Auger Falls: Multiple Uses, Multiple Conflicts

Auger Falls park to close for the summer, starting in early May. During closure, signage and wetlands will be established.

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TWIN FALLS • When you picture the perfect future for Auger Falls, what do you see?

Outdoor enthusiasts envision a network of bike paths and walking trails, meandering through the brush and by the river. Archeologists worry about preservation of historical sites within the park. Bird watchers hope for active nesting areas in soon-to-be-established wetlands.

So how does the city of Twin Falls balance the needs and desires of park users? That's what Parks and Recreation manager Dennis Bowyer is tackling. As the city prepares to close Auger Falls for the summer for wetlands development, the Parks and Recreation Department is weighing accessibility and preservation.

History Collides with Use

Part of the problem with opening up access to Auger Falls is that the park is home to historical sites, both historic and prehistoric, which are scattered throughout the 600-plus acreage.

On a blustery Tuesday afternoon, Twin Falls County Historic Preservation Commission chairwoman Shauna Robinson led a tour of historical sites in Auger Falls park, including a former gold

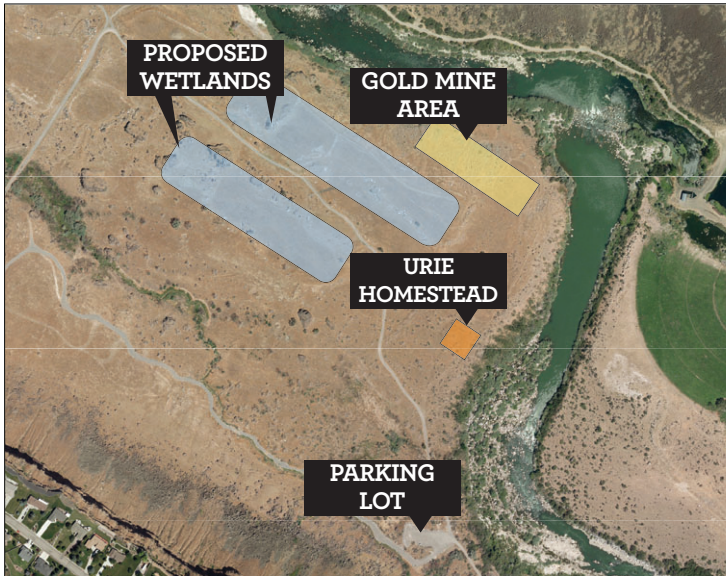
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mining area and the Urie homestead site. Robinson walked the group off the trail and pointed to a partial structure that served as a milking house for the Twin Falls homesteaders. Before the 2010 Auger Falls Fire, the building had wooden rafters and a roof; Now, only stone remains.

Rusted metal bands and pieces of cans lay scattered on the ground, and partially buried

North Side Canal Co. Manager to Retire

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JEROME • After more than four decades as the North Side Canal Co. manager, Ted Diehl's office reflects the knowledge and experience he has gained in those years.

His walls are lined with bookshelves and boxes containing water records, flow rates and phone books from across the state that

date back to the late 1960s. And there is still no computer in Diehl's office.

"Why would I need a computer?" he asked while pointing to the front desk. "Everyone else has a computer around me. I don't need one."

Diehl spent 44 years overseeing the canal company, which provides 165,000 acres of irrigation water to farmland in three southern Idaho counties.

At the end of the month, the 87-year-old Jerome native will retire. Two weeks away from his retirement, Diehl said it's difficult to leave a hard-working staff and board of directors.

"It just kind of felt like the right time," Diehl said. "But I have enjoyed the people I have worked with."

On Wednesday, the *Times-News* sat down with Diehl to get

some parting words:

Times-News: What changes have you seen in 44 years on the job?

Diehl: The biggest changes have been the switch from surface irrigation to sprinklers. Also, farms are bigger than they used to.

People aren't as connected to the canal company as they used to be. In the past, farmers would work closely with their ditch rider.

Burley Resident Says His Neighborhood Smells Bad

BURLEY • A southwest Burley resident told the Burley City Council on Tuesday that a bad odor emanating from a vegetable dehydration plant prevents them from enjoying their backyard.

"It smells like burnt bone or really bad barbecue with chemicals attached," said Robert Kay, who lives on Atlantic Drive.

Kay said his son-in-law, a registered nurse who is accustomed to strong odors, visited and just about vomited on the front lawn because of the "nauseating odor" coming from Ida Pro.

"It was so bad I could physically taste the odor and it about made me sick, too," Kay said.

Kevin Ryan of Ida Pro said the company has tried several remedies, including increasing its emissions stack and installing a misting system that will be operational in two weeks.

A third measure, yet to be tried but approved by the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality which issued the company's air-quality permit, is using a masking agent based on hydrogen peroxide.

"Part of our problem is we've been accused of odors we don't emit," Ryan said. "We've been accused of having a sewage smell, rotten cabbage smell and a smell of burning bones."

During the fall, the company also received complaints of a burning weed smell when many farmers were burning their ditches, Ryan said.

Ryan said the company has 28 employees and operates the plant

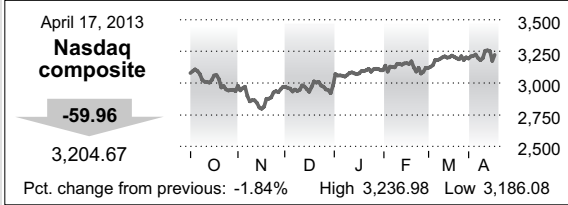
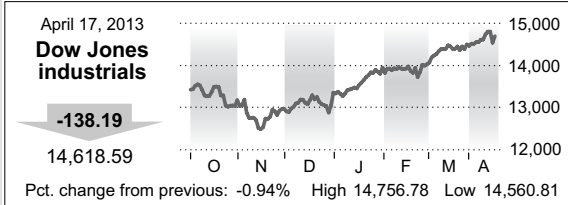

Stocks Fall on Signs of Slowing Global Economy

NEW YORK (AP) • Stocks fell sharply Wednesday for the second time this week as investors continued to worry about how much the global economy is slowing.

Commodities such as oil and copper fared even worse than stocks. Government bonds were a big winner as money flowed in from investors seeking safety. That drove prices higher, and the yield on the 10-year Treasury note fell to its low for the year at one point.

Shelley Native a Medic at Boston Marathon

Malan remembers the carnage that became the marathon.

Jared Malan was treating a soldier's feet bruised from running the grueling 26.2 miles through Boston on Monday when the earth shook and a thunderous boom rang in his ears.

His first thought: We're under attack. I need to run.

A second explosion ripped through the air, followed by wailing sirens and horrified screams.

The Shelley native grabbed two Gatorades and stepped outside the medical tent, just 25 yards from the marathon's finish line.

He left a message for his wife: "I love you. If this is it, know that I love you."

He texted his mom, Heidi Malan: "I'm fine."

He started to leave, but the guilt was too much. He headed back into the tent just as the first victim rolled in.

Jared Malan, 30, was serv-

ing as a medic at the Boston Marathon on Monday when two explosions went off near the finish line. At least three people were killed and 140 injured, according to the Associated Press.

At the time, Heidi Malan wasn't aware of the danger in Boston.

"By the time I knew there was any danger, I knew he was safe," she said. "But it was still a feeling of shock ... I was dazed."

All she knew was that her son had been excited to be there.

Malan had dreamed of attending the Boston Marathon since he was a boy. In his final year as a Temple University podiatry student, this was his chance.

But what was a lifelong dream quickly turned into a nightmare, a nightmare he can't shake.

The smell of gunpowder and burnt flesh fills his nose as he flashes back to the carnage that became the Boston Marathon.

"Within two minutes, you had the worst victims being wheeled in ... it happened so

fast," Malan said.

A man sat limp in a wheelchair, blood trailing from the wounds covering half his face and an entire side of his body.

A woman with shrapnel in her leg cried as Malan applied pressure to stop the bleeding until an ambulance arrived.

In an hour, the worst of it was over.

Forty-eight hours later, Malan can't shake the feeling of dread.

"I start crying (and) last night I couldn't sleep," he said. "It feels like there's a weight on my chest ... when there's a dull moment, I have flashbacks."

On Tuesday, he attended a group therapy session with others who were at the scene.

If there was anything positive about the bombings, he said, it was that the medical tent was 25 yards away.

"We had Harvard medicine, we had some of the finest physicians in the country and the (emergency medical technicians) were good," he said. "They were ready in less than a minute."

Artesian: A City with High Hopes

ARTESIAN CITY • A few headstones in the Artesian City Cemetery are the only evidence that a town ever existed here.

Cattleman James E. Bower is credited with settling the area where Dry Creek flows out of the South Hills in Cassia County and into Twin Falls County on its way to the Snake River.

Bower came to Idaho in 1873 with a large herd of A. J. Harrell's cattle, and settled in the Shoshone Basin just north of the Nevada border. By 1876, Harrell claimed some 800 acres of homestead and desert land at the mouth of Dry Creek Canyon.

According to the memoirs of long-time Murtaugh resident Oliver Johnson, Bower was described as "a small man with beady eyes and had a mean reputation typical of hard men who settled the West."

Locally, Bower was known to have killed more than a few men, according to Johnson.

Bower confessed to being an accomplice in the 1895 murder of two Oakley sheep herders, John Wilson and Daniel Cummings. His confession eventually led to the pardon and release of the infamous "Diamondfield" Jack Davis.

But that's another story.

In 1895, Bower drilled two water wells for his livestock near his home just east of Dry Creek. But instead of potable water, Bower hit a pocket of 110-degree water with seemingly endless potential.

By 1909, Bower sold off a large portion of his property and two dozen families

moved into the area. That year, Idaho Real Estate and Produce Co. announced the development of Artesian City on 560 acres of former Bower property, at that time owned by Frank Somsen.

Artesian opened in September 1909, with the promise of electricity, a health spa and retreat, and frost-free irrigation for fruit orchards - all from the artesian water.

Folks quickly established a general store, a school, a hotel, a livery stable, a dance hall, a post office and a cemetery.

The town was short lived. The post office shut down in 1913. An inter-urban railroad that was to run from the Murtaugh train depot to Artesian and on to Oakley, never got past the planning stage.

But the town had one success.

In its heyday, the Artesian Natatorium — the "Nat," for short — was the favorite hot springs resort in the Magic

Valley. The Nat - which consisted of two indoor swimming pools - opened in April 1916.

Promoters invited the public to visit Artesian, where "the air is pure (and) the climate is delightful."

The Nat operated until 1925. Some say the hot springs dried up when irrigation wells were drilled in the area. Others say interest in the spa waned, and it went out of business. The artesian wells were capped and the townsite has been reclaimed by farmland.

This has been a tough week to forecast the weather. While we did call for rain and snow Tuesday, we didn't imagine that some places would see as much accumulating snow as they did. Even Wednesday had a few lingering snow showers across the Magic Valley. The Weather Authority Storm Team wants every forecast we do to be right, and when they don't go exactly as we expect, we take it personally. Even with all the technology we have today at our fingertips, from radars to satellite and weather computer models, forecasting the weather is not an exact science. We are predicting the future. While we get many weather forecasts right, there will always be a few we don't get right.

Today's weather will be nicer and a little warmer. While temperatures reach the low to mid-50s by the afternoon, these temperatures are still about five degrees below the average temperature this time of year. We should remain dry for the next 24 hours.

The next storm system will arrive Friday. This will bring areas of rain showers off and on through the day and into Saturday morning. Most of the weekend should remain mostly dry with seasonal temperatures near 60. It will become warmer and nicer as we go into next week.

stones make a path that leads to the structure.

Two archeologists from the Idaho State Historical Society, Travis Pitkin and Ethan Morton, also participated in the tour. During the discussion at the Urie homestead, Pitkin emphasized the importance of leaving the site alone, even if scattered debris looks like rubbish.

Robinson agreed. “It’s OK to look at them and see what they have, but just leave them,” she said.

Visitors might not know they’re messing with actual artifacts, and nothing marks the site as historical.

Bowyer wants to change that with interpretive signage. That has two bonuses: It tells visitors exactly what they’re looking at to educate them, and it lets them know that the artifacts aren’t up for grabs.

Previously, that was a problem, said Mychel Matthews of the Twin Falls County Historic Preservation Commission.

The commission wants people to see the sites, but the city has an obligation to protect historic areas on its property, Matthews said.

Other than the interpretive signage, there isn’t much more to do to prevent people from messing with the artifacts and sites.

But it’s better than nothing, Matthews said.

“You hope education raises awareness and apprecia-

tion of our heritage,” she said.

Weighing Access and Preservation

When the city took input from citizens on developing Auger Falls, there were plenty of conflicting ideas, said city engineer Lee Glaesemann.

Most agreed on one thing: Leave the park as undeveloped as possible.

But “development” can have different meanings. Does the city pave the main walking path to the falls, or leave it gravel? How about picnic tables and benches? Or shade trees? If there are trash cans, who will empty them?

Even moving the parking area closer to the falls made some people upset, Bowyer said. Runners especially objected to the move, saying it gave them less room where they were protected from cars. (Motorized vehicles aren’t allowed past the park-

ing area.)

There are other potential conflicts with making Auger Falls multi-use.

This summer, the city is closing the park to establish up to 100 acres of wetlands, partly in an attempt to attract nesting birds.

But nesting birds need safety, and people who bring off-leash dogs to the area may disturb those nests.

The dogs can get in trouble, too, Glaesemann pointed out. Porcupines can injure dogs that wander off the path.

Bowyer and other city officials have time to think about the balance while the park is closed this summer. Robinson said she’s confident the different groups can find a compromise.

“There’s a lot going on down there, and all kinds of interests,” she said. “We just need to accommodate everybody in the best way we can.”

24 hours a day, seven days a week. None of the employees have complained about odors.

He said the company stopped running a sun-dried product in 2012 because company officials thought the product might have been tied to the offensive odor.

Ninety percent of the company’s product is potatoes and the other percentage is vegetables, he said.

The company does not add any chemicals, he said.

Burley Mayor Terry Greenman said last week the smell coming from the plant

was terrible.

“I’ve smelled that smell in my backyard a number of times,” Greenman said.

Harry Bedke, engineering manager for Ida Pro, said the DEQ odor management plan calls for a step-by-step process to eliminate the odor.

Burley Councilman Steve McGill said the company is not unique and it needs to do whatever it takes to eliminate the bad smell.

“You’re dehydrating potatoes. We’ve been dehydrating potatoes in this town for 50 years,” McGill said.

Kay said company officials indicated emissions scrubbers may be needed but could cost \$200,000 and

the company did not want to pay that much for a remedy.

“I had to bite my tongue when they were standing on my doorstep saying they didn’t want to spend \$200,000. There’s not a home in that subdivision that costs less than that. I think we’ve been pretty patient,” Kay said.

Greenman said the city has been working with the company for over a year on the issue.

“I want you to follow through with this otherwise we will have to take action,” Greenman said. “We’re not anti-business either but we’re not going to sacrifice our community for any business.”

Council Says No Chickens in Burley

BURLEY • Burley officials buried the hatchet on a new city ordinance draft Tuesday that would have allowed chickens and rabbits to be kept within city limits.

Burley Councilman John Craner made a motion to cease working on the ordinance and abandon it. The council unanimously ap-

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Business as Usual for Idaho’s Senators, despite Ricin Scare

TWIN FALLS • Ricin-laced letters sent to U.S. senators in Washington, D.C., haven’t disrupted work for Idaho’s senators.

Sen. Jim Risch, R-Idaho, works on the fourth floor of the Russell Senate Office Building in Washington D.C. Alabama Sen. Richard Shelby, who received a letter, works on the third floor of the same building. But Brad Hoaglund, spokesman for Risch, said the Risch and his staff weren’t evacuated.

“I talked to staff back

there and they said all they have noticed is an increased police presence, but everything else is functioning as normal,” Hoaglund said.

Shelby is one of several U.S. senators who received suspicious packages or letters over the last couple of days. Others include Democratic Sen. Carl Levin of Michigan and Republican Sen. Roger Wicker of Mississippi. Another suspicious letter, sent to the White House, was intercepted.

The suspicious letters haven’t changed how Risch’s offices accept mail, which already includes a se-

cure process, Hoaglund said.

“It’s just making sure we follow the proper protocols for all incoming correspondence,” he said. “There is a process we are to follow, and in situations like this we really make sure they’re being followed.”

Idaho Republican Sen. Mike Crapo works in another building that wasn’t affected by the evacuations, said communications director Lindsay Nothorn.

“They’ve got a heightened sense of security,” but otherwise, everything is business as usual, Nothorn said.

Attorneys Move to Delay Restaurant Stabbing Trial

TWIN FALLS • Attorneys in the case of a Twin Falls man charged with voluntary manslaughter in the stabbing death of another man have moved to delay the case again.

According to online court records, defense attorney Keith Roark and Ada County special prosecutors who have been assigned to 21-year-old Cayde Lish’s case agreed to ask the District Judge Richard Bevan delay the trial that’s scheduled to begin May 13.

Roark wrote in a motion to delay the trial that he will be in a murder trial in Ada county until May 1, which will not give him enough time to prepare for Lish’s trial.

A motion hearing to decide whether the trial will be delayed is scheduled for April 29 in Twin Falls

County court.

Lish was charged with voluntary manslaughter for the death of 24-year-old Jerimiah Paiz. Police say Lish stabbed Paiz following a verbal altercation outside Canyon Crest Dining and Event Center on Oct. 6, 2012.

At a court hearing on the case, Twin Falls Police Officer Kevin Loosli testified that Lish said he was outside Canyon Crest when someone started talking “crap” to him. Lish said he was punched, kicked and hit, including a hit in the eye, and believed several people joined the fight, Loosli said.

At the hearing, Paiz’s girlfriend, Kayla Webb, alleged that during a verbal altercation, Lish used a racial slur against Paiz that led to the physical altercation.

Webb testified the two fought for about a minute to a minute and a half. During

the fight, Paiz had Lish in a headlock, she said. Lish’s head was near Paiz’s abdomen and Lish was hitting Paiz in the back, she testified.

Medical personnel arrived and Twin Falls Police Officer Samir Smriko said he applied chest compressions while another emergency worker breathed for Paiz. Smriko said he continued to apply chest compressions in the ambulance as they traveled to St. Luke’s Magic Valley Medical Center.

Twin Falls County Coroner Dennis Chambers said Paiz died from his stab wounds. Paiz was stabbed 13 times in the back and once in an arm, he said. Two of the stab wounds entered a lung, he said.

Ada County deputy prosecutors Kai Wittwer and George Gunn were appointed to the case. Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb said too many people in his office had a connection to Lish, Paiz or their families.

‘Nothing Wrong with Shot Glasses,’ Some Students and Parents Say

JEROME • Some students at Jerome High School and their parents want to know what the big deal is about giving away shot glasses to students.

If you browse the Internet for prom favors, senior Jesse Smalley said, many of the items are wine or shot glasses.

“I feel like this is getting blown out of proportion,” he said. “I couldn’t have asked for a better prom. ... the DJ was great, the music. ... I don’t think students, teachers, anyone should get in trouble for it.”

The glasses were meant as souvenirs, but that doesn’t mean the message was to drink alcohol: They were meant as keepsake that you filled with candy on the way out, Smalley said.

Parent Holly Carlson said it didn’t bother her when

her son and daughter came home with shot glasses.

“We go on vacation quite often and collect shot glasses from the places we visit,” she said. “It doesn’t mean we use them.”

Student Lyndzie Parker, in an email to the *Times-News*, said she enjoyed the night’s decorations and candy.

“They did hand out shot glasses to kids as they left to put their candy in,” she wrote. “If you did not want one, you didn’t have to take one. ... I thought the shot glass would be a great memory of the wonderful night I had at prom. I have never had any alcohol and this didn’t all of a sudden spark a partying urge in me.”

One Magic Valley businessman said this is not the first time he’s seen a school give away shot glasses.

“I wasn’t surprised. It’s something I’ve seen all the

way back into the ‘80s,” said Sid Vanderpool, owner of MME Event Group. “I’ve seen schools give away beer glasses, wine glass, shot glasses. ... I’ve seen stemware given to girls and beer mugs to boys. They’re something they can pour punch into at prom.”

Vanderpool said he’d like to see more area schools use photo booths, which would be more age appropriate and give students a memorable keepsake.

Superintendent Dale Layne told the *Times-News* on Tuesday that there was no ill intention by students giving out the glasses, but he said it probably a gift that shouldn’t have been ordered because it made some students and parents uncomfortable.

The purchase order read “mugs,” Layne said. “Something just got missed”

Lit Cigarette Near Oxygen Tank Caused Jerome Fire

JEROME • Thursday’s Jerome apartment fire that resulted in one fatality was caused by a lit cigarette too close to an oxygen tank, according to Jerome city fire officials.

Wanda Black, 67, died after accidentally starting a fire by lighting a cigarette while connected to an oxygen tank, Jerome Fire Chief Jack Krill said. With oxygen tanks hosed throughout the apartment, the fire was able to spread quickly.

“Oxygen makes things burn hotter and faster,” Krill said. “When you light an oxygen tank, it’s a like a fuse to a bomb.”

Original reports indicated that an explosion had also

gone off in the apartment. However, there were no signs of an explosion once firefighters arrived on the scene, Krill said.

“The windows weren’t blown out and there were no signs of pressure waves,” he said. “There may have been a loud ‘woof’ sound from the fire that the neighbors might have heard.”

Police believe the fire was accidental and do not suspect foul play, said Jerome Police Chief Dan Hall.

Black was the only person

found in the apartment, Krill said. Firefighters also found a small dog under a desk that died in the fire.

Krill encouraged everyone to remain cautious around oxygen tanks.

“Anybody using home oxygen should be extremely careful around any hot objects or flames,” Krill said. “This means no smoking, no barbecues, no lighting candles. If anyone knows someone who is careless, please take steps to take care of them.”

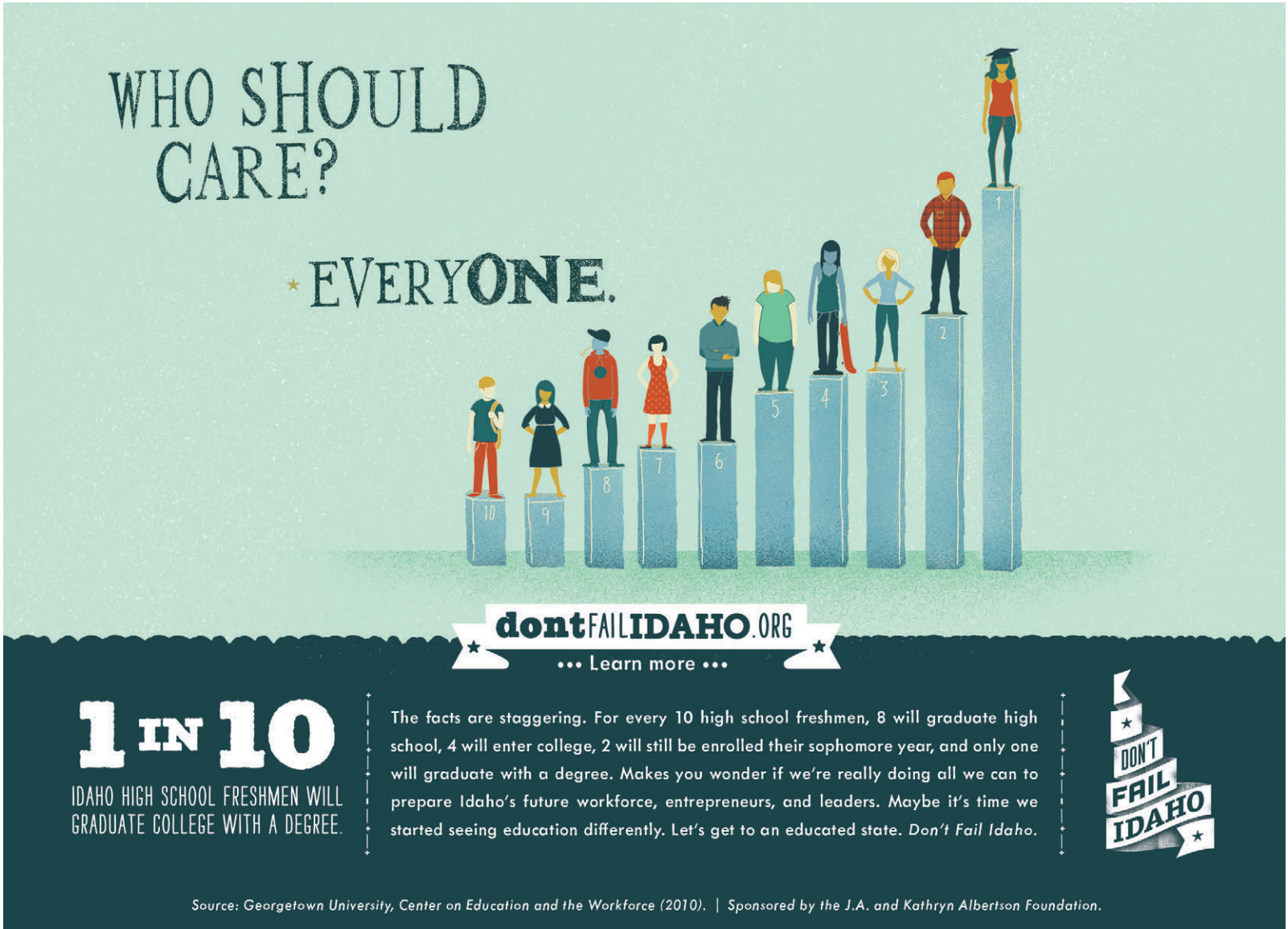



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Former Declo Resident Sentenced for Possessing Explicit Images of Minors

BOISE • A former Declo resident was sentenced Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Boise to prison for possession of sexually explicit images of minors.

David Jay Wheeler, 70, now of Homedale, was sentenced to eight years in prison, followed by 10 years of supervised release.

Chief U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill also ordered Wheeler to pay \$2,219.47 in restitution on behalf of a child victim and forfeit property used to commit the offense.

According to court documents, Wheeler is a former “hands-on” child molester whose sexual attraction to pre-pubescent females dates back decades. By his own admission, Wheeler used his computer to access online child pornography twice a week over the past ten years, according to a press release from U.S. Attorney Wendy J. Olson.

Wheeler used sophisticated means to avoid detec-

tion, but investigators were able to locate him by using GPS technology, according to court documents.

A search warrant executed at Wheeler’s home in Declo resulted in the seizure of a computer and computer storage media that contained sexually explicit images and videos of minors as young as 4 years of age. According to court records, Wheeler was sitting at his computer and was in the process of downloading child pornography videos at the time investigators executed the search warrant.

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children reviewed the child pornography seized from Wheeler and reported that the material depicted child sexual abuse victims from Idaho, Washington, Montana, Colorado, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Texas, Nevada, Hawaii, California, Illinois, Delaware, Georgia, Florida, New Hampshire, New Jersey, the Netherlands, France, United Kingdom, Belgium, Italy,

Germany, Ukraine, Canada, Denmark, Sweden, Germany, Norway, Austria and Brazil.

The case was investigated by officers from the Boise Police Department, assisted by agents and investigators from the Idaho Attorney General’s Office, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the U.S. Postal Inspection Service, the Idaho State Police, and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement’s Homeland Security Investigations.

This case was brought as part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative launched in May 2006 by the Department of Justice to combat the growing epidemic of child sexual exploitation and abuse. Led by the United States Attorneys’ Offices and the Criminal Division’s Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section, Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state, and local resources to locate, apprehend, and prosecute individuals who sexually exploit children, and to identify and rescue victims.

Man Arrested on DUI Charge After Injury Crash

TWIN FALLS • Police say a 22-year-old Twin Falls man had been drinking when he caused a car crash that badly injured several people.

Tyler John Parks was arraigned Monday in Twin Falls County Fifth District Court on one count of aggravated driving under the influence.

On April 13, police were dispatched to a two vehicle crash at Shoshone Street South and Third Avenue South.

According to a police report, Parks was driving a silver 2007 Hyundai Tiburon with Utah temporary tags and ran the stop sign on the corner of Third Avenue South before striking a red

2002 Chevrolet Trailblazer with Idaho plates.

A woman who was walking on Shoshone Street when the crash occurred told police she saw the vehicles collide, the report states. The woman told police that she saw Parks exit the driver’s side door and help a woman, later identified as Sheri L. Hall, out of the driver’s side, the report states.

According to the report, the witness told police that she heard Parks tell Hall to say she was driving the vehicle.

The report describes Parks as being confused about what was happening, smelling of alcohol and having glassy, bloodshot eyes and slurred speech.

Parks complained of injuries to his arms but was

unwilling to go in an ambulance to be checked out, the report states.

Police placed Parks into custody and took him to St. Luke’s Magic Valley Medical Center to be medically cleared and to get a blood draw to test his blood alcohol level, the report states.

At the hospital, the report states, medical staff told police that several people involved in the crash had serious injuries that would likely cause life-long problems.

Parks was medically cleared by staff and transported to the Twin Falls County Jail where he was booked for felony aggravated DUI. Parks posted a \$5,000 bond on Monday.

A preliminary hearing is scheduled for April 26.

Texas Fertilizer Plant Blast Injures Dozens

WEST, Texa• A massive explosion at a fertilizer plant near Waco on Wednesday night injured dozens of people and sent flames shooting into the night sky, leaving the factory a smoldering ruin following a blast that damaged buildings for blocks in every direction.

The explosion at West

Fertilizer in West, a community about 20 miles north of Waco, happened shortly before 8 p.m. and could be heard as far away as Waxahachie, 45 miles to the north.

Tommy Muska, West’s mayor, said at a news conference three hours after the explosion that he didn’t yet know how many people had been injured or killed. He said buildings in a five-block radius from the plant were severely damaged by the explosion.

Among the damaged buildings was the West Rest Haven Nursing Home, from which first-responders evacuated 133 patients, some in wheelchairs. “We did get there and got that taken care of,” Muska said.

Information was hard to come by in the hours after the blast, with even Texas Gov. Rick Perry saying state officials were waiting for details about the extent of the damage.

Political Kin, and Politcally Dangerous

The regulatory, administrative state, which progressives champion, is generally a servant of the strong, for two reasons. It responds to financially powerful and politically sophisticated factions. And it encourages rent-seekers to exploit opportunities for concentrated benefits and dispersed costs (e.g., agriculture subsidies confer sums on large agribusinesses by imposing small costs on 316 million Americans). Such government inevitably means executive government and the derogation of the legislative branch, both of which produce exploding government debt. By explaining these perverse effects of progressivism, the Hudson Institute’s Christopher DeMuth explains contemporary government’s cascading and reinforcing failures. Executive growth fuels borrowing growth because of the relationship between what DeMuth, in a recent address at George Mason University, called “regulatory insouciance



and freewheeling finance.” Government power is increasingly concentrated in Washington, Washington power is increasingly concentrated in the executive branch, and executive branch power is increasingly concentrated in agencies that are unconstrained by legislative control. Debt and regulation are, DeMuth discerns, “political kin”: Both are legitimate government functions, but both are now perverted to evade democratic accountability, which is a nuisance, and transparent taxation, which is politically dangerous. Today’s government uses regulation to achieve policy goals by imposing on the private sector burdens less obvious than taxation would be, burdens that become visible only indirectly, in higher prices. Often the goals government pursues by surreptitious indirection

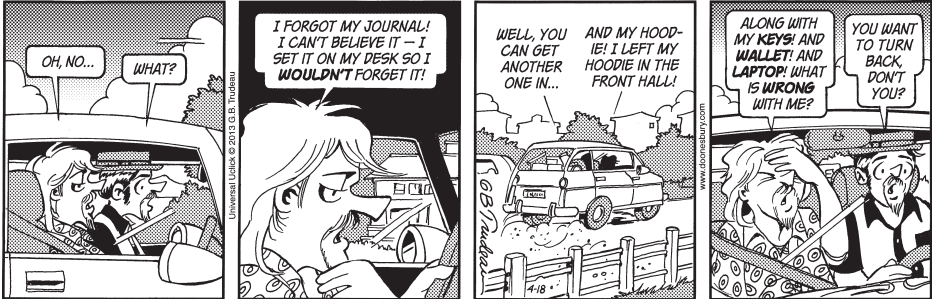
are goals that could not win legislative majorities — e.g., the Environmental Protection Agency’s regulation of greenhouse gases following Congress’ refusal to approve such policies. And deficit spending — borrowing — is, DeMuth says, “a complementary means of taxation evasion”: It enables the political class to provide today’s voters with significantly more government benefits than current taxes can finance, leaving the difference to be paid by voters too young to vote or not yet born. Two developments demonstrate, DeMuth says, how “delegation and debt have become coordinate mechanisms of legislative abnegation.” One is Congress’ anti-constitutional delegation of taxing authority to executive branch regulatory agencies funded substantially or entirely by taxes the agencies levy, not by congressional appropriations. For example, DeMuth notes, the Federal Communications Commission’s \$347 million operating expenses “are funded by payments

from the firms it regulates,” and its \$9 billion program subsidizing certain Internet companies is funded by its own unilateral tax on telecommunication firms. The Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, another free-booting agency not tethered to the appropriations process, automatically receives a share of the profits of the Federal Reserve banks. A second development is “the integration of regulation and debt-financed consumption.” Recently, a Washington Post headline announced: “Obama administration pushes banks to make home loans to people with weaker credit.” Here we go again — subprime mortgages as federal policy. Is this because lowering lending requirements and forcing Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac to securitize the loans worked so well last time? This illustrates DeMuth’s point about how unfettered executive government uses debt-financed consumption and “regulatory conscription of private markets” to force

spending “vastly beyond what Congress could have appropriated in the light of day.” High affluence and new technologies have, DeMuth believes, “led to unhealthy political practices.” Time was, the three basic resources required for effective political action — discretionary time, the ability to acquire and communicate information, and persuasion skills — were scarce and possessed only by elites. But in our wealthy and educated society, interest groups can pressure government without being filtered by congressional hierarchies. Legislative leaders — particularly, committee chairs — have lost power as Congress has become more porous and responsive to importuning factions using new media. Congress, responding to the increased difficulty of legislating, has delegated much lawmaking to specialized agencies that have fewer internal conflicts. Congress’ role has waned as that of autonomous executive agencies has

waxed. The executive has driven the expansion of the consumption of benefits that are paid for by automatic entitlement transfer payments, by government-mandated private expenditures, and by off-budget and non-transparent taxation imposed by executive agencies. Government used to spend primarily on the production of things — roads, dams, bridges, military forces. There can be only so many of such goods. Now, DeMuth says, government spends primarily for consumption: “The possibilities for increasing the kind, level, quality and availability of benefits are practically unlimited. This is the ultimate source of today’s debt predicament. More borrowing for more consumption has no natural stopping point short of imploding on itself.” Funding the welfare state by vast borrowing and regulatory taxation hides the costs from the public. Hence its political potency. Until the implosion.

Romanian National Sentenced for Obtaining a Visa by Fraud

BOISE • A Romanian national living in Ketchum was sentenced Wednesday for obtaining a visa by fraud, according to an announcement by U.S. Attorney Wendy J. Olson.

Stefan Csaba Csep, 32, was sentenced to two years of probation and a \$500 fine by Chief U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winnmill. He pleaded guilty to the charge in January 2013.

According to the plea agreement, Csep entered into a fraudulent marriage with a U.S. citizen in 2005, with the sole purpose of evading immigration laws and obtaining immigration benefits. According to court documents, Csep did not reside with the individual he married. Following the marriage, he filed paperwork with the Department of Homeland Security/Citizenship and Immigration Services, seeking lawful permanent resident status based on his fraudulent marriage. The agency subsequently approved the application and Csep was granted a lawful permanent resident visa.

As a result of his conviction, Csep will be deported to his native country of Romania and will be prohibited from entering the U.S. in the future.

The case was investigated by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations.

Labrador Renews Push to Revamp Monument Process

BOISE (AP) • U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador has reintroduced a bill that would require congressional approval any time a president wanted to carve out new national monuments across the country.

Labrador testified on the bill Tuesday during a hearing hosted by a House Natural Resources subcommittee that focused on several pieces of proposed legislation on limits of presidential discretion.

Presidents have the sole authority under the 1906 Antiquities Act to protect land under national monument status. Presidents from both parties have used the law to designate monument status to places such as the Grand Canyon and Idaho's own Craters of the Moon.

But the Republican argues Congress should have greater oversight on such decisions no matter the president's political party, according to an *Idaho Statesman* story published Wednesday.

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Email Rules Loosened for Mormon Missionaries

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • The Mormon church's strict rules about email communication for missionaries have been loosened a bit to allow them to send emails to friends, priesthood leaders and new converts.

Previously, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints missionaries could only email immediate family members, though they've always been allowed to send written letters to friends and others.

LDS spokesman Eric Hawkins said Wednesday that missionaries must get permission from their mission president before send-

ing emails to converts or people of the opposite gender, under the new rules.

And they are still restricted to sending emails through the church's filtered email service and on the designated preparation day each week. Emails also must be sent from public computers at somewhere like a library where a fellow missionary can see the screen.

The missionary handbook shows that the rules stem from the expectation that missionaries are to devote all their time and attention to "serving the Lord, leaving behind all other personal affairs."

The handbook also advises missionaries to never include anything confidential, sensitive or negative about the area where they are serving.

Missions are considered rites of passage for many Mormons, broadening their perspective on the world, strengthening their faith and helping prepare some of them for future leadership roles within the church.

Young Mormon men are expected, but not required, to serve missions while women have faced far less pressure to serve. Men serve two years while women go for 18 months.

In October, the church

lowered the minimum age for missionaries: from 21 to 19 for women and from 19 to 18 for men.

The church said applications for new missions are up twofold since the announcement and more than 65,000 Mormon missionaries are serving around the world. About half of all new applications to go on missions have been from women, the church said. Previously, 15 percent of missionaries were women.

More than 20,000 additional missionaries have been called to serve, while another 6,000 are in the interview process.

Board OKs Tuition Hike at All 4 Idaho Universities

MOSCOW (AP) • Idaho public university students can expect a higher price tag on their tuition bills next fall.

The state Board of Education voted Wednesday to hike tuition at all four public universities — though not all university presidents got exactly what they requested.

Trustees approved a 6.9 percent hike at Boise State University and increases between 4 and 5 percent for the University of Idaho, Idaho State University and Lewis-Clark State College.

The boost represents a smaller increase than previous years: tuition jumped by at least 9 percent at three campuses two years ago.

University officials say the increase will help fund scholarships and faculty benefits.

University of Idaho President Duane Nellis argued declining enrollment at the Moscow campus and an ongoing gap in state funding made the increase necessary.

Ketchum Officials Pass Smoke-free Law

KETCHUM (AP) • Ketchum officials have banned smoking in a long list of areas that include all city-owned facilities, parks, and indoor public places and places of employment, including hotel and motel rooms.

The *Idaho Mountain Express* reports that city councilors passed the ordinance Monday that comes with a yearlong education campaign before enforcement begins.

After that, penalties start with a warning and rise to a \$52 fine for a third violation.

Employers in the resort area who are found to discriminate against employees making complaints concerning the ordinance face fines of \$1,000 to \$5,000.

N. Idaho Man Gets Life for 2011 Slaying

SANDPOINT (AP) • A north Idaho man has been sentenced to life in prison in the 2011 shooting death of a romantic rival.

First District Judge Barbara Buchanan sentenced 20-year-old Austin Blake Thrasher of Cocolalla Tuesday.

The *Bonner County Daily Bee* reports the judge or-

dered Thrasher to serve at least 25 years before becoming eligible for parole in the slaying of 19-year-old Michael Wyatt Smith.

Detectives said Thrasher resorted to violence after learning he and Smith were dating the same 16-year-old Clark Fork girl. Bonner County Prosecutor Louis

Marshall said Tuesday the slaying was committed out of jealousy and with premeditation.

Smith was initially reported missing and his killing was undetected until early 2012 when Thrasher's wife — arrested for a separate crime — then told police where the body was buried.

Coroner Blames Carbon Monoxide for 5 Fire Deaths

LEWISTON (AP) • A coroner says he's almost certain that carbon monoxide poisoning is to blame for the deaths of five people killed in a house fire in Orofino last weekend.

Clearwater County Coroner Will Rambeau says

smoke inhalation was a lesser factor in the deaths of two adults, three teens and two dogs in Saturday's fire. He expects his conclusions to be confirmed in blood tests.

Rambeau says everyone died in their sleep from carbon monoxide created from

a slow burning fire, then seeped into the house.

The *Lewiston Tribune* reports that investigators have concluded the fire was caused by an overloaded power cord on the front porch where an electric grill was plugged into an outlet.

Rambeau said the house had two smoke detectors but lacked a carbon monoxide detector.

Senate Blocks Expanded Gun Sale Background Checks

WASHINGTON (AP) • Senate Republicans, backed by a small band of rural-state Democrats, turned away legislation Wednesday to tighten restrictions on the sale of firearms, rejecting repeated appeals from President Barack Obama and personal pleas by families of the victims of last winter's mass elementary school shooting in Newtown, Conn.

Attempts to ban assault-style rifles and high capacity ammunition magazines also faced certain defeat in a series of showdown votes four months after a gunman killed 20 elementary school children and six staff members at Sandy Hook Elementary.

The background check measure commanded a majority of senators, 54-46, but that was well short of the 60 votes needed to advance. Forty-one Republicans and five Democrats sided to scuttle the plan. In the hours before the key vote, Sen. Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., bluntly accused the National Rifle Association of making false claims about the expansion of background checks that he and Sen. Pat Toomey, R-Pa., were backing.

"Where I come from in West Virginia, I don't know how to put the words any plainer than this: That is a lie. That is simply a lie," he said, accusing the organization of

telling its supporters that friends, neighbors and some family members would need federal permission to transfer ownership of firearms to one another.

The NRA did not respond immediately to the charge, but issued a statement after the vote that restated the claim. The proposal "would have criminalized certain private transfers of firearms between honest citizens, requiring lifelong friends, neighbors and some family members to get federal government permission to exercise a fundamental right or face prosecution," said a statement from Chris Cox, a top lobbyist for the group.

Said Sen. Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa, "Expanded background checks would not have prevented Newtown. Criminals do not submit to background checks."

Senate votes were set on a total of nine provisions, some advanced by lawmakers on each side of an issue in which Democrats from rural or Southern states generally lined up with the overwhelming majority of Republicans.

Whatever the outcome, the events were unlikely to be the last word on an issue that Democratic leaders shied away from for nearly two decades until Obama picked up on it after the Newtown shootings.

Kerry: US Making Progress on Benghazi Attackers

WASHINGTON (AP) • Secretary of State John Kerry says the Obama administration is making progress in its effort to hold people accountable for the Sept. 11 assault on a U.S. diplomatic installation in Benghazi, Libya.

Testifying before Congress, Kerry says the U.S. has identified people it believes were culpable in the attack that killed U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans.

He says U.S. authorities are working through the

evidence and making a case. This takes time, he says, because Libya remains largely lawless a year-and-a-half after the United States helped rebels there overthrow dictator Moammar Gadhafi.

The Obama administration has long promised to bring the perpetrators of the attack to justice.

Kerry didn't say if any suspect has yet been arrested, detained or otherwise targeted by American or Libyan authorities.

AUTHORITIES SEEK SUSPECTS IN BOSTON MARATHON BOMBING

BOSTON (AP) • Investigators poring over photos and video from the Boston Marathon have an image of a potential suspect in the deadly bombing but do not know his name and have not questioned him, a law enforcement official said Wednesday.

The news came with Boston in a state of high excitement over a possible breakthrough in the case and conflicting information over whether a suspect was in custody. Police and reporters converged on the federal courthouse in the afternoon.

Several news organizations reported earlier in the day that a suspect had been identified from surveillance video taken at a department store midway between the sites of Monday's two bomb blasts, which killed three people and wounded more than 170.

A law enforcement official who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity and was not authorized to discuss the case publicly confirmed only that investigators had an image of

a potential suspect and had not established his identity.

Also Wednesday, a law enforcement official briefed on the investigation told the AP that a suspect was in custody. The official, who was not authorized to divulge details of the investigation, said the suspect was expected in federal court.

But the FBI and the U.S. attorney's office in Boston said no arrests had been made.

"Contrary to widespread reporting, there have been no arrests made in connection with the Boston Marathon attack," the FBI said in a statement. "Over the past day and a half, there have been a number of press reports based on information from unofficial sources that has been inaccurate. Since these stories often have unintended consequences, we ask the media, particularly at this early stage of the investigation, to exercise caution and attempt to verify information through appropriate official channels before reporting."

Venezuela High Court Chief: No Basis for Recount

CARACAS (AP) • Venezuela's Supreme Court president said Wednesday there is no legal basis for holding a vote-by-vote recount that opposition candidate Henrique Capriles is demanding for the disputed presidential election.

It was the latest indication that the governing system left behind by Hugo Chavez when he died of cancer last month has no intention of agreeing to Capriles' request. He claims Sunday's election was stolen from him.

Capriles has not formally filed a request for a recount with the National Electoral Council, which on Monday ratified Nicolas Maduro, Chavez's anointed successor, as the winner. The council says Maduro won with 50.8 percent of

the vote to Capriles' 49 percent.

Judge Luisa Estela Morales, the Supreme Court chief, said Venezuela's voting system is so automated that a manual count doesn't exist. Technically, however, a recount is possible as paper receipts are issued for every vote cast and can be checked against tallies done by each voting machine, voter registries and centralized records.

"This presumed instigation to a manual count has angered many Venezuelans," said Morales, whose court, like all of Venezuela's national government institutions, is packed with Chavista loyalists. What was unusual about her statement is that it was impromptu, unrelated to any specific court case.

Morales is the same judge

who issued a controversial decision three days after Chavez's March 5 death saying that Maduro effectively became president at the moment of his mentor's passing. That enabled Maduro to be sworn in the same day as acting president.

Analysts say Capriles has few options, given Maduro's solid hold on all the levers of power, including the loyalty of the military high command. On Tuesday, Capriles canceled a big protest march he had called for Wednesday after Maduro responded by telling his backers to take to the streets, too.

"Whoever goes out into the street tomorrow is playing the government's game," Capriles said. "The government wants there to be deaths in the country."

Funeral Held for Diplomat Killed in Afghanistan

RIVER FOREST, ILL. (AP) • A taste for adventure and a belief that good can be done in tough places led young American diplomat Anne Smedinghoff to Afghanistan, where she reached out to Afghanis, especially children, in hopes they might charge headlong toward their dreams as she did.

The 25-year-old, just three years into a promising foreign service career, was doing just that — delivering textbooks to a school in southern Afghanistan — when she was killed April 6 in a Taliban bomb attack that also claimed the lives of four other Americans and an Afghan doctor. Family and friends packed a suburban Chicago church Wednesday for her funeral, remembering her as a brave, selfless woman who wouldn't let fear stop her from trying to make a difference in faraway places.

“Meeting Anne changed people’s lives,” Undersecretary of State Patrick Kennedy told mourners. “She inspired Afghanis young and old to pursue their dreams, to think critically about our modern world and in many cases to reconsider their perceptions of America.”

Mourners lit small candles and watched as pall bearers brought her flag draped coffin into the sanctuary of the church in River Forest, where Smedinghoff grew up.

Outside, along street after street throughout the village, neighbors and strangers touched by her story had tied white ribbons around trees and lampposts. Speaking at the funeral, Smedinghoff’s father, Tom, marveled at her sense of adventure and admitted that he and his wife lived vicariously through her.

There was the time in college when she went skydiving and didn’t tell her parents. She biked 4,000 miles across the country for a cancer



fundraiser. She took her parents to check out Angel Falls deep in the jungle in Venezuela, her first diplomatic post.

“The foreign service really was a perfect fit for her,” her father said. “... It combined her love of foreign policy with her desire for adventure.”

Smedinghoff joined the foreign service right after graduating from Johns Hopkins University, where she majored in international studies and became a key organizer of the university’s annual Foreign Affairs Symposium in 2008. The event draws high-profile speakers from around the world.

After her assignment in Caracas, Venezuela, she volunteered for Afghanistan.



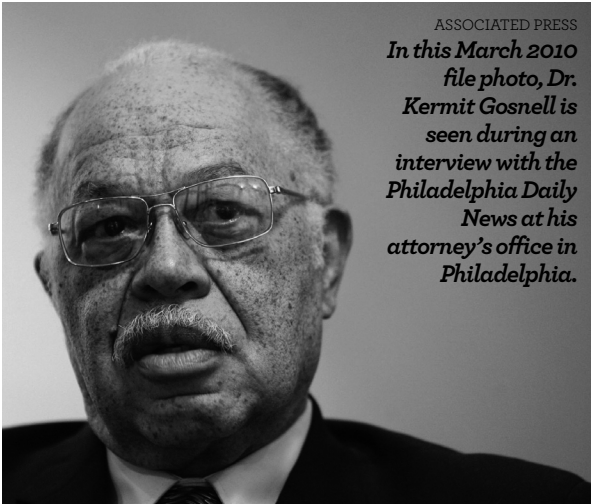

One of Smedinghoff’s favorite projects there was working with the Afghan women’s soccer team and helping it gain greater acceptance in the deeply conservative country. To ensure she could better interact with the Afghan players, Smedinghoff even practiced her own soccer skills on her days off.

She appeared on Afghan TV for a cultural discussion in which she talked of the similarities between Thanksgiving and Muslim holi-

days to show both societies shared a devotion to family gatherings and giving thanks.

About two weeks before her death she was chosen to assist with a visit to Afghanistan by Secretary of State John Kerry, reflecting the trust placed in the second-tour officer despite her few years of service. Kerry stopped in Chicago on Monday to visit Smedinghoff’s parents and praised the young woman as having been “full of idealism and full of hopes.”

PA. ABORTION TRIAL: ASSISTANT GAVE ANESTHESIA

PHILADELPHIA (AP) • A woman trained only as a medical assistant told jurors Wednesday that she gave anesthesia, set dosing amounts and performed ultrasounds when she worked at a now-shuttered abortion clinic whose owner is charged with killing a patient and seven babies.

Latosha Lewis testified as prosecutors wrap up their five-week case against Dr. Kermit Gosnell, 72. A string of former employees have testified that they went to work at the chaotic, run-down clinic because they were desperate for work, or were former patients, or knew Gosnell through his family or the gritty West Philadelphia neighborhood. A final employee was expected to testify Thursday before the prosecution rests.

Most of the former co-workers have pleaded guilty to criminal charges for the work they did, and face years in prison for murder, conspiracy, racketeering, drug distribution or abortion law violations. Investigators say Gosnell ran a “pill mill” by day frequented by addicts and drug dealers; and an illegal “abortion mill” by night, where poor women with late-term pregnancies endured long, painful procedures performed by untrained staff until Gosnell arrived for the final phase of the surgical abortions.

Lewis, 31, had gone to a career school for eight months to qualify as a medical assistant, and was sent to Gosnell’s clinic as part of training. Before long, she was hired to do paperwork and draw blood. But that quickly morphed into skilled work as she delivered intravenous drugs, performed ultrasounds and made independent decisions about how much anesthesia patients should get. At one point, she had a scare with a patient.

“I had given her too much (medication) and I was concerned whether or not she

would come (back) from anesthesia,” Lewis testified.

Women often got near-hourly doses of Cytotec, a drug designed to induce labor, as they waited for Gosnell, along with painkillers to quell the powerful cramping, Lewis said. She sometimes chose to reduce the clinic dosages. By 2008, Lewis had moved to the front desk because she was no longer comfortable with the amount of drugs the patients were given.

“The women were going into labor too fast, and I didn’t want to deal with it,” Lewis testified, adding that she still handed out some medications.

The patient who died, 41-year-old refugee Karnamaya Mongar, was given four doses of Cytotec during her November 2009 visit, along with Demerol and other drugs, according to notes scrawled randomly across her medical paperwork. A medical examiner said she died of an overdose.

Lewis, who checked in Mongar when she arrived at the clinic from Virginia, said her chart does not list her weight because the clinic’s scale was broken. As many as two dozen women a day came in for abortions, some of whom delivered babies in toilets or waiting areas before Gosnell arrived, according to staff testimony. Gosnell had taught them to snip the babies in the back of the neck to “ensure fetal demise,” according to the testimony of unlicensed doctor Stephen Massof and others.

Massof and two others have pleaded guilty to third-degree murder. On cross-examination by defense lawyer Jack McMahon, Lewis acknowledged that several relatives had gone to Gosnell for abortions or other medical care.

McMahon has told jurors there were no live births at the clinic, and that any movement seen by the staff was an involuntary response.

SAN JUAN (AP) • Going to the doctor in Puerto Rico has for years often meant getting in line. Now, it might mean getting on a plane.

A medical exodus is taking place in the Caribbean territory as doctors and nurses flee for the U.S. mainland, seeking higher salaries and better reimbursement from insurers. Many of their patients, frustrated by long waits and a scarcity of specialists, are finding they have no choice but to follow them off the island.

Among them is Marilu Flores, a 60-year-old rural mail carrier who is battling advanced rheumatoid arthritis.

She not only is flying to the U.S. mainland to receive treatment; she’s moving to Texas.

“The best doctors left a long time ago,” she said.

In the last five years, the number of doctors in Puerto Rico has dropped by 13 percent, from 11,397 to 9,950, according to the island’s Medical Licensing and Studies Board. The biggest losses are primary care physicians and specialists within a specialty, such as thoracic oncologists.

Of the roughly 400 cardiologists who practiced in Puerto Rico about five years ago, only about 150 remain. The number of anesthesiologists has dropped from roughly 300 to about 100 in roughly the same time period, said Dr. Eduardo Ibarra, president of the island’s Association of Surgeons.

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“Same with the neurosurgeons. They don’t even number 20 now,” Ibarra said. “There are no specialized surgeons in certain areas.”

Those seeking a thoracic oncologist, for example, have to go to Florida, if they can afford it. The exodus of doctors is part of a larger wave of professionals who have left the U.S. island territory in recent years, settling in states such as Florida and New York, where there is a big demand for bilingual workers, especially police and nurses.

Many Puerto Ricans also seek to escape a wave of violent crime and higher cost of living. Almost a million more Puerto Ricans now live on the mainland than on the island. Medical professionals say they expect the situation will worsen.

President Barack Obama’s new health care law means U.S. states will soon seek more doctors amid an influx of patients, said Dr. Guillermo Tirado, an internal medicine specialist in Puerto Rico.

“All states are preparing to cull a lot of doctors from Puerto Rico,” he said. “If we have a big exodus now, we’re going to see it get worse ... There hasn’t been a revolution yet because the escape valve is to buy a plane ticket to Orlando,” referring to the many patients who fly to the U.S. for treatment if they can afford it.

Puerto Rico currently does not meet federal recommendations on the number and types of doctors needed per

capita, Tirado said.



The island of 3.7 million people has no more than two pediatric neurosurgeons, even though guidelines state there should be at least one pediatric neurosurgeon per roughly 80,000 people, he said.

Puerto Rico also lacks 93 full-time primary care physicians to adequately cover the medical needs of the population, according to statistics from the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration, which tracks areas suffering from a shortage of

health professionals.

Of the island’s 78 municipalities, 37 need more health care professionals, including the capital of San Juan and Ponce, the island’s second largest city. The island has roughly 7,000 primary care physicians, Ibarra said.

At the same time, the island’s medical tourism industry is growing, with two new hospitals being built in Manati and Bayamon, catering mostly to foreigners from elsewhere in the Caribbean, and even some from the U.S.

The June release of Hollywood’s latest Superman tale, “Man of Steel,” also should renew fan interest. The film offers a fresh start for the kid from Krypton, with Henry Cavill as the boy who falls to Earth and becomes its protector.

Siegel and Shuster labored on their creation for years in the throbbing grip of the Great Depression before finally selling Superman to a publisher.

The Man of Steel became a Depression-era bootstrap strategy for the Siegel/Shuster team, according to Brad Ricca, a professor at nearby Case Western Reserve University who uses Superman in his classes.

“They really just saw it as a way out,” he said.

In his upcoming book “Super Boys,” Ricca says the story of Superman’s creation is mostly about their friendship: two boys in the city’s Glenville neighborhood dreaming of “fame, riches and girls” in a time when such dreams are all the easier to imagine because of the crushing economic misery.

Ricca said Siegel and Shuster reflected Cleveland’s ethnic mix: both were sons of Jewish immigrants, struggled during the Depression and hustled to make something of themselves.

Superman’s first appearance, in Action Comics No. 1, was April 18, 1938.

The first and greatest superhero

has gone on to appear in nearly 1,000 Action Comics and has evolved with the times, including a 1940s radio serial, a 1950s TV series and as a reliable staple for Hollywood. Pop culture expert Charles Coletta at Bowling Green State University said Superman ranks globally with George Washington and the Super Bowl as American icons.

But it wasn’t just hardscrabble circumstances that tempered the Man of Steel, Siegel’s daughter said.

Laura Siegel Larson said Cleveland’s public library, comic pages and high school mentors all nurtured her father’s creativity.

“The encouragement that he received from his English teachers and the editors at the Glenville High School newspaper and the literary magazine gave my dad a real confidence in his talents,” she said by phone Monday from Los Angeles. She plans to be in Cleveland for the Thursday anniversary.

The tale of Superman’s first moments begins in Siegel’s bedroom. He once recalled coming up with the idea while looking up at the stars and imagining a powerful hero who looked out for those in distress.

Today, Siegel’s home is easy to pick out on a street with a mix of renovated and dilapidated homes: a stylized red Superman “S” adorns the fence and a sign identifies the home as “the house where Superman was born.”

And like the Man of Steel, the neighborhood is tough.

“You better have ‘S’ on your chest if you come out after dark,” grinned Tommie Jones, 50, helping move furniture several doors away.

Hattie Gray, 61, who moved into the home nearly 30 years ago unaware of its history, has gotten used to the parade of Superman fans walking by or knocking, trying to savor a piece of comics lure.

“I get people all the time, people all the way from Japan, from Australia,” she said. “It’s a great joy to live here.”

American Airlines Resumes Most Flights

DALLAS (AP) • American Airlines resumed most flights Wednesday, a day after a massive technology failure forced the nation’s third-largest carrier to ground all planes from coast to coast.

Some lingering problems remained. At midday, American and regional offshoot American Eagle had canceled more than 200 flights, according to flight-tracking service FlightAware.com. But that was a huge improvement over Tuesday, when American and Eagle cancelled nearly 1,000 flights and delayed another 1,100.

“Our operations returned to normal this morning,” American Airlines spokeswoman Andrea Huguely said.

Some of Wednesday’s cancellations were because of bad weather in Chicago and a lack of crews and planes in the right places. The airline added five unscheduled flights to accommodate passengers stranded in Chicago, Dallas and Los Angeles, Huguely said.

The company blamed the breakdown on a “software issue” that knocked out both primary and backup computer reservation systems, which are also used for everything from issuing boarding passes to determining how much fuel to pump into planes.

The failure affected nearly two-thirds of scheduled flights aboard American and American Eagle. And it was a

public-relations nightmare for American, which is preparing to merge with US Airways to become the world’s biggest carrier. Passengers took to social media sites to criticize the airline, which for hours could only apologize and say that it was trying to fix the problem.

On Wednesday, American posted a video apology from CEO Tom Horton

that provided the airline’s most detailed explanation of the outage.

“As you’d imagine, we do have redundancies in our system,” Horton said, standing in front of employees and banks of computer monitors in the airline’s control center in Texas. But in this case, the software trouble had wide-ranging effects.

Russian Opposition Leader’s Trial Adjourned

KIROV, Russia (AP) • The embezzlement trial of a Russian opposition leader was adjourned for a week shortly after it started Wednesday in a northwestern city besieged by hundreds of activists and journalists. In the evening, hundreds more rallied in Moscow to show their support.

Lawyer and anti-corruption campaigner Alexei Navalny, who spearheaded anti-government protests in 2011, and his former colleague are accused of leading an organized criminal group that embezzled \$500,000 worth of timber from a state-owned company in the city of Kirov.

The charges not only threaten to send the 36-year-old Navalny to prison, but strike at the essence of his image as an anti-corruption activist. Navalny says the charges are an act of revenge for his exposure of high-level corruption.

As the trial began, several dozen activists protested in

support of Navalny outside the courthouse in Kirov, chanting, “We will not let you go!”

At the Moscow rally, Lyudmila Alexeyeva, an 85-year-old human rights activist and former Soviet dissident, was among those

who spoke out in Navalny’s defense.

“Everyone present here is well aware that he is not guilty of what he is accused of and everyone present here knows that in spite of this he will be found guilty,” Alexeyeva told the crowd.

Ex-official’s Wife Says Husband Shot DA

KAUFMAN, Texas (AP) • The wife of a former North Texas justice of the peace implicated her husband in the shooting deaths of a local district attorney, his wife and an assistant prosecutor, according to court records filed Wednesday.

An arrest affidavit revealed Kim Lene Williams told investigators Tuesday that her husband, Eric Lyle Williams, was the trigger man in the slayings of Kaufman County District Attorney Mike McLelland and his wife, Cynthia, and assistant prosecutor Mark Hasse. McLelland and Hasse prosecuted Eric Williams last year for theft of three computer monitors.

Kim Williams was arrested early Wednesday and charged with capital murder. Eric Williams has been in custody, charged with making terroristic threats. He has not been charged in the slayings. The affidavit says Kim Williams “described in detail her role along with that of her husband.” However, the document does not outline what Kim Williams’ alleged role was. After Eric Williams was convicted of theft, he lost his elected position as justice of the peace — a judge who handles mostly administrative duties — and his law license. He was sentenced to probation. The McLellands were found dead March 30, two months after Hasse was slain.

The officer who signed the affidavit, Kaufman County Sheriff’s Sgt. Matt Woodall, said he had learned from other officers and county employees that Hasse and Mike McLelland both believed Williams blamed them for the loss of his job and carried handguns because they thought he was “a threat to their personal safety.”

Kim Williams was being held on \$10 million bond at the Kaufman County Jail, sheriff’s spokesman Lt. Justin Lewis said. He declined to answer questions Wednesday about the investigation but said families of the victims would be briefed on the case.

Her husband is being held on \$3 million bond.

A probable cause affidavit

says the former justice of the peace sent an email one day after the McLellands’ bodies were discovered implying there would be another attack if authorities didn’t respond to various demands.

A law enforcement official said ballistics experts were testing at least 20 weapons found in a storage locker under Eric Williams’ name at a facility near Dallas. A Ford Crown Victoria similar to one spotted in the McLellands’ neighborhood around the time the couple was killed was parked at the storage facility, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the ongoing investigation.

Jail records did not list an attorney for Kim Williams. A message left with an attorney who had been representing her husband was not returned Wednesday.

Williams has said that after the McLellands’ deaths and after Hasse was gunned down Jan. 31 near the county courthouse, he submitted to gunshot residue tests and turned over his cellphone.

Williams has appealed his theft conviction, and a day before the McLellands’ bodies were found, a state appeals court in Dallas agreed to hear oral arguments in the case. During closing arguments at Williams’ trial, the prosecutors presented testimony indicating he had made death threats against a former girlfriend and a local attorney.

In the sentencing phase, Kim Williams testified in her husband’s defense. She said she suffers from several illnesses, including rheumatoid arthritis and chronic fatigue syndrome. She said her husband was her sole caregiver as well as the caregiver for her two ailing parents.

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Britain's Iron Lady Laid to Rest with Full Pomp

LONDON (AP) • Margaret Thatcher, Britain's Iron Lady, was laid to rest Wednesday with a level of pomp and protest reflecting her status as a commanding, polarizing political figure.

Queen Elizabeth II, prime ministers and dignitaries from 170 countries were among the mourners at St. Paul's Cathedral, where Bishop of London Richard Chartres spoke of the strong feelings the former prime minister still evokes 23 years after leaving office.

"The storm of conflicting opinions centers on the Mrs. Thatcher who became a symbolic figure — even an -ism," he said. "Today the remains of the real Margaret Hilda Thatcher are here at her funeral service. There is an important place for debating policies and legacy ... but here and today is neither the time nor the place."

More than 700 soldiers, sailors and air force personnel lined the route taken by Thatcher's coffin to the cathedral and around 4,000 police officers were on duty. Security was stepped up after Monday's bombings at the Boston Marathon that killed three people and wounded more than 170. Spectators lining the route broke into applause — and scattered boos

25-year-old **Anthony Boutall**, who — clutching a blue rose — joined hundreds outside the cathedral to pay his last respects.



— as the carriage passed by, escorted by young soldiers, sailors and airmen.

Some clearly disagreed with the bishop's exhortation to leave politics at home. Some staged silent protests by turning their backs on Thatcher's coffin. One man held a banner declaring "Rest in shame." Arguments also broke out in the crowd along the route between Thatcher supporters and opponents.

Guests inside the cathedral included Thatcher's political

colleagues and rivals and her successors as prime minister — John Major, Tony Blair, Gordon Brown and David Cameron.

Former U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and former Vice President Dick Cheney were among the American dignitaries, while figures from Thatcher's era included F.W. de Klerk, the last apartheid-era leader of South Africa; former Polish President Lech Walesa; ex-Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney and entertainers including "Dynasty" star Joan Collins, singer Shirley Bassey and composer Andrew Lloyd Webber.

The ceremony was traditional, dignified and very British. Mourners entered to music by British composers including Edward Elgar and Ralph Vaughan Williams, and the service featured hymns and readings chosen by Thatcher, who grew up as a grocer's daughter in a hard-working Methodist household.

There was a passage from T.S. Eliot, a section of Gabriel Faure's "Requiem" and the patriotic hymn "I Vow to Thee, My Country" — also played at the 1997 funeral of

Rut Nuts

Explore traces of the Oregon Trail at the Milner Historic Recreation Area.

MURTAUGH • A wide grin spread across Mark Asay's face as he knelt and examined a pair of basalt boulders protruding from the earth.

"You just know these rocks were carved by wagon wheels! Look at the straight edge here and that groove over there — imagine how many thousands of wagons it took to wear them down like that!"

His verdict helped confirm my earlier suspicions after coming across the rocks during a solitary exploration.

After Asay rose, we took a longer view of the Oregon Trail ruts heading in both directions and further appreciated their existence. The route here is preserved within an area administered by the Bureau of Land Management known as the Milner Historic Recreation Area. In addition to concrete posts that mark the trail, several signs along

the way offer hikers insight about subjects such as the settlers' wagon construction and a list of recommended supplies for the perilous journey.

No more than a hundred yards from the historic route, a present-day road leads to a kiosk that offers more information about the mass movement westward and this locale in particular.

By chance I happened to meet Asay, a fifth-grade teacher from Utah, and his wife at the interpretative shelter. The couple had just spent much of their spring break touring as many Oregon Trail sites across southern Idaho as possible. The Milner segment amounted to the last stop on their return home.

Having once held a modest interest in the route, Asay became hooked a few years ago after he began reading accounts written by the emigrants. The self-proclaimed "rut nut" once travelled as far back as Nebraska to view evidence of the

route that ultimately channeled more than a half-million settlers to a new promised land. He rates the section through the Milner area with a "B+" due to the extent and visibility of the ruts, the worn basalt rock that we inspected, and the level of interpretation provided by the displays.

Mike Courtney, the BLM's Burley office field manager, says that his agency would like to add to the experience sought by future visitors.

"We have a conceptual site design in place for the area; now we are looking for funding to make the project happen," he said.

The formal plan calls for a hiking trail that parallels, and sometimes joins, the Oregon Trail for a distance of three miles. Interpretative displays along the route would be upgraded, and the hiking path would include a return loop along the Snake River.

Other potential improvements

Getting There

Reach the Milner Historic Recreation Area by departing Interstate 84 at exit 194 and driving south 6.5 miles. After crossing the Snake River below Milner Dam, turn left on 100 South and drive one mile to the site's main entrance.

The area can also be accessed from U.S. Highway 30 between Murtaugh and Burley.

Fees: Day use is \$3 per day, and camping is \$5 per night.

for the Milner Historic Recreation Area include transforming the boat landing into something more user

friendly and performing a makeover on some of the present campsites. Courtney notes that many visitors enjoy spending the night along the shore and that the agency would like to provide for a variety of camping experiences. Larger spaces for modern recreation vehicles would be created, and the locale's east side would offer more dispersed camping.

While a charge would remain in place for campers, the agency hopes to bolster day use in part by eventually dropping the entrance fee for those wishing to picnic or visit the trail. This action would also benefit the many anglers who arrive to fish the impounded river. With the plan in place and the environmental oversight process completed, the BLM is searching for partners willing to offer assistance, financial or otherwise, for the project.

In the meantime, the ruts left by

TWIN FALLS • With a mere 574 paces, Chris Anderson completed a journey that he began in 1994.

With a walk across the parking lot March 29 to Hawaii's highest point — Mauna Kea — Anderson had reached the highest point in 49 states.

"I have no intention of getting Alaska. It's so much more dangerous and expensive," said Anderson, a production specialist and observatory coordinator at Faulkner Planetarium.

He thought his journey ended after 48 states, which he completed on July 4, 2007, when he reached the top of Mount Rainier in Washington.

It takes most climbers at least three days to climb Mount Rainier, Anderson said, but his journey took a little bit longer. His first attempt was unsuccessful, but

Anderson is only three counties away from checking off all 44 counties from his list.

The three counties Anderson has yet to summit include: Clearwater, Valley and Teton.

Clearwater

The highest point in Clearwater County is Rhodes Peak (7,930 feet), which is located on the eastern side of Idaho, not far from the Montana border. According to Summitpost.org, Rhodes

Peak is a part of the Shoshone Range, which is a part of the Bitterroot Mountain Range.

Valley

The highest point in Valley County is Big Baldy (9,705 feet). Anderson said it is the longest trip from trailhead to summit in Idaho. Anderson estimates he can do it in four days. According to one hiker who left comments on Summitpost.org in 2009, water sources are rare and

Historical Perspective

One of the great conservation success stories of our day has been the sportsmen-subsidized introduction and reintroduction of wild turkey populations here in the American West. Every spring and fall an increasing number of hunters experience the thrill of luring a big amorous Tom into shotgun range with a seductive series of hen clucks and purrs. If your bucket list dreams include mounting a turkey fan and beard in

your trophy room, than you'll need to pattern more than just your local Tom's behaviors; you will have to pattern your shotgun, too.

The Challenge

While few big game hunters question the wisdom of checking the zero of their rifles before opening morning, surprisingly few shotgunners realize that their favorite scattergun can be just as finicky about the ammo it's fed. Since head shooting a gobbler requires precise pellet placement, the only way to know how

Colorado River Tops 2013 Endangered Waterways List

LAS VEGAS (AP) • Drought and demand are pushing the Colorado River beyond its limits — with the needs of more than 40 million people in seven Western states projected to outstrip dwindling supply over the next 50 years, according to an endangered rivers list released Wednesday.

The annual top-10 list by Washington, D.C.-based American Rivers points to a three-year federal Bureau of Reclamation study that warned last December that the river won't always be able to serve all the residents, businesses, ranchers, Native Americans and farmers who rely upon it.

Already, the Colorado River is drained of nearly every drop by the time it reaches Mexico, American Rivers spokeswoman Amy Kober said.

The listing drew an endorsement from an Interior Department official who praised it for raising the profile of problems facing what she called a critical resource.

"The river is the essential foundation to the health and prosperity of the American Southwest," Assistant Interior Secretary for Water and Science Anne Castle said in a statement. It "provides multiple and diverse benefits including water supplies for agriculture and people, outdoor recreation, clean energy generation, and unparalleled ecosystems."

The list, produced with Protect the Flows and Nuestro Rio, notes that the Colorado is sometimes called the most controlled and plumbed river on Earth, and has more dams and diversions planned. River water irrigates nearly 4 million acres of farmland, which yield about 15 percent of the nation's crops, and serves as a primary drinking water supply for cities including Denver, Los Angeles, Las Vegas and Phoenix.

Officials talked about the report Wednesday at a marina on the scenic but drought-scarred Lake Mead reservoir behind Hoover Dam. A white mineral "bathtub ring" stretch-

es more than 100 feet up the rocky shore from the current water line to the 1983 high-water mark. Officials say Lake Mead is still about half-full.

"The Colorado River is the lifeblood of the American Southwest, not just for people but also for fish and wildlife and the river ecosystem," Gary Wockner, an official with the Denver-based advocacy group Save the Colorado, said in a separate interview.

"It's time for Congress to recognize that it is stretched to the breaking point right now, and to begin appropriating funds to support water conservation and river protection programs in the Colorado River basin," Wockner said.

Kober noted the Col-

orado River also topped the America's Most Endangered Rivers list in 1991 and 2004, and made the list in 1992, 1997, 1998 and 2010. Rankings are determined by nomination from river groups and advocates based on the size of the threat, the significance of the waterway to people and nature and whether it can help influence action in the coming year.

"The bureau report underscores that there's not enough water to meet demand," Kober said of the 163-page Colorado River Basin Water Supply and Demand Study. "No one is going to fix the Colorado River in one year. But we need people to come together and we need Congress to fund efforts like

WaterSMART and Title XVI."

Title XVI is a Bureau of Reclamation-led water recycling and reuse program. WaterSMART, an acronym for Sustain and Manage America's Resources for Tomorrow, was established in February 2010 to coordinate and encourage the efficient use of water and a blend of hydrologic and energy policies.

Castle noted that in addition to completing the three-year study, the federal government signed a recent supplement to a Colorado River water use treaty with Mexico. It provides for international cooperation to ensure that river water reaches the Gulf of California for the first time in decades.

New Milestone Reached in Yellowstone Snow Plowing

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) •

A public-private effort to plow roads in Yellowstone National Park and open up two of the park's entrances on time this spring despite federal budget cuts reached a milestone Wednesday with state and federal road crews meeting up on the park's East Entrance Road.

The Wyoming Department of Transportation crews spent 11 days plowing westward from the East Entrance. They met Yellowstone crews plowing eastward about 15 miles inside the park gate, according to department spokesman Cody Beers.

"It went really well. Our people were dedicated to it, they enjoyed the effort, and we're pleased the Park Service was able to meet us," Beers said.

Plenty of work remains. Enough snow needs to be cleared for two lanes of traffic, plus extra room on the shoulders for motorists to pull over and turn around.

Also, parking areas and driveways for park installations still need to be cleared. For all of those reasons, the East Entrance is not scheduled to open until May 3.

The plowing by the state crews is funded by \$100,000 raised by the Cody Country Chamber of Commerce and \$71,000 from the town of Jackson.

The chamber and town, coordinating with the National Park Service and Gov. Matt Mead, came up with the plowing plan in the aftermath of the federal cuts that took effect March 1.

The cuts caused park officials to delay the start of spring plowing from March 4 to March 18. The idea was to let warmer weather do a greater share of snow removal work in Yellowstone this year and save the Park Service as

much as \$300,000.

The decision pushed back the estimated date of opening the East Entrance from May 3 to May 17 and the South Entrance from May 10 to May 24. That rankled business owners who worried about lost business from the first wave of tourists to visit the park by automobile this year.

Mead agreed to make state plows available to clear the Yellowstone roads provided the state didn't have to pick up the cost of about \$5,000 to \$10,000 per mile. Now, weather permitting, the gates are back on track to open as originally planned.

Cody chamber Director Scott Balyo suggested Yellowstone might even be able to open the East Entrance sooner than May 3. Park spokesman Dan Hottle said that was unlikely.

Besides all the plowing that needs to be done yet, there's always the possibility of more snow. About 2 1/2 feet has fallen on the East Entrance Road this month, setting back the plowing effort by perhaps half a day, Beers said.

"We keep that caveat, 'weather permitting,'" Hottle added.

As of Wednesday, the forecast was favorable for plowing on the South Entrance Road to continue at a rate of a mile or two per day. About eight miles still needed to be plowed before park and state crews met up in that part of Yellowstone.

Balyo said the plowing program has enabled him to reassure travelers who call to ask about visiting the Yellowstone area.

"It's been great to be able to tell them, whether you've had plans in place or are just starting to make your plans, the gates are going to open on time," he said.

Several California Condors Found Dead

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. (AP) •

The state Game and Fish Department says endangered California condors are having a rough time lately.

Condor biologist Allen Zufelt says seven condors that travel in northern Arizona and southern Utah have died since September, including breeding females. Zufelt says three of the birds died of lead poisoning and one died of unknown causes. Another condor that fell into a crack at the

Grand Canyon hasn't been recovered. Zufelt says lab results are pending in two more deaths. The department still is looking into an unconfirmed death in the Grand Canyon.

Environmental groups say the deaths could be prevented with a ban on lead ammunition. Game and Fish officials say that's unnecessary because most hunters voluntarily use non-lead ammunition, and poisoning isn't the sole cause of condor deaths.

Buck Lake is the only sure place after the first couple of miles.

Teton

Garns Mountain (9,016 plus feet) and Piney Peak (9,000 plus feet) are the two highest points in Teton county. Anderson said it is not known which one is higher, so he plans to climb both. According to an overview of Garns Mountain on Summit-post.org, the peak is in the middle of the Big Hole Mountains west of Teton Valley. The view features a 360 degree panorama of the Big Holes Mountain Range.

Anderson said the hardest high point is found in Idaho County. That's because there isn't just one or two peaks you must scale, but three: He Devil, She Devil and a third unnamed peak all stand over 9,400 feet.

Anderson said it's common for the highest point in an area to change as technology progresses and allows for more accurate measurements.

"Teton County had four peaks and now has two," Anderson said.

He said he purposely left Teton County for last to save himself from climbing all four peaks.

If you want to reach the highest point in an Idaho county, but don't want to climb, there are some that can be reached by car, Anderson said. For example, Twin Falls County's two unnamed points, at 7,840 plus feet, are accessible by vehicle, though the road is not paved. Ada County's unnamed area, which is 6,000 plus feet, can also be driven to.

And while purists will argue that driving is not an option, Anderson said if he can drive, he does.



But that does not necessarily mean a smooth ride.

"Some drives were dicey. I've dented the side of my vehicle and popped a tire," Anderson said.

Idaho's Centennial Trail

The trail was designated the official state trail in 1990. The 900-mile Idaho Centennial Trail showcases Idaho's wild country in southern and northern Idaho.

Anderson said he still has a fair amount of miles to hike, including a stretch that will be a multi-night backpacking trip.

The southern portion of the trail begins at 6,000 feet near Murphy Hot Springs on the Idaho/Nevada border. In the north, the trail eventually reaches 6,000 feet in the Cabinet and Selkirk mountains.

Anderson will often bike the trail, driving his moun-

tain bike to one end so he can hike to it and bike back to his car.

And when the day comes that Anderson crosses this trail off his list, he'll still a few high points to revisit.

In New Hampshire, the highest point is Mount Washington. At the time that Anderson visited this location, property owners didn't like people on their land. So he and others had to be satisfied with not actually touching the highest point, but merely standing near it.

Anderson said he has since heard the new landowners are okay with people visiting Mount Washington and he wants to go back so he can say with certainty that he touched all the highest points in the United States.

Shotgun

your shotgun will perform at the moment of truth is to take it to the range and pattern it.

The pattern that a shotgun throws is a function of the gun's barrel length, choke constriction, and the ammunition that it's fed.

Top turkey gunners recommend the ballistically-efficient and easily maneuvered 26-inch barrel, a tightly constricted choke, and a magnum dose of no. 5 or no. 6 hardened or

plated shot. Please be aware that every gun is a law unto itself and unless you get out there and pepper the patterning board, you'll never really know what Ole Betsy is truly capable of.

Your Task

Experts suggest that 8-10 pellet hits in the vital head/neck region are required to cleanly take a big gobbler. Your task is to carefully pattern your gun to discover the maximum range that your preferred choke/shotshell combination will deliver these hits.

Tool of the Trade

A turkey's bobbing head/neck region is a tricky target at best. Many hunters opt for fixed or magnetically attached high visibility fiber optic pipes or beads to aid in shot placement. While specialty gobbler guns may feature pricey cantilever scope bracketed barrels or receivers drilled to accept optical or red dot sights, my eldest daughter and I have found that our budget 870 Express 12 and 20 gauge pump guns, with their inexpensive magnetically-mounted Hi-Viz

sights, adequately precise to pinwheel several love-struck Toms foolish enough to respond to my weak imitations of lovelorn hens.

Did you know that wonderful turkey patterning videos and free printable targets are available online? Check out our favorites at The National Shooting Sports Foundation (NSSF) website www.nssf.org, and The National Wild Turkey Foundation www.nwtf.org.

Range Time

When sighting in last

weekend, we set our targets out at 30 and 40 yards (see photo). After testing three different choke/ammo combinations, I discovered that my modified RemChoked 12 bore delivered lethal patterns of Remington's 2 3/4-inch Express Magnum no. 6's out to 30 yards. I have established this as my maximum effective range. While many veteran turkey hunters flock to the pricey new specialty loadings, for my money, a conventional magnum dose of no. 5 or no. 6 traditional hardened lead shot does the trick every time.

Live the Dream

So if the hunting gods gifted you with a spring turkey tag, please take the time to pattern your scattergun and discover the 'perfect' combination of sights, choke, and ammo to put your gobbler in the gravy. What a wonderful way to begin the 2013-14 hunting seasons.

Montana House Kills Bill to Increase Bison Hunting

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • The House has rejected a bison management plan that would have increased the number of hunting licenses for bison and prohibited the future relocation of the animals. The bill directly targeted any bison movement from Yellowstone National Park and aimed to downsize Yellowstone herds by increasing hunting around the park. Republican Sen. John Brenden of Scobey warned the House's rejection of

Senate Bill 143 will likely cause eastern landowners to lock up their lands. Landowners say that despite Montana's brucellosis-free status, bison coming out of Yellowstone have the potential to spread the disease to cattle. But critics say the bill was introduced in retaliation to the state's relocation of about 60 Yellowstone bison to the Fort Peck Reservation last year. The measure failed Wednesday in a tie vote.

Scientists Decode DNA of 'Living Fossil' Fish

NEW YORK (AP) • Scientists have decoded the DNA of a celebrated "living fossil" fish, gaining new insights into how today's mammals, amphibians, reptiles and birds evolved from a fish ancestor. The African coelacanth (SEE-lah-kanth) is closely related to the fish lineage that started to move toward a major evolutionary transformation, living on land. And it hasn't changed much from its ancestors of even 300 million years ago, researchers said. At one time, scientists thought coelacanths died out some 70 million years ago. But in a startling discovery in 1938, a South African fish trawler caught a living specimen. Its close resemblance to its ancient an-

cestors earned it the "living fossil" nickname. And in line with that, analysis shows its genes have been remarkably slow to change, an international team of researchers reported Wednesday in the journal Nature. Maybe that's because the sea caves where the coelacanth lives provide such a stable environment, said Kerstin Lindblad-Toh, senior author of the paper and a gene expert at the Broad Institute in Cambridge, Mass. Modern coelacanths make up two endangered species that live off the east coast of Africa and off Indonesia. They grow to more than 5 feet long and have fleshy fins. The coelacanth's DNA code, called its genome, is

slightly smaller than a human's. Using it as a starting point, the researchers found evidence of changes in genes and in gene-controlling "switches" that evidently aided the move onto land. They involve such things as sense of smell, the immune system and limb development. Further study of the genome may give more insights into the transition to living on land, they said. Their analysis concluded that a different creature, the lungfish, is the closest living fish relative of animals with limbs, like mammals, but they said the lungfish genome is too big to decode. The water-to-land transition took tens of millions of years, with limbs developing in primarily aquatic animals

as long as nearly 400 million years ago, by some accounts, and a true switchover to life on land by maybe 340 million years ago, said researcher Ted Daeschler. Daeschler, curator of vertebrate zoology at the Academy of Natural Sciences of Drexel University in Philadelphia, who didn't participate in the new work, said genome research provides a way to tackle some previously unanswerable questions in evolution. He emphasized that DNA is best used in combination with fossils. "This is a great detective tool," he said. "You might collect DNA evidence at a crime scene, but you can't ignore the dead body.... With paleontology, we have the dead bodies."

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Offshore Drilling in U.S. Seen as Safer Than Before BP Spill

Offshore drilling is safer than prior to the BP spill in 2010 even though Congress has failed to pass legislation tightening rules, according to members of a government panel that investigated the accident.

Response to spills has “substantially improved” since BP’s Macondo well in the Gulf blew out on April 20, 2010, killing 11 workers and spewing more than 4 million barrels of oil that spoiled the shores of Gulf Coast states, the group, Oil Spill Commission Action, said Wednesday. The group includes former members of a panel appointed by President Barack Obama that in 2011 recommended steps to prevent future spills.

While regulators and the drilling industry have responded to the recommendations, Congress hasn’t, said Bob Graham, a Democrat and former Florida senator who was co-chairman of the presidential commission. Congress earned a “D+” Wednesday, higher than its “D” grade in 2012, a year after the commission’s work ended with the delivery of its report to the president.

“Three years have passed since the explosion and Congress has yet to enact one piece of legislation to make drilling safer,” Graham said in a video news conference. “Most safety provisions we discussed are regulatory, administrative. These issues are of significant national importance that they should be enacted in statute.”

The group’s 2013 report card maintained a “B” grade for the administration and raised the industry’s mark to “B-minus” from “C+.”

Among the recommendations awaiting congress-

sional action is a proposal for drilling companies to pay a fee that would cover costs for improved U.S. inspections and oversight. Gains made in that area may be undermined by automatic budget cuts known as sequestration that took effect March 1, Graham said.

Another recommendation is for Congress to review the \$75 million ceiling on spill liability in place for more than 20 years. That amount would have been exhausted within days of the BP spill, crippling work to restore soiled coastlines and damaged industries, Graham said. The liability cap proposal and other issues were discussed this week in a meeting the group had with Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., who heads the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, Graham said.

“We can anticipate the committee to be giving attention to these issues,” Graham said.

A month after the BP blow out, Obama replaced the Interior Department’s Minerals Management Service, faulted for lax regulation of offshore drilling, with three offices to issue leases, oversee drilling safety and collect royalties. The agency has strengthened leasing, permitting, safety and oversight, according to today’s progress report from the group.

BP, which is based in London, is appealing a court ruling upholding decisions by the administrator disbursing cash from an \$8.5 billion settlement that the company says will force it pay billions more than expected. The company will face a jury trial Aug. 25, 2014, in federal court in Houston on investors’ multibillion-dollar allegations that the company hid the true size of the spill to limit the effect on its stock price.

Route Change Forces Keystone Foes to Shift Aim to Climate Change

Opponents of the Keystone XL pipeline used to have a simple argument: the project would endanger Nebraska’s delicate Sand Hills region, a vast network of dunes and wetlands that have been designated a National Natural Landmark.

State leaders, including Gov. David Heineman, R, opposed the project on those grounds. President Obama cited the threat to water in the state before denying TransCanada Corp. a permit last year to build the pipeline, which would carry Canadian tar sands oil to refineries on the U.S. Gulf Coast.

Then TransCanada offered a new route that largely avoids the Sand Hills and won Heineman’s support. While oil spills remain a concern, environmental groups opposed to the pipeline have shifted their emphasis to the more complex charge that mining Canadian tar sands will result in more greenhouse gases and exacerbate global warming.

“The initial opposition was framed heavily in terms of its impact on water and the risks to the aquifer,” former Rep. Phil Sharp, D-Ind., president of Resources for the Future, a Washington-based research group, said in an interview. “They kind of downplayed the greenhouse gas issue. Now I think they’re coming up short in the public argument because there either isn’t the public foundation on this issue or the same intensity of interest.”

Lobbying on both sides of the debate has picked up in advance of a decision expected in coming months from the State Department, which has jurisdiction over the \$5.3 billion project because it would cross an international border. The agency scheduled a hearing for Thursday in Nebraska where opponents and supporters are expected to appear.



Last month, 17 Democrats joined every Senate Republican in support of a non-binding resolution endorsing Keystone XL. On Tuesday, the House Energy and Commerce subcommittee on Energy and Power voted 17-9 to approve and send to the full committee a bill sponsored by Rep. Lee Terry, R-Neb., that would allow the pipeline to be built without the Obama administration’s approval. Obama has said he would veto the measure.

Also Tuesday, groups fighting Keystone released research they said showed it would increase greenhouse-gas emissions by 181 million metric tons. That is equal to the emissions from 46 coal plants and 34 million vehicles, under estimates used by the Environmental Protection Agency. James Hansen, the former U.S. space agency scientist who has been urging policymakers to combat global warming since the 1980s, said building Keystone will mean its “game over for the climate.”

“The public is beginning to understand that greenhouse gas emissions are bad for the

climate and that there’s a lot that’s going to be released by mining the tar sands,” Erich Pica, president of Friends of the Earth in Washington, said in an interview. “This has always been an uphill fight.”

Refiners say failure to approve the pipeline may actually increase greenhouse gas emissions. Transportation costs associated with U.S. imports of crude from the Middle East and other nations, as well as Canadian exports to Asia, could result in more emissions, according to the American Fuel & Petrochemical Manufacturers, a Washington-based group whose members include Exxon Mobil of Irving, Texas, and Valero Energy of San Antonio.

Environmental groups maintain that concerns over climate change have always been part of the attack on Keystone XL.

Recent extreme weather events such as Hurricane Sandy in October and Obama’s decision to highlight the dangers of climate change in speeches earlier this year have helped galvanize opposition, according to Amy Atwood, senior attorney with the Cen-

ter for Biological Diversity. “We’re trying to appeal to a Democratic president who gave a State of the Union address where he said that climate change is a big problem,” Atwood said in an interview. “This is the moment in history where we have a small diminishing chance to reverse the trend toward catastrophic climate change.”

The State Department hasn’t helped on that score. On March 1, it issued an updated environmental assessment that concluded the project would have minimal impact on climate change because the oil would find its way to market with or without the pipeline.

Approval or denial “is unlikely to have a substantial impact on the rate of development in the oil sands, or on the amount of heavy crude oil refined in the Gulf Coast area,” according to the assessment.

An earlier assessment by the agency, released in 2010, raised concerns about the Sand Hills. The one released last month noted the change in the route adds 21 miles to avoid sensitive areas such as the Sand Hills.

AS BIRD FLU CONCERNS RISE, HERBAL REMEDIES SELL OUT

HONG KONG • A popular herb called ban lan gen, or blue root, has been flying off pharmacy shelves across China as local governments encourage people to consider traditional remedies to ward off the latest bird flu virus.

With scientists so far unable to pinpoint the H7N9 influenza virus’ animal host, locals are preparing for a possible pandemic by stocking up on popular plant remedies as well as face masks and hand sanitizers and other over-the-counter medicines.

“Chinese people associate ban lan gen with anti-virus,” said Shen Jiangang, assistant director for research at the Chinese University of Hong Kong’s School of Chinese Medicine. “So when they hear about bird flu, they immediately think it might be effective to protect themselves although there is no experimental evidence.”

Ayurvedic and Chinese medicines have used the remedy for centuries. Scientists have proved it can relieve bacterial conjunctivitis in eye drops and found it has an antiviral effect in test tubes. There is no test to show it works against influenza.

That hasn’t stopped buyers. Chinese consumers, especially older ones, tend to believe in traditional formulations especially when it comes to cold and flu remedies, said Iwona Mamczur, an analyst at Mintel International Group Ltd. The market for over-the-counter medicines was worth 77.5 billion yuan (\$12.5 billion) in 2011, according to a report from the

London-based researcher.

Ban lan gen is the root of a flowering plant known as dyer’s woad or indigo woad, and found in southeastern Europe, central Asia and eastern Siberia. The roots are dried and often processed into granules, which consumers ingest dissolved in hot water or tea. According to traditional Chinese medicine, which seeks to balance heat and cold in the body, the root can help clear the heat triggered by a viral attack, Shen said.

Patients should take the remedy under the guidance of a trained health practitioner, said Albert Leung, who heads Hong Kong University’s School of Chinese Medicine.

Huashi Pharmacy, located in Shanghai near the eastern bank of the Huangpu river, has started replenishing supplies of ban lan gen daily instead of weekly and still struggles to meet demand, according to pharmacy worker Zhang Zhijin.

Sales of facial masks have also gone up 10 times from

before the H7N9 infections announcements, hand sanitizer has sold out, and companies have been bulk-ordering alcohol wipes for their employees, Zhang said.

Beijing Tongrentang, which makes a product extracted from ban lan gen, said in an e-mail that the outbreak of H7N9 has boosted sales, but didn’t provide numbers. The company’s shares increased 1.9 percent to a two-week high of 22.20 yuan at the close of trading in Shanghai Wednesday.

Francis Chu, the Singapore-based inventor of the tobobobo face mask, said he’s fielded more than 20 inquiries about the pollution-filtering equipment’s effectiveness against bird flu since the start of April. Sales are up eight-fold from the same period last year.

Provo, Utah, Is Next City for Ultra-fast Google Fiber

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Google will take over a troubled municipal fiber-optic system and make Provo, Utah, the third city to get its high-speed Internet service via fiber-optic cables, the company announced Wednesday.

Google Fiber was rolled

out in Kansas City, Mo., last year. The Mountain View, Calif., company announced earlier this month it will make Austin, Texas, the second city to get ultra-fast Internet service.

The Provo deal is the first time Google plans to acquire an existing fiber-optic sys-

tem. The city of 115,000 created the fiber-optic network, iProvo, in 2004. It planned to operate the system itself for Internet, television and phone service but found the operation too daunting and turned it over to a succession of private partners that have struggled

to break even.

A Google official said the company will offer basic Internet service at no charge to Provo residents, who can opt to pay for service up to 200 times faster. The system also provides cable or satellite TV service.

“Once connected, Provo

will be one of the first cities in the world where access to broadband will flow like water or electricity,” Kevin Lo, general manager of Google Fiber, said Wednesday.

The rollout is an expensive undertaking and gamble for Google, which hopes it will drive innovation and

pressure phone and cable companies to improve their networks. Google benefits when people spend more time online.

Provo officials said Google will charge customers a \$30 activation fee. The free service provides speeds of 5 megabits per second.

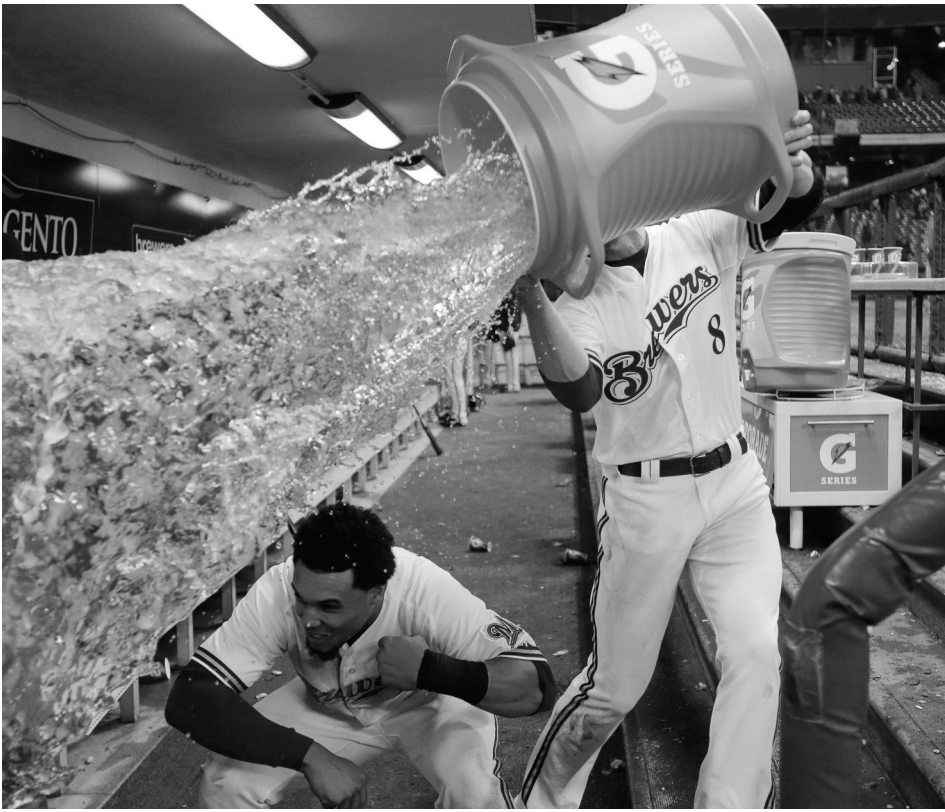

Runners Say Boston Bombing Won't Keep Them Away

Linda Bachand-Doucet of Pawtucket, R.I., entered the Boston Marathon with two pals who were hoping to earn membership in a group for avid runners of 26.2-mile races.

They were about five miles from the finish when one of her friends got a cellphone call from his mother, up ahead in the stands: There had been an explosion. The trio couldn't complete the race.

Yet Bachand-Doucet says she and plenty of other marathoners are determined not to run away from an event and a distance they love, no matter what fears might have been raised by Monday's bombing.

"This won't prevent me from running. I have marathons (scheduled) for every weekend now until the middle of the summer," said the 44-year-old Bachand-Doucet, a detective in the major crimes unit of the Pawtucket Police Department.

Then, with half a chuckle, she added: "I may get another life insurance policy."

She and other runners are already marking their calendars, eager to get back on the road, step by step. For Bachand-Doucet, that includes the Oz Marathon in Olathe, Kan., on Saturday, the Big Sur International Marathon in Carmel, Calif., on April 28, the Flying Pig Marathon in Cincinnati on May 5.

And, looking way ahead, the Boston Marathon on April 21, 2014.

"Without a doubt I will absolutely be there!!!!" Bachand-Doucet wrote in an email to the AP on Wednesday.

Noting that it's difficult to know for sure how many

people share those feelings, former Boston Marathon race director Guy Morse wrote in a text to the AP: "It is my sense from those with whom I have spoken or otherwise heard from, there seems to be an almost universal desire to support and come back to Boston, no question."

Ernesto Burden, a 42-year-old from Manchester, N.H., finished in under three hours Monday, but couldn't truly celebrate that achievement.

He's eager to return.

"I'll register on Day 1," he said.

Stacy Wingard, a 42-year-old who lives outside Seattle, Wash., ran her 10th marathon Monday, her first in Boston, and was timed in 3 hours, 29 minutes, 50 seconds. But because of about a half-hour lag at the start, she said she was only a few blocks away when two bombs went off near the finish line, killing three people and injuring more than 170.

Wingard said Monday's bombing will not affect her decisions about entering future races, including Boston

— and she's heard the same from other runners in emails and Facebook messages.

"I qualified to come back next year," Wingard said, adding: "I'll come back next year."

That kind of determination is part of the very essence of distance running — the will to keep pushing. And it will play a role in how people respond to the Boston attack, according to Scott Dickey, CEO of Competitor Group Inc., which manages more than 35 marathons and half marathons around the world.

"The endurance community is resilient. ... Your ability to resist and withstand and recover from trauma — that's what 'to endure' means. And so this is the wrong community to challenge, because these people are tough and gritty, especially those that work so hard to qualify for the Boston Marathon," Dickey said.

"You're seeing an incredible rally cry within the running community," he said. "And I think you'll see participation and the celebration around marathons, not only

continue, but grow."

Mike Ewoldt, co-owner of a running gear store and a race manager in charge of several events in the Omaha, Neb., area, agrees that the attack in Boston will not hurt running's popularity.

"Most of us don't run away from things. We run for things — charity, ourselves, our families," Ewoldt said. "I don't see where this is going to diminish running at all."

Oklahoma City Memorial Marathon spokeswoman Kari Watkins also expects people to be more determined to run after Boston. Her April 28 race was started as a fundraiser for the memorial and museum dedicated to the 168 people killed and nearly 700 injured in the April 1995 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building.

"That is more a signal of defiance. We're going to stand up together and show how terrorism did not win. Oklahoma City as a community has spent two decades saying terrorists won't defeat us," Watkins said. "This is an exclamation point on that."

Watkins said runners who didn't finish the Boston Marathon are invited to Oklahoma City to run for free — and they will be allowed to pick up at the mile where they stopped, if they want.

Marathoning is that rare sport that allows amateurs to participate right there alongside the elites. That's part of the appeal, certainly.

So, too, is the way that trying to finish a marathon — or even training for one — can serve as a test for one's body and mind.

And the solitude offers a chance for reflection.

"We find peace and perspective in our running," said Rick Nealis, director of the Marine Corps Marathon.

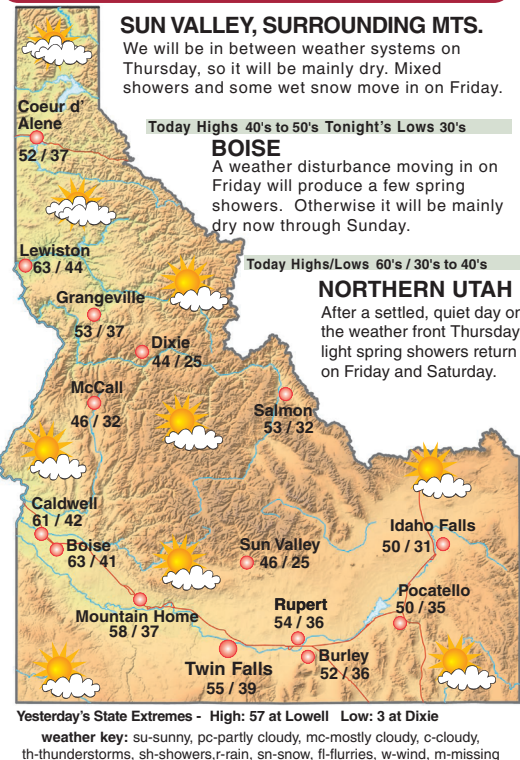

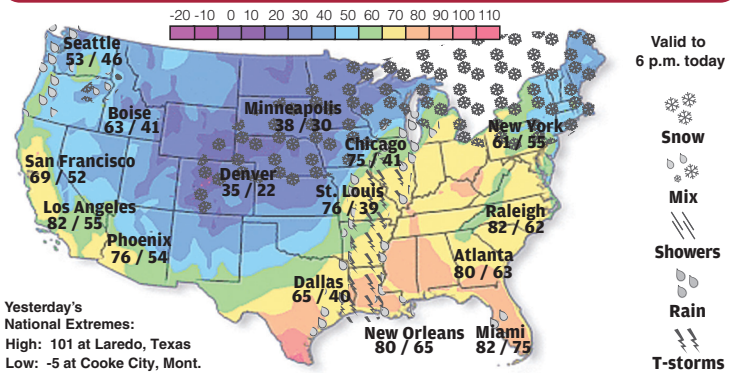

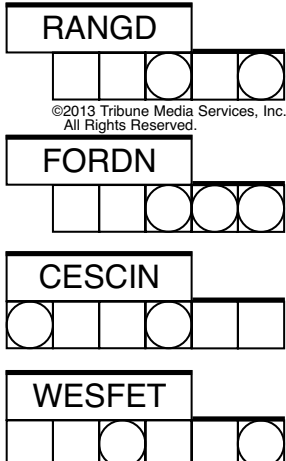

On this date:
In 1775, Paul Revere began his famous ride from Charlestown to Lexington, Mass., warning American colonists that the British were coming.
In 1831, the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa was officially opened.
In 1906, a devastating earthquake struck San Francisco, followed by raging fires; estimates of the final death toll range between 3,000 and 6,000.
In 1910, suffragists showed up at the U.S. Capitol with half a million signatures demanding that women be given the right to vote.
In 1923, the first game was played at the original Yankee Stadium in New York; the Yankees defeated the Boston Red Sox 4-1.
In 1942, an air squadron from the USS Hornet led by Lt. Col. James H. Doolittle raided Tokyo and other Japanese cities. The first World War II edition of The Stars and Stripes was published as a weekly newspaper.

Scott Peterson was arrested in San Diego in the death of his wife, Laci, who was eight months pregnant when she vanished on Christmas Eve. (Peterson was later convicted of murder and sentenced to death.)
Five years ago: Addressing the United Nations, Pope Benedict XVI said international cooperation needed to solve urgent problems was "in crisis" because decisions rested in the hands of a few powerful nations. Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin gave birth to her fifth child, a son named Trig Paxson Van Palin.
One year ago: Defense Secretary Leon Panetta apologized for gruesome photographs published in the Los Angeles Times that purported to show U.S. soldiers posing with the bloodied remains of dead insurgents in Afghanistan two years earlier. Dick Clark, the ever-youthful television host and producer who helped bring rock 'n' roll into the mainstream on "American Bandstand" and rang in the New Year for the masses at Times Square, died in Santa Monica, Calif., at age 82.

When the Open Teams of France and Portugal met in the 2010 European Championship, France squeaked home, but Portugal scored well on this board. In the Open Room, Herve Vinci-guerra for France opened one club as dealer, and Eric Eisen-berg responded one spade. West doubled and East bid two diamonds. South's two spades closed the auction, and declarer emerged safely enough with his partscore.

In the Closed Room, Portugal's Juliano Barbosa opened one club, like his French counterpart. But here, Antonio Palma speculatively jumped to four spades on his seven-loser hand. West, Alain Levy, with the strongest hand at the table, doubled, and East, Paul Chemla, let it ride.

West led the heart king, which Palma won in dummy. He called for the spade nine and, when this held, followed up with dummy's second trump to his 10, West showing out. On the club five, Levy rose with his ace, then cashed a heart trick. Knowing from East's carding that nothing more was available in that suit, West switched to a tricky diamond jack. Unfazed, Palma called for dummy's queen, which held, then began his trump reduction by cashing the club king and ruffing a club. A diamond to the ace and a heart ruff in hand completed his trump reduction to bring him down to the same spade length as East.

Now Palma exited in diamonds, and regardless of the return, he was able to make both his ace and queen of trumps for plus 590.

ANSWER: Just to set the record straight, after a one-diamond overcall over your partner's one-club opening, a bid of one of a major by you shows four or more cards, not five cards. It is important to differentiate this case from the opponents' overcalling one heart, when a one-spade call by you would show five and a double would show four spades.

DEAR SCARED: Children don't come with 100 percent, money-back guarantees. What they need in order to thrive is parents who love each other and them, and who are willing to put forth the time and energy to raise them. I don't know what went wrong in your siblings' marriages, but it appears their kids have been used as pawns rather than having their own interests put first. If both parents cooperated in the interests of the children there would be no battles.

Please do not allow the dysfunction you have seen in your work to influence your decision. You and your husband will not be having more children than you can afford, and I assume you are approaching the idea of parenthood in a mature fashion. I would caution you about one thing, however. Having a child because of pressure from your in-laws would be a poor reason to embark upon parenthood.
