out front, "get in it." A bank run is a terrible thing to miss. If any one of these red lines, let alone all of them together, get crossed, we will rue the day that we did not use these last five years to make our own economy more resilient. After all, in sports, timeouts are when you catch your breath, try to make sense of what is coming at you at high speed, figure out what has been working and what has not, design a play to win the game and then collaborate on its execution.

Future historians will surely ask how we in America could not agree on sensible near-term infrastructure investment — to upgrade our country with cheap money — paired with a long-term package of tax reforms and spending cuts, phased in gradually as the economy improves, so we have a much sturdier balance sheet to survive any geopolitical storms. We're now driving around without a bumper and a spare tire, just when the world seems poised to turn into a crash 'n' smash derby. (Kudos to President Obama for still trying for a Grand Bargain. Will the GOP step up?)

But historians will also ask China: What were you thinking? When will you realize that whatever is bad for America is not necessarily good for you? Will it take South Korea, Japan, Vietnam and Taiwan all getting nuclear weapons? China controls food and fuel going into North Korea. It could end the freak show there anytime it wants, by cutting off both and opening its border to refugees. Yes, it is worried about a united, nuclear Korea and a flood of refugees, but America could help facilitate a united, non-nuclear Korea and dealing with refugees.

Then there is the Russian president, Vladimir Putin—the man who was born on third base and thinks he hit a triple, because his country has so much oil and gas. Refusing to ease Assad out in Syria, rather than hanging tough with him, at best could alienate Russia from the next generation of rulers in Syria and at worst could help Syria turn into another Afghanistan. Do the Russians really believe that indulging Iran's covert nuclear program, to spite us, won't come back to haunt them with a nuclear-armed Iranian Islamist regime on its border?

In many ways Russia and China are more irresponsible than we are. We need to make ourselves resilient but are not. We are being shortsighted. They are being downright harmful.

The net result is that we could all look back one day and wish we had used this timeout from any global geopolitical contagion more wisely. I hope historians won't say that for five years we were lucky. And then we weren't.

# America's Shrinking Defense

The following editorial appeared in Monday's Washington Post:

hen he was asked in 2011 about the possible impact of the sequestration on defense, Chuck Hagel breezily replied that the Pentagon was "bloated" and "needs to be pared down." In his first major speech as defense secretary on Wednesday, Mr. Hagel's assessment was considerably more sober. The \$41 billion cut the department is taking this year, he said, "is already having a disruptive and potentially damaging impact on the readiness of the

Still, Mr. Hagel is looking at the possibility of a major new drop in defense spending as an opportunity. The pressure of forced cuts, he said in his speech at the National Defense University, could help to "fundamentally reshape the defense enterprise to better reflect 21st-century realities." He is right, up to a point: There is plenty of waste in the Pentagon budget. But if Mr. Hagel is to push through the kind of change he is talking about, he will need far more cooperation from the Pentagon bureaucracy.

In his address, Mr. Hagel identified some broad areas for savings. Military pay and benefits and accelerating costs for weapons systems, Mr. Hagel said, are threatening to turn the Pentagon into "an agency administering benefit programs, capable of buying only limited quantities of irrelevant and overpriced equipment." The Tricare health program has grown in cost from \$19 billion in fiscal 2001 to \$53 billion in fiscal 2012, while the budget's biggest line item is

the nearly \$400 billion F-35 program, which is 70 percent over its cost estimate.

Like former Secretary Robert M. Gates, Mr. Hagel believes the Pentagon's "fourth estate" of officers and bureaucrats could be trimmed; that some jobs being performed by military personnel could be transferred to civilians. The problem, of course, is persuading the services or Congress to accept such restructuring. Following his rocky confirmation process, it's hard to be optimistic about Mr. Hagel's chances of finding allies in a polarized Congress for eliminating National Guard depots or cutting benefits. As he himself put it, "it could turn out that making dramatic changes ... could prove unwise, untenable or politically impossible."

The danger here is not merely that Mr. Hagel will

fail to accomplish far-reaching reform. It's that, having failed to do so, he will bring down spending with cuts that are more easily accomplished but far more damaging to national security. The Post's Craig Whitlock has reported that the Army and Marines are bracing themselves for possible force reductions going well beyond the trims of 9 and 10 percent previously ordered by Mr. Obama. The sequestration is already forcing worrisome reductions in training, the grounding of air fleets and the cancellation of ship deployments, not to mention a demoralizing furlough of civilian workers.

We wish Mr. Hagel luck in his effort to restructure the Pentagon. But we also hope that he and the president are working on a backup strategy to preserve vital U.S. defense functions.

# Plans Meet Reality

 $\textbf{BOISE} \quad \bullet \ \text{The} \quad \text{different}$ branches of Idaho's government don't always agree on a path forward.

Each January, the governor outlines his priorities in a  $speech \, to \, the \, Idaho \, Legislature.$ 

So how did Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's plan line up with lawmakers' accomplishments? Here's a rundown of some of Otter's wishes:

### Successes

**Insurance exchange:** In the most public battle of the session, the Legislature passed a bill to establish a statebased insurance exchange in Idaho. Otter made it clear he's no fan of the Affordable Care Act but endorsed the insurance exchange, saying it was the state's best option under the law.

5 new WWAMI seats: Idaho is in a partnership with the University of Washington Medical School and the states of Washington, Wyoming, Alaska and Mon-

tana to provide taxpayerfunded training for medical students across the region. Otter recommended funding five more seats in the program, and the Legislature agreed. The Joint Finance-**Appropriations Committee** added the funding in Febru-

Rangeland fire protection: After a devastating 2012 fire season, Otter supported establishing a process for starting and operating nonprofit rangeland fire protection associations, where voluntary groups can work with agencies to fight fires. This year, the Legislature budgeted \$400,000 to help establish at least four of the groups.

### Partial Successes

Personal property tax: Otter wanted a full repeal of the tax, which applies to tools, machinery and other business equipment. But local governments expressed concern over the revenue loss. ness's assessed personal property per county.

Otter hopes to fully repeal the tax in the future. A press release from Otter's office calls it "an important first step toward total elimination of this onerous and burden-

### Didn't Happen

Extension of the Hire One **Act:** The Hire One Act offered tax incentives for businesses that created new positions for employees. A bill to extend the tax credit passed the House but didn't get a hearing in the Senate. That means the tax credit will expire at the end of this

Opening of a mental health facility for prisoners: In his January speech, Otter discussed securing \$70 million in bonds for a 579bed mental health facility for Idaho prisoners. The Department of Corrections withdrew its request for the study options.

# Girl Scout Cookie Fight Gets National Attention

TWIN FALLS • Idaho's Girl Scout Cookie tax exemption fight received national attention, and supporters hope to harness that mo-

mentum for next year. On Saturday, the Wall Street Journal ran a frontpage article on the failed exemption effort, and ABC's Good Morning America ran a segment on the story.

Idaho and Hawaii are the only two states with a sales tax on Girl Scout Cookies. An effort to exempt the tax passed the Idaho House in March but didn't get a hearing in the Senate.

According to the Silver Sage Girl Scouts, Idaho receives about \$150,000 annually from taxes on Girl Scout Cookies.

Sen. Jim Patrick, R-Twin Falls, supports exempting the tax. He was quoted in both the Wall Street Journal and on Good Morning America. On the ABC morning show, Patrick explained the opposition in the Senate. The part of the interview where Patrick discussed his support for the exemption was cut from the final segment, and Patrick is concerned viewers think he opposes the exemption.

"I was a little disappointed in the way they did it," Patrick said, adding he understood the program had a short amount of time to explain the issue.

But the important thing is the attention, Patrick said. He hopes the bill will come back next year. So do the scouts. Twelve-yearold Makayla Williams told the Wall Street Journal that next year the girls will focus lobbying efforts on the

# Nearly \$200,000 Donated So Far for Phase Two of CSI's Softball Complex

\$80,000 gift that started the fundraising is the largest private gift in CSI athletic history.

 $\textbf{TWIN FALLS} \bullet \textbf{It}$  was February on the College of Southern Idaho campus - 20 degree weather was reason enough to scurry across the grid of ice-covered grass and concrete.

But Jason Vickery, CSI's coordinator of marketing and athletic promotions, didn't want to look conspicuous - it's not like he had security.

Vickery was on his way to his car, which he would drive to the bank. He was carrying six bags full of two dollar bills totaling \$20,000.

"I only saw one person on the trip," Vickery said. "It was a student. He looked at me and couldn't believe how much cash was in there. I always had this image of him going back to his dorm and saying, 'Guys, you won't believe it. There is a guy walking across campus with six bags of cash?"

Vickery and CSI can hardly believe their luck the last three months.

Over \$100,000 in anonymous donations have come in since late January as part of fundraising for phase two of CSI's softball complex, which will include a concession stand, bathrooms, training room, booster room, press box, media room, ticket booth and permanent seating, according to Karen Baumert, CSI's sports information

It started with a lead gift of \$80,000 from either one person or a pair "close to the program who has (have) followed CSI athletics for a long time," according to Vickery.

Vickery, who was the first hire for CSI in a position it created in 2010 - a one man fundraising arm of the athletic program - had been working on the

donation since his hiring. "I figured at some point they'd eventually donate, but I had no idea it would be that much," Vickery said.

It is the largest private gift in CSI athletic history. It was shortly followed by a \$20,000 donation in two dollar bills by someone who "made the donation in "It's not like we were ready to go and his daughters' names," according to Vickery. build right away."

The two dollar bills symbolized the donor's two daughters.

"That's just his personality. He likes to do fun and creative stuff like that," Vickery said. "It was hilarious."

Since then, CSI has received \$10,000 and \$25,000 gifts (the latter coming this Monday) as CSI nears the \$200,000

mark for the phase two project. Vickery said he wants to get closer to \$250,000 before the school contracts

out the work and breaks ground. "It's happened so fast we didn't have the numbers worked out," Vickery said.

Vickery said the best case scenario is that phase two is completed by the start

When it's finished, CSI head softball coach Nick Baumert said, it could be one of the five best softball facilities at the junior college level, comparing with some in Division I.

"It's one of those things that you kind of dream about," Baumert said. "It seems like a lot of dominos have fallen in place for us. It allows CSI to further sell itself. It's the next puzzle piece and it will help in recruiting. It gives kids a place to call home."

CSI freshman Katie Hlushak, an Airdrie Alberta native who chose CSI because it felt like "home," said she hopes phase two is completed before she

"I think having bigger facility might just attract more people to come and watch," Hlushak said. "The softball complex is exciting and I'm ready for the home to finally come complete."

In its inaugural year, 2007, CSI played at Twin Falls high school. Phase one of the softball complex was paid for by the college and completed in 2008.



# Many Fouls, Few Points as Season Draws to a Close

**ATLANTA** • Once the nets are down and the confetti stops flying, it will be safe to open your eyes again, bas-

ketball fans. Yes, 2012-13 has been one

ugly season. Scoring hasn't been this low in decades and the same for shooting percentages. Foul calls also are way down, which turned much of this year's action into something more like wrestling with occasional breaks for free-

throw shooting. Long delays for video reviews, confusion over the charge-block call, handchecking, arm-blocking and always, always, an endless string of TV timeouts added to a feeling among even basketball lovers that many nights were hard to sit

through. "It doesn't take long, if you're really watching, to see what's happening and say, 'Oh my God, this is awful," said ESPN analyst Jay Bilas, who has been one of the most outspoken critics of the state of the game.

The season capped off by the Michigan-Louisville NCAA title game Monday night has been one marked by amazing parity - something the leaders of most sports strive for, but one that may have played into the muddle that has become college hoops.

At one point, the top spot in The Associated Press poll changed for five straight weeks. Only one top-seeded team, Louisville, made it to the Final Four and there were two No. 4s and a No. 9; overall, this was only the fourth time since seeding began in 1979 that only one top-3 seed made it to the sport's biggest

Better coaching, better preparation, more good players and the willingness of many of the best ones to enroll at less-heralded schools all played into the evenness. As early as junior high, players in the same age bracket go against each other on traveling AAU and All-Star teams. When college rolls around, the intimidation factor is gone. If today's dynamic were in place in the 1970s, almost every player at the Final Four would've played against Bill Walton at least once.

"Some of these guys couldn't score, so is that ugly?" said Bill Raftery, one of the sport's most effervescent color commentators. "Some would prefer high scoring and free-wheeling but preparation is such that it's not going to be that way. And the kids all know one another, so they're not in the least bit in awe of an opponent. You get Wichita State playing Louisville and they don't really give a damn. It's just another team to them."

It can make for unexpectedly close games and exciting finishes – see No. 1 Louisville's come-from-behind 72-68 win over that plucky underdog, No. 9 Wichita State, in the national

semifinals. Still, the overall product suffered this year and the statistics back that up:

- Teams averaged 67.49 points, lowest since 1951-52, decades before either the 3point line or the shot clock were introduced to college
- Field goal percentage was 43.3 percent, lowest since 1964-65.
- Shooting from the 3point line was a tad over 34 percent, the worst it's been since 1996-97.
- The average team's 17.66 fouls per game were the lowest since the stats started being recorded in 1947.
- March Madness did not provide a reprieve. This has been the lowest scoring version of the NCAA tournament since the 3-point line came into effect in 1987, at 131.2 points per game.

Given those numbers, it seems almost fitting that the tournament's most enduring moment was cringe-worthy: the compound leg fracture of my pals?

suffered by Louisville guard Kevin Ware. And then, in the run-up to the Final Four, there was the unsavory story of Mike Rice, coach of a losing program at Rutgers who got fired for his brutish tactics during practices.

"A failure of process," school president Robert Barchi called the Rice fiasco, which also led to the resignation of the athletic director, who failed to fire the coach when first presented with video evidence of his abuse.

While that story keeps unfolding over the offseason, the leaders in college basketball will spend the time off trying to clean things up on the court.

Raftery predicts the sport's powers will take a long look at the "arc" - that befuddling semicircle drawn underneath the basket that a defensive player cannot be standing in if he hopes to draw a charge call.

"They're going to do some things with the rules," Raftery said. "But I enjoy the game, so it doesn't really offend me the way it does a lot

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

Pitino was one of the sev-

"When I got the call I was trying to call my wife over so she could hear it and I'm trying to put it on speaker phone and a text keeps beeping as I'm getting this special call," Pitino said Monday, just hours before he led Louisville against Michigan in the national championship game. "I saw the text. 'Go Gophers. I got the job."

It was his son, Richard, who had just found out he was chosen to be the head coach at Minnesota.

It's been that kind of week for Pitino, who is among 12 people overall who will join the class of 2013.

The others announced Monday at a ceremony at the Final Four were college coaches Guy Lewis of Houston, Jerry Tarkanian of UNLV and Sylvia Hatchell of North Carolina, former NBA stars Bernard King and Gary Payton and former University of Virginia star Dawn Staley.

The inductions will take place in Springfield, Mass., on Sept. 8.

Inductees announced previously were: Edwin E.B. Henderson, a direct elect by the Early African Pioneer Committee; longtime Indiana Pacers guard Roger Brown; Oscar Schmidt of Brazil, the leading scorer in Olympic history; Richie Guerin, a star for the New York Knicks in the 1950s; and, Russ Granik, the longtime assistant commissioner of the

It was Pitino, however, who stole the show.

His Cardinals are in the championship game and a win would make him the first coach to win a title at two schools. He won it all with Kentucky in 1996.

On Saturday, Goldencents, a horse which Pitino coowns, won the Santa Anita Derby, a major prep race for the Kentucky Derby.

"I was looking around for lightning," Pitino joked. "This was such a special moment."

Pitino, the only coach to take three schools to the Final Four, has won 661 games in



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28 seasons as a college coach and his 47-16 record in the NCAA tournament is the third-highest winning percentage among active coach-

He also had two stints in the NBA with the Boston

Celtics and New York Knicks.

When he was a young assistant with the Knicks from 1983-85, Pitino forged a relationship with King, one of the playing days. "I remember Rick as a very

most feared scorers in his

young coach, a coach starting his career, a coach who knew the game," said King, who averaged 22.0 points in his 15-year NBA career, including averaging 34.8 points in the 1984 NBA playoffs. "Iremember Rick came with me to the NBA All-Star game and we were flying from Denver to San Antonio. We talked a lot about that even though we had some injuries we had to get off to a good start.

"Bi" should just be herself and tell anyone who needs to know when she feels comfortable telling them. And you're right, Abby - she should tell her husband first. But if her marriage is as strong and happy as she indicated, I'm pretty sure he already knows. I know I did.

writing. The comments I received about that letter were passionate and informed:

**DEAR ABBY:** Bisexual women and men who begin identifying and clarifying their sexual identities in the context of committed relationships need spaces where they can sort through their understandings of themselves.

A support group that is either counselor- or peer-led, in-person or online, can be an important resource to help "Bi in the Deep South" recognize that others have also experienced what she is going through and she can learn from them. She will see there is a place of support and encouragement where it's OK to talk about what bisexuality means for her. Being part of such a group can be particularly liberating.

**DEAR ABBY:** If "Bi in the Deep South" is comfortable enough with who she is to tell someone, she should not be advised to stay in the closet to any degree. She has the right to be honest with herself and her family and not go through life hiding.

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"When you know what you want, and want it bad enough, you will find a way to get it."

When this deal came up at the rubber-bridge table, where the priority is to make your contract, not struggle for possibly irrelevant overtricks, declarer played too fast and suffered the consequences.

After a Stayman auction, North-South identified their heart fit, and the opening lead was the spade king to the ace. Declarer immediately won and led a diamond to the queen to play a trump to the king. When this held, but West showed out, declarer was doomed to lose three trump tricks and a spade, since East was left with the A-Q-9 of trumps poised over dummy's J-10 of hearts.

The best policy on the deal is to focus on what you can afford to lose. The answer is that you do not mind losing two trump tricks, just so long as you do not lose three. After the initial spade lead, the defenders are not threatening a ruff, so you can afford to tackle trump safely.

Win the spade lead, then immediately lead a low heart at trick two toward the J-10. This limits declarer's losses to two trumps and a spade, no matter which defender has the four trumps. The point is that once you discover who has the long trump, you can take the appropriate evasive action to negotiate the hearts, and the defenders can score only their two high trumps whatever they do.

ANSWER: Since you'd double with any strong balanced hand, any action you take in a suit will be somewhat limited in high cards. A simple call of two spades (planning to come again in hearts) would be sensible enough. An alternative approach (if you trust your partner to be on the same wavelength) would be to cue-bid two clubs to show both majors and a limited hand.

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


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

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
