Twin Falls Police Search for Shooting Suspect, Find No Evidence

TWIN FALLS • Police and emergency medical personnel spent more than an hour Friday evening searching for a possible shooting in Twin Falls.

Twin Falls city spokesman Joshua Palmer said emergency dispatchers got a call at 5:26 p.m. from a deaf interpreter who said a male deaf individual told them someone just shot his mother. Palmer said the caller told the interpreter, "He shot my mom."

WATERTOWN, Mass. • Lifting days of anxiety for a city and a nation on edge, police captured the surviving Boston Marathon bombing suspect, found bloodied in a backyard boat Friday night less than 24 hours after a wild car chase and gun battle that left his older brother dead and Boston and its suburbs sealed in an extraordinary dragnet.

"We got him," Boston Mayor Tom Menino tweeted. A cheer erupted from a crowd gathered near the scene.

"CAPTURED!!!" police added later. "The hunt is over. The search is done. The terror is over. And justice has won. Suspect in custody."

During a long night of violence Thursday and into Friday, brothers Dzhokhar and Tamerlan Tsarnaev killed an MIT po-

lice officer, severely wounded another lawman and hurled explosives at police in a desperate getaway attempt, authorities said.

Late Friday, less than an hour after authorities said the search for Dzhokhar had proved fruitless, they tracked down the 19-year-old college student holed up in the boat, weakened by a gunshot wound after fleeing on foot from the overnight shootout with police that left 200 spent rounds behind.

He was hospitalized in serious condition, unable to be questioned about his motives.

Tamerlan Tsarnaev, 26, died in the shootout early in the day. At one point, he was run over by his younger brother in a car as he lay wounded, according to investigators.

A Glance at the Search for Boston Bomb Suspects

BOSTON (AP) — Key moments related to the search for the Boston Marathon bombing suspects, based on reports from the Massachusetts governor, the Middlesex County district attorney, Massachusetts State Police and Boston police.

• At 5:10 p.m. Thursday, investigators of the bombings release photographs and video of two suspects. They ask for the public's help in identifying the men.

Around 10:20 p.m., shots are fired on the campus of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge, just outside Boston.
At 10:30 p.m., an MIT campus police officer who was responding to a disturbance is found shot multiple times in his vehicle, apparently in a confrontation with the Boston Marathon bombing suspects. He is later pronounced dead.

• Shortly afterward, two armed men reportedly carjack a Mercedes SUV in Cambridge. A man who was in the vehicle is held for about *Please see* **GLANCE, A4** 5:51 p.m. Police could not determine from where the call came.

Police searched residences on Maurice Street, Gimlet Drive and Honey Locust Lane and found no problems.

Palmer said police stopped their search and handed the case over to detectives.

Palmer said police haven't ruled out that the call was a prank.

"We're treating it as a suspicious incident. That doesn't rule anything out," he said.

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THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

Stocks Recover Slightly, Ending Tough Week

NEW YORK (AP) • Strong earnings from a pair of technology giants helped the stock market recover some of its losses Friday, a positive end to Wall Street's worst week in five months.

Microsoft and Google both beat earnings expectations, yields of government bonds ticked up and copper – a key industrial metal — continued its fall, losing 2 percent.

Microsoft gained 3 percent to \$29.77, leading the Dow Jones industrial average higher. The software giant reported earnings late Thursday that beat analysts' forecasts and showed solid results from its Office, software tools and Xbox divisions.

Google's stock climbed 3 percent to \$799.87. The leader in Internet search boosted prices for ads distributed to smartphones and tablet computers.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 13.64 points to 1,555.25, an increase of 0.9 percent. The Dow rose 10.37 points to 14,547.51, a gain of 0.1 percent. The Dow spent most of the day down, pulled lower by disappointing results from IBM.

Traders, like everyone else, were following the news out of Boston, where police were hunting for one of two brothers suspected to be behind Monday's Boston Marathon bombings. One brother was killed in a gun battle with police overnight. But the news had no impact on markets, traders said.

Police: Man Flashed Gun at T.F. Walmart

TWIN FALLS • Shoppers on Wednesday evening got a scare when police say a man flashed a gun in the parking lot of the Twin Falls Walmart.

Police responded at 7:05 p.m. to Walmart, at 252 Cheney Drive West in Twin Falls.

According to a police report, witnesses told officers that the man, identified as Emmanuel Alvarez, flashed the gun, then he and another man got out of a silver Dodge pickup and went inside the store.

When police arrived, they found the truck with Oregon plates nearby in the 400 block of Robbins Avenue and made a traffic stop, the report states.

Officers ordered the two men to get out of the vehicle and they were detained.

Police reported finding a Smith and Wesson 9 mm

handgun under the center console and a magazine with 14 rounds in a glove box.

Other officers stayed at Walmart to speak to the witnesses. According to the report, the witnesses said they were loading groceries and their five children into their vehicle when two men pulled up in the truck and were playing loud music.

The witnesses said they looked up for a moment, then returned to loading groceries.

According to the report, the two men got out of the truck and confronted the man for "staring them down." After a verbal exchange, the report states, Alvarez told the man he was lucky and pulled his shirt up, exposing a handgun tucked in his waistband. Alvarez then pointed to the gun and made a motion with his hand like he was going to grab the gun.

The couple said they were afraid for their lives and believed the man would start shooting.

Police say in their report that Alvarez was not immediately forthcoming, but then became very cooperative. The report states that Alvarez said the man loading groceries told Alvarez he was lucky first, so Alvarez responded that the man was lucky and pulled up his shirt to show him the gun.

"He later shared with me that it was a bad choice on his part," the officer wrote in the report.

According to the report, Alvarez said the gun was never loaded. Police could not confirm that.

Alvarez was taken to the Twin Falls County Jail and booked on a count of aggravated assault. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for April 26.

Tried to Strangle Man

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls police say they arrested a woman after a man said she hit him with a scented glass jar and attempted to strangle him.

At about 1:22 a.m. Wednesday, police responded to the 400 block of Third Avenue West in Twin Falls after a man called 911. When police arrived, they said they found a man who was extremely upset. The man told officers a woman, identified as Apryl Preacher Ricaldi, 26, got angry and began beating him.

According to the police report, the man also had abrasions on his neck, bite marks on his arm and additional injuries to one of his legs.

According to the report, the man told police Ricaldi hit him in the head with a scented candle in a glass jar and attempted to strangle him with a space heater cord, a cellphone charger code and a necklace. The

man also said Ricaldi pushed him into a closet door, causing the door to break, the report states.

According to the report, a 6-month-old baby was in the house at the time.

Police charged Ricaldi with attempted strangulation and domestic battery with traumatic injury. She was arraigned in Twin Falls County Fifth District Court on Thursday and her bond was set at \$50,000. She has an additional misdemeanor domestic battery charge from November, 2012, according to online court records.

A preliminary hearing is scheduled for April 26.

\$300,000 Grant to Fund Patientcentered Care at Health Clinics

TWIN FALLS • Idaho Primary Care Association was awarded a grant to help community health clinics become a "patient-centered medical home."

The nonprofit organization received a three-year, \$300,000 grant from Cambia Health Foundation.

IPCA will work with 20 community health clinics, including Family Health Services in Twin Falls.

Teri Barker, director of clinical quality for IPCA, said the medical home concept is a way to deliver evidence-based primary care to patients.

Barker said it's impossible

for doctors and nurses to monitor all patient conditions themselves, so this model includes a clinical team approach.

Another component: Getting patients involved in their own care.

Through the Idaho Medical Home Collaborative, she said a goal is to monitor and improve patient outcomes. That could be ensuring a patient's diabetes is under control, for instance, or lowering their blood pressure.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter created the Idaho Medical Home Collaborative – which includes primary care physicians, insurance companies and organizations - in 2010.

The model aims to improve the quality of care for patients while reducing health care costs.

Barker said the three-year grant from Cambia Health Foundation will allow IPCA to continue work already in progress.

Family Health Services' administration office in Twin Falls didn't have information Friday to provide about the grant.

Barker said IPCA is working with clinics to help them improve their health information technology infrastructure.

That includes electronic medical records and using data for quality improvement.

"There's a lot of things

we're doing with this grant," she said.

Through the new funding, IPCA will also provide resources to community health clinics to help them gain recognition by the National Committee for Quality Assurance as a patient centered medical home.

Throughout Idaho, there are currently 16 clinics who have gained recognition, Barker said.

Barker said a lot of other clinics have been working on their application for a year or more. It's generally a two or three-year process.

Within the next six months, a few more clinics should be submitting applications, she said.

Mormon Church to Review New Boy Scouts Proposal

SALT LAKE CITY • Mormon Church leaders plan to carefully review the Boy Scouts of America's new proposal on the organization's longstanding ban on gays be-

fore it takes a position. The Scouts on Friday announced a proposal to lift the gay ban for youth members but continue to exclude gays as adult leaders.

The Church of Jesus Christ Latter-day Saints of spokesman Michael Purdy said

the church is looking closely at the proposal's language and studying its implications. He notes that the church still has time, since the Scouts plan to submit the proposal to its National Council at a meeting in Texas the week of May 20.

The Mormon church has more Scouting troops than any other religious denomination, so there is widespread interest about what it will say about the proposal.

Nationally, the Mormon Church has 37,000 troops and 420,000 youth members, as figures from the Boy Scouts of

America show. In the Boy Scouts' Great Salt Lake Council – one of the largest in the country with 5,500 troops and 73,400 youth - 99 percent of the troops are sponsored by the Mormon church.

The LDS church still teaches its members that marriage is between a man and a woman and that same-sex relationships are sinful. In December, however, the LDS church launched a website encouraging members to be more compassionate in discussions about homosexuality.

In making its announce-

ment, Boy Scouts of America estimated that easing the ban on gay adults could cause widespread defections that cost the organization 100,000 to 350,000 members.

Utah was likely included in that estimate.

Four out of five Scout leaders and parents in the Boy Scouts' Great Salt Lake Council said they are opposed to lifting the ban on gays, according to results of a survey completed by 4,700 adults. Nearly half said they would quit the Boy Scouts if the ban on gays is lifted.

This team includes nurses, therapists, social services, nutritionists, chaplain services and volunteers. Hospice care offers emotional and other supports for the patient, but sometimes more importantly, the family. It's a time where families can get the emotional support they may need from a team of professionals who are educated in all aspects of the death and dying process.

Even after the passing, hospice also comes to your home every other week to ensure that you and your family get the emotional support they need, especially those first few months after a loss. There is also the opportunity to get involved in a support group through hospice care.

Ultimately, talk to your mother and respect her

The violent endgame unfolded four days after the bombing and just a day after the FBI released surveillance-camera images of two young men suspected of planting the pressurecooker explosives that ripped through the crowd at the marathon finish line, killing three people and wounding more than 180.

The two men were identified by authorities and relatives as ethnic Chechens from southern Russia who had been in the U.S. for about a decade and were believed to be living in Cambridge, Mass. But investigators gave no details on the motive for the attack.

President Barack Obama said the nation owes a debt of gratitude to law enforcement officials and the people of Boston for their help in the search. But he said there are many unanswered questions about the Boston bombings, including whether the two men had help from others. He urged people not to rush to judgment about their motivations. The breakthrough came when a man in a Watertown neighborhood saw

blood on a boat parked in a yard and pulled back the tarp to see a man covered in blood, authorities said. The resident called 911 and when police arrived, they tried to talk the suspect into getting out of the boat, said Boston Police Commissioner Ed Davis.

"He was not communicative," Davis said.

Instead, he said, there was an exchange of gunfire — the final volley of one of the biggest manhunts in American history.

Watertown residents, who had been told in the morning to stay inside behind locked doors, poured out of their homes and lined the streets to cheer police vehicles as they rolled away from the scene.

Celebratory bells rang from a church tower. Teenagers waved American flags. Drivers honked. Every time an emergency vehicle went by, people cheered loudly. "They finally caught the

TEXAS TOWN GRIEVES FOR DEAD FIRST-RESPONDERS

WEST, Texas (AP) • Buck Uptmor didn't have to go to West Fertilizer Co. when the fire started. He wasn't a firefighter like his brother and cousin, who raced toward the plant. But a ranch of horses next to the flames needed to be moved to safety.

"He went to help a friend," said Joyce Marek, Uptmor's aunt. "And then it blew."

Two days after the fertilizer facility exploded in a blinding fireball, authorities announced that they had recovered 14 bodies, confirming for the first time an exact number of people killed. Grieving families quickly started planning burials.

At least three of those killed in Wednesday's blast were firefighters, according to family members. The dead included Uptmor and Joey Pustejovsky, the city secretary who doubled as a member of the West Volunteer Fire Department, as well as a captain of the Dallas Fire Department who was off-duty at the time but responded to the fire to help.

The explosion was strong enough to register as a small earthquake and could be heard for many miles across the Texas prairie. It demolished nearly everything for several blocks around the plant. More than 200 people were hurt.

Texas Department of Public Safety Sgt. Jason Reyes said he could not confirm how many first-responders had been killed. Efforts to search devastated buildings in a fourblock radius around the blast site continued Friday.

"They knew it was dangerous. They knew that thing could go up at any time," said Ronnie Sykora, who was Pustejovsky's deacon at St. Mary of the Assumption Catholic Church. "But they also knew that if they could extinguish that fire before it went up, that they could save tens of lives, hundreds of lives. That's why they were in there."

Edward Smith, a volunteer chaplain for the Dallas Police Department, counseled firefighters at West's fire station Friday morning. Outside, firefighters from nearby Alvarado washed a truck that was used after the blast to put out the fires started by the explosion.

"Right now, the general public might be saying, 'Well, why aren't they talking about this?" Smith said of the firefighters. "They don't necessarily even want to talk about it. They're holding out hope."

In a town of just 2,800 people, everyone here knew someone affected by the explosion.

Plant owner Donald Adair released a statement saying he would never forget the "selfless sacrifice of first-responders who died trying to protect all of us."

One of the plant employees was also killed responding to the fire, Adair said.

Federal investigators and the state fire marshal's office planned to begin inspecting the blast site Friday to collect evidence that may point to a cause.

Franceska Perot, a spokes-

woman for the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, said investigators would begin at the perimeter of the explosion and work inward toward the destroyed fertilizer company.

The fertilizer facility stores and distributes anhydrous ammonia, a fertilizer that can be injected into soil. It also mixes other fertilizers.

Texas Sens. John Cornyn and Ted Cruz, who toured the town Friday, said they would wait for more information about the explosion before considering whether there should be more regulation of anhydrous ammonia.

Russia's Chechnya Has Seen Decades of War, Terror

MAKHACHKALA, Russia (AP) • The two brothers suspected in the Boston Marathon bombings have their ethnic roots in Chechnya, a part of the Caucasus Mountains that has spawned decades of violence – from separatist wars to suicide attacks, blood feuds and hostage sieges.

Authorities have not linked Tamerlan and

Besides McCain, the four Republicans who voted for the bill are Sens. Susan Collins of Maine, Mark Kirk of Illinois, Obama's home state, and Pat Toomey of Pennsylvania.

The four Democrats played down the unusual rebuke from their party's president.

Baucus brushed off Obama's comments, telling reporters, "He can say what he wants to say." Baucus said he is comfortable with his vote, adding: "That's my state."

Dzhokhar Tsarnaev to any insurgent groups, and the Kremlin-backed strongman who now leads Chechnya says the brothers got their inspiration in the U.S., not the troubled region in southern Russia. The Tsarnaev brothers lived in the region only briefly as children, but appeared to

How Vladimir Putin Could Help Boston

ust hours after the Boston Marathon bombings, Russian President Vladimir Putin condemned the act as a "disgusting" crime and

Putin condemned the act as a "disgusting" crime and offered to help in any way he could. Now's his chance.

The Tsarnaev brothers appear to have Chechen roots; the older, now-deceased brother, Tamerlan Tsarnaev, may have touted radical Islamists on his YouTube site. (The only question is whether the site's holder is the same Tamerlan Tsarnaev.) There is no doubt, then, that Putin has a big interest in helping out with the FBI's investigation — a much bigger interest than he did on Monday, before the Chechen link was suspected. More to the point, there is very little doubt that he also has the means to help out.


Putin's popularity, in the early years of his presidency, stemmed largely from his hard-line tactics against the Chechen rebels, who were waging a separatist insurgency in their southern province and, to that end, launching terrorist attacks in Moscow. During that era, in the mid-to-late 1990s, the rebels, though mainly Muslim, were motivated largely by nationalism — as were the leaders of Chechen rebellions dating back to the 19th century. But as Putin put down the insurgency with increasing force, the survivors grew more and more radical, and in the past few years, the movement has taken on explicitly Islamic colors, including an alliance with al-Qaida. This has only hardened Putin's determination to defeat them.

One result of this: Russian intelligence services are all over Chechen radicals. That means that if - and this is a very big if - the Tsarnaevs had ever been in touch with Chechen radicals or with Islamists elsewhere who have ever been in touch with Chechen radicals, then Putin's spy agencies have a record of it.

Putin has another reason for getting engaged in this probe. The 2014 Winter Olympics are taking place in Russia — specifically in Sochi, near the Black Sea and the Caucasus Mountains, only 300 miles from Chechnya. Putin's biggest political and public relations nightmare is a terrorist attack disrupting his Olympics, his grand moment on the world stage. U.S. and Russian counterterrorism agencies already have a history of cooperating in tracking common enemies. If a joint effort plays some role in shining light on the Boston bombers' motives or wider networks (if there are wider networks), that would strengthen these ties considerably — and possibly enhance the safety of the coming Olympics.

President Barack Obama has been exploring avenues for another "reset" of Russian-American relations. At least when it comes to counterterrorist operations, Putin is too. Depending on how the next few hours or days go, Boston may serve as an opportunity for these two powers to start over.

Breaking News Is Broken

nspired by the events of the past week, here's a handy guide for anyone looking to figure out what exactly is going during a breaking news event. When you first hear about a big story in progress, run to your television. Make sure it's securely turned off.

Next, pull out your phone, delete your Twitter app, shut off your email, and perhaps cancel your service plan. Unplug your PC.

Now go outside and take a walk for an hour or two. Maybe find a park and sit on a bench, reading an old novel. Winter is just half a year away - have you started cleaning out your rain gutters? This might be a good time to start. Whatever you do, remember to stay hydrated. Have a sensible dinner. Get a good night's rest. In the morning, don't rush out of bed. Take in the birdsong. Brew a pot of coffee. Finally, load up your favorite newspaper's home page. Spend about 10 minutes reading a couple of indepth news stories about the events of the day. And that's it: You've now caught up with all your friends who spent the past day and a half going out of their minds following cable and Twitter. In fact, you're now better informed than they are, because during your self-imposed exile from the news, you didn't stumble into the

many cul-de-sacs and dark alleys of misinformation that consumed their lives. You're less frazzled, better rested, and your rain gutters are clear.

Breaking news is broken. That's the clearest lesson you can draw about the media from the last week, when both old- and new-media outlets fell down on the job. By now you've likely heard the lowlights. CNN and the AP incorrectly reported on Wednesday that a Boston Marathon suspect had been arrested. People on Reddit and editors at the New York Post wrongly fingered innocent kids as bombing suspects. Redditors also pushed the theory that a Brown University student who has been missing for more than a month was one of the bombers - a story that gained steam on Twitter Thursday when people listening to police scanners heard the cops repeat the student's name. Though everyone should have been careful to dismiss chatter heard over the scanner, few did. Caught up in the excitement of breaking news, I was one of many journalists who retweeted news that the Brown student was one of the suspects - a fact that, in

the morning, I feel absolutely terrible about. People on Reddit feel terrible about it too, though now the damage to his reputation has been done. (Although I'm choosing not to mention his name here, that's not going to accomplish very much — it's already been stained.)

Twitter's comeuppance could not have come soon enough. Earlier in the week, many social-media tough guys were calling CNN's failing a sign of the times proof that cable news couldn't keep up with the Web. CNN was criticized for not taking the time to check its sources' claims that the cops had arrested a "darkskinned" suspect. The failure seemed in keeping with cable news' inherent weaknesses. News takes time to develop, but because cable anchors have to fill up airtime and want to scoop their rivals, they're eager to speculate and grab at any halfway credible sounding story they hear from their sources. Twitter, everyone on Twitter agreed, was better than that. Then, a day later, people on Twitter made exactly the same mistakes. Besides the mistaken identification of the Brown student, Thursday night's tweeters - including many local reporters covering the manhunt couldn't get straight whether one or two suspects had been arrested, whether

the suspects were dead or alive, and whether they were light- or dark-skinned. Even more weirdly, many on Twitter were now making fun of CNN for being behind — for not following the news in the same slipshod manner as Twitter. By staying behind, though, CNN avoided the Web's embarrassment. For all its mistakes, the network at least didn't falsely identify anyone.

The useful distinction here isn't by medium. It's silly to say that Twitter is a better way to follow breaking news than CNN, or vice versa. The real problem is that both Twitter and CNN now depend on technologies that make it possible to follow breaking news too closely.

There's a gap between facts and comprehension, between finding some pictures online and making sense of how they fit into a story. What ends up filling that gap is speculation.



NEW APPROACH TO DIVORCE

Startup business strives to avoid costly, bitter court battles.

BOISE (AP) • Michelle Crosby was 9 years old when she was put on the witness stand in a custody hearing between her divorced parents.

"The question posed to me was, 'If you were stranded on a desert island, which parent would you choose to live with?" Crosby recalls.

She was crushed. She loved them both.

"At 9, you know the system is broken if you have to answer that question," she said.

In that moment, Crosby says, she decided to be a lawyer. That journey led her to seek a better way for couples to divorce that would ease pain and emotional wreckage.

The result, 28 years later, is Wevorce, a Boise startup Crosby co-founded in December with Boisean Jeff Reynolds that combines technology and professionals like counselors and accountants for mediated-divorce settlements aimed at keeping people out of protracted, expensive and bitter courtroom fights.

The cost: an average flat rate of \$7,500.

Last fall, Crosby and Reynolds put their idea in front of Y Combinator, a venture capital firm recognized by Forbes magazine in 2012 as the country's top business incubator. Y Combinator put up \$100,000 to help the company grow. From Y Combinator's offices in Mountain View, Calif., Crosby and Reynolds have pushed hard to expand Wevorce beyond its original location in Boise. Within two months, Wevorce had offices in San Francisco, Portland, Seattle and Asheville, N.C. The Asheville office is meant to plant Wevorce in the eastern half of the United States so it can start growing in that region, Crosby said.

The company has 28 professional independent contractors who help deliver its services.

Crosby won't say how much revenue Wevorce brings in. She set a goal to increase revenue by 10 percent each week, but Wevorce lately has been chalking up 14 percent increases, she said.

On Tuesday, Crosby and Reynolds will go before 400 more venture capitalists in a demonstration day sponsored by Y Combinator to raise money to help Wevorce open in every state. About 80 percent of those who make presentations come away with additional money, said Garry Tan, a Y Combinator partner.

Wevorce was one of 46 startups chosen by Y Combinator – from 3,000 applicants - to receive funding. Wevorce's melding of mediation and technology appealed to the firm, Tan said. Wevorce's software helps the company establish behaviorial expectations of clients, provides ways for them to fill out legal forms that aren't intimidating and offers tutorial programs on issues facing divorced couples. For example, the software shows Wevorce how each spouse may be at a dif-

ferent stage of grief over the pending divorce. Wevorce is unique in the tech space where it is oper-

ating, Tan said. "We look for things that change the world," he said.

Crosby struggled with family law at the beginning of her career.

After graduating with a law degree from Gonzaga University in Spokane, she tried family law but found that the adversarial system between parties in a divorce - fueled by their lawyers had not changed since the day she'd been asked that terrible question.

"I can't be part of this problem," she thought.

So she switched to securities law. She married an Idahoan, and they moved to Boise seven years ago. They eventually divorced, amicably, Crosby said.

But Crosby couldn't see herself as a securities lawyer for the next 30 years. She dabbled in an approach to divorce that would take dueling lawyers out of the center of the dispute. She opened a business called Family Architects in Boise a couple of years ago that laid the groundwork for what would become Wevorce.

Crosby saw divorces as conflicts with legal implications. "I did not see them as legal problems," she said. "We the lawyers were drivthem into legal ing problems."

Idaho Unemployment Rate Holds at 6.2 percent; Camas Co. Lowest

BOISE • New figures show Idaho's adjusted unemployment rate held steady at 6.2 percent from February to March.

The Department of Labor report released Friday shows Camas County has the lowest rate at 3.7 percent, while northern Idaho counties like Benewah, Clearwater and Shoshone all have rates higher than 10 percent.

While jobs have been generated faster in Idaho than the national average, the report shows labor numbers still remain at 2011 levels when few employers were creating new positions.

Overall, the report shows employers hired 13,000 people for new and replacement jobs in March - 500 fewer than companies hired in March 2012.

The number of new hires represents twice Idaho's fiveyear average, since the economy began to tumble in 2008. About 1,400 people left the workforce in March.

Board Elects New Leadership Team

MOSCOW • Members of the board that governs Idaho public schools and universities have elected a new leadership team.

Trustee Don Soltman of Twin Lakes was picked as the new president Thursday at the board's meeting at the University of Idaho.

Soltman was first appointed to the board in 2009 by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and had held the position of vice president. He previously served in the U.S. Air Force and at various health care facilities across the United States and Europe.

He recently retired from his position at Kootenai Medical Center in Coeur d'Alene.

Soltman replaces Ken Edmunds, a businessman from Twin Falls.

Trustees also voted to elect Emma Atchley, a businesswoman from Ashton, as the new vice president. Rod Lewis, of Boise, was selected board secretary.

Yellowstone West Entrance Opens

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. • Yellowstone National Park's West Entrance opened to vehicles as originally planned Friday before budget cuts threatened to push back the date a week.

People now can drive from West Yellowstone, Mont., to Old Faithful or north to Mammoth Hot Springs.

The park's East and South entrances remain closed but plowing funded in part by the towns of Cody and Jackson and area businesses is making progress.

Those entrances also are on track to open on time, or May 3 for the East Entrance and May 10 for the South Entrance.

The Jackson Hole News & Guide reports good weather helped Yellowstone crews open the West gate.

Budget cuts threatened to delay the opening until April 26 while keeping the East and South gates closed until May 17 and 24.

Man Charged with Sexual Abuse

BOISE • A southwest Idaho man who police say had sexual contact with a 14-year-old girl he met on a social media website has been taken into custody.

Authorities say Luke Allen Inman of Nampa was taken into custody Tuesday and faces felony charges of child enticement and sexual abuse of a minor under 16.

Ada County Sheriff's investigators say he arranged to meet the girl on the grounds of a high school before classes Tuesday.

The Idaho Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force says Inman attempted to contact nearly 200 girls ages 14 to 16 through the website since mid-March.

He was being held in the Ada County Jail on \$250,000 bond.

Protection for Gays, Lesbians

POCATELLO (AP) • The Pocatello City Council on Thursday narrowly rejected an ordinance intended to protect gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people from discrimination, bucking the direction set by three other Idaho cities that have recently passed antidiscrimination ordinances for sexual orientation.

The ordinance, which mirrors protections passed in Sandpoint, Boise and Moscow in the last 15 months, would have criminalized discrimination in cases of housing, employment and use of public services.

The Idaho State Journal reports that Mayor Brian

Blad cast the deciding vote breaking a 3-3 tie.

The ordinance would have made discrimination based on sexual orientation a misdemeanor, punishable with fines up to \$1,000 and six months in jail. State law already makes it illegal for employers to discriminate based on other factors including race, gender and religion.

But the plan faced resistance from council members who argued making discrimination a crime goes too far.

City councilman Craig Cooper said he objects to discrimination in all forms, but said imposing civil penalties would be a more appropriate punishment.

"My vote last night was not in favor of discrimination, my vote last night was in opposition to the way the ordinance was written," he told The Associated Press Friday. "I think there are people who are unaware of what's going on and it's just not a healthy thing to criminalize in my mind."

Thursday's vote comes a month after state lawmakers denied a formal hearing on a proposal to add the words "sexual orientation" and "gender identity" to the state's Human Rights Act. Supporters, however, were given the chance to make their case to lawmakers during an informal listening session in March.

POLSON, Mont. • Lake County authorities say a Pablo man suffered injuries to his head and arms after a bear at tacked him in his yard.

Undersheriff Dan Yonkin says the man got between a sow and her two cubs Friday morning. The man said he was not aware the animals were in his yard.

Authorities have not confirmed what kind of bear it was, but the man believed it was a grizzly.

Sheriff's department spokeswoman Karen Sargeant says the man was hospitalized in Kalispell. His name was not released.

Yonkin says officers went door-to-door in the area near the attack to warn residents of the potential danger.

Billings Man Convicted of 13th DUI

BILLINGS, Mont. • A 54-year-old Billings man has been convicted of his 13th instance of driving under the influence after jurors rejected his argument that he drove away from his house last summer because he felt threatened by a neighbor.

The Billings Gazette reports jurors convicted John Harvey Hoots on Thursday. His attorney argued state law allows a person to commit a crime to avoid serious injury or death. Hoots testified he feared his neighbor.

The neighbor testified he called 911 on July 31 to report Hoots had dropped his pants. A short time later, the neighbor's mother called to report Hoots indicated he had a gun.

Hoots was driving away as officers arrived. His bloodalcohol level was 0.20 percent. Hoots had been released from prison six weeks earlier on his 12th DUI.

Nevada Gay Marriage Bill Amended to Protect Churches

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) • A proposal seeking to clear the way for gay marriage in Nevada was amended Friday by the state Senate in a move designed to make it more acceptable to some lawmakers who struggled with their religious convictions.

The amendment offered by Sen. Pat Spearman, a lesbian minister, states: "Religious organizations and clergy have the right to refuse to solemnize a marriage and no person has the right to make any claim against a religious organization or clergy for such a refusal."

Spearman, D-North Las Vegas, said she hoped the amendment would ease concerns and ensure colleagues that religious protections "would not be denied."

The amendment was approved on an 11-10 partyline vote with Democrats in favor. Senate Joint Resolution 13 now goes to the Senate floor for a vote early next week.

Senate Majority Leader Mo Denis, D-Las Vegas, was one lawmaker who grappled with the proposal. Denis is a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

After the vote, Denis said he believes the amendment addresses concerns raised by a number of groups about protecting religious covenants.

Records: Two Men Accused in Fatal Montana Fire Lit Apron

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) • A Montana mobile home fire that left four people dead began when two men lit an apron on fire in the kitchen while the victims slept following a party, according to court documents filed Friday.

Preliminary autopsy results showed all four victims died of smoke inhalation, authorities said. Three bodies were found in bedrooms and one in the mobile home's dining room.

County Yellowstone Sheriff Mike Linder identified the victims as Donavon Fogle, 25, Troy Saylor, 28, Brandi Hansen Moats, 25, and Amber Marie Beyers, 33. All four were from Billings.

Two men arrested on Thursday night in the case each face four counts of negligent homicide and one count of felony arson.

The suspects – Zaccary John Kern and Robert Eric Bottenhagen, both 21 and from Billings – were being held at the Yellowstone County Jail. It was uncertain if they had retained attorneys.

Probable cause affidavits filed by Yellowstone County Attorney Scott Twito said both men admitted during interviews with investigators to being at a party at the residence earlier in the night. Kern denied further involvement, according to the documents.

But a female witness who picked up the two suspects said that after leaving the party, the men discussed having lit an apron on fire after the others at the home went to sleep, the affidavits said.

"Both stated to this witness that they thought they had put the apron out before leaving the residence," the affidavit said. "At one point (they) drove back to the residence and observed the fire and the emergency vehicles. Both of them panicked and stated that they could not believe this was happening." Linder said further tests

will be done to confirm the

cause of death. There were no signs of trauma or bodily injuries to the victims, the affidavits said.

Firefighters were called to the mobile home in Lockwood, just northeast of Billing, shortly after 4 a.m. on Thursday. They arrived as smoke and flames came from what appeared to be the kitchen area, The Billings Gazette reported.

Crews entered the residence and got the fire under control in about 10 minutes, Lockwood Fire Chief Bill Rash said.

Deputies later obtained a search warrant and removed the four bodies found in the home Thursday afternoon. The Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives joined the investigation, and friends and family of the victims gathered near the scene throughout the day.

Linder said detectives still were trying to piece together the relationship between the suspects and victims.

Elko County Nets \$450,000 From Delinquent Land Sales

ELKO, Nev. (AP) • Elko County has raised nearly a half million dollars by auctioning off more than 150 pieces of land where county property taxes were delinquent.

More than 100 bidders turned out at the treasurer's office this week to snatch up a piece of northeast Nevada real estate. Treasurer Rebecca Erickson said \$450,000 was collected almost double what the county raised at auctions in recent years.

Many of the bidders return to Elko every year to buy property, she said.

"It's the cheapest land money can buy," said Charlotte Abbott, who traveled from Lynden, Wash., where she owns a wholesale land company, Smile4U Inc. She bought about 25 parcels on Tuesday, some in the Montello area.

"I really hope someday to build a home here myself," she told the Elko Daily Free Press. "I love it here. It's a special place."

Ashley Baxter, of California, attended with Jesse Marshall, of Calgary, Canada, who's been coming for a decade and now owns about 70 properties in Nevada. They bought 19 parcels on Tuesday in Montello, along U.S. Highway 93 near Jackpot.

"Many people go to the beach for a vacation, but we go to Elko," Baxter joked.


"It's fun to go see the property afterward," said Baxter, whose personal tradition is to take lawn chairs and a bottle of champagne

out to their new properties to celebrate. "There's a couple that you take a gamble on, obviously."

Property owners who were delinquent on their taxes have up to one year to reclaim what is left of their property sales revenue after taxes, fees and a percentage that goes to the county.

This year was the first time the auction took place in the spring and the first time the county accepted credit cards for the purchases.

"I think allowing credit cards brought the prices up a bit," Erickson said. Organizers decided to make the move in part because the auction came the day after federal income taxes were due, she said.

Ferrell was an integral part of Wildcats' basketball team, which lost to Snake River in the 3A state championship.


And while Ferrell intrigued schools with her size and athletic ability as a basketball player, Ferrell was most concerned with academics.

Local Runners Reflect on Boston Bombings

On early Monday morning, the Boston Marathon was already on Rupert resident Terry Evans' mind. Her daughter-in-law was running it this year, and Evans had already qualified and planned to run it in 2014.

When news of the bombings reached Evans in Idaho, her first concern was for her family. It took an hour before she received word that everyone was OK. Her daughter-in-law had finished 10 minutes before the explosions. "I was devastated," Evans said. "When I heard about the bombing I thought of all those marathoners in a once-in-alifetime opportunity, this dream they'd had was going to be marred by this (tragedy)." Evans, who says she's a "middle-of-the-pack plodder who qualifies in the grandma division," ran Boston in 2011. The race is like the Super Bowl of marathons, and Evans says it lived up to the hype and exceeded her expectations. "Bostonians love their marathon and they really roll out the red carpet for marathoners," Evans said. Shari Hart of Filer, who ran the marathon in 1996 for its 100th anniversary, said having been there before gave her a unique perspective on the bombings. "You could experience it more realistically; it's not just something you see on the news," Hart said. "You've been there. You've been on that street. It brought it closer to home." Hart and Evans both said they weren't surprised by the heroic and inspirational stories coming out of Boston in the aftermath, as marathoners and spectators ran to the aid of the victims.

cided that I would try and run a marathon to qualify for Boston. I would need to drop 12 minutes off my previous best of 3:32.56 and run a 3:20 to qualify. A part of me was not sure I could.

But I knew then that faith can move mountains, and I really do serve a giant God, and He and I make a pretty good team. I ran and won (by God's grace) the May 1980 Great Potato Marathon in 3:12.22 setting a new record for women marathoners in Idaho. I was Boston bound!

I was also a very poor college student working my way through college, and many friends rallied to raise money for me to go.

Boston was my first

big "dream come true," my best ever marathon finish time, cruising the 26.2 miles in a little over seven minutes a mile. I rode to the start with a former state senator and a current newscaster of 26 years (it was another God appointment), and I stayed in a house less than five blocks from the start of the race with noted author and speaker George Sheehan. I ran the 100th Boston in 1996, and again in 2000 I ran it with a group of friends from the Magic Valley.

I celebrate everyone who runs and dreams of crossing that finish line. And it is more than just getting to toe the line of that prestigious event because you qualified. It is the culmination of months of training, and hoping and praying and laying it all out on the line, fearful you won't make it and yet so hopeful you can. And what you get when you cross that line and finish means the world to you, but not nearly as much as what you became through the process of putting yourself out there and following your dream.

The bombings at the finish line destroyed the beauty of that moment for so many. It destroyed the lives of so many, and it took away so much from the hearts of those who have lost loved ones or limbs.

I signed up for the 2013 St. George Marathon the night before the running of the 117th Boston Marathon. If I go, it will be my 10th marathon in St. George, and I was hoping to qualify for Boston 2014 at the event.

If God allows, I will toe the line in Hopkington in tears in 2014, and if I cross that finish line I will again be bawling.

Don't ever give up the dreams you should be keeping. In the long run they are what define you and perhaps even give you the platform on which to share God's love and grace with others.

Injured Derek Jeter Will Be 39 When He Returns to Yankees

NEW YORK • Don Mattingly knows about trying to come back from an injury that just won't heal.

A star first baseman for the New York Yankees from 1982-95, Mattingly retired as a player following several years of severe back pain.

It remains to be seen how successful injured Yankees captain Derek Jeter will be in returning to shortstop this summer at age 39 - after a careerhigh, nine-month layoff.

"The older you get makes it tougher," Mattingly, now the Los Angeles Dodgers manager, said Friday. "But I think if there was one guy I wouldn't doubt, it would be Jeter because he seems to defy the odds."

Jeter broke the ankle in the AL championship series opener against Detroit in Oct. 13 and found out Thursday there was a small crack near the original injury. The new break will need four-to-eight weeks to heal.

He hit .316 last season and led the AL with 216 hits, his best season since winning his fifth World Series title in 2009. Age has already crimped his range and some wonder whether he will be able to be an everyday shortstop when he returns.

"That's a pretty significant injury when it's going

to impact your legs like it is, especially the position he plays," Tampa Bay manager Joe Maddon said. "I don't know if they have to start making other plans to play different spots based on mobility. I don't know how significant or bad it is. But it's going to be difficult to come back to what we remember of him in the past, I would think?

Not wearing a boot and walking without a limp, Jeter spent 45 minutes Friday at the Yankees' minor league complex in Tampa, Fla. The Yankees captain was wearing sneakers when he left the facility, where he talked with the training staff. Asked if he was disappointed by the setback, he said "of course" but little else.

Jeter plans to talk about his injury with New York media next week when the Yankees return from a trip that ends Wednesday at Tampa Bay.

"It must be devastating for him," said 43-year-old closer Mariano Rivera, who came back for a final season this year following a knee injury that sidelined him most of last season. "There are people that lead by example, and he's one of them. He doesn't have to say anything. He doesn't have to say much. He will say something if he needs to, but most of the time it's just by example. Being there. Playing hard. Respect the game. Be there for your teammates. All what's that. That's missed."

The university announced the suspension on Friday, saying that Brian Brecht will continue to be paid.

The school did not give details of allegations.

Rutgers, under the direction of President Robert Barchi and Interim Athletic

Director Carl Kirschner, has been reviewing videos of practices in all sports since men's basketball coach Mike Rice was fired this month after a video was made public that showed him abusing players.

The Rutgers lacrosse team competes in the Big East Conference, and is struggling this season. The Scarlet Knights are 2-11 overall, and 0-5 in the league. Brecht's team has lost 10 consecutive games headed into Saturday's home game vs. Duke.

Brecht, in his second season as coach at Rutgers, spent seven years as coach at Siena College, and was a three-time conference coach of the year in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference. He is a New York native who played at Springfield College in Massachusetts, and was hired by former Athletic Director Tim Pernetti on June 16, 2011, after posting 57 victories with the Saints in his final five years there. Pernetti resigned two days after Rice was fired.

Local Churches Hold Benefit to Bring Home Boise Pastor Saeed Abedini

TWIN FALLS • As seniors and juniors at Lighthouse Christian School walked across I.B. Perrine Bridge, they left a trail of 1,000 yellow ribbons.

It was a silent message strips of plastic tied to the railing, fluttering in the breeze of passing vehicles - that people in the Magic Valley are demanding the release of Pastor Saeed Abedini. He is currently imprisoned in Iran's Evin Prison, a prison that has a reputation for being one of the more brutal in the country.

"The more noise we make, the more outspoken we are that we as American citizens are not satisfied with our own

creating a network of Christ-

ian churches in private homes. According to the American Center for Law and Justice, which represents Abedini's wife, Naghmeh, and her two children, Saeed has been suffering from internal bleeding for months. These injuries, the ACLJ states, exist due to beatings in prison. The ACLJ says Saeed has yet to receive any medical treatment.

Benefit for Freedom, a fundraiser and show of support to help free Saeed.

Standing on stage in the school's auditorium, Naghmeh Abedini told students about when she came to the U.S. and how she and her twin brother converted to Christianity when they were 9.

"I became a believer at 9 years old. I knew it was a hard decision because I came from a Muslim family. Since I was nine, various trials have come to me," Naghmed said. "He (God) can use someone from Idaho to change the world."

Eventually, Naghmeh said, her own parents, once devout Muslims, also converted to Christianity.

She shared the pain of not seeing her husband and the anguish of knowing he is beaten because of his faith.



being treated this way," said Pam Fadness, women's ministry leader at Lighthouse.

On Thursday, April 18, Fadness and about 60 students and teachers tied yellow ribbons in honor of Saeed Abedini, a Boise pastor who was sentenced Jan. 27 to eight vears

Jamie Morton, 17, a student at Lighthouse Christian School, said the event was important to her because Saeed is a local pastor and her father is also a pastor.

"I think Twin Falls cares, no matter religion or race. That's why I like Twin Falls," Morton said.

Saeed has been in an Iranian prison since September 2012. He was in Iran visiting family when he was arrested and charged with attempting to undermine state security by

"It's more than religion. His human rights are being violated...he deserves our support. It's wrong they can keep him this long," Fadness said.

The ribbons on the bridge were also a message for Naghmeh Abedini that the community supports her as well. Students said they hoped that she would see them the next day as she drove into Twin Falls to speak at their school.

On Friday, April 19, Naghmeh Abedini was at Lighthouse Christian School to share Saeed's story and attend

"He's your best friend, your soul mate, and they come and take him," Naghmeh Abedini said. "When Saeed first went to prison, I wanted to go in a hole and hide."

But now she is perhaps Saeed's greatest advocate, keeping her husband's story alive in the media. This weekend she will appear on Fox News.

Fadness said that as a pastor's wife, she can't imagine the hardship Naghmeh Abedini is facing.

"She's burning the candle on both ends. I admire her. She's an inspiration," Fadness said. "If it was my husband, I'd hope the community would get involved."

Jessica Parsons-DePew of Jerome, one of the organizers,



said she remembers hearing Saeed Abedini speak in Hagerman a couple of years ago. At the time, Parsons-De-Pew said, she wasn't at a place in her life to fully hear his message. But now she is fully committed to help return him to his family.

Parsons-DePew said she approached Lighthouse a month ago to see if they could help organize the event and get other churches in the area involved. The collaboration produced the Benefit for Freedom.

"This is all of our brother. It's all of our cause. It's a human rights issue. It's a faith issue," Parsons-DePew said.

Naghmeh Abedini said January was the last time she communicated with her husband by phone, but she does receive letters. Before

her speech, she played a video of a letter written by Saeed Abedini.

He talked about hugging those who beat him.

"He has so much love and forgiveness for them," Naghmeh Abedini said. "Love fixes things, covers things. Our first reaction is anger, but often it should be love and compassion. Love is going to change."

know struggle in the middle: we believe in a loving God, a God who walks with us and who has given human beings free will. It wasn't God who plotted and designed the bombs that brought tragedy to the Boston Marathon. It wasn't God who conspired to submit a child to abuse from ages 3 until 11. It wasn't God who tortured and taunted and beat up Adam Lanza when he attended Sandy Hook.

Christians are still celebrating the Easter season.

The mocking of the crowd is fresh in our minds. We remember how they taunted Jesus as he hung on the cross, "He saved others, let God save him, if he loves him."

They dared God to intervene in an extraordinary, showy fashion. "Where is your God now?"

We remember the despair of Jesus' followers as we struggle with the horrors we inflict on each other. We wonder: if God is sovereign, why is the world in such a mess? And we reject pat answers: "It is God's will. Good will come of this. It's a message to heathen America."

And we struggle together to deal with our anger that

some fool with pressure cookers, duffle bags, BBs and a circuit board can rip apart so many lives. That such ordinary objects could cause such destruction. Yet cars driven by drunken or distracted drivers do that, and worse. The innocent are lured and tortured by the same devices that allow me to write this article and to communicate with bereaved parishioners.

"Where is God?" begs the question of whether God is big enough to handle our anger and our anguished questions. "Where is God?" Emmanuel, Godwith-us, I believe was in those who tore down the fences to allow people to flee from the bomb debris

God-with-us is in those who shielded others with their own bodies. Godwith-us is in the medical and emergency personnel who labor overtime to save lives, just as God-with-us is in those who investigate the causes of violence, are working with disturbed children and with school districts to combat bullying.

"Where is God?" Looking to Jesus, I see that Godwith-us is one who suffers too; I have faith that there is a depth to God no one can comprehend. But most importantly, I have faith that God is not only with us in the pews but in our lives. And that God's promise is that love will win - that neither bomb nor knife nor

cross nor tomb will have the last word.

"Where is God?" Wherever love, justice and mercy are present - that's where I find God.



Warsaw Marks 70 Years Since Uprising in Ghetto

WARSAW, Poland (AP) • Sirens wailed and church bells tolled in Warsaw as largely Roman Catholic Poland paid homage Friday to the Jewish fighters who rose up 70 years ago against German Nazi forces in the Warsaw ghetto uprising.

The mournful sounds marked the start of state ceremonies that were led by Polish President Bronislaw Komorowski at the iconic Monument to the Ghetto Heroes. The president was joined by officials from Poland, Israel and elsewhere as well as a survivor of the fighting, Simha Rotem, to honor the first large-scale rebellion against the Germans during World War II.

About 750 Jews with few arms and no military training made their opening attack on April 19, 1943, on a much larger and wellequipped German force. The attack came after most of the nearly half a million inhabitants of the ghetto had already been sent to die at Treblinka.

The insurgency came when it was clear the Nazis were about to send the remaining residents of the ghetto to die too. The revolt was crushed the following month, and the ghetto was razed to the ground, most of its residents killed.

"We knew that the end would be the same for everyone. The thought of waging an uprising was dictated by our determination. We wanted to choose the kind of death we would die," said Rotem, an 88-year-old who is among a tiny number of surviving fighters and was the key figure at the ceremony. "But to this day I have doubts as to whether we had the right to carry out the uprising and shorten the lives of people by a day, a week, or two weeks. No one gave us that right and I have to live with my doubts."

Rotem's uncertainty is in stark contrast to how the world remembers the revolt. Though a clear military defeat, it is hailed as a moral victory for the Jewish fight ers, who refused to go without a fight to the gas chambers. It is prominently commemorated in Israel, part of a never-again ethos that stresses the importance of self-defense. "The Nazi Germans made a hell on earth of the ghetto," Komorowski said in a speech. "Persecuting the Jews appealed to the lowest of human instincts." During the ceremonies, Komorowski bestowed one of the country's highest honors on Rotem - the Grand Cross of the Order of the Rebirth of Poland. Later the two of them, along with Israeli Education Minister Shai Piron and Wladyslaw Bartoszewski, a Polish Auschwitz survivor who helped rescue Jews during the war, walked side-byside to the monument and bowed before it as soldiers laid a wreath for them. To a military drum, other dignitaries followed them in paying their respects at the dark memorial to suffering and struggle, including Polish Prime Minister Donald Tusk, members of Poland's Jewish community and U.S. Ambassador Stephen Mull along with an American survivor of the Warsaw ghetto, Estelle Laughlin. Poland's chief rabbi and a cantor also recited mournful Hebrew prayers as they were joined by three Polish army chaplains, one Catholic, one Eastern Orthodox and one Protestant. Psalm 130, which starts, "Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord! ..." was recited in Hebrew and Polish. Officials had announced that a second surviving fighter, Havka Folman Raban, would also participate, but she was not featured in television coverage and it was unclear if she actually was there. It's not clear how many of the fighters are still living, but the number is tiny, with Polish authorities

saying they believe there are perhaps four. One, Boruch Spiegel, is 93 and living in a home for the elderly in Montreal. He was presented with a state honor in Warsaw on the 60th anniversary of the uprising but was unable to attend commemorations this year.

Throughout Warsaw, national and city flags fluttered from city buses, trams and public buildings as authorities made an unprecedented effort to encourage Poles to remember the ghetto fighters and Jewish suffering during the war. Warsaw city hall said it is the first time that churches in the capital rang their bells to mark the anniversary.

Though the Warsaw ghetto uprising is wellknown worldwide, it hasn't received the same level of attention among Poles, for whom a separate city-wide revolt in 1944 plays a much more critical role in national memory.


Authorities, however, have been trying to change this and to convince Poles that the ghetto uprising is a key moment not just in Jewish but also in broader Polish history.

Newspaper articles in re-

cent days have stressed the Polishness of the Jewish revolt, while officials have encouraged Warsaw residents to get involved in a month of commemorations that ends on May 16. That is the day in 1943 when the Nazis blew up the Great Synagogue, a jewel of 19thcentury architecture, to symbolize their crushing of the revolt. The events Friday followed an evening of commemorations on Thursday

featuring the Israel Philhar-

monic Orchestra. Israel also marked the anniversary of the uprising on its Holocaust Remembrance Day, April 7, which coincided with the Hebrew date of the anniversary of the Warsaw ghetto uprising.

Today's Highlight:

On April 20, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln signed a proclamation admitting West Virginia to the Union, effective in 60 days (June 20, 1863).

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1836, Congress voted to establish the Wisconsin Territory.

In 1861, Col. Robert E. Lee resigned his commission in the United States Army. (Lee went on to command the Army of Northern Virginia, and eventually became general-in-chief of the Confederate forces.)

In 1889, Adolf Hitler was born in Braunau am Inn, Austria.

In 1912, Boston's Fenway Park hosted its first professional baseball game while Navin Field (Tiger Stadium) opened in Detroit. (The Red Sox defeated the New York Highlanders 7-6 in 11 innings; the Tigers beat the Cleveland Naps 6-5 in 11 innings.)

In 1945, during World War II, allied forces took control of the German cities of Nuremberg and Stuttgart.

In 1968, Pierre Elliott Trudeau was sworn in as prime minister of Canada.

In 1972, the manned lunar module from Apollo 16 landed on the moon.

In 1978, a Korean Air Lines Boeing 707 crash-landed in northwestern Russia after being fired on by a Soviet interceptor after entering So-

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

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viet airspace. Two passengers were killed.

In 1988, gunmen who'd hijacked a Kuwait Airways jumbo jet were allowed safe passage out of Algeria under an agreement that freed the remaining 31 hostages and ended a 15-day siege in which two passengers were slain

In 1993, Mexican comedi-Cantinflas (Mario an Moreno) died in Mexico City at age 81.

In 1999, the Columbine High School massacre took place in Colorado as two students, Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold, shot and killed 12 classmates and one teacher before taking their own lives.

In 2010, an explosion on the Deepwater Horizon oil platform, leased by BP, killed 11 workers and began spewing an estimated 200 million gallons of crude into the Gulf of Mexico for nearly three months.

Ten years ago: U.S. Army forces took control of Baghdad from the Marines in a changing of the guard that thinned the military presence in the capital. Celebrating Easter, the Rev. Emmanuel Delly, a longtime Iraqi bishop, pleaded for safeguards against the persecution of Christians in the new Iraq. A landslide in southern Kyrgyzstan killed some three dozen people.

Five years ago: Pope Benedict XVI celebrated his final Mass in the United States before a full house in Yankee Stadium, blessing his enormous U.S. flock and telling Americans to use their freedoms wisely. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice mocked anti-American cleric Muqtada al-Sadr as a coward during a visit to Iraq. Danica Patrick became the first female winner in Indy-Car history, capturing the Indy Japan 300.

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


