Police: Fake Shooting Call Caused Real Problems in Twin Falls

Resources stretched thin during April 20 false alarm.

TWIN FALLS • Responding to a call about a fake shooting used resources that could have been used elsewhere, say city, county and state law enforcement.

On April 20 at about 5:25 p.m., Twin Falls emergency dispatchers got a frightening call. A person, calling through a deaf interpretation relay service, simply said "He shot my mom."

On Friday, emergency dispatchers could be heard over police radio scanners saying the caller said a man had been drinking and was out in the hallway while the caller and his mother were hiding in a room.

Police received the name of a person they thought was the caller and matched it up with a Maurice Street address.

When police arrived at the house, officers blocked off side streets and got their shields and rifles out. Neighbors told police there was a family with a member who is deaf who lived nearby. Some even said they may have heard gunshots, said Twin Falls Police Capt. Matt Hicks.

When officers found no signs of a

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls dog owners could possibly face another disappointment in trying to find a designated area for their pets.

For years, local dog owners, volunteers and city staffers have attempted to establish a dog park

in Twin Falls. A lack of funding continues to stall the project.

To help find a temporary alternative solution until a dog park opens, City Council members suggested finding a park where dogs could roam without a leash.

But after collecting surveys from residents and hosting a series of public meetings, the overall animals must be leashed at city parks, according to code. The only exemption is for water training areas at Dierkes Lake.

Bowyer listed five locations that he pursued as possible offleash sites: Teton Park, Villa Vista, Baxter's Park, Jason Kelly Woodland's Hills Park and Rock Creek Canyon Parkway. But each park location had at least one neighwant that to happen again."

The responses showed people were concerned over potential conflicts and dog poop, he said. As a result, Bowyer will not recommend any of the locations to the Parks and Recreation Commission, which has been charged to make a final recommendation to City Council members.

Fraud Alleged as State Shutters Mental Health Clinic

Seasons of Hope plans to appeal.

TWIN FALLS • Seasons of Hope laid off as many as 10 employees at its Twin Falls and Burley clinics earlier this month after losing its Medicaid provider status.

The Chubbuck-based mental health clinic and developmental disabilities agency has offices across the state.

In a 14-page letter of allegations dated March 28, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare said Medicaid payments to Seasons of Hope were being suspended.

"The Department has determined there are credible allegations of fraud against Seasons of Hope and an active investigation is pending," the letter said. Seasons of Hope must repay nearly \$440,000 in overpayments and pay a civil penalty totaling about \$110,000, according to the letter.

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare alleges Seasons of Hope altered records, billed for services that weren't covered, misrepresented services, billed for services not documented or provided, and billed for medically unnecessary services.

Seasons of Hope's website lists a variety of services they provide, including speech therapy, occupational therapy, developmental therapy, psychosocial rehabilitation, psychotherapy, psychological testing and adult daycare.

Seasons of Hope will file an appeal contesting department's decision. The deadline is today.

Stocks Little Changed after Mixed Earnings

NEW YORK (AP) · The stock market finished pretty much where it started Wednesday as a mixed bag of earnings from big-name American companies left investors uninspired.

The Dow closed down 43.16 points, or 0.3 percent, at 14,676.30. The Standard & Poor's 500 index – the market's most widely used barometer -- was flat at 1,578.79.

In other markets, the price of oil soared, posting its biggest gain this year. The price of gold and the yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury rose.

Sleuth Finds Pistol Likely Used in 117-year-old Murders

SHOSHONE BASIN • Either Jim Bower or Jeff Gray – or maybe both – shot and killed Oakley sheepherders John Wilson and Daniel Cummings in 1896.

Never heard of any of them? Chances are you are not alone.

The title character of southern Idaho's bestknown murder mystery was "Diamondfield Jack" Davis, an innocent man who was tried, convicted and sentenced to hang for the killings. Over the years, Davis' story has eclipsed the real story about the victims and the shooters.

Several years ago, former Idaho Representative Max Black visited the city park in Albion, where a historical marker is dedicated to Diamondfield Jack. The story on the marker left Black hungry for more details of the crime itself.

"I couldn't find anyone who knew exactly where this took place," Black said. "Then I wondered about the court records."

Black contacted the Idaho State Historical Society and was led to a large box con-

Cassia County authorities estimated that the sheepherders had been dead for two weeks.

Davis quickly became the one and only suspect in the deaths.

John Sparks – who later became the governor of Nevada - hired Davis to police the range claimed by the

brought in William Borah who would later become a U.S. senator from Idaho and Orlando Power, a former Supreme Court Justice in Utah Territory.

Davis' defense team included future governor of Idaho James Hawley, Kirkland Perky – a former law partner of William Jennings Bryan - and future U.S. senator Will Puckett.

Davis was convicted and sentenced to hang the following year. Shortly before Davis was to face the gallows, Bower and Gray confessed to shooting the sheepherders in self defense, and Davis was given a short reprieve.

According to their depositions, Wilson attacked Bower in the camp wagon, knocking Bower down. Fearing Bower would be killed, Gray shot both Wilson and Cummings. In the scuffle, Bower was able to remove his short barrel .44 caliber Model 1878 Colt Frontiersman from its shoulder holster, and fired a few shots of his own.

Despite the confessions, Borah was not willing to concede defeat. Through appeal after appeal, Davis spent a total of six years in prison, before he was eventually pardoned and released.

Black became somewhat obsessed with the murders, trying to sort out fact from fiction. In the court papers, he found surveys of the crime scene that eventually directed him to the site.

camp site on private property in what is now southern Twin Falls County.

With a metal detector, Black located a .44 slug wedged under a rock. It is believed to be the missing slug that was shot through a saddle hanging on a large sagebrush in the camp.

Black believes the slug was shot from Bower's pistol, which according to Bower's deposition, was lost in the desert after the shooting.

Black took the slug to a Boise firearms expert to verify its age and caliber. After Black explained the story of the slug, the man told Black that he had purchased a short barrel .44 caliber Model 1878 Colt Frontiersman from a man who had found the rusted pistol in the desert near the area Black had described.

The sight had been filed off the pistol, which was then a common revision to shoulder-holstered pistols like Bower's.

Black recently wrote a book titled, "Diamondfield: Finding the Real Jack Davis," which will be released this summer.

TWIN FALLS • This Friday, Valley House Homeless Shelter is holding its annual benefit dinner and auction.

About 40 percent of Valley House's \$180,000 annual budget comes from the fundraiser, said Valley House

director Sharon Breshears. Much of that money comes from the event's raffle items and live and silent auctions. TWIN FALLS • Lighthouse Christian School wants to repurpose some space at its present location on Eastland Drive.

The goal: build a gym, small secondary worship hall and extra classrooms, said Superintendent Kevin Newbry. The additions will increase school size and give its basketball and volleyball teams a place to practice.

Why Won't the Wind Stop Blowing in Southern Idaho?

ne of the questions I frequently get is, "Why is it so windy around here in southern Idaho?" There are many factors that cause our frequent gusty winds here in the Magic Valley. The most common cause is our terrain and location.

Our strongest winds typically take place in our vallev locations, especially when you get a wind coming out of the west or have a westerly component. The wind will funnel into the valleys, which become like a wind tunnel, increasing the speed of the wind. On a smaller scale, you will notice this when near the canyon on a breezy day. You could be in downtown Twin Falls and have winds between 10-15 mph, but as vou stand along the canyon the wind is funneled and becomes stronger and faster.

Another frequent cause is winds mixing rom higher altitudes down to the surface. This is usually associ-



ated with instability in the atmosphere or with a passing cold or warm front. We can get air mixing up and down through the atmosphere. If winds are strong high above us, winds can work down to the surface. A lot of times this is where we get our wind advisories or warnings.

The other big reason it is so windy across southern Idaho is the terrain. With a lot of wide open spaces, there is little friction in the form of buildings and forests to slow down strong winds when they occur.

GIVING VOICE TO BOOKS

Idaho native Tavia Gilbert has recorded more than 200 audio books, learning along the way that sometimes it gets deeply personal.

PORTLAND, Maine • Twin Falls High School graduate Tavia Gilbert didn't know Rachel Corrie. She only learned Corrie's story after the young woman from Olympia, Wash., died a violent death in the Gaza Strip.

Corrie was a peace activist protesting Israeli military tactics. She was crushed by an armored bulldozer that had targeted a civilian house. Corrie put herself between the bulldozer and the house.

But the bulldozer didn't stop

Gilbert learned of Corrie's story from her own mother, who called one night after hearing Corrie's parents speak. "She reminded me so much of you," Gilbert's mom said.

With that, Gilbert's quest had begun. She read Corrie's writings, collected in a book titled "Let Me Stand Alone," and began researching the young woman's life. Their similarities struck her.

Both were from the Pacific Northwest – Corrie from Washington and Gilbert from nearby northern Idaho. They were about the same age. They shared political leanings and were passionate about their beliefs.

"She was braver than I," said Gilbert, a Portland actor who makes her living doing voice work and recording audio books. "But she could have been anybody's daughter, sister, friend."

Last week, Gilbert put the final touches on her recording of Corrie's book. It's a project long in the works, and it required her to get to know Corrie's parents and win their approval. She also recruited actor Ed Asner, best known as Lou Grant on the TV series "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" and "Lou Grant," to record the introduction, which was written by Corrie's father, Craig.

The audio book is sched-

16, so it is deeply meaningful to spend some time with her words. She was a remarkable young woman – a thinker and a writer far beyond her years. She was a lightning rod for Israeli-Palestinian relations because of her tragic death.

"But her work as a humanitarian and an activist began in her early childhood, and she certainly would have continued to do remarkable work had her life not been so unnecessarily cut short."

The Corrie project represents a personal highlight in the career of a Portland actress who has appeared on stages around the region many times but who has made her mark with the anonymity of her voice.

Over the past five years, Gilbert, 35, has recorded almost 200 books, including several by Pulitzer Prize-winning author Annie Dillard. She just earned a Master of Fine Arts degree in writing and has begun focusing her sights on a career that includes both reading and writing as well as acting.

Her audio career is soaring. In 2012, the Audio Publishers Association nominated her for an Audies Award – the highest honor in the business

Overall, she's received three Audie nominations and two Earphone awards given by AudioFile for "exceptional presentations."

Because of her success, Gilbert is outgrowing Portland. As much as she loves living here, she plans to give up her cozy West End apartment and move to Brooklyn, N.Y., later this spring.

"I've been doing everything I can to develop my career from Maine, and I've been super fortunate. But if I want to take my career to another level, I have to go to

Her agent has been en-Gilbert said.

fully. Gilbert came to Maine in 2001 to study at the Salt Institute for Documentary Studies, and quickly fell into rhythm with the city. She was young, just starting out, and coming east for the first time in her life.

It was exciting, and she thrived.

She did a fair amount of work in theater, appearing at She put down roots and harbored no desire to leave.

Gilbert's voice work eventually allowed her to make a living as a full-time actor, something most people in her field in Portland cannot claim. And her timing was impeccable. Audio books have become hugely popular, and Gilbert's talents are in demand.

She loves the intimacy of audio books.

"That mic is like someone's ear," she said, adding that each time she reads she imagines she is reading for a friend seated in a nearby chair.

Gilbert records in a sound booth that she tucked into a corner of a second-story nook in her apartment. The WhisperRoom - that's the trademarked name - arrived last year on 17 pallets. It's a state-of-the-art recording studio that looks something like an oversized and overstuffed old-style phone booth.

She spends many hours each day in isolation in the booth, reading from an iPad. It's not easy work, she said, but it's rewarding when you can tackle a project you believe in.

she died, and that her work as a peace activist was overshadowed by controversy surrounding her death.

At age 23, Corrie arrived in Gaza early in 2003 as part of a sister-cities college assignment. She befriended peace activists and worked to prevent the Israeli army's demolition of Palestinian homes work that resulted in her death. Her book collects many of her emails home from Gaza, as well as other writings.

Recording this book, Gilbert said, was difficult. She found herself beset by emotion many times and had to work to control her tears.

"With other books, I can tell when the emotion is coming up, where the crescendos are," she said "With Rachel's book, it overwhelmed me. The grief comes at any moment without warning."

In some ways, Gilbert felt called to this project. Similarities with the author aside, she believes she was the right person at the right time to tell Corrie's story. She developed a rapport with Corrie's parents and made a special effort to make sure she was capturing the author's spirit.

"I want every book to be the best it can be. But when I do vampire porn," she said, her voice trailing off to laughter.

"With Rachel, I want people to listen. I want people to give her a chance.

"She's been gone for 10 years. If I can be a small part in keeping her voice alive, it's a small thing and an honor."





War and postwar constitutional amendments effectively overturned Dred Scott v. Sandford (1857), which held that blacks could never have rights that whites must respect. Plessy v. Ferguson (1896), which upheld legally enforced segregation, was undone by court decisions and legislation.

Korematsu v. United States (1944), which affirmed the president's wartime power to sweep Americans of disfavored racial groups into concentration camps, elicited a 1988 congressional apology. Now Peter Irons, founder of the Earl Warren Bill of Rights Project at the University of California, San Diego, is campaigning for a Supreme Court "repudiation" of the Korematsu decision and other Japanese internment rulings.

A repudiation would be unprecedented, but an essay that Irons is circulating among constitutional law professors whose support he seeks is timely reading in today's context of anti-constitutional presidencies, particularly regarding war powers.

On Feb. 19, 1942, President Franklin Roosevelt authorized the military to "prescribe military areas ... from which any or all persons may be excluded." So 110,000 Americans of Japanese ancestry, two-thirds of them born here, were sent to camps in desolate Western locations. Supposedly, this was a precaution against espionage and sabotage. Actually, it rested entirely on the racial animus of Gen. John DeWitt, head of the Western Defense Command.

Using government records, Irons demonstrates that because senior officials, including Solicitor General Charles Fahy, committed "numerous and knowing acts of governmental misconduct," the court based its decision on "records and arguments that were fabricated and fraudulent." Officials altered and destroyed evidence that would have revealed the racist motives for the internments. And to preserve the pretext of a "military necessity" for the concentration camps, officials suppressed reports on the lack of evidence of disloyalty or espionage by Japanese - Americans.

The 1943 "Final Report" on Japanese "evacuation," prepared under DeWitt's direction and signed by him, said a Japanese invasion was probable, that "racial characteristics" of Japanese- Americans predisposed them to assist the invasion, and that is was "impossible" to distinguish loyal from disloyal Japanese-American citizens, if there were any: "The Japanese race is an enemy race and while many second- and thirdgeneration Japanese born on United States soil, possessed of United States citizenship, have become 'Americanized,' the racial strains are undiluted."

When War Department officials objected to such assertions and demanded revisions, DeWitt ordered all copies and records of the original report destroyed, but one copy escaped DeWitt's cover-up. The court, however, never saw it, remaining unaware of the racist basis of the theory of internment's "military necessity." Also kept from the court was a report, prepared for the Chief of Naval Operations and made available to DeWitt, estimating potentially disloyal Japanese as just 3 percent of the Japanese-American population, and declaring that these were "already fairly well known to naval intelligence" and could be quickly apprehended, if necessary. The suppressed reports' conclusion: "The entire Japanese problem has been magnified out of its true proportion, largely because of the physical characteristics of the people (and) should be handled on the basis of the individual ... and not on a racial basis." Fahy ignored an assistant attorney general's warning that not advising the court of this report would constitute "suppression of evidence." Furthermore, DeWitt justified internment because "the interception of unauthorized radio communications" emanating from along the coast "conclusively" accounted for Japanese submarine attacks on U.S. ships. The FBI, however, reported "no information" of "any espionage activity ashore or ... illicit shore-to-ship signaling." The Federal Communications Commission investigated "hundreds" of reports of suspicious radio communications but found nothing to confirm DeWitt's accusations. Yet Fahy in his oral argument assured the court he could guarantee the veracity of "every line, every word, and every syllable" of DeWitt's report, and that "no person in any responsible position has ever taken a contrary position." The Korematsu decision reflected perennial dangers: panic, and excessive deference, judicial and other, to presidents or others who would suspend constitutional protections in the name of wartime exigencies. It is less important that the decision be repudiated than that it be remembered. Especially by those currently clamoring, since Boston, for an American citizen - arrested in America, and concerning whom there is no evidence of a connection with al-Qaeda, the Taliban or other terror network – to be detained by the military as an "enemy combatant." The Korematsu case is a reminder that waiving constitutional rights is rarely necessary and rarely ends well.

A Nation with Clipped Wings

cross-the-board federal spending cuts - "sequestration" - have started to impinge on air transportation. Furloughs to Federal Aviation Administration air-traffic controllers, which the Obama administration says are legally unavoidable, began Sunday, causing flight delays. On Monday, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., announced that the relatively

modest impact so far is just the "first taste of the pain of sequestration."

Mr. Reid's remark was part of a Democratic effort to highlight sequestration-related travail and blame it on Republicans, who refused any budget deal with President Obama that would have increased revenue. The Democrats are right that sequestration is counterproductive and that Republicans could have helped avoid it.

Actually, if the air-traffic furloughs pose both a big inconvenience and a short-term danger to the U.S. economy - and they do - it would be irresponsible to let them go on until an unlikely grand bargain is struck, or even to use them as political leverage to achieve one. Mr. Reid is not a powerless bystander; he should work with the White House and Republicans to help the FAA offset the furloughs, which account for \$160 million of the \$637 million FAA sequester. That's not small change, but surely it could be scrounged out of the Transportation Department's \$70 billion budget, given appropriate legislation.

eBay, you probably received a scary email this week. The Senate is threatening small businesses, it warned. Complain to your legislators, it pleaded.

Actually, it isn't, and you shouldn't.

Senators appear ready to deflect the pressure. On Monday they advanced a bill that would allow states to collect sales tax from out-of-state online vendors. This will level the playing field for stores that have a physical presence, which are already charging tax on all local purchases. That is fair for retailers, good for state budgets and even beneficial for condo as early as Wednesday.

Maybe brick-and-mortar stores will become obsolete. Maybe they will continue to serve a need, even in the age of Amazon. Government shouldn't decide by unfairly favoring one outcome over the other. Treat all retailers the same way and let consumers decide. At the moment, the government is pushing consumers toward Internet retailers by failing to collect sales tax on many online transactions – an unprincipled, \$11 billion annual tax giveaway.

You wouldn't design policy this way. The current system is the result of a decades-old Supreme Court decision that put

erential tax treatment.

Anti-tax advocates, meanwhile, object to more tax revenue being collected anywhere, despite the fact that the Senate's proposal would merely allow states to apply existing policy universally. The online sales tax loophole perverts states' tax policies at the cost of revenue that all 50 of them need. Both Maryland and Virginia, for example, have built transportation plans on the expectation that Congress will act at long last.

Congress shouldn't keep them waiting. The Senate should pass its bill, and the House should promptly follow.



will be scheduled within 30 days. A hearing officer will then make a decision about the case.

Magic Valley Presence

Heath Sommer, chief executive officer of Seasons of Hope, said the Twin Falls clinic was growing rapidly and the Burley clinic just opened a couple months ago.

Employees were being shared between the two of-fices, he said.

Seasons of Hope was planning to eventually open more offices in rural areas of the Magic Valley and Wood River Valley, including Oakley and Hailey, Sommer said.

Seasons of Hope employed about 100 people in Idaho and the company had to lay off "virtually everyone," Sommer said.

A few people are still left doing administrative and legal work, he said. A couple of psychologists are still employed by the organization.

Sommer said there's a Seasons of Hope psychologist who is still seeing non-Medicaid patients in Twin Falls.

How are Patients Affected?

In an April 8 statement, Sommer wrote that letters and emails went out to patients about Seasons of Hope.

"We made specific refer-

rals to providers in your area we believe can appropriately assume your treatment needs," he wrote. A sign on the door of the

Twin Falls office, located on Polk Street, says the clinic is only open by appointment.

Bibiana Nertney, spokeswoman for Community Partnerships of Idaho, Nertney said they're open to talking with any former Seasons of Hope patients, but the agency doesn't provide all the same services – such as psychosocial rehabilitation — as Seasons of Hope, she said.

Community Partnerships of Idaho – which has a Twin Falls office – provides services for children, teens and adults with developmental disabilities and mental illnesses.

"If families find themselves not knowing what to do, we're here to help or point them in the right direction," she said.

Idaho's Medicaid Providers

Idaho's Medicaid program is a federal and state partnership. Most medical claims are paid with 70 percent federal funds and 30 percent state funds.

Shanahan said there are more than 30,000 Medicaid providers statewide.

Certified Medicaid providers go through an inspection once a year by the state's Medicaid credentialing unit.

IDHW reviewed some of the mental health clinic, psychosocial rehabilitative and developmental disability services billed by Seasons of Hope from Jan. 1, 2010 to Jan. 31, 2013. Shanahan said 27 patient records were randomly pulled at Seasons of Hope. Of those, 15 had missing, invalid or expired treatment

plans. Shanahan said the Medicaid credentialing unit notified fraud investigators about the findings in June 2012.

Fraud analysts sat down with Sommer in January to go over the allegations, Shanahan said, but a lot of practices continued at Seasons of Hope after that conversation.

Federal law required the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare to take immediate action at that point, he said.

Sommer said Seasons of Hope received a visit 18 months ago from the Idaho Department of Heath and Welfare.

He said representatives came back in January and asked questions, but didn't say much about findings.

Sommer alleges that ID-HW promised him Seasons of Hope would have time to respond to allegations before formal action was taken, but that didn't happen.

"It has been devastating," he said, adding that he believes it's a violation of due process.

Sommer — who used to work for Idaho Department of Health and Welfare said the agency has the right to investigate Seasons of Hope, but needed to provide time to respond to allegations.

He said there have never been formal findings of past impropriety against Seasons of Hope.

Plea Deal Struck Before Analco-Gutierrez Trial

Lewd conduct, assault charge dismissed.

BURLEY • Nineteen-yearold Mauro Alberto Analco-Gutierrez pleaded guilty to misdemeanor loitering under a plea agreement before opening statements were made at a jury trial in Cassia County Fifth District Court on Wednesday.

The agreement dismisses one charge of lewd conduct with a child under 16, one count of battery with the intent to commit a serious felony and one count of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. One count of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon will be amended to a misdemeanor loitering

Analco- tering Gutierrez charge, according to

Analco-Gutierrez's attorney.

"He spent four months in jail, missed a semester of school and missed out on going to a national FFA competition," attorney Lisa Barini-Garcia said.

Analco-Gutierrez will be sentenced on the misdemeanor charge in Cassia County 5th District Magistrate Court. A date has not been set. Barini-Garcia said her client faces a maximum penalty of \$300 and six months in jail on the charge.

"My belief is the complaining witness was unreliable," said Barini-Garcia about the dismissal of the felony charges. Barini-Garcia said there were also issues concerning "cohort" witnesses.

The witness was 13 when she alleged Analco-Gutierrez restrained and sexually assaulted her in his vehicle.

"We ran into some evidentiary issues and felt like we couldn't carry the burden of proof, but we felt like she was being truthful," said Al Barrus, Cassia County prosecutor.

Provo City Council OKs Google Fiber Proposal

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Provo's high-speed Internet and television service provided by Google Fiber has moved closer to being a done deal, but it's going to cost the city more than initially announced.

The Provo's City Council voted unanimously Tuesday night to approve the sale of the city's nearly decadeold fiber-optic network to Google Inc., which will pay \$1 to take over a system that cost \$39 million to build.

Both sides need to sign off on the contract before it becomes final, said Google Fiber spokeswoman Jenna Wandres. The Mountain View, Calif., company has 180 days to take over the network after the city council approval.

Google Fiber officials announced they had chosen Provo last week, making it the third city in addition to

Kansas City, Mo., and Austin, Texas.

Provo residents will get basic Internet service at no charge if they pay a \$30 hookup fee, and they can get a much faster, gigabit connection for a yet-to-bedetermined monthly fee that will likely be close to the \$70 charged in Kansas City.

Provo officials revealed Tuesday that it will cost the city an estimated \$1.7 million to get the system built in 2004 ready for the handover. The money will come from an existing fund that had been set aside to upgrade the system eventually, said Provo deputy mayor Corey Norman. That means it will require no new money from taxpayers in the city of 115,000 about 45 miles south of Salt Lake City.

Norman compared the investment to money a

"All the information that was given to us turned out to be fraudulent," he said.

The call was closed at 6:26 p.m., said Twin Falls city spokesman Joshua Palmer.

Palmer said 12 Twin Falls police units responded to the call, and another was used traffic control. Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman Lori Stewart said one deputy responded to help with traffic control.

Sgt. Michael Wendler with the Idaho State Police said at least three ISP officers, including himself, responded to the call. Wendler said two officers were on the call for about 45 minutes and another assisted for about 90 minutes.

Officers broke off to different duties throughout the call to spread their resources in a situation that kept jumping around.

Wendler said he was glad there was no actual shooting but officers spent valuable time on the call that could have been used helping other people.

"We were fortunate that it happened when we had additional officers coming in for night shift," Hicks said. "But when those type of things happen, you never have enough officers."

Officers were following leads at several locations, and because of the nature of the call, more than one offi-

cer went to each location, Hicks said.

With so many officers out looking for a potential shooter and victim, Hicks said, other people who are calling 911 may have had a delay in police response.

Police detectives are working to subpoena the relay company that was assisting dispatchers for information on where the call came from, Hicks said. Once detectives get that information, they hope to be able to track down the caller and press charges.

Hicks said the caller could be charged with making a fraudulent 911 call, interfering with police or filing a false report. Hicks said police could pursue civil charges to recoup the cost of police resources.

Guilty to Killing Wite

SANDPOINT • A Northern Idaho man accused of killing his wife and unborn daughter last December has pleaded guilty to two counts of first-degree murder.

The Bonner County Daily Bee reports 27year-old Jeremy Keith Swanson entered his pleas Tuesday as part of a plea agreement. Prosecutors allege Swanson stabbed his wife Jennifer Marie Bosch-Swanson repeatedly in the head and torso with an ice pick and a knife on Dec. 18.

In exchange for his pleas, Bonner County Prosecutor Louis Marshall said he will not seek the death penalty for Swanson, who will be sentenced in June.

Marshall said he will instead recommend life in prison without parole because Swanson had no prior criminal history, has potential mental health issues and the victim's family did not want to see him executed.

Idaho: No Plan to **Shift Part-timers to Insurance Exchange**

BOISE (AP) • Idaho govern-ment officials haven't discussed mimicking Washington lawmakers who are considering shifting part-time state employees who work less than 30 hours a week to insurance exchanges.

The Legislature in Idaho just passed the exchange only a month ago, and Department of Insurance Director Bill Deal says all his efforts are directed at making sure it's running by Jan. 1, 2014.

Deal wasn't aware of neighboring Washington's proposal when asked about it Tuesday.

"We don't have the luxury" of considering extras, Deal told The Associated Press. Washington state "has been working on their exchange for 2 1/2 years."

Washington's legislature in 2011 created its exchange, the online marketplace where the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act foresees individuals and small busishopping nesses for insurance.

Idaho had the first meeting of its 19-member exchange board this week and is only just in the process of hiring an executive director, Amy Dowd, a consultant from Oregon who previously worked in Idaho on its exchange plan.

Tammy Perkins, an aide to Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter on health care issues, confirmed that Washington's proposal isn't on the table in Idaho, at least for now.

The Washington Legislature is exploring a plan to capitalize on provisions of President Barack Obama's health care law that could allow part-timers to be covered through an exchange.

Some predict \$120 million savings for the state government over two years.

But the switch could strain the federal budget that would have to subsidize many of the part-timers premiums

and potentially force state employees to pay more for insurance than they do now.

In a move in 2009 that was disputed by state employees, Idaho began requiring parttime workers – those who work between 20 hours and 29.9 hours weekly – to pay more for their state-sponsored insurance plans.

Some of the then-1,007 part-time workers saw their monthly premiums quadruple as part of the move that saved Idaho about \$2.7 million annually.

But Idaho continues to pay a portion of premiums for part-time workers.

For the current fiscal year, for instance, the state pays \$285 per pay period for parttime employee medical insurance premiums, as opposed to about \$360 per pay period for full-time employees, said Department of Administration Director Teresa Luna.

As a consequence, moving part-timers to the exchange could save Idaho money, if the state ended or reduced its share and shifted costs to the federal government, in the form of potential premium subsidies that policy holders would receive based upon their income.

But Luna says such a shift isn't in the cards. "This is not a discussion that we have had," she said.

Washington's proposal comes as other states are also navigating how to insure their part-time government workers, since the federal law requires employers to provide coverage for those working at least 30 hours.

Virginia aims to skirt penalties by requiring all part-time employees to work fewer than 30 hours. Florida, facing a potential \$300 million penalty for not covering workers who have 30 to 39 hours a week, aims to extend coverage to those employees.

BOISE (AP) • An Idaho alternative energy company beset by lawsuits faces another one, this time from a bike race that says it hasn't been paid millions in promised sponsorship money.

Exergy Development Group of Boise and its owner, James Carkulis, were sued in Colorado by Classic Bicycle Racing, owner of Colorado's USA Pro Challenge race.

John Moore, Classic's

general counsel, said Wednesday company owners were forced to make additional capital contributions when Exergy failed to meet its contractual obligations.

Carkulis is accused of fraud, too, for allegedly misrepresenting his ability to pay.

developments, surrendered control of a Minnesota wind farm and was sued for reneging on a Pennsylvania turbine deal.

Amid these woes, Exergy jettisoned its men's cycling team and canceled the nowdefunct Exergy Tour women's race in Idaho.

Clashes Suggest Sunni Anger Boiling in Iraq

BAGHDAD (AP) • With Sunni gunmen beginning to confront the Shiite-led government's security forces head-on in northern and western Iraq, fears are growing fast of a return to fullscale sectarian fighting that could plunge the country into a broader battle merged with the Syrian civil war across the border.


With more than 100 people killed over the past two days, it's shaping up to be the most pivotal moment for Iraq since U.S. combat troops withdrew in December 2011.

"Everybody has the feeling that Iraq is becoming a new Syria," Talal Younis, the 55year-old owner of a currency exchange in the northern city of Mosul, said Wednesday. "We are heading into the unknown....I think that civil war is making a comeback."

A crackdown by government forces at a protest site in the northern town of Hawija on Tuesday triggered the latest unrest. It has enraged much of the country's restive Sunni Arab minority, adding fuel to an already smoldering opposition movement and spawning a wave of bold follow-up clashes. It is too soon to say whether the rage will lead to widespread insurrection in the largely Sunni cities of Mosul and Ramadi or, more significantly, spiral into open sectarian warfare in the streets of Baghdad.

The Iraqi capital is far more tightly controlled by security forces than the remote towns hit by the latest unrest, but insurgents continue to launch regular, wellcoordinated waves of attacks inside Baghdad. Outright threats that all but disappeared as the last bout of sectarian fighting waned in 2008 are making a comeback too, like the leaflets signed by a Shiite militant group that began turning up on the doorsteps of Sunni households in Baghdad earlier this vear

MEN'S YEARS-LONG FEUD LOOMS OVER **RICIN LETTER PROBE**

OXFORD, Miss. (AP) • The investigation into poisoned letters mailed to President Barack Obama and others has shifted from an Elvis impersonator to his longtime foe, and authorities must now figure out if an online feud between the two men might have escalated into something more sinister.

Paul Kevin Curtis, 45, was released from a north Mississippi jail on Tuesday and charges against him were dropped, nearly a week after authorities charged him with sending ricin-laced letters to the president, Republican U.S. Sen. Roger Wicker of Mississippi and an 80-year-old Lee County, Miss., Justice Court judge, Sadie Holland.

Before Curtis left jail, authorities had already descended on the home of 41-year-old Everett Dutschke in Tupelo, a northeast Mississippi town best known as the birthplace of the King himself. On Wednesday, they searched the site of a Tupelo martial arts studio once operated by Dutschke, who hasn't been arrested or charged.

His attorney, Lori Nail Basham, said Dutschke is "cooperating fully" with investigators and that no arrest warrant had been issued. Curtis, who performs as Elvis and other celebrities, describes a bizarre, yearslong feud between the two, but Dutschke insists he had nothing to do with the letters. They contained language identical to that found on Curtis' Facebook page and other websites, making him an early suspect.

Federal authorities have not said what led them to drop the charges against Curtis, and his lawyers say they're not sure what new evidence the FBI has found.

After being released from jail Tuesday, Curtis described a long feud between himself and Dutschke, but said he's not sure exactly what started it. It involves the men's time working together, a broken promise to help with a book by Curtis and an acrimonious exchange of emails, according to Curtis.

Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, 19, was listed in fair condition as he recovered from wounds suffered during a getaway at tempt. He could get the death penalty if convicted of plotting with his older brother, now dead, to set off the pressure-cooker bombs that killed three people and wounded more than 260 on April 15. Tamerlan Tsarnaev, 26, died in a shootout with police.

The bombs were detonated by remote control, according to U.S. officials close to the investigation who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss it publicly. It was not clear what the detonation device was, but the charges against Dzhokhar say he was using a cellphone moments before the blasts. U.S. officials also said Dzhokhar has told interrogators he and his brother were angry about the U.S. wars in Muslim Afghanistan and Iraq.

After closed-door briefings on Capitol Hill with the FBI and other law enforcement officials, lawmakers said earlier this week that it appeared so far that the brothers were radicalized via the Internet instead of by direct contact with any terrorist groups, and that the older brother was the driving force in the bomb plot.

In Russia, U.S. investigators traveled to the predominantly Muslim province of Dagestan and were in contact with the brothers' parents, hoping to gain more information. The parents, Anzor Tsarnaev and Zubeidat Tsarnaeva, plan to fly to the U.S. on Thursday, the father was quoted as telling the Russian state news agency RIA Novosti. The family has said it wants to bring Tamerlan's body back to Russia.

Investigators are looking into whether Tamerlan, who spent six months in Russia's turbulent Caucasus region in 2012,



was influenced by the religious extremists who have waged an insurgency against Russian forces in the area for years. The brothers have roots in Dagestan and neighboring Chechnya, but had lived in the U.S. for about a decade.

At the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, bagpipes wailed as students, faculty and staff members and throngs of law enforcement officials paid their respects to MIT police officer Sean Collier, who was ambushed in his cruiser three days after the bombing. The line of

mourners stretched for a half-mile. They had to make their way through tight security,

including metal detectors and bombsniffing dogs.

Boston native James Taylor sang "The Water is Wide" and led a sing-along of "Shower the People." Biden told the Collier family that no child should die before his or her parents, but that, in time, the grief will lose some of its sting.

"The moment will come when the memory of Sean is triggered and you know it's going to be OK," Biden said. "When the first instinct is to get a smile on your lips before a tear to your eye."

Laura Bush Helps Influence Texas-themed Library


DALLAS (AP) • Laura Bush wanted to make sure her husband's presidential center reflected their Texas roots, and it does – right down to the building's limestone base from the Midland area, where they both grew up and lived after they were married.

The former first lady led the design committee for the 226,000-square-foot George W. Bush Presidential Center, which houses the 43rd president's library, museum and policy institute. The center, which opens to the public May 1, will be dedicated Thursday at Laura Bush's alma mater of Southern Methodist University, not far from the couple's Dallas home.

"I wanted it to have the Texas feel that this building does because that's where we're from," Laura Bush told The Associated Press in a phone interview last week. "I also wanted the building to be modern-looking, to be forward-looking because George was president during the very first decade of our new century."

The building includes red brick to blend in to SMU's Georgian architecture. There's also a 67-foot-high, "lantern" made of limestone that serves as a focal point for the center and pays tribute to the domed Dallas Hall on the campus.

The Bush center features woodwork from Texas tees, including mesquite hardwood floors and pecan paneling. And the center's 15-acre urban park recreates a Texas prairie complete with a wildflower meadow, a new blend of native grasses and even trees transplanted from the Crawford ranch.



The former president says his wife's touch can be seen throughout the property, even in picking the building and landscape architects.

"The building is spectacular and the gardens are going to be great, and she gets a lot of credit for that," George W. Bush told The Associated Press last week. "I was on the sideline — watching, of course, but deferring to her judgment and tastes."

It was announced this month that the building had gotten the highest certification – platinum – from the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) program. In addition to getting many materials from within 500 miles of the site, other eco-friendly features include green roofs in three different areas and a cistern that will gather rainwater and provide half of the site's irrigation.

Architect Robert A.M. Stern says the former first lady influenced the design throughout the project.

HACKERS COMPROMISE AP TWITTER ACCOUNT

NEW YORK (AP) • Hackers compromised Twitter accounts of The Associated Press on Tuesday, sending out a false tweet about an attack at the White House.

The false tweet said there had been two explosions at the White House and that President Barack Obama was injured. The attack on AP's Twitter account and the AP Mobile Twitter account was preceded by phishing attempts on AP's corporate network.

The AP confirmed that its Twitter account had been suspended following a hack and said it was working to correct the issue.

The false tweet went out shortly after 1 p.m. and briefly sent the Dow Jones industrial average sharply lower. The Dow fell 143 points, from 14,697 to 14,554, after the fake Twitter posting, and then quickly recovered.

A Securities and Exchange Commission spokeswoman declined comment on the incident.

AP spokesman Paul Colford said the news cooperative is working with Twitter to investigate the issue. The AP has disabled its other Twitter accounts following the attack, Colford added.

The Syrian Electronic Army claimed responsibility for the hack. This couldn't be corroborated.

The FBI has opened an investigation into the incident, spokeswoman Jenny Shearer said. She declined to elaborate. The SEA has taken credit for a string of Web attacks on media targets it sees as sympathetic to Syria's rebels. Among the targets the group claims to have hacked are Twitter feeds of Al-Jazeera English and the BBC.

White House spokesman Jay Carney said the president was fine. "I was just with him," Carney said at a news briefing.

Twitter had no comment.

Collapsed Factory Building in Bangladesh Kills 87

SAVAR, Bangladesh (AP) • Rescuers tried to free dozens of people believed trapped in the concrete rubble after an eight-story building that housed garment factories collapsed, killing at least 87. Workers had complained about cracks in the structure before it came tumbling down, but were assured it was safe.

Searchers cut holes in the jumbled mess of concrete with drills or their bare hands, passing water and flashlights to those pinned inside the building near Bangladesh's capital of Dhaka. Bangladeshi soldiers use an earthmover during a rescue operation at the site of a building that collapsed in Savar on Wednesday.



The Children's Place, said that "while one of the garment factories located in the building complex has produced apparel for The Children's Place, none of our product was in production at the time of this accident."

"Our deepest sympathies go out to the victims of this terrible tragedy and their families," Singer said in a statement.

Dress Barn said that to its knowledge, it had "not purchased any clothing from that facility since 2010. We work with suppliers around the

"I gave them whistles, water, torchlights. I heard them cry. We can't leave them behind this way," said fire official Abul Khayer. Rescue operations illuminated by floodlights continued through the night.

The disaster came less than five months after a factory fire killed 112 people and underscored the unsafe conditions in Bangladesh's massive garment industry.

Workers said they had hesitated to go to into the building on Wednesday morning because it had developed such large cracks a day earlier that it even drew the attention of local news channels.

Abdur Rahim, who worked on the

fifth floor, said a factory manager gave assurances that there was no problem, so employees went inside.

"After about an hour or so, the building collapsed suddenly," Rahim said. He next remembered regaining consciousness outside. On a visit to the site, Home Minister Muhiuddin Khan Alamgir told reporters the building had violated construction codes and "the culprits would be punished."

Among the textile businesses in the building were Phantom Appar-

els Ltd., New Wave Style Ltd., New Wave Bottoms Ltd. and New Wave Brothers Ltd., which make clothing for major brands including The Children's Place, Dress Barn, and Primark.

Jane Singer, a spokeswoman for

world to manufacture our clothing, and have a supply chain transparency program to protect the rights of workers and their safety."

Primark, a major British clothing retailer, confirmed that one of the suppliers it uses to produce some of its goods was located on the second floor of the building.

In a statement emailed to The Associated Press, Primark said it was "shocked and deeply saddened by the appalling incident." It added that it has been working with other retailers to review the country's approach to factory standards and will now push for this review to include building integrity.

Under Criticism, GOP Puts Off Its Health Care Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) • An effort by House Republicans to highlight problems with President Barack Obama's health care law by bailing out a program for people with pre-existing medical conditions appeared to backfire Wednesday.

GOP leaders postponed a scheduled vote after the measure met strong opposition from two directions: from conservative groups resistant to any federal role in health care and from Democrats who objected that the Republicans planned to pay for the high-risk patient program by raiding a disease prevention provision the administration says is essential to the overhaul.


The legislation, a departure from the usual GOP efforts to kill the Affordable Health Care Act outright, also faced a White House veto threat.

Erica Elliott, spokeswoman for Republican Whip Kevin McCarthy of California, said in a statement, "We had good conversations with our members and made a lot of solid progress" on the bill. But she said there was "still work to do," and "we'll continue the conversations" when the House returns in May after a recess next week.

The GOP bill would provide up to \$3.6 billion to shore up the Pre-existing Condition Insurance Plan, or PCIP, which is intended to be a stopgap measure for uninsured high-risk patients until the end of this year, when full consumer protections under the health care act go into effect.

Under the plan, those who have been uninsured for six months would be subsidized so they could buy insurance at average rates. The original goal was for the plan to reach more than 300,000 before it disappeared at the end of this year, but the program's costs were higher than anticipated and it enrolled slightly more than 100,000 before the administration announced that it would stop taking new applications.

Their bill, said Rep. Michael Burgess, R-Texas, is a "needed piece of relief for the hundreds of thousands of Americans who were prom-

ised by their president that they would be covered under the Affordable Care Act's Pre-existing Condition Insurance Plan and then were told as of Feb. 1 of this year, 'Sorry, we're closed?"

ABORTION PROVIDER WON'T TESTIFY, NOR CALL WITNESSES

PHILADELPHIA (AP) • A Philadelphia abortion provider won't testify or call witnesses at his capital murder trial, leaving jurors to weigh five weeks of prosecution evidence.

Dr. Kermit Gosnell, 72, is charged with killing four babies allegedly born alive at a clinic that authorities have described as filthy. He is also charged in the 2009 overdose death of a 41-year-old refugee who died just months after coming to the U.S. Gosnell's defense rested Wednesday without calling a witness. The jury is expected to hear closing arguments on Monday.

Former employees have testified that Gosnell relied on untrained, unlicensed staff to sedate and monitor women as they waited for abortions. Three workers have pleaded guilty to third-degree murder charges, admitting they helped medicate the adult victim or "snipped" babies' necks after they were born alive to make sure they died.

They told jurors that Gosnell had taught them the technique, and said they trusted that it was legal. At least one, though, admits she grew so concerned about conditions at the clinic that she took pictures of the outdated equipment, messy rooms and stacked specimen jars containing the severed feet of aborted babies.

Gosnell told staff he sometimes kept the samples for DNA purposes in case the pregnancy led to assault charges. Prosecution experts said there were less invasive ways to preserve DNA.

"Once fetuses leave the mother, they are then due the respect that would be given any human being," Assistant District Attorney Ed Cameron argued Tuesday, in support of abuse of corpse charges filed over the severed feet.

Flood-weary Fargo, ND, Lobbies for Permanent Fix

FARGO, N.D. (AP) • Filling and laying sandbags has become a civic rite of spring in Fargo, where the swollen Red River has caused major flooding in three of the past four years.

With the region finally thawing out from another unusually snowy winter and the river again rising, local leaders are using this year's communitywide campaign to build support for a 36-mile canal that would steer the floodwater around Fargo and neighboring Moorhead, Minn., and fix the area's nagging problem once and for all.

But the plan, which has been kicked around for a few years, has drawn strong opposition from upstream farmers, homeowners and businesses, who don't want the diversion channel carving through their communities. They say it's nearly \$2 billion price tag is a waste of money, and North Dakota legislators have balked at committing any of the state's money until the federal government gives the OK and puts in money of its own.

Dennis Walaker, who has spent much of his seven years as Fargo's mayor dealing with the flooding problem, said there's no sense in delaying the project, which would take an estimated 10 years to complete. He said the time and money

spent trying to stave off flooding every year has become "an almost ridiculous process," and that the canal is the only way to protect the Fargo metropolitan area from catastrophic floods like the one in 2009.

"To say that this gets easier," said Walaker, referring to the city's flood fighting prowess, "for some of us it's getting old. We need the diversion to go through."

Fargo dealt with major flooding for three straight years, starting in 2009. The first year was the worst, with the Red River hitting a record high-water mark of nearly 41 feet, or 23 feet

Thousands of people had to leave home for higher ground and about 100 homes were badly damaged or rendered unlivable. The 2010 flood was the seventh-highest on record and the 2011 flood was the fourth-

This year's peak is expected to reach at least 38 feet, which would make it the fifth-highest flood in history. When city and county leaders christened the opening of Sandbag Central earlier this month, Cass County Commission Chairman Vern Bennett compared the annual flood fight to a sporting event.

again against a very dangerous team, whose members are called Red, Wild, Maple, Rush and Sheyenne," he said, rattling off names of area rivers to volunteers who would go on to fill a million sandbags in eight days. "We're ready, but this does not

guarantee a win. In order to guarantee a win, we need to have permanent flood protection."

Twenty miles south, which is upstream on the north-flowing Red River, Mike Bice proudly displays a sign outside of his popular bar as a counter to what he sees the "giant pep rally" being held downstream to build support for the project. It reads, "CELEBRATING 41 YEARS WITH NO FARGO DAM," referring to the project by the derisive nickname opponents have given it.

A Risk Including Gay Partners in Immigration Bill?

WASHINGTON (AP) • Frustrated at being left out of an immigration overhaul, gay rights groups are pushing to adjust a bipartisan Senate bill to include gay couples. But Democrats are treading carefully, wary of adding another divisive issue that could lose Republican support and jeopardize the entire bill.


Both parties want the bill to succeed. Merely getting to agreement on the basic framework for the immigration overhaul, which would create a long and costly path to citizenship for the estimated 11 million people in the U.S. illegally, was no small feat for senators. And getting it through a divided Congress is still far from a done deal.

Even so, gay rights groups, their lobbyists and grass-roots supporters are insisting the deal

Supporters trekked to the Capitol to make their case at senators' offices on Wednesday.

"Opponents will be proposing amendments that, if passed, could collapse this very fragile coalition that we've been able to achieve," Sen. John McCain, an Arizona Republican, said last week at the unveiling of the bill. He said the eight senators from both parties who crafted the legislation are committed to voting against changes that could kill it.

For Democrats, it's a precarious position to be in. Democratic senators overwhelmingly support gay marriage - all but three are now on the record voicing their support - and two dozen of them this year backed a separate bill called the Uniting American Families Act to let gays sponsor their partners independent of a comprehensive immigration overhaul. But the party's senators are still bruised from an agonizing defeat on gun control this month. And few seem eager to inject divisive issues that might sink their best prospects for a major legislative victory this year and a potential keystone of President Barack Obama's legacy.

MINARET OF FAMED MOSQU IN ALEPPO, SYRIA, DESTROY

BEIRUT (AP) • The 11th-century minaret of a famed mosque that towered over the narrow stone alleyways of Aleppo's old quarter collapsed Wednesday as rebels and government troops fought pitched battles in the streets around it, depriving the ancient Syrian city of one of its most important landmarks.

President Bashar Assad's government and the rebels trying to overthrow him traded blame over the destruction to the Umayyad Mosque, a UNESCO world heritage site and centerpiece of Aleppo's walled Old City.

"This is like blowing up the Taj Mahal or destroying the Acropolis in Athens. This mosque is a living sanctuary," said Helga Seeden, a professor of archaeology at the American University of Beirut. "This is a disaster. In terms of heritage, this is the worst I've seen in Syria. I'm horrified."

Aleppo, Syria's largest city and a commercial hub, emerged as a key battleground in the nation's civil war after rebels launched an offensive there last summer. Since then, the

fighting has carved the city into rebeland regime-held zones, killed thousands of people, forced thousands more to flee their homes and laid waste to entire neighborhoods.

The Umayyad Mosque complex, which dates mostly from the 12th century, suffered extensive damage in October as both sides fought to control the walled compound in the heart of the old city. The fighting left the mosque burned, scarred by bullets and trashed. Two weeks earlier, the nearby medieval covered market, or souk, was gutted by a fire sparked by fighting.

With thousands of years of written history, Syria is home to archaeological treasures that date back to biblical times, including the desert oasis of Palmyra, a cultural center of the ancient world. The nation's capital, Damascus, is one of the oldest continually inhabited cities in the world.

At least five of Syria's six World Heritage sites have been damaged in the fighting, according to UNESCO, the U.N's cultural agency. Looters have broken into one of the world's bestpreserved Crusader castles, Crac des Chevaliers, and ruins in the ancient city of Palmyra were damaged. Both rebel and regime forces have set up bases in some of Syria's significant historic sites, including citadels and Turkish bath houses, while thieves have stolen artifacts from museums.

The destruction of the minaret which dated to 1090 and was the oldest surviving part of the Umayyad Mosque - brought outrage and grief.

The main Western-backed opposition group, the Syrian National Coalition, accused the government of intentionally committing "a crime against civilization and humanity" by destroying the minaret.

"The regime has done all it can to tear apart the Syrian social fabric," the Coalition said in a statement. "By its killings and destruction of heritage, it is planting bitterness in the hearts of the people that will be difficult to erase for a long time to come."

There were conflicting accounts about what leveled the minaret, leaving the once-soaring stone tower a pile of rubble and twisted metal scattered in the mosque's tiled courtyard.

How Canada Terror Suspect Grew More Radical

TORONTO (AP) • One of two men accused of plotting with al-Qaida members in Iran to derail a train in Canada became radicalized to the point that his father reached out to a Muslim support group for help and advice, a local religious leader said Wednesday.

Muhammad Robert Heft, president of the Paradise Forever Support Group Inc., a nonprofit organization that provides support to Muslims in Canada, said Mohammad Jaser came to him several times citing concerns about the radicalization of his son.

"He came to me about his son saying he how concerned he was getting about the rigidness of his son and his interpretation of Islam. He was becoming selfrighteous, becoming pushy, pushing his views on how much they (his family) should be practicing as a Muslim," said Heft.

Jaser's son, Raed, 35, has been charged along with Chiheb Esseghaier, 30 with conspiring to carry out an attack and murder people in association with a terrorist group in their plot to derail a train that runs between New York City and Montreal. Canadian investigators say the men received guidance from members of al-Qaida in Iran. Iranian government officials have

said the government had nothing to do with the plot.

"His son was becoming overzealous and intolerant in his understanding of the religion," Heft said. "Those are the telltale signs that can lead into the radicalization process."

The discussions took place between 2010 and 2011, while the father was renting a basement apartment in Heft's home in Markham, Ontario.

Elephant Bird Egg Gets \$101,813 at UKAuction

LONDON (AP) • A massive, partly fossilized egg laid by a now-extinct elephant bird has sold for more than double its estimate at a London auction. Christie's auction house said Wednesday that the foot-long, nearly nine-inches in diameter egg fetched 66,675 pounds (\$101,813).

It had been valued at 20,000 to 30,000 pounds pre-sale, and was sold to an anonymous buyer over the telephone after about 10 minutes of competitive bidding.

Elephant birds were wiped out several hundred years ago. The oversized ovum, laid on the island of Madagascar, is believed to date back before the 17th century.

Flightless, fruit-gobbling elephant birds resembled giant ostriches and could grow to be 11 feet high. Christie's says their eggs are 100 times the size of an average chicken's.

Boeing Sees Early-May Restart of 787 Deliveries

Boeing reported a better-than-expected first-quarter profit even as it scrambled to fix its grounded 787.

The company said on Wednesday that deliveries of the 787 should resume in early May. Most of the 50 planes that have been delivered to airlines will be fixed by the middle of the month, Chairman and CEO Jim McNerney said on the company's quarterly earnings conference call.

Resuming deliveries and passenger flights would cap a notable turnaround for Boeing. The three-month grounding over battery problems frustrated airlines and turned a spotlight onto the way commercial planes are designed and regulated. Putting the problem behind it will let Boeing focus on building new versions of its best-selling 737 and 777.

Air safety authorities around the world grounded 787s after two different planes suffered from smoldering batteries – one of them including a fire, one of them in-flight - in January. The Federal Aviation Administration has approved Boeing's redesigned batterv system, which the company says should sharply reduce the risk of a fire.

Once the FAA approves the fix on individual planes, airlines can start flying them again. United Airlines, the only U.S. airline with the planes, moved one of its six 787s to a Boeing facility in San Antonio, Texas, on Tuesday so it can get the battery fix. Neither of the battery incidents involved a United jet.

The new battery system includes extrainsulation between the battery's individual cells, a box designed to contain any fire and changes that Boeing says will extinguish any fire almost instant ly. The fix should keep any battery problems "from affecting the airplane

or even being noticed by passengers," McNerney said.

The new battery setup has been installed on 10 787s that belong to airlines, and on nine more that have been built but not delivered, he said. Each installation takes about five days.

Boeing wouldn't say how much the 787 issue has cost. Much of the expense was soaked up by its research and development budget, Chief Financial Officer Greg Smith said. Boeing's net income rose 20 percent in the quarter to \$1.11 billion, or \$1.44 per share. Excluding pension-related charges, Boeing would have earned \$1.73 per share, well above analyst expectations.

The 787 troubles showed up in other places besides Boeing's bottom line. Revenue fell 3 percent to \$18.89 billion in part because Boeing delivered just one 787 before the grounding. Airlines make their final payment for the plane when it's delivered

Enrico Letta Appointed Italian Premier-designate

ROME (AP) • Italy's president appointed Enrico Letta as premier-designate Wednesday, asking him to form a coalition government representing Italy's main parties to end two months of political paralysis and put the country back on the path of reform and growth.

Letta, a 46-year-old longtime center-left lawmaker and No. 2 Democratic Party leader, said he accepted the job knowing it's an enormous responsibility and that Italy's political class "has lost all credibility."

President Giorgio Napolitano charged Letta with putting together a coalition government of the Democratic Party and the center-right party of Premier Silvio Berlusconi, the two biggest blocks in Parliament, and said he had received assurances that both would support Letta. "It is the only possible solution," Napolitano said, calling Letta the figure who could rally "a broad convergence of the political forces."

TWIN FALLS TEEN WINS NATIONAL

KIMBERLY • Wyatt Brown has a very specific shot plan.

With his left arm by his side, thumb in his belt loop, Wyatt took a deep breath. Standing in the basement of his Kimberly home on April 20, Wyatt raised his right arm, air pistol in hand, above the target and then lowered to the center.

He exhaled and fired.

The automatic target retrieval system fetched the paper target, with a small

hole formed in the center.

On April 4, Wyatt retained his place on the USA Shooting Junior National Team for a second time by winning the Men's 10m Air Pistol at the 2013 Junior Olympic National Shooting Championship in Colorado Springs, Colo. Wyatt, a senior at Twin Falls High

School, won the two-day event with a 12.9-point advantage over his challenger in the final, according to a press release.

Wyatt said there are currently 17 members on the pistol national junior team.

With his spot earned just a few weeks ago, Wyatt is already thinking about his next goals. One is to secure a spot on the USA Shooting National Team alongside his older brother Will, a resident athlete at the Colorado Springs Olympic Training Center.

His ultimate goal? To compete in the 2016 Olympics in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. But before then, Wyatt has

Silver Creek Restoration Still Waiting on State Approval

PICABO • Progress on proposed Silver Creek restoration is stalled as state officials consider approving the permits needed to move the project forward.

The Nature Conservancy and the Purdy family's Picabo Livestock Co. – two adjacent landowners - propose restoring a stretch of Silver Creek by removing sediment buildup, forming wetlands, altering a dam and reducing water temperatures.

The estimated \$1 million project already has approval from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Howev-

er, Blaine County commissioners are holding off from approving the needed permits until they hear back from the state, said Commissioner Larry Schoen.

The Idaho Department of Water Resources is the last state agency that needs to give its decision on the permit applications before Blaine County can decide what it will do, Schoen said.

"We don't make final decisions in these types of applications without hearing back from everyone," he said

Currently, the state is reviewing public comments and analyzing the impacts of the project, said

Aaron Golart, state coordinator for IDWR's stream protection program.

While the department has approved smaller restoration projects in Silver Creak in the past, this project demands more time because of its scale and complexity, Golart said Tuesday.

"One common thing I'm hearing is that visitors have a large surface area for recreation at this point," he said. "By narrowing and deepening would that then reduce the surface area available to recreate? I think that's a valid concern, and it's one of many we're going over."

Golart said he expects to make a

decision before fall but hopes to do so sooner.

On March 19, the county held a public hearing on the project. The packed hearing attracted backers and critics. Schoen said IDWR's response will determine whether the county will need to hold another public hearing.

For now, The Nature Conservancy and others involved in the Silver Creek restoration project are hoping to hear an answer from the state and county soon, said Dayna Gross, preserve manager with the conservation organization.

The organization received mostly positive comments from the March 19 hearing, Gross said. However, the project designs were tweaked slightly to meet some of the suggestions submitted in comments.

For example, some of the comments urged The Nature Conservancy to keep the "S" curve near the upper pond open for people who like to float, Gross said.

The Nature Conservancy would like to get the permits approved sooner rather than later because it would like to start the project in early fall this year, Gross said.


"We are still finalizing designs, but we need to start getting contractors on site so we can start getting bids," she said.

The 170-page, spiralbound guide includes information from previous editions of a guide to "Idaho Range Plants," but it's the first edition to be printed in color. That makes a big difference when you're trying to identify flowering plants.

The book provides a detailed guide to identifying 69 plant species frequently seen throughout the state.

Produced by the University of Idaho Rangeland Center and the Idaho Rangeland Resource Commission, the seventh edition was a collaborative project involving UI students, faculty, alumni and friends of the UI Rangeland Center. Proceeds from the book will go to the UI Rangeland Center student internship program.

Common Experience Does Not Inform Our View of Distant Cosmos

he farther away something is, the smaller it looks, obviously. A galaxy twice as far away should look half as wide. But at the largest distances, it just isn't so.

The evidence that the universe has been expanding since its fiery birth 13.8 billion years ago is straight forward: The farther away a galaxy is, the faster it recedes from us. (Like a loaf of raisin bread, the farther raisins are from each other, the faster they move apart as the loaf rises.) Because light - although fantastically fast - moves at finite speed, it takes a long time to traverse the universe. The light from a galaxy billions of light years away arrives in our eyes billions of years af-



ter leaving the galaxy, from a time when the universe itself was smaller.

So, the farther away we look, the further back in time we see, and the smaller the universe was when the light started our way. But, because the volume of space appears larger the farther out we look, at great distances structures which were small in the young universe appear magnified.

Thus, while more distant galaxies appear smaller in the near universe (where the effects of cosmic expansion are too small to notice), any galaxy whose light takes 9.8 billion years or more to get here will actually appear larger than an identical, closer galaxy. Yes, in the distant universe, the farther away a galaxy is, the *larger* it looks.

At the greatest observable distance, we look back to a time when the universe was around 1 billion times smaller than it is today. As revealed by the Planck microwave satellite last month, microscopic density and temperature variations in the 380,000-year-old universe now appear writ large across the heavens. **Next column:** The celes-

tial crow.

2013 Big Game Rule Books Are on the Street

JEROME • The 2013 Big Game Seasons and Rules brochures are now being distributed, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said. Find them at license vendors and Fish and Game offices.

• This year, deer hunters will have a new archery controlled hunt in Unit 45, more either-sex controlled hunt tags in Upper Snake Region, and new antlered deer controlled hunts in units 21, 28, 30, 36A and 36B.

• Elk hunters will see a net increase of more than 2,000 controlled hunt tags around the state in response to population increases in some units. A new cap on Bear River Zone B tags means 20 percent fewer tags there this year. A general season A-tag muzzleloader hunt has been added in Pioneer Zone units 36A and 50.

• Two pronghorn youth hunts have been added in units 39 and 54, and the archery hunt in Area 68 has been split into two hunts.

• The Unit 1 archery-only black bear hunt has been converted to any-weapon and will open two weeks earlier. Bear hunters may check out the bear identification training program on the Fish and Game website at http://fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/educa-

tion/bearIdentification/.

• Mountain lion seasons in the Panhandle Region are longer.

• Gray wolf hunting seasons are longer on private land in the Panhandle, and in the Middle Fork, Beaverhead and Island Park wolf management zones, and in that portion of Unit 16 north of the Selway River.

New wolf trapping seasons have been added in parts of units 2, 3, 13, 18, and 22, and trapping seasons in the Salmon and Island Park zones.

A Few Notes on Errors:

• Notes are missing from two elk hunts on page 58. Muzzleloader-only elk hunt 2161 should read antlerless only; and hunt 2164 should read antlered only.

• On Page 11, "What's New?" includes an incorrect date for deer. The last bullet point should read "New October 10 – November 30 controlled buck hunts in units 21, 28, 30, 36A and 36B."

• Hunting passport information on Page 115 is incorrect. It should read: Anyone who has previously held a hunting license in any state is not eligible. Anyone who has completed a hunter safety class but has not held a hunting license is still eligible.

Ask Fish and Game:

Sage Grouse Need Sagebrush, Solitude

New research shows the desert bird prefers undeveloped areas to an extent never understood before. The data could affect plans for power lines and bird protection.

BOISE • A new study led by a U.S. Geological Survey biologist reaches a simple conclusion: Do not disturb the sage grouse.

Steve Knick's work shows that 99 percent of active leks, or breeding sites, are in areas with no more than 3 percent of the land disturbed by humans for uses such as roads, power lines, pipelines and communication towers.

In the lands around the leks that serve as nesting habitat, less than 14 percent showed any development or disturbance.

"We knew, from previously published science, that human activity affected sage grouse, but our results in this new research showed that most leks were even absent from areas that had very low levels of human activity," Knick said.

The results, published in the journal Ecology and Evolution, come as the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is reviewing whether to list the sage grouse as a threatened species. The Bureau of Land Management, which controls 50 percent of the grouse's sagebrush-steppe habitat across the West, is working on a court-ordered plan due by 2015 to protect the bird so it won't have to be listed. A sage grouse listing could restrict development,

energy exploration and ranching across the West from New Mexico to Washington state.

States such as Idaho and Wyoming are working on plans of their own that they hope will replace the BLM plan and still forestall listing. And on Friday, the BLM is expected to release a recommended power line route as part of a final environmental impact statement on the 1,100-mile long Gateway West Transmission Line proposed by utilities to run across southern Idaho and Wyoming.

Knick's team compiled and analyzed map information on three-mile circles around 3,000 active leks within 355,000 square miles of historic sage grouse range.

The conclusion? This is a bird that wants to distance itself from humans and human development. Even in traditional grouse habitat, Knick's research found, construction of new cellphone towers pushed birds out.

"We're talking about a wildland species," said Jack Connelly, a sage grouse expert with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game who was not involved in the study. "This isn't a pheasant or a quail."

Connelly's own research shows that sage grouse nest farther from leks than previously known.

"It's the area around the

leks that provides the critical habitat," Connelly said. "It can extend out miles."

Supports Otter, Undercuts Wyoming

Knick's study reaffirmed the importance of sagebrush to sage grouse. At least 40 percent of the landscape surrounding leks was dominated by sagebrush. All leks were in areas with few junipers or expanses of grassland. Most leks were located in areas with less than a fourth of the land used in farming.

The study did not address grazing, because the diffuse disturbance of moving livestock doesn't lend itself to map analysis.

"Part of the problem with grazing is you don't really map the effects of grazing like you do other disturbances," Knick said.

The study also affirms Idaho Gov. Butch Otter's Sage Grouse Task Force approach to conservation, which focuses the highest levels of protections in key habitats.

"That shouldn't come as too much of a surprise since the governor's plan was largely built on the recommendations of Connelly and others at our Fish and Game Department with input from key stakeholders," said Tom Perry, Otter's chief counsel, who has led his sage grouse task force.

Knick also was consulted by the task force, which is made up of Fish and Game officials and representatives from business, ranching and environmental groups.

The Otter proposal designated millions of acres across southern Idaho as a Sage Grouse Management Area with three zones. In "core habitat," big infrastructure projects would be prohibited, with few exceptions.

"Important habitat" is slightly less restrictive and "general habitat" offers much more flexibility. The plan includes triggers that would require even stronger restrictions.

Knick's research could have a bigger impact on Wyoming's plan. It allows up to 5 percent disturbance in core sage grouse habitat, 2 percent more than what Knick's team says sage grouse will tolerate.

"The purpose here was not to promote one viewpoint or another," Knick said. "What is important to sage grouse is we look at the data so when we do make decisions, we can do it with a scientific foundation."



One-day Fishing License


Question: I am an Idaho resident; can I buy a one-day fishing license and salmon permit?

Answer: No. Residents can buy a one-day fishing license but not a threeday salmon or steelhead permit, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

A daily fishing license allows a person to fish in the waters of the state on a day-to-day basis but not for salmon or steelhead. A resident one-day license costs \$11.50 plus \$5 for each additional day purchased at the same time, but a one-day license holder can't buy a salmon or steelhead permit.

Resident anglers must first buy a season fishing license for \$25.75 to buy a salmon or steelhead permit for \$12.75.

The rules do not allow Idaho residents to buy the nonresident three-day license.

Camping Opportunities Abound on Northeastern Nevada's Humboldt-**Toiyabe Forest**

Pack up the camping gear and head for Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest's campgrounds. Even if you have time for only an overnight trip, there are several beautiful camping spots in the Ruby Mountains, East Humboldt, Jarbidge and Mountain City areas that don't require much travel time.

The Mountain City Ranger District has three main campgrounds, Wildhorse Crossing, Big Bend and Jack Creek. Wildhorse and Big Bend cost \$5 and \$8 per night, respectively. The fees collected go back to the campgrounds to make improvements, provide camp hosts and maintain the sites.

• Wildhorse Crossing is easily accessible off the Mountain City Highway (SR 225), and is next to the Owyhee River where many people enjoy fishing, hiking, horseback riding, hunting and mountain biking.

• Big Bend is reached via the Gold Creek Road (Elko County Road 745), and is a great base camp for those who enjoy riding their ATVs and dirt-ready motorcycles on the miles of forest and county roads. Sunflower Flat, Meadow Creek, Merritt Mountain and the Bruneau River are among the locals' favorites. An excellent longer trip will take riders to Jarbidge. Big Bend is also a great campground for mountain bikers, horse riders, hikers and anyone else who enjoys the peace, quiet and off-thebeaten-path beauty.

• The free Jack Creek Campground is a small, relatively undeveloped campground on the banks of Jack Creek in a beautiful drainage below Jack's Peak and north of the Independence Mountains. Opportunities abound for just about any outdoor sport.

The Ruby and East Humboldt Mountains have several campgrounds and picnic areas run by the concessionaire, Scenic Canyons. The company's staff maintains the campgrounds, dayuse areas, water systems and all other day-to-day operations associated with the facilities and sites. Fees at

these locations go to staff for cleaning and maintenance.

• Lamoille Canyon, sometimes called "the other Yosemite," and a true jewel in the Ruby Mountains, is home to the Thomas Canyon Campground at the mouth of a spectacular rocky and steep canyon. A hiking trail is suitable for anyone with strong legs and lungs who wishes to access the highalpine country. Hikers may be rewarded with sightings of mountain goats and Himalayan snowcock if they hike high enough and keep a sharp eye on the cliffs and ridges.

• Some sites at Thomas Canyon Campground may be reserved, and some are first-come, first-served. Both tent and RV-suitable campsites are available, with drinking water but no hookups. Thomas Creek enters Lamoille Creek at the campground and is a welcome sight when you arrive at your campsite after a big hike into the mountains.

• Powerhouse Picnic Area is at the bottom of Lamoille Canyon, near Spring Creek and the town of Lamoille. This area can be used from dawn to dusk for family picnics; a group site is often reserved for weddings, reunions and other functions. You may enjoy lovely views up and down the canyon, as well as cool water near your picnic site. Lamoille Creek runs from high in the mountains, through the picnic area, and into the valley.


the top of Lamoille Canyon. This picnic area is in the heart of the steep, rugged and rocky cliffs of the canyon and has spectacular views in all directions.

Drive to Road's End to take a hike toward Lamoille, Liberty and Favre lakes to earn your picnic lunch when you return to take a rest at Terraces. The South Ruby Campground is a unique, quiet campground surrounded by pinyon pines and juniper trees for shade and is just above the Ruby Lake National Wildlife Refuge. Opportunities abound for fishing, kayaking, canoeing, relaxing and enjoying a view of the marshes.

In the East Humboldts, there are two main campgrounds run by Scenic Canyons: Angel Lake and Angel Creek. Both are accessible via the Angel Lake Road (SR 231), and just above the town of Wells. Both have drinking water.

• Angel Creek is for both tents and RVs. A picnic area is nestled in the aspens at the heart of the Angel Creek Campground with a large picnic table and grill.

• Angel Lake can accommodate tents and smaller trailers; the paved road, however, is steep and winding, so use caution if you are hauling a large trailer or fifth wheel. This campground has several picnic sites, each with grills and tables, in the aspens and at the edge of the lake. Angel Lake is a small man-made lake that sits in a beautiful alpine basin with steep cliffs above and aspen trees around the edge. A one-mile hiking trail leads to Smith Lake, which is situated just to the

northwest of Angel Lake. Stretch your legs on this trail, see another spectacular natural alpine lake in a beautiful basin, and watch for goats and bighorn sheep.

The Jarbidge Ranger District has two free campgrounds, Pine Creek and Slide Creek. Both are small, primitive, remote campgrounds with fire rings and tables and can accommodate smaller trailers or RVs. Pine Creek, in particular, is near the end of a narrow and rocky road with a difficult turnaround; scout it out ahead of time if you have a larger trailer. Drinking water is not available at either location, so bring your own water or a purifier. Both campgrounds are wonderful places to tent camp.

• The Pine Creek Campground is along the Jarbidge River with a nearby trailhead to access the Jarbidge Wilderness via Snowslide Gulch.

• The Slide Creek Camp-

are not allowed in the campground. The Slide Creek Trailhead is right next to the campground, and Hummingbird Springs Trailhead is also nearby. Many roads invite unlimited exploring with mountain bikes, ATVs or 4WD vehicles in both areas. The town of Jarbidge is just north of Pine Creek.

• Scenic Canyons also maintains the Terraces Picnic Area, a lovely day-use area approximately two miles below Road's End, where the paved road ends at ground sits near the springs where Slide Creek begins. This campground's amenities include small corrals with a large parking area for horses and trailers. Horses

two more competitions in June. One will be his first international competition when he travels to the Czech Republic.

To an outsider, success in shooting may seem to come easy for Wyatt, who has been shooting for only five years. Wyatt's father, Dan Brown, credits that to his son's discipline and growing up in the sport.

"The difference between the two: Will was our groundbreaker for our family. We learned a lot and it really helped speed it up for Wyatt," Dan said.

According to a 2009 *Times-News* article, Wyatt was an eighth-grader at Kimberly Middle School when he brought home a silver medal in Air Pistol during his first year shooting in the Twin Falls Rifle and Pistol Club. It was also his first trip to nationals.

Wyatt said he's progressed because his strategy always includes following his shot plan and being mentally prepared.

"I like to say that it's 98 percent mental. Once you develop technical abilities the game becomes more about focus, habits, muscle memory," Wyatt said. "The biggest obstacle in shooting is not being able to shoot a good shot technically, but a good shot mentally."

Wyatt said that because he trains most of the time in his basement, which is a lowstress environment, sometimes practice didn't translate well at competitions. That's why his shot plan is so important; if it's utilized right, the tension of the environment shouldn't matter.

Wyatt spends two to three times a week live firing and 30 minutes before school dry firing.

"I've set up a training schedule. It's not too, too intensive but maintains all technical aspects," Wyatt said. "If I progress like I have then I hope to make it on the national team with my brother."

Wyatt also plans to pursue shooting in college and will be a member of the pistol team at the University of Utah in Salt Lake City.

Forest Service Personnel Conducts Reconnaissance Flight of Marsh Creek

CHALLIS • Here's some valuable data for spring boaters.

On April 17, Forest Service personnel conducted a reconnaissance flight of Marsh Creek from Dagger Falls to Idaho Highway 21. They observed:

• One tree, about half a mile below the confluence of Bear Valley Creek and Marsh Creek, lying from bank to bank.

• Five trees lying from bank to bank above the confluence of Bear Valley Creek and Marsh creek, with one being about a quarter-mile below the launch site on Highway 21.

• An additional six trees span at least halfway across Marsh Creek.

• The Idaho Department of Fish and Game fish trap was in place about half a mile below the Highway 21 put-in site. This is not a complete list

of hazards, the Forest Service warned. The observers may not have seen all down trees. And this is a dynamic system; more trees will fall, and those in the stream will be moved by high water.

Spring boaters use Marsh Creek as one way of accessing the Middle Fork of the Salmon River when the Boundary Creek Road is closed by snow.

"If you plan to boat Marsh Creek and the Middle Fork, please exercise extreme caution," the Forest Service's press release said. "Marsh Creek is fast flowing and the water is very cold. Bends and curves hide obstacles until you are very close. High banks and no eddies make it very difficult to halt your descent and exit the stream in

time. Scouting is essential for all blind curves. Please ensure you and the members of your party are highly skilled boaters with appropriate early-season protective equipment such as dry suits, helmets, warm clothing, etc. Typically, highly maneuverable kayaks or similar boats that enable you to avoid obstacles or to hold your position in the stream will lessen your chance of a serious incident."

Each year, boaters have serious accidents - sometimes fatal – and close calls on Marsh Creek and the upper Middle Fork. If rescue becomes necessary, it will be slow due to communications, access, location and capability of aircraft, and lack of landing zones. Darkness and weather could further delay rescue and diminish the chance of survival. The Forest Service does not remove trees from Marsh Creek or the Middle Fork of the Salmon River. Boaters are not prohibited from removing trees; however, within wilderness this must be done

using non-motorized tools. The boundary for the Frank Church-River of No Return Wilderness is about 1 mile downstream from the Highway 21 launch site. When you enter the wilderness, it is illegal to use a chain saw or have it in your possession. Traditional tools such as crosscut saws, axes, come-alongs and block and tackle are allowed.

Bills Would Expand Yosemite National Park

SACRAMENTO, Calif. • More than a century ago John Muir argued that Congress should include a wildlife corridor with stunning vistas of the Merced River in the boundaries of Yosemite National Park. He lost to timber interests.

Now with the old-growth Ponderosa pine and cedar long gone, a California nonprofit is trying to make good on the famed environmentalist's vision. Pacific Forest Trust has agreed with a group of private landowners to sell the 1,600-acre parcel to the National Park Service.

The addition of land on the western boundary near El Portal would be the 761,000-acre park's first expansion in more than 70 years.

"It has a magnificent view of the Wild and Scenic

Merced River, and it's also a migration corridor for deer," said Laurie Wayburn, president of the forest trust group. "This was always meant to be a part of the park."

The federal government would use money from the Land and Water Conservation Fund, which collects fees from offshore oil drilling

Sen. Dianne Feinstein and Rep. Jim Costa introduced bills on Tuesday to modify the boundary of the park

also its greatest challenge," Feinstein said in a news release.

Besides logging, the land that would be included in the expansion has had pressure from development. It surrounds the Yosemite West subdivision that would not

be included in the sale.

Park officials declined to comment on the expansion proposal, citing regulations that keep them from commenting on pending legislation.

But last week the California State Senate approved a resolution urging the expansion. It also has support from the Board of Supervisors in Mariposa County, where the land is remotely located and delivering services such as police and fire protection is expensive.

The Pacific Forest Trust bought 900 acres eight years ago from the second owners after the Yosemite Timber Co., which cut its last trees from the property roughly

140 years ago. The family wanted the land protected. The owners of the rest of the property are a consortium of doctors who purchased it as an investment years ago but are willing to sell now.

The trust worked for eight years to thin heavy stands of white fir that are susceptible to fire and to restore meadows whose water they sucked dry. Wayburn said the trust will donate onethird of the value of the land, which will be established through a fair market appraisal.

"We always intended it to go into the park," she said. "Yosemite is a national treasure and the pride of the state."

Nebraska May Allow the Hunting of Mountain Lions

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) • The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission soon will be deciding whether to let people hunt mountain lions in the state.

The *Lincoln Journal Star* says the proposal to be considered at the commission's May 24 meeting would allow a total of three the big cats to be taken over two short periods of one season in parts of the Nebraska Panhandle. One hundred permits would be issued by lottery to Nebraska residents and one through an auction also open to nonresidents.

Officials say mountain lions all but vanished from Nebraska by 1890. The cats have been making a comeback in the northwest corner of the state and have traveled as far east in Nebraska as Omaha. The commission estimates the Pine Ridge area has a population of 22 animals.

Wis. Woodchuck Hunting Bill Gets Cold Reception

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — A handful of animal lovers tore into a bill that would establish a Wisconsin woodchuck hunting season, blasting the measure as unnecessary during a hearing Wednesday and calling it another sign that legislators are obsessed with killing wildlife.

Only eight people addressed the Assembly Natural Resources and Sporting Heritage Committee about the bill. One was the measure's author, Rep. Andre Jacque, R-De Pere. Another was a Department of Natural Resources wildlife ecologist. The others all spoke against the proposal.

"I think the primary (motivation) here is thrill kill," said Randy O'Connell, 59, of Omro, who described himself after the hearing as a recovering hunter. "This culture, not a heritage, needs to come to an end."

Woodchucks, also known as groundhogs or whistlepigs, are beaver-like creatures known for burrowing and gobbling up plants at a manic pace. They've been crane seasons in recent years. Jacque told the committee his bill is more about maintaining the integrity of the protected species list than hunting. Ho said there's no

plated feral cat and sandhill

hunting. He said there's no biological or scientific reason why woodchucks deserve protected status.

Still, he argued woodchucks are a nuisance and a number of other states have hunting seasons targeting the animals, including Illinois, Iowa and Michigan. Attendees at the Conserva-2009 tion Congress' statewide spring hearings overwhelmingly approved the idea of hunting woodchucks, Jacque added. The congress is a group of influential sportsmen who advise the DNR on policy.

The bill has two Democratic sponsors in the Senate, but Democrats on the Assembly committee still criticized the plan. They pointed out landowners already can kill problem woodchucks and the season would allow hunting during woodchucks' birthing period in spring and summer.

They also questioned whether hunters could use dogs to root out hibernating

Good Trout Season Start Predicted for Oregon

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — In the summer of 1913, the Oregon Fish Commission used pack horses to stock trout in remote Cascade lakes for the first time.

One hundred years later, it's fitting that the 2013 general trout season — which opens Saturday — figures to be one of the better ones in the Cascade Lakes.

A lighter-than-average winter snowfall, coupled with a relatively warm spring, means better early season access and conditions at many lower-elevation lakes.

"We don't have any ice, we don't have any snow. We're just wide open right now," said Pat Schatz, owner of Crane Prairie Resort in the Cascades southwest of Bend. "This is the mostopen year we've had since 1995."

on the state's protected species list for decades. Property owners can kill nuisance woodchucks but anyone else needs a license.

DNR ecologists don't have any estimates on how many woodchucks live in Wisconsin, but they say they're abundant and it's not clear why they were ever placed on the protected species list. Some experts have speculated wildlife officials wanted to ensure woodchucks continued to burrow because the holes can provide shelter for other animals.

Jacque introduced a bill earlier this month that would remove woodchucks from the protected species list and establish a hunting and trapping season from March 1 through Dec. 31. The bill would prohibit the DNR from setting any bag limits.

Hunters already can kill a wide range of animals in Wisconsin, including deer, bears, wolves, mourning doves, coyotes, squirrels, rabbits and wild pigs. Legislators also have contemwoodchucks, a veiled shot at one of the most polarizing elements in wolf hunting regulations that allow hunters to chase wolves with dogs. The committee's attorney said he'd have to research that question.

Regardless, Rep. Tom Hebl, D-Sun Prairie, home of Jimmy the Groundhog, Wisconsin's version of Punxsutawney Phil, saidhe hasn't heard of anyone dining on woodchucks. He asked Jacque if he thought it was immoral to kill an animal for no reason.

"People are already ridding themselves of woodchucks without eating them," Jacque responded. "Are they immoral?"

Rep. Joel Kleefisch, R-Oconomowoc, an avid hunter who mounted an unsuccessful push for a sandhill crane hunt last session, defended Jacque. The Wisconsin Constitution guarantees the right to hunt, he said, adding woodchuck pelts are valuable and the meat could be tasty. The ice went off the reservoir a little over two weeks ago, Schatz said, and "generally, two weeks after iceoff is when fishing picks up ... I'm expecting fishing to be good" opening day.

Meanwhile, anglers in the Willamette Valley and environs can also anticipate a good opener. With sunny days and temperatures around 70 forecast this week, angling conditions in the McKenzie River and other Willamette tributaries should be favorable come Saturday.

"The river looks good," said ODFW district fish biologist Jeff Ziller. "With lower water, hatches are going to happen earlier and with a little warmer water temperatures, fish become a little more active."

As has become the new norm, only the lower section of the McKenzie will be stocked before opening day. About 8,250 fin-clipped hatchery rainbow will be released by stocking boat between Leaburg Dam and at Crane Prairie Reservoir near Bend, Ore., May 14, 2010.

Hendricks Wayside. An additional 2,900 will go to Leaburg Lake.

The McKenzie is one of the most productive fisheries around. ODFW creel surveys conducted in 2010 and 2011 indicated that anglers averaged better than one trout for every hour spent fishing during the two-year period.

"That's just outrageously good," Ziller said.

Other typical fishing hot spots on opening weekend are those that get the largest releases of hatchery-reared rainbow trout. For all stockings, "legal-size" trout are about 8 inches long upon release; "larger" fish are 12 inches long, "pounders" measure about 14 inches, and "trophy" fish are 16 inches.

The relatively mild winter notwithstanding, some lakes in the high country will remain snowbound well into May. The Cascade Lakes Highway will be accessible from the south only as far as Lava Lake, according to the Deschutes County Road Department. Also, access to East and Paulina lakes in Newberry Crater will be blocked by a snow gate.

Diamond Lake was partially covered with about a foot of slushy snow and ice Sunday, but resort spokesman Rick Rockholt said about half the lake should be open water by Saturday.

Once snows retreat from wilderness lakes in the Cascades, trout fishing should be good.

Many of the high lakes visited by horse packers a century ago are now stocked by helicopter in odd-numbered years. (About 40 of the most popular high lakes are also stocked by backpackers in even-numbered years.)

Thousands of fingerling air-lifted into the backcountry in 2011 will be pan-size this summer, while survivors from the 2009 stocking will be "lunkers," Ziller said.

"Any fish that makes it to 4 years old in the high lakes is usually a pretty good-sized fish," he said.

Ziller suggests fishing the high lakes early — before helicopter restocking occurs — in the season, or late, after mosquitoes wane.

"Helicopter stocking is usually the first week after the Fourth of July, and it's generally not a good idea to fish in the week or two after we have stocked it, because those fish are just chock full of the little fish we just put in there," he said.

Thanks to modern technology, finding those hidden-gem wilderness lakes is no longer as problematic as it was even 20 years ago. The ODFW's listing of high lakes of the south Willamette watershed includes GPS coordinates, as well as when each was stocked. Find that at http://rgne.ws/11dyL3D.

Yellow frog, Yosemite Toad Close to ESA Protection

SACRAMENTO, Calif. • The Yosemite toad and the Sierra Nevada yellow-legged frog share some critical mountain habitat and now an unenviable distinction: both are being proposed for federal Endangered Species Act protection.

Yellow-legged frogs, which live throughout the Sierra Nevada, have declined in numbers in recent years due to habitat destruction, predation by non-native trout in mountain waterways, the drifting of pesticides to the mountains from farm fields and climate change. Yosemite toads are threatened primarily by livestock grazing, climate change and pesticides, according to the Center for Biological Diversity, which has pushed the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to speed up protection decisions.

"Not too long ago, yellow-legged frogs and Yosemite toads were a common and popular sight in the high Sierras," said the center's Jeff Miller in a release. "Their declines are a warning of the failing health of our high Sierra ecosystems, which are being hurt by habitat loss, rapid climate change, introduced species, pesticide contamination and an amphibian disease epidemic."

The proposal, announced Wednesday, includes designating 2 million acres of critical habitat for the amphibians.

The listings could impact some federal permits on grazing land, a situation that is frustrating members of the California Cattlemen's Association.

"Ranchers are disappointed in this proposed action, as University of California research has shown that frogs and grazing cattle can coexist together without having negative impacts on habitat or forage," said spokeswoman Stevie Ipsen in an email.

BIRMINGHAM, ALA. BOMBING VICTIMS

WASHINGTON (AP) . Four young victims of a deadly Alabama church bombing that marked one of the darkest moments of the civil rights movement are one step closer to receiving Congress' highest civilian honor. By a 420-0 vote, the House on Wednesday passed a measure that posthumously would award the Congressional Gold Medal to Addie Mae Collins, Carole Robertson, Cynthia Wesley and Denise McNair.

The girls were killed when a bomb planted by white supremacists exploded at the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Ala., in September 1963. The measure will now be considered by the Senate. The House effort was led by Alabama Reps. Terri Sewell, a Democrat, and Spencer Bachus, a Republican. The two represent Birmingham and presented Wednesday's vote as a way to honor the legacy of the victims.

"It was there blood which was shed for the bounty that so many of us now enjoy," Sewell said.

Bachus said the tragedy pushed the civil rights movement forward and honoring its victims was the correct way to commemorate their legacy. While Congress has shown broad support for awarding the medal, the idea has split relatives of the four victims.

5 NEW MURALS AT TRAILS CENTER IN ELKO SHOW TRIBES

ELKO, Nev. (AP) • The California Trail Interpretive Center in Elko is getting ready to unveil a series of large, colorful murals dedicated to the American Indians of the Great Basin.

The \$60,000 exhibit funded by the federal government covers all 1,000 square feet of wall space inside the Great Basin Room at the visitor's center along U.S. Interstate 80 in northeast Nevada.

"It's quite an experience to come in," said Gary Koy, manager of the trail center. "You're totally surrounded by the murals."

Los Angeles artist Jeanine Hattas painted the five acrylic murals depicting people from the Shoshone, Paiute and Ute tribes from the early 1800s to modern times.

"It's a pictorial history of this area prior to and after the wagon trains came through," he told the *Elko Daily Free Press.*

A reception for the exhibit's opening is scheduled for Tuesday from 6 to 8 p.m.

The murals depict a number of scenes, opening with Native

Americans watching the arrival of pioneers and closing with integration into schools and dancing at a modern powwow.

Hattas said each is intended to evoke a different feeling.

"One has a very peaceful feeling, another gloomy, another joyous. The brushstrokes create these moods," she said.

A project committee liked her concept drawings and selected her for the job in May from a pool of applications.

"I love doing public art," Hattas said. "My favorite thing to do is work with a community to do something they would be proud of."

Koy said it wasn't easy to settle on just one artist for the new exhibit that will remain on display permanently.

"It was a delicate balance between creating an artistic mood and having historical accuracy," he said.

Hattas said the committee helped provide key insight on the region's history to make sure the details were correct. "It was definitely a lot of re-

search," she said.

Utah Hatches Plan to Protect Sage Grouse

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Utah has come up with its own plan to protect the sage grouse.

The state's plan, released Wednesday, aims to invite those birds back by restoring sage brush burned up by wildfires and overtaken by juniper.

The plan comes as federal officials are considering naming the birds an

endangered species.

But Utah Public Lands Director Kathleen Clarke says the "endangered" label would impose a costly and burdensome slew of regulations on Utah.

Others contend it would disrupt the state's oil, gas, and mining industries, among others. Biologists say the bird has lost 90 percent of its historic habitat.

Wildfires, invasive plants and humans have driven the birds from their canyon homes in a number of western states.

The birds sport singular features resembling a white shawl and black spikey plumes.

do and I'm going to ride as if my life depends on it.

Recent studies confirm my oncologist's advice. A study published last fall in the journal Cancer found that obese survivors of certain types of breast cancer were 40 percent more likely to have a recurrence than survivors whose weight was in a healthy range. Even women who were overweight but not obese were more likely to experience a recurrence. In 2005, the Nurses' Health Study found that breast cancer survivors who exercised as little as three hours per week after diagnosis experienced a lower risk of a fatal recurrence than survivors who did not exercise. So I began to exercise just days after my last full chemotherapy treatment. (Under my regimen, I continued to receive infusions of Herceptin, a therapy for a certain type of breast cancer, for eight more months.) My return to the bicycle was accompanied by an urgency and seriousness of purpose that I'd lacked before. At the beginning, I felt as if I were starting from scratch. I rode slowly and got tired quickly. But I was patient, telling myself I was in it for the long haul.

I settled into a mixed-

KALISPELL, Mont. (AP) • The Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes have no plans to kill a grizzly bear that mauled a man near the tribal college in Pablo last week, a tribal natural resources spokeswoman said.

"It was a surprise encounter between a female grizzly and her two yearling cubs in an area that is frequented by bears," said tribal natural resources spokeswoman Germaine White. "The bear charged, attacked, retreated and left the area. It was clearly defensive behavior. She was defending her cubs."

Tribal wildlife officials consulted with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services grizzly bear recovery coordinator Chris Servheen in determining that the bears and the area of the encounter will be monitored closely. However, the bears haven't been seen since the attack.

The 42-year-old victim of the April 19 attack was bitten three times on the arms and head and continued to recover Monday at a Kalispell hospital. His name has not been released.

Lake County Sheriff's spokeswoman Karen Sargent tells the *Missoulian* that cosmetic surgery will be needed to repair injuries to the man's head and face.

White is still urging people to take proper precautions because grizzly and black bears are becoming more active. soy products? Processed foods? What about alcohol? I'd been surfing the Web looking for information. My doctor gently interrupted and said plainly, "If you want to prevent a recurrence, you need to get your weight into a healthy range and get an hour of vigorous exercise every day."

I'd once been a runner. I ran as many as 40 miles a week and competed in races as long as 10 miles. But over the years, work, parenthood and home obligations had taken their toll, and I could no longer devote the time I once had to my own fitness. Eventually, I started commuting to work by bike. It was the most convenient way to get exercise but the first thing to be sacrificed when the schedule was too full. Still, when I was able to ride, it allowed me to contity as the athlete I'd once been.

Then, in January 2009, at age 45, I was given a diagnosis of cancer. I had a mastectomy and went through six rounds of chemotherapy for Stage I invasive ductal carcinoma. For the six months between my diagnosis and the completion of chemotherapy, I didn't get on the bike or do any other real physical activity. During chemo, I gained 20 pounds, which I was told wasn't unusual.

As my oncologist spoke, I thought of the commuting bike, purchased two months before my diagnosis, gathering dust under the basement steps. There was virtually nothing I could control about the nightmare of my cancer, I thought. But give me one thing that I can take charge of, that I can do that I love to mode commute 12 miles round trip by bike, the rest by train two days a week. I rode my bike for short trips and errands. In a gesture of defiance, I rode to and back home from one of my last chemotherapy appointments.

Gradually, this routine gave way to a bicycle-only commute, 29 miles round trip. And two days per week became three, which led to four, and then some riding on the weekend, too. I shed 35 pounds. Riding became a refuge; two hours of daily solitude in a life that was hectic and sometimes sad. It was a chance to get lost in thought or in no thoughts at all (sometimes, just to get lost). It became second nature. It made me feel healthy even as I harbored doubts about whether reality matched the brave front I put up.

7 Charged with Smuggling Fish Bladders to China

SAN DIEGO (AP) • Seven people have been charged with smuggling bladders from an endangered fish in what authorities said Wednesday may be a growing international practice in which the bladders are sold for up to \$20,000 each to be used in a highly desired soup.

U.S. border inspectors in Calexico have seized 529 bladders since February that they believe were destined for China and Hong Kong. The probe began when an inspector spotted about 30 bladders buried in an ice chest.

The bladders came from totoaba fish that live exclusively in Mexico's Sea of Cortez. Also known as Mexican giant bass or giant croaker, the fish can measure up to 7 feet long and weigh more than 200 pounds. The creamcolored, leathery bladders alone measure up to 3 feet.

The fish are captured with gillnets when they migrate in the spring to the shallow waters in the northern Sea of Cortez, authorities said. The gas-filled bladders, which keep the fish buoyant, are removed and taken to stash houses along the border, with the fish carcasses left to rot on gulf shores near the tourist town of San Felipe.

The totoaba has been protected under the Convention on International Trade and Endangered Species since 1976 and was added to the U.S. Endangered Species Act in 1979. Fishing is also prohibited in Mexico.

The totoaba population began to plummet in the 1940s after construction of the Hoover Dam in the U.S. limited the flow of Colorado River water into Mexico. Totoaba spawned near the mouth of the river.

Heavy fishing and inadvertent capture of young fish in shrimp nets also exacerbated the decline.

Just as shark fins are coveted for use in a different soup, the totoaba is desired for its meat but even more for its dried bladders. The organs used in fish maw soup are tasteless but are said to improve skin, blood circulation and fertility.





Gooding's Faulkner Inks with College of Idaho

GOODING • On a team laden with star power, quarterback Josh Faulkner didn't get nearly as much attention as a lot of his teammates.

It didn't take College of Idaho football coach Mike Moroski long to know he wanted the Gooding gunslinger, though.

In front of friends, family and two proud coaches, Faulkner signed a letter of intent Wednesday to join the class of incoming Coyotes that will resurrect the school's football program in 2014.

"I'm just excited for the chance to keep playing football," said Faulkner, a dual-threat quarterback who threw for more than 1,200 yards and 12 touchdowns. He mixed in nearly 400 rushing yards and nine scores for a team that won 10 games and reached the Class 3A semifinals.

"He's just a competitor and a kid that wants to win. He's the first one to show up and the last one to leave, and he's a leader without needing everyone to know it.

When Cole (McGinnis, star lineman) went down last season, he was still the guy in the huddle and everyone looked at him because he's the leader. We won a lot of games last season because of Josh."

Faulkner becomes the third District IV football player to sign with the College of Idaho, joining Twin Falls senior Jason Byce and 2012 Kimberly graduate Brock Hulsey.

What ultimately won Faulkner over was a combination of the campus visit and the opportunity to continue playing quarterback.

Moroski thinks he'll be able to do it well.

"He's a really effective runner, a tough guy, and I think he can do all sorts of things for us and fit really well. We have three or four guys who can play quarterback, but only two or three who are quarterbacks," Moroski said. "I think he's got all sorts of potential, and that's what's fun about a place like the College of Idaho and recruiting kids like this who are far from tapped out."

TWIN FALLS • The group doesn't have a name.

They're above that. Understated. A few are even masters of brevity, and according to those in the group, not just for reporters.

But they have a chance to be remembered for their play, as one of Twin Falls' best groups of athletes to grow up together, play together and win together.

Six players for the Twin Falls baseball team, all seniors, have been sandlotters for close to a decade.

As 11-year-olds, Sayer Conrad, Damon Jones, Casey Merritt, John Hohnhorst, Jason Byce and Thomas Corr won the Northwest Regional Championship of Cal Ripken Baseball.

Seven years later, with just one loss in conference this season and a tough nonconference schedule which featured some of the best 4A and 5A teams in the state, the Bruins' six - the leadership core of the team - want to finish off their ride together with one more.

"I have a picture with Jonesy after we won our first one," Corr said. "We both have our arms up, yelling. It would be really cool to get another one like that."

Most members of the group played for the 2011 state championship team, some in more limited roles than others. Conrad had to sit out that season after transferring from Canyon Ridge.

But this is the year the group has stamped its identity on the team it's theirs. It just works.

"I play fall ball and the team chemistry isn't so great," Merritt said. "But I come back to play with these guys and we play so well together. This is it, our last chance; we have to go out on top."

The group isn't as close as it used to be. They've each become their own men, branching out into other cliques at school.

"We've grown up together, stayed friends and always had each other's backs," Conrad said. "We used to hang out with each other every day."

They haven't forgotten the old times and, according to them, have gotten closer as their senior year has worn on.

Perhaps a long ago embedded memory has started moving to the fores of their consciousness, sentimentality, the reality of impending graduation - curtains for the group – sets in.

"Just the other day we were talk-

ing about how we won that (regional championship) and now we're a few weeks away from it all being over," Hohnhorst said. "We've been together forever."

It could be that time again.

"It hasn't sunk in that I won't be playing baseball with them again in a few weeks," said Byce. "I don't want anybody to move on. This is fun, I love this. We want to finish this the right way."

But there's one missing from the original group. He'd like nothing more than to keep the Bruins from winning a state championship.

His name is Kaleb Price, and he's the star pitcher for cross-town rival Canyon Ridge.

"I thought he'd be with us and we'd go win some state titles," Hohnhorst said.

What drama.

Canyon Ridge has the best team

in school history, led by Price.

They play this weekend. The full group meets again. Odds are they'll meet in the district tournament, too.

"This being the last conference game and against our town rival, it's time to turn it up," Merritt said. "They have gotten better, but that's what you have to expect from a new school, each year they've gotten better. At the start of the season they were the talk of the Magic Valley. We were like, 'OK, they can be the mouths of the town?"

The group said they're still friends with Price – off the field.

"But on it, it's not about fun," Hohnhorst said.

"We don't want them feeling like they are better than us," Corr said. "We want to beat them in every aspect of the game."





OKLAHOMA CITY -Kevin Durant and Russell Westbrook both scored 29 points, and Oklahoma City recovered after squandering a 15-point lead in the fourth quarter to beat Houston 105-102 on Wednesday night and take a 2-0 series lead.

Durant hit the go-ahead 3-pointer with 2:28 to play, and the Thunder didn't relinquish the lead after that. Durant missed a free throw with 1 second left, but Houston was out of timeouts and Carlos Delfino couldn't connect on a desperation shot at the final buzzer.

James Harden scored 36 points and spearheaded a 21-2 comeback that wiped out the big deficit and put the Rockets up 95-91. But the top-seeded Thunder were able to respond and protect the home-court advantage they'd spent all season earning.

Game 3 is Saturday night in Houston.

The Thunder's big lead melted away with nine straight empty possessions as the Rockets mixed in a zone defense. Oklahoma City came back to tie it before Harden knifed to the

Houston its last lead, 97-95 with 2:42 to play. Durant answered right away with a deep 3 from the left wing, and the Thunder came up with back-to-back stops before Thabo Sefolosha's 3 provided a little breathing room at 101-97.

NC, LSU Thrive in College Baseball's New Era

It's been three years since college baseball zapped the power from its metal bats, causing the once ubiquitous slugfests to largely disappear.

Nobody has adjusted bet ter than North Carolina and LSU.

Home runs are down more than 50 percent and scoring has plummeted since the NCAA put strict new guidelines on the sport's bats, causing them to behave much more like their wood counterparts at the professional level.

So teams have had to find other ways to win.

"There's a secret - it's called balance and versatility," LSU coach Paul Mainieri said. "The days of swinging for the fences and mashing 100-plus homers in a season are over. It helps to have a few guys who can hit the ball out of the park, but you've got to have guys who can handle the bat and run. You've got to have righties and lefties."

"And of course, you've got to pitch and play defense."

North Carolina (39-3) and LSU (37-4) are the class of college baseball so far this season. The Tar Heels just finished a 14-game winning streak and the Tigers are off to their best start in the program's storied history - which includes six

national titles.

The programs with the gaudy win-loss totals are among a handful of top contenders for the national title. The last time a college baseball national champion finished with less than 10 losses was in 1995, when Cal State Fullerton won the title with a 57-9 record.

North Carolina coach Mike Fox – who is in his 15th season – has the program off to an 18-2 start in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Tar Heels ripped off a 14-game winning streak before a 9-8 loss to UNC Wilmington on Tuesday.

"We're playing some good baseball these days and I'd like to keep it that way," Fox said.

Both LSU and North Carolina have balanced rosters that include loads of pitching and defense and just enough power in the lineup to blast a few big hits that can put games out of reach.


"We probably don't have the best offense in the country or the best pitching," Mainieri said. "But we do play some great defense and when you put everything together, we've got something special."

LSU's been dominant in arguably the most difficult league in college baseball the Southeastern Conference. The Tigers have a 15-3 league record and are one of six SEC teams ranked in Baseball America's top 25.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • Playing on the offensive line is about as unglamorous as it gets in professional football.

Nobody pays much attention to the guys in the trenches until flags are flying. They spend Sunday afternoons getting punched, kicked and thrown to the turf, their fingers smashed and their face masks twisted - not to mention whatever goes on at the bottom of those piles. The best offensive tackle will never be as valuable as, say, the best quarterback, and rarely does one of the guys up front stoke the passions of a fan base weary of losing. So perhaps it's no surprise that since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970, only twice has an offensive lineman been selected first overall in the draft – Orlando Pace in 1997 and Jake Long in 2008.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. • NASCAR has a zero tolerance policy when it comes to engines, tires and fuel on a race car. Anything even slightly improper is dealt with swiftly and severely. NASCAR always throws the book at offenders.

Matt Kenseth and Joe Gibbs Racing were no exception, getting hit with one of the largest penalties NASCAR history in Wednesday after the engine from Kenseth's race-winning car at Kansas failed a post-race inspection. The team had nothing to do with the error, and manufacturer Toyota immediately accepted responsibility for one of eight connecting rods failing to meet the

minimum weight requirement by 3 grams - less thanan empty envelope.

"We take full responsibility for this issue with the engine. JGR is not involved in the process of selecting parts or assembling the Cup Series engines," Toyota Racing Development President Lee White said.

It's been a busy season for NASCAR discipline. In February, Nationwide Series driver Jeremy Clements was suspended after an apparently insensitive remark to an MTV blogger and Denny Hamlin was fined \$25,000 for criticizing the new Gen-6 race car.

But in the past week, NASCAR has levied more than \$450,000 in fines, suspended nearly a dozen crew members for upcom-

ing points races as it punishes teams for rules violations involving the cars themselves.

The penalty to Kenseth, who held off Kasey Kahne of Hendrick Motorsports to earn his second win of the season, dropped him from eighth to 14th in the standings





There are almost as many different ways to assign conventional meanings to three-level responses to one no-trump as there are calculations of the World's Top Player. (Only kidding: Everyone knows that he would be the world's top player if he could just find a competent partner.)

In today's deal, North-South was using three-level calls to show both minors, in different ranges, with specific shortages, and thus reached a delicate game. For the record, three diamonds would have been forcing with both minors; three hearts and three spades would have shown shortage in the other major, 5-4 in the minors.

On lead against three notrump, Migry Campanile (West) led a natural but unfortunate spade against three no trump, and declarer's trick count was now up to seven. South, Mark Bompis of France, then made the natural, if potentially unsuccessful, play of the diamond queen from hand, trying to establish his eight-card fit, and Campanile won the king. If she had routinely returned a heart or spade, as was the case at many tables, declarer would then have had no problems both establishing diamonds and returning to dummy to make use of them.

In fact, where the board was played between two world-class teams on Vugraph, one West played a spade, the other played back a diamond. But Campanile returned a club to disrupt the entries to dummy, and now declarer had no chance when neither minor behaved.

That was a well-deserved 13 IMPs to the Israeli team.


