

JEROME • Volunteers spent Saturday cleaning up public land on the north rim of the Snake River Canyon for the 14th annual cleanup day.

As he gripped a trash grabber, Robert Pierce used the pole to pick up shotgun shells left behind on the north rim of the Snake River Canyon.

He placed each one into a small white bucket.

"I got most of them," he said, looking back at the area he'd cleaned up. "It looks nicer."

His truck was parked David Freiberg, outdoor recreation nearby and the surrounding desert landscape was quiet as Pierce worked.

Nearby, another volunteer arrived at the area with a trash bag and started to pick up plastic water bottles.

Pierce was among more than 70 volunteers who spent hours Saturday picking up trash.

Bureau of Land Management staff joined several groups — including the Southern Idaho Off-Road Association, Magic Valley ATV Riders, Snake River

Canyon Krawlers, Back Country Horsemen and geocachers.

Greg Moore, vice president of the Southern Idaho Off-Road Association, said there were also community members who came out to volunteer.

Just north of the I.B. Perrine Bridge in Jerome County, some volunteers drove their trucks out to collect garbage in the area. Others rode ATVs and pulled small flatbed trailers behind them.

One Dead after I-84 Rollover

WENDELL • Eighteen-year-old Sonya Alania of Gooding died early Saturday evening after her car rolled off the westbound lane of I-84 near Wendell.

According to a report from the Idaho State Police, Alania was driving a 2004 Chevrolet Cavalier when her vehicle drove off the right shoulder of the highway at milepost 154 and rolled. Police responded to the incident around 5:50 p.m. and determined that Alania died after being partially ejected from her car. Police say the young woman was not wearing a seatbelt.

The right lane of I-84 was blocked from around 6:30 to 9:30 Saturday night. All lanes of traffic are now open.

Urgent Care in Wendell Now an Option Thanks to New Clinic

WENDELL • Up until a week ago, Wendell area residents looking for an urgent care clinic had to take a drive out of town.

Now, there's an option in Magic Valley's hub city.

Physician assistant Gary Myers and his wife Karen Myers, a licensed practical nurse, have opened Right Choice Urgent Care and Family Medicine.

The clinic — located on West Main Street - opened Monday, May 6. Walk-in patients are welcome and community members can also make an appointment.

Gary Myers said he and Karen were ready to take the step of opening their

Before, patients in Wendell and the surrounding small towns who were looking for an urgent care clinic would have to drive to Twin Falls. The nearest hospitals are North Canyon Medical Center in Gooding or St. Luke's Jerome.

The Myers' clinic focuses on urgent care and family medicine, but they're ready to help patients with other needs as well.

"Whoever walks through those doors we'll treat," Gary Myers said.

Gary Myers said he anticipates there will be patients seeking urgent care who aren't able to get an appointment right away at the Wendell Family Health Center.

Physician assistants can have their own clinics, but must work under the supervision of a medical doctor.

Gary Myers said his supervising physician will review 10 percent of patient charts and conduct an on-site visit once a month. He also has an alternate supervisor.

The physician will be accessible on the phone for any questions, he said, and he knows doctors at St. Luke's Jerome he'd be comfortable asking for advice.

In addition, there's protocol for getting a patient the care they need when their condition is out of his scope of practice.

Medical Roots

Gary Myers, 40, said he plans to spend the rest of his career in Wendell. It's fitting since it's where he began his time as a physician assistant.

After graduating from PA school in 2001, Gary Myers had to find a rural, underserved area to work in to fulfill a two-year obligation as a National Health

Service Corps scholar.

He began his career in Wendell working as a physician assistant for Dr. Mark Spencer.

When Spencer moved to Gooding, Gary continued working for St. Benedicts Wendell Family Clinic in a new building.

It's the same building where Right Choice Urgent Care and Family Medicine is now located.

Gary worked there for about four years. When he started, he was seeing five to seven patients per day.

By the time he left, that number had grown to 18-20, he said. Later, St. Benedicts

Family Medical Center closed the Wendell clinic in 2010. Patients were given the

opportunity to pick up their records or allow them to be transferred to the Jerome Family Clinic. Then, in October 2011,

St. Benedicts Family Medical Center in Jerome merged with St. Luke's. For more than two years,

the Wendell clinic building was vacant.

Once they decided to open their own practice, Gary Myers and Karen Myers spent four months getting the building ready and making preparations to open.

It meant frequent trips back and forth between Wendell and Shelley.

Gary Myers has been a physician assistant for 12 years, while Karen Myers has been a licensed practical nurse for more than 30 years.

Gary Myers described Wendell as an old-fashioned town where residents are kind, genuine and everyone knows other.

He said many people like to have a rapport with their health care provider and want to see the same person they trust every time.

"Patients really like that," Gary Myers said.



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Resounding Election Win for Pakistan's Sharif

LAHORE, Pakistan • Former Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif looked poised Sunday to return to office with a resounding election victory — a mandate that could make it easier to tackle the country's daunting problems, including growing power outages, weak economic growth and shaky government finances.

Questions remain, however, about Sharif's stance on another key issue: violent Islamic extremism. Critics have accused his party of being soft on radicals because it hasn't cracked down on militant groups in its stronghold of Punjab province.

That could be a concern for the United States, which has pushed Pakistan for years to take stronger action against a variety of Islamic militant groups, especially fighters staging cross-border attacks against American troops in Afghanistan.

As unofficial returns rolled in Sunday, a day after the election, state TV estimates put Sharif close to the majority in the national assembly needed to govern outright for the next five years. Even if he falls short of that threshold, independent candidates almost certain to swing in Sharif's favor would give his Pakistan Muslim League-N party a ruling majority.

That would put the 63-year-old Sharif in a much stronger position than the outgoing Pakistan People's Party, which ruled for five years with a weak coalition that was often on the verge of collapse.

Pakistan suffers from a growing energy crisis, with some areas experiencing power outages for up to 18 hours a day. That has seriously hurt the economy, pushing growth below 4 percent a year. The country needs a growth rate of twice that to provide jobs for its expanding population of 180 million.

19 New Orleans Shooting Victims Include 2 Kids

NEW ORLEANS • Gunmen opened fire on people marching in a neighborhood Mother's Day parade in New Orleans on Sunday, wounding at least 19.

The shooting — described by the FBI as a flare-up of street violence - shattered the festive mood surrounding the parade that drew hundreds of people to the 7th Ward neighborhood of modest row houses not far from the French Quarter. Cell phone video taken in the aftermath of the shooting shows victims lying on the ground, blood on the pavement and others bending over to comfort

At least three of the victims were seriously wounded. Of the rest, many were grazed and authorities said that overall most wounds were not life threatening. No deaths were reported.

The victims included 10 men, seven women, a boy and a girl. The children, both 10 years old, were grazed and in good condition.

Mayor Mitch Landrieu urged witnesses to come forward with information during a news conference Sunday night at a hospital where gunshot victims were taken.

"These kinds of incidents will not go unanswered. Somebody knows something. The way to stop this violence is for you all to help," he said.

Mary Beth Romig, a spokeswoman for the FBI in New Orleans, said federal investigators have no indication that the shooting was an act of terrorism.

Veteran Diplomat Says Benghazi Review Was Thorough, Defends Report amid GOP Inquiry

WASHINGTON • The seasoned diplomat who penned a highly critical report on security at a U.S. outpost in Benghazi, Libya, defended his scathing assessment but absolved then-Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton. "We knew where the responsibility rested," Thomas Pickering said Sunday.

"They've tried to point a finger at people more senior than where we found the decisions were made," Pickering, whose career spans four decades, said of Clinton's critics.

The Accountability Review Board, which Pickering headed with retired Adm. Mike Mullen, the former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, did not question Clinton at length about the attacks but concluded last December that the decisions about the consulate were made well below the secretary's level.

Pickering and Mullen's blistering report found that "systematic failures and leadership and management deficiencies at senior levels" of the State Department meant that security was "inadequate for Benghazi and grossly inadequate to deal with the attack that took place."

Pickering's defense of his panel's conclusions, however, failed to placate Republicans who have called for creation of a special select congressional committee to investigate the Sept. 11, 2012, assault on the U.S. diplomatic mission that killed four Americans, including U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens.

Just How Did Howard Dean Do in Idaho?

ontrary to many expectations, Idaho has a good many Democrats, more than a lot of people suspect. More than 200,000 Idahoans voted for Barack



Obama for president last year, and more than 200,000 votes in the two U.S. House races in the state went for the Democratic candidates.

Of course — and no minor point — there were about twice as many votes cast for the Republicans in those races, so in Idaho the Democrats lost. Still, the D numbers are something with which to conjure.

I bore that in mind last week a report from Lou Jacobson, a writer on politics for Governing magazine who specializes on politics not on the federal level but in the states. His provocative question: Did the Howard Dean 50-state strategy actually do any good for Democrats? Short answer: He says it did. Idaho relevance: Democrats should pay attention and take heart; and it could matter to Republicans in many places too.

The longer answer, explaining jargon and party history ...

During his tenure as national Democratic chair from 2005 to 2009, former Vermont Governor Dean launched an ambitious and, to many professional pols in both parties impractical, effort called the "50-state strategy." The norm in politics is to tightly target one's efforts in swing areas, and secondarily build up support in the base — and let slide the areas in strong opposition. For national Democrats, that means forgetting about places like Idaho, Wyoming, Oklahoma, Nebraska ... you probably know the list. (Republicans have their opposing list, too.)

Dean thought this was all wrong, that the national party could, by carefully planting enough seed money and building organization in all 50 states, change the political atmosphere in even the toughest places — maybe not turning red states blue, but shifting them to less deeply red, building a bench of candidates at local levels who eventually could run for, and maybe win, higher office.

He got blasted for the proposal; pundit Paul Begala famously said (he eventually apologized) Dean would be "hiring a bunch of staff people to wander around Utah and Mississippi and pick their nose."

But Dean pushed his plan through in his four years in the chair. And what happened? Jacobson, while noting that 2006 and 2008 were good Democratic years for reasons beyond party organization, wrote, "the patterns are suggestive. In the 20 states we looked at — those that have voted solidly Republican in recent presidential races — Democratic candidates chalked up modest successes, despite the difficult political terrain. Then, after the project stopped, Democratic success rates cratered."

He also concluded this: "One divide that's apparent in the data is between the Great Plains and the West on the one hand, and the South on the other. To the extent that the 50-state strategy worked, it did so in the small-to-medium states in the western half of the U.S. By contrast, the effort did little, if anything, to stem the long-term shift in the South toward the GOP. Perhaps that's because the libertarian leanings of the Great Plains and the West are more compatible with Democratic social positions than is the Christian brand of conservatism that is influential in the South."

That means serious efforts at party organizations in Idaho can, to some extent at least, yield results.

Whether Idaho Democrats manage that is an open question. But it is something they could do, suggesting that their cause, while difficult, is not beyond hope.

I Violated Speeding Law That Doesn't Exist

got a speeding ticket the other day. I was driving between meetings in Kootenai County when a state police officer pulled me over. But the ticket made me wonder. I wondered why the state of Idaho has a law that fines people \$155 for speeding. It turns out, it doesn't; I broke a law that doesn't exist. More on that in a moment.

I think a lot about the impact of Idaho law on the working poor. My job isn't just to promote low taxes, less government and less regulation; these are items typically found in the vernacular of the people from "our" side. No, we must think more about whether a law serves to unfairly inhibit or punish people in the pursuit of happiness and the enjoyment of the fruits of their labor.

For me, a \$155 speeding ticket, while annoying, isn't devastating. Sure, I will cut something out of my budget to pay the fine, but that item won't be food for my kids or electricity to heat my home. For others, sadly, that would

be the case. The gas station attendant earning minimum wage will lose more than two days of income before taxes.

Now back to the fine for a law that doesn't exist. My speeding ticket says I violated Idaho Code 49-654(2)(E), excessive speeding, for doing 73 in a 55 zone. Turns out there is no such statute. The "E" on the ticket is the state police's own unique way of distinguishing between regular speeding and really, really fast speeding. That's because, apart from speeding in a work zone and speeding in a school zone, there is only one kind of speeding in Idaho law, whether you are going 5 miles an hour too fast or 30. The Legislature made no distinction.

The Supreme Court, however, in 1991 said there is a difference between driving too fast and really, really driving too fast. The difference between the former and the latter is 15 miles an hour. Today, the fine for speeding is \$90, but past the 15 miles an hour mark, it is \$155.

A couple of observations are worth making:

First, the Legislature itself should set the penalty for speeding. Instead, lawmakers, in 1988, decided that the state Supreme Court should figure that stuff out. It gave the court no parameters for doing so, and thus, my crime of speeding could as easily be \$355 as it is \$155. This could probably be argued to be an unconstitutional delegation of the Legislature's authority. But more importantly, when set by the Legislature, the questions I raised previously ("Is this penalty unduly punitive on portions of our population?") can be properly considered.

Second, in our Republic, there is a basic concept that says only the Legislature should make law; the court should adjudicate that law.

In the case of Idaho's speeding regulations, the Supreme Court has assumed the role of a separate branch of government. Is it good policy? I don't know.

Perhaps a better policy is one that, for example, distinguishes between speeding at night and speeding in the day, speeding in a residential area or speeding on a highway. But this is something that should be worked out in the painstaking lawmaking process of the Legislature, with hearings in front of the House and the Senate, debate in the two chambers of elected officials and the consideration of the governor.

Few regulations impact everyday Idahoans as much as the rules of the road. If you drive, you run the risk of running afoul of laws, both real and imagined. Lawmakers and the court would do well to get this portion of the law correct.
