TALKING TRASH

City councilor pushes for more representation for Twin Falls on waste district board.

TWIN FALLS • The city of Twin Falls might be one of the area's largest waste contributors, but that doesn't mean it qualifies for a seat on the waste district's

Currently, the Southern Idaho Solid Waste District board is made up of one member from seven different counties. SISW operates as the area's landfill for seven south-central Idaho counties.

However, last week the Twin Falls City Council members once again held a discussion on the lack of city representation and possible rate increases if the city continues to push for increased recycling efforts.

Councilman Chris Talkington led the council discussion on possible solutions to increasing recycling efforts and pointed out concerns over in a SISW audit for fiscal year 2012.

Last year, 60 percent of Twin Falls County's waste came from the city, Talkington said. Without representation on the board, the city is at a disadvantage. For example, if the city wants to divert more waste materials as recycling, some city council members fear it could Please see TRASH, A8

Good Ol' Boys Club? Not So Much

Law enforcement discusses how they respond when one of their own is arrested or under investigation.

TWIN FALLS • While a good ol' boys mentality and police officers protecting their own still happens regularly in TV and movies, local law enforcement officials say it's just not the truth.

"Now there's a policy pretty

much for everything we do," Cassia County Undersheriff George Warrell said.

Policies taught from the beginning of officer training help instill the attitude that officers must be treated like anyone else, he said.

Recently, a Twin Falls County sheriff's deputy, was arrested on allegations of domestic abuse.

The same set of policies that require the sheriff's office to get another agency to investigate the case also require them to stay publicly silent on personnel issues, like Sgt. Michael Cooper's case, sheriff's office spokeswoman Lori Stewart said.

Deputies Rescue Man **Trapped** in Cave

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office range deputies rescued an 18-year-old man from a cave Friday evening.

At about 5:36 p.m. Friday, range deputies were dispatched to an area of the Snake River Canyon rim, north of the intersection of Eastland Drive and Pole Line Road, for a man who was stuck in a cave.

Twin Falls Fire Department and Twin Falls Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue also responded to help the man, identified as Austin Wiggins of Buhl.

Wiggins was found and rescued. He was not injured.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman Lori Stewart said Wiggins was hiking with friends when he became lodged between rocks in a hole. It took rescuers about 30 minutes to get to Wiggins. The entire rescue took about two hours, Stewart said.

Stewart said rescuers used an anchored line as a safety aid during the rescue.

THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

BofA Leads Banks Up; S&P 500 Index Ekes Out Gain

NEW YORK (AP) • Bank of America led a rally in big-bank stocks in mostly quiet trading on Monday. Stock indexes ended little changed following a record-setting run last week.

News that Bank of America and MBIA, a bond-insurance company, had reached a settlement over a long-running dispute propelled both companies' stocks up. BofA will pay \$1.7 billion to MBIA and extend the troubled company a credit line.

MBIA soared 45 percent, or \$4.46, to \$14.29. Bank of America gained 5 percent, or 64 cents, to \$12.88, making it the leading company in the Dow Jones indus-

The Dow slipped 5.07 points to close at 14,968.89. The Standard & Poor's 500 index crept up 3.08 points to 1,617.50, a gain of 0.2 percent.

Six of the 10 industry groups in the S&P 500 rose, with financial companies in the lead.

No major economic reports came out Monday, but a handful of companies reported their quarterly results. Tyson Foods, the nation's largest meat-processing company, fell 3 percent, the biggest drop in the Standard & Poor's 500 index, after saying its net income sank as costs for chicken feed rose. Tyson's stock lost 83 cents to \$24.10.

Southern Idaho's Banana Belt



Why is the scenic Hagerman Valley considered the banana belt of southern Idaho?

banana belt is defined as any segment of a larger geographic region that enjoys warmer weather conditions than the region as a whole, especially in the wintertime.

"I believe that Hagerman is called the banana belt because the temperature is usually a few degrees warmer than the surrounding towns," said geologist Art Small. "I have heard Riggins called the banana belt also. The warmer temperatures are because of the low elevation and the canyon with black rocks. which absorb heat from the sun and radiate the heat down into the canyon."

Banana belts refer to areas with a warmer, milder climate, said Shawn Willsey, professor of geology at the College of Southern Idaho. "Hagerman is about 800 feet lower in elevation than Twin Falls and in a wide valley. Additionally, the numerous springs in the area provide water for a large riparian ecosystem. As the area lies below the canyon rim, it is somewhat sheltered by winds at times."

The Treasure Valley area around Nampa is known as

Idaho's Banana Belt.

With Lewiston located at the confluence of the Snake and Clearwater Rivers, it is known as the "Banana Belt of the Pacific Northwest." Residents enjoy year-round golfing, while being only a short drive away from snow skiing. The elevation is 738 feet above sea level.

Kari Prassack, paleontologist for Hagerman Fossil Bed,s said Hagerman Valley is called a "banana belt" because it is an area that receives warmer weather and less snowfall than the areas surrounding it - like a belt of the "tropics" in Idaho. "This happens because warm air lifts upwards over the mountains, expands and cools, producing rain. And then, as drier air, it descends along the other side - in this case into the valley here where the air compresses and warms."

Prassack was asked if dinosaurs gravitated to the

Hagerman Valley because it was warmer. She said Idaho has some fossils that date to the Mesozoic (age of dinosaurs) but Hagerman's fossils are much more recent - only 3 to 4 million years compared to over 65 million. "The climate of all of North America was much warmer and wetter during the Mesozoic than it is today. As a result, there were dinosaurs living as far north as Alberta, Canada and even up above the Arctic Circle. The Hagerman Valley did not even exist back then. It was formed by the Bonneville Flood a mere 15,000 years ago," said Prassack.

"There's still not a lot of information about what started the downtown Jerome fire last Tuesday. And while the structure may no longer be intact, there's still plenty of information about its past.

"For example, the building was first built in 1908, just one year after the city of Jerome was officially founded, according to Linda Helms, assistant curator



at the Jerome County torical Museum.

"In the front, the building's owner ran a classy, designer furniture store, but in the back the owner also operated the city's only mortuary, Helms said. The caskets were stored in the basement, and a hand-



operated elevator was used

to raise elevators whenever

they needed a casket. ...'



Twin Falls Council Focuses on Budget, Building Permits

TWIN FALLS • A new dog park, community garden and building improvements were just some of the items on the wish list of Twin Falls City Council members. The council is currently in the early stages of its fiscal year 2013-2014 budget planning process.

During Monday's meeting, members were asked what city staffers should focus on while preparing budget proposals.

Councilman Don Hall requested more funding for

water infrastructure and wanted supporting funds for a city grant writer and other personnel as needed.

"We are a service organization. That service we provide happens with people. I'll be open to the idea if we need more personnel," he said.

Councilwoman Rebecca Mills Sojka requested more attention to downtown parking.

City staffers will now begin preparing budget proposals. The council will again discuss the budget in June, City Manager Travis Rothweiler said.

The budget discussion

followed a presentation on the city's finances from the past six months.

Overall, the city is in a good spot to begin looking ahead to next year's budget, Rothweiler said.

The council also unanimously approved amending sections of the building permit fees ordinance.


The goal wasn't to increase building permit fees but to simplify the permit process, said Mitch Humble, community development director.

The city's building department is facing an increase in building permit applications while working on reduced staff, Humble said. This has resulted in an increased wait time in approving building permits.

Under the new amendments, the building project value structure has been simplified but the permit fee structure will not change. Mechanical, engineering and plumbing fees are now simplified, and the ordinances definition of "small job" has narrowed.

City The Council also unanimously approved to vacate two locations within the Canyon Trails Subdivision.



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

Tax Free Internet Shopping May Soon Be a Thing of the Past

TWIN FALLS • A mandate that would apply state sales tax to nearly every Internet purchase took a major step forward today when the U.S. Senate approved the Marketplace Fairness Act of 2013.

If the bill is signed into law, it would apply state taxes to all web purchases made from the 45 states with sales tax, including Idaho.

According to former state legislator Leon Smith, Idaho loses an estimated \$35 million per year in remote sales, most of which are taxes not collected from Internet shoppers.

The Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce made its stance clear when Chamber President Shawn Barigar sent an email to all 885 mem bers encouraging support of the bill.

"Businesses are saving that they're losing customers, they're losing transactions because of this unbalanced playing field. That's a huge impact, because every one of those dollars that could've been spent here isn't being spent here," Barigar said. "That's what the economy is: dollars getting spent. If that's not happening here and it's happening far away, that's detrimental to our economy."

Evening the Playing Field

One argument in favor of the Marketplace

Fairness Act is that it will even the playing field for small businesses that compete with the In-

Jim Vickers, owner of Vickers Western Store in Twin Falls, said people often take pictures of his saddles with smartphones and leave.

"Somebody comes in my store, they write down all the model numbers, they go home and write them online because they save six percent," Vickers said. "If they aren't paying sales tax, it puts all of the stores at a disadvantage. The largest competitor that we all have in business is the Internet. ... I can compete against (local stores) lower and match prices, but how

do you compete against the Internet?' Vickers said small, local businesses should be a priority in order to maintain a healthy, long-term economic outlook.

"Fair competition is the key to the ballgame," Vickers said. "It's very important for the mom and pop stores to be able to stay viable, because if we all have to buy from big boxes or over the Internet, I think we're toast. Mom and pops are important. That's where your kids and your grandkids can be entrepreneurs themselves."

Businesses That Would Be Affected

Part of the mandate exempts businesses that sell under \$1 million per year in Internet sales.

Red's Trading Post in Twin Falls would not be exempt if the bill becomes law. The store sells around \$4 million worth of guns per year. About 70 percent of their business is done online. Red's owner Ryan Horsley said politicians are dressing up the bill to look like something

"It sounds really peachy keen and nice, but the fact is we're going to create an even bigger bureaucracy and this is going to make selling on the Internet extremely difficult," Horsley said. "...Lets' call a spade a spade. This is about tax. This is about collecting tax. This has really nothing to do with trying to protect small businesses. At least be honest with people. Stop trying to say this is going to save small business from Walmart or Amazon or eBay or any of these evil empires that small businesses see as a threat."

Horsley said the Marketplace Fairness Act will be a strain on his employees and send online revenue to states that don't have sales tax.

"We're going to be able to adjust," Horsley said. "It's going to be difficult. We're going to have to make some significant changes in regards to adapting with this. That's tying up more people not being able to sell, not being able to package, but just to sit there and deal with taxing entities."

YouTube Set to Soon Launch Pay Channels

YouTube is set to announce within a few weeks a series of channels that will require payment, a person familiar with the matter said Monday.

The content on the new pay channels will be in addition to the millions of videos viewers watch for free on YouTube. It's not clear whether the paid videos will come with advertising.

The person was not authorized to speak publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity.

The Financial Times reported earlier that viewers would be charged as little as \$1.99 a month for subscriptions.

a statement, YouTube said it is looking into creating a "subscription platform" that provides its partners with a way to generate revenue beyond video rentals and placing ads in and around content. It said, however, that it had "nothing to announce at this time."

Executives hinted at the coming pay channels at a preview event in March ahead of a meeting in New York with advertisers.

Such a model could help video producers make money from niche audiences. That's different from how YouTube works now, where the most popular videos, like PSY's "Gangnam Style" music video, make the most money from adver-

One example given by executives was of video lessons by a computer science teacher.

"For people who create great value but for only a narrow interest group, I think that the potential for pay channels unlocks opportunities for creating revenue streams," said Lucas Watson, YouTube's vice president of sales and marketing, at the

Introducing pay channels would also accustom fans of YouTube to paying for content, something the site is not known for, although it has sold and rented movies and TV shows from major studios since late 2008.


"It's a whole new skill set to develop: to convince people to actually take out their credit card, even for one cent," said Robert Kyncl, YouTube's vice president and global head of content partnerships, told reporters at the March event.

Conservative Study Sets Off Immigration Bill Squabble

WASHINGTON • A bipartisan Senate immigration bill would cost the government a net \$6.3 trillion over the next 50 years to provide benefits for millions of people now living in the U.S. illegally, the Heritage Foundation said in a report Monday, setting off a fierce dispute with fellow conservatives who attacked the study as flawed and political.

The study from the prominent conservative think tank said immigrants granted new legal status under the bill would eat up more than \$9 trillion in health, education, retirement and other benefits over their lifetime, while contributing only around \$3 trillion in taxes. Republicans and conservative groups who support the bill quickly countered that the study failed to measure broader economic benefits from an immigration overhaul, including a more robust workforce that would boost the gross domestic product.

"The Heritage Foundation document is a political document; it's not a very serious analysis," said former Mississippi Gov. Haley Barbour, a Republican who's part of a task force with the nonprofit Bipartisan Policy Center that supports the bill. "This study is designed to try to scare conservative Republicans into thinking the cost here is going to be so gigantic that you can't possibly be for it."

Former Sen. Jim DeMint, R-S.C., the Heritage Foundation's new president, dismissed such criticism.

"It's clear a number of people in Washington who might benefit from an amnesty, as well as a number of people in Congress, do not want to consider the costs," DeMint said. "No sensible thinking person could read this study and conclude that over 50 years that it could possibly

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The brouhaha developed as both sides prepare for the landmark bill to undergo its first tests later this week in the Senate Judiciary Committee, which will begin voting on amendments Thursday. It underscored the high political stakes for both supporters and opponents, as each jockeved to define the legislation. And it laid bare splits within the Republican Party, where business-oriented leaders such as Barbour and anti-tax activist Grover Norquist are

The Heritage report was a reprisal of a study the group released at the height of the last congressional debate on immigration, in 2007, which said the bill being considered then would have cost \$2.6 trillion. That figure, too, was disputed, but it carried weight with Republicans and helped lead to the legislation's eventual defeat in the Senate.

This time, supporters of the bill are determined not to let opponents wrest control

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of the debate. Anticipating Heritage's release of its new report, bill supporters responded quickly with conference calls and talking points criticizing its methodology and the foundation's agenda.

The Heritage authors acknowledged their report does not attempt to offer a comprehensive analysis of the entire 844-page immigration bill, which would boost border security, change legal immigration and worker programs, require all employers to check their workers' legal status and offer eventual citizenship to the estimated 11 million immigrants already living in the country illegally.

Instead, the Heritage study focused almost exclusively on the added costs the government would incur in providing benefits to immigrants here illegally once they gain legal status. These include Social Security, Medicare, unemployment insurance, health care, welfare, public education, and services like police and fire protection, highways and parks. The study said an average adult now living in the U.S. illegally would receive \$592,000 more in government benefits over a lifetime than he or she would pay in taxes.

"It becomes extraordinarily expensive," the lead author, Robert Rector, said at a press conference near the Capitol for unveiling the report.

Costs are higher for this bill than the last one in 2007, Rector said, partly because government spending itself has grown more generous.



cause a rate increase which would then fall onto city residents - for not sending enough material to the landfill.

"Their (SISW) operation does not allow for any recycling," he said. "That's unfair to the city of Twin Falls."

The city faced a similar situation in the past when it sought representation on the Southern Idaho Regional Communication Center board, Talkington said. Like SISW, the board was only made up of one county representative despite the city of Twin Falls making up a bulk of the calls. The city eventually decided to operate its own dispatch center.

Creating a city spot on the board first requires getting approval from the board, said Stephanie Thompson, SISW's chief finance officer.

The district isn't looking to raise its rates at this time but the district does have fixed costs it must meet, she said. However, the district isn't opposed to recycling.

"We do have waste diversion programs," she said.

"Last year, we diverted 32,000 tons through our recycling programs."

Talkington also pointed out that SISW's latest financial audit included a detailed paragraph on "a certain deficiency in internal control." Yet, according to the financial auditor who conducted the report, the deficiency refers to SISW's lack of a certified public accountant on its staff.

Close to five years ago, au-

diting standards changed to expect that cities, counties, school board and waste districts would have an accountant on their payroll to help keep track of expenses, said Gerald Price, of Gerald Price and Associates based in Burley.

There isn't a penalty for not having a CPA on staff but auditors are now required to point it out in each audit, he said.

"In Idaho, only large cities and counties have a CPA on staff," he said. "Most Idaho counties, especially in rural areas, do not have a CPA and you'll see this paragraph show up. It's a generic paragraph we have to add."

On Friday, Twin Falls city and county officials will meet to discuss SISW's finances, Talkington said.

"We need serious answers that don't patronize us," he said. "There have been a lot of issues not answered."



frustrating when it feels like the sheriff's office doesn't get to tell its side of the story.

"An employee has rights and can say whatever," Stewart said. "We can't tell our side. It's frustrating when we know we've done our job."

These days, something as simple as an officer's family member being involved in a traffic accident requires another agency be called in to handle the crash, said Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Don Newman.

Jerome County Sheriff Doug McFall said he remembers some attitude of "cops protecting cops" when he first started out in law enforcement in the 1970s, but it soon faded.

McFall said the Rodney King police beating in Los Angeles and other high profile incidents made police agencies hyper-aware of their image in the public eye.

If a deputy is pulled over for driving under the influence by another deputy, or police respond to the home of an officer or officer's family member, a second agency is called in to do the criminal investigation, Newman said.

"Because of public perception that cops will cover for cops," Newman said. "That's not the case."

These days, Newman said, the sheriff's office is as transparent as possible.

If a Twin Falls County deputy is arrested, another agency like Twin Falls police or Idaho State Police are called in.

"It's hard to convince people we have the ability to be unbiased," Newman said.

In some cases, a deputy is put on paid leave while a criminal or administrative investigation is underway,

Newman said.

While some might question the practice, Newman said, the employee is entitled to pay while a decision about their job is being made.

The sheriff's office also has to be careful about the reason for firing someone, Newman said. If he fires someone without due process, Newman said he'd be the one in trouble at the end of the day.

Along with a criminal investigation, sheriff's office employees also face an administrative investigation. Since that investigation is about their employment, and not the criminal case, Newman said, the rights a person has in court don't

In court, a person has the right to remain silent, a deputy can be fired if they refuse to answer a question during an administrative investigation, he said.

Although supervisors can use the information learned in an administrative investigation to determine whether someone can keep their job, that information can't be used in court, McFall said.

McFall, Warrell and Newman all said that if a deputy is arrested, the public can be assured the case will be handled like any other.

"Our trust with the public is our most important aspect and therefore law enforcement entities take it serious and make darn sure the public feels good about the way we're handling situations when we screw up," McFall said. "Police screw up too."

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

BEIRUT • From Israel's perspective, its airstrikes near Damascus were more about Iran than Syria: Tehran's shipment of guided missiles destroyed in the weekend attacks would have posed a potent threat had the weapons reached Iranian proxy Hezbollah in Lebanon.

While Israel says it has no interest getting involved in the Syrian civil war, it could find itself drawn into the conflict if Syrian leader Bashar Assad's Iranian patrons continue to use his territory to ship arms to Hezbollah.

Repeated Israeli strikes would almost certainly prompt Syrian retaliation, yielding a nightmare scenario in which Israel finds itself in a Syrian morass teeming with jihadi rebels, sectarian hatred and chemical weapons.

For the West, it offers another compelling argument that the Syrian war must somehow be brought to an

Since the uprising in Syria began in March 2011, Israel has carefully avoided

taking sides. At the same time, Prime Minister Benjamin Ne-

tanyahu has repeatedly de-

Syria Aimed at Iran clared a series of red lines that could trigger Israeli military intervention, including the delivery of "game-changing" weapons to Hezbollah.

The first test of this policy came in January when an Israeli airstrike in Syria destroyed a shipment of advanced anti-aircraft missiles bound for Hezbollah, according to U.S. officials.

Israel and Hezbollah fought an inconclusive monthlong war in 2006 and are bitter enemies.

When Israeli intelligence determined last week that sophisticated Iranian-made Fateh-110 missiles had entered Syria, the military prepared to strike again.

Although Israel has not officially confirmed the operation, a senior official said a first airstrike at a Damascus airport early Friday destroyed most of the shipment, while a series of subsequent airstrikes on nearby locations Sunday took out the remnants of the missiles. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss a covert military mission.

Residents in Damascus said they felt and heard several huge blasts before dawn Sunday. Radwan Midani, a 25-year-old office assistant, said he "saw the sky light up."

Boston Bomb Suspect's Pal Released Pending Trial

BOSTON • A friend of Boston Marathon bombing suspect Dzhokhar Tsarnaev has been released from federal custody while he awaits trial for allegedly lying to federal investigators probing the April 15 bombings.

Robel Phillipos was charged last week and faces up to eight years in prison if convicted. The 19-year-old was a student at the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth with Tsarnaev.

Prosecutors initially asked that Phillipos be held while he awaits trial, arguing that he poses a serious flight

But prosecutors and Phillipos' lawyers said Monday in a joint motion they now agree that Phillipos can be released under strict conditions, including home confinement, monitoring with an electronic bracelet and a \$100,000 secured bond.

Secrecy Shrouds Pretrial Hearing in WikiLeaks Case

FORT MEADE, Md. • Government secrecy reaches a new level this week in the court-martial of Army Pfc. Bradley Manning, an intelligence analyst who sent 700,000 classified U.S. documents to the WikiLeaks

A military judge, Col. Denise Lind, has ordered what prosecutors say is an unprecedented closed hearing Wednesday at Fort Meade to help her decide how much of Manning's upcoming trial should be closed

to protect national security. An unidentified prosecution witness will testify during that closed hearing in a "dry run." Defense attorneys say that could allow the judge to find ways to avoid closing the courtroom to the public during the presentation of classified evidence. Lind and attorneys for both sides have suggested there are a number of options to shield sensitive material, including closing parts of the trial; redacting documents; using written summaries as

evidence to omit sensitive de-

tails; or even using code words for classified information.

The sensitive evidence includes Iraq and Afghanistan battlefield reports and State Department cables Manning has acknowledged leaking, along with official communications about those classified documents. The government says the leaks in 2009 and 2010 endangered lives and security. Manning's lawyers contend there was little to no damage.

Lind's decision to hold the practice run out of public view has drawn mixed reactions from national security

and legal experts. Air Force Reserve Lt. Col. David Frakt, who teaches at the University of Pittsburgh law school, called it a "great idea" for minimizing disruptions such as those at U.S. military commissions' cases involving terrorism detainees at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Frakt defended Guantanamo detainees Mohammed Jawad and Ali Hamza al Bahlul in 2008 and 2009.

"The judge wants the trial, when it happens, to go smoothly, and the last thing you want is some inadvertent disclosure," Frakt said.

Bashful? Buy the Little Blue Pill Online

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) • Men who are bashful about needing help in the bedroom no longer have to visit a drugstore to buy that little blue pill.

In a first for the drug industry, Pfizer Inc. told The Associated Press that on Monday it will sell begin selling erectile dysfunction pill Viagra directly to patients on its website.

Men still will need a prescription to buy the blue pill on viagra.com, but they won't have to face a pharmacist to get it filled.

Other drugmakers likely will watch closely, and could begin selling other medicines online.

Unlikely Scribe Handwrites Good Book in 4 Years

PHILMONT, N.Y. (AP) • In the beginning, New York resident Phillip Patterson decided to write out every word in the Bible.

Now, four years after starting with Genesis, the 63year-old Hudson Valley man has copied out more than

2,400 pages and is close to completing the job. Patterson will finish up the final lines of the Book of Revelation during a ceremony at his church, St. Peter's Presbyterian in Spencertown, on May 11.

Patterson might seem like an unlikely scribe for the King James version of the Bible. The retired interior designer is neither monkish nor zealous. He goes to church but has never been particularly religious. Health issues - including AIDS and anemia have sent him to the hospital and slowed the work.

But he says he has always been curious.

This Ain't Yogurt

n Arab friend remarked to me that watching the United States debate how much to get involved in Syria reminded him of an Arab proverb: "If you



burn your tongue once eating soup, for the rest of your

life you'll blow on your yogurt."

After burning our tongues in Iraq and Afghanistan, and watching with increasing distress the aftermath of the revolutions in Libya, Tunisia and Egypt, President Barack Obama is right to be cautious about getting burned in Damascus. We've now seen enough of these Arab transitions from autocracy to draw some crucial lessons about what it takes to sustain positive change in these countries. We ignore the lessons at our peril - especially the lesson of Iraq, which everyone just wants to forget but is hugely relevant.

Syria is Iraq's twin: an artificial state that was also born after World War I inside lines drawn by imperial powers. Like Iraq, Syria's constituent communities – Sunnis, Alawite/Shiites, Kurds, Druze, Christians never volunteered to live together under agreed rules. So, like Iraq, Syria has been ruled for much of its modern history by either a colonial power or an iron-fisted autocrat. In Iraq, the hope was that once the ironfisted dictator was removed by us it would steadily transition to a multisectarian, multiparty democracy. Ditto for Egypt, Libya, Tunisia and Yemen.

But we now see the huge difference between Eastern Europe in 1989 and the Arab world in 2013. In most of Eastern Europe, the heavy lid of communist authoritarian rule was suppressing broad and deeply rooted aspirations for democracy. So when that lid was removed, most of these countries relatively quickly moved to freely elected governments -helped and inspired by the European Union.

In the Arab world, in contrast, the heavy lid of authoritarianism was suppressing sectarian, tribal, Islamist and democratic aspirations. So, when the lids were removed, all four surfaced at once. But the Islamist trend has been the most energetic -helped and inspired not by the EU but by Islamist mosques and charities in the Persian Gulf —and the democratic one has proved to be the least organized, least funded and most frail. In short, most of Eastern Europe turned out to be like Poland after communism ended and most of the Arab countries turned out to be like Yugoslavia after communism ended.

As I said, our hope and the hope of the courageous Arab democrats who started all these revolutions, was that these Arab countries would make the transition from Saddam to Jefferson without getting stuck in Khomeini or Hobbes - to go from autocracy to democracy without getting stuck in Islamism or anarchism.


To do that, though, they need either an external midwife to act as a referee between all their constituent communities (who never developed trust in one another) as they try to replace sectarianism, Islamism and tribalism with a spirit of democratic citizenship, or they need their own Nelson Mandela. That is, a homegrown figure who can lead, inspire and nav igate a democratic transition that is inclusive of all communities.

America, we all know, played that external referee role in Iraq —hugely ineptly at first. Eventually, though, the U.S. and moderate Iraqis found a way back from the brink, beat back both Sunni and Shiite violent extremists, wrote a constitution and held multiple free elections, hoping to give birth to that Iraqi Mandela. Alas, they got Nouri al-Maliki, a Shiite who, instead of building trust with other communities, is re-sowing sectarian division. Decades of zerosum politics - "I'm-weak-how-can-Icompromise/I'm-strong-why-should-I-compromise" — are hard to extinguish.

I believe that if you want to end the Syrian civil war and tilt Syria onto a democratic path, you need an international force to occupy the entire country, secure the borders, disarm all the militias and midwife a transition to democracy. It would be staggeringly costly and take a long time, with the outcome still not guaranteed. But without a homegrown Syrian leader who can be a healer, not a divider, for all its communities, my view is that anything short of an external force that rebuilds Syria from the bottom up will fail. Since there are no countries volunteering for that role (and I am certainly not nominating the U.S.), my guess is that the fighting in Syria will continue until the parties get exhausted.

Meanwhile, wherever we can identify truly "good" rebels, we should strengthen them, but we should also be redoubling our diplomatic efforts to foster a more credible opposition leadership of reconciliationminded Syrians who can reassure all of Syria's communities that they will have an equitable place at a new cabinet table. (Never underestimate how many Syrians are clinging to the tyrannical Bashar Assad out of fear that after him comes only Hobbes or Khomeini.) That way, when the combatants get exhausted and realize that there can be no victor and no vanquished - a realization that took 14 years in Lebanon's civil war next door —a fair power-sharing plan will be in place. Even then, Syrians will almost certainly need outside help to reassure everyone during the transition, but we can cross that bridge when we come to it.

Here's the one alternative that won't happen: one side decisively defeating the other and ushering in peace that way. That is a fantasy.

You know what I'm talking about: crusted heels and toes blackened by the dirt and debris picked up ambling the concrete jungle. And those gross conditions are exacerbated by hoofing it to the office or around the neighborhood in the cold or the rain. Street gravy, anyone?

There are painful consequences to wearing flip-flops. A 2008 study from Auburn University found that the shoes can lead to orthopedic problems, such as sore feet, ankles and legs. There are also the blisters, calluses and stubbed toes to consider. "They are terrible for the arches. They give you no support, and they don't protect your feet," Kathya Zinszer, an associate professor and director of community outreach at Temple University's School of Podiatric

Medicine, told CNN. "You need to make sure that you are securing the biomechanics of your foot," she said. "So if you just get what people call slides, or rubbery flipflops, it is more dangerous than trying to do something barefoot."

Look, I know I'm fighting a lonesome battle. Especially since the object I'd love to toss goes all the way back to the ancient Egyptians. But if you want to walk like an Egyptian, do so in lace-ups, heels or, if you must, any other type of sandal.



Company Nixes Idaho Cobalt Mine Amid Money Problems

BOISE • A proposed Idaho cobalt mine with government approval and support from environmental groups has nixed its project, for now, because it said the price of the metal is too low and riskaverse financiers want too much to lend it money.

Chief Executive Officer Mari-Ann Green of Formation Metals Inc. said the company's Idaho Cobalt Project aims to be ready when prices rebound and investors return.

In the meantime, however, her Vancouver, British Columbia-based company is in retrenchment mode, slashing jobs and salaries and focusing on boosting its separate business at its precious metals refinery near Kellogg in northern Idaho's Silver Valley.

Formation had aimed to

construct the nation's largest cobalt mine in the Salmon-Challis National Forest to unearth the strategic metal used in jet engines, hybrid vehicle batteries, and prosthetic knees and hips. Now, the project — and the 150 full-time jobs that were to accompany it — is limbo.

It didn't return a phone call seeking comment Monday but outlined its challenges in a statement to investors.

"The weak prices seen over the last year, coupled with enhanced adversity to risk by potential financiers in these turbulent markets has made financing costs unattractive for the further development of the ICP at this time," Green said.

Cobalt prices peaked at more than \$50 per pound in 2007. That's about the time when Formation Metals said it could yield about \$46 million of the strategic metal annually.

But since then, its price has languished, trading at around \$12 per pound recently, according to a report from the U.S. Geological Survey based on prices from the London Metal Exchange.

The mine had secured permits from the U.S. Forest Service in 2008 and that same year won kudos from environmental groups, including the Idaho Conservation League, after striking a pact over how to manage and reclaim the site.

Robert Cope, a commissioner in central Idaho's Lemhi County that had hoped to see a boost to its local economy, pointed out other mines in the region are retrenching, too, with metals prices in the cellar.

Late last year, Thompson Creek Metals Co. Inc. in neighboring Custer County suspended expansion plans at its molybdenum mine in a move that will cut 100 jobs through 2014.

"It's not like this is the only mining outfit in the world that's cutting back right now," Cope said, adding he's optimistic that Formation will reinvigorate operations as

market conditions recover. "Sometimes great ideas have

to wait for their time to come."
As of December, Formation still hoped to begin underground construction using a \$5 million cash infusion from a private investor to prepare for the work and winterize the project.

But everything was predicated on larger financing that never materialized. Even so, the company isn't abandoning the project, Green said.

"The ICP is a valuable asset and we intend to preserve it for future development once conditions improve," she said.

BOISE (AP) • An increased emphasis on conservation and education along with more efficient appliances are contributing to a decline in water use in Idaho's biggest metropolitan

The *Idaho Statesman* reports that water use in the Treasure Valley last year was down about 30,000 gallons annually for each metered customer compared to 2000 consumption. Overall, that's

about 2.5 billion gallons annually and enough water to serve an additional 29,000 customers.

Over the last decade, the state's largest water market has taken steps to reduce consumption.

Five years ago, Boise opened the WaterShed Environmental Education Center, which has raised more than \$1.2 million and educated about 100,000 people about conserving water.



on the European Tour, the most of any British player, and he was a stalwart in the Ryder Cup. The Scot played in eight of them and never lost in singles (6-0-2) while competing on six winning teams. He also was the winning captain in Wales in 2010.

He never won on the biggest stage, however. Montgomerie lost the 1994 U.S. Open and the 1995 PGA Championship in a playoff. He was second to Ernie Els again in the 1997 U.S. Open at Congressional. And the most painful of all came in 2006 at Winged Foot, when he made double bogev from the middle of the 18th fairway and finished one shot behind Geoff Ogilvy.

"That's the one that hurts," Montgomerie said of Winged Foot, noting another Hall of Fame member, Phil Mickelson, also made double bogev on the 18th. "The four or five others, really, somebody happened to beat me. The 2006 Winged Foot, I beat myself. And that's where it hurts most. So that has taken the most to recover from."

Montgomerie is the fourth player in the last four years to be

inducted into the Hall of Fame without having won a major. The others were Jumbo Ozaki, Jock Hutchison and Christy O'Connor Sr. A fifth would be Peter Alliss, who won 23 times on the European Tour, though he was recognized more for his work with the BBC.

"I've enjoyed thoroughly my exploits in major championships," Montgomerie said. "I just haven't been fortunate, or whatever it takes. I've never, ever stood up and made a winner's speech and said I was unlucky. Never. I never will. There's always a time where a bit of fortunate comes your way, whether it be for you or against your opponent at the time, and it just so happens that I just haven't been so-called fortunate to walk through the door. The door has been ajar many a time. I just haven't been able to walk through it.

"So at the same time, if

you're talking about regrets of any part of my golfing career, I have none. Absolutely none," he said. "I've done exactly what I've tried to do. I've tried 100 percent on every shot, and sometimes it works and sometimes it doesn't."

Montgomerie also received 51 percent of the vote on the International ballot.

BULLS STEAL GAME 1, TOP HEAT 93-86

MIAMI • Nate Robinson scored 27 points, Jimmy Butler added 21 points and 14 rebounds while playing every second for the third straight game, and the Chicago Bulls stunned the Miami Heat 93-86 on Monday night to take Game 1 of their Eastern Conference semifinal series.

Trailing 86-83 with 2 minutes left, the Bulls scored the final 10 points of the game to beat the Heat once again.

Joakim Noah added 13 points, Taj Gibson had 12 and Marco Belinelli added 10 for Chicago, which snapped a 27-game Miami winning streak during the regular season, and handed the Heat their first loss in their last 13 games in this one.

LeBron James scored 24 points for Miami, which got 14 from Dwyane Wade.

Game 2 is Wednesday night in Miami.

The Bulls were without Derrick Rose, as they've been all season. Kirk Hinrich was out again with a calf injury. Luol Deng isn't even expected to rejoin the team until Tuesday, after dealing with an illness apparently so severe that a spinal tap and other tests since - were needed to rule out things like meningitis.

And the group that was left gave the reigning NBA champions more than they could handle.

A pair of three-point plays by James - one of them coming when he just broke through a tackle attempt by Butler and muscled the ball to the rim anyway – gave Miami a 76-69 lead midway through the fourth quarter, the biggest deficit Chicago faced all night.

The Bulls, predictably, were undeterred. Coming off a Game 7 road win in Brooklyn two nights earlier just to get into a series with Miami, the Bulls just kept grinding. When Ray Allen made a 3-pointer to give Miami an 80-78 lead, Butler came back with one of his own to put the Bulls back on top. When the Heat went up by three after James made a free throw with 2:22 left, Belinelli connected for 3 - on asecond-effort possession to knot the game.

Then when Robinson connected on a 20-footer with 1:18 left, the Bulls had the lead and plenty of swagger.

With good reason, too.

Wade missed a 3-pointer on the next possession, Robinson drove the lane and scored with 45.5 seconds left, and suddenly the Bulls were up 90-86 — rendered virtually the entire building silent.

James drove against Butler and tried a 12-footer that missed everything, the Bulls got the rebound, Robinson made a free throw to stretch the lead to five and the stunner was complete.

James was honored before the game, with a brief oncourt ceremony to commemorate his fourth NBA MVP award.

Teamwork, passion, a continued extraordinary desire to improve, and a state of excellence that is unmatched. So thank you LeBron James, for what you bring to our league!"

James picked up the trophy - he was actually presented with it Sunday - and made a slow circle with it aloft, as cheers rained down from the sold-out stands.

"It's an unbelievable achievement, but I wouldn't be able to do it without these 14 guys here, our coaching staff and most of all you guys," James said, speaking to the crowd. "This trophy is for you. So thank you so much, and let's get ready to

And with that, the game started.

Problem was, no one was ready to go.

The Heat missed their first seven shots — maybe rust from an eight-day layoff really was a factor - and Chicago led 21-15 after an opening quarter where Nazr Mohammed, he of the 2.6point-per-game scoring average in this regular season, had as many points (two) as any Miami starter did.

A 10-0 Heat run in the second gave Miami a 25-23 lead, and the teams were tied at 37 at halftime.

The story at that point was James, who wore twice as many pairs of sneakers in the first half (two) as he had field goals (one). He had two points at the break, the lowest of his 120-game postseason career, on just 1 for 6 shooting. James started the game in sneakers that were MVP editions, then returned to his more customary style late in the first half.

He opened the second half with a 3-pointer, so the shoes were a quick fix.

But the Bulls were in for the long haul, and after James made the consecutive three-point plays to open a seven-point lead, Chicago answered with seven straight points, knotting the game at 76-all when Belinelli made a 3-pointer with just under 5 minutes left.

Momentum belonged to Chicago, and soon, so did the game.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"New opinions are always suspected, and usually opposed, without any other reason but because they are not already common." — John Locke

In today's deal, the three little pigs all found their way to a sixheart slam on a top spade lead from West. The pig who made his house out of straw won in dummy, cashed the heart ace, then went to the diamond ace and took a heart finesse. West won his heart queen to play back a spade, forcing declarer to ruff in dummy. Now, with clubs not breaking, declarer could no longer bring home 12 tricks, whether he drew the last trump or not.

By contrast, the little pig who made his house out of wood cashed the ace and king of hearts, and when they split, he snorted smugly to himself and turned his attention to clubs. Even though West could ruff away one of his winners, he was safe.

In the post-mortem, the pigs were arguing about whose line was best. The third little pig, who made his house out of stone, pointed out that he had found a line that guarded against either a 4-1 break in hearts or clubs (or both) and lost only if West had the singleton heart queen. He had won the opening lead and taken an immediate trump finesse.

When it lost, he ruffed the spade return, drew trumps, and set up the clubs with the diamond ace as an entry. Had the heart jack held, the heart ace and king would have followed, and then he could have played on clubs, with two side entries to dummy available had he needed them.

be able to muddle back to hearts

one way or another.






